Pre-university department has academic section, which is headed by joint director (Academic), various programs/activities have been regularly chalked out under the supervision of the Director. This section Consists of two assistant directors and three section officers. The important functions of this section are as follows:

I PUC ADMISSION PROCESS:

The number of students being admitted to PU classes is increasing year by year. It is a very welcoming fact that majority of students are continuing their education. To encourage students to select the college according to their merit and aptitude the department has prepared uniform admission guidelines and at this same time instructs the colleges all over the state to follow these guidelines As a result there is impartiality and transparency in the admission process. Moreover, insisting the department is insisting the colleges to follow reservation norms strictly.

TRAINING:

It is generally acknowledged that promoting Lecturer quality is a key element in improving higher secondary education in any country. It is a proven fact, now, that systematic in-service lecturer training improves the quality of PU education programs and promotes students development. So systematic in-service

training, over and above lecturers formal education and experience, is a predictor of educational program quality. Without a doubt, one of the primary goals of the training policy of the PU education is to have a "highly qualified and trained lecturers in every classroom". The PU Education has been engaged in in-service training of Lecturers and Principals as a part of its mandate for the last decade. These are conducted throughout the state to support continuous professional development of the lecturers and the Principals.

- Since Department introduced new curriculum/syllabus in all 34 subjects as per NCF-2005. Training programs were conducted in 12 subject at Divisional/ District/Cluster level for all 9825 Govt. PU college lecturers during 2015-16.
- Mathematics Lecturers were deputed to attend a special training programme for õTeaching mathematics using GEOGEBRAö Organized by Regional Institute of Education (NCERT) at Mysore.
- 3. Biology Lectures were deputed to attend a special training programme for õDevelopment of ICT based TLMö Organized by Regional Institute of Education (NCERT) at Mysore.
- 4. One day training programme were conducted for 911 Principals in 8 districts on õAdministration and Academic Deliveryö with the help of Acharya college.

In addition, our department is giving away cash prizes also to sports talents i.e.. Rs: 20,000 - First place, Rs: 15,000 - Second place, Rs: 10,000 - Third place. Totally our department is giving due importance to co-curricular activities which are necessary for students to pursue better education and to develop overall personality.

The Karnataka (under-19)teams represented by pre-university board have won 38 Gold medals, 18 Silver medala and 20 Bronze medals and 76 medals. The Karnataka Swimming team members are the overall champions.

National social service (NSS):

National social service (NSS) program has been introduced in the year 1969 on birth centenary of Mahatma Gandhiji. This program has been started in order to inculcate social responsibility among the students.

However, NSS program has been started in PU colleges in the year 1978-79. Initially this program covered only 2000 students but at present, this program is introduced in all districts and in 780 PU colleges. As many as 78000 student NSS volunteers (both boys and girls) are working under this program.

In the year 2015-16 under NSS program the two important activities have been conducted they are as follows:

1. Daily activities:

Under this activity, every student volunteer has to render 120 hours of service in a year. This type of activity can be taken up in college premises or slum area or in any backward village. A student volunteer is expected to work in coordination with a village panchayath, youth organization etc.

1. Special camps

Every PU College having NSS wing has to conduct 7-day camp especially in slum area, in an adopted village, or in any backward village every year. During camps NSS volunteers normally take up activities like plantation, rain water conservation, play ground/toilet construction etc.

Through this program it is attempted to create awareness among the students regarding environment consciousness, literacy program, teenage problems, social service, nation building, health and sanitation, conservation of water, solar energy, rural employment guarantee program, fundamental rights, significance of blood donation understanding our constitution etc.
