ACADEMIC AND ADMINISTRATIVE AUDIT REPORT (2010-11)

PROCEDURE ADOPTED

The Internal Quality Assessment Cell (IQAC) of the University with a systematic pre-emptive approach prepared background to collect the information from the Departments (covering the research and academic progress including self appraisal reports of the faculty), Colleges, Central and Supportive Services and Administrative Units. On the basis of the information furnished by them the IQAC office prepared systematic profiles of the departments which served as a basic data for conducting AAA Work. IQAC has formed four teams headed by the Experts and also provided the visit schedule of Departments and other units.

The IQAC Office as a preliminary step arranged a pre-consultative meeting of the Committee with the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor and other Officers of the University. Dr. H.B. Walikar, the Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor in his opening address spelt out the priorities of the University in the competitive higher education environment and emphasized that teachers should commit themselves to the quality teaching and research in order to enhance the performance and standards of the University. The Chairman of the Committee in response stressed on the theme 'Reformation (ಸುಧಾರಣೆ) and Transformation' (ಬದಲಾವಣೆ) and felt that the adoption of this approach would certainly meet the needs of priorities to be achieved by the University in the contemporary changing educational scenario in the Country.

INSPECTION AND AUDIT

The Committee consisting of 13 members split into four groups as arranged for the purpose of inspection and audit. The following Table shows under the broad classifications the total number of Departments, Colleges, Offices, Services, and Hostels etc, visited.

- The Department since the year 2008 has earned a revenue of nearly Rs.8 lakhs to the University by way of fee for admissions.
- The Guest faculty in the circumstances deserves a fair remuneration.
- The Department gained sufficient momentum in respect of intake for Certificate and Diploma Courses in view of changing job perceptions and OEC admissions.
- This may be a favourable gaining factor.

Commendations:

It is appreciable to note the commitment of the Faculty working in the Department till late hours in view of the course timing schedule.

Recommendations:

1. One full-time Faculty may be recruited in each Foreign Language.
2. Further the guest faculty should be paid suitable remuneration taking into consideration the fact of working hours and the nature of workload.
3. Adequate protective and safety measures may be carried out in respect language Laboratory for effective usage.

Observations:

- The teaching faculty in the Department has shown interest in research work.
- However, the furnishing of the Department with suitable furniture as well as student accommodation in the class room needs a considerable attention.
- The recommendation of the previous AAA Committee with regard to the recruitment of teaching faculty is yet to be fulfilled.
- Also the Department is running with office staffs who are engaged on contract basis through a contractor.

Recommendations:

1. The benches in the class rooms for the students seating need to be replaced with proper sitting and writing facility.
2. A provision for drinking water for the students may be made available in the Department.
3. The recruitment of one full time office clerk cum typist in the Department may be considered as an urgent need.
4. The syllabus to be revised immediately.
5. The Department has to undertake the work of Translation.

Observations:

- The Department is wearing a perennial festive look with full fledged faculty and witness research work by way of publications and carrying out of research projects sponsored by different agencies.
- The Department enjoys the privilege of preserving the voluminous content of ancient manuscript. However, the space in the library and seating accommodation of the benches in the class room appear to be an issue.

Commendations:

1. It is appreciable to note that the Department is privileged with special Assistance Program (SAP) of the UGC.
2. The Faculty in the Department have involved in research work with the initiation of Major Research Projects.
3. The Department with its sincere efforts established collaboration with Central Sahitya Academy and National Manuscript Mission.
4. The Institute has undertaken four projects under Classical Kannada Scheme sponsored by the State Government.

Recommendations:

1. The existing library in the Department needs an extension with adequate space and necessary furniture.
2. There is an urgent need to preserve intact the voluminous ancient manuscript of Kannada in the Department with scientific approach.
3. Further, the library needs digitalization of the works to meet the new challenges.
4. The provision of comfortable seating accommodation to the students in the class rooms.
5. In the light of the introduction of classical language status to Kannada, 3 Professor Posts are to be designated. They may be named as Professor of Ancient Kannada Literature, Professor of Medieval Kannada Literature and Professor of Modern Kannada Literature.
6. In the modern context, we are living in a multilingual situation hence, a student of Kannada must study additional Language in UG Course and must continue the same language in PG Course. This will also complement the translation work.
7. To enrich the quality of research in Kannada, the topics for Ph.D. study should be high and serious in standard. Neglected and unexplored areas are to be insisted.
8. The courses of Certificate and Diploma are to be strengthened.

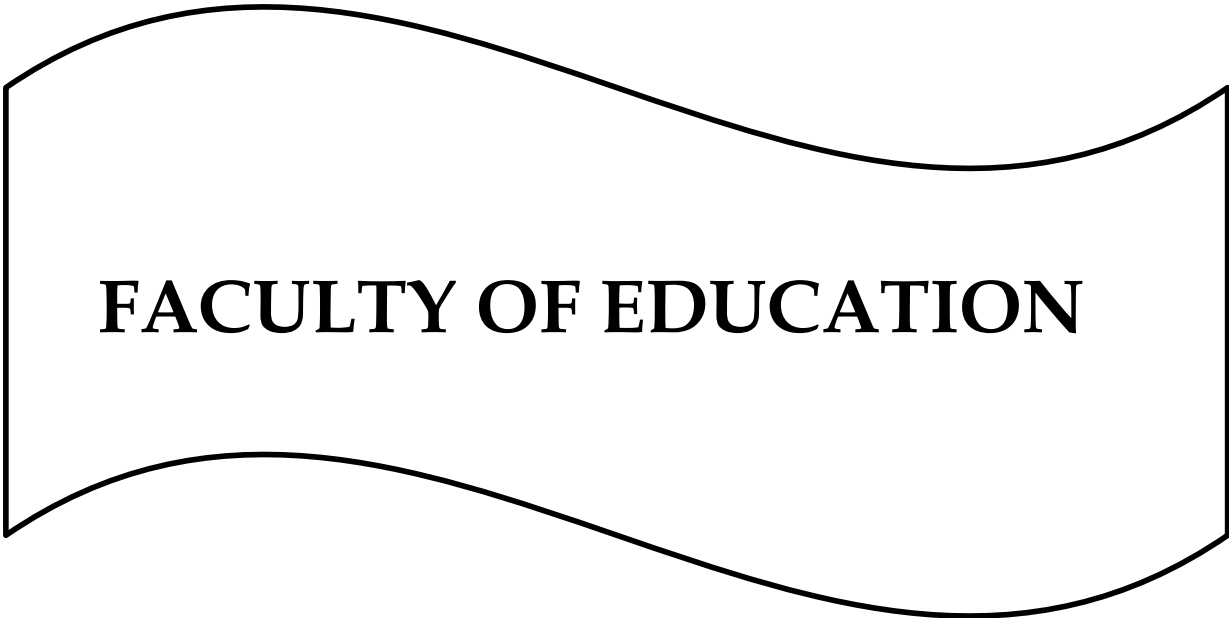

- The Department is bringing out an annual students' journal namely, "Journal of Economic Development and Change" since two years.
- The Department regularly conducts conferences/seminars/workshops/symposia on relevant themes.

Commendations:

1. The Department has undertaken many research projects funded by various agencies which are highly relevant to the current policy of environment.
2. The recognition to research activity of the Department is evident through the various fellowships/awards won by the teachers

Recommendations:

1. Intake of 90 students for the PG programme is highly unmanageable. Therefore, the Committee strongly recommends to the University either to reduce the intake from 90 to 60 or to have 2 sections of 45-50 each;
2. The vacant teaching positions must be filled soon;
3. Department should involve PDFs in teaching;
4. Staff members to conduct Parents - Teachers meetings regularly;
5. Coaching for SLET/NET and competitive examination to be taken up by the Department;

- Students were not available for interaction.
- Research output in terms of projects, publications, etc is highly inadequate.

Recommendations:

2. To design and offer one or two Open Elective Course/s for the students of other departments.
3. The Department shall undertake extension activities – to create awareness about Mahatma’s principles, life, views on business, economics, etc among the students of schools and colleges.
4. Research publications in peer-reviewed journals by the faculty be initiated.
5. Ph.D. Theses should be published in the form of books for wider circulation and dissemination of research works relating to Mahatma’s principles.

7. The University should fill up vacant Professor’s post.

Recommendations:

4. As the demand is very less, the Committee recommends that the Department to offer an Open Elective Course for the students of other Departments.

Observations:

- The Department is headed by a faculty from the Law College by way of additional duties.
- There is no faculty as such for the Department.
- However, the Department has made considerable progress in research and publications.
- They are conducting part time Diploma Courses over the years.
- The location of the Department is uncomfortable.
- The syllabus was framed in the Year 2006.
- The Department has been granted Rs. 33 lakhs from UGC under XII Plan to run the activities.

Commendations:

1. It is appreciable that the Department has initiated various awareness programmes on 'Women and Health' in collaboration with Family Planning Association of India.

Recommendations:

1. Taking into consideration the availability of UGC grant under XII Plan the University may recruit a full time Coordinator and the necessary faculty for the Department on term contract basis.
2. There is a need to reorient the syllabus of the courses taking into consideration various social and legal dimensions faced/confronted by the women in India.

PEETHAS / CENTERS

Basaveshwar Adhyayana Peetha

Observations:

- The Peetha has vast infrastructure facilities which need utilization to the full extent.
- The Peetha is presently looked after by a retired Professor.
- There is no sufficient administrative staff.
- The Peetha is carrying out the activities from the interest earned out of the limited funds.
- Publications of Basava's teachings and preachings in other core languages is a task to be attained.
- Commendable work is done through publication, organizing seminars and conducting Diploma courses.

Commendations:

1. It is noteworthy to mention the fact that the Coordinator has made sincere efforts to get financial resources from the Donors and initiated the quality publications for the Peetha.
2. The Peetha has also carried fair quality of work of translation in English especially the work 'Makers Mint', which was released in USA.

Recommendations:

1. There is a need to organize short duration programme of two to three days to spread a knowledge of Basava's preaching to the entire student community of the University by evolving suitable action plan.
2. Publications of Basava's preaching in other languages.
3. The Guest Faculty well versed in English and Hindi be appointed as supportive staff.
4. Full time Director and adequate office staff be appointed.
5. Supportive matching grant may be given every year from the University internal resources.

Kanaka Adhyayana Peeth

Observations:

- The Peetha enjoys the possession of vast infrastructure facility.
- It should be visualized accordingly.
- Though the Peetha enriched with some publications, most of them are repetitive.

Recommendations:

1. The appointment of qualified faculty with multidisciplinary background to run the affairs of the Peetha in well designed manner.
2. A proper evolving of annual academic activities to be carried out in the Peetha which is an urgent need.
3. Apart from the Kanaka literature, the society to which Kanakadasa belonged, also needs to be incorporated with all cultural dimensions in the study.

Shri Somavansha Sahasrajuna Kshatriya Research Center

Observations:

- The Peetha is headed by a Faculty from other Department.
- The Peetha was started in the year 2006 with a corpus of Rs.25 lakhs given by the State Government.

Recommendations:

A full time Coordinator may be appointed on contract basis with a view to carry out the activities of the Peetha in a meaningful manner.

Swami Vivekananda Kendra

Observations:

- The Centre has an independent spacious building.
- It is conducting Personality Development Course for the students of all the Departments.
- So far, about 500 students have undergone this course.
- Besides, the Centre is conducting Spoken English Course for the students at a nominal fee which is utilized to meet a part of recurring expenses of the Centre.
- It is also offering Open Elective Course. However, activities pertaining to Swami Vivekananda are not visible.

Recommendations:

1. There are no Statutes governing the functioning of the Centre. Therefore, the committee recommends to both the Centre and the University to prepare the Statutes and get the approval of the Chancellor.
2. Optimum utilization of this new and spacious building is suggested.
3. The building is not fully utilized. There are Departments on the campus which are facing the problem of lecture halls, staff rooms, etc. Hence, the Committee recommends to the University to think of utilizing the unused halls/ rooms in the building for other Department/s (by adding some more halls in the first floor, if necessary).
4. The Centre to think of conducting either a Certificate Course or Diploma course in the area of Swami Vivekananda's philosophy, thought, etc.
5. There shall be at least one Co-ordinator appointed exclusively for the Centre. This Centre may be attached to Departments such as Education, Philosophy, etc. This enables the University to continue with the activities of the Centre and save expenses substantially.

Hazarath Tippu Sultan Study Center

Observations:

- It appears the State Government has directed the University to create necessary funds for running of the Peetha by breaching its earlier commitment made to the University

Recommendations:

It is appropriate to request the government to relocate this Peetha to Mysore University taking into consideration the fact that entire Tipu's regime revolves around Mysore.

Mahayogi Vemana Peetha

Observations:

- The Peeth is being run with the accrued interest proceeds earned on the corpus fund of 13 lakhs annually.
- The Faculty from other Department is entrusted with the responsibility of looking after the Peetha.

Recommendations:

A full time Coordinator may be appointed on contract basis within the available resources with a view to carry the mission meaningfully.

Dr. Zakir Hussain Study Centre

Observations:

- The UGC has sanctioned Dr. Zakir Husain Study Centre to Karnatak University, Dharwad under the Epoch making Thinkers of India Scheme during the IX Plan Period.
- This Centre is situated and functioning in the Department of Post-Graduate Studies and Research in Education. Further, financial assistance was continued even during the X and XI Plan periods.
- Though some activities in the form of a Seminar and a few lectures were undertaken by the Centre during the IX and X Plan periods out of the funds sanctioned and released by the University Grants Commission, thereafter, the Centre has become almost defunct.
- In order to continue the activities of the Centre, UGC has sanctioned Rs.7.5 lakhs and released Rs.3.75 lakhs for the XI Plan period.
- Surprisingly, the Centre has not received the amount. As a result, no activities were conducted during 2010-11.

Recommendations:

1. The Centre to approach (through the University) the UGC for the continuation of financial support even during XII Plan period.
2. If the Centre fails to receive the financial assistance from UGC, then the university has to take a decision – either to continue the activities of the Centre by providing assistance out of its internal resources or to close it.



KUPG CENTERS

PG Centers at Karwar, Haveri and Gadag

These Post Graduate Centers are functioning in Karwar, Haveri and Gadag. The Karwar and Haveri centers have their own campus with a few buildings. And in case of other centre there is need to appoint more staff to carry out the work satisfactorily.

The Gadag PG Centre for Commerce is located in a College and only M.Com course is being conducted. It is learnt that all the fees collected from the students is taken by the University and it is appropriate to give the part of it to the College where the course is being conducted.

Every Thursday resource persons belonging to different fields are invited to interact and guide our students. A number of magazines like Chronicle, Business Economy, Sparda Chetara etc., that cater to the needs of students are made available in the cell. A 3 day workshop on "Competency Building" by a reputed firm Y-gen was organized during the academic year 2010 - 2011.

Observations:

- A tremendous improvement in managing the academic affairs of the college is identified from all perspectives.
- Of late, the University has commenced new courses in the UG and PG in the College.
- The faculty has carried out quality research work by way of publication of Articles and Books.
- And have guided Ph.D. students.
- The college has maintained all records specified for the inspection of the Committee and there is a good response from the faculty.
- The last year AAA Committee's recommendation with regard to the expansion of the class room facility is being adhered to with an exception to the recruitment of adequate teaching faculty.
- Further, the teachers in the college are burdened with rigorous teaching workload throughout the year in PU, Degree and PG Courses.

Commendations:

1. It is highly appreciable to note visible progress in all aspects.
2. The Faculty members of the College have made good progress in the research publications.
3. The college initiated the starting of 'Red Cross Wing'.

Recommendations:

1. The present practice of running of affairs of Arts, Commerce, BBA, and B.Com (CS) under one Head may be discontinued by separating Arts Section into one unit and Commerce, BBA and B.Com (CS) into another unit with separate administrative Headship (Principal) mechanism.
2. An urgent need for bifurcation of PU college administration by fresh recruitments confining only to the PU Section as per PU Board guidelines.
3. The recruitment of full time teachers on priority basis with a view to attain punctuality, commitment and quality in imparting education.
4. The requirement of construction of additional class rooms.
5. The Research Supervisors in the college may be permitted to register only five Ph.D. candidates at a time. This is necessary for the purpose of maintaining class room teaching quality for a college teacher.
6. The appointment of a Full time librarian and other supportive staff is the need of the hour.
7. Renovation of existing internal arrangements/ facilities for students reading of the books in the library may be taken on priority basis.
8. Finally, digitalization of library is foremost need of the hour.

Master of Tourism Administration (MTA)

Observations:

- A Department has been equipped with updated infrastructure, suitable for running the Tourism Course.
- State Government funding to the Course would be discontinued from this academic year.
- The University is now vested with the task of conducting the Course by extending the necessary logistic support.
- Attention be given to recruitment of the staff keeping in view the adequacy of the demand for the course.

Commendations:

1. The College has shown considerable progress in developing suitable infrastructure to impart education.

Recommendations:

1. This program may be brought under self-financing course in order to have substantial support for maintaining staff both teaching and administrative.

Every year the students visit to the KRI & Geology Dept. of Karnatak University, Dharwad and the Dept of Environmental Science Research Centre, Home Science, Dairy Farming, Cattle Research Centre and Plantation of Agricultural University, Dharwad in relation to Environmental Education Subject and Geography Method. Lecturers will be arranged by the experts of the Universities.

12. Is counseling for students available? If so, what are the tangible results?

Yes. Timely guidance and counseling will be provided to the students for their academic and personal problems.

Observations:

- The College which is offering only one Bachelor's Degree Programme viz., B.Ed possesses the services 8 faculty members on regular basis and all are Ph.D. holders.
- It has computer laboratory with 14 systems with internet connectivity.
- The college has a good library with good number of collections and subscribing to 23 journals.
- Though the College possesses all the requisite infrastructural facilities, the academic environment is highly concerning.

Recommendations:

1. Many of the female students are unhappy with their hostel (**Sulabha**) facility more particularly about the food provided. The students were in weeping mood when the committee interacted with them. Even in the case of boys' hostel, the students informed the Committee that the hostel has not started functioning even after 10 - 12 days of commencement of classes. Hence, the committee strongly recommends to the University to solve this problem on priority basis.

2. Another serious problem is the differences between majority of the teachers on the one hand and the principal on the other. Each leveled charges against other. Hence, the committee recommends to the university to initiate fact finding probe and to take appropriate action against the erring group/s. This is essential as otherwise the students will be demoralized.
3. The college has almost all the facilities - adequate number of teachers, lecture halls, good library, staff rooms, etc. Unfortunately, there is no team spirit. Consequently, the students suffer and the quality of education becomes the victim. This may also spoil the academic environment of not only the college but also P. G. Department of Education which is also housed in the same building. Hence, immediate action is recommended.

The students are counseled about the opportunities available after graduation. During the course, lectures by eminent professionals are arranged to impart information to students, so that they can make an informed choice as to whether they should enter trial advocacy, appellate advocacy, non-litigation practice, legal process outsourcing, jobs in corporate sector, etc. As a result of appropriate counseling the students have gained entry in reputed law firms like King and Patridge, Singhania, Dhua, Indus Law, Holla Associates, Fox & Mandal, etc. In corporate sectors the students have joined Volva, Voda Phone, Harihar Poly Fibers, Anz Bank, Bajaj Allianz, etc.

Observations:

- The College has good academic environment.
- The College offers two UG programmes – three year LLB degree and five year integrated LLB programme.
- The College library equipped with good collections.
- The zerox facility in the library is essential for the students as well as for the faculty.
- A computer lab is being developed.
- The College has an alumni association.

Commendations:

1. The practical component of the LLB courses is impressive.
2. The 'moot court' programme has drawn state and national level audience.

Recommendations:

1. Subscription of on-line journals to be initiated.
2. Strengthening of IT infrastructure needs to be undertaken.
3. Further extension of legal literacy and legal aid programmes to be initiated.
4. Setting up of a courtroom for the benefit of students.
5. The Library needs to be organized in a systematic manners.
6. The library needs to extend the zerox facility.



**ADMINISTRATIVE
SECTIONS**

Academic Section

Observations:

- The overall performance of this section is good.
- The caseworkers were found to be active. The staff maintain personal day book which is appreciable.
- However, a common format with various details such as date of receipt, the subject matter, file number and disposal date could make it more effective.
- The knowledge of most of the staff members as regards to KCSR and other University guidelines is found to be marginal.

Recommendations:

1. The details of personnel day book be made available in intranet, the very next day.
2. The student registered in KUD should have only one registration number at the point of entry and the same be continued for further University degrees.
3. The invitation to evaluate the thesis be sent through emails and the replies also be accepted by the same media.
4. An appropriate remuneration be fixed for conducting the Viva-Voce test for Ph.D./M.Phil. degree.
5. The level of TA/DA be the same for all the University work such as Central Valuation, practical evaluation, BOE Meeting, BOS Meeting, etc.
6. In the light of request for record room, it is suggested to digitalize the documents and be kept in e-format. The Statutes and Ordinances, University Act, Guidelines, Circulars, etc., be made available on University website.
7. As University has been given UPE tag, it is high time for it to go for E-Governance. Such software is available from Amrutmai University, Kerala at free of cost (this is for information).
8. The staff be given periodic training on administrative matters and computer applications. The departmental test be made compulsory to increase the efficiency bar.

Accounts Section

Observations:

- Handling of research project accounts from different funding agencies is quite efficient though in a traditional way.
- From the files shown to the Committee, it appears that the clearing of matter is fast.
- The Committee found there is a lot of rigidity among the staff to accept any suggestion.
- The staff is not maintaining the day book.

Recommendations:

1. All the accounts should be transferred on to tally software, which is a specialized software for financial management.
2. The staff needs to maintain day book as being practiced by other sections on the campus. This information may be made available on intranet on the next working day.
3. The amounts utilized for project under various heads be made available on internet, so that Utilization Certificate preparation becomes easy and fast.

BOA Section

- The Section has done quite a good work in cases of CAS promotion.
- Over 90% of the teachers under CAS were promoted within one year of their eligibility.
- The overall staff has very positive attitude towards work culture.

Recommendations:

1. The University should make a provision to receive application from teachers as and when they become eligible. The whole process of promotion be completed within six months from the date of application.
2. The section should obtain the list of experts for BOA Panel from various sources such as internet.
3. Since the position of the authors in the authors list of research publications is linked to calculation of API index, the University **should send a circular specifying that the student working for Ph.D./M.Phil be the first author and guide be the corresponding author.**

DPAR Section

Observations:

- The section maintains personal records of teaching, non-teaching and guest faculty records and also does the process of recruitment of these staff.
- The computer literacy of the staff is not adequate and rely on computer operator for minor things.

Recommendations:

1. In complicated cases DPAR and Legal Cell should work in tandem.
2. Computer training for the staff should be made compulsory and their promotion be linked to passing of the departmental test.

Examination Section

Observations:

- The examination section is running in a traditional way and usage of E-management is marginal.
- However, the records of certificates are properly bound and kept in order for easy access. The old records have become brittle and prone to damage.
- Question Paper Branch of the Examination Section is doing quite well and this is because of personal involvement of the case workers.
- It is observed that there is no Question Paper leakage in the entire history of the University for which the section needs appreciation.
- The Committee did not come across any surveillance system in any part of Exam Section.

Recommendations:

1. It is high time that all old and new records be digitized and be kept in order by using data mining software for easy and immediate access.
2. A methodology be evolved to issue degree certificates (convocation certificates) within 3 days.
3. Passing in departmental test be linked to promotion of non-teaching staff.

Legal Cell

Observations:

- Legal Cell is managed by 5 persons of which the Co-ordinator is from law faculty and two retired staff under contract basis.
- The cell has done excellent work.
- Total number of 50 Writ Petitions were filed from January 2005 to July 2012, of which 33 were disposed in 2012 and 17 still pending.
- Thus, the track record of legal cell seems to be quite satisfactory.
- It is may also observed that, most of the work is done by the two retired contract staff and hence there is an urgent need to provide two junior staff to be trained under these experienced people.

Recommendations:

1. Two junior staff to be appointed/transferred having legal background with immediate effect.
2. Periodical refresher course be conducted for non-teaching staff towards administrative matters, KCSR rules, computer application, etc.
3. A minimum budgetary allocation be made for the purchase of core books relating to service matters.

Planning and Development Section

Observations:

- The section deals with various planning activities of the University such as Five Year Plan Proposal, proposal preparation for various funding agencies, purchase of general equipments for university departments.
- It also helps in preparing of policy matters like purchase policy and annual reports.
- Though number of persons in the section are few, the amount of work it does is appreciable.
- The section is having up-to-date information of all funding agency requirements, the report formats, utilization certificate and guidelines.
- The information received from various departments is maintained in electronic format and thus making the process of obtaining data easy.

Recommendations:

1. Various administrative sections of the University are seeking same information many a times in a year from the departments, thus leading to the wastage of valuable time and stationery. This can be avoided by establishing an Information Cell which will receive information from all the sections and departments once/twice a year. This information may be transferred by the information cell in the required format as and when required by any section. With a scope to update the information on continuous basis via internet.

Syndicate Section

Observations:

- The Section is managed in a traditional way and the usage of e-management was found to be minimum.
- It appears that the staff requires good training in usage of computer and internet so that they can surf on net to find qualified people for University nominations for various panels.

Recommendations:

1. Section requires rejuvenation.
2. Departmental exams and efficiency bar are to be introduced to raise the working skills of the staff.



CENTRAL FACILITIES

Prof. S.S. Basavanal Library

- The Karnatak University Library is one of the best libraries in this part of the country.
- It has collection over of 3 lakhs books, 1784 theses and 45,966 book volumes. It subscribes 350 periodicals.
- The library is endowed with repository of UN publications since June 1967.
- It is an unique wing of the University and it has a rare distinction.
- The library has adequate number of computers with internet facility.
- The students browse regularly to get their information.
- UGC-INFLIBNET-INFORNET facility is largely used by the users.
- The librarian is very enthusiastic and doing a good work.
- The major handicap is inadequacy of supportive staff.

Therefore, the Committee strongly recommends that the existing vacancies may be filled up early for smooth functioning of the library and for better service to the staff, students as well as public at large.

University Scientific Instruments Center (USIC)

- There are large numbers of instruments in USIC which are useful to all the science departments.
- All the instruments are in good condition.
- The whole building is maintained well.
- In spite of limited staff members they are helping the researchers whenever they approach them.
- The Department is providing the required data as early as possible. Though there are many instruments available, still there is a need for procuring some more instruments by securing grants from UGC, DST and other funding agencies.
- We recommend that the services provided for researcher as well as for outsiders may be reasonable charged.

Central Computer Centre

Observations:

- The section is doing quite a good job to achieve its objectives.
- The laboratory is clean and sitting arrangement is satisfactory.
- They have adequate software and effective connectivity.
- It is appreciable to note that students can print the material at nominal cost.
- A team of trained personnel is available for proper help and guidance.

Recommendations:

1. Within the space available, few more computers can be added.
2. A second surveillance camera be fitted to opposite wall.
3. A colour inkjet printer with CISS be added.
4. All the computers connected to University intranet should open only with the password given by the University. The first page should have the information on circulars, notifications, advertisement, tenders, invitations etc. This could be the first step towards e-governance.
5. The University website be redesigned so as to have the detailed information regarding the profiles of faculty members, departments, etc.

University Health Centre

Observations

- Health Centre has the minimum required facilities.
- It has the services of two Doctors including one Resident Doctor.
- Besides, a few external specialists are visiting the Health Centre once in a week.
- The Centre has the minimum number of technical staff and an ambulance.
- The centre has one bed exclusively for casualty. It has conducted a few health camps. On average, 90 - 100 persons (both the students and employees and their dependents) utilize the services of the Centre every day.
- The University annually is earmarking a requisite amount for the purchase of required medicines (for the year under review, it is Rs. 10 lakhs) which are given to patients at free of cost.
- There is a minimal provision for taking care of emergency medical situation.

Recommendations

1. Keeping in mind the increasing number of users of Health Centre, the committee recommends providing additional rooms and services of one Resident Doctor on regular basis.
2. The University can also explore the possibility of providing a 6-bed facility as at present there is no facility for in-patient treatment.
3. The dress code among para-medical and other staff should be strictly enforced.
4. It is also necessary to obtain the services of a Dentist and an Orthopedician, at least once in a week.
5. Due importance must be given for hygiene and cleanliness of surroundings in view of growing amount of filth generation on account of existence of several small canteens around the Health Centre.
6. Keeping in the mind the importance of health, the Committee recommends the Centre to organize health awareness programme such as brushing teeth before bed time, food habits, importance of regular exercise, etc for the students, at the beginning of the academic year.
7. A separate compound wall may be constructed for the Health Centre to maintain hygiene and cleanliness

Central Workshop

Observations:

- The workshop has 11 employees – 6 on regular basis and 5 on contract basis.
- It attends to both repair works and new works such as student cots for hostels, gates for the buildings, etc.
- It has adequate equipment and materials required to attend to its activities.
- It has maintained the Stock Register and other registers.
- Purchase of required materials/equipment is done through quotations if the amount involved is less than Rs. 1 lakh and with the approval of the Purchase Committee (through tenders) if the amount involved is Rs. 1 lakh or more.

Recommendations:

1. To follow the procedure of e-tender for procurement, whenever they purchase of material/equipment exceeds Rs. 1 lakh.
2. In the case of new works, a comparison of cost, if the work is undertaken internally in the workshop, with the external market price for the same/similar item/work shall be made. Based on this, the workshop must try to reduce their cost below the level of the external market price.
3. The Workshop must maintain registers indicating the number and type of works executed, date of commencement and end of works, date of delivery of the work to the concerned department, materials and labour time spent on the works and cost incurred in completing. Such registers help in evaluating the performance of the Workshop.

Botanical Garden

Observations:

- The Committee appreciates the efforts put in by the Estate Officer Dr. G.S. Mulagund in maintaining the rare medicinal plants and other endangered species.
- Committee is happy with the maintenance of the garden within the limited resources available.
- The scientific segregation of plants and nurturing of medicinal and rare species plants is highly appreciated.

Recommendations:

1. This garden is in dire need of compound wall.
2. With the present water sources, it is difficult to maintain a garden of 40 acres area. So an urgent attention is required to arrange for water supply. This can be partly achieved by installing waste water treatment plants.
3. The number of labourers be increased to at least 15.

Printing Press

Observations:

- The very site of the building presents a worn out appearance.
- The non-disposal of bundles of waste lying in the premises presenting an awkward appearance.
- The absence of a qualified person in the helm of affairs of the Press is identified.
- Also the recommendations of the previous AAA Committee were not implemented in respect of the identified issues.

Recommendations:

1. Appointment of a technically qualified incharge person to look after the affairs of the Press instead of deputing a person from other academic department.
2. The practice of obtaining elaborate clearance procedure for the disposal of waste may be discontinued and the same be vested within the purview of the Head of the Press as per the rules.

Prasaranga

Observations:

- The very site of the Department presents a poor look from the perspective of maintenance of the furniture, etc, the space arrangement in the building.

Recommendations:

1. The practice of maintaining the stock of books of Prasaranga with the University Press should be discontinued. A provision should be made within the Prasaranga building for this facility. Since enough space is available on the first floor of the same building, a water proof arrangement may be made by applying corrugated roof system for this purpose.
2. A professional and attractive way of arrangement and display of the publications should be made using modern equipments.
3. Renovation of the rooms and the building in order to present an attractive look for the members of the public.
4. The publications intended to be made by the Prasaranga may be entrusted to the concerned experts of the faculties within the University for the purpose of corrections/editing instead of sending to outsiders.
5. Periodical Book Mela may be arranged in strategic places in the City in collaboration with organizations like Vidyavardhak Sangha.
6. The Periodicals of the University be regularized and Karnataka Bharati and Vidyarti Bharati be brought out quarterly.
7. Maintenance of books and other publications must be created through the software system. The journals and periodicals need to be updated.
8. The Department must evolve annual calendar of events with regard to its activities.

University Canteen

Observations:

- Vegetables were not stored properly.
- The food items served were not warm/hot.
- The number of refreshment items were less.
- Water leakage is found.
- It looks more like a boarding rather than a canteen.
- Rate boards were not displayed.

Recommendations:

1. Scientific store be installed for the proper storage of vegetables and food grains.
2. The food items be served hot and fresh.
3. A proper exhaust be fixed in kitchen to get-rid off suffocating smell of burnt oil.
4. The number of items be increased.



SUPPORTING SERVICES

Students Welfare Section (DSW)

Observations:

- DSW Section has taken care to provide minimum facilities inspite of increasing students strength.
- Good practice of Yoga classes in some Hostels, the same may be extended to other hostels to inculcate good values.

Recommendations:

1. The students, who are admitted to academic programme of University and is desirous of staying in hostel, should be provided hostel on the first day itself. DSW should work out a methodology in consultation with academic section and departments.
2. Warden be authorized to spend up to Rs. 20,000/- from DOMOS fund to meet the immediate requirement of hostels without any prior permission.
3. The information available at the DSW office regarding fellowship, scholarship, extracurricular activities, and other welfare provision be made available on website.
4. The punctuality and alertness in the office staff can be brought about by surprise visits of DSW.
5. There is a need to extend Yoga classes to all Hostels.

Engineering Section (Building Department)

- The building section has taken up the large number of building constructions in the campus.
- The plans and estimates for these buildings are prepared and approved by appropriate bodies Pawate Institute for Mathematical Science is well prepared by the architect and the location selected for the building is beautiful.
- The building section is planning to renovate some of the old buildings on the campus, which may be done as early as possible.

University Employment Information Guidance Bureau (UEIGB)

Observations:

- Placement record of UEIGB is found to be very poor.
- Liaison government officer is taking extra effort to make UEIGB effective.
- This Center is conducting personality development program in various colleges.
- The committee felt that this number could be increased.

Recommendations:

1. Efforts should be made continuously to pursue the unsuccessful candidates for their placement.
2. Wide publicity campaign apart from formal circulars be initiated through email, website.
3. Center should make voluntary effort to create the competitive spirit and placement awareness.
4. In view of Technology Savvy Students it is essential on the part of the center to make arrangement for few PCs with internet connectivity in reading room.

Sports Section

Observations:

- The Department virtually has no control on the grounds and stadium maintained by the University.
- The staff in the Sports Section has no representation in the Gymkhana of the University.

Recommendations:

1. There is an urgent need to merge the three departments namely, the Dept. of P.G. Gymkhana, the Dept. of Physical Education and the Department of Sports into one Department. This would certainly mitigate the faculty shortage as well save the additional cost of running office staff and also the space. For the cultural activities of the Gymkhana, a suitable faculty may be appointed.
2. This would certainly enable the faculty of Sports Section the privilege of being members in Board of Studies and Board of Examination, etc.
3. The University indoor stadiums and play grounds should be brought under the control of Sports Section.
4. Correspondingly four ground staff for maintenance of the play grounds may be recruited.
5. A Gym expert/ instructor for proper utilization of Gym facilities.
6. A Ground Supervisor for better maintenance of the play grounds.

National Service Scheme (NSS)

Observations:

- The present activities of the NSS are being carried out as usual.
- However, there is the presence of disgust in the minds of the supportive staff in the Department in view of their salary and other service conditions.
- Over the years this supportive staff is working for a meager remuneration without any social security benefit in the event of any misfortune or retirement.

Recommendations:

1. The University needs to evolve proper service conditions for the supportive staff in the Department with regard to the payment of salaries taking into consideration their length of service.
2. Also there is a need to evolve minimum social security protection such as PF and Pension to this staff.

P.G. Gymkhana

Observations:

- The presence of outside players other than the students of University is noted.
- This has to be strictly prevented and a care must be taken to allow only the students of the University.
- The maintenance of the grounds and the indoor stadium need a fresh look.

Recommendations:

1. The University needs to concentrate on improvement of sports facilities for the students by improving the existing infrastructure.
2. The present practice of entrusting the charge of the affairs of Gymkhana to a Faculty member should be discontinued. Further, the maintenance of the Gymkhana and the play grounds must be entrusted to the Sports Department with the deployment of adequate number of ground staff and the Supervisors.

IAS/IPS Training Center

Observations:

- In spite of the efforts made by the Director, the Center is found to be idle for entire year towards IAS/IPS coaching. However, with the help of University resource, it has conducted training for PDO aspirants.

Recommendations:

1. The IAS training center should put in extra efforts to register more students to reach the objectives of the center.
2. The Center may explore the possibility of starting coaching for other competitive exams.
3. The centre should keep the track record of the candidates trained.
4. The students feedback be obtained and be used for further improvement.

SC/ST Cell and Cat-I Cell

- We visited these cells on 28.08.2012.
- We met all the staff members working in both the Cells.
- They are all well informed and extend all the help the students who approach to them for getting the scholarship.
- The scholarships are regularly distributed.
- Both the Cells are functioning satisfactorily and the required additional staff be provided as early as possible.

Minority Cell

Observations:

- This Cell is looking after the disbursement of fellowship/ scholarship and training the students towards competitive examinations.
- The Cell has good class room and a computer lab, though the computer lab is not in use for last one year.

Recommendations:

1. The Cell should extend the training towards competitive exams.

Academic Staff College (ASC)

Observations:

- The College has done a good job within the available resources.
- Academic Staff College has conducted good number of refresher and orientation courses.
- The dynamism of the previous Director and the present Director Incharge has made the Academic Staff College quite visible.

Recommendations:

1. Should increase the number of resource persons from outside the State
2. Refresher/training programmes be conducted on the use of SPSS for research students on the campus.
3. The Computer facility of Academic Staff College may be extended to University students and programs during its idle period with nominal fees. In turn the University should take care of its maintenance.

College Development Council (CDC)

Observations:

- College Development Council is doing excellent work towards affiliation and maintaining of the information relating to various grants provided to the affiliated and constituent colleges.
- Presently, it is disseminating the information through circulars.
- The CDC has prepared a directory of all the affiliated and constituent colleges to make communication more effective.
- The Director and the office staff are well versed with information and functioning of the council.

Recommendations:

1. The CDC should provide an e-mail id to all colleges using University URL.
2. Dissemination of information be made through e-mails and SMS. The Director be provided a mobile phone for the same.
3. R & D guidelines prepared for constituent colleges be made applicable to all the Principal Investigators (PI) of various research projects in the affiliated colleges also.
4. CDC director/ subject expert (nominated by the Director) be involved in monitoring of all the fundings including research grants.
5. LIC report formats and other requirements be uploaded on website, the same be downloaded by the Principals.
6. An Orientation exercise for LIC members be arranged before their visit.
7. It is recommended to float its own website.

School of Correspondence Education (SCE)

Observations:

- The section is doing extremely well with limited staff.
- The School has developed its own study materials with the help of experts in the field.
- Registration of the candidate, issue of study material and examination hall ticket is done in a single shot on the first day itself.

Recommendations:

1. The registration and supply of study material be made online.
2. The School should give better publicity by evolving print and electronic media so as to reach even the remote area.



Akkamahadevi Hostel

Observations:

- The Committee appreciates the excellent efforts put forth by the warden and her staff in keeping the hostel clean and tidy inspite of the building being oldest among all the ladies hostels.
- The attitude of the warden is highly positive towards the improvement.
- The creation of meditation hall for students of all caste and community is highly appreciable.
- The warden has also initiated special training for inmates in the areas of soft skill, women problem, legal awareness, etc.

Recommendations:

1. Bath rooms need to be renovated and modernized.
2. A good quality comods must be provided in each wing for needy.
3. Flooring in the kitchen needs to be redone.
4. It is strongly recommended to put microwave oven in addition to heater in each wing.
5. Warden be authorized to undertake purchases, repairs upto ₹. 20,000/- from DOMOS fund without at prior permission.
6. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
7. With help of UEIGB, placement awareness programme be conducted in the hostel between 7-8 pm.

Rani Channamma Hostel

Observations:

- The Hostel is in a bad shape. Bathroom and toilets are not maintained properly.
- The water purifiers are not working. Overhead tanks assigned for drinking water are not being cleaned regularly (even once in three months).
- There are many places of water leakage.
- Heaters are not working and electrical fittings are also in bad shape.
- The documentation is poor with respect to stock, activities, etc.
- During the student's interaction, it was found that these problems have been prevailing for the last one year which is unfortunate.

- The DOMOS fund is laying unutilized which otherwise could have been used for urgent requirement such as buying cots, repairing water facility, heaters, electrical fitting, water purifiers etc.
- Though the warden is informed of the problems, no action has been taken for last six months by DSW.
- The student mess seems to be working fine and students are also happy with the taste.
- The menial staffs are not listening to the direction of warden which has lead to some anarchy in hostel.
- Warden reported the non co-operating culture of the menial staff.

Recommendations:

1. Bathrooms require renovation and modernization.
2. The Hostel requires immediate attention towards
 - a) Providing of cots and chairs b) Hot water facility c) safe drinking water facility d) renovation of bathroom including doors & e) proper electrical fitting.
3. It is strongly recommended to put microwave oven in addition to heater in each wing.
4. Warden be authorized to undertake purchases, repairs upto ₹. 20,000/- from DOMOS fund without prior permission.
5. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
6. With the help of UEIGB, placement awareness programme be conducted in all the hostel between 7-8 pm.

Saraswati Hostel

Observations:

- The general condition of the hostel is not appealing.
- The students have to come down stairs to collect the hot water.
- The mess contractor has occupied most of dining room and meeting room, however, the food quality is good.
- The office staff is not well informed about their duties.

Recommendations:

1. The approach road towards the hostel be repaired and asphalted.
2. The road lights be fixed.
3. A good quality comods must be provided in each wing for needy.

4. Warden be authorized to undertake purchases, repairs up to ₹. 20,000/- from DOMOS fund without prior permission.
5. With the help of UEIGB, placement awareness programme be conducted in the hostel between 7-8 pm.
6. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
7. Water heaters be arranged in first floor.
8. General heaters and ovens be made available in each wing.

Working Women's Hostel

Observations:

- The Committee express displeasure about warden not being present before the Committee and instead asked the clerk to take the charge of the affair.
- There seems to be a difference of opinion between the inmates and mess contractor.
- However, such problems have not been seen in other hostels, and therefore, it appears that warden and her staff involvement is not satisfactory.
- The Committee observed that the students have resorted to use heater in their room as there are no general heaters in the wings.
- Toilets were found to be in bad shape.

Recommendations:

1. Bathrooms and toilets require renovation and modernization.
2. The warden be made more responsible towards the hostel affairs.
3. With the help of UEIGB, placement awareness programme be conducted in all the hostel between 7-8 pm.
4. Good quality commodes may be provided in each wing for needy.
5. If the students are not happy with contractor, he may be replaced in consultation with students.
6. It is strongly recommended to put microwave oven in addition to heater in each wing.
7. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
8. Warden be authorized to undertake purchases, repairs upto ₹. 20,000/- from demos fund without at prior permission.

Bhima Hostel

Observations:

- It is extremely disappointing to sight such a dilapidated Hostel building in the University premises.
- The hostel as such is built for the purpose of economically poorer sections of the students with a facility to cook in the rooms.

Recommendations:

1. The noble intentions of the University in rendering assistance to poorer student community may be made fruitful by building a new hostel.
2. The existing structure may be demolished.
3. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.

New Boys Hostel (Malaprabha Hostel)

- Heard plethora of complaints from the inmates with regard to the existing facilities in the Hostel.
- The building is leaking during rainy season, there is no proper drinking water facilities and also for taking bath etc.
- There is no mess in the hostel.
- There is an urgent need to look into the problems of the students and redress their grievances at the earliest.
- The warden is doing his best to satisfy the students.
- Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.

New P. G. Hostel and Shalmala Hostel

Overall Observations

- Since the problems of both the hostels are similar, the Committee presents a single report.
- Both the buildings are not maintained properly.
- Besides, there are no security persons.
- No food is provided for the hostelites (of course, the students are also partly responsible for this).

Recommendations

1. University should attend to all repair works on priority basis as the hostel environment is not conducive for students to stay and study. A security person shall be posted to each of the hostels on 24 × 7 basis.
2. Compound is required for Shalmala hostel as pigs enter into the hostel and move freely.
3. Solar power can be explored for both the hostels for lighting and water heating purposes.
4. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
5. University authorities should explore the possibility of providing atleast break-fast and dinner in the hostels (of course, the students should also realize their responsibility in this regard).

Nijalingappa Hostel

Observations:

- The hostel is kept in neat condition inspite of the building being quite old.
- The hostel has been found with renovated electrical wiring.
- 1000 litre capacity water purifier has been installed to take care of perennial drinking water problem.
- The toilets and bathrooms are found to be clean, though, they require renovation and modernization.
- Students have good recreation facility and in general happy with the quality of maintenance of overall hostel facilities.
- As there is no mess contractor appointed sofar, the Warden has arranged a stop gap mess facility for the benefit of students in consultation with students and the students are happy with the quality and quantity of food.
- The Warden has responded to the needs of physically challenged inmates and taken good care to provide amicable atmosphere for them.
- In some rooms students were found to use electrical extension boards which is dangerous.

Recommendations:

1. Bathrooms require renovation and modernization.
2. It is strongly recommended to put microwave oven in addition to heater in each wing.
3. Warden be authorized to undertake purchases, repairs upto ₹. 20,000/- from demos fund with at prior permission.
4. Usage of laptops have become essential part in student academic activities. Hence a provision be made for a low tension (0.5 amp) electrical outlet for charging laptops in each room with a proper trip off, if students try to misuse the same.
5. One more floor be added to the existing structure to accommodate more students.
6. Hostel requires a compound wall to maintain the gardens and stop pig manace.
7. Drinking over head tank should be cleaned at least twice a month.



RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee acknowledges and places on record the level of increased confidence and self trust in the academic environment of the University after visiting the Departments, Colleges, Institutions, Peethas, Offices and Hostels. The Committee with the general consensus places on record the macro level observations in the context of entire University and make the following recommendations:

I Teaching - Requirements

1. The University at the earliest must make efforts to fill the current vacancies in various Faculties.
2. In each Department there must be only one Post-Graduation Course; otherwise unforeseen internal squabbles might arise, which ultimately spoil the entire academic atmosphere in the Department.
3. The Departments which have not secured the admissions of minimum 10 students for three consecutive three academic years, such departments may be merged with the Departments of Cognate subjects.
4. A Committee consisting of academics may be appointed to consider the modalities of merging of P.G. Departments and Cognate Departments.
5. An Expert Committee consisting of Academics may be constituted to survey the available space and infrastructure in various departments and present a master plan of optimum utilization of the space and infrastructure.
6. All the Departments and the Institutions in the University should draw a complete and calendar of annual events pertaining to Classes, Special Lectures, Seminars, Conferences and co-curricular activities at the beginning of the academic year and intimate in advance to the University, Students, Faculty, Accounts and other primary setups in the University. And should strictly adhere to the Schedule as drawn during the academic year.

7. The students of the University must basically be familiar with the mother land's physical and cultural heritage. Knowledge of Karnataka Hand Book is mandatory and for this purpose the same should be made a part of curriculum for U.G. course.
8. Knowledge of two language formula including Kannada is essential for all Faculties including students with more emphasis in case of Arts Faculty.

II Academic Research

9. It is pertinent to mention the fact that the Science Faculty in the University certainly made a mark in carrying potential quality of research work, followed by the Social Sciences Faculty and finally the Arts Faculty. Precisely it is this area where the University must lay an emphasis in motivating the Arts Faculty to involve more in innovative research.
10. The Research Guides must exercise due care and diligence in assigning/approving of the Ph.D. topics to the Research Students with due consideration to challenging and unexplored issues, rural etc, and repetition of the same topics should be avoided.
11. The grant of any Departmental Research Project must be on the basis of a consideration of remaining service of faculty member before the attainment of the age of Superannuation and the corresponding duration of the research project.
12. The Scholarships/Fellowships for the research students be released in time and disbursed.

III Infrastructure Facility

13. Part of the enhanced fees collected in the academic year may be spent for the Department towards the improvement of existing class room and teaching facilities.

IV Supporting Services

14. The Right to Services Act, 2011 (સકાલ) should be made applicable to the University Services with immediate effect. An effort in this direction must be initiated through legislative lobbying.
15. Proper deployment of non-teaching staff in appropriate sections conversant to his/her knowledge, qualification and experience. Further the non-teaching staff needs a periodical orientation in respect of the service matters, University Statutes and Regulations etc.

V Miscellaneous

16. The University must be discreet in accepting the endowment sponsorship in the name of persons. Such endowments in the name of the living or non-living persons must be on certain objective criteria i.e. a consideration of the merit, scholarship and reputation etc., of such persons. In this regard, the University should frame appropriate guidelines in such endowments must be approved by the Syndicate.
17. The University must strictly prohibit the exhibition of the photos of religious god, goddess and other portraits in the Offices, Departments etc. However, such exhibition is limited to only to the portraits which are approved by the Central and State Government. Further, display of the portraits of any renowned personalities connected with the departments etc. must be done only with the approval of the Syndicate.
