The Chairman welcomed Professor Maqbool Ahmed who was attendirg the meeting of the Commission for the first time.

Item No. 1: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Commission held on 22nd March, 1976.

The minutes of the 178 th meeting of the University Grants Commisșion held on March 22, 1976 were confirmed.

Item No. 2 : a) To approve the action taken on certain matters.
b) To receive the items of information.
c) To receive the statement of proposals. which could not be accepted by the Commission.
(a) The Commission approved the action taken on items listed in Appendix I*. Arising out of this, the. following decisions were taken :
(i) Item 2(a)(3) - The Commission, keeping in view of the special needs of the Berhampur University, desired that it may be assisted as recommended by the Visiting Committee for the construction of the workshop building, Herbarium (Botany Department), Animal House (Zoology Department) at an estimated cost of Rs.1,10,000.
(ii) Item 2(a)(14) - The Commission was of thepriew that the Universities be advised that the teachers of the affiliated colleges located at the headquarters of the university and possessing the requisite qualifications as suggested by UGC be encouraged to participate in the postgraduate teaching in the university departments.
(iii) Item 2(a)(23) - The University may be advised to appoint the staff already agreed to as soon as possible.
(iv) Item 2(a)(25) - The English Summer Irsstitute for 1977 to be organised by the C.I.E.F.I., Shillong for universities in the region may be organised in collaboration with the North Eastem Hill University.
(b) This was noted.
(c) This was noted.

Item No. 3: To approve the statemënt of grants released after the last meeting of the Commission held on 22 nd March, 1976.

The Commission approved the grants released after the last meeting of the Commission held on 22nd March, 1976 (Appendix II*).

Item No. 4 : To receive the statement of expenditure incurred by the University Grants Commission during 1975-76 upto 31st March, 1976.

This was noted.

Item NO. 5 : To receive the minutes of N.C.C. Committee appointed by the Commission to consider the recornmendations made by the Evaluation Committee set up by the Government of India on the working of $\mathrm{N} . \mathrm{C} . \mathrm{C}$.
The Commission accepted the views of the committee on the recornmendations made by the Evaluation Committee set up by the Govermment of India on the working of the N.G.C. as given in Appendix III, and desired that the same be communicated to the Ministry of Education.

In this connection it was pointed out that a Committee was being appointed separately to prescribe the guidelines for courses in Defence/dilitary Studies.

Item No. 6: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the Commission to assess the Fifth Plan proposals of the Jadavpur University.

The Commission considered the Report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee on Jadavpur University and generally accepted the recommendations made by the Committee subject to the following:
i) The University may set up an Academic and Planning Board which may develop inter action between various faculties and formulate new courses on an inter-departmental basis as suggested by the Visiting Committee. The Board may also coordinate and continuously evaluate the progress of the Fifth Plan development schemes and projects.
ii) The question of developing studies in linguistics in the university may be examined with the help of an Expert in linguistics and the recommendation of the Visiting Committee for providing teaching staff in linguistics to the departments of English and Sanskrit may be considered in the light of the views of the Expert.
iii) The specialization for the post of professor in the department of English may be English language teaching.
iv) The post of Reader recommended under and priority for Geology Department may be provided to the Department of Chemistry rith specialisation in Photo-Chemistry.
v) The recommendations of the Visiting Committee about providing additional teaching staff to the departments of Mathematics and Physics may be considered after the views of the University on the various suggestions made by the Visiting Committee with regard to the development of new areas in these departments are available.
vi) Teaching staff as recommended by the Visiting Committee under first priority in respect of other departments may be provided to the university. The question of praviding teaching staff recommended under second priority may be considered after joint courses as suggested by the Visiting Committee have been formulated by the university and examined.
vii) Posts of two technical assistants may be provided to the department of Geology.
viii) A grant of Fs .2 .5 lakhs as UGC share may be provided to the university on 50:50 sharing basis for campus development and improvement of water supply facilities.
ix) A grant of Rs. 2 lakhs as UGC share may be provided on 50:50 basis for improvement of facilities in the existing hostels.
x) A grant of $p .5$ lakhs for equipment and posts of one instrumentation engineer and one technical assistant may be provided for establishment of central instrumentation laboratory.

The question of providing staff for central instrumentation laboratory in the universities may be examined with the help of an Expert Committee.
xi) The financial implications of the scheme accepted by the Commission are indicated in the Appendix IV.

Item No. 7:To consider the report of the Visiting Cormittee appointed by the Commission to assess the V Plan proposals of the Calcutta University.

The Comrission considered the report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee on Calcutta and fully agreed with the views expressed by the Visiting Comittee on the suggestion made by the Ghani Comittee with regard to declaring Calcutta University as an Institution of National Importance by the Central Government.

The Commission noted the recommendation of the Visiting Committee regarding the de-centralisation to be implemented simultaneously for administrative and academic purposes and agreed that it would be desirable that this de-centralisation be brought up by setting up different campuses of the Calcutta
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University. If this is acceptable to the Calcutta University, the Commission agreed to provide an allucation upto fis one crore, as its share, for this purpose and desired that the University be requested to submit iss proposals for the consideration of the Commission.

The Cormission further noted that the Calcutta University had been informed that an amoun= upio ks, 2 crores, as its share, would be available to the Gniversity during the Fifth Plan for the colleges within the metropolitan limits of Calcutta for providing inter-institurional facilities at different places and also for establishment of academic centres for improvement of standards of undergraduate education in colleges. It was noted that the University had already been requested to set up a Group for formulaing this proposal. The Commission desired that the Calcut ta University be requested to take inmediate steps in this regard keeping in view the suggestion made above for setting up muiti-campuses of Calcutta University.

The Commission generally accepted the other recommendations made by the Visiting Comittee subject to the following:
(1) The Commission could not agree with the suggestion for separating Honours courses from M.A./M.Sc. courses in the departments of Psychology, Anthropology and Physiology and for transfer of Honours courses to the collegez.
(2) The Commission was not in favour of starting postgraduate classes in the colleges affiliated to Calcutta Thiversity. The question of strengthening teaching and research programmes in the Presidency College, Calcutta and developing it as an autonomous college may be considered separately.
(3) The University and the State Govermment may take immediate steps to either merge the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences with the Postgraduate Institute of Medical Education \& Research or provide adequate hospital facilities to the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences. The question of providing assistance to the existing departments in the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences as reconmended by the Visiting Comittee may be considered only after a decision is taken on this.
(4) A specific anount be provided every year in the Revenue budget of the university for the maintenance of the university. buildings.
(5) A certain percentage of seats in the university hostels: be earmarked for research scholars enrolled with the university specially for those who come from outside the state.
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(6) The procedure for appointment of teaching staff in the university needs to be looked into by the university and the State Government. The observations made by the Visiting Committee may be kept in view while considering amendment of the University Act.
(7) The University should take immediate steps to fill all the vacant posts in each department and Commission's assistance for the teaching staff approved for a department be made available only after the existing posts available in that department have been filled.
(8) The suggestion made by the Visiting Cormittee for establishing regional offices of the University Grants Commission is a wider issue and will have to be examined in detail separately.
(9) Fifty Junior Research Fellowships.being allocated to the University for the Fifth Plan period may be utilised for development of research facilities in the existing campus as well as in the new campuses to be opened by the university during the Fifth Plan period.
(10) The teaching and other staff recommended by the Visiting Committee for various departments under first priority may be provided to the University.
(11) A grant of Rs. 7 lakhs for equipment and posts of four technical assistants including an Instrumentation Engineer may be provided to the University for establishment of a central instrumentation laboratory.
(12) Grants recommended under first and second priorities for extension of academic buildings may be provided to the University.
(13) Grant of Rs. 3 lakhs for improvement of facilities in the existing hostels and Rs . one lakh for furnishing the guest house be provided as UGC share to the University on 50:50 sharing basis.
(14) The financial implications of the schemes accepted by the Cormission are given in the Appendix V.

Item No. 8: To consider the Report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission for assessing the development needs of the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, during the Fifth Five Year Plan.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Visiting Committee appointed by it for assessing the development needs of Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, during the Fifth Five Year Plan period, and agreed to provide the grants as indicated in Appendix VI.
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The Commission further desired that the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, be requested that the details of the essential posts to be created within the total provision of As .12 lakhs and also for continuing education within the provision of 6 lakhs may be sent to the Commission for concurrence.

Item No. 9 : To consider the recommendations made by the Committee set up by the Commission to suggest Guidelines for formulating courses in History of Science and Technology in the Universities and Colleges.

## The Commission generally accepted the recommendations made by the Committee and decided :

(i) A dozen or so universities may be identified for support in teaching and research of history of science and technology. The universities so selected should have attained some level of development in this area.
(ii) Ten Junior research fellowships may be instituted for supporting research in this area. The fellowships may be administered centrally by the UGC. These fellowships will be normally available to those departments which have already made some provision for teaching and researeh in this area. It is important that the selected fellows work with guides who have demonstrated their interest and capacity in this field.
(iii) A non-recurring grant of Rs. $25,000 /-$ may be made available to some selected university departments which have already undertaken studies and research in the history of teaching science and technology. This grant will be available to the central library of the university; books and journals to be brought with the help of this grant will be selected by a committee of the concerned department.

Item No. 10: To consider the report of the Conmittee appointed by the Commission to consider the proposal of School of Planning \& Architecture, New Delhi, for declaring it as an Institution deemed to be University under Section 3 of the University Grants Commission Act.

The Commission considered the recommendation of the Committee appointed to consider the proposal of School of Planning \& Architecture, Now Delhi, for_declaring the
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School as an Institution deemed to be university under Section 3 of the UGC Act, and accepted in principle to recommend to the Central Govermment that the School of Planning \& Architecture may be declared as an Institution deemed to be University under Section 3 of the UGC Act. The Commission further desired that before this recommendation is sent to the Government of India, views of the Delhi University, to which the School is presently affiliated, may be obtained.

The Commission is further of the view that before a notification is issued in this regard, matters relating to governnance of the institution and other related matters may be examined by a Committee to ensure its functioning as a University.

Item No. 11 : To consider the report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to assess the programme of Continuing Eaucation at Saurashtra University, Pajkot.

The Commission considered the report of the Conmittee appointed by it to examine the proposal of Saurashtra University, for assistance towards its programmes of continuing education and agreed to provide assistance as detailed below on a sharing basis of $75: 25$ for the purpose during the Fifth Plan period:
i) Director of the Centre (Honorary) - Bs. $250 /-\mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
ii) Co-ordinator (Rs.1100-1600) - Revised.
iii) Programme Officer (Rs.700-1300) - Revised.
iv) Accountant-curi-clerk (265-465)
v) Typist (Rs.265-465)
vi) Messenger (Rs.110-170)

Expenditure on programmes (including honorarium to resource persons, TA and DA, remuneration to part-time assistants, etc. Books and Journals, Publication, miscellaneous expenditure e.g. Publicity, stationery, postage, electricity etc.) ... Rs. 50,000 p.a.

Non-Recurring Expenditure
(Equipment, Fumiture etc.) - Rs.20,000

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Item No. 12: To consider the recommendations of the Committee appointed by the Commission to examine the Computer requirements of. Annamalai University.

The Conmission accepted the report of the Cormittee appointed by it to examine the Computer requirements of Annamalai University, and agreed to provide the following grants for the development of. computer facilities:

1. Non-recurring
a) TDC system including taxes about Rs.27.6 lakhs.
b) Auxililary equipment and building modifications etc. - Rs. 2.0 lakhs

2: Recurring (to be provided on net deffcit basis)
a) Technical Staff and maintenance etc. as per general norms to be prescribed.

Item No. 13: To consider the recommendations of the Committee appointed by the Commission to examine the Computer requirements of M.S.University of Baroda, Baroda.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Expert Committee and agreed to provide the M.S.University of Baroda the following grants for development of computer facilities:

1. Non-Recurring
i) Computer phase I =Rs. 30 to 32 lakhs phase II = Rs. 5 lakhs
ii) Building including air-conditioning and installation of computers $=$ Rs. 3 lakhs
2. Pecurring
i) Ps. $50,000 /$ - per annum from 1976-77 for purchase of computer time until the computer centre is established.
ii) Other recurring assistance to be provided on net deficit basis according to the norms to be determined by the UGC Committee on computer development.
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Item No. 14: To further consider the question of increase in the value of the following awards under the scheme of "preparation of University level books by Indian Authors."

The Commission considered a note on the question of raising the value of the fellowship awards under the scheme of the preparation of university level books by Indian authors and decided that the value of the fellowship may be raised from Rs. 500 p.m. to $\mathrm{Ps} .600 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m} . \mathrm{w} \cdot \mathrm{e} . \mathrm{f}$. 1.9 .1975 for those fellows already working under the scheme and who have a Ph.D. degree. In the case of other fellows working under the scheme as on 1.9.1975, the value of the fellowship may be raised to hs. $600 /-\mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. when they complete two years of satisfactory work under the scheme.

The Commission could not agree to the suggestion that retired teachers/scientists who may take up book writing programe without the assistance of a fellow be paid Rs. $750 /-$ p.m as in the.case of Retired Teachers Scheme. It was noted that such teachers/scientists would receive Rs. $600 /-$ p.m. w.e.f. 1st September, 1975.

Item No. 15: To consider further the question of institution of Readership in Single Faculty Colleges.

The Commission agreed that general criteria for creation of Readerships in Single Faculty Colleges be as follows:

1) The college should have satisfied all conditions of affiliation and should have secured permanent affiliation with the university.
2) The college should have demonstrated its willingness to initiate change and innovation in teaching and internal assessment.
3) The college should have an enrolment of at least 100 in degree classes and above; a faculty of at least ten teachers and student-teacher ratio of $1: 10$, good staff to be judged by the proportion of teachers with first class postgraduate or research degrees and with research publications, facilities for postgraduate education and research and a library of at least 20,000 books and 10 to 20 research and professional journals. These criteria would apply to Teachers training, Home Sci ence and Physical Education \& Fine Arts, Social Work etc. Colleges.
4) In the case of Commerce Colleges, the college should have an enrolment of atleast 500 in degree classes and above, a student-teacher ratio of $1: 20$, good staff to be judged by the proportion of teachers with first class postgraduate or research degrees and with research publication, provision for tutorial system on an institutional basis, good examination results ( $60 \%$ and above), a library of atleast twenty to thirty thousand books and 15 to 20 academic and professional journals and facilities for postgraduate teaching and research.
5) The number of Readerships that may be made available in such colleges would be determined on the merits of each case, the assistance for such posts will be on $100 \%$ basis.

Item No. 16: To consider a proposal from Government of Madihya Pradesh to create Readership in the universities for their assignment to the Government Colleges.

The Commission generally agreed with the proposal of the Madhya Pradesh Government to create Readerships in the universities and assigning them to the Government colleges. The Commission felt that the number of Readerships to be so created would be in accordance with the guidelines accepted by the Commission.

Item No: 17: To consider the question of granting leave on academic grounds to junior and senior research fellows during tenure of fellowship.
The Commission decided that Junior and Senior Research Fellows working on the various programes of research fellowships supported by U.G.C. may be granted leave up to one academic year during the ontire tenure of the Fellowship for purposes of accepting teaching assignments on a temporary basis provided the post accepted by them is in the same department or in an institution located in the city and would therefore enable the fellow to continue with his research work also. This period would be counted towards the normal tenure of the Fellowship.

Item No. 18: To consider a proposal regarding enhancement of annual allocation made under the scheme of 'unassigned grants' to universities.

The Commission agreed that while determining the total unassigned grants to different universities for 1976-77, the following criteria may be followed:
(i) The amount may be determined on the basis of f.30/per faculty member; 虑. 15/- per university research scholar, and $8.5 /$ - per postgraduate student of the university subject to a minimum of $\mathrm{Ps} .15,000$ and maximum of Rs. one lakh. The numbers of the faculty members, research and postgraduate students are to be taken as on 15th of August of the previous year.
(ii) For the UGC Unit, Rs. 12,000/- to a University having less than 50 affiliated colleges and Rs.18,000 to a University having 50 or more affiliated colleges.

Item No. 12: To consider the question of expanding the scope of the Book Bank Scheme to cover the Postgraduate and Professional colleges.

The Commission agreed that the scheme of Book Banks may be extended to all colleges including professional colleges listed under Section 2( $f$ ) of the UGC Act. The Commission, could not agree for separate book banks for the postgraduate students.

The Commission desired that for purposes of determining enrolment under the Book Bank as well as Rs. 5 lakh scheme, the enrolment boti at the undergraduate and postgraduate level excluding PUC and Intermediate may be taken into account.

The Cormission further agreed that such of the colleges which have fully utilised the assistance already made avatlable under the Book Bank scheme, may be assisted further during 1976-77 and the assistance to be given would be upto. $50 \%$ of the grant earlier approved.

Item No. 20: To consider the suggestion to increase the amount of honorarium paid to awardees under the scheme 'USRT' by the institution, where the teacher works.

The Comission decided that under the scheme of utilisation of the services of retired teachers, an institution where the teacher works may be permitted to pay to the teacher concerned from its own funds, if it so desires, an. additional honorarium ppto a maximum of $\mathrm{Ps} .6,000 /-$ per annum, subject to the prior approval of the U.G.C., instead of Rs. $4,000 /-$ per annum as provided under the rules at present.
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Item Na. 21: To consider proposals from Jawaharlal Nehru University for additional funds during the 5 th Plan period.

The Comission considered the proposals of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for additional funds during the 5 th Plan period and decided as follows:
(a) The University be assisted for augmentation of water resources for horticulture at an estimated cost of Rs. 22 lakhs.
(b) Provision of Vice-Chancellor's residence be agreed to at an estimated cost of Rs. $1,25,000 /-$.
(c) The proposals relating to purchase of equipment for the School of Theoretical \& Invironmental Sciences, School of Life Sciences,. Central Warkshop and Instrumentation, laboratory facilities may be examined by an expert committee in the first instance.
(d) Requirements of the Computer and System Sciences may be referred to the Standing Committee on Computer Sciences.

The Conmission could not, at this stage, accept the proposal of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for provision of additional funds for construction of women's hostel and the second phase of the School building.

Item No. 22: To consider the proposal of Dibrugarh University for the introduction of Postgraduate course in Petroleum Technology.

The Commission noted the non-recurring assistance that may be available from the Ministry of Petroleum to the Dibrugarh University for the introduction of Postgraduate courses in Petroleum Technology. The Comission desired that a committee may be appointed to work out the financial implications for introduction of this course and agreed to provide assistance for recurring expenditure as may be recommended by the committee and accepted by the Cormission provided that the state Government would agree to take over this as committed expenditure after the Commission's assistance ceases at the end of 1980-81.
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Item No. 23: To consider the proposal of the Rajasthan University for the construction of building for the Institute of Correspondence Courses.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Rajasthan University for financial assistance towards the construction of a building for the Institute of Correspondence Courses at an estimated cost of Rs. 6 lakhs on a sharirg basis of 50:50. This is subject to the condition that the University of Rajasthan accepts the guidelines formulated by the TUGC for introduction of correspondence courses.

Item No. 24: To consider the amendment proposed by the University of Delhi to its Ordinance relating to Visiting Professors or Lecturers.

The Comnission agreed that the guidelines earlier prescribed by it for appointment of Visiting Professors may be revised as given below. These guidelines would apply to the Visiting Professors invited from. within the country as well as from other countries except that in the case of persons from other countries a provision may be made for payment of ecpnomy-class air-fare by direct route.

1. A Visiting Professor should be an eminent scholar in his subject.
2. The maximum tenure of a Visiting Professor be "one year and minimum three months.
3. The Visiting Professor be paid honorarium up to Ps. $3,000 /-$ per month.
4. A suitable provision be made to enable the Visiting Professor to travel within the country for approved academic programe and also for reimbursement of medical expenses, if any.

## Visiting Appointments

1. The duration of visit should not be less than two weeks and should not exceed four months in a year.
2. The travel expenses would be met by the host institution.
3. In case of a person receiving his salary from the "parent institution", for the period of the visit, the host institution would provide hospitality and pay an honorarim not exceeding ls .1000 per month.

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4. In the case of a person not receiving his salary from his "parent institution" for a peniod of his visit, the "host institution" would pay an honorarium not exceeding $\mathrm{Ps} .2,500 /-$ per month.
In the case os $V_{i s i t i n g ~ F e l l o w s ~ a p p o i n t e d ~ i n ~ t h e ~}^{\text {in }}$ Centres of Advanced Study, the Comission agreed that such appointments should not be generally less than 3 months and exceed one academic year at the most. The honorarium be fixed within a range of Rs. 1500 to Rs. 2500 per month depending on the academic standing of the person appointed as a 'Visiting Fellow'.

The Commission desired that the Delhi University be requested to review its Ordinance for appointment of" 'Visiting Professors' in the light of the above.

Item No. 25: To consider the proposal of the Gujarat University for setting up a Department of Commerce.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Gujarat University for setting up a Department of Commerce for providing postgraduate instruction in Cormerce and agreed to provide for staff of one Professor, two Readers and three Lecturers within the grant already allocated during the Fifth Plan peridd.

The teaching of the postgraduate classes in Commerce would be organised by the Department of Commerce and the related departments in the School of Social Sciences and Management Studies.

Item No. 26: To consider the question of reviewing the policy of awarding Scholarships at the Honours and Master degree.level in Arabic, Persian, Sanskrit and Pali.

Consideration of this item was postponed to the
next meeting.

Item No, 27: To receive a note on implementation of the revised scales of pay and the conditions attached to these i.e. minimum qualifications, examination, remuneration and code of conduct in different States:

The Commission considered the note on the implementation of the revised scales of pay and the conditions attached to these, and decided. as follows:
(1) The minimum qualifications prescribed for recruitment to the posts of Lecturer in the Faculties of Arts, Social Sciences including Comerce and Science in the Universities be as per Appendix VII.
(2) The qualifications suggested for the posts of Lecturers at (1) above would also apply to all the Central Universities. It was also decided to ask the Delhi University to consider if they would like to have the same qualifications as suggested above for the teachers to be appointed in its college's.
(3) A committee may look into the question of prescribing minimum qualifications for lecturers in the Faculties other than Arts, Science, Social Sciences including Commerce and also for teachers in foreign languages and such other subjects for which adequate facilities for Ph.D. are not available in the country.
(4) The teachers who are re-employed by the universities after attaining the age of superannuation i.e., 60 years, should not hold appointments as Head of Departments or Dean of Faculties or any other such administrative responsibility.
(5) The Government of India be requested to impress upon the State Govemments to introduce retirement benefits (where not already done) as recommended by the "Sen Committee" and also provision for security of service for the employees of the universities and colleges.
(6) The Universities be requested to send a copy of the advertisement issued for recruitment to the teaching and academic posts and the qualifications of the persons finally appointed. In this connection, it was noted that the universities have been advised to send their advertisements for recruitment to the Employment News (Rozgar Samachar) being published by the Directorate of Audio Visual Publicity, Govermment of India.
(7) The Government of India be advised that condition (vi) for introduction of the revised scales of pay may be amended as follows:

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"The existing lecturers in colleges who did not
    possess at the time of their initial recruitment
    minimum qualifications as prescribed by the
    university concerned at the time of appointment
    should be required to attain these qualifications
    within five years from the date of placement in the
    revised scale. If they are unable to do so during
    this period, they should not be allowed to eam
    any future increment till they have satisfied
    this condition."
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(8) The Commission could not accept the suggestion of the Government of Meghalaya that marginally lower level of academic performance should be allowed for a person belonging to Schedule Tribe for being eligible for appointment as a lecturer under revised scale of pay.

The Commission desired that the points raised regarding Code of Conduct in the note placed before it may be brought up again at its next meeting.

Item NO. 28: To consider the Budget Estimates of the University Grants Cormission for 1976-77 (Plan).

It was agreed that this may be brought up before the Commission at the next meeting and in the meantime the proposed estimates may be treated as the interim working budget.
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Item NO. 22: To consider certain establishment matters of the University Grants Conmission.
(i) Report made by the Committee appointed to examine the question of recruitment of persons belonging to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in the office of the UGC.
(ii) Recommendations of the Departmental Promotion Committee for Class-I posts made at its meeting held on 6th April, 1976.
(iii) Reappointment of Dr. D. Shankar Narayan as Additional Secretary, University Grants Commission on tenure basis for another term of 5 years.
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(i) The Commission accepted the recommendations contained in the report made by the Comrnittee appointed to examine the question of recruitment of persons belonging to Scheduled Castes and Schedulai Tribes in the office of the University Grants Comnission and desired that further necessary action may be taken as early as possible.
(ii) The Commission while noting that there was no eligible candidate belonging to the reserved category of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in the cadre of Education Officer, Assistant Bducation Officer and Section Officer (Grade I) for promotion to the cadres of Deputy Secretary, Education Officer and Assistant Secretary respectively accepted the recommendations of the Departmental Promotion Comittee for Class-I posts made at its meeting held on 6th April, 1976 and approved the following departmental candidates for promotion in the order of merit given below in the respective cadres of Deputy Secretary, Education Officer and Assistant Secretary:-

Item No. 31: To consider the proposal of the Bombay University for the continuation of the Sabbatical Leave Programme in respect of teachers in Physics from the constitument colleges of the University.

The Commission desired that the Sabbatical Leave Programme which was initiated as on ad-hoc basis at the Bombay University may be discontinued w.e.f. 1976-77, in view of the fact that the Cormission has since formulated a detalled programme for Faculty Improvement Programe.

Item No. 32: To consider the question of extension of the two Senior Fellowship of the value of fs. $1,000 /-$ each offered by University Grants Comnission to Afghan Scholars by one year.

- The Commission agreed that tenure of two Senior Fellowships offered by the UGC to Afghan Scholars be extended by one year.

Item No, 33: To consider the report of the visiting committee appointed to examine the proposal of the Gujarat University, Ahmedabad, for the introduction of postgraduate course in Textile Chemistry etc.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Visiting Committee appointed to examine the proposal of the Gujarat University, Ahmedabad, for the introduction of postgreduate courses in Textile Chemistry, Analytical Chemistry, and Polymer Sciences and agreed to provide assistance as under :

It was noted that the establishment of these courses would also help in channelising the students who would otherwise seek admission in Chemistry Department consequent upon the affiliated colleges discontinuing Post-graduate classes.

The Commission further noted that the entire nonrecurring requirements for building and equipment for these courses would be met by the University out of the donations received by it. The Commission may be informed of the details of the expenditure incurred for these purposes.

DECISION OF THE UNIVERSITY GRANIS COMMISSION ON THE - RECOMMENDATION OF THE EVALUATION COMUTTEE

Recommendation of the Evaluation Committoe

1. Attendance at a NCC activity may be treated as academic attendance.
2. Universities having Military Studies Departments should offer Military Science as an elective subject, open to NCC Cadets.
3. The poissibility of NCC ${ }^{\text {B }}{ }^{\prime}$ ' Cenrtificate being treated as a subsidiary elective subject should be examined on the . $:$ basis of a revised syllabus. A revised syllabus has also been attached.

## Views of the University Grants Commission

The NCC Cadets should be enabled to derive the benefits for purposes of academic attendance, in the same memer as it available for students participating in the N.S.S. prom grammes and sports etc.. Any approved NCC activity which makes it necessary for the cadets to miss their academic class work should be treated as valid for purposes of academic attendance. Such concession should however, not exceed, say more than 6 per cent of the minimum attendance required as per university regulations.

It would be more appropriate to designate the existing military studies department in the universities as departments of defence stum dies and associate in their teaching and field programmes, personal, both active and retired, from the Defence . services. Defence studies or military studies should not be considered as an easy elective and alternatives to other courses. Accordingly, the contents to be included should be of university level and for this purpose a model syllabus could be laid down with the help of a Committee and the National Defence College. The syllabus so suggested could be suitably adopted. by other universities.

The ' B ' Certificate and its contents as at present cannot be accepted as a subsidiary elective subject for university studies. It should not be treated even as a subsidiary for a student offering military science as a major subject of study. The model syllabus to be suggested as indicated above, if it is of the university level, could perhaps be included as one of the subjects at the degree level in due course.

Recommendation of the Evaluation Committee
4. Other things being equal a student who has successfully completed NCC training may be given preference for admission to postgrdduate and professional studies.
5. The teachirg periods should be compressed to 5 days and one day in the week should be designated as Field day to be devoted to NCC activities as well as other youth activities, such as National Service Scheme and N.S.O.
6. The Directors of National Cadet Corps in the States may be given severe powers to award 'Displeasure'/to 'asure' the Part-time National Cadet Corps Officers with the provision for an appeal to the Vice Chancellors.
7. The heads of colleges/institutions should have powers of discharge of Senior Division NCC: Cadets as the Headmasters exercised those powers in respect of Junior Division Cadets.
8. Enrolment of students in NCC must be voluntary and selective. Rules of attendance must be strictily enforced after they join tho organisation.

## Views of the University Cicants Commission

It may not be appropriate to give preference to students who have completed NCC training for purposas of admission to postgraduate and professional studies. However, olly those cadets who have obtained ei:her ${ }^{1} \mathrm{~B}$ ' or ' C ' certificates should be given due weightage as is generaly given to outstanding sportsmen in the matter of admission to such courses.

The Committee regretted to accept this decision as it was not practicable.

In the present context it would be more appropriate to deal in such matters of indiscipline through the Heads of the educational institutions.

The Committee was of the view thet the powers to discharge the Cadets in the NCC should be vested. with the Commanding Officer instead of the Hoad of the Institution.

The Committee accepted the recommendation.

With regard to the reference from the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation regarding the guideline for a model Social forestry programe, the Commission was of the view that this should form part of the N.C.C. programme.

## Appendix VII to Item No. 27

For future recruitment to the posts of Lecturers in Universities, the minimum qualifications shall be as may be determined by the University Grants Commission which are as follows:

## University Lecturers

(a) A Doctor's degree or research work of an equally high standard; and
(b) consistently good academic record with list or high 2nd class B (in the seven point scale) Master's degree in a relevant subject or an equivalent degree of a foreign university.

Having regard to the need for developing interdisciplinary programmes, the degrees in (a) and (b) above may be in relevant subjects.

Provided that if the Selection Committee is of the view that the research work of a candidate as evident either from his thesis or from his published work is of very high standard, it may relax any of qualifications prescribed in (b) above.

Provided further that if a candidate possessing a Doctor's degree or equivalent research work is not available or is not considered suitable, a person possessing a consistently good academic record (weightage being given to M. Phil. or equivalent degree or research work of quality) may be appointed provided he has done research work for at least two vears or has practical experience in a research laboratory/organisation on the condition that he will have to obtain a Doctor's degree or give evidence of research work of equivalent high standard within five years of his appointment, failing which he will not be able to earn future increments until he fulfils these requirements.

## Explanation:

1. Candidates for being elligible for recruitment to the posts of Lecturers must have a ist or high Second Class B (in the seven point scale) at the Master's level and for determining consistently good record, average of $50-55 \%$ or $B$ (in the seven point scale) may be expected at the two examinations prior to the Master's examination.

- The following two examples would illustrate the above:
(1) A candidate who has obtained $52 \%$ marks at the Higher Secondary/Pre-University/Intermediate and $58 \%$ at the Degree Level would have an average of $55 \%$ and as such could be considered.
(11) A candidate who has obtained $60 \%$ at Higher. Secondary/Pre-University/Intermediate and 44\% at the Degree level would have an average of $52 \%$ and as such could be considered.

The minutes of the 177 th meeting of the University Grants Commission held on 16th February, 1976 were confirmed subject to the following:

The following may be added as sub-para (iii) to the general discassions held, on page 2 of the minutes:
"(iii) The Commission should have a mechanism for monitoring various research programmes in the universities in terms of their quality and relevance.". .
The following changes nay be made in Appendix IV to Item No. 3:

The first sentence in guideline No. 1 may read as follows:

- "The fellowship may be awarded to deserving " scholars working for Ph.D. degree."

The first sentence in guideline No. 6 may read as follows:
"The awards against these fellowships may be made with the help of a Committee appointed by the: University and in consultation with the Rescarch Fellowships Committee of the Department concermed and before the end of Septenber each year."

In this connection, the Commission desired that the universities be advised to set up Research Fellowships Comittee in the different departments of the universities.

Item No. 2: (a) To approve the action taken on certain matters.
(b) To receive the items of information.
(c) To receive the statement of proposals which could not be accepted by the Commission.
(a) The Commission approved the action taken on items listed in Appendix I*.
(b) This was noted.
(c) This was noted. ............ .

Item No. 3 : To approve the statement of grants released after the last meeting of the Commission held on 16th February, 1976.

The Cominission approved the grants released after the last meeting of the Commission held on 16 th February, 1976 (Appendix II*).

Item No. 4 : To receive the statement of expenditure incurred by the University Grants Commission during 1975-76 upto 29 th February, 1976.
. . . .This. was noted. . In .this .connection, it was .desired that the State Governments be advised to consider the possibility of introducing the block grant system for payment of maintenance grants to the universities.

Item No. 5: To receive a statement indicating the progress of issue of Utilization Certificates during the period ending 29th February, 1976.

This was noted.

Item No. 6 : To consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities \& Social Sciences on the report of Cormittee set up by the Commission to evaluate the working of the Centre of Advanced Study in Education, M.S. University of Baroda.

Consideration of this item was deferred.

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Item NO. 7 : To consider the recomandation of the Advisory Committee for Centres of Acivanced Study in Humanties \& Social Sciences on the report of Comittee set up by the Commission to evaluate the work of the Centre of Advanced Study in History, Aligarh Muslim University, and to examine its development proposals for the Fifth Plan period.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the V Plan Visiting Committee in respect of the Centre of Advanced Study in History at the Aligarh Muslim University and agreed to provide assistance as indicated in Appendix III up.to the end of 1978-79.

The Comission desired that the Centre should be advised to make special efforts to recruit a suitable proportion of its faculty from other universities and research centres in the country.

The Commission noted that in the case of the state Universities, it had been agreed that the recurring assistance for appointment of staff for Centres of. Advanced Study, Area Studies Programme, etc. approved during the V Plan be provided till 1980-81, provided that the Sta'te Govermments agree to take over this as committed expenditure thereafter. The Commission agreed that the other recurring expenditure sanctioned for proposals under these schemes may also be provided till 1980-81 on the usual tērms and conditions.

Item No. 8 : To consider the recommendations made by the Advisory Committee for the Centres of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences on the report of the Assessment Committee set up by the Commission to examine the 5th Plan development proposals of the Centre of Advanced Study in Economics, Bombay University.

The Commission accepted the recominendations of the Acivisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities and Social. Sciences in respect of the further development of the C.A,S. in Economics, University of Bombay, and agreed to provide grants as indicated in Appendix. IV. The assistance of the Comission would be available'upto 1980-81 subject to the usual conditions:

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Advisory Comittee for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities and Social Sciences in respect of the Centre of Advanced Study in Economics, University of Poona and agreed to provide grants as indicated in Appendix VI. The assistance of the Commission would be available upto 1980-81 subject to the usual conditions.

In this connection, the Commission desirod that the Poona University be requested to consider the question of giving aatonomous status to the Gokhale Institute of Politics \& Economics, so as to enable it develop good. undergraduate and postgraduato courses in Economics.

Item No. 11: To consider the recommendations made by the Advisory Committee for the Centres of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences on the report of the Assessment Committee set up by the Comission to examine the 5th Plan development proposals of the Centre of Advanced Study in Linguistics, Annamalai University.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Advisory Comattec for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities and Soeial Sciences in respect of the C.A.S. In Lingulstics, Annamalai University, and agreed to provide grants as indicated in Appendix VII. The assistance of the Commission would be avalable upto 1980-81 subject to the usual conditions.

The Commission accopted the reconmendations of the Advisory Comattee for Centres of Advanced Study in Hunanities and Social Sciences in respect of the C. A.S. in Sanskrit, University of Poona, and agreed to provide grants as indicated in Appondix VIII. The assistance of the Commission would be availabIe upto 1980-81 subject to the usual conditions.

Item No.13: To consider the recommendations of the Advisory Committee for the Centres of Advanced Study in the Humanities and Social Sciences on the report of the Comrittee set up by the Commission to evaluate the work of the Centre of Advanced Study in Sociology; Delhi Thiversity, and to examine. its development proposals for the 5 th Plan period.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Advisory Committee for Centres of Advanced Study in Humanities and Secial Sciences in respect of the C.A.S. in Sociology, Delhi University, and agrecd to provide grants as indicated in ppendix IX. The assistance of the Commission would be available for the period ending 1978-79.

Itom No.14: To consider the recommendations of the Committee set up by the University Grants Commission for proposing ways and means of developing expertise in the field of Archaeology and Museums in the Universities.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Committee set up by the U.G.C. for proposing ways and means of developing expertise in the ficld of archaeology and maseums in the universities and agreed that 10 fellowships of the value of ls .500 per month for a period of three months every year be nade available to in-service teachers who may like to undertake training in the ficld of archaeology with the Lurchaeological: Survey of India at their major excavation centres. Each person would avail of this fellowship for a poriod of three months in two successive years. In addition to the fellowship, the fellow would be paid T. L. in accordance with the rules of the university concermed.

It was noted that the maximum number of followships that may be available at any given time would not exceed 20.

The Universitios having at'least four courses in archaeology at the postgraduate level and with adequate arrangement for practical treaining may be considored for some assistance outside the plan allocation for development of archaeological studies.

Item NO. 15: To consider the recommendations rade by the Pancl on Law at its mecting held on $N$ vvember 22, 1975 and Jamuary 27, 1976 regarding scholarships for full-time fJ.M. courses.

The Commission agreed to institute 50 scholarships for LJ.M. studios to be administered directly by the UGC to onable merited students to pursue their full-time LL.M. course in universities identified for the purpose with the help of Pancl on law. The value of the scholarships would be Rs. $250 /$ - per month tciable for a period of two years and where a scholar is enrolled in a university other than from the university from which he obtained his LI.B. degroe, he ray also be paid travel expenses as in the case of national scholarships.

In the light of the views expressed by the universities on the earlier decision of the Cormission that only full-time LI.M. courses be provided by the universities, the Commission desired that the Law Panel may be requested to revicw its earlier recommendations rogarding this, bearing in mind that factors like criteria of admissions, quality of teaching, the prescribed standard for the LL.M. courses, motivation and job opportunities for the candidates and the total period of studies may be more important than the full-time or halftine character of the course.

Item No. 16: To consider the recommendation of forty-second report of the Committec on the welfare of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes on the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare.

The Comission noted that in the past it had not even bcen possible to award all junior and senior fellowships reserved for scheduled castos and scheduled tribes. The Comission was of the vicw that its decision to earmark 50 junior fellowships to be awarded in addition to the 10 per cont already roserved for candidates belonging to schoduled
p.t.o.
castes and scheduled tribes would be more adventageous to the students coming fron the weaker sections than accepting the suggestion made by the Committee on the welfare of Scheduled Cgstes and Schoduled Tribes to provide for $22 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent roservations for such students in the general pool.

The Commission further desired that the present provision be reviewed after a period of two to three years.

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Item No. 17: To receive a Report of the UGC-ICSSR Study Team on Social Sciences in Professi mal Education.

This was noted. It was also observed that the report of the UGC-ICSSR Study Team on Social Sciences in Professional Education has also been circulated to the universities and professional colleges.

Item No. 18: To consider a reference from the Ministry of Education and Social Weifare regarding recommendations made by the Committee of Writers on travelling fellowships/special Visiting Professorships.

The Commission accepted in principle the suggestion made by tho Comittec of Writers on travelling fellowships/ special Visiting Professorships in the universities and desired that the details of the scheme may be worked out With the help of a Committec. The Commission further desired that such Visiting fellowships should also be available in other creative arts.

Item No. 12: To consider again the report of the M.Phil. Comittee about the objectives and working of the M.Phil Courses in the universities.

The Commission desired that a sub-comittee of the Comission may finalise the guidelines for instituting M. Phil. courses keeping in view the discussions held at the meeting of the Commission.

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Iton NO. 20: To consider the report of the sominar on continuing cducation hold at P pona on February 7-9, 1976.

This was noted. The Cormission desired that this may be considered by the Committee on Continuing Education.

Iten No. 21: To further consider the proposal of the Bhopal University for starting correspondence courses for B.A. and B.Com.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Bhopal University for starting correspondence courses for B. A. and
B. Com. and agreed to provide necessary assistance in accordance with the norms. The Commission desired that the University be advised not to appoint any tutors for the proposed correspondence courses.

It was noted that the M.P. Uchha Shiksha Anudan Ayog has given an undertaking thatono other university in M.P. will offer correspondence courses during the current Plan period.

Item No, 22: To consider the ques位符, of period of assistance to the affiliated colle ges towards the creation of additional posts during Vth Plan.

The Comission agreed that assistance for additional teaching posts, if any, sanctioned under the fis. 5 lakh scheme or under the schemes for assistance of the development of postgraduate facilities in affiliated colleges may be provided for the period ending 1980-81 on the usual conditions. However, while estimating the cxpenditure on such posts within the overall ceiling for the different schemes, the cost will be worked out for the period ending 1978-79.

Item NO: To consider the question of extending benefit of the scheme af Teachor Fellowship to teachers in the affiliated agricultural colleges.

The Commission desired that the I.C.A.R. be requested to consider the desirability of instituting teacher fellowships for teachers from the agricultural colleges affiliated to the Universities.

Item No. 24: To consider the question of providing assistance to the colleges in Biher which have suffered in floods last year.

The Commission expressed its inability to provide any special assistance to the colleges which were affected by the fldods in Bihar last year. The Comission, however, agrecd that in case of such colleges, assistance under As. 5 lakh scheme may not be split in two phases, but, if necessary, the proposals of the colloges may be considered for full assistance in the first instance itsclf.

Item No. 25: To consider the programes of academic collaboration between (1) Department of Botany, Calcutta University, and Qucen Mary College, University of London, Department of Botany, University of Nottingham, U.K., (2) Department of Metallurgical Engincering, BHU, and Department of Metallurgy, University of Sheffield (UK).

The Commission accepted the programmes of academic collaboration between (1) Department of Botany, Calcutta University, and Queen Mary College, University of London, Department of Botany, University of Nottingham, U.K. and (2) Department of Metallurgical Engineering, B.H.U., and Department of Metallurgy, University of Sheffield (U.K.) and agreed to provide assistance as given in Appendix X.

Item No. 26: To consider the propsal of the Utkal University for change in the specialisation for the posts of Readers approved for the V Plan period.

The Commission desired that the proposals from the universitics suggesting changes in specialisation for the posts accepted on the recommendations of the $V$ Plan Visiting Committees may be placed before the Commission for consideration with all relevantinformation e.g. (a) the Visiting Committee's recommendations, (b) justification given by the University for the change in specialisation, and (c) qualifications and specialisation of the academic staff ailcady in position in the Department.

The Commission further desired that the proposal of Utkal University may be brought before it along with the information indicated above.

Item No. 27: To consider the report of the Visiting Commj.ttee appointed by the Commission to exanine the proposals of the Calcutta University for the development of University PG Centre at Agartala.

The Commission accepted the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee which examined the proposal of the Calcutta University for setting up a Postgraduate Centre at Agartala and agreed to provide assistance as given in Appendix XI.

In this connection, the Comrission desired that a sum. of Pis. 50,000 may be provided for use of researeh facilities by teachers of the Postgraduate Centre at other places.

Item No. 28: To consider the report of the Visiting Committee which assessed the Vth Plan needs of universities in the Madhya Pradesh (except Jabalpur University).

The Comission noted the general observations made in the reports of the Visiting Committee on the development of higher education in the universities in M.P. (excluding Jabalpur). It also noted the discussions which the Visiting Committee had wi th the representatives of the State Government and the M.P. Uchha Shiksha Anudan Ayog: The Comission made the following gencral and specific observations in this regard:

## GEMVERAL

1. ... The Commission agreed that the Uchha Shiksher Antidan Ayog could play a useful role in proper implementation of the development programmes of the universities but it was emphasized that the overall responsibility for coordination and maintonance of standards had been vested wi th the UGC in the contoxt of development of higher education in the country.
2. The present organisation of the univorsities in M. P: does not facilitate a proper inter-action with the colleges and the universities concerned. It would, therefore, be desirable to establish such working relationships as . well as set up an Advisory Committee to help the colleges affiliated to the universities concorned for their planning and developmont and utilization of the assistance available from the U.G.C. and the State Govemment. The Commission would consider providing some assistance to enable such Committees to function in en offective manner.
3. In view of the limited resources available, it would be desirable if the universities could undertake a survey of the stage of development of its colleges and identify one or two colleges in each district which could be assisted and developed as quality institutions in the present plan period in the first instance.
4. Wherever appropriate, some of the colleges located at the headquarters of the University could be made as constituent colleges and the University might teke over direct responsibility for their administrative and academic functions. (It was noted that somewhet similar arrangoment has been introduced in some of the universities in Bihar.).
5. The constitution of Board of Studies be so modified that the University Departments would be enabled to play a major. role in the development of curricula and courses of studies.

The Commission generally accepted the rocommendations made by the Visiting Comittee which assessed the V. P.lan.
: needs of the Universitios in M.P. as indicated in Appendix XII subject to the following:

Bhopal University:. The proposal of the University for setting up a Department of Law may be considered on merit along with similar proposals from other universities in Madhya Pradesh. The University may establissh ai Department of Modern Persian and Modern Arabic instoad of Department of Comparative Language and Culture with one Professor, two Readers and two Lecturers.

Jiwaij and Vikram Thiversities: The Univorsities may develop facilities for the entire history of India including hastory of medieval and moderm periods in addition to the history of anciont period on which they are concentrating at present.

Saugar University: The Comission desired that in order to strengthen the study of medieval history, it would be useful to start postgraduate course in the Departrent of Urau and Persian. and for this; one post of Reader may also be provided:
A.P.S. University, Rewa: The Commission desired that funds for the proposed Department of Physics may be provided under Priority I. The University may utilize the grants to set up a broad-based department requirod to mect its teaching needs and need not aim at specialisation in space physics.

Item No. 29: To consider further the report of the Roview Comittee on Visva-Bherati app ointed by the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare in the light of the comments roceived from the Academic Council and the Erecutive Council of the University on the report of the Committee.

The Comission considered the report of the Review Committec on Visva-Bharati appointed by the Ministry of Education \& Social Welfare and generally agreed wi th the recomendeti ons made by the Committee. It was felt that the power of the Visitor may, generally, be similar to those in other Central Universities.

The Comaission also considared the comments received from the Visva-Bharati on the report and agreed that the observations on these as given in Appendix XIII* may also be communicated to the Ministry of Education.

Item No. 30: To consider the report of the Comnittee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine a proposal to declare the School of Planning and Architecture as an Institution deemed to be University under Section 3 of the UGC Act.

Consiacration of this iten was postponed.

Item NO. 31: To consider certain establishment matter of the UGC.

Request from Shri M, Achuthan, Staff-CarDriver for altcration of his date of birth in the office record.

Thic Comission in view of the circumstances of the casc as represcnted by Shri M. Achuthan, Staff-Car-Driver, and the affidevit filed by him, agreed, as a special case, that the date of his birth recorded in his service book in the University Grants Comission may be altered to 16th November, 1923.

Item No. 32: To note the dete and place for the next mecting of the Commission.

It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held on April 29, 1976.
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Iten No. 33: To consider the Budget Estimates for 1976-77 under Plan.

The Commission noted the provision thet may bo available to the Comissi on under plen during 1976-77 and dosired that the draft budget estimatos may be referred to a committee of the Comission for considoration.

Itom No. 34: To receive the Annual Accounts of the University Grants Comission for the ybar 1972-73 as prosented to the Parliament under Section 19(4) of the. UGC Act, 1956.

Tho Commission approved the replies to the audit objections on the annunl accounts of the UGC for the year 1972-73 as given in Appendix XIV.*

Item No. 35: To consider the question of establishment of a National People's University (Open University).

The Comission weleomed the proposal of the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare for setting up of a National People's University (Open Univorsity) on the lines indicated in the note.

Iten No. 36: To consider the question of revision of rates of Scholarships payable to National Scholars appointed under the scheme of Centre of Advanced Study.

The Comission agreed that the valuc of the scholarships may be revised as follows with effect fron the next academic year:
(a) Scholarships instituted by the UGC for pursuing M.A./ M.Sc. courses :- From Rs. 150 per month to Rs. $250 /$ - per month.
(b) Scholarships for honours courses instituted by the UGC :- From Ps. $100 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. to Rs. $150 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.

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In this conncction, the Comission dosired that the question of averding scholarships at the honours and master's degree level in Arabic, Persion, Sanskrit and Pali may be reviewed. Wi.th regerd to the proposal from tho Delhi University to incroese the volue of M.Iitt. scholarships from Rs. $250 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. to $\mathrm{Is} .400 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. the Commission desired that it may bo ascertained in the first instence if the M.Litt. cuurse was in the nature of M. Phil. course as now defined by the Commission. If it be so, tho value of the scholarships may be raised to ks. 400 per month.

Programes of academic collaporation between the Universities in India and U.K. under IBUC
(a) Department of Boteny; Calcutta University and Queen Mary College, -University of London/Department of Botany, University of Nottingham, U.K.
(1) The duration of the programme will be fite years.
(2) Exchange of visits of three scientists per yeer from India to U.K. and vice-versa.
(3) The period of stay of junior scientist three months. The longer 1 senior not exceed four weeks and for programme is required for detailed acquaintance with and experience of any panticular specialised methedology or instrumentation and collection ô material from endemic conditions for further stay. The shorter programme will involve holding of seminers and discussions, acquintance with specialised technology and exchange of observations on the topic concerned.
(4) Visitors on longer programe may include technical personnel as well.
(b) Department of Metalurgical Engineering, -BHiU and Department of Metallurgy, University of Sheffield (U.K.).
(1) The programe will be of the duration of five years.
(2) The programe would involve exchange of academic starif about five on either side over a five year period.
(3) Roughly half of the visits would be of the duration of $2-12$ wecirs primarily for the exchange of ideas and to a limited extent for experimental work. The other half of the visits may be of the duration of 3-12 months mainly to prosecute researches in one specified area:
(4) The short and long visits over the five yeer period would involve $40-\mathrm{man}$ months at Sheffield and 20 man months at Veranasi.
(5) A limited number of exchange visits for 25 -man days eech over the five year period on both sides may a so be provided for British/Indian Scientists, who may happen to visit the host, or neighbouring countries in some other connections. Such visits would involve only locel hopitelity.
(6) During 1976, the following visits would materialise :-
(i) Long visit by Dr. S.N.Tiwari, Reader in Process Metallurgy to Sheficield for one year for work in Solidification.

(iii) Short visit by Dr. CM.Sell ars, Reader in Metallurgy, to Varenasi for 12 weeks for studies on Ifechanicel Working. Provision for support for the research expenses of visiting scientists and for the occasional necessity to transfer experimental material between the-two departments annuil. allocation of funds- $\$ 500$ from U.K. side and Rs. $10,000 /$ - from the Indian side to pay for the cost of raterials and their transport between the two centres.

-The University Grants Commission approved the constriction of staff quarters for Class IV staff at Allahabad University at an estimated cost of $\mathrm{Fs} .2,01,794$ pon usual sharing basis during the fourth plan period. The approval was conveyed to the university vide letter dated 16.2.1973. Subsequently, on 1.8.1973 the Government of India imposed a ban for one year i.e. 1973-74 on construotion of non-functionil billding as en econony moasure.

The university vide its letter dated 13.11.1973 approached the Tniversity Grants Comiaission to lift the ban as all fomalities for construction purposes were completed by the university. After careful examination, the university was allowed vide letter No.F.59-4/70(CU/D-2a) dated 21.11.1973 to proceed with the construction work on the specific condition that the university would utilise the matchins share of the project from the State Government - In the first instance and would approach the University Grants Commission for funds in the fifth plan. This was done on the
.. presumption that the ban would be lifted in 1974-75. However,

-     - the Government of India did not do so, but in the meantime, the university had already incurred expenditure amounting to Ps. 1, 18, $400 /$-upto 31st May, 1974 on the project. The " Withholding of the grants' (UGC share) would have thus resulted in waste of money and delay in the completion of the project. To avoid this loss, grants were released to the Allahabad University from $1974-75$ onwards; so as to enable it to complete the project and put the milding to use. (vide orders dated 28.3.1976.)

## 3. Berhampur University-Construction of Teachers Hostez12 Teachers Quarters-Fifth Plan Scheme

The V.G.C. fifth Plan Visiting Comrnittee which examined the requirements of Berhampur University recommended assistance of Rs. $1,75,000 /$ (i.e. $50 \%$ of Rs. $3,50,000 /-$ ) for the construction of Staff Quarters(i.e. 10 Lecturers quarters) under 3rd priority. In view of the fimited resources available vith the Commission, this proposal could not be accepted by the Comission. In December, 1975, the Berhampur University requested the Comission that it may be permitted to undertake the construction of Teachers Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs. $4,60,000 /$-in place of canteen building, workshop building, Herbarium (Botany Deptt.) and Animal House (Zoology Deptt.) approved by the Comaission since the University was in urgent need of staff quarters. The proposal of the Berhampur University for the construction of Teachers Hostel has been accepted (NO.F.19-4/74 (D-3a) dated the 8th March, 1976) on 50:50 sharing basis, on the condition that the Comnission's share for the purpose will be limited to $1 \mathrm{~s} .2,30,000 /$ or $50 \%$ of the actual expenditure, whichever is less, and this anount will be met by the University from out of the provision already appproved for the following items during the V Plan period:-

4. Bhagalpur University-construction of Superintendents ${ }^{\prime}$ Quarters in the hostels-5th plan.

In March, 1976 the Bhagalpur University sent a proposal for construction of 3 Superintendents Quarters at an estimated cost of Ri.47,554/-each-One each for the Postgraduate Men's Hostel, Postgratuate Women's Hostel \& 2nd Men's Hostel. In support OI the proposal, the University stated that the construction of quarters was necessary as no Senior teacher was willing to accept the Superintendantship of Hostels for want of suitable accommodation. The University further informed that their. need was urgent \& for supervision and nanagement of hostels, senior teachers are to be persuaded to the Superintendentship of the hostels. Accordingly, the proposal of the Bhagalpur University for the construction of 3 Superintendents quarters at an estimated cost of Ps. $1,1,4,662 /-$ has been accepted
(F.9-4/76(D.3a) dated 30th March, 1976) on the condition that the assistance of the comission for all the quarters will be linited to Rs. $71,331 /$ - or $50 \%$ of the actual expendituro, whichovor is loss and that the assistance for this project will be within the 5th Plen allocation.
5. Burdwan University Grants-in-aid towards appointant of Trained Coachos - 5th Plan Period.

The UGC Fifth Plan Visiting Comittoc which ox amined the 5 th Plan proposals of the Burdwan University recomended the appointment of 2 trained coaches for providing training to students in the fiold of games and sports. However, in view of the lirrited resourcos available with the University Grants Comission, this could not be accomodated within the schemes accepted by the Conraittec for the current Plan period. In March, 1976, the Burdwan University informed the Comaission that the necossity for the appointnent of 2 Trained Coaches was being keonly felt and, therefore, requested the Comission to provide assistence towards the appointment of two trained coaches in the Fifth Plan period. Accordingly, the proposel of Burdwan university-for the appointraent of two trained coaches in the usual scale of pay has been accepted on the condition that the Comission will provide assistance towards the salary of these posts on 75:25 sharing basis upto the end of the 5th Plan period and thereafter these posts will be meintained by the University/State Goverment: The assistance will be provided for the purpose within the 5th Plan allocation of the University.
6. Basic grant -Calautte University for the purchase of Library Books and Journels for the 5th Pl an period : Enhancement of allocation.

The Cormission had allocated in the beginning of the Fifth Plan a basic grent of R. 5:00 Iolchs to the Calcutta University for the purchase of Library books \& journals for the 5th Plan Period and this anount has already since been released in full to the University. In Pebruary, 1976 the Calcutta University informed that the above mentioned Basic Library grant of Ps. 5:00 lakhs has almost been utilised, and requested the Cormission to provide an additional basic library grant of fi. 2.00 lokhs, pending finilization of the report of the Fifth Plan Visiting Committee which exariined the Fifth Plan proposals of the University in September, 1975. The proposal of the University has been accepted and a grant of Rs. 2.00 lakhs for purchase of books and jourmals. for various Hunanities and Science departmonts has been approved raising the total 5th Plan basic allocation for Books fron Rs. 5.00 lakhs to Is. 7.00 lakhs.

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## 7. Kalyani University-Sanction of an additional post of Lecturer for the Deptt. of Zoologym 5th Plan period:

The UGC fifth Plan Visiting Comittee which exarnined the 5th Plan requirenents of the University of Kalyani recommended additional stafir of one professor, two readers and two lecturers(i.e. one reader in first priority and one professor, one reader and two lecturers in the 3 rd priority) for the Zoology Deptt. In view of the limited resources available with the Commission, the Commission agreed to provide post of one reader for the Zoology Department which was recommended by the Visitine Committee under.first priority. In Feoruary, 1976.the Vice-Chancellor, Kalyani University requested the Commission to sanction an additional post of Lecturer for the Zoology Department for the fifth plan period. In support of this proposal the Vice-Chancellor informed that the additional post of lecturer was very badly needed in order to fulfil the teaching and research commitments and also that the promess of the departinent may not be hampered. Accordingly, the proposal of Kalyani University for the creation of an additional post of lecturer for the Department of Zoology has been accepted(NO.F.4-3/76(D-3a) dated the 22 nd March, 1976) on the condition that the U.G.C. will pay grant towards the salary of the above post on $75: 25$ sharing basis upto 31 st March, 1981 and thereafter it will be the responsibility of the University/State Govt. to maintain the above post. The assistance will be provided for this purpose within the 5th Plan allacation of the University.
8. Development schemes for the Fifth Plan periodAcceptance of additional schemes within the V Plan allocation in respect of the universities of Patna, Bihar and Magadh.

As per the general policy and in view of the limited resources available with the Commission for the V Plan period, the universities have generally been allocated grants upto $2 / 3 \mathrm{rd}$ of the ceiling on the basis of the recommendations of the VPlan Visiting Committees. In the case of the universities of Patna, Bihar and Magadh, the Commission had approved grants for books and equipment recomended by the V Plan Visiting Committee under priority-1. Grants for purchase of books, journals and equipment recomaended by the Committee under 2nd priority Kow have now been generally approved in respect of the

universities of Patna, Bihar and Magadh as per details given below, since the grants approved so far in respect of these universi ies were less than the $2 / 3$ rd of the ceiling fixed for these universities.

## 1. Patna University:

The Comission originally accepted the proposals of the Patna University amounting to Rs. 119.965 lakhs against Is. 133 lakhs which is $2 / 3$ rd of the tentative allocation of Rs. 2 crores fixed for the university. The Cominission could provide further assistance to the extent of Rs. 13.035 lakhs to the university. Additional grants of Rs. 3.803 lakhs and Rs. 5.44 lakhs for books and journals and equipmont respectively, for the existing Science, Humanities and Social Sciences Departments during the V TFive Year Plan have therefore been approved for the university. With this, the total allocation made so far for the Patna University would increase from Fs.119.965 lakhs to Rs.129.208 lakhs.

## (2. Bihar University:

The Commission originally accepted the proposals of the Bihàr. University amo nting to Rs. 87.04 lakhs against Hs. 100 Iakhs which is $2 / 3 \mathrm{rd}$. of the tentative allocation of Hs. 150/-lakhs fixed for this university. The Commission could provide further as sistance to the extent of Rs.12.96 lakhs to the university: Additional grants of Rs. 5.59 Iakhs and hs. 3.65 lakhs for purchase of books and journals and equipment respectively for Science, Humanities and Social Sciences Departhents, Central Workshop, Central library and language laboratory during the fifth Five Year Plan have therefore been approved for the university. With this; the total allocation made so far for the Bihar University would increase from Rs.87.04 lakhs to Rs.96.28 lakhs.
(3) Magadh University:- The Commission originally accepted the proposals of the Magadh University amounting to As. 84.80 lakhs against Pis. 100 lakhs which is $2 / 3 \mathrm{rd}$ of the tentative allocation of Rs. 150 lakhs fixed for this university. The Comission could provide further assistance to the extent of m .15 .20 lakhs to the university. Additional grants of Rs. 5.17 lakhs and Fs. 3.68 lakhs for purchase of books, journals and equipment respectively for the Sciance, Humanities and Social Sciences Deprrtments, Central Workshop and Central Library during the $V$ Five Year Plan have the refore been approved for the University. Wi th this the total allocation made so far for the Masadh University would increase from Rs. 84.80 lakhs to Rs. 93.65 lakhs.
-9: Utkal University - Installation of Air Conditioning.. in the Central Library - Fth Plan Scheme Additional grant.

On the recommendations of the UGC Fifth Plan Visiting Committee, the Commission agreed to provide a grant of Rs. 20,000/- on $100 \%$ basis to the Utkal University for the installation of Air-conditioning in the Central Library for keeping the valuable manuscripts and rare books etc. In January, 1976 the Utkal University informed that the quantity of materials to be preserved in the Library necessitates a big rom and as such one Unit of AirCondition nee would be inadequate to control the requirements of the Library and, therefore, proposed to install 2 units of Air Conditioners which would cost about Rs. $30,000 /-$. The Utkal

- University, therefore, requested -the Commission to provide anadditional amount of Rs. $10,000 /$ - for the purpose. It has been agreed to provide an additional grant of Rs. $10,000 /-$ on $100 \%$ basis to the Jtkal Jaiversity for the installation of 2 units of Air Conditioners in the Central Library within the Fth Plan allocation. The Comission's Share on this account will thus increase from Rs.20,000/- to Rs.30,000/-.

10: Development Schemes of the Uckal University for the 5th Plan period. - Acceptance of the schenes by the Comission

The Commission made a tentative allocation of Rs. 150 lakhs to the Jtkal Jiversity for the 5 th Plan period and accepted the proposals amountin? to Rs.89.39 lakhs. Assistance is generally provided to the Universities uito 2/3rd of the allocation in the first instance and, therefore, a total amont of Rs. 100 lakhs could be provided to the Utkal University.

The proposal of the University for the enhancement of the estimated cost of Women's Hostel for 100 students from Rs.9,00,000/. to Rs.12,93,500/- and the enhancement of the cost of construction of lien's Hostel for 200 students (instead of 100 students approved earlier) from Rs.9,00,000/- to Rs. 19,51,800/- only has therefore been accepted by the Commission (No.F.21-5/74 (D.3.a.) dated 24 th January, 1976), on the condition that the Commission's share would be limited to Rs.9,70,125/- (i.e. $75 \%$ of Rs. 12,93,500/-) and Rs.9.75,900/-(i.e. $50 \%$ of Rs.19,51,800/-) asainst Rs.6,75,000/and Rs.4,50,000/- agreed to earlier respectively for two hostels. .

It has also been agreed to, as a special case, to accept the proposal of the Thiversity for providin r posts of one lecturer each for the Departments of Botany, English and Political Science to Utkal Thiversity recommended by the Visiting Couritice under tigird priority, within the V Plan allocation subject to the condition that the Comission would be providing assistance towards the salary of these posts on 75: 25 basis upto 31 st March, 1981 and thereafter these posts would be maintained by the University/ State Government.

The total allocation has now increased froin Rs. 89.39 lakhs to Rs.98.50 lakhs in respect of Jtkal University.

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11: Utkal University - Grant-in-aid for the improvenent
of Hostel facilities - 5th Plon

In December, 1975 the Jtkal University sent a proposal for financial assistance torards the extension of dining room facilities in the two Men's Hostels and one Women's Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs. $1,54,300 /-$ In support of this proposal, the University informed that dining roon facilities in the University were not adequate, and that the arrangements proposed to be made in this regar would be on permanent basis and further that the State Govermment had agreed'in principle' to provide the necessary matching share on this account; if the proposal is accepted by the .UGC. . The . proposal of the Utkal University for the extension of dining room \& toilet facilities in the two Men's Hostels and one Women's Hostel at an estimated cost of Rs.1,54,300/- as detailed below, has been accepted, on the condition that the share of the Commission for the purpose will be limited to Rs.89,615/- as indicated and that the same will be a charge on.the Fifth Plan allocation of the University :

12: Sanction of Students Aid Fund grant to Mathabhanga College, Cooch-Bihar (Horth Bengal University) on the basis of student enrolment for 1975-76.

The Commission's assistance for establishment of Students' Aid Fund is determined on the basis of students enrolment in degree classes for the preceding year. To be eligible for assistance under the scheme a College, providing two-year degree course should have a minimum en rolment of 100 and a College providing three year degree course should have a ninimum of 150 students in degree classes. The Mathabhanga College, CoochBihar (providing three year-degree course) was having only 137 students during 1974-75 but has 165 students during 1975-76. In relaxation of the general rule of assisting Colleges on the basis of the previ us year's enrolment, the Mathabhanga College has been given a' grant of Rs. 482 during 1975-76 on the basis of students curolicnt for 1975-76 and on tia basis of Collego's om collection (vide order dated 4.3.1976).

13 : Allocation of additional basic grant of Rs.50,000/to Gujarat Vidyapith Ahmedabad for the purchase of books and journals.

The basic grant of Rs.1,50,000/- allocated to Gujarat Vidyapith, Ahmedabad for the purchase of Books and Joumals for 1974-75 and 1975-76 was fully utilized by the Vidyapith upto January, 1976. The Vidyapith requested for an additional grant of is. 50,000/for books and journals.

The Commission at its meeting held on 7 .1.1976 considered the report of the Visiting Committee on the Gujarat Vidyapith, Ahmedabad; and generally a ccepted the recom riencations made by the Committee. It was agreed that the Gujarat Vidyapith may be requested to immediately set up Committees as recommended by the Visiting Comattee and make their reports available to the Commission. Pending the availability of these reports, the Commission may accept the imediate requirements of the Vidyapith within the framework of the recommendations of the Visiting Committee for Postgraduate education and research and other facilities in the existing campus.

A further amount of Rs.50,000/- has been sanctioned to Gajarat Vidyapith, Ahmeda'jad for the purchase of books and journals in the light of the Commission's resolution nentioned above.

The aditional allocation mentioned above will be adjustable a mainst the amount which may be provided to the Vidyapith for books and journals on the basis of the recommendations of the V Plan Visiting Committee (the approval was conveyed to the Vidyapith, under this office letter No.F.27-1/74(D.4.a.) dated 29.3.1976).


The reports of the Visiting Committee appointed to assess the requirements of Bombay, Shivaji and Marathwada. Universities for the Fifth Five Year Plan were placed before the Comission at its meeting held on 27th and 28th October, 1975 and the Commission desired that these may be discussed with the Vice-Chancellors alongwith some members of the Visiting Committees; (Item 21). Accordingly, the reports of the Visiting Comnittee were discussed by the Chairman, University Grants Comission with the ViceChancellors concemed on 28 th January, 1976. The following were also present :

University of Bombay
a) The Vice-Chancellor ointed out that the departments of Science and Social Sciences have already been shifted to the new campus at Kalina. They also propose to shift the departments of languages in due course to the new carnpus. He said that departments of Biological Sciences and Computer Science will also be located in the new campus. Full developaent of the new campus will take a long time. The University proposes to provide for expansion of the existing departments in the new campus. The Chai man pointed out to the Vice-Chancellor that in deciding the the location of various departments, consideration should be given to the Physical proximity and inter-action between various departments and the necessary library and laboratories facilities. The Vice-Chancellor said that efforts would be made to strengthen all research activities at the new campus only but the university will have to keep some classes and library facilities in the old campus in order mainly to cater to the needs of employed persons who join morning or evening classes. At present such classes are held in $\mathbb{E c}$ nomics, Politics and Law. It was suggested that the University should make adequate arrangements to provide
administrative services both at the old campus as well as ct the new campus, but all section aealing thith matters and programes relatiny to postgraduate education and researchetc. be located in the new campus. A building for this purpose may be constructed in the new campus for wich full assistance should come frou the State Government. Adequate funds may also be provided by the State Govermment for the maintenance of the existing buildings and furmiture. The Vice-Chancellor agreed that all the new buildings recommended by the Visiting Committee will be constructed at the new campus at Kalina: It was agreed that due to special circumstances of the new campus, Commission's assistance towaris expenditure on external services for the buildins to be constructe may be provided upto 10 per cent of the civil cost.

It was agreed that the University may set up a Committee (including a representative of the University Grants Comaission) to look into the whole of Postgraduate teaching in the University departments vis-a-vis Colleges. It was also agreed that the University will consider ways of discontinuing the system of a wardin? M.Sc./i.A. degrees by research only.

It was also agreed that provision for the teaching posts in the Department of Computer Sclence i.e. 1 Professor, 2 Readers and 2 Lecturers would be made under the Fifth Plan allocation. Assistance for other staff required for the Computer Centre will be detemined after the Computer is installed, and the necessary assistance provided outside the Fifth Plan allocation.

## Marathwada University:

a) The Vice-Chancellor, Marathwada University arreed that the University would attach highest priority t, the consolidation of existing departments.
b) The Vice-Chancellor explained that some posts approved by the UGC during the Fourth Plan remained vacant due to certain unavoida reasons. He, however, agreed that the new posts approved by the Commission in Fifth Five Year Plan will be filled in only after the posts approved in the earlier plans have been filled in by the University. It was agreed that instead of opening a new department of Biochemistry. L The University will also approach
the State Govermment for financial assistance towards the post of Professor of Biochenistry and some other posts created during osont, kcep the Fourth Plan for which the Commission could not give assistance ochonistry The number of intake to M.Sc. classes in different subjects ction withinould be related to facilities available.
c) It vas also agreed that the proposal relating to the departments of Library Science, Dramatics and Journalism may be considered under priority III. It was also agreed that the first year of the ©i.Sc. class in Chemistry in all branches should be comon. The evenin classes in Zoolo will be discontinued.
d) It was also agreed that the contribution of College teachous for conducting postgraduate classes would be reduced when the existing vacancies in the University departinents are filled in.
e) The Vice-Chancellor also agreed to provide facilities for the study of History of Western India instead of itaratha History only.

## Shivaji University :

a) The Vice-Chancellor agreed that priority should be given to the consolidation of the existing departments as compared to the opening of new departments.
b) It was agreed that M.Sc. course in Statistics may be given by the Department of Mathematics and Statistics. It may not be necessary to open a new department of Statistics at this stage. To provide leadership to the Education Departments of affiliated Colleges, it was agreed that the universit may start a department of Education and give full time M. Ed. course. As for the department of Geology, the proposal may be considered after the Geology panel of the UGC spells out the new areas in which there is need for providing facilities for higher education.
c) The Vice-Chancellor pointed out that there is not much of contributory system of teaching in Shivaji University. The University teaching departments run the courses generaily with their own complement of staff. Accordingly intake into M. Sc. diasses should be related th the facilities available.
e) The Vice-Chancellor agreed that posts sanctioned by the Commission during the Fourth Plan will be filled in before appointments are made against new posts approved during the Fifth Plan.
f) It was dso agreed that the grants recommended by the Visiting Committee for the purchase of books, equipment and for Botanical Garden under 2nd priority may also be approved uncer the first priority.

The Conmission's approval to the recommendations of the Visiting Comittese's report and sanftion of grants has been conveyed to the Bombay; Shivaji and Marathwada Universities (under *F.1-5/75 (D4a) dated 12.3.1976, +F.6-1/76(D4a) dated $25 \cdot 3 \cdot 1976$ and $*+\mathbb{T} \cdot 2-1 / 76(D \cdot 4 \cdot a)$ dated $25 \cdot 3 \cdot 1976$ ) subject to the above.
d) $* *$

It was also agroed that the contribution of Colloge teachers for conducting Post-graduate classes would bo reduced when the existing vacencios in the University dopartaents are filled in.

15: Approval of revised proposal of the Biopal University for the Establishment of Printing Press during V Plan.

During the IV Five Year Plan the Cormission approved the proposal of the Bhopal University for the Establishment of Printing Press at an estimated cost of Rs.3,30,503/- (Rs.2,30,503/for Buildino and Rs. $100,000 /-$ for Press Mechinery and Equipnent). The Commission's share was limited to Rs.1,20,000/m (Rs. 53,333/for buildin and Rs.66,667/- for equipment).

- . The University submitted the revised proposal for Establishment of Printing Press at a cost of Ris. $4,49,475 / 63$ (is. $3,18,274 \%$ for building and Rs.1,31,201/63 for furniture \& equipment) and requested for enhancing the Commission's share according to the pattern of assistance for the V Plan period. During Fifth Plan, the Commission's assistance for Printing Press is on 50:50 basis subject to the maximum of Rs. 2 lakhs.

Since the proposal of Bhopal University for the Rstablishment of Printing Press was accepted by the Commission on the last day of the IV Plan viz. on 30.3.1974 and practically the implementation of the project has taken place durin the V plan, it has been agreed to provide assistance to the Bhopal University for Printing Press on $50 \%$ basis subject to the ceiling of Ps. 2 lakhs both for building and equipment as Commission's share.

The approval has been $c$ nveyed to the University under letter No.F.89-1/73(SA/D-4a) dated 22nd March; 1976.

## 16: Shivaji University - Construction of Wmen Students Hostel.

The Commission had accepter a proposal of Shivaji University for the construction of a hostel for 50 postgraduate wonen students The University submitted the plans and estimates for the hostel for an area of $13,500 \mathrm{Sq.ft}$. at an estimated cost of Rs.4,62,593. The plans and estimates were accepted subject to the condition that assistance from the Commission will be restricted to the proportionate cost worked out for an area of $10688 \mathrm{Sq} . \mathrm{ft}$. according to approved U.G.C. norms. 'The Vice-Chancellor, Shivaji University representeu that as the Commission had, during the Third Plan, approved a similar hostel for $13,500 \mathrm{Sq} . f \mathrm{f}$. $\angle$ The justification given for the proposal is that the present construction is only for the completion of the whale block consisting of two wings. af 50 rooms each and the area has to be kept unchanged. This is also necessary for keeping the architectural symmetry intact.

In view of the justification given by the Vice-Chancellor, it has been agreed, as a special case, to share the expenditure on $75 \%$ basis of the estimated cost of Rs. $4,62,693 /-$ for the built up area of $13,500 \mathrm{So.ft}$. of Women's Hostel on the condition that the share of the Comission will be a charge on the V Plan allocation of the University. The approval was conveyed to the University under letter No.F.26•9/73(CU-I/D-4a) dated 19.12.1975.

Larea are olso shard the expenditure, the Comission mey share the expenditure on the construction of IInd Hostel for an area of $13,500 \mathrm{sq}, \mathrm{ft}$.

## .17: Sardar Patel University - Approval of grant for

 Air Conditioning of the Couputer Centre.The Commission agreed to the transfer of IBM 1620 Computer and the periphral equipment from Delbi University to Sardar Patel University in 1973. The Sardar Patel University was required to make the necessary arrangements for packing, transportation etc. of the Computer and meet the expenditure thereon from its ow resources. Recurring expenditure of Ps.75;000/- p.a. was approved for staff and maintenance, pending assessment of the requirements of the Computer Centre by an expert committee.

The Sardar Patel University was informed that an expenditure of Rs. $30,815 /-$ was incurred on shifting the machine from Delhi and installation at the Sardar Patel. Wiversity including packing, insurance, upgrading, transport charges etc. In addition, Rs. $49,616 /$ - was spent on non-recurring items (air-conditioners, voltage stablisers and Control Panels) to put the computer in smooth working. The University requested the Commission to sanction and release/by expert committee).

Since the Sardar Patel University was required to meet the expenditure for packinge transportationetc. of the Computer out of its own resources, a grant of the 1 . $9,616 /-$ for air-conditioner, Voltage, stablisers and control Panels has been sanctioned under letter No.F.28-5/73 (Sc.I/D-4a) dated 21st October, 1975.

## 18: Nagpur University - Appointient of Development Officer.

The Negpur University approached the University Grants Commission for the creati n of a post of Development Officer in the rank of Depraty Registrar in the scale of Rs.700-1250 on a permanent basis. The University also reported the appointment of Shri B. Y.Aher, as a Development Officer on a initial salary of Rs.1000/- p.m. in the scale of Rs.700-50-1000-BB-501250 w.e.f. 7.4.1975. The Commission has decided that the Universities which have not created the post of Development Officer during the IV Five Year Plan may be assisted during the $V$ Plan provided the post of Development Officer so created is continued on a permanent basis when the assistance of the Commissic ceases.

Since the University created the post of Development Officer on a permanent basis, the proposal of the University for the appointment of Development Officer has been accepted and the appointment of Shri B.Y. Aher as a Development Officer has also been noted. The Commission's assistance on $100 \%$ basis for the above post would be available to the University for the period ending 31.3.1981 and thereafter the post will have to be maintained by the University/State Government.

The expenditure on the above post will be a charge on the $V$ Plan allocation of the University. The approval was conveyed to the University under letter No.F.20-4/71(CDN/D-4a) dated 31.12.1975.

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19: South Gujarat University - Construction of Men's Hostel.

The Visiting Committee which assessed the V Five Year Plan proposals of the South Gujarat University recommended the proposal of the University for the Construction of Men's Hostel under Second Priority. The Commission, for the present, has accepted the V Plan schemes of the South Gujarat Universi, ty, falling under the first priority only.

The University requested that an amount of Rs. 7 lakhs (J. G.C. share RS. 3.5 lakhs) may be approved durine the $V$ Plan for the Construction of Men!s hostel. Since the total sanction. amounts ti Rs. 61.40 lakhs only as yet (out of the $V$ Plan allocation of Rs. 100.00 lakhs), the proposal of the University for the Construction of Men's Hostel has been accepted at an estimated cost of Rs. 7 lakhs. (The approval has been conveyed to the University under Ietter No.F.22-6/75(D.4.a) dated 13th February, 1976).

20: Gujarat University - Approval for the Construction of Class IV Staff quarters.

The Gujarat University started the Construction of Class IV Staff Quarters approved b: the University Grants Comission at an estimated cost of Rs.3,12,000/- (J.G.C. share. Rs.1,56,000/-) during the IV Five Year Plan; without prior acceptance of the Plans and estimates by the Comnission. In this regard .the Vice-Chancellor of the Gujarat Thiversity informed the Commission. that the Estate Department of the University which had to look after the security of the University buildings and properties forgot to wait for the approval of the U.G.C. because of Nav Nirman trouble started vịolently on 3rd of January, 1974.

In view of the position intimated by the Vice-Chancellor the plans and estimates amountine to Rs. $3,12,000 /-$ (certified by the P.W.D.) for the construction of Class IV Staff Quarters have been accepted subject to the condition that the share of the Commission will be limited to Rs. $1,56,000 /$ - or to $50 \%$ of the actual cost whichever is less (under letter No.F.32-6/72(Cu-I/D.4.a) dated the 19th February, 1976.
.21: Saurashtra University - Approval of a grant for Books and Furniture for the Students Fome.

The Saurashtra University approached the Comilission for a grant of Rs. $24,000 /-$ for Books \& Furniture for the Students Home Building approved by the Commission during the IV Plan. The Students, Home Scheme as per IV Plan pattern of assistance includes provisions for building, furniture and books and for furniture and books a maximum ceiling of Rs. $24,000 /-$ was admissible. The grant for the purchase of furniture and books for students Fome is normally approved when the building for the purpose is completed in all respects. Since the students Home building of the Saurashtra Thiversity has been completed,
a piovision of Rs. $24,000 /$ for furniture and books has been approved as part of continued IV Plan proposal of the University viz. the establishment of Students Home. The approval to this effect was conveyed to the University under this office Ietter No.F.10-2/69(SA/D+a) dated 7.1.1976.

## 22: Acceptance of the proposal of the Allahebad University for introduction of correspondence courses at the undergraduate level.

The Comission at its meeting held on 7 th January, 1976 accepted the proposal of the Allahabad University for the introduction of correspondence courses for $B A$ and B.Com. Later the Cominssion at its meeting held on 16 th February, 1976 agreed that the assistance for the different posts sanctioned during the $\mathrm{V} \mathrm{Plan} \mathrm{under} \mathrm{other} \mathrm{progranmes} \mathrm{i.e}$. Centre of Advanced Study, Area Study, Correspondence Courses may be provided till 1980-81. Accordingly it was agreed that the assistance of the Commission for approved staff towards the introduction of Correspondence Courses may be provided to the Allahabad University upto 31st March, 1981 subject to the ovorall ceiling of Rs. 5 lakhs for the scheme. This has been conveyed to the Allahabad University vide this office letter No.F.8-4/75(ER) dated the 3rd March, 1976. Hyderabad.

The Comission while approving in its meating held on 16.2.1976 the action taken under item 2 (3) which inter alia provided that a grant of Ps. 50 lakhs nay be placed at the disposal of the University of Hyderabad for scientific equipment agreed that a committee consisting of Professor $S$. Gopal, Professor JB Chitambar, Professor. BM Udgaonkar, Professor SS Saluja and Professor RP Dambah may be requested to look into the details of the equipment proposed to be procured. by the University of Hyderabad. Accordingly a meeting of the Committee was convened on 22 March 1976 at 9 AM. Professor S Gopal could not.attend the meeting. The ViceChancellor, University of Hyderabad, had also been invited to attend this meeting. In addition, Professor SV Kesar, Professor of Chemistry, Panjab Miversity and currently National Fellow of the UGC was also requested to attend the meeting to advise the committee on matters referred to it. On the basis of the general consensus that since the items of equipment to be imported will be fully utilised by the University as assured by the Vice-Chancellor and that the items of equipment to be imported would form a regional centre facility which is not existing at present at Hyderabad and that the foreign exchange now released by the Government of India will not be debited against the allocation of the UGC, the Cormittee agreed that the university may at this stage - procure equipment ont of the list submitted at a cost not

- exceeding Rs. 50 lakhs. Professor BM Udgaonkar however dissented Irom this decision of the Committee.

The recomendations of the committee have been accepted and a srante of $[3.50$ lakhs has been released to the university.

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24: Examination Rerom - Regional Workshops on

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The U.G.C. Implementation Committee on Examination Refomms et its meeting held on 14 th May, 1975 in New Delhi suggested the organisation of regional workshops on grading as it felt that there would be nany advantages if the grading system is introduced simultaneously by all the universities specially by universities within a particular region. Accordingly, the Cominission sponsored workshops on grading at the following universities and approved expenditure for the purpose according to its norms :

The recommendations of the workshops mentioned at No. 1 to 4 ahove were placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 7th January, 1976 (item No.31) and a consolidated note on the recomendations of these workshops was circulated to the universities for takinc necessary action in the matter. The report of the workshop held at Jabalpur is awaited. It is also proposed to organise a workshop on grading for universities in the Eastem Zone some time in May, 1976.

The Commission agreed to assist the universities to acquire audio-visial aids e.g. transparencies, plaster casts and epidiascopes etc. for the departments of History and Archaeology and agreed $t$ provide a grant up to Rs. $15,000 /-$ to selected departments for the purpose in the 5 th Plan period. It was further agreed that a grant upto Rs. $20,000 /-$ may be provided to the universities which have already working museums in II: story and Archae ology for further development of such museums during the 5th Plan period. The Comaission desired that proposals may be invited from the universities and examined. The proposals received from the universities were considered by the Panel on History at its meeting held on No member 26; 1975. The Conmittee discussed the organisation of seminars in English literature during 1977. It was agreed that two seminars may be organised at the following Centres:-

1. For the Southern Region : The University of Madras
.... OR the University of Bangalore. The seminar at the Southem Centre may be held for about 10 days between 2-12. Jenuary 1977.

The Committee feit that it would be appropriate if for ench centre two Indian scholers are also nomineted to co aduct the geminar along with the UK specialists. The selection of the Indian specialists may be mede with the help of a Comrittee consisting of Professor kamesh Mohan, Professor S.K. Kumer eut Professor C.D. Narasimhaiah.

The Universities mentioned above may be requested to organise the seminar as per schedule.

Item No. 3: Io consider a letter received from the Fegistrar, University of poona regarding invitation to teachers of affiliated colleges not located ina particular zone where a seminar is held on English Iiterature.

The Committee noted that the difficulty in case of teachers from Poona University arose because Poona University was included in the area covered by the Seminar at the northern centre which was held at Delhi and this centre admitted teachers only from Delhi. The centre at Osmenia did not consider the teachers from Poona University on the ground that they were not included in their area.

The Committee was of the view that although these seminars are held at two centres, one in the north and the other in the south, they are held on an all. India basis, and the centres may, in special circumstences, subject to availability of places, also consider the cases of teachers who may not belong to the area covered by a particular centre, but who may desire to participate in the seminar at that centre. There should also be some coordination between the two centres in the selection of participants for the seminar.

## UIIVERSITY CRANTS COITISSICN

Meeting :
Dated : 29th Lpril, 1976.
Item No. 5 : To consider the rocomnendation of the Committoe appointed by the Commission rogarding the rocomendations made by the Eraluation Comnittee set up by the Goverrment of India, on the working of tine N.C.C.

The University Grants Commission at its mocting held on 11-12th Lugust, 1975 considered a reforence from the Ministry of Education and Social Wolfare, rogarding the recomendations made by the Evaluation Commitiec on the National Cadet Corps appointed by it. (Item No. 5). The Commission desired that the recomendations made by the Defence Ministry for consideration by the University Grants Conmission may bo referred to a Cormittee whieh may have a representatiwe each of the Ministry of Education and the Director Goneral, NoC.C.

The Comission subscquently roceived a roferonce from the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation (Department of dgriculture) regarding the guidelines for a Model Social Forestry Project for Mural Welfare Hood. It was decided that this matter may also be referred to the Cormittec appointed by the Commission, to consider the rocommendations made by the Iyaiuation Committee set up by the Government of India. In extract from the letter received from the Ministiry of Agriculture and Irrigation in this respect is rcproduced below:-

MRaising of trees is a productive activity which is very useful and rowarding. Recently H.C.C. has included it in their. programe. Hovever, a lot more remains to be done in the mattor or improving the environment and socio-economic conditions of the rural poor, through trec planting. It is folt that if the youth of the country is irvolved in this activity, far reaching rosults can be axpootod. The youth would cultivato some offection for the trees, the rural people and the environment. If this scouid be achieved even upto $20 \%$ it would be a great achievenont."

The Comission accordingly appointed a Committee with the following to Wisidor the recommondetions made by the Eraluation Comittec.

The recommendations made by the Committee are detailed below:-

Attendance at a NGC activity may be treated as academic attendance.

Views -of the Committee appointed by the U.G.C.

The NCC Cadets should be onabled to derive the benefits for purposes of academic. attendance, in the same manner as it awaitable for students participating in the NS .S. programmes and sports etc.. Any approved NCC activity which makes it necessary for the cadets to miss their academic class work should bo treated as valid for purposes of academic ationdenco. Such concosion shoved however, not exceed, say more than 6 per cent of the minimum attendance required as per university regulations.
Contra..... .3/-

Universities having Military Studies Departments should offer Military Science as an elective subject, open to NCC Cadets.
3. The possibility of NCC 'B' Certificate being treated as a subsidiary elective subject should be examined on the basis of a revised syllabus. L revised syllabus has also been at ached.

It would be more appropriate to designate the existing military studies department in the universities as departments of defence studies and associate in their teaching and field programmes, personnel, both active and retired, from the Defence services. Defence studies or military studies should not be considered as an easy elective and alternatives to other courses. Accordingly, the contents to be included should be of university level and for this purpose a model syllabus could be laid down with the help of a Committee and the National Defence College. The syllabus so suggestod could be suitably adopted by other universities.

Tho 'B' Certificate and its contents as at present cannot be accepted as a subsidiary elective subject for university studies. It should not be treated oven as a subsidiary for a student offering military science as a major subject of study. The model syllabus to be suggested as indicated above, if it is. of the university level, could perhaps be included as one of the subjects at the degree level in due course.
4. Other things being equal a student who has successfully completed NCO training may be givenpreference for admission to postgraduate and professional studies.
5. The teaching periods y should be compressed to 5 days and one day in the week should be designated as Field day to be dovoted to NCC activities as well as other youth activities, such as Fabional-Sorvico Scheme and Nas.0.

It may not be appropriate to give preference to students who have complete NCC training for purposes of admission to postgraduate and professional studies. However, only those cadets who have obtained either ' ${ }^{\prime}$ l or ${ }^{\prime} \mathrm{Cl}$ certificates should be given duo weightage as is generally given to outstanding sportsmen in the matter of admission to such courses.
The Committee regretted to accept this decision as it was not practicable.

6. The Dircctors of National Cadct Corps in the Statos may be given powors to award 'Displcasure' and 'Sotere"displeasure' to the Part-time National Cadet Corps Ofinicers with the provision for an appeal to the Vice -Chancellor.
7. The heads of colleges/ institutions should havo. powers of discharge of Sonior Division NCC Cadets as the Head-masters exercised those powers in respect of Junior Division Cadets.
8. Enrolment of students in NCC must be voluntary and scloctive. Rules of attondence must bo strictly onforced aftor they join the organisation.

It wes mentioned that a National Scrvices Act was likely to be made by the Central Govermient soon. In the. present coritext it would be more appropriate to deal in such natters of indiscipline through the Heads of tho educational institutions.

The Committee was of the viow that the powers to discharge the Cadets in the NOC should be vested with the Commanding Officer instead of the Head of the Institution.

The Committee accopted the recomendation.

With rogard to the roforence from the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation regarding the guideline for a model Social forestry programe; the Committec was of the view that this should form part of the N.C.C. programe.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Mrs. Inder Jit Kaur Sandhu, Vice-Chancell or, Fanjabi University, Patiala, could not attend the meeting being abroad during that period.

The Chairman welcomed the menbers and referred to the several suggestions and recommendations made by the Mahajani Comaittee which had reviewed the working of the N.C.C. In the light of the reorientation suggested by that Committee with regard to the aims and objectives of the N.C.C., IN.C.C. should be viewed as an important activity of the youth inculcating in tham an awareness of discipline, leadership and cooperation. N.C.C. should not be looked upon as merely in agency to train students for likely recruitment to the defenoe services but the quality imbibed should be useful to then as good citizens. Accordingly the activities of the NCC should be nade more attractive, useful and also interesting both at the junior level in the schools and at the senior level in the universities. Some aspects of social service should be suitably incorporated into the NCC programmes, thus enriching the NCC adivities. It zhould also have suitable interaction with other youth programmes such as the NSS. In the context of the ñw $10+2+3$ pattern, it should be expected that the junior division would be mainly be shifted to the +2 stage and would be used for emphasising drill, parade and similar physical activities besides training them for discipline and teadership. The universitios should concentrate upon the. senior division and wherever possible accept cadets who has under gone the junior level training. It would.then enable the NCC astivities to be suitably linked with academic studies and the curriculum so that the cadets could apply their kno-iedge in basic sciences, biology, social sciences and develop suitable programmes of work experience which would constitute the NCC programmes. There should be no bar for NCC cadets taking part in social activities. These various points ware discussed generally before the Committee took up for consideration the specific items referred to it through the Commission by the Ministry of Education... The views expressed arg given below:-

Item No.1: Attendance at a NCC activity may be treated as academic attendance.

The NCC cadets should be enabled to derive the benefits for purposes of academic attendance, in the same manner as is available for students participating in the N.S.S. programmes and sports etc.. bny approved NCC activity which makes it necessary for the cadets to miss their academic olass work should be treated as valid for purposes of academic attendance. Such concession should, however, not exceed, say more than 6 per cent of the minimum attendance required as per university regulations.

Item No. 2: Universities hav'ing Military Studies Departments should offer Military Science as an elective subject, open to NCC cadets.
It would be more appropriate to designate: the existing military studies department in the universities as departments of defence studies and associate in their teaching and field
programmes personnel, both active and retired, from the Defonce services. Defence studies or military studies should not be considered as an easy elective and alternative to other courses. bccordingly, the contents to be included should be of university level and for this purpose a model syllabus could be laid down with the help of a Comattee and the National Defence Institute. The syllabus so suggested could be suitebly adopted by other universities.

Item No. 3: The possibility of NCC 'B' Certificate biig treated as a subsidiary elective subject should be examined on the basis of a revised syllabus. th revised syllabus has also been attached.
The 'B' Certificate and its contents as at present cannot be accepted as a subsidiary elective subject for university studies. It should not be treated even as a subsidiary for a student offering military science as a major subject of study. The model syllabus to be suggested as indicated above, if it is of the university level, could perhaps be included as one of the subjects at the degree level in due course.

Item No. 4: Other things being equal, a student who has successfully completed NGC training may be given preference for admission to postgraduate and professional studies،

It may not be appropriate to give preference to students who have completed NCC training for purposes of admission to postgraduate and professional studies. However, only those cadets who have obtained either ' $\mathrm{B}^{\prime}$ or ${ }^{\prime} \mathrm{Cl}$ certificates should be given due weightage as is generally given to outstanding sportsmen in the matter of admission to such courses.
Iten No. 5: The teaching periods should be compressed to 5 days and one day in the week should be designated as Field day to be devoted to NCC activities as well as other youth activities, such as National Service Scheme and N.S.O.

The Committee regretted to accept this decision as it was not practicable.
Iten No.6: The Directors of National Cadet Corps in the States may be given powers to award 'Displeasure' and 'Severe displeasure' to the Part-time National Cadet Corps officers with the provision for an appeal to the Vice-Chancellor.

It was mentioned that a NSS Act was likely to be made by the Central Government soon. In the present context it would be more appropriate to deal in such matters of indiscipline through the Heads of the educational instintations.


Item No. 7: The heads of colleges/institutions should have powers of discharge of Senior Division NCC Cedets as the Headmasters exercised these powers in respect of Junior Division Cadets.

The Committee was of the view that the powers to discharge the Cadets in the NOC should be vested with the Commanding Officer instead of the Head of the Institution.

Item.No. 8: Enrolment of students in NCC must be voluntary and selective. Rules of attendance must be strictly enforced after they join the organisation.

The Cominittee accepted the recommendation.

Agtinù -tem No.2: To consider a reference from the Ministry of Agriculture and Irrigation relating to guidelines for a model social. forestry programe.

The.members were of the view that this should be a part of the NCC programe.

The Conmittee visited the Jadavpur University on 21st, 22 nd and 23rd September, 1975. The report of the Committee is attached (Appendix).

Main observations and recomendations made by the comittee are given below:-

1. The committee iss not in fevour of changing the unitary nature of the Jadavpur University and converting it into an affiliating university. The committee is aware of the problems of Calcutta University but is not in favour of the suggestions for transfer of some of the Colleges of the Calcutta University to Jadavpur University.
2. . . Théré should bé a continü̈ng omphasis" on the technological biàs of Jadavpur University and this should be kept in view even by the social sciences and humanities departnents of the university. General lectures and joint courses on Science and Society, Technology and Economic Development and such other subjects involving both technology and other departments may be introduced by the University.
3. The Jadavpur University was started to conduct courses in Engineering and Technology. Subsequently, it introduced postgraduate courses in Humanities and Social Sciences and Physical Sciences. The introduction of courses in Humanities and Social Sciences, however, distorted the original "character of the university and has tended to transform it into a proto-type of the other two universities in the city of Calcutta, with the result thet this univorsity has little of a special character of its own which it could have easily developed by giving a new dimension to the study of Ifumanitios and Social Sciences as also the Physical Sciences instead of considering them as separate adaitional streams to be offered to students like in ary other university. At present there is no interaction between the faculties of Humanities and Social sciences and those of Sciences and Engineering and Technology. The university may set up working groups to develop interaction between various faculties and introduce new courses. For this purpose, the university could study the patterm of courses in the I.I.T's.
4. The introduction of postgraduate courses in humanities and social sciences has led to an anomalous situation. So fer as teachers are concemed, more than $0 \%$ of them are in the faculty of engineering and the majority of the students at the undergraduate level are also in the feculty of engineering. However, the number of stuadents at the postgraduate lovel in
humanities and social sciences and pure-sciences is more than what it is in the faculty of engineering. Further the students are not distributed in a manner commensurate with the staff strength between the three faculties. It is not clear as to how the university wants to develop the faculty of engineering and technology and the faculties of humanities and social sciences and sciences in a balanced fashion. In the circumstances, it will be better if the university restructures its courses in all the faculties by adopting a multidisciplinary approach.
5. The University. may consider introducing common core courses for Science and Technology students including technical arts and workshop practice as prevalent in the III's', so that the science students could get the advantage of a technological institution.
6. . . . The committee suggests that for the proper formulation of perspective plans for the development of the university and for coordination and continuous evaluation of the progress of various development schemes and projects, a planning board and a coordinating unit be set up by the university.
7. The conditions of hostels in tho University particularly of the men's hostel is poor. Immediate steps be taken by the university to improve the living conditions in the hostels and also to provide facilities for games and sports etc.
8. The committee noted that the State Government had no integrated $p l a n$ for the development of the university education in the State. All the universities in the State have continued to introduce the sane traditional and conventional type of courses. The committee is, therefore, of the view that the West Bengal Government should consider giving more attention to this aspect and also suggests that the coordinating committee of the Vice-Chancellors in the State may look into this question on a priority basis.
9. The comittee noted that the enrolment of research students in the various departments was not commensurate with the facilities available in these departments and found that the number of research students per teacher in some of the departments was relatively on the high-side. Tho committee, recommends that the enrolment of research students should be commensurate with the facilities available in the respective departrucnts including equipment and contingency grants in case of experimental areas. The university should also ensure that the persons appointed especially to the posts of Proícssors and Readers, possess adequate research qualifications and experience.
10. The committee heard complaints about inadequacy of space. It appears that the existing space in the University was rot being rationally utilised. The university may try to rationalise the uso of available space by appointing a Committee.
11. The Comittee was surprised to find that the Science Departm ments had not fiven much thought to the possible utilisation of the variable energy cyclotron, a rare and mojor national research facility which is coming up in Calcutta.
12. The University should avoid inbreeding and should recruit the teachers fron 011 parts of the country. The univorsity should also reconstitute the Boards of Studies and appoint experts on it from outside the state.
13. 

The Comittee is not in favour of introduction of any new counse, such as Master's Degree courses in Library Scicnce and Education proposed by the university. hssistance for developnorit of contral facilities for biophysical research has not been recommonded within V Plan allocation. Establishmont of Central Inetrmentation Laboratory during the Fifth Plan period has been recommended under second priority.
14. The Comattee has recommended strengthening of the existing 13 departments; and has recommended grents for books and equipment etc. For these departments. . Tho Committee. has. al so recomended assistance for construction of teachers' quarters, class IV quarters; Scíerice Block extension of library building including museum building; and improvement and rennovation of cxisting hostels under first priority.

The Committee visited the Jadavpur University on 21st, 22nd and 23rd september, 1975. It had preliminary discussions with the Vice-Chancellor, Deans of Faculties and Officers of the Uniyersity on $21 s t$ September, 1975. The members of the Committee visited the various departments next day and discussed the fifth plan proposals with the heads of the departments and members of the teaching staf.f. The Committee visited the university library; departmental buildings and hostels. The Committee alse metrepresentatives of the students, teachers and nonetcaching employees.

## 2. Basic facts and Etqures

2.1 Establishment of the University: The Jadavpur University was established in 1955 as a residential and teaching university with its territorial jurisdiction extending witiln a radius of two miles from. the university office. The university has three faculties of arts, science and engineering and technology. The faculty of arto has nine departments: Eengali, English, Economics. History, Political Science/International Relations, Sanskrit, Philosophy, Library Science and comparative literature; while the faculty of science has only 4 departments: Physice, Chemistry, Mathematics \& Geology. The university is running undergraduate and postgraduate courses in all the above subjects except in iibrary science which has only an undergraduate course. The university startedevening courscs at the master's degree level in all subjects in the faculty of arts (except in comparative literature and international relations) and in mathematics in 1955 and in physics and chemistry in 1057.
2. 2 Campus: The university campus extends over an arca of about 54 acres. Area occupicd by various builde
ings and the number of classarooms an? laboratoriee allocated to each department are indicated below:

2.3 Student Enrolment: The increase in the total. enrolmont of students in all the faculties increased from 4,603 on $1.4,67$ to 5,460 on $1.4,74$. The percentage of increase was 19 whereas the percentage of increase in the student entolment in the faculties of arts. and science alone was ajout 34. Department-wise number of students in undergraduatc and postgraduate courses as on 1.4 .65 and 1.4 .74 is indicated below:

2.5 Teaching StaEE: The tocal number of teachers in the faculties of arts ant scieace is 25s. Of these, 14 professors, 39 readers and 32 lecturers are in the 4 departments in the faculty 0 : science and 14 professors, 32 readers and 77 lecturers are in the 9 departments if the faculty of arts. The teacher pupil ratio is $1: 0$. The number of teachers in various departmente is:

2.6 Examination Results: The results of university eramentions during the past 5 years in various subjeats are given in Annemure-I.
2.7 Income \& Expenditure: The total income of the university during the period 1.4 .65 to 31.3 .74 was is $12,93,38,359$ whereas the total expenditure was 5. $13,11,52,774$. There wes thus a net deficit of Ds 13,14,415. In the year 1973-74, the university had an incone os about 131.75 crores whereas iks expenditure during this year was about fs 1.93 crores. There was a net deficit of ebout is 18.41 lakhs. The details.of income and cmpenditure from 66-67 to 73-74 are giventin Annexure-II.
2.3 Admissions: Admissions to various courses are made on the besis of merit ater an intervicw by the Admission Boari constifuted by the university.
2.9 Appointment of teachers:. The university has constituted an Appozrtment oard for appointing of teachers and other staftin the Uaiversity. The Vice-Chancellor, two Members of the University and one llominee of the Shancellor are members of this toppointrient Board. In the selection of teachors, the edditional members are. Dean of the Faculty, Hoad of the Department concerned and three experts in the subject nomineted by the Vice-Chancellor.

## 3. Progress of Fourth Plan Schemes:

3.1 During the Fourth Elan, the University Grants Commission assisted the University towards tiae appointment of academic and technical staff, purchase of books and journals and laioratory equipnente and construction of academic and residential buildings. The university during the last plan period concentrated on strengthening its existing postgraduate"de partments by extending la $\begin{gathered}\text { diaratory, }\end{gathered}$ library, research and teaching facilities and by appointing additional stafe. As such the University could not introfuce any new subject of study at the postgraduate level during the last plan. The central library was strengthened, more amenities to students and teachers were provided and most of the construction projects which were started during the 3 rd plan and the new projects sanctioned during the 4 th plan were completed except CoIV stafí quarters.
3.2 The university could not take up the construction of 32 staff quarters, museum building, science block: nd ViceChancellor's residence. During the 4 th Plan, the Commission sanctiond 5 posts of prosessors, 10 posts of readers aind 12 posts of locturers. The uaiversity could not fill up the posts or one ifeder and one research asststant.
3.3 For the proposals accepted by the Commission, the total provisfontras is 67.35 lakhs of which the Commission's shar was Ps 47.69 lakhs: The grants released upto the end of the 4 th plan period amounted to ps 29.74 lakhs. The actual spillover to be carricd to the 5 th plan is about 6.75 lakhs, which would be the first charge on the 5 th plan allocation of Rs 1.00 crore. A statemeat giving details of the schemes approved, grants relcased upto 31 st March, 1974, and the spilloover to be carried to the 5th plan is attached as Annexure-Ill. The unive $n$ sity's programes during IV Elan were badly affected by campus distirbances.
4. Fifth Plan proposals:

The university has submitted proposals involving an out-lay of is 69.36 lalhs (excluding the salary of additional state). OE this, fs 50.01 lakis is in the first priority; Fin. 11.36 lakhs in the 2 nd priority; and li 7.99 lakhs in the 3rd priority. These proposals also include the development of the unive:sity campus. In addition, the university has requested assiotence towarls the salary of additional staff of $\sigma$ professors; 12 readers, 5 lecturers, 9 research scholars and 15 others, in the Ist priority; 3 professors, 9 readers, 3 lecturers ant 3 others in 2nd priority; and 3 professors, 2 realcis, 5 lecturers and 11 others in the 3 rd priority. The proposals generally relate to the strengthening of the existing science and humaities departments. The univorsity
has proposec, introduction of postgraciuate courses in library science and Education and estailishment of Ceniral Instrumentation laboratory as well as renewal of building projects , which were approved in the IV Plan but could not be taken up by the universtty.
5.2 Meeting with the Vice-Chancellor: The Vife-Chancellor in his discussions with the Visiting Committee incer-alia emphasised the following points:
(1) The Uaiversity is rather young, During the Fourth plan the University tried to consoliciate the existing departments and improve the standard of teaciting and. research. The early years of that glan were quite disturbed, and the normal life of the University was greatly affected. During recont years, the University and its teachers ware mainly handicapped due to shortage of equipment etc. and rise in prices.
(2) During the current Plan period, the University intends to bring about qualitative improvements. The main emphasis would be on postgraduate development and rosearch. Introduction of $M$.Ehil. courses in a number of subjects is proposed. The proposals of the University elso include introduction of M.Ed, courses and Milib. Science courses and development of contral zacilities for biophysical research. The University has been running B.Lib. Science and B.Ed, courses and now it wants to introduce postgraduate teaching in thesc subjects. The proposal Eor the introduction of M.Ed. course has been included outside the allocation of ps 1.00 crore.
(3) Buildings of some departments have also to be eztended. The Science Block which was unfer construction in the Fourth Flan was unlewfully occupied and damaged. The Commission was therefore, requested to treat the casc as a special one ant arrce to stare the expenditure reguired for the repair of the building.
(4) The drainage system is very bad with the result that flood and rain water damaged the playgrounds nad disturbed the normal life on the campus. The water logging problem needs immediate readers by raising the lovel of the roads and the grounds. The expanditure involved in this has been included in the Elan proposals.
(5) The water supply on the Carpus as well as in the laboratories is being arranged through individual tanks. Consequently, water supply is not available in the laboratories and in the hostels Eor all the 24 hours. In order to get rid of this pro biem; the University wants to provide a central rescrvoir.

(6) Since emenities provided to etucents are. measre, the university would like to improve them especially ty the extenoion of the health centre and development of playgroundsd
5.3 Meeting with Students: The: Committee had a meeting with a representative group of students. They laid stress on the following points:

## ..

(1) In the Chemistry Department excessive emphasis is being given to theory. The courses should be applicetion oriented. Besides, the library and laboratories are - not properly equipped. The stock of equipment, books and journals is inadequate.
(2) The students wanted an improvement in the library facilitics e.g. open shelf system, more co-operation from library staff, less bureaucratization, multiple copies of text-books and xerow facilities,
(3) • The students.of.the department of International Relations stated that there was too much empliasis on Eolitical Science in their courses. They wished to have special groups on International Economics and Sociology.
(4) The students of Electronic Engineering Department wanted adequate training in the handling of instruments and equipnents.
(5) Computer facilities should be provided to all the departments ant a course in Operation Research introduced. The mathematics students in particular wanted a use of the computer in connection with the numerical analysis and programaing courses.
(6) The stusents generaliy complaind that the playground was always water logged and not in proper shape.
(7) The students expressed thenselves in favour of examination reforms . continuous assessment, more scope for tutorials, seminars, viva-voce etc.
(8) In reply to questions, the students said that they would welcome courses relating to Science and Society, philosophy and History of Science, values in a technological socicty etc.
(9) The number of research Eellowships should be increased especially in Arts Faculty where very few rescarch Eellowships were available.

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(10) In certain subjects, the syllabus needed immediate, revision since for the last 10 or 20 years no such revision had taken place.

The Visiting Committee Eeels that it is necessary for the university to have an effective faculty student committee, which provides a forum for frequent dialogue between the teachers and students.
5.4 Meeting with Teachers: The Committee also met a representative group of teachers, discussed with them the prodems of the University and znvited suggestions Erom them for inproving the standards of teaching and research in the University.
(1) The teachers, in gencral, complained about the lack of research Eacilitios, inadequataly. equipped laborator-. ies and libraries. They also emphasised the need for more teaching accommodation.
(2) Some of the teachers desired that the personal promotion scheme which was introduced, by the commission in 1972-73 and subsequently witharawn, may be raintroduced. This would provide an incentive to those teachers who are in the same grade for the last 10 to 15 years and for fhom tho chances of promotion are very scanty.
(3) The teachers also desired that residential accomodation mey be provided to them, as most of the teachers have to come Erom a long distance.

It was sad to see that the discussions with the teachers were largely dominated by thesequestions. Questions relating to improvement of academic programmes future dixection of the university, thrust areas of research, possibilities of inter-disciplinary programmes did not evolce much response'.
6. ' General oiservations \& Recommendations':
6.1 The Committee is not in favour of changing the unitary nature of the university and converting it into an affiliatm ing university. The Committee is aware of the ptoblems of Calcutta University an the suggestion that one way of lipheening the load on Calcutta University is to transfer some of the colleges to Jadavpur University. While Eully sympathetic to Celeutta University the Compittee does not recomend that the problem be solved by changing the nature of Jadavpur Univoisity
6.2 There shoul be continuing emphasis on the tecin logical bias of Jadavpur University añ even the
-
Social Science and Jumanities departments should keep this in view. In particular, che Sommittee recommends general lectures and even perhaps the development of joint courses on Science and Society, technology and economic development an? such other subjects involving both technology and other departments.
6.3 The Jadavpur University is a semi-residential University, but in the metter of organisation of courses, it does not seem to be different from other universities in the state. The University has neither introduced any new branch of study, iceeping in view the special needs of the area or the existence of technology on the same campus nor any new ideas of faculty organisation. There has not been any arrangement for inter-depertmental cooperation. During 20 years of its eristence, it has not been able to adopt new lines or an inter-disciplinary approach.
6.4 The university was : started co conduct courses in engineering and technology. Subsequently, it introduced postgraduate courses in Humanities and Social Sciences and Physical Sciences. But the introduction of the courses in Humanities and Social Sciences distortad the original character of the university and tended to transform it into a protomeypeot the other two. universities in the city of Calcutta. The University thus hes lititic of a sperial character of its own which it couldeasily have developed by giving a new dimension to the study of Humanities and Social sciences as also the physical sciences instead of considering them aṣ scperate edditional streams to be offered to students like in any other university. Thus, the University couldeasily have introduced subjects in the Arts Faculty having a bearing on engineering and technology. There is at present no inter-action-between the faculties of Humanitics and Social Sciences and tho se of Sciences and Engineering and Technology. The Committee emphesised the desirability of such interactions and new courses in its discussions with the faculty. It hopes that the university will set up working groups to develop such courses. In doing so, the university may study the pattern of courses in the I.I.Ts.
6.5(a) The introduction of postgraduate courses in Humanities an: Social Sciences has led to a situation which appears to be quite anamalous. So far as the teachers are concerned, more than $60 \%$ of them are in Faculty of Engineering. At the undergraduate level, the majority of students are in the Faculty of Engineering, while the number of students at the postgraduate level is more in manities and social science. and pure sciences than what it is in the Eaculty of Engineering: The students are not distributedin a manner commensum rate with the staff strength becween these three faculties. It is not clear as to how the University wants to develop
p.t.o.
the Faculty of Engineering and Technology and the Faculties of Humanities and Social Sciences and Sciences in a balanced fashion.
6.5(b) The University will, have to restrueture its courses in all the faculties by adoptinf multi-disciplinary approach e.g. by introducing some courses in Logic; or scientific thought, Economics, History and English for the students of Engineering and Technology (as in the IbI.Ts.')
6.5(c) The Committee found that certain departrieats need to recast their courses to bring them in line with the latest developments in the suiject and tale into account the man power needs of the areas and of the country. The courses in Humanities and Social Sciences as well as in Sciences will have to berecest leeping in view the need of Engineering and Technology students. The university may try to give special attention to what should be the role of Humanities and Social Sciences as also sciences in a technological university.
6.5(d) The university may consider introducing common core courses for sidence and technology students including technical arts and workshop practice as in the I.I.Ts. so that the science students. here get'the"advantage of a technological institution.
6. 5(e) The M.A. course in Fhilosophy appears to be oriented towards the study of logic. The philosophy department could for example consider introducing a course relating to values in a modernising or developing or technological society.
6.5(f) The courses in International Relations are more oriented towards the political science then towards the study of other behavioural sciences. No active links have been established with the departments of History, Ecanomics, Philosophy and English.
6.5(g) The departments of Bengali a nd Sanskrit are not aware of the work being done by their counterparts in other universities of the statc and hence there is considerable duplication of efforts.
6.5(h) The Committee is of the view that during the current plan, the existinf departments should be consolidated and上o, be encouraged to develop interaction with one another. Opening areas of study and starting new specialisations should be given low priority sthis would only lead tó a thin diffusion of scanty resources.
6.6 The Committee Irew the attention of the Jadavpur University to the importance of recruiting toachers from all parts of the country. The university in particular try to avoid in.breeding.
6.7 The University should also reconstitute the Boards of Studies and appoint experts from outside the state.
6.8 For the proper formilation of perspective plans for the development of the university and for a proper co-ordination an a continuous evaluation of the progress of various development schemes and projects; it is necessary that a Planning Board and Coordinating Unit is set up by the University. The Vice-Chancellor informed the Comintee that a development officer has recently been appointed. This is a satisfactory first step.
6.9 The Committee noted that the University has appointed student-faculty Committees in various departa ments, but it was rather disappointing to note from discussion with students that these Committees have not bec: very effective anc that the communication between the students and teachers needs considerable improvement.
6. 10 The Committee noted that there was a xerox Machine available in the library but the students were not anare of its cxistence. Greater use should be made of the machine.
6.11 The Committee; strongly recommends that: (a) more copießs of textmbooks may be purchased in the libraty out of the grant allocatci for the purchase of books and journals; (b) the vorling hours of the 11 brary may be extended; (c) open shelf system be introcuced and (d) a Committee with the representatives of sudents ancteachers should be constituted for looking after the working of the university library.
6.11. The men's hostel which was constructed in 1951 by the University from its own resources is in a very poor shape. It hes practically no Sacility for games and sports or for a reading room. The toilets and kitchen were dirty The students were not happy with the quality of food served and Erom what the Comittec noticed during its visit to the hostels, there scems ample ground for the complaints of the students. The Committee, therefore, recommends that steps be taken immediatcly by the University to improve the living conditions.in"the hostels.
6. 12 Thé maintenance of university buildings, was below par. The University authoritics should pay greater attention to this.
6. 13 The Committee suggests that upto onemthird of the book grant allocsted during the current Plan period may be used for purchasing text-books. But the Committea is not in favour of starting denartmental libraries in what is basically a 'one compus' university. But as some departmental libraries already exist, the Committee felt that it would be more appopriate to stock textsbooks in the departmental libraries ant the general and reference books in the central library.
6. 14 While the bact: volumes of journals may be purcia sed out of the grant alloceted by the Commission, current journale should be purchased by the University out of the block grant provided by the $S$ tate Government.
6. 15 The Committee noted that the State Government ias not so far any integrated plan for the development of the university education in the stete. All universities are continuing to intraduce the same traditional and conventional courses. The Committee, is therefore, of the view that the State Government might consider giving more attention to this. The coordinating Committee of Vice-Chancellors in the state may look into this question on a priority basis.
6. 16 In some departments the number of research students per teacher seems to be relatively high. The enrolment of research students should be commensurate with the facilities available in the respective departments (including equipment and contingent grants in the case of experimental areas? and a teacher should not undertake to guide research work of more than five or siz students. The university may ensure that the persons appointed especially to the postsof Professors. or Readers possess adequate research qualifications', and cxperience'.
6.17 The workload of teachers in certaindepartments is low. Thile the gize of a tutorial group in some departments is too large. The University has introduced M. Phil courses in a few departments an wants to introduce such courses in other subjects Eor Eresh postgraduate students, specially for those who wish to go in for research. For proper teaching of vi.Fhll course, it is necessary that the faculty must be suitably qualified. Hence, the courses may be introduced only in those departments which havec capable teachers for running them. The guidelines for M.Phil are befing framed by the U.G.C. and may be taken into accqunt by the university in.framing its M. Phil. courses.
6. 13 The Committee suggesta that a Committec may be set up to coordinate or estoulish priorities for the purchase of costly equipments, especially equipment that is likely to be uscd on an inter departmental basis. Individual
items costing less than say is. $30,000 /$ - may, however, be purchased directly by the departments concerned. The grant recommended for equipment latter in the report, may also be used.for meeting the cost of recommiesioning of equipment lying idle in various departments. The university must mảe every effort to keep in proper maintenance and use all the equipment with laboratories. It wo uld expect the maintenance of equipment to be better than it has been specially considering the tachnological character of the university.
6. 19 The Committee feels that the intate of the science depertments should continue to remain as.at present because of various limitations and job potential. Erogrammes for improvement of quality of teacising and existing specialisation be vigorously pursued by the departmerts. The Committee does not generally favour the opening of new specialisations at this stage. Iowever, as suggestod elsewhere students in on departmentlfaculty may be encourazed to take courses in other departnentsfiaculty. The intake of the humanities departments also needs to be regulated.
6. 20 Verious departments have asked for documentation facilities anc grant for puticationof research worko. The Committee does not favour the purchase of equipment by indivilual departments for this purpose, since it is of the view that such fecilities should bo available at a Central place, so that these could be uscd by all the departments.
6.21 The Committec recommends that the additional teaching anf technical posts mentioned ater in the report are being recomended on the specific conditions that intheffect from the date Commission's assistance ceases; i.e. from Ist April, 1979, these will be maintained by the state Government and that atino stage, the number of teacting and technical posts would be less than those existing on 1.4 .1974 and the additional posts recommended now. However, if tothis happens, the Comattee recommends that in the Sixth Plan the Commission may taise suitable steps to ensurethat this is not repeated.
6.22 The Comittee heard. frequent complaints of inadequacy of space. However, it. did not appear that the existing space vas rationally utilised e.3. a big workshop hall has not been used for five years; time tables of different departments conid periaps be adjusted to use the lecture hall space more conomically; departments seem to spread in different ưildings indicating an unplanned growth; various itcmsare lying around on the floors of laboratories, giving an unnecessarily over-crowded and delapidated look atc. The university may try to rationalise the use of availaile space by appointing a Committee.

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6.23 The Committee was surprised to Eind that the science departments had not ziven much thought to the possible utilisation of the variable energy cyclotron, a major national research Eacility whicilis coming upin Calcutta.

## 7. Eaculties of Iumanities \& Social Sciences:

7.1 Department of Erglish: The department has been offering $M, A$ and $M$.Litt. courses. The M. Litt. courses is of two years' duration and has been running for the past three years. The intake in this course is $\delta$. The department has a staff of one profassor, Eive readers and 15 lecturers... 25 candidatesiarcengaged in doctoral research.

The major areas of research inthe department are. Renaissance. Literature and. Literature from $18 t h$, particularly fiction and the Literature of Ideas. The members of the department have published a number of articles and reviews, mostiy. in Indian Journals This is a good Joint seminars have been organised with the departments of comparative literature añ Bengali. But closer links should be developed, It has a programe for building up the tcaching of the English language, for which the department needs a senior person: The iibrary is not well-equipped and needs, to be strengthened. The following assistance is recommencefor this department under first priority. :
 Journals.

The department is also organising, a seminar on "English for speciar "purposes" in collaboration with C.I.E.F.L. Hyderabad ant the British Council. The U.G.C. also shoula support this: The departmenthas tought financial assistance from the U.G.C.

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7.2 Department of Comparative Literature: The departmeat is offering facilities for teaching upto B.A. (Hons) and Met levels. It has an intake of 59 students in B.A.(Hons) 55 students in M.A.(previous) and 48 students in M.A.(Final) It has a staff of one professor, four readers and five lecturers. One partatime lecturer is also assisting the department. Five candidates are registered Eor Ph.D. degree. The departmeat has a library which has in stock about 1,700 books. It hes been subscribing to about

48 journals. The major etudies undertaken so far are the study of Myth in the Epic ant the relationship between Myth and Literature. The department wants to undertake research on Indian Epics and to expand it to modern Iiterature. It also wants to continue research in the field of Comparative Study, Testern \& Indian Literatures. The department has been publishing a journal entitled 'Jadavpur Journal of Comparative Literature of which 12 volumes have been published since 1961:

This is one of the promising departments of the University. The Commitee recomends that the following facilities may be provided to the department during the current plan period under first priarity:
(1) Teaching Stafs: Lecturers - 2 (in Hindi \& Tamily
(2) Books \& Journals: is $50,000 /=$.

The department should develop closer collaboration with the Department of Languages.
7.3 DeportmontoE Dendaly: The department has an intake of 50 students in $M$. $A_{\text {. (previous) and the same number }}$ of students. in M.A. (final). It has a staft of one Professor, five Readers and nine Lecturers. The post of one Lecturer is lying vacant. Besides, one professor has been provided uncer personal promotion scheme. The department has produced $17 \mathrm{Fh} . \mathrm{Ds}_{\mathrm{s}}$. since 1967 and. 34 research students are morking in the department. The department has not been able to establish active links with the department of Sanskrit, English anc Comparative Literature. However, they have been taking the help of the history department for the toaching ot Mistory of Bengal... They also have not developed ary contacts with the department of Bengali in other universities of the State. The Committee recommonds that the following assistance may be provided to the department under first priority:
(i) Teachingstaff: $\quad$ Reader - 1 (with specialisation in Modern Literaturel.
(ii) Books \& Jeurnals: Ps 20,000/=.
7.4. . Dopartaentoosanskit: The department has been oEforing Eacilities for teaching Sanskrit upto "B.A. (Hons.) and. M. levels. The total intake of the department both at tic undergraduate as wall as at the postgraduate level is 200. It hes a stafe of two professorsy three readers
p.t.o.
and six locturers. Four part-time lecturers are also helping the department. The average workload pei teacher per week is 13 to 14 periods. The deparmentihas been conducting traditional courses and. has not tried to intem: grate the traditional and modern aspects of sanskrit. teaching. It has also not been giving any emphasis to the teaching of new aspects of Sanskift scholarship. The Committec noted that wile in other countrice a new dimension is being given to logic and gramhar; there is no provision for such a study inthe courses proscribed by the department: The Committee, would; therefore, emphasise that the department may give serious thought to the restructuring of its courecs so as ta link them with the recont developments in tite field of modern Sanskrit, Poetry, Logic and Grammar. The Committee recommends that the following estistance be provided to the department under firet priority:
(i) Teaching StaEE: Wecturer - (in Linguistics)
(ii) Books \& Journals: $\quad$ Rs $40,0001=$
7.5 Department of Economics:- The Departrient has been offering facilities for the teaching, at the B.A. (Hons.) and $M_{\text {a. }}$. levels. The present intake of department is 40 students in $M$.A.(Previous) and the same number of students in M. (Einail). The intake of students ef: the B.A. (Hons.) level is 40 each year. The department has a steff of two professors, four readers anl eigit lecturers. The department has a slant towards teaching and research in Matiomatical and Monctary Economic Problems. It wants to develop teaching aņ resóprch in Public Finance and Gencral Economics.

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It is a Eairly strong department and has done considerable resedrcly duting recent years. One of its research projects hasं been acecpted as guideline for project formuletion and Evaluation by the UllDOI: The cvaluction made by Uilldol has formed the bạsis of policy meking by the Reserve Bank' of India for financing small scele cnterprises: The Sommitceerecommends that this department should be given encouregement for pursuing its rosearch programmes The following facilities may be provided to the separtricat during the current plan period:

7.7 Department of mistory This department has also been offering Eacilities of teaching at the B.A.(Hons.) and M.A. levels. The total intake at the B.A. (Hons.) is too while at Mo level it is 90. 11 canaidates have bcen awarded Fh. J. derree during the last Five years. 20 research students are working in the departaent. The department has a sanctioned strengthof 15 persons on its st"ff. The post of one professor and to readers are lying vacant. Thus, the pesent staft position in the department is two professors; one reatci and nine lecturers.

This department is basically a modern history departmeat and the cources lay emphasiston the study of Soctal and Politicel History of 19 th and 20 th centuries. The comittec, thereforc, sugecist the the department should develop teaching and research programmes in

Medieval History ant the vicant posts of one professor and two readers may be filled up by appointind persons in this field. The department has not been able to establish any links with the depertments of Interngtional Relations and Sanskrit. Since the present stafe strength is adequate, the department may be helped by providing Euns for strenthening the library to the extent of $50,000 /-$ during the current plan periodunder Eirst priority.
7.0 Department of Philogophy: This depertment has also bee offering facilities for teaching Philosophy at the B.A. (Hons) and postiraduate levels. It has an intake of 230 students. It has produced so far four Phods. and 20 candidates are engaged in coctoral research. The department has 15-Ecachers and teacher stucent ratio is 1:13. The teaching load on each teacher is on an average 12 periods per.weok. . The department has produced 4 Ph. P s. in past five years and 15 schotars at present working for their Pl:.D.

The main"tarust of the department is in Ehilosophy Hof Languages and thilosophy of Logic. . The department has dalso been running M.Phil. course.

The publications and rescarches of the department are impressive, and the department as a whole is promising. However, the syllabus is not very satisfactory and in some respects is out-dated.

The department has produced good work in the field of Logi c, Philosophy of Languaces and Philsophy of Science, and therefore it secms to be worthinile to assist them in spectalising in thesc fielde.

The departnent eiould provide lectures and courses on the Ehilosophy of Scicnce and of Mathematies for students of technology.

The Comittec recomenes that following a ssistance be provided to the department under first priority:

Two Readers - one in Indian logic and the other in philosophy of Science of Horal Philosophy
(ii) Books \& Journals:

-7.9 Eparticnt of Library Scicnces. The department has bon conducting a Dib. Sctence course an wants to introduce oncy yt it. Lib. Science course. There are three whole-time teaciers. onc reader and two lecturers in the department.

Four part-cime lecturers are also helping the departaent. The B.Lib. Science course is purcly a professional course in which emphasis is being given, to documentstion, use of computer, preservation of manuscripts and che use of other nonaboot materials. The Committee recommends that the department be strengthened for providing intensive training at the B.lib. Science. Level. Some additional staEf and Eunds for books and jourals etco may be provided Accordingly, the folloving facilities are recommended for the current plan periodunder first priority:
(i) Teachingstaff; Lecturer 1 .
(ii). Books \& Journals: Rs 40,000/-.

## 8. Faculty of Science

8.1 Departmentof 3eolofical Eciences $\quad$ : !
(i) Ekisting courses and students intake: The department runs both $\ddagger$ Sce ant M.Sc. 3-year Applied Geology courses. About 15 to 20 stufents are admitted into B.Sce Degree on'tie average and between 10 and. 20 .are. admittcdinto N.Sc. Applied jeology Course'.
(ii) Research Scholars: Et present there are 15 researci scholars woring in the department in various schemes ant uncer, university Eellowships. 31 doctorates were produced during the last 10 years, and 10 schemes from CSİ, University Grants Commission, Government of ivest Bengal are being run at present. In additiong tize Committec was told that six more projects have been sanctioned. The department has so far published about 500 scientific articles in various learned journals and the students of the department have successfully completed in U.F.S.C. examinations and have been employed in various governmental and private agencies and in the Geological Survey of India.

In recognition to the valuable work, done by this department", the UGC has sanctioned the department a special assistance progremme for the period 1972077 an 1 thus the department hes already attained the status of one of the few leading centres of teaching and rescarch in geolozy iñ the country.
(iii) Main thrust areas: The main thrust areas of the department are in the fields of (i) Economic Geology (in wich 2 prosessors have specialised); (ii) Pe'trology \& Mineralogy (in which one Professor has. specialised) and (iii) Structural Geology, Paleeoctology \& Stratigraphy. As a minor area the department is interested in coophysics.
(iv) Existing StaEf: There are at present three professors, 3 readers, 9 lecturers in the department. In addition, there aret wo readers and one research associate under special as sistance progremme.
(v) V Elan íroposels: The lepartment hos submitted an ambitious programme of consolidition and expansion during $V$ plan period. In particular they proposed additional staff requirements of. 3 professors, 5 readers and a draftsman. It hes submitted proposals towar equipment grant worth $\mathbb{P} 5.6$ lakhs library grant of ps 1.1 lakh, a Eurniture grant of 1.25 lakhs an building requirement of is 3 laths.
(vi) VPlan recomandetions: After surveying the Committee is satisfied with the high caliber of the teaching staff of this lepartment, with the courscs.ans syliabii that are being pursued in the Misco. Appli.ed Geology Course, with the research output and witi the topics of researeht that are being pursued in this depertment: In partleular, it is noted that the department is receiving opecial assistance from the UGC in the field of edonomic geology :These laboratories are willeequipped and facilities for research and training are of a reasonably htgh. standard.

It may be noted thet fha iepartment hais already one reader in geophysics. Being very near to the geological survey of India and its geophysical wing, the Univeraity oz Jadavpur should in fact have a strong division of exploietion geophyics; ohlch is.one of the inportant and modern branches of geological sciences. The Comnittce thercfote recommencs that in the V plan period, the Jepartment should open a new thrustere in the field of coploration geopinysics: It can make a beginning by appointing onc lecturcr who is specialised in exploration geoplysics.

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(i) Equipment: Some of tie equipment of the department is not in. working condition. It is therefore necessary as a first priority to put those instruments which are not in working condition, into operation. For this purpose, the Committee would like to set apart a sum of is $50,000 /$ - for repair and maintenance aut of equipment grant being recommended under first priority. In addition, the Comaittee would like to recommend an equipment grant of Rs 5 lakhs for purchase of new equipment iisted by the department. Thus a total sum of $\mathrm{Ps}^{5} .5$ lakhs is recommended For equipment (Rs 3.50 lakins under first priority and Rs 1.00 lakh each in second snd tairapriority.
(c) Books and periodicals: A sum of Es 1 lakh is recommended for books ant journels under first priority.
(d) Recurrine: The department at present obtains o. sum of $\mathrm{Rs} 3,500$ from the $U G C$ towards ficld training programmes of postoraduate students. In addition, it is recommended that $\mathrm{f} ; 3,000 /-\mathrm{be}$ given to this department under first priority during $V$ Elan towards field work and rosearch contingencics. The university may give additional (at least equal) amounts also from its own funds, to augment the resources for fiela expensesie.
(e) Space: The department is at present having an area about 7, 500 sq.ft. ansis. getting 5;000 sq.ft. more soon, thus making it a total of $12,500 \mathrm{sq}$ fit. Even though the Department has put up proposalg for adiltional space of $5,000 \mathrm{sq}$. ft., the Committee feels thet no new space need be given to this department and the existing space of i2; $500 \mathrm{sq.ft}$. is sufficiont at this juncture.

It is noted thet at present the department is situated in two adjacent buildings; It is necessary to rationalige the space and to accommodate the endigh department in one building or part thereof where the the total space available to the department viz., 12,500 sa.ft. is located in onc area.
f) The departaent should enable teacher fellows from .othor institutions to coma, and use its facilities.
g) The department may try to avoid in breeding and recruit steff on an ell India basis, especially as it cnjoys thestatus os depirtment of special assistance.
:3.2 Department of Chemistry: Baing the department of an enginecring university, it primarily caters to the needs of students of various engineering departments. Fa addition; the deportment has graduate and honours
courses in chomistry lecenng to R.Se. degree. Rescarch Tork is also beine. confucted by verious memers of the stef for the doctorel degree of the university.

The department has several major equipments such as Thermobalence for stucy in controlled atmosphere, various Spectrophotometers, Ligite scatterinz patometer, jutg-lewis Comparator, dolaregrapia ece. The cepartmentel library has 4,000 books, several of which sre multiple copies of the text books and subecribes to 58 journels. The workshop has a lathe, drillith necine ent sone other tools ant hes one Forman to loo: fiter tie work. Gless blowing facility is evaileble to the recearch workers.

The main thrust of the research nork has been in Analytical and inorganic Chenistry, Physidal (electrochemistry, Eatochemistry ant spectroscopy surface cienistry and molecular statiotical mechenics of iniquas) Organic Chemistry (Synthetic Organic Chenistry and reaction mechenics, Organic photochenistry). During the past 10 years, 241 publications have been made in various national and internetional jo:nnels. During the same period, 15 members of the stafe visited verious institutions abroad on Eallowships and visiting positions and the lepartment oporetey 18 researdi schemes sponsored by various agencies as CSIR, UGG, Eest Incia Tharmaeditical worls, Calcutta etc. In adition, a project "roperties of electrolysis in Horiaqueols Mediall wes supportad by llational Burcau of otandard, tasington under the PL-480 sctome. At the time of the $\therefore$. visit there werc 24 rezular research students supported by the various ageacies. In adfition, there were 20 part-tine (unpeid) rescarci workers in the depertment.

The departnent of chenistry is spread over three
buildings. In eaci building, the space is allocated on fifereht floors. Thes creates difficulties in organising the teachingend recearch work of the department. There is considerable congestion in the various rooms and lajoratories in the department. In some cases, the teachers dit not appear to have even a proper place to sit. Althou sh some more space would beoome qualaule after proposea reallocetion in mich the geology and Mathematies departants wouls sinteron one of the building housing the department, the dspartaent's need for additional space neods urgent consideration.

The workstop availatle is Inadequate Most of the nazincs appeared to be out of order and no wottinwhile work apeers to have been talen during the last five years. Sonc workhop Eactlitics were availatiefrom the Fiysics dopartnenteane some other dopartments, on a personal basis.

A large part of the equipment is not in a working con?ition. One Becknen DU Epectrophotometer ras sept in a normairconditioned room. It has leen out of operation for more than $l_{\text {h }}$ years. This also epplies to some other castly and sophisticated equiprent, parts of winch were not opersting beceure of lact of spares andfor minor repairs.

The library facilities nedz consicerable improvemone, Since the avoilable space is not suffieient, the journals should be shifted to the Central Library. only the textm books needed by the poetgraduate students should be retained.

The researcis contriiution iy tat members of the stafi is of a high ozaer ani the members of the department heve puthished research papers in joutnals of mational and International repute. Jut all the senior faculty members lo not seem to have been consulted in preparing the final dreft of the Fifthelan proposals submitted to the Visiting Committee and that there could ie more coordinated planning within the department.
$\because$ : The university siould give atcention to consolidations of the accommodation of the department presently available in several builuings.

Tie existing instruments must be put in order providing air-conditioning, where necessary.

The main tirust of the research work will perhaps continue in the areas in Physical, Inorganic/analytical anc orgenic Chemistry. given above and should continue to be supported. It rill be desiratle to ensure that rescarch activities in Inorgamic/Analytical. Chemistry section are sustainef, since Professor A. K. Majumar who did somuch work in the area rotired some time ago.

Infilling tio vacant positions, balance botween various arcas shoulit be bootied into; at present, tie staffing is too much biased towards inorganic chemistry. The department ney introsuce instrumentation as a component of the resular training of its Moscs. This may be done in cquoperation wita tac Electronic Engineering department.

## Staf: :

Committce should be formed. It should deal with all new sopiisticeted equipment to be purchased and some of the existing equipnent could also be brought under itts: purview fint is not the intentionato silet all such çuipment to one loction, but their operation should not be controlleduy an in ividual teacher or a department. The university may avold duplication with the Indien Association for Gultivation of science, with regard to costly journals.
3.3 Ehysics jepartment: Tie PKysics Jopartment has a stafiof of 3 professors ( 1 vacant), 8 readers ( 1 vacant) and 30 lecturers and principal research aress are Molecular Structurc, Theorctical Zigh Energy Ehysics and $2011 d$ State Ehysies. A choud chamber and neutron generator have beem under construction Eor some time, but the Committee found it ifficult to get en idea as to what one would do with these, when ready. Also, the time scale on which this work has been going on appeares to be rather long. It - vould je useful to tave more clear objectives when such Eabrication work is undertaken ant then to complete it soon.

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The Department ias a nuclear physics lajorstory for M.Sce sturentse it has not yet siven any serious thought to the possibilityor using the Varia le Bnergy Jyclotron (VEC) a major nationel rescarch Eacilfty, which is coming tp at Galcut ta! iThe Committae has recomnenced some positions to which qualisied experimental nuclecr physicicts may be appointed, so that the department may de in a posttion to use VEC. Existing nuclear piysiaists may also. consider orienting themselves to the use of VEC.

The solid atete proframme beserves siport. On tie other hend, the bommittea/ ioes not recommend the plesma physics proposel since no one in tie physiss fepertment appears to be interected.in this area now.

The Comitteafelt that tive department des perheps offering too many spectelisetions at M.Sc. (and then complaining ajout teaching load). It may consi ser reducing the number of specialisations offered, fint corfining them to those areas mere active research ges going on in the cepartment.
$\because$.. . The Comaintee Jas. given to understand that the specialisation in olectronic was formarly given in the clectronies eagineering department, but this had to be discontinued. Even now, tie M.Sc's from the physics department were sait to be going to the electronic engineering department for research, iecause of better job opportunities. The universicy, mey, therefore, conetier whether the electronics spccialisation should not again be made an interm depaztmentel programme.

The depertment may try to identify a Eaw research arcas in wich all or most of the researcheffort may be concentrated during the rifth zlan period so that they mey be able to make an impact. This would be particularly necessary in deciding the priorities for ecuipment to be bought out of the limited plan recources. Solid state physics end nuclear physics (based on VEC) appear to be two such areas. Even here, especially in nuclear physícs, careful planning will be necessary, and the university may consult cuperts at VEC.

8.4 Department of Mathematics: The department of mathematics has 3 professor (all specialised in Applied Mathematics), 11 readers and 20 lecturer $s_{9}^{\prime}$ 'Most of the readers and lecturers (except 3 or 4) have also specialised in applied mathematics. possibily as a result of, this students also mostly do not take pure mathematics at M.Sc. The development of the department, therefore, clearly lacks balance. The department, in future, should try to restore a balance on a priority basis by laying greater emphasis on pure mathematics, because unless this side is. properly developed, applied mathematics side also cannot grow as it should. The Committee is not convinced that it is difficult to get good pure mathematicians, as was stated to us during discussions.

The department has been quantitatively quite productive in research. It lists as many as 22 major areas of research. No depantment can be expected to specialise in so many branches and do justice to them. The department may; therefore, try to conoentrate on a limited number of selectea thrust areas, so thit its regesrches may make. an impact at the national and international level.

The department has conducted several summer ingtitutes for school and college teachers and Nists scholars. Work is also being done in the field of Mathematics Eiducation.
p.t:o

There is a feeling in the department that the teaching of mathematics in the engineering faculty is different from the teaching in the main department. For example, we were told that they have asked AlCTB for a professorship in Engineering Mathematics because most of their teachers are with a nonengineering background. This kind of a feeling creates walls which are harmful both to the engineering subjects and to mathemitics, and should therefore be avoided if the standards of mathematics are to be ralsed. The staff may try to exploit theif location in a technological enviroment to orient themselves appropriately. There is scope for increased interaction with the engineering departments both rior research and for teaching. The department may consider reorienting the courses at undergraduate and postgraduate levels, keeping in view the fact that it is located in a technological unitersity.

The group on operations research may be encouraged to establish contacts with industriks and with Departments of the Engineering faculty.

The Biomathematics group will have to develop close contacts with biology or medical research workers outside the. University.

The following assistance is recommended for the depattment of Mathematicsi

country wich are trainine diploma bolders and graduates in libriry science. The University should Lor the present concentrate on consolidating the E.Lib. course.
9.2 Eostriaduate Courge in Eciucation:- The University proposes to introiuce a post graduate course in education during the riftit plan period. The course which ass been formulated on the basis of the recommendations made by the Education Commission (1964-65) would include papers on educetional plenning anc administrative, teacher education, educational evolution etc. The University, would award a Master's ذefree after a student successfully completes the prescribed courses wisici will have four compulsory anc too optional papers as well as a dissertation and vive voce. The University would require a stafe of to Professors, sixReaters and 12 lecturers on the teaching staff for introducing the course as well as a nonmrecurring grant of rs 10.30 lakins and a grant of $\mathrm{P}_{3} 13.85$ lakhs, for meeting expenditure on recurring and otier itens. Tise proposal presented to the Committee did not reflect any new ideas especially the fact that the postgraduate course would be run in a tecinnological enviromment at a time when $10+2+3$ was being introduced. Tiie Committee is not inclined to recommend opening of a postaraduate course in educotion. Other universities in the state are already providing facilities for undergraduace ard postoraduate courses in education.

### 9.3 Central facilities for Bio-physical research

The Committee considered tine proposal for tie development of ecatrel facilities for biophysical research at Gie u:iversity ans discussed it with the scientists concerned. The Committee foels that the proposal seserves serious consiceration, but found it difficult to include it in its recommendations within the limited resources. It would suggest that the scientists concerned may make a scperate joint inter-departmental research proposal to the U.J.C. or to the S.R.E.C. of the Department of Science and Tecinology outside the V Plan.
10. Miscellaneous Items:
10.1 Centrol Librery: The University library
has at present about $1,95,000$ books in various
subjets. It is also suoscrioing to about 1100 journals. the university spent ps 2.10 lakhs on books and journals during the year" 1973-74. The library works
for 10 hours a day. Ito realing room has the capacity for 335 students. The University has got 6000 text. books in the library and 2500 books are issued on an averaje per weel: to the students an? teachers.

The library has got Chief Librarian, a Librarian and 74 other staff wich include Assistent Librarians, Gorters, Biaders, Junior Assistants and Peons. The staff provided for the librery is adequats. The Gommittee redommends that an amount of is 8.00 lakhs (?s t.00 laths uncer firet ane ps 2.00 laki each in II \& III friorties) may be proviced to the Central Library for tiae purchace of bools ant journals. The Library may also be provided with a grant of is $10,000 /-$ for equipment under first priority (including Kerox Machine). The University itas proposed eutension of the library building since large number of jooks and jourrals etc. are stacked on the floors of che existing building and students end teachers find great difficulty in méring.use ozthem. The'University will réquire extra space to keep these boots anc journals in proper orc̣er

The University also could not implement the project foz construction of a museum wich was approved in the Fourth Plan period. The University $h_{s} s$ now proposed construction of museum in the library building on the ground floor at a totel cost of is 1.02 lakhs. The estimates cost on the construction of library building is Rs 6.50 lakhs. The Cammittee recommends that the proposal of the Univeisity be accepted end the Commission may provide assist nee for this purpose on usual sharing basis. The tocal cost would be about is 7.50 lakis (UGC share is 3.75 lakli, Ps 2.00 lakhs in first and fa 1075 latis in second priority).
10.2 Central Instrumentation Laboratory:- The University proposes to develop central facilities for research and industriel consultancy and, therefore, has proposed the esta-blishment of a Gentral Instrumentation Laboratory during the Fifth Elan period, which will also serve as a service centre for the different university departments. The proposal for the establishment of the Gentral Laboratory envisages a total assistence of Pi 1.00 crore of which is 85.00 lakhs would be needea as capital grent and the rest for nceting expenses on staff and contingencies. A staff of one principal Scientific officer, six Officer-incharge of Chemici, Electronic, Electrical, Mechanical, Optical and Zydrolic zections, 8 Techntal Assistants and 10 Junfor $\operatorname{stc}$ Ef including zeons has been proposed for the Gentral Laboratory. The proposal has been submitted to the A.I.C.T.E. The Committec supports
the general idea of a cencral Inctrumentation Laboratory. It efmar's an emount of if 10.00 laths for instruments that may be purchesed in tifs central facility and two staff positions under second priority. In any case, the Committee recommencis that the maintenance of the instruments in the various departments, of the university should be a central responsibility, for which cteps ie taken on an urzent basis.
10.3 Stujents' Hostel:- The University has got four hostels. It can accommodate 730 students. 620 seats are available for underfraduate students, 100 for poecgraduate students an 10 for reserch stucents. Tius, 12 per cent students are accommodates in the aostels. Three sostels are meant.for boya and one. for girls. . The University. did not propose extansion of hostel Eacilities since the present facilities appesr to be adequete.

The Committee recommends a srant of is 1.00 lakis under first priority as UGO share for improvement and renovation of the hostels and it ho pes that the state Government will also make not only matching but adequate contribution for chis purpose.
10.4 Teachers: Quarters:- The University has at present, steff quartere for teacleers and a teachers' hostel for eccommodating 15 Erofessors, 17 Readers and 20 Lecturers. The teachers.in their meeting. With the Sommittee stressed the need for providing more accommodation to then as most of them have ito come Erom a long dietance. The University has included construction of stafy quarters in its Fiftin Elan proposels. Conctruction of additional staft quarters was approved by the Commission in the Fourth zlan period, but for a voriety of reasons the University could not undertake the construction work so far. The Committec recommends that approval for construction of stafe quarters be renewed during tio Fifth Flan perio? ds a new scheme and, construction of staft quariers at a total cost of filloo lakhs on usual sharing basis nay be approved by the Commission. (USC Shere 5.50 lakhs, 2.50 lakhs in first and is. 3.00 leths under seeond priority.).
10.5 Glass-IV Stifin 2uarters: $=$ The Commission. approved construction of 32.61 ss. IV staff quarters Guring the Fourth Elan period. The work on this project has been recently undertaken. The jeneral secretary of the Jadavpur Univercity Non-teaching mployces. Association met the conattee and requested that the University has got such a laree number of class -IV:
employees that unless suitaile accommodation is not provised to all of tem, it would create lot of hardsiips to them and tieir Eamilies. Ze, therefore, requested thet a total of 576 quarters may be constructec for slassilV enployees et a total coot of is 3.44 crores. Tha Comittee feels that construction of 32 staft querters will not ease the situation ant, therefoze, the Commission should provice assistance for construction o more quarters for GlassulV employees during the Fifth Plan period. The Universiey has indicated that a totel axpensiture of is 7.56 laths aill have to be incurred on construction of 32 querters for Class-IV employees since tine cost of construction has considerably zone up. The Comrittee recomends that assistance be provided to the Univessity for construction of 32 adlitional staft quarters for Class-IV employees, at $\varepsilon$ total cost o fs 7.5 1a<hs ant the Comission may provide assistancc Eor this = purpose on usucl sharing ia sis (UGC share m 3.75 lakhs :i 1.75 lakhs under first and pi 2.00 lakhs under second priority).
10.6 Science Block:- The Commission approved the construction of a Science block during the Fourth Plan period, but the University could not undertate the construction work during the Fourth Plan period. The University has requested that the sanctian be. rencwet furiag the Fifth Elen ane the Commistion may provide assistance for this purpose so that the Univarsity may proceci viti the construction of the Scicnce Block. Tie Committee recommends that the Gommission may provife assistance for the construction of Science Elock during the Fifth Elan period at a total cost of Ps 2.70 lakhs (UGC share fi 1.35 lakhs) on usual sharing basis under first priority.
10.7 Viee-Ghancellor's Residence:- The construction of Vice-Ehancellor's residence at a cost of is $90,000 /$ was approved by the Commission during the Fourth Plan period, wut like other buildings, construction of Viec-Chancellor's residence could not be undertaken by the University for a variety of rearons. The proposal has been iacluded by the University in its FiEthelan development sciemes. The estimated cost of construction has, \#owever, gone up from ps 90,000/to is 1.22 lakhs. The Committec recommends that the sanction may be renewed for the construction of a. Vice-Chancellor's residence during the Fifth Plan period and the Commission may provice assistance for this purpose on usual sharing basis, if funds are available under seconc priority.

10.0 Development officer:- The University has proposed that the Cominesion may approve a post of Jevelopment ofizicer Eor tie inniversity uning the Fisti flan period. The Committee noted that the Uaiversity did zot appoint any Jevelopment officer in the Fourth $21 a n$ period snc thet the Commission is givinz prefereṅe to such univereicies in the matter of providing assistance for the post of Development ofsicer mich dif not have this poot during the Fourth Elan period. The Committec, there Eore, recommens that the Comission may provide assistance for the post of a Development officer to the Jadavpur University under first priority during the Fifth Plan period. The University will have to provide for the estailichment of office for tho Dovelopaont officer Eroritis own resources. A Development Officer. Wes apparently already been, eppointed in. anticipation of UGC sanction.

### 10.9 Cempus Development/Water Supply:- The

 University his proposed the development of University campus by filling lowlyind areas and development. of roas ant culvarts ia the University campus at a total cost of es 5.00 lasis. The students in their meting with the Committec also pointed out that the playrounds were genefally, filled with water ant there was an ymacuiate neer to fill the low lying areas in the University campus. The Jniversity has also proposed the inprovement oz water supply Eacilities in the University. The Committee foels that these responsidilities should really be taiten by the-state Govt. and that the state Government should provide necessary funcs, on a priority basis.ffor campus: development and water supply facilities to the Univezsity specially as funds from the Comnissfon during the Fifth zlan perfad even for development programes are very Iimited andit would not be possiule for the UGG to provice any assistence for campus development etc. under development schemes cacept uncer priority third under which a oroviston of ts 5 ilaks is,recommended.10.10. Sescarci Eellowships:- The otudents in their meeting vith the comittes pointed out that the number of research Ecllowships available at the University ones so meagre specially in Arts $F$ culty that most.of the stufenes do not have any apportunity for pursuing reserath. The conmitee recommends that the Commission may provicic 15 junior fellowsips in the first priority to the Jedavpur Uaiverity. The total expenditure on . . proviaing these facilicies woule a be about ps 3 la\%hs.
10.11 Visiting Faculty: The Committee recommenis that a grant of fs 1.50 laklis unier firet priority, Ps 1.0010 hh under second and fo 2.50 lato under thind priority mey je 'provided to t?e Jadavpur University to enalle the Arts anci Science departments to invite experts and specialists from other institutions Erom within the country on short-term basis to help them in executing specisic teachino and research programmes.
10.12 Zutilction of Researcir Jork: The comnittec recommends that an amount of 1.001 akh may be proviled to the University to enajle it to undertake the puilicalion of theses and letrnod rosearch works completed by its scholars and teachers under first priority.
10.13 Use of Outststion Pescarcir Pecilities: o The tesciats and researcil students in Arts and Science departments liave sometimes to zo to other institutions for short periods in connection witi: their research work: Jue to laci of financiel assistence specifically for this purpose, the research wor's of teachers and research students who are not getting any fellowships etc.; sutfers: The tomittee, thoraEore, recommencs. thet a frant of do 1.00 lakh may be provilles to the University under first priority to onable it to provide finencial assistance towaris travel etc. to its teachers and researci scholars for worifing at other institutions in connection with their research work.
10.14 Eztension Lectures, Geminars Exchange Erogrammes The Committec recommends.thet an amount of is 1:00 lakh under first ant P 1.00 lakh under second priority may be made available to the University for organising extension lectures, seminars exchange prozrammes ctc. in the Eaculties of Arts and Scicnce.
10. 15 Gealt Centre: The University has a healtin centre which is housedin a two $£ 10$ or Luilding. The Centre has eye clinic, dentel clinic, Ellt clinic and a clinicel pathological laboratory in addition fo zeneral facilities. The Centre ias at present a total stafe oz $1 \%$ persons. Furtier stafz an equipment are needed to runthe centre efinciently. The comintec recommend thet a total grant of 1.001 akh (JGC share $1.075,000$ ) for extension anc equipment under first priority and steff on usual sharing basis) outsite V"Elan allocetion" nay be provided to the health centre.

The Conmittee visited the Cal cutta University from 18th to 20th September, 1975. The Report of the Committee is attached (appendix).

A surmary of the obsertations and recommendations nade by the Comirittee is given below:

1. The Comittee considered the Chani Committee's suggestion for declaring $\mathrm{C}_{3}$ cutta University as an institution of national importance by the Central Covemment. Taking all facto is into account, the Cormittee felt that the University $h_{\mathfrak{a}}$ yet to develop an all India and a national character before the quastion of declaring it an institution of national irportance is ansidered by the Central Covemment. The University should have an.op en door policy in the matter of recruitment of its teaching staff and admission to various coursos and attract talented teachers and students from all parts of the count ry.
2. It would sean, however, that aly that the University authorities intond by the request for reognition as institution of national importance is that the special problens and difficultios of $\mathrm{Cal}_{\text {al }}$ cutta University be recognized and more funds (even for mantenance purposes) be made available by the U. G. C. This certainly merits sympathetic onsideration. Certain proposals of the Chani Comittee which involve decentralization could be speedily irmlemented but administrative and acadenic decentralisation should go to gether.
3. The University should consider the implenentation of such ${ }^{\circ}$ recomendations of the Chani Comittee as do not require heavy investment of resources e. go ast ablishment of an Acaderic and Plaming Board, the introduction of correspondence courses or giving autonory to colleges. No steps had been tiaken by the University to formulate a programe or initiate measuras for introdicing correspondence coursos. The Comittee hop os that the University will not allow itself to be oppressed by the psychology of poverty.
4. The University should consider the setting up of acadenic centres for improvenent of standards of undergraduate pinantion. If funds are availablo in the State for this, the contre wuld also assist substantially.
5. $\therefore$ There has been an unrestricted expansion of departments and colleges during the past two decados. Judicious use should bo mado of the rosourcos available to the University during the current plan period. In viow of the limitations of space and funds, the univorsity should concentrate its resources and onergies during the Vplan period on consolidation of existing departants and coursas.
6.: There has been too much of fragnent ation; of dap artments in the sane discipline e.g. History has at prosent four dopartnents. There was very little ovidence of collaboration anongst the departnents which belong to the same discipline or allied disciplines e.g. Puro and applied Psychology depertmonts located on the same floor do not seen to be even on talking terns with each other. The University

should give serious thought to this problen and devise ways and means to bring such departnents closer to gether.
6. Teaching at honours level and at postgraduate level is done in the university departnents in physiology, psychology and anthropology. Such an arrangement not only increases the teaching load but also hampers the research work of the teachers and.lowers the level of rasearch in the department. It would be useful if undergraduate and post graduate teaching are sparated from each other and undergraduate classos are shif ted to the affiliated colleges in the above subjects. •
7. Postgraduate teaching is at present confined to university departments. With a view to reducing the pressure on the University Departments, the Cormittee favours the possibility of allowing two or three selected colleges in lalcutta which have facilitios for post graduate studies to start teaching a few sel ected subjects at post graduate level. The Comittee visited Presidency college, Calcutta and was of the view that this college had sufficient facilitios and faculty strength in certain departrients and should, thorefore, be considered for this purpose. The University faculty should, however,

- $b_{0}^{\circ}$ as sociated'with the selection connittees for alı colleges authorise. . . to undert ake pos.tgraduate teaching.

9. The Institute of Basic Medical Sciencos, Calcutta University $h_{\text {as }}$ in its nei ghbourhood a well-run and well staffed hospital vi $z_{z}$ F.G. Institute of Medical Education and Research which has its own departments of Basic Medical Sciences and is administered by the Heal th Dopartment of the State Covemment. There is, however, no working arrangement between these two Institutes and the members of the staff of the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences have no access to any hospital facilities, without which the departments in the Institute cannot work efficientiy. The Committee recommends that irmediate steps be taken to merge the two Institutes and this matter should be taken up at the highest level on top priority basis., If this is not possible, the university may consider the possibility of handing over the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences to the State Covernment. Whe ohe woltemative to this recomendation would be the establishnent of a scparate hospital for the Institute of Basic Medical Scierces of the same standard as the Institute of Medical Education and Research and since this is a very expensive proposition, the Comittee does not recommend it.
10. The Connittee also noted that no audit report on the accounts of the Caloutta University had been placed befo re the university syndicate during the past 12 years. The Cormittee is, therefore, of the view that the university and the State Coverninent must consider urgently, ways of providing audit of accounts within a reasonable period of time. Financial discipline is the first priority of any eninent acaderic institation like Salcutta University. The State Govemment should consider the possibility of creating a senior position of Finance Officer who should be responsible for $a l l$ financial matters and getting the accounts of the university audited in tine.
11. The Cormittee observed that the buil dings of the University were not being naint ained properly and, therefore, suggested that the. University authorities nay take urgent neasures to irprove the naintenance of the buildings.
12. Hostels maintained by the University are at present • intended only for M.A.M.Sc. students. Research scholars find great hardship in finding accomodation in the city. The university should consider the setting up of a separate hostel for research scholars. Even the hostel for post graduate students does not have $b_{a} s i c$ facilities and are not properly maintained. Facilities "in the present hostels should be irproved.
13. The Comittee got the information that the university incurred a substantial loss every year (of the order of ns. 4 1akhs) because it was diff cult to recover lodging/boarding dues from hosteliers. 'If true, this is a serious matter that needs to be looked into.
14. All appointrients to the teaching posts are made by the University without holding eny interview. The Comittee $f$ elt that the appointrients not only of lecturers but also of readers hould be nade after interview by the Selection Comittee. Only in case of posts of Professors, the procedure for interview need not be followed in all cases, but even here, interviews would be healthy and helpful.
15. . It also came to the notice of the Committee that in a few cases, the syndicate of the university did not accept the unaninous recomendations nade by the selection Cormittee and appointed persons who had not been recommended by the Selection Comittee. The Syndicate has also on several occasions, referred back the recomendation of a selection Comittee for reconsideration. This procedure needs to be reviewed by the universi ty/State Coverment.
16. The Cormittee was sorry to know that nearly $13 \%$ of the teaching posts were lying vacant which had an adverse effect on teaching and research in the concerned dep artments. The univorsity should $t a k e$ irmediate steps to fill the vacant posts.
17. The university staf $f$ has a large number of part-time teachers drawn from the local colleges. While this gives the selected teachers an opportunity to participate in postgraduate teaching, the flow is in one direction. The university may also consider the possibility of deputing some of its teachers to the colleges in order to inprove the standards of collegiate education.
18. In a number of departments especially in the Faculty of Hunanities and Social Sciences, teachers retired fron Covermont Service in the college have been appointed as Lecturers in the postgraduate Departnents. The Comittee feels that this is not a dosirable practice and as $f_{a r}$ as possible, this should be avoided.
p.t.o.
19. The Committee is of the view that the university will have to exercise caution in the matter of admission to postgraduate course, specially in the Arts subjects. This will not orly strengthen the standards of postgraduate teaching and research in the University but will also bring about a more equitable distribution of the postgraduate student population between the Calcutta and the Jadavpur Universities.
20. The Committee noted wi th concern that the faculty members in most of the departments (sometimes even professors) were not as sociated with the formulation of the development plans of the tepartrient. There was in fact very little di alogue within the department among the $f$ acuity members in most of the departments. One way to rectify this would be to hold regular meetings of the faculty to advise the Head of the department in $211 \mathrm{~m}_{\mathrm{a}} \mathrm{atters}^{\mathrm{p}} \mathrm{partaining}$ to the departant. mother suggestion worth consideration is the rotation of headship among the professors at least after two or three years.
21. The Committee noted a communication gap between students and teachers. Appropriate steps including formation of student teacher committees in departments may be taken to bridge this gap.
22. : While a few departments have revised their syll api and have incorporated in then the latest trends in the subject, many departments have not given any serious thought to. it. There is a need for a continuous review of the syllabi in each subject. The-Comittee was surpirsed to find that even a Professor in one of the departments complained that the syllabus had not undergone much change for the last 25 years inspite of rapid developments in the subject.
23. In addition to the departmental libraries which may have basic books and multiple copies of textbooks, it will be desirable to establish a Central Library in each campus where reference books: textbooks, genera al books and research journals could be kept. This would avoid purchase of multiple copies: of sine journals in different departments.
24. The Committee feels that whereas there is a need of each dep artrient to have some basic equipment for its own use, the costly and sophisticated equipment should not be the monopoly of any particular department. The university should prepare a list of such items of equipment available with it or even at the neighbouring laboratories for the information of its various faculties and nay also establish a 'Users Committee' to ensure smooth functioning of the Central Instrumentation facility and proper maintenance of equipment. The University should also est ailish a central service for servicing the instruments and ensure that the instruments do not remain idle for want of maintenance.
25. There is a need for continuous appraisal of the progress made by the University with regard to the suggestions and recommendations made by the Visiting Committee and approved by the University Grants Commission. The University is advised to set up an Academic and Flaming Board for this purpose which should have on it, University teachers. The University Grants Commission should seriously consider the establishment. of a regional office in Calcutta to cater to the needs of this region.
26. The Comittee has recominded establishment of a separate department of Sociology on first priority basis. This department is at present functioning as a part of the department of political science. The Comittee $h_{a s}$ also recomiended"introduction of a postgraduate course in Food and Nutrition at Vihari Lial College of Home Science, Calcutta. The Conrittee has not recomended any assistance for Iife Science Centre and has suggested that collaboratio teaching and research programes anong the departants concerned nay be undertaken so that a more meaningful proposal for the development of a Life Science Centre may develop in due course. The cominittee has also not recommended starting of a departrient of Oceanography and Meteriology, since it did not find any interest in the proposel during its discussions with the faculty nembers in the existing relevant dopartments.
27. The comittee has recomended a grant of Rs. 17.60 I jrhs
for books and Rs. 27.20 Iakhs for equipnent under first priority and Rs. 5.80 lakhs for books and Rs 9.00 lakhs for equipnent under second priority for the existing teaching departrients, and a grant of
Rs. 32.50 lakhs under first prionty and ist 25100 lakhs under second priority for construction of staff quarters and extension of Humanities and Science buildings. Assistance for students hostel $h_{\text {as }}$ been recomnended under second priority. The committee has also recommended a grant of Rs. 4.50 Iaks under first priority and Ps. 6.03 Ickhs under second priority for $f$ aculty inprovenent, visiting faculty, Seminars and Workshops, use of out-station research facilities and publication of research work. In addition, posts of six professors. ei ghteen Readers, and Nine Lectuerrs, and ten technical Assistants and others under firstipriority and rour professors, ei ghteen Readers, eighteen lecturers and thirteen Technical Assistants under second priority $h_{a v e}$ been racomended for the existing departnents.
28. The Comittee has recommended that the Insti tute of Basic Medical Sciences be either nerged with the P. G. Institute of Medical Education \& Research or the Institute be handed over to the state Govemmont. The Comittee. Fovever, exarined the needs of the various departrents functioning in the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences fand $h_{a s}$ recominended a total grant of Rs .23 .35 lakhs for the Institute as per details given below:

2. The Committee visited the University from 18th to 20 th September, 1975. It had preliminary discussions with the Vice-Chancellor, Deans of Faculties and Officers of the University on 18 th September 1975. The next day the members of the Committee visited the University Library, departmental buildings, students and teachers hostels, the health centre, the study centre, the library, the university printing press and met students' and teachers' representatives. The Committee broke up into two grouns for the Humanities and Social Sciences and for the Sciences respectively. These groups visited the university departments and discussed the Fifth Plan proposals of the individual departments with the persons-concerned.
3. Basic Facts and Figures :
3.1 Establishment of the University :
The Calcutta university was established in 1857 as an examining university It was in 1914 that the university had set up postgraduate teaching departments in the Humaniries, the Social Sciences and the Sciences. It is now a teaching and affiliating university with its jurisdiction extending over the States of West Bengal (excluding the termitorial areas of Burdvan, Jadavpur, Kalyani, North Bengal and Visva--Sherati University) and Tripuma.

3.2 In 1973-74, the university had the following faculties; Arts, Science, - Acriculture, Commerce, Education, Engineering, Fine Arts and Masic, Jourr=ism, Law, Medicine, Technclogy met Veteninary Sciance. There tre seven wiveraty ocilegen, namely College of Arts, College of Commerce, College of Law, College of Agricillture, College of Technoloty, College of Science and College of Medicine. Sixtyone departments are functioning in the above colleges.
3.3 During 1973-74, thene were 213 colleges, viz., Arts and Science - 158, Cormerce - 16, Medical - 10, Ayurved - 1, Teachers' Training - 12, Law - 4, Textile - 2, Veterinary - 1, Training - 1, Home \& Social Science - 1, Business Organization - 1, Ceramic - 1, Horticulture - 1, Engineering - 2, Music -1, Physical Education - 1, The number of institutions recognised for postgraduate degree/diplome cousse were 9 .
3.4 The university provides residential accomodation mostly to postgraduate students. There are no staff quarters. The university has one rowing club and only one playground.
3.5 The new library building of the university has an area of 39,600 sq.ft. for stack rooms and $13,400 \mathrm{sq}$.ft. for reading rooms. The University proposes to improve its library services by providing free and open access to the shelves of the library except to the rame collection and other reserved areas. It is also planned to provide documentation service on a modest scale.
3.6 It gees without saying that Calcutta University has a long tradition of quality research in most departments. The members of the university faculties have published research parers in both Indian and foreign journals. They also participated in a number of intemational conferences during the Fourth Plan period and some of them presided over all India, Conferences and Seminars. A number of research projects assigned to the university by the University Grants Commission, the Research Programe Comittee of the Planning Commission, CSIR etc. have been completed.
3.7 Examination results: A study of the examination results of the University during the last five years shows that the pass percentage has been better than the all India average at the B.Sc. examination but not as good in B.A. and B.Com examinations. In the M.A., M.Sc., and M.Com examinations, the pass percentage is below the all India average. The examination results of the University during the years 1968-1972 are given at Annexure I
3.8 Income \& Expenditure : The university has been muning in deficit. The deficit under general fund (non-plan) has gone up from Rs.36.14 lakhs at the end of 1970-71 to Rs.93.60 lakhs at the end of 1973-74. The statement of consolidated nosition of all funds during 1975-76 (Annexume II) indicates an incone of Rs. 453 lakhs and expenditure of Rs. 579 lakhs resuiting In an estimated deficit of Rs.126 lakhs.

3,9, Admission oualifications: Acconding to the regulations of the university, the minimm oualification for admission to the postgraduate courses is a Bachelor's degnee (rass or honouns), but in actual practice due to limited availability of seats admissions are made dacoording, to merit.
3.10 Progress of the Fourth Plan schemes: During the Fourth Plan the UGC assisted the iniversity towards the appointment of academic and tecmical staff, purchase of books and joumals zabd laboratory equipment and construction of academic and residential buildings. The iniversity duming the last Plan period concentrated on strengthening its existing postgraduate departments by extending labonatory, library, research and teaching facilities and by appointing additional staff.

The Central Library was stren ened, additional amenities to students and teachers were nmvided and most athe sonstruction projecte which were undertaken during the Third Plan and the new projects sanctioned during the Fourth plan were completed.

Durinc tie Fourth Plan, the Cormission sanctionsd 12 posts of professons, 14 posts of Readers and 29 posts of Lecturers. The university could not fili 3 posts of Professors and 3 nosts of Lecturers. In all fifty posts of tedchers ( 16 of Professors, 11 of Readers and 23 of Lecturers) were lying vacant on 15.9.75 in 41 departments. The total number of approved posts for these departments was 395 ( 55 professors, 103 readers and 237 lecturers) and of these only 345 were occupied in September 1975. Department-wise details in this regard are given in Annexme III.

For the proposals accepted by the Commission, the total provision wis about 169.17 lakhs of which the Commission's share was Rs.131.41 lakhs and the grants released upto the end of Fourth Plan period amounted to Rs: 102.43 lakhs. The actual spill-over to be carried to the Fifth Plan is Rs.22.09 lakhs which would be the first charge on the Fifth Plan allocations of Rs. 3,00 crores. A statement giving the details of the scheme approved, grants released upto 31.3 .1974 and the spill-over to be carrie to the Fifth Pian is attached at Annexure IV.
3.11 Fifth Plan proposha: The university has submitted proposals involving an outlay of Rs.391.34 lakhs. Of this Rs. 308.86 lakhs is in the first priority and Rs.92.48 lakhs in the second oriority. These proposals also include the expenditure on the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences and on the Sports complex. These proposald generally relate to the strengthening of Science and Humanities Departments and Institute of gasio Medical Sciences. The university has also proposed to start Professor SN Bose Institute of Physical Sciences. There is also a proposal for the construction of teacehrs quarters at C.I.T. Plot at Maniktala at an estimated cost of Rs. 30.00 lakhs.
4. Meeting with the Vice-Chancellor and Deans:
4.1 The Vice-Chancellor and Deans of Faculties, Calcutta University, in the course of their discussions with the Visiting Committee inter-alia emphasised the following noints.
4.2 The Comittee for the reorganisation and developnent of the University of Calcutta, aprointed by the University Grants Comission under the Chairmanship of Professor MM Ghani, former Vice-Chancellor, Calicut University had recommended develonment mmposals of the University involving an outlay of Rs. 10 crores. The University was under the inpression that it would be provided assistance by the Commission to that extent during the Fifth Plan period. However, subsequently, the UGC desined that the proposals may be brought down to a level of Rs. 3.00 crones, Consequently, the University had to prume its proposals to bring them within the allocation of Rs. 3.00 crones tentatively suggested by theCommission. Obviously, a number of requirements of the Eepartinents had to be abandoned and now whatever remained was the barest minimum.
4.3 In accordance with the guidelines indicated by theCommission, the university had allocated $25 \%$ of the total provision for buildings. The teaching denartments were cramed up for space. With a view to reducing this congestion, it was necessary to have more space. The History departments should be provided acconmodation in such a way that all the three History departments are contigunus to each other. The deraxtments of Physiology and Psychology also needed adequate space. The derartment of Archaeology required more accommodation. The proposal of the University, therefore, was to put up an eight storeyed building in the compound of the Education Denartment and ehift Psychology, Physiology, Agriculture and other departments to this building.
4.4 The univensity has included in its ponosals amounts for the devolonent of almost all the existing cerments. Dring tie coures of yous, tie intrie of these departments has increased considerably, and the number of teachers has gone un. In almost all the departments, the courses have been moiomised: new subiecte have been introduced and more groups of special papers are proposed to be added. Consequently, additional teachers, library books and journals, buildings and furniture and equipment are required.
4.5 The university proposes to establish the department of Metereology and develop Life Science Centre. The necessary infrastmucture in the form of expertise, and physical facilities is already available in the university for the estabishment of the department of Metereology. Regarding the Life Science Centre, the ViceChandellor stated that the subject has been introduced in the new pattern of higher secondary education, at both the High, School and Intermediate levels. A centre for the teaching and research in Life Sciences to train teachers in this branch of discipline was therefore desimble.
$4.6^{-\quad T h e ~ u n i v e r s i t y ~ h a d ~ d e c i d e d ~ i n ~} 1958$ to set up a department of Sociology and had also created a chair for the purpose. But owing to a number of factors beyond the control of the university, the department could not be set up. Now the university wants to pursue the matter seriously and set up a department in Sociology.
4.7. The strength of the university has been increasing year by year and it has not been possible to provide -dequate amenities to the students. Whatever amenities have been provided to the students within the limited resources available with the university are very meagre. The university wants to build an indoor stadium by the side of the Rowing Club.

Meeting with Teachers
5.1 The Cormitteemet a representative group of teachers whose main points were: (i) the teachens be provided with residential accommdation; (ii) the personal promotion scheme be revived; (iii) with the present teacher-pupil ratio being high, the tutorials carnot Be arranged and, therefore, additional staff be provided to each department; (iv) additional grant may be given to each depariment for promoting researeh and (v) the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences should be attached to some hospital.

## Meeting with Students

5.2 The Comittee met a representative group of students who pointed out that there was a great shortage of latest books and jounals. The student's Eonomics said that coumses were not practice oriented. They lack actual project work in industry and other organisations. The students complained of the shortage of staff and backlog in examinations.' They desired that the system of examinations should be decentralised and each denartment should be given the freedom to conduct its own examinations. The students of Psychology stated that the research scope in their department was very limited. Due to bifumcation of the Psychology depar-ment into Pume and ADDlied, the standard of teaching had also suffered. The students of Physiolog department wanted a central library on the Campus, a common room as well as hostel accomimation. They too desired that departments of Basic Medical Sciences should be attached to a hospital. The students of Museology complained that there was no full-time Lecturer in their department and they did not have any gas or watersupply. The Litrary was also ill-equipped and no junior research fellowship was available to the department from any source. The students of the Business Studies
(Comence Derartment) pointed out that the teacher pupil ratio in their department was the lowest. The syllabus was outroded and the library services aro inefficiant and inadequate. The hostels are very dirty and akin to barmects. The stucints desired that semarate builcings may be provided for each departinent.

The students of Law stated that in their department all the lecturns were part-time. Their courses were not practice oriented and even after obtainisg the Law degree they do not have any icea of court work, crafting the plaints, etc. The teachers after a whole day's labour at the courts hardly take any active interest in teaching. The students also are equally non-serious. Consequently legal education in the university is a misnomer. The students of Matnematics complained that original thinking was not encouraged in their subject. The Histry students wanted that more accommdation be made available for housing the seminu: library winich is at present located in a Professor's room. Moneover, multiple cop'es of text-books were not available. The Archaeology students wanted fellowships and provision for a laboratory and a library. The Political Science students pointed out that although their syllabus has been modernised, the latest books required for it were not available for lack of sufficient funds for purchase of foneign books. Students of Comparative Philalogy complained that their courses are history oriented: but very Iittle of the history of linguistics is taught. The students of Physiology stated that they have no grounding in Anatomy, and there is no project work.
6. . . General Observations :

6,7 The Fourth Plan Visiting Comittee had observed that the buildings of the unfiversity were not being maintained properly. This was discussed at a meeting with the heads of departments and. the committee was given to understand that the upkeep of buildings had actually deteriorated during the past five years. This was confirm by what the members of the committee saw during their visits to the university depam ments. The committee, would, therefore, suggest that the university authorities may take urgent measures to improve the maintenance of the buildings.
6.2(a) The sciehce departments and located in two buildings which are quite distant from each othen. Pure Chemistry, Pure Physics, Applied Mathematics, Physiology, Applied Psychology and Pure Psychology departments are located at 92 Acharya Profull Chandra Road, whereas Anthropology, Botany, Zoology, Geology, Statistics, Geography, Fure Mathematics and Biochemistry departments are located in another building at 35, Ballyganj Circular Road: The Institute of Basic Medical Sciences has got its ow building. The university could consider for the development on these lines and build up a multi canpus university:
6.2(b) Inadequate space is a major problem for most of the science departments. The existing space could however be used much more effectively by rationalizing the procedire for allocation of rooms to various departments in the same building. This is specially in the building at A.P.C. Road. The space provided to eath deparinent in this building is not contiguous. Rooms on the top floor recently added to the building have been allocated to the departments, located on other floors. Had floor been allocated to each department, movement of students and teachers from one floor to another could have been avoided. The university should consider reallocation of the roms among the various departments on this basis.
6.3 The university is faced with the problem of numbers owing to the unrestricte expansion of departments and colleges during the past one or two decades. Further expansion is likely to create serious complications and wold not be advisable.

A judicious use will hava to be made of the resources available to the university during the current Plan period. In view of the limitation of space and funds, it would be anrrorriate if the university concentrates its resources and energies duming, the FiEth Plan period on consolidation of existing departments and courses.
6.4 The Committea is of the view that the university will have to exarcise caution in the matter of admissions to postgraduate courses, specially in the Arts subjects. This will not only strengthen the standards of postgraduate teaching and research in the university but will also bring about a more equitable distribution of the postgraduate student population between the Calcutta and Jadavpur universities.
-6.5 The university staff has a large number of part-time teachers drawn from the local colleges. While this gives the selected teachers an opportunity to participate in postgraduate teaching, the flow is in one direction. The university may also consider the possibility of deputing some of its teachers to the colleges in order to inprove the standards fof collegiate education.
6.6 The Committee observed that in a number of departments especially in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, teachers retired from Govemment service in the colleges have been appointed as Lectumers in the postgraduate departments. The Committee feels that this is not a desirable practice and as far as possible this should be avoided.
-6.7 The Cormittee observed that in several cases the Head of the Department in almost all subjects did not have any idea of the number of candidates registered for Ph.D. in the subject concerned. The Committee was informed that the supervisor forwards the abplication of the candidate for registration to Ph.D. direct to the Registrar of the university who puts it up before the Ph.D. Committee. After the topic has been accepted, the candidate starts work. The head of the department concerned only comes to know about the admission at the time of the viva-voce examination. The record of all the candidates registered for doctoral research is maintained by the Ph.D. section, but such a recond is not available in the department itself. Consequently, the head of the department is not in a position to indicate the exact number of candidates engaged in doctoral research in his department at a particular stage or time. Such a situation obviously requires to be set right,
6.8 The Comittee found that the various Social Science departments of the university, and for that matter of any university in the State of West Bengal, have not developed any effective links with the Centre for Social Sciences, Calcutta and have not taken advantage of the facilities provided by this Centre. The Conmittee discussed this with the Director of the Centre for Social Sciences. There is need for a more effective machinery of collaboration between the Centre and the Social Sciences departments of the universities in the State.
6.9 An effective and flexible semester system may be introduced. M.Sc. degree, for examle, may be given after a student has completed a certain number of credit courses. An upper limit but not a lower one may be specified for the number of credits a student may take in any semester. Each student would be expected to cover the cone cumriculum formulated by the department and take a requisite number of additional courses including those in allied fields. For this purpose different subjects can be grouped together into broad categories such as physical sciences,
biological sciences $e+c$. As fin as courses in biological sciences are concemed it is felt that all students should take the following compulsory courses :
(a) Instmumentation technique
(b) The design of experiments and statistics and analysis of data
(c) Animal experimentation.

Once the semester system of teaching with Intendepartmental cooperation is established, it would enable the departments to give a 4 year evening course in M.Sc. to students and those employed in schools, colleges, industries and hospitels.
6.10 The university should consider the implementation of such recomendations of the Ghani Committee as do not fequire heavy investment of resounces e.g. establishment of an Academic and Planning Board and the introduction of correspnndence courses on giving autonony to oolleges. The Committee did not notice much coordination in the plan proposals or otherwise and it was sorry to note that no steps had been taken by the university to formulate a programe or initiate measures for introducing correspondence courses at the first degree. The Cormittee hopes that the university will not allow itself to be oppressed by the psychology of poverty.
6.11 No audit report on the accounts of the Calcutta University has been placed before the University Syndicate during the past 12 years. This is to say the least very unusual: The university and State Government must consider umgently ways of providin audit of accounts within a neasnable period of time. Financial discipline is the first priority of any eminent academic institution like Calcutta University. The possibility of creating a senior position of Finance Officer who would be responsibl for all financial matters and getting the accounts of the University audited in time may be considered by the State Government.
6.12 The Ghani Cormittee's suggestion for declaring Calcutta University as an institution of national importance by the Central Government was considered. The Vice-Chancellor in his meeting with the Committee also stressed the need for such a declaration since the University was facing acute financial hardships. The Committee, after taking afl factors into account felt that the University has yet to develop an all India and a national character before the question of declaring it an institution of national importance is considered by the Central Government. The university should have an open door policy in the matter of recruitment of its teaching staff and adnission to varlous coumses and should auttract talented teachers and students from all parts of the country.
6.13 It would seem, however, that all that the university authorities intend by the request for recognition as an institution of national inportance is that the special problems and difficulties of Calcutta University be recognised and more funds (even for maintenance purposes) be made available by the UGC. This certainly merits sympathetic consideration. Certain proposals of the Ghani Committee which involve decentralization onule be speedily inplemented but adninistrative and academic decentralization should go together.

The university should also consider the setting up of acadenic centres for improvement of standards of undergraduate education. If funds are available in the state for this, the centre could also assist substantially.
6.14 Postgraduate teaching is at present confined to university departments. With a vien to reducing, the pressure on the university departments, the Visiting Committee favours the poscicility of allowing in the first instaice tho or threa selected colleges in Calcutta, which have facilities for postgraduate studies, to start teaching a fer selected subjects at postgraduate level. In doing so, the norms for P.S. collages recent"y formulated by the UGC will have to be observed. The Committee visited Presidency College, Calcutta and felt that this, college had sufficient facilities and faculty strength in certain departments and could therefore be considered for the pumpse. The university faculty should be associated with the selection committees for all colleges authorised to undertake postgraduate teaching.
6.15 The Crmittee is of the view that there has been too much of fragmentation of departments in the same discipline e.g., History has at present four departments. There was very little evidence of collaboration amongst the departments which belong to the same discipline or allied disciplines. ©.g., Pure and Applied Psychology departments located on the same floor do not seem to be even in talking terms with each other. Courses formulated by each department could be taken up jointly. The univepsity should give serious thought to this problem and devise ways and means to bring the' deparments closer together. The four departments of. History should be brought together as "Department of Historical. Studies". The denartments of Sociology, Social Anthropology, Cultumal Anthropology and Physical Anthropology could also be brought together.
6.16 The Committee noted that all appointments to the teaching posts are made by the university without holding any interview. The matter was discussed with the Vice-Miancellor who said that there were some practical difficulties in this matter. He informed the committee that the univensity wes thinking of interviewing candidates for the posts of lecturers. The Committee felt that the appointments not only of lecturers but also of readers should be made after the interview by the. Selection Committee. Only in case of posts of professors, the procedupe for interview need not be followed in all cases; but even here interviews would be healthy and helpful. The Committee, noticed a considerable amount of inbreeding in many departments. This may be cautiously avoided and efforts made to get staff on an all India basis.
6.17. It also came to the notice of the Committee that in a few cases the syndicate of the university did not accept the unanimous recommendations made by the Selection Cormittees and appointed persons who had not been recommended by the Selection Cormittees. The syndicate has also on several occiasion, referred back the recormendation of a Selection Cormittee for reconsideration. This procedure needs to be reviewed by the university/State Government.
6.18 The Committee was sorry to note that nearly $13 \%$ of the teaching posts were lying vacant. This has an adverse effect on teaching and research in the concemed. departments. Most of the vacant posts are at Professor's level. 16 out of 55 posts of Professors, 11 out of 103 Readerships and 23 out of 237 posts of lecturers are lying vacant. Several departments are functioning without a Professor. The university should take immediate steps to fill the vacant posts.
6.19 The Cormittee noted with coricern that the faculty members in most of the departments (sometimes even professors) were not associated with the formulation of the development plans of the department. There was in fact very little dialogue within the department among the faculty members in most of the departments. One way to rectify this would be to hold regular meeting of the faculty to advise the Head of the department in all matters pertaining to the department. Another suegestion worth consideration is rotation of headship among the Professors
at least after two or three years.
6.20 There is undoubtediy a need for each department to have basic equipment: for sole use by its students and teachers, but costly and sophisticated equipment should not be the sole monopoly of a particular department. Even if such equipe: ment is located in a partieular department, it should be available for use by other departments and consider as a part of central instrument facility for the whole university. The Committee did not find much evidence of any concerted effort. or collaboration among the various departments in this direction. It also found several items of costly equipment lying idle for want of maintenance and repair. The equipment grants may just be used for putting such equipment into use ard an appropriate fraction of it set apart for maintenance of the equipment during the rest of the Pian period. It is also suggested that the costly equipment especially sophisticated imported instruments should be put to the optimum use. The iniversity may prepare a list of such items of equipment available with'the Lin' university (or other neighbouring laboratories) for the information of its faculty. These should be part of a central instrmentation facility. Users' conmittee(s) may be established to ensume smooth functioning of the central instruments facility and proper maintenance of the equipment. All new major instruments must be part of the C.I.F. The university may consider keeping all. the new items of equipment which costs more than a lakh of ruppes, at a ceritral place for use by all the departments and establish a central service for servicing. the instruments and ensure that instruments do not lie idle for want of maintenance
6.21 While a few departments have revised their syllabi and have incorporated in them the latest trends in the subject; many departments have not given ayy serious thought to it. There is a need for a contimuous review of the syllabi in each subject. The Cormittee was sumprised to find that even a Professor in one of the deparfments complained that the syllabus had not undergone much ohange for 25 years inspite of repid developments in the subject.
6.22(a) Hostels maintained by the university are at present intended only for M.A./M.Sc. students. Research scholars find great hardship in finding accenmodatit in the city. The university ahpuld consider the setting up of a separate hostel for research scholars.
6.22(b) Even the hostel for postgraduate students does not have basic faciities and the students living in the hostel pointed out that the hostels are not propend maintained. The hostels lacked adequate toilet and sanitation facilijties. Facilities in the present hostels should be improved."
6.22(c) The Committee got the information that the university incumed a substanti loss every year (of the order of Rs. 4 lakhs) because it was difficult to recover lodging/boarding dues from hosteliers. If true, this is a serious matter that needs to be looked into.
6.23. The university teachers also face hardship in the matter of accommdation, In a metropolitan city like calcutta, acconmodation is a serious problem specialls for those who come from outside the city. The lack of quarter's or teacher nostels is probably one major reason why the university does not attract talent from outs' Calcutta. There is a need for teachers hostel and teacher's: quarters for all categories of teachers.
6.24 Duming the Committee's visit to various departments, it was found that eat department maintains its own librery which in most cases was not functioning effectively due to lack of sufficient staff and space. The comittee fee; that
in addition to the departnental Jibraries wich may have basic books and muitiple copies of text-books, it would be desirable to establish a central library in each campus where reference books, text-hooks, general books and research journals which me of interest to more than one department are kept. This would avoid the pumchase of multiple copies of the same journals in different departments. The campus libraries and the central libnary should also be kept open for longer hours than at present. It would be desirable to include a student's representative in the library committee for each carpus.
6.25 . Some of the departments laid much stress on providing scholarships and fellowships exclusively to their departments to enable them to enrol students for research while other departments were quite satisfied with the number of fellowships obtained by the students. The Cormittee feels that it is not necessary to allocate fellowships separately for each department.
6.26 The Institute of Basic Medical Sciences, Calcutta university, has in its neighboumhood a well-mm and well-staffed hospital viz,; Institute of Medical Education and Research which has its own departments of Basic Medical Sciences and is administered by the Health Department of the State Government. However, unfortinately, there is no working arrangement between these two Institutes; and the members of the staff of the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences have no access to any hospital facilities, without which the departments in the Institute cannot work efficiently, The committee recommends that immediate steps be taken to merge the two Institutes and this matter should be taken up at the highest level on top priority basis. If thes is not possible, the university may consider the possibility of handing over the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences to the State Government. The only alternative to this recormendation would be the establishment of a separate hospital for the Institute of Basic Medical Sciences of the same standard as the Institute of Medical Education and Research and since this is a very expensive proposition, the Comuittee does not recomend it.
6.27 The posts now being recommended by the Visiting Committee for the Fifth Plan period for verious departments and which have been earmarked for specialisations should not be transferred to any other specialization or areas or converted into general posts.
6.28 The Comittee noticed a communication gep between students and teachers; appropriate steps including formation of student teacher committees in departments may be taken to bridge this gap.
6.29 There is a need for continuous appraisal of the progress made by the university with regard to the suggestions and recommendations made by theVisiting Cormittee and approved by the University Grants Commission. The university is advised to set up an Academic and Planning Board for this purpose which should have on it university teachers. The UGC should seriously consider establishment of a regional office in Calcutta to cater to the needs of this region.
7. Existing Departments

Humanities and Social Sciences.
7.1 Department of English : The department has about 400 students divided into four sections. The department has a sanctioned staff of one Profesisor, three Readers and eight lecturers. The post of Professor is lying vacant. The department
is also being helped by six salaried part-time Lecturers and three honorary parti-time Lecturers. Four of the whole-time Lecturers and one of the parttime Lecturens possess reseanch qualifications. 30 candidates are engaged in doctoral research. 35 students have been zwarded. Ph.D. degree. The department intends to give priority to the reorganisation and development of postgraduate teaching and to the introduction of tutorials and seminars on a planned basis. It also proposes to have a language laboratory and to give the teaching of prama Poetry and Fiction, a practical slant through 'Literary Workshops'. The student of M.A. (Final) class would also be encoumaged to write short and independent papers. The department also wents to undertake a progname for examining the impact of English on Indian languages and literature and translation of selected Pengali books into English.

The Conmittee found that the number of students admitted to the M.A. course is on the high side and it is necessary to curb the rising student enmlment. The possibility of restructuming admissions by restricting them to good honours students may be explored. The courses alro need to be restructur and redésigned. It would be of advantage if in the revised course equal emphasi is given to language and literature. The department should also start arranging orientation oourses for the English teachers of the affiliated colleges. The M.A. programe currently being offered by the department is largely a convention one with focus on English literary study. The Committee suggests that the department may organise its M.A'. prognamme in such à way that it takes into account the entry level of the present day student and also his needs as well as those of the commmity at large. The students at this level should have the ontion of specialising either in English literary studies or English language and language teaching. Both these groups should have six papers in common of which at least foum should be in English literature, the fifth paper could be in the use of Enclish (spoken and written) and the sixth paper on the structure of modern Einglish. Seventh and eighth papers should be either in : (i) Comparative Literatume or, '(ii) Commwealth Literature including Indian Writing in English or American Literature. For students specialising in Engliss teaching and language teaching; these two papers may be : (a) introduction of linguistics and (b) principles and techniques of teaching English as a second language in India.

The department could also do a number of things to bring about inprovement in the teaching of English at the undergraduate level in the affiliated colleges, e.g.'s syllabus reform, production of right type of teachin material, changes in the methods of teaching and examination reforms. The department should conduct seminars and workshops for teachers of English at which these changes should be discussed. The university department of English should also function as a service department. Most of the books and joumals are available only in English but knowledge of English of most of the students is very poor,, The English department can help by organising counses for the better understanding of English. These courses could be framed to suit the different needs of various departments. If the department agrees to undertake these tasks, the Committee recommends that the following assistance be provided to it. The vacant post of Professor shculd be fillad up immediately and the person to be appointed on the post should be a specialist in English language teachirg with a strong backgnound in English linguistics or specialisation in English linguistics with good qualifications in English language teaching on specialisation in linguistics related to EIT with good qualifications in ELT. In addition, the following are reconmended under first
(1) Teaching Staff
(2). Books and Joumals
(3) Equipment (tame-recorder, re record and typed material and film projectors)
(4)

Seminars/Workshops etc. required for revamping the undergraduate English prognamme

Reader (with specialissition in Companative Literature)
Rs. $30,000 /-$

Rs. 20,000/-

Rs. 25,000/-
7.2 Department of Urdu: The department of Urdu is at present a part of the deparitment of Modern Indian languages. It has a staff of two whole-time and two part--time Lecturers only. The intake of the department is 7 students in M.A. (Previous). There are. 10 students in M.A. (Final) The department has been conducting an M. A. teaching programme in Undu. The Committee noted that the department has not been able to inter-act with other language departments, especially Bengali, English, Arabic and Persian.

Although there are three laghs. Urdu speaking persons living in Calcutta and three colleges are providing facilities for urdu (Hons) the M.A. (Undu) course of the department of Modern Indian Languages has not been popular. This is mainly due to lack of permanent faculty support for this coumse. It has only two full-time lecturers and two part-time lecturens handling all the eight papers.

It is recommended that this department should be sanctioned the post of one Reader (inder first priority) and two Lecturers (ungér second priority) and a grant of heRs.10,000 for books \& joumals under first priority so that this course may be ma adequately. In due course it should develop research programmes leading to Ph.D. degree. At present, only three students are enrolled for research in Urdu and so far none has got a Ph.D. degree.
7.3 Department of Bengali ; The department of Bengali was set up in 1919. This is a part of the Derartment of Modern Indian Languages. It has about 400 students divided into six sections, three in M.A. (previous) and theee in M.A. (Final). There are 13 whole-time teachers (three Professors) three Readers and seven Lecturers) in the department. Foun part-time teachers and four honorary part-time teachers are also helping the department. During the last five years, 30 candidates have been awarded Ph.D. degree. At present, 20 students are engaged in doctoral research. The department has about 800 manuscrints of which only 150 have so far been published. It proposes to undertake a cormrehensive programme of research relating to folk literature and other themes as well as preparation of Bengali encyclopaedia, descriptive catalogue of manuscripts etc. The department has not established any link with the departments of History, Sanskrit, Philosonhy on English. It has not established contacts with its counterparts in other universities of the State. The department has no concrete plan for its development in the next Five Year Plan period.

It would be advisable if the department, instead of publishing manuscripts, undertake the prenaration and publication of a critical descriptive bibliography of the manuscripts preserved in its departmental library. A Bengali encyclopaedia is too ambitious a work which carnot be done by the Bengali department alone. About collecting folk songs, bellard and proverbs etc. the department is not equipped at present for undertaking this kind of work. Unless there are courses in phonetics and field techniques, any serious study in the field of folk litenature would be impractical.

The Comnittee feels that although the department has been named as department of Modern Incian Languaces, the courses at present conducten by the cepartment do $n t$ justify tinis nomenclature. No department can be called a department of Hodern Indian Languaces until and uniless it takes up the study of a number of Mocern Inctan Languages. The Committee, therefore, suggests that if the departinent has to justify its existence, it should conduct integrated courses involving study of two or three languages. It, therefore, sems necessary to redesign the Master's teaching programme to include a few more languaces. The Committee, therefore, emphasises that the department of Modern Indian Languages be renamed as the School of Modern Languages including the departments of Urdu, Hindi, Bengali and one or two other languages like Tamil and Thas. The Committee noted that a post of Professor is lying vacant $r$ ine department. It would be to the advantage of the department if this post is filled up immediately and the person appointed, possesses specialisations in old Bengali and Linguistics. The Committee, recommends that the following assistance be pravided to the Bengali department under first priority.
(1) Teaching Staff: Lecturer 1.
(2) Books and Journals: Rs.30,000/-
7.4. Department of Hindi: The department was set up in the year 1918. It has an intake of 50 students in M. . (Part-I) and has 50 students in M.A. (Part-II). The department consists of one Reader, three whole-time Lecturers and two part-time lecturers. 40 research scholars are working in the department. The department has a programme to introduce new optional groups and start honours classes, a wing for the study of Comparative Literature and a Centre for Advanced Study. It also has. proposal to undertake the preparation of a Literary History of India to compile a ilincuel or trilingual dictionary and to edit Bengali manuscripts having a bearing on Hindi:

The Comnittee, however, feels that it would not be desiratole for the department to start honours courses in Hindi. Such courses should be started and developed in the colleges. The programme of specialystudies proposed to be undertaken by the department may constitute the normal work and activities of the department and would not require any special assistance for the purpose. Various projects under this programme could be assigned to the research fellows. The Committee was of the view that for the present, there is no need for any additional staff at lower levels. However, to strengthen research in the department, the Committee recommends that following assistance be provided under first priority:
(1) Teaching Staff:
(2) Books and Journals

7.5 Department of Arabic and Persian :- The depaxtrant he sbeen beon concucting sepamte Mostor's dogeco courses bnth in Poasin and in Arabic. It has six students (Two in Ma. (Provious) and four in M.A. (Final) in Persian and 8 students (two in M.A، (Previous) and six in M,A. (Final) in Arabic. The sanctimed strength of the departnent is one professor, two Readers, four whole-tine Lecturers and one part-time Lecturers. The Professorship and one Lecturersinip heve been lying vacent. The depirtment proposes to introduce papers on cuaran and Tafsir and on Philosophy and Mysticism. It also seeks funds for purchase of Manuscripts and books and journals, for organising lectures and symposia, for publishing an annual bilingual journal and research works.

The Committee, found that the Mas teaching programme in Arabic and Persian lays more emphasis on the study of Ancient sirabic and Persian texts and.literature. It, therefore, recommends that the courses should be throughly revised. The stiady of modern Arabic and Modern Persian should fom a strong component of these courses. It also appears to be desirable that the posts for Mrabic and Persian be separately identified so as to encourage specialisation.

The Committee, therefore, feels that to provide leadership to the deprrtment; the post of Professor should be fillad up, immediately. After the Professor has been appointed, the future procrammes of deviclopment of the department may be planned by him and sent to the Comission for consiceration. 4 grant of hs. $10,000 /$ mqy in the meentime; be provided for books; Joumals in Arabic and Porsian first prioritý
7.6 Department f Sanskrit:- The Dopartment of storit is a big depertment hevivg 300 students in both M.A. (Previous) and M.A.(Finel). It has a sanctioned staff of one Professor, four Readers and six whole-time Lecturors. In addition, three teechers from other depertments participate in postgraduate teaching, and there are 18 part-time ${ }^{*}$ lecturers of whom ns many as 11 are working in an honorary capacity.

- During the lest 8 years, about 51 rescarch students have been awarded the Ph. D. Degree and seven candidates the D.Iitt. degree. The syliabus for postgradunte studies provides for as many à 14 specialisations, each covering four papers. At present facilities exist only for 10 optional groups. 21 candidates are engaged in doctoril research. One post of Reader is lying vacent.

The department has no links with the departments of Anciont Indian History, Pall and Philosophy. These should be developed, It wovid be also to on the adventage of the department if active links are established between the Sanskrit College and the University depnrtment of Sanskrit. The Cormittee recommends that the following assistance be provided to. the depitt. during the curront Plan period. under first periority.
(1) Teachīng Staff Lecturer - $T$
(2) Books, ind Jourmals: Rs. $30,000 /-$


 ono Reader, Three whole-time Looters and fear part-tineffeqturens of whom one in paid and the rest are working in an honor cepecity the post of Reader is, lying vacant. 20 candidates have been awarded the Ph. D+ degree during the inst 10 years and 12 research students are actively engage in doctoral Fesbarch. The department is specially interested in Buddhist Studies. It hos a collection of Tiberian and Chinese Manuscripts and has urifteken the translation of Ditto, French and German works on Buddhism in South East Isle into ort. English. The department has not been able to achieve much offing to the fact that it hats no links / the discipline of Shaskity History or Philosophy. It would be desirable to bring its works andicprogrames into closer association with the selallied disciplines, Front the point of view of employment potentials, Ms in in Pail do not have, a bright

+ future and that is why the enrolment of the department has all along

7.8 Department of Comparative Philology: the department has an intake of 31 students. It has a stnctionedaptaff of one Professor,
 are four Readers in the apartment, since two of the Lecturers have benipronotod ta Readers under personal proton scheme. The post of Professor has been lying want for rimose $10 y$ years. It appears that the University has not been abe to find a suitable person to head the department: Driring the course of the last five years; the department has produced 12 ProDs, and five, candidates are registered for their PReD. degree. The courses of study in this department are oriented tow as historical linguistics and adequate attention does not seem to have been given to the study of Modemiliguisties. It has
* bon proposed that a separate department of Modern Linguistics should be established and the department of ComprativerPilology be developed into a Centre of Advanced study in the field of historical linguistics, yet despite historical lingustics being a very strong component of the $Z \mathrm{M} A$. teaching programme, the department has failed to establish links with the departments of Finfish, Sanskrit and Bengali. The Comittee, however, does not support the idea of the establishment of a separate department of Modernitinguistiss. It was also disturbing to note that the Kara Professorship in Indian Linguistics and Phonetics which was instituted as early as: 1922 has been vacant for the last 10 years The department at one time was one of the best departments of Linguistics in the country, but this unfortunately is no longer the case. The Gomittee, recommends that the post of Professor must. be filled immediately. For the present, an amount of Rs. 30,000/toy be provided to the department for the purchase of library books and journals, and an equal amount for the purchase of equipment under first priority.
7.9 Department of Languages:- The languages department is conducting certificate/ Diploma courses in French, German, Aussian, Chinese and Tibetan. A dourse in spoken Hindi is also conducted by the depertnent. Tis departnent is being run słbly with the help of part-time teachors. The tetal Intake of the departiont, is about 150 students. Oaly those students are adritted to those courses whose mothertongue is Bengeli. The Universsity hes a programe to start courses in spoken Bengeli and Tamil and a few other forcign languages, like Italian, Spanish and Jabenese. . The Comittee feels that the inmediate reorganisation of Languages. department is very necessary especially bocause thero are a number. of departments which are overlapping. Since depertments of Arabic, Persian am Bengali are already in existence, the Comaittee feels that they are better placed to introduce diploma courses. The course in spoken Hindi at present being conducted by the. department may al so be shifted to the department of Hindi. The department of French may be merged with this departmentand a school of Foreign Languages may be set up. If the department agrees with this, the following facilities may be provided to it:-
(1) Teaching Staff: 4 Lecturers
(Two in I and two in II Priority)

One each in German, Mussian, Spanish \& Chinese.
(2) Books end Journals:-

- Rs. 50,000/- under First Priority.
7.10 Department of French :- The department is oonducting M.A. cource with the help of one wholemtime, Lecturer and one part-time Lecturer. It has a small student enrolment . The Comittee does not find any justification for an independent departreent of French. It also feels that the M.A. teaching programme in Freach has no practical value and certificate or diploma course in this language would be adequate. The department may, therefore, be amelgarnated with the School of Foreign Languages.
7.11 Depertment of Lifibrary Science :- The department has been conducting Byib. and M.Lith Seience courses. It has 100 students in B . Lib. Science and 10 stadents in M.Lib. Science. The M.Lib. Sciense A.... a two-years course. This course was introduced in 1973 nad the first batch will pass out this year.: The present staff comprises thiree Lecturesrs, six part-time Lecturers (paid) and two part-time Lecturers (horiorary). The M,Lin. Science is two yoars course and its main emphasis is on documentation. The Commission. hed sanctionsa two lecturers during the Fourth Plan which implies. that it has the approval of the Commission, although the Conmittee was of the view that in view of the financial constraints and very limited job-potential of MoLib. Science graduates, the starting of such a course was not necessary, at this atage. The Committee feels that the department may restructure its programmes in such a way thet the students are imparted practical training in documentetion specially in the literature published in the field
p.t.o.
of Science, Technclogy and Medicine. Assistance in this regerd may also be obtained from the INSDOC, Delhi and National Library, Calcutta. The depirtment should also obtain help from tho dopertments of History and Lengueges. It would olso be appropriato if the department runs a conducted course only and adnits those students who are sponsored by various institutions, namely, Colleges, Universities and other rescarch organisations. This would help the department in meeting its recurring and non-recurring expenditure. Since the department has alrcady been conducting a course with the holp of partutime Locturers, the Comittee feels thet if it organises its activities on the lines sufgested above it would not require any financial ain. But the department may be provided Rs. $30,000 /$ - for the purchase of books and joumnals under first priority.
7.12 Department of Education i- The department is offering courses leading to B. $\mathrm{H}_{\mathrm{H}} / \mathrm{M.A./M.Sc.(Education)}$. strength is abait 100. The staff consists of one Professor, three Reader, and seven whole-time Lecturers and one Instructor, nin e part-time Lecturers and two honorary Lectuers. During the lest five yoars, the dopartment has produced seven Ph.Ds. 30 candidates are at present registerad for the Ph.D. course. The department is housed in a residential building. The accommodation in this building is inadequate and unsuitable for runing a postgraduato department.. . . . The departmental library is housed in a single room, and is ill-equipped. The department has been carrying on research mainly on problems relating to teaching of Psychology and History of Education. The present proposal of the department is to introduce M.Ed. courses. The Committee feels that for the present, the deparment should hold in obeyance its proposels for introducing M. Ed. courses. It should also consider reducing the intake of students at the undergraduate as well as nostgraduate levels, The M. $\mathrm{A}_{\mathrm{o}} / \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{s}} \mathrm{Sc}$. course is an academic course while the $\mathrm{B}_{\mathrm{A}}$ Ed, course is podagogical, The existing teaching programe includes subjects which are usually taught at the $\mathrm{M} E \mathrm{Ed}$. level and hes a large muber of papers dealing with different aspects of ${ }^{-}$Psychology and measurement. Surprisingly, the department has no co-ordination with the department of psychology. The Committee feelis that the department of Psychology and this departmont would both benefit greatly if they establish close $\bar{r}$ cooperetion. The syllabus needs to be revised and brought up-to-date in the light of recent developments in the fields of teacher education.

The Committee al so recommends that the department may be shifted to the new Campus al ong with Deptts of Psychology and Appliad Psychology. It is also necessary that the department promotes research in the fields of examination refoms and guidance and counselling. It may also undertake short-term courses in service traning programmes for college teachers. The Committee feels: that it would be in the interest of the department if the B.fd. classes are transferred to the colleges. If this be done the present accomindation may be adequate for its research and teaching actirities. Later in the Sixth Plan period, the University may,
think of providing a new building for the department lalong with the Psychiology and Lappliod Psychology dopartments as suggested above. The Cormittce recomends that for the present the demrtrent may be providod the followng facilities :-

7.13 Deportment of Economics:- There are at present 80 students in M.A. ( Previous) and 60 students in M.A.' (Final). Generally, students with $B . A_{\text {. (Hns.) }}$ ) degree are admitted to this course. Outside candidates securing $50 \%$ marks in B.A. (Hons). lovel have to' appear for"a t'st and only those candidates are admitted to the Ma. course who qualify in the test. The department has a sanctioned strength of four Professors (including a Professorship endowed by the Reserve Bank"of Iidia), fiverReaders, five full-time Lecturers and five part-time Lecturers. Post of one Professor and one Reader are lyins vacant and two of the Lecturers have gane abroad for further studies. The average workload of a teacher per week is six to eight lectures. The major thrust of the department is in Quantative Economics", Agricultureal Ecconomics; Intemational Rconomics, Agricultural and Monetary Rconomics. 11 candidates have been awarded the Ph.D. degree during the last four years and 60 students are engeged in doctoral rosearch: The Comittee was informed that owing to lack of teachers, the depirtment has not been eble to arganise tutorials and seminars. However, the: department has been dowing good work in Economatrics and Applied Economics. The department has also completed a number of research projects.

The Comrititee noted that the deptt. has not established any links either with other social service deptt. of the university or with the centre for social services, Calcutta.

The department has a proposal to develop a section in Económic History. It is also anxious to intensify tutorials and seminars and undertake research projects on a continuing basis. The library of the department needs strengthening: The Committee, recormends that the following assistance be provided to the department:-
(1) Teaching Staff:

(b) Second priority - Professor- 1 (Esconomic History

. What special assistance in the field of urban Ecmmics. This may be referered to the appropriate Comittec.
7.14 Department of History:- The present intake of the depertment is 150 students to the M.is.olass each year. Besides, students from Presidency College come for tuition in the department. - Those possessing B.A.(Hons.) are qualifiedfor admission in the department. The present staff compriss two Professors, thiree Readers, four Whle-time Lecturers, five paid part-time teachers and five honorary part-time teachers. During the last five yoars, the department has produced five Ph. Ds. and 12 candidates are now working for their Ph.D. degree.

The department wants to intensify research in Iconomic History. 'It' inlso frtends developing t aching and research in. Scial and Cultural History of India. The department has not developed any links either with the departments of Economics and Political Science or with the Centre for Social, Sciences, Calcutta. It also has a programe to undertake a project on the History of Bengal since 1947.

The depertmicnt is at present housed in the College Street Canpus which is greatly overcrowed. The Committee recommends that the various deptts ${ }^{\text {a }}$ of History be housed together in one place and formed into a centre for Historical Studies. This would permit greater coordination and collaboration. The Committee, recomends the following assistance to the department of Histbry.
(1) Teaching Staff:
( 1 ) First priority : Professor - 1 (in Economic and (IPII) $\therefore \quad$ Social History
(B) Second priority : Reader -2 (One in Social History and other in Political History.
(2) Books and Joumals:

Under First Priority Rs. 50,000/-
7.15 Department of Ancient Indian History \& Gulture: The tintake of students in MA. (Previous) is 75. The staff comprises of two Professors, three Readers and five Lecturems. The post of the Bageswahi: Professor of Fine Arts has been vacant for a long time.
P.T.O.

One post of Reader is also vacant. The department has producer during the last 10 years, 25 Ph .Ds. 25 candidates are engaged in doctoral rosearch. The department has not established any links with Senskrit and Pali departments and not even with the depertmonts of Archeeology, History and Islamic History and Culture. The department was recognisod as the Contro of idvonced Study by the U.G.C. but the status was withdram on the basis of an assessment made by the Cormittce appointed by the Commission. The Committee fecls that the present staff strength is adequate an tho department does not require any addition to its staff. Howover, an amount of Rs. $30,005 /-m n y$ be provided to the doportment for the purchase of bonks and.journels under first priority.
7.16 Deproment of Islamic History \& Culture :- The intake of Students in M.A. (Previcus) is 50, The cepartment. has a. staff. of one Professor, two Readers and four Lecturers. Tho posts of one Professor and two Lecturers aro lying vacant. So the prosent staff strength is three Roaders and threc. Lecturers. During the lost five yoars, the dapartment has produc od five Ph. Ds. and 20 candidatos are engiged in doctorel resoarch. In its teaching programme, the department hns a special bias towards Modieval Indian History. The departmont hes not been able to meke errangenonts for tutorials and seminars on account of dearth of accommodation and toachers. It wants to introduce a special group on International Rolatinns and ronuires adritonal staff for it. The Committoe, however, feels that for this purposc assistance from the Political Scionce department may be obtained. The department has no links either with the Political Science dopartment or with other sistor dopartments.

The Committee was clearly and unanimously of the opinion thet the name of tho deptt. should be changed. It should be renamod as the Deptt. of Mediovnl History. It should start joint collaborative progrommes with the departments of Ancient Indian History, History and Archodogy. The depertmont would not recuire any additional staff but the vacant posts shculd be filled. However, the copartment may be provided a grant of Rs. 30,000/for the purchese of books and journals under first priority.
7.17 Department of irchaeology:- The prosent intake of the dopartment is 13 students in M.A. (Privicus). 12 students are in M.A. (Final). It has a sanctionod staff of one Profossor, one Roader anc threc Lecturers, but one Professor, one Roader ant three Locturers, but nene Professor and one Roador are on leave, so the actual strength of the department is threo Locturers. The department has produced two Ph. Ds. during the last five yoers. 8 Cendidatos aro engaged in cotive rescarch. Some of the teach rs of the dopartmont of Ancient Indian History and Culture, Goography and inthropology ere perticipating on a part-time besis in the academic progmames. The depertment providos a two years M.A. course in Archaeology. It is an active dopartment and hes undertaken fruitfull excavations during recont yuers. The department wishes to introduce B.i. (Hons) course in Archacologer. But the Conmittae does not support this idea. The proposel of the depertment to stert courses on Archoology for Fipt and South-East lisia is also not recommended.

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Egyptian Archaeology is alroady being looked after by the Archaeolorical Survey of India; and as at present persons trained in the Archacology of these regions are not available within the country end, therofore, a. few persons will have to besent for field studics to the se rogions.

The department should take advantage of the facilities provided. in the isutosh Muscurie ilthough, there are Iogistic difficultias even thon it would be appropriate to take students to this Museun in batches for providing lessons. To provide a separate museum for this depertment would, in view of the limited rescurces, not be advisable:

The Comittce recomends that the recant posts of Professor and Roador be fillod up immediately. The depmrtment may bo provided Rs. 30,000/- for books and joumnls. and Rs. 20,000/- for field trips and oxcavations unier first priority.
7.18 Museology Departnont:- The deparment is currently located in the ishutosh Museum of Indian irt of the Thiversity. The toaching staff consists of one Reader, three wholemtime Lecturers and rart-tinc Lecturcr. The dopartmont offers a two year M.M.M. Sc. course in Museologr and the total.intake of studonts is 12 ( 6 from arts and 6 from Scionce stream). It is one of tho fow topertments proparing specialists. . . . . . in Museclogy to cator to the neads of tho Nuseums of the country.

The syllabus is comprehensive consisting of three compulsory genemi papers on the various aspocts of Museum; and thore are two groups of ontional papers (i) Lrchacology, irt and Anthropology (Groun $\mathcal{L}$ ) and (ii) Wrtural Scionces (Group-B). Ench condidato is askod to offer ono of the groups; in additon there are two practical papors. In conoral, the syllabus is quite comprehensive and up-to-date.

The rescarch side of the dopartment is rathor weak and necds ${ }^{-}$ to be strengthoned. The following recomondations are being made :-

(B) Second priority - Professor-1 (with spocialisetion in either irchaeology or inthropology and 2 Tech. Assistants.

(3) Books and Joumals unter first

( ) Grants for Scholarships to MN/
M. Sc. students three cach year-from 76m77. Rs.45,000/ -
under first priority.
7.19 Department of Journalism :- The University has been - onducting M.i. course in Journalism with the help of part-time toachors. This weis introduced in 1970. It has on intake of 60 students, of whem about ohe-third are women. The dopartment is ranning entirely with the help of the part-time teachurs who are paid FB. 150/- p.m. ench. The Hoad of the Departnent is also a part-time teacher. There is, hovever, no intor-nction betweon this ccurse and the courses in the languages like English, Sanskrit, Bongali Urlu, Fersian and Arabic. The Committee found that the course doos not include any language training nor does it inpert knowluage aboutrecont devolopments in the fields of Indian or Worlds History, Intermational Relations, Diplomey and Moclem Economic , Social and Educational problems. The Comittee, recomends that it would be alvisable if the ccurse is refomulated nnt a fulfleched course in Joumelisn end: Mass Communication is introduced by the Univorsity. If the University recasts the syllabus on the lines sugz sted above, the position may bo revicwed during the Sixth Plan and assistence, if consiclered necessary, may be provided for the-course.
7.20 . Department of Phtiosophy:-The department has got 12 permanent posts and 10 part-tine tuachors: in the department. The bronk-ur of the ponment posts is this :- Professor - 1, Rendersm 3 and Lecturers-8. The department has produced 33 roseacch scholurs during the past 10 yaars, and four roscarch scholers who recoive fellowships are working in the departnent at prosent. Like tho other depantrnents, this department also could not supply the exact number of all the research scholars registered for Ph. D. in the department. But roughly the number is said to be 15 . The publications and rescerches done by sho staff monbers of the dopartment. during the last five years are quite substential in quantity, but very ordinary in quality. Most of the topies on which publications and resenrehes heve beon done are very genernl in nature, without much scope for epreialisetion and depth. Moreover, the topics of the Ph.D. researchis done during the last 10 yoars show nct only much overlapping but also repotition of topics in somo cases. On the wholc, the research work and acedenic develoment of the depertront have not been impressive in the recont pest. The cepartment also seems to lack the recuired unity and co-ordination within the department because some of the informetion sought by the Conmittoc was not available, although the information cancernd only the work done by the teachors and the rescarch scholars of the department.

Among the sonior tuachers of the dopartrent, a varicty of spocialisation is available at prosent which sooms to bo sufficiont for cat ring to the noeds of the prosent syllabus as well as tho rovised syllabus which is yet to be approved by the higher bodios of the universi"t. The syllabusos, now as well as old, aro vry unsatisfactorily dosigncd and thoy noed much modifjeation and improvenent. They are not specific onough and thore is some undosirable overlapping as well. Moreover, they havo the serious defoct of still continuing the practice of giving a substantial woight to tochnical psychology as differontiato from Philosphy of mind. This toaching of technical psycholngy in tho

Philosonhy course is out datod and not worthwinile both fron the viewpoint of the academic teaching of philosophy as woll. as the job-utility of this course. It is recommended that the syllabus be furthor revised keoping in viow the modernisation of Philosophy.

The departmont adrits 400 stulents for postgraduation overy yonr, and proposes to start the M. Phil. Programe ami also the tutorial. sistem, if sufficient strength is given to it. In view of the large number of afmissions, it is recomnonded that a Lecturership and a grant of Rs.40,000/. for books and joumals may be sanctimed to the Deptt. under first priorite,

The department has requostod for recognition as a special research Contre in Philosophy and has given an ostimate of about Rs. 3 lakhs as the annual expenditure for this Centre. This proposal need not be considerod at the moment.
7.21 Departinent of Political Science :- The Dopartrant of Political Science wes established as a separate departmont in the year 1948 and since thon it has boon attracting a large number of students to its postgradute course. In this respect it can be called one of the major departments in the University. At present, it hes 380 students on its rolls, of which 140 are in Moin. (. I- Yoar) and 240 in.?.M.A. (. II Yuar.). During the last five yenrs, 16 of its students We o awarded Ph. D. derree. At prosent 16 scholers are working for their doctoral research and wo were told that about 10 students seek admission to the Ph .D. course every year. The strength of the Friculty at present is two professors, (one of which cormarked icr Public Adrinstration is lying vacant), two Roaders- (one oi which is for Sociology) and four while-time lecturers. Apart from thoso eight whole-time toachurs, thero are 12 part - time Lecturers also in tho department. During the Fourth Plan perind no teaching post was sanctioned. The nunbor of whole-time teachers in the department as c mpered to other departments is meager. The M. A. courso comprises of eight papers, six of which are compulisory papers, viz, Political Theory, Political Sociology. Indian Political System, Indianeplitieal whought and Movement, Public Adrinstretion and Internaticmal Law. Besidos these; a student has to select an optional group of two papers of five groups for the teaching of which the depertment has provison at present. Th se groups are : Socielist Thought, Sociology, Political Amalysis and Research Methodology, local Government and Intornaticnal Law and International Organisation. Four more optionil groups are provided in the syllabus, but due to paucity of staff, the teaching could not be started. The couses were revised and made up-to-date recently. Tho department is also onducting certain rosearch projects and so fer, eeven research profjects financed either by the ICSSR or the UGC hove been undertaken by this department. Of those, three have been completed and the reports of two have bean publishod. Nis

The depertment now proposes to introduce a M. Phil. course to which only selected students, not more than 10 will be adritted and after completing M.Phil. will generally procced to Ph.D. cnurse. Apart from this the dopartmont has ellso a plan for the modermisation of the oxamination system which will involve introduction of the tutorial system and a process of continuous intermel assessment.

Before considering the demands of the dopn rtment for additions
staff etc., the Committee recomends that the course of Sociology should be transferred to a new department of Sociol Studies which will also include Social inthropology. Therefore, keeping in view this fact, that the $r$ epertment will become purely a Department of Political Science, the Comittee recommends posts of two Readers and two Lecturers. (one Roader \& one Lesturer undor first priority and one Reader âd ono lecturer under second priority) aind a grant of Rs. 40, Q00/- for books, joumals under first priority.

As regards the donand of the department for the opening of a Centre for the Study of West Bengel State Politics, the Comrittee suggests that the depertment should apply to the Indian Council of Sncial Science Resoarch for a project on the study of State. Politics. As there is a Computer Centre in tho University, the Nepartment nay toke its assistmoe and, thorefore, no gront for equipment is recommended.
7.22 Departmont of Commerce :- The Department of Commerce is ore of the biggest depertments in the University with on enrolment of about 2000 students in two shifts ( day and evening) for M. Com. desreo. This strength is spresd over 14 soctions. There are about 150 studerte in each saction. The dopartment also provides resoarch facilitios. Isading to the degree of Ph.D. in the areas of Applied Feonmics, Business Statistics, Accountancy and Goneral liangement. It hes at the moment two rescarch scholarships of R. $250 /-\mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. provided Jy the University to its Ph.D. students. The department has, so far, producec 15 Ph. Ds. and there are 25 students who are onrolled for Ph. D. degree. The dopartment has also undertaken as many as 11 projects from the PIrnning Commission, ICSSR, Institute of Manpower Resoarch etc. The presont stroneth of the toching faculty of the department is- Professor-, , Readers- 4,whole-time Lecturers- 16. part - time Lecturers- 28 and Honorary Lecturers-9. The departmont is also plaming to develop a special three fears postgraduate course. leading to the award of Master:s degree in Industrial Management $f r$ which the approval of the
Symdicete has been obtained. In addition, the dopartment is planning to offer an M. Phil. course to train Pr.D. fbudents and teachers in affiliatod colloges. It slso wents to strengthen the existing $\mathrm{M} . \mathrm{Com}$. Course by providing moro aroas of specialisations. For all theso, the dopartment has subritted proposals tothling (including a seperate building) Rs. $91,15,000 /$ - in financial tems. The department has asked for two Professorships and three Readerships, in adrition to a soparato building and sme administrative staf. and oquiment. The Hoed of tho Department told the Comittes that the Department of Comerce of Calcutta University wents to establish collaboration with tochnology stream and as such the specialisations needed for new Professorships could be Production Rnginecring, Operations Rescanch and Cybernatics. For throe Roadors, the specialisetions proposod by the Department are Sociolozy me Incustrial Psychology.

Going through the various papers submittea by the Dopertront of Conmerce on their development programme and the recormendations of the Ghani Comittee, one gets an impression that cleer lines on which the growth of Comerce Bducation in this University should proceor are being worded out and the confusion regarding the future role of Commerce in this Thiversity as en academic discipline is being elearod by removing the somewhat artificial difforonce botween Comnerce and Business Managoment. A hoolthy step in tris direction has been taken by renaring the College of Conmere as the University College of Business Studies.

- The three years Master's Course in Incustrisl Manesement (MTM) as a full-time day course is a major deviation from the estrblished practice. of offering two years Wester's course in Indian Univorsities. Specialise? advanced courses can be thought of mainly of one-year duration ass is the ease with most of the universities in the wost.

Proposals for M. Phil. Course have also been made out with five papers which have been suggested as course work for this. . The M. Phil. programae rightly ains at preparing canidates in rosench methodology. for coing Fh. Wh. whit and sor bridging the knowledge gip thet exists in our postgradunte programes.

It is rocomendon that the then huy ruwnemp more spence for .. A-.ins ru"cinnse tul some snace for research scholarsand tenchers. The present accommalation available to the deparment is grossly inanequate.

The lepartment may organise post-B.Com. diplma courses, like those of Corporate Sccretaryship, Industrial Rolations ond Perscanel Mannģinent, Markcting and Sales Manterement, Tax Planning thd Management ctc. wich are very well needod in a city like Calcutta. These will also reduce pressure on M. Com. admission.

Toking into account the low strength of senirr teaching froulty in tems of needs, it is suggested that this department may bo sanctioned one post of Profossor - with specialisation in liccounting and one Reader with specialisation in functionsl areas of business under first priority and three Readerships with spocialisations in Inclustrial Sociology, Industrial Relations, Personnel Management and marketing, under second priority. The Depertment should all so be given a grent of Rs. 75,000/-under first and Rs. 25,000/-under second priority for acquiring books and periodicals mainly for research use and an equiomert

The number of research scholarshins allocated to the department should be increased so that first-rate students ane encourased to take up research work on full-time basis. The

7.23 - Department of Lav: The Law college has got 6500 studeits on its rolls and almost all teaching is done by the part-the Lecturers wose number is 7 E . There are only three full-time teachers m one of which is a Princlual and two are the vico erincipals." This ollese has submitied roposals for starting LL. $\mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{o}}$ courses as full-tine day course. at jresent each section of LL.B. has a strencth of about 15 C students.

It is recommended that two Readers, one in firet and ons in second priority and two lecturers in second priority and N. 40,000 under first orterity for books, jcurnals, Besides, the honcrarium payable to part-time Lecturers wo taks 12 peniode of lectures a week, should be increased from $=.250 /-$ pdm. tc $=.5 c c /-m_{0}$ The department should also be provided more space for its class rooms and teachers.
8. Faculty of 3cience:
3.1. Dejertment of 3otany

The Deportmont of Botany which came into existence in the year 1918 had an initial inteke cf less than $10^{*}$ students. It now admits 60 students every year. Uf these 20 are admitted throrch the Fresidency College and the rest by the University. Lectures and special paper practicals of all stadints arataranedi in the department. Cnly in the seneral practicals,20 students vitivise the laboratory facilitios of the Presidency Colleģe. Eecause cif lare number, the practical classes are held in tyo shifts with commor theory classas in between the morning end the evening shifis. The stadents of the moming shift do not zet ample time for practical work and cre at a disadvantase visma-vis students of the afternoon shifts. This is a very unsatisfactory axrangemont. The dewartment亡s cranjod for space for general practicels and staif roomo. Sorridors are crowded with almirahs concainine herbarium anc. museum specimen.

The department offers special papars in seven disciplinos, namely, Oytogenetics, Wycology and Flant zathology, Want Physiology, Raxonomy, Xalseobotany, thamacognosy and Mitobiology. It also proposes to start som more soecialised disciplines like Biosystematics and Radiation Biclogy, Molecvlar Tenetics, Xperimental seclogy etc.

Thare are 96 research scholars vorking for their research dogroes, of which 52 are jart-time norkers and 44 are fill-tino research fellows vho rocoive sti ?inds from aẻncinss like USC, SIX, ICAF, Atomic Bergy Commission, the University etc. The department has $r$ cently introduced the Term system and tio whole M.Jc. course has been dovided into five Terms. This is indeed a welcome step. During the last 10 years, the departmont has published more than 500 rasearch papers in Indian and foreifn journals and has oroduced 77 Ih . De and $6 \mathrm{D}, \mathrm{Scc}_{\mathrm{s}}$. The main thrust in the department is in the area of Cytegenetics and Cytochcinistry in when the department has accuired rerutation. The U": C has solocted this dmartment as Cencre of social Assistance.

Devolcomant Flans: The department has diversified its teachine and research programmes to soveral specialised branches keaping in viev the job potential and modern develoments in the Eiclo:-. cal Sciences. Hovever, it rould bo advisable to ccncentrate teachin; and research in a fow specialised fields in which the dopartment has sufficient expertise and infrastructure to become 3 Contre of Sdvanced studias. This will include the disciplines of Gytc anetics, Jytochemstry, Radiation Biolozy, Biosystemat $\ddagger$ cs and iolecular denetics. Tsachers in other specialisation may. folv advantase of individual Teachers' Zesearch Schomes of the J.: fo: developing their fieldis.

Rosuiramonts: The minimum s ace rowuirencnt is a generai iaboretory to accomiodace 60 stiedonts, staff roors and $e$ bie room to store herbaiium and museun specimens. For this an area about 5000 to 700 CG . ft. may be provided f . farably in the same floor by axtengion in the eastern block.
 frofecsor and tro Readers in the field of ultrastructure and Moleculan radi tion 3iology may be sanctinnod. Besides, thase tochmici:ns for Tirsse Glure/Radiation Laboratories may be sanctioned.

Buloment: siluough the departinent has acquired several $x_{\text {a }}$ histicated a paratos, cortain additional equipmont and soares are nseried. a stm of". 2.50 lakhs may be provided.for this purpose.

3.2. Deperthent of Goology: The, department has a, total stren'sth of 12 faculty membars (2 xrofasscrs, 3 Peadors anc 7 Lecturers). 7 pert-time Lecturers are also involved in the teaching roramme. 55 sturents are enrolled in the kos. (rart-I) and 55 in $\bar{W} .3 c$. (Fart-II). The committee was informed that the HG has arreed to the introduction of a post-An, Sc. diploma course in "fnimal ifenetics" The toological seciety of Calcuta is alsc lodged within the promises of the Departtont. Tho departmental library has 3891 books and subscribes for 21 research journals. The research fialds of the two frofecors are
 Readers are "Cytozenetics", "3ntenclogy" and "ialacology". ither disciolines in which research is beine conducted in the deartmont are "Parasitoloy and Frotozcolozy", "Beerimental lurohology" and "Comparative A-natomy". . 20 full time research workers are anrollad for the Ph. D. decree.

During the Fifth Zlan woriod, the department prooses to strengtion, the existịng teaching and research facilities. Lookinu to the teeching and research responsibilitios of the department, the facelty needs ts be strenthened. The departwont ieeds more space for additinnal research laboratories. It alsc needs a temperature controlled room. Libráry facilitios need improvoment; tha department should subseribe t more resoarch journals in order to meet the recuiremonts of resoarch vorkors in various disciplines. Thero is a cese for strengthening of the copartment with respect $t$, ecemment.

Tho section on "解docrinolosy" has been doinc: hi hly
commendable work and hos acrned for itself ant international stature. It desorves all pessible assistance and encourasenont. nod research vork is also beins carried out in "Ortogenetics", "monnlocy" and "Parositolocy and "retozcolocy" and those sectione also neoct te be strentthened. The recontendations being hado herein for additicnal foculty mombers are in the lioht or the above observeticas. It is alse hoped that with the stromethening of the faculty the Department shall nov bo able to introance the post-ike diploma courso in "animal Fenetics".

The Cmmittse dicl mot notice any collaborative teaching or research effort botween the Zoolocy Department and other sister departhents. Is is recomenced that the Department shovid give a fresh look to the syllabi site to its aporoach to teaching at the postgraduate leval.

8.3. Departaent of Physics: The physice denartment has had a Jloricos tradition, haviny had man 1 ike C.V. Raman, Joil. Joso,
 it had not been able to keep ur this tradition. Jowever, the Comittae could sea that round was now beine prepered for ics
 it attracts, tha Committeo hopes thet the dopartrient will ajain take its glace among the frcnt-rank jhysics dapartmonts in the country.

The present staff consists of a professors, 5 roadass and 12 lecturers. The department had montioned various areas of spocielisation, but after some discussions these ware grouped into solid state physics (theory and experiment), biophysics and nuclear physics (low and hith onereios, incleding cosmic rays). The doartwent will do vell to form viable critical size wrips in these areas rather than diffuse its efforts. It vas hany to note the efforts durine the last year t. generat: a racench rroerame in exporimental solid state physics, with an cmohacie on building envipment, in winch for 7 or $\mathfrak{S}$ staff members from difforent sections had got tozethor and made a rosearch propesals. These efforts noed to be gacouracod aid supportod. The nowly angonted Falit rrofesser can be axpocted to build a schocl in tineoretical solid stats ohysice, and there is a good progromrio in biophysics too.

The ecuipment in tha department, except thi rocently accured electron microscope for bipphysice srou is ut-cctodj and the laboretories hav $\geq$ or beromexipped. In the lightof above ronarks, bulk cit the ecuiotiont rant that ts recmmanded should be used to buile up the infrestuctre of the solid state physics arcerame. Cortain accessoriこs wald also benpeded ror the slectron microscope. The sloctron micrescoos and the wlte centrifuza, that is roauested, should be jart of tha c ntral instruments facility. The dopartmens should also ware to 30 the variably ancrey cyclotron. Bor this, it will nood anipnent as well as staff. \& cortain acu* ment matt in moclear phyoics is beins recommandod, stibject to the deartment takine sioss to a oint experts who would be in a position to wo V $V$ effoctivoly, and a dotailed woorsals baing sabittec, the positions thet are recomendod, and the vecant ositions noy bo rislod, kouping the above recommenciations $\therefore$ n vi.

Tha Domitteo recommends the pesitlon of a werk-shon
 sho practic. Tio may bo atanho t tho central instraent Facility:
ath rogard te the recuosted pesitions of scenner and omulsion technicians, the committes fiels that these ocottions may be considorad separatoly autsicio tha blan in torns $2=a$ specific rasanch schene that ay be subnitt d by the invastiontors concerned.

The Oomittso was not in favour of creating adeittomel esitions in electronics for teachtn the cous in eloctroitcs. in ius viow, $\ddagger$ would be more destrabie, within the linited $r$ sourcos availsble, to appint readers in solid state phycies, or alcloar physics, whe may bo experts in selid state alactronos or nucloar instrunentation. The pesont stafi, vitin sach adcitions, and collaboration with the Instituto of Ravite physica, should be dele to take care of the cours 2 din olectrchics. The deparment may also bear upon oxpextise from hana Instituto of Nucl ier Fhysics and the Bose Institute for teking somo coursose There are possibilitios of joint rosoarch programes with those Institates, which also may be expletiod.

St present the dapartant soreadi in an inplan d fashion in ita buildine. It is cramped for soace (it hes men Loss suace than the physics devartment of the oresicinc, selioge).
 the dopartment vas arranged in a small roon with bocks snd journals hopod on top of sach otion on tables. The comritite hes recommondec sone additional suece ( 6,000 sce ft.). Nine: the now building will take some tine to come up, it wolle be cosirable to redistuibute the axisting spaca nore retionally.

The Commitee recommends thint following assistance may be provided to the department of physics. .

8.4. Department of ippli id lathematics: It has an arroved staff of 3 professors, 5 readers and 4 lecturers. 36 students are admitted each year for the two years of postgraduate course.

Areas of specialisations in the department are(i) Theory of盁asticity and Flasticity; (ii) Fluid Mechanics; (iii) Nemerical and finctional Analysis and (v) quantum Mechanics. Nork is also being cone in the Cyber atics, Statistical Rysics, Thermo-dynamics, Information Thacry, Nucliear Thecry, Topology, Foundation of Jeomotry and Genral Rolativity. Pilte a good number ef papers have been published in the department during the last five years in the iranches given above. Besides: 20 nart-time research scholars who are taachers in different colleges, there are 10 whole-time research scholars who get scholarships. The library of the department is heused in the room of the professor \& Head of the Department. We were informed that there are 7,000 books in the library. The dopartment subscribes to 34 journals of which 19 journals are subscribed by the Centre of idvanced Study in Mathematics $\mathcal{L}$ We understand thet the Centre of Advanced study status to the department has been taken away recently by the JaC. The department has passed through a bad time but it now shows signs of having come out of this difficult period and dolng quite useful work. Since the library is housed in the room of the Frofessor \& Head of the Dapartment, it is very difficult, for the teachers and students to make its free use. The timings of the library are the timings whon the Professor \& Hiead is present in his Office.

The department has produced 19 rescareh scholars during the 1ast five years. Space at the disposal of the department is ingufficient and is distributed in two different buildings and
 ment recently created Frofessar. $6 . \mathrm{N}$. Bese Instetute within $亠$ it to comemorate the memory of the late ifational Frofessor oll: Bose.

The library, and ofices of the Calcutta wociety which is cenerally manased by the head ore the departaent and other members of the dopartment of aplied nathematics are sitteted near the department of aplisd mathematics. The Calcutta Mathemeticel wociety has a very good library of books and also of journals, which it gets on axchange with other International Rocieti s, for the Bulletins whichit publishes. We are glad to learn that the head ef the departnent of ay liad mathematics takes care that no jorirnal subscribed by the departmont of aplied mathenatics is duplicatod with the journals which Solcutta Mathematicl socisty zets on exchenfe.

The department escuires the existinc hydrodynamic : laboratory, geo-physical laboratory and numerical laboratory to $\therefore$ be strengthened. Thsy alsc want to set up a elasto-mechenical laboratory. For the aoplied mathematics laboratory to be affectively utilised, steps must be taken to make it possible to make quantitative measurements, rather than only qualitative observations. The department requires additional space. The staf $\mathfrak{r}$ sems to be sufficient for the present courses, but if new courses are to be started and the areas already existing, are to be strengthened, then' some more staff is required. Froféssar .SoN. Bose. Institute is doing useful work. in organising national and international symeosia and seminars. It should be helped in these efforts. However, it should continue to be part of the department (and not become a separate institute) serving is à umbrella for seminars, symposia and non-traditional interdopartinental postgraduate course procrammes. The department may be givin a rofessorship in theoretical physics to help in these progranmes.

The department should concentrate on only a few branches like numorical analysis, cybernetics, operations research, oceanography because it is not possible to dovelop all the fields that have been mentioned above. as operation research is gaining sreat importance in the country and abroad and is being used in industry, it is strongly sujgested that a course in operation research be also started in the department with an intake of 10-20 students ench y ar.

The Major slectrostatic Dopier which the department has, may be kept as a central facility for the whole of the Campus and not only for the department of applied mathematics. University may consider if there is sufficient work for the Sopier in the department alone.

It is felt that the intake of 36 studente each yea. be raised to 50 including operatian restarch course. The dinim culty that was pointed out by the head of the dopertmeat was that if he increased the intake, thel the wactical work would have to be conducted in shifts. If some more suece and ocujment is grovidad to the departneat, this dinficulty can be solved.

The Comittee found that some of the emipmont in the department like the whd Tunnel and irnos Seismotreph are out of order. -Thase ecuipment should be imedietaly ropainad.

There should be a rational distribution of space Emons the difiorent departionts. The deportaent has ingrfficient space and should be provided more syace. It is also folt that the space at the divesal of the applied mathematics devertment shov:Id be compact and should not be distributed.
; Acditional steff may ba provided to the departront if the doportment starts the courss in owaration researche Technical staff may also be provided. The present vacancies must be fililed up.

The Committee rocommonds that following assistance nay be providod to the dopartment of aplied mathematics:

8.5. Department of Bure Mathematics: The sanctioned strength of the stafif in the department is two rropessors, four readers and aisht lecturers, it present 1 rofesscr, 4 Readers, 5 Iacturers, five stependary part-time teachers and two honorary jartmime teachers are porkinge The department used to admit 300 to ;350 student's each year. But tho Comnittec is glad to note that this year they have reduced the nuiber to only 140 in
M.Sc. (Previous) though.there are 300 students in M.Sc. (Final.) The reduction has been possible only because they are not adiniting only honours graductes and not pass graduntes which they were admitting in the past. The examinations are hild in the department with the help of invigiletors from the department as well as from outsido the department. There was a complaint that mass copying was going on in all the examinations that were held in the departinent. The Comittoe is satisfied to noto from the statement of the hoad of the dopartment that the departmont is trying to checl mass copying and it has boen roduced to a groat axtont.
$\therefore$ There are give papers in MoSc. (Frovious) class, all of which are compulsory. in M.Sc. (Final), a student offers three compulsory papers and two optional papers in any one of the following (i) Real Analysis; (ii) Complex Analysis; (iii) Geometry; (iv) Topology; (v) Functional Analysis; (vi) Algebra. The subject of Numerical Analysis'also figures in the syllabus but this is not being taught perhaps because there is no toacher In the department who oan teach this. subject.

Tho departmont has at prosent 5 research scholars on wholo-time basis and 10 part-time rosoarch scholars who are teachers in difforent collegos. The numbor of rosearch scholars in the dopartment is very small because more than 5 rescarch scholarships do not exist in the dopariment. Tho departmont has, produced soven Ph.Ds. during the last five yoars and has publishod 50 research papers. The workload of teachers is not more than 10 periods per week.

The tochors havo big rooms at their disposal. The librory of the dopartmont is situated in a big hall, but there are very fow books and journals. The librery hours are the samo as the teaching hours of the dopartment. The students and toachers are not able to consult the library aftor teaching hours. The department suberibes to only 5 journa.s.

The dopartment has sought moro scholarships so that it can attract greator number of resear.ch scholars. The departmont. also wants to introduce a papor. in Economatrics for which the post of , a teacher has boen requested for.

- The department has large number of students. Even now the present strength is 140 in M.Sc. (Previous). We foel that while it may be difficult to reduce this number, tho department may try to reduce the intake to only 100
- stüdents; remaining students may seek admission to the dopartmont of appliod mathomatics. The departmont may
also start an integrated course in mathonstics as it exists in most of the universitios in the country. There should be only 50 students in the course in purc mathomatics as yell as in the intsgratiod coursie. Tho committeo is against the suggestion to croato a soperato dopartment for the integrated course. The name of the department may be" chenged to the dopartment of mathematics.

Four toachers have left the depertment. Thesir substitutes have not' been appointed. Evon then the work of the dopartnient is going on smoothly. Wo, therefore, feel that no additional staff is needed even for running this integrated course. The substitutos for the four teachers who havo alroady loft may bo appointod in aroas which are noeded for tho integratod courso. However, , the department may be strengthoned by providing additional staff:

The space at the disposal of the depertment seems to be adequatio. There is a big room in which about 10 lecturers sit. Tho comaittee foels that this room cen bo eesily convertod into 8 cubicels. If this is done and one more room is coverted into cubicals then practically ovory tuackor will have a room to himsolf. The roons of professors, roeders and the retirod professors arc big onough and saminars can bo conduotod in those rooms which, we notg is not boing done.

The books which are usod most in the department may be kept in a small room no the library roon oen be divided into 0 common room for the students of the departaent and a sominar room.

The following assistence is rocommended for the department of mathomatics:

8.6 Departnent of statistics; Thure aro two profogsors throo roaders and four lecturors in tho dopartmont. The dopartriunt has at presont no wholuminic resoarch scholar, though therc are six part-time fosearch scholars. The space at the disposel of the department is quito sufficient. The departmont also acts as a service dopartment in so far as it delivors a few luctures in the departments of Botany, zoblogy and agriculture. Two . lectures aro delivored in the department of agriculturc on the design of experiments wheroas in the dopartments of botany and zoclogy, 15 to 20 ledtures are deliverod in the whole sossion on the analysis of the date. In the dopartnental library, there aro 4400 books. The department subscribes to 19 journals out of the book grant of Rs 4,000/- which is used entirely for tho subscription of tho joumels. For the purchase of books UGC makes ad-hoc grants. It has sufficiant equipment. It gets en equipnent, machine and appliences arant of As $8,000 /$ - per year out of which it purchases one or two calculating machinos cach ycar. The courses which are mun in the department are quite upto-dato. The department has tricd to kecp up its standard. Out of 20 studonts which are admittod each yoar to M.Sc. course, only one or two get first class.

The applied rescarch unit of the departmont should be strongthonod.

The dopartment, at prosont, has a papor in oporation rescarch. It may be invostigated if it can comoperato with the departricnt of applicd mathonatics when it starts a courso in operation rosearch.

The department admits 20 studonts oach year. It is suggested that the number may bo increased to 30. The dopartmont may also give courses in othor departments, like botany, economics and tho dopartmonts in the medical faculty where the coursos in statistics aro neoded.

The following assistance may be provided to the department of statistics:
A. Teaching Staff: 3 Lecturers One under first and two under second priority.
B. Books \& Journals Rs 50,000/-
C. Equipment Ps $20,000 /-1$
8.7 Department of Chemistry: The teaching and rosoarch work In the dopartment is carried out in 4 brond eroes of Chomistry viz. Organic Chemistry, Inorganic end Analyitcal Chemstry and Physical Chemistry. Inorganic Chemistry, the major thrust of work has beon the Chomistry of Natural Products, including their synthesis and transformation, study of inctarocyciic compounds of biological interest, Organomotallic compounds and their application in Synthatic Orgenic Chemistry. In Tnorganic and Analytical Chomistry, the major areas of intorost have been Coordination Chonistry, Chernistry of Rare Farths, Thermodynamics, Kinotics and Mechanism of Inorganic Roactions, Structure of Inorganic Chemistry etc. In Physical Chenistry, roscerch work has been carried ait in ethidy of . Optical, Electrical and Megnotic proportios of Organic and Inorganjc systans, thoorotionl ohomistry, Thoory of Electrolytes and Colloid Scienco etc.

The depertment has a UCC Special Assistanco Programme for Chenistry of Natural Products. During the past 10 year 8 the dopartment conductod 63 research schames, supported by UGC/CSIR/ICAR, Govornment of India, Ministry of Health Govarmont of Wost Bongal otc. and during this period research publicentions from the department exceeded 450 in various netional and intarnational journels of reputo. The prosent acadomic positions arc as follows: Professors - 4 (threo of which arc ondownonts viz. Khaira Profossor; Palit Profossor and Ghosh Professor); Roadors - 5 (Physical, Inorganic, Organic, Inorganic/Analytical) and Locturors - 15.

The department has one fellow, two Pool Officers, 5 research students supported by the Univarsity, 6 S.R.F. supportod by agencies such as CSIR/UGG/ICAR, 3 rosoarch Pssistance, 31 J R.Fs. supported by GSIR/UGC. In addition there are. Honorary Roscarch Workors in Organic (18), Inorganic (40) and physical (19) Chomistry. The special facilities available in tho dopartment include U.V.Spectrophotonctor and one I.R. Spactrophotomoter which at the tine of tho visit was not working due to want of accessories. Tho micro analyticel laboratory facilitity of the dopertment is - veilable to workers in tho Dopartmont as woll as outsiders (on a tokon paymont basis). The workors in the department also usc fecilities from other institutions in India such as CDRI. Lucknow (for I.R. and N.M. R. $_{*}$ ), BLRC Trombay (E.S.R.), Saha Instituto (spocial spoctro photometor), Sindri Unit of FCI (K-ray). The depertmont allows workers from other institutions and univorsitios in Wost Bongal and outside to meke use of its facilitics.

The dopartment proposos to devolop 4 additional
oroas viz. Photo Chomistry, Organá Motallic Chomistry, solid

Stato Chanistry and dnalyideol Chanistry.
The depertmont toachos only postgraduato courses for which 80 students nro admittad by tho dopartant and 30 by tho Presidency Colloge.

The department sinco its inception in 1916 was hoadod by internetionelly roputed scientists like Archarya P.C. Ray, Profossors J. M. Mukherjec, P. Ray, J.C. Ghosh, B.N. Ghosh, to name somo, who havo mede valuable contributions and havo brought this dopartmant to its prosont position of boing one of the best departnents of Chemistry in this country.

The growth of: the laboratories in the department has beon somewhat haphazard duc to non availability of sufficient spaco The toaching has to be organisod in shifts. The morning shift starts at $6.30 \mathrm{ar} . \mathrm{m}$. and continues till 10.30-a.m. This is fóllowd by lactures from 10.30 a.m. to $1.00 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{o}}$ for the students of the morning shift as well as the evening shift ( 2.00 y.m. to 6.00 p.mo). This is not a satisfactory arrangenent.
. . The library is confinod to a small foom approximatoly . $600 \mathrm{sq} . \mathrm{ft}$. in aroe. The library' subscribes to most of tho journels of intorest and hes mult"1, copios of textmbooks needoc for the toaching programio but due to lack of space most of these aro"stackod on tables. The students do not havo adoquate space to sit and consult bocks/joumals. .

The library is open from 10.00 a.tre to 6.00 p. $\mathrm{In}_{0}$. Tho hours cannot bo extended due to non-availability of extra steff. There is also the difficulty of subscribing to journals in time. The University finds difficulty in making edvance paymonts with the result that journals for 1974 had not bean reccived at thetim of visit of Committec. on the other hind, this university appears to : subscribe to two copies of the costly journal, 'Chenicel Abstracts, soperately for the Chonistry and lippliod Chenistry departments on the samo campus. It nay considor whothof it should continue to do so in view of abovo mentionod difficultics.
. The gless blowing facilitios in the department are inadequate. The department has no workshop of its own. Tho availeble facilitios from other departments do not appear to bo satisfectory. Therc is no Technical porson/Electronic Engineor to look after the maintonance /replecement/repairfabrication of smell conponants.

The numbor of fellowships available to the dopertment is not sufficient. The department gets 2 to 3 U.G.C.
p.t.o.
followshipsi. Tho rosearch students made a representotion about the difficulties they exporience in rospect of non availebility of equipmonts and insufficiont contingeasy grants for their work. They also ecmplained of residentiel accomicdation since they are not admitted to the postgraduato hostels.

It is noted thet inalyticel Chonistry is incuded as a part of Inorganic Chenistry which appoars to be somewhet unfair. During discussions it was pointed out that thore are menbers on the staff who have spocialised in Analytical Chemistry. Inspite of this, it is neither offered as a special peper nor rocognised as a section for toaching and rescarch in the Univorsity.

The main thrust of the rosoarch work has been in the Organic Chenistry of Naturel Products which is recoiving Special issistance from the UGG. This shourd continue to got major support out of tho Fifth Plan allocations. In ordor that other soctions also aro devclopod, it will be"desirable to havo a scporato alloction of funds for Inorganic and Physical Chomistry.
anong the various proposals for: starting resoanch work in additional aroas, the comnittoc felt that priority may be givon to Lnelytical Chonistry for which the infrastructure "elroady oxists. Support should also bo provided for doveloping other areas viz. Photochomistryf Orgeno Metallic Chanistry and Solid Statc Chomistry. Existing vacancios in the department may bo filled up without dolay.

8.8 Depertment of Physiology:- This dopartment takes each year 18 students for the BaSc. (Hons.) course and 24 students for M.Sc. The Presidency Collego also takes 12 students for M.Sc. The theory classes for the latter are conduted jointly wheroas the practicals arc conducted in individual Institutions. This depertment is well known for its work in the field of work physiology and Eronomics. It may bo worthwhilo for this departrant to continue to specialiso in this field rather than trying to develop new fields such as nutrition and diotetics, notabolic biochomistry, microbiology otc.

Physiology is now taught in the Univorsity Colloge of Scionce, the Presidoncy Gollege and Institute of Basic Mcdical Scionces. Similerly Biochonistry and Nutrition Research are carricd out in the Institutc of Basic Modical Scionces as well as in the Physiolegy, Zoology, Botany and Biochemistry Departmonts of the Bellygunge Cempus. It would be desirablo that the three physiology contres form a coordinating committee and plan, to the oxtent possible, 'corc' courses and try to use to the fullest extont oxportiso and physial facilities availeble in conducting tonching end roscarch. Similarly all dopartmonts concerned with toaching and resoarch in bicchomistry and microbiology can form a coordinating cormittos and plan intogratod coursos.

The physiology depertmont is badly in need of space and may be senctionod about 4,000 sq.ft. (if possible the whole of the ground floor) and Rs 4 lakhs for cquipment (Rs 3.00.1akhs under first and fs 1.00 lalch under second priorities), Rs 1.5 lakhs for books (Rs 1.00 lakh under first and RS 0.50 lalch undor second priority) anc two technical assistants (one under first and one under second priority).
8.9 Department of Biochemistry and the Guha Instituto of Biochemistry:- It is felt that thore should be a dofinitc uncerstanding thet the developmont should be plemnod in such a way thet thesc two operate as a joint unit. Tho Vico-Chancollor assured the committee that fragmentntion will bo avoided in future even in other subjects and these two (as woll as the Lpplied Mathematice Department and the Bosc Institutc) will opercto as single units. Such a reorganisation would be in tuno with the ideals and aims of the late Profossor Guha who sought to develop the ficlds of bicchemistry, nutrition and microbiology as a composite unit and tried to bring together not only tho sciontists in each of these disciplines but also those working in alliod disciplines.

It would be desirablo for this dopartment to concontrato on Ncuropharmacolcgy, Vitanin Metabolism and Microbial motabclism.

Lt present this doparment admits 60 students for M.Sc. every year. Thers arc 50 students working for Ph. D. In the last 5 yoars, 50 Ph. Ds. havo corro out of this dopartment.

This dopartment can initiate a 2 yoar evening course in Neurochanistry anc"nutrition for those who already have an M.Sc. dogree and aro working as tonchors in colleges. This may, if necessery, be linked with the M.Phil. degree. This dopartmont can olso give job orientod diploma courses in the evening for people omployof in schools, colloges, Industrios and hospitals. Examples of such courses are industrial microbiology, clinical bjochomistry, dictetics, eare and meintenanco of experimental animals otc.

The dopartinent can also run workshops, sominers and symposia in selected aspects of bicchomistry and nutrition. If possible, it should persuade the Guha Conference Comittos to hold their annuel onforonce in the Guha Institute.

Fumds rny be sanctioned for building about 2,000 sq.ft. laboretory ond croating the additional posts of one Professor in IUutrition under first priority, and one lecturer, and 2 tochnicians undor second priority in addition to Rs 4.00 lalchs for equipmont (Rs 3.00 lakhs under first and Rs 1.00 lakh under second priority) Rs. 1.5 lalkhs for books (Rs $1.00^{\circ}$ lakh undor first and Rs 0.50 lakh undor sccond priority) end Rs $50,000 /$ for conducting worlshop, symposic otc. under first priority.
8.10 Dopartinent of Gaclogy:- The Comittee had discussions with

- the nembers of the staff and roscerch scholers regarding the coursos thet are being run, the present facilities, utilisation of

Fourth Plen grents and the roquirononts of tho Fifth Flan poric:, as were presonted by tho dopartinent.

The Dopartnont of Gcology at presont is running two postiraduate courses, one leading to the M.Sc. Deeree in Geology (2 years duration) and a post-M.Sc. degree of one year duration (after M.Sc. Geology) in Applied Geology. The averase intake of students for the M.Sc. course is $20 \%$ per year. In addition, 10 students are admitted in the Presidenay college. They cone to this Department for theory dlasses. Apart from the staff of the department of Geology, two members of the Presidency Collego and one momber from an undergraduate college viz., Asutosh colloge participate in the lecture programme for the M.Sc. students.

During the last fow years; only one or two students joined the post-M.Sc. Applied Gcology course. The reason for this intake was stated to be lack of availability of students with proper background. It appears that most of the students passing the M.Sc. course from this! dopartment are immediately absorbed in different professional organisations and whosoever remains joins ejther rosearch or post-M.Sc. Appliod Geology Course. In viow of the poor intake, the Committee is of the opinion that it will be weconomical as also unnecossary to run this post-M.Sc. Applied Geology course. Instcad, the present two-year M.Sce (Geology) course should be strengthened and reoriented more towards applied geology.

At prosent, there aro one Professor, four Roaders and four Lecturers in the dopartment. 2 posts of Lecturors are vacant. Thore are also thee part-time toachors (two from presidency Collego and one from Asutosh college) The speciality of tho profossor is structural, Goology and Petrology.

Thero arc at present four Rescarch Scholars working for the ph.Ds dorrec. Of thesc, three are scholars under difforent schomos and one is holding the University fellowship. In adaition, fivo partwime rcsearch scholars from the Goological Survoy of India also work for their Ph. $D_{0}$ in this dopartmont. During the lest fivo years, 5 or 6 scholars from this dopartment end about 10 from Prosidency College got the Ph. D. degroe.

The main thrust arcas of the Department are stated to be (i) Structural Goology and Petrology, (ii) Igneous and Motanorphic Potrology and (iii) Micropaloontology. In addition, the Dupartment is also intorestod in a minor way in Ore Goology. Tho dopartment appoars to have been done some studies recently in the Singhbhum mineralisod belt.

The dopartment stated that it was able to utilise the Fourth Plan grants effectively; except that the posts of three Lecturers could not be filled. It appears that selections were
hald for these posts but somehow tho Univarsity hes not made any appointmont.

The department wants to start post-M.Sc. courses in Geophysical proppecting and lining Goolygy as it has a paper in Goophysics for the M.Sc. Goology; studonts. However, the comintoe felt that since the dopartment does not have any basic geophysical equipront, it is not dosirablo to stert a postm.Sc. courso in Geophysicel Prospocting. Sinilarly, the postm.Sc. coursc in Mining Goology is also not rocomended because of the lack of facilities in tho Department.

The department wanted two more profossors and one Reador to bo addod to their staff. Thay did not however, indicate any specialisation noeded for any of these posts. Thero is no justification for such a largo numbor of senior posts aithar from the point of teaching or rescarch. The department wants two tpohnical assistants one for instrumentation and the other for analytical work and roquires additional space for the library.

There is no special oquipment in the department and most of the equipmont available, are not in worktng condition. The Dopartment made a request for additional items of equipment worth Rs 12.00 lakhs.

Thore is a departmental library which is takon caro of by a librarien. 5300 books aro availablo at prosent in the librery and the dopartment subscribes to 24 poriodicals.

This dopartmont which was onco known to be of high celibrc is not maintaining that standard. It is vary necossary to strongthen tho Dopartment both facultywise and instrumantwise. More than this, tho Department should be encouragod to take up rescarch end investigativo work orionted towerds explorition geclogy and econonic goclogy taking into oonsidoration the presont probloms facing the country. In tho Prosidoncy Collogo thero is adequato oquipmont and considorablo amount of work of high celibre is boing conducted but thoro appenrs to bo littlo, collaboration and comperation botwoon the Presidency Collogo and the Dopartment of Goology of tho Calcutta Univorsity. No doubt two members of staff of the Presidency College teach in this department. But except for that, there is no othor collaboration: Collaborative research prajects of interest wer nevor attomptcdo On the other hand, the comittoe was told thet tho presidency collage is trying to crato perallol facilities for conducting thoory classes i.c. thoy would like to start seperate postgraduato tenching in the collego itself. This, in the opinion of the cormittee, should be discouraged since it will bo wastage of the rescureas available. Instead, a working formula should bo worked out to bring the prosidency colloge and this
department nearor to each othor at the teaching, rosonrch and investigation levels.

The Comitteo observed thet most of the students adritted to the M.Sc. courso have not takon Mathonatics at thoir Bosc. levol. Since the modern tronds in geological scionces require a minimum basic knowledge of Mathomatics, the Dopartment should encourago students who have taken Mathematics at the B.sc. level to join the M.Sc. ccurso in Geology. Othorwisc, the postgraduatos of this department will not be able to perticipate in tho work that is at present boing planned in the country in the ficld of Gcolcgy.

Regarding staff requiraments, the Comittee is of the opinion that one post of professor may be grantod undor first priority. This cen bo in any of tho thrust arees listed above oxcept the speciality of the presont professor. In addition post of one tochnical assistant may be approved under socond priority.

At prosent, thore is no provision for ficld work expanses and since Geology is a ficld subject, it is necossary for the students to be trained in the field for a minimum length of time. Tho committee reconmends a sum of $\mathrm{Bs} 30,000 /$ - towards field work programes of the postgraduato students and for meeting contingency expenses during the V Plan poriod under first pricrity.

Even though the Departmont has listed oquipment worth Rs 12.00 lakhs which they would like to obtain, they have not montioned anything about putting the existing equipment into oporation. Tho Committue is of the firm opinion that it is necossary to get the uxisting equipment ropaired as a first

- priority inder the equipmont grant. In particular, the optical spectrograph nocds to be immediately repeirod. possibly, some forcign oxchango also may bo required in this comection. A sum of is $50,000 /-$ is recommended for the repair of this and other oquipnent. The optical spectrograph needs immodiately the following requiraments:

1. Highor Voltage source unit with Automatic 1 sct Voltege Rogulator.
2. Hilgor Exposure Contrel with Electrom 1 set magnetic Shutter.
3. Craphite Eloctrodo Shapor 1 No.
4. Wator-cooled fully adjustable aro and 1 iset sperk stand with holders for irregular samples and eloctrodes.
5. Eyepioce micrometer for spectrum reading 1 No.

Tho chomical anolysis laboratory of the Dopartmont is in poor shapo. It is nocossary to increase the facilitios in the chanical analysis leboratory and a sum of Is $25,000 /-$ is rocommadod for incrasing tho facilitios of this laboretory.

In addition, a sum of Rs 1.50 lakhs is rocomnended for obtaining X-ray defraction unit from indogonoous sources. A vehicle for field work may also bo provided.

Thus, in all the following grants are rocommendod:
A. Repair of existing equipment, increased facilities for chemical
laboratory and new equipment.
B. Vehicle
C. Books \& Journals
i) Rs 1.75 lakhs under first priority.

8.11 Dopartment of Psychology:- The dupartment of psychology of this Univarsity is the oldest in the country. But, at present it is in a bad shape. The post of Professor is lying vecent for about two yoars and it is not yot filled up. Aftor the: soporation of ipplicid Psychology Dopartmont, the staff is depleted. It has acute shortage of space and the wholo dopartmont is cramped in a smell area. The departmont seoms to be overcrowded due to intike of honours students. The department has an approved"staff of ono Professor, two Readors and six Lecturors. It has at present 2 Readors, 6 Lecturors and 2 part-time Lecturers. Thoy have producod quita a fow papors in the last five yoars, anctsome of thom are of good quality in tho exporinental arca. They heve undertakon six reseerch projects since 1970 and som of then spoar to be of good quality. 16 research scholars havo boon working in the department since 1965 and sone of than have also done excellent work. In other words, the resbarch basis of this dopartment scoms to be quite good and thoy should specialisc more and more in experimentel and devalopmental psychology.

It was noticod in the coursc of discussion that this dopertmunt is in no way linkod with the Applied Psychology department. The memburs of the staff are not even aware of the teaching and rosearch progranmes of the appliod Psychology dopartment. It is rathor unfortunato thet thoro is no comordination at the lovel of teaching and rescarch betwoon
two sistor dopartments which should be close to each other. The Comittoe is of the opinion that greator collaboration and coordination should bo possiblo between two dopertments and some collaborative toaching work could bo undortaken by both the departnents.

The $C_{\text {cmmittee }}$ is of opinion that the dopartment of rsychology should be givon enough space to expand its work. The laboratory is not vary woll equippod. hany of the old apparatus are out of usc. As the dopartment would like to specialiso in Exporimontal work and it has alruady shown onough possibility in this arca, its laboratory should be properly strengthoned. Tho Comaittec recommends the following: -

1) Staff:

Roador - 1 (in exporimental or dovolopmental area) in second priority and Animal Koepor - 1 in first priority.
2) Books \& Journals is $75,000 /-$ (Rs $50,000 /-$ io ; in first and Rs 25,000/- D. :socond priority).
3) Equipment:

Rs 1.00 lakh (Rs $70,000 / \mathrm{m}$ in first priority, Rs $30,000 /-$ in socond priority).
: 8.12 Dopartmont of Applied Isychology:- This dopartment was sterted in the yoar 1969. Only ono Locturer was appointed towards the end of 1969, and tho romaining staff was appointod betwoon 1970 to 1974. This dopartmant como into axistenco during the Fourth ilan poriod. This wes not en original schomo of tho Univorsity subnitted to the UGC for the Fourth Plan dovelopment but during the coursc of Fourth Plan period, tho Univorsity startod this dopartment with the approval of "the UGC and with reallocation of ilen funds. Therc is, howover, no rocord to show the academic basis on which this department wes seperated from the perent department. is a result of this, there is absolutely no coordination and cooporetion between tho two departments. This department wants to organise one year special preparntory course for those students who have not taken Isychology at the B.Sc. level. The Comittec foels thet this preparatory course could be organised in cooperation with the Department of Ture Isychology which has qualifiod staff for the purpose. The ideal academic arrangomant would be to corplotoly intograte both the dopartmonts so that the quelity: of toaching and research inproves. As there is no axamic justification for running the two seporate dopartmonts, the Comittee focls thet the two dopartnonts of Isychology should "bo intogratud during the Fifth Ilan period.

Tho dopartriont hes at prosent ono Profussor, four Readors and five Locturors, two part-time Lecturers, ono rasoarch assistant and one Isychometrician.
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Lithough tho dopartment vas startod in 1970-71, nost of tho steff wore rocruited only in 1972-73. The depertinent hes therefore not shown much progross in difforent arcas of spocialisation. buring this period, two cendidates havo beon awarded Fh.D. and 8 woro registorod for the degroos. Thoy havo taken one snall research schome sponscred by the West Bongal Govornnent. They heve not beon able to prociure funds from difforant sources for any other rosearch projoct. No satisfactory reasons were offorod as to why special resoarch projects wore not formulatod and submittod to the various agoncios which provide funds. Altogether it has published 18 resoarch papors during 1970 to 1974 and fabricatod fivo instrurients for the use of staff end students. Since it is a now depar jent tho equipront position is not very good. Thoy have 857 books in the departriontal library and it subscribes to 16 journals.

The departrent has e. good pronise if it devolops on the right linos. The department should specialise in specific areas of Applied Isychology. But care should bo taken to give a -good grounding to its students in the fundamentals of psychology. This problen may be solved to some extent if Hons. students in isychology are admitted for the applied courso. The plans subnitted by the department have been drawn up on a very lavish scele. Teking into considoration the working of tho dopartmant during the last four yoars or so there does notsoen to be any justification for such oxpansion, during the Fifth Plan. The department should try to consolidate its research and teaching during this poriod and dononstrate its potentialitics in tho specific aroas of : Appliod Isychology. The . department should be arcouraged to fabricato difforont kinds of instrumonts for this purposo and in addition to its own staff, it should tako tho help of the Contral Workshop, which is boing strongthened. The Comittoc rocomends the following additional help during the Fifth Ilan poriod:-
(1) Staff:

Reador - 1 in second priority Photographor-cum-Artist - 1 and
Mochanic - 1 undar first priority.
(2) Books \& Journals is 75,000/- (Rs $50,000 /$ - in first and is $25,000 /-$ in socond priority).
(3) Equipnent: in 1.00 lakh (Rs $70,000 /-$ in first and is $30,000 /-$ in second priority).

- .13 Department of Anthropology:- anthropology is one of the oldest departrients of Gelcutta University and is also the oldest dopartnent of antmopalogy in India (1921). While it playod a role in pronoting teaching and research in the past particularly in eestern India, it has failed to moderniso itself by incorporating the new trends in teaching and resoarch. The hand over of the
traditionel anthropology emphasising the study of naterial culture, the primitive tribes, tochnology otce parsists ant the, inteke of current anthropological materials continued to be. at tho low sido. However, the revised syllabus for M.A. \&'M.Sc. inthropology coursos roflocts somo improvanent end noods to bo furthar nodernigod.
of late, tho dopartiment has done considorable worl in tho ficld of Social and Appliod inthropology and.has producod 17 doctoral dissertations. In copparison to social. inthropology Thysical inthropology, which was once its strome soction, has shown a docline and during the last six years six researchors havo boon awarded Fh. D. dogroc in Thysical Anthropology. Its third soction, Falaoo-inthropolcgy is well staffod but owing to very naturo of tho soction, it attracts tho loast nunbor of studonts aner has producod only two doctoral dissortations.

For tho present, tho departmont is conducting both honours and postgraduato coursos and the studonts! intake oach year is 16 in Honours course and. 25 in tho postgraduato courso. Tho toaching staff of this dopartmont for both honours and Postgraduate coursos consist of one Professor (Gencrel Anthropology), threo Raders (one Sociol, ono physical and one Pre-history), 6 full-timo and 3 pertmine Lecturers.

The department has plens to improve the existing facilitios for toaching and rescarch and to make arrangements for spocialisod studies in Appliod and Action Inthropology. It is also planned to shift tho dopartment of Anthropology to the proposed campus for the faculty of Socisl'scionces.

In the light of tho above facts, the following assistanco is tecomended for tho enthropology dopermont:

8.14 Dopartment of Goography: The dopartmont has at prosont ono rrofessor, two Readers, nino Lecturors and orie partmine Lecturor. Its sturents cano mainly from the Arts $\therefore$... side and thay have thorcfore to cimphasizo social and cultural Goography.

The Comitto discussed with tho faculty; the desirability of adritting students of Mathonatics and Scionco, who would do bettor
p.t.o.
in Cartography and in soil Geography. The department has not given serious thought to this so far and it would be desirable for it to do so. The department may also try to work out joint research proposals with the Departments of Agriculture and Geology.

The Committee recomends following assistance for the Department of Geography:

9. Instituto of Basic Medical Sciences:
9.1 There is a well-run and woll-staffed hospital (postgraduato Instituto of Modical Education and Rescarch) in the physical contiguity of the Postgraduate Institute of Basic Medical scionces and this hospital/Institute too has its own departments of basic medical sciences. : This Institute is administered by the Health Department of the Govornment of West Bengal. Thore is, howevor, no official working arrangemont betwoen these two Institutes. This has, it scams, resulted in lot of duplication in the distribution of resources. Besides, members of the staff of the Postgraduate Institute of Basic Medical sciences, ospecially those bolonging to Departmont of Pathology and Mícrobiology and Pharmacology, have expressed their lack of access to hospital facilitics without which, it can be understood, these departments cannot work éfficiently. It is interesting that these departments, all the same are imparting postgraduate training, resulting in the award of postgraduate degrees by the University. One can understand this, because the staff omployed have to justify their raison de etre. Evidently something, want aw at the planning stage of this Institute, and the stalemato, continues, reducing this Institute of Basic Modical sciences to perform its functions at a lovel which is even less than medioare, and through no fault of its staff.

It is not the purpose of this report to provide any roviow of the inheront flaws of the basic organisational

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structure of the postgreduate Instituto of Basic Medical sciences. This will require a soporato review conimittee and longor time of visit with appropriato torms of reforence. However, since the Comittec has to dofine priorities in the dovolopmont programes taking irto account limitod availability of funds, it bocones roleyant to recomand that inmediate stops be talken to mergo the two Institutes. This mattor should be teken up at tho highost leval on top priority basis. This will solvo at loast some of the problers facing the depertments of Fathology, Microbiology, Biochemistry and Pharmacology which together constitute more than half tho Instituto of Basic Modical sciencos. It this morgor is not possible on account of lack of politicol will, the UGC should use its good offices

- to convince the Univorsity of Calcutta to hand ovor the Instituto of Besic Medical Sciences to the Govorment of West Bengal. It is no uso sinking in, the UGC money morcly for the porpotuation of mediocrity. The altornative to this recomendation is tho building, equipping and staffing of a seperats bospital of the standard of postgraduate medical education and rasearch. This is a very expensive propositions, and the Gommitteo does not recommend it.
9.2 Non-practicing Allowanco:- The staff menbers enployed by the Postgraduate Institute of Basic Modical Sciences having medical dogrees do not get nonmpracticing allowance fithough no spocific instance of any amployco indulging in privato practice was montioned, it is undorstendablo that if any amployeo so chooses, ho can spond his time in privaté practice as thore would bo no logal or moral binding against it. No postgraduate institutc of basic medical scioncos cen deliver tho goods if the staff is not morally/legally bound to dovoto wholoutine attontion to the functions and duties required to be perfomed by then. There should bo a provisionifor giving non-practising allownce to all the omploycos holding nedical degros and explicitly forbid privato prectico. The financial implication for this will be woll undor Rs 1,00 leakh et the current ratos ( $30-10 \%$ of salary, not excooding hs $600 /-\mathrm{p} \cdot \mathrm{mb}$ ) and with the oxisting staff strangth. The rosearch follows and scholars arc creluded from this provision.
9.3 Gentral Facilities:- Even after 12 ycars of its inception this Instituto doos not have central facilities such as (i) a library (ii) an enimel housc, (iii) an illustration unit, and (iv) a workshop for repair and maintonence. The rosult is that each dopertrant is diverting substantial sums and managoment for theso ficilitios. Bosidos, some items of daily use (examplecistillation plant in Phemecology Department) which aro simple onouth to be repaired locally, have remained untended for a nuribor of years on account of the lack of repair facility.
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The advantages thet such fecilitios can provido to an institute of the nature undor reviow need emphasise. During the Fifth Plan period an adequate provision bo nado for providing such fecilitics. Financialitmplications vill require roughly a sum of is 8.00 lokhs (Rs 3 lakhs under first and Rs 2.5 lakhs, each in socond and third priority) to bo spont at onco (subject to a satisfactory solution of the problons of tha relation betweon the Instituto and tho Hospital discussod above) for purchase of mechincry and equipmont (in the total plan pariod), and about Is 3.00 lakhs ammally undor the recurront hoad to, moct the saleries and centingencios. The rough eelculations for the rocurring exponses have boon made in the following manner; and aro intonded to give a mocust start.

(B) Contingencios: Contingent expansos undor each head will be required e.g., for the enimal house to purchase animals, food, clonning matorial, cagg ropair etc., for illustration unit to purchase photographic papors, films, drawing papor, inks, slide bindors etc., and similerly matorials for workghop. It is estimeted that even if bogun on a modest scaloy, it will amount to. a totaliof about Rs 30,000/-undor: second priority.
(c) Contingencies for Library: For the library, regular expenditure will havo to bo incurred for ptirchase of books and journals. Cost of the annual subscription of standard foreign journals is anywhere betweon 30.50 dollars (is 250-400). For some good journals like Journal of Physiology, or Index Modieus... otc. it is much morc. d. very modost estimate would be about

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100-120 journals to be subscribed and about $500-800$ books to be addod ennuelly. Investiment on books in the beginning shall heve to be more. Expensus will bo requirod for stationery, postage, and matorials for binding otc. A total grant of is 3.00 lakhs (hs 2.00 lakhs undor first and Rs 1.00 lakh undur second priority) thorefore, is rocomonded.

Once such faoilities aro providod, tho oxisting soparato provisions under these headings for each dopartment would not exist. It also means that the itans of common utility oxisting in cech dopartmont for examplo journals and books aurrently accumulating in separato dopartrants should find due place in the Contral Library within consultation reach of ovary member of the Instituto.

It must be mentioned, howevor, that thesc vontures will have a bettor comofficiont of viability if the adjoining postgraduate Institute of Modical Education and Rosoarch and the Instituto undor roviow gets merged together thus onlarging the clientcle àspiring for these facilitios. Otherwise these contral facilitios may ronain undor used (for use only of 5 small dopartments). Thorofore, it is again omphasised that sufficiont political skill be employod at the earlicst to achieve this purpose.
9.4 Neen for an Administrative Head:- Tho Institute would also run bettor by having more coordination and botter liaison at the interdepartmontal level. It is advisable to create the post of a Diroctor under third priority with an office staff or some kind of central administrativo authority to ensure coordinetion for maximum utillsation of oxisting facilitios as also for kooping a chock on the departmonts becoming little kingdons, and for optimum working of the central facilities as rocomended in the report, Having such an adninistretitic set up may cost extra monoy but it will be wellworth on account of the saving it will bring by better coordination in the usage of existing facilitics.
9.5 Subjects of rescarch in the IBMS ought to bo nerrowed down to a few areas of excellence which should be tackled in depth. Nuraber of stuclonts should be limitod so that the oxisting facilitios ere not ovor-stretched. "The Institute could benofit from shortmerm appointmont of ominont sciontists as visiting frofossors against some of the vacant posts.
9.6. Department of Anatomy: The department has requested money for equipment, major items beirg electron microscope, cryostat, fluorescent microscope and accessories, refrigerators, air-conditioners, calculating machine, spectro-photo-fluorimeter; for staff and for books and journals, After making a due assessment of the type of research that is being carried on and the potential of the staff, the department may be provided money for the purchase of a cryostat, a fluorescent microscope with accessories and some other items like a refrigerator, and a calculating machine etc. during the Fifth Plan. Total allocation for the plan period may not exceed a sum of Rs. 1,50,000/- (Rs. 1.00 lakh under first and Rs. 50,000/- under second priority).

### 9.7. Department of Biophysics \& Biochemistry: There is no

 biophysics or biophysicist in this department as per the current understanding of what biophysics is. Therefore, the department should be renamed as the Department of Biochemistry. This department which is currently staffed by two lecturers and a number of research workers already possesses equipments like fir meters, superspeed'kyograph, deep freeze, refrigerated centrifuge Cryostat microtome, colorimeters, electronphoresis apparatus, spectrophotometers, etc. However, in the absence of the ex-Professor who was essentially a neurophysiologist and who has now left, this department clear cut tlirust areas for research do not yet seem to have been.. marked out.At present, there are only 3 r.D. students and 5 M.B.B.S. students studying for the Diploma in Basic Medical Siciences. The teaching and research activities seem to be at a lowebb. As these are full-time courses with no scholarship attached and no hospital. facilities attached, this department as well as other departments in this Institute are not able to attract good students. It is a pity that although right next door there is a huge hospital with postgraduate research laboratories but there is no official collaboration between these two institutes. Unless such a cooperation can be establised, the prospects for this department. do not seem bright.

The department of Biochemistry may be allocated Rs. 1.00 1akh for equipment under first priority and two Lecturers and two technical assistants under second priority.
9.8. Department of Pharmacology: This department too does not have a Professor. The present staff consisting of a Reader, three Lecturers and other research staff, however, seems to be quite enthusiastic in taking up research activities. The vacant job of the Professor should be filled up. It is recommended that a sum of Rs. 1.00 lakh be allocated under first priority to this department for equipment especially for a polygraph and its accessories.
9.9. Department of Pathology including Bacteriology: This department has two Readers and three Lecturers with research staff. Professor's host is vacant hore too. In the absence of a hospital,
these people have been doing research work in the fields of experimental pathology. The Fifth Plan period should see the implementation of following with regard to this department:
(i) Making two separate departments one for Pathology and the other for iicrobiology (bacteriology nane to be replaced by mi crobiology).
(ii) integrating with the parallel departments of the postm graduate Institute of Medical Iducation and Research and
(iii) filling of the vacant posts,

No recommendation for financial allocation is being made because no objective and worthwhile assessment is possible under the existing circunstances.
9.10. Dopartinent of Physiology: By and large this seems to be the only well run department of the P. G. Institute of Basic Medical Science with a Professor and Head of the Departient, a Reader and four Lecturers with the usual complement of research staff. The department needs to be. encouraged. However, they need to have a more precise earmarking of thrust areas of researck. It is recom. mronded that a sum of Rs. 2.00 lakhs (fs. 1.00 lakh each in first and second priorities) be allocated to this departnent for equipment for the Fifth Plan period. The additional staff should be given according to the speciality areas required to be developed during this period.
9.11. Sumary: The following should be the targets for the Fifth Plan period:-
(i) Accomplish the merger of the Postgraduate Institute of Basic hedical Sciences and the Postgraduatc Institute of ... Modical Education and Rescarch. Create sufficient political will to achieve this end.
(ii) Croate administrative set- up which onsures coordination between departnents to obtain maximal utilisation of . existing facilities and to avoid under- usage of the available equipment.
(iii) Abolish private practice of the basic medical scientists.
(iv) Greate central facilities like library, iliustration unit, animal house and workshop for repair and maintenance. These facilities will be nore viable and economic if the nergor takes placc.
(v) Appoint an appropriate committee to review, evaluate and provide guidance for channclizing the research activitics into avenuos which arc most relevant to national needs. .
(vi) The recommendations for the departments which will be least affected by merger; i.e. Departments of Physiology and Anatomy', are given. These are also the bost of existing five departments. Some recommondations have been given for the other three departments, i.e. (i) Pathology and Bactoriology, (ii) Biochomistry (iii) Pharmacology.

Honc of these three departments enjoy the presence of a. Professor, and their development has been stunted. This, in a way, may be of adventage when many issues stemming from negotiations of merger will come up for solution on account of the extra legspace that becomes available to the staff miloyed in the P.G. Institute of iiodical Bducation and Research. The input into these departinents should be restricted till appropriato decisions about merger are made and the Professors and Heads talco up positions in their respective deoartments.

## 10. Establishment of New Departments:

10.1. Departnent of Sociology: The University of Calcutta has been teaching Sociology (two papers) as a part of Political Scienco since 1911. One post of Professor in Sociology was croated in 1955 with funds from a private endowent and A.A. syllabus of the subject was pessed by the Academic Council in 1958. However, in view of cortain difficulties a separate department of Sociology could not be established so far, and the post of Professor could not be filled up. The University of Calcutta as well as the students of Calcutta expressed their strong desire to have a scparate P.G. avtrn af sociology on the first priority basis.

It is recommended that as Sociology is one of the basic Social Sciences, it should be sanctioned by the UGC on first priorit, basis. It should function in very close collaboration with the Depertment of Anthropology which has now strong Social Anthropology bias. Horcover, in the proposed syllabus submittod. to us, it has a strong Social Anthropoligical bias. The Reader in Sociology currently working in the Departnent of Political Seionces may be.tronsferred to the proposed Department of Sociology and the post of Proiessor in Sociology available with the university should be fịlled.

The following assistance be made available to the universities by the T.G.C. for establishing departnent of Sociology during Vth Plon.

1. Teading staff: Readers -2 (one with specialisation in Social inthropology \& the other in Sociomotry) Iecturers - (2) (1 Reader and one Lecturer each in first and second priorities).
2. $\quad$ Is. $50,000 /$ under first priority.

and Rs. $10,000 /-$ under second
priority.
3. Furniture:

Rs. $10,000 /-$ (UGC Sherc) under first priority.
10.2. Foods and Mutrition Department, Home Science: Thore are 8 Lecturers with a background in Chemistry, Physiology, Biochemistry and Hone Scionce at Vihari Lal College of Home ficionce. Professor S.K. Iukherjee of the Applied IFutrition Departinnt of University college of icionce is also teaching in this collegc. Fron this yoar, they have started k.Sc. (Foods and lutrition) and adritted 15 students. Judging from the physical facilitios and expertiso available, it seems they have started this coursc in a hurry, before establishing a strong programe for uncergraduates.

This course may have a greater probability of suecess, if. it is run by a coordinating committee consisting of Professors of Biochomistry, Physiology and Applied Nutrition in the University College of Science, Basic Medical Sciences, the All India Institute of Public Health and the Home Science College. The students should get facilities for practical work in all these institutions.

The college should admit only 10 students per year and follow strict ily the syIlabus prescribed by the ICMP for Foods and Futrition courses in Home Science faculties in Aericultural Universities.

If this is possible, a staff of one Reader in Foods under first priority and one Locturer in Institution Menagenent under second priority and Rs. 1.00 lakh for equipment and Foods laboratories (Ris. 75,000/- in first and Rs. 25,000/- in second priorities) and Rs. 50,000/- for books under first priority may be sanctioned. This support should be conaitional, subject to the university taking steps mentioned carlier.
10.3. Life Science Contre: The Life Science Centre of the Calcutte. University was created in 1968 at the University's own initiative without any formal concurrence of the UGC though, beginning from 1971-72, the letter gave it an assistance of Rs. $18,000 /-$ p. a. for library and certain miscellaneous heads of expenditure. The Gomaittec was informed that the Contre has introduced a posteli.sc. course in Lifc Scionce from 1974 and has beon organising an integrated lecture course for postgraducte Bioscience students of the Calcutta Univorsity ; it has also organisod symposia and sumor institutes. Tho Life Science Centre has a small Iibrary and only one temporary lissistant on its staff.

The developmont proposals of the Life Science Contre during the Fiftly Plen period are to the tune of fi. 13,25,000/and include, as the first priority, recruitment of regular staff (Professor -1; Coordinator, Reader- 1, Lecturers -3; Rescarch hssistants-2 and Librarion -1) as well as construction of a building. The consolidated Fifth Plan proposals of the Calcutta University, however, include only the posts of Professor-1, Reader1 and Lecturers-2, besides rocurring expenditure of lis. 85,000/per annum and non-recurring expenditure of Rs. 5000/- for this Centre.

The Cormittoe noted that the Calcutta University already has woll esteblished departnents of Botany, Zoology and Biochomistry with long traditions of teaching and research and could visualize two possibilitics for the development of a Lifo Scienco Centre. The Centre could either cone upp and flourish as a neaningflul. collaborative cxercise botwoen these and some other departments (such as those of Physiology end Biophysics with its Electron Microscopo). or it may omerge as a totally now and scparate entify with its own building, oquipment, library and teaching and supporting staff. .

The second of the above alternatives would anount to unnecessary duplication of the facilitics and would seen to be a difficult proposition in view of meagre resourcos available. The Comittee, therofore, actively considered the first possibilitythe development of a Life Science Centre through the collaboration of various departaients with a maximun utilisation of the facilities already available with them and hold prolonged discussions on the question with tire toachers of these departments. Should such on idea have taken a concroto shape, it would perhaps have been worthwhile to chennelize some funds for its promotion. liowever, it appeared that the concorned dopartaents were rother lukewam to the idea of pooling their resources for the purpose.

In theultimate analysis, thoreforc, the committee takes the view that the present thinking of the University behind the development of the Life Science Centre is notilkolyto take it fer. Consequently, it does not feel inclined to recornend the develop ment proposals of this Centre in their present form. However, the committee would recomend collaborative teaching and research prosrames anong the departments concerned so that a more meaningful proposal for the developnent of a Life Science Centre nay develop. in due course.
10.4. Department of Oceanography \& Meteriology: The Committoe found no interest in this proposal during its discussion in the existing relavant departnents and therefore does not recommend the starting of such a new department during the Vth Plan period in view of limitetion of resóurces.

## 11. Miscellaneous Schemes:

11.1. University Printing Press: The printing pross was set up, in 1912. It has a total staff of 207 persons including 118 technical persomel. The machinery is mostly out-dated ond out-moded. The total valuo of the types in use is estimated to be R. 5.00 lakhs. The annual turnover is about is. 10.00 lakhs. The press has printed a number oi stendard books, research works and toxtmbooks. Every year, about 15000 to 20000 copies each of 10 to 12 title are printed.
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The University has proposed extension of the builaing and purchase of machincry in its Fifth Plan development proposals. The Comrittee was rather disappointed to note that the press has not been organiscd on a comercial basis and is said to be running at a loss. The press had an income of alout Rs. 3.50 lakhs per year during 1971-72 to 1973-74 whereas its expenditure has been about Rs. 13.00 lokhs per year of which about R. 10.5 lekhs is spent on payment of salary etc. to the staff. It is not understood how the Press is ruming at a loss since the entire examination work is being undertaken by the press and a large number of copies of the books are also brought out every year. In case the cost of printing has gone up owing to the out-dated machines, the University should have replaced these machines either by ploughing beck the profits or by utilising the depreciation fund, The Comittce was informed that the depreciation fund has been uscd for paying the selaries of the staff. The Comittee was not happy at this situetion. The Press has not been properly managed and accounts have not been mointained. The annual balance-sheets were not availeble. In view of this situation as well as in the absence of annual balancesheets indicating the profit and loss position, the Comaittee does not feel inclined to recommend any assistance for the Press.

The Comittec would, however, like to suggest that the. press budget and financial transactions should bo separately recorded and attempts should be made to register the Calcutta University Press as the Private Limited Co., under the Company Let, 1956 so as to provide functional autonony to enable it to run on sound lines. This form of organisation has recently been edopted by most of the university pressess in Western World like, Qlaradon Press (Oxford University), Rottardown Press etc. This will enable the pross to pay incentives and other bonus to its workers and will bring the pross within the framework of industrial legislation for providing various social security benefits to the workers. The share capital of the press may be provided by the Colcutta University and ottonpts should also be made to get quality participation and loans from State agencies, like West Bengal Industrial Keconstru ction Corporetion, the State Finance Corporation, the various nationalisod banks functioning in the state. The Calcutta University will not have to pay for the sharo capital as it may bo allotted sharos in licu of the revalucd price of the present building, plant and mechinery and other estates. Organising press as a Private Limited Co., will also enable it to a.ttend to the business of printing and publishing of material from outside sources and. thus earn reasonable profits for contributing divident to the University's share capital and for ploughing brok retained camings. for modernisation and expansion of the press. Since almost all share capitel of the press will be owned by the Calcutta University, it will have the right to appoint the Diroctors and through them the staff. It will continue to have full control over the affoirs of the press through the board of Directors and as such the prescnt position of the University will not in any way be compromised under the IIrm organisation.

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11.2. Central Laboratory: In each campus (nomely Ballygunge and/Circular road compus and Basic Medical Sciences campus (subject to resolution of problems discussed cerlior) there should be a central instrumentation laboratory which will be in chargo of all equipment which cost morc than one lakh. This laboratory may be under the charge of an instamontation tochnologist in the grade of a Rocder/Profossor with throe technicions to assist him. Thesc posts may be epproved under second priority. This section may be given a contingency grant of Rs. $15,000 / \mathrm{m}$ per year. Tnis section can give a course in Instrumentation technology to all M.Sc. students, maintain 211 the costly equipment so that the students can go thore and use them and also get depertmental instrments such as colorimeter, pH meter etc. repaired. A rrant of Rs. 25.00 lakh (Rs. 15.00 lakh under second and Rs. 10.00 lorlh under third priorities) for equipment including accessories for electron lic-- roscope of Biophysics 'group which is to be-treated.as part of the Contral Instrumental facility.
11.3. Enimel Fiouse. For students taking subjects such as biology psychology biochenistry and home science, animal oxporimentation and/or study of animal behaviour should be part of the curriculum. To cater to these departments, on animal housc can be established. with a seniur person in charge. This may again be an independent soction with tho status of a department. It should be possible for this saction to mun appropriato courses for students from home science, psychology, zoology and biochomistry. This section can take the responsibility to breed animals and supply then accordingly to specification to the different departments. in amount of Rs. 1.00 lakh (fs; 75;000/- in first and Rs. 25,000/- in second priority) and the post of mimal lieeper under first priority may bo sanctioned for Animal House.
11.4. Control Workshop: It would be desirable to set.up a central workshop for the whole University consisting of olectrical, mechanicell and refrigoration divisions as well as glass blowing scetion. Rs. 2.5 lakhs for equipmont, Fs. $10,000 \%$ for contingencies, Rs. 1.00 lalk for shed under first priority and four posts of liochanics including Supervisior ( $t_{w o}$ under first and two under second priority) may bo approved for the Central Workshop.
11.5. Contral Librory: The Centrol Library of the University which was ostablished in 1937 is housed in a 10 storeyed building with a floor area of $80,000 \mathrm{sq}$.ft. (gross) distributod on 10 floors. Threc lakhs books are available in the Central Library and have beon stacked in $50,000^{S} q \cdot f t \propto f^{\prime}$ shelves in five stack floors covering an area of about $36,000 \mathrm{sq}$.ft. of floor area. The library has three reading halls for 700 students which occupy an area of 22,000 sq. ft. The library remains open for 13 hours ( $7.00 \mathrm{N}$.1 M . to $10.00 \mathrm{P} . \mathrm{M}_{\mathrm{s}}$ ) on working days and six hours ( 11.00 N. M. to 5.00 P.i.) on Sundays. The library is subscribing to 601 jourmals in Scienco and Tochnolow and 410 in inuminities and social Sciences. The budget estimates of. the university for 1975-76 indicate an exponditure of Rs. 8.91 lakhs on the library. In 1973-74, the University spent Re. 2.14 lokhs on
-been lying vacent for long and the Deputy librarian
books and R.s. 2.79 lakhs on journals. The library staff includes. one Librarian, one Deputy Librarian, four Lissistant Librarions and 128 Technicians and other staff. This doos not include 13 poste of technicol staff which cre lying vacont. The post of Librarion has alsol is officiating as Librarion since June, 1970. The library has four divisions, tho fcquisition Division has at prosent a staff of 8 , processing of books division, 16, Circulation and Fublic Rolation Division -55 and idministration Division-49.

The Fifth Plen proposal of the University for the development of the Central Librery includes ainconditioning of at least ono floor, reprographic facilitios, vaccun cleonors, establishment of binding unit and additional posts of one Deputy. Librarian, of issistant Librarians, two Cataloguers and three technical assistants.

It would be desirable to include students's representatives in the libramy comittee. Each canpus should have a cormon library Hall where a reasonable number of copies of standerd text-books, najor references in each subject and journalse sucil as chemicol. abstracts are kept. Each departnent should be allotted a separnto book grant and instructod that it should order two copies of importent books and references, one for the central library Hall and the other for the departinentel library:

The contral librery should be opened from moming 8.00 A.l. to 10.00 P.M. It should also have ancillary facilitios. The Comittee recommends a grent of is. 35.00 ladehs for books and journals for Central Library and Iibraries on different campus (fs. 15.00 ladchs under first and As. 10.00 lakhs cach under socond and third prioritics) and Ps. 20,000/.. for equipment under first priority including Xorox Machine. for Central Library. The University should also take irmodiate steps to fill up the post of Librarion and 13 posts of technical steff.
11.6. Extonsion of Science Block: The University in its devolop ment plans has proposed vertical extension of the Science Block building at 35 Ballygunge Circular Roed. It proposes to add two floors on the existing eastern block on an area of 17,600 sq.ft. , the total ostimetod cost of which including installation of lift would be about R. 32.00 lakhs. The University has 2 lso proposed horizental cxtension of the other science buildings at 92 Acharya Prafulla Chendra Road. It proposes to have a five floor additional building at the site of the Flydro-dynanic leboratory on an arca of $39,000 \mathrm{sq} . \mathrm{ft}$. at a total cost of Rs. 15.00 ladhs. The Comittee realises the need for providing additional space to the science departnents some of which are very much cramped. The Comaittoc, therefore, recomends that the proposal of the University for the extension. of the two science buildings may be accepted and assistance on usual sharing basis be provided to the University by the Comission. The total estinated cost would be about Is. 47.00 lokhs. The UGC ney provide P.s. 15.00 lakhs unücr first and R. 8.50 lakhs under second priority.

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11.7. Bxtension of Hunanities/Social Science Buildings: The University has proposed horizental extension of the education department building at 95 S. P.M. Road. The University proposes to construct a basoment for 4 storeyos with foundation for another six storeycs. The approxinete built up area for basement and four storeyes would be about $8,500 \mathrm{sq} . \mathrm{ft}$. and the cost is cstimated to be about li. 12.00 lakhs. The University has also proposed both horizental and ver-tical extension of the lincient History and irchaeology departnent building at llazara Rood. It proposes to add one floor to the existing three floors of the building on an ares of $4,600 \mathrm{sq}$.ft. at an estirated cost of i.s. 6.00 Iakhis and construcm tion of a four storoyed building on the adjacent vocent lond with strenger foundation to take another four storeyos at a later stago at a total cost of Ps. 20.00 Iakhs. The Comnittee recomends thet the proposal of the University be ascopted and the Comission may provide assistance for this purpose on usual sharing basis. Tho total estimated cost would be about R. 38.00 lakhs. The UGC mav, ${ }^{i}$ provide fse 9.50 lokhs each under first and scoond priorities.
11.8. Teacher's quartors: The University hes proposed construa tion of 32 quartors for teaching staff at CIT Plo't at Moniktala. The University proposes to have two blocks of four storeyed builating having an arca of $2,367 \mathrm{sq} . f t$. in cach floor and consisting of two three room flats in each floor. In addition, tho University peonoos to have another two blocks of four storoycd building having an area of $2054 \mathrm{sq} . \mathrm{ft}^{\prime}$. in each floor and consisting of two roon flats in each floor. The University would have to provide common service like construction of roads, sewers, tubewells and lighting arrongomonts for the teacher's hostel. The entire project is estimated to cost Rs. 30.00 Iakhs. The Comittee feels thet rosidential quartors for teachine staff are needed to attract persons from other states. The Comittoc, thercfore, recomends that the UGC may provice assistence for construction of 32 staff quarters on uisual sharing besis and rocommends a grant of is. 8.00 lakhs under first and Rs. 7.00 lakhs under second priority as UGC Share.
11.9. Student's Hostel: The. University has 11 men's hostels and 5 women's hostels which can aecomnodate 1127 male students and 301 fomale students. 623 seats in mon's hostcl and 245 seats in women's hostel are eamarked for postgraduate students while the rest are intended for undorgraduate students. The Universityidoes not havo any hostel specifically for research students. The research scholers in their neeting with the Comittee stressed the noed for providing a hostol cxclusively for then. The hostol facilitios availeblo for postgraduate students should also bo made availeble to rosearch scholers. In casc the University finds it difficult to provide rosidentiol accommation to research scinolars, the University may explore the possibility of establishing one more hostcl for students and the UGG mey provide assistance on usual sharing basis for this purpose if funds are available. The total ostimatod cost may be about fis. 8.00 lokhs. The UGC nay provide Rs. 4.00 Iokhs as its share under second priority.

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11.10. Sports Complex: The University has proposed establishment of sports complex at a totel cost of P.s 10.00 lakhs. The Comitituo feels that in view of the other inportent programios which tire university proposes to introduce for development of acadomic activities, the proposil for sports complox could be formulated and considerod under student welfare or any othor sinilar programe outside tho Fifth Plan ollocation.
11.11. Fellowships: liany departnents comploined about insufficient funds available for research fellowships. It ney be desirablo to allot 50 junior followships at an estirintod cost of is. 10.00 lakhs. In this connection, many rescarch students complainod that there is a difforence in the followship amount given by the UGC and the. University. It would be desirablo to. have a uniformity If the Univorsity does not have enough funds, thoy can reduce the number of fellowships offored instead of paying lovor anounts.
11.12. Faculty Improvement: For the improvanent of the Fraculty, the Comittec recomends that on mount of R. 5.00 lakhs may be provided to the University (hs. 2.00 lakhs each in first and second priority and Rs. 1.00 lach in third priority).
11.13. Vigitins Faculty: Alnost all the depertaents have speciol teaching and rescarch progromes to execute and would like to invite oxports/specialists as visiting professors on short-term basis. The Comnittec supports the idea, especirlly in those subjects/ specialisations in which suitable persons are not avoilable for appointmont on a pemonent basis. The Comittoc recomends that a provision of R. 5.00 lakhs may be approved for the purpose (ns. 1.00 lakh undor first and Rs. 2.00 lakhs each in second and third priorities).
11.14. Publicetion of Research Works: $A$ number of teachers in various departnonts arc interested in getting thoir research works published and require financial assistance for this purpose. The Comittce rocomends that on mount of Rs. 1.00 lokl each in second and third priorities nay be approved for the purpose.
11.15. Use of out-station research facilities: Every yoar, a number of toaciors and research students, especiolly those doing research in science subjects, have to go to other contres for getting their rescarch results anslysed. in amount of Rs. 50,000/is recomended for this purpose under first priority.
11.16. Extonsion Lecturos, Scminars, Exchange Programme etc: Tho Comittee recomends that an anount of R. 1.00 lakh each in first, scond and third priorities nay be providod to the University for orgenising extension loctures, seminers etc.:
