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### SUMMARY OF RECOMMENDATIONS

The Centrally sponsored schemes should be defined as the schemes which are funded directly by Central Ministries/Departments and implemented by States or their agencies, irrespective of their pattern of financing, unless they fall under the Centre's sphere of responsibility i.e., the Union List.

- 2. The total number of Centrally sponsored schemes under implementation as on 1.4.1985 is 262. Excluding 24 schemes being implemented by autonomous bodies, the Group recommended the transfer of 113 schemes involving a Seventh Plan outlay of Rs.1260.72 crores to the States. 125 schemes with a Seventh Plan outlay of Rs.14,104.17 crores are to be retained. [para 21 Table]
- 3. The transfer should be effective from the Eighth Plan.

- 4. If transfer is desired from an earlier date, it could be from 1.4.88 for the remaining 2 years of the Plan. The up-dated figure of Rs.800 crores available for 113 schemes to be transferred could be distributed to the States according to the Modified Gadgil Formula. [para 27]
- 5. Central assistance to the States in respect of transferred schemes should be governed by the formula applicable for Central assistance to State Plans in the Eighth Plan period. The Special Category States should, however, continue to enjoy the special dispensation as here-to-fore.

- 6. The schemes deleted/transferred to States should not be re-introduced in any other manner, nor should other schemes expand to take their place. In other words, the transfer should result in proportionate reduction in the Central expenditure and net addition to the resources being transferred to the States.

- 7. The Central Ministries should thoroughly look into the schemes being retained and if any scheme is likely to reach a stage where any component of it is likely to be transferred to the maintenance phase, thereby increasing the non-Plan liability of the States, the Ninth Finance Commission should be notified of the same well in time.

- 8. All the retained schemes should be critically examined and evaluated with regard to their thrust and content before their inclusion in the Eighth Plan. This examination should be carried out by the administrative Ministries/Departments in Consultation with the Ministry of Finance and the Planning Commission.

- 9. States should have flexibility in the matter of implementation of schemes to enable them to achieve the objective of the scheme in a cost effective manner keeping in view the special conditions and circumstances of each State. [para 25]

- 10. There should be no mid-Plan introduction of schemes. In other words, all the schemes to be implemented in a given Plan period should have been included in the Five-Year Plan. In exceptional cases, new schemes may be introduced to meet any emergent situation or to give effect to a new thrust in national policy (e.g., new Education policy) but these should, as far as possible, be 100% Centrally funded.

- 11. There should be prior consultation with the States, not sectoral but with Finance and Planning Departments, before introduction of new schemes and financial arrangements should be carefully worked out if the schemes are not 100% Centrally funded. In order that a broad view may be taken instead of a sectoral one by a particular Ministry, all new schemes should be approved by the full Planning Commission. [para 16]
- 12. The Group felt that while it is necessary to limit Centrally sponsored schemes both in terms of number and financial outlays, it may not be practical to lay down any ceiling. A rigourous procedure of fulfilling the criteria proposed by the NDC Committee, prior consultation with the States and approval of the full Planning Commission should however, ensure that the propensity for proliferation of schemes is kept in check.

- 13. The Central assistance to the States in the 8th Plan, by whatever formula it is determined, should take into account the additional requirements on account of the transferred schemes in case the transfer takes effect from the Eighth Plan. [para 35]

## REPORT OF THE GROUP OF OFFICIALS SET UP BY THE COMMITTEE OF NDC TO EXAMINE THE CENTRALLY SPONSORED SCHEMES

### Background

Until the Fourth Five Year Plan, Central assistance to States for implementation of Plan programmes within. the States' jurisdiction was given in the form of scheme-wise allocation of funds. This resulted in rigidities and inefficiencies in the system and inequitable distribution of Central assistance. The matter was raised in several meetings of NDC. On the basis of discussions in NDC, the concept of block assistance for State Plans was subsequently introduced.

- 2. However, it was felt by the Central Ministries and the Planning Commission that the system of scheme-wise assistance should be continued for a limited number of schemes. These schemes were classified as Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS). The NDC, while agreeing to the concept of CSS, suggested limiting the total monetary value of CSS to 1/6th or 1/7th of the quantum of Central assistance to State Plans.
- 3. Gradually, this financial limit came to be exceeded. Also, the States felt that while some schemes were drawn up too rigidly, others could be designed and implemented better as parts of State Plans. Considering the criticism voiced by the States in the NDC, at the time of the consideration of the 1978-83 Plan, after a Working Group had considered the matter, 72 CSS were transferred to the State Sector as part of the State Plan schemes. The resultant savings of about Rs.2,000 crores were given to the States as additional block assistance on a special formula known as the Income Adjusted Total Population Formula (IATP).
- 4. The Sixth Plan again witnessed an enlargement of CSS in terms of both numbers and the quantum of assistance for financing such schemes. At the time of the discussion of the Approach to the Seventh Plan in July 1984, since some of the Chief Ministers suggested a closer examination of the issues arising in connection with the operation of CSS accounting for a large transfer of funds, an Expert Group was set up.

### NDC Committee

5. The Expert Group under the Chairmanship of Shri K.Ramamurti went into various issues relating to CSS particularly the need for revision of ceiling in regard to total assistance for CSS, and for reducing the number and/coverage of schemes as well as re-examination of criteria

for introducing a CSS. The NDC, while considering the Ramamufti Report at its meeting held on the 8th and the 9th of November, 1985, resolved that a committee of NDC should be set up to examine the various issues raised in the Report and report back to NDC. Accordingly, a NDC committee under the Chairmanship of Shri P. V. Narasimha Rao, Minister of Human Resource Development was set up. The constitution and the terms of reference of the Committee are at Appendix I.

- 6. The terms and reference of the Committee included:
  - a) Review of the criteria for taking up new Centrally Sponsored Schemes;
  - b) review of the ceiling of 1/6th or 1/7th of Central Plan assistance for CSS keeping in view the Plan objectives of poverty alleviation and employment generation etc.;
  - c) consultation mechanism for starting new CSS;
  - d) examination of CSS under implementaion with a view to drop or transfer of some of them with the modalities of transfer of the funds involved; and
  - e) suggesting a periodical review mechanism of transferred schemes.
- 7. The first meeting of the NDC Committee held on November 3, 1986 considered a note prepared by the Planning Commission, which posed the following major issues for consideration:
  - i) whether criteria suggested by Ramamurti Committee should be modified:
  - ii) should there be a ceiling on the amount of funds to be transferred via., CSS and if so what should be its limit.
  - iii) in applying the ceiling how to proceed in reducing the number and coverage of the existing schemes.

### The Criteria

- 8. In discussing the criteria suggested by the Ramamurti Committee it was felt that the criteria suggested by Ramamurti Committee (Appendix III) seemed to be too broad and also the Committee did not specifically mention the fulfilment of an important national objective as one of the criteria. Accordingly, the NDC Committee adopted the following criteria:
  - a) The fulfilment of an important national objective such as poverty alleviation or achievement of minimum standards in education; or

- b) The programme has a regional or inter-State character; or
- c) The programme or scheme should be in the nature of a pace setter or should relate to demonstration, survey or research.
- 9. The Ramamurti Committee had also suggested that some programmes of national importance should be put into sub plans/within State Plans. The Committee found that there was not much advantage in this, for if outlays were earmarked and if Central assistance to the sub-plans was given on the same basis as for CSS, in practice, there would be no difference between the sub-plan and the CSS

### Ceiling and Future Procedure

- 10. Applying the above criteria and going by an effective ceiling of around one-third of block assistance, the Committee considered the question of examining which projects or programmes should be taken out of CSS and transferred to the State Plans along with associated funds.
- 11. Block assistance to the States for the Seventh Plan is estimated at Rs. 23,500 crores and on one-third basis the Central outlay of CSS would come to Rs. 8000 crores. Since the estimated Central outlay on CSS now provided for in the Seventh Plan is around Rs. 18,000 crores, the one-third limit would have meant that schemes involving Central outlay of Rs. 10,000 crores would have to be transferred to the States. This was not found to be feasible and it was felt that during the Seventh Plan a workable alternative would be to continue the anti-poverty programmes, rural water supply, family welfare and programmes intended to promote human resource development and sustained improvement in the quality of life like education, which were of national importance. Most of the Centrally Sponsored Schemes other than schemes of high national importance mentioned above could be considered for transfer.

### Group of Officials

12. The NDC Committee decided to constitute a Group of Officials to work out the details regarding the retention of CSS, mode of transfer of CSS to State Plans, allocation of outlays for the schemes proposed to be transferred etc. The Group headed by Secretary, Planning Commission consisted of 7 Union Secretaries of main Ministries concerned with CSS and Chief Secretaries of 11 State Governments representing the States whose Chief Ministers were members of the NDC Committee. Adviser, Plan Coordination of the Planning Commission was its convenor. The composition and terms of reference of the Group are at Appendix II. The Group was

required to examine the CSS in detail keeping in view the criteria approved by the NDC Committee and in particular to:

- i) List all the Centrally Sponsored Schemes that were under implementation on 1.4.1985 and to consider which of these schemes need to be continued, or dropped, or transferred to the State Governments for implementation, and for those schemes to be transferred, the modalities of transfer, including the formula that would govern the transfer to individual States, of the funds involved.
- ii) Suggest the modalities between the Centre and States that should be operative when the question of sanctioning new Centrally sponsored schemes is mooted by any Union Ministry or State Government.
- iii) Suggest a periodical review mechanism of transferred schemes, so that achievement of national Plan objectives involved in the schemes is watched jointly by the Centre and the States.
- 13. The group met four times on 28th January, 1987; 18th February, 1987; 4th April, 1987; and 29th April, 1987. The third meeting was addressed by Minister of HRD, Chairman of the NDC Committee.

### Definition of Centrally Sponsored Schemes:

The first task before the Group was to define CSS. It noted that this problem had defied solution in the past and even Ramamurti Committee had recognised that there were many Central sector schemes, which were in the nature of Centrally sponsored schemes. The Group felt that the definition of CSS should cover all schemes fully or partially funded by the Centre and implemented by the States or State agencies except those which fell in the Centre's sphere of responsibility i.e., in the Union List. In this connection it was pointed out that the list of 264 (referred to in para 19 ibid) included schemes funded by autonomous bodies like ICAR, NCERT, NCDC, UGC, NCUI, etc. While on the one hand, these agencies in certain cases have non-budgetary sources of funds and internal generation, etc., on the other, in many cases their funds were not routed through the State Governments and were provided direct to the beneficiary institutions. A further refinement of the above definition was therefore, found to be necessary. It was finally agreed that for the purpose of the work of the Group, only those schemes which were funded directly by Central Ministries/Departments and implemented by States or their agencies irrespective of their pattern of financing (unless they fell under the

Centre's sphere of responsibility) would be treated as Centrally sponsored.

15. Secretary, Planning Commission, as the Chairman of the Group accepted the suggestion of the Chief Secretaries that the Planning Commission should carry out an internal examination of the schemes funded by the autonomous bodies and implemented either by the States or their agencies or other public institutions in the States including Universities and other educational institutions with a view to re-assessing their usefulness. This exercise covering 24 schemes with an outlay of Rs. 392.02 crores would be independent of the task assigned to the Group.

### Modalities of introduction of new Centrally Sponsored Schemes:

16. There was unanimity on the need for consultation with the States, more particularly when new schemes were introduced during the middle of the Plan, which were not 100% Centrally funded. It was felt that in certain cases consultation was altogether wanting, while in some others it was of a sectoral nature with the concerned officers of the State Govern-The Group was of the view that wherever State's financial participation was visualised, consultation should be with the Finance and Planning Departments rather than sectorally. The Group was of the view that normally all schemes to be implemented during a given Plan should have been approved at the stage of formulation of the Plan. However, in case of very important Centrally sponsored schemes sought to be introduced during the mid-Plan period, and such cases should be rare prior consultation with the State Governments, particularly in regard to financial arrangements was necessary unless the scheme was 100% Centrally funded. In order that a broader view instead of a purely narrow, sectoral one may be taken, the Group suggested that every new scheme to be introduced as CSS should be approved by the full Planning Commission.

### Concept of Transfer

17. The Group deliberated on the concept of transfer. If the transfer to the State Plans was accompanied by earmakring, the overall expenditure was not reduced except that the Centre's role in the matter of administrative sanctions and release of funds diminished. Earmarking would still entail the responsibility of monitoring on the part of the Central Ministries. Andhra Pradesh view was that in the case of the transfer

Ministries for administration of the schemes would be reduced and there would be the consequent advantage of economy in expenditure. If, however, transfer was accompanied by complete flexibility to the States to continue, modify, reduce or altogether drop the scheme, then it amounted to deletion, as far as the Central Government was concerned. In that event, what would happen to the resources meant for such schemes. This point was discussed by the Group. The Chief Secretaries, who participated in the discussion, expressed different views. The consensus was to classify the CSS into three categories.

- i) Schemes to be retained as CSS in the light of the criteria approved by the NDC Committee, which would cover even the smaller schemes in terms of outlay or coverage as these were in the nature of pace-setter or related to demonstration, survey or research. An example of this would be the schemes of collection of statistics, which in spite of their small size in terms of outlay, were of considerable national importance.
- ii) schemes to be transferred to State Plans with earmarking accompanied by the requisite freedom to the States about the staffing pattern, the manner of implementation etc. within the framework of overall objectives.
- iii) schemes transferred to the States whose continuance, modification or dropping would be left solely to the States discretion.

### Listing of CSS and recommendations for their retention/deletion/transfer:

18. One of the more important tasks of the Group was to list all the CSS that were under implementation on 1.4.1985 i.e., at the commencement of the Seventh Plan (1985-90) and to consider which of these needed to be continued, dropped or transferred to the State Plans. It was a formidable task both because there had been a three-fold increase in their number and coverage since the last review in 1979 and also because no agreed and final list was available for want of an agreed definition. Whether a particular scheme was Central Sector or Centrally sponsored was largely a matter of nomenclature in many cases and the Finance Ministry had also been accepting for budgetary purposes of the Union the classification proposed by the administrative Ministries.

- 19. A list of 255 Centrally sponsored schemes consisting of 182 continuing schemes and 73 new schemes started/to be started in the Seventh Plan had been furnished to the NDC Committee .Prior to the first meeting of the Group, the 21 Ministries/Departments administering the schemes were asked to review their lists furnished earlier to the Planning Commission and check their correctness. In the meanwhile, the Sectoral Divisions of the Planning Commission were also asked to scrutinise these lists. On the basis of the information available with them, the Sectoral Divisions supplemented certain schemes to the lists of the Union Ministries. Thus, a total list of 278 CSS was presented to the Group in its first meeting. As many as 8 Ministries/Departments had suggested additions, deletion, merger, etc., in respect of the schemes concerning them. These suggestions were discussed in the first meeting of the Group and a list of 264 schemes evolved.
- 20. It was at this stage that the Group evolved a final definition of Centrally sponsored schemes and also decided to exclude, for the purpose of its work, the schemes funded by autonomous bodies as mentioned in para 14 ibid. In this context, the Group felt that Area Development schemes were in the nature of Special Central assistance to State Plans and need not be considered as CSS. The North Eastern Council, the Tribal Area Plan and the Border Area Development Programme were already omitted and the Group decided to exclude also the Hill Area Development Programme. Western Ghat Development Programme and Dacoity-Prone Areas Programme. Thus, including the above 3 area development schemes a total of 43 schemes consisting of 20 Central Sector Schemes, 20 autonomous bodies schemes (NCDC - 3, Central Silk Board - 4, ICAR - 8, Coir Board - 1 and Horticulture Board - 4) were deleted from the list of 264. Four schemes were dropped as the concerened Ministries indicated that they would not be taken up for implementation. Further, 14 schemes under Inland Water Transport were clubbed into 2 schemes and two schemes under Textiles were clubbed together while four schemes under Environment. Forests and Wild Life were merged into 2. Thus the list of 264 schemes stood reduced to 202. This excludes the scheme of Rural low cost sanitation under Rural Development, which had been deleted earlier and retained in a subsequent meeting (total number 203).
- During the discussion, certain Chief Secretaries had pointed out omissions in the list of 264. All the member States were requested to forward the details. Seven out of 11 Chief Secretaries furnished the lists which were circulated to the Central Ministries and Sectoral Divisions of the Planning Commission. Out of more than 200 schemes indicat-

ed by the States as omissions, a large number were found to be either Central Sector schemes or components of on-going Centrally sponsored schemes or schemes which were considered at the time of the formulation of the Seventh Plan but not finally included. As a result of consultations with the Ministries and Sectoral Divisions, 37 schemes were found fit for inclusion in the list of CSS. This list of 37 schemes was further scrutinised, as a result of which three schemes relating to Minikit Programme were clubbed into one, one scheme each was identified as autonomous body Scheme and Central sector schemes, leaving a balance of 33 schemes. The total of Centrally sponsored schemes thus came to 236 excluding 21 autonomous bodies schemes. As mentioned earlier (para 19) while reviewing the initial list of 278 CSS, the Group had considered certain schemes for dropping/identified as autonomous bodies' schemes etc. Out of these, 2 schemes under Department of Food were added to the list of CSS, while 3 schemes were identified as autonomous bodies schemes. They are as follows:

After detailed, scheme by scheme, examination the Group decided to retain 125 Schemes including the revived scheme 'Rural Low Cost Sanitation' and transfer 113 schemes, making a total of 238 schemes as below:-

- 22. While examining the schemes, the Group felt that the schemes of identical nature and content should be clubbed together or merged in order to prevent the proliferation of CSS and for more effective implementation. Schemes with smaller outlays (except those of national importance) should be deleted as the cost of administration of such schemes exceed the benefits. In this connection, the Group also examined the possibillity of categorising schemes in terms of the Seventh Plan outlay and deleting those with an outlay below Rs. 25 crores (154 schemes). Since the number of such schemes was quite large (58 schemes upto Rs. 2.5 crores; 35 schemes between Rs. 2.5 and 5 crores; 27 schemes between Rs. 5 to 10 crores; 13 schemes between Rs. 10 and Rs. 15 crores and 21 schemes between Rs. 15 and 25 crores) the Group decided on a case by case examination.
- 23. The Group was conscious that for all its efforts it was not able to observe 1/6th or 1/3rd of the Central assistance to States norm and that the total Seventh Plan outlay on the schemes to be transferred comes to Rs. 1260.72 crores against a total of Rs. 15364.89 crores for all the schemes. This was because of the limitation of retaining schemes of national importance and those intended to promote the human resource development or improve the quality of life such as, family welfare, anti-poverty programme, new Education policy, etc.

Excludes balance outlay available for 2 schemes under Agriculture & Cooperation and one scheme under Department of Food.

- 24. The Group observed that the Family Welfare Programme, which was the single biggest scheme accounting for Seventh Plan outlay of Rs. 3,256 crores should be thoroughly reviewed. While the importance of the programme was recognised, the Group felt that it was high time to evaluate the efficiency of the strategy adopted so far. A criticism was also voiced that the programme carries an overhang of the maintenance of a large number of PHCs and medical institutions, which did not leave enough money for acceptors. It was also felt that a similar exercise in respect of many other schemes would amply reward the efforts in terms of cost saving and promoting efficiency. The Group was of the view that even the schemes recommended to be retained should be critically examined and evaluated with reference to their objectives, content and benefits obtained and the priority they deserve before their inclusion in the Light Plan. This examinations should be carried out by the administrative Ministries/Departments in consultation with the Ministry of Finance and the Planning Commission.
- 25. The Group recognised the need for flexibility to the States in the staffing pattern and the manner of implementation of schemes within the framework of overall objectives as it was futile and wasteful to enforce uniformity in a vast country like India with varied agro-climatic and socioeconomic conditions.
- 26. The Group noted that new Centrally sponsored schemes could be introduced during the remainder of the Seventh Plan to give effect to the new Education Policy approved by the N.D.C.

### Time-table for Transfer:

27. Except for Andhra Pradesh and Tamil Nadu all the other Chief Secretaries agreed that considering the practical difficutlies of making major changes from the 4th year of the Plan, the transfer of Centrally sponsored schemes should be effected from the Eighth Plan. This much lead time was also required to enable the States to make the necessary organisational arrangements by way of re-deployment of staff in respect of transferred schemes which are not to be implemented or implemented in a modified form. The view of Andhra Pradesh was that this much lead time is not necessary and that it is possible and essential to transfer the schemes earlier. The States were, however, anxious that the fall out of the transferred schemes should be made known to the Ninth Finance Commission. It was, however, noted that since the NDC was likely to take a view on this matter around September, 1987, there was no risk of the Ninth Finance Commission not taking the implications of transfer for the States into account.

If mid Plan transfer of schemes is desired, the earliest it could be done would be from the year 1988-89. The balance amount of Rs. 665.35 crores available for 1988-90 in respect of 113 schemes proposed to be transferred is at 1984-85 prices. After up-dating it to a round figure of Rs. 800 crores in the light of the inflation/assumed inflation, this amount could be available for distribution to States in the last 2 years of the Plan. The Group favoured the Modified Gadgil Formula for distribution of these resources.

### Formula for Resource Distribution:

- The Group began by reviewing the basis for resource transfer pur-28. suant to the NDC decision on February 24-25, 1979 to transfer to States 72 schemes involving an outlay of Rs. 2000 crores during the years It was noted that the amount was distributed among the 14 nonspecial category States on the basis of the Income Adjusted Total Population (IATP) of each State i.e., total population of each State multiplied by the inverse of per capita income. At this meeting of the NDC, the then Prime Minister had also assured the special category States that funds would be made available to them outside the figure of Rs. 2000 crores for their share in the Centrally sponsored schemes. Having regard to the policy that in the case of special category States, the entire difference between their approved Plan outlay and their own resources was being met by Central assistance, it was decided by the Planning Commission to give Central assistance to the States enabling them to meet the extra expenditure that they would have to incur. The exercise carried out in this context indicated that an outlay of Rs. 150 crores would have to be transferred to the 8 special category States for the four year period (1979-83) and the respective shares of these & States were allocated out of this amount with corresponding increase in their Plan outlay.
- 29. The Group had an exercise carried out by the Planning Commission for the distribution of a notional sum of Rs. 1000 crores on the basis of IATP, the Modified Gadgil Formula and the Distance from Per Capita Income formula used by the Sixth and the Eight Finance Commission for the distribution of part of the States' share in the net proceeds of the excise duty. The methodology underlying the principle is to measure the distance as represented by the difference between the per capita income of a given State from: that of the State which has the highest per capita income. The difference is multiplied by the population to obtain the product for each State in proportion to which the respective shares are worked out. The Eighth Finance Commission had observed in this correction.

that if the distance principle was adopted without any modification, the State having the highest per capita income would not be entitled to any share, Accordingly, a special device was adopted whereby in the case of lunjab, which had the highest per captia income, a notional income distance equal to the distance of the average per capita income of Punjab from that of haryana, which had the second highest per capita income was adopted for Punjab. The Group also took note of the suggestions of Maharashtra Government for the distribution of 20% of the assistance to he States on per capita income and 10% on tax efforts in the Modified Gadgil formula proposing that for the purpose of the component based on SDP, the distance of the percapita SDP of a State from twice the average of the States should be considered and that for the purpose of the tax effort, the State's population should also be taken into account. Group recommended that since the proposal was to transfer the schemes from the Eight Plan period, the Central assistance for Centrally sponsored schemes to be transferred should be determined on the basis of the Modified Gadgil Formula or any other formula that would be adopted for transfer of Central assistance to State Plans in the Eighth Plan period in the case of non-special category States. As regards Special category States, it was recommended to provide additional Central assistance to each of the Special Category States to match the additional outlay on Centrally sponsored schemes finally approved for inclusion in their Eighth Plan. The Tamil Nadu view was that in the event of transfer of uring the Seventh Plan, the concomitant Centrally sponsored scheme transfer of resources may be made on the basis of three components of the medified Gaugil Formula with the respective weightage of population, per capita income and tax effort in the proportion of 60:20:10. The share thus determined may be allocated on the pattern corresponding to the loan and grant component of the schemes transferred to the States and not on the basis of 70:30 loan and grant as under the modified Gadgil Formula.

30. Since there would be a re-assessment of resources for the purpose of the Eighth Plan and Central assistance in respect of transferred schemes would be governed by the same formula as is applicable for Central assistance to State Plans, there would be not much point in distinguishing between Central assistance for State Plans and Central assistance for transferred schemes. Any such distinction would be only notional. The States would be, however, free to pursue the objective of the transferred schemes either by maintaining identity of these schemes or by merging them with similar on-going projects. In fact, not sub-dividing the kitty

into two imaginary compartments would give more flexibility to the States in the use of these resources.

### Review Mechanism:

- 31. As regards the review mechanism, the Group felt that transfer from the Eighth Plan virtually amounted to writing on a clean slate. In other words, the effect of the transfer to the State Plans would be the same as that of discontinuance as for the Central Government is concerned. Since there was no requirement on the part of the State Governments to continue any of the transferred schemes, there was no need to set up any periodical review mechanism other than the quarterly monitoring of the physical and financial progress of State Plan schemes in the earmarked sectors and financial progress of the schemes in the unearmarked sectors, recently introduced by the Planning Commission.
- Ceiling:
- The Group discussed the question of ceiling on the schemes to be 32. retained in the context of the early NDC decision of 1/6th or 1/7th Central assistance, the proposal of one-third made by the Ramamurti Committee and subsequent deliberations at the NDC Committee where the thinking was closer to a figure of Rs. 10,000 crores in respect of the outlay of the schemes to be retained. Since the scheme by scheme examination had disclosed that schemes involving an outlay of over 90% of the total at Rs. 15,364 crores or 60% of Central assistance to States during the Seventh Plan would require to be retained, the Group did not consider it practical to recommend any ceiling by way of a fixed percentage of Central assistance to State Plans. In this connection, however, Andhra Pradesh drew attention to their proposals for transfer, earmarking and retention etc., of the schemes which had been conisdered by the Group along with proposals received from eight other States and stated that their proposals were in accordance with the ceiling and norms recommended by the Ramamruti Committee. The view of Andhra Pradesh was that their proposals, if accepted, by the Group would have conformed to the Ramamurti Committee ceiling.
- 33. An apprehension was expressed, and shared by many States, that the deleted schemes might be re-introduced in some other manner or that other Centrally sponsored schemes might expand to take up their place. The Group felt that the schemes dropped or transferred to the States, should not be restarted in any other shape or form and that there should be a reduction in Central expenditure as a result of this effort releasing more resoruces for transfer to the States.

- 34. The Group recommenced that the Central Ministries should thoroughly look into the schemes being retained and if any scheme is likely to reach a stage where any component of it is likely to be transferred to the maintenance phase, thereby increasing the non-Plan liability of the States, the Ninth Finance Commission should be notified of the same well in time.
- 35. The Group recommended that since the proposal was to tranfer the Centrally sponsored schemes from the Eighth Plan period, which will eventually become part of the State's normal plan outlay, the allocation of Central assistance to be determined on the basis of modified Gadgil Formula or any other formula that would be adopted by the N.D.C. should take into account the additional requirements.

### Terms of Reference

- Review the criterial laid down by the National Development Council in 1979 for the taking up of Centrally Sponsored Schemes, and to suggest modifications therein, or additional criteria, that should govern such schemes for the future.
- Review the question whether the total outlays (Central outlays plus States' outlays) on Centrally Sponsored Schemes should be limited to 1/6 or 1/7 of the total of Central Plan assistance to the States in any given Plan period, or there is need to modify this ceiling keeping in view the Plan objectives (among others) of poverty-alleviation and employment-generation.
