PREFACE

AICTE was established as an advisory body in 1945, and subsequently as a statutory body by an Act of Parliament in 1987. Since then it has been striving to improve technical education in India.

AICTE started e-governance and on line submission of application for the approval of institutions across the nation. To further its progress, it also implemented online submissions for variations in sanctioned intake, extension of approval of existing institutions and closure of institutions, system of approval and so on. Transparency, efficiency and promptness in administration are the fruitful outcome of the e-governance.

The transformation was from a mere transaction level to a perfect process driven system based on rules and also subject to scrutiny and RTI compliant. The system is effortless, scalable, retrievable, secure and robust. It has earned the credibility and trust. This web based system is secured being utilized not only for various online applications and approvals but also the subsequent 'follow up' of the applications by the applicants. This system has furnished a reporting and analytical tool for AICTE. By notifications automated through email and online grievance reddressal mechanism were provided, this has further enhanced the stake holders confidence.

To foster the cause of transparency and accountability with its stake holders, AICTE is also currently implementing the workflow, accounts, electronic record, digitalization of records, security systems, and legal case tracking of applications; mail servicing and video conferencing across the regions of India.

Towards augmenting the quality and standards of technical education, the council equipped its faculty development programmes under various schemes such as Quality Improvement Programme, Career Award for young teachers, Emeritus Fellowship, Seminar Grant, Travel grant, Staff Development Programme, National Doctoral Fellowship, AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship and so on. The council also implemented Research and Institutional Development schemes such as MODROBS, Research Promotion Scheme etc AICTE – INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship (DVP), Research Park (RP), Innovation Promotion Scheme (TPS), AICTE – INAE –TRF (Teacher Research Fellowship). Employability Enhancement Training Programme (EETP) and Hostel for SC/ST Students for providing enhanced facilities and improved quality of technical education.

AICTE has also started schemes such as SAKSHAM, PRAGATHI, SAMVAY and KYC for the Community of students for their betterment. AICTE has also laid emphasis on skill development by funding community college scheme.

AICTE conducted Common Management Admission Test (CMAT) and Graduate Pharmacy Aptitude Test (GPAT) to reduce the burden of students in attending to multiple examinations.

AICTE has focused on quality by way of making NBA accreditation mandatory for expansion of capacity. With these changes, AICTE is forging ahead to provide excellence in technical education.

Introduction

1.1 PREAMBLE

All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) was set-up in November 1945 as a national level Apex Advisory Body to conduct survey on the facilities on technical education and to promote development in the country in a coordinated and integrated manner.

The Government of India (Ministry of Human Resource Development) constituted a National Working Group to look into the role of AICTE in the context of proliferation of technical institutions, maintenance of standards and other related matters. The Working Group recommended that AICTE be vested with the necessary statutory authority for making it more effective, which would consequently require restructuring and strengthening with necessary infrastructure and operating mechanisms.

Pursuant to the above recommendations of the National Working Group, the AICTE Bill was introduced in both the Houses of Parliament and passed as the AICTE Act No. 52 of 1987. The Act came into force w.e.f. March 28, 1988. The statutory All India Council for Technical Education was established on May 12, 1988 with a view for proper planning and coordinated development of technical education system throughout the country, the promotion of qualitative improvement of such education in relation to planned quantitative growth and the regulation and proper maintenance of norms and standards in the technical education system and for matters connected therewith.

The purview of AICTE covers programmes of technical education including training and research in Engineering & Technology, Architecture & Town Planning, Management, Pharmacy, Applied Arts and Crafts, Hotel Management and Catering Technology etc. at different levels.

1.2 THE ORGANIZATION

In accordance with the provisions of the AICTE Act (1987), for the first five years after its inception in 1988, the Minister for Human Resource Development, Government of India was the Chairman of the Council. The first full time Chairman was appointed on July 2, 1993 and the Council was re-constituted in March 1994 with a term of three years. The Executive Committee was re-constituted on July 7, 1994 and All India Boards of Studies and Advisory Boards were constituted in 1994-95. Regional Offices of the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India, located at Kolkata, Chennai, Kanpur and Mumbai were transferred to AICTE and the staff working at these offices were also deputed to the Council on foreign service terms w.e.f. October 1, 1995. These offices functioned as secretariats of Regional Committees in the four regions (East, South, North and West). Three



new Regional Committees in southwest, central and northwest regions with their secretariats located at Bangalore, Bhopal and Chandigarh respectively were also established on July 27, 1994. One more Regional Committee in South-Central region with its Secretariat at Hyderabad was notified on March 8, 2007. In addition to the Regional Offices, camp offices are also functioning in Guwahati and Thiruvananthapuram. The AICTE Trivandrum office was formally inaugurated on 09-02-2013 by Sri Oommen Chandy, Hon'ble Chief Minister of Kerla. The names of the States/UTs falling under the jurisdiction of the eight Regional Committees are given in **APPENDIX-1.1**.

The AICTE has its Headquarters in New Delhi and is presently housed in a building leased from the NDMC in the Chanderlok Building, Janpath, New Delhi. One bureau of the Council is housed in its own building having a covered area of 988 sq. mtr. at IV floor, East Tower, NBCC Place, Pragati Vihar, New Delhi. Due to lack of office space in Chanderlok Building, space measuring 11420.30 sq. ft in the Seventh floor in Mayur Bhawan in Shankar Market by NDMC have been leased, and renovated to house PC Bureau, RIFD Bureau, Distance Education Cell, IBA Cell, J.K. Scholarship Cell, etc.

The AICTE comprises of various Bureaus, namely, Approval Bureau, Planning and Co-ordination (PC) Bureau, University Bureau (UB), Administration (Admin) Bureau, Finance (Fin) Bureau, Research Institution and Faculty Development (RIFD) Bureau and Academic (Acad.) Bureau. Different Cells like Internal Audit, Anti-Ragging, Public Grievance, Information Facilitating Cell, CMAT & GPAT Cell, NSQF Cell, Complaint Cell, RTI Cell, IBA Cell, J.K. Scholarship Cell, Distance Education Cell, Vigilance Cell, Legal Cell and e-Governance Cells have also been constituted by the AICTE. Each Bureau/Cell is headed by an Adviser/Director, who is assisted by technical and other staffs. The multidisciplinary technical staff is taken either on deputation or on contract from various Government Departments, academic institutions, etc. Computers are appropriately provided to each bureau for work. These computers are networked through LAN for retrieval and exchange of information. Cleaning and maintenance, security, transport and hospitality are provided by agencies outsourced for the purpose.

1.3 HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

1.3.1 MEETINGS OF STATUTORY BODIES OF AICTE

The Statutory bodies, of the AICTE met periodically during the year under report i.e., the Council 3 times, the Executive Committee 3 times, All India Board of Studies 9 times, and the Regional Committees 36 times to deliberate on the significance of Technical Education in the country.

1.3.2 ADMISSION TEST

i) COMMON MANAGEMENT ADMISSION TEST (CMAT)

Common Management Admission Test (CMAT) for the Academic Year 2014-15 was conducted by the AICTE to cater to the needs of the aspiring students for Management Courses. A total number of 1,53,476 candidates appeared in this entrance test which was conducted twice in the months of September 2013 and February 2014. For the academic year 2015-16, entrance test was conducted twice in the months of September 2014 and February 2015. A total of 1,00,912 candidates from both the tests were declared eligible for taking admission in the Post Graduate Management programmes in AICTE approved Institutions/University Departments



For the first time, AICTE conducted Computer based online Graduate Pharmacy Aptitude Test (GPAT) in May 2013 followed by second and third online tests in February 2014 and February 2015 respectively. Students who qualify in the online GPAT are eligible for scholarship of Rs.8000/- p.m. to undergo M.Pharm Course.

iii) DEEMED-TO-BE /DENOVO DEEMED-TO-BE-/ PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES

On the request of UGC during the year 2014-15, AICTE has nominated a representative to be a part of the UGC team with a panel of Experts to assist the AICTE nominee to assess the physical and academic infrastructure for conferment of Deemed-to-be /Denovo Deemed-to-be-/Private Universities status and for reviewing the physical and academic infrastructure and performance of the existing Deemed/Private Universities. The visit to 37 universities has been conducted during 2014-15 and recommendations of Council along with Visit Reports have also been forwarded to UGC:

iv) UNAPPROVED INSTITUTIONS

The Council maintains a list of unapproved Institutions based on the information received from various sources and publishes for the benefit of general public on its website from time to time. A list of 343 unapproved institutions in the field of technology and other areas as on 31st March 2015 running technical education programs/ courses in Engineering, Pharmacy, Management, Hotel Management, MCA etc., without prior approval of AICTE has been published on AICTE website. A list of 116 unapproved institutions running technical education programs/courses in Architecture without prior approval of AICTE as on 31st March 2015 has been published on AICTE website.

1.3.3 NEW INITIATIVE AND SCHEMES

UK-INDIA EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH INITIATIVE PROGRAMME :

The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on 30th January, 2013 with British Council for mutual cooperation between two organizations. Under this initiative the AICTE in association with UK India Educational Research Initiative (UKIERI) is conducting a Leadership Development Programme to train 250 faculty members of various Technical Institutions in the country to become academic administrators

SAKSHAM : Under the scheme needy and meritorious students are provided scholarship amounting to Rs. 50,000 per annum as tuition fee and incidentals for pursuing Technical Education in AICTE approved Institutions. The total scholarship value is Rs. 5 crore/annum.

PRAGATI : The scheme is "Empowering Women through Education". Under the scheme a scholarship amounting to Rs. 50,000 per annum towards tuition fee and incidentals will be granted to girls, for pursuing Technical Education in AICTE approved Institutions. The total scholarship value is Rs. 20 crore/annum.

SAMVAY : The Skills Assessment Matrix for Vocational Advancement of Youth (SAMVAY) is a credit framework, aimed at promoting lateral and vertical mobility, is an effort to integrate skill and vocational development with mainstream general education



KYC: "Know Your College" is a portal developed for helping a prospective student make a valued judgment for selection of college for pursuing higher education providing the necessary information about the college.

E-Learning Centre For Technical Education (ELCTE):

The scheme aims to the use of electronic media, information and communication technologies in education. E-learning is broadly inclusive of all forms of educational technology in learning and teaching.

Skill and Personality Development Programme Centre for SC/ST Students (SPDP):

The scheme promotes of the centre shall be to provide opportunity to SC/ST students in the Institutes to reorient themselves in the light of emerging employment opportunities in Engineering undergraduate/ Diploma students at all level.

Project Centre for Technical Education (PCTE):

The objective of the Project Centre will be to provide the students with facilities in a common place within the University department where the students can have hands-on experience in various aspects of their learning.

1.3.5 GRANTS RECEIVED FROM MHRD FOR VARIOUS SCHEME

NEQIP SCHEME 2014-2015

As a follow up of the Scheme, AICTE also appointed Performance Auditors to assess the progress made by the individual NEQIP beneficiary institutions. The first meeting of Project Monitoring Committee (PMC) was held on 20th January, 2015 and 2nd Meeting of PMC held on 11th March 2015. Out of the 24 proposals evaluated by the Project Monitoring Committee in both the Meetings, with the approval of the Competent Authority, a total sum of Rs. 7,03,51,501/- has been released towards the 2nd Installment to the NEQIP beneficiary institutions during 2014-15.

1.3.6 RESEARCH AND INSTITUIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Through Clauses 10(C) and 10 (d) of the AICTE Act, the Council promotes innovations and research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies, to meet developmental requirements of the country and for the overall improvement of educational process.



Towards these ends, the Council operates three schemes, namely, Modernization and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROBS), Research Promotion Scheme (RPS) and Nationally Coordinated Projects (NCP). A total of 106 and 30 Proposals were released for financial support under MODROBS and RPS schemes respectively, during the financial year 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 207.79 Lakhs & Rs. 202.63 Lakhs respectively.

The projects thus sanctioned under the above research schemes are reviewed each year in monitoring meetings to ensure effective implementation of projects and proper utilization of grants.

1.3.7 FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

There are several schemes for faculty development, namely, Quality Improvement Programme (QIP), Career Award for Young Teachers (CAYT), Emeritus Fellowship, Visiting Professorship, Seminar Grant, Travel Grant, Staff Development Programme, National Doctoral Fellowship, AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship and financial assistance to Professional Societies/Bodies. Under the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP), faculty members of degree level institutions are given opportunity to upgrade their qualifications to Master's and Ph.D levels. Under the scheme QIP (Poly), polytechnic teachers can pursue Master's degree programmes. Courseware Development and other short term training programmes are also conducted under the QIP scheme. In the Emeritus Fellowship scheme, superannuated faculty members are supported for two years to continue research through grant of fellowships and contingency grants. Under the scheme of Visiting Professorship, reputed academicians and technologists provide required expertise to AICTE approved institutions. Financial assistance is provided to regular faculty through schemes of Career Award for Young Teachers, Travel Grant and Seminar Grant. The Staff Development Programmes help new teachers to further enhance teaching skills. Professional Societies/Bodies are also provided non-recurring grants for various purposes. The scheme of AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship jointly initiated by the AICTE and the Indian National Academy of Engineering (INAE) helps institutions avail expertise from experienced professionals from industry. The number of new programmes/activities sanctioned as well as fellowships awarded under various schemes of Staff Development during the year 2014-15 are given in Table 2.3. The details of each grant released under various schemes under AQIS during financial year 2014-15 are given in chapter 4, 5 & 6.

i) VISITING PROFESSORSHIP

The maximum tenure for the Visiting Professor is two years. Eminent scholars, superannuated professors and scientists from institutions of national repute are considered for appointment as Visiting Professors for AICTE approved Govt. and Govt. Aided Departments. The limit of funding is Rs.3,000 per day, for a maximum period of 12 -16 days per year and one professor per institution, maximum 3 months in a semester, open only for Govt./Govt. aided Institutes.

ii) QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMME (QIP)

During the year 2014-15, under QIP, AICTE has sanctioned and released Rs.948.00 Lakhs.

iii) CARREER AWARDS FOR YOUNG TEACHERS (CAYT)

During the period 2014-15 the Council received a total number of 197 proposals under CAYT and based on the recommendations of the expert committee a total of 13 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to sum of Rs. 43.35 Lakhs.

iv) EMERITUS FELLOWSHIPS (EF)

During the period 2014-15 the Council received a total number of 02 proposals under Emeritus Fellowships based on the recommendations of the expert committee, two meetings were held and none of the proposal was recommended.

v) SEMINAR GRANT

During the period 2014-15 the Council received a total number of 1209 proposals under Seminar Grant Scheme and based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 60 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to sum of Rs. 117.52 Lakhs.

vi) TRAVEL GRANT

During the period 2014-15, the Council received a total number of 168 proposals under Travel Grant Scheme and based on the recommendations of the expert committee a total of 15 faculty members of different Technical Institutes were offered financial support of Rs. 19.25 lakhs.

vii) FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAME (FDP)

During the period 2014-15 the Council received a total number of 2068 proposals for conducting Faculty Development Programmes and based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 78 proposals were approved for an amount of Rs. 430.06 Lakhs.

viii) SUMMER WINTER SCHOOL SCHEME:

During the year 2014-15, 85 proposals were received for Summer Winter School Scheme and 13 proposals were recommended by the Expert Committee amounting to Rs. 77.09 Lakhs.

xi) NATIONAL DOCTORAL FELLOWSHIP (NDF)

During the year 2014-15, 10 proposals were received and one proposal was recommended by the Expert Committee under NDF scheme amounting to of Rs. 7.83 Lakhs.



1.3.8 INDUSTRY INSTITUTE INTERATION

Under clauses 10 (C) and (f) of the AICTE Act, the Council promotes effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems, including industry and research community. For the purpose, the Council operates various schemes, viz, Industry Institute Partnership Cell (IIPC), Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDC) and National Facilities in Engineering and Technology with Industrial Collaboration (NAFETIC). The Council has provided financial assistance to 15 EDC cells and an amount of Rs. 19.76 Lakhs was released under the scheme during the year 2014-15.

1.3.9 OTHER GRANTS RELEASED DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2014-15

i) SC/ST HOSTEL SCHEME

Based on the recommendation of the expert committee, 2 new Proposals duly recommended for construction of SC/ST hostels and released a sum of Rs.200 lakhs and 2nd Installment amounting to Rs. 1335.99 Lakhs for the 17 existing SC/ST under SC/ST hostel scheme.

ii) INDIAN NATIONAL DIGITAL LIBRARY IN ENGINEERING SCIENCES AND TECHNOLOGY (INDEST)

Proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by expert committee duly constituted by the Council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, 20 new INDEST was given financial aid of Rs. 646.73 lakhs.

iii) POST GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP

Post graduate scholarship (PG) aims to provide financial assistance to M. Tech/ M. Pharm students having a valid GATE/GPAT score card. The limit of funding is Rs. 8000/- per month per student.



Statutory Bodies

2.1 STATUTORY BODIES

The Boards and Committees of the AICTE, the Executive Committee, ten All India Boards of Studies, eight Regional Committees are all of statutory nature.

The Council is a 51-member body and has a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Member Secretary with tenure appointments. The Council includes amongst others, representatives of various Departments of the Government of India, the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha, Govt. of States and Union Territories, representatives from the Statutory Boards and Committees of the Council, Professional Bodies and organizations in the fields of concerned areas of technical education and research and also organizations in the field of industry and commerce, etc. The AICTE Act empowers the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical education. The powers and functions assigned to the Council are given in **APPENDIX-2.1**. The Council performs its functions in consultation with State Governments, Universities, State Boards of Technical Education, Professional Bodies and experts etc.

The Executive Committee is a 21-member body constituted by the Council and discharges such functions as may be assigned to it by the Council. The Executive Committee is chaired by the Chairman of the Council and includes Vice-Chairman of the Council; Secretary to the Government of India; two Chairmen of the Regional Committees of the Council; three Chairmen of the All India Boards of Studies of the Council; one member of the Council representing the Ministry of Finance, Govt. of India; four members of the Council representing States/UTs; four members with expertise and distinction in areas relevant to technical education; Chairman of the University Grants Commission; Director of the Institute of Applied Manpower Research and Director General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research. The Member-Secretary of AICTE is also the Member-Secretary of the Executive Committee.

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in their areas of concern including norms & standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses etc. The areas of concern, constitution, functions and powers of the Boards of Studies are such as may be provided by the Council through appropriate Regulations. Initially, the AICTE Act provided for the establishment of five Boards of Studies. Later, four more Boards of Studies were added by the Council and subsequently one more Board has been added. Boards of Studies have 10-15 members each and are headed by subject experts of eminence. The Council is assisted by eight statutory Regional Committees covering different geographical regions. These Committees advise and assist the Council in all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their respective regions. Each Regional Committee has 15-20 members, headed by an engineer/technologist of eminence.



2.2 THE COUNCIL

On completion of the term of the previous constituted Council on May 20, 2011, MHRD advised AICTE vide its letter No. 1-24/2014-TS-TS-II dated January 05, 2015 to conduct meetings of Council with 18 ex-officio members and 15 members representing various organizations as per the laid down procedure. The letter of MHRD is given at **Appendix 2.2**.

2.3 THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause 12(1) of the AICTE Act, 1987, the AICTE had reconstituted the Executive Committee on January 12, 2015 for a period of three years. The composition of the Executive Committee is given in **Appendix 2.3**.

2.4 ALL INDIA BOARDS OF STUDIES

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in their respective area of concern including norms and standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses, academic facilities and any other academic matter from time to time.

In pursuance of the powers conferred under Clauses 13(1) and 13(2) of the AICTE Act, the All India Board of Studies were re-constituted by the Council for a term of 3 years. During the period under report, 10 meetings of All India Boards of Studies and 28 meetings of sub-committees/task forces were held for advising the Council in their areas of specialization.

2.5 REGIONAL COMMITTEES

According to Clause 14(3) of the AICTE Act, each Regional Committee advises and assists the Council on all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their regions.

In pursuance of Clauses 14(1) and 14(2) of the AICTE Act, Regional Committees were constituted by the Council at Kolkata, Chennai, Kanpur and Mumbai on April 18, 1990 and subsequently three more Regional Committees were set up at Bangalore, Bhopal and Chandigarh in the year 1994. One Regional committee was also set up at Hyderabad on March 8, 2007.

Each Regional Committee has 15 to 20 members from industry, technical institutions, universities, State/ Central government organizations and professional bodies/ societies working in the areas of technical education. Following Regional Committees with the Chairmen's mentioned below, except Southern Central Regional Committee were reconstituted vide notification No. F.No. AICTE/UB/RECONS.-RC/32-4/2014 dated May 19, 2014. 3.5 FOREIGN UNIVERSITY REGISTRATION

In supercession of the Regulations Notified by the Council vide Notification No. F. 37-3/ Legal (vi) 2003, dated 03rd April 2003 and in exercise of the powers conferred under Section 23 read with Clause (b), Clause (f), Clause (g) and Clause (n), (o), (p) of Section 10 of the AICTE Act, 1987, the Council made regulations for regulating entry and operation of Foreign Universities/ Institutions imparting technical education in India. This Regulation known as 'AICTE Regulations for Entry and Operation of Foreign Universities in India imparting technical education, 2005' were formulated primarily to check and avoid illegal entry of unscrupulous persons using/misusing the name of Foreign University/ Institution for unlawful gains. To safeguard the interest of all stakeholders, a public notice was issued in all leading newspapers on 5th May, 2005 directing the foreign universities operating with foreign universities/institutions based on media advertisement, directing them to comply with regulations 2005. These regulations were notified in the extraordinary gazette of India on the 25th May, 2005.

3.6 COMMON MANAGEMENT ADMISSION TEST (CMAT)-2014-15

National level online Common Management Admission Test (CMAT) was launched by AICTE in 2012 with an objective to lessen the burden of students attending multiple examinations. The initiative was taken to redress the issues of physical, mental and financial stress imposed on students by taking multiple entrance examinations conducted by various Institutes and State Governments across the country. This test has facilitated the Institutions to select meritorious students for joining Post Graduate Management Programmes and Diploma level courses in all AICTE approved Institutions/University Departments.

As a policy decision, AICTE conducts CMAT twice in a year with first test in the month of September/ October and the second Test in the month of February every year. The aspiring students can appear in both the tests and better of the two scores are considered for admission in the Management Programmes.

For academic year 2014-15, the first test was conducted for a period of five days from 26th September, 2013 to 30th September, 2013 in which a total number of 70659 students got registered and paid the fees for CMAT examination. However, out of this only 64534 candidates actually appeared in the test which was conducted in 61 cities across the country. The results were declared on 20th October, 2013. The second test was conducted from 20th February to 24th February 2014. A total number of 102688 students got registered for the test and paid the fees for CMAT examination. However, out of this, only 88942 candidates actually appeared for the test which was conducted in 62 cities for a period of five days across the country. The results were declared on 6th March, 2014.

Similarly, for admission in the academic year 2015-16, the first test was conducted from 25th September 2014 to 28th September 2014 and the second Test from 19th February 2015 to 22nd February 2015 in 62 cities across the country. A total of 1,00,912 candidates from both the tests declared eligible for taking admission in the Post Graduate Management programmes in AICTE approved Institutions/University Departments. The results of the first test were declared on 30th October, 2014 and that of Second Test on 25th March 2015 respectively. The All India merit list with rank and score secured were displayed on the AICTE CMAT Website for the purpose of effecting admission in the Post Graduate management programs both at Degree and Diploma level for academic year 2015-16.

3.7 COMPUTER BASED ONLINE GRADUATE PHARMACY APTITUDE TEST - 2014-15

Graduate Pharmacy Aptitude Test (GPAT), an all India Examination was launched by All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE), New Delhi with effect from the Academic Year 2011-12 for admission to The Master's Programme in Pharmacy (M.Pharm) and for award of Post Graduate and doctoral fellowships. Graduate Pharmacy





Aptitude Test (GPAT) -2010, 2011 and 2012 were conducted in 'paper pencil' mode by the AICTE in association with the M.S. University of Baroda, Vadodara (Gujarat). Considering success of the online CMAT, AICTE decided to conduct online Graduate Pharmacy Aptitude Test (GPAT) from 2013 for which huge response was received from the student community looking for admissions to the Master's Programme in Pharmacy (M.Pharm). Accordingly, AICTE conducted the first online computer based test in May, 2013.

The online registration window for GPAT-2014 was opened on 16th January 2014 and online test was conducted in 58 cities across the country from 25th February to 26th February 2014. In all there were 26763 registered and paid candidates out of which 25,062 candidates appeared for this online examination. The results were declared on the 15th March 2014. Qualified candidates were declared eligible for scholarship facility for joining Post Graduate Pharmacy Course. The scores awarded were used for national level admissions in the Post Graduate Pharmacy Program for the Academic Year 2014-15.

The online registration window for GPAT-2015 was conducted in 58 cities across the country from 23rd February 2015 to 24th February, 2015. In all there were 26,758 registered and paid candidates out of which only 25,062 candidates appeared for this online examination. Qualified candidates were declared eligible for scholarship facility for joining Post Graduate Pharmacy Course. The scores awarded were used for national level admissions in the Post Graduate Pharmacy Program for the Academic Year 2015-16.

3.8 DEEMED-TO-BE / DENOVO DEEMED-TO-BE-/ PRIVATE UNIVERSITIES

Universities including Private universities established by the State Legislations do not require prior approval from AICTE for starting faculties/courses. However, universities, deemed universities including the universities established by the State Legislature imparting technical education are required to comply with the norms and standards prescribed by AICTE from time to time.

In pursuance of the UGC letters for conferment of deemed to be university status to the institutions in the light of Ministry of Human Resources Development notification no. F. No. 2-1/2006U.3 (A), dated 5th April 2006 and as per provisions contained in Section 20(1) of the AICTE Act, a visiting team was sent by AICTE for on the spot assessment of these institutions. As per directives of the MHRD letter "AICTE will nominate a representative on the inspection committee of UGC; the person so nominated by the AICTE may; in addition, Head a team of the AICTE on the same day and such other person would not be part of the UGCs team but merely to assist the nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee. The nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee could give his or her report to the Chairman AICTE in the Performa prescribed by the AICTE and also on any additional point required by the UGC; which should then be forwarded by the AICTE to the UGC. UGCs Committee would incorporate the comments of the AICTE in its report before the Commission so that the Commission could take appropriate decision in the matter before making any recommendation to the MHRD. It has been felt that the above arrangement would serve the purpose of a de facto joint inspection while at the same time satisfying the requirements of the AICTE act regarding its own inspection. Such an arrangement would also ensure that the comments of the AICTE's nominee reflect adequately the comments of the Council and are not merely the individual perceptions of the nominee. This would also satisfy the directions given vide this Ministry's orders of the 5th April, 2006, wherein consultation with statutory Councils has been mandated before the UGC forwards its recommendations to the Central Government"

In view of the above direction of MHRD and on the request of UGC during the year 2014-15, AICTE has nominated a representative to be part of the UGC team along with a panel of Experts to assist the AICTE nominee



to assess the physical and academic infrastructure for conferment of Deemed-to-be /Denovo Deemed-to-be-/ Private Universities status and for reviewing the physical and academic infrastructure and performance of the existing Deemed/ Private Universities. The visit to the following Universities has already been conducted and reports forwarded to UGC.

3.9 UNAPPROVED INSTITUTIONS

All India Council for Technical Education has been established by an Act of Parliament (Act 52 of 1987) with a function among others to grant approval for establishment of new technical institutions, introduction of new courses etc. Regulations have also been notified by the Council with a provision that no technical institution shall conduct technical education programmes in Engineering & Technology, Management, Computer Application, Architecture & Town Planning, Pharmacy, Hotel Management & Catering Technology, Applied Arts and Crafts in India with or without Foreign University Collaboration without obtaining prior mandatory approval from AICTE. These regulations also have a provision for taking action against such unapproved technical institutions.

Provided further that any Institution offering Technical Program without approval of the Council, shall be termed as unapproved if

- It is started without prior approval by the Council
- It is working in temporary location / at location not approved by the Council
- It is declared as "Unapproved" by the Council



The institutions conducting unapproved courses have been directed from time to time through Public Notices and individual letters under intimation to concerned state government to seek AICTE approval for conduct of technical education programmes or to close down.

Provided further that any Technical Institution, which has already started without following AICTE approval procedure, wishes to submit an application / proposal shall be considered as new Technical Institution. For such purpose, they shall apply as per the provisions of Chapter I of Approval Process Handbook.

Its legal date of starting will be from the date of issue of the Letter of Approval. Students, who are admitted prior to approval by the Council, will not have any right for re-admission and will have to fulfill all the requirements for admission as prescribed by the competent admission authority.

The representation submitted by the institutions in response to the AICTE letters furnishing clarification and justification for removal of their name from the list of unapproved institution are being examined by a Hearing Committee and based on recommendations of this committee the names of suitable/eligible institutions are being removed from the list.

The Council maintains a list of unapproved Institutions based on the information received from various sources and publishes for the benefit of general public on its website from time to time. A list of 343 and 116 unapproved institutions in Technology & other areas and Architecture Institutes respectively, as on 31st March 2015 running technical education programs/ courses without prior approval of AICTE has been published on AICTE website.

3.10 NEQIP SCHEME 2014-2015

After the release of first installment of Rs. 33.12 Crores to 24 eligible institutions including 7 (seven) at Degree level and 17 (Seventeen) at polytechnic level out of the total sanctioned amount of Rs. 132.48 crores under the AICTE-NEQIP Scheme (2013-16) during the financial year 2013-14, Mentors were appointed by AICTE to provide clear guidance on reforms, implementations plans, and remedial actions to improve performance of the Institutions. AICTE - University Bureau devised the Mentoring formats for the purpose and the Mentoring of the Institutions was completed in November, 2014.

As a follow up of the Scheme, AICTE also appointed Performance Auditors to assess the progress made by the individual NEQIP beneficiary institutions. The Data Auditing and Performance Review formats were devised at AICTE-University Bureau and the Performance Audit of the Institutions was completed in two phases i.e. by mid of January, 2015 and first week of March, 2015. Accordingly, in terms of the provisions of the Scheme, the Competent Authority approved the formulation of "Project Monitoring Committee (PMC)" for evaluating the assessment of the qualitative improvements achieved by the individual Institutions and milestones achieved to consider suitability of disbursement of the Financial Grant in Aid for the 2nd year.

The first meeting of Project Monitoring Committee (PMC) was held on 20th January, 2015 where 10(ten) Data Auditing & Performance Review (DAPR) Reports were evaluated by the Committee which was submitted by the Performance Auditors after their visit. In the 2nd Meeting of PMC held on 11.03.2015, the Committee evaluated 14 (Fourteen) Data Auditing & Performance Review (DAPR) Reports.

Out of the 24 proposals evaluated by the Project Monitoring Committee in both the Meetings, based on the Data Auditing and Performance Review (DAPR), the PMC recommended the release of 2nd Installment in respect of the Institutions who had submitted the Utilization Certificate and Receipt& Payment Account. With the approval of the Competent Authority, a Total sum of Rs. 7,03,51,501/- has been released towards the 2nd Installment to the NEQIP beneficiary institutions during 2014-15.





Research and Institutional Development

4.1 RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

Through Clauses 10(C) and 10 (d) of the AICTE Act, the Council promotes innovations and research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies, to meet developmental requirements of the country and for the overall improvement of educational process.

Towards these ends, the Council operates three schemes, namely, Modernization and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROBS), Research Promotion Scheme (RPS) and Nationally Coordinated Projects (NCP). A total of 106 and 30 Proposals were released for financial support under MODROBS and RPS schemes respectively, during the financial year 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 207.79 & Rs. 202.63 Lakhs respectively.

The projects thus sanctioned under the above research schemes are reviewed each year in monitoring meetings to ensure effective implementation of projects and proper utilization of grants.

4.2 SCHEMES TO SUPPORT RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

The Council operates the following Schemes for supporting Research and Institutional Development:

- i) Modernization and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROBS)
- ii) Research Promotion Scheme (RPS)

Implementation of MODROBS and RPS Schemes

AICTE invites project proposals under the above schemes and provides information through an advertisement and through its official website.

4.2.1 MODERNIZATION AND REMOVAL OF OBSOLESCENCE (MODROBS)

The main objective of the Scheme of Modernization and Removal of Obsolescence is to provide financial support to institutions to equip their laboratories with modern equipment/infrastructure facilities, keeping in view rapid advancements in technology. Institutions were provided funds for replacement of obsolete equipment with modern, state-of-the-art equipment to ensure quality of educational process. Funding for this scheme is limited to Rs. 20 Lakhs.

MODROBS: After an initial scrutiny at the Bureau level, the proposals are evaluated by a duly constituted expert committee. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, the Council approves grant-in-aid under the scheme.




During the period 2014-15, the Council received 2180 proposals under Modernization and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROBS) scheme. These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by an expert committee duly constituted by the Council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 42 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to Rs. 607.11 Lakhs for the financial year 2014-2015. Total 106 proposals were released grant in 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 207.79 Lakhs. Sanctioned proposals include the grant released to some of the new proposals (1st installment) and partial grant released (2nd installment) from the approved proposals of the previous years.


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
Fig. 4.1: Region wise Distribution of Grant (%) under MODROBS during 2014-15.

Zone wise distribution of projects sanctioned under MODROB scheme during 2014-15 are shown in Table 4.1 & Fig.4.1. State-wise distribution of projects sanctioned are given in Table 4.2 & Fig. 4.2 respectively.

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4.2.2 RESEARCH PROMOTION SCHEME (RPS)

RPS aims to create research ambience by promoting research in technical disciplines and innovations in established and emerging technologies. Research and development activities are considered as an essential component of higher education because of their role in creating new knowledge and insight and imparting excitement and dynamism to the educational process, as well as make them need based in view



of the national requirements. The objective of this scheme is to create and update the general research capabilities of the faculty members of the various Technical Institutes. Institutions are provided funds for this scheme limited to Rs.25 lakhs.

Research Promotion Scheme (RPS):


During the period 2014-15, the Council received 2162 under Research Promotion Scheme (RPS). These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by the expert committee duly constituted by the Council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 56 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to Rs. 788.9 Lakhs. Total 30 proposals were released grant in 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 206.63Lakhs. Sanctioned proposals include the grant released to some of the new proposals (1st installment) and partial grant released (2nd/3rd installment) from the approved proposals of the previous years.




Fig. 4.5: State wise Distribution of Grant (in %) utnder RPS during 2014-15.

Region-wise distributions of projects sanctioned during the year are shown in Table 4.3 & Fig. 4.3. Institutionwise distribution of projects sanctioned are given in Table 4.4 and Fig. 4.4. State-wise distribution of projects sanctioned under the scheme of RPS during 2014-15 is given in Table 4.5 & Fig. 4.5 respectively.

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Fig. 4.3: Region wise Distribution of Grant (%) under RPS during 2014-15.






4.2.3 NATIONALLY COORDINATED PROJECT (NCP)

The Nationally Coordinated Project Scheme aims to plan, co-ordinate and execute integrated R&D programmes, involving collaboration between several institutions, Industry and user organizations at national level for societal development programmes.

More specifically, the research ventures that may be considered within Nationally Coordinated Project Scheme include the following:

- 1. The research should be carried out at a national level institution in coordination with participating institutions having proven track record and sufficient expertise in the proposed area.
- 2. The lead institution must choose a person of eminence having relevant knowledge and expertise in the proposed area of research as the chief coordinator of the project.
- 3. The project should have financial participation from the participating industry (if any) to the extent possible.

The All India Council for Technical Education supports two categories of Nationally Coordinated Projects for Technical Education.

- i) Catering to important issues of national importance.
- ii) Catering to technical education development.

The funding limit is Rs.50 lakhs in 3 installments under this scheme.

During the year 2014-15, the Council received 01 proposal under NCP. These proposal was evaluated as per the approved procedure by an expert committee duly constituted by the council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, no proposals were recommended. An amount of Rs. 0.513 Lakhs has been released as a partial grant for one proposal recommended in the previous years.





Staff Development Programmes

5.1 AICTE-INAE (INDIAN NATIONAL ACADEMY OF ENGINEERING) SCHEMES

5.1.1 AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship (AICTE-INAE-DVP):

AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professorship Scheme is jointly executed through AICTE- Indian National Academy Engineering (INAE).

The Scheme envisages promotion of industry-institute interaction by facilitating the dissemination of knowledge through the expertise of experienced and knowledgeable persons from industry to integrate their rich industrial experience with technical education. The Distinguished Visiting Professor will be an eminent scholar/ expert in his/her field, working in an industry/ R&D organization.

The Distinguished Visiting Professor contributes by delivering series of lectures on the state of the art of the industry, industrial ambiance and problems etc. A Distinguished Visiting Professor further helps in the project work of the students by way of identifying, guiding and evaluating the projects. The project guidance done is either at the host intuition or at the industry under the supervision of Distinguished Visiting Professors and the local faculty. Further, the Distinguished Visiting Professors are also expected through their interaction with academic staff to act as a catalyst, towards an integrated approach and in curriculum development. During the Financial year 2014-15, no fund was released to INAE under the scheme.

5.1.2 AICTE-INAE-TG

An "AICTE-INAE Travel Grant Scheme" for Engineering Students to present papers abroad has been launched for enhancing the quality of engineering education in the country. The objective of the scheme is to provide partial travel assistance and registration fees to Bachelors and Masters Level engineering students for presenting a research paper in an international scientific event (conference/seminar/symposium/workshop / exhibition etc) in order to encourage engineering students to engage in research. During the Financial year 2014-15, no fund was released to INAE under the scheme.

5.1.3 AICTE-INAE-TRF

AICTE and INAE have launched the AICTE-INAE TEACHERS RESEARCH FELLOWSHIP SCHEME for Engineering Teachers for Doctoral Research in Central Laboratories in order to promote a research culture amongst the faculty in AICTE approved engineering institutions. Under this scheme, engineering teachers in AICTE approved engineering colleges/institutions shall be sponsored to pursue research in Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR) and Defense Research and Development Organization (DRDO) laboratories leading to the award of a PhD degree in



the chosen field of study. The PhD degree will be awarded by the concerned organizations of CSIR and DRDO. The period of association of the engineering teachers selected under this scheme will be a maximum of three years. The age of the candidate should be 35 years or below. During the Financial year 2014-15 AICTE has released Rs. 47.80 Lakhs to INAE under the scheme.

5.2 QUALITY IMPROVEMENT PROGRAMME (QIP)

With the objective of upgrading the expertise, qualification and capabilities of the faculty members of degree level technical institutions, the Government of India launched the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) in 1970, which is now being implemented and monitored by the Council. Since 2001, QIP has also been extended to the teachers in approved polytechnic. During the year 2014-15, under QIP-Non Plan, AICTE has sanctioned and released Rs.948 Lakhs for 36 centers (under 45 GIA). Approved QIP centers in India are listed in **Appindex-5.1-5.3**. The major activities under QIP include:

(a) Master's and Doctoral Degree Programmes

Under this scheme, faculty members of AICTE approved institutions are given an opportunity to upgrade their qualifications. Certain selected institutions offer Master's and Doctoral Programmes to faculty members selected under these programmes. Participating faculty members are paid scholarships and contingency grant by the Council during 2014-15.

(b) Short Term Programme

In order to upgrade the knowledge and skills to teachers working in different institutions in the country, AICTE provides financial assistance for organizing short-term training programmes (STTP) in emerging areas of Engineering & Technology and other disciplines through major QIP centers.


(c) Curriculum Development

The major QIP Centers are provided assistance to conduct workshops for curriculum development. This leads to Model Curriculum Development, which are used as base documents by many institutions.


5.3 CAREER AWARDS FOR YOUNG TEACHERS (CAYT)


The purpose of CAYT Scheme is to identify young talented teachers who have established competence in their area of specialization and promote their professional growth by enabling them to devote major component of their time in research and study. The award is for a period of two years and this period is to be devoted to work on a specified project with a teaching load of a maximum of six hours per week in parent institution. During the period 2014-15, the Council received 197 under the scheme. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 13 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to Rs. 43.35 Lakhs for the financial year 2014-15. Total 15 proposals were released grant in 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 15.37 Lakhs. Sanctioned proposals include the grant released to some of the new proposals (1st installment) and partial grant released (2nd/3rd installment) from the approved proposals of the previous years.

The distribution of projects sanctioned during the year based on the Region-wise is shown in Table 5.1 and State-wise distribution is shown in Fig.5.1.

5.4 EMERITUS FELLOWSHIP

The Scheme of Emeritus Fellowship was launched during the year 1994-95. The main objective of the scheme is to utilize the services of meritorious and experienced superannuated professors in technical institutions for institutional development of existing and new emerging institutes, in research and development etc.

The funding is limited up to Rs.6.00 lakhs per year and Rs. 50,000/- (contingency per year) with four installments (once in six months) up to two years for superannuated professors/ scientists of reputed Institutes. During the year 2014-15, 02 proposals were received, two meetings were held for and none of proposal were recommended. During 2014-15 an amount of Rs. 14.466 lakhs have been released for 03 proposals as partial grant of the previous years.



5.5 SEMINAR GRANT

The Scheme of Seminar Grant is designed to promote high standards in technical education by extending opportunities to academicians and working professionals by providing a forum for sharing their knowledge, experiences, innovations and inventions. The scheme provides financial assistance to AICTE approved institutions for organizing Symposia/ Conferences/ Seminars /Workshops at national and international levels in various fields of technical education.


During the year 2014-15, 1209 proposals were received. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, a total of 60 proposals were approved for financial assistance amounting to Rs. 117.52 Lakhs. Total 169 proposals were released grant in 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 164.20 Lakhs. Sanctioned proposals include the grant released to some of the new proposals (1st installment) and partial grant released (2nd installment) from the approved proposals of the previous years.

Distribution of grant in percentile (%)





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Fig. 5.2: Region wise Distribution of Proposals under Seminar Grant during 2014-15

5.6 TRAVEL GRANT

The Scheme of Travel Grant extends financial assistance to enable full time regular faculty from AICTE approved technical institutions for interaction at international level in Conference/Seminars/Symposia etc. The assistance provided on reimbursement basis, of actual expenses or Rs. 1.50 Lakhs whichever is less as incurred towards airfare, registration fee and perdiem allowance.

During the year 2014-15, 168 proposals were received and 15 faculty members of different Technical Institutes were offered financial support to attend international workshops/conferences/symposium amounting to Rs. 19.25 Lakhs. Grant for 01 proposal amounting to Rs. 0.64 Lakh was released during 2014-15 for proposal recommended in previous year.


5.7 FACULTY DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (FDP)

The Scheme is intended to provide opportunities for young teachers employed in AICTE approved technical education institutions for their induction-training and up gradation of their knowledge and skills towards effective teaching and delivery of knowledge to the students. The programme is proposed to cover areas such as Technology Policy, Industrial Policy, new concepts to keep pace with the changing technology, educational technology, and communication skills etc.




Fig. 5.4: Region wise Distribution of Proposals under Faculty Development Programme during 2014-15





Fig. 5.5: State wise Distribution of Proposals under Faculty Staff Development Programme during 2014-15

During the Year 2014-15, 2068 proposals were received and 78 were recommended by expert committee for conducting Faculty Development Programmes amounting to Rs. 430.06 Lakhs. The region-wise, state-wise & Institutions wise release of grant under Faculty Development Programmes is given in Table 5.4 & 5.5 and Figure 5.4 & 5.5 respectively. Grant released include some of the new proposals (1st installment) and partial grant released (2nd installment) of the proposals from the previous years.

Table 5.4: Region wise Distribution of Proposals under Faculty Development Programme during 2014-15




Fig. 5.6: Institutional category wise distribution of grant under Faculty Development Programme during 2014-15.

5.8 SUMMER WINTER SCHOOL SCHEME:

The scheme is intended to provide opportunities through AICTE approved Staff Colleges / Institutions for Subject training that enhances teaching skills to teachers employed in AICTE approved Technical Institutions to facilitate up gradation of knowledge and skill. During the year 2014-15, 85 proposals were received and 13 proposal was recommended by the Expert Committee amounting to Rs. 77.09 Lakhs. An amount of Rs. 8.55 Lakhs for 03 proposals recommended in previous years has been released as a partial grant during the year.





The scheme of National Doctoral Fellowship was launched during the year 2003-04. The main objective of the scheme is to attract highly qualified and motivated candidates to pursue doctoral degree and offer themselves for teaching positions in technical education system. The scheme also provided research support to bright young candidates for pursing exciting and innovative research in the field of technical education. The National Doctoral Fellowship (NDF) Scheme is discontinued from year 2010-11, though the candidates selected during the previous years for three year financial grant were continued for the same.

During the year 2014-15, 10 proposals were received and one proposal was recommended by the Expert Committee under NDF scheme amounting to of Rs. 7.83 Lakhs. An amount of Rs. 7.83 Lakhs for 03 proposals recommended in previous years has been released as a partial grant during the year.

5.10 VISITING PROFESSORSHIP

The main objective of this scheme is to supplement and provide expertise to teaching and research in those areas in which the host institution does not have expertise. The maximum tenure for the Visiting Professor is two years. Eminent scholars, superannuated professors and scientists from institution of national repute are considered for appointment as Visiting Professors for AICTE approved Govt. and Govt. aided Departments. The limit of funding is Rs.3,000 per day, Max 12 -16 days per year and one professor per institution, maximum 3 months in a semester, open only to Govt./Govt. aided Institutes. During the year 03 proposals were received and none of the proposal were recommended.



Industry Institute Interaction

6.1 **GENERAL**

Under clauses 10 (C) and (f) of the AICTE Act, the Council promotes effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems, including industry and research community. For the purpose, the Council operates various schemes, viz, Industry Institute Partnership Cell (IIPC), Entrepreneurship Development Cell (EDC) and National Facilities in Engineering and Technology with Industrial Collaboration (NAFETIC). The Council has provided financial assistance to 15 EDC cells and an amount of Rs. 19.76 Lakhs was released under the scheme during the year 2014-15.

6.2 SCHEME OF INDUSTRY INSTITUTE PARTNERSHIP CELL (IIPC)

The Scheme of Industry Institute Partnership Cell (IIPC) is operated by the Council to promote Industry Institute Interaction, that is, between technical institutions and industries. The main objective of this scheme is to establish Institute-Industry Partnership Cells in AICTE approved technical institutes/technical departments of Universities, which will act as liaison centers between industries and various departments of the institutes for mutually beneficial activities. To start with, in the first year, the Council provides financial assistance up to a maximum of Rs. 5.0 lakhs as onetime non-recurring grant and Rs. 10 lakhs as recurring grant to create Industry Institute Partnership Cells in selected technical institutes. It is envisaged that after 2 years these Cells will be selfsupporting.

The major objectives of IIPC schemes are:

- Maintenance, coordination and promotion of consultancy services.
- Establishment of proper links, coordination with departments, agencies and taking necessary action for promotion of consultancy services.
- Encourage internship programmes/student's fellowship programmes.
- Organize Industry Study Tour Programmes (ISTP) and liaison with concerned industries/ industrialists.
- Signing of MOU on behalf of the Institution.
- Generate funds from industry/other agencies for maintenance and development of the cell.

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• Assist Industries in obtaining tax incentives from GOI by supporting R&D programmes in the Institution.



- Maintain and distribute funds obtained from consultancy services, assist weak departments in the institutes/ universities from the funds generated through consultancy for strengthening of the University/Institute /Department.
- Invite experts from industry to participate in curriculum development and training from time to time in consultation with the Department/Institute/ University.

During the period 2014-15, the Council received 37 proposals under IIPC scheme. These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by expert committee duly constituted by the council and no proposal was recommended. An amount of Rs. 16.71 Lakhs for 06 proposals recommended in the previous years have been released as a partial grant during the year. List of IIPC is appended in **Appendix 6.1**.

6.3 INNOVATION PROMOTION SCHEME (IPS)

This scheme provides financial assistance to institutions for organizing technical projects exhibition at State/ UT level. The scheme intends to bring out practical talent among students by providing a forum for exhibiting their technical knowledge and innovations. This scheme also intends to exhibit this talent to industry in order to convert useful / innovative / commercially viable projects into products. This will also initiate interest in entrepreneurship activities or in registering for patents/IPR etc. During the period 2014-15, the Council received 25 proposals under IPC scheme. These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by expert committee duly constituted by the Council and 01 proposal was recommended amounting to Rs. 5.00 Lakhs.

6.4 RESEARCH PARK (RP)

This scheme provides financial assistance to institutions for setting up Research Park in collaboration with the Industry or group of Industries. Grant of Rs. 1 crore (per State/UT) shall be given under this scheme. During the period 2014-15, the Council received 07 proposals and no proposal was recommended by the expert committee duly constituted by the Council. An amount of Rs. 34.51 Lakhs was released as a partial grant to the proposals recommended in the previous years.

6.5 NATIONAL FACILITIES IN ENGINEERING AND TECHNOLOGY WITH INDUSTRIAL COLLABORATION (NAFETIC)

This scheme aims to establish National Facilities in frontier areas of Engineering and Technology in collaboration with industry for design, instrumentation, testing, manufacturing etc. in AICTE approved Institutions. During the period 2014-15, the Council has not received any proposals and no grant was released during the year.

6.6 ENTREPRENEURSHIP DEVELOPMENT CELL (EDC)

This Scheme was launched with a view to encourage students in AICTE approved Polytechnics and Degree Technical Institutions to consider self-employment as a career option, provide training in entrepreneurship through modular courses and increase the relevance of management particularly in the non-corporate and under-managed sectors. This scheme motivates to develop a support system for technocrats and entrepreneurs. The Entrepreneurs Development Cell set up under the scheme is expected to act as a tool to promote entrepreneurship and selfemployment amongst technical students as an attractive and viable career option.



The objectives of the Scheme are as follows:

- 1. To create an environment for self-employment and entrepreneurship development through formal and non-formal programmes.
- 2. To introduce the concept of entrepreneurship in curricula at diploma and degree levels.
- 3. To develop management personnel at appropriate levels for the non-corporate and un-organized sectors like education, rural development, small-scale industry etc.
- 4. To utilize the infrastructure facilities and technically trained manpower for development of noncorporate and unorganized sectors.
- 5. To promote employment opportunities.

With a view to fulfill the above needs, Entrepreneurship Development Cells have been established by AICTE in various Institutions and Universities. The activities that are visualized at the EDCs include Entrepreneurship Development/Awareness Programmes, Continuing Education, Skill Development Programmes, Quality Assistance, Support Facility for Entrepreneurship as a career option, Curricula Input on establishment of an enterprise & its management, Solutions for small business management & entrepreneurs and training & retraining of entrepreneurs.

During the period 2014-15, the Council received 2180 proposals under EDC scheme. These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by expert committee duly constituted by the Council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, 01 new Entrepreneurship Development Cell was recommended amounting to Rs. 4.58 lakhs. Grant to total 15 proposals were released grant in 2014-15 amounting to Rs. 19.76 Lakhs. Grant released include the partial grant released from the approved proposals of the previous years.

6.7 OTHER GRANTS RELEASE DURING THE FINANCIAL YEAR 2014-15

During the financial period 2014-15, the Council received proposals under INDEST, **SC/ST hostels** and **PG** grants schemes (passed out and DBT). These proposals were evaluated as per the approved procedure by expert committee duly constituted by the Council. Based on the recommendations of the expert committee, 02 new INDEST was given financial aid of Rs. 646.73 lakhs. During the year 2014-15, first installment to 02 new SC/ST



centers of Gujarat state was released amounting to Rs. 200 Lakhs and 2nd Installment amounting to Rs. 1335.99 Lakhs for the 17 existing SC/ST hostels was released. List of 63 SC/ST hostels is appended in **Appendix 6.3**.

Post graduate scholarship (PG) aims to provide financial assistance to M. Tech/ M. Pharma students with a valid GET/GPAT score card. The limit of funding is Rs. 8000/- per month per student. During the financial year 2014-15, Grant was released to pass out students as well as under DBT.

6.8 NEW INITIATIVE TAKEN

Five new schemes have been started by RIFD Bureau in the year 2014-15. These are as under;

6.8.1 E-Learning Centre For Technical Education (ELCTE):

The scheme aims to the use of electronic media, information and communication technologies in education. E-learning is broadly inclusive of all forms of educational technology in learning and teaching. E-learning is suited to distance learning, which becomes flexible learning and make a big difference in education. The centre would create e-resource facility to impart technical education (Engg., Architecture, Pharmacy, applied arts etc.) at all level. The aim is to enhance quality of institutions through sharing of resources and technical capability of lead institute. Under the scheme a total of 295 proposals received on line, evaluated and 4 of the applications have been recommended amounting to Rs. 167.48 Lakhs. Maximum limit of funding to the Institute under this scheme is limited to Rs. 50 lakhs for the period of 03 years.

6.8.2 Skill and Personality Development Programme Centre for SC/ST Students (SPDP):

The scheme promotes of the centre shall be to provide opportunity to SC/ST students in the Institutes to reorient themselves in the light of emerging employment opportunities in Engineering undergraduate / Diploma students at all level. It is to empower the SC and ST students by providing special skill trainings apart from regular study. To enhance the skills of Scheduled Caste (SC)/Scheduled Tribe (ST) candidates with help of modules on communication, personality development and proficiency in English language. It will boost the confidence of SC and ST students and provide them with better career opportunities so that their employability in the industry increases. Under the scheme a total of 209 proposals received on line, evaluated and 4 of the applications have been recommended amounting to Rs. 73.90 Lakhs. Maximum limit of funding to the Institute under this scheme is limited to Rs. 25 lakhs for the period of 03 years.

6.8.3 Project Centre for Technical Education (PCTE):

The objective of the Project Centre will be to provide the students with facilities in a common place within the University department where the students can have hands on experience in various aspects of their learning. These could be in works like fabrication, interaction amongst the students themselves allowing them to enhance their understanding in their respective disciplines of study. The project centre will also allow the final year students to showcase their project. The project centre will also allow the students to learn in developing and preparing academic projects which will include the initial stage to the final stage where the students can present their final project. Under the scheme a total of 213 proposals received on line, evaluated and 5 of the applications have been recommended amounting to Rs. 125.50 Lakhs. Maximum limit of funding to the Institute under this scheme is limited to Rs. 50 lakhs for the period of 03 years.




6.8.4 Scholarship Scheme for Girls (PRAGATI) Child:

Scholarship Scheme for Girls (PRAGATI) is an endeavor by AICTE to promote technical education at Degree and Diploma levels to a girl child. Scheme aim is to provide financial assistance for advancement of girls participation in Technical Education across India, in order to empower them with the knowledge, skills and self confidence necessary to participate fully in development process of the Nation. Under this scheme, 4000 girl children will be benefited every year with the restriction that only one girl child per family where family income is less than 6 lakhs/annum will be considered. The candidates will be selected on merit at the qualifying examination to pursue technical education from amongst such candidates and implemented by the authorized admission centre of the respective State Governments. The scheme envisages to provide Rs. 30000 or tuition fees or at actual whichever is lesser and Rs. 2000 per month for 10 months as a contingency allowance in a year until the duration of the course. The student should be admitted to a AICTE approved Technical Institution's/University Department Imparting Technical Education in Diploma/ Undergraduate degree level in the 1st year through centralized admission process of the State/Central Government. This Scheme has been launched scholarship on 11.11.2014. Under this scheme a total 4287 applications were received and 2764 proposals were recommended. Out of the recommended proposals, grant to 737 proposals (complete in all respects) have been released through DBT amounting to Rs. 251.29 Lakhs. State wise Distribution of Grant under PRAGATI scholarship scheme is given in Table 6.2.

6.8.5 Scholarship for Differently Abled Student (SAKSHAM)

All India Council for Technology Education (AICTE) has launched a scholarship on 11.11.2014 named as SAKSHAM for differently abled students to provide financial assistance to encourage/promote technical education at Degree and Diploma levels to differently abled students across India, in order to empower them with knowledge, skills and self confidence necessary to participate fully in development process of Nation. Scheme support to 1000 differently-Abled students to pursue technical education in a year. The amount of scholarship is, tuition fee of Rs. 30000/- or at actual, whichever is lesser and Rs. 2000 per month for 10 months as a contingency allowance in a year until the duration of the course. This scholarship is for those differently abled students whose family income is less than Rs. 6.0 lakhs per annum. The candidates will be selected on merit at the qualifying examination to pursue technical education from amongst such candidates. The student should be admitted to a AICTE approved Technical Institution's/University Department Imparting Technical Education in Diploma/Undergraduate degree level in the 1st year through centralized admission process of the State/Central Government. Under the scheme a total of 179 applications were received and 89 proposals recommended. Out of the recommended proposals, grant to 34 proposals (completed in all respects) have been released through DBT amounting to Rs. 10.83 Lakhs. State wise Distribution of Grant under SAKSHAM scholarship scheme is given in Table 6.3.

Vocational Education

7.1 NATIONAL SKILL QUALIFICATION FRAMEWORK (NSQF)

After the launch of National Vocational Education Qualification Framework (NVEQF) Scheme in October 2011, now National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF), a number of initiatives have been taken to formally integrate vocational education with the current conventional educational streams across school and higher education to provide an opportunity and incentive to students to explore a large universe of opportunities. NSQF allows cross mobility of students and their absorption in Industry with certain skills gained over a fixed period of time that enable them to acquire formal degree and higher skill so that they occupy higher level jobs in the Industry.

Apart from the above, the following initiatives were also taken up by the Council during the year 2014-15:

7.1.1 UK-INDIA EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH INITIATIVE PROGRAMME

The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on 30th January, 2013 with British Council for mutual cooperation between two organizations. Under the clause 5.1 of MoU up to 4 visits of Indian delegations comprises of policy makers in the field of technical education and institutional heads from the State Technical Departments will be conducted in every year for the duration of MoU i.e. November, 2012 to March, 2016.

Under this initiative the AICTE in association with UK India Educational Research Initiative (UKIERI) is conducting a Leadership Development Programme to train 250 faculty members of various Technical Institutions in the country to become academic administrators. In this regard a two member team from Dudley College, U.K visited AICTE under UK-India Educational Research Initiative Programme. The members of the team visited NITTTR Chandigarh and NITTTR-Chennai and different institutes in Delhi.

The programme will be delivered by a highly skilled team of trainers from Dudley College, United Kingdom. An advertisement towards the programme got published in leading newspapers for inviting online applications from the permanent faculty of AICTE approved, Govt. and Govt. aided Technical institutions having at least fifteen years of experience in the field of teaching/academia administration for participation in the further Education Leadership Development Programme.

The Council invited on-line applications for participation in the Further Educational Leadership Development Programme from Faculties of Govt. and Govt. Aided Technical Institutions under UKIERI project.



A total 556 applications were received on-line as well as from State Govt. in response to letter sent by Chairman, AICTE to Principal Secretaries of States requesting two nominations from the Institute.

All eligible applicants were divided in two cohorts.

The cohort –I consists of 133 candidates and cohort –II consists of 110 candidates.

7.1.2 PROGRESS ON THE AICTE -TISS MOU ON VOCATIONAL EDUCATION

AICTE on 27.03.2012 signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with Tata Institute of Social Sciences(TISS), Mumbai with an objective of research into vocational educational studies, on skill requirements and development in the country, building content for various sectors based on NVEQF (now NSQF), developing teaching methodologies and pedagogy, training the trainers, methodology for skill assessment and skill accreditation, creation of best practices document in vocational education viz-a-viz its relation to NVEQF(now NSQF).

The progress of project as under:

- TISS has introduced the vertical anchor to enable better control and provided dedicated focus to the respective industry sector. Vertical Anchors have been appointed in 6 verticals/sectors which covers Automotive, Travel and Tourism, Construction, HR and Sales, Retail Management and Media & Entertainment. Expected Numbers to HUB tie-ups by March 2014 is 33. Expected number of student enrolment by March 2014 is approx. 1000.
- 2. TISS –SVE shall be setting up the Centre of Excellence for the 6 verticals: The Centre of Excellence will be appointed earliest by Mid January 2014
- 3. Launch admissions: A few courses are ready to start by early February 2014 and hence the admission process will be launched tentatively by Mid January 2014.
- 4. Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP) application implementation: The application is scheduled to be ready for implementation by End January. The ERP data will be available to all concerned and appropriate access rights.
- 5. Vocation Aptitude System (VAS) Pilot testing of the test developed: Currently 8 tests have been developed for 4 trades i.e. Printing, Dialysis Technician, Welding, CNC Machine Operation. The internal testing is currently in progress. A pilot test will be conducted between January and March 2014. Between April and June 2014 the next steps of analysis of data, checking the reliability and validity etc will be carried out.
- 6. Completion of Content Development for the Generic Module of all the Levels as per the Community College Module.
- 7. Website re-design: The dynamic integration of ERP data to the website is in progress. This will be a simultaneous activity and will be completed in line with the ERP implementation process.

7.1.3 SKP/Technical Institutes Extension of Approval (EOA) under NSQF for academic Year 2014-15

In pursuance of the decision of the Cabinet Committee on Skill Development in its meeting held on 19th December 2013, Ministry of Finance vide its notification no. 8/6/2013-Invt. dated 27th December 2013, notified the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF). As per the notification all other framework including NVEQF would cease to exist and will be superseded by NSQF.

In view of the new notification by the Ministry of Finance, the Council decided to run the existing programmes approved under NVEQF by AICTE after aligning them as per the provision of NSQF.

In accordance with the above decision and decision taken in the meeting of the AICTE Executive Committee held on 30th May, 2014. The Executive Committee (EC) vide Item No.89.01.18 approved for Extension of Approval (EoA) to all Institutes/SKPs for the academic year 2014-15 under the NSQF Scheme.

7.1.4 Amendment in AICTE National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM) Regulations. 2013" (1st Amendment) :

The EC in its 85th meeting and Council in its 37th meeting held on 17th January 2014 has approved to give the benefit of parent company under which a section 25 company is formed for registration as NEEM Agent under All India Council for Technical Education [National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM)] Regulation, 2013

Accordingly the Gazette notification dated 27.02.2014 was issued as:

Registration as NEEM Agent under NEEM

AICTE has notified All India Council for Technical Education (National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM) Regulation, 2013 on 15th April, 2013 and invited on-line applications for registration as agents under NEEM. The registration as NEEM agent has been kept open throughout the year.

7.1.5 AICTE-CII Survey of Industry-linked Technical Institutions 2014 held on September 10, 2014

AICTE in association with CII is conducting Survey for linkage of Technical Institutions with Industry for the selection of "AICTE-CII Survey of top Industry linked Technical Institution 2014" The Council invited online application from all Technical Institution to participate in the Survey.

A Jury of experts scrutinizes the online application of institutes and shortlisted 38 institutes under 62 different disciplines. In order to verify the facility at colleges regarding its industry association and other information furnished by the institute in online application, an EVC is to be conducted in all institutes with two experts one from AICTE & one from CII.

An 8-member Jury met to deliberate over the computer-generated scores shared with CII by AICTE. The members present included Mr. M.S. Unnikrishnan, Managing Director, Thermax Ltd; Mr Sanjeev Lal, Vice-President, Tata Chemicals; Dr. Y.S. Rajan, Honorary Distinguished Professor, ISRO & Chairman, NIT Manipur; Dr. R. Prahlad, Former Vice-Chancellor, Defence Institute of Advanced Technology, Pune, Dr. R. Natarajan, Former Chairman of AICTE & Former Director of IIT Madras, Prof. J.K. Mitra, Faculty of Management Studies, Delhi University, Dr Amita Dev, Principal, Ambedkar Polytechnic, Delhi, and HOD, Dr. Vishnu Goyal, CS-IT Government Khetan Polytechnic, Jaipur,.

Dr Avinash Pant, Vice-Chairman, AICTE welcomed the Jury Members and briefly gave an overview of the third survey and the evolution over the past two years. He did not participate in the Jury process.

The Jury discussed in detail the various aspects of the evaluation parameters and processes. It also gave a number of suggestions for improvements for future evaluations. The Jury scrutinized the scores of the 223 institutes and selected institutes for the second stage of evaluation for each discipline and category separately.





The overall score trend in individual category was analysed to select the institutes for the second shortlist. In the categories where the top scores did not come up to the threshold of 40 out of 100 marks, no institute was shortlisted for further evaluation.

7.1.6 CONCLAVE ON ENTREPRENEURSHIP HELD ON 19TH SEPTEMBER 2014

In India, Entrepreneurship is receiving greater attention from policy makers and experts because it contributes to economic well being of nation by converting innovative ideas into commercially viable products and processes.

In order to discuss issues related to policies that need to be put in place for effective upbringing of the culture of entrepreneurship in educational institutions imparting technical education, a conclave of all the stake holders was held on **19th September**, **2014 at New Delhi.**

The conclave was inaugurated by Hon'ble HRM Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani. In the inaugural address HRM informed that Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) are ranked fourth on a list of fifty best Entrepreneurial undergraduate institutes in the world. The ranking was compiled by pitch book date; a US based private equity and Venture Company sharing the achievement at the conclave. She said that feat calls for further celebration as the IITs have been ranked higher than some of the best Ivy League Universities such as Harvard. In the study the research firm found that IITs has a total 264 entrepreneurs who have founded 205 companies and cumulatively raised \$ 3.15 billion. She further emphasized that the paradigm of education should be such that it is able to cross the knowledge with analytical skills and logical reasoning, helping students acquire skills and entrepreneurial quality.

The conclave was attended by senior functionaries including Vice Chancellors, Directors, Deans and senior Faculty Members from academic institutions besides participation of real entrepreneurs to share their success stories.



7.1.7 REVIEW MEETING OF COMMUNITY COLLEGE SCHEME- STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION HELD ON 30[™] SEPTEMBER 2014

The Council has granted 72 polytechnics in first phase to run Community Colleges Scheme to institutionalize National Skill Qualification Framework notified by Ministry of Finance vide notification No. 8/6/2013-Invt. dated December 27, 2013 under the Community College Scheme a student may get a Bachelor Vocational Degree completing 7 levels of training or a Diploma vocational after level-V. There is a provision of Community Skill Diploma (CSD) also after 5 years of training for such students who do not have any formal education.

A review meeting with the Principals of all the Community Colleges to whom the Grant- in-Aid was released during 2013-14 was held on 30th September, 2014, at India Habitat Centre, Lodhi Road, New Delhi, to ascertain the current status of the implementation of Community College scheme. A total of 72 Community Colleges participated in the meeting.

The aim of the review meeting was to have a proper briefing/interaction with the representatives of the institutes on working of the Community Colleges and to ascertain the difficulties being faced by them in implementation of the scheme.

The Chairman AICTE in his inaugural address, gave an over view on the basic concept of Community College scheme. He stressed that all our efforts should be made to make the scheme a success for promotion of skill development in the country. The points/apprehensions raised by the participants were clarified to their satisfaction. It was mentioned that such review meetings would be held in future also to know status of the scheme.

AICTE has so far launched 72 Community Colleges in existing AICTE's approved Polytechnics/ Institutions and 35 more proposals are under process (Total 107). Such Colleges will impart five levels of training with 1000 hours of learning of vocational and general education at each level.

7.1.8 Launch of new schemes on National Education Day 2014

Ministry of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India organized a function on the **National Education day on 11th November 2014** in the plenary Hall, Vigyan Bhawan, New Delhi. Hon'ble President of India Dr. Pranab Mukherjee was the Chief Guest and Smt. Najma Heptuallah, Minister of Minority Affairs was the Guest of Honor on this august occasion. The function was presided by Hon'ble HRM, Govt. of India.

During the function following new schemes of AICTE were launched:

- **SAKSHAM**: Under the scheme needy and meritorious students are provided scholarship amounting to Rs. 5 Cr per annum as tuition fee and incidentals for pursuing Technical Education in AICTE approved Institutions. The scheme is an attempt to give every young student who is otherwise specially abled, the opportunity to study further and prepare for a successful future. These scholarships will help one thousand children per annum to pay for college tuition fee every year in addition to receive Rs. 2000/- every month for ten months as incidentals each year.
- PRAGATI: The scheme is "Empowering Women through Education". Under this scheme, a scholarship amounting to Rs. 20 Cr. per annum towards tuition fee and incidentals will be granted to girls, for pursuing Technical Education in AICTE approved Institutions. The scheme is an attempt to give every young woman the opportunity to further her education and prepare for a successful future.







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- **SAMVAY**: The Skills Assessment Matrix for Vocational Advancement of Youth (SAMVAY) is a credit framework, aimed at promoting lateral and vertical mobility, is an effort to integrate skill and vocational development with mainstream general education. It is in the spirit of the Gandhian education priority for Samvay, where the thrust was on integrating mental and physical development by incorporating learning by doing, learning by observation and experiential learning. It is therefore, in the fitness of things, that it is called 'SAMVAY'.
- **KYC**: "Know Your College" is a portal developed for helping a prospective student make a valued judgment for selection of college for pursuing higher education providing the necessary information about the college.
- 7.1.9 Joint Task Force on Community College under India-US Higher Education held on 17th November 2014 at Taj Palace Hotel, New Delhi

A meeting of Joint Task Force on Community College under India-US Higher Education Dialogue was held **at Taj Palace Hotel, New Delhi** on 17th November 2014.

At the outset, the Hon'ble Chairman AICTE, Prof. S S Mantha has made a presentation on National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) and informed about the AICTE initiatives in respect of:

- A) Development of framework for mobility between skill & formal education
- B) Development of curriculums for 14 sectors & 72 specializations
- C) Development of credit framework

The US delegation responded by citing some "similarities" and "differences" in their system. Specific inputs from experience of Montgomery / Cape Card / University- kapi' olani/ Broward/ AACC were also discussed.









The Ministry of Human Resource Development in association with AICTE and UGC conducted a two days Workshop on **"Skills in Higher Education"** on 6th and 7th of December, 2014 at Vigyan Bhavan, New Delhi.

The Workshop was inaugurated by Smt. Smriti Zubin Irani, Hon>ble Minister of HRD, Government of India in the august presence of Hon'ble MoS for Human Resource Development Shri Upendra Kushwaha, Shri Satyanarayan Mohanty, Secretary (HE), MHRD, Ms. Vrinda Sarup, Special Secretary (SE&L), Prof S S Mantha, Chairman, AICTE, Prof Ved Prakash, Chairman, UGC and Sh Amajeet Sinha, AS(TE), MHRD.

The Workshop was attended by State Secretaries and their representatives, CEO of National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC), Vice Chancellors and other senior faculties from Institutes of Higher and Technical Education across the country.

Hon'ble HRM in her inaugural address shared new initiatives being taken by MHRD for reforms in the field of education. Hon'ble HRM informed that MHRD has launched "**Know Your College Portal**" a unique Portal having information about the existing Colleges and Universities. The portal is designed with an objective so that students may take decision regarding selection of College based on the information available on the Portal. Students have also been provided free access to 20,000 hours of video lectures on the Know your College Portal.

In order to provide access to education and quality education to all, MHRD has developed an open Learning Platform SWAYM. MHRD is also implementing the Skill Credit Framework, Skill Assessment Matrix for Vocational Advancement of Youth (SAMVAY) for empowering youth through Skill development. Hon'ble HRM further informed that the Ministry is working to evolve the ranking procedures for the Institutes and urged for inputs from the participants on the new initiatives of MHRD.

At the outset of Workshop, Sh. Amarjeet Sinha, Additional Secretary, MHRD, introduced the objective of the Workshop and the activities scheduled during the two days of Workshop. Sh. Sinha, AS (TE), further emphasised the need of the cooperation amongst all departments in order to successfully incorporate Skills in Higher Education.

The Chairman, All-India Council of Technical Education and Chairman, University Grants Commission in their opening addresses presented the salient features of the "Credit Framework for Skills in Higher Education, and the Choice-Based Credit System".









7.1.11 MoU Between AICTE and NSDC on 31st December 2014

AICTE signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) on 31.12.2014 for Alignment of "Community College" Scheme to Outcome based Trainings, Assessments and Certification on Qualification Packs (QP) and National Occupational Standards (NOS) under NSQF.



7.1.12 MoU between AICTE and ATDC

AICTE on 31.12.2014 signed a MoU with Apparel Training and Design Centre (ATDC) to use the ATDC Accredited Training Centers as SKPs for the Apparel and Textile Sector under NSQF for giving vocational training to students admitted under NSQF Program.

7.1.13 Global Innovation Expo-2015 held from 7th-13th January 2015 at the Vibrant Gujarat Summit 2015 at Gandhi Nagar, Gujarat

The Govt. of Gujarat organized the Vibrant Gujarat, 2015 Summit in Gandhinagar, Gujarat from 07th to 13th January 2015. The Summit was organized with an objective to give a platform for all States and companies of the country to network with one another, as also with other Countries and global leaders in all important sectors. A Global Trade Show was also organized as a part of the Vibrant Gujarat 2015 Summit. Govt. of Gujarat has also hosted Pravasi Bharti Divas 2015 (PBD) Event and Exhibition as a part of entire Summit. PBD 2015 organized from 7th to 9th January, 2015 whereas Exhibition was organized from 7th to 13th January, 2015 at Gandhinagar. In this PBD 2015 Exhibition was to highlight and showcase the important vision, activities and schemes of Government of India, including Space Mission, Make in India, Smart Cities, Namami Ganga, Digital India and other foresight accomplishments of Government of India.

MHRD requested AICTE vide letter No. M-11018/18/2012-CON(Pt.) dated 29th December 2014 to explore possibilities to participate and showcase latest achievements and developments in the Vibrant Gujarat Summit 2015 at Gandhi Nagar, Gujarat.

AICTE participated in the summit and showcased the initiatives of AICTE to meet the main objective of AICTE.

7.1.14 Workshop for Alignment of Vocational Contents Developed under NSQF with SSC held on 16th March 2015

To facilitate mobility from vocational to general education, and vice-versa, Ministry of Finance vide No. 8/6/2013-Invt. dated 27.12.2013 notified the National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) with objective to make qualifications more understandable and transparent.

AICTE has notified "All India Council for Technical Education (Grant of Approval for conducting Vocational Education Program, Community College course(s) and Skill Knowledge Provider under National Vocational Education Qualification Framework) Regulations, 2012" for granting approval to conduct Vocational Education Program, Community College courses and to register Skill Knowledge Provider under National Vocational Education Qualification Framework. The Regulation is under amendment in view of NSQF Notification.

AICTE has notified "All India Council for Technical Education (Grant of Approval for conducting Vocational Education Program, Community College course(s) and Skill Knowledge Provider under National Vocational



Education Qualification Framework) Regulations, 2012" for granting approval to conduct Vocational Education Program, Community College courses and to register Skill Knowledge Provider under National Vocational Education Qualification Framework. The Regulation is under amendment in view of NSQF Notification.

As per the provisions under NSQF Notification Sector Skill Councils which are industry-led national partnership organizations have been assigned the responsibility to bring together all the stakeholders from their respective sectors. Based on the needs of the industries in concerned sector, the SSCs are developing the NOSs and QPs for the various job roles in their sectors, and they will align the same to appropriate levels of the NSQF. In the event of there being no SSC for a given sector, or inability on the part of the SSC to produce the NOSs/QPs in a timely manner, this responsibility may be assigned by the National Skills Qualifications Committee (NSQC) to a relevant regulatory body or other entity having experience and knowledge of the sector.

Further, the competency based curriculum packages consist of syllabus, student manual, trainers guide, training manual, trainer qualifications, assessment and testing guidelines and multimedia packages and e-material are to be developed for each NSQF level for specific Qualification Packs (QPs) identified by the SSCs. This has to be done by such agencies as the Ministries/Departments, Sector Skills Councils and Regulatory Bodies may designate, or any other body, in accordance with the NSQF Notification.

AICTE with the help of experts has made detailed General and Vocational contents in 16 sectors with 71 specializations which are uploaded on the AICTE web-site at www.aicte-india.org/education/ vocationaleducation. The respective Sector Skill Council have also developed QP-NOS for following Sectors:

As per the NSQF Notification it is the role of respective Ministry Regulatory Bodies to develops competency based curriculum using the NOS and QPs developed by the respective SSCs.

Accordingly, AICTE has organized a workshop on 16th March 2015 at India International Centre (IIC) to align the Vocational Contents developed by experts under NSQF in accordance with NOS-QPS being developed by Sector Skill Councils (SSCs) as per NSQF Notification. The workshop was attended by AICTE experts and the experts from respective Sector Skill Councils (SSCs).

7.1.15 Workshop on UKIERI Collaboration on Developing Community Colleges at AICTE HQs., New Delhi on 16-17 February 2015

The UK Department for Business, innovation and Skills (BIS) and the Ministry of Human Resource signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) in February 2013 for the development of community college partnerships



facilitated by UK-India Education and Research Initiative (UKIERI). As part of this MoU it was agreed that UKIERI and MHRD would collaborate to facilitate the development of links between Community Colleges in priority states and sectors with a maximum of 25 such partnerships supported over the duration of this MoU (valid till March 2016). MHRD then identified AICTE as the lead for implementation for this scheme.

The participating colleges from the Indian side were decided jointly by AICTE and MHRD.

As part of the MoU Indian colleges will jointly work with the UK colleges and below are some suggestion for the activities which will be carried out in the joint work between Indian and UK Institution.

Suggestive Activities under the project include -

- a) Design mechanisms and pedagogical methods to create highly skilled teachers/trainers equipped to deliver industry-relevant training that enhances employability and enterprise.
- b) Activities aimed at increasing employability at the community level and engaging with the local SMEs within the region both in India and UK.
- c) Work on the existing curriculum materials and make it more industry-relevant.
- d) Dissemination of the resources created beyond the institutions.
- e) Activities using technology for wider reach, impact and dissemination.
- f) Activities linking all/either industry, SSC, formal and informal sector to enhance employability.
- g) Activities aimed at employer engagement and employability.
- h) Activities to support leadership development, governance and strategic planning.
- i) Develop mechanisms for quality assurance, accreditation and self-assessment.
- j) Develop mechanisms for apprenticeships routes.

UKIERI has identified UK partner colleges to work on this partnership and **Govt. Institute of Electronics** shortlisted as one of the Polytechnic for the collaboration with the UK partner college.

Accordingly, AICTE and UKIERI jointly organized a two day Workshop at AICTE HQs., New Delhi on 16th and 17th February, 2015 to prepare the blue print of activities to be undertaken during the project and finalize the work plan for the project in association with UK college.

To achieve the goals of planned and co-ordinate development of technical education and to implement the provisions of the Official Language policy of the Government of India, All India Council for Technical Education, has introduced ('TAKNIKI PATHYAPUSTAK PURASKAR YOJANA') with a view to provide state of the art knowledge of Engineering and Technology in Hindi Language. The scheme encourages to write standard technical textbooks in Hindi to facilitate class-room instructions in Hindi language in Hindi speaking states. Finance

9.1 FINANCE

The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) receives grants-in-aid from the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India towards implementation of its programmes and activities. During the Financial Year 2014-15, AICTE received grants to the tune of Rs.32000.00 Lakhs for AICTE Schemes, Rs.5000 Lakhs for J&K Schlorship Scheme from the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India under Plan Head and Rs. Nil under Non-Plan head from the Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India. The unspent balance of the previous year, i.e. 2013-14 was Rs.36937.39 Lakhs and Rs.93607.72 Lakhs for Plan and Non-Plan respectively. The scheme/head wise details of expenditure for Financial Year 2014-15 are given in chapter 10 of the Annual Report.

9.2 ALLOCATION

9.2.1 Plan Allocation

The grants released by Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) during the Financial year 2014-15 was Rs. 37000.00 Lakhs for AICTE Schemes and J&K Schlorship scheme. An amount of Rs. 36937.39 Lakhs was the unspent balance of the previous year and the miscellaneous receipts during the Financial Year 2014-15 amounted to Rs.3402.49 Lakhs.

9.2.2 Non-Plan Allocation

An amount of Rs.Nil was received from the MHRD as Non-Plan Grants during the Financial Year 2014-15 for AICTE Schemes. There was Rs.93607.72 Lakhs as unspent balance of the previous Financial Year (2013-14) and miscellaneous receipts amounted to Rs.38590.11 Lakhs during the Financial Year 2014-15.

Appendix 2.1

Powers and Functions of the Council (Extracted from AICTE Act, 1987)

It shall be the duty of the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical and management education and maintenance of standards and for the purposes of performing its functions under AICTE Act, the Council may:

- (a) undertake survey in the various fields of technical education, collect data on all related matters and make forecast of the needed growth and development in technical education;
- (b) coordinate the development of technical education in the country at all levels;
- (c) allocate and disburse out of the Fund of the Council such grants, on such terms and conditions as it may think fit to;
 - i) Technical institutions, and
 - ii) Universities imparting technical education in coordination with the Commission;
- (d) promote innovations, research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies to meet developmental requirements and for over-all improvement of educational processes;
- (e) formulate schemes for promoting technical education for women, handicapped and weaker sections of the society;
- (f) Promote an effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems including research and development organizations, industry and the community;
- (g) evolve suitable performance appraisal systems for Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education, incorporating norms and mechanisms for enforcing accountability;
- (h) formulate schemes for the initial and in service training of teachers and identify institutions or centres and set up new centres for offering staff development programmes including continuing education of teachers;
- (i) lay down norms and standards for courses, curricula, physical and instructional facilities, staff pattern, staff qualifications, quality instructions, assessment and examinations;
- (j) fix norms and guidelines for charging tuition and other fees;
- (k) grant approval for starting new technical institutions and for introduction of new courses or programmes in consultation with the agencies concerned;



- (I) advise the Central Government in respect of grant of charter to any professional body or institution in the field of technical education conferring powers, rights and privileges on it for the promotion of such profession in its field including conduct of examinations and awarding of membership certificates;
- (m) lay down norms for granting autonomy to technical institutions;
- (n) take all necessary steps to prevent commercialization of technical education;
- (o) provide guidelines for admission of students to Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education;
- (p) inspect or cause to inspect any Technical Institution;
- (q) withhold or discontinue grants in respect of courses, programmes to such technical institutions which fail to comply with the directions given by the Council within the stipulated period of time and take such other steps as may be necessary for ensuring compliance of the directions of the Council;
- (r) take steps to strengthen the existing organizations, and to set up new organizations to ensure effective discharge of the Council's responsibilities and to create positions of professional, technical and supporting staff based on requirements;
- (s) declare technical institutions at various levels and types offering courses in technical education fit to receive grants;
- (t) advise the Commission for declaring any institution imparting technical education as a Deemed University;
- (u) set up a National Board of Accreditation to periodically conduct evaluation of technical institutions or programmes on the basis of guidelines, norms and standards specified by it and to make recommendations to it, or to the Council, or to the Commission or to other bodies, regarding recognition or de-recognition of the institution or the programmes and
- (v) Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

Inspection :

- 1. For the purposes of ascertaining the financial needs of technical institution or a University or its standards of teaching, examination and research, the council may cause an inspection of any department or departments of such technical institution or University to be made in such manner as may be prescribed and by such person or persons as it may direct.
- 2. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or University the date on which any inspection under sub-section (1) is to be made and the technical institution or University shall be entitled to be associated with the inspection in such manner as may be prescribed.
- 3. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or the University, its views in regard to the results of any such inspection and may, after ascertaining the opinion of that technical institution or University, recommend to that institution or University the action to be taken as a result of such inspection.
- 4. All communications to a technical institution or University under this section shall be made to the executive authority thereof and the executive authority of the technical institution or University shall report to the Council the action, if any, which is proposed to be taken for the purposes of implementing any such recommendation as is referred to in sub-section (3).

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ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

2014-15



Principle Accounting Policies

1. Accounts

- The Financial Statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and generally on the accrual method of accounting unless otherwise stated. a)
- Separate set of accounts are maintained by the Council in respect of Plan, Non-Plan and CPF activities. q
- All Receipts on account of fees/subscription and refund of unspent grants are accounted on cash basis. С С

2. Grants-in-Aid

Grants are recognized on receipt basis & taken to credit of Income & Expenditure account except to the extent of expenditure of capital nature incurred (which amount is credited directly to the capital fund). Any Non monetary grant received free of cost is reflected at nominal amount of Re.1/-.

Fixed assets and Depreciations

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- Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less depreciation. Fixed assets received by the AICTE without consideration has been capitalized n the financial statement at a nominal value i.e. Rs. one. a)
- On periodical physical verification, the obsolete and non-usable assets are identified and cost thereof written off by debit to the capital fund account. q
- Receipts, if any, on the sale of these assets is taken as income under the head ' Misc Receipts. С С

4. Depreciation

- During this year depreciation has been charged on Straight line method as provided in new format for standardization of accounts issued by MHRD. Earlier depreciation was charged on written down value method as per Guidance Note issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of India.
- In respect of additions to fixed assets during the year, depreciation is provided for full year and in respect of deductions from the fixed assets, no depreciation is charged. ù.



a) Printing & Stationery

The amount spent for printing of publications, is treated as expenditure as and when incurred. No adjustments are made in accounts for the closing stocks, as the value is not determinable.

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b) **Telephone Deposit**

Deposit for telephone and allied facilities is written off during the year of installation/commissioning and charges/ expenditure bills are accounted for at the net value after adjustment, if any, for initial deposit, by the concerned department.

- Interest on All Deposits/ Investments is accounted for on accrual basis.
- Payment to EDCIL and NIELIT: Payments to EDCIL and NIELIT for supply of manpower are accounted for as advance to EDCIL and NIELIT at the time of payment. These payments are accounted for as expense only in the year of receipt of Utilization Certificate from EDCIL and NIELIT. 2

8. Employees Salaries/Benefits

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- Central Government Employees service rules are by and large, made applicable to the employees of the Council. a)
- Retirement benefits are accounted for on cash basis, as per system prevailing in case of Central Government Employees. q
- The Council maintains a separate Notified Provident Fund account for its employees. ŝ

Notes to the Accounts

- Grant received from Government, based on budget approved by the Parliament, constitute main source of receipts of the Council. Though the grants received (after the adjustment of expenditure of capital nature) are taken to income and expenditure account, the effective income of the Council is nil in the light of restrictions that without sanction of Government, the unspent balance of Grants can not be carried over from one financial year to another. Thus this does not attract any Income tax liability. ÷
- Surplus funds under Plan and Non-Plan head are kept temporarily with Schedule Bank in fixed deposit account with higher net interest earnings. No restrictions exist on utilization of amount at any point of time.

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- Expenditure on Establishment, Printing and Stationary and Telephone deposits have been given the accounting treatment as per accounting policy. ς.
- The cost of publication as on 31.03.2014 and 31.03.2015 was Rs.12,25,150/- and Rs12, 25,150/-

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- An advance of Rs.1,70,66,00,000/-(previous year Rs. 74,12,58,000) has been paid to CCE (R & D Central, DRDO) upto 31.03.2015 as Advance for construction of AICTE H.O. building at J.N.U. Campus New Delhi. <u>ю</u>
- An advance of Rs.2,88,00,000/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Bhopal upto 31.03.2015 (previous year Rs 1,44,00,000/-) as Advance for construction of AICTE building at Bhopal. <u>ن</u>
- An advance of Rs. 7,26,89,000/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Trivandrum upto 31.03.2015 as advance for construction of AICTE building at Trivandrum.. Ч.
- Amount of Rs. 2,67,27,651/- has been adjusted out of advance paid to EDCIL for the financial years 2013-14 for supply of manpower to AICTE. ÷.
- Amount of Rs. 72,07,956/- given to NIELIT for man power supply. No adjustment could be made as no UC is received up to March31,2015. б.
- Amount of Rs. 1,13,80,459 /- given for NVEQF has been adjusted against expenses during the financial year 2014-15. 10.
- During the financial year 2014-15 Rs. 320,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of H.R.D as Grant in Aid for AICTE Schemes. 11.





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- During the financial year 2014-15 Rs. 225,00,00,000/- has been refunded to UGC out of unspent grant received from UGC Rs 300,00,00,000/-for P G schemes during 2013-14. 13.
- Fixed Deposits are shown as part of closing balances of Banks in Receipts & Payments Account. 14.
- Advances made and shown as recoverable are adjusted to final head of account/recovered on receipt of final bill/ receipt from the concerned party/department. 15.
- From the Financial Year 2011-12, Security Deposit paid by newly approved Institutes has been earmarked and invested in Fixed Deposit Receipts. 16.
- From the Financial Year 2011-12, the Council has conducted CMAT/GPAT and has collected Fee for Registration and Appearing in Entrance Examination. The same has been deposited in separate Bank Account CMAT-SBI A/c and CMAT-ICICI A/c. 17.
- The investment in Government Securities out of CPF Account was as per the purchase value of the government securities on the date/ time of purchase and not on face value. 18.
- Th freaction of rupee have been converted to the nearest rupee as a result of which there may be variation of one rupee in the total in some cases. 19.
- Previous year figures have been regrouped wherever considered necessary.

AUDIT REPORT OF THE YEAR 2014-15





Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts of All India Council for Technical Education for the year ended 31st March 2015

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of All India Council for Technical Education (Council) as at 31st March 2015, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 19 of the AICTH Act, 1987. These financial statements include the accounts of 8 regional offices of AICTE. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains (he comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification. conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, eic. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Rcports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4. Based on our audit, we report that:

- i) We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- ii) The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Human Resources Development, Government of India vide order No. 29-4/2012-FD dated 17 April 2015.
- iii) In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Council in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv) We further report that:

A. Balance Sheet

A.1 Liabilities

A. 1.1 Current Liabilities & Provisions (Schedule 3) Rs. 249.56 crore

The above does not include unutilised grants of Rs. 99.02 crore resulting in understatement of Current Liabilities and overstatement of Capital Fund by Rs. 99.02 crore.

A.2 Assets

A.2.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule 4) - Rs. 9.60 crore

The Council had purchased Computer Accessories worth Rs. 1.52 lakh (Hard disk, Memory card, UPS, Pen Drives etc.) and accounted for as "Computer Consumable" in Administrative Expenses. This has resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets and overstatement of Expenditure by Rs. 1.52 lakh.

B. Income & Expenditure Account

B.1 Income

Grants / Subsidies (Schedule 10) — Rs. 158 crore

Schedule 10 of Grants & Subsidies has not been correctly drawn. The Council had an opening balance of Grant of Rs. 369.37 crore as on 1/4/2014 which has not been taken in the schedule. This has resulted in a negative





balance of Rs. 297.05 crore under the head 'balance carried forward" whereas the Council had unspent balance of grant as on 31/3/2015 of Rs. 99.02 crore .The disclosure in this schedule is not correct to this extent.

C. General

C.1 Notes on accounts and accounting policies

As per the Principal Accounting Policy No. 8(b) the retirement benefits are accounted for on cash basis which is in contravention of Accounting Standard 15 and Format of Accounts prescribed by M/o HRD.

C.2 Bank Reconciliation Statement

- (i) In Bank Reconciliation Statements (BRS) of the three accounts of AICTE amount remained unreconciled as detailed in the Annexure-I.
- (ii) The Council reconciled the balances of ICICI C-MAT account No. 038601001960 and ICICI Processing fee A/c No. 34301002392 by showing opening difference of Rs. 13,52,854 and Rs. 54,57,785 respectively. The details of these differences were not made available to audit. This was also pointed out in previous year report but no action has been taken by the Council to reconcile the amount.

D. Grants-in-aid

The Council received grants-in-aid of Rs. 370 crore under Plan including Rs. 27.50 crore for NER and Rs. 50 crore under J&K Special Scholarship Scheme. Out of this grant. Council received Rs. 66.45 crore in the month of March 2015. It had its own Plan receipt of Rs.34.03 crore (Refund of unspent grant Rs. 13.31 crore and interest & Misc. Income of Rs.20.72 crore). The Council had an opening balance of Rs. 369.37 crore including Rs. 261.29 crore of UGC grant. Out of total amount of Rs. 773.40 crore, it utilised Rs. 449.38 crore (Plan General Rs. 314.04 crore, NER Rs. 15.80 crore, J.K. Special Scholarship Scheme Rs. 85.25 crore and UGC: Rs. 34.29 crore). The Council also refunded Rs. 225 crore to UGC out of Rs. 300 crore received in 2013-14 for P.G. Scheme, The Council had a closing balance of Rs. 99.02 crore as of 31st March 2015.

E. Management letter:

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Chairman, All India Council for Technical Education through a management letter issued separately for remedial / corrective action.

- (v) Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income and Expenditure Account and Receipts and Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with I he books of accounts.
- (vi) In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the said financial statements, read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure II to this Audit Report, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:
 - a) in so far as they relate to the Balance Sheet of the state of affairs of the All India Council For Technical Education as at 31 March 2015; and
 - b) in so far as they relate to the Income and Expenditure Account of the deficit for the year ended on that date.

5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues
