Item No. 1: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Commission held on 24th November 1974.

The minutes of the 163rd meeting of the University Grants Commission held on 24th November, 1974 were confirmed.

The Commission desired that the Delhi University may be requested to send to the Commission the list of teachers, both in the University and its colleges, who had been given extension beyond the age of 60 or 63 years as the case may be, after 1st January 1973 along with the date on which the extension was approved by the University.

Item No. 3: To approve the statement of grants released after the meeting of the Commission held on 11th November, 1974.

The Commission approved the grants released after the meeting of the Commission held on 11th November, 1974 (Appendix II)*.

Item No. 4: To receive a statement indicating the progress of issue of Utilization Certificates during the period ending 15th November, 1974.

This was noted.

Item No. 5: To further consider the demands made in the first All-India Convention of National Students Union held in Bombay and those made by the All India Students Federation at its conference held in Cochin,

It was noted that the views expressed by the 1st All-India Convention of National Students' Union held in Bombay and by the All-India Students' Convention at its conference in Cochin on some vital issues of Indian higher education were in general agreement with the Commission's own thinking. It was mentioned in this connection that the Commission had already initiated, within the resources

available, several measures to implement some suggestions made at these conferences.

The Commission made the following further bservations:

The Commission agreed that participation of students in the working of the universities would be an important step in the process of democratisation of higher education. While generally endorsing the recommendations of the Gajendragadkar Committee in this regard, the Commission felt that where a 'Students Council' is not provided for, provision should be made for representation of students on the Academic Council. Care has, however, to be taken that areas relating to examinations, appointment of academic staff, etc., do not come within the purview of students' participation.

Democratisation of higher education, it was felt, was not merely participation of the students in the working of the universities, but, more important, it was pening up of opportunities of access to higher education to students from under-privileged backgrounds. These apportunities will have to be widened, keeping in view the available facilities and resources.

- 2) The Commission reiterated its earlier decision that capitation fee for purposes of admission to institutions of higher learning was bad in principle and unproductive in practice. It was, however, recognised that institutions will have to raise adequate resources for their efficient functioning and maintenance of standards. The following general principles may be observed if institutions decide to raise funds for their maintenance and development:
- (a) Contributions may be accepted from students on a voluntary basis. It will be a good practice not to accept any contribution from students at the time of admission.
- (b) Admission to institutions should be strictly on merit and in accordance with the conditions prescribed by the university and the institution concerned.
- (c) Additional resources may be raised, in consultation with the university, by a differential fee structure and may be spread over the entire duration of the courses offered by the institution.

- (d) A certain proportion of seats should be reserved for meritorious students who, because of financial difficulties, cannot maintain themselves in such institutions. Such students should be provided exemption from fees and necessary financial support to pursue their courses of studies.
- (e) Contributions raised by the institutions should be used only for maintenance and development of the institutions in consultation with the university concerned.

The question of such institutions receiving general "grant-in-aid" from the State Governments should be further examined.

- organising remedial courses for students coming from deprived education backgrounds. Such remedial courses should not only help them to reach the level of competence required for admission to specialised institutions but should also help them in the mastery of the language which is the medium of education in the institutions concerned. It was recognised that any worthwhile result can be achieved in this direction only with the help of State Governments which should be requested to make a major contribution for this purpose.
- formulated certain guidelines for the establishment of new universities. These guidelines do take into account the higher education needs of rural areas. Establishing a university in a rural area will not necessarily make it a fit instrument of rural development merely by its location.

Item No. 6: To receive the proceedings of the meeting of the Committee on linking education and work experience.

The Commission desired that the final report of the Committee's work may be awaited.

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Item No. 7: To consider the recommendations of the Committee appointed to examine the proposal of the M.S. University of Baroda for assistance for the publication of Gaekward Oriental Series.

The Commission agreed to provide support to the M.S. University of Baroda for the publication of Gaekward Oriental Series. It was noted that the estimated expenditure on this account over the next four years would be about Rs.1,80,000 and that the University had agreed to provide Rs. one lakh for this programme. The Commission agreed to provide a grant to cover the deficit subject to a maximum of Rs.80,000. This amount would be debitable to the V Plan allocation of the University.

Item No. 8: To consider the recommendations of the Standing Committee on New Universities and University Centres made at their meeting held on 21st November 1974.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Standing Committee on New Universities/University Centres as per Appendix III.

Item No. 9: To consider the question of awarding approved construction works of projects financed by the University Grants Commission to Public Undertakings.

The Commission agreed that if a university desired to award the work of building construction to the National Building Construction Corporation or similar public undertaking, the university may do so by negotiation. It was understood that negotiations are actually based on 'actual cost' plus a certain percentage as overhead cost including the profit of the undertaking. The Commission was of the view that before finalising the agreement, the universities should obtain acceptance of the Commission with regard to the 'actual cost' of construction which would be based on the estimates accepted by the P.W.D. A provision could, however, be made in the agreement for revising the actual cost, if necessary, on the basis of statutory price rise in respect of specific items and wages of the labour. It was also desired that the public undertaking concerned should itself undertake the civil work directly and should not sub-contract such work.

The Commission while accepting the proposal of the Aligarh Muslim University in this regard desired that the buildings so completed by the N.B.C.C. should be got test-checked with the help of the C.P.W.D. with regard to the construction work and costs involved.

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Item No. 10: To consider the proposal of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for construction of a second school building.

The Commission desired that the proposal of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for provision of a second school building may be considered by the visiting committee along with the V Plan proposals of the University.

Item No.11: To consider the proposal of the Meerut University for financial assistance towards the construction of Guest House already completed by the University during the Fourth Plan.

The Commission agreed to provide assistance to the Meerut University for construction of a Guest House already completed subject to the sharing basis as provided in the fourth plan provided further that the amount payable will be a charge on the V Plan allocation of the University.

Item No.12: To consider a proposal regarding implementation of University Leadership Project in Mathematics at Bombay University under COSIP.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Bombay University to take up the University Leadership Project in Mathematics under the College Science Improvement Programme and agreed to provide for the purpose a grant Rs.5 lakhs over a period of three years. The Commission desired that the specific purposes and items for which this amount will be utilized may be indicated by the University. It was noted that any academic positions created under this programme will be for the duration of the project.

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Item No. 13: To consider the appointment of the members of a Jury for making final selections of scientists for awards instituted by the Commission from out of the endowment made available by the Hari Om Ashram Trust, Nadiad.

The Commission decided that the Jury for making final selection of scientists for awards instituted by the Commission from out of the endowment made available by the Hari Om Ashram Trust, Nadiad, may consist of the following:

- 1. Vice-Chairman, UGC.
 2. Dr. Amarjit Singh
 3. Professor Rais Ahmed
 4. Professor J.B. Chitambar

 - 5. Professor M. Santappa 6. Professor B.M. Udga**o**nkar
 - 7.1 Two other persons to be nominated by 81 the Vice-Chairman.

Item No. 14: To consider the question of financial assistance towards introduction of short-hand and typewriting classes in universities and colleges.

The Commission felt that while the colleges should be encouraged to provide facilities for short-hand and typewritin classes for their students, no separate grant should be paid for the purpose by the Commission; such courses should be organised on a self-supporting basis.

I tem No.15: To consider further the question of pattern of education namely 10+2+3.

The Commission noted that it had already endorsed the recommendations of the Central Advisory Board of Education for adopting a general pattern of 10+2+3 for the first degree course. The Commission endorsed the views of the C.A.B.E. that where a university desired to have a 2-year Pass Course on the pattern of 10+2+2 years, it could do so but in such cases, adequate provision should be made available for such graduates who wish to pursue postgraduate studies by offering

them suitable 'bridge' or 'link' courses. Where universities opt for both General Pass and Honours first degree courses, the Colleges which propose to offer such Honours courses should be carefully selected on the basis of facilities and standards maintained by them.

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Item No. 16: To note the date and place for the next meeting of the Commission.

It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held on 10th February 1975.

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Item No.17: To consider the work plan for Faculty Improvement Programme.

The Commission generally accepted the plan of work (Appendix IV) proposed for implementation of Faculty Improvement programme during the fifth plan period viz.;

I University Leadership Projects

II Refresher Courses/Short-term Institutes

III Teacher Fellowships

IV National Associateships

Refresher Courses/Short-term Institutes may be organised by the University and should be directed towards improvement of curricula, teaching methods and examination reforms to be introduced by the universities. Specific proposals for this purpose may be invited from universities having affiliated colleges.

The crganisation of the advanced level institutes and the specific topics of such institutes may be determined in consultation with the subject panels. The Commission further agreed that 6 - 8 Summer Institutes in English may be organised during the current academic year.

The Universities and colleges and wherever necessary the State Governments concerned should be requested to provide academic leave to teachers sponsored and selected for the teacher fellowships.

The Commission also desired that a committee may work out the details relating to facilities to be created for in-service teachers to improve their qualifications beyond M.A./M.Sc. level through correspondence courses.

The Commission agreed that the proposals from universities for organising Seminars, Symposia and Workshops etc., may be considered once a year prior to the beginning of the academic year.

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Item No. 18: To consider the recommendations made by the panels in the Humanities and Social Sciences at their meetings held in September/October 1974.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Humanities and the Social Sciences Panels and made the following observations:

- 1. Workshops on modernizing the undergraduate and postgraduate syllabi in various disciplines with a view to integrating in them work experience and a measure of relevance may be organised on a regional basis. It is most important that the Workshops should be preceded by adequate preparatory work and that all the components of the academic community should be represented in these Workshops.
- 2. The question of developing museums and providing audio-visual aids to the department of History/Archaeology may be brought up separately before the Commission at a later meeting.
- 3. The proposal to support studies in the history of science outside the V Plan allocation of the Universities may be accepted in principle and the History Panel may be requested to identify a few departments of history/archaeology for the purpose.
- 4. The Commission agreed to set up a separate panel in Social Work and to call the present panel on Sociology, and Social Work as the Panel on Sociology and Social Anthropology.
- 5. In-service training and further education of college teachers in various disciplines should be developed under the Faculty Improvement Programme.
- 6. The Commission accepted in principle the development of suitable reading materials for B.A.(Hons.) and M.A. students in Economics and desired that the Economics Panel may prepare a specific proposal towards this end. The question of preparing suitable text-books in Economics with special reference to regional economics may be referred to the Publication Committee.

- 7. The question of giving special support to some selected universities to publish doctoral dissertations of distinctive merit in some discipline may be considered by the Publications Committee.
- 8. The question of restricting the LL.M. Course only to full-time students may be discussed by the visiting committees with the concerned universities. Equivalence of the LL.M. Course with M.Phil. Courses may be considered after qualifications of lecturers, consequent on the revision of salary scales, have been considered by the Commission.
- 9. The universities selected for special assistance under the programme of examination reform are free to bring law departments within the purview of this programme. The matter may, however, be referred to the examination reform committee for advice.
- 10. A small committee may be set up to prepare a status report on teaching in modern Indian languages and the themes suggested by the Linguistics Panel.

The Commission also desired that an expert group may be set up to consider the long-term goals, immediate objectives and methodology of teaching of foreign languages in India, including English.

It was felt that the question of setting up of review committees on classical Indian languages may be postponed for some time.

- 11. The Commission approved a grant of Rs.2.12 lakhs for advanced research projects of 11 teachers as per details given in <u>Appendix V</u>. Shri Karumuri V. Subbarao's proposal for a workshop may be referred to the committee which will consider proposals for summer institutes/workshops/seminars etc.
- 12. The Gommission approved a grant of Rs.3,04,150 for research projects of 126 university and college teachers as detailed in Appendix VI.
- Item No. 19: To consider the report of the Committee appoint by the UGC to examine the proposal of Rajasthan University for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the postgraduate level.
- Item No. 20: To consider the report of the Committee appoint by the UGC to examine the proposal of Universit of Anuhra for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the rostgraduate level.

Item No.21: To consider the report on the proposal of the Utkal University for the introduction of correspondence courses.

These items were withdrawno

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Item No.22: To consider the recommendation made by the Sub-Committee on COHSIP about selection of colleges for participation in the programme and the guidelines for implementation of the programme recommended at the Conference of Principals of Colleges provisionally selected for participation in the programme.

Consideration of this was postponed to the next meeting.

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Item No.23: To consider further the proposal of the Government of India for making National Service for a specified period as a pre-condition for the award of a degree.

Consideration of this was postponed to the next meeting.

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Item No. 21+: Review of U.G.C. Programmes.

The Commission generally reviewed the progress made in respect of its programmes during the past two years.

The points arising out of the discussions are given in the note at Appendix VII.

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Item No. 25: Any other item.

(a) Evaluation of Junior Fellows

The Commission further considered the procedure to be followed for evaluating the work of the junior research fellows who at present are drawing Rs.400 per month, but at the end of two years would be eligible to receive Rs.500 per month. The Commission agreed to the following procedure in this regard:

A research fellow who has completed two years of junior fellowship should be required to submit a report indicating the work done and the progress made in his approved research project. This report should be accompanied by an assessment report from the supervisor of the candidate. These reports may then be referred to two experts who may be requested to indicate (a) whether in the light of the work already done by the candidate, he may be given the increased amount of the fellowship, or (b) may be allowed to continue on the existing basis for another year when his work could be again evaluated, or (c) whether the candidate's work may be assessed after an interview, or (d) the fellowship may be discontinued because of the unsatisfactory progress.

The Commission also desired that the supervisor concerned, while forwarding the assessment report of the research fellow, should indicate the total number of students working for Ph.D. under his guidance at the time of reporting, the name of the students, date of registration and the topic of research of the scholars.

(b) V Plan proposals from Colleges

The Commission noted that the guidelines for preparation of development proposals for improvement of undergraduate educational facilities in affiliated colleges during the V Five Year Plan period have been circulated. The colleges have been requested to send their proposals through the university concerned and also to send a copy of their proposals to their State Governments. It was agreed that the State Governments be requested to communicate to the concerned universities their views on the proposals of the colleges within a specified period. The universities while forwarding the proposals to the Commission with their recommendations would also convey the

views of the State Government on each proposal. This procedure may not be necessary in respect of schemes where the colleges do not expect a matching share to be provided by the State Government or do not expect the State Government to meet in full or share the "committed" expenditure which has to be continued after the Commission's assistance ceases at the end of V Plan.

The main recommendations of the Standing Committee or new universities and university centres as accepted by the Commission are given below:-

I. Establishment of a University at Rohtak.

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On further considering the proposal of the Government of Haryana for the establishment of a teaching-cum-affiliating university at Rohtak immediately, the Committee was not in favour of establishment of a new university at Rohtak at present. Instead, it was suggested that the Kurukshetra University Act should be amended in such a way that the unitary character of the University is maintained and at the same time a new organizational set up like the Directorate for undergraduate education in colleges is set up as a wing of the Kurukshetra University to deal with the affiliating functions in respect of the colleges that are now affiliating functions in respect of the colleges that are now affiliated to the university consequent upon their transfer from the - Panjab University. Suitable provision should also be made in the Act so that it would be possible for such a Directorate for Collegiate Education and for the Postgraduate Centre at Rohtak to function at a high academic level and in an autonomous manner, within the University framework.

II. Upgrading the Postgraduate Centres at Guntur (Andhra University) and Warangal (Osmania University) as fullfledged TrivUniversities in Andhra Pradesh.

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The two existing above Postgraduate Centres should first be enabled to function as autonomous centres academically, administratively and financially. It would be necessary for the Universities of Andhra and Osmania and the State Government to consider how best this could be achieved. The question of bringing about structural changes in the Acts of Osmania and Andhra Universities may also be considered by the State Government so that on the one hand the required autonomy for the Postgraduate Centres be conferred and on the other a separate wing under the aegis of the Universities be brought into being for discharging its affiliating functions for undergraduate eductation in colleges. The Fifth Plan Visiting Committees which would visit these Centres may also be requested to suggest the measures for the development of these Centres.

III. Establishment of a Science and Technological University in Tamil Nadu.

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It was noted that the Tamil Nadu Government had revised its proposal in conformity with the suggestions and conditions laid down by the U.G.C. and the Government of India from time to time and felt that there was a prima-facie case for setting up such a unitary university as it will pave the way for optimum utilisation of the existing institutions that will form the representation. The proposal was, therefore, accepted in principle, on the proposed University should also include under it the Departme of Chemical Technology, Leather Technology, Textile Technolog and Architecture and Town Planning of the University of Madra

IV. Declaration of Gandhigram Rural Institute as an Instituti deemed to be a University.

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A Visiting Committee be sent to Gandhigram to examine the proposal and make recommendations. The Government of Tamil Nadu may also be consulted in this matter, simultaneously, to arrive at a mutually acceptable decision.

V. Establishment of a University Postgraduate Centre at Tellicherry (Calicut University). (Item No.7 of the minute

It was noted that the U.G.C. had already agreed in princip to the starting of a postgraduate centre in Tellicherry subjeto the proviso that the Commission would not be able to give any financial assistance for the purpose in the Fourth Plan and the question of assistance to the Postgraduate Centre in Tellicherry will be considered on the basis of a report of an Expert Committee which would visit the University in due course. The Commission also noted that the Postgraduate Centre had started functioning and the Commission had agreed to the creation of one post of Professor in English. In view of this, a Visiting Committee may be constituted to consider the question further, and advise regarding introduction of various courses and financial assistance required during V Plan period.

VI. Establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura.

Since the present proposal made by the Calcutta University is in conformity with the advice given earlier, the Commission agreed that the Calcutta University be allowed to go ahead with the establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura, and a Visiting Committee may be appointed by the Commission to assess the developmental and financial requirements of the Centre.

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The work plan for Faculty Improvement Programmes during V Plan period.

The faculty improvement programme would consist of the following activities:-

- I. University Leadership Projects.
- Refresher Courses/Short-term Institutes TI.
- III. Teacher Fellowships
- TV National Associateships.

Details regarding the scope of each of these activities during the Fifth Plan period are given below:

I <u>University Leaderships Projects</u>.

During the Fifth Plan period, every university which has more than 25 affiliated colleges providing undergraduate courses may be invited to take up a University Leadership Project in each of the major subjects so that the instructional facilities and methods in the colleges could be improved in relation the courses evaluated by each university and the college teachers being provided with a variety of opportunities to improve their competence as teachers. On this basis, about 40 additional University Leadership projects may be initiated in science subjects and a similar number in the humanities and social science subjects during the Fifth Plan pariod. The adequacy (The present number could number would enable at least 10 University Leadership Projects be reviewed to be initiated in each of these two groups annually for the next four years. Each ULP would be for a duration of 3 years.

course of the II Refresher Courses/Short-term 'Institutes' Fifth Plan period.

These Institutes would be generally in the nature of the Summer Institutes so far organised by the Commission, but the universities would be enabled to organise such institutes at any time convenient to them throughout the year, preferably during the vacations. These institutes/ refresher courses may be of four types:

(a) University/State based institutes generally of six weeks duration: Individual universities or a group of universities within a State having affiliated colleges may be assisted to organise each year at least one institute each in a science subject and in a social science subject, depending upon the number of teachers in its affiliated colleges. Since the number of teachers and the number of

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affiliated colleges in the different universities and States would vary considerably, provision may be made as follows in determining the number of institutes to be held each year:

- (i) one institute each in science subjects and social science subjects, if the total number of teachers in the subject in degree classes is less than 150;
- (ii) two institutes each in science subjects and social science subjects, tf the number of teachers in the subject concerned in degree classes is between 150 and 400:
- (iii) three institutes each in science subjects and social science subjects, if the number of teachers as above is over 400.

On this basis, it is estimated that each year about 75 to 80 Institutes would be held each in (a) science subjects and (b) humanities and social science subjects.

Each such institute of about six weeks' duration may have 50 college teachers as participants. The UGC may provide a maximum grant of Rs.35,000/-.for each such institute. Any extra expenditure should be met by the University/participating college

(b) Refresher/Course/Institutes through Correspondence Method.

The programme is intended mainly for the undergraduate college teachers for raising their qualificiations and to give them subject-matter competence through correspondence course so as to enable them to become better teachers. The correspondence course may be organised in inter university collaboration basis in each state. The course material to be sent to the participating teachers may be prepared by combined efforts of the subject departments concerned in the State/the universities. But the responsibility of coordinating the work to cover the entire population of college teachers in that subject in the State would be entrusted to one of the departments of the collaborating universities in the State.

Besides the provision of courses through correspondence, over one academic year, the participating teachers may be required to have about 2.4. weeks' contact classes and laboratory work in the form of a short-term institute to be organised by each of the participating departments of the universities in the State for the benefit of the teachers coming from the colleges affiliated to that particular university. The programme of Faculty Improvement through correspondence courses may be viable in such subjects where the number of teachers to be covered is 250 or more in a particular State. The universities may organise correspondence courses for one year or in a sequential manner covering 1-3 years depending upon ins convenience and the facilities available. The contact programme of 2-4 weeks

would provide the college teachers a forum for discussing their difficulties and for additional seminars, lectures and practical work.

The estimated expenditure on preparation of course materials etc. to be sent to the participating teachers may be about Rs.5,000/- in a particular subject and the expenditure for the organisation of a contact class of 2 or 4 weeks' duration may vary from Rs.15,000 to Rs.25,000 per annum.

(c) All India Advance Level Institutes.

The All-India Advanced Level Institutes would enable teachers from universities/colleges from different regiona to avail themselves of the opportunities for getting acquainted with the latest developments in the subject concerned through lectures, seminars, discussions and possibly through project work. One or two such All India Advanced Level Institutes may be organised in each major subject annually. It would be desirable for a college teacher to participate at the advanced level institute after he has attended at least one institute organised in his State by his University. The total number of participants in an all India advanced level institute may be limited to 50 and the duration may be about six weeks. The participants from university departments in such all India advanced institutes should not exceed 25 per cent and such university teachers may nor may not have attended summer institutes etc. earlier. The location of the all India advanced level institutes can be determined on a regional basis to be organised in universities (affiliating or unitary), IITS and other institutions of National importance.

About ten such advanced level institutes of six weeks' duration may be organised annually in science subjects and an equal number in Humanities including Social Sciences. The organisation of an advanced level institute of xix weeks' duration may involve an expenditure of Rs. 60,000/- to Rs. 70,000.

(d) About ten Institutes in English Language Teaching may be organised each year for the benefit of teachers of English in the colleges. The English language Institutes may be of 6-8 weeks' duration to be located in different regions so as to cover as many college teachers as possible region-wise. Out of ten such institutes to be organised in each year, 2-3 may be of an advarced level on an All India basis for specialised purpose. The estimated cost for each regional institute may be about Rs.30,000 to Rs.35,000 and that of an all India advanced level institute about Rs.60,000 to Rs.70,000.

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III. Teacher Fellowships.

Teacher Fellowships are specifically meant to provide opportunities for teachers to work towards either an M.Phil. or M.Litt. or Ph.D. degree. Accordingly, the teacher fellowships may be of two types:

- (a) short term fellowship of one year's duration: and
- (b) long term fellowship of a duration not exceeding 3 years

The persons to be nominated and selected for long term teacher fellowships should preferably be below the age of 35 years so that the benefit of their training would be available for a long duration. In the case of short term fellowships of one year duration, preference may be given to teachers who are below the age of 45 years. Such teachers for either the long term or short fellowships should be sponsored by the colleges, which should protect their total emoluments for the period of their deputation and also give them necessary increment \(\alpha \) due and give an undertaking that such teachers would be taken back to their substantive posts without affecting their seniority etc. The teachers may be required to give an undertaking to serve such institution for a period of at least five year on their return to the college. Similarly, in the case of teachers nominated for one year teacher fellowships, the college should give the same terms as for long term teacher fellowships. teacher may be required to give an undertaking that he would scrve the institution for a minimum period of three years on his return to his substantive post. In either case, the UGC would provide funds to the college concerned for appointing suitable substitutes in place of teachers nominated for these fellowships. The Commission would also provide to the teacher concerned a living expense allowance of Rs.250 per month, provided the teacher undertakes to utilise the fellowships in a university not located in his normal place of duty.

For both these categories of fellowships, a number of university departments and other research institutions should be recognised as approved institutions. The number of teacher fellowships either long term or short term to be accepted by any one of the designated departments to be identified for the not exce-purpose would be about 50 covering all subjects. The selection of the teachers would be made by the departments concerned on the basis of the nominations to be recieved by them. Such given departments may be asisted with a contingency grant of Rs.1,000 time and to Rs.2,000 per annum per teacher fellowship.

such IV National Associateships.

The present scheme of national associateships provides for 200 persons to be maintained on the roll of national

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associateships for a period of five years and provide for each national associate an opportunity of visiting other institutes upto three times, each visit of a duration not exceeding three months.

In addition to this long term national associateship programme, short term national associateship programme may be initiated wherein teachers may be selected for a single visit during a year to work in any of the universities/research institutions having specialised facilities connected with their research work over a period of 8 to 12 weeks.

Annually 100 such associateships may be awarded and the follows be required to complete their visit within a period of 12 months from the date of selection. The other requirements and financial provisions of the short term national associateship programme would be the same as in the case of the present national associateship programme.

Operational Procedure.

The programme stated above have been suggested to provide to the teachers in colleges a wide variety of opportunities for improving their qualifications and competence and for the exchange of ideas through group discussions. The organisation of an all India advanced level institution in English Language Teachings, and national associateship will be the responsibility to be taken up centrally. In the implementation of programmes like University Leadership Projects, Teacher Fellowships(after identification of the departments/universities/ efforts may be made to decentralise the organisational aspects giving considerable autonomy to each university. The university concerned would be required to set-up a suitable machinery for coordinating the organisation of various types of programmes under Faculty Improvement.

Appendix VII to the minutes of the UCC meeting held on 9th and 10th Dec., 1974 (Item No.24).

The Commission generally reviewed its working over the past two years since the reconstitution of the Commission under the UGC Amended Act. The discussions mainly related to a self-assessment of (a) the achievements; (b) the weaknesses; and also (c) efforts to be made to overcome these weaknesses and difficulties. The functioning of the Commission was considered under the three major items viz., (a) policies and programmes; (b) implementation; (c) secretarial support. The Commission felt that, on the basis of this self-evaluation, it had been able to make substantial progress in matter of laying down both policies and programmes aimed at the regeneration of higher education in the country in the context of the V Plan; putting forward a policy of restricting unplanned growth of universities and colleges; bringing the concept of planning to universities and colleges, and preparing them for introducing new areas for study and research. The Commission, therefore, felt that while it could feel justified in its achievements and need not feel diffident, there was still a considerable part of its work to which the Commission had to devote its thought and action.

Programmes & Policies

- 2. During the past two years, the Commission has reviewed the various policies and programmes of higher education so far followed by the Commission up to the end of the fourth plan. It was felt that several of the programmes developed by the earlier Commissions were of importance and had helped in raising university and college standards and facilities several of these programmes as well as policies needed modification and re-orientation in the present context keeping in view the objectives and goals of higher education during the V Plan period. This evaluation, re-structuring and re-orientation of the programmes, as well as procedures of implementation had been undertaken with the help of the various standing and ad-hoc committees and expert panels so as to ensure participation by a wide section of the academic community. At the same time, inadequacy as well as uncertainity of the resources created difficulties in the fuller implementation and effectiveness of the Commission's programmes. Yet another important limitation in the full effectiveness of the programmes of the Commission related to the managerial and administrative procedures prevailing in the university system.
- 3. A major policy decision taken by the Commission related to providing more support for university research and revision in the emoluments of the research personnel and the university academic staff so as to attract and retain the best talent available within the university system.

- 4. The Commission noted that, besides re-orienting the existing programmes so as to make them more effective and widespread over the university system, the Commission had been able, in the past two years, to initiate several new activities also. The Commission had formulated guidelines for comprehensive and multi-dimentional development of the universities as well as the affiliated colleges. The guidelines, besides indicating the general objectives and philosophy to be pursued during the V Plan period, also set out certain important directions of growth and development so as to bring in within the next five years the necessary re-structuring, flexibility and autonomy in the functioning of the various institutions. These directions specifically related to (a) autonomous colleges, (b) re-structuring of courses of study in relation to regional or local (rural) relevance, (c) examination reforms, (d) development of postgraduate facilities outside the university headcuarters; and (e) inter-institutional coordination and development.
- Implementation.5. The Commission noted that the experience over the past two years had also brought out certain inadequacies and gaps or weaknesses in its functioning. One of the major weaknesses related to a) the means of communication with the academic community, and b) involvement of academics at different levels, both with regard to the formulation of programmes as well as implementation of the programmes at the institutional level. The proposed journal to be published by U.G.C. on higher education would serve as a vehicle for such communication and flow of information in both directions. It will also enable open discussion on important emerging academic issues and feedback on the impact of the various activities funded by the Commission. Such a dialogue with the academic community should prove useful to the functioning of the Commission. It was felt that the Commission should establish multi-channel communications with the academics, not relying exclusively on Registrar's offices as at present. Regional conferences, seminars, etc. on important issues can elicit a cross section of the views of teachers, students, educational administrators and others concerned with higher educational programmes in the country. A beginning in this direction has been made throughthe regional workshops, but these need to be considerably expanded.
 - 6. It would also be desirable for the members of the Commission to establish channels of communications and dialogue with the universities and colleges in the region so as to bring to the notice of the Commission problems of regional significance. The Commission's programmes should then be flexible and capable of adjustment so as to respond to such regional needs.
 - 7. Similarly, it would be necessary to have greater inter-action with the State Covernments. Regional meetings with Vice-Chancellors, State Grant: Committees etc. would be useful for the purpose, as well as discussion of State educational plans.

While emphasizing the need for R&D projects in universities, care should be taken that the infra-structure created in universities does not mean over-emphasis on consultancy to the neglect of basic research.

8. The Commission also felt that the machinery for docision making, both within the Commission as well as in the university system, should be sharpened so that decisions could be taken at the appropriate tito without deluy, and action initiated for implementing such programmes when the situation really warrants.

It was felt that the question of providing some training in management/organisational techniques to administrators/senior faculty members in universities could be studied further. Similarly, the Commission felt that there was greater need for coordination and inter-facing of related programmes taken up in sciences, humanities and social sciences, engineering and technology having common purpose, objectives as well as mechanism of implementation. This would have much beneficial results at the institutions end also. It would also help in a comprehensive view of higher educational problems rather than encourage a number of parallel, disparate activities without inter-action.

9. The Commission also felt it necessary to establish a convention by which the academic community who serve as members of various committees should be kept informed of the decisions taken by the Commission on the recommendations made by them and also the implementation and evaluation of these activities from time to time. This would bring to the members of such committees a greater sense of participation.

Secretariat.

As regards the internal organisation of the Commission's secretariat, 10. it was noted that some concerted efforts had been made in the past two years to reorganise the work into various cohesive divisions keeping in view the problems of development of different regions, inter-university collaboration, similarity of programmes and activities, and to lay equal emphasis both on general development schemes as well as selected programmes which would help in the improvement of standards and quality of education. The re-organisation of the work had also brought to the surface the urgent need for further strenthening of the secretariat and provide to the officers sufficient time to engage themselves in specific studies either in relation to the regional needs or in respect of specific programmes. Such studies within the office would increase the efficiency of the functioning and effectiveness of the programmes. It was agreed that a Research Wing should be set up in the U.G.C., to engage in research on important educational developments such as curriculum reforms. evaluation techniques, monitoring of research programmes particularly with regard to the R&D activities in the universities. Such a Wing should be staffed by seconding persons from universities. If necessary, some of the existing staff could also be seconded to this Wing. The staff of this Wing may not have to deal with the other day to day work of the Commission. A suggestion was made that for this a certain number of floating posts (Research Officers) may be created and the recuritment made on a tenure basis depending upon the requirements at any given time.

- 11. It was agreed that a Documentation-cum-Evaluation and Planning Unit be set up in the U.G.C. and the details of this may be worked out by a Committee.
- 12. Early steps may also be taken for the appointment of a Director for Science Research Council and its supporting staff. The Director should be able to help establishment of inter-phasing between universities, research laboratories and also kelp in formulating R&D projects.
- It was felt that considerable thought and attention had not been given so far to several other important activities which concern the Commission's functions during the V Plan period. One of them related to the student amenities and welfare programmes. This was to some extent due to paucity of resources so far and the inadequacy of financial allocations to the Commission during the V Plan period. It had not been possible to make larger inputs for development of students amenities, even in the matter of providing hostel accommodation. While some funds have been made aviable for students hostels, non-resident student centres, study centres, health centres, book banks and student aid funds, the present inputs in each of these programmes have been at a very sub-critical level. Unless funds of an optimum size or "threshold level" can be channelised for these vital activities affecting the student life in their most formative years, no appreciable impact is possible. It was noted that some of these programs were presently under review and the results of such reviews would help the Commission in concentrating on some of these programmes and channelising available resources so as to derive maximum benefits. The Commission would also have to give some thought to facilities for Sports and Games in the Universities and Colleges.

- 14. The Commission also considered the desirability of UGC making efforts to mobilising resources from private organisations, foundations public / in view of the limited allocations which the Government of India itself can make available for the various programmes to be taken up by the Commission during the V Plan period. In this direction, a view was expressed, that providing tax relief may act as an incentive for such philanthropic organisations to make donations to the Commission either for specified purpose or for general activities taken by the Commission. It was agreed that this may be taken up with the Government of India.
- 15. Yet another important activity which should be taken up by the Commission related to making available to the students and the teachers necessary tools which would include text-books of quality and good standard other reading material, lagoratory manuals and teachers guides, books and journals as well as educational aids required for effective class-room and laboratory instructions. The programme of preparation of university level books which was taken up by the Commission during the Fourth Plan period, as an earmarked programme with the funds provided by the Ministry of Education, has not been able to keep pace mainly due to lack of funds. Since the Commission itself has a major responsibility in this direction, it should undertake, from the funds available to it, the programme of production of books required for university level. The types and title

of books required could be assessed with the halp off subject panels, both for purposes of eliminating the existing gaps as well as for production of books with relevance to national needs.

- Over the past two years a beginning has been made to identify a few locations where examination reforms could be initiated. These institutions should serve as focal points of examination reforms and help establishing an effective net work and thus have a multiplier effect enabling other universities and institutions also to implement such reforms with confidence. It is true that any such reform programmes could have multiplier effect only where major institutions are involved and can share their experience with other institutions. The evaluation techniques developed by these centres and the Question Banks developed by them should be available for use widely. The Commission should obtain such mateirials and techniques so developed and make them available to ther institutions and also help such institutions in implementing these reforms, The idea of 'question bank', which by its very nature has to be dynamic, will become acceptable to the extent it has enoughtflexibility to provide for the individual teacher's initiative also. The extent to which 'question banks! could be used as a source for different examinations sould vary from institution to institution. The programme of examination reform should make it possible for any institution with a worthwhile programme to obtain support on the basis of critical assessment of the approach as well as the possible outcomes. The examination reforms carbe expected to succed most in situations where they are individualised in relation to the students and staff composition of the institution concerned and these could be further revised on the basis of exchange of experience of a large number of institutions implementing such reforms.
- 17. Similarly, the existing apprehensions about grading, on the basis of internal evaluation and new examination methods, could also be removed gradually by establishing acceptable norms for reliable grading of students performances. It may also lead to a practice of institutions giving detailed transcripts indicating the students performance in different subjects as against the present system of overall classification of students into divisions.
- 18. The Commission felt that since considerable part of the UGC funds are utilised by universities and colleges for construction of buildings for various pruposes, the Commission should give sufficient thought to the kinds of buildings, norms, building materials, maintenance of buildings to ensure economy and better utilisation and keeping in time with the local environments. An expert committee could look into these aspects and provide necessary guidelines for various construction programmes.

Item No.4: To consider matters arising out of the decision taken by the Government of India regarding revision of scales of pay of the teachers in Universities and Colleges.

The Commission considered the recommendations of the Committee regarding the minimum qualifications for recruitment to the post of Lecturers in the Universities and Colleges consequent upon the revision of scales of pay of teachers of the Universities and the Colleges; and agreed to the follows University Lecturers

- (a) A doctor's degree or equivalent published work of high standard; and
- (b) consistently good academic record with 1st or hip 2nd class (B+) Master's degree in a relevant subject or an equivalent degree of a foreign university.

Having regard to the need for developing inter-disciplinary programmes, the degrees in (a) & (b) may be in relevant subjects.

Provided that if the Selection Committee is of the view that the research work of a candidate as evident either from his thesis or from his published work is of a very high standa it may relax any of the qualifications prescribe in (b) above.

^{*}Not enclosed.

Provided further that if a candidate possessing a doctor's degree or equivalent published work, is not available or not considered suitable, a person possessing a consistently good academic record, weightage being given to M.Phil, or equivalent degree or published research work of quality, may be appointed on the condition that he will have to obtain a doctor's degree or give evidence of equivalent published work of high standard within five years of his appointment, failing which he will not be able to earn future increments, until he fulfills these requirements.

College Lecturers

- (a) A consistently good academic record with 1st or high 2nd class (B+) at the Master's degree in a relevant subject or an equivalent degree of a foreign university; and
- (b) An M.Phil. degree or a recognised degree beyond the Master's level or published work indicating the capacity of a candidate for independent research work.

Provided that if a candidate possessing the qualifications as at (b) above is not available or not considered suitable, the college, on the recommendations of the Selection Committee, may appoint a person possessing a consistently good academic record on the condition that he will have to obtain an M.Phil. degree or a recognised degree beyond the Master's level within five years of his appointment, failing which he will not be able to earn future increments till he obtains that degree or gives evidence of equivalent published work of high standard.

Explanation

Consistently good record would mean overall record of all assessments throughout the academic career leading to the Master's degree, which should at least be B+ or high second class.

Fixation of salary of teachers

The Commission recommended that the salary of the Lecturers in the selection grade in the Colleges of Delhi University (Rs.700-1250) may be fixed in the revised scale of pay of Rs.700-1600 in accordance with the formula agreed to for purposes of revision of scales of pay or at Rs.1,100 whichever is more.

The Commission further recommended that the same method of fixation of salary of Senior Lecturers/Readers in the scale of Rs. 700-1100 in the 1966-71 revision of scales of pa and now fixed in the revised scale of pay of Rs. 700-1600, may be followed in case of teachers in the colleges affiliated to State Universities.

Work-load


The Commission agreed that the recommendations of the Sen Committee in this regard be communicated to the University and keeping this in view, they may indicate the number of periods etc. per week a teacher is expected to take. The Commission was further of the view that while no doubt some work is done at home, it should however be ensured by the universities that the teacher is present and is available to students at least for 20 hours a week on the official premisof the University/College and further no teacher is expected to do more than three hours of lecturing in a day. These makes the circulated to the Universities as guidelines and the detarules may be framed by each University.

The Commission desired that the questions relating to assessment of Lecturer's work, work-load for teachers for correspondence courses and evening classes, and submission of plan of work may be considered at a later meeting.

Any other item

The Commission noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held on 9th & 10th December 1974 in New Delhi. The Commission was of the view that in view of the work of the Visiting Committees with which the members of the Commission will be associated, no meeting may be held in January 1975. The date for the meeting of the Commission to be held in February 1975 would be decided later.

Item No. 2(a): To approve the action taken on certain matters.

(1) The award of German Academic Exchange Service Fellowships (DAAD) 1975, under Indo-FRG Cultural Exchange Programme 1972-74 on the recommendation of the U.G.C. Committee.

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The German Academic Exchange Service, New Delhi, has offered ten fellowships for one year's duration to the Commission for 1975-76 to enable junior teachers of universities/institutions to have advanced training in FRG Universities/Institutions in the fields of Natural Sciences, Mathematics, Geology and German Language.

Nominations in prescribed proforms were invited from all universities/institutions in these fields and 137 applications from eligible candidates were received. The Commission constituted a Committee which examined all applications and recommended that 28 candidates may be called for interview. These 38 candidates were called for interview in the office of the Commission on Sunday, the 3rd November 1974, and 33 of 38 attended the interview.

Item No.2(c): To receive the statement of proposals which could not be accepted by the Commission.

(1) Proposal of Panjab University for undertaking projects for compilation of Encyclopaedia dictionary in Panjabi.

The proposal of Panjab University for financial assistance for undertaking three projects viz. Compilation of an Emyclopaedia in Punjabi, Compilation of a Standard Punjabi English Dictionary and Compilation of an Etymological Dictionary of Punjabi Language could not be accepted by the Commission. The university has been informed that such projects are best undertaken with assistance from the State Governments to whom the Central Government provides funds for the development of regional languages. The university has, therefore, been advised to contact the State Government in the matter.

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Revised Item 2(a)(3)

Proposals accepted by the U.G.C. for Colleges in Eastern India.

(1) Moirang College, Moirang - Additional teaching accommodation.

The Commission, in November, 1973, accepted in principle the proposal of Moirang College, Moirang, Manipur for the construction of additional teaching accommodation at an estimated cost of Rs.1,78,329/- with its share as Rs.1,18,886/- or 2/3rd of the actual cost or whichever is less subject to the condition that the Commission will give no grants during the financial year 1973-74. On receipt of a request from the College the proposal of the College has now been accepted finally and the College has been allowed to take up the project in 1974-75 at the cost and the sharing basis as indicated above.

(2) Nowgong College - Living Room Furniture for Men's Hostel.

The Commission had accepted the proposal of Nowgong College, Nowgong for the construction of Mens' Hostel for 68 students at a cost of Rs.3,32,772/- with its share as Rs.1,40,055/- during the Fourth Five Year Plan period under the scheme of Rs. 3 lakhs. The College had not made any provision for living room furniture in the initial estimates. Consequently, the College approached the Commission in April, 1974 for assistance towards the purchase of living room furniture for the hostel building. Since the hostel building could not be put to use without living room furniture and the building was nearing completion, the proposal of the College for the purchase of living room furniture at an estimated cost of Rs.12,920/- with U.G.C. share as Rs.6,460/- or 50 per cent of the actual cost or whichever is less has been accepted as this was an on going project. The amount paid/to be paid to the College towards this project during the Fifth Five Year Plan period would be the first charge against the Fifth Plan allocation.

(3)T.N.B.College, Bhagalpur - Residential Flats for Teachers.

In December, 1971 the Commission to the basis of the recommendations of the U.G.C. Advisory Committee on Teachers Hostel accorded its approval in principle to the proposal of the T.N.B. College, Bhagalpur for construction of Teachers Hostel and requested the college to send a detailed proposal for final approval.

The College submitted the detailed estimates in June, 1973 for final approval of the Commission and intimated that they had started the construction work in anticipation of Commission's approval. But the consideration of the proposal was postponed by the Commission due to paucity of funds during 1973-74.

The Bhagalpur University in July, 1974 intimated that the college had incurred a total expenditure of Rs.93,573/- on the project and requested for final approval of the Commission to the proposal of the college.

Under the circumstances stated by the University the proposal of the T.N.B. College, Bhagalpur for construction of Teachers Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs.1,78,221/-, with Commission's share being limited to Rs.1,41,253/- or 80% of the actual cost whichever is less has been accepted.

(4) R.D.& D.J. College, Monghyr - Residential Flats for Teachers.

In December, 1971 the Commission on the basis of the recommendations of the U.G.C. Advisory Committee on Teachers Hostel accorded its approval in *rinciple to the proposal of the R.D. & D.J. College, Monghyr for construction of Teachers Hostel and requested the college to send a detailed proposal for final approval.

The College submitted the detailed estimates in June, 1973 for final approval of the Commission and intimated that they had started the construction work in anticipation of Commission's approval. But the consideration of the proposal was postponed by the Commission due to paucity of funds during 1973-74.

The Bhagalpur University in July, 1974 intimated that the college had incurred a total expenditure of Rs.66,409/- on the project and requested for final approval of the Commission to the proposal of the college.

Under the circumstances stated by the University the proposal of the R.D. & D.J. College, Monghyr for construction of Teachers Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs.1,78,221/- with Commission's share being limited to Rs.1,41,247/- or 80% of the actual cost whichever is less has been accepted.

(5) Marwari College, Bhagalpur - Residential Flats for Teachers.

In December, 1971 the Commission on the basis of the recommendations of the U.G.C. Advisory Committee on Teachers Hostel accorded its approval in principle to the proposal of the Marwari College, Bhagalpur for construction of Teachers Hostel and requested the college to send a detailed proposal for final approval.

The College submitted the detailed estim tes in June, 1973 for final approval of the Commission and intimated that they had stated the construction work in anticipation of Commission's approval But

the consideration of the proposal was postponed by the Commission due to paucity of funds during 1973-74.

The Bhagalpur University in July, 1974 intimated that the college had incurred a total expenditure of Rs.59,737/- on the project and requested for final approval of the Commission to the proposal of the college.

Under the circumstances stated by the University the proposal of the Merwari College, Bhagalpur for construction of Teachers Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs.1,78,221/- with Commission's share being limited to Rs.1,00,000/- or 80% of the actual cost whichever is less has been accepted.

Item No. 5 To further consider the demands made in the first All-India Convention of National Students Union held in Bombay and those made by the All-India Students Federation at its Conference held in Cochin.

The first All-India Convention of the National Students Union was held in Bombay in July 1973. was followed by the All-India Students Federation held in Cochin in January 1974. Conference In both the Conferences demands were made for the overhauling of the educational system with a view to making it more purposeful and relevant to the society. The Convention held in Bombay in July 1973 passed resolutions on Education, Affairs in Aligarh Muslim University, Economic and Political Situation in the country, problems of minorities and also issued an Education Manifesto. A copy each of these is attached as Appendices Ito V. The demands made at the All-India Students Fedoration Conference held at Cochin in January 1974 are indicated in Approving -VI. The main demands made at the two Conferences, so far as higher education is concerned. are listed below:

- The existing system of education does not fulfil the aspirations of a free people striving establish a secular, democratic and socialist society. It needs a large scale transformation to relate it to the life and needs of our people.
- 2. There should be a broad uniformity in the new pattern of education throughout the country. But at the same time flexibility and dynamism in the new system should also be ensured so that it has enough scope for experimentation and innovation and there should be proper links between manpower, planning and education.

- Emphasis should be laid on achieving a genuine equality of educational opportunity so that backward areas and the socially deprived classes are provided with proper education facilities. (The Commission has decided that 1070 of the fellowships may be reserved for Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes).
- 4. Pigher education should be made available to all those students who wish to acquire it but full time institutional higher education may be limited to those genuinely interested in academic pursuits. Great emphasis should be laid on programmes of informal education.
- Figher education is largely confined to the upper strata of the society. This situation should not be allowed to continue. Remedial measures should be taken so that educational opportunities are available to the underpriviledged classes. (The scholarships available to the scheduled castes and tribes from the Central and State Governments should go a long way in mitigating in desperities.
- 6. There should be continuous inter-action between various disciplines in order to develop new ideas and structures. The present examination system is irrelevant to the new society and should be reformed.
- 7. The medium of instruction at all levels should be the regional language. Teachers and students should jointly participate in the process of learning. Therefore there should be effective teacher and student participation in academic and administrative decision making.
- 8. The working conditions and pay scales of teachers should be improved. (It has already been suggested to revise the scales of pay of the teachers in the universities and colleges).
- 9. One year's service in a village should be made compulsory for every graduate as a precondition to the conferment of a degree.

 (The M.S.S. scheme of the Government of India)

as accepted by the Commission, is under the consideration of Fanels of the UGO - A definite picture is expected to emerge after all the panel reports are finalised.

- 10. More facilities for sports, games, recreation, accommodation, library and laboratory should be provided.
- 11. The outlay on education in the fifth plan should be commensurate with the requirements.

The points made above in the two Conferences had been dealt with in a very comprehensive manner by the Education Commission set up by the Government of India. The Government of India subsequently laid down the National Policy on Education which provides guidelines for the development of higher education. Education including higher education is a State Subject and the Centre's responsibility for higher education is only with regard to the maintenance and coordination of standards. In the light of the National Policy on Education, the policies and programmes pursued by the University Grants Commission are directed towards making higher education purposeful and an instrument of social change.

The question of structural changes in the educational system is under the consideration of the Government of India. The Central Advisory Board of Education has recommended that it is desirable to adopt a uniform pattern of education viz. 10+2+3, in all parts of the country. The University Grants Commission has endorsed the recommendation of the C.A.B.E. The Commission was also however of the view that where students were not desirous of pursuing the postgraduate courses, the pattern of education may vary as considered necessary. Further the course of two years for the pre-university or intermediate should be administratively separate for the College/University. The matter is being pursued by the Central Government with the State Governments.

The quest on of medium of instruction in universities had been discussed by the Conference of Vice-Chancellors in 1967 and the statement adopted at the Conference which has been endorsed



by the University Grants Commission is given in Appendix VII. This is a matter to be decided primarily by the Universities and State Governments. It may, however, be stated that most of the universities have either partially or wholly switched over to their regional languages in undergraduate courses in the humanities and social sciences.

Within the resources available, the University Grants Commission has taken various steps for the improvement of the present higher education system so that it is meaningful and helps in the economic and social development of the country.

- facilities for postgraduate studies the Commission has taken the view that postgraduate teaching should be consolidated as far as possible in university departments or at postgraduate centres set up by the university or through a coordinated programme by groups of colleges or in well-established postgraduate departments in colleges rather that allowing individual colleges to start subviable postgraduate departments. The Commission is initiating coordinated programmes in this behalf.
- One of the most important and perhaps crucial 2. sectors in the university system is that related to the undergraduate education leading to the Bachelor's degree. A major part of this responsibility, say about 85%, is discharged by affiliated colleges. The Commission has therefore devised programmes for improvement of college education through College Science Improvement Programme. This Programme is based upon the strength of the colleges and the motivation of the faculty as well as students to experiment with new aducational ideas, teaching methods, valuation techniques and thus make the undergraduate instruction meaningful and worthwhile. It has been decided to inditiate a similar programme for improvement of instruction in humanities and social sciences subjects. The COSIP has made substantial impact in improvement of science education



in undergraduate colleges selected to participate in this programme. It has also produced new text materials, new demonstration equipment and other teaching aids for class room as well as laboratory work. During the V Plan, these programmes will be implemented on a bigger scale so that they have a tangible impact on the existing situation.

- 3. The Commission has appointed from time to time raview committees in different subjects to assess the stage of development of each of the subjects in the Indian universities and to assess the facilities available for proper instruction and research and also to suggest the directions for future growth of each of the subjects. The work of the review committees is followed up with the help of panels in the subject groups. These panels bring to the notice of the Commission areas which need to be developed in different regions and also the programmes that may be initiated for the purpose. Following this, efforts are being made to devilop collaborative and inter-disciplinary programmes of courses and research involving several departments e.g. programmes in area studies, biological sciences, carth sciences, law & social change, development studies in relation to science and technology, and social sciences, environment and ecology.
- 4. The Commission has recently initiated a substantial programme for Examination Reforms and a plan of action has been drawn up and 12 universities have been invited to set up special cells for the purpose. The main emphasis would be to make evaluation of students learning, comprehension and performance an integral part of the total teaching process and thus eliminate the existing situation where teaching and examination are separately performed by different set of persons as well as institutions. New methods of testing and new examination questions will be developed on the basis of class-room experience and suited to levels of attainments of different groups of students.
- 5. The Commission has taken a positive step towards giving autonomy to carefully selected colleges, so that these institutions can experiment with new educational processes and bring about the necessary change in their teaching, courses of



study and evaluation methods. The guidelines and criteria for this purpose have been circulated to the universities and the process of selection of such institutions is to be taken up soon.

6. Attempts are being made to re-structure courses of study so as to make them relevant to local and regional needs including those of rural areas and also introduce work experience as part of college sducation.

- A beginning has been made during current plan period to provide direct support for research in the universities and also to build up the necessary infra-structure required for sustained research. Efforts are being made to involve university research in areas of R & D relevance so that they can make a direct contribution to economic development.
- 8. Programms have also been initiated to check the growth in enrolment in formal education and to divert a considerable proportion of students to benefit from correspondence courses, evening classes and part-time courses during the next plan period. Great emphasis will be given for developing such courses and to make team equal to or even better than the courses available in formal institutions. The Commission has agreed in principle to the concept of Open University.

So far as the question of democratising the educational system is concerned the Committee appointed by the UGC under the Chairmanship of Dr. P.B. Gajandragadkar in its report on Governance of Universities has made comprehensive recommendations with regard to the structure of the university bodies and the participation of students and teachers in the affairs of the university. The Commission has expressed itself in general agreement with the recommendation of the Committee. The report has been sure to the universities and State Governments and it has been observed that the State Governments in modifying the acts are drawing heavily on the report of the Gajandragadkar Committee.



The University Grants Commission has recommended revised scales of pay and service conditions for teachers in universities and colleges which are receiving attention of the Government of India.

In the Fifth Plan, sufficient provision is proposed to be utilised for removal of regional imbalances, and provision of commensurate facilities for the underpraviledged sections of the society.

The allocation for higher education in the various plans has not been commensurate with the requirements of this sector and the inadequacy of funds has adversely affected the programmes of the Commission.

The Commission at its meeting held on September 9, 1974 decided that the assistance to colleges for setting up "Book Banks" may be continued in V Plan.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

RESOLUTION ON EDUCATION



- 1. The existing system of education in our country does not fulfil the aspirations of a free people striving to establish a secular, democratic and socialist society. It is obvious that our educational system needs a large scale transformation to relate it to the life and needs of our people.
- 2. In the new educational system there should be a broad uniformity in the pattern of education throughout the country. But at the same time we must ensure that there is enough flexibility and dynamism in the new system so as to keep it in consonance with the changing times and local environment. It must have enough scope for experiment and inovation.
- 3. Education has not been given as much importance in our planning process as it should have been given. Education should be planned broadly according to manpower needs and keeping in view the demands of the future.
- 4. Education should be brought to the masses and a massive effort should be made to eradicate illiteracy.
- 5. Special emphasis will have to be laid on achieving a genuine equality of educational opportunity. The backward areas of the country and the socially deprived classes should be provided with all facilities of education.
- 6. Primary education should be compulsory, free and universal. Secondary education should be made free where it is already not so. Vocationalisation programmes should be introduced at the secondary stage. The entire system should be transformed in order to make it socially oriented.
- 7. Higher education should be made available to all those students who wish to acquire it. But full-time institutional higher education will have to be limited to all those genuinely interested in academic suit. This means that great emphasis will have to be laid on programmes of informal education such as correspondence courses and the open university.
- 8. The class character of our educational system is such that higher education is largely confined to the upper strata of society. This situation much not be allowed to continue. Remedial measures must be taken immediately in the shape of scholarships, for the under-privileged classes.

9. The content of education and the curriculum hould be recriented in view of the urges and aspirations of our people. The history of our freedom struggle against imperialism should be introduced in the curriculum.

The education system must inculcate in the students the values of the new society that we seek to build the values of secularism, democracy and socialism.

It should be related with the environment and should help in enhancing productivity.

It should be such ao as to provide for the all round development of the individuals personality to make him capable of facing the challenges of a modern scientific and industrial society.

It should stress the development of a scientific outlook, scientific attitudes and the scientific method and should be directed towards solving the problems of society.

- 10. The three language formula should be fully impremented and regional languages should, as far as possible, be the medium of instruction.
- 11. Co-curricular activities should be an integral part of the educational system and programmes of national service should be encouraged.
- 12. The rapidly advancing frontiers of knowledge and simultaneously the increasing tendency towards special-isation have today made inter-disciplinary studies extremely important. There should be a continuous interaction between various disciplines in order to develop new ideas and structures.
- 13. The present examination system is clearly irrelevant to the new society. Emphasis should be taid on internal evaluation and continuous assessment of the intellectual progress and capabilities of a student rather than his catacity of memorisation.
- 14. The standards and quality of education should keep space with the rapidly advancing forces of science and technology. In certain fields it should surpass the best in the world.
- 15. The student movement should fight the vested interests in the administration of educational institutions. Bureaucractic attitudes have no place in the academic community.

16. The student Unions should ordinarily be the bodies to pepresent student participation. However, suff cient representation should be given to the academically brilliant students and those good in co-curricular activities.

Representation from such categories should be through an electoral college. Student representation should be such as to cover various disciplines and aspects of University life.

- 17. Detailed manpower planning and a break through in industry and agriculture are required to provide adequate employment opportunities for our young people. A radical transformation of the educational system cannot be achieved in the absence of comprehensive social change towards a new society.
- 18. The endeavour of the National Students Union of India shall be to strengthen the popular movement in our country towards this new society.

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Appendix-II

RESOLUTION ON ALIGARH MUSLIM UNIVERSITY AFFAIR:

(13)

The NSUI expresses its great concern at the recent happenings in Aligarh Muslim University which had nothing to do with academic matters. The reactionary and communal forces that are seeking to make our educational institutions instruments to serve their selfish motives have also manifested themselves here. The Muslim Majlis and Muslim League that claim to represent minority right have created situation in which the academic life of this national institution is obstructed.

We would like to point out that traditionally the student union invited eminent national leaders to address them. But recently well known reactionary leaders such as Shri Pilloo Mody, Shri Banarsidas, Shri Charan Singh, Dr. A.J. Faridi were invited in rapid succession to incite agitation on the campus,

The Union leaders misappropriated Union funds meant for student welfare obtensibly for conducting the agitation. They have been assured of party tickets for the forthcoming $U \cdot P \cdot$ elections. Funds are also being made available to them from undisclosed sources.

They also insulted our national leaders like Shri Jagjivan Ram, Shri Fakhruddin Ali Ahmed, Professor S. Nurul Hasan and Five MLA from U.P. They conduct the most virulent propaganda against our leader Shrimati Indira Gandhi. They insulted respected members of the Executive Council of the University.

It pains us immensely to draw the attention of the student community to the presence of reactionary and communal element within the party itself who are willing to make compromises with the communists. We shall fight and expose them.

The NSUI assures all secular and democratic forces in the University that we stand solidly behind them in their struggle.

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NOTE ON THE PROBLEMS OF THE MINORITIES

The NSUI firmly opposes communalism of all shades however, we are fully conscious of the difficulties that the minorities of our country face even after a quarter of a century of freedom. Attempts at suppression of the Urdu Language, discrimination against Muslims and other minorities in employment and in various institutions of higher learning are well-known.

NSUI declares that these practices that go against the traditions of our rich composite culture and against the ideals of our freedom movement have no place in our national life.

Ordinarily the percentage of Muslims out of the total number of persons employed should have been broadly proportionate to their population. The facts are to the contrary. This could be because of two reasons.

- 1) The Muslims are economically and socially backward
- 2) They suffer discrimination in employment.

The result of this is the minority persecution complex and a feeling of insecurity which is exploited by the communalists.

In this connection it must be emphasised that the attempts to revive the Muslim League in various parts of the country is a more, that goes against the basic interests of the Muslim toiling masses of our country. NSUI calls for concerted effort to send the Muslim League and Muslim Majlis into oblivion.

We would also like to point out the aggressive communal activities of organisation such as the R.S.S., Jana Sangh and Shiv Sena with which Muslim, Communalists are in League. NSUI calls upon the Government to immediately take measures to solve the basic problems of the Muslims. We further resolve to champion all genuine demands of minorities and economically and socially exploited classes.

The final answer to communalism can only be given in the secular, democratic and socialist society that we seek to build in which every Indian will develop a new personality.

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BESOLUTION ON ECONOMIC & POLITICAL SITUATION

- 1. Our country is passing through a serious economic situation. The events of 1971 in the sub-continent and the natural calamities that followed contributed to a significant extent in creating these problems. We would like to point out, however, that ordinarily climatic factors make an adverse impact on the economy only when the base of the economy is week. Our rate of growth has been slow and our planning faulty. The emphasis is not an achieving physical targets. The fixing of financial targets in the plan and leaving its introduction into practice to private initiative maintains spontanety in the development of the productive forces and our young people remain at the mercy of a situation not of their making and outside their control.
- 2. The mixed economy has led to the growth of monopoly capitalism and the parallel economy which hamper social progress and have resulted in vast social and economic disparities. Shum dwellers live in the shadows of imposing sky scrapers.

NSUT demands that a full transition to socialism be made by bringing the means of production under social ownership. Major industries should be owned by the State and the lands of the landlords and kulaks should be distributed among the small and landless presently.

3. An effective public distribution system should be established by the State so that the benefits of social progress the common people of our country.

The economicantsis has manifested itself in the spiralling prices. If we are to control prices concerted efforts will have to be made on the economic front.

MSUI demands from the Government strong and serious measures to solve this problem. We also call upon the masses to help the Government not mass action to check this abnormal price rise. We appreciate the recent decision to nationalise the wholesale trade in what. We call upon the Government to further nationalise the distribution of all essential commodities. But the implementation of these policies should not be left with the bureaucracy alone that is itself in league with the vosted interests.

At the same time we feel it is our duty to expose and fight the substeams of foodgrain trade take over within the party.

The forces of reaction within the party that have in the past scuttled hand reforms are today engaged in resisting.

democratic and socialist socially that employs the forces of science and technology in socialist production.

4. The forces of right reaction are trying to utilise our economic difficulties to launch a massive attach on our programmes to give a between life to the toiling masses.

These forces manifest themselves in various forms and exploit regional, communal, linguistic and other parochial considerations in order to serve the interests of the propertied classes. Domestic reaction is assisted by making properties to subvert our progress towards socialism.

Those who pretend to be the saviours of this great national institution are doing it the greatest hare.

In the Banaras Hindu University the communal forces leby the fascist storm troppers of the LuS have created a situation in which the progress of yet another great national institution is hempared.

7. The MSUI categorically declares that communatism and parochiatism have no place in our national life and were resolved to spruggle against than with great vigour.

The students and young must mobilise their energies to fight reaction in all spheres of national life in order to make our socialist programmes a success.

ALL INDIA STUDENTS FEDERATION 19TH CONFERENCE HEID AT COCHIN FROM 14-17 JANUARY 1974

DEMANDS:



- 1. A new education system with scientific content and orientation and also with socialist, secular, democratic ideals and perspective should be evolved which would inspire patriotism and secularism and feeling of solidarity among students.
- 2. Teacher-student ratio should be reduced. Bettef relation and proper understanding should be developed among them.
- 3. There should be proper link between manpower planning and education.
- 4. The present outdated examination system should immediately be discarded and UGC recommendations on examination reform should be tried with necessary flexibility. While doing so, necessary safeguards should be ensured that this system will not be abused.
- 5. Medium of instruction at all levels should be regional languages. Steps be taken without any further delay to develop regional languages well-suited for the purpose.
- 6. Statutory democratic students unions should be set up. Active student participation at all levels of decision-making bodies of the universities and other educational institutions should be ensured. The teaching and non-teaching staff should also find their due place in all these bodies.
- 7. Secondary education has to be made free and primary education free, compulsory and universal.
- 8. More facilities for sports, games, recreation, accommodation (hostel) and also library and laboratory facilities should be provided.

Appendix-VII



The conference considered the question of the place of regional languages in higher education and affirmed its conviction that energetic development of Indian languages and literature is vital for the promotion of higher education and of national culture generally. The subject Erchange-over of medium of education to regional languages, the conference stressed, could only be considered as an integral part of a deliberate policy and plan with a view to improving the quality of education, promoting creativity and national integration and bringing education closer to the needs and aspirations of the community.

The conference was in general agreement with the recommendations of the Education Commission with regard to change-over in the medium of education. But, higher education is a closely integrated system and any modification, such as a change in the medium of education, would have a direct effect on other parts of the system. The conference recognised that the change-over in the medium of education, if properly carried out, would be a major step towards improvement of higher education and towards strengthening of its roots in our soil. The programme should be pursued in a sustained and systematic manner. The conference endorsed the statement of the Education Minister that "the programme of change-over to regional languages as media of education will have to vary from university to university, from subject to subject, and even from institution to institution, in the same university. The criteria in each case should be that the change-over helps, at every stage, to raise standards." The manner and speed of the change-over should be left to the university system. This was in accordance with the recommendation of the Education Commission and was reiterated by the Education Minister in his address to the conference.

The conference felt that at the undergraduate stage, the change-over in the medium of education to regional language could be carried through in about five to ten years, depending on the degree of preparatory work already done, on the nature of the subject and other relevant factors. In the programme of change-over the importance of English should be fully recognised and adequate arrangements for its study made at the undergraduate level.

At the postgraduate and research level the question of "medium of education" loses its usual meaning, as students will have to depend, for instance, in science, medicine and technology, on books and journals in English and other important world languages (because of the universality and rapid growth of knowledge).

In the case of all-India institutions, the present arrangements regarding the medium of education may continue, as recommended by the Education Commission.

In the case of large cities, with multi-lingual population, the medium of education may continue to be English, in addition to the regional languages which the university would provide.

The Chairman welcoming the members of the Committee informed that the Commission felt that in order to make education purposeful, measures have to be taken towards modernization, rationalization as well as diversification of the educational programmes in our colleges and universities Restructuring of courses of study and making them relevant to local, r gional and national needs was a step in this diraction. Equally important is the question of recrientstion of the contents of the courses of studies so as to bring about an effective link between theory and practics and incorporate relevant work experience as part of the class room instruction laboratory exercises and project work. The Commission, therefore, has appointed various panels in science and other subjects, committees to work out details with regard to providing bias to rural studies and problems, making naytonal service as part of educational programms and also the present committee to suggest methods of linking education with work experience and productivity. He also referred to the background papers relating to this subject, circulated for use of the Committee.

There was a general discussion with regard to the present patt on of education in sciences, humanities and social sciences and the inherent inadequacies of these educational programmes in making the products unemployable to a large extent. While it may be true that education may not create jobs it should nevertheless orient its programmes to increase the employability of the graduates and make efforts towards developing in them not only the knowledge or assimilation of information but also appropriate skills, attitudes and values which they could use as citizens and in the jobs that they may finally take up after leaving educational institutions. It should also enable them to continue their education subsequently through non-informal and informal methods. A reference was made to the problems of unemployment, self-employment,



training in enterpressureship etc. It was felt that while these are important matters, in the national context of social and economic development, the main concern of the committee would be to suggest methods which would enable setting in motion, processes which would help to integrate education and work experience both at undergraduate and at postgraduate levels, of education in our colleges and universities.

Over the past 35 years, while the hurried expansion of schools, colleges and universities has been continuing undiminished and at ever increasing cost, there has been a counter-tide of disillusionment with formal education. The educational institutions do not, after all, appear to equip people to be good at the jobs they enter or to contribute to the acceleration of production of wealth and welfare. Worse still, they seem positively to discourage people from undertaking types of occupation which are essential goals of social development.

The problem of linking education, work experience and productivity or employment is to be viewed from the points of view of intercelationships between education, work-experience for students, productivity general to national development, opportunities for carning while learning, and also learning to make a living by using appropriate technology by development of skills of a diversified nature. These problems cannot be considered in isolation from the educational programmes by resorting to providing supplementary courses and thereby making the students spend longer duration in educational institutions.

It is to be recognised that for a vast majority of students entering university system the first degree education extending over two or three years period is almost the terminal stage and accordingly an effort to link education with work experience should be made as integral part of the "total or complete education" offered to them during this period. In addition to this it may be useful also to develop post-B.A./B.Sc. and post-M.A./M.Sc. diploma courses in specialised areas which would further increase their employability particularly existing stock of graduates.

It is also true that several colleges particularly those participating in the college science improvement programme sponsored by the University Grants Commission have already made offerts in these directions but the present concern is not so much to confining it to a few selected colleges having hacessary motivation and facilities for



these purposes but to divise suitable methods by which 🐉 this could be introduced over the total undergraduate education system in the colleges and universities. The breaking of the existing rigidity of educational pattern, conferring autonomous status to enable an individual institution to devise suitable courses of study by incorporating work experience etc., are important factors. The Commission is already concerned with these problems. Nevertheless even within the existing framework of university prescribed syllabus and university conducted examinations, it should be possible to make worthwhile efforts to link classroom instructions in theoretical aspects with relevant practical work by drawing upon examples from the immediate vicinity and life satuations rather than taking examples from abstract situations with which the student is never confronted throughout his life. The effort should be, therefore, to expose and involve the students studying each subject to varying types of practical experiences relevant to the subject concerned keeping in view the emerging problems of a local or a regional nature.

The problem of introducing work experience is to be considered at two relevant levels - (a) at the first degree level and (b) at the postgraduate level. Education at the first degree level, at least in the case of science subjects should not attempt to narrow down the work experience offered to the students so as to make them fit to a particular limits of curriculum and the facilities available in a college and taking advantage of the R&D institutions, industries etc., in neighbourhood the students can be exposed to meaningful work experience and guided towards Optimisation of processes and development of products on a laboratory scale. In a quite number of instances, it may not be necessary for the colleges to set up pilot plants for such purposes. Good workshop facilities and exposing students to real industrial situations would help in developing the student's science and technological potential. The types of experiments to be chosen should be diversified and suitable modules developed for use by different batches of students as well as by different institutions. The relevant question to be asked is, how much is the student course work useful to him in his later occupations. Some acquitance should also be given to dealing with human relations and management by objectives.

At the post-B.Sc. level, the students can be introduced to appropriate project work and the topics for such project work and term papers could be identified in



consultation with the local industry. The universities, the industry, the national laboratories and other R&D Organisations can indicate the role of each of the components in enabling the students project work. The science and technology plan developed by the National Committee of Science & Technology has identified several such relationships and tasks in chemical sciences, earth sciences etc. Such project work which can make contributions to national development should be considered as a worthwhile experience to be introduced at the postgraduate level. Such project work should also be taken up by talented undergraduate students in selected institutions such as COSIP colleges.

It was, therefore, agreed that the individual members of the committee would make available to the UGC a list of suitable work experiences, laboratory exercises etc., which could be introduced as part of the undergraduate curriculum in different subjects. These experiments could then be considered by the science panels and adopted for purposes of restructuring of the courses of study in different subjects. The question of designing appropriate post-B.A./B.Sc. and post-M.A./M.Sc. diploma courses could be considered at a subsequent meeting. It was suggested that the members may make available the information suggested above within a month so that a few programmes could be identified and recommended for introduction at an early date.

To consider the recommendations of the Committee appointed to examine the proposal of the M.S. University of Baroda for assistance for the publication of Gackward Oriental Series.

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At its meeting held on 7th October, 1974, Item No. 14, the Commission considered the report of the Committee appointed to examine the proposal of the M.S. University of Baroda for assistance towards the completion of 'Critical edition of Valmiki Ramayana' and the Publication of Cackward Oriental Series. As regards recommendations of the committee relating to the publication of Critical Edition of Valmiki Ramayana, the Commission agreed to provide assistance for the period ending 31st March, 1975 and for the publication of Fratika - Index. However, the recommendation of the committee relating to the publication of Gackward Oriental Series could not be considered by the Commission. The recommendations of the committee regarding the publication of Gackward Oriental Series are reproduced below:-

"The committee then discussed the proposal of the university relating to its programme of publication of works in the Gackward Oriental Series for the years 1975-79. The committee was informed that on an average, the Oriental Institute was bringing out five publications in a year and the following expenditure had been incurred on this programme during the last three years i.e. 1971-72 to 1973-74:-

The committee noted that the average expenditure on the publication programme of Gackward Oriental Series would thus come to about Rs.40,000/- per annum. Since most of the publication work is done in the university's own press, the rise in printing costs is not expected to be much. However, taking into account the rise in cost of paper etc., the average expenditure during the period 1975-76 to 1979-20 may come to about Rs.45,000/- per annum or Rs.1,80,000/- for four years. Since the university has agreed to provide Rs.25,000/- per annum for this programme, the committee recommends that the Commission may assist the university to meet the balance expenditure of Rs.80,000/-".

Item No.8: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Standing Committee on new universities/university centres held on 21st November 1974.

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The Standing Committee on new universities and university centres met on 21st November 1974 and a copy of the proceedings of the meeting is attached as Annexure. The main recommendations of the Committee are given below:

I. Establishment of a University at Rohtak (Item no.1 of the minutes)

....

On further considering the proposal of the Government of Haryana for the establishment of a teaching-cum-affiliating university at Rohtak immediately, the Committee was not in favour of establishment of a new university at Rohtak at present. Instead, it was suggested that the Kurukshetra University Act should be amended in such a way that the unitary character of the University is maintained and at the same time a new organizational set up like the Directorate for undergraduate education in colleges is set up as a wing of the Kurukshetra University to deal with the affiliating functions in respect of the colleges that are now affiliated to the university consequent upon their transfer from the Panjab University. Suitable provision should also be made in the Act so that it would be possible for such a Directorate for Collegiate Education and for the Postgraduate Centre at Rohtak to function at a high academic level and in an autonomous manner, within the University framework.

II. Upgrading the Postgraduate Centres at Guntur (Andhra University) and Warangal (Osmania University) as fullfledged Universities in Andhra Pradesh. (Item No.2 of the minutes).

. . . .

The Standing Committee felt that the two Postgraduate Centres should first be enabled to function as autonomous centres academically, administratively and financially. It would be necessary for the Universities of Andhra and Osmania and the State Government to consider how best this could be achieved. The question of bringing about structural changes in the Acts of Osmania and Andhra Universities



may also be considered by the State Government so that on the one hand the required autonomy for the Postgraduate Centres be conferred and on the other a separate wing under the aegis of the Universities be brought into bring for discharging its affiliating functions for undergraduate education in colleges. The Fifth Plan Visiting Committees which would visit these Centres may also be requested to suggest the measures for the development of these Centres.

III. Establishment of a Science and Technological University in Tamil Nadu. (Item No.3 of the minutes.)

. . .

The Standing Committee noted that the Tamil Nadu Government has revised its proposal in conformity with the suggestions and conditions laid down by the U.G.C. and the Government of India from time to time and felt that there is a prima-facie case for setting up such a unitary university as it will pave the way for optimum utilisation of the existing institutions that will form the new university and also recommended that the proposal be accepted in principle on the condition that the proposed University should also include the Departments of Chemical Technology, Leather Technology, Textile Technology and Architecture and Town Planning of the University of Madras.

IV. Declaration of Gandhigram Rural Institute as an Institution deemed to be a University. (Item no.4 of the minutes.)

. . .

The Standing Committee agreed that a Visiting Committee be sent to Gandhigram to examine the proposal and make recommendations. The Government of Tamil Nadu may also be consulted in the matter.

V. Establishment of a University Postgraduate Centre at Tellicherry (Calicut University). (Item No.7 of the minutes).

. . .

The Standing Committee noted that the U.G.C. has already agreed in principle to the starting of a postgraduate centre in Tellicherry on the basis of its recommendation made in September 1973 subject to the proviso that the Commission would not be able to give any financial assistance for the purpose in the Fourth Plan and the question of assistance to the Postgraduate Centre in Tellicherry will be considered only on the basis of a report of an Expert Committee which would visit the University in due course. The Committee also noted that the Postgraduate Centre has started functioning and the Commission has agreed to the creation of one post of Professor in English. In view of this, the Committee suggested that a Visiting Committee may be constituted to consider the question further.



VI. Establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura. (Item No.12 of the minutes).

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Since the present proposal made by the Calcutta University is in conformity with the advice given earlier, the Committee recommended that the Calcutta University be allowed to go ahead with the establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura, and a Visiting Committee may be appointed to assess the requirements of the Centre.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No. 1: To consider further the proposal of the Government of Haryana for the establishment of a University at Rohtak.

The Standing Committee noted that its recommendations on the proposal of the Government of Haryana for the establishment of a University at Rohtak was considered by the Commission at its meeting held on 12th August, 1974 and the Commission "was not in favour at this point of time that Haryana State may have another University at Rohtak." The Commission had, however, felt that as and when a second university is agreed to be set up, it should be a Teaching-cum-Affiliating University coverning all the colleges of the State and that the Kurukshetra University should be enabled to develop as a unitary University.

The Government of Haryana, while requesting the UGC to reconsider its decision, has indicated that it would become difficult for the Kurukshetra University to develop as a unitary University in the changed circumstances as all the colleges of Haryana State had already been affiliated

with Kurukshetra University with effect from 30th June, 1974. It would, therefore, be necessary to set up a Teaching-cum-Affiliating University at Rohtak immediately so that the Kurukshetra University may continue to be developed as a unitary University.

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The Committee was not in favour of establishment of a new University at Rohtak at present: Instead it was suggested that Kurukshetra University Act should be amended in such a way that the unitary character of the University is maintained and at the same time a new organizational set up like a Directorate for undergraduate education in colleges is set up as a wing of the Kurukshetra University to deal with the affiliating functions in respect of the colleges that are now affiliated to the University consequent upon their transfer from the Panjab University. Suitable provision should also be made in the Act so that it would be possible for such a Directorate for Collegiate Education and for the Postgraduate Centre at Rohtak to function at a high academic level and in an autonomous manner, within the University framework.

Item No.2: To consider a proposal of the Government of Andhra Pradesh for upgrading the Postgraduate Centres at Guntur (Andhra University) and Warangal (Osmania University) as fullfledged Universities in Andhra Pradesh.

The Committee noted that the Government of Andhra Pradesh has proposed the upgrading of the Postgraduate Centres at Guntur (Andhra University) and Warangal (Osmania University) as Universities. The Committee felt that the two Postgraduate Centres should first be enabled to function as autonomous centres academically, administratively and financially. It would be necessary for the Universities of Andhra and Osmania and the State Government to consider how best this could be achieved. The question of brining about structural changes in the Acts of Osmania and Andhra Universities may also be considered by the State Government so that on the one hand the required autonomy for the Postgraduate Centres be conferred and on the other a separate wing under the aegis of the Universities be brought into being for discharging its affiliating functions for undergraduate education in colleges. The 5 th Plan Visiting Committee which would visit these Centres may also be requested to suggest the measures for the development of these Centres on the lines indicated .evods

Item No. 3: To consider further the proposal of the Government of Tamil Nadu for the establishment of a Technological University in Tamil Nadu.

The Standing Committee noted that the Government of Tamil Nadu had revised its proposal in conformity with the suggestions and conditions laid down by the UGC and Government of India from time to time in this respect. The proposed new University of Science and Technology would be set up with the College of Engineering, Guindy as its nucleous and would consist of the following institutions:-

1. Centra Polytechnic

- 2. Institute of Chemical Technology
 3. Institute of Leather Technology
 4. Institute of Textile Technology

- 5. Regional School of Printing
- 6. State Institute of Commerce

The Government of Tamil Nadu also proposes to move the Madras University to transfer its departments of Chemical Technology, Leather Technology, Textile Technology and Architecture and Town Planning presently located in the campus of the Alagappa Chettiar College of Technology to the proposed new university.

The Standing Committee felt that there is a prima-facie case for setting up such a unitary University as it will pave the way for optimum utilisation of the existing institutions with maximum economy. The Committee, therefore, recommended that the proposal may be accepted in principle subject to the condition that the proposed University should include the departments of Chemical Technology, Leather Technology, Textile Technology and Architecture and Town Planning of the University of Madras.

Item No. 4: To consider the question of declaring the Gandhigram Rural Institute, P.O. Gandhigram, Madurai District, Tamil Nadu, as a deemed to be a university under Section 3 of the UGC Act, 1956.

The Committee considered the question of according a deemed to be a university status to the Gandhi Gram Rural Institute and noted that the Institute is organising various courses which are generally not available in the Universities of India and some of these courses are organised at university level standards and the Institute is making useful contribution to higher education in its chosen fields. The Committee felt that conferring a deemed to be a university status to

Gandhigram Rural Institute would further enhance the development of the area of specialisation, teaching and research activities in the Institute. It was agreed that a Visiting Committee be sent to Gandhigram to examine the proposal and make recommendations. The Government of Tamil Nadu may also be consulted in the matter.

Item No. 5 and

To consider a proposal of Sri Venkateswara University, Tirupati for the establishment of two Postgraduate Centres in the University area - one at Kurnool and other at Nellore.

To consider a proposal of the Andhra University for the establishment of Postgraduate Centres in Krishna, East Godavari and West Godavari districts under the jurisdiction of the University.

The proposal of Sri Venkateswara University for the establishment of two Postgraduate Centres was considered along with the proposal of the Andhra University for establishing 3 Postgraduate Centres in their respective areas. Committee noticed that the Universities in Andhra Pradesh are following different policies regarding Postgraduate teaching. While Sri Venkateswara University is organising postgraduate education only in the University departments and PG Centres, Andhra University has now been permitting postgraduate teaching in selected colleges also. It would, therefore, be necessary for the State to have a definite plan for the development of postgraduate education and for this it would be advantageous to have consultation with the Vice-Chancellors of the three Universities in Andhra Pradesh and the State Government. It was indicated that proposals regarding setting up new Postgraduate Centres in the State of Andhra Pradesh will be considered after the proposed joint discussion with the Universities and State Government.

Item No.6: To consider a proposal of Madurai University for the establishment of four Postgraduate Centres at Tirunelveli, Palayamkottai, Virudhunagar and Nagercoil.

The proposal of the Madurai University for the establishment of four Postgraduate Centres will be considered after the question of organising postgraduate education in Tamil Nadu has been discussed with the Vice-Chancellors of Universities in Tamil Nadu and the State Government.

Item No.7: To consider the establishment of a University Postgraduate Centre at Tellicherry (Calicut University).

Sth September, 1973 it had recommended that the proposal of the Calicut University for the establishment of a University Postgradurete Centre be examined in the light of the data made available by the University and the matter decided by the Commission if necessary justification has been given. The UGG accordingly has agreed in principle to the starting of a postgraduate Centre in Tellicherry subject to the proviso that the Commission would not be able to give any financial assistance for this purpose in the Fourth Plan and the question of assistance to the Postgraduate Centre at Tellicherry will be considered only on the basis of a report of an Expert Committee which would visit the University in due course. It was further noted that the Postgraduate Centre has started functioning and the UGC has agreed to the creation of one post of Professor in English. In view of this, the Committee suggested that a Visiting Committee may be constituted to consider the question further.

Item No. 8 and No. 9:

To consider further a proposal of Guru Nanck University, for the establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Jullumdur.

To consider further the proposal of Gujarat University regarding establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Nadiad.

The Committee noted that the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee will be visiting these Universities to assess the Fifth Plan needs and as such these proposals may be discussed by the Visiting Committees with the authorities of the Universities and State Government.

Item No.10: To receive a copy of the Rules framed under Section 12-A of the UGC Act, 1956.

The Committee noted the rules framed under Section 12-4 of the UGC Act, 1956.

Item No. 12: To consider a proposal of the Calcutta University to establish a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura.

The Committee noted that the present proposal of the Calcutta University to establish a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura has been proposed by the Calcutta University on the basis of advice given by the Commission earlier while considering a proposal of the Government of Tripura for setting up a University in Tripura. The Commission had suggested at that time that the question of setting up a University Centre for postgraduate studies in Tripura be pursued by the Tripura Government with Calcutta University. Since the present proposal made by the Calcutta University is in conformity with the advice given earlier, the Committee recommended that the Calcutta University he allowed to go ahead with the establishment of a Postgraduate Centre at Tripura, and a Visiting Committee may be appointed to assess the requirements of the Centre.

Item No.13: To consider a proposal about setting up
Postgraduate Centres in rural areas made by the
Vice-Chancellor, Gujarat Vidyapith.

The Committee felt that such proposals be considered on merit.

Item No. 9: To consider the question of awarding approved construction work projects financed by the U.G.C. to Public Undertakings.

The University Grants Commission has been sanctioning various types of building projects to universities under the successive five year plans. The universities so far have generally been executing these projects through contractors after inviting open tenders giving vide publicity to such works.

According to the present practice, universities forward to the Commission plans and preliminary estimates of such projects alongwith the specifications to be adopted. After such plans are accepted by the Commission, the universities prepare detailed estimates on the basis of specifications and schedule of rates of the PWD/CPWD. As soon as these detailed estimates are prepared by the university, a copy thereof is forwarded to the Commission and the university also invites tenders for the execution of such works on item rate basis. For each such work the Cogmission receives information regarding the value of estimates put to tender, number of tenders received, value of the lowest tender, value of the tender accepted and if the lowest tender is not accepted, the reason for the same. On receiving this information, the universities are allowed to go ahead with the construction of accepted projects.

Difficulties have been experienced by universities in obtaining the services of good contractors in many places. There have also been difficulties arising out of non-availability of adequate construction material and even labour. Some of the universities have been trying to enlist the association of contractors located in out-station areas due to non-availability of suitable local contractors and very often universities find it difficult to get work executed through contractors or private agencies who have been registered with the Public Works Department for undertaking such works. These is also want of adequate competition before the works approved are awarded to such contractors. There is further abnormal dalay in completing such work detrimental—the developmental activities of the universities. There have also been cases where universities have been obliged to face awarded situation like contractors



leaving the job unfinished and in an uncomplete stage, resulting thereby financial losses apart from non-execution of the projects themselves. The number of contractors available and who can be engaged for similar type w of works is also very limited.

The Aligarh university has recently negotiated with the N.B.C.C. the execution of their building projects approved by the UGC. The NECC which is a well equipped, experienced and well staffed organisation executes the works undertaken by them according to CPWD norms and specifications. And the Aligarh University has indicated that the cost of works executed by the NACC which will avoid inviting tenders by the university will not cost more than what it would be by following the present practice of inviting tenders at 90 or 100% above the existing CPWD schedule. The agreement entered into by the Aligarh University (copy enclosed) shows that the university will be required to pay the NBCC - actual cost + 15% as over-head cost including profit to the NBCC. The university considers this arrangement to be better than entrusting the work to congrectors and keep also indicated that the terms of agreement proposed is subject to review when it will be possible for the university to decide the suitability of the arrangements made.

N.B.C.C., it has been stated by Aligarh Muslim University, has executed such works satisfactorily on the basis of "cost plus" formula for other Government institutions.

The proposal of the Aligarh University to execute its building projects through the NBCC to avoid inconveniences and difficulties in dealing with private contractors was referred to the CPVD. The CPWD has indicated:

"The N.B.C.C. And Government of India undertaking and as such can be relied upon to complete satisfactorily the rorks entrusted to them. If, however, the university do not wish to enter into agreements on "cost plus" basis due to the uncertainty of the final liabilities involved until the works are fully completed, and also are finding it difficult to get the works executed directly, they may be advised to entrust their future works to CPVD. The CPWD will take up the works as deposit works on payment of nominal departmental charges".



While the CPWD considers NBCC as a dependable organisation to execute such works entrusted by universities to it, it has also advised in case of difficulty that the work may be entrusted in future to the CPWD as deposit works on payment of nominal departmental charges.

The matter is placed before the Commission for its consideration.

THE NATIONAL BUILDINGS CONSTRUCTION CORPORATION LIMITED, a company incorporated under the Companies Act of 1958 and having its registered Office at 44, Ring Road, Lajpat Nagar-III, New Delhi 110024 (hereinafter called NBCC which expression shall be deemed to include its successors and assigns) on the other part.

WHEREAS AMU is desirous of getting all their present and future works that may come up for construction in the university campus till the end of Fifth Five Year Plan period executed by NBCC and, WHEREAS NBCC is willing to undertake and execute the said works as per terms and conditions and for consideration after fully described in Annexure I, NO WIT HAS BEEN AGREED between the above mentioned parties as under:

- i) That this agreement shall be effective in respect of the works listed in *Annexure-II and those awarded on or after the date of this agreement and that modifications or alterations that are made in this deed subsequently shall be regarded as additions to this deed.
- ii) That this agreement shall be governed by the terms of agreement fully described separately and shown in <u>Annexur</u>
- iii) That the attached document viz., <u>Arnexure I</u> giving details of the terms and conditions including the items of expenditures coming under the terms "Actual cost" shall also be deemed to form part of this deed of Agreement. IN WITNESS WHEREOF the parties above mentioned have signed this deed on the day and year above written in the presence of witness.

Annexure T (32 al)

Terms and conditions of the Agreement to execute the works of the Aligarh Muslim University at Aligarh.

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- 1) The NBCC shall execute and complete all such works as may be entrusted to them from time to time as per conditions of the agreement to the satisfaction of Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh and on the basis of the separate work order to be placed for different works and in accordance with the programme mutually settled in respect of each work. The list of works presently assigned to the NBCC is enclosed (Annexure-II).
- 2) It was agreed that the NBCC shall work as a major construction agency in respect of present and future works that may come up for construction in the University Campus till the end of 5th Five Year Plan period. The Aligarh Muslim University may obtain the assistance of the NBCC in respect of planning and designing of any works if it considers necessary on the terms that may be mutually agreed upon. All the same the University may reserve the right to assign any of the works to any other agency other than those already assigned to NBCC.
- 3) The NBCC shall be paid the actual cost as listed under clause 4 of this agreement plus 15% thereon to cover the Head Office overheads and margin of profit. This agreement will remain operative in respect of the works assigned for immediate execution. After six months, the position may be reviewed and any future works to be assigned to the NBCC may be on cost plus basic subject to the ceilings that may be determined after mutual consultations.
- 4) a) The term'actual cost' shall include the followings:

The cost of materials, Viz. Cement, MS rods, centering Shuttering and Scaffolding and other steel of various sections and sizes bricks, sand timber stone metal, lime stone and all other materials purchased or manufactured directly or indirectly, by the Contractors (NBCC) and the value of any other materials that may be supplied by the Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh for use on any of the works at the rates mutually agreed. This also includes value of materials received by transfer from other Units of the Corporation. All materials purchased or required through transfer except Plant and Machinery will be the property of the University. The University will always be associated in the matter of purchases of all major materials and consulted in % the matter of transfer from other Units of the Corporation.

b) Cost of cartage, insurance, freight, taxes, octroi, royalty, custom and excise duty, watch and ward etc. of all the materials/stores brought to site.



- c) Cost of direct labour engaged on muster roll and or through labour contractors and sub-contractors vi_z . piece rate workers etc. This will include all the fringe benefit like Bonus, retirement compensation etc. as per rules of NBCC as also the cost of importation of Labour, if any.
- d) Cost of idle labour due to heavy rains and other causes if it is beyond the control of the NBCC.
- e) Cost of all incidental charges of the field unit such as:-
- i) Salaries and allowances of all staff (Regular, work charged or causal) employed on execution of works, supervision, accounts recruitment of labour, purchase and maintenance of store etc. Salaries and allowances will also include all fringe benefits or remuneration like L.T.C., Children Education Allowance, Contribution towards bonus, CPF, Gratuity etc. that may become payable to staff as per rules of the Corporation. This will also include leave salary contribution for the regular staff posted at the unit.
- contractors

 ii) Payment to sub- / labour contractors (Jamadars)
 or any other agency employed for the recruitment of labour.
- iii) Any compensation paid or payable to labour under the workmen's compensation Act or any other labour laws of the country as also insurance charges on labour. In case compensation can be made payable by the insurance company through insurance there will be no question of further compensation by clients (AMU)
- iv) Expenses on running, maintenance of the P & M and vehicles including insurance, rates and taxes etc., and repairs during the execution of University works.
- v) Depreciation and interest charges on Plant and machinery including vehicles as per norms approved by NBCC.
- vi) Temporary works like hutments of the field offices, stores and for staff/labour employed on the works, approach road, water line, temporary electrification, as may be mutually agreed upon and considered necessary by the NBCC and the University.
- vii) Cost of all small tools and stores.
- viii) All contingent expenditure of the field unit such as T.A. & D.A. Office furniture and equipment, liveries, hot and cost weather charges, telephone charges, stationery, printing advertisement, postage and telegram, bank charges, staff welfare, laboratory expenses, legal charges and miscellaneous expenses etc. directly connected with the works of the University.



- ix) Water and electricity charges and cost of installations including international distribution and arrangement for construction purposes.
- x) Medical expenses for field staff and labour including maternity expenses for their families.
- xi) Expenses on insurances of labour, Cash, works etc.
- xii) Losses, if any on account of fire, riots, war or enemy action or any other causes beyond the control of NBCC.
- xiii) Any other item of expenditure relating to field unity in the interest of the University works.
- xiv) Extra percentage on account of Head Office overheads and profits will not be levied on 'Actual cost' in respect of Item No.(iii) and xii).
- b) Credit for the residual values in respect of Temporary hutments, small tools and stores, centering, shuttering and Scaff-to AMU, atter the completion of works in respect of the items that may be mutually agreed upon.
- 6) The NBCC being exempted from deposit of any earnest money or security for the execution of the works shall not deposit any such earnest money or security.
- 7) The NBCC shall be paid an advance to the extent of 10% of the value of the work alongwith the work order. This advance shall be interest free and shall be recovered from the running bills of the concerned work at the rate of 10% of the amount of the bill. The balance amount of advance, if any, shall be recovered from the final bill.
- 8) The Aligarh Muslim University shall make necessary arrangements for water and electricity as required for the construction at a convenient point for such sizeable work as mutually settled. In case, the same is not provided by AMU, the cost of such arrangement shall also form part of actual cost.
- 9) Payment shall be made by the AMU to NBCC every month as under:-
- i) Every month a running bill shall be prepared by the NBCC showing the details of vouchers, RVs, TVs etc. and submitted to AMU on the basis of actual cost plus 15%.
- ii) The Aligarh Muslim University shall complete the checking of the Bills within three weaks of the submission of the bill and any verification of vouchers etc. required shall also be completed at the site/office of the NBCC within this period.



The relevant original records will thereafter be sent to the Head Office of the NBCC and the University may inspect, them for reference till the final bill is passed after the completion of concerned works.

- iii) Payment for the monthly bill shall be made by the AMU within 21 days of the submission of the bill. In case, the bill could not be passed within 21 days for one reason or the other, an advance to the extent of 90% of the amount of the bill shall be paid to NBCC shall be adjusted from the concerned bill when it is passed for payment.
- 10) At the end of every year NBCC shall furnish to AMU a cost statement based on the audited figures of the Annual Accounts soon after the completion of the annual accounts. This bill shall be treated as the final bill for that year which shall be passed for payment by AMU within 3 months of the submission of the bill.
- The Aligarh Muslim University shall provide accommodate to the regular staff of the Corporation posted for the execution of the work.
- 12) The works shall be executed as per the general specification in force in CPWD, New Delhi or any such other specifications as may be decided by the AMU.
- 13) All questions, disputes or differences of any kind, whatsoever, arising out of or in connection with the contract at any time, whether during the progress of the work or after the completion, or whether before or after the determination of the contract, it shall be referred to two Arbitrators, one nominated by the Vice-Chancellor or the AMU and another nominated by the Managing Director of NBCC. In case of disagreement between the two Arbitrators, they can appoint an Umpire whose decision shall be final and binding on both the parties.

Item No: 10. To consider the proposal of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for construction of a second school building.

The Jawaharlal Nehru University has sent a proposal for the construction of one more school building to be constructed during the 5th plan period in order to achieve the target of providing academic courses for 3200 students at the end of plan period. The proposed school building will be with a plinth area of 96,572 sq.ft. The University has asked for the acceptance of the preliminary plans of the buildings. The ground floor of the building will have workshop, physical laboratory and other laboratories. The first and second floors will have administration, seminar rooms, lecture theatres besides laboratories. The third floor will have teaching laboratories, seminar room and lecture rooms. The fourth floor will have students common room, library, seminar room besides laboratories. The building proposed, therefore, includes mostly laboratories, lecture theatres, seminar rooms and workshops etc, in addition to a very small portion for the administration.

In this connection it may be stated that the Commission had agreed to the construction of a number of buildings during the 4th five-year plan period. These include a building for School of Life Sciences, building for the setting up of Computer Centre, staff quarters, hostel buildings etc. The total spill over component of the 4th plan and the items agreed to so far during 1974-75 which will be a first charge on the 5th five-year plan allocation amounts to about Rs. 3.50 crores. The Commission had requested the Jawaharlal Nehru University to send its V Plan proposals within an allocation of Rs. 6 crores, but the university with great difficulty and keeping into view the commitments made regarding the development of the university has been able to confine this to about Rs. 10 crores.

The Commission on the advice of the Government of India had requested the universities not to undertake as far as possible new building projects as a measure of economy in the context of the current financial situation. At its meeting held on 8th July, 1974 (Item No.19) while considering the memorandum issued by the Government of India for economising the expenditure by continuing



temporary ban on construction of non-functional buildings, the Commission requested the Government of India to treat buildings required for librarires, laboratories, including workshops (and animal houses, class rooms, accommodation and such other buildings as may be required for installation/housing of scientific equipment) as functional. Any other buildings that may have to be considered in merits of each case. The Commission has, however been agreeing to the construction of buildings in some universities where this was absolutely necessary.

In this connection it may be stated that while it may be possible to defer construction of buildings, to some extent, in the case of old established universities the requirements of the new universities and those established in the IV Plan, may have to be considered differently. In view of this it is for consideration if the proposal of Jawaharlal Nehru University for construction of the second school building may be examined and the university allowed to take necessary steps for its construction. The major portion of the expenditure would be incurred by the university during 1975-76 on wards.

Item No.11: To consider the proposal of the Meerut University for financial assistance towards the construction of a Guest Forse already completed by the university during IV - Plan.

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In September, 1973 the Mearut University had proposed that it may be permitted to include certain additional projects to be accommodated within the over-all ceiling allocation fixed by the University Grants Commission to the university for the 4th Plan. One of the additional projects included related to the construction of a Guest House. Since the University had indicated that it would be possible for it to accommodate within the over-all ceiling, the university had been asked to identify the savings so that this proposal could be considered. In March, 1974 before the expiry of the 4th Five Year Plan period, the university indicated that it anticipated a saving of Rs.1.51 lakhs and a sum of Rs.1 lakh may be allocated for the construction of a Guest Youse as UGC share. It was also indicated that the State Government had already released its share of Rs.50,000/- towards the construction of the Guest House.

On sacking further clarification, the university also informed that the actual construction of the Guest Gouse was taken up on 11.9.1973 and the construction work is also complete. The university has further requested that the Commission may consider allowing reappropriation of Rs.1 lakh from the savings of the 4th Plan as indicated by the university. It may be stated that while the university started construction work on 11.9.1973, the University Grants Commission on the basis of the memorandum issued by the Government of India for economising expenditure had advised all universities not to go ahead with the construction of non-functional buildings not taken up or when work had not proceeded beyond plinth level and if any construction work was considered assential, the same had to be referred to the Commission for its concurrence.



The Meerut University has completed the construction of the Guest "ouse without the Commission's concurrence and also when there was a temporary ban on construction of such work. It may, however, be stated that against the allocation of As.56 lakes provided to the Meerut University for the 4th Plan, a sum of Rs.48,56,718/-had been paid to the university as on 1st April, 1974. The amount if paid, will be the first change, to V Plan allocation.

The matter is placed before the Commission for its consideration.

Item No.13: To consider the appointment of the members of a Jury for making final selections of scientists for awards instituted by the Commission from out of the endowment made available by the Hari Om Ashram Trust, Nadiad.

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The Hari Om Ashram Trust, Nadiad, Gujarat has placed a sum of Rs.4.5 Takhs at the disposal of the Commission for creating a Hari Om Ashram Science Research Trust for giving three annual awards each of the value of Rs.10,000/- for the best scientific research work produced in this country by Indian Scientists in different fields. The following three awards are to be made to a scientists in the field:-

- 1. Sir C.V. Raman award for Experimental Research in Physical Sciences.
 - 2. Dr. Homi J. Bhabha award for research in applied Sciences.
 - 3. Dr. Meghnad Saha Award for Research in Theoretical Sciences.

As per procedure suggested by the Committee appointed by the Commission to formulate the guidelines for making these awards, nominations were invited from Vice-Chancellors of Universities, various research institutions, national laboratories and other professional societies.

The Commission at its meeting held on 2nd and 3rd June, 1974 (vide item No.41) desired that the Chairman may appoint a committee for preliminary screening of the nominations and to suggest refrees to whom the nominations may be referred for evaluation. It was also decided that the Jury to make final recommendations will be appointed by the Commission at a later stage.

As per above decision of the Commission, a Committee consisting of following members was appointed to scrutinize the nominations:

- 1. Professor A.R.V.Murthy, Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore.
- 2. Professor R.C. Mehrotra, Rajasthan University.



- 3. Dr. Amarjit Singh, Member, University Grants Commission.
- 4. Professor M. Santappa, Member, University Grants Commission.
- 5. Professor C.N. Ramachandran, Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore.
- 6. Dr. A. Ramachandran, Secretary, Department of Science & Technology.
- 7. Dr. T.R. Anantharaman, Banaras Findu University.

The meeting of the Committee was held on 13th August, 1974. The minutes of the meeting are given in Annexurer As suggested by the Committee the details of research activities etc. was collected from the nominees and was referred to the experts for evaluation. Out of the nominees recommended by the Committee Professor Jaikrishna, Vice-Chancellor, Roorkee University informed that he is not willing for consideration of his name for the award. The assessment reports from most of the referees have been received and the final selection is to be made by a Jury to be appointed by the Commission.

Item No.14: To consider further the question of financial assistance towards introducing shorthand and typewriting classes in colleges affiliated to

Delhi University.

The Commission at its meeting held on 5th April '72 had accepted in principle a proposal received from Shri Ram College of Commerce for starting Shorthand and Typewriting classes. The Commission had desired a note on the quantum and basis of assistance may be placed before it and the scheme extended to other colleges desiring to go in for it. Accordingly at its meeting held on 4th October 1972, the UGC considered a proposal received from Delhi University (Item No.8(ii) regarding basis of financial assistance towards non-recurring and recurring items of expenditure for introducing Shorthand and typewriting classes in the colleges affiliated to Delhi University.

For organising shorthand and typewriting classes for 100 students in batches of 50 each, a sum of Rs.21,300/- as non-recurring expenditure and an annual recurring expenditure for Rs.10,800/- with an expected income of Rs.1600/- from fees of students was indicated by the university for a college. Non-recurring expenditure was sought to be met by the UGC on 100% basis and the recurring expenditure was proposed to be treated as approved expenditure for purposes of maintenanc grant after deducting the income from fees,

The Commission agreed to provide assistance to the colleges affiliated to Delhi University for introducing shorthand and typewriting classes and desired that the proposal of Shri Ram C llege of Commerce (considered by the Commission at its April 1972 meeting) be assessed in consultation with the Central Secretariate Training School, Delhi. The Commission also agreed to proide 75% of the approved expenditure for non-recurring items and as regards recurring expenditure to be treated on the same basis as other recurring expenditure for purposes of payment of maintenance grant. The Commission further decided that this may be brought to the notice of other universities and colleges.

Accordingly the views of the Institute of Secretariate Training and Management were sought by the Commission on this scheme (America). The Institute of Secretariate Training and Management suggested that progress in acquiring skills in Shorthand and typewriting can be achieved and maintained only if a certain portion of time is regularly devoted everyday and as such holding classes on alternative days may not give the students the full benefit of training and one year duration may not also be adequate as proposed by the College and in the opinion of the Institute to

acquire the necessary speed and skill in shorthand and type rising a minimum period of two years training with daily classes i shorthand in considered necessary.

To produce good graduates with stenographic qualifications and to avoid wastage, the Institute considers that only 50 graduates can be trained in stenography and typewriting in two years and the non-recurring expenditure has been estimated at Rs.21,360/- and recurring annual expenditure at Rs.9,000/-. The income from students has been shown as Rs.6,000/- suggestill that Rs.10 per month may be collected as fees from water each student. Thus the excess annual expenditure over income has been estimated at Rs.3,000/- for organisis shorthand and typewriting classes simultaneously. For training in typewriting only a minimum period of six months is considered nocessarily with daily classes of one hour and on this basis in an academic year 100 students can be trained by one teacher and the financial implications would be non-recurring expenditure Rs.20,360/- and the recurring amual expenditure Rs.9,000/- income from fees will be Rs.3,000/- @ Rs.5/- par month per student and the excess annual expenditure over income will be Rs.6.000/-.

The Delhi University has considered the above views of the Institute of Secretariate Training and Management and has agreed with the same. The University has sought Commission's approval for institution of these two courses in the colleges affiliated to Delhi University is on the basis of the norms laid down by the Commission.

The Commission while considering the reply of the Dalhi University had further wanted the university to indicate how the university has assessed the particular need of the community and by the training proposed how the university expects to meet that requirement If the University has not made such an assessment, the Commission had further requested the University to make such an assessment in the first instance and then approach the Commission for assistance. The University has replied that it proposes to introduce the courses only in the colleges which have shown interest for introducing the scheme. It is difficult to assess the particular need of the community and how the training proposed is expected to meet that requirement. The University has indicated that it is generally clear that there is a great need for trained typists and stenographers and in fact the university is not finding it easy to recruit suitable stenographers. The university, has therefore, suggested that the U.G.C. may accept the proposal of at least a few of the colleges for the introduction of typing and shorthand classes without results of the assessment of the need of the community.

The matter is placed before the Commission for its consideration.

Institute of Secretariat Training and Management

It is assumed that the students selected will be trained in both English Shorthand (Pitman system) and Typewriting, besides other subject which they will receive coaching during their graduation course. The advantage of choosing Pitman system of shorthand is that, apart from its wide popularity in our country and abroad, it can be easily adapted to the writing of Hindi shorthand also the 'standard system' approved by the Government of India.

Shorthand and Typewriting are special skills, where speed is involved, and naturally the training methods are to be different from those adopted for other subjects in arts and science.

First of all, a proper selection of the students who have shown interest in their study is called for preferably by holding a screening test to assess their language ability, apititude, etc., as otherwise there is likely to be wastage of effort and money. This is mentioned because, not all who show enthusiasm in their study at the beginning, particularly of shorthand, do show the same degree of interest later, and quite a good number drop out because they find to their surprise that it is not quite so easy as they had imagined it to be. Shorthand requires daily class work and periodical revision; study at irregular intevals of time is of little value. Progress can be achieved and maintained only if a certain portion of time is regularly devoted to its study everyday. Therefore, it is doubtful whether holding of classes on altern tive days will give them the full benefit of training and shape them into good writers within a period of one year as mentioned in the letter dated 6th September, 1972 from Lady Shri Ram College for Women.

The University colleges do not work normally for more then 150 to 160 days in a year, which means 160 hours in a year, at the rate of one-hour period per working day. It is not possible within this time to acquire the necessary speed and skill in the twin subjects and be in a position to take an examination:-

- a) in shorthand at 80 w.p.m. (this is the minimum speed prescribed by an examining authority) and transcribe their shorthand notes on the typewriter with sufficient accuracy and speed;
- b) in typewriting at a speed of 30 way.m.a paper or babular work and also typing from corrected hand-written manuscript; and



c) a theory paper in shorthand typewriting.

The fact that they have to study other subjects also, in addition to shorthand and typewriting, and therefore, their time is divided between the two, will have to be kept in mind in this context.

In the light of what has been explained above, it is felt that a minimum period of 2 years' training, with <u>daily</u> classes in shorthand, is considered nocessary. Laying down this standard may help to produce good graduates with stenographic qualifications and avoidance of wastage. On this basis, in a class with 10 typewriters and a teachers working daily for 5 hours (this period of daily class work is assumed for the purpose of considering the proposal in the p.u.c., though it is too much to ask a shorthand teachers to work for more than 4 hours per day) only 50 graduates can be trained in stenography and typewriting in 2 years. The financial implications are worked out below:-

A minimum period of six months is necessary with daily classes of one hour to train a student in typewriting. Whether the training is given in typewriting only, or in both, the training expenditure per student, on the above basis, works out to be the same, viz. Rs.5/- p.m. Once the typewriters are made available, it is advisable to train them in both the subjects, provided the students are fit to receive that training. This arrangement will help not only in meeting the grate shortage of good stenographers felt at present everywhere, but in helping the young graduates to start their career on a decent salary soon after their graduation at a time when there is great unemployment in the country.

Item No.15: To consider further the question of pattern of Education namely 10+2+3.

At its meeting held on 18th April 1974 (Item No.14), the Commission had considered a note on the uniform pattern of school and colleges classes, and at its meeting held on 7th May 1974, the Commission generally endorsed the pattern of education viz. 10+2+3 as suggested by the Central Advisory Board of Education and as endorsed by the Advisory Committee of Vice-Chancellors at its meeting held on 30th January 1974. The Commission was further of the view that where students were not desirous of pursuing the postgraduate courses, the pattern of education may vary as considered necessary. The views of the Commission have also been brought to the notice of the universities in this connection.

There has been subsequent re-thinking in this respect. In the course of discussions that have been taken place about the adoption of the uniform pattern of 10+2+3 in the country by the task forces of the Planning Commission and the Central Advisory Board of Education a certain general consenses has emerged on the main features of the pattern. This was indicated at the meeting of the Central Advisory Board of Education held on 5th and 6th October 1974, as below:

- "(1) The school stage should necessarily cover a period of 12 years and should preferably be divided into 10+2.
- (2)At the undergraduate stage, we may have a Pass Courses of two years and an Honours Course of three years. This will have several advantages. In the first place, it will not mean an addition of one year for every student in those States where the First Degree is now obtained in a period of 14 years. It will thus reduce the cost involved very substantially. Even in the States where the B.A. degree is now obtained in a period of 15 years, this will make it possible for a large number of students to get their First Degree after 14 years, and this will save considerable cost as well as time. Moreover, the introduction of the Honours Courses for three years will make it possible to isolate the more competent and better motivated students from the others and help in raising standards, especially at the postgraduate stage.

contd.....

(3) It should be open to all students who have taken the First Degree in the Pass Course to appea for the First degree in the Honours Course at any ime.

- (4) Postgraduate course should cover a period of two years after the Honours degree.
- (5) The research degree should take three or more years after the Master's degree."

The progress made in the implementation of this pattern in the different States is as below:-

Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Karnateka, Kerala, Maharashtra and West Bengal have adopted new pattern of 10+2+3 and have also introduced the new syllabii associated with it. The State of Jemmu & Kashmir have also decided to adopt the new syllabus from the academic session 1975-76. In the discussions held at the Central Advisory Boxrd of Education, it was hoped that the remaining States would also take necessary action so that the pattern of 10+2+3 will be implemented by all States by the end of Fifth Five Year Flan so that the various educational objectives connected therewith could be achieved. The position obtaining in the States which have not implemented/decided to implement the pattern of education is given in Annexure

Item No. 17: To consider the work plan for Faculty Improvement Programme.

The Commission at its meeting held on 7th October 1974 white generally agreeing with the recommendations made by the Committee constituted by the Commission for formulating guidelines for implementation of the faculty improvement programme, desired that a concrete work-plan may be prepared and placed before the Commission. The faculty improvement programme would consist of the following activities.

- I University Leadership Projects under the College Science Improvement Programme and College Humanities and Social Sciences Improvement Programme.
- II Refresher Courses/Short-term Institutes.
- III Teacher Fellowships
- IV National Associateships.

Details regarding the scope of each of these activities during the Fifth Plan Period are given below:

I University Leaderships Projects

The College Science Improvement Programme (COSIP) which was initiated during the Fourth Plan period has been mainly directed towards improvement of undergraduate science education and has, as its important component, provision for improvement of teachers' competence, qualifications and other opportunities for the teachers to improve their teaching methods. Presently, about 25 universal Leadership Projects have been approved and are active,

The Standing Committee for the College Science Improvement Programme, which has evaluated this part of the COSIP has felt that the University Leader-ship Project has been able to make a distinct contribution towards improvement of the teachers in the Colleges and to make available to them the necessary curriculum and other material required for better teaching and has also been able to establish a meaningful channel of communication between university and college teachers. The Standing Committee has, therefore, suggested that the Commission could consider excending this programme further during the Fifth Plan period.



It is proposed that during the Fifth Plan period, every university which has more than 25 affiliated colleges providing undergraduate courses may be invited to take up a University Leadership Project in each of the major subjects so that the instructional facilities and methods in the colleges could be improved in relation to the courses evaluated by each university and the college teachers being provided with a variety of opportunities to improve their competence as teachers. On this basis, it is expected that about 40 additional University Leadership projects would be initiated in science subjects and a similar number in the humanities and social science subjects during the Fifth Plan period. adequacy of this number could be reviewed during the course of the Fifth Plan The present number would enable at least 10 University Leadership Projects to be initiated in each of these; two groups annually for the next four years. Since each of the U.L.Ps would be for a period of three years and the average cost for a science subject University Leadership Project would be about Rs. 10 lakhs and in the case of the humanities and social science subjects, the average expenditure per U.L.P would be about Rs. 6 lakhs for a three year period, the estimated expenditure for this purpose would be about Rs. 6.40 croves.

II Refresher Courses/Short-term 'Institutes'

These Institutes would be generally in the nature of the Summer Institutes so far organised by the Commission, but the universities would be enabled to organise such institutes at any time convenient to them throughout the year, preferably during the vacations. These institutes/refresher courses may be of four types:

- University/State based institutes generally of six weeks duration. It is proposed that each university or a group of universities within a State having affiliated colleges may be assisted to organise each year at least one institute each in a science subject and in a social science subject, depending upon the number of teachers and the colleges to be covered. Since the number of teachers and the number of affiliated colleges in the different universities and States would vary considerably, it is proposed that provision may be made as follows in determining the number of institutes to be held each year:
 - (i) one institute each in science subjects and social science subjects, if the total number of teachers in the subject concerned is less than 150;



- (ii) two institutes each in science subjects and social science subjects; if the number of teachers in the subject concerned is between 150 and 400;
- (iii) three institutes each in science subjects and social science subjects, if the number of teachers is over 400.

On this basis, it is estimated that each year about 75 to 80 Institutes would be held each in (a) science subjects and (b) humanities and social science subjects.

Fach such institute of about six weeks' duration may have 50 college teachers as participants. The expenditure per institute may be about Rs.35,000/-i.e. Rs. 52,50,000 p.a.

(b) Refresher Course/Institutes through Correspondence Method.

The programme is intended mainly for the undergraduate college teachers for raising their qualifications and to give them subject-matter competence through correspondence course so as to enable them to become better teachers. The programme envisages a one-year course through correspondence covered in eight semesters and one independent project.

The correspondence course may be organised in inter university collaboration basis in each State. The course material to be sent to the participating teachers may be prepared by combined efforts of the subject departments concerned in the State/the universities. But the responsibility of coordinating the work to cover the entire population of college teachers in that subject in the State would be entrusted to one of the departments of the collaborating universities in the State.

Besides the provision of courses through correspondence, over one academic year, the participating teachers may be required to have about 2-4 weeks' contact classes and laboratory work in the form of a short-term institute to be organised by each of the participating departments of the universities in the State for the benefit of the teachers coming from the colleges affiliated to that particular university. The programme of Faculty Improvement through correspondence courses may be viable in such subjects where the number of teachers to be covered is 250 or more in a particular State. The universities may organise correspondence courses for one year or in a fequential manner covering 1-3 years depending upon



its convenience and the facilities available. The contact programme of 2-4 weeks would provide the college teachers a forum for discussing their difficulties and for additional seminars, lectures and practical work.

The estimated expenditure on preparation of course materials etc. to be sent to the participating teachers may be about Rs. 5,000/- in a particular subject and the expenditure for the organisation of a contact class of 2-4 weeks' duration may vary from Rs. 15,000 to Rs. 25,000.

(c) All India Advance Level Institutes

The All-India Advanced Level Institutes would enable teachers from universities/colleges from different regions to avail themselves of the opportunities for getting acquainted with the latest developments in the subject concernd through lectures, seminars, discussions and possibly through project work. One or two such All India Advanced Level Institutes may be organised in each major subject annually. It would be desirable for a college teacher to participate at advanced level institute after he has attended at least one institute organised in his State by his University. The total number of participants in an all India advanced level institute may be limited to 50 and the duration may be about six weeks. The participants from university departments in such all India advanced 1 institutes should not exceed 25 per cent and such university teachers may nor may not have attended summer institutes etc. earlier. The location of the all India advanced level institutes can be determined on a regional basis to be organised in universities (affiliating or unitary), IITs and other institutions of National importance.

About ten such advanced level institutes of six weeks' duration may be organised annually in science subjects and an equal number in Humanities including Social Sciences. The organisation of an advanced level institute of six weeks' duration may involve an expenditure of Rs. 60,000 to Rs. 70,000.

(d) About ten Institutes in English Language Teaching may be organised each year for the benefit of teachers of English in the colleges. The English Language Institutes may be of 6-8 weeks' duration to be located in different regions so as to cover as many college teachers as possible region-wise. Out of ten such institutes to be organised in each year, 2-3 may be of an advanced level on an All India basis for specialised purpose. The estimated cost for each regional institute may be about Rs. 30,000 to Rs. 35,000 and that of an all India advanced level institute about Rs. 60,000 to Rs. 70,000.

III Teacher Fellowships



Teacher Fellowships are specifically meant to provide opportunities for teachers to work towards either an M. Phil. or M.Litt. cr a Ph.D. degree. Accordingly, the teacher fellowships may be of two types:

- (a) short term fellowship of one year's duration;; and
- (b) long term fellowship of a duration not exceeding 3 years.

The persons selected for long term teacher fellowships should preferably be below the age of 35 years so that the benefit of their training would be available for a long duration. In the case of short term fellow-hips of one year duration, preference may be given to teachers who are below the age of 45 years. Such teachers for either the long term or short fellowships should be sponsored by the colleges, which should protect their total empluments for the period of their study leave and also give them necessary increments; as due and give an undertaking that such teachers would; be taken back to their substantive posts without affecting their seniority etc. The teachers may be required to give an undertaking to serve such institution for a period of at least five years on their return to the college. Similarly, in signicase of teachers nominated for one year teacher fellowships, the college should give the same terms as for long term teacher fellowships. The teacher may be required to give an undertaking that he would serve the institution for a minimum period of three years on his return to his substantive post. In either case, the UGC would provide funds to the college concerned for appointing sultable substitutes in place of the achers nominated for these fellowships. The Commission would also provide to the teacher concerned a living expense allowance of Rs. 250 per month, provided the teacher undertakes to utilise the fellowship in a university not located in his place of duty. For both these categories of fellowships, a number of university departments and other research institutions should be recognised as approved institutions. The number of teacher fellowships either long term or short term to be accepted by any one of the designated departments should not exceed five at any given time and the number of such departments to be identified for the purpose would be about 50 covering all subjects. The selection of the teachers would be made by the departments concerned on the basis of the nominations to be received by them. Such departments may be assisted with a contingency grant of Rs. 1,000 to Rs. 2,000 per annum per teacher fellowship.



IV National Associateships

The present scheme of national associateships provides for 200 persons to be maintained on the roll of national associateships for a period of five years and provide for each national associate an opportunity of visiting other institutes upto three times, each visit of a duration not exceeding three months. This may be continued and depending upon the value of this programme, the possibility of increasing this number could be considered in due course.

It is suggested that in addition to this, long term national associateship programme, it may be desirable to introduce short term national associateship programme wherein teachers may be selected for a single visit during a year to work in any of the universities/research institutions having specialised facilities connected with their research work over a period of 8 to 12 weeks.

It is proposed that annually 100 such associateships may be awarded and the fellows be required to complete their visit within a period of 12 months from the date of selection. The other requirements of the short term national associateship programme would be the same as in the case of the present national associateship programme.

V. <u>Seminars</u>, Symposia, Workshops, Conferences, etc.

These are proposed to be continued for enabling peademic meeting on an all India basis or regional basis for specified purposes. The selection of such institutes would be made, as at present, with the help of an advisory committee once a year prior to the beginning of the academic year. The seminars and workshops etc. should not be of less than one week's duration and not more than two weeks duration. The duration in respect of conferences etc. would however vary.

Operational Procedure

The programmes stated above have been suggested to provide to the teachers in colleges a wide variety of opportunities for improving their qualifications and competence and for the exchange of ideas through group discussions. The organisation of an all India advenced level institutes.

in English Language Teachings, seminars, symposia, conferences and national associateship will be the responsibility to be taken up centrally. In the implementation of programmes like University Leadership Projects, Teacher Fellowships (after identification of the departments/universities) efforts would be made to decentralise the organisational aspects giving considerable autonomy to each university. The university concerned would be required to set-up a suitable machinery for coordinating the organisation of various types of programmes under Faculty Improvement.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No. 18: To consider the recommendations made by the panels in the humanities and social sciences at their meetings held in September/October 1974.

The panels in the humanities and social sciences met for the second time in September/October 1974. Reports prepared by the convenors of panels on Linguistics, History, Sociology, Law, Economics, Political Science and Psychology have been received. The report of the convenor of the Philosophy panel is awaited.

The main recommendations made by the panels are given below:

- 1) Regional seminars/colloquia may be organised at different places in the country on zonal basis to consider the question of updating the syllabi at under-graduate and postgraduate levels.
 -History, Palitical Scienco, & Economics Panel
- The question of developing museums and providing audiovisual aids to the department of History/Archaeology may be given high priority during the current plan period and the universities may be advised to include such proposals in their V Plan development schemes.

.... History Panel

To promote studies in the history of Science, assistance for appointment of a Reader/Lecturer and for books and journals may be provided by the Commission to about four universities, to be selected on regional basis, outside the plan allocation. The teaching of history of science may be introduced at M.A. level by providing one or two optional papers in History of Western/Indian Science.

... History Panel

A separate panel for social work may be constituted by the Commission and the present panel on sociology and Social Works may be called panel on Sociology and Social Anthropology.

... Sociology Panel

5) Short-term courses of 8-10 weeks duration should be organised as part of improvement of training of college



teachers. Running of these courses should be entrusted to the centres of advanced study in Economics and Institutes recognised by the ICSSR. Assistance should be given to these Institutes and Centres towards staff and equipment to enable them to run about three courses a year.

6) on a priority basis.

Suitable text-books at the undergraduate level, and reading materials mainly for B.A. (Hons) & M.A. students should be . rared / Reading material should supplement the text-books 数点点 *** basis particularly where more recent developments in the subject and enough Indian data and illustrations, are concerned. The concerned Universities should be encouraged to prepared schemes for preparation of text-books on economics of tho region in which they are situated and undertake them with the Commission's support.

7) In addition to the publication grants provided by the Commission to the universities, some universities may be given special assistance to publish the most distinctive doctoral dissortation and other research materials in a particular subjects. For example, the University of Bombay may specialise in publication of research materials in Economics. For this purpose, the University should set up a bread-based Publications Board of experts in the subject, including a nominee of the University Grants Commission.

... Economics Panel

8) The L.L.B. course should be of three years' duration with practical training integrated into it. Institutions imparting legal education may not generally be encouraged to start Masters Degree course in Law. Only in exceptional cases where all the conditions as indicated in the proceedings of the Poona Conference on Legal Education have been fulfilled by the universities, the question of permitting it to start L.L.II. course be considered. L.L.M. education should be offered to whole time students only and it is undesirable to impart L.L.M. education to part-time students. Whole time L.L.M. students should be provided with adequate financial assistance and for this purpose this course should be equated with the M. Phil. course. L.L.M. course must have substantial research content.

9) Proposals for introducing innovations in examination system should also be invited from the university law Departments and the Law Colleges and the Commission may provide assistance to a few best institutions for introducing examination reforms.

....Law Panel

10) A committee to evaluate the present position of teaching and research in modern Indian Languages may be set up and at least one member of the panel on Linguistics may be associated with the work of this Committee. The Committee may examine the possibility of starting linguistics courses based on the commonality of ideas, theme and terminology in various Indian Languages and consider the development of studies in Linguistics as part of the courses in Language and literature.

Another Committee may be set up to review the present position of teaching and research in English and foreign languages

A one-man committee to review the present position of teaching and research in each of the classical languages like Arabic/Persian and Sanskrit may be set up by the Commission. The Arabic and Persian Committee may be headed by Professor Wazir Almed of Aligarh Muslim University and the other Committee for Sanskrit and allied languages, may be headed by Professor T.G. Menkar of Bombay University.

Report of the Panel on Political Science

Minutes of the meeting of the Panel on Political Science held on Wednesday, the 25th September, 1974.

A meeting of the panel of Political Science was held in the Commission's office at 10.30 A.M. on Wednesday, the 25th September, 1974 with Dr. George Jacob, Chairman of the Commission in the Chair. The following members were present:-

The following business was transacted:

1. The report of the panel adopted at its meeting held in March 1974 and later revised by the Conveners in the light of discussion in the combined meeting of various



Social Sciences and Humanities Panels and suggestions received from fellow political scientists was adopted. The Chairman, while opening the discussion on the report underlined the need of picking up some items on a priority basis so that there could be some tangible results in terms of implementation during the Fifth Five Year Plan. Fe particularly emphasized the need of modernizing the undergraduate syllabi in Political Science on a country-wide basis. We was of the opinion that while some effort has been made to modernise the syllabi at the postgraduate level, there has hardly been any effort to do so at the undergraduate level. His point of view was endorsed by the panel though its members felt that the modernization of syllabi cannot take place in a piecemeal fashion, as an integrated view of the syllabus from the under-graduate through the postgraduate to the pre-Ph.D. levels with an eye on its modernization alone can help matters. panel resolved to address itself to this task with the support of the follow political scientists in the country on a priority basis. With this end in view it was decided to hold seminars/colloquia on the modernization of syllabi in Political Science either at different places in the country on a zonal basis or at one place on an all India basis. The consensus seemed to favour more the former than the latter. The final decision in the matter was, however, to be taken by the Commission in consultation with the Convener. It was also agreed that a working paper highlighting the salient features of the present day syllabi and, more importantly, suggesting the broad pattern of changes may be prepared which may form the basis of the colloquia on the modernisation of syllabia The Commission should decide in consultation with the Convener about the ways and means of preparing the working paper. It was also agreed that the colloquia on the subject should be held as early as possible

- 2. The Panel was of the view that for the time being the question of preparing a status report in Political Science may be shelved as we could draw upon the reports prepared by the ICSSR and part of the work in this regard may also be done at the colloquia on the modernization of the syllabi.
- 3. As far as the question of undertaking a study of the existing position with regard to the award of doctorate degrees and suggesting measures for improving the existing system was concerned, it was resolved that this issue should also be taken up at the proposed colloquia. For this Dr. J.N. Kaul of the University Grants Commission may be requested to prepare a working paper as he has already collected a lot of useful information on this issue.

- 4. The recommendations made by the Review Committee appointed by the ICSSR about developing research methodology courses in the Universities etc. was adopted and the idea contained in these recommendations could be pursued further during the colloquia.
- 5. The suggestions received from the teachers about priority areas of research were considered and the Committee thought that they were broadly covered by the subjects already listed. The panel would, however, like to recommend a correction in the entry about studies of socialism which should now read as Theory and Practrice of Socialism with special reference to India.
- 6. The panel thought that the proposal for introduction of courses in Criminlogy as a part of undergraduate courses in Political Science does not pertain to the field of this discipline though it could be considered by panels on Sociology and Law.
- 7. The panel wholeheartedly endorsed the question of developing the departments of mass communication and journalism in the Universities during the Fifth Five Year Plan on a priority basis. It also thought that effort should be made to introduce optional groups/papers in Political Science particularly on political communication and Political Development.
- 8. The panel did not favour the idea of integrating the National Service Scheme with the curriculum at the first degree level though it agreed with the need of modernizing the syllabi in a fashion so as to enable the students to apply themselves both to the theory and Practice of the subject matter of the study. The panel may try to have a look at the syllabi of Political Science from this angle while finalising the working paper for the colloquia on modernising syllabi in Political Science.
- 9. The panel considered the proposals received from the Universities and the College teachers for financial assistance for undertaking advanced research and made the following recommendations:
 - a) The response of the panel on proposals Nos.1,2, 5,6 and 7 was in the negative.



- b) The panel thought that the proposal of Sri S.K. Kakadey be considered among short-term research projects. (Later approved also while projects in this category were considered).
- (c) The panel thought that the proposal of Professor Perumal should be accepted though he may be requested to reduce the cost component from Rs.75/- to Rs.2000/-. The panel would particularly like to point out that it should be enough to have just two research assistants for this study and perhaps the field work and the use of question——naire may not be that much necessary.
- 10. The panel also considered the proposals for shortterm research projects and made the following recommendations
 - a) The response of the panel to proposals 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11, 12, 13, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 22, 23, 25, 26 and 27 was in the negative.
 - b) The panel agreed to subsidize proposals 2, 10, 14, 21 and 2± for financial assistance. The panel also felt that Dr. Kedar Nath may be advised to take up the study of the President's Rule on a case study basis selecting two or three states only. While the panel agreed to grant the amounts asked for in regard to other proposals, in the case of Sri. S.N. Dutta the panel thought that Rs. 1500/- for printing should be deleted.
- 11. The panel also considered the short term projects submitted by teachers of Public Administration and made the following recommendations:
 - a) Dr. P.D. Sharm's proposal should be treated as a proposal for advanced study and it may be sent for opinion of experts before it is considered by the panel in a subsequent mesting.
 - b) The panel's response to proposal No.3, 4 and 5 was in the negative, while it agreed to subsidize Dr. Ravindra Sharma's proposal to the extent of Rs. 2000/-



- 12. The panel also considered the short term research projects from the teachers of Library Science. While its response to proposals 2 and 3 was in the negative, it recommended that proposals 1,4 be subsidized to the tune of Rs. 2,500/-.
- 13. From among the supplementaries, the panel agreed to subsidize proposals No.1, 2, 3 and 5 in Political Science, while it said no to proposals No.4, 6, 7, 8 and 9. Here it also reduced the amount of grant to Rs.2000/-in the case of proposal No.1. The panel did not consider the proposal of Professor K. Kamalanathan as it belonged to the advanced category proposals and should as such be sent for the opinion of the expert.
- 14. As far as supplementary proposals in Public Administration were concerned, it agreed to support the proposal of K. Murli Manchar, though to the tune of Rs. 2,500/- only.
- 15. As far as the supplementary proposals in Library Science were considered, the panel agreed to finance the proposal of Sri H.A. Khan, though the panel thought that its would be advisable if he only confined his research to Karnataka.
- 16. The panel up-dated as far as it could the list of University professors in Political Science, though it felt that the Commission was in a better position to do so. The panel also observed that it should take its obligations more seriously in this regard than its seems to have done in its present effort.
- 17. The panel took note of the suggestion that efforts should be made to encourage study of Parliementary Institutions in the country.
- 18. Finaly, the panel considered the recommendations made by the University Grants Commission Standing Committee on Development of Libraries in the Universities. The panel strongly felt that there should be no dispersal of the resources and stock of central library. If departmental libraries were to be built up, this could be done on the basis of additional holdings only. The panel would, however, not like to recommend any uniform pattern as the existing situation varied from University to University and it may not always be desirable to change it in favour of a uniform model.

The meeting came to an end with a vote of thanks to the Chair.

Report of the penel on Economics

The meeting of the Economics Panel was held on 27th September, 1974 at 10.30 A.M. and it lasted till 6.00 P.M. on the same day. Discussions were continued on the 28th September, 1974 from 10-30 A.M. to 1.00 P.M. The following were present:

After considerable discussion it was decided that the panel should take first in hand the question of preparation of suitable textbooks at the undergraduate level, two on each major topic, and the selection of reading material, mainly for B.A. (Hons.) and M.A. students. The reading material should supplement the textbooks regarding more recent developments and it should also provide enough Indian data and illustrations. The panel should recommend to the University Grants Commission the major topics on which books and monographs were essential. The names of the persons to be invited on each of them and the selection of reading material along with the changes needed in the same so as to make them appropriate for the purpose in hand should be indicated; and the persons invited should be allowed if they so seems to take the help of one or more co-authors with the approval of the University Grants Commission. Their requests for facilities beyond those usually given for the preparation of such books should be sympathetically considered.

As for as textbooks for B.A. students are concerned it was lecided that the following papers should be taken up:

- Micro-Economics including a brief discussion 1. of Methodology;
- Micro-Economics including introduction to 2. social accounting;
- International Economics, 3.
- Economics History of India till 1947; 4.



- 5. Indian Economic Problems (after 1946);
- 6. Problems of Growth and Development;
- 7. Public Finance and Fiscal Policy;
- 8. Mathematical and Statistical techniques in their application to economics;
- 9. Regional Economics.

It was decided that the Universities should be requested to submit schemes for preparation of textbooks in Economics of the regional in which they are situated.

It was decided that short-term courses 8-10 week's duration should be organised as a part of improvement of training of college teachers. They should comprise of some elementary mathematics and statistics, elementary research methodology and exercises in application of the same. In the first instance the running of these courses should be entrusted to the centres of advanced study in Economics and institutes recognised by the ICSSR. These institutes and centres should be given necessary staff and equipment to run about 3 courses a year. In running the courses help should be taken from the staff of colleges and other Universities belonging to the region. The UGC should ensure that necessary facilities are given to college teachers to attend these courses.

It was suggested that regional seminars should be organised to discuss the courses for economic students mainly at the undergraduate stage. A background paper should be prepared with special reference to undergraduate training by Dr. Man Mohan Singh.

Item 2: It was agreed that the status report in Economics should contain the present position of teaching and research in the subject; the new papers that should be introduced, and the new lines of research. In addition to this, it should also give an idea of the work of the existing departments and institutions and assess their potential for further teaching and research work. The report should be prepared in the course of 18 menths. Further discussion on the subject was postponed to the next meeting.

Item 3: It was decided that before giving a Ph.D. degree to a student, it should be ensured that he had undergone a training in research methodology as an essential part of the Ph.D. programme; the training course would last for about a year. The Ph.D. theses should be regarded as a contribution to the understanding of the subject and an application of the technique of analysis.

In order to ensure that publications should be prompt and also of high standard, it was agreed that in addition to the ordinary publication grants, some universities should be given special grants to specialize in publications in different subjects. The University of Bombay may be approached for specialisation in Economics publications. For this purpose, the university should agree to set up a broadly based publication board of experts in the subject including a nominee of the University Grants Commission,

Item No.4: The matter had been partly covered in Item 3. Further consideration of the same was postponed to the next meeting.

Item 5: The priority areas of research in Economics:

The suggestions received from various teachers were considered and it was decided to amend the priority areas as under:

- (1) Item 3 Instead of import substitution in India, 'expert promotion and import substitution in India'.
- (2) After Item 14; 14(a) Technological change and agricultural development and income distribution.
- (3) After 10: 10(a) Public distribution system.
- (4) Item 16: Economics of Education.

Item 6: The Panel had no opinion to express.

Item 7: The recommendations made by the Committee for the development of studies of transport economics were reviewed. The Panel generally agreed with the same. It, however, felt that the claims of Commerce Developments which might have been teaching transport economics and doing research in the same should not be over-looked.



Item 8: The question of integrating the national service scheme with the B.A. curriculum was considered. It was felt that the best way to link the two would be to have one optional paper at the B.A. (Fons.) level where students could do a field project individually or in groups on subjects like 'Appraisal of a plan project'.

Item 9: It was decided to recommend to the University Grants Commission that the research material cell at the Osmania University should be financed for one more year i.e. 1974-75 and that the expert assessment committee which visits the Osmania University should be requested to also review the work of the research material cell and submit a detailed report on the same.

Item 10: The present procedure for consideration of schemes were discussed. It was felt that for their efficient consideration, these should be circulated in advance among the Panel members. The University Grants Commission should consider to that end asking those who submitted the schemes to submit an appropriate number of copies.

The following proposals were recommended for acceptance by the University Grants Commission:-

12. The list of University Professors in Economics was discussed. The Office was requested to write to the Universities and ensure that the list was up-to-date.

13. The recommendations of the U.G.C. Standing Advisory Committee on Library development in the universities and colleges were considered. The seminar agreed with the recommendation that there should be complementary seminar libraries in Social Sciences in which documentary material could be kept. It recommended that this practice should be made applicable to new universities as well as well established universities.

Report of the Panel on Sociology

Minutes of the meeting of the panel of Sociology held on 30th September, 1974, at the office of the University Grants Commission, New Delhi.

The meeting of the Sociology Panel was held at the Office of the University Grants Commission on September 30, 1974. The various items placed on the agenda were discussed and the following decisions were arrived at.

- 1. In view of the report of the panel adapted at its meeting held in March, 1974, it was decided to constitute a separate UGC Panel for Social Work. The present panel on Sociology and Social Work would now be called Panel on Sociology and Social Anthropology.
- In addition to the preparation of a status report in sociology as suggested in the final report of the panel adapted in March, 1974, it was decided that an 'appraisal report' on sociology may be prepared preferably within two to three weeks time by a Committee consisting of the convener Professor S.C. Dube and Professor M.S.A. Rao.

The Status Report may be prepared by the same panel of experts as suggested in March meeting of the Sociology Panel.

The existing system of doctoral level work and the 3. award of Ph.D. was discussed by the members in order to suggest measures to improve the standards. members were of the opinion that some high quality level course work must be a part of the Ph.D. programme in all Universities. In working out the exact nature of the course work, such as whether it should be a part of M.Phil Programme or whether it should be merely pre-Ph.D. course work, and what emphasis may be given in the course work itself in respect of orientation to methodology, theory and analysis of substantive areas etc., it was decided that scope for flexibility may be allowed in developing such programmes. In addition to this the members felt that some norms about the number of students registered at the Centres/ departments commensurate to the number of supervisors available may be essential to lay down for all universities.



- 4. The recommendations made by the review committee appointed by the ICSSR about developing research methodology course and Pre-Ph.D. course in the University was considered. It was decided that University Grants Commission may enable selected departments on merit to organize research methodology courses.
- 5. The suggestions received from the teachers about priority areas of research in Sociology and Social Work were considered. It was suggested that since the ICGSR has already selected 12 major areas of priority research work of which it may not be able to sponsor all of them just now due to various reasons, it may be advisable that University Grants Commission selects 2-3 of these priority areas for promotion as a part of its own programmes.
- 6. Regarding the questions of developing the Departments of Mass Communications and Journalism in the universities during the Fifth Plan period members held the view that both Journalism and Mass Communication as areas of study and research merit promotion at an independent level without being part of sociology programmes. Being of interdisciplinary nature, for the promotion of these two areas, disciplines like sociology, psychology, political Science anthropology and education may be of relevance. It may nevertheless be possible that Centres/Departments in any of these individual disciplines may institute relevant courses in mass communication and journalism contingent to the core of the respective discipline concerned. The University Grants Commission might approach such individual departments for promotion of the scheme.
- 7. The question of integrating the National Scheme with the curriculum at the first degree level in Sociology was considered in depth. After deliberations at length the panel decided as follows:
 - i) Since at present only a small minority of students (less than 10%) is involved in NSS work at the first degree level in Sociology it may not be possible to integrate the NSS Scheme with course work.

- ii) However, the Heads of Departments and persons designated for NSS work may be formally involved in discussing with the students participating in NSS Scheme, to evolve relevant areas related to the course that he/they may be offering based on the experience of the students in this context. Such areas may be incorporated eventually in their teaching courses.
- iii) Panel held that in order to render the NSS really offective efforts should be made to involve more students in this programme.
- 8. The proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking advanced research were scrutinised by the panel. The projects No.3 and 5 were approved. For the project 5 it was decided that Professor S.N. Ranade, in consultation with the referee of his project may work out the re-allocation of the project estimate of his project in view of the various phases in which it would be undertaken. Project No.4,6 and 13 were rejected. Consideration of the rest of the projects were postponed in view of the absumes of the referees comments for later considerations.
- 9. The proposals received from the University and College Teachers for financial assistance for undertaking short-term projects were considered. The projects as mentioned in Annexure-I were approved for the amounts mentioned against each.
- 10. The list of the University Professors in Sociology and Social Work was received and up-dated.
- 11. The proposals for the introduction of courses in Criminology as part of the undergraduate course at the Universities was considered. The Panel decided that Criminology being an independent discipline, it may not be advisable or possible to link it up with sociology. However, certain areas of Criminology such as Sociology of deviant behaviour, sociology of crime and social pathology etc. which are related to criminology and also form part of Sociology may be introduced as optional papers in undergraduate courses in sociology.



The recommendation of the UGC Standing Committee for development of libraries in the universities about the desirability of establishing specialised seminar libraries in universities was discussed by the panel. The panel held that whereas it may not be desirable to change the organic character of the library wherever possible departments/centres may be allowed to develop their own Seminar Library hollings by berrowing books from the Centre Library to be used by the faculty and the students.

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Report of the Panel on Linguistics

Report of the Lignistics Panel which met on 3rd & 7th October, 1974 in the Commission's Office.

The second meeting of the Panel on Linguistics was held in the Commission's office on 3rd & 4th October, 1974 at 10.30 A.M. The following were present:

The Panel considered the filowing items: -

Item No. 1: To receive the final report of the panel adopted at its meeting held in Merch, 1974.

The panel accepted the report and made the following recommendations:

- A. (i) There should be an additional sub-committee for English and Foreign Larguages on the same lines as the sub-committee on Modern Indian Larguages. The terms of reference of this sub-committee uills therefore, be mutatic mutandis same as the above sub-committees.
 - (ii) Add the following to the terms of reference of Modern Indian Languages and research programmes sub-committee under (iii):
 - "At least one of the members of the parel may be associated with the work of the sub-committee and the sub-committee may be requested to meet the Fanel at its next meeting. The report of the sub-committee should be available within 6 months i.e. by my May, 1975".
- B. The programmes in English, as suggested in agenda item No.5 by the Panel in Linguistics, should be developed at some selected centres in the universities. It was further recommended that these suggestions may be passed on to the proposed subcommittee on English and Foreign Languages for suggesting modalities of operationalising of such programmes. The subcommittee may further consider the financial implications of starting of such programmes at selected centres and seeking the UGC support.

The Panel recommended that one man committees may be appointed in classical languages like Arabic and Persian and Sanskrit headed by Professor Msser Ahmed and Professor Heirkar respectively and they may submit their reports and reviews on their subject within the same time span on the other sub-committee and that with the same terms of reference mitatia mutancis.

Item No.2: To consider the question of preparing a status report in Linguistics indicating the most promosing areas of devolopment, the work done in the existing centres and the nature of support needed.

The proposals submitted by the various universities for development of linguistics during the V Plan period were sent to Frof. R. B. Panlit. It is requested that the proposals received from the universities for development of linguistics, but not already sent to the Cowener may now be sent to him as early as possible.



The status reports on -(1) English & Foreign Languages; and (ii) Modern Indian Languages will be ready by about 6 months. These reports will cover both teaching and research.

Appraisal reports for the guidence of the Visiting Gommittees will be prepared as under: -

- (1) Minguistics by Prof. P.B. Pandit
- (ii) Sanskrit Pali and Prakrit by Prof. Mainkar.
- (111) Arabic and Fersian by Prof. Assar
 - (iv) The question of appraisal reports for Modern Indian Languages and English may be considered by the Commission.
- Item No.3. To consider the question of undertaking a study of the existing position with regard to the award of doctorate degrees and suggest measures for improving the existing system in the interest of raising the standards.
- Item No.4. To consider the recommendations made by the Review Committee appointed by the I.C.S.S.R. about developing research methodology courses in the universities and the question of developing and strengthening Pro-Ph.D. courses in the universities.

The Panel considered the proposals for improving the existing system of research degrees such as Ph.D.

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The Panel discussed the issues in the light of the ICSSR suggestions and observations on the earlier committees and made the following recommendations:

- (1) There is a need to introduce a pre-Ph.D. course between master's degree and the doctorate degree which may be known as M.Litt. or M.Phil. because the master's degree courses at present do not generally have a proper research orientation and do not equip the students with proper understanding for undertaking advanced research. The components of such a programme should include a regular course work in -
 - (i) research methodology;



- (ii) advanced research in the field of specialisation;
- (iii) comprehensive coverage of the field; and
 - (iv) project or thesis work.
- (2) It may not be necessary to evolve a common Ph.D. course for all discipling under the Humanities and Social Sciences.
- (3) One of the purposes of the Fre-Ph.D. course may be to fillier out such students who do not possess necessary aptitude for research work.
- (4) It is advisable that such an M.Litt/M.Phil. programme should be of two years' duration. However, if it is not a terminal degree then the Ph.D. programme should be of 3 years duration, the first year of which will be a pre-Fh.D. programme.
- (5) The Junior Research Fellowship should be made available to the candidates working towards M.Litt./M.Phil.
- (6) There should be a rigorous admission procedure for envoluent to research degrees such as M.Litt./M.Phil. or Ph.D.

Evaluation: The Panel recommends that there should be two external examiners for evaluating a Ph.D. thesis whose concurrence is essential for the award of the degree and one internal examiner, who superviser the thesis.

The names of all the examiners who accepted the thesis should be inscribed on the thesis and if and when the thesis is published these names should also be printed.

Item No.5; To consider the suggestion received from Professor T.G. Mainkar and Dr. D.P. Pattanayak with regard to the development of teaching and research in Sanskrit and Linguistics and introduction of Linguistics in the Postgraduate courses in various languages.

This was noted.



Item No.8. To consider the suggestions received from the seachers about areas of priority research in Languages and Linguistics.

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The Panel recommends that the sub-committees (for singlish and Foreign Languages, Modern Indian Languages, Arabic & Persian and Sanskrit) may consider this item in greater detail.

Item No.7; To consider the question of integrating the National Service Scheme with the curriculum at the first degree level.

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The Panel considered the proposal and felt that the National Service Scheme cannot be integrated with the curricula of the subjects which come under the purview of this purel. This, however, does not perclude the operation of NSS as an activity itself.

Item No.3: To consider the proposals recaived from the University and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking advanced research.

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The Panel considered the proposals received from advanced research in languages and linguistics and made the following recommendations:

- i) The proposal of Dr. S. Nagarajan, Head of the Department of English, Poona may be considered under the U.G.C. scheme of assistance for writing university level books.
- ii) Dr. S.K. Desal, Head of the Department of English, Shiveji University may be advised to revise the project in the light of the comments made by the exports and the revised proposals when received may be placed before the panel for consideration.
- iii) An amount of 3s.2,000/- may be sanctioned under the UGC scheme for assistance for short-term projects to Dr. G.N. Rao, Lecturer in English, Sri Venkateswara University.



- iv) Meas of exports on the projects submitted by Dr. M.S. Sangadhar, wead of the Department of Marathi, S.H.D.T. University, awaited.
- (v) Dr. S. Acherya, Reader in Linguistics, Gujarat
 Vidyapith may be advised to delimit his project to
 one region as suggested by the export. The comments
 of the expert may be communicated to him and he may
 be advised to ravise the project accordingly.
- The proposal for assistance submitted by Dr. V.I. (v1)Subvamorian. Held of the Department of Linguistics, Kerala University for undertaking Muslim dialect survey may be considered as part of the V Plan development as was done in the case of the two earlier similar project undertaken by him and the proposal may be considered by the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee. The Kerala University may if it so desires appoint Research Assistants upto March, 1975 for initiating the project. Under reforence can meet 50% of the expenditure thereon from their own resources and other 50% may be met from out of funds that may be allocated by the Commission to it during the Fifth Plan. Item No.10: To receive a list of university professors in Languages including Linguistics.

The list of University Professors may be up-to-dated by the Commission.

Item No.11: To consider the recommendation made by the UGC Standing Committee on development of Libraries in the universities about the desirability of establishing specialised Seminar libraries in the universities.

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The Panel recommends that in the established university where there are department libraries, they can be developed as 'seminar libraries'; and in the new universities and colleges, seminar libraries may be instituted.

Item No.12: To consider the question of preparing 'readings in Indian Minguistics and critical anthologies in the fields of literature'.

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The Panel recommends that in developing new areas such as Indian Einguistics, there is a need for bringing out the readings in Indian Einguistics' should consist of selected articles of Indian Linguistics covering various areas of Indian Linguistics such as Historical, applied, descriptive and socio-linguistics. To being with a consolidated book of readings may be brought nat. The Panel recommends that such readings should be substituted by the University Grants Commission and assistance for the preparation of such readings should be provided for.

In the fields of literature, it is desirable that critical anthologies should be brought out with suitable annotations. The Fanel recommends that such proposals should be considered by the University Grants Commission and subsidised.

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The second meeting of the Panel on Histroy was held in the Commission's office on 9th October 1974 at 10-30 A.M. The following members were present:

Professor R.S. Sharma, Dr. S. Gopal and Dr. H. Subramaniam could not attend the meeting. Dr. J.S. Graval, Professor of History, Guru Nanak University attended the meeting by special invitation.

The panel considered the following items:

Item No.1: To receive the final report of the panel adopted at the meeting held in March 1974.

The panel made the following recommendations:

- 1. The question of developing museums and providing audio-visual aids for the Departments of History/Archaeology in the universities may be given high priority during the V plan period and the universities may be advised to include such proposals in their V Plan development schemes for consideration by the Visiting Committees.
- 2. The suggestion for promoting archaeological studies in the universities and for organising a seminar jointly with the Archaeological Survey of India for this purpose at Poona University may be persued.

contd....



- 3. A sub-committee in consultation with the Vice-Chairman, U.G.C. who is also the Convenor of the panel may be appointed to prepare a list of basic books and amportant journals for the henefit of the colleges which are having postgraduate courses in history/archaeology.
- 4. Regional seminars may be organised to consider the question of updating the syllabi in History at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. About 10 universities may participate in each of these seminars and the number of participants in each seminar may be about 30. The possibility of organising two seminars one in the western region and other in the northern region may be considered in the first instance. A sub-committee may be appointed to prepare working papers for amsideration at the seminar.
- 5. Item No.2 : To receive the draft report of the Review Committee on Teaching and Research in History.

The consideration of the Araft report of the Review Committee on the teaching and research in History constituted in 1964 by the Commission, was postponed to the next meeting of the panel.

Item No.3: To consider the question of preparing a status report in history indicating the most promising areas of development the work done in the existing centres and the nature of support needed.

It was noted that Prof. R.S. Sharma had agreed to prepare an appraisal report in History on the basis of V Plan development proposals received from the universties. This report would serve as guideline to the Visiting Committees when they visit the universities to assess their V Plan requirements.

The question of preparing a comprehensive status report in History and Archaeology, may be considered at the next meeting of the panel

Item No.4: To consider the question of undertaking a study of the existing position with regard to the award of doctorate degrees and suggest measures for improving the existing system in the interest of raising the standards.

It was felt that the present position, with regard to the award of doctoral degrees varies from the continuous constitution and subject to subject and there was a need to improve the existing system. The panel felt that it will be useful to discuss this question in detail at the regional seminars.



Item No.5 : To consider the recommendations made by the Review Committee appointed by the I.C.S.S.R. about developing research methodology courses in the universities and the question of developing and strengthening Pre-Fh.D. courses in the universities.

The panel naved that the Commission has recently decided to set up a Committee to consider the entire question of introduction of M.Fhil. courses in the universities. The panel felt that it will be useful to discuss the question of development of pre-ph.d. courses in the universitient the regional seminars.

Item No.6 : To consider the suggestions received from the teachers about areas of priority research in History.

The penel considered the various suggestions received from teachers for inclusion of items under areas of priority research in History and felt that there was no need for the present to reverse in the areas of priority research in History indicated in the brechure.

Item No.7: To consider the recommendation of the National Commission for the compilation of History of Science in India.

The panel felt that there was a need to encourage the teaching and studies in History of Science in some selected universities during the V Plan period and made the following recommendations in this regard.

- a) Assistance for promotion of studies in History of Science may be provided to some selected universities by the Commission outside the V Plan allocation.
- b) Assistance may be made available to the universities for appointment of a Reader or a Lecturer for teaching History of Science and for books and journals needed for the teaching of the subject.
- c) The teaching of History of Science may be introduced at M.A. level by providing one or two optional papers in History of Western/Indian Science.
- d) About four universities on regional basis may be provided assistance by the Commission for the above purpose during the V Plan period.

Stem No. 8 % Commider the question of integrating the National Germica Scheme with the curriculum at the first degree terms...

The panel felt that the possibility of introducing field work and survey projects in the curriculum at undergraduate level in History may be examined by the appropriate academic bodies of the universit These may be taken up as group projects and credit could be given for this. The panel, however, felt that it would be difficult to integrate the Nation Service Scheme in the History curricula at undergraduate level.

Item No.9 : To receive a list of university professors in History,

The panel modified the list of university professors as far as possible and desired that the list may be updated by the Commission after circulating it to the universities and concerned departments. The panel in this connection made the following suggestions:

- i) The possibility of including scholars in History who are working in the institutions other than the universiti in the list may be examined.
- ii) The Commission may also maintain a list of eminent university professors in each subject who have retired from the universities as Professors.

Item No. 10 To consider the proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking advanced research.

It was agreed that the proposals received for support for advanced research in History and Archaeology may be considered at the next meeting of the panel.

The panel further suggested that as the Commission had received proposals for financial assistance for undertaking archaeological experience it will be useful to invite the Director General, Archaeologic Survey of India, as a special invite at the next meeting of the panel to have the benefit of his advice in such matters.

Item No.11: To consier the proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking short-term projects.

The Commission considered short-term projects received from university and college teachers and made the following recommendation



- The proposals at SI.Mos. 1,7,17,23,24,34,35,36,37,38,39,40,44, 41,42,43 and supplementary No.2 may be considered at thenext meeting of the panel.
- 2. The proposals at SI.No.2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 18, 21, 25, 27, 28, 33 supplementary No.1 and 4 sould not be accepted.
- 3. The proposal at SI.No.6 may be referred to Professor S.C. Dube for his advice. The proposals at SI.No.30 and 31 may be referred to the panel on Folitical Science for consideration.
- 4. The proposals at Sl.No.13 and 14 may be considered under long term projects and experts opinion may be obtained on these proposals in the first instance.

REPORT OF THE PHYCHOLOGY PANEL

The second meeting of the Psychology Panel was held on 14 and 15 October, 1974 in the Office of the Commission. The following were present:

Item No.1 - The report of the Committee was reviewed alongwith the suggestions made by the Committee of Conveners of the Panels on Humanities and Social Sciences at its meeting held on 22nd August, 1974. The subservations made by the Committee on the possibility and desirability of undertaking a survey and assessment of research projects in Psychology which was approved by the UGC is not worth the trouble. Since the grants paid to the research scholars were not much much it was not considered desirable to take all the trouble of assessing a large number of such projects.

It was also observed that the list of colleges given as priority areas is not properly recorded from the ICSSR Review Committee Repirt (Volume I-pp.41-44 and 127-128) where trends, gaps and priority areas of research have not been spelt out - Necessary corrections should be made in the brochure which has listed the areas of priorities in Psychology.

The first meeting of the Panel suggested that the status of teaching Psychology at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels should be assessed and the status report prepared. The Committee reiterated the earlier decision of the Panel and suggested that a Sub-Committee might be appointed to prepare the status report relating to teaching of the subject at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels. A sub-committee consisting of Porf. R.Rath, Prof.E.I. George and Prof. A.Ansari was set up and it was requested to prepare the status report within a period of about 4 months. Dr. R.Rath was requested to coordinate the work.

Item 2: The status report in Psychology indicating the most promising areas of development prepared by Prof. R.Rath was discussed and accepted. This review report contains information only about 23 departments in India. The proposals and research information of other departments were not sent by the UGC for review.

Item 3: The question of undertaking a study of the existing position with regard to the award of Doctorate degrees was also referred to the Sub-committee set up for preparing the status report.



Item 4: The committee was of the opinion that a Ph.D. candidate should be required to qualify an examination before he is finally accepted for Ph.D. research. This qualifying examination may be prescribed by the supervisor. This question may also be referred to the sub-committee set up for the purpose of preparing the status report.

Item 5: The committee considered the suggestions made by some teachers with regard to the inclusion of certain items in the priority list. The Gommittee accepted the following two items to be included in the list:
(i) Community Psychology; and (2) Curriculum development and text-book productions for primary and secondary schools. After the necessary corrections are made in the priority list in the light of the ICSR Review Report (Vol.I), the question of inviting further suggestions in this respect may be referred to sub-committee.

Item 6: Optional papers in Social Pathology may be included only at the Honours and M.A. levels.

Item 7: The Committee considered it desirable to develop departments of mass communications and journalism in the universities in active cooperation with the Psychology departments. Teachers involved in Secial Psychology would be able to handle such problems more efficiently.

Item 6: The Committee was of the view that MSS could be made an integral part of the curriculum at the undergraduate level. It was felt that students unlergoing teaching in child psychology, abnormal psychology, educational psychology and industrial psychology could go to the community and undertake project work. They should visit the schools and help teachers in managing the classes better. They can go to different and make assessment of psychopathic cases, cases of problem behaviour and prepare case histories of patients. They sould also visit the homes of such patients and help them to understand such problems. They might also visit industrial areas and tackle various problems relating to industrial tension, absentism, alchoholism, etc. In short, students of Psychology can be of immense help in certain areas of inevitable social behaviour creating problems for the community.

Since is is a very difficult task and the students need constant guidance and supervision, enough trained staff may be provided if MSS in areas of Psychology is to be effective. It should be introduced as an optional subject in some universities to start with.

Item 9: Proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance were considered. The Committee's recommendations are indicated below:-

(1) Dr. 0.0. Gupta — He may be asked to indicate items of equipment which he wants to obtain and the purpose for which the two research follows are to be appointed for the project.

Item No.1: To receive the final report of the panel adopted at its meeting held in March, 1974.

The Panel discussed the question of duration of the LL.B. Course and decided to recommend to the Commission that the Course should be of three year's duration with practical training integrated into it.

The Panel recommends that institutions imparting legal education may not generally be encouraged to start Master's Degree courses in Law, Only in exceptional cases where all the conditions as indicated in the proceedings of the Poona Conference on legal education have been fulfilled by our Institutions, should the question of permitting it to start the LL.M. course be considered.

The Panel considered the matter of imparting LL.M. instruction to part-time students. It is recommended that LL.M. education should be offered to whole-time students only and it is underirable to impart LL.M. education to part-time students. The Panel recommends, however, that whole-time students should be provided with adequate financial assistance, and that for this purpose LL.M. course be equated with M. Phil. course. The LL.M. course must necessarily have substantial



research content and include instruction in research methodology and project work.

It was agreed that Prof. Indra Deva & Dr. Upendra Baxi will examine how best the course contents and research for LL.M. degree should be made socially relevant and their report may be placed at the next meeting of the Panel. It was further agreed that the problem of medium of instruction be examined by a Committee consisting of Prof. G.S. Sharma and Dr.B.S. Murty, Br. P.K.Irani and Dr.R.C. Hingorani. Since this problem is specially relevant to the future development of the teaching programme and scholar research in Law. The report of this Committee may be placed at the next meeting of the Panel for consideration.

The Panel considered the question of admissions to the LL.B. courses and felt that for variety of reasons no definite recommendations can be made in this regard.

The Panel recommended that the proposals for introducing invotions in the examination system could also be invited from the university departments of Law and the Law Colleges and a few Institutions could be provided assistance by the University Grants Commission for this purpose.

Item No.2: To consider the question of preparing a status report in Law indicating the most promising areas of development, the work done in the existing centres and the nature of support needed.

It was agreed that the convenor of the Panel will prepare a report on the development of teaching and research in Law in the university during the Fifth Plan period keeping in view the views expressed by the members in this regard.

- Item No.3: To consider the question of undertaking a study of the existing position with regard to the award of doctorate degrees and suggest measures for improving the existing system in the interest of raising the standards.
- Item No.4: To consider the recommendation made by the Review Committee appointed by the ICCSR about developing research methodology courses in the universities.
- Item No.5: To consider the suggestion received from the teachers about areas of priority research in Law.



On the suggestion of some members, items 3,4 & 5 were taken up together for consideration as they are inter-The course of research methodology be part of compulsory instruction for the LL.M. course. Dr.Upendra Baxi was requested to undertake a study of the Ph.D. work already done in Law by the Indian universities and submit a full report, analysing the nature of the work done along with the comments and suggestions for future, the drop outs of students who were registered and other features. The University Grants Commission was requested to give the necessary grant to the Delhi University for Dr. Baxi's work. It was generally felt that there should be no rigid list of priority for research areas in the field of Law. The topics listed in the report of the Panel should be treated as illustrative only. However, it is to be observed that in a subject like law which is so colsely related to society, it is the responsibility of law schools to emphasize social implications and social consequences of the role of Law in Indian society.

Item No.6: To consider the proposal for introduction of courses in criminology as a part of undergraduate courses in the universities.

The question of introduction of courses in criminology at the LL.B. Degree was considered. It was poined out that the law of crimes is one of the optionals which the student is permitted to offer during their instruction for the LL.B. course. This suggestion was accepted and the panel decided to recommend accordingly.

Item No.7: To consider the proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking advanced research.

Proposals for financial assistance to teachers for advanced research were considered. The Panel recommends a grant of Rs. 5,000 to Dr. M.Ghouse. Dr.B.S. Murty was requested to kindly outline in greater detail the research project and research design.

Item No.8: To consider the proposals received from the university and college teachers for financial assistance for undertaking short-term projects.



Proposals forfinancial assistance to teachers for short-term projects were considered. The Panel recommends a grant of Rs.2,500/- to Shri S.S.Singh of Rewa for contingency and internal travel and Rs.3,500/- to Shri K.S. Rao of Hyderabad. Shri Rao was requested that the work has to be done with emphasis on item(5) in his analysis i.e. application of the rules of natural justice in disciplinary proceedings against students. He should also deal with cases where a sutdent goes to court on the ground of violation of natural justice in student election processes. Shri M.D. Komalam was requested to re-formulate the proposal emphasizing legislation and case law relating to the status of women.

Item No.9: To consider the question of integrating the National Service Scheme with the curriculum at the first degree level in Law.

It was agreed that a Committee consisting of Dr. G.S. Sharma (Convenor) and Dr. Upendra Baxi may look into the question of intergrating the National Service Scheme with the curricula of the LL.B. course and its report may be discussed at the next meeting of the Panel. The Committee may co-opt one member to assist it in its work.

Item No.10: To receive a list of university professors in Law.

The Panel considered the list of university professors in Law and the list as modified on the suggestions made by the Panel members is attached (Appendix).

Item No.11. To consider the suggestion for encouraging study of Parlimentary institutions.

Constitution and procedure is being already taught in constitutional law paper. Greater emphasis may be given to practice of Parliamentary institutions like Mobb parliament. Courses through continuing education on the subject may also be organised.



Item No.12: To consider the proposal of Delhi University for starting part—time LL.M. course at the Evening Law Centre(No.1).

The Panel could not agree to the proposal for the Delhi University for starting part-time LL.M. course in view of the views expressed by it earlier under item No.1.

Item (C) To consider the report of the committee appointed by the UGC to examine the proposal of the University of Rajasthan for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the postgraduate level.

- 1. The University Grants Commission, at meeting held on 7th October, 1974, considered the report of the committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of the Rajasthan University for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the post-graduate level. The Commission felt that it would be desirable to suggest specific guidelines in regard to the development of Correspondence Courses at the undergraudate and post-graduate levels to be offered by universities.
- 2. The Commission, at its meeting held on 11th November, 1974, generally accepted the guidelines suggested for the introduction of correspondence courses at the undergraudate and postgraduate levels. The Commission, however, desired that the question of organisational set up for correspondence courses in the universities, particularly their relationship with the university teaching departments and the role of correspondence education in breaking new ground at the under-graduate level may be referred to the Standing Committee on part-time education. (Resolution No.13).
- 3. The Report of the Committee placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 7th October, 1974 is attached (Annexura) The following recommendations of the committee are already in line with the guidelines accepted by the Commission.
- (a) In future much greater attention will have to be paid to the selection of experts for preparation of lessons and guidelines, reference materials and review and editing of reading material. The above objectives can be achieved only when the departments in the university are more fully involved in the conduct of correspondence courses and the remuneration for writing and review of lessons is suitably enhanced.
- (b) The Committee is not altogether satisfied in regard to student responses and assignments. The impression it gained was that student response sheets were not marked with care and deliberation. The University has to consider the way in which a group of students are placed under the charge of a tutor, who is responsible for ensuring that student response sheets and internal assessment is done properly and there is a proper feedback to the students.

- (c) The Committee also recommends the institution of postal library services by the university so that students enrolled in postgraduate correspondence courses may receive books through post at the cost of the university. They may be required to return the books at their own cost after the specified period.
- (d) The teachers of the Institute as well as the President of the Rajasthan University Postgraduate Correspondence Study's Association impressed upon the committee the need for putting the sep up of the Institute on a permanent basis. This is highly desirable for the functioning of the Institute and for attracting and retaining well qualified staff in the Institute. Starting from 1968-69 correspondence courses have already run a cycle of six years in the university and in view of the fairly satisfactory enrolments and results at the undergraduate level, there seems to be no reason why the institute should not be run on a permanent basis.
- (e) The other conditions mentioned in the guidelines accepted by the Commission will be brought to the notice of the university for necessary action.
- 4. The committee has recommended a grant of Rs.5,00,000 for a building for correspondence courses being 50 per cent of the estimated cost of Rs. 10,00,000. The committee has further recommended assistance for a period of two years to the University of Rajasthan for each of the subjects of History and Political Science for the following items of expenditure as already approved by the Commission in the case of the University of Mysore and Panjabi University, Patiala.
- (i) Core Staff: One Reader and two Lecturers.
- (ii)Preparation of reading material and guideline Rs, 15,000.00 etc.
- (iii) Two contact programme and one orientation Rs. 5,000.00 programme.
- (iv) Visiting Lectures and Provision for taped Rs. 5,000.00 lectures.
- (v) Evaluation of reading material and students Rs. 6,000.00 responses.

A grant of Rs. 10,000/- for books and journals has also been recommended. The grants will be paid subject to their being an overall deficit in respect of postgraduate correspondence courses and the university implementing the recommendations of the committee and the guidelines.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Report of the committee appointed by the UGC to examine the proposal of the University of Rajasthan for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the postgraduate level.

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The University Grants Commission appointed a committee, consisting of the following members, to examine the proposal of the University of Rajasthan for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the postgraduate level.

- Professor N.R. Deshpande visit d the university on 15th July, 1974, but the other member of the committee viz professor \$.C. Misra could not reach Jaipur on that date owing to unavoidable circumstances. Frofessor Misra and Dr. Goel visited the university on 8th August, 1974 and discussed the details of the proposal of the university with Professor, Iqbal Nagain, Doan and Hony, Director of the Institute of Post-graduate Correspondence Studies, Shri J.N. Asopa, incharge, (Mistory) and Dr. R.L. Kamal, incharge (Fol. Science), The committee also met the teachers of the institute of postgraduate correspondence studies. Shri V.P.Arya. President, Rajasthan University Fostgraduate Correspondence Study's Association submitted a memorandum to the committee and also raised points about the fee structure, the need for puting up a building and the need for streamlining the working of the institute and the desirability of introducing new courses at the postgraduate level, specially courses having better job opportunities. The Committee also called on the Vice-Chancellor of University Shri R.P. Padhi, The main observations and recommendations of the committee follows:-
- 3. The proposal of the University of Rajasthan to introduce correspondence courses at promiversity (Commerce) and B.Com.levels through the medium of Mindi was accepted by the Commission at its meeting held on 7th February, 1968 (Resolution No.70). The Commission at its meeting held on 6th March, 1968, agreed that grants to the university towards the institution of Correspondence Courses may be paid for a period of four years subject to the ceiling of M.5,00,000/- (Resolution No.25). The University started correspondence courses for the B.Com. Begree in July 1968 through the medium of Handi. The proposal of the university to run the programme

through the English medium also was addepted in July, 1969. In September, 1971 the university introduced (with the concurrence of the UGC) correspondence courses for M.A. in Mistory and Political Science. It was decided that the quantum of assistance for the purpose may be determined later. The present Committee was constituted specially to examine the financial needs and requirements of postgraduate correspondence courses in the University.

- 4., For admission to the M.A. previous courses in Political Science and History, a candidate must have passed the B.A. examination or any other equivalent examination recognised by the university of Rajasthan. For admission to the M.A. final class the candidate must have passed the M.A. previous examination of the university of Rajasthan in the subject concerned. Candidates have the option to take their examination in Hindi or English but the instructional material is sent to them in Hindi only.
- 3. The papers for M.A. in History and Political Science required to be offered by candidates enrolled in the Institute of Correspondence Courses are given below.

- In addition to the instructional material sent out to the students at regular intervals, the university organises contact programmes for them. Farticular mention may be made of the personal contact programmes organised by the university at Jaipur, Chandigarh and Delhi during the last two years. Teachers of the university of Rajasthan, Jamia Millia Islamia, Jawaharlal Nehru University, University of Delhi and Panjab University participated in these camps. A study centre is also maintained by the university at Delhi.
- The core staff in each of the subjects consists of one Reader, who is designated as Incharge and four Lecturers. The administrative staff of the Institute of Postgraduate correspondence studies consists of one Section Officer, two Assistancts, One Accountant, One Stenographers, 5 U.D.Cs, 11 L.D.Cs and 7 class IV staff. The University also takes the help of teachers in the university departments and affiliated colleges for writing of Lessons and evaluation work. The Lessons are prepared by teachers who are paid a remuneration of R.125/- per lesson. R.50/- are paid for review of a lesson. A teacher who reviews lessons for a whole paper is given an honorarium of R.250/-. During the last three years, the expenditure incurred on this account has increased from Rs. 17,336 in 1971-72 to Rs.25,807 in 1972-73 and Rs.50,000/-1973-74. (Budget estimates). Romuneration for part-time evaluation has also increased from Rs.244 in 1971-72 to Rs.1,663 in 1972-73 and Rs.60,000/- in 1973-74 (budget estimates).

- The committee welcomes the initiative taken by the University of Rajasthan in offering correspondence courses for M.A. in History and Political Science. It feels that on purely a prior grounds, correspondence education is an effective method of education, if well-conducted. The University of Rajasthan also gained sufficient experience of running correspondence courses at the undergraduate level before it was permitted to offer correspondence courses at the postgraduate level. However, in the context of general policy, the committee is not sure whether correspondence courses could be organised on a self- supporting basis if a university simultaneously allows private appearance at University examinations, as done by the University of Rajasthan, In fact, there is every likelihood of enrolment in the current year going down. The university has so far been able to admit only 59 students to M.A. in Political Science and 44 students for M.A. in History. It has already started having a deficit on account of correspondence courses for the B.Com. degree. These developments would naturally east their shadow on the viability and efficy of correspondence education. The present position calls for an immediate review so that correspondence courses are made so attractive and rewarding that a sufficiently large number of students would like to have the benefit of this impartant channal of advocation.
- 10. The committee is concerned about the maintenance of standards at the postgraduate level which is the seminal point of higher education. From the viewpoint of standards, the preparation of reading material and guidelines is crucial for the success of the programme. The estimate of experts in History and Political Science who were members of this committee is that a substantial portion of the total instructional material prepared by the university could be considered as satisfactory. In history the material on Indian History was on the whole well-written and satisfactory, that an European and non-Indian history needed improvement. The emphasis was more



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on impditing information than on premoting understanding and the letter aspect needs to be more carefully and imagindtively looked into. Secondly a close scrutiny has to be made of the questions/exercises which the students are required to do and return. These have been on the whole poorly framed and are stereotyped. Such exercises may be based not only at the questions asked in the examination but also on the need of appraising the students critical understanding of the material sent to him. Critical evaluation will be possible only if there exercises are carefully framed, which needs to be done. These comments also apply to relitical Science. This would mean that in future much greater attention will have to be paid to the selection of experts for preparation of lessons and guidelines, reference materials, and review and editing of reading material. The above objectives can be achieved only when the departments in the university are more fully involved in the conduct of correspondence courses and the remuneration for writing and review of lessons is suitably enhanced.

- 11. The committee is not altogether satisfied in regard to student responses and assignments. The impression it gained was that student response sheets were not marked with care and delibertion. The university has to consider the dispensation under which a group of students are placed under the charge of a tutor, who is responsible for ensuring that student response sheets and internal assessment in done properly and there is a proper feedback to the students.
- 12. From the statewise enrolment of students in university correspondence courses, it is noted that 97% of the students in M.A. Political Science, 86% students in M.A. Frevious History and 95% students in M.A. final History were from the States of Rajasthan, Delhi (Union Territory) Haryana and Panjab in that order during the session 1973-74. The university should therefore try to have collaborative arrangements with university departments or postgraduate colleges in these States so that students can make use of local libraries and received guidance from selected teachers. The university could consider paying a token amount for these services. Moreover, it is necessary, if the Institute aims at having an all India coverage, that there are better arrangements for publicity, especially in distant states.
- 13. So far the Institutes for postgraduate and undergraduate correspondence courses in the university have been functioning as separate units. The university now proposes to merge the two units so that the Institute of correspondence courses has a unified control for purposes of administration while retaining autonomy and freedom in regard to academic matters such as the selection of lassen writers, reviewers, conduct of contact programmes, evaluation of student responses etc. The Institute will function under the charge of a whole time Director, as the present arrangement of designating a Professor as honorary Director is not altogether satisfactory, in view of the fact that the management of a correspondence course Institute requires full time attention. The Director and the Readers Incharge of various subjects should be able to work in co-operation with the University Heads of Departments concerned in regard to academic matters. The effective samples of the correspondence course programme requires much greater involvement of teachers in the departments in the work of the Institute and of teachers in the Institute in the teaching & research activities of the departments. For financial matters, the Institute could have a Governing Body on the pattern of the university of Jelhi to ensure the smooth daytoday functioning of the Institute.

- 14. It would be necessary for the university to maintain separate accounts for undergraduate and postgraduate correspondence courses, especially in regard to thos facilities which are approved by the Commission for postgraduate correspondence courses. This seems to be necessary in view of the fact that the period of UGC assistance towards undergraduate correspondence courses in the University of Rajasthan is already over.
- 15. The Committee also recommends the institution of a postal library services by the university so that students enrolled in postgraduate correspondence courses may receive books through post at the cost of the university. They may be required to return the books at their own cost after the specified period.
- The teachers of the Institute as well as the President of the Rajasthan University Postgraduate Correspondence Study's Association impressed upon the committee the need for making the set up of the Institute permanent. This is highly desirable for the functioning of the Institute and for attracting and retaining well qualified staff in the Institute. Starting from 1968-69 correspondence courses have already run a cycle of six years in the university and in view of the fairly satisfactory enrolments and results at the undergraduate level, there seems to be no reason why the Institute should not be run on a permanent basis.
- 17. The tuition fee charged from the correspondence course students should be regulated keeping in view the fee charged from regular students of the university and after examining the cost-structure of the parallel courses. The present amount of tuition fee is N.350/- per annum(payable in three instalment of N.150/-, N.100/- and N.100/-) as against a fee of N.200/- p.a. chargid from regular students. This seems to be discriminatory, especially in view of the fact that the existing to correspondence course students are not at par with those provided to regular students of the University.
- The Institutes of undergraduate and postgraduate studies in the university of Rajasthan are at present housed in rented buildings. The need for a permanent building for the Institute is therefore apparent. The Commission has so far paid an amount of B.75,000/- for undergraduate courses in the university. A sum of B.4.25 lakhs is therefore available to the university for its building programme. In fact, the amount of R.75,000/- may have to be recovered from the university in case the accounts for the years 1968-69 to 1971-72 for B.Com. correspondence courses show a surplus. It should therefore be possible to sanction a building for the Institute at a cost of R.10 lakhs on 50: 50 sharing basis. This could be accepted in principle so that the construction work may be taken up after the ban on the construction of new building is lifted.
- 19. The university proposes to start correspondence courses in a number of subjects like dindi, Sociology, Commerce, Bosnomics and Public Administration, according to a phased programme. The committee is of the view that



the need in this regard should be assessed properly keeping in view the number of private students appearing at these examinations from year to year. In view of the existing needs and requirements and job opportunities, the committee is inclined to recommend the proposal for instituting diploma courses in banking, financial administration etc. The university may formulate its proposals in this regard and send them for the consideration of the Commission.

The statement of Income and Expenditure supplied by the university in respect of the postgraduate correspondence courses show a net income of & 1,35,960/- for the year 1971-72 and & 4,04,766/- for 1972-73. However, the budget estimates for 1973-74 show a deficit of & 78,300/-. If the recommendations of the present committee are implemented in regard to writing of lessons, conduct of contact programmes, evaluation of response-sheets library services, fees and study centres etc., the postgraduate correspondence programme could possibly have a somewhat larger deficit. The committee recommends assistance for a period of two years to the university of Rajasthan for each of the subjects of History and Political Science for the following items of expenditure as already approved by the Commission in the case of the University of Mysore and Fanjabi University, Patiala.

(i) Core staff: One Reader and two Lecturers.

(ii) freparation of reading material and guidelines etc. R. 15,000,00

(iii) Two contact programme and one orientation programme. Rs. 5,000.00

(iv) Visiting Lectures and Provision for taped & 5,000.00

(v) Evaluation of reading material and students & 5,000.00 responses.

A grant of %.10,000/- for books and journals is also recommended. The grants will be paid subject to their being an overall deficit in respect of postgraduate correspondence courses and the University implementing the recommendations of the Committee.

The University Grants Commission, at its meeting held on 7th October 1974, considered the report of the committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of the Andhra University for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the post-graduate level. The Commission felt that it would be desirable to suggest specific guidelines in regard to the development of correspondence course at undergraduate and post-graduate levels to be offered by universities.

The Committee, at its meeting held on 11th November 1974, generally accepted the guidelines suggested for the introduction of correspondence course at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels. The Commission, however, desired that the question of organisational set up for correspondence courses in the universities, particularly their relationship with the university teaching departments and the roll of correspondence education in braking new ground at the undergraduate level may be referred to the Standing Committee on part—time education (Resolution No.13).

A copy of the Report of the Committee placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 7th October 1974 is attached (Annexure). The Commission examined the proposal of the Andhra University for the introduction of correspondence courses from the point of view of demand and the willingness of the departments to assume responsibility for the conduct of correspondence courses and recommend the introduction of correspondence courses for M.A. (Economics and M.Com.) The guidelines now accepted by the Commission will be grought to the attention of the university for necessary action.

The Committee has recommended that assistance for the courses may be provided for a period of two years for each of the subjects for the following items of expenditure as already approved by the Commission in the case of Mysore University and the Panjabi University, Patiala.

- 1. Core Staff: One Reader and Two Lecturers.
- 2. Preparation of reading material and guidelines etc. Rs.15,000/-
- 3. Two contact programmes and one orientation prog. Rs. 5,000/--
- 8. Visiting Secturers and provision for taped lecturers Rs. 5,000/-
- 5. Evaluation of reading material and students responses Rs. 5,000/-

A grant of Rs.10,000/- for books and journals is also recommended. The grants will be paid subject to there being an



over-all deficit in respect of postgraduate correspondence courses and on condition that the university implements the recommendations of the Committee and the guidelines.

The University has requested a grant of Rs.49,000/- for extension of the correspondence course building to enable it to have postgraduate correspondence courses in the same building. The area required is 1650 sq.ft. and the cost will be Rs.49,000/- (including service and furniture). This may be agreed to in principle so that the construction of the building may be taken up after the present ban on the construction of buildings is lifted.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

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Report of the Committee appointed by the U.S.C. to examine the proposal of the Andhra University for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the postgraduate level.

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The University Grants Commission appointed a Committee, consisting of the following members, to examine the proposal of the andhra University, Maltair for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses at the post-graduate level:

- 2. The Committee visited the Andhra University on August 13 & 14,1974 and held discussions with Shri L. Bhullayya, Vice-Chanellor, Shri M. Gopal krishna Reddy, Registrar, Trof. K.V. Sivayya, Professor of Commerce and Director, School of Correspondence Courses and Dr. J. Suryanarayanamurty, Reader in History, Frof. K. Viswanadham, Head of the Department of English, Prof. K.V.R. Narsimham, Head of the Department of Telugu, Prof. K. Venkateswarlu, Professor of Politica and Public Administration and Prof. B. Sarveswara Rao, Head of the Department of Economics. The observations and recommendations of the committee follow.
- 3. The School of Correspondence courses (established in 1972-73) at the andhra University imparts education in respect of the following courses:
 - (i) Two year Pra- University Course.
 - (ii) Three- year B.A. & B.Com. Course.

The above courses were started with the concurrence of the Commission and the Commission agreed to provide assistance amounting to N. 5 lakhs for a period of four years for the programme (Resulution No.11, dated 4th August, 1971). The proposal of the University for the construction of a composite building at a total cost of N. 3.60 lakhs for the correspondence course portion was also accepted by the Commission on condition that the share of the U.G.C. will be limited to 50% of the building cost and the total assistance for



capital projects and recurrent expenditure will be subject to the ceiling of the 5 lakhs during a period of four years.

- 4. Instructional material is supplied to correspondence course students in Telugu or anglish in the two-year promuniversity course and English in the B.A. & B.Com. courses. The conditions for admission are as given below:
- (1) IYear F.U.C. Candidates passing the Matriculation examination under New Scheme. H.S.C. Examination or any other qualifying examination recognised by the indhra University as equivalent thresto are eligible for admission to the First Year of the Two-Year P.U.C.
- (II) IIYear P.U.C. Candidates passing Matriculation under old regulations and S.S.L.C. are eligible for admission to the Second Year of Two-Year Pro-University Course.
- I Year B.A. & W.Com. Candidates passing the qualifying examination such as one year P.U.C. (Cld): H.S. & M.F.S.L.C., Intermediate Examination recognised by the Andhra University as equivalent thereto are eligible.
- II Year B.A. & B.Com. (1) Those who appeared for the first year examinations after studying in a regular college. (2) Those who appeared for the I Year examinations privately and (3) Those who have passed the old Intermediate examinations are eligible for admission to II Year B.A. & B.Com. Courses.
- III Year B.A. & Com. Those who studied for first and second years im regular colleges and those who appeared at first and second years privately are eligible for admission to the third year course.
- 1esson covers the amount of teaching work normally done in one week in regulær class room lectures. Lessons are prepared by teachers teaching the subjects concerned in various colleges of the university and are also edited and reviewed The teachers are paid at the rate of Pa35/- per lesson. Unlike the practice obtaining in other universities, the entire package of lessons in some of the papers was written by the same person. The University adopted this method in the interest of continuity but the Committee feels that this is idenfensible and has seriously impinged on the quality of lessons. The purpose of the scheme is defeated if lesson- writing is not a co-operative venture. Even when lessons are written by different persons, uniformity of presentation can be maintained through proper editing and review.

- 7. Enrolment in B.A. Correspondence Course in the Andhra University has not been so encouraging as in some Universities in the North e.g. Delhi, Panjab and Pubjabi, nor has it satibilized around a certain level. However, the trend of enrolment in commerce compares favourably with the trend elsewhere e.g. in the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur. Student enrolment in B.A. & B.Com. Correspondence courses for the year 1973-74 is given below:-

It would be seen from the above figures that the University started with low enrolment but during the second year of the conduct of correspondence courses, the rate of admission shot up considerably. The pass percentage has been about the same in B.A. Ist year correspondence courses as for the regular students but pass percentage in B.Com. Ist year was 41 for correspondence course students as compared to 21 for the regular students of the University.



- une of the chief weakensses of correspondence courses in the Anibra University is the lack of adequate teaching staff. at present, the teaching staff consists of only two assistant birectors, one in Commerce and the other in Economics in the scale of pay of a lecturar. They co-ordinate the programma, review the lessons and do proof relaing since an other Chortcoming of the undergraduate correspondence projecture in the madequate attention pald to contact classes. The conflact programms was organized for only three days during 1973-74, although the reported attendance viz., 60% was highly satisfactory. Responsesheets are corrected by those who write lessons. Payment for the evaluation of student response-sheets is made at the rate of 35 paise per response-sheet, Nearly 25% response-sheets are received from the students which. seems to be in line with the experience of other Universities offering correspondence courses. It is to be regretted that presently there exists no cooperation between the andhra University and Sri Venkateswara University both of which offer correspondence course for B.A. and B.Com. Such co-operation is feasible in diverse areas e.g. the writing of lessons, conduct of contact programmes etc and was, in fact specifically suggested by the Commission, while accepting the proposal of Sri Venkateswara University to introduce correspondence courses. We suggest immediate action towards co-ordination in the programme in both the universities, which are located in the same state.
- The Andhra University proposes to introduce correspondence courses for M. Com. and the M.A. degree in Telugu, Inglish, Economics, Political Science and History. This question was discussed at the conference of Vice-Charcellors of the three universities in Andhra Iradesh and the conference resolved that the Andhra University may take initiative in the matter. It may also be mentiomed in this connection that at present only one university in the Southern zone is offering correspondence courses for the M.A. degree viz., the University of Mysore for M..., in Kannada. The andhra University also has some experience in running correspondence courses at the undergraduate level, Therefore the proposal of the university to extend these facilities to the postgraduate level should be acceptable 'in principle'. However, the main question to be considered in this context is whether there will be sufficient demand for post-graduate correspondence courses to make them viable and if so, in which of the subject areas. In this connection, the Committee noted that for such of the subjects in which correspondence courses are offered by the university, the provision to permit private appearance at University examinations would be withdrawn.

- Considering the demand from various points of view, the 13. Committee supports the proposal of the Andhra University for the introduction of correspondence courses for M.A. (Economics) and M.Com. established departments of the University and Both these are well the professors are willing to assume responsibility for running these courses. The departments of economics and commerce can also collaborate with each other in regard to some papers which are common to both the courses. The Committee is, however, positive that the courses cannot be started during 1974-75. The current academic year should be utilised by the university for adequate preparation so that the courses can be offered from 1975-76. Assistance for the courses may be provided for a period of two years for each of the subjects for the following items of expenditure as already approved by the Commission in the case of the Mysore University and the Punjabi University, Patiala.
- i) Core staff: One Reader and two Lecturers.
- ii) Preparation of reading material and Rs.15,000-00 guidelines etc. iii) Two contact programmes and one orientation programme Rs. 5,000-00 Visiting Lecturers and Provision for iv) taped lectures Rst. 5,000-00 ∇ Evaluation of reading material and Rs. 5,000-00 students responses

A grant of Rs.10,000 for books and journals is also recommended. The grants will be paid subject to there being on overall deficit in respect of postgraduate correspondence course and on condition that on the condition that the University implements the recommendations of the committee.

Item No. 21: To consider the report of the proposal of the Utkal University for the introduction of correspondence courses.

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- 1. The University Grants Commission, at its meeting held on 7th October 1974, considered the report on the proposal of the Utkal University, Bhubaneswar for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses. The Commission felt that it would be desirable to suggest specific guidelines in regard to the development of correspondence courses at undergraduate and postgraduate levels to be offered by universities,
- 2. The Commission, at its meeting held on 11th November, 1974 generally accepted the guidelines suggested for the introduction of correspondence courses at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels. The Commission, however, desired that the question of organisational set up for correspondence courses in the universities, particularly their relationship with the university teaching departments and the role of correspondence education in breaking new ground at the undergraduate level may be referred to the Standing Committee on part-time education (Resolutions 12)
- 3. The report placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 7th October 1974 is attached (Annexure). The Utkal University proposes to start correspondence courses at the undergraduate level (4 years Two years Intermediate and Two years B.A.) from 1975-76. A sum of Rs.30,000 has been recommended to enable the university to make necessary preparations for starting the course. The details are give below:-

Item No. 7: To consider the report on Introduction of Correspondence Courses at Utkal University, Enubaneswar.

The Utkal University, Bhubaneswar approached the Commission for financial assistance towards the introduction of Correspondence Courses for intermediate (Arts) from 1972-73 academic session. The proposal of the University was placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 2nd August, 1972. The Commission decided at this meeting that a Committee may be appointed to examine the proposal of the Utkal University for financial assistance towards the introduction of Correspondence Courses. Pursuant to the above decision, a Committee comprising of Professor Rais Ahmed and Dr. M.L. Misra visited the Utkal University, Bhubaneswar on 3rd and 4th February, 1973 and discussed the details of the proposal with the University authorities. The Committee was of the view that the introduction of Correspondence Courses for the intermediate examination should be a part of an integral plan to introduce correspondence courses for the B.A. degree in successive stages. If correspondence courses are conceived for the Intermediate examination only the U.G.C. may find it difficult to support the scheme.

Accordingly, the University was requested to send a detailed proposal for further consideration by the U.G.C. The revised proposal sent in April, 1974 envisaged a total expenditure of Rs. 19 lakhs during the first year of introduction of the course. Of this Rs.6.3 lakhs were to be met from the tuition fees. The proposal proposed to cover the entire four years course leading to the first degree in Arts i.e. two years of Intermediate and two years of first degree. Details of the proposal are given at the Appanding to this item.

It wad decided that an officer of the Commission may be deputed to visit the University to discuss the matter with the University authorities.

Dr. R.K. Mathur deputed for the work visited Utkal University, Bhubaneswar on 23rd August, 1974 and discussed the scheme with the University authorities. The report is given at Appendix II

Having considered all aspects of the scheme and the views of the Visiting Committee and of persons associated with the framing of the proposal, the following recommendation are

made for the consideration of the Commission: -

- 1. At present no University in the Eastern region is offering correspondence courses. It will be a good idea if some University in the region starts this programme. This would remove the imbalance in our present distribution of correspondence courses.
- 2. Utkal University may be assisted towards introduction of correspondence courses. The remaining part of 1974-75 may be utilised by the University for preparatory measures for introduction of the courses from 1975-76. The Commission may give to Utkal University for correspondence courses the same assistance which is normally given for Correspondence Courses in other Universities.
- 3. The University may appoint an Officer on Special Duty in Reader's scale for 5 months w.e.f. 1.11.1974 to take advance action towards introduction of correspondence courses. The office would, apart from looking after other issues concerned with introduction of correspondence courses from 1975-76, take action towards:
- (a) Preparation and printing of prospectus for the proposed correspondence courses. The prospectus will lay down eligibility requirements for the different courses, duration of the courses, details of study and scheme of examination medium of instruction, method of instruction, fees and other charges, details of contact programmes, application form and registration form etc. The prospectus should indicate the last dates for receipt of application form and the instalment of tuition fees etc.
- (b) Necessary changes in the University regulations may be introduced in case the Utkal University proposes to extend the facilities for correspondence courses to students from areas which are not within the jurisdiction of the University.
- (c) Committees in the different subjects for dividing the syllabus into convenient instructional units for develop ment of lesson plans and instructional material may be constituted and convened. In the initial stages of the operation of the scheme, it would be more economical to have various academic jobs such as writing of lessons and editing done on part time basis by the academic staff of the University. However, some core staff may still be necessary.



- (d) Sufficient instructional material for the students enrolled under the correspondence courses should be kept ready in advance before introducing the courses from the beginning of the academic year 1975-76.
- 4. A sum of N. 30,000/- may be made available to the University to start the courses from the beginning of the academic year 1975-76.
- 5. The amount of Rs. 30,000/- to be sanctioned towards meeting expenditure on advance action will be the first charge on the assistance amounting to a maximum of Rs. 5 lakhs which may be sanctioned to the University for a period of four years on net deficit basis towards the scheme.
- 6. The University should also consult the State Government regarding financial commitments during the current plan period to meet the deficit and for taking over the liability, if any, at the end of 1978-79. The Commission's assistance towards the scheme will cease after 1978-79. Till then the U.G.C. will annually meet the deficit subject to a maximum of Rs. 5 lakhs for four years.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

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CORDED CONTINCE COULSES, UKAL UNIVERSITY, VANIVINAR, BHUS ANESNAR

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The correspondence course to be organised by the Utkal University aims at importing instruction for the first degree level alongwith the Intermediate level through correspondence. This will be an Institution and will be managed by the University. The question of affiliation does not arise.

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The need for the course arises on account of:

- 1. It will prevent the influx of average students for collegiate education leading to the demand for more institutions resulting in the growth of mushroom colleges.
- 2. It will strongthen the regional language and will help the University to face the problems of double media in the existing colleges.
- 3. It will provent the demand for Wening colleges in many places and ultimately help the employees to receive further education.

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- (a) Admissions are open to students from all over the States, The Act of the University will be amended in due time, if necessary,
- (b) Any registered student of the University may be admitted to the Intermediate Examination in Arts, if he has passed the Matriculation examination or the high School certificate examination conducted by the Beard of Secondary Education, Orissa or some other examination recognised by the Academic Council as equivalent thereto, Provided he has studied the prescribed course satisfactorily for a period of two years under correspondence.

II. DURATION.

The duration of Intermediate and the B.A. courses of the correspondence course of the University is two years for all those admitted to the course. This scheme is, therefore, continuous upto B.A. stage covering a period of instructive of four years.

III. OCURS & SOBJECTS OF STUDY.

The Syllabi, duration of the course, Examination of the correspondence course are the same as for the regular students of the Utkal University.

The Course offers the following subjects:

English. (2) Oriya, (3) Economics, (4) Political Science,
 Logic & Fhilosophy, (6) History, (7) Mathematics and (8) M.I.L. Criya.



Students will be required to offer English and Criya (M.I.L.) and any three of the following subjects at the Intermediate stage.

The choice of subjects will be two at the B.A. Stage.

1. Criya.

2. Economics.

3. Pol.Science.

4. Logic & Philosophy

5. History.

6. Mathematics.

IV. EXAMINATION

The candidates will appear at the examination to be conducted by the University.

But they cannot take the University Examination without pursuing the correspondence course, for the prescribed duration of the course.

There will be two papers in each of three group subjects to be chosen by the candidate and two papers in English and one paper in Mother tongue. At the B.A. stage there will be three papers in each of the two group — subjects to be chosen by the candidate and two papers in English and one paper in Mother tongue. Each paper will carry 100 marks and be of three hours' duration. The examination will be held in February or any other date to be fixed by the University.

V. BLOKS.

Students are required to make their own arrangements for books.

VI. MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION.

Criya/Inglish will be the medium of instruction.

VII. FREPARATION OF LESSONS.

The subject teachers will divide the syllabus prescribed for the examination into suitable units and write lessons on each. Each lesson will contain the essential points and will be of such standard as is prescribed by the University for the examination. It will provide adequate opportunity for thinking and for encouraging independent study of original books. The lessons will contain suitable thought-proveding questions for the students. The answer scripts will be examined by the lecturers. There will be committee on each subject to spell out the units of the curricular material with some members of the Boards of Studies in the respective subjects. The lessons will be prepared by the academic staff of the Institution and the assistance of the faculty members will be taken, where a cessary. The lessons will be kept ready sufficiently in advance before the scheme is given effect to.

VIII. FROVISION OF CONTACT CLASS.

As soon as the buildings of the Directorate are constructed arrangements will be made for contact class at least twice a year. Until then such classes may be arranged in suitable buildings which may be hired. The contact classes may also be held in convenient centres where large number of students are available.



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Introduction of Correspondence Courses at Utkal University, Bhubaneswar

The Utkal University, Bhubaneswar approached the Commission for financial assistance tow rds the introduction of correspondence courses for intermediate(Arts) from 1972-73 academic session. The proposal of the University was placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 2.8.1972. The Commission decided at this meeting that a Committee may be appointed to examine the proposal of the Utkal University for financial assistance towards the introduction of correspondence courses. Pursuant to the above decision, a Committee comprising of Professor Rais Ahmed and Dr. M.L. Micra visited the Utkal University, Bhubaneswar on 3rd and 4th February, 1973 and discussed the details of the proposal with the university authorities. The Committee was of the view that the introduction of correspondence courses for the intermediate examination should be a part of an integral plan to introduce correspondence courses for the B.A. degree in successive stages. If correspendence courses are conceived for the intermediate examination only the UGC may find it difficult to support the scheme. The report of the Committee was placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 28th May, 1973, The consideration of this item was postbon mi until such time the Commission has considered the question of total duration of education upto the first degree stage and also the measures to be taken for informal education etc.

The Utkal University was further asked vide our letter of Februar 13, 1974 to introduce correspondence courses at the first degree level also alongwith intermediate level, if it so desires, and send a detailed proposal for further consideration by the U.G.C. The revised proposal sent in April,74 envisaged a total expenditure of M.19 lakes during the first year of introduction of the course. Out of this M.6.3 lakes were to be met from the tuition fees. The proposal proposal to cover the entire four years course leading to the first degree in arts i.e. two years of intermediate and two years of the first degree.

It was decided that an officer of the Commission may be deputed to visit the university to discuss the matter with the university authorities.

Dr. R.K. Mathur deputed for the work visited Utkal University, Bhubaneswar on 23rd August, 1974 and discussed the scheme with the following:

Having considered all aspects of the scheme and the views of the persons associated with the framing of the proposal the following recommendations are made for consideration:

- 1. At present no University in the Tastern region is offering correspondence course. It will be a good idea if some university in the region starts correspondence courses. This would remove the imblance in our present distribution of correspondence courses.
- 2. Utkal University may be assisted towards introduction of correspondence courses. However, the remaining part of 1974-75 may be utilised by the University for preparatory measures for introduction of the courses from 1975-76. The Commission may give to utkal university for correspondence courses the same assistance which have been given for correspondence courses in other universities.
- 3. The University may appoint an Officer on Special Duty in Reader's scale for 5 months w.e.f. 1.11.1974 to take advance action towards introduction of correspondence courses. The officer would, apart from looking after other issues concerned with introduction of correspondence courses from 1975-76, take action towards:-
 - (a) Preparation and printing of prospectus for the proposed correspondence courses. The prospectus will lay down eligibility requirements for the different courses, duration of the courses, details of study and scheme of examination, medium of instruction methol of instruction, fees and other charges, details of contact programmes, application form and registration form etc. The prospectus should indicate the last dates for receipt of application form and the instalment of tuition fees etc.
 - (b) Necessary changes in the university regulations, in case the Utkal University proposes to extend the facilities for correspondence courses to students from areas which are not within the jurisdiction of the University.
 - (c) Constitute and convene committees in the different subjects for dividing the syllabus into convenient instructional units for development of lesson plans and instructional material. In the initial stages of the operation of the scheme, it would be more economical to have various academic jobs such as writing of lessons and editing done on part—time basis by the academic staff of the university. However, some core staff may still be necessary.
 - (d) Sufficient instructional material for the students enrolled under the correspondence courses should be kept ready in advance before introducing the courses from the beginning of the academic year 1975-76.
- 4. A sum of R. 30,000/- may be made available to the university to enable it to start the courses from the beginning of the academic year 1975-76. The envisaged expenditure during the remaining part of the

current financial year is as follows:-

- 5. The amount of Rs. 30,000/- to be sanctioned towards meeting expenditure on advance action will be a first charge on the assistance amounting to a maximum of Rs. 5 lakes which may be sanctioned to the university for a period of four years on net deficit basis towards the scheme as has been done in the case of other universities for correspondence courses.
- The final proposal giving all the relevant details including admission requirements, medium instruction, exam fees, duration, jurisdiction and organizational set up may be sent to the U.G.C., as soon as these are finalised and approved.
- 7. The University should also consult the State Government regarding financial commitments during the current plan period to meet the deficit and for taking over the liability, if any, at the end of 1973-79. The Commissions assistance towards the scheme will cease after 1978-79. Upto that time the U.J.C. will annually meet the deficit subject to a maximum of N. 5 lakhs for four years.
- 8. The University may consider the possibility of instituting correspondence courses in B.Sc. and B.Com. as well for which the demand is likely to grow.

Item No. 22: To consider the recommendation made by the Sub-Committee on COHSIP about selection of colleges for participation in the programme and the guidelines for implementation of the programme recommended at the Conference of Principals of Colleges provisionally selected for participation in the programme.

The University Grants Commission, at its meeting held on 28th May, 1973 (Item No.33) agreed to initiate a programme for improvement of instructions in humanities and social sciences subjects in the colleges at undergraduate level on the lines of College Science Improvement Programme. The Advisory Committee constituted by the Commission for initiating the programme met on 10th September, 1973 and the recommendations made by this Committee were considered by the Commission at its meeting held on 8th July, 1974 (Item No. 10). The Commission generally accepted the suggestions made with regard to the implementation of COMSIP. The Commission was of the view that the programme should cover all departments in humanities and social sciences of a college selected for participation in the programme and assistance to such colleges may be provided up to a ceiling of Rs.3 lakhs per college over a period of three years. In selecting the colleges, an attempt may be made to select at least one college in each district. The Commission further desired that a beginning may be made in a few selected colleges during 1974-75.

A Standing Committee to advise the Commission on implementation of COUSIP was constituted (Annexure-I). The Committee recommended that the proposals from colleges which are already participating in COSIP and have departments of Tumanities and Social Sciences may be invited in the first instance and that the Vice-Chancellors may be requested to indicate the names of few other guidelines based on the recommendations of the Advisory Committee (Annexure-II) were sent to the Universities and Colleges, which in their view, have took Arts departments and should be invited to send their proposals under this programme.



invited from all COSIP colleges. Proposals from 72 colleges were received and these were considered by a Sub-Committee of the Standing Committee on COMSIP consisting of Dr. Tapas Majumdar, Dr. Yogendra Singh and Dr. W.S.Rajpal, Professor R.S. Sharma, Dr. C.D.S. Devanasen, Dr. J.N.Kapoor and Professor D.J. Cowda were invited but could not attend the meetings. The Sub-Committee at its meeting held on 19th September, 1974 suggested that the selection of colleges under COMSIP may be made keeping in view of the quality of teaching staff, number of books and journals in the college libraries, staff student ratio, university results in the various courses and quality of programmes. The Committee met again on Ist October, 1974. The Committee considered the proposals and suggested that 43 colleges may be selected in the first instance under this programme. The names of these colleges are given at (Annexure-III). The method adopted for the selection of colleges is indicated at Anneuxre-IV.

While going through the individual proposal sent by the colleges, it was felt that it would be useful to have in the first instance, a Conference of the Principals of Colleges which have been recommended by the committee for participation in COUSIP to consider some common problems and issues. The Principals Conference was held on 3rd and 4th December, 1974. The guidelines recommended at the Conference are given at Annexure-V.

It was agreed at the Conference that the proposals sent by the colleges would be revised by them in the light of the guidelines recommended at the Conference. These proposals are likely to be received within a fortnight or so.

The items for which assistance could be provided to the colleges for implementing the COSTP are suggested below:

- Appointment of part-time staff to undertake teaching, tutorials and seminar work. Postgraduate and research student who are not receiving any stipend or scholarship may generally be preferred for this assignment. The rate of remuneration may vary from Rs.150/-p.m. to Rs.300/-p.m. depending on the quantum of work assigned to a person.
- ii) Audio-Visual aids for teaching.



- iii) Stationery duplicating equipment and secretarial assistance for typing and duplicating work.
- iv) Essential books and journals which are not available to the teachers students in the library.
- v) Remuneration to students/staff for attending to library work in the extended hours.
- vi) Short Surveys and field work in nearby areas and agencies related to the courses prescribed in the syllabus.
- vii) Guest lectures. '
- viii) Remuneration for translating articles published in various research journals into the regional languages for the benefit of the students.

Expenditure on construction of buildings, furniture payment of allowance to the teaching or secretarial staff of the colleges, purchase of typewriters may not be covered under COUSIP.

The proposals of the 43 colleges selected provision ally for participation in the COMSIP will be processed after the Commission has considered the guidelines proposed by the Principals.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

College Humanities & Social Sciences Improvement Programme (CCHSIP).

- 1. Purpose: The aim of the College Humanities and Social Sciences improvement programme is to strengthen the teaching of the humanities and social sciences at undergraduate level in the colleges and to provide ample opportunities to the undergraduate students to develop their aptitude and interest in the study of the subjects of their choice.
- 2. Eligibility and Selecting of Colleges: The Colleges approved under the UGC Act having provision for undergraduate teaching in the humanities and social sciences are eligible for participation in the COHSIP. The proposals for participation in the programme may be sent by a College through the University in the prescribed form which may be obtained from the University or the Commission's office for consideration by University Grants Commission. In case two or more colleges situated in the same city/town wish to introduce the programme jointly by pooling their resources and facilities already available to them, they could formulate and send a joint proposal for consideration by the Commission. Selection of Colleges for participation in the programme will be made by the University Grants Commission.
- 3. An Illustrative list of activities: Programmes under the scheme may include activities for improving the teaching of Arts subjects at undergraduate level in the colleges. The aim should be to prepare a student for higher studies and research in the field of his choice. The first and foremost task should be to improve the quality of teaching with a view to making it effective and useful. The following activities could be undertaken to achieve this objective.
- (a) The courses to be covered during the session may be divided in two or three terms. The programme of lectures to be delivered during a term may be planned by the teacher at the beginning of each term. The list of topics on which lectures are to be delivered and a summary of each lecture including brief notes on each topic to be covered in a lecture, may be cyclostyled and criculated well in advance to the students. These notes may be assessed periodically by the experts and notes of goods quality may be published as text material for use by the other colleges.
- (b) Class lectures should necessarily be followed by tutorials or preceptorials. In case it is found that it would be too expensive to introduce tutorials in some subjects, seminars may be regularly organised in that subject once in a week or fortnight and students should be required to present papers in these seminars to be followed by discussion. Each student should prepare and present at least one long essay or paper in one term. Number of students in a seminar may be kept flexible and may very from subject to subject and



institution to institution depending upon the physical facilities available in the college but whatever number is fixed for participation in a seminar, its effectiveness in improving the understanding of the students in the subject should be properly ensured.

- (c) The contribution made by each student in the discussions in the seminars/tutorials should be continuously assessed and evaluated by the teacher. The progress of the students be reviewed periodically on the basis of credits acquired by him and remedial measures be taken to improve the competence of the students who are lagging behind.
- (d) Post-graduate students and research scholars could be involved in teaching at under-graduate level. Pessibility of enlisting the services of maritorious post-graduate students research scholars on a part-time basis for tutorial and seminar work and also in some cases for lecture work should be explored in each college.
- (e) Inter-departmental lectures may be organised regularly in the college on the topics which are of common interest to several disciplines. These lectures could be given by the faculty members or by visiting teachers. Regular programme of such lectures may be planned at the beginning of each term. These lectures could be organised under the auspices of the various academic and cultural associations as part of their normal programmes.
- With a view to giving some practical training to the students programmes may be organised in the college for taking groups of students frequently out of the college in the town or adjoining villages to enable them to study for themselves the problems which are related to their disciplines. Field study, practical work or survey work etc. could be incorporated in each subject as part of normal teaching. Such programmes would not only help in developing the thinking and analytical capabilities of the students and making the teaching interesting and meaningful, but would also help in creating an awareness among the students of the social and local problems and in bringing the institution closer to the community around it.
- Audio-visual aids like lingua-phone, epediascope, projectors etc., may be used for strengthening teaching work wherever necessary.
- 4. Teachers and students may be induced to read books and journals, and with a view to improving their reading habits, the following steps could be taken:
- (a) Books, journals and reading material needed for enrichment of studies and teaching may be procured.
- (b) Teachers may take initiative and special interest in inculcating reading habits among the students by providing them regularly, annotated bibliography on each topic indicating the portions and chapters which are specifically related to the concerned topic. The department should maintain a complete record



of such bibiliographical notes circulated to the students for assessment of the work of the teachers.

- (c) Every student may be induced to read at least one or two standard text books in a year on each subject of his study.
- (d) Both teachers and students should be encouraged to use more frequently reference materials, dictionaries and encyclopaedia.
- 5. With a view to improving the expression and writing capabilities of the students, remedial teaching should be regularly organised in each subject specially in the languages.
- 6. Assistance from the Commission: The Commission's assistance to a college under this programme would be available to the extent of Bs.3 lakhs for a period of three years. The grant would be available for appointment of additional teaching staff on partitime basis, purchase of books, journals and reading material, equipment and audio-visual aids needed for strengthening the teaching and other miscellaneous expenses. Funds would not be available for instituting any scholarship or to meet or improve the salaries or to provide any honoraria etc. to the existing members of the teaching staff or to meet capital cost of the existing commitments of the institutions. The assistance would be available on hundred percent basis; but it is expected that each college will be prepared to make available within the limits of existing resources some funds for achieving the objectives of the COHSIP both during the period of UGC assistance and in the years there after.

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Recommendations of the Conference of Principals of Colleges selected provisionally for participation in the College Humanities and Social Sciences Improvement Programme held on 3-4 December, 1974 in the UGC Office.

(163)

1. Objectives of the Programme:

The purpose of the College Humanities and Social Sciences Improvement Programme is to strengthen and enrich the teaching, learning and examination processes in the Humanities and Social Sciences at the undergraduate level in the colleges and to provide opportunities for change and innovations within the frame work of the existing curriculum. Enrichment of the curriculum and experimentation should ultimately provide a frame work for modernising and up-dating the syllabus in cooperation with the concerned academic and other concerned bodies of the universities. This programme together with the COSIP should eventually help the colleges towards an autonomous status within the university system in the country.

2. Maximum utilisation of existing resources:

It was agreed that no worthwhile quality programme can be implemented in the colleges unless a deleberate and conserted effort is made to make the maximum and best use of available resources. Particular mention was made in this connection of the library facilities which are central to the improvement of teaching and learning in the Humanities and social sciences. The library hours should be extended to at least 12 hours a day. An attempt should be made to see that books and journals already available in the library are used to the best advantage both by teachers and by students.

It may be necessary to provide some assistance to the colleged to employ part-time staff, especially students, to attend to the library work during the extended hours. This will not, however, mean any additional professional staff for the college library. In general, evertime allowance to the library staff should be avoided and extensive use should be made of the students help in this connection.

It should be possible for all the colleges to so devise the college programme that maximum use is made of the space already available in the colleges. This is particularly important because assistance will not be available under the CCHSIP for construction of buildings. It was also suggested that staggering of the time-table could provide opportunities for better and more intense use of available space.



3. Optimum use of common facilities:

There was consensus that physical and material facilities already available in the colleges should be used by all the departments of the colleges. Particular mention was made of the audio-visual equipment and duplicating facilities which exist in some departments of the colleges. It was agreed that no department should have exclusive ownership on any item of equipment made available in the colleges. In order to maximise the use of existing materials and facilities, it was agreed that all equipment should be centralised and for this it may be necessary to provide some support to the colleges to organise service to individual departments according to their needs. Students could again be used here for part-time assistance. It was felt that the colleges should try to train 4 or 5 teachers in the operation of audio-visual aids. This training could be arranged locally and within the expertise already available in the science departments and it should not take long. It might also be necessary to provide some support to the colleges for furnishing the audio-visual room which will be organised centrally.

4. Tutorials and Seminars:

It was recognised that tutorials and seminars, to be meaningful and productive, will have to be organised on an institutional basis. Every student should know in advance the number of tutorials he has to attend in a course. The student should also know the assessment of his work in the tutorial and this assessment, wherever possible, should form a part of the total assessment of the student. It was recognised that some universities do not have any provision for internal assessment. The Principals, however, agreed that it would be a good idea if all the colleges could institute a certificate of their own which would include an account of comulative records of the students in various subjects. This certificate should be issued to every student at the time of his leaving the college.

It was agreed that the programme of teaching in every course should be planned and announced to the students, at the beginning of each term. The list of topics to be covered either by lectures or by tutorials may be indicated and synopsis of each lecture, including comprehensive and graded bibliographical notes may be cyclostyled and circulated amongst the students well in advance of the actual teaching work. These notes will have to be revised periodically. Adequate clerical and stenographic assistance will have to be provided to the teachers for this purpose. Assistance in this behalf could be provided by students, who should be paid for the work done by them.



Tutorial work should not necessarily mean more teaching periods. Lecture periods could be reduced with advantage and tutorial periods could take their place in the general scheme of teaching.

Teacher-pupil ratio being unsatisfactory in most of the colleges; it may be necessary to employ additional part-time staff to cope with the tutorial work. For this purpose also postgraduate and research students in the colleges may be employed and if the college does not have such students on its own rolls, postgraduate and research scholars from other institutions and the neighbouring university could be invited to help in the tutorial work of the college on the basis of a suitable honorarium. The consensus was that honorarium to existing teachers for any work under the CQ/SIP should be avoided at all costs.

There was a general feeling that the language equipment of students, particularly in English and sometimes even in regional languages, was rather unsatisfactory. Special provision of remedial teaching may have to be undertaken to anable the students not only to improve their capacity for comprehension and expression in the language concerned, but also in understanding courses in other subjects.

It was felt that the teachers in the colleges do not always have an idea of what the tutorial is and what its objectives should be. A suggestion was made that it would be advantageous to have a workshop on the method of operating the tutorial system. This matter may be examined in depth by the UGC.

5. Practical orientation to the courses:

It was agreed that even within the existing system and the existing courses, it should be pessible to give practical orientation to some courses and to at least some parts of some courses. Various possibilities were mentioned particularly in Psychology, Fconomics and political science. The general agreement was that the teachers should prepare materials for practical orientation courses, teach them accordingly and help students to better comprehend their courses to ultimately provide the groundwork for reforming the university syllabus.

While short surveyes in the neighbourhood would be all-right, it may not be necessary to undertake long-term projects which may involve extensive touring and may have only a remote bearing on the existing curriculum. Limited field work in some subjects may be necessary, but it should not be extended to courses where it is not so essential; e.g. extended excursions and long tours in the case of disciplines like languages, philosophy, etc.

6. Internal Assessment:

It was recognised that the importance which a university attaches to internal assessment will ultimately determine the solution.



success of the internal assessment and tutorial system. But even so, the Principals agreed that internal agreessment in connection with the certificates to be issued by the colleges should stimulate the students and teachers to do better work. For internal assessment it will be necessary to employ a variety of questions e.g. short answer questions, multiple choice questions, true-false questions and short examinations without previous warning. It should be possible for every department to prepare a question bank in each subject and this could be supplemented and refined by cross references with the question banks prepared by other colleges/impressities under this scheme. It may be possible ultimately to finalise a question bank in a given subject and bring it out for the benefit of students of all colleges.

7. Improvement of reading habits:

The primacy of reading, writing and the audio-visual aids was recognised in the teaching of the humanities and social sciences. Special efforts will have to be made to improve the reading habits of students. For this purpose it may be necessary to provide to the students (a) notes on bibliographies; (b) duplicated periodical literature and (c) regional language translations of materials that appear in English periodicals. The teachers should arrange seminars where their own students together with postgraduate and research scholars in and around the college could periodically review new books in the subject.

All the students should be oriented to the college library and instructed in the use of the library services. It is also important that the students know right from the beginning how to locate reading materials is the library, how to consult dictionaries and Encyclopadeas and how to collect references for topics of their tutorials.

5. Mentification of priorities:

Mach college will have to identify its own priorities in the light of the guidelines mentioned above. The programme should have flexibility within the general frame work recommended by the Principals. For instance, while it may be necessary for some colleges to invite guest lecturers for short periods, other colleges may find it more profitable to invite guest teachers for extended periods, say 2 to 3 weeks and pay them travelling allowance and hospitality. Similarly, some colleges may like to add to their staff, while others may have to strengthen their



library and audio-visual departments.

The college Principals agreed to send revised programmes in the light of the guidelines accepted by them.

Item No. 23:

To consider further the proposal of the Government of India for making National Service for a specified period as a precondition for the award of a degree.

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The University Grants Commission at its meeting on 7th May, 1974 (Item No.11) considered the suggestion of the Ministry of Education & Social Welfare, Government of India for integrating the National Service Scheme with currcular activities in Universities and Colleges and for treating national service as a pre-condition for the award of a degree. The Commission resolved as under:-

"The Commission was of the view that it would be desirable to extend the National Service Scheme to cover all the students who join the first degree course in universities and colleges on a compulsory basis. This would, however, have to be suitably phased out. While it would not be practicable to link the National Service Scheme with all the university disciplines, it should be possible to integrate this programme with the curricula of some selected subjects. The academic bodies of the universities may consider how much of integration is possible and in what disciplines, the manner in which this may be done is best left to the Universities. The Commission desired that the manner in which integration of university disciplines with National Service Scheme is effected may be examined also by a committee of experts. This committee should be informed of total sum available for the scheme during the V Plan period".

The Ministry of Education was informed accordingly. The Ministry desired to have specific views of the Commission with regard to the suggestion for making National Service as a pre-condition for the award of a degree in professional courses. The Ministry was informed that the Commission is of the view that it would be desirable to extend the National Service Scheme to cover all the students who join the first degree course in all subjects, including professional subjects. As the number

Kindly refer to the correspondence resting with the University Grants Commission's letter No.F.14-7/73(HR) dated the 10th July, 1974, regarding the proposal for making national service for a specified period as a pre-condition for the award of a degree. The views of the University Grants Commission conveyed in this letter were made available to the Ministry of Law.

- What has been stated in the UGC letter pertains to compulsory national service during the college term. However, as already stated, the Cabinet suggestion is somewhat different and pertains to liability for service after the degree. What the Cabinet has suggested is a system under which national service could be prescribed as a pre-condition for the grant of a degree. The intention is that social service is to be performed after the attainment of the degree and after acquiring the necessary qualifications, but the liability to perform it is to be made a pre-condition of a degree. In case the suggestion cannot be universally adopted for all those who obtain the first degree, in the first instance, it should be examined whether specified types of graduates viz. Doctors, Engineers, Teachers, etc., can be compelled to render a specified period of national service after they have qualified fully for the award of a professional degree, the liability to render such service being a pre-condition inherent in the award of a degree.
- 3. In view of what has been stated above, it will be appreciated that the views of the University Grants Commission intimated in their letter of 10th July, 1974, do not touch this specific suggestion. We shall, therefore, be grateful if the matter could be examined by the UGC de novo and their veiws and comments on the Cabinet suggestion outlined above made available at a very early date. In particular, the UGC may kindly let us know if they consider the suggestion outlined in the preceding paragraph is viable, desirable and possible. If so, how and in what manner such a stipulation can be made may also kindly be intimated, before we approach the Ministry of Law again.



4. Since the Cabinet Secretariat has been pressing us for quite some time, we shall be grateful if this could be treated as urgent.

OFFICE MEMORANDUM

Sub: Suggestion for National Service for a specified period as a pre-condition for the grant of a degree.

While considering the introduction of the National Service Bill (moved by the Ministry of Fome Affairs) in the Lok Sabha, the Cabinet had desired in its meeting of 24th November, 1971, that the suggestion that National Service for a specified period be made a pre-condition for the grant of a degree, be examined.

- The suggestion was examined <u>vis-a-vis</u> the recommendations made by a Sub-Committee set up by the Ministry of Education in 1971 for a mid-term appraisal of the National Service Scheme for university students launched in 1969. This Committee had, inter alia, recommended that the curriculum of the first degree course in every discipline be modified to include some aspects of social service so that the National Service Programme can be enlarged as part of the curricular activities of the first degree course. It had also suggested that attempts to utilise service of fresh graduates who evince keen interest in National Service activities for a specified period after graduation, should also be examined.
- 3. The Ministry of Education & Social Welfare convened a meeting of the Informal Group of Ministers and Educationists in May, 1973, to discuss the suggestion concerning National Service as a pre-condition for the award of first degree of the University. The general consensus that emerged following a detailed discussion was that on account of managerial and motivational difficulties, constraint of resources, involvement of vast number of students etc.,



- it is not feasible at this juncture to introduce compulsory National Service as a pre-condition for the award of first degree. The Group instead suggested that an attempt should be made to build into the curricula, field-criented works projects for execution by the teaching and student community largely in rural and slum areas and that this attempt should become a forerunner of compulsory National Service at a later date. This Ministry of Education agreed with this view and referred the question of integration of NSS to the University Grants Commission.
- 4. A Note for the Cabinet containing the views given in paragraph 3 above was prepared in September, 1973, and forwarded to the Cabinet Secretariat with reference to the suggestion regarding compulsory National Service as precondition for the grant of a degree.
- 5. In the meantime, the National Service Act was passed in June, 1972. This act provides for the registration of graduate doctors, engineers and technologists, and for rendering of national service by such persons for a period of not more than 4 years to assist the Defence of India and Civil Defence or the efficient conduct of military operations including such social service as the Central Government may consider necessary for public purposes. The act is applicable to persons below 30 years of age. During such service, these persons will be paid salary and allowances etc. as admissible to persons holding similar positions under the Government.
- 6. In October, 1973, the Cabinet Secretariat clarified that what the Cabinet had suggested in a system under which national service could be prescribed as a precondition for the grant of a degree. The intention is that social service is to be performed after the attainment of the degree and after acquiring the necessary qualifications, but the liability to perform it is to be made a precondition for the grant of a degree. In case the suggestion cannot be universally alopted for all those who obtain the first degree, in the first instance it should be examined whether specified types of graduates viz. Doctors, Engineers, Teachers, etc., can be compelled to render a specified period of national service afterthey have qualified fully for the award of a professional degree, the liability to render such service being a pre-condition inherent in the award of a degree.

- The Ministry of Education & Social Welfare has been asked to re-examine the entire matter and submit a paper to the Cabinet. Before this is done, it is requested that the above proposal (para 6) may kindly be examined in the Ministry of Labour and Employment/Ministry of Fealth & Family Planning (Deptt. of Fealth) and their views communicated as to whether the Cabinet suggestion, referred to above, is desirable, viable and possible. The Ministry of Labour may also kindly indicate if they are in favour of the above proposal keeping in view the labour and employment situation in the country. Department of Health may also indicate their views in so far as it pertains to the doctors.
- Since the Cabinet Secretariat desire that the paper to be submitted to them immediately, it is requested that the views and comments requested above may kindly be furnished to the undersigned as early as possible and latest by 15th December, 1974.

Univergity Grants Commission

We may consider the functioning under three heads:

- (1) Programmes
- (2) Implementation
- (3) Secretariat support

(1) Programmes:

1.1. Colleges

Effort has been made to develop a new philosophy of the improvement of the colleges. States have been advised not to establish new colleges without a survey and if a new college is considered absolutely necessary, full justification be given for this. The major attempt is to strengthen the existing colleges. For this purpose, the following programmes have been developed:

- (a) Autonomous colleges
- (b) Development of Postgraduate colleges and Postgraduate Centres;
- (c) Development of Academic Centres and Colleges clusters;
- (d) General programmes for the other colleges coming under Section 2(f);
 - (e) Programmes for colleges in the backward regions including rural areas and colleges for women.

It has been suggested that the district may be chosen as a unit for planning the development of colleges. Guidelines for the U.G.C. pattern of assistance for the Fifth Five Year Plan have already been despatched. Divisional Heads have been asked to prepare an educational profile of the states bringing out, particularly, the position of the colleges.

The above programme has yet to be put on the ground. Apart from Birla Institute of Technology, Ranchi, no college has actually been given autonomous status. Interest, however, in the project, has shown by many states and universities. Some states have also amended the Acts of the Universities for this. The entire project for college development needs detailed discussions with various State Governments. (A separate note is being prepared).

1.2 Universities

University Grants Commission guidelines on establishment

have been spelt out in detail. The basic manner in which existing universities are to be developed is spelt out in the guidelines for the Fifth Plan.

3. Special Programmes

The special programmes developed by the Commission may be discussed as under:

3.1 Research

- (i) Fellowships, Research Associateships etc.
 The new pattern has started being implemented.
- (ii) Projects : 203 advanced research projects were received in social sciences and humanities.

 19 were accepted, 75 are under consideration. These are being placed before the December meeting. In the case of natural sciences, 693 projects were received. 88 were cleared by the Panels, 294 under consideration, 181 yet to be evaluated. They are to be placed before the SRC.
- (iii) <u>CAS</u> and <u>SACS</u>: Review of the existing CAS has been done. Proposals for CAS and SACS have yet to be invited.
- (iv) <u>UNDP Projects</u>: 10 projects with emphasis on R & D have been sent to the UNDP Agency.
- (v) Area Studies: Projects for the Fourth Plan have been reviewed and universities invited to præpare proposals in their light. New scheme; shave also been cleared and universities informed.

(vi) PL 480 and Ford Foundation:

They are still in the discussion stage. Fresh ground has been broken in the field of research. The biggest limitation is of funds, which is being discussed with other scientific agencies. The question of appointing a Director who will be Member-Secretary of the SRC has been taken in hand.

3.2. Faculty Improvement:

The biggest improvement salary revision has been implemented in the Oemtral Universities. Discussion with States are continuing.

Summer Institutes and Seminars have been reviewed.

Refresher Courses & Teacher Fellows : Broad guidelines have been worked out. The work plans for Faculty Improvement Programme is before the Commission as item No. 17 of the Agenda.

3.3 Orientation of Courses:

The Parels are expected to play an important role in the reorientation of syllabi and courses.

- 3.4 Guidelines regarding work experience, vocational courses, rural orientation etc. are being worked out.
- 3.5 Science Centres: The note is being prepared and will soon go to the Universities.
- 3.6 Examination Reforms: A separate note will be appended.
- 3.7 <u>Non-formal Continuing and Adult Education</u>: The guidelines for Correspondence courses have been worked out and the projects are being cleared in the light of the guidelines. The programme of adult education will have to be re-organised in the light of the note from the Ministry of Education.
- 3.8 Buildings: Although universities and states have been asked to use local material, little progress appears to have been made. Norms regarding hostel accommodation, faculty buildings etc. need revision in the light of existing realities.
- 3.9 <u>U.G.C.</u> Journal: Report of the Editorial Committee is being placed before the Commission.
- 3.10 Student Amenities: Norms for Canteens, Student homes, Health Centres etc. will have to be fixed in the light of the funds position. Additional funds may have to be provided for the purpose,
