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1. HORTICULTURE AND FRUIT UTILISATION

· (i) Expansion of Multi-purpose Horticulture Farms

All the 11 existing Horticulture Farms and the newly established 18 Model Orchards (8 in Pithoragarh, 8 in Chamoli and 2 in Uttarkashi district) of about 5 acres each established at the Block Headquarters continued to function. Efforts were made to acquire suitable land for establishing Model Orchards at the headquarters of the remaining three blocks (2 in Chamoli and 1 in Uttarkashi). These orchards demonstrate horticultural activities at different areas of the district and extend technical guidance to the growers. The principal physical targets achieved during the year 1964-65 are noted below :

Besides, the farms and nurseries in the Pithoragarh district sowed 189.72 kg. of different vegetable seeds and 275.65 kg. fruit seeds and sold 69.852 kg. of honey during the year. In the Chamoli district 26.45 kg. of vegetable seeds was sown. At the farms and nurseries in the Uttarkashi district 2,243 Thalas were prepared and 1,243 pits dug for planting mother plants.

(ii) Horticulture Plant Protection Mobile Teams

All the existing 23 Plant Protection Mobile Teams (8 in Pithoragarh with 2 sub-teams at Munsiyari and Dharchula Blocks, 9 in Chamoli and 6 in Uttarkashi) provided in each development block for disseminating up-to-date knowledge about proper maintenance of old plantations continued functioning during the year. Besides, a Horticulture Plant Protection Unit has been set up at Pithoragarh. The principal physical targets achieved during the year are :

Besides, 18,398 thalas were prepared, 12,945 pits dug and 184 kitchen gardens established during the year by the Mobile Teams functioning in Pithoragarh district. In Chamoli district 10,996 thalas were prepared and 33,357 plants pruned by the Mobile Teams. The 6 teams functioning in district Uttarkashi established 1,156 kitchen garden, pruned 77,161 plants and made an area of 611.921 acres free from rat infection.

(iii) Community Canning Centres

All the existing 4 Canning Centres (1 in Pithoragarh, 2 in Chamoli and 1 in Uttarkashi) continued to function effectively. The three new Canning Centres sanctioned at Nala and Simli in district Chamoli and at Naugaon in district Uttarkashi during 1963-64 are expected to start functioning soon. Three more Canning Centres (2 in Pithoragarh and 1 in Chamoli district) have been sanctioned. The principal physical targets achieved during the year are noted below :

(iv) Mali Training

During the year under report 104 (64 in Pithoragarh and 40 in Chamoli) trainees received suitable training. In the remaining district of Uttarkashi no training could be imparted during the year due to the non-availability of suitable candidates at the present rate of stipend of Rs.40 per head per month. (v)(a) Long term loan and Grant-in-aid

This has greatly assisted the plantation of new orchards to improve the economic well being of the local people on a long term basis. A sum of $R_{s,2}$.00 lakhs ($R_{s.50,000}$ each for Pithoragarh and Uttarkashi districts and $R_{s.1,00,000}$ for Chamoli district) was sanctioned during the year.

(b) Grant-in-aid for transport subsidy

A sum of Rs.20,000 (Rupees 10,000 for Pithoragarh, Rs.6,000 for Chamoli and Rs.4,000 for Uttarkashi district) was sanctioned during 1964-65.

(c) Purchase and sale of fruit plants on "No-profit-no-loss basis"

A sum of Rs.80,000 (Rs.30,000 each for Pithoragarh and Chamoli districts and Rs.20,000 for Uttarkashi district) was sanctioned during the year.

(d) Grant of rewards to outstanding orchardists

The local people are extremely poor and have frequently found it difficult to switch over to the orchard plantation of their own volition particularly because this results in a reduction in agriculture income for the period taken by the orchard to start bearing fruit. With a view to attracting local people to increasingly utilise their land for plantation of orchards and thereby achieve long term economic benefits, it was decided to give some incentive in the shape of cash award i.e. first and second prize of Rs.200 and Rs.100 respectively at the district level and Rs.100 and Rs.50 at the Block level.

2. MINOR IRRIGATION AND FLOOD CONTROL SCHEMES

MINOR IRRIGATION SCHEMES

Minor irrigation schemes costing above Rs.15,000 executed by the Irrigation Department and the smaller schemes are executed by the Block agency under the control of the District Magistrates concerned. The Irrigation Department prepared a Revised Plan for Rs.55.84 lakhs (Rs.42.76 lakhs for Minor Irrigation and Rs.13.08 lakhs for flood control schemes). It is anticipated that work to the extent of Rs.13.533 lakhs would be executed through the Block Agencies and hence the total cost of the Third Plan under this sector is likely to be Rs.69.373 lakhs.

2. Minor Irrigation Schemes executed by Irrigation Department

(i) Pithoragarh Hill Channels Project (Estimated cost Rs.3,52,000) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on the project continued to make steady progress during 1964-65.

(ii) Uttarkashi Hill Channels Project (Estimated cost- 'Rs.3,90,546) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on the project continued to make steady progress.

(iii) Chamoli Hill Channels Project (Estimated cost-Rs.2,85,787) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on the project continued to make steady progress.

Fourteen schemes for district Chamoli, five schemes for district Uttarkashi and sixteen schemes for district Pithoragarh are under investigation and preparation of Preliminary Estimates at a total cost of Rs.37,83,514.

3. Minor Irrigation Schemes executed through Block Agencies

In the year 1964-65 works involving an expenditure of (i) Rs.3,19,200 in district Pithoragarh, (ii) Rs.75,000 in dis-

trict Uttarkashi and (iii) Rs.1,44,000 in district Chamoli was done on such schemes. Thus a total amount of Rs.5,38,200 was spent on these schemes in the year 1964-65 as against the amount of Rs.4,48,766 spent on such schemes during 1963-64.

4. Flood Control Schemes

Flood Control Schemes executed by Irrigation Department-(i) Uttarkashi Flood Control Scheme (Estimated cost-Rs.1,07,591) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on this scheme continued to make steady progress.

(ii) Yamunotri Flood Control Scheme (Estimated cost-Rs.1,02,579) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on this scheme continued to make steady progress.

(iii) Kedarnath Flood Control Scheme (Estimated cost-Rs.13,154) was administratively approved by the Government of India. The work on this scheme continued to make steady progress.

(iv) Flood Control Scheme for village Bagori, district Uttarkashi (Estimated cost-Rs.43,158) was administratively approved by the Government of India.

(v) Jauljibi Flood Control Scheme (Estimated cost-Rs.1,42,361) has been submitted to the Government of India, Ministry of Home Affairs for administrative approval, which is still awaited. The Irrigation Department has been authorised to take up the work in anticipation of the Government of India's approval.

Fourteen Flood Control Schemes are under investigation and preparation of Preliminary Estimates at an approximate cost of Rs.12,80,154.

3. FOREST AND SOIL CONSERVATION

(i) Soil Conservation

The scheme envisages the execution of soil conservation measures to check soil erosion. The programme was successfully implemented over an area of 1,070 acres during 1964-65.

(ii) Communications

The scheme envisages the construction/improvement of roads and installation/maintenance of telephone lines in forest areas of Uttarakhand Division. The physical target fixed for the year 1964-65 was almost double of the year 1963-64, yet work was completed per schedule. Details of physical achievements and expenditure incurred during 1964-65 are as under :

An expenditure of Rs.20,09,543 was incurred in the execution of the above works.

(iii) Forest Resources Survey

The scheme envisaged survey of Government forests to determine the occurrence and distribution of various types of trees, their enumeration and sampling to ensure that particular types of forest produce could be provided at the time of demand. Survey of 3,09,550 acres was completed during 1964-65.

(iv) Rehabilitation or Regraded Forests

The Uttarakhand Division includes a large area of Government Forests and private panchayati forest managed by Gaon Sabhas. Due to great demand for forest fuel for providing heat and cooking facilities forests, particularly those near the inhabited villages were indiscriminately damaged and little efforts were made to improve their stocking. This scheme, therefore, envisages a more scientific management of these forests and plantation of trees. Artificial and natural means are both employed in planting new species. The work has been taken in hand both in Government as well as civil forests. Plantation work was completed over an area of 505 acres in Government Forests. The report about the target achieved in civil forests is still awaited.

(v) Buildings

The construction and improvement of forest buildings which may serve as offices, residences and rest houses etc. is undertaken under this scheme. Up to the end of 1963-64, during current plan period, construction of 94 buildings and part construction of 49 buildings was done at the cost of Rs.8,45,645. During 1964-65, 97 buildings were constructed and an expenditure of Rs.6,22,188 was incurred.

(vi) Raising of Economic plantation

The planned development of country has greatly changed the pattern of forests products. It is now felt that apart from firewood and timber for the manufacture of doors, windows and furniture the forests must be able to provide a much larger variety of timber of economic and industrial importance. The present scheme envisages the plantation of such species. Plantation work was successfully completed over an area of 1,040 acres during 1964-65.

(vii) Fire Protection

Fire Protection measures are necessary to protect the forest wealth against the dangers of incidental fires which threaten the very existence of the forest areas. Cutting of 34 miles of fire lines was completed during 1964-65. Besides 8, Binaculars and 6 telephone machines, were also purchased.

(viii) Development of Medicinal Herbs

The scheme envisages supervision and collection of medicinal herbs by trained staff and also aims at stepping up plantation thereof. Besides maintenance of plantation over 33.5 acres done in the past three years, further plantation over an area of 16 acres was completed 1964-65.

(ix) Amenities for forest labour

The forest labourer had to work hard frequently under very difficult living conditions. The necessity of providing suitable shelter, drinking water facilities, first-aid and sanitary arrangement was, therefore, keenly felt. Eighteen hutments with drinking water and sanitary facilities were fully completed and 10 such hutments partly constructed during 1964-65. Besides shouldaries and medicine boxes were also purchased.

4. ANIMAL HUSBANDRY DEVELOPMENT

I. Veterinary Hospitals, Veterinary Dispensaries, Stockmen Centres and Mobile Dispensaries

The veterinary hospital at Dharchula, 94 stockmen centres (including 27 borne on the State budget) and six mobile dispensaries continued to function effectively. Out of 94 Stockmen Centres, 12 were established during the year 1964-65.

2. Intensive Animal Husbandry Development Centre

Six Stud Ram Centres, 14 Bull Centres, two Poultry Demonstration units and four stallion centres, continued to function effectively. In these centres 38 bulls, 140 Rams, 11 bucks and one stallion are located. The following table shows the number of animals covered, progeny born, cases treated etc., at the above centres :

In the two poultry demonstration units at Uttarkashi 10,610 eggs were laid, of which 1,816 eggs were sold for hatching purposes 'and 8,182 eggs for 'table' purposes while 589 were set' in the incubator out of which 214 eggs were hatched out.

3. Improvement of existing and establishment of new sheep Farm by providing foreign sheep

The five sheep farms borne on Animal Husbandry Department's budget continued to function. The sheep farm at Bangali in the Chamoli District borne on the Uttarakhand budget has now been fully established. Two hundred Rampur Bushier Ewes were purchased from Himachal Pradesh for this sheep farm. Six Rambouillet Rams have also been located at this farm. One new sheep farm was proposed to be established at Naitwar in the Uttarkashi District but it could not materialise due to prevalence of scabies among sheep near the site. Another site is being selected for this sheep farm.

The supply of sheep under the "Freedom From Hunger Campaign of the F. A. O." is still anxiously awaited.

4. Improvement of existing Stud Ram Centres and establishment of new Centres

All the 20 Stud Ram Centres (including 11 centres borne on State budget) continued to function effectively. These 20 centres include 3 centres sanctioned from the Uttarakhand Budget during 1964-65. In the 9 centres borne on the Uttarakhand budget there were 228 rams and 6 bucks at the close of the year. The following table shows the number of ewes covered, progeny born, etc:

5. Establishment of Poultry Extension Centres

All the nine poultry extension centres/Deep Litter Houses sanctioned till 1963-64 continued to function effectively. Five more such centres sanctioned during 1964-65 have also been established. Now the total number of these centres is fourteen. In Pithoragarh and Chamoli Districts 11,688 eggs were produced, out of which 8,982 were sold for table and hatching purposes.

6. Establishment of Cattle Breeding Farms

The Livestock Farm at Pashulok in Dehra Dun District continued to supply good quality stud bulls, sheep, mules, .stallions, etc., to Uttarakhand Division. It has not yet been possible to find a suitable site for the establishment of a cattle breeding farm in the Uttarakhand Division itself. Efforts in this direction are still continuing.

7. Subsidy and grant-in-aid for maintenance of Stud Bulls, Yak Bulls, Chamba bucks, donkey stallions and piggery development

(a) Stud Bulls-At present 126 bulls are operating; 62 in Pithoragarh, 54 in Chamoli and 10 in Uttarkashi. Stud Bulls will now be withdrawn from the Gaon Sabhas gradually, as it has been noticed that they are not maintaining the bulls satisfactorily. The bulls withdrawn from them will be maintained at Government Bull Extension Centres. Eight Bulls in Pithoragarh and 6 in Chamoli have been withdrawn from the Gaon Sabhas and the same are being maintained at the Government Bull Extension Centres. (b) Yak Bulls-The yak bulls unit in Pithoragarh District consists of 1 yak bull, 2 cows and 3 calves. Two more Yak bulls are operating, one each in Chamoli and Uttarkashi districts. The yak bull in Chamoli has covered 40 cows and the number of progeny born during the year is 34.

(c) Chamba Bucks--Two hundred and twenty-two Chamba bucks were purchased and distributed to interested breeders. Two hundred and eighteen bucks are operating in Pithoragarh District and 206 in Chamoli District. In all 3,033, goats were covered and 1,763 progeny born.

(d) Donkey Stallion-Two Bhotia Donkey stallions, one, each in Pithoragarh and Uttarkashi districts, continued to operate. In all 88 mares were covered and 16 progeny born.

(e) Piggery Development-This scheme has been introduced in Pithoragarh and Munakot blocks of the Pithoragarh District on an experimental basis. Two Piggery Units have so far been established and 6 boars and 24 saws have been distributed to Shilpkars (local Harijans) for the implementation of this scheme.

8. Development of pasture

A sum of Rs.0.80 lakh was distributed as grant-in-aid to Gaon Sabhas and Forest Panchayats for growing pasture trees and fencing the existing pasture lands. A scheme for the establishment of fodder nurseries in the development blocks is also under consideration.

9. Distribution of loan for sheep development

Two thousand and ninety-six sheep were purchased and distributed (673 in Pithoragarh; 643 in Chamoli, and 760 in Uttarkashi districts) at a cost of Rs.1.03 lakhs.

10. Distribution of loan for development of livestock

Under this scheme, a sum of Rs.1.04 lakhs was sanctioned for distribution as taqavi to intending purchasers of milch cattle among the local milk suppliers. Thirty-one Milch cattle were purchased and distributed among the interested breeders in Chamoli District and 92 in Uttarkashi District.

11. Publicity

Under this scheme, one-day livestock show is organised in each development block during the winter season. Twenty-one such livestock shows were organised during 1964-65.

12. Development of Fish Culture

Action is under way for the establishment of two Nursery Farms, one each at Baralu and Thal-Kedar in Pithoragarh. The possibilities of further development of Fish Culture in this district are also being explored.

5. COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Ten development blocks in Stage I, 8 in Stage II and 3 in Post-Stage II phase continued to function effectively in the Uttarakhand Division till the end of fourth quarter of 1964-65. High priority was given to Agricultural Production Programme including growth of potatoes and other vegetables and propagating the scientific methods of agriculture and use of Chemical fertiliser and manures in the blocks. Rabi Crop was good Great stress was also laid on poultry development programme and additional grant-in-aid was provided to interested breeders for the development of poultry farming in the blocks. Great emphasis was also given on the Minor Irrigation Programme and for providing drining water facilities to local people. Sufficient work was done under Communications Programme. Other approved programmes under "Health and Rural Sanitation", Education and Social Education and Rural Arts, Crafts and Industries" were undertaken in the blocks in accordance with the scope and needs of the people, and in conformity with the recommendation of the Block Development Committees of the blocks. Some of the important achievements made in the block till the end of 1964-65 are noted below :

6. POWER

The State Electricity Board have been entrusted with the execution of Power Schemes in the Uttarakhand Division. For the speedy development of Uttarakhand Division under the "Power Development Programme", the following power schemes have been administratively approved by Government of India and the work on these projects is continuing. The position of the various schemes at the end of the year 1964-65 is indicated below :

1. Pithoragarh Power Project-(Estimated cost-Rs.2,65,000) was completed in the year 1962-63. The Board sent a proposal to spend Rs.1,97,624 more to augument the present supply and this was sent to Government of India for approval. The Government of India have raised some technical objections which are being cleared by the Board.

2. Uttarkashi Power Project—Has been administratively approved by Government of India and technically approved by the C. W. P. C. The revised Project amounting to Rs.26.31 lakhs has been submitted by the Board which has been sent to Government of India for administrative approval.

3. Chamoli Power Project—Has been administratively approved by the Government of India and technically cleared by the C. W. P. C. at an estimated cost of Rs.14.83 lakhs. Revised Power Project amounting to Rs.26.05 lakhs was sent to Government of India for administrative approval. But Government of India have raised some technical objections which are being cleared by the Board.

4. Joshimath Power Project—The interim scheme has been completed. The fresh Preliminary Estimate amounting to Rs.22,52,300 has been received from the Board and sent to Government of India for administrative approval.

5. Guptakashi Power Project—The Preliminary Estimate at an estimated cost of Rs.15,50,000 has been sent to Government of India for administrative approval. The execution of the scheme has however, been sanctioned pending approval by the Government of India.

6. Badrinath and Kedarnath Power Project-The Preliminary Estimates have been sent to Government of India for administrative approval. The work on the scheme has, however, been started.

7. Power Schemes for Pipalkoti and Simlie in district Chamoli-Preliminary Estimates for Pipalkoti at a cost of Rs.41,428 and Simlie at a cost of Rs.37,087 has been approved by the Government of India. The work at each of the places is continuing. The State Electricity Board has prepared a revised Power Plan for taking up Schemes at 22 places and investigating 50 other Projects at an estimated cost of Rs.197.775 lakhs. The plan has been sent to Government of India for administrative approval.

7. DEVELOPMENT OF INDUSTRIES

(A) Mineral Development

The Field operation and investigation of Asbestos was continued and a sum of Rs.40,000 was sanctioned for purchase of equipments such as Portable Rock Drilling Unit, Microptic Theodolite, Chemical, glassware and tentage, out of which Rs.33,000 were utilized.

(B) Cottage and Small Scale Industries

Details of the progress achieved under various schemes are indicated below:

(i) Wool Development

(a) Carding Plant-Production of woollen goods is the chief cottage industry of this area. The carding plants set up at Dharchula (Pithoragarh District) and at Uttarkashi are used for carding departmental as well as private wool. The two carding plants carded 18,331.295 kg. of wool during the year 1964-65. Efforts are being made to procure a carding plant for Chamoli District also.

(b) Jal Charkhas-Thirty-four Jalcharkhas have been set up to promote fast and even spinning of woollen thread. They utilize water power available from the small springs for driving a shaft connected to 24 or more spindles to produce even yarn. Suitable carded wool is supplied from the carding plants. One thousand eight hundred and eighteen kg. of yarn was spun during the year under report. Buildings for all the thirty-four Jalcharkhas have almost been completed.

(c) Wool Production Centre, Bin, Pithoragarh-The centre has been established to assist the poor and indigenous weavers in the production of improved woollen goods to improve their earning capacity. Training facilities are provided to spinners and weavers. Efforts are being made to expand the wool production centre, Pithoragarh. Four hundred and fifteen spinners and fourteen weavers were trained during the year under report. 1308.749 kg. of yarn was produced at this centre. Cloth worth Rs.31,234.15 was produced and worth Rs.42,882.94 was sold there.

(d) Wool Utilization Centres-Six wool utilization centres continued to function satisfactorily during the year. In Pithoragarh District finishing has been done to the extent of Rs.3,115 and in Chamoli District weaving has been done to the tune of Rs.850.00 during the year.

(e) Finishing and Mobile Dye Houses-Sixteen Finishing and Mobile Dye Houses continued to function effectively. Technical advice was given to 228 local people with a view to creating interest in them for regular spinning and dyeing. Goods worth Rs.17,222.17 were produced during the year under report.

(e) Finishing and Mobile Dye Houses-Sixteen Finishing and the two set up during the year, 1964-65, continued to function satisfactorily. These sale-depots have been set up for sale of goods produced at various centres.

(ii)) Embroidery-cum-Knitting Carpet Making and Shawl Weaving Centres

The production of woollen goods by the women folk particularly amongst the Bhotias, has been widely popularised in respect of knitting, embroidering, carpet and shawl making. Twelve centres including one started under Tailoring-cum-Hosiery during the year 1962-63, continued to function effectively. Goods worth Rs.51,879.97 were produced during the year and goods worth Rs.26,106.18 were sold. Two Trainingcum-production centres in Namda Making have been established in Pithoragarh and Uttarkashi. In Pithoragarh eight persons were trained. Goods worth Rs.4,024.73 were produced and goods worth Rs.1,821.13 were sold.

(iii) Carpentary Centres

Two carpentary centres one at Bhuintala (Chamoli) and another at Uttarkashi were started in the year 1960-61. The third centre at Bin (Pithoragarh) was started in 1962-63. A subcentre at Naugaon in Uttarkashi has also been established. In addition, two such centres have been sanctioned during 1964-65, in this Division. These centres provide training facilities to local carpenters and manufacture furniture, wooden vessels, doors and windows, etc. During the year under report, sixty-six trainees received training in carpentry at these centres and furniture worth Rs.1,01,311.23 were manufactured during the year at these centres. The sale amounted to Rs.97,764.08 Paisa.

(iv) Service Centres for Farms and Agricultural implements and Metal Industries

The Division is famous for the manufacture of indigenous copper and brass utensils. The blacksmiths follow their agricultural implehereditary professions and manufacture ments like plough and sickles for local use. In order to organise this local industry on a more systematic pattern and to provide suitable training to blacksmiths, etc. two service centres one at Uttarkashi and another at Chamoli were set up during They have started functioning. The items like 1963-64. angethies, buckets, trunks, etc. are being manufactured. Goods worth Rs.6,331.71 were produced and goods worth Rs.5,886.20 paisa were sold at both the centres during the year under report. One more such centre at Pithoragarh has been sanctioned during 1964-65.

(v) Ringal Utilization Centre, Chamoli

Under this scheme two training-cum-production centres one at Bhintala and the other at Dhunarghat continued to function effectively. Articles worth Rs.1,668.70 were manufactured and sale to the tune of Rs.852.09 Paisa has been effected during the year. Ringal and wood work centre at Jauljibi (Pithoragarh) manufactured articles worth Rs.336.00 while the sale worth Rs.320.81 Paisa has been done during the year under report.

(vi) Award of stipends and scholarships to candidates [for technical training

This division does not provide any institution for technical and vocational training so far. Therefore, under this scheme stipends and scholarships are awarded to suitable local students to encourage them to join the technical institutions in other hill districts and the plains. An amount of Rs.58,920.00 has been awarded to the trainees receiving technical training in the various technical institutions and centres during the year under report. In all a sum of Rs.82,000 has been sanctioned for all the three districts under this scheme during the year 1964-65.

(vii) Loan for Small Scale Industries

This scheme envisages the distribution of suitable loans to the interested people for starting new small-scale and cottage industries in the three districts. This scheme is calculated to encourage employment of increasing numbers of local people. Out of an allotment of Rs.2,55,000 a sum of Rs.1,55,000 has been distributed to the private entrepreneurs and interested persons for the development of small-scale industries in this division during the year under report.

(C) Herb Development

This scheme continued to operate in the four border blocks viz. Dharchula, Munsiyari, Joshimath and Bhatwari. It is felt that systematic collection of herbs can form a dependable source of supplementary income to the local people. Domestication and cultivation programme under this scheme have accordingly been extended to nine development blocks (3 in Pithoragarh, 4 in Chamoli and 2 in Uttarkashi) at the close of the year 1964-65. With a view to providing technical know-how to the villagers through practical demonstrations, one demonstration unit has also been sanctioned to be established at the headquarters of each district.

In Pithoragarh District cultivation of herbs and other medicinal plants of commercial nature is being done in the three drug farms at Balanti, Quenti and Sirkha. 5.135 kg. herb seeds was produced during the year in that district. In Chamoli District the following drugs are under experimental stage and are expected to give better revenue to the department when they come to productional stage :

- 1. Digitalis Lanata
- 2. Digitalis purpurea
- 3. Atropa Belladana
- 4. Acconitun Hytrophulm
- 5. Phyrethrum
- 6. Hysomus Nigar
- 7. Metricares Chemomula
- 8. Acconitum Nappllinesis.

Besides, 55 Co-operative Societies participated in the herb development programme during 1964-65. 228.35 quintals of graded herbs were collected and marketted by 1909 drug collectors drawn from these societies. Under the two months' stipendary training programme 160 persons were imparted suitable training. 978 drug collectors were initiated in the techniques of proper collection, storage and marketting of drugs in specially arranged camps. 40 officials were given two months extensive training at Pharmaceutical Laboratories during 1964-65.

8. TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATION

The region now known as Uttarakhand Division had been most backward till the end of the II Plan period in the means of transport and communications. At that time there existed only 245 miles of motorable roads. Motor roads involved heavy cost in construction and a great deal of difficulty in maintenance. Even bridle tracks were inadequate and these too remained open only in fair weather.

It was realised that the success of any development plans chalked out for the region would be primarily dependent on the proper development of means of communications. Construction of 7 lateral motor roads known as the roads of economic importance was, therefore, undertaken immediately on the creation of the Uttarakhand Division in 1960. Then the Uttarakhand III Five-Year Plan was drawn up, under which maximum emphasis was laid on the communications scheme. Out of the total Third Plan outlay of Rs.28 crores, an amount of Rs.12.50 crores was earmarked for the Communications Scheme alone. Several road and bridge projects based on the felt needs of the area including the 7 lateral motor roads of economic importance taken together estimated to cost Rs.17.50 crores approximately were included in the Scheme under the Third Plan. It was envisaged that work worth Rs.12.50 crores approximately would be completed during the Third Plan period leaving a spill-over of about Rs.5 crores for the Fourth Plan.

Due to various factors not much progress could, however, be achieved during the first 2 years of the Third Plan period. By 1963-64 the entire staff having been put up in position, having gained adequate experience of the region and having completed all preliminary work, the work gained momentum and a high tempo was created. The work has since then been progressing at a commendable speed and efforts are continuing to cover up the deficiency of the first 2 years. It is to be hoped that the progress of work during the last year of the current Plan would be all the more heartening.

Besides, the Antarim Zila Parishad bridle roads and bridges in the entire Uttarakhand Division were in a bad state of repairs. The Antarim Zila Parishad had no finances to maintain them satisfactorily. A scheme to render an *ad hoc* financial assistance by way of grant-in-aid to the 3 Antarim Zila Parishads was, therefore, drawn up and grants amounting to Rs.2 lakhs during the year 1963-64 and Rs.4 lakhs during 1964-65 were released under this scheme.

One of the bottlenecks experienced due to which the progress was hampered was non-availability of road rollers and transport carriers. The 23 road rollers arranged for purchase during 1962-63 could not be received in full until close of the year 1964-65. Similarly sanction for purchase of 36 additional diesel trucks sought from the Government of India was not received during the year.

There also arose the problem of acute labour shortage. Local labour was far too inadequate to meet the requiremens of the heavy construction programme undertaken. Labour had, therefore, to be imported from outside the region to overcome the problem. They, however, in the beginning took some time to get acclimatised to the area. Special arrangements had to be made for supply of ration to the imported labour. There is also great shortage of cement. No tangible results could so far be obtained to get over this difficulty despite persistent efforts. It has yet to be solved effectively.

9. EDUCATION

Government Primary Schools-During the year under report only 50 Government Primary Schools were opened. This raised the number of such Primary schools in Uttarakhand Division to 416. The new primary schools have been provided with necessary teaching aids, equipments, furniture, etc. and fare functioning satisfactorily. Financial assistance for purchasing books etc. to poor and deserving students at the rate Rs.20 per school was continued.

Buildings-During the year 1964-65 construction of 50 new Primary schools (25 in Pithoragarh, 15 in Chamoli and 10 in Uttarkashi) was sanctioned. The expenditure on the construction of these schools, for the completion of the schools sanctioned in the last years and the repairs of the schools amounted to Rs.4,67,022 as detailed below:

Grant-in-aid to non-Government Primary Schools-Nonrecurring grant-in-aid amounting to Rs.5.77 lakhs was sanctioned to Antarim Zila Parishads Pithoragarh/Chamoli/Uttarkashi to enable them to meet the expenditure on employing additional teachers in the schools run by them to cope with the increased enrolment and also for carrying special repairs to old buildings and construction of new buildings for such schools in the same scale as adopted in the Government schools.

During the year the following steps were taken to encourage girls education on the analogy of the schemes included in the State Education Plan: (a) The school mothers were appointed in certain mixed primary schools to escort girl students from and to their homes and also to attend them during the school hours.

(b) In order to encourage women teachers to take up appointment in Junior and Senior Antarim Zila Parishad Basic schools located in rural areas non-recurring grant of Rs.9,395.00 was sanctioned to Antarim Zila Parishads Pithoragarh/Chamoli/Uttarkashi. This allowance was not sanctioned to teachers in Government Primary schools because they are already in receipt of Border Special Pay.

II. MIDDLE EDUCATION

1. Government Junior High Schools-During the year 1964-65 six new Government Junior High Schools were opened. In addition to these, 58 Government Junior High Schools also continued to function during the year.

A sum of Rs.15,400 was released for the purchase of 220 Allopathic First Aid Box in the Pithoragarh district, 100 boxes in the Chamoli district and 20 boxes in the Uttarkashi district. These Boxes will be distributed among the rural schools, Panchayats and blocks for treatment of minor ailments in the interior parts.

GRANT NO. 1

During 1964-65 six Eye Relief Camps were organised in the Pithoragarh district at a cost of Rs.6,000, six in the Chamoli district at a cost of Rs.10,000 and three in Uttarkashi district at a cost of Rs.10,000. A Jeep was supplied to the Eye Hospital, Sitapur to serve as Mobile Van in the Pithoragarh and Chamoli districts at a cost of Rs.20,800.

The permanent Eye Hospital at Pithoragarh continued to function. A grant-in-aid amounting to Rs.25,000 was extended for this purpose to the Eye Hospital, Sitapur.

One permanent Eye Hospital was planned for the Chamoli district also at Gopeshwar. An amount of Rs.98,000 was extended as grant-in-aid to the Eye Hospital, Sitapur for construction of necessary building for the purpose. The building is expected to be completed during 1965-66.

The Leprosy Units at Barkot in the Uttarkashi district and Dharchula in the Pithoragarh district continued to function. No addition was made to the staff. In the Uttarkashi district alone the following work was done by the Unit at Barkot :

Besides these 23 M. C. H. centres, five new centres were sanctioned one each for Simli, Mundoli, Basukedar, Mansoona and Chamoli in the Chamoli district.

Each of the centres is provided with one midwife (Rs.45–100), one Dai (Rs.22–27) and one sweeper-cum-chaukidar (Rs.22–27); Rs.100 for T. A. and Rs.1,000 for recurring-contingency. The scheme of Dai Training and financial assistance to trainees of Auxiliary Nurse/Midwife/Health visitor continued to function.

12. INFORMATION AND PUBLICITY

(i)) Field Publicity-This scheme provides for suitable publicity for the various development activities in the Uttarakhand Division, aims at promoting feeling of national solidarity and encourages the local people to take more keen interest in the efforts to improve their economic status and living conditions.

Film shows, Cultural shows, Meetings, Exhibitions, Publicity Camps, press conferences, etc. are organised and posters, leaflets and handbills distributed to publicise development activities. Four hundred and seventeen film shows, 503 public meetings, 339 cultural programmes, 40 puppet shows, 10 Kavi Sammellans, were organised and 199 press notes issued in the three districts of Uttarakhand Division during 1964-65. Besides 8,000 copies of booklets and pamphlets were also distributed. Small savings, Family Planning, Kharif and Rabi Campaigns are other items about which intensive publicity was made. With a view to stepping up field publicity one Jeep and two additional Cinema Units have been sanctioned for each of the three districts.

(ii) Community Listening-Most of the radio sets distributed in this Division continued to function during the year. The staff provided under this scheme made special efforts to keep the sets in order. Used dry batteries were promptly replaced and minor repairs of the sets was attended on the spot by the Radio Inspectors concerned. Efforts are being made to supply one community Radio Set to each of the Gram Sabha of the Division.

(iii) Publication-The Scheme provides for publication of suitable literature regarding the customs, manners, history and religion, etc. of the people residing in Uttarakhand Division. Twelve thousand copies of various booklets on the above subjects were published.

(iv) Information Centres-The three Information Centres set up at the headquarters of each of the three districts, 3 Tahsil Information centres in Pithoragarh and 2 Tahsil Information centres in Chamoli continued to function effectively. These centres are equipped with various magazines, journals, books, newspapers, etc. and are catering the needs of the visitors very successfully.

(v) Films and Photography-Two documentary films were produced by the Film Unit of Uttarakhand Division on the various aspects of life of the people and development activities being implemented there. Another such film was under completion. In order to step up production of such films one more Film unit has been sanctioned. (vi) Kisan Melas and Exhibitions-Cultural Programmes, exhibitions, etc. are organised in the important fairs held in the three districts of Uttarakhand Division. To encourage the people to take more interest in development work, mobile exhibitions are set up. A Godown costing Rs.8,000 was constructed in Chamoli District for safe storage of Mela materials.
