




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

PREFACE



AICTE as a statutory body established through an Act of Parliament provides direction to technical education in the country through regulations and policies. It ensures growth with quality by operating several schemes with institutions, faculty, and students targeted as beneficiaries. These range from funding research to travel grants for attending conferences abroad to the faculty; from modernization of laboratories to building of hostels in the institutions; and providing scholarships for the meritorious to women and Divyangas.

The year 2019-20 started with completion of the annual Approval Process, putting in place a framework for admissions in the institutions approved by AICTE, to the new academic session. Several changes were effected based on the feedback of the stakeholders, changing landscape of technology and the priorities of the country. All this, with an eye on sourcing well-rounded technical manpower to the country, not just by ensuring meeting of the norms for institutions, departments, faculty, laboratories etc but also ascertaining participation of institutions in Quality Initiatives of AICTE and government initiatives.

The teachers are the cornerstone of education systems and their preparedness/ readiness is the key determinant in quality of education. AICTE intensified its efforts during the year on this front by launching FDPs through its ATAL Academy with focus on new technology areas, linking teacher training with career progression, FDPs for Student Induction Programme, training teachers for Examination Reforms etc. Professional development of teachers was facilitated, also through funding research, facilitating e-resources for research. All this besides the QIP, FDP and STTP schemes which have been benefiting a huge number of faculty for a long time.

While schemes to benefit the students continued whether through scholarships or financial assistance for their start-ups, during the year a National Educational Alliance



for Technology (NEAT) was launched as an Artificial Intelligence-based portal to help the learners get a personalized learning experience. The efforts on the internship front were intensified with linkages firmed up through MoUs not only with industry but with government agencies also. Such opportunities together with Student Induction Programme (SIP) administered at the time of initiation of students into colleges, challenging them through annual Hackathons, Clean & Smart campus competitions etc. and participation in national initiatives like Ek Bharat-Shrestha Bharat, One Student-One Tree, Save Water Campaign will prepare them fully, on the graduate attributes for technical graduates.

This annual report comes at a time when the entire world stands paralyzed by COVID-19 virus and education systems are equally hit. The commitment, resilience and robustness were put to severe test and successful conduction of examinations, approval to new institutions and courses, admission of students, running of the courses in this unprecedented situation need appreciation. As the saying goes, necessity is the mother of invention, we are confident about the global-scale adversity becoming a cause for innovations springing up, from across the technical education system also. I am confident that these innovations will benefit other educational bodies, institutions, teachers and students alike and thus, academic cycles will continue brake-free. I am equally confident that the pandemic will not cast shadow on our pursuits and our next annual report will equally impress all our stakeholders.

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
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

1.1 Statutory Bodies & Their Composition

All India Council for Technical Education has been established through an Act of Parliament (Act No. 52 of 1987) with a view to the proper planning and co-ordinated development of the technical education system throughout the country, the promotion of qualitative improvement of such education in relation to planned quantitative growth and the regulation and proper maintenance of norms and standards in the technical education system and for matters connected therewith. In order to effectively function and discharge its duties, AICTE seeks guidance and advice from different stakeholders and statutory bodies.

1.1.1 The Council

The Council is a 51 member body and has a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Member Secretary with tenure appointments as per AICTE Act. The Council includes amongst others, representatives of various Departments of the Government of India, the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha, Government of States and Union Territories, representatives from the Statutory Boards and Committees of the Council, Professional Bodies and organizations in the fields of concerned areas of technical education and research and also organizations in the field of industry and commerce, etc. The AICTE Act empowers the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical education. The powers and functions assigned to the Council are given in Appendix 1.1.The Council performs its functions in consultation with State Governments, Universities, State Boards of Technical Education, Professional Bodies and experts etc.

On completion of the term of the previous constituted Council on 05-01-2015, MHRD advised AICTE vide its letter No. 1-1/2018-TS-II dated 10-04-2018 to conduct meetings of Council with total 44 ex-officio members and representing various organizations as per the laid down procedure. The letter of MHRD is placed as Appendix 1.2.

1.1.2 The Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is a 21 member body constituted by the Council and discharges such functions as may be assigned to it by the Council. The Executive Committee is chaired by the Chairman of the Council and includes Vice-Chairman of the Council; Secretary to the Government of India; two Chairpersons of the Regional Committees of the Council; three Chairpersons of the All India Boards of Studies of the Council; one member of the Council representing the Ministry of Finance, Govt. of India; four members of the Council representing States/UTs; four members with expertise and distinction in areas relevant to technical education; Chairman of the University Grants Commission; Director of

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the Institute of Applied Manpower Research and Director General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research. The Member-Secretary of AICTE is also the Member-Secretary of the Executive Committee.

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause 12(1) of the AICTE Act, 1987, the AICTE had reconstituted the Executive Committee on 12-04-2018 for a period of three years. The composition of the Executive Committee is given in Appendix 1.3.

1.1.3 All India Boards of Studies

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in their areas of concern including norms & standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses etc. In pursuance of the powers conferred under Clauses 13(1) and 13(2) of the AICTE Act, in all 11 All India Boards of Studies have been constituted for advising the Council in their areas of specialization.

The areas of concern, constitution, functions and powers of the Boards of Studies are such as may be provided by the Council through appropriate Regulations. Initially, the AICTE Act provided for the establishment of five Boards of Studies. Presently 11 Boards are in existence with10-15 members in each and headed by a subject expert of eminence. Of these, 10 Boards were reconstituted on 03-01-2020 for a term of 3 years and All India Board of Applied Arts, Craft and Design was formed for the first time with effect from 10-09-2018 for a term of 3 years.

The composition of various All India Boards of Studies is given in **Appendix 1.4** and the names of the Chairpersons are given below.

1.1.4 Regional Committees

In pursuance of Clauses 14(1) and 14(2) of the AICTE Act, Regional Committees were constituted by the Council at Kolkata, Chennai, Kanpur and Mumbai on 18-04-1990 and subsequently three more Regional Committees were set up at Bangalore, Bhopal and Chandigarh in the year 1994. One Regional committee was also set up at Hyderabad on 08-03-2007. According to Clause 14(3) of the AICTE Act, each Regional Committee advises and assists the Council on all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their regions.



Each Regional Committee headed by an engineer/ technologist/ professional of eminence, has 15-20 members from industry, technical institutions, universities, state/ central government organizations and professional bodies/ societies working in the areas of technical education, industry & policy making (Appendix 1.5). The term of office of the Chairman and other members except ex-officio members is for three years from the date of constitution of the Committee. Table 1.1.2 gives the list of Regional Committees and the respective Chaipersons, functioning during the reporting period.

		AICTE comments. UGC vide its letter dated 01-04- 2019 has not permitted the continuation of B. Sc. in H & HA through ODL mode citing AICTE's letter dated 30-01-2019 that it has been the policy of AICTE not to recognize the qualifications acquired through open and distance learning education mode at Diploma, Bachelor's and Master's level in the fields of Engineering & Technology, Architecture, Town planning, Pharmacy etc. except MBA, MCA and Travel & Tourism. The Hotel Management program involves extensive practical components, hence AICTE is of the opinion that the courses in Hotel Management may not be allowed in ODL mode.
		The Council deliberated at length on the matter and noted that since 3-year BBA/ BCA and B.Sc. in Hospitality & Hotel Administration (H&HA) programs are in the purview of UGC and as such AICTE is not according approval to these programs. However as per its policy, AICTE is according approval only to MBA, MCA and Travel & Tourism programs through ODL Mode which don't involve practical components. As per IGNOU Letter, B.Sc. in Hospitality and Hotel Administration program being conducted by IGNOU in collaboration with NCHMCT is in blended mode. IGNOU has also informed that skill components of the programme are imparted through 66 IHMs under NCHMCT and knowledge components are imparted by IGNOU.
		In view of the above, UGC may ascertain claims of IGNOU through a committee of experts and take an appropriate decision.
59 th Council meeting 21-08-2019	Item No. 59.04.01 To consider and approve creation of an independent society under AICTE by replacing National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) scheme of MHRD, which is run by National Board of Accreditation (NBA).	The Council considered the proposal and in- principle agreed creation of an independent society as India Ranking Society (IRS) under AICTE by replacing National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) scheme of MHRD, which is run by National Board of Accreditation (NBA). The Council was informed that the Memorandum of Association (MoA) of the proposed IRS is being jointly drafted by AICTE and NBA in consultation with MHRD. Thereafter the same will be placed before the Council for its approval.

The Executive Committee deliberated on AICTE-Globalink Research Internships-Mobility of Undergraduate Students in India for Research in Canada and approved the following: (i) 64 students selected by the MITACS for Globalink Research Internships, as referred in the agenda shall pursue internship in Canada. (ii) MITACS shall contribute to the extent of \$7913 CA per student which is about 2nd/3rd of the expenses incurred on each student along with procuring medical insurance. (iii) Amount of \$192000 CA as contribution to MITACS for 64 students @\$3000CA per student selected by the MITACS under the AICTE-MITACS GRI Scheme. The amount shall only be released after the MITACS furnishes student-wise joining details. Further the effective conversion rate of rupee to Canadian Dollar shall be taken on date of release by the AICTE. The EC opined that based on the feedback on the international exposure of the students, in future AICTE may consider to include more students under this scheme.
125 th Executive Committee meeting 26-04-2019	Item No. 125.03.03	The Executive Committee noted that pursuant to the decision in its 119 th ' meeting held on 11 th October, 2018, regarding establishment of four ATAL academies, five-days training programmes for Technical Teachers, in emerging areas, was completed successfully at five centres i.e. MNIT, Jaipur; KTU, Trivandrum; IIT, Guwahati; NIT, Agartala & RGPV, Bhopal, in February 2019. Model curriculum of 9 thrust areas of emerging technologies, suggested by the committee constituted for the purpose of perspective manpower requirements in the country, has been launched by AICTE. The Executive Committee approved the proposal to conduct 50 such programmes in a year by each ATAL academy in the thrust areas and some other areas of modern technology by inviting Experts/Resource persons across the country, during the Financial Year



		2019-20. The EC also approved that the Regional Officer, AICTE, NWRO- Chandigarh will coordinate all the' activities of the four ATAL academies located at different places. It was also resolved that the technical universities be roped in for this purpose. The Executive Committee also approved the budget expenditure of Rs.32,40,000/ for conducting five programmes in the four ATAL academies @ Rs.1,62,000/- as cost for one workshop' It has been also approved that Rs.1,62,000/' be given to each program also to be conducted in future during FY 20I9-20. The EC appreciated the State Government of Andhra Pradesh for keen interest and willingness in setting up of such an ATAL academy at Hyderabad by AICTE. The EC suggested that AICTE may write to the State Government of Andhra Pradesh and also other UT/State Governments as well seeking their respective interest in setting up of such ATAL academies in their respective States/UTs to impart training to faculty in emerging areas.

The Executive Committee deliberated on restructuring the scope of Camp Office Guwahati into ATAL Academy and also construction of Guest House & Auditorium. The EC noted that CPWD has already been awarded a work contract for designing and construction of Camp Office Guwahati. Further, CPWD has now agreed to integrate AICTE's Camp Office- Guwahati and the proposed ATAL Academy by removing duplicity and redesigning the rooms as referred in the proposal to avoid re-negotiating/ re-tendering. The Executive Committee approved the restructuring of the scope of Camp Office Guwahati into ATAL Academy as proposed in the agenda. The EC also approved construction of Guest House and Auditorium which was not in the original MoU. The EC further agreed to the enhancement in the existing estimates as per the CPWD norms, due to restructuring of scope of work. The decision of AICTE is communicated to CPWD. The observations of IFD, MHRD in light of their communication dated 18 th June, 2019, automatically satisfied as work is assigned to CPWD only.

The Executive Committee noted and appreciated the success of fast- paced non-stop 36-hours competition to develop creative and innovative solutions by students for pressing problems faced by the participating countries in Singapore India Hackathon 2018. The Executive Committee deliberated and approved the proposed budget of Rs. 1,02,75000/- (Rs. One Crore two lakh seventy-five thousand only) for the second edition during 28-09-2019 to 30-09-2019 at IIT, Madras focused on the themes 'Good Health and Well-Being', 'Quality Education' and 'Affordable and Clean Energy'. This expenditure for Singapore India Hackathon 2019 will be met from AICTEs' own funds (IRG).

The EC also decided that such applications which are lying pending as on April 30 could be processed as and when applicant could obtain requisite NOCs on or before the announcement of the next Approval Process, since change in name of Trust/ Society or change of site has no direct linkage with grant of approvals to an institute and does not affect the intake capacity. The EC opined that an appropriate clause may be included in the next Approval Process Handbook (APH 2020-21).

These Online courses will be available online through SWAYAM platform for future generation of Engineers to equip with Indian Culture, Values with Life Skills and Human Excellence in addition to their Technical Abilities. The EC approved financial support like any other credit course(s) offered under SWAYAM and the courses of this nature may be considered as Credit Courses as per the SWAYAM MOOCs Guidelines.

The Executive Committee was informed about the short term and medium term perspective plan by Shri B.V.R. Mohan Reddy, Chairman BOG-IIT- Hyderabad, which was approved by the EC in its 120 th meeting held on 27-10-2018. The report suggested that ICT specifically digital technology be made part of the curricula for every stream of Engineering. The nine emerging areas identified are Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things (IOT), Robotics, Cyber Security, Block Chain, Quantum Engineering, Data Sciences/ Big Data & Analytics, 3D Printing & Design and Augmented Reality/ Virtual Reality. Accordingly, a Working Group was constituted by AICTE to suggest nomenclature/ specialization of new UG courses in emerging areas of technology.
		 The Executive Committee considered the recommendations of the Working Group as proposed and approved the following: (i) AICTE to introduce B.Tech. Programme in Artificial Intelligence & Data Science (AI&DS). However, only those institutions who can ensure quality should be allowed, for which AICTE can identify certain criteria. To start with institutes in lieu of NBA accreditation or by closing some existing courses as per APH 2019-20. (ii) Courses in emerging areas can be allowed as specialization from the same department. The minimum credits for such courses should be in the range of 16-18 and this can be mentioned in the degree, as specialization in that particular area. For example, doing extra credits for Robotics in Mechanical Engineering can earn B.Tech. (Hons) Mechanical Engineering with specialization in Robotics. (iii) Minor programs in emerging areas may be allowed wherein a student of another department can take courses (a minimum of 16 credits) and get a degree with minor from another department. (iv) AICTE may consider to fix seats/ intake for generic programs rather than for specializations.
		The EC suggested that a course in an emerging area can be attached to a generic discipline in Engineering. The said course attached to the Computer Science Engineering discipline will be treated as a specialization in the emerging area. The said course attached to a conventional discipline of engineering may be treated as a minor programme in an emerging area. The EC also suggested that the emerging area courses may also be offered in PG Engineering programmes.
		The EC opined that the model curriculum in other emerging areas may be prepared by constituting subject-wise Committees and also the existing model curriculum of AICTE may be relooked in view of the dynamic technological changes where a need is felt to revise or improvise the existing model curriculum. The credit distribution of honours may also be relooked.
		The EC was also of the view that there is a need for rationalization of the processing fee being deposited by the AICTE approved institutions across the country defined in APH.
		The EC therefore decided that necessary provisions/ amendments may be suitably incorporated in the next Approval Process Handbook (APH).



	Item No. 128.01.04 To consider and approve the draft Memorandum of Association (MoA) for creation of an independent society under AICTE by replacing National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) scheme of MHRD, which is run by National Board of Accreditation (NBA).	The Executive Committee was informed about the genesis of creation of an independent society India Rankings Society (IRS) under AICTE by replacing National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF) scheme of MHRD, which is run by National Board of Accreditation (NBA). It was noted that the domain of IRS as per MoA has expanded which will include rankings of institutions in various areas like Agriculture, Dental, Ayurveda also. The EC, therefore, opined that the Secretaries of a) Indian Council of Agriculture Research; b) Dental Council of India & c) AYUSH may also be included in the composition of the Governing Board of IRS. The Executive Committee was informed that MHRD is creating a repository of data region-wise. This data can be effectively utilized for research purposes wherein the best practices can be adopted for a holistic development of the country and thus improving the quality. The EC, therefore, suggested that Experts be co-opted to undertake these specialized tasks by effectual data utilization to generate findings/ Research papers which can also be published and presented in Seminars/ Conferences. The EC suggested that the IRS can expand its horizons gradually and may cover institutions located abroad for ranking as well. The draft Memorandum of Association (MoA) was deliberated at length and approved by the Executive Committee with above amendments. The EC decided that MoA may be sent for legal vetting before further processing.
129 th Executive Committee meeting 19-11-2019	Item No. 129.03.03 To consider and approve the Construction of Camp Office NWRO, and AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academy at Jaipur.	The Executive Committee considered and approved the proposal for revised Preliminary Estimate (PE) of Rs. 27,40,60,461/- for construction of Camp Office NWRO, AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academy at Jaipur and Guest House, submitted by CPWD after inclusion of Furniture, provision of LAN/ IT networking, Smart Classrooms/ computer rooms etc. This PE also includes 1.5% for design consultancy and 3% towards contingency. The comments of IFD, MHRD received through mail on 19-11-2019, against this agenda, mention that components towards design consultancy and contingency are higher, and need rationalization. The EC while consideration of the proposal had noted that 1.5% charges for design consultancy are as per the provisions of Council of Architecture under `Scale of Charges' and 3% towards contingency are in consonance with the `CPWD Works Manual 2019'.

The Executive Committee deliberated on the point b) above and further clarified that all the Universities that intend to offer online/ODL courses are conducting the same courses in regular course. So, it is expected and presumed that the contents of these regular course content should be used for online and ODL courses. However, such Universities may be asked to submit an affidavit to UGC that they are adhering to all the above conditions. 2. For offering courses through ODL mode: The Executive Committee reiterated as discussed and decided in its 118th meeting held on 18-08-2018 on the ODL mode of courses as follows: a) All the Deemed-to-be-Universities notified by UGC as Category-I institutions as per UGC (Categorization of universities (only) for grant of graded Autonomy) Regulations, 2018 shall be exempted from seeking approval from AICTE for the programmes mentioned in SI. No. 1 above i.e. MBA, MCA, Diploma/Degree in Travel and



Tourism. However, such Deemed-to-be-Universities shall have to adhere to norms & standards announced by AICTE from time to time and an affidavit stating that the deemed-to-be university is observing norms & standards of AICTE, must be submitted to the UGC. For all such UGC notified Category-I Deemed-to- be-Universities, the AICTE approval shall be considered as deemed to have been accorded for running ODL programmes in MBA, MCA, Diploma/ Degree in Travel and Tourism. However, in case of violation of AICTE norms reported through complaints, AICTE shall conduct inspection and submit its observations and recommendations to the University Grants Commission (UGC) to initiate actions including withdrawal of Programme recognition and take further actions as per provisions of UGC (ODL) Regulations.

b) For all other Deemed-to-be- Universities other than Category-I Deemed-to-be-universities as mentioned at point 2 above, interested in running ODL programs in MBA, MCA and Travel & Tourism, AICTE shall invite applications and such Deemed-to-be-Universities shall submit applications online on the AICTE web portal within notified deadline and shall be processed as per Notification issued in this regard. AICTE will forward the recommendations to UGC for further necessary action in the matter.

However, the Hon'ble High Court of Delhi in its decision under WP(C) No. 261/2019 dated 19-07-2019 under Dayalbagh Educational Inst. Vs. UGC and Others, directed AICTE to frame Regulations for granting approval to Deemed-to-be-Universities offering courses in ODL mode. The EC was informed that AICTE has accordingly framed regulations for Deemed-to-be-Universities and will give approvals to Deemed-to-be-Universities offering to conduct ODL courses as per laid down norms in the regulations.

The Executive Committee also noted that as per UGC regulations on ODL mode for the course of MBA, MCA and Travel & Tourism, for other Private and State Universities, approval of the regulatory body is required. Accordingly, the EC decided that all such cases will be dealt with the same regulations of AICTE as notified for Deemedto-be- Universities and in such cases the recommendations of AICTE will be communicated to UGC for taking further necessary action at their end.

In general, the Executive Committee reiterated that any course to be offered in regular or ODL or online mode should ensure:

- a) Prior approval of AICTE;
- b) Sanctity of admissions as per chosen policy declared in advance;
- c) Good quality Learning material and interaction with faculty;
- d) Standard of examination papers;
- e) Sanctity of examination: Proctored examination;
- f) Timely evaluation of exam papers and announcement of results.



		 Permissible Specializations: AICTE is not granting approvals to Universities and Institutions to offer Diploma/UG/PG level courses in Engineering & Technology, Pharmacy, Architecture, HMCT, Applied Arts Crafts and Design through ODL/ Online mode. Course nomenclature like Post Graduate Diploma in Artificial intelligence/ Block Chain/ Information Technology etc. shall arouse confusion amongst its aspirants and stakeholders that whether the same are falling under the ambit of AICTE/ Technical education. The EC is of the opinion that UGC shall not permit such nomenclatures of courses to be offered in ODL/Online mode. Further, the Programs like B.Sc. and M.Sc. do not fall under the ambit of AICTE, so the Executive Committee did not consider this matter. Conduct of Examinations: The Universities/ Institutions Deemed-to-be-Universities offering such courses in online or ODL mode shall ensure that the Examinations are conducted in a proctored manner. Award of Degree: The Executive Committee opined that universities offering courses through ODL/ Online mode shall clearly mention in the Degree Certificate issued to the candidates that the course was offered in ODL/online mode as the case may be. 2.1 Growth of Technical Education

AICTE grants approvals for starting new technical institutions and for introducing new courses or programmes in already approved technical institutions, in accordance with the functions assigned to AICTE under Clause 10 (k) of the AICTE Act. The Approval Process Handbook (APH) is revised annually after elaborate discussions with stakeholders and in consultation with respective State Governments and Affiliating Universities, keeping in view the requirement of technical manpower in the country, expectations of the industry, technological changes at global level, interest of stakeholders and also for maintaining transparency.

2.2 New provisions introduced in the APH 2019-20

- In case of new Technical Institutions, the Council if deems fit shall grant approval to issue Letter of Intent (LoI) for the given Academic Year, the same shall be valid for three Academic Years. Within the validity period, after the establishment of infrastructure facilities as per the requirements, the applicant shall apply on AICTE web-portal for the Letter of Approval (LOA) anytime in the year. On expiry of the validity, the LoI issued stands cancelled and the applicant shall make a fresh application for the issuance of Letter of Intent
- 2. For land/ building private lease Deed (Registered) (for a period of minimum 30 years with at least 25 years of live lease at the time of submission of application was allowed
- 3. To start new programme(s)/ level(s) in the existing Institutions
- 4. Merger of institutions under the same Trust/ Society/ Company operating in the same campus
- 5. Conversion of Second Shift Course(s) into First Shift Course(s)
- 6. Closing of MBA Programme and introduction of MCA Programme and vice-versa
- 7. Merger of the courses
- 8. Lateral entry to Second Year Diploma Course(s) has been reduced from 20% to 10% of "Approved Intake"
- The Council shall not permit the introduction or continuation of Lateral Entry separate division in second year of Engineering and Technology/ MCA Courses. However, merger of Lateral Entry separate divisions in second year Engineering and Technology/ MCA Courses to first year regular courses is allowed
- 10. Further, the institution applied for closure (if the same is under process/ approved for Progressive Closure) are



eligible for admission to the lateral entry in the current academic year, as Extension of Approval was issued in the previous Academic Year and students were admitted during that year

- 11. The institutions where "No Admission" have been issued for the current Academic Year are eligible for admission to the lateral entry in the current Academic Year, as Extension of Approval was issued in the previous Academic Year and students were admitted during that year. However, in the institutions where "No Admission" have been issued for the previous Academic Year are not eligible for admission to the lateral entry in the current Academic Year
- 12. Institutions applied for the conversion of Degree level into Diploma level and vice-versa/ conversion of Women's institution to co-education institution and vice-versa and approved for the conversion are eligible for admission to the lateral entry as per the approval of the previous Academic Year
- 13. Change in the name of the bank
- 14. Chapter IV (new) Grant of Approval through a single application for the University
- 15. Recommended short- and medium- term perspectives for Engineering Education in India by the Committee to provide National Perspective Plan
- 16. The existing institution applied for closure of the institution are also eligible to apply for starting a new technical institution in the same premises in the same year
- 17. Institutions not having Occupancy Certificate/ Completion Certificate/ Building License/ Form D/ Barrier free environment/ PGDM Institutions not having NAD or not uploading student enrolment data in the AICTE Web-Portal/ Institutions demanding for the Original Degree Certificates from the Faculty members at the time of joining the Institution shall be liable for punitive action

In supersession of the Regulations notified by the Council vide Notification No. F. 37-3/ Legal (vi) 2003, dated 03rd April 2003 and in exercise of the powers conferred under Section 23read with Clause (b), Clause (f), Clause (g) and Clause (n), (o), (p) of Section 10 of the AICTE Act, 1987, the Council made regulations for regulating entry and operation of Foreign Universities/ Institutions imparting technical education in India. This Regulation known as 'AICTE Regulations for Entry and Operation of Foreign Universities in India imparting technical education, 2005' were formulated primarily to check and avoid illegal entry of unscrupulous persons using/misusing the name of Foreign University/ Institution for unlawful gains. To safeguard the interest of all stakeholders, a public notice was issued in all leading newspapers on 05-05-2005 directing the foreign universities operating in India to comply with the above regulations. Communications were sent to all Indian Institutions directing them to comply with regulations 2005. These regulations were notified in the extraordinary Gazette of India on the 25-05-2005. During the period under report, no new institute for foreign collaboration was approved.

2.5 Deemed-to-be/ Denovo Deemed-to-be-/ Private Universities

Universities, including private universities established by the State Legislations do not require prior approval from AICTE for starting faculties/courses. However, deemed universities including the universities established by the State Legislature imparting technical education are required to comply with the norms and standards prescribed by AICTE from time to time.

In pursuance of the UGC letters for conferment of deemed to be university status to the institutions in the light of Ministry of Human Resources Development notification no. F. No. 2-1/2006U.3 (A), dated 05-04-2006 and as per provisions contained in Section 20(1) of the AICTE Act, a visiting team is sent by AICTE for on the spot assessment of these institutions. As per directives of the MHRD letter "AICTE nominates a representative on the inspection committee of UGC; the person so nominated by the AICTE may; in addition, head a team of the AICTE on the same day and such other persons who are not part of the UGC's team but merely assist the nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee. The nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee gives his or her report to the Chairman AICTE in the Proforma prescribed by the AICTE and also on any additional point required by the UGC; which then forwarded by the AICTE to the UGC. UGC's Committee would incorporate the comments of the AICTE in its report submitted to the Commission so that the Commission could take appropriate decisions in the matter before making any recommendation to the MHRD. It has been felt that the above arrangement would serve the purpose of a de facto joint inspection while at the same time satisfying the requirements of the AICTE act regarding its own inspection. Such an arrangement would also ensure that the comments of the AICTE's nominee reflect adequately the comments of the Council and are not merely the individual perceptions of the nominee. This would also satisfy the directions given vide this Ministry's orders of the 05-04-2006, wherein consultation with statutory Councils has been mandated before the UGC forwards its recommendations to the Central Government.

In view of the above direction of MHRD and on the request of UGC during the year 2019-20, AICTE nominated its representatives in the UGC teams along with a panel of experts to assist the UGC nominees to assess the physicaland academic infrastructure for conferment of Deemed-to-be/ Denovo Deemed-to-be/ Private Universities status and for reviewing the physical and academic infrastructure and performance of the existing Deemed/ Private Universities. The visit to the Universities has already been conducted and reports forwarded to UGC. Accordingly, AICTE granted approval to 25 Deemed/Private Universities for Academic Year 2019-20.

2.6 Unapproved Institutions

AICTE has been established by an Act of Parliament (Act 52 of 1987) with a function among others to grant approval for establishment of new technical institutions, introduction of new courses etc. Regulations have also been notified by the Council with a provision that no technical institution shall conduct technical education programmes in Engineering & Technology, Management, Computer Application, Architecture & Town Planning, Pharmacy, Hotel Management & Catering Technology, Applied Arts and Crafts in India with or without Foreign University Collaboration without obtaining prior mandatory approval from AICTE. These regulations also have a provision for taking action against such unapproved technical institutions.

Provided further that any institution offering technical programmes without approval of the Council, shall be termed as unapproved if

- It is started without prior approval by the Council
- It is working in temporary location/ at location not approved by the Council
- It is declared as "Unapproved" by the Council

The institutions conducting unapproved courses have been directed from time to time through Public Notices and individual letters under intimation to concerned state government to seek AICTE approval for conducting of technical education programmes or to close down.

Provided further that any technical institution, which has already started without following AICTE approval procedure, wishes to submit an application/proposal, it shall be considered as a new technical institution. For such purpose, they shall apply as per the provisions of Chapter I of Approval Process Handbook. Its legal date of starting will be from the date of issue of the Letter of Approval. Students, who are admitted prior to approval by the Council, will not have any right for re-admission and will have to fulfil all the requirements for admission as prescribed by the competent admission authority.

The representation submitted by the institutions in response to the AICTE letters furnishing clarification and justification for removal of their name from the list of unapproved institutions are examined by a Hearing Committee and based on recommendations of this committee, the names of suitable/eligible institutions are removed from the list.

The Council maintains a list of unapproved Institutions based on the information received from various sources and publishes for the benefit of the general public on its website from time to time. A list of 173 and 168 unapproved institutions in Technology & other areas and Architecture Institutes respectively, as on 31-03-2020 running technical education programmes/ courses without prior approval of AICTE has been published on AICTE website.



3.1 New Policies/ Regulations

The Bureau shouldered the responsibility of framing the Memorandum and Rules & Regulations in respect of India Rankings Society and Professional Engineers' Bill and submitted to MHRD.

The Bureau also framed the AICTE ODL Regulations 2019 for Institutions-Deemed to be Universities, AICTE ODL Regulations for Standalone Institutions and AICTE Regulations for Graded Autonomy of Standalone Institutions and the same were notified.

3.2 Quality Initiatives

In order to provide quality education to students in technical institutions AICTE Council in its 49th meeting held on 14-03-2017 approved a package of 10 quality initiatives; revision of model curriculum, induction programme for students, mandatory internship, examination reforms, industry readiness, accreditation, start-up and innovation & research promotion are a few to mention. Highlights of the activities undertaken by AICTE during the year are given in following sections: -

3.2.1 Model Curriculum

Realising the need to revise and update the Curriculum of UG and PG Courses in Engineering education and PGDM/ MBA Courses, AICTE has prepared and released outcome based model curriculum for Undergraduate and Post Graduate courses in Engineering & PGDM/ MBA Courses and made student internship mandatory whether in corporate world or at Institutes of National Importance, National Laboratories or in Development sector. Value education has been made an integral part of Course Curriculum. Key features include: Induction Programme; Encouragement to Innovation and Research; Virtual Laboratories; Courses on Constitution of India; Environment Science/ Engineering and Essence of Indian Traditional Knowledge; Better Hands-on experience; Encouragement to problem solving approach; Flexibility in different engineering disciplines; Mandatory Summer Internships.

During the year the model curriculum of 8 Diploma courses and B. Arch. was launched by Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank', Hon'ble Minister of HRD on 18-09-2019. AICTE also released a model curriculum of elective courses in Emerging areas viz. Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things (IoT), Block Chain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber security, 3D Printing and Design, Virtual Reality. Towards the end of the year, a model curriculum for UG course in Biotechnology was also released.



The universities are encouraged to adopt the curricula tweaking them to allow local needs to be taken care. Most of the technical universities have adopted the AICTE model curricula which is available on AICTE website.

3.2.2 Student Induction Programme

AICTE has introduced Student Induction Programme (SIP) for smooth initiation of students into technical institutions, to make students well-acquainted with the culture of the institution, inculcate moral values and familiarize with the essential requirement of the professional education. It is expected that through this initiative, at the end of the 3-week SIP, the students are committed and excited about learning and appreciate the importance of professionalism and establish strong bonding with fellow students and faculty. A two-week SIP is now also a part of the model Curriculum for Diploma courses released during the year. AICTE conducts FDPs for faculty in its institutions, to prepare them to effectively handle SIPs in their institutions.

An Induction Cell has been established at AICTE to monitor the SIP activities (Section 5.3 of this report).

3.2.3 Student Internship

With a view to align Indian technical education with global standards and ensure hands-on exposure to its students, AICTE came up with a new internship policy which makes internship mandatory by integrating it with curriculum.All activities related to student internships are dealt by the Internship Cell, operating as an independent entity (Section 5.3 of this report).

3.2.4 Examination Reforms

Examinations/ student assessments play a very important role in deciding the quality of education. They must not only assess a student's achievements (and grades) but also measure whether the desired learning outcomes have been achieved. The achievement of objectives and programme outcomes are crucial and needs to be proven through accurate and reliable assessments. With a view to bring in qualitative change in the examination system, AICTE came out with an Examination Reform Policy with Bloom's Taxonomy at its heart. Workshops for awareness among Controllers of Examination, Deans and Senior Faculty members of various universities and institutions were initiated in December 2018. The streak was continued in the reported year also, in which 10 one-day workshops were conducted, details of which are given in Table 3.2.1. A three-days workshop for hands-on training on preparing question papers was held in Chandigarh in December 2019.

A committee under the Chairmanship of Shri B.V.R. Mohan Reddy, Chairman, Board of Governors, IIT, Hyderabad prepared a Short- and medium- term Perspective Plan for technical education which was approved by the Executive Committee of AICTE. Main recommendations of the committee include (a) courses on emerging technologies namely, Artificial Intelligence (AI), Internet of Things (IoT), Block chain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber Security, 3D Printing & Design & Augmented Reality (AR)/ Virtual Reality (VR); and (b) greater focus on multi-disciplining courses by reducing the seats in conventional disciplines and converting the existing seats into these courses.

As a follow-up, AICTE has started approving the new 4 year UG level course in Data Science & Artificial Intelligence from the academic year 2020-21 and a Model Curriculum of the same is being prepared. Technical institutions are now also allowed to have specialization/ minor degrees in Artificial Intelligence (AI), Internet of Things (IoT), and Block-chain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber Security, 3D Printing & Design and other emerging technological areas.

Besides these CS/IT areas, specialized minor degrees can be offered in areas like- Control Systems and Sensors Technology, Instrumentation and Control Engineering, GIS and Remote Sensing, Sustainability Engineering, Green Technology, Strategic Civil Infrastructure, Coastal & Offshore Engineering, Smart Cities, Underground Space Utilization, Bio similar Technology, Genome Engineering and Technology, Precision Health Technology, Waste Technology, Energy Engineering, Robotics, 3D Printing, Electric Vehicles, Sensors Technology, Micro-grid Technologies, Infrastructure Engineering, Environmental Geotechnology, Earthquake Engineering, Waterways Transport Engineering, Lean Construction Technology, Organ Printing Technology, Nutrition Technology, Drug Engineering, Aqua-food Technology and Cellular Agriculture.

3.2.6 Teachers' Training Policy: Faculty Certification

Training for all new entrants in teaching profession in technical institutions has been made mandatory as per AICTE Teacher's Training Policy, who are required to complete 8 Course modules offered through MOOCS-SWAYAM Platform for career progression. This training is now integrated with teacher's pay scales and service conditions under the 7th Pay revision for Technical Teachers and the Gazette notification has been issued accordingly.

3.2.7 Mandatory Accreditation

With a view to improve and maintain the quality of educational programmes, technical Institutions are being motivated to get their programmes accredited. It is now mandatory for all technical institutions to have their 60% programmes NBA accredited by 2022 otherwise no extension of approval will be granted.

In order to guide and prepare the institutions desirous of getting their courses accredited, 48 Margdarshaks have been identified and trained to mentor the institutions. These are experienced faculty who have been forthcoming on the call of AICTE, to help the institutions in accreditation. Institutions going for accreditation are encouraged to associate themselves with well-established institutions and seek Margdarshan from 26 institutions selected under scheme Margdarshan to facilitate institutions in getting NBA accreditation. Thus, a hub-and-spoke system is in place under the Margdarshan Scheme, with an institute of repute pivoting itself as a Mentor (hub) to guide and disperse knowledge to ten technical institutions (spokes) to encourage best practices.

Progress of Margadarshan and Margadarshak schemes handled by Margadarshak cell is given under section 4.4 of this Report.

3.2.8 Promoting Innovations/ Start-ups

The objective of this initiative is to train the graduating students in applying the knowledge acquired during their course to solve problems. Several other skills get developed in the process of preparing the students making them well-rounded. This in turn helps in creating an enabling ecosystem for innovations and an ideal entrepreneurial ecosystem in technical Institutions which can be intensified by strong inter-institutional partnerships and also those with industries.



During the year AICTE in collaboration with MHRD's Innovation Cell (MIC), i4c and Persistent Systems organized the Smart India Hackathon (SIH) 2019, hardware edition which was organized during 08-07-2019 to 12-07-2019 in 19 centres across India. Under the ambit of MoU with the Canada-India Acceleration Programme (CIAP) to support and promote cooperation while designing collaborative programmes in the area of start-ups and innovation development, 50-Canadian and 50-Indian Women Led Tech Start-ups are being supported for the next 5 years. Details of progress under Innovations and Start-up, are given under section 5.8 of this Report which deals with MIC.

3.2.9 FDPs by ATAL Academies

AICTE Training And Learning Academies (ATAL) is helping in imparting quality technical education in the country and supporting technical institutions in fortering research, innovation and Entrepreneurship through training in various emerging areas like Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things (IoT), Blockchain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber Security, 3D Printing & Design, Augmented Reality (AR)/Virtual Reality (VR) etc. (Please refer Section 5.2 of this report).



4.1 Institutional Development Schemes

4.1.1 Construction of Hostels for SC/ST Students

The scheme supports Government/ Government-aided engineering colleges for construction of girls/ boys hostels for students/ researchers belonging to SC/ST category. The intended beneficiaries existing for the last five years and having more than 150 SC/ST students on roll for the previous three years, are eligible for the grant. The maximum amount of Rs. 3.00 crore, disbursed in 3 instalments, is offered under the Scheme.

The total grant released during year 2019-20 as first, second and third instalment is Rs. 9.06 crore as under:

The scheme was launched in 2012-13 and grants amounting to Rs. 165.65 crore were released for construction of hostels to 101 Institutes till 2019-20 (listed in Annexure 4.1). In all, 38 hostels with a capacity to accommodate 2280 SC/ST students have been constructed under the Scheme and are occupied.

4.1.2 Modernisation and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROB) Scheme

AICTE has been operating MODROB Scheme, to enhance the functional efficiency of technical institutions for teaching, training and research activities by helping in timely upgradation of infrastructure. A variant of the Scheme was introduced as MODROB- RURAL with focus on institutions located in disadvantaged rural settings.

During the financial year 2019-20, for 341 projects, Rs. 34.71 crore was sanctioned.

4.1.4 Skill and Personality Development Programme Centre for SC/ST Students (SPDC)

The scheme promotes the establishment of infrastructure in the form of a SPDP Centre in institutes to empower the SC and ST students by providing special skill trainings apart from regular study. The training is provided with the help of modules on communication, personality development and proficiency in English language. Thus, it boosts the confidence of SC and ST students and provides them with better career opportunities, so that, their employability in the industry increases. Maximum funding to the institute under this scheme is Rs. 25 Lakh, to be spent within three years.

47 institutes were supported (31 new SPDP Centres established and 16 already running SPDP centres) with disbursement of Rs. 2.79 crore during the year 2019-20. The detail of the newly established and already running SPDP centres supported during 2019-20 is given in Table 4.1.4.




Fig. 4.1.1: State-wise distribution of grant (in %) under SPDC scheme during 2019-20

4.1.5 Grant for Organizing Conference (GOC)

The scheme provides financial assistance to institutions for organizing conferences at national and international level in various fields of technical education. During 2019-20, Rs. 5.42 Crore was released to 170 institutions for organizing conferences.




Fig. 4.1.2: Statewise distribution of grants under GOC during 2019-20

4.2 Student Development Schemes

4.2.1 Pragati Scholarship Scheme for Girl Students

AICTE awards Pragati Scholarship to girl students with an aim to provide assistance to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to give young women the opportunity to pursue higher technical education and prepare them for a successful future.

The scheme launched on National Educational Day, 11-11-2014, allows two girls per family to benefit provided family income is less than Rs. 8 Lakh annum.

Scholarships are offered under the scheme: 4000 (2000 for Diploma and 2000 for Degree).

The candidates should have been admitted to the 1st first year of the Degree or Diploma programme in any of the AICTE approved institutes during the current academic year through the centralized admission process of the State/ Centre Government.

Tuition Fee of Rs. 30,000 or at actual, whichever is less and Rs. 2,000 per month for 10 months as incidentals charges each year.

Reservation to 7.5% ST, 15% for SC, and 27% for OBC candidate constitute the scholarship is given.

4.2.2 Saksham Scholarship Scheme for Differently-abled Students

AICTE awards Saksham Scholarship to differently-abled students with an aim to provide encouragement and support to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to provide young differently-abled students an opportunity to study further and prepare for their successful future.

This scheme launched on National Educational Day, 11-11-2014 is available to students having more than 40% disability and whose family income is not more than Rs. 8 Lakh per annum.

In all 1000 (500 for Diploma and 500 for Degree) scholarships are available to candidates admitted to the first year of the Degree or Diploma programme in any of the AICTE approved institutes during the current academic year through the centralized admission process of the State/ Centre Government.

The scholarship covers Tuition Fee of Rs. 30,000 or at actual, whichever is less and Rs. 2,000 per month for 10 months as incidentals charges each year.

Reservation to 7.5% ST, 15% for SC, and 27% for OBC candidate/applicant is available.

4.2.3 Prerana Scheme

The Prerana scheme is an effort to overcome the acute shortage of faculty in engineering and polytechnic colleges by providing financial assistance to institutes who are willing to put extra efforts for encouraging SC/ ST students to go for higher education and give coaching to clear admission tests like GATE/ GPAT/ CAT/ CMAT/ TOEFL/ IELTS and GRE for getting admission in renowned institutions.

A limited one-time financial assistance of Rs. 10 Lakh is given to the institutes, for a period of two years, for paying the application fee of students for these exams and for meeting expenditure on honorarium to eminent faculty members invited for conducting sessions.

During the financial year 2019-20, Rs. 2.32 Crore were disbursed to 32 (8 cases of 2018-19 + 24 cases of 2019-20) institutes to benefit the students.

4.2.4 Samriddhi Scheme

The broad objective of this scheme is to help SC/ST students as per AICTE's start-up policy in designing, launching, and running their own business/ start-up through entrepreneurship development programme after formal education is over during their education.

Funding to the institute under this scheme is limited to Rs. 20 Lakh to be spent within a period of 2 years. Up to 9 start-ups of SC/ST students are selected by the committee set up at the institute level and the seed money of Rs. 2 Lakh (non-refundable) is provided to the selected candidates. The institute is provided Rs. 2 Lakh (Rs. 1 Lakh per year) for meeting the expenditure on honorarium to eminent faculty members/entrepreneurs invited for conducting sessions on entrepreneurship.

During the year 2019-20, grant was released to 12 (10 cases of 2018-19 + 2 cases of 2019-20) institutes amounting to Rs. 1.19 Crore.

4.2.5 Post Graduate (PG) Scholarship Scheme

In order to ensure development of technical education in India, AICTE awards scholarships for GATE/GPAT qualified students @ Rs. 12,400 per month through its Post Graduate (PG) Scholarship Scheme. The Scholarship is awarded to students admitted in Master of Engineering, Master of Technology, Master of Architecture and Master of Pharmacy courses in AICTE approved Institutions and AICTE approved University/Departments.

During the financial year 2019-20, an amount of Rs. 30,502.7 lakh was released, benefiting directly into their bank accounts through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT).

4.2.6 National Doctoral Fellowship (NDF)

The scheme of National Doctoral Fellowship (NDF) was launched from the academic year 2018-19 for supporting meritorious students for Ph.D. programme in the 28 identified research institutes of AICTE. The objectives of the NDF aims to promote research culture in AICTE approved Institutions; to nurture talent for technical research and to promote collaborative research between Institutes and Industries leading to start-ups.

PSG College of Technology, Coimbatore was selected as National Nodal Center to handle the scheme on behalf of AICTE for the 3 academic years from 2018-19. Online applications were invited and the selected candidates after due selection procedures were directed to report to the Research Centers as per the research area chosen by the candidate and availability of guides. Reservation policy of the Government was only followed.

Selected researchers receive a fellowship of Rs. 31,000 per month for first two years and Rs. 35,000 for the third year and house rent allowance (HRA) as per government norms. In addition, an amount of Rs. 15,000 per annum as contingency grant is given. The duration of the scheme is 3 years but, is extendable by 6 months in two spells in special cases.

From the academic year 2019-20, the number of seats has been increased from 150 to 300. Presently 351 scholars are pursuing research in 12 thrust areas under NDF Scheme, in 37 identified research institutes of AICTE.

4.2.7 Support to Students for Participating in Competition Abroad (SSPCA) Scheme

The SSPCA scheme was started in 2017 to support the students for participating in competitions held abroad. This scheme provides travel assistance and registration fees to a team of 2 to 10 students for attending competition at international level in order to encourage engineering students to improve in their field of technical education. In 2019-20, 11 teams (Total 75 students) were supported financially through Rs. 67.02 Lakh released.

Indian teams performed well at international level competition and brought laurels to the country.



4.2.8 AICTE-MITACS Globalink Research Internship (GRI) Scheme

An MoU was signed between MITACS (Mathematics of Information Technology and Computer Systems), Canada and AICTE on 23-02-2018, for 'the AICTE-MITACS GRI Scheme' to foster cross-border partnerships focused on creating a platform for collaborative research between Canada and India to a pool of student talent in India, which has been implemented for a period of five years from 2018 to 2023.

MITACS Globalink Internships are open for third year/final year students in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) disciplines in AICTE approved institutes in India. The Interns undertakes research in Canadian universities. The duration of internships is 12-weeks, and both MITACS and AICTE share the cost of internships. The total cost of the programme is \$12,000 CAD per student out of which MITACS contributes \$9,000 CAD per student and AICTE transfers \$3,000 CAD per student to MITACS prior to the approved students' travel to Canada.

During the year 2019-20, MITACS has selected 64 students for undertaking internships in Canadian universities. Out of which 60 students (including 12 girls) joined the programme. AICTE supported these students for their internship by granting Rs. 97.81 Lakh.

4.3 Faculty Development Schemes

4.3.1 Quality Improvement Programme (QIP)

With the objective of upgrading qualification and capabilities of the faculty members of degree level technical institutions, the Government of India launched the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) in the year 1970, now being implemented and monitored by the Council. From 2001, QIP has been extended to the teachers in approved diploma level technical institutes.

Selected institutions offer Master's and Doctoral programmes to faculty members selected under this programme who are paid monthly scholarships @Rs.9,000/- and Rs.15,000/- respectively.

In order to upgrade the knowledge and skills of teachers working in different institutions in the country, AICTE provides financial assistance to select institutions for organizing Short-Term Training Programmes (STTP) in emerging areas of Engineering & Technology and other disciplines. The maximum grant for the 20 weeks' course is Rs.15,000/- per participant and an additional, Rs.10,000/- per participant is given over 30 participants.

During 2019-20, QIP Centres increased to 112, while the number of faculty deputed for Ph.D. increased to 653. QIP (Pharmacy) Nodal Centres were also revived during the year, after 6 years.

4.3.2 Faculty Development Programme (FDP)

The FDP scheme provides financial assistance for organizing training which will facilitate up gradation of knowledge, skill besides providing opportunities for induction training to teachers employed in technical disciplines. AICTE approved Institutions/ University Departments imparting technical education are entitled for this grant. An institution is provided up to Rs. 7 lakh to conduct this proposed/ approved programme of two week duration.

Under the FDP scheme, during the year 2019-20, 144 proposals qualified and an amount of Rs.695.31, was sanctioned as grant-in-aid.

4.3.3 Short Term Training Programme (STTP)

The STTP Scheme was launched in the year 2018 to provide financial assistance limited to Rs 5 lakh per programme to conduct a six days' residential programme to enable faculty members in the field of technical education to introspect and learn techniques that can help prepare students as for active and successful participants in a knowledge society.

Rs. 1240.51 lakh was sanctioned as grant-in-aid for 397 proposals. An amount of Rs. 1152.47 lakh was released for 369 proposals during the year 2019-20. The region-wise, Institution-wise and State-wise release of sanctioned projects under STTP is reported.

4.3.4 Research Promotion Scheme (RPS)

Research Promotion Scheme aims to promote research in technical disciplines and innovations in established and emerging technologies. Research and development activities are considered as an essential component of higher education because of their role in creating new knowledge insight by imparting excitement and dynamism to the educational process, thereby making them needed based in view of the national requirements. The objective of this scheme is to create and update the general research capabilities of the faculty members of the AICTE approved technical institutes for which funds limited to Rs.25 lakh are provided. During the period 2019-20, 88 projects were sanctioned which included RPS (NER) and RPS (Management).

RPS (NER) is a dedicated scheme focussed on for the institutions of North Eastern Region (NER) of India The objective is to inculcate the research culture in technical institutes located in far-flung areas of North East Region (NER).

In the RPS scheme, 176 proposals were received from Management discipline in the year 2018-19. Out of 176 proposals 20 proposals were found fit for release of funds. A total of Rs.138.32 Lakh was released to 20 projects in the year 2019-20.

4.3.5 AICTE — ISTE Induction/ Refresher Programmes

An MoU was executed between AICTE and ISTE for conducting 100 Refreshers Programmes and 50 Induction Programmes sponsored by AICTE, with a ceiling of Rs. 3 lakh per programme for teachers in AICTE approved technical institutions. 40 faculties per programme are trained in various subjects as follows: -

- Pedagogical Training
- Subject related Training to teachers employed in disciplines: Engineering & Technology, Management, Pharmacy, Architecture etc.
- Training related to Moral Values, Ethics, and Behavioural Sciences & Attitude etc.
- Training for teachers regarding orientation of newly admitted students.
- Training for supporting technical and administrative staff including Librarian.

In addition, similar numbers of programmes are also done under self-financing. All these programmes are considered for the Career Advancement Scheme of AICTE.

An amount of Rs. 3,61,64,207/- was released to ISTE for conduct of AICTE-ISTE programmes during the year 2019-20.

4.3.7 STTP for Physical Education Directors/ Sports Officers

An STTP of two weeks (residential programme) for Physical/ Sports-Games Teachers/ Director of Sports/ Sports Officer (Faculty designated) was initiated, as a pilot, with the following objectives: -

- To train the trainer especially for Sports, Fitness Management and Sports Engineering.
- To make the trainer able to conduct physical fitness activities for a large group of students at a time.
- Orientation of trainers for the mass physical activities which will create interest and enhance participation of today's mobile glued youth.
- Participant should be able to relate traditional sports and games for fitness of youth (Sports of all)
- Participants will get training from the International Olympics Committee approved "TAFISA Certified Leadership Course" certification in "Sports for All" under internationally recognized speakers.
- Participants will learn about Sports Facilities Management.
- Participants will be able to contribute in final year students' projects based on sports engineering like sports analytics, Performance measurement and enhancement, etc.
- To create awareness about Sports Engineering as potential, value added specialized engineering discipline.

3 institutes were approved as beneficiaries during 2018-19, out of which Hanuman Vyayam Prasark Mandal, Amravati succeeded in conducting STTP and Rs. 10 lakh were released to this institute during 2019-20.

4.3.8 Travel Grant (TG) for Faculty

This scheme provides financial assistance to regular faculty of the AICTE approved institutes to facilitate opportunities to present their research papers at international conferences abroad and within India, enrich themselves with new knowledge and learn best practices.

AICTE has initiated steps to streamline and make it easy for such prospective faculties who intend to take benefits under this scheme. Under this scheme, every year the experts appointed by AICTE identify and prepare lists of forthcoming conferences/seminars/ symposiums/workshops proposed to be held abroad & within India. The applicants, having received an invitation from any of the events identified, shall be eligible to receive financial assistance on basis of predecided fixed rates depending upon the location of the group of countries or average amount recommended by experts or actual expenditure incurred whichever is less. The maximum limit including international travel is Rs. 1.5 Lakh and minimum Rs.50,000.00 (for locations within India).

4.3.9 AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professors (DVP) Scheme

The scheme envisages promotion of industry-institute interaction by facilitating the dissemination of knowledge through the expertise of experienced and knowledgeable persons from industry to integrate their rich industrial experience with technical education. The Distinguished Visiting Professors are nominated amongst the eminent scholars/experts in their field, working in an industry/ R&D organization such as CSIR/ DRDO Labs to teach the technical students of graduation & post-graduation level for one-week duration.

4.3.10 AICTE- INAE Teacher Research Fellowship (TRF) Scheme for Ph.D.

AICTE and INAE launched the Scheme for the engineering teachers for Doctoral Research in central laboratories in order to promote a research culture AICTE approved engineering institutions. Under this scheme, engineering teachers are sponsored to pursue research in Council of Scientific and Industrial Research (CSIR)/ Defence Research and Development Organization (DRDO)/ Department of Space (DoS)/ Department of Atomic Energy (DAE) laboratories leading to the award of a Ph.D degree by a University. Faculties have completed their Ph.D. till date and 19 are currently pursuing their Ph.D. under this scheme.

4.3.11 Faculty Trainings through MoU with Technical Universities

The objective of the AICTE-Technical University training programme is to conduct training for faculty members (including librarians) to prepare them for enhancing / refreshing their knowledge in their specific fields and to perform in a competitive world. The expenditure for conduct of one training programme will be limited to Rs. 3 lakh, to be equally shared by AICTE and the technical university. 10 programmes will be conducted by each of the institutes during an academic year.

4.3.12 National Policy for Technical Teachers Training

In the past few decades, there has been a spectacular increase in the number of technical institutions. However, the thrust on improving the quality of education in such a wide spectrum of institutions has been lacking. A large number of technical institutions exist in the country where a huge number of teachers are employed and being recruited. It is estimated that at present, there are over 6,00,000 existing teachers and in addition 30,000 fresh teachers are being recruited every year in these institutions.

Given the scenario, the need for adequately augmenting the quality of technical education and making it more and more appropriate to the present requirements is becoming very acute and requires effort on the part of the monitoring agencies as well as the stakeholders. Towards this, AICTE implemented a Comprehensive Training Policy for Technical Teachers. Towards implementation of this, 8 online courses have been prepared in collaboration with NITTRs which have since been included in gazette notification for 7th pay commission, as applicable mandatorily to new inductee teachers and teachers into service with less than five years of experience.

- 1. Orientation towards Technical Education & Curriculum Aspects
- 2. Professional Ethics & Sustainability
- 3. Communication Skills, Modes and Knowledge Dissemination
- 4. Instructional Planning and Delivery
- 5. Technology Enabled Learning and Life-long Self-learning
- 6. Student Assessment and Evaluation
- 7. Creative Problem Solving, Innovation and Meaningful R&D
- 8. Institutional Management & Administrative Procedures

For this first of its kind initiative, a web portal **www.nittt.ac.in** enabling fresh inductees and the teachers to login and register, was launched on 12-01-2020 by Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' Hon'ble Minister MHRD in the presence of AICTE officials. The portal is user-friendly and self-explanatory with built-in features of compatibility with SWAYAM platform. All the 8 online modules have been uploaded on SWAYAM. More than 40,000 faculties registered for the courses that commenced in the first week of March 2020.

4.3.13 International Issue

Indian engineers working in Kuwait were undergoing difficulties in processing their residency Visas and continuation in jobs due to the Government of Kuwait's new policy of retaining only engineers from accredited institutions. The Public Authority for Manpower (PAM) of Kuwait issued an administrative circular in March, 2018 instructing the labour department not to issue work permits to the expatriate engineers unless they provide No Objection Certificate (NOC) issued by the Kuwait Society of Engineers (KSE).

In order to find a solution to the issues faced by Indian Engineers with the Kuwait Government and to resolve the issues amicably, a visit from 25-06-2018 to 30-06-2018 by a high level delegation from Kuwait Government to India was organized. A list of Institutes/ Universities/ Professional Societies offering Technical Programmes in India, Chairpersons of AICTE, and UGC & NBA was provided to the Government of Kuwait. Also, an Indian delegation led by Dr. Sukhbir Singh Sandhu, Additional Secretary (TE), MHRD visited Kuwait 05-03-2019 to hold further discussions with authorities of Kuwait on the issue of Indian engineers' degree accreditation.

Subsequently, a delegation of Kuwait visited India on 08-04-2019 to attend the NIRF announcement ceremony.

The following additional list of Institutes as per the following was handed over: -

- 1. List of top 200 NIRF technical institutes/universities for the last 3 years excluding (minus) NBA accredited institutes.
- 2. List of NAAC approved technical institutes excluding (minus) NIRF institutes as above and excluding (minus) NBA accredited institutes.
- 3. List of all premier institutes (IITs/ NITs/ IIITs/ Central universities etc.)

The issue has since been resolved to a great extent. Kuwait authorities have been generous and have decided to absorb those not meeting some of the criteria on alternative positions that have helped in avoiding relocating Indian families.

4.4 Margdarshak Scheme

In order to maintain the quality of technical education in the country, it has been made mandatory that 60% of the eligible courses are to be accredited. In the absence of such accreditation, AICTE shall not grant further extension of approval. Accordingly, Margdarshan Initiative has been introduced by AICTE for facilitating the technical institutes to improve the quality mandate as a whole. The initiative solicits support from senior academicians and well established institutes to hand hold & mentor other institutes who aspire to achieve accreditation.

The senior academicians from IITs/ NITs/ other AICTE approved institutes (serving or superannuated) shall be nominated as Margdarshak (individual mentors) for guiding beneficiary institutes. Their principal role shall be to guide, support and encourage the beneficiary institutions in their development as they work to achieve accreditation in alignment with the broad objectives of quality mandate.

Presently, AICTE has already nominated 298 senior academicians as Margdarshaks, out of which 191 Margdarshaks have been mapped with 329 beneficiary institutes for mentoring. In a similar manner, well-established AICTE approved institutes are being nominated as Margdarshan Institute or Mentor Institute (MI) who shall adopt/ guide other technical institutes in vicinity for achieving accreditation of NBA.

Presently, 40 such institutes have been nominated as Mentor Institutions who are mapped with 462 beneficiary institutes. Thus, 891 institutes have been facilitated under the scheme, looking to achieve suitable accreditation status in the next few years.

5.1 e-Governance Cell

AICTE implemented an e-Governance system in 2010 which is now operational under the e-Governance Cell. The Cell anchors the annual Approval Process of AICTE and also provides a platform for operating a number of schemes, thus ensuring accountability, integrity, credibility, transparency and efficiency in day-to-day activities of the organization to all its stakeholders. Besides providing major IT infrastructure support, e-Governance Cell was, during the year, involved in several activities.

5.1.1 Ek Bharat Shrestha Bharat (EBSB)


EBSB initiative has been launched by Hon'ble Prime Minister of India implementation of which in AICTE approved institutions was taken up by the e-Governance Cell. 3134 AICTE approved institutions agreed to participate in EBSB programme, activities under which are finalized by MHRD.

Based on the decision by the Government, 1427 pairs were created involving 1813 AICTE institutions who were asked to conduct various activities including students' groups exchange and faculty exchange, as per direction of MHRD.






Fig. 5.1.1 (a): Project competition (07-02-2020 & 08-02-2020) Ghousia College Of Engineering Gujarat-Karnataka

5.1.2 AICTE-Stanford Project on Student Learning Assessment (SLA)

AICTE signed MoU with Stanford University, California on 06-02-2017, for conducting a survey on the Student Learning Assessment (SLA), to find out the skill levels and gains of socially-disadvantaged students like women/SC/ST/OBC etc. as compared to the economically advantaged and rural students in India. The survey was intended to benefit colleges and the students in particular, by improving their understanding of how much they are learning as well as how different institutional characteristics, faculty characteristics, teaching practices and student's behaviours contribute to the student learning in India.

The Stanford University Team conducted a survey in three phases in 42 randomly selected AICTE approved institutions, spread across the country- Pilot survey, Baseline survey and the End line survey. The Pilot phase of survey was conducted from February 2017 to June 2017 in which approximately 5,000 students, 600 faculties and 30 heads of department (HODs) were involved. This Pilot test was conducted for first semester engineering students in ECE and CSE streams, for the Academic Year 2017-18. The Baseline phase of the survey was conducted from June 2017 to April 2018 in the same 42 institutions, in which the Stanford survey team monitored approximately 18,000 students (1st and 3rd year students), 3,500 faculties and 100 Heads of the Department.

The End line phase of the programme was held during the second semester of the Academic Year 2018 -19 between May 2018 to July 2019 for same set of students (second year and fourth year students), faculty and HODs, who were involved in the Baseline survey in the 42 colleges selected earlier. After compilation and analysis of the data collected by the Stanford University team from July 2019 to September 2019, a Final Internal Report was submitted in October 2019 by the Stanford University to AICTE on the findings of the survey. Stanford University will submit a comprehensive final report to AICTE covering all aspects required for improving the student learning in colleges/ institutes in India pending which AICTE has geared up for implementing Student Learning Assessment survey in its institutions.

5.1.3 Protsahan Bharati

By March 2020, App was opened for use by AICTE officials on a trial basis. One training session was organized for all officers of AICTE and feedback was taken, to improve the App.






Fig. 5.1.3: Protsahan Bharati Android application on Play store

5.1.4 360 Degree Feedback for Teachers

Teachers play a key role in developing the precious human resource, the young talent of students that shape the future of our country and need to be constantly upgraded. Factoring this, AICTE 7th Pay Regulation defines the process of collecting the 360-degree feedback data that will be submitted by the education institutes. It starts by first establishing a data framework that maps teachers, students and subjects/courses to capture the data at source through an online mechanism.

In this application, performance of a faculty will be measured by various factors viz. self-reporting of the teaching process, contributions to the society, feedback from the head of the department, principal and students. In order to facilitate this process, AICTE in association with Smart Cookie Rewards Pvt. Ltd (having MoU with AICTE) has developed an online Framework to collect the feedback data. The system will further summarize and share the collected data for the department/ institute/ college management for giving increments and promotions for the teachers. Also, AICTE will provide regulatory compliance to ensure transparency and fairness in the process. Till January 2020 eight colleges have been inquired and implementation manuals have been sent to all these eight colleges. In the month of February and March emails have been sent to TPOs of more AICTE approved institutions. An implementation plan has been prepared and data of over 5 lakh teachers data have been shared with Smart cookie and accordingly college masters have been created for more than 10,000 institutions and teachers' masters have been created for more than 5 lakh teachers.

Detailed implementation plan includes Data Upload, Data Verification, App Distribution, Credential Distribution, Training and Helpdesk with following:

- Implementation schedule based on the target dates given as feedback by colleges.
- Training platform and training mechanism, train the trainer that can be college staff and students.

5.1.5 AICTE web portal

The web-portal of AICTE connects the organization with its stakeholders and it is the endeavour of e-Governance Cell to continuously upgrade the web-interface for a pleasing experience. During the year, several initiatives were taken in this direction which are as follows:

New features added on AICTE web portal:

- 24 x 7 Automated Help: Chatbot Integration
- To get authentic Faculty data, Faculty PAN Number has been validated against NSDL PAN Database.
- New professional look and feel for better experience in doing entries on portal
- Separate flows are introduced for new institute, New University, Existing Institute and Existing University.
- Dashboards have been prepared for Regional Offices and Headquarter.
- E-Improvement's
- Disaster Recovery Services have been invited to bring better reliability of e-governance applications.
- Security audits of network and e-Gov applications have been done and suggestions given have been implemented.

Security Audit for Network:

The AICTE network at HQs and Regional Offices was security audited by STPI, Bangalore to ensure security compliance of guidelines of MeiTY, Govt. of India. All network based services were upgraded with Active Directory implementation and updated firewall as well as Anti-Virus services as per recommendations of STPI. Servers and Bandwidth from ISP was also upgraded to meet ever-growing demand for fast internet access by users.

Security Audit for E-Governance Applications:

As a mandatory exercise Application Security Audit of web applications of AICTE like Pragati, Saksham, JK Scholarship, Startup, deemed university, Clean campus was carried out and all vulnerabilities fixed.

New Initiatives:



E-Governance cell has initiated NKN connectivity for AICTE Hqs and its Regional Offices,

Improved SMS services through NIC, Cloud hosting for new and on-going applications so as to have state-of-art technology and maintain pace with emerging areas, including Artificial Intelligence (AI), cloud hosting and computing, Machine Learning etc.

5.2 AICTE Training and Learning Academy Cell

Training with the latest tools and technologies is vital to keeping an institute competitive and more productive. It is required for increasing the knowledge and skills of students to make them more employable to acquire global competencies. Picking up from the recommendations of a committee that prepared Perspective Plans for technical education in India specifically on emerging technologies, it was decided to set up AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academies; first ones being at Jaipur (Rajasthan) followed by Vadodara (Gujarat), Thiruvananthapuram (Kerala) and Guwahati (Assam). Establishment of 11 more ATAL Academies was announced by Hon'ble Minister Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal Nishank, Hon'ble Union Minister, Human Resource Development in the presence of Shri Sanjay Dhotre, State Minister of Human Resource Development, Govt. of India on 11.09.2019.

Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs) are conducted by the ATAL Academies in emerging technology areas like: Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things, (IoT), Blockchain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber Security, 3D Printing & Design, Augmented Reality (AR)/ Virtual Reality (VR) etc. The training programmes are conducted by highly qualified faculty from IITs, NITs, IIITs etc and also industry.During the year, more than 10000 faculties from across the country undertook 190 courses that were conducted in face-to-face mode, out of which 170 were on the emerging technologies.




Fig. 5.2.2: State-wise distribution of FDPs conducted by ATAL Academies

5.3 Induction & Internship Cell

5.3.1 Induction Cell

The Induction Cell has been established in AICTE to coordinate and oversee all activities related to the Student Induction Programme (SIP). The purpose of the SIP is to help new students adjust and feel comfortable in the new environment, inculcate in them the ethos and culture of the institution, help them build bonds with other students and faculty members, and expose them to a sense of larger purpose and self-exploration.

The effective rolling out and implementation of SIP requires training for faculty (through FDP) in all AICTE approved institutions who have to conduct the SIP which has been made mandatory for all UG courses and introduced in the model curriculum of Diploma courses also. To implement these FDPs, AICTE has formed a National Coordination committee for Induction Programme (NCC-IP). Model curriculum of Universal Human Values II (UHV-II) has also been contemplated as part of the UG course.

During the Financial Year 2019-20, 143 offline FDPs were conducted and 10032 faculty members were trained. (Out of which 37 FDPs were conducted by the AKTU). A workshop for Resource Persons was organised on 28-09-19 and 29-09-19 at AKG College of Engineering, Ghaziabad. A web portal was developed for organizing FDPs, Monitoring Progress, displaying relevant study material and issuing Certificates. (www.fdp-si.aicte-india.org).

5.3.2 Internship Cell

AICTE has formulated its Internship Policy that makes internship mandatory for students as part of their curriculum. This will ensure exposure to the industrial environment, current technology relevant to their subjects and opportunities to learn, understand and sharpen real-time technical and managerial skills. Towards effective implementation of the Policy, an Internship Cell has been functional which focuses on facilitation of internships by connecting with internship providers and uses technology extensively.

A portal has been developed services as a one-stop-shop solution for students, of AICTE approved institutions. Besides the industries, corporates, non-corporates (SMEs) and start-ups, the portal has on-boarded number of government bodies Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA), National Highway Authority of India (NHAI), Indian Railways to name a few, as well as several Research organisations. It is envisioned to realize a target of facilitating 1 crore internships by 2025. 37 Union Ministries and 16 PSUs have been requested to provide internships at the portal and sign MoU with AICTE.

During the year, an initiative was taken requesting District Magistrates across the country to offer internships to students, to facilitate exposure to live problems/ issues/ challenges at the district level to students from nearby institutions. Likewise, AICTE reached out to the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI) urging it to provide internships on infrastructure projects which agreed for engagement of 5000 interns recommended by AICTE. As a big boost, the Ministry of Housing & Urban Affairs has together with AICTE, created The Urban Learning Internship Programme (TULIP), to provide internships to fresh engineers in urban local bodies. TULIP will provide access to internship opportunities spread over 4400 urban local bodies and smart cities pan India.

For facilitating internships and industry-academia collaborations, AICTE decided to conduct 20 nation-wide IMPACT (Internship Mobilization & Promotion through Academia Corporate Tie-up) Workshops. 20 Mentor colleges along with their 10 Mentee institutions (total 200 institutions) are connected with industry, by AICTE. These institutes are adopting cluster based approaches for internships and placements arrangements. A portal has been developed for proper coordination between Mentor Institutions, Mentee Institutions, respective SPIUs, NPIUs and AICTE. A MoU was signed by AICTE with National Project Implementation Unit (NPIU) for activities, to benefit the institutes under TEQIP III which inter alia included 20 IMPACT workshops and 30 FDPs for Student Induction Programme (SIP).




Fig. 5.3.3: J&K Internships AICTE Portal

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AICTE and IIT – Bombay agreed on "Promotion of Entrepreneurship" through an MoU signed on 19-11-2019. The MoU is a form of mutual commitment in the promotion of Entrepreneurship among the students studying in AICTE accredited colleges with the help of The Entrepreneurship Cell of IIT Bombay. More than 500 students from AICTE affiliated engineering colleges attended E-Summit 2020, conducted under the ambit of MoU.

Towards implementation of Internship Policy and other Quality Initiatives of AICTE and discussing the challenges/ problems/ issues related to them, one-day Workshop was organised on 28-09-2019. More than 350 Training and Placement Officers, industry representatives from across the country attended the workshop. Likewise, a Workshop on implementation of AICTE Internship Policy in the state of Rajasthan was organized by AICTE and Bikaner Technical University in association with Bhardwaj Foundation, Jaipur and Rajasthan Chamber of Commerce, Trade and Industry at MNIT, Jaipur on 21-06-2019. Executives from sectors such as IT/ITeS, Telecom, Automotive, Construction and Electronics, attended the workshop. Vice Chancellors, Principals, Directors of the Technical Universities and Institutions located in Rajasthan also attended.

Second Conference of Academic Leadership on 'National Education Policy' was organised on 27th July 2019 by AICTE in association with Bharatiya Shikshan Mandal (BSM), UGC, IGNOU, AIU, IGNCA, JNU, ICSSR, RNT and STPI organised 2nd 'Conference of Academic Leadership on the National Education Policy'. 5.4 National Educational Alliance for Technology (NEAT)

NEAT is a public-private partnership between the Government (through its implementing agency AICTE) and the Education Technology companies of India. AICTE is playing the role of facilitator between Ed-Tech companies and students/ youth, thereby enhancing their employability skills, bridge their learning gaps and enhance employability. NEAT was conceptualized to bring the best technological solutions in pedagogy to the existing students and youth of the country. The Artificial Intelligence-based portal helps the learners get a personalized learning experience. NEAT also has a scheme for providing free seats to students of economically and socially weaker sections of society. The distribution of free seats will be implemented by AICTE based on student information shared by Educational Institutions.

13 education technology companies- Amphisoft Technologies, CL Educate Limited, CodeTantra Tech Solutions, Digital Future of Education, English Helper Education Technologies, FACE, Wiley India, Individual Learning, Info Plus Technologies, LetzConnect Technologies, Perfectice Eduventure, THG Publication, upGrad Education- were selected for offering their products/ solution spread over Assessment Test, Certification Course, Class Management, Placement Support, Coding, testing and e-Content.

In order to create awareness about the products being offered from the NEAT portal, awareness workshops were conducted across nine states (Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Delhi, Gujarat, Karnataka, Kerala, Maharashtra, Rajasthan and West Bengal) of the country. Total number of registration of the NEAT portal till 31 March 2020 is 8100 which includes 6500 registered students and 1600 registered faculty, professionals engaged in job for up-skilling. NEAT has recieved 22,500 seats as an advance free seat from coupons from 13 Ed Tech companies (45 products). The total worth of advance free seats is more than Rs.25 crore.

5.5 Skill Development Cell (SDC)

Skill Development Cell has been entrusted the responsibility to train youth by providing them skills through AICTE approved Colleges/Registered facilitators with objective for enhancing their Employment/Self-Employment opportunities. The Cell is running various schemes to meet its objectives.

5.5.1 Wheebox Employability Skill Test 2019

Council has partnered with Wheebox, a Global Talent Assessment company and its consortium partners to build & publish the "India Skills Report". Wheebox conducts an on-line examination for all pre-final and final year graduates of





AICTE approved institutes. The outcome of the test will help the institute to identify core strength and improvement areas of their students in the form of transcript and certification (Jointly certified by CII & AIU). This test also measures and identifies talent using validated, reliable and standardized tests for pre-hiring and learning needs.

This test eventually helps in publishing India Skills Report. The report captures the skill levels of the supply side as assessed on the Employability skill assessment test and needs of the demand side of the Talent Supply chain as captured by India Hiring Intent Survey. In 2019, Wheebox changed its test name to Wheebox National Employability Test (WNET). The India Skills Report 2019 was launched by Shri Dinesh Sharma, Deputy Chief Minister, Uttar Pradesh at Lucknow, in association with Confederation of Indian Industry (CII), AICTE, Association of Indian Universities (AIU), LinkedIn, and People Strong & United Nations Development Programme (UNDP).

5.5.2 Vocational Degree/Diploma Programmes

Vocational Degree/ Diploma Programmes are offered under National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) by AICTE approved institutions. Under this scheme, the education component is taught by the institute and the skill component is covered by Industry Partner or Skill Knowledge Provider (SKP), approved by AICTE or NSDC or any government agency. In AY 2019-20, Council received applications from 673 institute to run vocational courses.out of which, council approved 473 institutes with an intake of 35,475 to run vocational courses in the AY 2019-20

5.5.3 National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM)

NEEM aims to offer on-the-job practical training to enhance employability of a person either pursuing his/ her graduation/ diploma in any technical or non-technical stream. Under the scheme, AICTE has registered NEEM Facilitators who are giving NSQF compliant industrial training to students for a minimum of 3 months and a maximum of 36 months. Till date, there are 40 NEEM Facilitators and around 2.4 lakh student trainees are enrolled and benefiting from different NEEM facilitators.

5.5.4 AICTE- UKIERI Technical Education Leadership Development Programme (TELDP)

AICTE signed an implementation agreement with the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (DBEIS), UK, on the joint operation of the activities under UK India Education and Research Initiative (UKIERI) Phase-III. Under this, the Council is conducting the Technical Education Leadership Development Programme (TELDP) for the senior faculty of AICTE approved institutions. Participants selected for TELDP workshop have to attend three workshops in a year and carry out a Change Management project in their organization to get a certificate from Chartered Management Institution (CMI), UK.

In the year 2019, applications were invited from the faculty of all AICTE approved institutions under the AICTE- TELDP and 1270 nominations were received. Training programme was conducted for 200 participants in two cohorts of 100 each; first workshop in Delhi during July/ August 2019 and the second in Jodhpur during December 2019. The third workshop scheduled in Indore during March 2020 stands postponed due to COVID-19 pandemic.

5.5.5 AICTE - Vishwakarma Awards 2019

AICTE instituted Vishwakarma Awards in 2017, to encourage and motivate young students and institutions to raise their performance in their specific domains leading to significant contribution towards the growth and development of the nation as a whole. In the year 2019, AICTE called applications for the Vishwakarma Award 2019, with the theme "How to enhance the income of Village" in two distinct categories: Category-I: Chhatra Vishwakarma Awards (CVA) - for Outstanding Innovative Team (for Students & Mentor) and (b) Category-II: Utkrisht Sansthan Vishwakarma Award (USVA) for exemplary Institutional intervention.

5.6 Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS) Cell

PMSSS is an initiative of MHRD aimed at the students of Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh entering into higher education, responsibility of whose execution is entrusted with the PMSSS Cell of AICTE. The scholarship provides assistance for the youth in these regions for higher education outside the state.

The Scheme is operational since 2013-14 and has undergone some major changes during academic year 2019-20 as per the decisions taken by the Inter-Ministerial Committee (IMC) of MHRD, Govt. of India. In Professional Stream, there were 2830 scholarships which include Engineering, Hotel Management & Catering Technology, B. Pharmacy, B. Architecture and B.Sc. (Nursing) programmes etc. In general stream programmes, the scholarships were 2830 and 100 for Medical Stream to enhance their employment opportunities. A special emphasis was given to ensure quality education by including NBA/ NAAC accredited and NIRF Ranked Institutions through on-line counselling process conducted by AICTE and 4404 students reported to the allotted institution which includes lateral entry (diploma) admission in Engineering Stream only.

AICTE conducted Interactive Sessions for Principal/Faculty of Schools/Colleges in Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh generating awareness about the PMSSS Scheme during the year 2019-20. The awareness workshops were also organised at various places in the regions like Kargil, Leh, Anantnag, Kupwara, Baramulla, Doda, Rajouri, Kathua, Jammu and Srinagar in co operation with J & K Government for the aspiring students and their parents.

5.7 SWAYAM

SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) is a programme of MHRD designed to achieve the three cardinal principles of Education Policy viz. access, equity and quality. SWAYAM has emerged as one of the World's largest Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) integrated platform and portal for online courses, using information and communication technology (ICT), covering subjects from high school onwards till higher education and also skill sector courses to ensure that every student benefits from learning material through ICT. The courses hosted on SWAYAM are in 4 quadrants – (1) video lecture, (2) specially prepared reading material that can be downloaded/printed (3) self-assessment tests through tests and quizzes and (4) an online discussion forum for clearing the doubts. Steps have been taken to enrich the learning experience by using audio-video and multimedia and state of the art pedagogy/ technology.

5.7.1 Development of SWAYAM 2.0

IIT Madras has recently developed SWAYAM 2.0 MOOCs Platform the higher version which is expected to have attributes like: Higher Scalability and Performance; Enhanced features for faculty and students; Improved assessment and evaluation; Internationalisation; Translation to Indian languages; Local chapters and mentors; Offering of on-line Degrees Source:

5.7.2 Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT)

MHRD launched the Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT) on 13-11-2018, a major and unique initiative towards online professional development of 1.5 million higher education faculty using SWAYAM. AICTE has been nominated as National Coordinator (NC) for ARPIT by MHRD. It has also been appointed as NC for self-paced courses and other remaining courses which do not fall within the ambit of other NCs as stipulated in SWAYAM MOOCs guidelines.

70 discipline-specific National Resource Centres (NRCs) were identified to prepare online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new & emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum. During the year 2018, SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 6.909 Crore from MHRD for disbursement to 47 NRCs @ Rs.14.70 lakh to each NRC. During 2018-19, 46 NRCs were released grant @ Rs.14.70 lakh each, for conducting online courses for faculty of higher education institutions.

ARPIT-2019

21 discipline-specific NRCs have been asked to prepare online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new & emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum. SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 5.29 Crore from MHRD for ARPIT 2019 for disbursement to 21 discipline-specific NRCs. The grant was disbursed to the eligible NRCs, based on the Utilisation Certificate and Receipt & Payment Accounts for FY 2018-19.

During the year 2019-2020, AICTE signed MoU with Vivekananda Institute of Human Excellence, Ramakrishna Math, Domalguda, Hyderabad on 04-02-2020, for creation of self-paced courses/ credit online courses for SWAYAM in the capacity of National Coordinator.

5.8. MHRD's Innovation Cell (MIC)

MHRD Innovation Cell has been established by MHRD at AICTE to systematically foster the culture of innovation, entrepreneurship and start-up in Higher Educational Institutes (HEIs) across the country. MIC has conducted various activities in the following categories to build and streamline the innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem in HEIs in the country.

5.8.1 Smart India Hackathon (SIH)

SIH is a national initiative by the Ministry of HRD, Gol and implemented by MHRD's Innovation Cell at AICTE. Over the years, SIH has evolved as the world's biggest open innovation model. SIH is a unique initiative to identify new and disruptive technological innovations for solving the challenges faced by our country. The third edition of SIH was conducted in the year 2019.



Total student participation in SIH2019 crossed 2 lakhs and the number of ideas submitted was more than 57,000 coming from more than 34,000 teams. Student participation from 2235 institutions to solve problems given by 167 organizations (including 95 Industries, 17 Ministries, and 55 MSMEs) and Student Innovation category was witnessed.

532 problem statements were created for students out of which 334 were software solution related and 198 for hardware solutions. The Grand Finale for Software Edition was conducted on 2-3-2019 & 3-3-2019 in 48 nodal centres across the country. Grand finale of hardware sub-edition of SIH 2019 was conducted during 8-7-2019 and 12-7-2019 across 18 nodal centres.

Out of 319 winning teams from SIH2019 Software edition, 134 teams have been mapped and connected with DST funded Technology Business Incubators (TBIs) to take their projects forward. Some of the winning teams have also received internship offers from industries. Few ministries have also accepted some of their winning teams to take forward their projects by implementing them as solutions.

5.8.2 Singapore India Hackathon

Singapore India Hackathon is the first International hackathon, a joint initiative by Govt. of India and Govt. of Singapore. The second edition of Singapore India Hackathon was held in September, 2019 at IIT Madras, India, focused on three themes 'Good Health and Well-Being' 'Quality Education' and 'Affordable and Clean Energy'. It was designed as a fast-paced non-stop 36-hours competition to develop creative and innovative solutions for pressing problems faced by the two countries. The event saw participation of 40 teams, 20 from both countries, each with 6 participants. Winning teams were felicitated by the Hon'ble Prime Minister of India.

5.8.3 IDEAthon

Realizing the importance of orienting the community of scientists and technologists around the country at this crucial time to scout technological solutions that can help the society and government in effectively handling the crisis arising in light of the pandemic, Fight Corona IDEAthon, a 2-day online Ideathon, was jointly organised by AICTE, MHRD Innovation




Fig. 5.8.1: Zone-wise Distribution of IICs



Cell, InnovatioCuris, Forge as organising partners and MEITY Startup Hub, DST, and other organisations of global and national prominence offered support in terms of Technology, Knowledge, Outreach, etc.

This event was conceived and executed in a short span of 8 days. With 21 partners, the IDEAthon witnessed more than 5500 participants including student innovators, researchers, and startup founders. Also over 150 mentors and jury members- including domain experts, healthcare providers, professionals and innovation mentors, etc. from across the country joined to support and guide the innovators in their pursuit of designing a technically feasible, and economically viable solution to the curated set of problems. Online webinars, master classes and live one-one mentoring sessions were also organized to support innovators and guide them in technical design, innovation acceleration and rapid development of their prototypes.

5.8.4 Network of Institution Innovation Councils (IIC)

More than 1600 IICs have been established in higher education institutions across the country to encourage, inspire and nurture students to develop ideas and convert them into prototypes during their formative years. IICs programme was launched on 21-11-2018 by Shri Prakash Javadekar, Minister of Human Resource Development at AICTE. An annual calendar of suggestive activities is released for Institutions of Higher Education for the Academic period from November 2018 to July 2019, which include national, regional and institute level programmes such as developing cognitive skills, design thinking, IPR, Business plan development etc.

5.8.5 Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA)

ARIIA is an initiative of the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) to systematically rank all major higher educational institutions and universities in India, on indicators related to Innovation and Entrepreneurship Development. Hon'ble Minister, Shri Prakash Javadekar, MHRD unveiled ARIIA Framework on 30-08-2018 and the results were announced by Hon'ble President of India on 08-04-2019 in Vigyan Bhawan.

1473 HEIs had registered for ARIIA, representing 33 states and UTs of these, 815 HEIs including institutes of national importance are in the fray, competing in this national ranking process. The institutions were grouped in two broad categories- Publicly funded and privately/ Self-financed institutions".

5.8.6 National Innovation and Start-up Policy (NISP)

NISP is a unique guiding framework for higher education institutes for defining new incentivizing methodology for faculty and students keen on pursuing innovation and entrepreneurship activities along with academics. The programme heavily focuses on mechanisms for IP ownership, equity sharing between institutes and incubated start-ups, time allocations for start-up activities, etc. Towards implementation of NISP, nominations of a senior faculty from each higher education institute were invited for orientation and offering handholding support in the implementation process. First phase of nominations is closed and a total of 1012 HEIs submitted their faculty nomination details. Faculty nominated by a total of 898 HEIs have been trained during firstphase.

5.8.7 MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV)

A new academic programme, MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV), is introduced. This course is designed with action and out-come oriented syllabus to offer opportunity for students with innovative and problem-solving mind-set to work on challenging ideas and successfully build ventures while simultaneously earning the Master's degree. The programme was rolled-out as pilot in four institutes across India in 2019-20.

6.2 Hindi Cell

6.2.1 Meetings of Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC)

In order to ensure compliance of Official Language Act, 1963, Official Language Rules, 1976 and propagation of the progressive use of Hindi, an Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC) has been set up in AICTE, headed by the administrative head of the Council to assess the progressive use of Hindi and to comply the orders issued by Ministry of Human Resources Development and Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs from time to time. The meetings of OLIC were held on 04-04-2019, 24-09-2019 and on 23-12-2019 in which several decisions were taken in these meetings to enhance the use of Hindi in office.

6.2.2 Takniki Pathyapustak Puraskar Yojana (TPPY)

With a view to achieve the goals of planned and coordinated development of technical education and to implement the provisions of the Official Language policy of the Government of India, AICTE has introduced Takniki Pathyapustak Puraskar Yojana. This initiative serves to fill the gap of textbooks which can provide knowledge about state of the art in Engineering and Technology disciplines, in Hindi. For the year 2016-17, 10 authors were selected for prizes who were felicitated by Prof. Anil D. Sahasrabudhe, Prof. M.P. Poonia and Prof. A.P. Mittal in a function organized on 05-07-2019

6.2.3 Financial Assistance for Manuscript writing for Hindi Technical and other books

It was noted by AICTE that English being the predominant medium of higher education for Engineering, Management and other technical subjects, the demand for books in Hindi is less posing financial hurdles in their publication. In order to increase the books in Hindi on engineering management and other technical subjects, another scheme by AICTE was been started in the year 2018. 


Fig. 6.3.1: AICTE followers during the year 2019-20, on Facebook and Twitter

6.4 Library

- Open Source Library Software Koha 4.18 was duly installed in order to facilitate Computerization of library resources, data entry of the books has been taken up with other work such as customization of software, creating patrons, generating QR code etc.
- Over 4200 English/ Hindi books were accessioned
- Higher and Technical Education related news snippets from media, including 16 newspaper received in the Library as well as online information, were collected and catalogued
- Details of the AICTE programmes/ activities in electronic form are received in the Library from October 2018 onwards for maintenance in an archive for retrieval as per demand in future.
- Library staff presented the paper titled Smart Age and Smart Library during the 8th International Library and Information Professionals Summit (I-LIPS 2019) organized by Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University (BBAU), Lucknow (Uttar Pradesh). The theme of the Summit organized during 22-11-2019 to 24-11-2019 in collaboration with United Nations of India, The International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) and Special Library Association (SLA) was "Empowering Libraries with Emerging Technologies for Common Sustainable Future". The paper presenters were awarded with a shield as one of the Best Presented Paper during the Conference.



7.1 Finance

AICTE receives grants-in-aid from the Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD), Government of India towards implementation of various schemes. During the Financial Year 2019-20, AICTE received grants to the tune of Rs. 43600.00 lakh for AICTE Schemes, Rs. 20701.50 lakh for J & K Scholarship Scheme and Rs. 817.33 lakh for SWAYAM MOOCs under Plan Head from MHRD. MHRD has not released any grants under Non-Plan category and AICTE has been incurring expenditure under Non-Plan head from its own generated funds. The unspent balance from the previous year 2018-19 was Rs. 11359.58 lakh and Rs. 187089.31 lakh for Plan and Non Plan respectively. Grants from the AICTE own generated funds were also released to Innovation Cell (Rs. 1100.00 lakh). The scheme/head-wise details of expenditure for the Financial Year 2019-20 are given in section B of the Annual Report.

7.2 Allocation

7.2.1 Plan Allocation (Ministry of HRD)

The Grants released by Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) during the financial year 2019-20 was Rs. 65118.83 lakh for AICTE Schemes, J&K Schemes, and SWAYAM MOOCs. An amount of Rs. 11359.58 lakh was the unspent balance of the previous year and the miscellaneous receipts during the Financial Year 2019-20 amounted to Rs. 3337.94 lakh.

7.2.2 Non-Plan Allocation (AICTE own Generated Funds)

No amount was received from the Ministry of HRD as Non-Plan Grants during the financial year 2019-20 for AICTE Schemes. There was Rs. 187089.31 lakh as unspent balance from the previous year 2018-19 and miscellaneous receipt of Rs. 61859.86 lakh.

7.2.3 Innovation Cell

During the Financial Year 2019-20, an amount of Rs. 1100.00 lakh was paid to Innovation Cell Account from AICTE own generated funds (Non-Plan) as per instructions of Ministry of HRD. There was Rs. 152.92 lakh as unspent balance of the previous year 2018-19 and miscellaneous receipts of Rs. 220.35 lakh.





APPENDIX AICTE





It shall be the duty of the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical and management education and maintenance of standards and for the purposes of performing its functions under AICTE Act, the Council may:

- a. undertake survey in the various fields of technical education, collect data on all related matters and make forecast of the needed growth and development in technical education;
- b. coordinate the development of technical education in the country at all levels;
- c. allocate and disburse out of the Fund of the Council such grants, on such terms and conditions as it may think fit to;
 - i) Technical Institutions, and
 - ii) Universities imparting technical education in coordination with the Commission:
- d. promote innovations, research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies to meet developmental requirements and for overall improvement of educational processes;
- e. formulate schemes for promoting technical education for women, handicapped and weaker sections of the society;
- f. Promote an effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems including research and development organizations, industry and the community;
- g. evolve suitable performance appraisal systems for Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education, incorporating norms and mechanisms for enforcing accountability;
- h. formulate schemes for the initial and in service training of teachers and identify institutions or centres and set up new centers for offering staff development programmes including continuing education of teachers;
- i. lay down norms and standards for courses, curricula, physical and instructional facilities, staff pattern, staff qualifications, quality instructions, assessment and examinations;
- j. fix norms and guidelines for charging tuition and other fees;
- k. grant approval for starting new technical institutions and for introduction of new courses or programmes in consultation with the agencies concerned;
- I. advise the Central Government in respect of grant of charter to any professional body or institution in the field of technical education conferring powers, rights and privileges on it for the promotion of such profession in its field including conduct of examinations and awarding of membership certificates;
- m. lay down norms for granting autonomy to technical institutions;



- n. take all necessary steps to prevent commercialization of technical education;
- o. provide guidelines for admission of students to Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education;
- p. inspect or cause to inspect any Technical Institution;
- q. withhold or discontinue grants in respect of courses, programmes to such technical institutions which fail to comply with the directions given by the Council within the stipulated period of time and take such other steps as may be necessary for ensuring compliance of the directions of the Council;
- r. take steps to strengthen the existing organizations, and to set up new organizations to ensure effective discharge of the Council's responsibilities and to create positions of professional, technical and supporting staff based on requirements;
- s. declare technical institutions at various levels and types offering courses in technical education fit to receive grants;
- t. advise the Commission for declaring any institution imparting technical education as a Deemed University:
- u. set up a National Board of Accreditation to periodically conduct evaluation of Technical Institutions or Programmes, on the basis of guidelines, norms and standards specified by it and to make recommendations to it, or to the Council or toe the Commission or to other bodies, regarding recognition or de-recognition of the Institution or the Programmes.
- v. Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

INSPECTION:

- For the purposes of ascertaining the financial needs of technical institution or a University or its standards of teaching, examination and research, the council may cause an inspection of any department or departments of such technical institution or University to be made in such manner as may be prescribed and by such person or persons as it may direct.
- 2. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or University the date on which any inspection under sub-section (1) is to be made and the technical institution or University shall be entitled to be associated with the inspection in such manner as may be prescribed.
- 3. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or the University, its views in regard to the results of any such inspection and may, after ascertaining the opinion of that technical institution or University, recommend to that institution or University the action to be taken as a result of such inspection.
- 4. All communications to a technical institution or University under this section shall be made to the executive authority thereof and the executive authority of the technical institution or University shall report to the Council the action, if any, which is proposed to be taken for the purposes of implementing any such recommendation as is referred to in sub-section (3).

Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts of All India Council for Technical Education for the year ended 31st March 2020

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the All India Council for Technical Education (Council) as at 31st March 2020, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 19 of the AICTE Act, 1987. These financial statements include the accounts of 10 regional offices of AICTE. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4. Based on our audit, we report that:

i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.

ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Education (erstwhile Ministry of Human Resource Development), Government of India vide order No. 29-4/2012-FD dated 17 April 2015 subject to the observations in the report.

iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Council in so far as it appears from our examination of such books. iv. We further report that:

A. Balance Sheet

A.1 Application of Funds

A.1.1 Current Liabilities & Provisions (Schedule 3)-Rs. 704.66 crore

As per the form of Utilisation Certificate for Autonomous Bodies (GFR 12-A), unadjusted advances have to be shown as Unutilized Grant-in-Aid. The unadjusted advances of Rs. 84.55 crore from the Grant-in-Aid as on 3/1st March, 2020 has not been included in the unutilized Grant-in-Aid of Rs. 149.93 crore shown in the above schedule. This has resulted in understatement of Current Liabilities & Provisions and overstatement of Capital Fund by Rs. 84.55 crore.

A.1.2 Fixed Assets (Schedule 4)- Rs.23.23 crore

The Council has released an advance of Rs. 174.91 crore to Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) upto 31.03.2020 for construction of building of AICTE Hqrs, New Delhi. The building was completed and handed over to the Council during 2016-17 (August 2016) and put to use but the same have not been capitalised as expenditure statement has been submitted by DRDO is under examination. This has resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets and overstatement of Loans, Advances & Deposits. Further, depreciation (at the rate of 2%) has not been charged on this building by the Council during the years 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19 and 2019-20. This is being pointed out since 2016-17 but no remedial action has been taken.

B. Principal Accounting Policies (Schedule 23)

As per the Principle Accounting Policy No. 7(b), the retirement benefits are accounted for on cash basis which is in contravention of Accounting Standard 15 and Format of Accounts prescribed by MHRD. This is being pointed out since 2014-15 but remedial action has not been taken.

C. Grants-in-aid

The Council received grants-in-aid of Rs.651.18 crore {General: Rs. 436.00 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs.8.17 crore, PMKY- Nil, TEQIP-II Nil, PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs.207.01 crore} during 2019-20. Out of this grant, Council received Rs. 16crore in the month of March 2020. It had its own receipt of Rs.29.06 crore (Refund of unspent grant: Rs.22.91 crore, Interest & Misc. Income Rs.6.15 crore). The Council had an opening balance of Rs. 113.59 crore {General: Rs. 80.27 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 8.11 crore, PMKVY: Rs.12.61 crore for,



TEQIP-II: Rs.0.03 crore and for PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs.12.57 crore}. Out of total amount of Rs.793.83 crore, it utilised Rs.647.79 crore {General: Rs.439.69crore (include adjustment of advances of Rs 4.32 crore), Swayam MOOCs: Rs.10.26 crore, and PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs.197.84 crore}.

The Council had a closing balance of Rs.146.04 crore {General Rs. 84.38 crore, Swayam MOOCs Rs.9.61 crore, PMKVY Rs.28.97 crore, TEQIP Rs.0.03 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme Rs.23.05 crore)} as of 31st March 2020.

D. Management letter: Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Member Secretary, AICTE through a management letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the said financial statements, read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:

a. In so far as they relate to the Balance Sheet of the state of affairs of the All India Council for Technical Education as at 31 March 2020; and

b. In so far as they relate to the Income and Expenditure Account of the surplus for the year ended on that date.

- 1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System
- The Council has an Internal Audit cell.
- Internal Audit of AICTE Hqrs was not conducted during 2019-20.
- During the year 2019-20, internal audit of 5 Regional Offices were planned out of which 3 were audited during the year.

2. Adequacy of Internal Control System

The Internal Control System of the Council needs strengthening in following areas:-

• The internal audit reports pertaining to 3 ROs of Council conducted by the Internal Audit cell during the year 2019-20 revealed deficiencies viz. excess payment, irregular purchase of air ticket, unsettled advances, inadmissible/ irregular payments, irregular stay at hostel in place of AICTE own guest house, non-submission of UC of advances given and non-following of tendering process.

• The management's response to audit objections is not effective as 127 audit paras were outstanding as on 31.03.2020.

• Non adjustment of National Board of Accreditation Workshop Advances of Rs. 34.03 lakh and advance of Rs. 3.10 lakh to JNTU since 2012-13 and 2007-08 respectively.

3. System of physical verification of fixed assets

- The physical verification of Land and Building has been conducted upto 31/3/2020.
- The physical verification of other Fixed Assets has been conducted upto 2018-19.

4. System of physical verification of inventory

• The physical verification of inventories like stationery and consumables has been conducted up to 2018-19.

5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

• As per annual accounts, no payment over six months in respect of statutory dues was outstanding as on 31.03.2020.



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
