Item No.1: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Commission held on March 21, 1977.

Minutes of the 189th meeting of the Commission held on March 21, 1977 were confirmed, subject to the followir

Item 2(a) may read as follows:

"The Commission approved the action taken on items listed in Appendix 1\*.

Arising out of this item, the Commission desired that the Colleges already approved for assistance under Rs.five lakh scheme may be advised to send their proposals for faculty improvement programmes and for providing facilities for remedial courses. This may also be brought to the attention of the colleges which have not yet approached the Commission for assistance under this scheme."

- <u>Item No.2</u>: a) To approve the action taken on certain matters.
  - b) To receive the items of information.
  - c) To approve the statement of proposals which could not be accepted by the Commission.

(a) The Commission approved the action taken on items listed in Appendix 1\*.

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Arising but of Items 2(a)(6) & (9), it was agreed that (i) the space science programmes being run at the Gujarat University, Ahmedabad; Kerala University, Trivandrum and Panjabi University, Patiala, may be reviewed before the beginning of the next academic session and (ii) the universities be advised that the Vice-Chancellor's house now to be constructed should normally be in accordance with the norms suggested by the Commission.

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### To approve the statement of grants released after the last meeting of the Commission Item No.3: held on March 21, 1977.

The Commission approved the grants released after the last meeting of the Commission held on March 21, 1977 (Appendix II\*).

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To receive the statement of expenditure Item No.4: incurred by the University Grants Commission during 1976-77 up to March 31, 1977.

This was noted. em No.5: To receive a statement indicating the progress Item No.5: of issue of utilisation certificates during the period ending March 31, 1977.

Item No.6: To consider the report of the Committee appointed to work out the details for providing facilities for studies in Marine Sciences in Postgraduate Centre, Goa.

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The Commission generally accepted the report of the Committee appointed to work out the details for providin facilities for studies in marine sciences at the Postgraduate Centre, Goa, subject to the following:

(a) The Centre should function on an All-India basis and at least 50 per cent of the seats should be reserved for candidates coming from colleges other than those located in the Jhion Territory of Goa;

(b) 20 per cent of the seats would be reserved for scheduled caste and scheduled tribe students; and

(c) Studentship of the value of Rs.250 p.m. may be given for a period of 12 months to all students in the third year of the course, who have secured at least 55% marks in the annual examination at the end of second year.

A provision of N.6,000 per annum may be made for payment of honorarium to the scientific staff of the National Institute of Oceanography, Goa, who may be requested to participate in the teaching programme.

<u>Item No.7</u>: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the U.G.C. to assess the V Plan requirements of the Institute of Medical Sciences of Banaras Hindu University

The Commission considered the report of the V Plan Visiting Committee to the Institute of Medical Sciences Banaras Hindu University and generally accepted the recommendations of the Committee. The Commission desire that the recommendations concerning the expansion of the hospital and taking over of Kashi Kashtha Seva Sang Hospital may be considered later.

The University may be advised that, keeping in view the available number of hospital beds, it should limit its admission to the MBBS course to 54 students including 4 seats reserved for the Government of India nominees of foreign students and the normal reservations for scheduled caste and scheduled tribe candidates. The Commission did not favour reservation of four seats for students who passed the Pre-medical test from Banaras Hindu University and desired that this should be discontinued forthwith.

The Commission made the following further observations:

1. The University should give the highest priority to the consolidation of existing Departments at the Institute of Medical Sciences.

2. Emphasis should be given to rural hearth programme at the undergraduate level and the University be advised to prepare a suitable programme and send it to the Commission for consideration.

3. Admissions to the postgraduate courses should be made in accordance with the norms laid down by the Medical Council of India and after taking into account the fact that the maximum bed strength available in the hospital will not exceed 550.

4. The question of upgrading the different Sections/ Centres in the Departments of the Institute of Medical Sciences into full-fledged Departments may be considered on the merits of each case. 5. The University may take urgent steps to make regular appointments against the permanent vacant posts of Professors, Readers and Lecturers.

It was agreed to provide assistance to the Banaras Hindu University for the Institute of Medical Sciences during the V Plan period as indicated in Appendix III.

The Commission also agreed to provide assistance for the construction of faculty housing upto 50 per cent of the faculty positions sanctioned during the V Plan period.

Item No.8: To consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee for the CAS in the Humanities & Social Sciences on the report of the Committee set up by the Commission to evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education at M.S. University of Baroda.

University aroda The Commission agreed that the Department of Education/may continue as a Centre of Advanced Study in Education for the present. Its working may be reviewed towards the end of the current plan period.

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Item No.9: To consider the report of the Committee which examined the proposal of the Panjab University for participation of its Department of Sociology in the UGC's scheme of CAS/DSA in the Humanities and Social Sciences.

The Commission agreed to invite the Sociology Department of the Panjab University to participate in the scheme of Special Assistance to Uni ersity Departments and approved support to the Department as given in Appendix IV.

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In this connection, the Commission agreed that the assistance to the Departments which are brought within the scheme of Departments of Special Assistance during the current plan period may be provided till the end of the VI Plan on the condition that the State Government would agree to take over the recurring liability at the end of 1983-84.

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Item No.10: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee which examined the proposal of the History Department (Modern India) of the Calcutta University for participation in the programme of Centre of Advanced Stud Departments of Special Assistance in the Humanities & Social Sciences.

The Commission agreed to invite the Department of History (Modern India) of the Calcutta University to participate in the scheme of Special Assistance to University Departments and approved support to the Department as given in Appendix-V.

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In this connection, the Commission made the following observations:

1. Hodern Indian History may not be limited to British History alone. The Department may decide on its the scope of the period.

2. The study of Modern Indian History may not be limited to Eastern Region/alone. Other regions in the country relevant to the needs of this field may also be taken in for study and research.

Item No.11: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee which examined the proposal of the Department of Economics of the Punjabi Universit, Patiala for participation in the programme of Centres of Advanced Study/ Department of Special Assistance in the Humanities & Social Sciences.

Consideration of this item was deferred. The University may be requested to fill in the acant posit: in the Department at an earl date and the matter may be placed before the Commission as soon as the department has the full approved strength.

Item No.12: To consider the report of the Committee set up by the UGC to examine the question of strengthenin the professional staff of the Ratan Tata Library of the Delhi Schoo of Economics, Delhi University, Delhi.

The Commission considered the report of the Committee appointed by it to examine the question of strengthening the professional staff of the Ratan Tata Library of the Delhi School of Economics, Delhi University, and agreed to provide one Deputy Librarian (Ns.1100-1600) and four Professional Assistants to the University.

In this connection, the Commission desired that the question of revision of scales of pay of the Deputy Librarian and the Assistant Librarian in the light of the recommendations of the Sen Committee may be brought up before the Commission again.

Item No.13: To consider the report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of the Aligarh Muslim University for staff for the Library.

The Commission desired that the matter may be brought up before it after the information required by the Committee is made available by the Aligarh Muslim University and considered by it.

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Item No.14: To consider the minutes of the meeting of the JGC Implementation Committee on Examination Reforms held on 2nd March, 1977.

The Commission agreed that the general philosophy of examination reforms and implications for policy may be discussed at a subsequent meeting. In the meantime, action may be taken in the light of the recommendations of the Implementation Committee on Examination Reforms.

Item No.15: To consider the Recommendations of the Conference of Coordinators of COHSSIP Colleges held at St.Xaviers College, Bombay in January, 1977. (Khandala Camp).

The Commission accepted the recommendations made at the Conference of Coordinators of COHSSIP Colleges held at St.Xaviers College, Bombay in January, 1977 as given in Appendix VI.

Item No.16: To consider the recommendations of the Directors of Summer Schools in Physics.

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The Commission agreed that in the summer institutes being supported by the Commission, the participants(other than the faculty members) be supplied books worth upto Rs.100 each, subject to a ceilin of Rs.5,000 per Institut

The Commission also accepted the following recomment tions made by the Directors of the Summer Institutes in Physics:

- 1. The Director of the School concerned may be informed about the organisation of the Summer Institute by October, each year so that the pre-Institute meeting of the Directors may be held sometime in January next year and the circulars to colleges are issued in the same month.
- 2. A date by which the applications are to be received from the prospective participants may be indicated in the application form.

In this connection, the Commission desired that a calendar of dates fixed for receipt of applications for different JGC awards and for Institutes to be organised with UGC support may be prepared and circulated to all the universities.

Item No.17: To consider the question of relaxation of marks by 5% for Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes candidates for the purpose of eligibili for the award of research Scholarships/ Fellowships in the Universities.

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The Commission was not in favour of relaxation of marks by 5 per cent for scheduled caste and scheduled tribe candidates for the purpose of eligibility for award ( research scholarships/fellowships in the universities and noted that this small margin would in are case be covered under the new grading system.

In this connection, the Commission reiterated its earlier decision that it was not in favour of relaxation of general eligibility condition in respect of scheduled caste and scheduled tribe candidates for award of fellowships/scholarships and that specific cases which merit special consideration for relaxation should however be considered by the Commission. Item No.18: To consider the proposal of the University of Delhi for assistance for the construction of a teachers hostel with about 100 rooms for the implementation of a teachers fellowship Scheme.

The Commission accepted in principle the proposal of the Universit of Delhi for assistance for the construction of a hostel for teachers under the faculty improvement programme.

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I was further noted that in the proposed hostel to be set up at the Delhi University, the accommodation will primarily be used for teacher fellows coming from outside Delhi.

It was also agreed that similar proposals as and when received from the universities which attract a large number of outside teacher fellows may be considered on merit.

Item No.19: To consider the proposal of the University of Madras, Madras for granting autonomous status to the P.G. Centre at Coimbatore & Triuchirapally.

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The Commission agreed to provide assistance to the Madras University for the appointment of two Assistant Rejistrars for the Postgraduate Centres at Commatore and Tiruchirapally. Assistance for this would be provided for the period ending 31st March, 1981 on the condition that the State Government would take over the recurring expenditure thereafter. The University may be informed that the grant of autonomy to the Postgraduate Centres does not necessarily mean that these two Centres would automatically be raised to the status of a University.

Item No.20: To consider the proposal of Allahabad University for approval of grants recommended by the V Plan Visiting Committee under second & third priorities.

The Commission agreed in principle to the proposal of the University for providing posts recommended by the Visiting Committee under second and third priorities. The Commission, however, desired that the approval of these posts may be conveyed after the non-plan posts lying vacant are filled in by the University. With regard to the University's proposal for approval of grant recommended by the Visiting Committee under third priority for building, it was agreed that this may be crought up before the Commission after the University has intimated the specific steps taken by it on all the recommendations/observations made by the Visiting Committee.

Item No.21: To consider further the revised proposals of the Bangalore University for the construction of Science Blocks at the New Campus.

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The Commission considered the revised proposal of the Ban alore University for the construction of science blocks at the new campus and desired that the University be advised to undertake construction during the V Plan of Botany and Zoology blocks at an estimated cost of  $\mathbb{R}$ .44.19 lakhs and the Commission may meet 50 per cent of the actual approved expenditure subject to a maximum of  $\mathbb{R}$ .16.90 lakhs which may be re-appropriated from the provision made for different buildings made under first and third priorities, subject to the conditithat the decision of the Commission would be formally communicated to the University after it has intimated the specific action taken by it on the various recommendation observations made in the report of the Visiting Committee as accepted by the Commission.

In this connection, the Coumission agreed that while considering the proposals from the universities in the second and third priorities for buildings, no re-appropriation be made from the funds agreed to on the recommendations of the Visiting Committee for acquiring books, journals and equipment.

<u>Item No.22</u>: To consider the proposal of the Kanpur University for assistance for es ablishment of School of Life Sciences.

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The Commission accepted the proposal of the Kanpur University for establishment of the School of Life Sciences during the V Plan period and approved assistance for the purpose on the usual basis as per details given in Appendix VII.

It was noted that the assistance being approved for staff quarters and hostels will be treated as a central facility and the requirements of the School of Life Sciences for books and journals would be met out of a grant of No.10 lakhs already agreed to for the Central Library.

<u>Item No.23</u>: To consider the comments of the Delhi University on the observations made by the V Plan Visitin; Committee in its report on the South Delhi Campus.

The Commission considered the comments of the Universit of Delhi on the observations made by the V Plan Visiting Committee in its report on the South Delhi Compus and agreed that the hiversity may institute postgraduate courses in commerce, political science, sanskrit, mathematics, history, philosophy and business economics at the South Delhi campus and agreed to provide assistance as indicated in Appendix VIII.

The Commission desired that the question of instituting B.A.(Hons.) and M.A. courses in Russian at the South Delhi Campus may be further discussed in the light of the facilities already being provided for such courses by the Jawaharlal Nehru University.

It was further agreed that the question of institutin M.Phil. courses in the South Delhi Campus may be considered after the guidelines have been prepared by the Commission for instituting such courses in the different Departments of the Universities.

The Commission noted that the cost of land to be acquired for the South Delhi Campus is now estimated to be about No.27 lakhs as against the original estimate of No.45 lakhs. The Commission desired that the University be advised to send its revised proposal for construction of building; purchase of books and equipment keeping in view that a sum of No.100 lakhs may be available for the development of the South Delhi Campus during the current Plan period.

Item No.24: To consider the proposal of the Kashi Vidyapith for creation of Professors posts in the Departments of Hindi and Sanskrit.

The Commission agreed to provide one post of Professor in Sanskrit at Kashi Vidyapith as part of the V Plan development proposals of the University. The Commission however could not agree to the proposal of the University for providing an additional post of Professor in Hindi.

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#### Item No.25: To consider the proposal of Himachal Pradesh University, Simla for assistance for buildings within the ceiling of Rs.100 lakhs fixed for the University for the 5th Plan period.

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The Commission agreed to the proposal of the Himachal Pradesh University for assistance for addition buildings and agreed to provide as its share a sum not exceeding N.13 lakhs by re-appropriation (Animal House Rs.2.5 l khs; Furniture - Rs.3 lakhs; Central Library -Rs.7.5 lakhs) from the funds under different priorities as recommended by the Visiting Committee for buildings and furniture for construction of the Central Library and acquiring gas plant.

It was noted that the formal approval may be convey only after the University has communicated the specific steps taken by it on the recommendations made by the V Plan Visiting Committee.

Item No.26: To consider the proposal from Bihar Universito to continue its Department of Russian Langua as an independent unit of the University.

The Commission agreed to the proposal of the Bihar University to continue the Department of Russian Languag as an independent unit provided that the facilities for the language laboratory agreed to by the Commission for this unit would also be made available to other language department.

Item No.27: To consider the proposal of Centre of Advance Study in Zoology, University of Delhi regarding change in specialisation of the teaching posts sanctioned during V Plan.

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The Commission agreed that three Professorships (two sanctioned under the Centres of Advanced Study and one under the V Plan) may have the specialisation of Entomology/Cell Biology/Cytogenetics/Biological Chemistry, subject to the condition that not more than one Professor would be appointed in each of the specialis tions. The Commission also agreed that the post of Reader may be treated as open.

#### Item No.28: To consider the proposal of Delhi University regarding the field of specialisation of the post of Professor in Mathematical Statistics sanctioned during the V Plan.

The Commission considered the proposal of the Delhi University regarding the field of specialisation of the post of Professor in the Department of Mathematical Statistics sanctioned during the V Plan and agreed that the specialisation of the post may be Theoretical Statistics (Multi-variate Analysis, Statistical Inference etc.).

Item No.29: To consider the proposal of Lucknow University for change of specialisation for some posts approved by the Commission during the V Plan period.

The Commission considered the proposal of the Lucknow University for change of specialisation of some of the posts sanctioned during the V Plan and agreed that the specialisation of the approved posts may be as follows:

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- 1. One post of Professor in Mathematics may be treated as open.
- 2. One post of Professor and one Reader in Physics may be in the field of solid state physics (experimental).
- 3. One post of Professor and one Reader in Physics may be in the field of theoretical Physics.

With regard to the post of Professor in Anthropology, it was noted that the Commission had recommend d this as an open post and therefore it is for the University to decide as to the specialisation with which it would like to fill the post.

It was also noted that the proposal of the University for change of the specialisation of the posts in the Department of Chemistry would be brought up before the Commission after the necessary information, already asked for, from the University has been supplied. Item No.30: To consider a proposal from Patna University regarding the changes effected in the areas of specialisation of certain additional posts sanctioned to the Department of Botany of the University on the basis of Fifth Plan Visiting Committee's recommendations.

The Commission desired that the proposal of the University may be referred to the Committee which is shortly visiting the University to consider the proposal of the Department of Botany, Patna University, to participate in the programme of Special Assistance to University Departments.

In this connection, the Commission desired that the University be informed that the specialisation revised by it may not be acted upon till a final decision of the Commission is available.

<u>Item No.31</u>: To consider the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for creation of post of Lecturer in Sinhalese during the V Plan peri

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for providing a post of Lecturer in Sinhalese as part of V Plan development proposals of the University.

<u>Item No.32</u>: To consider the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for assistance for establishing a Centre for Life Sciences.

The Commission considered the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for establishing a C stre of Life Sciences and desired that the University e advised to set up the Centre within the assistance recommended by the Visiting Committee under first and second priorities for the purpose, as given in Appendix IX.

Item No.33: To consider further proposal of Saurashtra University for development of its Rajkot Campus during V Plan.

Consideration of this item was deferred to the next meeting of the Commission.

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#### Item No.34: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the Fifth Plan development proposals of Visva-Dharati University, Santiniketan.

The Commission considered the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the Commission to examine the V Plan development proposals of Visva Bharati and generally accepted the recommendations of the Committee. The Commission made the following observations in this regard:

1. The additional six posts of teachers for the higher secondary school may be provided in Patha Bhawan.

2. The University may keep in view the recommendations of the Masud Committee while restructuring its undergraduate courses.

3. The Visva-Bharati may not start at this stage teaching of all the Indian languages. It is advisable to confine its language programme to 2 or 3 Indian languages other than Bengali and Hindi, e.g. Marathi, Assamese and Tamil. The Hindi programme may be strengthened, and one post of Lecturer may be provided for the purpose.

4. To develop the studies on the history, culture and philosophy of China, the Cheena Bhawan may inter-act more closely with the Department of History and Philosophy.

5. The Visva Bharati may undertake popularisation of science in rural areas as part of its extension programmes.

The Commission agreed that assistance may be provided to the University as given in Appendix X.

It was noted that the requirements of the Kala Bhawana and Sangeet Bhawana, which have not so far been assessed, would be brought up before the Commission later.

<u>Item No.35</u>: To note the date and place for the nex' meeting of the Commission.

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It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held in New Delhi on 16th May, 1977.

## Item No.36: To consider the question of providing recurring assistance to computer centres in the universities.

The Commission agreed that assistance for the development of the computer centres in the universities sanctioned in the IV Plan may be on the same basis as in the case of the computers set up during the V Plan. While determining this assistance, it was noted, the positions created during the IV Plan period in different Centres would be taken into account for determining the maintenance grant payable for the computer centres.

Item No.37: To consider further the question of sponsor delegations from the universities to the selected International Conferences/Seminars. Workshops.

Consideration of this item was deferred for the next meeting.

### Appendix VI to Item No15

Recommendations of the COHSSIP Conference (January 1977).

(1) COHSSIP is meant for all the students and should be integrated into the normal orogramme of studies in the college. It is possible that some parts of the COHSSIP though kept open to all, may not be taken up by all the students equally well. But the college should not disqualify students on its own by restricting the programme to a few. Similarly in the beginning it may be necessary for a time to have the COHSSIP separated from other programmes in the college for the sake of spcial care and better organisation. But sooner rather than later the COHSSIP must improve and vivify the normal approach to teaching so that improved methods of teaching-learningassessment become the normal process in the college.

(ii) Teachers in the COHSCIP colleges can and should adopt better methods of assessment. A combination of essay type and objective tests should be used to meet the requirement of specific situations. The COHSSIP colleges should be encouraged to expose teachers to reorientation courses on methods of testing and evaluation.

(iii) No financial incentives should be given to teachers or students doing COHSSIP work. However, special consideration may be given to well-thought out programmes for faculty development proposed by COHSSIP colleges to encourage teachers doing excellent COHSSIP work.

(iv) Amounts sanctioned for non-recurring items and not spent during one academic year may be carried forward to the next academic year. Normally, books should be purchased as soon as possible, but in case of some special difficulty, grants for books may be carried over to the next year. Re-adjustments between different heads of budget in an approved programme are possible to the extent of 10 per cent of the total grant for the year. However, major adjustments in a plan already accepted may be sent to the UGC as a fr sh revised proposal.

(v) Teaching assistants paid under the COHSSIP should preferably be postgraduate or research students. If a good case can be made out by a college for using first degree holders as teaching assistants, the UGC may agree, but normally this category of assistants should be considered least acceptable.

(Vi) Persons with qualifications such as a B.A. Pass or B.Com. who are assigned clerical or computational work connected with COHSSIP teaching should be considered under the budget provisions for "Office assistant" and not "teaching assistant". (vii) Provision may be made for one or two - part-time office assistants/typists but full-time office staff may not be employed under the programme.

(viii) Costly equipments whose price consumes a major part of the budget should not be provided under COHSSIP. Xerox machines may not be permitted.

(ix) Regular annual or semi-annual COHSSIP conferences or orientation programmes for smaller groups (regions, zones etc.) should be sponsored by the UGC through COHSSIP colleges.

(x) A quarterly COHSSIP Newsletter for sharing news and views may be tarted. Professor Jayakar of Ramanarain Ruia College, Bombay may be requested to undertake this project.

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(xi) Autonomy is necessary in fully implementing the new methods of teaching and evaluation under COHSSIP and every COHSSIP collegé should work towards this.

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(xii) The initial period for the COHSSIP will continue to be three years for the present.

(xiii) A set of guidelines for study tours under COHSSIP should be worked out. In the meantime, this activity may not be given high priority.

Lal and offered its sincere condolences. The members of the Commission observed a minute's silence in his memory and resolved to convey its sense of sorrow to the members of the bereaved family.

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The Chairman mentioned that a copy of the UGC Review Committee Report has been received and a request has been made to the Ministry of Education & Social Welfare for additional copies of the Report. As soon as these are received, the Report would be circulated to the members.

To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Item No.1: Commission held on February 21, 1977.

Minutes of the 188th meeting of the Commission held on February 21, 1977 were confirmed.

(a) To approve the action taken on certain matters Item No.2 (b) To receive the items of information. (c) To approve the statement of proposals which could not be accepted by the Commission.

The Commission approved the action taken on items (a) listed in Appendix 1\*.

Arising out of this item, the Commission desired that the colleges already approved for assistance under  $\mathbb{R}_{.5}$  lakh scheme may be advised to send their proposals for facilty improvement programmes, with special emphasis on providing facilities for remedial courses. This may also be brought to the attention of the colleges which have not yet approache the Commission for assistance under this scheme.

(b) This was noted.

This was noted. (c)

To approve the statement of grants released after Item No.3: the last meeting of the Commission held on February 21, 1977.

The Commission approved the grants released after the 1 meeting of the Commission held on February 21, 1977(Appendix \* Not enclosed.

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This was noted.

The Secretary reported the present position of the grants released and sanctioned to the universities and colleges during 1976-77.

He further reported that the Government of India had, subject to the vote of the Parliament, agreed to the following provision for 1977-78:

> Plan ... Rs.4250 lakhs (excluding ensineering & technolog <u>Rs. 547</u> lakhs (for engineering & technology) Total: <u>Rs.4797</u> lakhs

Non-plan... No.3318.50 lakhs.

It was further noted that the detailed budget estimates would be prepared keepin; the above in view and placed before a sub-committee and then brought up before the Commission.

<u>Item No.5</u>: To receive the proceedings of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to consider a proposal from the Ministry of Education & Social Welfare for setting up Centre of Advanced Study and Research at N.C.E.R.T. New Dolhi.

The Commission agreed to recommend to the Ministry of Education & Social Welfare that the NCERT may set up a Centre of Advanced Study and Research at the Delhi campus of the National Institute of Education for the institution of programmes of studies at the M.Phil. level leading to Associateship of the Centre and the programme at Ph.D. level leading to fellowship of the Centre.

Item No. 6: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Standing Advisory Committee on Area Studies held on February 4, 1977.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Standing Advisory Committee on Area Studies.

Item No.7: To receive the recommendations of the Engineering Panel at its meeting held on October 19, 1976.

The Commission considered the recommendations of the Engineering Panel and observed as follows:

a. The essential qualifications recommended for recruitment of teachers in engineering and technology by the Panel be referred to the Committee which has been appointed to recommend the qualifications for the posts of Lecturers, Readers and Professors in engineering and technology.

b. The scope of the UGC scheme of National Associateship may be widened to cover the training in industry of inservice teachers in engineering and technology, generally below the age of 35 years which may be relaxed on the merit of the case. The normal period of training in industry of 3 months at a time under the scheme may be extended upto 6 months so as to enable the teachers in Engineering/Technology, to gain adequate industrial training in planning, production and other R & D activities. The period of stay for 3 months at a time in respect of teachers in other disciplines may also be similarly raised if necessary, to enable them to avail of the special facilities in other universities/institutions/research organisations etc. Besides actual travel cost (once each way), the Commission will provide an allowance of Ns. 500/-p.m. to the selected National Associate for a period of 6 months to enable him to acquire the requisite training in industry. The period of 6 months industrial training may be further extended by another 6 months provided the allowance of Ns. 500/-p.m. for the extended period agreed to be met by the Industry where the teacher may be attached.

The Commission could not accept the recommendation of the Panel that an undertaking be obtained from fellows to the effect that they will not leave the fellowship the middle of the tenure.

With regard to the increase in the value of the fellow ship and also provision of additional amount to the fellows by the institutions themselves, the Commission desired that the position prevailing in the IITs and the Regional Engineer; Colleges may be obtained and the matter brought up again befor the Commission.

Item No. 8:

To consider further the proposal of the Centre of Advanced Study in Geology, Panjab Universit Chandigarh for utilisation of grants during th Fifth Plan period.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the CAS in Geology, Panjab University and agreed to provide the grants as given in Appendix III.

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Item No. 9: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee by the University Grants Commission to examine the Fifth Plan development proposals of North Eastern Hill University, Shillong.

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The Commission generally accepted the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by it to examine the Fifth Plan proposals of the North Eastern Hill University, Shillong. In this connection, the Commission made the following observations:

(a) The total allocation of the University for the Fifth Plan may be raised from  $\Re$ . 6 crores to  $\Re$ . 6.5 crores and the University may be advised to send proposals in respect of the additional allocation of  $\Re$ . 50 lakhs.

(b) In formulating proposals within the additional allocation of Rs. 50 lakhs, special stress may be laid on the Centre for Rural Development.

(c) It was noted that the orientation for the development of Physics was mainly towards theoretical side. It would be desirable, as in the case of other Departments of the University to give experimental bias to Physics by including areas such as ionospheric and atmospheric studies, utilisation of solar energy, etc.

(d) The Instrumentation Centre should be set up and managed in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the Commission.

(e) In the building construction programme to be undertaken by the University in the new campus, top priority should be given to residential accommodation for teachers and student hostels.

(f) In designing the new campus, the University should make provision for a Central Library and also for modest libraries in the Schools.

(g) The main aim of the College Development Council should be to promote and oversee the academic development of the colleges.

(h) The University should take urgent steps to fill in the senior positions of administrative staff e.g. Registrar, Finance Officer and Library staff.

(i) It is important for a University located in a predominantly tribal area to ensure that the faculty has a genuinely helpful attitude towards students of the weaker sections of the society.

The Commission agreed to provide assistance to the University as given in Appendix IV.

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Item No. 10: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the University Grant Commission to examine the proposal of the Department of Economics of the Andhra University for participation in the Program of Centres of Advanced Study/Departments of Special Assistance in the Humanities and Social Sciences.

The Commission agreed to invite the Department of Economics of Andhra University for participation in the Programme of Special Assistance to University Departments a agreed in principle to provide assistance as given in Appendix V on the condition that the University will effect the amalgamation of the Department of Economics and the Department of Applied Economics. The Commission's assistant may be indicated and provided as soon as the two Department are merged.

Item No. 11: To consider the report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of the Department of Linguistics of Osmania University for participation in the Programmes of Centres of Advanced Study/Department of Special Assistance in the Humanities & Social Science

The Commission agreed to invite the Department of Linguistics, Osmania University for participation in the Programme of Special Assistance to University Departments and to provide assistance as given in Appendix VI. The question of providing support for appointment of Phoneticial Senior Research Assistant and Junior Research Assistant. may be decided after getting relevant information from the University.

Item No. 12:

To consider the report of the Visiting Committee which examined the proposal of the Psychology Department of the University of Allahabad for participation in the Programme of CAS/DSA in the Humanities and Social Sciences.

The Commission agreed to invite the Psychology Department, University of Allahabad for participation in the Programme of Special Assistance to University Departments and to provide assistance as given in <u>Appendix VII</u>.

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Arising out of this, the Commission agreed that the Department of Ancient History and Archaeology, Allahabad University, may be assisted under the Programme of Special Assistance. The support provided to the Department, it was noted, had been approved by the Commission under Item 2(a)(14).

Item No. 13: To consider the report of the Committee which examined the proposal of the Calcutta University for participation of its Department of Economics in the University Grants Commission programme of: Centres of Advanced Study/Department of Special Assistance in the Humanities and Social Sciences.

Consideration of this item was postponed. It was agreed that matter will be brought up again before the Commission after obtaining additional information as desired by the Commission.

Item No. 14:

To consider the report of the Committee set up by the University Grants Commission to consider the proposal of the Bombay University for setting up an inter-disciplinary centres for research and training in Social Development

The Commission desired that the University of Bombay may be advised to send a revised proposal in the light of the comments of the members of the Visiting Committee.

Item No. 15:

To consider a reference from the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare regarding revision of Bond obtained from officials deputed for training etc., abroad.

It was agreed that the question of prescribing a bond for teachers deputed for training abroad as suggested by the Public Accounts Committee may be referred to a Committee after obtaining the relevant information from the universities.

Item No. 16:

To consider the question of rationalising the scheme of Research Associateships in the universities.

It was agreed that the question of rationalisation of the scheme of research associates in the universities may be referred to a Committee.

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Item No. 17: To consider the proposal of the Delhi University for institution of M.A. and Diploma Course in Tamil.

#### This was withdrawn.

Item No. 18: To consider a reference from the Vice-Chancellor, University of Bombay regarding follow up action consequent upon the 42nd amendment of the constitution placing education in the concurrent list.

Consideration of this item was deferred.

Item No. 19: To consider the proposal of Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages, Hyderabad for the establishment of a Regional Centre in the Northern Region during Fifth Plan period.

The Commission accepted, in principle, the proposal of the Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages, Hyderabad, for the establishment of a Regional Centre in the North and desired that the C.I.E.F.L. may be advised to explore the possibility of locating the centre in the north region at a place other than Delhi.

Item No. 20: To consider the proposal of the University of Udaipur for the institution of corresponder. courses.

The Commission agreed that the University of Udaipu may institute correspondence course for the B.A. degree and assistance may be provided to the University for the purpose according to the norms laid down by the Commission subject to the usual terms and conditions. The proposal of the University for the institution of correspondence courses for B.Ed. may be considered in consultation with NCERT after obtaining information from the University of Rajasthan in this regard.

To consider a proposal of the University <u>Item No. 21:</u> of Kerala, for the establishment of a

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Music Department during the Fifth Plan period.

The Commission accepted, in principle, the proposal of the Kerala University for the establishment of a Music Department during the V Plan and agreed to provide assistance to the University on the usual sharing basis.

The Commission desired that before conveying the approval, the University be requested to indicate the specific action taken by it on the various recommendations made by the V Plan Visiting Committee in its report accepted by the Commission.

Item No. 22: To consider the proposal of Gorakhpur University for change of specialisation for the post of Professor approved in the Department of Chemistry during the Fifth Plan. \_ \_ \_ \_ \_ \_

The Commission accepted the proposal of Gorakhpur University for keeping the post of Professor approved in the Chemistry Department "open".

Item No. 23: To consider further the proposal of Bangalore University for the conversion of a post of a Reader in the Department of Political Science into two Lecturerships.

The Commission could not agree to the conversion of one post of Reader with two posts of Lecturers in Political Science at Bangalore University but agreed in principle that an additional post of a Lecturer in Political Science be provided to the University for the Department of Political Science. · · .

The Commission desired that before conveying the approval, the University be requested to indicate the specific action taken by it on the various recommendations made by the V Plan Visiting Committee in its report accepted by the Commission.

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Item No. 24: To consider the proposals of the Poona University for the change of specialisations and for additional staff etc., sanctioned during the Fifth Plan.

The Commission accepted the proposal of Poona University for the change of specialisation of faculty/ technical positions in the Departments of Botany and Zoology as follows:

Botany:	Lecturer in Experimental Botany.
Zoology:	Reader in Genetics/Ecology/Physiology Technical Assistant - Open.

The Commission also agreed to provide one post of Lecturer in the Department of English.

In this connection, the Commission desired that the University be requested to indicate the present position of implementation of the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee for introduction of M.Sc. course in Ecology.

Item No. 25: To consider the proposal of the Bombay University for change in specialisation of faculty positions sanctioned during Fifth Plan.

The Commission could not accept the proposal of Bombay University for change in specialisation of faculty positions in the Department of Chemistry sanctioned during the V Plan. In this connection, the Commission desired that the Bombay University be advised to discontinue award of M.A/M.Sc. degrees by research only.

<u>Item No. 26:</u>

To consider the proposal of the Rajasthan University for the conversion of post of Lecturer in Hindi into that of Lecturer in Persian.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Rajasth University for the conversion of one post of Lecturer in Hindi to that of Lecturer in Persian approved during the Fi Plan.

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#### Item No. 27: To consider the proposal of the Panjab University for approval of grants recommended by the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee for buildings under 2nd and 3rd priorities.

The Commission accepted, in principle, the proposal of the Panjab University for providing assistance for extension of science laboratories and social sciences building up to R. 19 lakhs out of funds recommended under second and third priorities by the Visiting Committee. The Commission desired that before approval is conveyed, the University may be requested to indicate specific action taken by it on the various recommendations made in the report of the Visiting Committee accepted by the Commission.

Item No. 28:

To consider the proposal of Jammu University for approval of additional grants as well as grants recommended by the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee for buildings under Second and Third priorities.

The Commission agreed, in principle, to provide a grant of R. 3.5 lakhs for bio-sciences block and R. 7.5 lakhs for library building at Jammu University. The Commission could not accept the additional provision proposed by the University for the law building.

The Commission desired that before conveying the approval, the University may be requested to indicate the specific action taken by it on the various recommendations made by the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee in its report accepted by the Commission.

In this connection, the Commission desired that the proposals for assistance under the second and third priorities received from the Universities (other than books and equipment) may be brought up before it along with a note indicating the action taken by the University concerned on the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee.

Item No. 29: To consider a proposal of teachers training programme in English.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on English language teaching for improvement of teaching in English language.

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Item No. 30:

To receive a note regarding the reservation of seats to various courses in Universities/ Colleges for students belonging to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes.

This was noted.

In this connection, the Commission desired that the Universities be advised to implement the provision for reservation quota for scheduled castes and scheduled tribes in the same manner as is done by the IITs.

It was further agreed that a Committee may be appointed to elaborate the concept and modalities of implementation of remedial courses to be provided in the universities/colleges. The Commission desired that scheduld caste and scheduled tribe candidates, who apply for award of junior research fellowships, if they so desire, submit their applications direct to the U.G.C.

Item No. 31:

To consider the present position of the implementation of examination reforms in the universities.

This was noted.

It was further noted that the recommendations made by the Implementation Committee which had considered this note would be brought up at the next meeting of the Commissi

Item No. 32:

To consider the proposals of St. Anthony's College, Shillong (North Eastern Hill University) for financial assistance within Rs. 8 lakhs as University Grants Commission share.

It was suggested that the proposal received from St. Anthony's College, Shillong, may be referred to the Vice-Chancellor, N.E.H.U. for his observations. The Colleg may be advised to suggest some proposals under the faculty improvement programme.

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Item No. 33: To consider further the report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to assess the needs and requirements of the Jammu University, Jammu towards the establishment of a Centre for continuing education in the Fifth Plan period.

The Commission agreed to provide assistance as given in <u>Appendix VIII</u> to the Jammu University towards the establishment of a Centre of Continuing Education in the light of the observations and recommendations of the Visiting Committee.

Item No. 34: To consider the proposal of Bombay University to include (1) B.V. Bhavan's Mungalal Goenka Institute of Postgraduate Studies and Research, Chowpatty, Bombay (2) Tata Memorial Hospital, Bombay (3) Cancer Research Institute, Bombay, (4) and Bhabha Atomic Research Centre which are recognised institutions of the University, under Section 2(f) of the UGC Act 1956.

The Commission agreed that the Cancer Research Institute, Bombay, and the Bhabha Atomic Research Centre, Bombay, be brought within the provision of Section 2(f) of the UGC Act 1956 as recognised institutions.

<u>Item No. 35:</u>

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To consider a proposal from Ministry of Education for the amendment of the Pharmacy Act 1948 in order to empower the Pharmacy Council of India to regulate the first degree course in Pharmacy.

The Commission could not recommend the amendment of the Pharmacy Act 1948 to enable the Pharmacy Council of India to regulate the standards of first degree course in Tharmacy.

Item No. 36: To consider the question of further strengthening University Departments as a follow up of the recommendations made by the Fifth Plan Visiting Committees.

The Commission agreed that there was a need for assessing the status and growth of each discipline in the

universities and that it would be desirable to project the general picture discipline-wise and according to the universities, states and the regions, etc. It was also noted in this connection that the Commission had earlier desired that a review should be made of the implementation of the recomme dations of V Plan Visiting Committees which examined the working of the university departments during the V Plan peri

The Commission agreed that, in the first instance, the Convener of the Physics Panel may be requested to undertake a review of the development of physics in the universities on the basis of the information already available in the Commission and the recommendations made by the Visiting Committees. For this purpose, the assistance of a Research Associate may be provided to him.

Item No. 37: To note the date and place for the next meeting of the Commission.

It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held in New Delhi on April 18, 1977.

Item No. 38:

To consider the recommendations of the Standing Advisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study and Programme of Special Assistance to selected departments held on 8th March, 1977.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Standing Advisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study and Programme of Special Assistance to selected departments and agreed that Visiting Committees may be sent to the departments as indicated in <u>Appendix IX</u> to assess the suitability and requirements of the departments for participation in the programme of special assistance to selected departments.

The Commission also agreed that proposals be invited from the departments as listed in Appendix X for participatic in the programme of departmental research support.

It was agreed that the suggestions made by the Advisory Committee for award of fellowships intended for university teachers under the faculty improvement programme may be referred to the Committee which is looking into the question of grant of sabbatical leave to teachers.

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Item No. 39: To consider the question of relaxation of eligibility conditions for purposes of assistance to colleges in backward areas and for women colleges under the Rs. 5.00 lakhs scheme.

The Commission agreed that in the case of women colleges, the eligibility conditions under the R. 5 lakh scheme with regard to student enrolment and faculty strength be the same as prescribed for colleges in the backward regions. With regard to the proposal of the Orissa Government and J & K Government, it was desired that these may be examined in the light of the decision taken earlier.

In this connection, the Chairman mentioned that he had received representations from different universities and colleges suggesting that as in the case of IITs and the Regional Colleges of Education, ceiling fans be provided in the living rooms of the hostels. The Commission accepted, in principle, to assist the universities and colleges for provision of fans in the living rooms of the hostels and desired that different aspects for providing assistance to the universities and colleges in this regard may be examined.

Item No. 40: To consider the recommendation made in the 22nd report of the Commissioner for Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes (1973-74) relating to reservation of seats in hostels in universities and colleges for students belonging to Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes.

The Commission agreed that the universities and colleges be advised to provide reservation of 20% of seats in hostels for scheduled caste and scheduled tribe students no matter whether the hostels were constructed with assistance from the Commission or from other sources.

<u>Item No. 41:</u> To consider the question of basis and quantum of assistance to the Postgraduate Centre of Jawaharlal Nehru University at Imphal.

The Commission accepted, in principle, to provide assistance on 100% basis for approved items for the Postgraduate Centres at Imphal and Agartala on the condition

that the State Governments concerned would give an assurat in the first instance that they would not establish a University in the State during the course of the next decade or so. :

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The U.G.C. instituted the National Associateship Scheme during 1970 to enable outstanding and young teachers upto the age of 35 years, from Universities and colleges engaged in research to visit and work for short periods at University Centres. Research Institutions, National Laboratories etc. which have special facilities relevant to their respective field of study and research.

There are 300 positions available under the five years! scheme and 100 positions under the one year! scheme at a time. The Commission at its meeting held on 10th December, 1973 inter-alia decided that the selection of National Associates may be done in consultation with relevant subject panels. Accordingly, the nominations received from various universities were referred to various Subject Panels and they recommended 50 more candidates for the award of National Associateship as given below :

(4) Banaras Hindu University - Sacoli ... a Post of Lechnical Officer for the Mass Spectrometer under Fifth Plan Development Scheme.

The Commission had earlier approved a grant of %.13 lakh for the purchase of a Mass Spectrometer for setting up of the Service Laboratory at Banaras Hindu University as a first charge to the Fifth Plan allocation of the University. The Banaras Hindu University subsequently requested for the creation of a post of Technical Officer (Category A -- Item No.21 dated 22.9.1976) in the pay scale of No.700-1300 for looking after the sophisticated instrumentation facilities in Banaras Hindu University. The proposal of the University has been accepted subject to the condition that the expenditure on the post would be met within the Fifth Plan Allocation vide orders dated 2.3.77.

(5) Acceptance of the Schemes of the Development Schemes of Kanpur University during the V Plan period.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held on 19th July, 1976 (Item No.5) considered the report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee for Kanpur University and desired that the question of organising of teaching and research in the Kanpur University may be examined further by a Committee of Experts (as in the case of Agra University). The Commission could not agree to any of the colleges of Fanpur University starting M.Phil courses until such time the concept of academic centres and the <u>cuestion</u> of initiating teaching in the University has been considered by the Committee.

Accordingly a Committee was constituted consisting of (1) Professor C.P. Bhambri, Centre for Political Studies, JNUmNew 1 (2) Professor A.N. Kapoor, Department of Ecology, Rajasthan University, (3) Professor J.N. Kapur, Department of Mathematics, Indian Institute of Technology, Kanpur, (4) Professor R.C. Mehrotra Delhi University, (5) Professor B.M. Udgaonkar, Tata Institute of Fundamental Research, Bombay, (6) Professor H.L. Starna, Chairman, Commission for Scientific and Technical Terminology. New Delhi.

The recommendations made by the Committee for introducing M. Fhil courses were discussed with the Vice-Chancellor, Kanpur University. The proposal of the university for introduction of M. Fhil courses in three subjects vize, Commerce at DAV College;

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Education at ANDMM College and Inglich at Christ Church College has been approved for this purpose for uncertify, and for library during the Vth Plan period.

On the recommendation of an expert committee which visited the Department of Mysics, Funjabi University in August, 1971, the Commission agreed to provide a maximum of 10 scholarships of the value of Rs.250/- pome to both the M.Sc./B.E. diploma courses in Electronics and Television Engineering and Space Sciences outside the 4th Plan allocation. The courses were started in 1971-72.

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The Commission at its meeting bold of July 19, 1976 (Item 5.27) considered the recommendations of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of Punjabi University for the continuation of Scholarships for pest M.Sc./B.E. diploma courses in Electronics and Television Engineering and Space Sciences and desired that the recommendations of the Committee may be examined further in the light of the observation made by the Committee and necessary action taken. The proposal of the Punjabi University for continuation of 7 scholarship for the post M.Sc./B.E. diploma courses in Electronics and Television Engineering till the end of Fifth Flan period and

the University for publication of News letters (1839-42).

5 scholarships for the post M.Sc./B.E. diploma courses in Space Sciences in the year 1976-77 outside the Fifth Plan allocation has been accepted. The value of scholarship is  $N_{0}.400/-p_{o}m_{o}$ 

The Panjab University on March, 15, 1983 entered into an agreement with the Fresident of India, regarding publication of certain News-letters (1839-42), being Covernment records in the custody of the National Archives of India. For one reason or other, the final editing of the News-letters was completed only a short while ago, and National Archives of India desired that the News-letters be printed as soon as possible. The University agreed to undertake the printing of News-letters and requested the Commission for necessary funds. The proposal of the University for assistance of  $%_053_000/-$  for publication of 500 copies of News-letters (1839-42) in custody with the National Archives of India, has been accepted.

(8) Additional Assistance for the installation of Computer TDC-312 by the Dibrugarh University.

The University Grants Commission on the basis of the recommendations of an Expert Committee appointed by it had sanctioned in January, 1976 assistance up to  $\&_26_000$  lakhs for the purchase of a TDC-312 Computer (Ist Phase). The University was also authorised to take necessary steps for procurement of this computer from ECL, Hyderabad. The Commission subsequently also released  $\&_66_000$  lakhs to the University to facilitate purchase of this computer in accordance with the specifications as laid down by the ECLL, Hyderabad.

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The Commission was informed in Sentember, 1976 by the University that the cost of computer without the stabilizer came to Rs.5.88.044/ ... The University also informed the Commission that the total cost of installing the computer including the cost of stabilizer (%,15,000/~) and cost of installation (%,00,000/~) would come to Rs.6,63,030/~ and accordingly sought from the Commission an additional grant of %,63,000/ to complete this project.

At its meeting held in August, 1976 (Item No.19), the Commission had decided to pay actual cost to the universities for the installation of computers including air-conditioning, preparation of site and voltage stabilizer on the basis of actual expenditure incurred for the purpose. In terms of this decision, an additional grant of %,63,000/- has been sanctioned to the Dibrugarh University for installation of the Computer TDC-312, thus raising the Commission's share of %,6,00 lakhs to %,6,63 lakhs (vide orders dated the 18th March, 1977).

(9)Acceptance of the proposal of the Magadh University for construction of Vice-Chancellor's residence.

The Fifth Plan Visiting Committee which assessed the development meeds of Magadh University had recommended a grant of R.1,03,000/- being 50% of the estimated cost of Be2,06,000/for the construction of Vice-Chancellor's residence, under second priority. In the programmes accepted for implementation, this could not be, therefore, accommodated in the context of limited resources available.

In August, 1976 the Magadh University indicated to the Commission that the construction of Vice-Chancellor's residence was a priority programme and proposed that a sum of Nolo50 lakhs as Commission's share may be sanctioned for this construction work, the /-timated due to increase in cost of construction material etc. The Magadh University has further on clarification indicated that it is not in a position to take up the construction of the Central Library building for which a sum of  $\Re_2 5_0 00$  lakes has been sanctioned as a first priority programme due to some litigation going an and the court proceedings are not likely to be completed before the end of 4th year of the current plan. In view of this uncertainty and in the context of the urgency for constructing the Vice-Chancellor's residence, the University has sought the concurrence of the Commission to utilise an amount of Rs.1.50 lakes from this provision for this purpose. In view of this, the proposal of Magadh University for the construction of a Vice-Changellor's residence at

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an estimated cost of  $\aleph_0 3.00$  lakes with Commission's assistance limite to  $\aleph_0 1.05$  lakes has been accepted in principle subject to the condition that the required amount would be found by the University from out of the provision of  $\aleph_0 5.00$  lakes which has already been made for the construction of the Central Library building in the current plan. The remaining 50% will be met by the University/State Government. The University has also been advised to forward revised plans and estimates according to the norms now revised which is likely to reduce the cost of building (vide orders on 8.2.1977).

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(10) Proposals of the Colleges accepted under COHSSIP.

The thirty six colleges selected recently under COHSSIF have already been reported to the Commission at its meeting held in February, 1977 under Item No.2(a). 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#### University Grants Commission

Item No. 6: To consider the report of the Committee appointed to work out the details for providing facilities for studies in Marine Sciences in PG Centre, Goa.

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The Commission at its meeting held on 19th July, 1976 accepted the recommendations of the Committee for the Development of the Postgraduate Centre, Goa during Fifth Plan. In this connection the Commission desired that a Committee be appointed to work-out the details for providing facilities for studies in Marine Sciences in Goa in collaboration with the National Institute of Oceanography, Goa.

The Committee was accordingly appointed, which visited Goa on the 9th February, 1977. The report of the Committee is attached as <u>Annexure</u>.\*

The main recommendations of the Committee are as under :

p 5-8

1. The Committee agreed that a programme in Marine Sciences be developed as a part of the Biological Sciences Programme at the PG Centre in collaboration with the National Institute of Oceanography, Goa. The prime focus of this school should be on the biological resources specific to Goa and its immediate sorroundings.

2. The Committee recommended that the grants approved by the Commission for Biological Sciences should be utilised for a Postgraduate Programme in Marine Sciences.

3. The Committee felt that it would be most appropriate to have the postgraduate course in Marine Sciences as a three-year integrated programme. The degree to be awarded may be designated as M.Sc.(Tech.) in Marine Sciences within the faculty of Science. The students of the three-year programme could be drawn from different backgrounds of Physical Sciences as well as Biological Sciences. Initially the annual intake of students should be 12 which may later increase to 16. The Centre could also accept a few Ph.D. scholars.

4. The Committee recommended that scholarships of a value of R.250/- p.m. be given to each student for all 12 months in a year for a maximum of three year duration.

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Necessary funds may be provided by the Commission for these scholarships. During the third year, students who may choose to work in any other institution in connection with their project work may be assisted to meet their travel expenses once each way. The ultimate expenditure on scholarships and travel expenses could be about Rs.1.45 lakhs.

5. The Committee recommends that the sanctioned staff of 1 Professor, 2 Readers, 2 Lecturers and 1 Technical Assistant for starting the programme in Biological Sciences may be utilised for the Marine Sciences programme. Some staff should also be drawn from the departments of Physics and Chemistry of the Postgraduate Centre. The National Institute of Oceanography may depute 4 to 6 of its scientific staff to participate in the teaching programme every semester. No such person would be required to give more than 20 hours of instruction in each semester. The Committee recommends that each such person may be paid an honorarium of Rs.500 per semester for participating in the instructional programme. The expenditure on this account will be about Rs.6,000/per annum.

The total expenditure involved in the recommendations of the Committee amounts to Rs. 1.51 lakhs per annum.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

#### Annoxure to Item No.6

Report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to work out the details for providing facilities for studies in Marine Sciences at the University of Bombay Centre of Post-graduate Instruction & Research, Goa in collaboration with the National Institute of Cceanography. Goa.

The Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to assist the Bombay University in developing an appropriate programme in Marine Sciences during the fifth plan period met at NIO on 9th February, 1977. The following were present:

1. Dr. D. Shankar Narayan

2. Dr. S.Z. Qasim

3. Professor S. Bitt

4. Professor M.C. joshi

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5. Professor D.B. Wagh (By invitation)

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The Committee was in agreement with the suggestion made earlier by the Supert Committee and the UGC that the P.G. Centre at Goa, in consultation with NIC, work out the essential details of developing a collaborative programme in Marine Sciences as a part of its Biological Sciences programme utilising the facilities of the existing Departments of the Centre. The Committee also agreed that the prime focus of this school should be on the biological resources specific to Goa and its immediate surroundings.

The Committee discussed in detail the marine ecosystem and the Marine Sciences problems which an area like Goa presents and the need for developing a Post Graduate Course, which would be capable of giving attention to training and research in this area and at the same time interact in a worthwhile manner with the facility and the facilities available at the NIO. The Committee accordingly feels that the Biological Sciences programe and the grants specifically recommended for the same during the Fifth Plan period be utilised to nucleate a Post Graduate programme in Marine Sciences.

The Committee is of the view that a Post Graduate Instructional programme in Harine Sciences to be initiated at the Cantre should be both distinct in its course contents and student input and also take into account the need for trained nanpower in this area felt by the different agencies likely to appoint such graduates. The Committee deliberated over this considerably and taking into account the expertise available at the NIC, felt that it would be most appropriate to have the Post Graduate Course as a 3 year integrated programme in Marine Sciences. The first year of such a programme could consist of two senesters and about four courses in each senseter would provide the student the necessary acquaintance in different aspects of the study of marine sciences and introduce him to essential techniques in the discipline both qualitative and quantitative. This would include inputs not only from the fields of Marine biology but also marine geology and geophysics, oceanography and meteorology, marine chemistry and micro-biology and some aspects of electronic instrumentation relevant to marine sciences. Since the students of the 3-year integrated programme would be drawn from different backgrounds of physical Sciences as well as biological sciences, the first year programme would be broadbased and would provide necessary insight into the complex multidisciplinary aspect of the study of marine sciences. The first year course would therefore enable the student to move into the second year and benefit from the discipline based courses in the two major areas of (a) marine physical sciences and (b) marine biological sciences. At the end of the second year the student would then be in a position to identify his problems and interests and engage himself in project work of sufficient academic or economic importance.

Structurally it is expected that each academic year would consist of 2 semesters and each semester would be of 16 weeks duration. The workload will consist of about 30 contact hours a week of which not more than 16 hours would be utilized for lectures, 9 hours for laboratory work, 3 hours for field work and 2 hours for seminars and discussions. This would take a five day week leaving The units of courses Saturday free exclusively for field work. to be designed in each semester would be such that they could be completed within this period and the students could be examined in each of these units at the end of each semester. The marks to be given for each course may include 25% for continuous internal assessment which may be in the form of periodical tests, laboratory work and field work. The major project work during the third year could be done not only at the P.G. Centre, Goa or the NIO, Goa but could also be done in other institutions which have marine sciences programme such as the Universities of Andhra, Annamalai, Cochin and Kerala as well as other R & D institutions engaged in some aspect of marine sciences development and utilisation (e.g. ONGC, OMERI, CIFT etc.).

In view of the nature of the contents involved and the time required for students to be properly trained, the committee is of the firm opinion that this programme should be of three years duration instead of the usual two years M.Sc. programme. The degree to be awarded may therefore be different and could be designated as M.Sc. Tech. in Marine Sciences, within the faculty of Science.

Both from the point of view of economic viability as well as the need for trained man power in this area it would be appropriate for the P.G. Centre to start with an initial intake of 12 students in the early stages and later increase the same to 16 students in each year. The centre could also accept a few Ph.D. scholars. The students to be admitted to this programme should possess a B.Sc. or a S.Sc. (Hons) degree in any of the science subjects (Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Geology or Micro-biology) and should possess at least a second class degree and 50% marks in the major subject. Since the Post Graduate Centre should serve the local needs, the Committee would like to suggest that at leas:

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fifty per cent of the suidents intake be of students coming from colleges of the Union Territory of Goa and the other fifty per cent students be drawn on an All-India basis on the basis of an entrance test. Two seats may be reserved for students coming from Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes.

Since this will be a specialised course of 3 year duration and selective admissions are envisaged, it would be necessary for such students to be supported by studentships. On the analogy of similar studentships available from the NCRT, the Committee would like to recommend that studentships of a value of  $\frac{15}{250}$  per month each be given to each of the students for all twelve months in each year for a maximum of three years duration. Necessary funds may be provided by the Commission for these studentships. Duration the third year, students who may choose to work in any other institution in connection with their project work, can be assisted to meet their travel expenses once each way.

The University Grants Commission has already sanctioned a staff of one Professor, two Readers, Two Lecturers and one Technical Assistant for starting the programme of Biological Sciences. This staif could be utilised for the Marine Sciences programme and accordingly the Committee would like to suggest that the above faculty may be recruited as follows: The post of Professor may be filled by recruiting a person with a good academic record and outstanding ability in any one of the branches in Marine Sciences (excluding Marine Ingineering). The posts of 2 Readers could be filled by recruiting persons one each in areas of (a) Marine Physical Sciences including Oceanography, and (b) Marine Biological Sciences. The posts of Lecturers can be filled by persons qualified in (a) Marine Geology and Geophysics and (b) Harine Charistry. The technician be recruited from the area of electronical instrumentation. The above staff along with the existing staff in Micro biology and the staff to be drawn from the Departments of Physics and Chemistry in the P.G. Centre should provide sufficient strength to carry on its teaching programme in collaboration with the staff to be made available from the NIC Goa. 

The Director, NIC, Goa may be requested to designate for each semester four to six of the scientific staff from the NIC to participate in the teaching programme (lectures, practicals, laboratory and field work as well as seminar discussions). It is expected that no such person would be required to give more than 20 hours of instruction in each semester. Accordingly the Committee would like to recommend that each such person may be paid an honorarium of \$.500/~ per semester for participating in such instructional programme. The persons from MIC to be designated for this work could be decided by the Director NIC and the Professor in the Department of Marine Sciences by mutual consultation and in relation to the courses to be offered in each semester. In addition, some experts could be invited from other institutions mentioned above for giving a series of lectures and they can be paid suitable honorarium as per guidelines given by UGC. This would help in bringing about a worth while connection between PG Centre, Goa and other institutions engaged in teaching and research in Marine Sciences in the country. The honorarium expenditure can be met out of the provision available for the visiting faculty during the 5th plan period.

The Committee noted that during the 5th plan period the UGC has initially given a grant of  $\mathbb{R}_3$  lakhs for scientific equipment and that a sum up to about a lakh of rupees would be available for Books and Journals out of the total allocation of  $\mathbb{R}_3$  lakhs made to the PG Centre on this account. The Science Block under construct tion should be able to provide the necessary space required for the programme in Marine Sciences. The Committee is aware that these amounts are not adequate to meet the full needs for the functioning of Marine Sciences but only sufficient to make a beginning and organise the programme in collaboration with NIC facilities. The exact requirement for the growth of this programme would have to be identified and provided for at the beginning of the sixth plan period.

In view of the urgency and the need for starting the programme from the next academic year in June 1977, the Committee has requested the individual members to help in the formulation of the courses of study on the basis of the discussions held in the Committee so that they may be approved early by the academic bodies of the Bombay University. The University may be requested to take urgent steps to recruit the faculty members as detailed above so that these persons would be able to join early in May 1977 and acquaint themselves with the work in progress at NIC before they could start their teaching programme a few weeks later.

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Item No.7: To consider the report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee to the Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University.

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1. The University Grants Commission requested the Banaras Hirdu University to formulate its proposals relating to Medical Education for the 5th five-year plan period within an allocation of Rs.1.50 crores in two priorities - first priority being 2/3rd of the allocation i.e. Rs.1.00 crore and the second priority within the remaining 1/3rd i.e. Rs.0.50 crore. This allocation does not include the requirements of the hospitals and the spill over.

2. The Banaras Hindu University, against the above allocation formulated proposals involving a financial implication of Rs.1.65 crores in two phases - first phase Rs.1.00 crore and the second phase Rs.0.65 crore. In addition, proposals were also made outside this allocation for the consideration of the Commission.

3. The matter was considered by the Commission and it was desired that an expert committee may be appointed to examine the proposals and to make recommendations to the Commission. Accordingly, a Committee was constituted for the purpose under the Convenorship of Prof. P.N. Chhuttani, Director, Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education and Research, Chandigarh. The composition of the Committee is given in Part I of the report. The report of the Committee is Attached as Annexure-

4. Part II of the report gives the background history of the Institute and the facilities available in it along with essential information relating to courses of studies, departments, staff, students and relevant statistics etc.

## 4th Plan Development:

5. The Commission during the 4th plan period sanctioned teaching and non-teaching staff in addition to the funds for equipment, books and journals as also for the construction of some buildings. The funds provided during the 4th plan period were effectively utilized by the Institute. The new Departments of Otolaryngology, Anaesthesiology, Dental Surgery, Psychiatry, Biophysics and of Orthopaedics were established in the 4th plan and the college was converted into the Institute of Medical Sciences by integrating all the Departments of the College. The main emphasis of development during the 4th plan period had been on postgraduate training and during this period. the Institute introduced postgraduate courses in all the broad specialities of Medicine and Surgery. The most significant development of the 4th plan has been the development of the hospital attached to the Institute of Medical Sciences. The UGC approved a 550 bedded hospital with necessary anciliary buildings. The O.P.D. building has since been occupied and the main hospital building is expected to be completed and occupied early.

## 5th Plan Development Proposals:

6. The Institute gave the following priorities to its 5th five-year plan development proposals:

- (1) Development of specialities.
- (2) Strengthening of the existing departments.
- (3) New schemes including setting up of Departments of Bio-medical Engineering and Department of Radiotherepy and Cancer Research.

7. The development of specialities included the introduction of postgraduate courses leading to the award of D.M. and M.Ch. degrees in the various super-specialities of Medicine and Surgery as given below:

M.Ch.	••••	Neuro Surgery Urology Thoracic Surgery Plastic Surgery Paediatric Surgery.

8. The new departments proposed to be set up in the 5th five-year plan period included (1) Department of Radio Therapy and Cancer Research and (2) Department of Bio-medical Engineer-ing.

The following observations were stressed by the universit in the course of their discussion with the Committee:

(1) The Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University and the S.S. Hospital attached to it provide training to the students at the undergraduate and the postgraduate level The S.S. Hospital of the Institute has been catering to the needs of the people of Eastern U.P., Northern Bihar and other adjointing States. (2) The Institute had originally submitted proposals involving a financial outlay of Rs.4.39 crores for the five years' duration of the plan in the background of the aims and objectives of the Institute in the 5th plan period. While recasting the plan proposals as desired by the UGC within the suggested albeation, the Institute had to abandon many projects which were originally included in the plan proposals of the Institute.

(3) For the development of specialities, the Institute needs 200 beds so that adequate training may be given as recognised by the Medical Council of India. This may be considered as a fist charge on the hospitalis allocation during the 5th plan period.

The other observations made by the Vice-Chancellor, Director, Institute of Medical Sciences, students and teachers are given inPart V of the report.

#### General Observations:

9. The general observations made by the Committee are given inPart VI of the report. Some of the important observations ar given below:

(1) The Institute of Medical Sciences at Banaras is one of th finest medical institutions in our country where the staff ar devoted and dedicated and where uniformally excellent work is gong on in most of the Departments.

(2) Looking to the increasing cost of equipments, materials and books for the library and the increasing number of the paients for the medical services attending the Institute, the pcposals which have been put by the Institute of Medical Scences are reasonably justified and need to be supported.

(3) The University should give the highest priority to cosolidate the existing Departments at the Institute of Medical Siences. This is the most urgent need of the Institute.

(4) Emphasis should be given on rural health programme bth for boys and girls at the undergraduate level.

(5) The development of postgraduate courses has its own pace in medical education, but should not let the undergraduate curses be inadequate or suffer in any way in order to look for mre postgraduate and Ph.D. courses. The basis of our medical eucation should have sound footing before it should develop the sper-specialities and postgraduate courses.

..4/ ...

(6) The Institute has introduced courses leading to the award of M.Ch. and D.M. degrees in the various specialities of the Departments of Surgery and Medicine from July, 1976. The UGC has already conveyed its no objection to start the courses and to include the requirements if any in the 5th plan allocation. The Institute has asked for staff etc. for functioning of each speciality keeping in view the recommendations of the Medical Council of India. They have also included the requirements of 200 additional beds for making the minimum requirements of the Medical Council in the speacialities which may be provided out of the hospital fund as the first charge of the hospital allocation during the 5th five-year plan period.

(7) The matter was discussed at great length by the Committee and the following conclusions were arrived at in respect of priority to be given to the consolidation of the existing departments vis-a-vis the programme of introduction of D.M. and M.Ch. courses:

- (2) The consolidation of the existing programmes of teaching and research at the Institute be given higher priority over the programmes of introducing D.M. and M.Ch. courses.
- (b) In order to develop the medical teachers training programme in the Institute, it is very much desirable to start the super-specialities leading to degrees of M.Ch. and D.M. at the Institute.
- (c) The lead taken by the Institute of Medical Science is really praise-worthy and the Institute must take this up with their best efforts to develop this programme. But while doing this, the Institute must keep in view the potential and facilities available in the various Sections of Medicine and Surgery in line with the norms laid down by the Medical Council of India in this regard.
- (d) The quality of the work carried out in the Departments of Pediatric Surgery, Plastic Surgery and Urology would make them eligible to hold M.Ch. course provided they are given required beds and staff immediately. The Department of Neuro-surgery will have to increase its total work output further. The Department of Thoracic Surgery and Cardiology are unable to carry out an open heart programme because of lack of equipment whether these two sections can conduct the M.Ch. course should be decided by the Medical Council of India as soon as possible.

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(e) Similarly in the Department of Medicine except for the Section of Neurology other Sections may wait till the requisite facilities are made available to introduce D.M. course. The Committee supports the introduction of D.M. in Neurology at this stage and for others the Nedical Council of India may be invited to advise.

- (f) It is, however, essential to support all those sections where the Committee has not recommended the introduction of M.Ch. and D.M. courses and provide them with the required facilities for the benefit of the needy patients in the Eastern U.P., Western Bihar and Northern parts of M.P. In an Institute like the Institute of Medical Sciences, it is essential to have higher training facilities. It would be wrong not to support these super-specialities at this stage as it will further weaken areas which are already weak.
- (g) The Committee recommends that each Section of Medicine and Surgery be headed by a Professor and the University may think of upgrading these Sections into independent Departments/Divisions in course of time. The Committee recommends the provision of Professor in all the Sections of the Departments of Surgery and Medicine where such faculty positions are not available.
- (h) The university has already registered students in the various super-specialities of Medicine and Surgery. It has not been possible for the Committee to recommend the continuation of all the super-specialities at this stage. The Committee, however, suggests that the students already admitted be allowed to complete their studies without any difficulty.

. (8) It would be necessary to establish a separate Department of Immunology with complete collaboration from the Department of Pathology, Micro-Biology and Bio-Chemistry and Transplantation Surgery. Establishment of an independent Department will lead to further strengthening of this very important discipline at this Institute. The Department of Radiotherapy and Cancer Therapy be grouped under the Department of Orcology.

(9) With the increase in the required staff and the postgraduate students at the Institute, it will be most essential to provide suitable living quarters and hostels for the staff and students as soon as possible.

(10) A few posts of Readers and Lecturers are lying vacant besides some posts of Professors. The University has appointed temporary Lecturers against most of these posts. In the opinion of the Committee, this is not a healthy arrangement and the university should take urgent steps to make regular and permanent appointments against these posts. The Committee, in its report on each Department has expressed its concern about the filling up of vacant posts.

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(11) The Committee suggests that the Institute should strive to retain its all-India character and attract students from all over the country. It would be desirable to provide scholarships and fellowships for attracting the students from all over the country.

#### Recommendations;

(1) The Committee has made recommendations for each Department for its essential requirements in the report on each Department. Recommendations have also been made with regard to the central facilities such as Surgical Research Laboratory, Central Animal House, Central Workshop, Art & Proto Section, Library and Mortuary Complex. The Committee has endorsed the recommendations made by the 4th Plan Visiting Committee about the Surgical Research Laboratory according to which a Central Division of Experimental Medicine and Surgery be created and the Surgical Research Laboratory should be merged with this Division.

(11) The Committee with regard to a Centre of Bio-Medical Engineering was of the view that the scheme be implemented. However, such a Centre should be established in the Engineering Faculty of the University and the Institute of Medical Sciences should work in collaboration with that Faculty.

(12) It was disturbing for the Committee to note that the growth of Clinical Bio-chemistry had not been well planned and well co-ordinated. A number of Clinical Bio-chemistry programmes have been taken up by a number of groups without proper supervision. The Committee strongly suggest that this arrangement should not be allowed to continue and a centralized welldeveloped Clinical Bio-chemistry Unit be established to co-ordinat all the aspects of Clinical Bio-chemistry work.

(13) The Committee is convinced about the need of a hostel for postgraduate students particularly in view of the introductio of the new residency scheme and the starting of a number of postgraduate courses in the Institute during the 4th plan period. The Committee strongly recommends the acceptance of the proposal of the University as a special case.

(1)+) The proposal for the taking over of the Kashi Kushtha Sewa Sang has been supported by the Committee. It has, however, been suggested that this may be done in consultation with the State Government, the Central Government and the UGC.

(15) The Committee has recommended provision for buildings (Rs.19.00 lakhs), equipment (Rs.58.45 lakhs), books & journals (Rs.10.90 lakhs) besides creation of post of professors (14), Readers (15), Lecturers (18), and non-teaching and technical staff The details are given in <u>Annexure-22</u> of the report. The estimate expenditure under Ist priority is Rs.149.70 lakhs and under 2nd priority is Rs.59.68 lakhs.

(15)

Hospital:

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(16) The university has also approached the Commission for the sanction of additional 200 beds for running of postgracuate courses in various super-specialities. This proposal was also included by the university in its 5th five-year plan proposals of the Institute. It has been suggested by the university that the proposal may be considered by the Commission as a first charge on the hospital allocation to be made for the 5th fiveyear plan. The following justification has been given by the university in support of its proposal for additional beds:

(a) The S.S. Hospital attached to the Institute of Medical Sciences for providing clinical training to the students undergraduate and postgraduate students of the Institute has been catering the needs of the people of Eastern U.P., Northern Bihar ard other adjoining States. Being an economically backward region, the people from distant places have been attending the Hospital. The out-patient attendance of the hospital has reached over 4,29,000 during 1975. The in-patient number has been over 16,000. Inspite of all the specialised treatment facilities available in the hospital, quite a large number of patients are refused admission or are kept waiting due to shortage of beds.

(b) The sanctioned bed strength of the Institute Hospital by UGC is 550 which was approved as follows:

The bed requirements for undergraduate training was calculated at the rate of 1:7 for 50 students which is the approved intake of M.B.B.S. course by the UGC. This strength, however, needs revision since the actual intake for M.B.B.S. course must exceeds against the sanctioned intake as explained below:

Thus for about 65 to 70 M.B.B.S. students admitted every year, the requirements of beds in the Hospital comes between 450 to E00-

The present strength of 550 beds includes 200 beds for postgraduate training. This number was fixed about 7-8 years back. The Institution is now providing postgraduate training in all the broad specialities. From 1.1.1974 the residency scheme of training has been introduced and recently the UGC has approved 210 number of residents.

(c) The recommendations of the Medical Council of India on Postgraduate Education (1971) with regard to the beds are as follows:

"In order to be able to train postgraduates in Medicine, Surgery and their various specialities, it is absolutely essential to have a large sized teaching hospital. The number of beds of this hospital has to be carefully related to the number of postgraduates that have to be trained in the various departments. A specialist clinical unit of 50 beds could train not more than 5 postgraduates at one time. In other words, in order to give adequate clinical experience to the postgraduates in General Medicine and its specialities and sufficient operative experience to the students in Surgery and its various specialities, we should have a 1000 bedded hospital if we wish to train 100 postgraduates It is desirable that atleast 150 beds should be reserved for General Medicine and a similar number for General Surgery so as to provide three units in each of these two major departments. The specialities of Medicine and Sungery should have 50 beds each. The Department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology will, however, have to be given a larger share and at least 75 beds should be provided for this purpose! this purpose".

(d) The financial implications of the proposal has been given as detailed below:

Maintenance @ Rs. 10,000 p.a. n 200 = Rs. 20 lakhs 

Non-recurring @ Rs.5,000 = Rs. 10 lakhs

(17) In this connection, the following observation are made

Sciences

(1) The terms of reference of the Visiting Committee which had assesed the 5th plan requirements of the Institute of Medica Sciences were limited to the proposals of the Institute of Medic relating to the Medical Education only. In view of this, the Committee did not examine this proposal of the university. However, the Committee in its observations on the introduction o super-specialities leading to the award of D.M. and M.Ch. degree at the Institute has charly emphasised the need for additional beds in each of the super-specialities.

(7)

(2) The university has not asked for any assistance for the construction of buildings required for providing space for additional 200 beds.

(3) The Commission provides assistance to the Banaras Hindu University for 550 beds for diet, dressing and medicines @ R.3,500 per bed per annum as approved by the Government of India.

(4) The Commission so far as the assistance towards salaries of the staff etc. are concerned, provides assistance at the old rate of Rs.3,900/- per bed per annum pending final decision of the Government on the recommendations of the Wahi Committee in this behalf which is under the consideration of the Committee of co-ordination between the Ministry of Health & Family Planning and the Ministry of Education & Social Welfare. The decision is still awaited.

(13) With effect from 1974-75, no separate grant is being paid for the Medical Colleges and hospitals attached to them and the expenditure is provided within the maintenance grant payable in respect of Banæras Hindu University and Aligarh Muslim University.

(19) The Ministry of Education & Social Welfare in November, 1976 sent the statement indicating the approved 5th plan allocation for the various programmes of the UGC which inter-alia also included provision for medical colleges. According to the revised 5th plan outlay a sum of Rs.787 lakhs has been included in the outlay of the UGC for the Medical Colleges of Central Universities.

(20) The matter regarding:- (a) Report of the Visiting Committee to the Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University and (b) the proposal of the university for providing assistance for 200 additional beds at the Banaras Hindu University is placed before the Commission for consideration.

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## REPORT OF THE VISITING COMMITTEE

#### Institute of Medical Sciences

#### Banaras Hindu University

#### SUMMARY OF THE REPORT

The Commission requested the university to formulate its proposals on medical education within an allocation of &.1.50 crores in two priorities - first priority &.1.00 crore and second priority &.0.50 crore. The university made proposals involving &.1.65 crores in two phases. Proposals were also made outside this allocation.

The Institute has 28 Departments and 12 Sections. It offers courses leading to the award of the degrees of M.B.B.S., M.S., M.D. and Ph.D. in modern medicine. From 1976, it has introduced courses leading to the award of M.Ch. and D.M. in super-specialities in Surgery and Medicine respectively.

The grants made in the 4th plan were effectively utilized. New Departments of Otolaryngology, Anaesthesiology, Dental Surgery, Psychiatry, Biophysics and Orthopaedics, were constituted from the existing departments. The College of Medical Sciences which started in 1960, was converted to the Institute of Medical Sciences in 1971. The main emphasis of development during the 4th plan period had been on postgreduate training. During this period, the Institute introduced postgraduate courses in all the broad specialities and development of the hospital attached to the Institute. The UGC approved a 550 bedded hospital with necessary anciliary buildings. The O.P.L. has been completed and occupied and the main hospital building is nearing completion. The Institute had been the venue of many All-India Conferences and Seminars and the staff of the Institute contributed a large number of research papers.

During the 5th plan, besides strengthening of the existing Departments, the Institute has introduced postgraduate courses leading to the award of D.M. and M.Ch. in various super-specialities in Medicine and Surgery. The Committee feels that the consolidation of the existing programmes be given higher priority over the programmes of introducing D.M. and M.Ch. courses. The quality of work in Paediatric Surgery, Plastic Surgery and Urology would make them eligible to hold M.Ch. courses. The Committee supports the introduction of D.M. in Neurology in Medicine at this stage. It is, however, essential to support all these Sections where the Committee has not recommended the introduction of M.Ch. and D.M. courses. The Department of Radio Therapy and Cancer Therapy should be grouped under the Department of Oncology. With the increase in the required staff and the postgraduate students it will be essential to provide living guarters and hestels. The Committee endorses the recommendation of the 4th Plan Visiting Committee for the Surgical Research Laboratory according to which a Central Division of Experimental Medicine and Surgery be created and the Surgical Research Laboratory be merged within this Division. The Committee has recommended provision for buildings (Rs.19.00 lakhs), equipment (Rs.58.00 lakhs), books and journals (Rs.10.90 lakhs) besides creation of posts of Professors (14), Readers (15), Lecturers (18) and other non-teaching and technical staff. The Committee has recommended some scholarships and fellowships outside the plan.

The Committee was favourably impressed by the programmes of the Institute.

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## Report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee to the Institute of Medical Sciences, Eanaras Hindu University

## PART-I - COMMITTEE & VISIT

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1.1 The University Grants Commission requested the Banaras Hindu University to formulate its proposals relating to medical education for the 5th five-year plan period within an allocation of Rs.1.50 crores in two priorities - first priority being 2/3rd of the allocation i.e. Rs.1.00 crore and the second priority within the remaining 1/3rd i.e. Rs.0.50 crore. This allocation does not include the requirements of the hospitals.

1.2 The Banaras Hindu University, against the above allocation formulated proposals involving a financial outlay of &.1.65 crores in two phases - first phase Rs.1.00 crore and the second phase Rs.0.65 crore. In addition, proposals were also made outside this allocation for the consideration of the Commission.

1.3 The matter was considered by the Commission and it desired that an Expert Committee may be agocinted to examine the proposals and to make recommendations to the Commission. Accordingly, a Committee consisting of the following was constituted:

> 1.5 The Committee held detailed discussions with the Vice-Chancellor, Director, Plan Co-ordination, Director, Institute of Medical Sciences, Heads of Departments/ Sections, Faculty members, students and other staff of the Institute.

1.6 The Committee visited the various clinical and nonclinical departments, the S.S. Hospital, the New O.P.D. Block, the 550 bed hospital under construction and the other units of the Institute such as workshop, animal house, photo and arts section, surgical research laboratory and the yoga centre. The Committee also visited the urban & rural health centres and the leprosy, T.B. and rehabilitation centre of the Kashi Kushtha Sewa Sangh, Sarnath.

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## PART-II - BASIC FACTS

## (A) INSTITUTE OF MEDICAL SCIENCES

#### 2.1 BRIEF HISTORY

2.11 The present Institute of Medical Sciences initially started as the College of Medical Sciences. The ideal of the College of Medicine according to Mahamana Malaviyaji's dream was that Hindy Medical Science would be taught here along with the European system of medicine and that the Hindu system of medicine will be enriched further by adopting in it the latest achievement of modern medicine and surgery, both the preventive and curative aspects.

2.12 In the initial stage the Department of Ayurveda existed as a branch of Oriental Learning of the University. It was in the year 1924-25 that the College of Ayurveda started functioning as an independent College under the Faculty of Oriental Learning and later under the Faculty of Medicine and Surgery (Ayurveda) which was constituted in 1928.

2.13 The College of Medical Sciences was started in the year 1960 in place of the old Ayurvedic College after discontinuing the courses of instruction in Ayurveda at the undergraduate level. This was the consequence of a countrywide agitation by the students of Ayurvedic Colleges for better rights and privileges. With the advancement of modern medical education more and more medical colleges were opening in the country. There was much less scope left for Ayurvedic graduates. Earlier efforts to improve their lot by including teaching of modern subjects in the syllabus and awarding the degree of Ayurvedacharya and Bachelor of Medicine and Surgery (A.B.M.S.) by the University, did not prove rewarding for practical purposes, It was with this background that the Government had to decide to establish a fulfledged Medical College in the Banaras Hindu University to provide instructions in the modern system of medicine at the undergraduate level. The University Grants Commission approved the establishment of a Medical College in this University in June 1960 and the College of Medical Sciences started functioning from September 1960.

2.14 However, the study of Indian Medicine at the postgraduate level was mooted and the idea of establishing a postgraduate training centre was worked out. Therefore the Postgraduate Institute of Indian Medicine was established in 1963. The postgraduate course in Ayurvedic Medicine (D.Ay.M.) was simultaneously introduced. The financial assistance was sanctioned by the Ministry of Health in 1963, for conducting advanced training and research in Indian Medicines.

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2.15 On the recommendation of a Committee of the University Grants Commission the decision was made in 1971 by the Executive Council of the University to establish the Institute of Medical Sciences by integrating all the Departments of the Medical College and the Departments of Indian Medicine.

2.16 The College first started to function in the small building of the then Ayurvedic College and in a few other buildings of the University. The College was recognised by the Medical Council of India and also by the British Medical Council even while in its early phase of establishment.

2.17 The College was sanctioned grants by the University Grants Commission for the construction of the buildings of the College, hostels, staff quarters and purchase of equipment and library books etc. The construction of the main building of the College was completed in 1957 and the College started functioning in the new building from 1967. The new three-storied building extending in four blocks, now accommodates all the Departments of the Institute, different laboratories, lecture rooms, museums and libraries. The construction of other ancillary plocks of the building viz., gas house, animal house, workshop were completed a later. In the close proximity of the main building are located Nursing Training Centre, Medical Enclave (teaching staff residences), boys and girls' hostels, and House Surgeons' and Nurses' Hostels. Another Medical Enclave (residences for teaching staff) has been newly constructed just beyond the walls of the University in an area procured by the University for its expansion.

## 2.3 COURSES

2.31 The Institute (then College) initially started the training at undergraduate level leading to M.B.B.S. (Bachelor of Medicine and Bachelor of Surgery) degree. The first batch of students admitted was in 1960 and the yearly intake capacity of 40 students was fixed. During the national emergency in 1962, the number was raised to 60 which was further enhanced upto 70 admissions and remained so till 1968-69. From July 1969 admission was reduced to 50 which was in pursuance of the recommendation of a Committee that the institution should concentrate more on postgraduate training and research. The first batch of M.B.B.S. graduates of the College came out in the year 1965.

2.32 The Institute (then College) started the postgraduate training programme (M.D./M.Sc. coursec) in 1953-64 in selected specialities as the 'in service' facility for its own staff members. The facilities were extended to many other specialities during subsequent years. A few postgraduate diploma courses were started simultaneously. The College was visited for assessment of the postgraduate facilities during September 1968 by the Inspector of the Medical Council of India. Later on the inspection under the Indian Medical Council Act was carried out in respect of various postgraduate examinations held in 1965 by the Inspectors of the Medical Council of India and the degrees were recognised.

2.33 At present M.D. courses are being conducted in Anaesthesiology, Bio-chemistry, Biophysics, Dermatology, Forensic Medicine, Medicine, Microbiology, Paediatrics, Pathology, Pharmacology, Physiology, Preventive and Social Medicine, Psychiatry, Radiology, Radiotherapy and Tuberculosis and respiratory diseases. M.S. courses are conducted in Anatomy, Obstetrics & Gynaecology, Ophthalmology, Orthopaedics, Otolarynology and Surgery.

2.34 There were also diploma courses till 1975-76 in the following specialities: Anaesthesiology, Child Health, Larynology and Otology, Medical Radio-diagnosis, Medical Radiotherapy, Ophthalmic Medicine, Orthopeedics and Tuberculosis and Chest diseases,

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2.35 From the current year the following courses (super-specialities) have been introduced. Degrees of Magister Chirugiae (M.Ch.) in Cardiovascular and thoracic surgery, Neurosurgery, Paediatric Surgery, Plastic Surgery and Urology and Degrees of Doctoratus Medicinus (D.M.) in Cardiology, Endocrinology, Gastroenterology and Neurology.

2.35 The three years! course leading to the Degree of Doctor of Ayurvedic Medicine (D.Ay.M.) is open to graduates of Indian Medicine. The annual intake is 20.

### 2.4 ADMISSION POLICY

2.41 The Institute admits students to undergraduate course on all-India basis strictly on merit through a competitive examination (Pre-Medical Test). The Centres for appearing in the P.M.T. are Varanasi, Patna, New Delhi and Nagpur. The admission is strictly made on the basis of marks secured by the candidates in the competitive examination.

2.42 Similarly all new intakes for the postgraduate (M.D./M.S.) are also through a written test and interview in order of merit.

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## 2.7 STAFF

2.71 Faculty of the Institute includes 30 Professors, 46 Readers and 52 Lecturers. The position of the faculty department-wise, cadre-wise is given in <u>Annexure-II;</u> cadre-wise and specialisation is. in <u>Annexure-III.</u> The vacant posts are shown in <u>Annexure-IV.</u> Posts of two Professors, 8 Readers and 12 Lecturers are lying vacant. Most of the posts are non-plan posts and temporary Lecturers have been appointed against many posts.

2.72 Recruitment on all the posts is done on the basis of University Recruitment Policy and University Rules and Regulations i.e. the appointment of teachers is governed by Statute 27 of the B.H.U. Act and Statutes after advertisement of all posts on all-India basis. The qualification laid down for the posts are the same as prescribed by the Medical Council of India for each category of the posts.

## 2.8 RESEARCH ACTIVITIES

2.81 The research in the Institute of Medical Sciences is being done both in the areas of Modern and Indian Medicine. At the postgraduate level the students are allotted subjects of thesis in the area of research already undertaken by the Department to maintain continuity and make some original contribution. Besides that, regular research training facilities leading to the award of Ph.D. degrees are available in almost all the Departments.

2.82 The faculties of the Institute are also individually engaged in their own research activities. Many of them have their individual research projects which are financed by various agencies like the Council of Scientific and Industrial Research, Indian Council of Medical Research, Indian Council of Agricultural Research, University Grants Commission, Department of Atomic Energy as well as Science and Technology, Government of India etc. The problems connected with the trial of drugs are mostly financed by the drug manufacturing firms.

2.83 In the field of Indian Medicine the research activities have aimed towards the areas of development and revival of ancient concepts and methods of diagnosis and treatment, re-assessment and critical analysis of the basic concepts and facts of Ayurveda with the help of modern scientific methods, elucidation and explanation of Ayurvedic concepts and ideas in modern scientific terms in order to make it intelligible to the scientists all over the world, and to discover new indigenous drugs. 2.84 Surgical Research Laboratory and Yoga Research Centre are two special research wings functioning in the Institute.

## MEDICAL HOSTELS

2.85 At present the accommodation is available for 400 residents. The position of the available accommodation and the accommodation required is summarised in the following table:

2.87 The position of students qualified for M.B.B.S./ M.D./M.S. and Diploma Courses till date is given in Annexure-V.

The position of utilization of postgraduates passed during the last five years is given in <u>Annexure-VI</u>.

## GRANTS FROM THE STATE GOVERNMENT

2.88 The State Government is providing no grants for medical education to the Institute of Medical Sciences. This, however, does not include such schemes which are sanctioned by the Government of India through State Govt. e.g. all-India hospitals post-partum programme and mobile service programme. In hospital side the State Government is contributing @ R.2,000/~ per bed per annum for 180 beds only.

## GOVERNMENT OF INDIA CONTRIBUTION FOR MEDICAL EDUCATION

2.89 In 1953 the Postgraduate Institute of Indian Medicine was established by the Ministry of Health for imparting postgraduate training leading to the award of D.Ay.M. (3-years duration course) and for advancement of research. The original scheme involves R.14.81 lakhs and expansion scheme (sanctioned later) involves Rs.4.29 lakhs. The entire scheme involving Rs.19.10 lakhs is financed by the Ministry of Health. In addition 75 Ayurvedic Research beds are also financed by the Government of India for which separate grant of R.4,87,500/- is received from the Government of India. Although, the Departments of Indian Medicine previously part of the Postgraduate Centre of Indian Medicine have become the Academic Departments of the Institute after upgradation of the College to the Institute by the President of India in his capacity as Visitor of the Institute, there is no mixing of establishment, grants either in the academic or hospital side which account is separately maintained, audited and submitted to the Ministry of Health, Government of India every year.

## (B)3.1SIR SUNDER LAL HOSPITAL

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3.10 The foundation of the present Hospital of the University was laid in January 1924. It was named as Sir Sunder Lal Hospital in the memory of the first Vice-Chancellor of this University. It provided accommodation for the treatment of one hundred indoor patients, nearly 300 patients daily in the Out-Patient Departments and for about 1500 Operations yearly.

3.11 With the starting of the College of Medical Sciences the Hospital also got a fillip in its development and its bed strength increased gradually to the present number of about 550 beds. This has been possible with the expansion of the existing buildings and the construction of new buildings and blocks with grants received from the Government of India and U.P. Government and out of the funds received from donations.

## 3.12 Buildings of the S.S. Hospital

## (i) Children Hospital (1965)

The Department of Paediatrics and Paediatric Surgery Section occupy this building. It has bed strength of 75 and space for Out-Patients Departments, Laboratories and Specialised Clinics for Children Patients.

## (ii) Bhuwalika Eye Hospital (1964)

Apart from the Department of Ophthalmology, the Department of E.N.T. and Dental Surgery are also located in it and includes space for Out-Patient Clinics and Indoc Wards. A modern operation theat to suit and a good sound proof Audiometry room of the E.N.T. Department are the notable attractions.

(iii) Radiotherapy Block (1968)

It has a 250 K.V. Deep X-Ray therapy machine and a Telecobalt Unit which was commissioned in September 1969. Diagnostic and Therapeutic facilities with radio active Isotopes are also provided in this Centre.

## (iv) Clinical Block (1969)

It houses some of the specialised out-patient clinics, E.E.G. and E.M.G. Laboratory, Blood Bank, Central Sterlization Unit, Pharmaceutical Section and other laboratories and Sections.

## (v) Special Ward Block (1964)

To meet the requirements of paying patients, a special ward consisting of 15 rooms was built in 1964. With increasing demands from the public, 6 more rooms were added in 1968.

## (vi) Traumatic Surgery & Rehabilitation Blocks (1962)

These Blocks were added with the main Hospital building which houses casualty section and orthopaedic out-patient clinic and indoor ward with 30 beds and an operation theatre. The Department has an established rehabilitation Unit.

## (vii) Isolation Block and Psychiatry (1967)

A separate Block was constructed as Isolation ward. The same Block also houses the Psychiatry Department. The Psychiatry Clinic is being developed to be a centre for treatment of all types of Mental illness with facilities for an in-patient treatment.

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(viii) Other Buildings

- (a) Doctors' Hostel for House Surgeons and House Physicians and other Resident staff.
- (b) Staff Nurses Hostel.
- (c) School of Nursing.
- (d) Rest House (Dharmshala) for relations and attendants of the patients admitted in the Hospital.

## (ix) <u>New Hospital</u>

To meet the growing demands of the Postgraduate Teaching and Research, the Government of India (U.G.C.) sanctioned funds for constructing and equipping a new modern hospital of 550 beds. The main features of this Hospital will be a separate Out-patient Block, Maternity Block, Radiology, Clinical Laboratories and Operation Theatra Block and a Medical and Surgical Block to house patients. The building is under construction and is expected to be completed in the very near future.

(x) Out-Patient Department Building

The building has since been completed and occupied in 1975. This released the congestion that existed in the old building.

# 3.13 Specialised Clinics:

Apart from routine medical and surgical outpatients departments there are many speciality clinics operating in the Hospital. The main ones are:-

(1) Orthopaedic Surgery, (2) Neurosurgery and Neurology clinics, (3) Chest surgery and chest diseases clinics, (4) Plastic surgery clinic, (5) Paediatric surgery out-patients is conducted in the Children Hospital,
(6) Cardiac Surgery and Cardiology clinic, (7) Thyroid clinic, (8) Dialysing Unit, (9) Peptic ulcer clinic,
(10) Dental Surgery clinics, (11) Psychiatric clinics,
(12) Dermatology and Venereology clinics, Leprosy patients are also being treated in this clinic, (13) Diabetic clinic,
(14) Castroenterology clinic, (15) Obstetrics and Gynaecology clinic, (16) Ophthalmology and Paediatrics clinics and (17) Endocrinology clinic.

## 3.14 <u>Medical Record Section</u>:

Medical Record Section was established during the year 1963. Since 1963 all records of indoor patients are being maintained and since this year the records of outpatients department are also being maintained.

## 3.15 School of Nursing:

Attached to the hospital, the School of Nursing is training girls who come from different parts of the country. Well trained sisters, staff nurses and student nurses look after the patients in the hospital including operation theatres. out-patients departments etc.

## 3.16 <u>Staff</u>:

The Medical Superintendent is the overall incharge of the hospital administration. The Medical Superintendent is aided by the two Deputy Medical Superintendents and all the Heads of the clinical departments, besides a large number of medical officers. There is also a Committee consisting of Medical Superintendent, two Deputy Medical Superintendents and different administration-in-charges of various sections, which takes all decisions with regard to the hospital management.

#### 3.17 Statistics:

The Hospital Medical Records Section maintains the details of the indoor as well as out-door patients. In 1975 a total number of 4,29,330 patients were treated in various out-patient departments. Of these, approximately one-third were female patients. There were 1,618 births in the Hospital during last year. The total number of admission of the in-door patients in 1975 was 16,405, of whom 1319 patients died. The number of in-patiente days worked out to be 234,887 and average period of hospital stay was for 14.31 days.

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## PART-III - FOURTH PLAN DEVELOPMENT

4.1 The Commission during the 4th plan period sanctioned teaching and non-teaching staff in addition to the funds for the equipment, books and journals as also for the construction of some buildings. The sanctions of the Commission are given in <u>Annexure-VII</u>.

4.2 The Committee in this connection also took note of the following observations made by the 4th plan Visiting Committee in its report:

- (1) "The postgraduate education is one of the main objectives of this institution and it is desirable that research should be encouraged in every department. This would ultimately lead to the institution as a whole being involved in fundamental, applied and developmental research".
- (2)"Separate departments should be set up for Ear, Nose, Throat, Orthopaedics and Anaesthesiology ... when the new hospital building is completed, a separate department of dentistry be also created ... Realising the importance of training in psychological medicine and psychiatry, '.... an independent department would be necessary to ensure 3.3 their full development. This may, however, be deferred till the hospital facilities have been adequately expanded. The Department of Biochemistry and Biophysics has also developed ... this department may be split up into two separate Department of Biochemistry and Bio-Physics".
- (3) "The College of Medical Sciences had developed a great deal since its inception in 1960. Most of the Departments are now well-staffed and relatively well-equipped. The Committee is of the view that the College can now develop postgraduate facilities in the various disciplines in a major way".
- (4) "The College of Medical Sciences at Banaras Hindu University with its Hospital and the Postgraduate Institute of Indigenous Medicine is a compact unit and can be recognised as one of the biggest units of the University. With the development, we have envisaged, we feel that it should have the requisite autonomy in its working. The Committee

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recommend that the University may consider making this complex an autonomous unit within the framework of the Act and Statutes of the University".

4.3 The Committee makes the following observations with regard to the implementation of the 4th plan development proposals as sanctioned by the Commission:

- (A) PHYSICAL FACILITIES
- (1) <u>Buildings</u>:

The following buildings were constructed/ completed\_during the period:

(a) Extension Wing Library:

The UGC sanctioned 5,000 sq.ft. accommodation for the extension of the Library Wing. The building completed was occupied in February 1974. The additional accommodation is being used as stack room for bound periodicals, loose periodicals cum journal, reading room and teacher reading room.

(b) Central Workshop:

Prior to the sanction of accommodation for the Central Workshop under the IV Plan, the Workshop was functioning in a small shed. The new building was completed in 1974. The additional facilities provided have enabled the Institute to start the following sections in the workshop: (i) Mechanical, (ii) Electrical, (iii) Glass Blowing, (iv) Welding and (v) Carpentry. Over 15,000 jobs are executed by the workshop every year. Sanction for ges line connection have also been obtained from the UGC.

(c) Central Animal House:

The Central Animal House has been started in the new building. The animal house was also sanctioned &, one lakh for equipments including air-conditioning, Although, Central air-conditioning is still lacking for the entire building few air-conditionars have been provided and some basic equipments has been procured.

(d) <u>Hostel Facilities</u>:

The following were added to the hostels during the 4th plan period: (1) reading room, common room and two wardens quarters in Dhanwantri Hostel (2) Kitchen block and dining hall in Ruiya Hostel, (3) 24 boys and 12 girls hostel and wardens quarters at Rural Health Centre, Chiragaon.

## (e) Residential Facilities (staff quarters):

During the 4th plan period, quarters for the staff were completed and occupied as under: Director's Quarter-(, Professors Quarters-8, Readers Quarters-6, Lecturers Quarters-12, Technical Staff Quarters-8, Ministerial Staff Quarters-6, Class IV Staff Quarters-6, Ministerial Staff Quarters at Rural Health Centre-6 and Class IV Staff Quarters at Rural Health Centre-5.

In addition, sanction for E.E.G. building in the Department of Psychiatry has also been received.

## 2. Equipment:

The UGC sanctioned Rs.29 lakhs towards the equipments grant (including Rs. one lakh for workshop and Rs. one lakh for central animal house). The grants were utilised as under:

3. Books and Periodicals:

A grant of Rs. 3 lakhs was sanctioned for books and periodicals with a further grant of Rs, one lakh. The amount was utilized for the purchase of new books, periodicals, back volumes of journals. A certain percentage of grants was also utilised in appointing staff for processing of the books within the permissible quota. The expenditure incurred for the various purposes is given below:

## 4. <u>Staff</u>:

Besides that a number of other non-teaching posts (technical and para-medical) were also sanctioned. The appointments on these posts were spread over a period of 3 years. All the posts were filled in during the period, except for the following:

The Personal Promotion Scheme was also extended to the Institute and 4 Readers and 6 Lecturers were given the benefit of the scheme.

### 5. Creation of New Departments:

The following new Departments were set up during the 4th plan period:

- (1) Department of Otolaryngology
- (2) Department of Anaesthesiology
- (3) Department of Dental Surgery
- (4) Department of Psychiatry
- (5) Department of Biophysics
- (6) Department of Orthopaedics.

5. Upgrading of the College of Medical Sciences to the Institute:

The Executive Council of the University took the decision to establish the Institute of Medical Sciences by integrating all the Departments of the College, The proposal was approved by the Visitor in March 1971. The Institute of Medical Sciences came into existence with immediate effect. The list of the Departments of the Institute is given in Annexure-X.

### 7. Training Programme:

# (a) Undergraduate Training

During 4th plan period, the admissions to the undergraduate courses (M.B.B.S.) was reduced from 7.0 to 50 which enabled the staff to devote more time on postgraduate training and development of research in the Institute.

The following improvements took place in the undergraduate training programme during the period:-

- (a). Introduction of integrated teaching
- (b) Separating Pathology and Microbiology examination in the IInd Professional
- (c) Introducing the IIIrd Professional Part I examination comprising P.S.M. & Ophthalmology and E.N.T.
- (d) Full-fledged residential Internship Training at the Rural Health Centre (both for boys and girls).
  - (b) <u>Postgraduate Training</u>:

The main emphasis of development during the 4th plan period, had been on postgraduate training. During this period, the Institute had the credit of introducing postgraduate courses in all the broad-specialities, satisfactory inspection of the various examinations by the Medical Council and recognition of postgraduate qualifications by the Medical Council of India and their inclusion in the I schedule by the Central Government. The position of the postgraduate courses by the end of 4th plan is given in Annexure-XI.

# 8. Scholarships and Fellowships

The UGC approved 50% of the postgraduate students for postgraduate scholarship subject to a maximum of 40 per year tenable for a period of 2 years. This scheme worked till the introduction of the residency scheme from 1.1.1974.

#### 9. Residency Scheme:

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The Residency Scheme was introduced from 1st January 1974 in the clinical department and has now been extended to all the pre-para-clinical and clinical departments. The distribution of 210 residents (145 Junior and 65 Senior Residents) is given in the <u>Annexure</u> with the introduction of Residency Scheme, now all the postgraduates are paid.

10. New Schemes:

The following new schemes/projects were started in the Institute:

(i) <u>Neuro-Physiological Unit:</u> The scheme was sanctioned by the UGC with the following facilities:

> <u>Staff</u>: Research Officer ... 1 Sr.Technical Assistant ... 1 Equipment grant ... Rs.30,000/-

The Unit has been doing scientific studies on the effect of physical exercises with special reference to Yoga. These scientific studies have provided the ground work to start courses in Yoga and establishing a Yoga Centre in the University.

> (ii) Social Obstetrics, Social Paediatrics and Social Psychiatric Projects:

During the last 5 years, the Institute has taken up the above projects extending the services to the rural areas and taking up school health programmes. The Social Psychiatry has further secured international co-operation with the Netherland Government.

(iii) Human Reproduction and Population Dynamics. Scheme was started with the help of W.H.C.

#### 11. Research:

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The Institute has adopted research as a part of the postgraduate training programme. Besides that teachers are engaged in the various research projects both departmentally and individually. Many of these research projects were financed during the last plan period by the agencies like I.C.M.R., C.S.I.R., U.G.C., PL-480 etc. Almost all the Departments have started Ph.D. programme: in their subjects.

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#### 12. Conference and Seminars:

The Institute has been venue of many of all-India Conferences, Seminars. A list of the Seminar/Conferences organised during the period from 1970-1974 is given in Annexure-XIII.

### 13. Publications:

The staff of the Institute has contributed a large number of research papers, besides a number of books and monographs. Some of the teachers had the privilege to represent international conferences.

#### Hospital Expansion: 14.

The most significant development has been the development of the hospital attached to the Institute of Medical Sciences. The UGC approved 550 bedded hospital with necessary buildings, equipments and recurring maintenance grant. The building complex includes accommodation for indoor-wards, O.P.D., hostel for operation theatre, laundry, kitchen and other auxillary buildings. The O.P.D. building has been completed and occupied. It has solved the problem of shortage of out-door accommoda-tion to a great extent.

# PART-IV - FIFTH PLAN DEVELOPMENT PROPOSALS

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osals:

5,1 The University Grants Commission had requested the Banaras Hindu University to formulate its proposals relating to medical education for the 5th five-year plan period within an allocation of Rs.1.50 crores in two priorities - first priority Rs.1.00 crore and the second priority Rs.0.50 crore. This allocation does not include the requirements of the hospitals.

5.2 The Banaras Hindu University, against the above allocation formulated proposals involving a financial outlay of B.1.65 crores in two phases ~ first phase Rs. 1.00 crore and the second phase Rs. 0.65 crore. In addition, proposals outside this allocation have also been made for the consideration of the Commission.

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5.3 The break-up of the financial implications of the proposals is given below:

5.4 The Institute has envisaged the following objectives during the 5th five-year plan period:

- To produce doctors (general practitioners, specialists as well as super-specialists) who can serve the society efficiently in their respective professional settings in India.
- (2) To train medical teachers who can effectively re-orientate the medical education in various disciplines in the Medical Colleges of India towards the needs of the country. In this connection, the Institute aims to start the

postgraduate training programme in various super-specialities leading to the award of Degree of M.Ch. and D.M. in the 5th plan period as a major programme of activity.

- (3) To train research workers who can conduct research on fundamental, applied and operational research on the problems of national importance.
- (4) To strengthen various specialised clinical service in specialities in the Institute's Hospital.
- (5) To cultivate integrated service training and practice in rural medicine.

5.5 The Institute has given the following priorities to its proposals:

- (1) Development of specialities
- (2) Strengthening of the existing departments
- (3) New schemes including (a) Central laboratory (b) setting up of Department of Bio-medical Engineering (c) community medicine (d) postgraduate hostel (e) additional floor in the building (f) administrative staff etc.

# 5.6 Development of Specialities:

The Institute during the 5th plan period plans to introduce pestgraduate courses leading to the award of D.M. and M.Ch. in various super-specialities in the Departments of Medicine and Surgery.

# 5.7 Consolidation of existing Departments:

During the 4th plan period some new postgraduate courses were started and a number of new Departments were set up. Certain basic facilities in respect of paraclinical and other staff are needed for the independent functioning of these Departments. The university has included the requirements for the strengthening of the existing Departments in the 5th plan proposals.

#### 5.8 New Departments:

The university proposes to establish the following new departments in the 5th plan period:

- (i) Department of Radio Therapy and Cancer Research
- (ii) Department of Bio-medical Engineering

## 5.9 Other Proposals:

Other proposals included within the allocation suggested by the UGC relate to the following:

- (1) Central Services
- (2) Administrative Office
- (3) Students Amenities
- (4) Requirements common for all
- (5) Training of Community Medicine
   (Rural Areas)
- (6) Central Clinical Laboratory

# 5.10 Central Services:

This includes (1) Surgical Research Laboratory, (2) Central Animal House, (3) Central Workshop including Gas House (4) Art and Photo Section, (5) Institute Library and (6) Mortuary Complex.

5.11 The requirements common for all Departments/ Sections include equipment, office equipment, furniture, books, racks, Telephone exchange, multi-purpose hall, additional floor in the existing building, space for godown and garrages and laboratory maintenance etc.

P.T.0.

The proposals outside allocation include the following:

- (1) 200 more beds in the hospital of the Institute so as to raise its bed strength from 550 to 750
- (2) More scholarships for students and research workers
- (3) Financial assistance for taking over of Kashi Kushtha Sewa Sangh, Sarnath
- (4) More staff quarters.

5.12 The Commission has, prior to the visit of the Committee, already accepted a few proposals of the Institute. These are given in <u>Annexure-XV</u>. This interalia includes the introduction of M.Ch. and D.M. courses in Surgery and Medicine.

# <u>FART V - VIEWS OF VICE-CHANCELLOR AND</u> OTHERS

The Vice-Chancellor, Director, Plan Co-ordination, Director of the Institute, Heads of Departments and Sections inter-alia made the following observations:

(1) The Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University and the S.S. Hospital attached to it provide training to the students at the undergraduate and the postgraduate level. The S.S. Hospital of the Institute has been catering the needs of the necple of Eastern U.P., Northern Bihar and other adjoining States.

(2) The Institute had originally submitted proposals involving a financial outlay of %.4.39 crores for the five years' duration of the plan in the background of the aims and objectives of the Institute in the 5th plan period. However, the UGC requested the university to formulate their 5th plan proposals for the development of medical education within an allocation of %.1.5 crores in two priorities, the first being 2/3rd of the total allocation and the second of the remaining 1/3rd. While recasting the plan proposals as desired by the UGC within the suggested allocation, the Institute had to abandon many projects which are originally included in the plan proposals of the Institute. (3) The scope of development of the Institute during the remaining plan period will be further reduced if the amount of spill over forms the first charge of the plan allocation suggested by the UGC. The university requests the UGC to treat spill over outside the allocation

(4) The Institute has started postgraduate courses (M.Ch. and D.M.) in various specialities in the Departments of Medicines and Surgery from July 1976. The UGC has already conveyed its no objection to start the courses and to include the requirements if any under the 5th plan allocation. The staff included for the specialitie is the minimum requirements for functioning of each speciality keeping in view the recommendations of the Medical Council of India in this regard. The university has also included the requirements of 200 additional beds for meeting the minimum requirements of Medical Council of India in the specialities which may be provided as the firs charge against the 5th plan allocation of the Hospital.

(5) Several new postgraduate courses were started and a number of new departments were set up without adequate additional inputs. Certain basic facilities in respect of para-clinical and administrative staff are absolutely necessary for the effective independent functioning of these departments. In some cases like skin and V.D., T.B. and chest diseases and Micro-biology, the deficiency of staff and space has also been pointed out by the Inspectors of Medical Council of India and this delayed recognition of postgraduate degrees in these subjects.

(6) There is an acute shortage of accommodation for postgraduate students also. The university had requested the U.G.C. for a postgraduate hostel, as the available accommodation is not sufficient. The proposal was approved by the UGC at one stage, but could not be finalized. In this connection, the Committee noted that the university was advised by the U.G.C. to provide the hostel accommodation for medical students out of its plan allocation for the university.

(7) With the creation of many new departments, development of the Institute in the 4th plan, introduction of postgraduate courses in all the specialities, sanction of various projects and schemes by other agencies, the existing accommodation in the present building which was mainly planned for undergraduate training has been found insufficient. During the last inspection of the Department of Microbiology, the Inspector found that the Department of Microbiology has not the adequate space for its development and activities.

(8) According to the requirements of the Medical Council of India for an undergraduate institution, at least one lecture theatre with the capacity of 1,000 students in the institution is necessary, basides, an auditorium. The original plan of the building had a provision for an auditorium which could not materialise. The Institute has only 3 lecture theatres with the capacity of 100 to 150 students. There is a great difficulty in organising joint meeting of the students and staff, conferences and seminars, clinical meetings and examinations for want of a proper hall. The need for multi-purpose hall with a sitting capacity of 1,000 has been badly felt during all the years.

(9) The Institute has over a dozen vehicles with 2 garages. Similarly, there is no space for storage (godowns) which are felt essential,

(10) The process of development of specialities was started during the 4th plan. Some specialities like -Cardiology, Cardiothoracic Surgery, Urology etc. could not be properly developed, because the equipments required for these Departments involved a huge sum.

(11) One of the main problems is with regard to the purchase of office equipments like type-writers, duplicators, water-cooler which can not be purchased out of the equipments grant. Almost all the specialities and the Departments need such facilities periodically for replacement of old office equipments as well as for the new requirements.

(12) The building had the provisions of intercommunication with conduit pipes laid down, the wiring and installation of internal telephone equipments could never be done for want of necessary funds. The internal communication system is badly felt to save time and energy.

(13) During the course of years with the development of the departments, introduction of postgraduate training programme, more number of postgraduate students, additional sanction of staff during the 4th plan and creation of many new departments, there is acute shortage of furniture both for laboratory, seminar and demonstration rooms and office furniture.

(14) The last Visiting Committee did not make any recommendations on the requirements of administrative and clerical staff during the 4th plan and left the matter for the university from its own resources. It may be stated here that no administrative and clerical staff could be provided to the Institute which has grossly affected the smooth functioning of the Departments of the Institute and the implementation of various programmes through the main

administrative office of the Institute. It may be pointed out that a number of Departments were set up during the 4th plan period with no administrative and ministerial staff sanctioned to the Departments. The recommendation of the Committee for giving autonomy cannot be considered unless adequate administrative staff is provided.

(15) There is no provision of scholarship for the undergraduate students which can attract the meritorious and ranking students to join the Institute. Inspite of the efforts to maintain all-India character of the Institute, the fact is that only such students who are not selected in other medical colleges or who belong to near by places, only join the Institute. If adequate provision is made for some kind of scholarships for the undergraduate students, this can enable the Institute to maintain high standard of undergraduate teaching.

(16) Although the Institute has introduced Ph.D. programme in all the Departments, there is no provisions of fellowships for the Ph.D. students other than the opportunity to work under some schemes. The Ph.D. programme have proved helpful in promoting the research activities in the Departments. Somekind of fellowship for Ph.D. or research work has been considered essential.

(17) During the last few years, it has been felt that in order to promote the research, the teachers should be provided with adequate facilities for promoting research such as adequate provision for attending the conferences in India and abroad, deputation of postgraduate students to participate in the conferences, typing facilities by providing pool of typist centrally or reimbursing typing charges. Provisions for stationery and postage including reimbursement to the cost of reprints.

(18) Due to increased cost of journals and for want of an annual grant for the journals, a number of journals had to be discontinued in the past. The list of such journals is enclosed (<u>Annexure\_XXII</u>).

(19) For the development of super-specialities, the Institute needs 200 beds so that adequate training may be given as recognised by the Medical Council of India. This may be considered as first charge on the hospital's allocation during the 5th plan.

(20) The proposals made by the Institute are the barest minimum. The university requests the acceptance of the proposals in toto in the interest of the advancement of university education in general and the medical education in particular.

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(21) The allocation of 210 residents have been made depending upon the local needs as per details given to the Committee. Out of 210 residents, strength of Senier Residents is only 65. For the proper training, more posts of Senior Residents are needed. In super-specialities at least two Senior Residents should be provided in each speciality so that a minimum of one student may be admitted to the D.M./M.Ch. every year. Further most of the Departments are extending their services to the rural areas under three-tier health care programme and other schemes. For service programmes also more senior posts of Residents are needed. In pre and para-clinical departments Senior Residents are needed for imparting postgraduate training and organizing research activities besides hospital schemes in the Departments like Pathology and Microbiology.

### Meeting with the Teachers:

The Committee met the representatives of teachers who requested for the revision of their pay scales and the N.P.A. The note given by the representatives to the Committee is enclosed (<u>Annexure-XXI</u>). The representative were told that according to the policy of the Commission, teachers of all the faculties in a university will be in the same scale of pay.

#### Meeting with the Students:

The Committee met the representatives of the students and the residents. The representatives requested for additional facilities in the Institute, hospital and in the hostels. Their main demands are summarized below:

(1) Auditorium with 1500 capacity, (2) more funds for books and journals, (3) setting up of the book bank in the Institute, (4) at least 1/3rd of the students be provided with scholarships, (5) increased funds for extracurricular activities, sports and games, (6) improved canteen facilities, co-operative general stores and stationary, (7) provision for diploma courses such as D.C.H., D.C.P.., D.T.C.D. etc.

## Hospital:

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(1) More beds atleast 400 in the hospital, (2) more technicians, nursing staff and choukidars in the hospital and 0.P.D., (3) bank and P & T office in the hospital for patients and their attendants, (4) increase in X-ray film quota and provision for special investigations, (5) provision for cheap drugs store round the clock, (6) air-conditioning of library, labour room, 0.T'.S., nursing, intensive care unit etc., (7) opportunities for visiting other centres in

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the country and abroad, (8) public telephone booths in hospitals and hostels, (9) improved and subsidised food and canteen services, (10) refrigerators for every ward for keeping samples, blood and drugs, (11) projectors in each 0.P.D. for teaching, seminars and discussions etc., (12) provision for drugs and food for attender patients in general wards and (13) refreshments to emergency duty doctors.

#### Hostel:

(1) More hostel facilities atleast 250 rooms for residents, (2) furnishing of existing hostels,
(3) accommodation for married couples, (4) improved facilities for common rooms, reading rooms and library for every hostel, (5) improved mess and canteen services in the hostels, (7) fans in each hostel, (7) covered badminton courts and tennis courts in the hostels.

3. Meeting with Senior Technical Assistants, Research Officers of the Surgical Laboratory and Casualty Medical Officers, S.S.Hospital:

The Committee received representations from Senio: Technical Assistants, Casualty Officers and the Research Officers of the Surgical Research Laboratory. These representations are attached as <u>Annexure XXI</u>.

The Research Officers of the Surgical Research Laboratory have requested for the benefits at par with the teachers of the university. It has been stated by them the they are considered non-teachers and as such they were not given the benefit of:- (1) upgradation and revision of grades like teachers, (2) deputation to conferences and symposia, NPA, etc. like the other teachers of the universi

### Senior Technical Assistants:

The Senior Technical Assistants have some avenues of promotion in their cadre. It wasstated that some of the have rendered about 10-15 years service.

The casualty medical officers of the S.S.Hospital represented about the revision of their pay scales from the existing Rs.300/- p.m.

The non-teaching staff of the Institute also requested the Committee to provide additional administrativ staff in order to cope with the amount of work. It was stated by them that no additional staff was provided during the 4th five-year plan period.

### PART VI - GENERAL OBSERVATIONS

The Committee makes the following general observations:

1. The Institute of Medical Sciences at Banaras is one of the finest medical institutions in our country where the staff are devoted and dedicated and where uniformally excellent work is going on in most of the Departments. As in any big institution, there are some areas of deficiency which need to be improved and supported.

2. Almost all the Departments responsible for imparting training are well-staffed, equipped and are having sufficiently good programme of teaching and training the students. Looking to the increasing cost of equipments; materials and books for the library and the increasing number of the patients for the medical services attending the Institute the proposals which have been put by the Institute of Medical Sciences are reasonably justified and need to be supported.

3. The university should give the highest priority to consolidate the existing Departments at the Institute of Medical Sciences. This is the most urgent need of the Institute.

40 Emphasis should be given on rural health programme both for boys and girls at the undergraduate level so that these graduates should be encouraged to go in the rural areas either for service or for their own private practice, There should be sufficient incentives for the medical graduates to look for service or practice in the rural area with the advancement of medical science so that the benefit of advancement of modern medical sciences could reach to the rural population through the services of our doctor. The rural health programme of the Institute of Medical Sciences is fairly well organised, It is, however, essential to consolidate the programme by sanctioning the necessary requirements and staff as the benefits of such programme will lead to significant improvement of Medical relief and over-all training of undergraduate and postgraduate students.

5. In our rural areas the medical services are not adequate. This does not rule out the possibility to developing the super-specialities by introducing postgraduate courses leading to the award of D.M. and M.Ch. degrees in the various super-specialities in the Departments of Medicine and Surgery. The development of postgraduate courses has its

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own place in medical education, but should not let the undergraduate courses be inadequate or suffer in any way in order to look for more postgraduate and Ph.D. courses. The basis of our medical education should have sound footing before it should develop the super-specialities and postgraduate courses.

6. The Institute has introduced postgraduate courses leading to the award of M.Ch. and D.M. degrees in the various specialities of the Departments of Surgery and Medicine from July 1976. The U.G.C. has already conveyed its no objection to start the courses and to include the requirements if any in the 5th plan allocation. The Institute has asked for staff etc. for functioning of each speciality keeping in view the recommendations of the Medical Council of India. They have also included the requirements of 200 additional beds for meeting the minimum requirements of Medical Council of India in the specialitie which may be provided out of the hospital funds as the first charge of the hospital allocation during the 5th five-year plan period.

The D.M. and the M.Ch. courses have been introduce from July 1976 in respect of the following super-epecialiti in the Departments of Medicine and Surgery, Students have also been registered in these specialities as indicated below:

- (a) The consolidation of the existing programmes of teaching and research at theInstitute be given higher priority over the programmes of introducing D.M. and M.Ch. courses.
- **(**b**)** There is a great demand to have trained medical teachers in various disciplines in the Medical Colleges of India. In order to develop the medical teachers training programme in the Institute, it is very much desirable to start the super-specialities leading to degree of M.Ch. and D.M. at the Institute. At present, most of the medical and dental colleges have the teaching staff who hardly had any training in the teaching programme, hence they do possess the knowledge in their own specialities, but some of them lack in presentation and not able to carry out the teaching programme successfully. The modern aids in imparting education have improved and those aids should be utilised by the medical and dental teachers to have effective teaching in the institutions. The lead taken by the Institute of Medical Sciences is really praise worthy and the Institute must take this up with their best efforts to develop this programme. But while doing this, the Institute must keep in view the potential and facilities available in the various Sections of Medicine and Surgery in line with the norms laid down by the Medical Council of India in this regard.

Out of the existing Sections, Plastic Surgery, Paediatfic Surgery, Thoracic Surgery, Urology and Neurosurgery have been carrying out good work inspite of the limited beds allotted to them and very inadequate equipments and staff available to them. The quality of the work carried out in the Departments of Pediatric Surgery, Plastic Surgery and Urology would make them eligible to hold M.Ch. course provided they are given required beds and staff immediately. The Department of Neurosurgery will have to increase its total work output further. The Department of Thoracic Surgery and Cardiology are unable to carry

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out any open heart programme and cardiac catheter work respectively because of total lack of most essential facilities such as heart lung machine and cardiac catheter set up etc. Whether these two Sections can conduct the M.Ch. course should be decided by the Indian Medical Council as soon as possible.

(d) Similarly in the Department of Medicine exception for the Section of Neurology other Sections may wait till the requisite facilities are made available to introduce D.M. course. The Committee supports the introduction of D.M. SNeurology at this stage for others the M.C.I. be invited to adise.

- (e) It is, however, essential to support all those Sections where the Committee has not recommended the introduction of M.Ch. and D.M.courses and provide them with the required facilities for the benefit of the needy patients in the Eastern U.P., Western Bihar and Northern parts of M.P. In an Institute like the Institute of Medical Sciences, it is essentiat to have higher training facilities. It would be wrong not to support these superspecialities at this stage as it will further weaken areas which are already weak.
- (f) The Committee recommends that each Section of Medicine and Surgery be headed by a Professor and the university may think of upgrading these Sections into independent Departments in course of time. The Committee recommends the provision of Professor in all the Section of the Departments of Surgery and Medicine where such faculty positions are not available
- (g) The university has already registered student in the various super-specialities of medicine and surgery (page 36 ). It has not been possible for the Committee to recommend the introduction of all the super-specialities in medicine and surgery as discussed earlier in the report. The Committee is, however, inclined to suggest that the students already admitted may be allowed to complete their studies without any difficulty. The future registration of students may, however, be made in accordance with the observations of the Committee.

7. While distributing the beds in the new hospital, one will have to take into consideration the special requirements of each Department. It will be essential to provide facilities for central oxygenation and central suction in special areas where critically ill patients will be kept as soon as possible. In the new hospital building basement should be utilised for Mortuary and postmortem work.

8. The Department of Radiotherapy and Cancer Therapy should be grouped under the Department of Oncology with joint control from the Radiotherapist and surgical staff incharge Cancer Surgery.

9. The Committee suggests the creation of Central Clinical Laboratory (Bio-Chemical and Pathelogical) which will improve the laboratory facilities available to the patients and better utilization of the staff and equipments.

10. The Committee feels that it would be necessary to establish a separate Department of Immunology with complete collaboration from the Department of Pathology, Micro-Biology and Bio-Chemistry and Transplanation Surgery, Establishment of an independent Department will lead to further strengthening of this very important discipline at the Institute.

11. Steno-typist-cum-clerical staff must be supplied to each Department. The UGC should study the total requirements taking into consideration the senior staff attached to each Department and the work-load. To start with one steno-typist should be sanctioned for each Department immediately.

12. With the increase in the required staff and the postgraduate students at the Institute, it will be most essential to provide suitable living quarters and hostels for the staff and students as soon as possible.

13. A suitable sized auditorium and place for students gymnasium should be provided if possible close to the Institute.

14. A few posts of Readers and Lecturers are lying vacant besides some posts of Professors. The university has appointed temporary Lecturers against most of these posts. In the opinion of the Committee this is not a healthy arrangement and the university should take urgent steps to make regular and permanent appointments against these posts. The Committee, in its report of each Department has expressed its concern about the filling up of vacant posts.

The Banaras Hindu University is a Central University and used to have an all-India character in regard to the composition of students and faculty, However, in recent years the student enrolment has been mostly from the States of U.P. and Bihar. This is also true by and large in respect of the Institute of Medical

Sciences. The Committee suggests that the Institute should strive to retain its all-India character and attract students from all over the country. It would be desirable to provide scholarships and fellowships for attracting the students from all over the country.

The Committee also suggests that the Institute 16. should attract the best teachers, scholars and researchers from all over the country and even from abroad. It should take all possible steps to avoid inbreeding. Highly qualified staff from outside will bring in new outlook and freshness to the Departments and the university.

Four Readers and 5 Lecturers were given the 17. benefit of personal promotion scheme in various departments. The present position of such faculty have been taken into consideration while assessing the over-all needs of these departments. The situation will, however, change as and when these positions fall vacant. At that stage, it would be desirable to provide positions corresponding to the personal promotions so as to keep the optimum faculty positions in the concerned departments in order to cope with its programmes of teaching and research.

#### PART VII: PROPOSALS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

The proposals made by the Institute are discussed in the following pages of the report along with the recommendations of the Committee:

#### DEPARTMENT OF ANATOMY 1.

The Department of Anatomy was established in 1960. 1. It offers courses leading to the award of the degrees of M.B.B.S., M.S., Ph.D. and other degrees/diplomas such as D.Av.M., B.P.Ed. and Nursing.

3. The faculty of the department includes one Professor, three Readers and one Lecturer. Posts of one Lecturer is lying vacant. The vacant post may be filled early.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: Teratology, Sexing of bones and Neuroanatomy. 159 research papers were published by the faculty so far. One research project financed by I.C.M.R. is being pursued in the department. The faculty participated in several International and National Conferences.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:-

- (i) To develop the department further on teratological research which would include facilities for doing work in cytogenetics and tissue/organ culture along with the use of electronmicroscopy;
- (ii) To develop Neuro-anatomy for training both to undergraduate and postgraduate students.

The Committee makes the following observations:

(a) The department has been doing commendable research work in the area of Teratology and Neuroanatomy. It has a well-established museum.

(b) Some of the deficiencies of the department are:

(i) Heavy teaching load, (ii) lack of technical staff, (iii) lack of senior faculty position to teach Neuro-anatomy, Histology and Embryology, (iv) lack of equipment such as cryostat, orthomat, microscope, mortuary cooling plant etc., (v) inadequate grant to meet the increased cost of animals and chemicals.

(c) The department is one of the finest departments of anatomy in the country. The standard of knowledge of postgraduate students was excellent. However, this was not so at the undergraduate level because of the significant dearth of teachers. The quality of research work in teratology and neuro-anatomy is very high. The publications from the department in the national and international journals are of very high standard. The department has a very good artist section.

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7. The Committee recommends additional faculty, other staff and provision for books, journals and equipment during the 5th plan period.

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3. The faculty of the department includes one Professor, three Readers and four Lecturers. Posts of two Lecturers are lying vacant. The vacant posts may be filled early. The Committee noted that one temporary Lecturer was working against one post.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of:- (a) Neuro-Physiology, (b) Cardiovasentor, Physiology, (c) Nutrition, (d) Endocrinology and Reproductive Physiology, (e) Respiratory Physiology. 49 research papers were published by the faculty during 1971-76. 8 projects financed by I.C.M.R./U.G.C./C.S.I.R./ I.C.A.R. and U.S.E.F.I. etc. are being pursued in the department. The faculty participated in various International and National Conferences.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:-

- (i) Expansion of Neuro-physiology unit.
- (ii) Development of Endocrinology and Reproductive Physiology Unit.
- (iii) To develop sports medicine unit in collaboration with the Department of Physical Education of the university.
- (iv) Development of the various research plans of the Department.

6. The Committee makes the following observations:

(a) The Units of Neurophysiology, Endocrinology and Re-productive Physiology were established in the 4th plan period. Three faculty members are abroad for training in Neuro-physiology, Nutrition and Reproductive Physiology.

(b) There is an acute shortage of space in the department. This was also pointed out by the 4th plan Visiting Committee to be provided by adjustment, but could not be done. In addition, funds are also needed for equipment to be imported. The important licences had been already obtained.

7. The Physiology Department is well-developed and has a very strong group, particularly the Neuro-Physiology and the Physiology of Intestinal absorption group. The Committee was impressed with the overall growth of the department.

8. The Committee recommends additional faculty and provision for books, journals, equipment and accommodation during the 5th plan period:

3. The faculty of the department includes one Professor, two Readers and one Lecturer. No post is lying vacant.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: Biochemistry and Molecular Biology covering (i) Analytical enzymes as diagnostic and prognostic tools in cancer, (ii) Ascorbic acid statute in thyroid disorders, (iii) Neurochemistry, (iv) Molecular basis of host-virus interaction, (v) Cell structure and function. 161 research papers were published by the faculty so far. 10 projects financed by I.C.M.R./U.G.C./ C.S.I.R./D.S.T., D.A.E. and Jane Cottin Childs Memorial Fund for Medical Research etc. are being pursued in the department. The faculty participated in many International and National Conferences.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

(i) Reorientation of training in Biochemistry for undergraduate students as per recommendations of Medical Council of India and all round improvement of the postgraduate training in view of the introduction of residency programme.

- (ii) Raising the research standard to the highest possible level (studying clinical problems at molecular level). The specific interest will be in the field of Viral Etiology of cancer and metabolic disorders in cardiac diseases.
- (iii) To develop Molecular Biology Unit, the department is actively engaged in researches mainly in the areas - (a) clinical biochemistry and (b) molecular biology. In the field of clinical biochemistry emphasis is being laid on cancer research and in the field of molecular biology the two areas picked up are - (i) molecular basis of host- virus interaction and (ii) structure and function of ribosome. During the 5th plan more emphasis will be laid on these areas.
- (iv) To develop the department as an advance centre in Molecular Medicine.

6. The Committee makes the following observations:

(a) The department has been doing commendable research work in the areas of Molecular Biology. The research activities of the department have been boosted by strong support from several granting organization of this country and abroad.

(b) The department lacks in faculty position and sophisticated instrumentation like Atomic absortiometer, spectrofluorimeter and automatic analyser,

(c) The Spinco Preparative Ultracentrifuge equipment was received under 12 million dollar scheme in a highly damaged condition with most of the electrical circuits and rotors missing. To put the instrument into operation and to have some extra accessories additional funds about &.1.5 lakhs would be required.

7. The Department of Biochemistry and its molecular biology unit has developed into a very well-known department in the country and some of the outstanding contributions have come from this department. The department has very well developed Ph.D. and M.D. programme and they have also been able to develop various facilities for bio-chemical and molecular biology studies. The Committee was impressed with the development of the department.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: (1) Radiation in Medical Biophysics,
(2) Studies on Monoamine oxidase and related enzymes,
(3) Macromolecular Biophysics of viruses and proteins,
(4) Viral Biophysics, (5) RBC membranes proteins,
(5) Cellular regulation and (6) Exercise and Stress.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

- The Committee makes the following observations:
  - (a) The department which started from scratch in 1971, is now equipped and recognised for M.B.B.S. and conducting M.D. (Biophysics) and Ph.D. courses.
  - (b) The department has produced the first M.D. (Biophysics) in the country.
  - (c) During the last Inspection by the Medical Council of India (September 1975), the Inspector pointed out the deficiencies of equipment and experienced staff in the areas of Biophysical Chemistry of proteins and lipids, Biochemical Engineering with electronics as a major background, Nuclear Medicine, Solid State Biophysics.
- (d) The department lacks of necessary office staff and space.

7. The development in the Department of Biophysics is very poor. The post of Professor is lying vacant and the Reader is on long leave. Considering the importance of this subject in the overall growth of the Basic Sciences in the Institute, the Committee feels that this department needs to be strengthened immediately and the university must fill up the vacant post of Professor in order to make the department a viable unit. The Committee suggests to the university to give special attention towards the development of this department.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: (i) Cardiovascular Pharmacology, (ii) Neuro-psycho-pharmacology, (iii) Gastric Pharmacology
(iv) Indigenous drug research, (v) Pharmacology of Poikilothermic animals; (iv) Biopharmaceutics and Phytochemistry and (vii) Clinical Pharmacology. 207 research papers were published by the faculty so far. 19 projects financed by I.C.M.R./U.G.C./I.C.A.R. and C.C.R.I.M.H. are being pursued in the department. The faculty participated in International and National Conferences.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

- (i) Starting and development of Clinical Pharmacology.
- (ii) Development of Autocoid Pharmacology.
  - (iii) Starting and development of Endocrine Pharmacology including reproduction.
  - (iv) To start postgraduate course in Clinical Pharmacy.

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The Committee makes the following observations:

(a) During the last five years, the following research laboratories were set up in the Department:

- (i) Psycho-neuro-pharmacology;
- (ii) Cardio-vascular Pharmacology;
- (iii) Castric Pharmacology;
  - (iv) Indigenous drug Pharmacology; and
- (v) Phytochemistry and Pharmaceutics.

(b) The department has been attracting research scholars from medical (including clinical) Veterinary, Pharmacy, Agriculture and Basic Sciences.

- (c) The research facilities of the department are used by:
  - (i) Other Institutes in India namely viz. C.D.R.I., Lucknow and Institute of Experimental Medicine, Calcutta.
    - (ii) Other Departments of Banaras Hindu University namely Pharmaceutics, Psychology and Chemistry.

- (iii) Other Departments of the Institute namely- Physiology, Medicinal Chamistry, Medicine, Paediatrics, Surgery, Anaesthesiology, Ophthalmology, Dermatology, Dravyaguna, Prasuti Tantra Tantra and Obst. & Gynaecology.
- (d) There is an acute shortage of space in the department. The 4th Plan Visiting Committee had suggested provision of 6000 sq.ft. floor area to be provided by adjustment. Only about 1000 sq.ft. could be provided.

7. The Pharmacology group is engaged in a good programme of Nuro-Pharmacology but the Clinic Pharmacology was found lacking in the department. The Committee feels that a Clinic Pharmacology unit may be started in collaboration with the Pharmacology Department.

3. The faculty of the department includes two Professors, three Readers and four Lecturers. Posts of two Lecturers are lying vacant. The vacant posts may be filled up early. It was noted that two temporary Lecturers are working against these posts.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: (i) Blood Coagulopathy, (ii) Erythrocyti enzymes and abnormal haemoglobins, (iii) Immunologlobul in changes in different pathological disorders and characterization of paraproteins, (iv) Studies on isoenzy mes, nutritional values of food items and Arginone toxins, (v) Morphological studies on various tumours. 300 research papers were published by the faculty from 1971. 8 projects financed by I.C.M.R., U.G.C. and C.S.I were undertaken in the department and completed. One project of the C.S.I.R. is in hand.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

- (i) To augment the development of sections of haematology, immunology and nutritional pathology.
- (ii) To develop the newer fields of: Ultramicrotomy and electron microscopy; Nutritional haematology; Neuro-pathology; Tumour immunity; Cytology.
- (iii)Blood banking facilities including blood fractionation techniques and lyophilisation.
- (iv) To consolidate the hospital laboratory facilities.

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- The Committee makes the following observations:
  - (a) The department has expanded and developed the laboratory facilities in some special areas. In <u>Haematology</u> large number of advanced technique were developed. Blood Coagulation laboratory was recognised as a national treatment centre for Haemophilia by World Federation of Haemophilia.
  - (b) Chemical Pathology Laboratory has been selected for Quality Control by Covernment of India as one of the 12 laboratories in the country.
  - (c) The Clinical Immunology Unit has developed a number of advanced immunological techniques which are available for research and hospital services.
  - (d) There is a shortage of microscopes, research microscopes and other equipment like, Spectrophotometer, a large Refrigerated Centrifuge, Cryostat. Facilities for Fractionation of Blood Components and Lyophilization of Plasma and its components at the Blood Bank are also lacking.

7. The Professor of Pathology is out of India on an another assignment. Apart from Morbat Anatomy and Histology, the Pathology is also responsible for Immunology, Nutritional Pathology, Neuro-Pathology and Haematology. In all these areas good work is being done and research papers published. The Committee noted that the department is concerned with the clinic biochemical responsibilities of the hospital. This in the opinion of the Committee needs to be rectified,

3. The faculty of the department includes one Professor, one Reader and one Lecturer. Posts of one Reader and one Lecturer are lying vacant. The vacant posts may be filled up early. It was noted that two temporary lecturers are working against these vacant posts.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of:- (i) Inheric Infections, (ii) Immunology (iii) Mycology and (iv) Mycobacteria. 40 research papers were published by the faculty during the last five years. Two projects financed by I.C.M.R. and C.S.I.R. are being pursued in the department.

5. The main objectives of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

- Consolidation of existing facilities by acquiring staff, space and equipment to obtain recognition of the Medical Council of India.
- (ii) To make the research efforts more community oriented.
- (iii) Consolidation of the Enteric Infection Unit, besides other units, like Bacteriology, Virology, Immunology, Serology, Parasitology and Mycology.
- (iv) As a future plan to start M.Sc. (Microbiology).
- 6. The Committee makes the following observations:
  - (a) The department is a well known centre for research and training in Medical Microbiology in general and Enteric Infections in particular.
  - (b) During the last inspection of the department by the Medical Council of India, the following deficiencies were pointed out by the Inspector because of which M.D. qualifification is yet to be recognised by the Medical Council of India.
    - (i) <u>Staff</u>: At least one additional post of Associate Professor and other technical and non-technical staff.
    - (ii) <u>Accommodation</u>: was found grossly inadequate. All available space (verandas, space under stair-case, corridors) already in use. No room for reception of specimens, for patient and personal giving specimen and collecting results, for recording an inquiry in the diagnosis system. No library and seminar room. Space for Clinical Microbiology insufficient. There is no room for P.G. laboratory and staff, animal experiment room. Space for breeding animals.

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(iii) Equipment: - Lack of cold room, deep freezes refrigerated high speed centrifuges, freeze drawing equipment Although some of the facilities have already been provided, the department is in badly need of additional space, some essential equipments, and additi nal staff to get the M.D. recognised by the Medical Council of India.

7. The work of the department is mainly service oriented. The research achievements are mainly in the field of Enteric Infections. The laboratory facilities for postgraduate training need to be improved. Accommod tion for Microbiological Laboratory is inadequate. The work in the field of Bacterial Immunology needs improvem

3. The faculty of the Department includes one Professor, one Reader and one Lecturer. Against the post of Lecturer, only temporary Lecturer is working. The post may be filled up permanently early.

(ii) To improve mortuary facilities.

(iii) To develop museum by acquiring additional space and facilities.

(iv) To organise Medical Legal Training to the Interns.

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The Committee makes the following observations:

(a) The department needs a mortuary complex, space for museum and furniture for post-mortum room for demonstration to undergraduate students.

(b) There is a need of authorisation for the teachers of the Department to conduct Medico-Legal Post-Mortum of Varanasi district. This has also been pointed out by the Inspector of Medical Council of India.

7. The Forensic Medicine Department has a good museum which has to be properly accommodated. The Autopsy is near the department and is not in a satisfactory state. A full Autopsy complex attached to the hospital complex is essential.

3. The faculty of the department includes one Professor one Reader and five Lecturers. Posts of one Professor and Two Readers are lying vacant. The vacant posts may be filled early. It was noted that one temporary Lecturer was working against the vacant post of Reader.

4. The research work in the department is being done in the areas of: (a) Studies on M.C.H. & F.P. (b) Operational research studies in organisation of community health services (c) Epidemiological studies in communicable diseases specially cholera, enteric infections and filariasis (d) Research in Social Aspects of Health and (e) Research in Rural Health Planning. 421 research papers were published by the faculty so far. 5 projects financed by I.C.M.R./U.G.C./I.C.S.S.R. and Government of India etc. are being pursued in the department. The department is to collaborate with the Liverpool University for Postgraduate Training and Research under the B.U.C. Programme. The programme is yet to be implemented.

5. The main objective of the department during the 5th plan period are as under:

- (i) To consolidate the existing training programme with additional staff (field and teaching) as per recommendations of Medical Council of India
- (ii) To develop research in Rural Health Planning & Social aspects of Rural Health.
- (iii) To organise Epidemiological Unit and develop Statistical Section with more and resources.
- (iv) Urban Health Centre inputs as per recommendations of the Medical Council of India.

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- The Committee observed that:-
  - (a) The department has given a tremendous push to the field training programme.
  - (b) Rural Health Centre Unit has been established through donations of the land from the public; Urban Health Centre is being run as a registered Kalyan Samiti in a building at a token rent of Rs.1/-.
  - (c) The field examination pattern of the department has been a unique achievement which is being followed in many other universities in the country.
  - (d) Research scholars from Science Faculty use P.G. laboratory for water chemistry and water bactariology. Training facilities at the Urban and Rural Health Centre are availed by Regional Family Planning Centre, Kashi Vidyapith, Social Science Faculty and Nursing Schoolof the Institute.
  - (e) The department has remodelled the University Health Services, provide Comprehensive Health Care through scientific utilisation of resources. The department is also organising a General Practice Unit in the University Health Centre.
- Some of the deficiencies of the department are:
  - (a) Permanent structure for the laboratory preferably within the main building.
  - (b) Statistical laboratory required airconditioning.
  - (c) The old shorter counter has to be replaced.
  - (d) Shortage of space for the department.
  - (e) At Rural Health Centre adequate hostel staff, housing facilities and a diesel operated vehicle.

1. The Section of Paediatric Surgery was established in 1967. It offers courses leading to the award of the degrees of M.B.B.S., M.S. and M.Ch.

2. The faculty of the Section includes one Reader and one Lecturer. No post is lying vacant.

3. The research work in the Section is being done in the areas of Hydrocephalics, Imperforate anus, variahe calcerlus, Post Urethral valves and Faediatric Surgery problems. 120 Research papers and 14 books were published by the faculty so far.

4. The main objectives of the Section during the Fifth Plan period are as under :

(i) Development of the Speciality for proper training facilities for M.Ch. & patients care.

4. The main objectives of the Section during the Fifth Plan period are as under :

- (ii) To provide open heart surgery facilities to the patients of U.F., Bihar and Crissa, where it is not done.

#### 5. The Committee makes the following observations :

(a) At present Cardio Thoracic Surgery Section has only lo sanctioned beds but in the new hospital it is proposed to sanction 25 beds. The facilities for C.T. out-patient clinic are satisfactory. Nearly 3,000 case are examined every year and approximately 250 major operations are carried out every year.

The Section is carrying out advanced Esophegeal and Fulmonary Surgery and some Vascular Surgery. Closed heart surgery for Rheumatic heart disease and simple congenital heart disease is being performed. So far only one open heart operation has been carried out. Although the members of the staff are M.Ch. qualified and well experienced Surgeons but have not been able to carry out any advance surgery because of the lack of facilities mainly for the open heart surgery. The Department has carried out some clinic research work and has published and presented papers at National and International Conferences.

At present, the quality of work and the equipment supplied to the Department does not qualify the require ments of the Indian Medical Council, to hold the MoCh. course in Thoracic Surgery. However, since the reference work is considerable and members of the staf well qualified and experienced, in the interest of medical relief and higher medical training, it will be worthwhile starting the establishment of this superspeciality at the Institute as soon as possible.

It has got only few E.C.G. machines, one Cardiac Monitor, one Defibrillator with Pace Maker, 2 Coronary Care Units, Because of lack of facilities, the Section has not carried out even signle Cardiac Catheterisation. Fesearch contributions from the Section are average. The D.M. Course has been introduced with effect from July 1976. In view of the position stated above, the Committee feels that it would not be appropriate to start course in D.M. in Cardiolo mless and until the necessary equipments sauctioned for the Department and the quality of the specialised work is improved. The staff of the Department, is, however, enthusia stic. The Committee feels that it would be advisable to establish a separate Department of Cardiology at this stage.

- (ii) Out of the total seven centres allotted in whole of India by I.C.M.R. for the study of "Cooxdinated study in the prevalence and incidence of blindness in the country" the department was one of them.

- 111) The research facilities and equipments are being utilized by other Departments, namely, Pharmacology, Pathology, Microbiology, Medicine, Surgical Research Laboratory and Department of Estany, B.H.U. etc.
- The Department lacks in : (a) Beds, presently the (iv) Department has only 48 general beds and 2 special beds (Wards) for catering the meds of relatively less attended and economically backward population in Eastern U.P. Every year specially during winter a large number of patients are refused admission for Cataract Operation owing to shortage of Hospital Beds; (b) There is an urgent need of a separate operation theatre exclusively for Eye Department where only aseptic operations are to be performed. (c) Some important appliances are needed for proper research as well as relief work e.g. Latest Model Synoptophore, Tonography Set, Electro Ratinography Machine, Operating Microscope, Visual Field Analysor etc. (d) Shortage of space.

7. The Department is doing very good work in Clinical Medical Relief, Medical Education and Clinical Research. The Committee recommends that the Institute may provide a separate operation theatre to the Department in the new building.

- (a) The Department lacks in staff as per recommendations of the Medical Council of India. There is a shortage of beds and essential equipment in the Department.
- (b) As regards proposals of starting the M.D.S. course in the Department of Dental Surgery in the speciality of Operative Dentistry, the Committee feels that it may be premature at this stage to introduce such a course although the Academic Council of the Uni-versity has accepted and passed this proposal. Before planning the postgraduate course in the various specialities of Dental Surgery, the Committee is of the view that it is absolutely necessary to start an undergraduate course leading to the Degree of Bachelor of Dental Surgery (B.D.S.). It

is a four year course which could be started with a small student enrolment of say about 10 only. The Committee is strongly of the view that without having B.D.S. course of high standard and quality there will be lot of difficulties in conducting the M.D.S. course directly. The Committee suggests that introduction of the M.D.S. course may be postponed at this stage till the B.D.S, course has been implemented successfully.

(c) Dr. Bhargava suggested the creation of a Dental College at the Banaras Hindu University. A copy of the proposal formulated by him is enclosed as Annexure 16.

4. The main objectives of the Department during the Fifth Plan Period are as under:-

For the letter activity the department has the necessary facilities of equipment on account of the two PL-480 projects and the Indo-Danish project. Apart from this, researc facilities are extended to various other clinical, biomedical and basic science departments.

Tissue Culture and Election Microscopy: The laboratory is engaged in organotype culture work, where various types of tissues including bone, skin, thyroid, liver and gonad are grown in vitro. In addition to these, effect of vitamins, hormones and some indigenous drugs on the growth and regeneration oftissue is also studied. Electron microscopic investigation of such tissues is also carried out. This laboratory is providing facilities for the training of guest scientists in culture and electron microscopy.

Phytochemistry and Pharmacology: This group is primarily engaged in screening of oral contraceptives and is partly financed by Central Council for Research in Indian Medicine and Homeopathy.

Synthetic Organic Medicinal Chemistry: A group of investigators are engaged in the synthesis of some typical sulphur containing compounds which might prove as potential antithyroid, antitubucular and anticancerous agents. They are particularly interested in the synthes of certain derivatives of thiourea, thiels and other related compounds with potent biological activity.

6 In this connection the committee took note of the fol Vowing observations made by the 4th plan Visiting Committee on the Surgical Research Laboratory:

"The Committee was pleased to see the organisation of the surgical research laboratory and the good work being produced. However, it was noted that similar facilities had not been provided for the other clinical departments, both for their research and postgraduate thesis It is suggested that a central division work. of experimental medicine and surgery be created under the Principal where the staff of all clinical departments will have equal facilities for carrying on original research and where postgraduates will have the opportunity to carry on experimental research for their thesis work. The surgical research laboratory should be merged with this division. It is also suggested that the photo and art section should be a part of this division. This envisages a collaborative set up with the facilities and expertise of the pre-clinical and para-clinical department also available and vice-versa. The University be requested to prepare the detailed plans for this division and submit the same to the Commission for consideration."

The Committee also noted that the above recommendations of the 4th Plan Visiting Committee could not be given effect to. The Committee endcrses the above ob-servation of the 4th Plan Visiting Committee and suggest that further action be taken early in this regard. ## 2. CENTRAL ANIMAL HOUSE

1 The Central Animal House of the Institute was sanctioned under 4th Plan. It started functioning in its new building from the session 1975-76. The new building has the facilities like breeding, experiments etc.

2. The Institute have been using a large number of animals for experimental research. Most of these animals are procured from different agencies which involve lot of finances. It is planned to raise the new Central Animal House, Colony of known strains of animaks like rats, mice, rabbits and guineapigs to cater the needs of all the Departments of the Institute.

3 The present staff includes animal caretaker (1), Animal attendant (3) and sweeper-cum- dome (1).

4 Additional staff and air-conditioning of the animal house are the important requirements during the 5th plan.

It was stated that laboratory animals are to be maintained instandard and uniform invironmental conditions like temperature humidity etc. This requires complete air-conditioning of the animal house. During the 4th plan the equipments sanctioned for the animal house included provision for air-conditioning also but the amount be-ing inadequate the complete air-conditioning could not be done and it required allocation of funds during the 4th plan period. Further till now the expenditure on purchase, up-keep of animals including the expenditure on food cages etc. was met from the funds earmarked to the Surgical Laboratory. Since the plan are to raise colonies of animals to caterthe needs of all the departments, adequate funds are to be earmarked for the animal house to meet the various expenses.

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5 The Committee was greatly impressed with the development of the animal house particularly the way the animals are maintained.

Of these jobs, major are carpentry work which involve construction of test tube and pipette racks, reagent racks, specially designed thermostatic baths, operation tables etc. The workshop carries out repair of instruments liek incubators, workshop carries out repair of instruments like incubators, autoclaves, hot air ovens, centrifuges. B.P. instruments etc. The repair of various refrigeration equipments like refrigerators, deep freezers, refrigerated centrifuges and o'C rooms is also undertaken. The equipments like electrophoresis apparatus are also constructed in the workshop. The workshop also makes glassware like centrifuge tubes, chromatography tiroughs, homogenis ers, ampoules etc. The repair of the electronic instruments is also undertaken.

3.3 The Institute workshop has five fully operative sections is Mechanical, Electrical, Glass Blowing, Welding and Carpentry.

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4 List of important equipments which are available in the workshop are:- (i) Harihar MBD: (ii) Lathe; (iii) Universal Drilling Machine; (iv; Shearing Machine; (v) Double ended Grinder; (vi) Air compressors; (vii) Pipe Bending Machine; (viii) Band Saw Machine; (ix) Multipurpose Wood Machine; (x) Glass Grinder Machine; (xi) Glass Slicer Machine; (xii) Coil Winding Machine; (xiii), Gas Welding Set; (xic) Electric Welding set; (xv) Battery Charger.

5 The major problem of the workshop is with regard to the repair and maintenance of electronic equipments and for this purpose, a post of an Electronic Engineer has been requested.

6 The Committee was disappointed with the present position of the workshop. The Committee suggests that the University may look into the working of the workshop so as to make it a real worthwhile Central facility. Although many electronic instruments are being used by the bio-medical group of the Institute, there is no engineer to service the instruments.

7 The Committee recommends the following staff under 1st priority.

5. LIBRARY

• The library shifted to the pres-ent building of the Institute in 1967 with the floor area of 5,000 sq. ft. During the 4th plan period another 5,000 sq. ft. area was added to meet the growing needs of the library.

2. The library is going ahead of 45,000 books and 450 current periodicals. The library remains open for 14 hours working in three shifts.

3 It was stated that with the increase in the number of Departments and postgraduate facilities, the amount spent towards the books and periodicals have not been commensurate with the needs of the Institute. Besides the non-recurring grant from the UGC the Institute has been expanding over R. 1.00.000/- per annum, for periodicals. Due to increasing cost of the periodicals, a large number of journals had to be discontinued during past years, continuity of which is to be maintained for research purposes. Costly journals like Excerpts Medica, Annals of N.Y. Academy of Sciences, Biochemical at Biophysics Acta, etc. are to be continued. The introduction of M.Ch. and D.M. . . courses in super-specialities need extra allotment of funds for the purchase of books and journals including back volumes. The Institute would therefore request that besides the non-recurring allotment the UGC may sanction a recurring grant to maintain the procurement of new additions and recent advances. In order to maintain the various services-documentation with running work of cataloguing, tracing, transcribing, filling and servicing and to maintain the efficiency of the library, there is dire necessity of additional library staff both supervisory and subordinate staff.

4. The Commission during the 5th plan period has already sanctioned a grant of Rs. 4,00,000/- as basic grant for books.

5 It was stated that the introduction of postgraduate training facilities required more emphasis on development of departmental library and subscription of more journals besides strengthening of the Institute Library with larger number of reference books, journals etc. An extra-ad-hoc grant is immediately needed to develop the library facilities in all the super specialities which have started M.Ch. and D.M. course from July, 1976. The Institute have been making steadily progress in the field of research for which adequate facilities of library has to be provided. These all facilities in respect of books and journals can be provided only on a liberal allocation for books and journals.

6 The Committee was happy to see the library facilities and the interest of the librarian in extending facilities to the staff and the students. The various clinical and para-clinical groups also profitably use this facility, and this good library facility needs to be strengthened further. It is essential to increase grants for library, so that several journals which had to b dis-continued could be again started. It is also essential to increase the library staff.

7. The Committee has recommended grants for books for each Department separately. The Committee further recommends a provision of Rs. 2.50 lakhs for the purchase of books for the Central Library of the Institute.

8 The Committee recommends the following staff for the library under 1st and 2nd priorities:

# 6. MCRTUARY COMPLEX

It is proposed to develop the mortuary complex which is utilised by the Department of Anatomy, Forensic Medicine and Pathology. The Institute have got the facility of post-mortums of Varanasi District being conducted in the Institute its-elf for the benefit of undergraduate students and also postgraduates. The Mortuary Complex as proposed would include besides the mortuary plan, facilities for waiting room for Police Officers, relatives and also toilet facilities and emergency duty room for the attendant. The existing mortuary plant available in the Department of Anatomy needs replacement. Some staff-minimum for managing mortuary like mortuary supervisor, mortuary attendant and sweeper-cum-dome have been demanded for this purpose.

The Committee recommends the following staff and provision for equipment during the 5th plan under first priority.

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## DEPARTMENT OF BIO-MEDICAL ENGINEERING

The Institute proposes to set up a Centre in Bio-medical Engineering during the Fifth Plan period. The objective of the Centre is to develop a fullfledged teaching programme and a strong research and development base. The broad outlines of the teaching and research programmes are given below:-

(a) <u>Teaching</u>

The teaching programme of the centre will have essentially three aspects:

- i) In the M. Sc. (Engg.) programme, course on bio-medical engineering are to be included as electives. In due course of the time it
  . is proposed that the teaching of these courses will evolve into a full orientation towards BME at the postgraduate level.
- ii) Medical doctors in India are becoming more and more aware of the need of knowing about engineering methods used in modern medical practice. However, facilities for refresher courses to meet the need are not available. Therefore, one of the objectives is to run short terms intensive courses for medical doctors who went to have knowledge and experience about modern medical equipment.

Project work to M.D. and M.S. candidate are also to be given.

iii) Parallel to the above course, another course for engineers will be run. The purpose of the course will be to familiarise engineers with bio-medical engineering principles and instrumentation. This will especially be useful for personnel associated with the rapidly growing medical instrumentation industries.

## (b) <u>Research and Development</u>:

The research programme will be oriented towards providing a base for the teaching and meeting the crucial need of the medical profession:

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The areas of research proposed are:-

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- Instrumentation for evaluation of cardiovascular functions for medical diagnosis and surgery.
- ii) Instrumentation and biological central system.
- iii) Techniques for the study and diagnosis of opthalmological and Ent aids, including fibre optic prosthesis for cateract and claucoma detection.
  - iv) Myo-electric central system.
    - v) Bio-mechanics and associated prosthetic devices.
  - vi) Devices for speeding up patient handling in hospitals.
    - a. medical test instrumentation.
    - b. computerised patient handling.
    - c. mobil hospitals.
- vii) Microwave and ultrasonic physical therapy.
- viii) Biomedical telemetry.

- ix) Ultrasonic neurosurgical aids.
  - x) Study of mammalian subjects under extreme stress.

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The Committee considers the proposal of the Institute to develop a Centre of Bio-medical Engineering during the Fifth Plan as a sound one and is of the view that the scheme be implemented. However, the Committee feels that such a Centre should be established in the Engineering Faculty of the University and the Institute of Medical Sciences should work in collaboration with that faculty. The Committee is confident that in a complex like Banaras Hindu University where there is a well-established Institute of Technology and established Science Departments and the Institute of Medical Science it may not be difficult for the University to implement a programme in Bio-medical Engineer-ing.

# TRAINING OF COMMUNITY MEDICINE

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The Institute, in addition to the work being done by the Department of Preventive & Social Medicine has already taken over the project of Training of Community Medicine in Rural Areas. In the first phase of the Project, the Institute has provided first aid Training to a batch of people deputed by Gram Pramukhs, from the surrounding village areas of the University. Further, each Department has been alloted a village to look after the complete health care of the people.

In this connection, the Committee was informed about the importance which State Government give to this programme as contained in the State Government's letter reproduced below:-

"As per recommendations of the Joint Council of Health and Family Planning held in New Delhi ca in April, 1976, it has been decided to attach the following Primary Health Centres to the Institute of Medical Sciences, Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi for purposes of undergraduate training and delivery of package deal of Health Services as also to make available the people in the rural areas expertise available with the Institute.

This is to inform you that Government attaches highest importance to this and therefore utmost importance and assistance should be extended to the authorities of the Institute."

The Committee recommends a provision of Ns. 0.75 lakhs for the purchase of a vehicle and other equipments:-The Committee also recommended a recurring expenditure of Rs. 25,000/- p.a. for the P.O.L. expenses and drug and dressing material etc.

## CENTRAL CLINICAL LABORATORY

It is proposed to establish a Central Clinical Laboratory during the 5th plan period where various advance type clinical investigation facilities would be made available both for research and relief. It was stated that besides the routine investigative laboratories in the hospital, the Departments of the Institute are largely involved in the advance type of investigations. The Committee supports the proposal of the Institute. It was noted that such a facility will be developed in phases and that certain sophisticated specialized equipments are already available with the Institute.

It was disturbing for the Committee to note that the growth of Clinical Bic-chemistry had not been well planned and well co-ordinated. A number of Clinical Bio-chemistry programmes have been taken up by a number of groups without proper supervision. The Committee strongly suggest that this arrangement should not be allowed to continue and a centralized well-developed Clinical Bio-Chemistry Unit be established to coordinate all the aspects of Clinical Bio-chemistry work. The Committee suggests that the university may keep this in view while developing the Central Clinical Laboratory.

The Committee recommends a provision of Rs. 2 lakhs under first priority and Rs. 1.00 lakh under second priority for e uipment needs of this laboratory.

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## STAFF QUARTERS

The University has asked a sum of Rs. 20 lakhs for the construction of staff quarters for the staff of the Institute of Medical Sciences. It was requested by the University that this may be provided outside the present allocation. The Committee has earlier on page 14 of the report given the present position of the staff quarters and the staff which is yet to be provided with such facility. It was stated by the authorities of the Institute that due to demand and increase in the number of staff-teaching and non-teaching, the present number of quarters is inadequate. Further there is a pressing need for married accommodation for the postgraduate students of the Institute specially after the introduction of · · · · residency training. The Committee in this regard was informed about the policy of the Commission in line with that of the hostels as indicated separately (page 122). The Committee was given to understand by the University that it would not be possible for them to provide staff quarters for the staff of the Institute out of the general allocation and that some funds may be provided for the purpose during the plan. This is essential for the medical staff. and also in view of the residential character of the University. The Committee suggests that an allocation of Rs. 10 lakhs may be provided to the University for this purpose as a special case under second priority.

#### PUBLICATION UNIT

1 This Unit was started in 1965 with the financial support from the UGC for publishing a quarterly Journal of Surgical Sciences. The staff included only one post of Proff-Reader-cum-Typist. During the 4th plan, the Unit was financially supported with the Institute fund consequent to the merger of the scheme with the block grant.

2 This Unit has been rendering important services in publication of the above journal till now. So far the journal has published 11 volumes with 4 numbers each with the following special issues,

3. It was stated that due to special nature of the work of publications-printing, proof-reading, marketing etc., this Unit was also entrusted from time to time the responsibilities of publication of books, articles, conference materials etc. besides the usual work of publication of Journal. One of the important requirement of the members of the staff for promoting research has been lack of assistance for typing of articles, proof-reading and other related problems of publication.

4. During the 5th plan period, it is proposed to organise and consolidate the facilities of the publication Unit. It is proposed that the Unit will extend facilities like typing of articles, printing problems, proof-reading, assistance in collection of research materials, correspondence regarding dispatch of reprints etc. The above facilities when pooled and provided centrally to the teachers of the Institute, will prove a boon for the development of research in the Institute:

The Committee recommends a provision of Rs. 5 lakhs under first priority for the equipment needed by the Art and Photo Section, Central Workshop, Animal House and Surgical Research Laboratory.

## PART-TIME PHYSICAL INSTRUCTCIS

It was stated that the games and sports activities of the medical students have been suffering for want of any physical Instructor. Previously there was exrangement of a part-time Physical Instructor for medical students but the same was later withdrawn. The Institute has asked for a part-time physical Instructor. The Committee hopes it should be possible for the University to provide this from its funds.

#### OTHER AMENITIES

The Institute has asked for some of the basic amenities re-quired for students both in the hostel and in the Institute. These include furnitures for the hostel/reading room, water cooler and recreation facilities in the hostel as well as Institute. The Committee supports the proposal and recommends a sum of Rs. 1.00 lakh under first priority.

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#### STUDENTS AMENITIES

#### (a) Hostel for Postgraduate students:

The University has asked funds for the construction of a hostel for postgraduate students. The hostel accommodation available and the additional needs have already been given on page 12 of the report. The University authorities during the course of their discussion with the Committee stated that there has been acute shortage of hostel accommodation during the past 3 years. This has been mainly due to - (1) starting of postgraduate courses in all the subjects, (2) reduction in the number of girl students in M.B.B.S. course. During the last 4 years, hardly 5-10 girl students have been admitted. This has resulted in overcrowding the boys hostel. The present hostel was constructed for M.B.B.S. students There has been no provision for postgraduate only. students till now. Consequent to the introduction of residency programme in all the pre-clinical, paraclinical and clinical departments, the number of students needing accommodation in the hostel have increased. The accommodation required for Ph.D. scholars and research fellows is extra. Therefore, there is an immediate necessity of hostel for residents accommodating 230 students (including provisions for repeaters). It was further stated that the UGC had already agreed and approved plans and estimates for the construction of a hostel amounting to Rs. 10.50 lakhs. This had to be revised to accommodate almost double the number of students originally planned. In this connection the Committee was given to understand that the Commission in general is of the view that students facilities such as hostels etc. should be provided in a university on an integrated basis and not on a faculty/collegiate basis unless there are separate earmarked funds available for this The Committee further understands that the purpose. UGC had intimated the Banaras Hindu University to provide for hostels for the medical students out of the 5th plan allocation of the University. The Committee was also informed that the Commission on the recommendation of the Visiting Committee which assessed the 5th plan development proposals of

Banaras Hindu University has allocated a sum of Rs. 4 lakhs for men students hostel, Rs. 2 lakhs for women students hostel and Rs. 4 lakhs for teachers' quarters as general and not separately for medical engineering, arts, science faculty etc.

The Vice-Chancellor, Director Plan-Coordination, Director, Institute of Medical Sciences categorically told the Committee that it would not be possible for the University to provide any hostel facilities to the students of the Institute of Medical Sciences out of the funds approved by the Commission on the basis of the 5th plan Visiting Committee recommendations. They, therefore, very strongly impressed upon the Committee to request the Commission to kindly agree to the proposal of the University for a separate hostel for postgraduate students of the Institute of Medical Sciences.

The Committee was further given to understand that the question of earmarking funds for the medical education in the Central Universities is under the consideration of the Commission in consultation with the Govt. of India and that some allocation is likely to be made for the purpose. The Committee is convinced about the need of a hostel for postgraduate students particularly in view of the introduction of the new residency scheme and the starting of a number of postgraduate course in the Institute during the 4th plan period. The Committee strongly recommends the acceptance of the proposal of the University as a special case.

#### SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIPS

The Institute has requested 5 scholarships of the value of Ns. 100/- each for the M.B.B.S. courses to be awarded to the candidates occupying first 5 positions in the pre-medical examination. It was stated that presently there is no provision of any kind of scholarships either for undergraduate students or for research purposes which may attract meritorious and outstanding candidates from different parts of the country. It was also stated that during the last decade the research activities in the various

## : 1 24 :

Departments of the Institute have considerably increased. Many of the Departments have enrolled candidates for Ph.D. in the respective projects. The demand has been increasing but there is no provision of scholarships except available under research projects of the C.S.I.R., I.C.M.R. etc. The Institute has requested for 10 Junior Research Fellowships. The Committee supports the proposal of the Unive-rsity and recommends that these fellowships may be provided outside the allocation made for the Institute.

# TAKING OVER OF KASHI KUSHTHA SEWA SANG, SARNATH, VARANASI

1 The University has made a proposal for the taking over of Kashi Kushtha Sewa Sang, Sarnath, Varanasi. This involves an expenditure of Rs. 9.57 lakhs in order to run the Centre on modern lines and toprovide necessary additions in the physical facilities, staff and services.

The Kashi Kusht ha Sang (Sarnath) has been running a Leprosy and T.B. Sanitorium. This includes the following components: (i) Lepr-osy Centre (ii) T.B. Centre and (iii) Rehabilitation Centre.

3 The Kashi Kushtha Sewa Sangh is a voluntary organisation devoted to the total care of leprosy in our society namely, education of society regarding the disease, dignosing it, treating by drugs and surgery where required and rehabilitating these notionts. It was founded in 1967 by late Padmashree Er. Bhola Nath and is registered. A 75 bodded hospital fully equipped with X-ray, Pathology laboratory, Operation theatre etc. is running. The rehabilitation Centre attached to it has been providing psyshological rehabilitation apart from physical and social rehabilitation. The Sang has been receiving some nonrecurring grant from the Government and private organizations.

4 After the death of its founder the University has agreed to take over running of the above Leprosy and T.B. Centre for service as well as training of the students in the rural set up. The present policy

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of Government of India to have such an institution attached to the University for free plan of services between the medical institution and periferial areas for providing rural medical care, health education and rehabilitation and leprosy, have been the main consideration. The Centre will serve as:-

- (a) A periferial Rural Hospital with 76 beds to the Institute.
- (b) Provide facilities for treatment and rehabilitation of leprosy and tuberculosis.
- (c) As a teaching area in these specialities, it will be an asset.
- (d) It will provide a location for contact of the rural population with the experts and help to implement the Government's policy in providing medical care and the 20 point programme.

5 The Committee supports the proposal of take over of the Sang by the University but suggests that this may be done in consultation with the State Government and the Central Government including the U.G.C. The Sang may be looked after by the Department of V.D. and Dermatology of the Institute where work on Leprosy is also being done. It will also be desirable to consult the Department of Preventive and Social Medicine in formulating the working programme. The Committee suggests that the university may approach the UGC later after they have consulted the State Govt. The taking over of this would involve an expenditure of about Rs. 9.5 lakhs (R & Non-recurring).

#### ADDITIONAL BEDS

The Institute has requested for 200 beds to be provided during the 5th plan in the S.S. Hospital outside the allocation already made by the Commission. It was suggested by the University that the proposal may be considered by the Commission as a first charge on the hospital allocation to be made in the 5th plan. The Institute gave the following justification

#### in support of their proposal.

1. The SS Hospital attached to the Institute of Medical Sciences for providing clinical training to the students-undergraduate and postgraduate students of the Institute has been catering the needs of the people of Eastern U.P., Northern Bihar and other adjoining States. Being an economically backward region, the people from distant places have been attending the Hospital. The out-patient attendance of the hospital has reached over 4,29,000 during 1975. The in-patient number has been over 16,000. Inspite of all the specialised treatment facilities available in the hospital, quite a large number of patients are refused admission or are kept walting due to shortage of beds.

2. The sanctioned bed strength of the Institute Hospital by UGC is 550 which was approved as follows:

3. The bed requirements for undergraduate training was calculated at the rate of 1:7 for 50 students which is the approved intake of M.B.B.S. course by the UGC. This strength however needs revision since the actual intake for M.B.B.S. course much exceeds against the sanctioned intake as explained below:-

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Thus for about 65 to 70 M.B.B.S. students admitted requirements every year, the re uirements of beds in the Hospital comes between 450 to 500.

4 The present strength of 550 beds includes 200 beds for postgraduate training. This number was fixed about 7-8 years back. The Institution is now providing postgraduate training in all the broad specialities. From 1.1.1974 the residency scheme of training has been introduced and recently the UGC has approved 210 number of residents.

5. The recommendations of the Medical Council of India on Postgraduate Education (1971) with regard to the beds are as follows:

"In order to be able to train postgraduates in Medicine, Surgary and their various spe-cialities, it is absolutely essential to have a large sized teaching hospital. The number of beds of this hospital has to be carefully related to the number of postgraduates that have to be trained in the various departments. A specialist clinical Unit of 50 beds could train not more than 5 postgraduates at one time. In other words, in order to give adequate clinical experience to the postgraduates in General Medicine and its specialities and sufficient operative experience to the students in Surgery and its varicus specialities, we should have a 1000 bedded hospital if we wish to train 100 postgraduates. It is desirable that atleast 150 beds should be reserved for General Medicine and a similar number for General Surgery so as to provide three units in each of these two major departments. The specialities of Medicine and Surgery should have 50 beds each. The department of Obstetrics and Gynaecology will, however, have to be given a larger share and atleast 75 beds should be provided for this purpose ".

6 In accordance with the above recommendations of the Medical Council of India, the existing bed, strength of the Hospital attached to the Institute of Medical Sciences should be increased from 550 to atleast 750 beds. The immediate requirements of beds for the Department of Medicine and Surgery and their specialities would be as follows:

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7 The terms of reference of the Committee were limited to the proposals of the Institute of Medical Sciences relating to medical education only and the requirements for the hospital were not to be considered by the Committee. In view of this, the Committee did not examine this proposal of the University.

8 The University has given the distribution of beds out of 550 beds available in the new hospital where the number of beds for each super-speciality has been shown separately. This number will be increased in accordance with the norms of the Medical Council of India on the availability of 200 beds. The over-all position is given in Annexure 19.

#### ADMINSTRATIVE OFFICE AND ATTACHED UNITS

The Institute has asked for additional adminstrative staff during the 5th plan period. It was stated that all the activities of the Institute relating to adminstrative, academic, financial and other matte-rs are being managed with the staff which was sanctioned initially with the establishment of the Institute of Medical Sciences (1960) without any additions during the 4th plan period. Further with the tremendous increase in the work-load during the last 15 years of development of the Institute, the existing strength of staff of the office of the Director, is hardly adequate to cope with all the activities attached with the office and addition of more staff is a dire necessity during the 5th plan period for efficient work and services. It was also stated that during the · 4th plan the Visiting Committee had decided to leave the matter of office staff for the consideration of the university but no additions of staff could be made except an Assistant Registrar during the last one decade. The Committee is of the view that more staff has to be provided to enable the Institute to carry out its adminstrative, financial and other matters. The Committee was not in a position to go into the details of such requirements because this would require a detailed examination keeping in view

the requirements of the staff vis-a-vis the other academic units of the university. This problem cannot therefore, be considered in isolation. The Committee however, allocates a sum of Rs. 1.50 lakhs for such staff under first priority and Rs. 0.75 lakh under second priority and suggests that the university may determine the additional staff for the Institute at the earliest. The Committee is convinced for such a need and therefore hopes that the additional staff would be provided at the earliest, in order to see that the work of the Institute does not suffer.

#### OFFICE EQUIPMENT

4 .

The Institute has asked for funds for the procurement of office equipment like typewriters, watercooler, duplicators etc. which cannot be purchased but of equipment grant means for scientific equipments only. The provision will cover the requirements of all the Departments/Sections of the Institute. The Committee supports the proposal of the Institute.

#### FURNITURE

The Institute has asked funds for the purchase of furniture. It was stated that during the course of years with the development of the Departments, introduction of postgraduate training programme, more number of postgraduate students, additional sanctioned of the staff during the 4th plan and creation of many new Departments, there is an acute shortage of furnitures both for laboratory, seminar and demonstration rooms and office furnitures. The Committee supports the proposal.

#### PABX TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

The University proposes to instal an exchange of its own in the Institute during the 5th plan period. It was stated that with the development of medical complex in the University, there is an urgent need of adequate internal communication facilities. The Committee supports the proposal of the University.

#### MULTI-PURPOSE HALL

A proposal has been made by the University for the construction of a multi-purpose hall. It was stated that for an undergraduate institution; the Medical Council of India has recommended a big lecture theatre which can accommodate all the students of the institution. In the present building of the Institute only 3 small lecture theatres with the capacity of 100 students are

#### available which are not adequate to meet mt only the routine academic requirements like examinations, seminars, symposiums but also vocational needs for any conference, guest lectures arranged by the Institute, which is very common in the case of Institute where a large number of visitors and guests happen to visit. According to the policies of the University, all the examinations are conducted by the Faculties concerned. Atleast one examination hall is needed for arranging examinations only which are five times in a year in case of undergraduates and twice for postgraduates besides other routine periodical examinations. In order to meet these requirements there is a most pressing need for a multi-purpose hall in the Institute where the various kinds of activities, curricular and extra-curricular may be arranged at the Institute level, commensurate with the strength of staff of the Institute.

The Committee appreciates the proposal of the University but recommends the proposal under second priority in view of the other urgent needs of the Institute.

#### ADDITIONAL FLOOR IN THE EXISTING BUILDING

Funds have been asked for the construction of an additional floor in the existing building of the Institute. It was stated that with the development of the Institute and expansion of the Departments in , the field of teaching and research, addition of more staff and students, sanction of various schemes financed by other agencies like I.C.M.R., C.S.I.R. etc. the space available in the existing building is proving insufficient. Some of the Departments have acute space problems and there is hardly any scope to accommodate future expansion, activities, creation of Departments etc. in the existing building. During the current plan period the Institute has proposed for the creation of new Departments and development of super-specialities. In the field of research new posts of research fellows have been asked.  $\mathbf{P}_{roposals}$  also include the establishment of a Clinical Laboratory. The space available for the Central Photo and Art Section is insufficient. Similarly in the adminstrative wing there is no scope for further accommodation for future development. There is need of a conference room for the

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meetings of the Heads of the Departments, Postgraduate Medical Board of the Institute. Keeping all this in view, the Institute has made a proposal for the construction of an additional floor in the existing building to mee some of the urgent demands of space. This point has also been raised by the Inspectors of the Medical Bouncil of India on more than several occasions. It was also suggested that if possible a separate administrative complex building accommodation the administrative wing, conference hall, photo and Art Section, Publication Unit and other be provided. The space available for the existing Departments and other related Units is given in the Annexure in . The Committee keeping in view the growth of the Institute during the 4th plan and the proposed development in the 5th plan recommends that the proposal of the Institute may be accepted.

### SPACE FOR GODOWN AND GARRAGES

The University has made a proposal for construction of godown and garrages along with chowkidar's cabin attached to them. It was stated that one of the shortcomings experienced during the course of years in the existing building has been found lack of space for the central store and garrages for the vehicles. There is no proper place wherein consignments received daily from the railways could be stored before their deliveries to the respective Departments. Similarly for large number of vehicles there are no garrages. The Committee noted that a few vehicles are parked in the open for want of garrage space. The Committee supports the proposal of the University.

#### L'ABCRATORY MAINTENANCE/ CONSUMABLES

The Institute has requested for additional recurring grant for the maintenance of its laboratories etc. It was stated that all the development programmes envisaged during the 5th plan will require additional maintenance grants. Further there has been increase in the cost of chemicals, glasswares, animals and other contingent expenses. The research activities of the Departments have increased. The number of Departments and Units have also gone up. The extension activities of the Institute to the rural areas will entail extra expenses on maintenance of vehicles, P.O.L., drugs and dressing materials. The Institute is also planning to extend the facilities of typing, postage printing of research papers and other materials to the teachers for which necessary funds will be required. The development of the specialities and conduct of D.M./M.Ch. courses will also re-quire considerable recurring expenditure. The Committee keeping in view all these points suggests that an additional recurring expenditure of Rs. 3 lakhs per annum may be made available to the Institute for the remaining period of the 5th plan.

The Institute is to consolidate the existing activities of its various departments in respect of programmes of teaching and research and also to implement the programme of super-specialities in the various areas of medicine and surgery. All this has been discussed by the Committee on the earlier pages of the report. The overall recommendations of the Committee under first and second priority are given below:-

The funds already made available for books and equipment under the basic grants to the Institute may be adjusted against the provision recommended above.

The Committee has recommended 5 scholarships of the value of Rs. 100/- p.m. for M.B.B.S. students and 10 Junior Research Fellowships for pursuing research in the Institute outside the allocation.

The Institute has requested a sum of Rs. 9.50 lakh for the taking over of T.B. and Leprosey Centre of the Kashi Sewa Sangh outside the allocation. This may be decided by the university in consultation with the UGC.

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#### Annexure-XVI

#### Proposal for a Dental College

There are about 6000 qualified Dentists in India, which is a very small number looking to the population, thus the dentist population ratio is 1/80,000. There is an increasing awareness of the various diseases in the masses, the services and facilities are being increased to cater the needs of the population. The various State Government and the Central Government are trying to open new Medical Colleges, Nursing Colleges, Hoppitals, Dispensaries and Ayurvedic Colleges. With the pace and rate these facilities for medical training and services are being extended, but for the dental colleges, clinics and facilities have not been provided by the various State Govts. and not a single Dental College has so far been started by Central Government.

Looking to the increasing number of patients attending and taking treatment in the existing dental colleges or the Dental Departments of the medical colleges, it is an established fact that there is a great demand of dental services in the country and the awareness of dental treatment in rural as well as urban population is increasing.

In India there are only 15 Dental Colleges. About 450 Dental Surgeons qualify each year. All these Dental Colleges are run either by their respective State Govts. or by the Universities, the admission to these colleges are restricted to the domicile of their respective States. There is no dental college run by Government of India.

In the State of Uttar Pradesh, at present there is only one Dental College situated at Lucknow, affiliated with Lucknow University. There are only 30 students being admitted each year for a four year degree course leading to Bachelor of Dental Surgery (BDS). Whereas in the State of Maharashtra there are three Dental Colleges - two in Bombay while one in Nagpur. Uttar Pradesh being the largest State, having the largest population has only one dental institution.

In view of the increasing awareness of dental diseases in Uttar Pradesh, specially in Varanasi and nearby areas, which I have observed from the statistics of the Dental Department of Institute of Medical Sciences, B.H.U., I am of opinion that there is a great scope and need of starting a full-fledged dental college and hospital under the Institute of Medical Sciences first for B.D.S. courses with a small number of students and later on the postgraduate courses leading to a degree of M.D.S. can be started.

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In view of the present facilities available in the various departments viz., Anatomy, Physiology, Pharmacology, Pathology, Surgary and Medicine of the Institute of Medical Sciences, it will not be difficult to start the 8.D.S. courses in the Department of Dental Surgary. I had the opportunity of meeting the various staff members of the Department of Dental Surgery. The staff members are well qualified and sincere in their duties. The present space available for dental clinics of the department is sufficient for the departmental work, but more space will a required if a Dental College has to be started.

The equipment, instruments and materials available in the department are sufficient to start the college, however, year to year phased programme will have to be laid down, as each year the students will be admitted and they go in a higher classes. The phased programme will be in respect of increasing the number of staff members of various categories, addition of equipment, instruments and materials according to the increasing need proportionate to the increasing number of students and increasing number of patients attending the dental college.

The library facilities as at present are adequate for a well established Dental Department of a Medical Institute, however, if the proposal of starting a Dental College has to be considered then gradually, year to year phased programme of number of journals and periodicals will have to be added. A well equipped library with back issues of good journals periodicals are essential part of the library specially if at a latter stage the postgraduate courses are to be introduced at the Institute.

If proposal of starting a full-fledged dental college and hospital at the Institute is under active consideration by the authorities concerned, I shall recommend that a mature and well experienced person should be appointed to develop this college. A person having an experience in starting and developing a dertal college or have had a long teaching experience in a well established dental college will be most suited for such a post. He should be designated as the Principal of the Dental College, with full powers and authority to develop the college.

Subject : Teachers' Salary

The comparative data for scales and NAA for the teachers in various categories in the Institute of Medical Sciences, B.H.U., Varanasi, and for the Medical Colleges run by the Central Health Services who are having exactly identical qualifications are given in Tables 1-3. It is obvious that our teachers are having starting salaries lower by Rs.550/- for Lecturers and Rs.400-500 for Readers and Frofessors.

The revised pay scales with NPA have introduced the following anamolous situations (i) Presently a Lecturer draws lower salary that what was offered in the pre-revised scales (Table - 4), (ii) and Suprisingly a Lecturer is offered lower salary than the Senior Resident who works in a junior capacity (Table - 5).

In view of the glaring differences the desired scales are suggested in Table - 6. The recommendations of the Medical Council of India (dated 24th March, 1976) are also enclosed for kind perusal.

We would be extremely grateful if our requests after thoughtful considerations are recommended to the University Grants Commission for an early implementation.

Subject: Pay structure for teachers in Medical Colleges.

I am directed to forward herewith the following resolution of the Executive Committee of this Council as approved by the Ledical Council of India at its meeting held on 24th March, 1976:

(a) The basis for the recommendations of the Medical Council of India that all posts of teachers of medical colleges should be full-time and non-practising was to ensure high standards of medical education and research.

(b) The pay structure for all full-time non-practising teachers in medical colleges should be the same as that recommended for University teachers by the University Grants Commission plus 50% of the basic practising allowance.

(c) The State. Central Government are requested to implement to above recommendations as early as possible in all categories of Modical Colleges. This is absolutely essential to attract the right type of persons for taking up modical teaching and research and continue in the same.

In this connection your attention is also invited to the following recommendations of the council in the Standard Requirements for amedical college for 100 admissions annually:-

"The toaching staff of all departments of a medical college shall be whole-time and non-practising. In Institutions where part-time/Hony. teachers are employed in clinical departments, they should be replaced by wholetime-teachers by 1977. In meantime, such part-time/hony. teachers will only be recognized as teachers provided they put in not less than 4 hours clinical and teaching duties per day in one teaching institution."

## Ruspectud Sir,

--

Prosently there are two junior and two senior Research Officers (JRO and SRO) in the Surgical Research Laboratory. One more JRO's post is yet to be filled up. We were appointed by well constituted selection committees in the lecturer's and reader's grade respectively. All of us are guiding research and the SROs have worked as lecturers earlier and have produced several PheDs" as well: Since our university bes not consider guiding research as teaching we are totally denied of all the academic privileges enjoyed by our teacher colleagues.

#### 1. Upgrading and revision of grades.

While five percent of the lecturers and teaders were upgrades as readers and professors, the research officers were not even considered for such promotion as they are non-teachers. When he salary grades were revised; the lecturers: and reader's grade enjoyed by us were also lowered. As a result the maximum salary for the SRO is equivalent to that of a lecturer and the JRO's is brought down still further. Dr. Sathyanesan, SRO worked in this same university as lecturer in Zoology for about ten years before joining this laboratory in the reader grade. The same is true of Dr. Srivastava SRO, who worked as lecturer at the Roorkee University. This revision of grades actually brought them back to the lecturer grade.

#### 2. Deputation to conferences and symposia.

As non-teachers the research officers are not eligible for deputation to seminars and symposia. Even one gets financial assistance from some other sources he will not be granted duty leave. He has to utilise his casual or privilege leave.

#### 3. Non-practising allowance

Dr. J.P.N. Chanshuria, JRO is the only medical personnel in the Institute of Modical Sciences who is denied the nonpractising allowance. His plue is pending for a long time at the U.G.C. undefided.

4. Study abroad.

Dr. Miss. Sodana Chatterjue URO, who has gone to Japan

for further stuly was given extraordinary leave without pay. As she is a non-teacher as per rules she is not eligible for study leave with half pay provided to the teaching staff of our university.

#### 5. Purchass of books and clorical assistance.

As surgical Research Laboratory is noither a department nor a part of one hence technical difficulties forbil to have suparate allocation for buying books or to have office staff We do not have ever a typist to type our research papers. The only office staff is a store keeper.

#### 6. Research guidance and library book borrowing.

At one stage Dr. Sathyanusan, "SRO was asked not to guide research as he is not a teacher that to after producing Several Ph.Ds. However, after repeated appeals and enceavours the" Academic council has reinstated the right to guide research which he was enjoying in this same university as a lecturer. A lecturer can Borrow ten library books at a time, whereas a SRO can get only four." However, our Vice-Chancellor has personally increased the quota to ten for the SRO.

#### 7. Suggistions for rodrissing.

(I) We request this learned committee to consider guilling research equivalent to teaching so that the designation of the JROs and SROs may be changed to lecturers and readers. Such archange might provide us the rightful promotions, grades, and other privileges of the teachers which were depied to us so far.

(II) The monitory loss involved soffar in the denial of non-practising allowance, study leave with half pay, and five percent upgraling may kindly be rectified with retraspective offect.

(III) The Surgical Research Laboratory may be made", into an independent department or part of a department which will automatically solve all the technical problems.

We are presenting these serious problems which are crippling our academic interests and ambitions for the past in years with the hope this committee of intellectuals will favour us with justice.

At the very putset we express our sense of gratuide to our Director, Dr. K.N. Udupa, for getting an appointment with the Visiting Committee despite its awful busy programmes. Privileaged with this, we find it a right and appropriate opportunity to aprise the Committee with the problem of Senior Technical Assistants regarding their future prospects at a time when the Committee is going into the depth of numerous problems of the respective d partments related to teaching an! research under V Five Year Plan.

- We are very much indepted to our Director, Dr. K.N. Udupa for his pains in redressing our grievance at his end. "For the avenue of further promotions and future prospects, he has very strongly recommended our case sometime back (copy enclosed) in the light of Senior posts existing in other facilities.

This, is in reference to the semiormost amongst Sr. Feen. Assistants who have rendered about 10-15 yrs of service and shall serve at least 15-20 yrs more in the same calle. We are submitting a brief detail as under:-

We were initially appointed as Technician in the grade work of Rs. 210-425. This grade has been revised from 1.4.68 as 325-675 with the changed designation of Sr. Technical Assistant. This revised grade of Sr. Tech. Assistant was made effective in the University in general i.e. all the persons designated as Technician were given the benefit of the revision irrespective of length of service. Certain categories lower to the cadre of technician were also placed in this grade has been revision of 1968. Under II Pay Commission, this grade has been revised as 550-900 without any change in designation. At present, the Seniormost persons are drawing Rs. 725/- as basic salary in the above grade which shall expire at Rs. 900/-. This makes it obviou that within a period 5-6 yrs. mist of us will be getting the maximum of the grade.

It is worth montioning that in order to give some incentiv at various stages in ministerial cadre (Non-teaching) the Univers has already created newsvenues of promotion, such as Special Assistants, Sri. Superintendent and Assistant Registrar i.e. upto the grade Rs. 700-1300. Similarly, in the technical cadre also some senior post such as Foreman, I/C Workshop exist in the University in the grade of Rs. 700-1300.

In view of the contribution made at the initial stages of stablishing various departments, teaching and research activities, we have established our devotion and responsibility in the uplifting of the Institute. Since our appointment to the

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prisint position, we find ourselves in the same endre loo. Without promotion a yone is a constant of the same endre loo. In the light of the facts mentioned above, we request your goodself to pen avenue of promotions in this cadre also for the Senior Technical Assistant whethave rendered a long service.

Wu are approaching with overy hope of sympathetic and find consideration.

5. That under the new residency scheme even a first year Junior resident is getting about Rs. 662/50 per month where duti are no way comparable to us.



Item No.8 :: To consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee for the Centres of Advanced Study in Humanties & Social Sciences on the report of the Committee set up by the Commission to evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education at at M.S. University of Baroda.

The Advisory Committee for the Centres of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences at its meeting held on the 9th May, 1975 considered the report of the Assessment Committee (copy enclosed AnnexureI) which evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, M.S. University of Baroda and the additional comments made by some members of the Committee (Annexure.II.III.IV and V).@ It was felt that as the conclusion drawn by the Committee did not seem to flow directly from the observations made in the body of the report and as there was some divergence of opinion among the members of the Committee, it may be useful to have a meeting of the Assessment Committee may be placed before it next meeting.

The Assess-ment Committee met twice, first on June 20, and then on September 3, 1975 to consider the observations of the advisory Committee of the Centres of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences on the report of the Committee. A copy of the second report of the Assessment Committee is attached (Annexure-VI)

The matter was placed before the Advisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities and Social Sciences at its meeting held on December 20, 1975 for consideration. The Advisory Committee made the following recommendation :-

"The Advisory Committee considered the supplementary report of the Assessment Committee. Neither of the reports of the Assessment Committee.inspired confidence in the ability of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, Baroda University to provide leadership in this important area. The Committee came to the conclusion that no useful purpose would be served by continuing the recognition of the Education Department of the Baroda University as a Centre of Advanced Study!

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The above recommendations of the Advisory Committee for CAS in the humanities and Social Sciences were placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 22nd March, 1976. The consideration of this item was deferred.

The matter is again placed before the Commission for consideration.

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## UNIVERSITY GRANTS COMMISSION

REPORT OF THE ASSESSMENT COMMITTEE WHICH VISITED CENTRE OF ADVANCED STUDY IN EDUCATION, BARODA, UNIVERSITY ON 15TH AND 16TH JANUARY, 1975.

The University Grants Commission constituted in November, 1973, a Committee consisting of Dr. S.K. Mitra, Joint Director, National Council of Educational Research and Training Dr. S. Shukla, Professor of Education, Jamia Millia and Dr. J.N. Kaul, Joint Secretary, University Grants Commission to evaluate the work done at the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, Baroda University during the past ten years and to consider its requirements during the Fifth Plan period. The terms and reference of the Committee are given in Appendix-I.

The Committee visited the Centre on 5th December, 1973. Owing to dislocation in air service and unsatisfactory train arrangements the Committee could work only for a few hours at <sup>B</sup>aroda. The members therefore felt that à second visit to the Centre would be necessary to complete the work assigned to the Committee.

The membership of the Committee was enlarged and Dr. S.B. Adval Professor of Education, Allahabad University, Dr. V. Manual, Professor of Education, Kerala University and Dr. H.S. Asthana, Professor of Psychology, Saugar University were requested to join the Committee. The Committee visited the Centre on 15th and 16th January, 1975. All the members joined the Committee. Shri A.B. Gupta, Education Officer, University Grants Commission accompanied the Committee. The report of the Committee follows:

#### Brief History of the Centre:

The Department of Education in the Faculty of Education and Psychology at the M.S. University of Baroda was recognised as a Centre of Advanced Study in Education by the UGC in November, 1963. The UGC provided non-recurring grants to the time of Rs. 2,50 lakhs for building Rs. 60000/- for equipment and Rs. 1.00 lakh for books and journals. The recurring grants included expenditure on the appointment of one Professor, two Readers, three Senior Research Fellows, five Junior Research Fellows and adequate grants for inviting visiting fellows and for incurring the expenditure on the appointment of necessary technical staff, administrative staff, travel, publication and contingencies. For the Thrid Plan period the total grant was for Rs. 4,62,500/-. Although, the sanction of the UGC was given in November, 1963, the Centre did not get started until July, 1964 The Syndicate of the University in June, 1964, gave to the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, the status of a Department in the Faculty of Education and Psychology with the proviso that the senior most professor would function as is head and the Dean of the Faculty would be the exofficio Director of the Centre. The Centre was to work in close co-operation

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with the other Departments of the Faculty and also the Research Units in Examination Reform and student Counselling which had earlier been sanctioned by the UGC. These points were noted by the first Assessment Committee of the UGC.

Dr. S.N. Mukherjee soon left the case after it was established. Thereafter, the two successive heads of the Centre Dr. M.S. Patel and Dr. A.S. Patel Development the work. It was only towards the latter half of the 1969 that Dr. M.B. Buch joined as the Head and has continued since then, This fact was noted by the Assessment Committee. Although the Committee was asked to look at the work of the CASE since its inception, in effect it means really looking at and evaluating the work done during the last five years under the leadership of Dr. M.B. Buch. The First Assessment Committee under the chairmanship of Prof. A.R. Wadia in their report had indicated that there were four distinct units in the Centre on Psychometrics, Curriculum, Language Leerning and Guidance and Counselling. While this was found by the First Assessment Committee in January, 1966, considerable change in the structure and function of the Centre had taken place since the recommendations of the First Assessment Committee in January, 1966 were available to the University and particularly from 1969 when Dr. Buch took charge.

The objectives of the Centre as mentioned in the Centre's report 1970-71 are :-

- a) To undertake and carry out intensive and extensive studies and researches with a view to improving the present techniques and tools of instruction and evaluation in Schools.
- b) To undertake studies in educational innovations and change.
- c) To undertake studies in the area of teacher education with a view to suggesting messures for improving teacher preparation at the preservice and inservice levels.
- d) To disseminate findings of educational research through appropriate publications.
- e) To train research workers in methods of education.

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f) To provide servic s to individual research workers and institutional engaged in research and to develop-co-operative research projects.

#### Second Assessment Committee

As mentioned above, the UGC appointed a second Committee for Assessment of the CASE in 1973 and later expended the membership of this Committee whose composition is given above. This Committee visited the Centre at Baroda on 15th and 16th January, 1975. The programme of work of the Assessment Committee on these two days were as follows :- 15.1.1975

<u>11.00 A.M. - 11.30 A.M.</u> The members of the Assessment Committee met to Chalk out their plan of work and procedure.

<u>11.30.4.M. - 12.30 P.M.</u> The Committee met with the Dean of the Faculty of Education and Psychology and with the Head CASE where they discussed the organisation and administration of CASE, the kinds of courses offered, the degree of integration of CASE with the Department of Education, the amount of autonomy enjoyed by CASE, etc.

 $12.30 P.M_{2} 1.30 P.M_{2}$  The Committee met all the members of the teaching staff and research staff as well as teacher fellows and research fellows and discussed the important programmes of work, their significant contributions etc.

<u>3.00 P.M. to 5.00 P.M.</u> The Members of the Committee went round individually and/or in pairs and discussed with individual members of the staff and/or in groups the kind of work which they were doing. They also saw the library and the lay out of building.

<u>5.00 P.M. - 6.00 P.M.</u> The Committee met the members of only the teaching staff in a group and discussed particularly their contribution to the teacher training programmes in the Department of Education.

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16.1.1975

9.00 A.M. to9.30. A.M. The Committee called on the Vice-Chancellor.

10.15 A.M. \_ 11.15 A.M. The Committee met with Dr. M.S. Patel, a Member of the Advisory Committee and the previous Director of the Centre and discussed particularly the role of Advisory Committee and its function as well as the facilities and funds for research and for teacher fellows.

<u>11.15 A.M. - 12.00 Noon</u> The Committee met with the Heads of the Departments of Home Science and Child Development and discussed with them the kinds of inter-departmental collaboration that existed and expectation on both sides.

<u>12.00- 1.00 P.M.</u> The Committee met a group of B.Ed. and M.Ed. students and discussed with them the training programme and the kinds of improvements they would like to see in it.

<u>2.30 P.M. - A.00 P.M.</u> The members of the Assessment Committee met to discuss the cutline of the report of the Committee and the main points of the report and their recommendations.

Research and Training Programme of CASE.

(a) Research. The research done by CASE are in the following areas :...

1. Teaching and Teacher behaviour;

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- 2. Achievement motivation;
- 3. Educational technology including programmed learning; and
- 4. Innovations and educational change.

1. <u>Teaching and teacher behaviour</u>. In teaching and teacher behaviour, a conceptual framework has been developed. Within this conceptual framework, a number of research projects have been carried out concerning the effect of teacher behaviour on pupil modification, class-room organisatio. and climate, aspects of pupil growth, attitudes and enxieties of pupil and pupil achievement. Similarly, studies have been made on themodification of teacher behaviour through feed back and micro teaching. The studies are well designated and competently executed. As the Survey of Educational Research published by the CASE shows, this is an area of work whe where not much work has been done in India.

The Committee was pleased to note the CASE had taken initiative in organising the work in this areas and has emerged as a Centre in India for educational research workers for developing models and particularly for the experimental design and statistical analysis of research in this area.

2. <u>Achievement motifation</u> In achievement motivation, studies have been conducted in the development of this motive in urban schools. Relationship of this motive with hope of success and fear of failure, adjustment, anexisty, etc. has been studied.

3. Educational Technology including programmed learning. It was noted that 16 programmes for use in school and on various school subjects have been developed. Some comparative studies between programmed learning method and other methods of teaching and learning have been made. The relationship of some personality factors and programmed learning have been studied. Stadies have been conducted on micro-teaching as a technique for developing indirect class-room behaviour in student-teachers for changing the verbal behaviour of the teacher and on the feasibility of using micro teaching technique for training teachers. A study was made to compare the relative effectiveness of micro-teaching and conventional practice teaching. The effectiveness micro-teaching techniques for developing specific teaching techniques have also been studied.

The Committee noted particularly the fact that on the basisof the research done, the Centre not only found that microteaching and programmed learning techniques were better than the conventional ones, but also introduced these techniques in their own training programme. The Committee was informed of the development of a programme on evaluation and measuremen which has been found to be so effective that in the next semester instead of taking classes on this subject, the programmed learning material will be available to the trainees and only a seminar once every month will be held on this subject, thereby making the time available for other work in train "he Committee was also informed that a research methodology programme was being developed for the M-Ed. level. These programmes will be made available very soon for use in other Teachers' Colleges. <u>4.</u> <u>Innovations and educational Change.</u> In this area. a model has been developed to fit the Indian situation. Some studies have been under taken into the conditions which promoto innovations in Indian schools, factors which influence the diffusion of innovations, the profilo innovative schools the factors in resistence to innovations.

Apart from these four major areas, in which CASE has been able to develop some organised work, some work is also being done an organisational climate, leadership and morels of teachers.

The Committee noted with satisfation that the CASE has come out with a comprehensive survey of educational research in India. A monograph on the model of teacher behaviour, a book incorporating the important studies done at the Centre on teacher behaviour and class-room teaching, book on the work done in programmed learning and some other publications. A list of works published during the past five years by the Centre is attached (Appendix-II).

It was also noted with satisfaction that the University has allowed the Centre to develop a fund out of the sale of these publica--tions which could be used by the Centre for its own research and development work. The research fellows as well as the teacher fellows and members of the staff at the Centre were drawn from all over India to give it an all-India character which is a very commendable feature of the Centre. The Committee found a congenial climate of work and facilities of consultation and of library with which the schelars were highly satisfied.

(B) <u>Training</u>

1. <u>Ph.D. Level Programme</u> - There is no Ph.D. level programme although the Centre is providing a consultative service of research methods and statistical analysis. It has not offered advance courses on important aspects of educational research and methodology. Teacher fellows were found enrolling themselves for the Ph.D. The Centre may like to consider whether such enrolment is desirable in view of the fact that they stay at the Centre for a short period of time. Related to this is the question whether residence requirement for Ph.D. should not be compulsory.

2. <u>M.Ed. and B.Ed. Level Courses</u> - The Centre has been functioning as an all India Centre. Tt has been attracting students from outside the State and even from foreign countries. About 20% of the students in B.Ed. and about 35% of the students in M.Ed. belong to the other States or foreign countries ; A Statement giving year-wise enrolment in B.Ed. and M.Ed. since 1964-65 is attached (Appendix\_III).

It was found that the courses are prepared exclusively by the teachers concerned. While this gives flexibility and allows continuous revision and upgrading of the course it raised the question whether such courses are at par with those offered in other universities. It may perhaps be associate some external teachers from other universities in drawing up the syllabus and courses. Something is applicable in the case of internal assessment. The students were

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also not happy with it. In order to be sure that internal assessment is not leading towards gradual decline in standards, it is perhaps desirable to have some system whereby teachers and other universities would also have a look at the scripts and the marking.

It was found that in practice teaching, two innovations have been introduced which are worthy of note. One is the introduction of micro-teaching for specific teaching skills. The other is the introduction of practical workshops to teach the trainees specific aspects of teacher behaviour. The Committee was pleased to note the use of educational teachnology in B.Ed. and M.Ed. teaching about which mention has been made in the previous section. The Committee, however, found that whereas these innovations have been made in the training programme of teachers, the new ideas of training, as emodidied. in the Kothari Commission's report, are not much in evidence.

The admission of students was found to be based on the us-ual method and students of average quality were being admitted and no attempt was being made to use research evidence in improving the selection, such as the use of tests of teaching aptitude, etc.

In the matter of development of new courses, not much has been achieved. A course of educational change and innovation is the only new thing which was brought to the notice of the Committee.

In the matter of modernisation of syllabi etc., the Committee noted the use of educational technology (Programmed learning and micro-teaching) in teacher training.

#### Physical Facilities.

The Committee noted that the CASE has a fine building and no further addition is indicated or is in demand.

Library, it was fou,d has a stock of about 11,000 books and subscribes to 40 journals. In addition, it gets a number of journals free. It is used by 50 scholars per day on the average and is open only from 10.30 A.M. to 5.00 P.M. with only one Librarian and no other assistance. The Committee felt that the library should have longer hours and one Assistant may be provided to the library so that longer hours could be possible.

The Committee noted lack of equipments like video\_tape, teachin lab., Zerox facilities, calculators, etc. The Committee was informed, however, that the CASE was trying to get some video\_tape equipment. The Committee would like to recommend that these equipments should be available for further development of the Centre.

# Organisation and Administration

The Wadia Committee had noted the lack of integration of the C with the Department of Education. This Committee was peased to note that the integration has been achieved since 1971 (vide the Resolution adopted by the University Syndicate given in Appendix IV). The Committee was also pleased to note that the University has full confidence in the Dean of the Faculty and the Head of CASE so that there is no difficulty on the part of CASE in carrying through its programme of work. It has

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on the part of CASE in carrying through its programme of work. It has full support from the University financially as well as administratively and it enjoys considerable authonomy so that the usual restriction which are usually imposed on other Departments have been waived in the case of this Centre.

The present composition of the advisory Committee is given in Appendix\_\_\_\_V. It was noted that the Advisory Committee does not meet mote than once in a year. It is desirable that the Advisory Committee should meet more frequently in order to give effective guidance to the Centre and its development. It should be considered whether other cognate disciplines from the University should not be brought into the Advisory Committee to make it more broad based. Similaryly, the question should also be examined whether other faculty members and some research fellows should not also be members of the Advisory Committee. One of the things which the Committee noted was a lack of development of comparative education, history of education, sociology of education and such other areas in the CASE. Interdisciplinary research in education could perhaps be developed better if there are some faculty members from disciplines other than education and also if faculty members from other disciplines become members of Advisory Committee. In this context, the Committee noted with Estisfaction, the recent Resolution of the University (Appendix\_VI) whereby the University has now allowed any student with a Master's degree in any subject to register for Ph.D. in education. Interdisciplinary research the Committee realises, is not very easy and it noted that efforts are being made by CASE to develop joint work with the Departments of Child Development, Home Scinece, Mathematics, .etc. One would like to see a closer association and collaboration with the Department of Statistics, Sociology and Psychology.

The Committee noted that the CASE has turned out, in these few years, a number of Ph.Ds. in Education. A statement giving year-wise number of students registered for Ph.D. and number of students who completed the Ph.D. have left or are still continuing their college work is attached (Appendix\_VII)

# Five Year Plan

The Five-Year Plan (1974-79) which has been submitted by the Centre is a logical out-growth of the research results already obtained in the four major areas in which CASE has specialised. It is good to note that now that the CASE has acquired a confidence and has built up the morale of its staff and developed necessary facilities it is opending out in the direction of tother areas of research like higher education, sociology of education, organisational climate and teacher morale, etc. The Committee generally approved the programme of work for the five years (1974-79).

The Head of the Centre has very modest demand of Rs. 15,000/-(per annum) additional amount of money for strengthening the library and Rs. 15,000/- (per annum) more for visits of fellows. The only demand for additional staff is for two funior research fellows (per p.t.o.

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annum) to strengthen the research work. The Committee recommends all this.

It was noted that the State Government of Gujarat appreciated, as much as this Committee didm the good work that has been done during the last five years only in this Centre. Five years is not a too long a period for any University Department to have a sizeable impact. It is, therefore, commendable to note that the CASE has already made an impact on the Indian scene and the State Government, in due recognition of that, has expressed its willingness to take the full responsibility of bearing the expenditure of the Centre.

#### Recommendations.

1. The Committee appreciates the research that has been developed by CASE in the areas in which it has apecialised and recommends that it should continue as an advanced centre in these areas of work.

2. The Committee recommends that two more Junior Research Fellowships (per annum) may be given to the Centre to strengthen its Ph.D. programme.

3. Better housing facilities should be provided to its teacher fellows.

4. External experts should be associated in evaluation as well as in the framing of courses in order to maintain standards at part with other universities.

5. The Committee recommends that the CASE may gradually develop new courses and inter-disciplinary work in its training programme.

6. The Committee recommends a grant of Rs. 15,000/- (per annum) for the library and Rs. 15,000/- (per annum) for visits of fellows.

7. The Committee recommends that for equipment, a block grant of Rs. 50, ( may be made available to the Centre.

At the end, the Committee will like to record its deep appreciation for the hospitality and facilities provided by the University to the members to carry on their work of assessment during their visit to the University and the CASE on 15th and 16th January 1975.

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# Appendix-I

# UNIVERSITY GRANTSCOMMISSION

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General terms of reference for the Assessment Committees for evaluation of the work of the Centres of Advanced Study in Indian Universities.

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The Assessment Committee will visit the Centre concerned and hold discussions with the university authorities, the staff of the department and other research workers as may be considered essential, with regard to the various academic training and research programmes undertaken by the Centre consequent upon the Department being recognised as a Centre of Advanced Study by the UGC.

The Committee would look into the organisational and administrative aspects of the Centres particularly regarding identification of the Centre of Advanced Study as an integral pert of the Department concerned. It would also examine the aspects relating to measure of autonomy enjoyed by the Centres in implementing various programmes undertaken by them, within the existing university framework.

The Committee would examine the stage of development of the area of specialisation selected initially for special support and its impact on the total development of other disciplines within the Department.

The Committee would also examine the question relating to the advisory committees appointed for each Centres of Advanced Study with regard to their composition, role and effectiveness in furthering the activities of the Centre, such as (a) functioning of the Centre of Advanced Study as an all India Centre with regard to recruitment of staff, students intake, and interaction with other departments in the subject concerned and possible influence, in raising of standard of teaching and research in the subject concerned; (b) new courses developed either at the post- B.Sc. or Post- M.Sc. level, pre-Ph.D. programmes etc. in addition to the usual undergraduate and postprogrammes and (c) steps taken by the Centres to function as focal points of growth.development and modernisation of the academic system.

5. The Committee would also look into the future programmes of work in the next five years and the financial requirements of the Centres in this regard. The continuing assistance from the UGC to the Centres of Advanced Study, after 1973-74 would be subject to evaluation made by the Committee and its recommendations to be considered by the Commission. The assistance would be continued only where the Centres have earned the recognition and have made sustained and continued effot for attaining the highest standards possible in the academic training and research activities.

Any other aspect with regard to the functioning of the Centres as may be considered essential by the Assessment Committee.

The University ordinance for Ph. D. used to be as under :

No candidate shall be permitted to appear for the Ph.D. degree in a subject different from the one in which he has obtained his Master's degree. Frovided, however, that the recognised teacher may recommend to the Council of Post-graduate studies and Research admission of a student to the Ph.D. degree in a related subject.

As a result of the representation by the Head, CASE and the Dean, Faculty of Education and Psycholody, the university has amended the above resolution and the amended resolution is :-

> No candidate shall be permitted to appear for the Ph.D. degree in a subject different from the one in which he has obtained his Master's Degree Provided, however, that recognised teacher may recommended to the Council of Post-graduate studies and Research admission of a stydent to the Ph.D. degree in a related subject.

The scholar holding Master's degree in any discipline. shall be considered eligible for registration for Ph.D. degree in Education under the Faculty of Education and Psychology of this University, provided they are otherwise eligible for registration for Ph.D. degree in Education. Comments of Professor S. Shukla on the report of the assessment committee which evaluated the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, M.S.University of Baroda.

...

I am generally in agreement with the report. However, as pointed out in the report itself of the Centre started functioning effectively only from 1969. The present assessment therefore, pertains to a 5-years period as contrasted with the 10 years life of most advanced centres. I feel, therefore, that the Commission may consider sending a fresh assessment committee by about 1978-79 to confirm that the present development has been sustained and strengthened sufficiently.

My further comments on the report are as follows :

1. <u>Page 5</u>:

We met the Head of the Department of Mathematics also who is undertaking some work in modern mathematics education. From my report with the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee which visited Baroda on January 27-28, 1975 this was considered to be a very weak department.

# 2. Page 6, para 2, line 3:

I should add the survey as far as a good bench mark for future. However, it is to be noted that this is essential documentation work which the NCERT or some similar agency should have done. Also this survey is based on summaries prepared by fellows of the Centre, in some cases with no specialised competence in the areas concerned. Future editions of the survey would require to rectify this.

#### 3. Page 8(1) Ph.D. Level Programme:

There is no course work as part of this. The Centre also enrolls for Ph.D. without any residence requirements. The desirability of this may be examined by the Centre and by the U.G.C. Further the whole schemes of teacher fellows may be reviewed by the U.G.C. The intention of the scheme was that teacher fellows would improve their general understanding of the discipline and improve the quality of work in the colleges and universities from which they come on return.

# (2) M.Ed. Course

The number of students from other parts of India is not very high. Stemps may be taken to increase this number.

#### Page 11:

4.

We should add a paragraph to say that there is need for rationalisation of the areas of academic specialisation between the different departments in the faculty. The Department of Education specialists in areas already mentioned while other aspects of education namely History of Education and Comparative Education are dealt with by the Department of Educational Administration. This leads to a lack of emphasis on these areas in the work of the Centre. Besides there has also occasionally been inadequate specialisation for Ph.D. supervision.

# 5. Pages 11-12:

It is to be noticed that there is serious danger of low quality contributions from other discipline where interdisciplinary research is organised. Such appears to be the fear in the case of mathematics education here. The centre should take particular care to interest departments of the universities which have a high academic standing in interdisciplinary research in Education. It is to be noticed also in the case of Home Science candidates who could not have registered in that faculty for Ph.D. were enabled to do so in the Centre because there are no residence requirements here. Special care requires to be taken that the quality of research grows rather than declines through indisciplinary co-operation or through the recent modification of Ph.D. regulations permitting holders of Master's degrees other than Education to enrol for Ph.D. with the Centre.

6. Page 13:

At the end of the first recommendation we might add "namely teaching in its various aspects."

<u>Recommendation 3</u>: The very low provision for contingency namely Rs.100/per annum needs to be looked into. The question of Teacher Fellows registering for Ph.D. may be re-examined.

<u>Recommendation 4</u>: We must continue to maintain the essentiality internal character of assessment while ensuring that the level and contents of courses remain at a high level.

<u>Recommendation 8</u>:  $\blacktriangle$  fresh assessment committee should be sent in 1978-79 or 1979-80. Meanwhile the Centre may be encouraged to further strengthen its all India character.

Comments of Dr.H.S. Asthana Professor and Head, Department of Psychology, University of Saugar, Segar.

I have looked into the draft report circulated by you. I feel that it is very well drafted and covers all the points we made. However, I would like to make a suggestion.

. . .

We noted that while the case was seeking collaboration with Departments of Child Development, Home Science and Mathematics, the more cognature disciplines which have shown for greater impact on education in recent times remain unassociated. This point has been raised in the draft at the end of p.11 and at the beginning of p.12. It should, in my opinion, be a major recommendation (to be put between points 5 and 6 on page 13 of the draft) that - cognature disciplines: Statistics, Sociology and Psychology be represented not only on the Advisory Committee but that in research and teaching these departments should be more actively associated with the case.

It was surprising to see that the Faculty of Education and Psychology in which case is located does not associate the Department of Psychology which has three senior staff (one professor and two readers) besides other staff. Nor did we meet any from sociology and statistics. It hardly needs emphasising that modern developments in the Sociology of education, experimental designs and analysis in Statistics besides the developments in Psychology have greatly influenced the development of educational theory., research and instruction.

Annexure IV to Item No.8

Views of Dr.V. Manuel with comments made by Dr.S.Shukla on the report of the Committee which assessed the work of the CAS in Education at Baroda University.

### (a) <u>Reactions to the further comments of</u> <u>Prof. S. Shukla</u>

#### 1. On the weakness of the Mathematics Department

This remark just cites an observation from Dr. Shukla's committee on the Department of Mathematics. The implication for the present report is worked out only in point 5. Hence my comments are also given there.

#### 2. On the Survey of Education:

I agree that NCERT or some similar agency (I presume that this includes UGC also) should have done this work long ago. But this work has been left undone all these years. CASE has done it and has not even asked for any special support for the purpose to be considered by the Committee. Under the circumstance: I consider that the remark that some other agency should have done it is unnecessary. It is another matter however if the CASE effort has prevented any other relevant agency from working at this task. But such a case has not been put hefore us. I would quite, welcome the proposal that NCERT or U.G.C. itself should take up such work (not 'should have done' such work). But such proposals can be discussed at that stage by the appropriate agency and need not be anticipated by our committee. The relevant question for us is whether it is appropriate that the centre of Advanced Study should step in to fill a documentary gap neglected by all other agencies, and enable research (both within and outside to the country) to 'advance' from where the previous workers have left it.... My answer is 'Yes'.

The need to use fellows without specialised competence for preparing abstracts also appears to me to be a general sin of the academic community in India. Inc procedure appears to be that the CASE requests each university to send abstracts of Ph.D. Theses, followed by reminder letters and telegrams. When all these have failed a fellow is asked to go to the spot and do the needful. The tasks of the fellow include: dealing with University Professors who have not responded, libraries and Administrators. Sometimes theses have to be dug out. The specialised skills involved in this situation are at least as much administrative as academic. Besides I do not think it is practicable to send specialists to every University for every area falling under this last stage mopping up observations unless huge amounts are set up for the purpose. I must also note in this connection that with reference to one subject I did discuss with Dr. Buch some cases of abstracts which seemed to contain no worth hile contributions and specifically asked . him whether the abstracts are fair to the Thesis. He said that in most

e abstracts were sent by the authors the

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of the cases the abstracts were sent by the authors themselves or by the Department of the concerned University. Under the circumstance I would hesitate to indicate the fellows for want of specialised competence.

I do agree that further editions of the survey should require to rectify the weakness revealed from the first venture and build up on the strength. (I presume that this is already being done).

# 3. Ph.D. Programme

I have no objection to a full-scale review of the teacher fellowship scheme and the question of residence requirements for Ph.D. The latter should be done on an all-India level. Personally I think that full residence requirements for Ph.D. in Education is an advantage only in certain types of studies. Where the emphasis is on field work in the local context, partial residence requirements may be even better than full residence.

# 4. <u>Weaknesses in certain specialisations</u>

It is true that some areas are relatively weak and that there has occasionally been inadequate specialisation for Ph.D. supervision. But I should thank that it is inevitable in our present state of development in Education where even a centre for Advanced Study of Education cannot afford to fortify every sub-area. Comparison of staff strength in an American School of Education would make the position clear. But I must also add that in education some compensatory advantage is gained (and this is particularly relevant in Indian conditions) by the generalist approach also.

# 5. <u>Possibility of low-quality contributions from</u> other disciplines (to be read with I)

Here Dr. Shukla is drawing a retrospective reference from his Report based on a visit on January 27-28, 1975 in which the Department of Mathematics was found to be very weak. Reverting back to our own committee meeting, if I remember right, three members from the Mathematics Department were present. Most of the questions on inter-disciplinary collaboration in Mathematics education were put by me, and the dialogue was mainly with one member at the other end, who impressed me as one who can contribute to mathematics education. My experience has been that inter-disciplinary dialogue does not commence with full Departments as such but with individual members who can cut across another pattern of thinking, and use it to enrich their discipline. I know of every strong, pure scientists and mathematicians who can be absolutely disinterested in or useless for educational dialogues. I have also come across relatively 'weak' mathematicians whose step by step thinking and concrete illustrations can be very useful in developing universal numeracy. In this case I do not know what is the exact nature of weakness in the Mathemitics Department found by Dr.Shukla. It is of an administrative nature or of the nature of number of papers not presented in conferences of abstract mathematics, they may be neutral to our purpose or even be an advantage. A Ramanujam who jumps seven steps at a time may not be the best person for an educational dialogue. I am not insisting

that educationists can collaborate only with mediocre mathematicians and scientists. (Persons like and Einstein and Raman could make excellent members in such teams). But unless the weakness referred to is in the nature of absolute want of logic in every member of the Department, I think the mathematics Department would have resources to make a contribution to mathematics education in school.

As regards Home Science, the attraction to do Ph.D. in education through relaxation of residential requirements can result in lowering of standards as Dr.Shukla suggests. But this relaxation can also result in more relevant and varied topics being studied. Much more than that, it can bring back to 'home science' persons who are actually running a home. Strict residential requirements for Ph.D. in home science tend to encourage women to postpone full participant home management or to neglect the home. It would be worth-while if the U.G.C. makes or helps to support a posteriori study of effect of relaxation of residential requirements on standards of Ph.D. Theses and a survey of the actual position prevailing in various universities.

6. I agree fully with first three points and the second half of the last point. I have no objection to the view that a fresh assessment committee should be sent in 1978-79, or 1979-80, if such a provision is administratively required. But among institutions which have not functioned uniformly well during the 10 years period, there is a difference for the committee between one which is showing a curve of increasing return and one which is showing a curve of decline.

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Annexure V to Item No. 8.

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Copy of letter from Dr.N. Vedamai Manuel, Prof. & Head of the Deptt. of Education, addressed to Dr.J.N. Kaul, Joint Secretary, U.G.C., New Delhi.

I am herewith enclosing my reactions to the further remarks of Prof. S.C. Shukla. I agree only with the notes of incorporation included under this point 6. The point made out by Dr. Asthana is already there in the Report (p.11 bottom and p.12 top). If at all it is modified, I would prefer that it is in the direction of toning down rather than increasing the directivity in a reference to interdisciplinarily. I believe in inter-disciplinarity, but I also think that it can only be encouraged, but not imposed, or subjected to a . . . . priori criticism. Recommendation No. 5 (p.13), I think, is ideally worded for this purpose. Many of the points raised by Prof. Shukla may indicate areas which University Grants Commission may study carefully as issues in themselves on an all-India Plane rather than get them centred round one institution which our committee has happened to visit particularly because this institution has probably done its best with a specific deficiency which has been widely pervasive.

I do not have many criticism of my own. There are some typographical errors which I presume, will be checked again. Two minor suggestions are given below :

(1) In page 5, para 2, after Child Development 'and of Mathematics' may be added. We did meet the mathematics representatives.

(2) Recommendation 4 regarding external experts in evaluation is better worded in a more flexiable and non-directive manner as in p.9 (para 1). Our recommendation should have the effect of retaining the benefits which have accrued from the internal assessment and add the benefits in terms of comparison of standards.

Proceedings of the Committee appointed to evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education at M.S. University of Baroda.

The Assessment committee appointed to evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education at M.S. University of Baroda met twice, first on June 20, and then on September 3, 1975 to consider the observations of Advisory Committee of the Centre of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences on the report submitted by the Evaluation Committee. Professor S.B. Adval and Prof. H.S. Asthana could not attend the first meeting and Professor V. Manuel could not attend the second meeting. Dr. S.K. Mitra and Professor S.C. Shukla attended both the meetings.

The Committee noted the comments of the CAS committee as reported by Prof. S.B. Adaval and Dr. J.N. Kaul and the relevant observations made in minutes of the Advisory Committee on Centres of Advanced Study which are reproduced below :-

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"The Committee considered the report of the assessment committee which evaluate the working of the CASE in Education at Baroda University and the additional comments made by some members of the Committee. It was felt that as the conclusions drawn by the Committee did not seem to flow directly from the observations made in the body of the report and as there was some diverage of opinion among the members of the Committee, it may be useful to have a meeting of the assessment committee to reconsider the whole matter. The final report of the assessment committee."

The Committee considered its own report, the comments of the members of different issues raised in the report and the observations made by the CAS Committee, observations and suggestions of the committee are given below.

1.2

1. The members of the Committee were informed by the UGC that questions have been raised by the Standing Committee of the UGC on Advanced Centres regarding the report submitted by the Assessment Committee. The members were also informed that the Assessment Committee is not expected to make any recommendations regarding the continuation or otherwise of any advanced centre which, according to the members is one of the privileges of the Assessment Committee following from one of the terms of reference of the Committee which says that the Committee has to make recommendations regarding the next 5 years and particularly about the financial matters. The members felt that the assessment report contained all the views of the Assessment Committee and the UGC could consider those views independently of the recommendations made by the Committee. 2. It was noted that the first assessment Committee under the Chairmanship of Prof. A.R.Wadia had made some recommendations and given some guidelines about the working of the CAS in Education at Baroda University. The members felt that it was a fefinite advantage that the Centre did not implement these recommendations; otherwise it would have host the concentration of work which it has developed now.

3. Advanced Centre in any subject concentrates its efforts in a specific area of the subject. Likewise, C.A.S.E. has specialised in research on teaching and its contribution as an advanced centre should be judged in that context. This is where it has made an all India impact

4. The performance of the Centre during the first five years was not very good primarily because of the changes that tsok places in the leadership of the Centre.

5. It was recognised that the impact of the Centre on the teachin programme in the Faculty of Education had not been much because it had to work under very difficult conditions created by the internal organisational set up in the Faculty of Education. The Committee howeve: was pleased to note that this difficulty had, by and large, been straighted out. It is hoped the innovative programmes and research carried on in the Centre will get reflected in the teaching programme of the Centre.

6. Inter-departmental cooperation even within the Faculty has not been possible because of conditions mentioned above and is still more unlikely in the future in view of the recent changes in the positic of senior staff in the Faculty of Education. It was noted that two or three senior persons in the Faculty including, the Director of the Cent are due to retire in a couple of years.

7. The Centre needs to develop inter-disciplinary studies and research in cognate disciplines like statistics, sociology and psychology and the Advisory Committee should have representatives from those disciplines. It should be emphasised that inter-departmental collaboration should be preferably with strong departments to avoid the danger of weak departments weakening the centre itself.

8. The question of the Centres' contribution towards an orginal theoretical frame work for research in its chosen area of specialisation namely Teaching, was discussed. It was recognised that it is too early to judge this issue. Even if the Centre adopted existing models a developed these further that should be regarded as a positive contribut

9. The Centre should retain the benefits accuring from internal assessment of its candidates but while doing so the benefits of standards prevailing in other universities should not be lost sight of

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10. There was considerable discussion on the concept of a dvanced centre and what should be expected of such centres. It was recognised that in spite of difficulties what has been achieved by the  $C \cdot A \cdot S$ . in the field of research in education is worthy of appreciation.

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11. It has been pointed out in the report that the Centre started functioning effectively only from 1969 although it was set up and recognised as a Centre in 1963. The present assessment therefore, pertains to only five years from 1969. It is, therefore, recommended that another assessment may be made by about 1978-79 to confirm that the present development has been sustained and strengthened sufficiently.
