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Preface



AICTE having been established through an Act of Parliament as a statutory body provides direction to improve quality of technical education in the country through regulations and policies. It has discharged its duties through regulations, coordination and facilitation and is largely known as a regulator, approving the technical institutions and the courses offered by them, responding to the growing need of technical manpower. From stakeholders' perspective, AICTE has been extending financial, intellectual and policy support in the matters of students (admission, courses, fees, scholarships); faculty (qualifications, salary, development and promotion), institution (approvals, infrastructure, accreditation, innovation and research); industry (curriculum, emerging areas, internships); society (disadvantaged sections, meritorious, societal challenges) in the larger national perspective of technical education.

The year 2020-21 started with the world slipping into an unprecedented uncertainty after the Coronavirus outbreak and the academic cycles also being hit hard. AICTE too was taken aback, but was back to complete its critical annual Approval Process with the commitment, resilience and robustness put to severe test. AICTE oversaw successful conduction of examinations, approval to new institutions and courses, admission of students, running of the courses in this unprecedented situation. Technology was used to the hilt, in the process in an innovative manner to not only complete the process but also embrace the changes for the future.

AICTE proactively reached out to the pandemic-stressed students through a Helpline as a first response and followed it up by arranging e-learning contents free of cost and facilitating internships to support the students across the country. The expanse of scholarships to girl child (Pragati Scheme) and differently-abled (Saksham) was increased both in numbers and geographical spread. Students from Jammu, Kashmir & Ladakh regions were facilitated the opportunity to do internships with IITs and IISERs. Youth Undertaking Visit for Acquiring Knowledge (YUVAK) Scheme was launched to support students for an educational tour to ATAL tunnel in J&K. AICTE also launched a scheme for Technical Book Writing to source books in regional languages to the students, conforming to the requirement of the NEP 2020 in order to provide engineering education in regional languages.

The support to strengthen the institutions continued through MODROBS and CAFES Schemes and was intensified by launch of SPICES Scheme for student clubs. Polytechnics and Aspiring institutions were put under



focus for enhancement of their laboratories, while institutions in North East region were exclusively considered for hostels and also solving water and electricity woes in the campuses. During the year, AICTE IDEA (Idea Development, Evaluation & Application) Labs Scheme was launched to create 24x7 infrastructure to support the new-age learning, focused on imparting 21st century skills.

The teachers are pivotal in education systems and their development is the key to maintaining quality of education. During the year, they were put in an uneasy condition and forced to adopt online teaching to complete the semesters. ATAL Academy conducted online FDPs on emerging technologies by experts from IITs, NITs, IIITs, Central/ state universities and trained 1.65 lakh teachers- a superlative feat that earned us recognition from the World Book of Records! MoUs were signed with Technical Universities and NITs in different states to help faculty update their domain knowledge. Professional development of teachers was facilitated, also through funding research projects, e-resources for research and e-conferences.

During the year, Indian Knowledge System (IKS) Cell of the Ministry of Education became operational in AICTE, with a special mandate to take initiative and contribute towards spreading the rich heritage of India and its traditions. AICTE developed an AI based auto-translation tool for sourcing courses in regional languages, which will ensure that the quality and quantity of information/ instruction will be accessible to all students. The Ministry's Innovation Cell (MIC) among other things conducted the 4th Smart India Hackathon, ASEAN India Hackathon, IDEathon and launched Toycathon 2021 during the year, besides handing out the ARIIA rankings and bands to 332 HEIs.

AICTE also recognizes the efforts/ services of all those contributing to its march for quality. To the list of Chhatra Vishwakarma Award, Clean and Smart Campus Award, Utkrisht Sansthan Vishwakarma Award, AICTE-CII Awards given during the year, AICTE added few more- recognizing the excellence/ best practices/ innovativeness of teachers in technical education (Visvesvaraya Best Teachers); acknowledging the contribution of women (Lilavati Award); and realization of institutional excellence in Universal Human Values (Prof RR Gaur Excellence Award). AICTE-Emeritus Professor Scheme was introduced to recognize and utilize the expertise of highly qualified, experienced and accomplished professionals, for the benefit of AICTE approved institutes.

This annual report comes at a time when India shaken up by the second pandemic wave is awaiting the return of normalcy. Despite the uncertainty, AICTE is going ahead, not allowing its activities to suffer, and has prepared the technical institutions for the next academic session. Factoring in the aspirations and anxieties of the stakeholders, during the year it left no stone unturned to convert global-scale adversity into opportunity, allowing innovations to happen and adopt them. I am confident that our achievements and also the lessons learnt during the year, will benefit other educational bodies, institutions, teachers and students alike, and AICTE's next annual report will be equally impressive.

01 | AICTE & ITS STATUTORY BODIES

1.1 Statutory Bodies & their Composition

All India Council for Technical Education has been established through an Act of Parliament (Act No. 52 of 1987) with a view to the proper planning and co-ordinated development of the technical education system throughout the country, the promotion of qualitative improvement of such education in relation to planned quantitative growth and the regulation and proper maintenance of norms and standards in the technical education system and for matters connected therewith. In order to effectively function and discharge its duties, AICTE seeks directions, guidance and advice from different statutory bodies.

1.1.1 The Council

The Council is a 51-member body and has a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Member Secretary with tenure appointments as per AICTE Act. The Council includes amongst others, representatives of various Departments of the Government of India, the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha, Government of States and Union Territories, representatives from the Statutory Boards and Committees of the Council, Professional Bodies and organizations in the fields of concerned areas of technical education and research and also organizations in the field of industry and commerce, etc. The AICTE Act empowers the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical education. The powers and functions assigned to the Council are given in **Appendix 1.1**. The Council performs its functions in consultation with State Governments, Universities, State Boards of Technical Education, Professional Bodies and experts etc.

On completion of the term of the previous constituted Council on 05-01-2015, MHRD advised AICTE vide its letter No. 1-1/2018-TS-II dated 10-04-2018 to conduct meetings of Council with 44 ex-officio members and representing various organizations as per the laid down procedure. The letter of MHRD is placed at **Appendix 1.2**.

1.1.2 The Executive Committee

The Executive Committee is a 21-member body constituted by the Council and discharges such functions as may be assigned to it by the Council. The Executive Committee is chaired by the Chairman of the Council and includes Vice-Chairman of the Council; Secretary to the Government of India; two Chairmen of the Regional Committees of the Council; three Chairmen of the All India Boards of Studies of the Council; one member of the Council representing the Ministry of Finance, Govt. of India; four members of the Council representing States/UTs; four members with expertise and distinction in areas relevant to technical education; Chairman of the University Grants Commission; Director of the Institute of Applied Manpower Research and Director General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research. The Member-Secretary of AICTE is also the Member-Secretary of the Executive Committee.

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause 12(1) of the AICTE Act, 1987, the AICTE had reconstituted the Executive Committee on 12-04-2018 for a period of three years. The composition of the Executive Committee is given in **Appendix 1.3**.

1.1.3 All India Boards of Studies

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in their areas of concern including norms & standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses etc. The areas of concern, constitution, functions and powers of the Boards of Studies are such as may be provided by the Council through appropriate Regulations. Initially, the AICTE Act provided for the establishment of five Boards



of Studies. Now, 11-Boards are in existence. Boards of Studies have 10-15 members each and are headed by subject experts of eminence.

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in respective areas of concern including norms and standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses, academic facilities and any other academic matter from time to time. The 10- Boards were reconstituted on 03-01-2020 for a term of 3 years and All India Board of Applied Arts, Craft and Design was formed for the first time w.e.f. 10-09-2018 for a term of three years.

In pursuance of the powers conferred under Clauses 13(1) and 13(2) of the AICTE Act, in all 11 All India Boards of Studies have been constituted by the Council for advising the council in their areas of specialization.

The composition of various All India Boards of Studies is given in **Appendix 1.4** and the names of the Chairpersons are given below.

1.1.4 Regional Committees

According to Clause 14(3) of the AICTE Act, each Regional Committee advises and assists the Council on all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their regions in pursuance of Clauses 14(1) and 14(2) of the AICTE Act, Regional Committees were constituted by the Council at Kolkata, Chennai, Kanpur and Mumbai on 18-04-1990 and subsequently three more Regional Committees were set up at Bangalore, Bhopal and Chandigarh on 28-03-1994. One Regional committee was also set up at Hyderabad on 08-03-2007.

The Regional Committees covering 8 geographical regions advise and assist the Council in all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their respective regions. Each Regional Committee, is headed by an engineer/ technologist of eminence, 15-20 members from industry, technical institutions, universities, State/ Central government organizations and professional bodies/ societies working in the areas of technical education, industry & policy making. Following Regional Committees were functioning during the reporting period. The term of office of the Chairman and other members except ex-officio members shall be for three years from the date of constitution of the Committee:

2.1 Growth of Technical Education

AICTE grants approval for starting new technical institutions and for introducing new courses or programmes in already approved technical institutions, in accordance with the functions assigned to AICTE under Clause 10 (k) of the AICTE Act. The Approval Process Handbook (APH) is revised annually after elaborate discussions with stakeholders and in consultation with respective State Governments and Affiliating Universities, keeping in view the requirement of technical manpower in the country, expectations of the industry, technological changes at global level, and interest of stakeholders, by maintaining transparency.

2.4 Foreign University Registration

In supersession of the Regulations notified by the Council vide Notification No. F. 37-3/ Legal (vi) 2003, dated 03-04-2003 and in exercise of the powers conferred under Section 23 read with Clause (b), Clause (f), Clause (g) and Clause (n), (o), (p) of Section 10 of the AICTE Act, 1987, the Council made regulations for entry and operation of Foreign Universities/ institutions imparting technical education in India. 'AICTE Regulations for Entry and Operation of Foreign Universities in India imparting technical education, 2005' were formulated primarily to check and avoid illegal entry of unscrupulous persons using/ misusing the name of Foreign University/ institution for unlawful gains. To safeguard the interest of all stakeholders, a public notice was issued in all leading newspapers on 05-05-2005 directing the foreign universities operating in India to comply with the above regulations. Communications were sent to all Indian Institutions directing them to comply with this regulation. These regulations were notified in the extraordinary Gazette of India on the 25-05-2005. During the period under report, no new institute for foreign collaboration was approved.

2.5 Deemed-to-be/ De novo Deemed-to-be/ Private Universities

Universities, including private universities established by the State Legislations do not require prior approval from AICTE for starting faculties/courses. However, deemed universities including the universities established by the State Legislature imparting technical education are required to comply with the norms and standards prescribed by AICTE from time to time.

In pursuance of the UGC letters for conferment of deemed to be university status to the institutions in the light of Ministry of Human Resources Development notification no. F. No. 2-1/2006U.3 (A), dated 05-04-2006 and as per provisions contained in Section 20(1) of the AICTE Act, a visiting team is sent by AICTE for on the spot assessment of these institutions. As per directives of the MHRD letter "AICTE nominates a representative on the inspection committee of UGC; the person so nominated by the AICTE may; in addition, head a team of the AICTE on the same day and such other persons who are not part of the UGC's team but merely assist the nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee. The nominee of the AICTE on the UGC committee gives his or her report to the Chairman AICTE in the Proforma prescribed by the AICTE and also on any additional point required by the UGC; which then forwarded by the AICTE to the UGC. UGC's Committee would incorporate the comments of the AICTE in its report submitted to the Commission so that the Commission could take appropriate decisions in the matter before making any recommendation to the MHRD. It has been felt that the above arrangement would serve the purpose of a de facto joint inspection while at the same time satisfying the requirements of the AICTE act regarding its own inspection. Such an arrangement would also ensure that the comments of the AICTE's nominee reflect adequately the comments of the Council and are not merely the individual perceptions of the nominee. This would also satisfy the directions given vide this Ministry's orders of the 05-04-2006, wherein consultation with statutory Councils has been mandated before the UGC forwards its recommendations to the Central Government.

In view of the above direction of MHRD and on the request of UGC during the year 2020-21, AICTE nominated its representatives in the UGC teams along with a panel of experts to assist the UGC nominees to assess the physical and academic infrastructure for conferment of Deemed-to-be/ De novo Deemed-to-be-/ Private Universities status and for reviewing the physical and academic infrastructure and performance of the existing Deemed/ Private Universities. The visit to the Universities has already been conducted and reports forwarded to UGC.

Further, ODL/ Standalone Institutions were also granted approval for conducting 66 courses through ODL mode in the Academic Year 2020-21.

2.7 Unapproved Institutions

AICTE has been established by an Act of Parliament (Act 52 of 1987) with a function among others to grant approval for establishment of new technical institutions, introduction of new courses etc. Regulations have also been notified by the Council with a provision that no technical institution shall conduct technical education programmes in Engineering & Technology, Management, Computer Application, Hotel Management & Catering Technology, Applied Arts and Crafts in India with or without Foreign University Collaboration, without obtaining prior mandatory approval from AICTE. These regulations also have a provision for taking action against such unapproved technical institutions.

Provided further that any institution offering technical programmes without approval of the Council, shall be termed as unapproved if

- It is started without prior approval by the Council
- It is working in temporary location/ at location not approved by the Council
- It is declared as "Unapproved" by the Council

The institutions conducting unapproved courses have been directed from time to time through Public Notices and individual letters under intimation to concerned state government to seek AICTE approval for conducting of technical education programmes or to close down.

Provided further that any technical institution, which has already started without following AICTE approval procedure, wishes to submit an application/proposal, it shall be considered as a new technical institution. For such purpose, they shall apply as per the provisions of Chapter I of Approval Process Handbook. Its legal date of starting will be from the date of issue of the Letter of Approval. Students, who are admitted prior to approval by the Council, will not have any right for re-admission and will have to fulfil all the requirements for admission as prescribed by the competent admission authority.

The representation submitted by the institutions in response to the AICTE letters furnishing clarification and justification for removal of their name from the list of unapproved institutions are examined by a Hearing Committee and based on recommendations of this committee, the names of suitable/ eligible institutions are removed from the list.

The Council maintains a list of unapproved institutions based on the information received from various sources and publishes for the benefit of the general public on its website from time to time. A list of 264 unapproved institutions in Technology & other areas and Architecture institutes respectively, as on 31-03-2021 running technical education programmes/deemed/ courses without prior approval of AICTE has been published on AICTE website.



03 | POLICY & ACADEMIC PLANNING BUREAU

3.1 New Policies/ Regulations

a) Open and Distance Education and Online Education Guidelines 2021

The Bureau framed the AICTE (Open and Distance Learning Education and Online Education) Guidelines-2021 for technical institutions.

The highlights of the guidelines are:

Institutional Level Eligibility Criteria

- 1) Any institution, may apply for offering programmes through the Open and Distance Learning mode and / or Online mode, which fulfils the following conditions, namely: - (a) institutions having NAAC score of 3.26 and above on a scale of 4 or NBA Score of 700 on a scale of 1000 or having rank in top-100 in University category of National institutional Ranking Framework, at least twice in three preceding cycles (at the time of application), shall be permitted to start full-fledged ODL courses and/ or Online courses without prior approval of the AICTE only in the NBA accredited programmes, provided it satisfies all the conditions mentioned in these regulations:

Provided also that institutions shall be required to submit application and desired information, and comply to all the provisions of the Guidelines and shall be required to submit an affidavit to the AICTE.

- 2) Any institution, may apply for offering programmes through the ODL mode and/ or Online mode, which fulfils the following conditions, namely: -
 - i. shall be in existence for at least five years; and
 - ii. shall be accredited by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council with minimum score of 3.01 on a 4-point scale; or
 - iii. NBA accreditation with at least 650 points on a scale of 1,000 or
 - iv. shall be in the top-100 in the University category in the National Institutional Ranking Framework for at least twice in last three preceding cycles (at the time of application).

Provided further, institution has to acquire NBA Accreditation with a minimum score of 650 points on a scale of 1000 in next 2-years from the date of initial approval.

- b) All India Council for Technical Education Regulation on Clarifications on certain issues/ anomalies in 7th CPC pertaining to Qualifications, Pay Scales, Service Conditions Career Advancement Schemes (CAS)/ promotions etc. for Teachers and other academic staff of technical institutions (Degree/Diploma) 2020.
 - After issue of AICTE Gazette notification dated 01-03-2019 on 7th CPC, AICTE had received several references pointing out difficulties in its implementation. These references were examined and placed before the committee of experts. The clarification on 7th CPC were issued vide AICTE Gazette Notification dated 20-05-2020 with the approval of the Ministry of Education (MoE).
- c) All India Council for Technical Education [Clarifications on certain Issues / Anomalies in 6th CPC pertaining to Qualifications, Pay Scales, Service Conditions, Career Advancement Schemes (CAS)/ promotions etc. for Teachers and other Academic Staff of Technical institutions (Degree / Diploma)], 2020.

- After issue of AICTE 6th CPC Gazette Notification dated 05-03-2010, the Council had received number of representations pointing out difficulties in implementation. These representations were examined and placed before the committee of experts and the clarification on 6th CPC were issued vide AICTE Gazette Notification dated 20-05-2020 with the approval of the Ministry of Education (MoE).

3.2 Quality Initiatives

In order to provide quality education to students in technical institutions AICTE Council in its 49th meeting held on 04-03-2017 approved a package of 10 quality initiatives; revision of model curriculum, induction programme for students, mandatory internship, examination reforms, industry readiness, accreditation, start-up an innovation & research promotion are few to mention. Highlights of the activities undertaken by AICTE during the year are given in following sections: -

3.2.1 Model Curriculum

Quality of technical education depends on various factors such as outcome based socially and industrially relevant curriculum, scientific teaching learning process, industry internship and proper evaluation of student's knowledge.

a) Revision of Model Curriculum

AICTE revamped the existing curriculum and launched outcome based model curriculum for Diploma, Undergraduate and Postgraduate Courses in Engineering and PGDM/MBA Courses. Student internship has been redefined and made mandatory whether in corporate world or at institutes of National Importance, National Laboratories or in Developments Sector. Universal Human Value Education has been made an integral part of Course Curriculum.

Revision of Model curriculum of UG Degree course in Engineering and Technology in Electronics & Communication Engineering, Computer Science and Engineering & Mechanical Engineering is in pipeline.

b) Model curriculum for new programmes

Development of model curriculum for the following Undergraduate Degree course in Engineering and Technology is in progress.

1. Smart and Sustainable Energy
2. Robotic and Artificial Intelligence
3. Smart Agritech
4. Construction Automation
5. Industrial IoT
6. Additive Manufacturing

c) Model curriculum for emerging areas

AICTE has also prepared Model curriculum of courses as elective/ minor in Emerging Areas viz. Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things (IoT), Block Chain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber security, 3D Printing and design, Virtual Reality.

d) Highlights of the activity

- Model Curriculum for Mechatronics, Bio-Technology and Automobile Engineering have been launched and model curriculum for B. Tech Degree in AI& Data Science and AI & Machine Learning is being finalized.



- Model Curriculum for Bachelor Degree in Planning and PG Degree in Planning have been launched.
- Programmes in B. Tech with honors/ minor degrees in emerging areas were introduced.

The response of the technical universities and institutions on model curriculum has been overwhelming. Most of the technical universities have adopted the AICTE model curriculum. All these model curriculums are available on AICTE website.

3.2.2 Teachers' Training Policy: Faculty Certification

Training for all new entrants in teaching profession in technical institutions has been made mandatory as per AICTE Teacher's Training Policy, who are required to complete 8 Course modules offered through MOOCS-SWAYAM Platform for career progression. This training is now integrated with teacher's pay scales and service conditions under the 7th pay revision for Technical Teachers and the Gazette notification has been issued accordingly.

3.2.3 Mandatory Accreditation

With a view to improve and maintain the quality of educational programmes, technical institutions are being motivated to get their programmes accredited. It is now mandatory for all technical institutions to have their 60% programmes NBA accredited by 2022 otherwise no extension of approval will be granted.

In order to guide and prepare the institutions desirous of getting their courses accredited, 48 Margdarshaks have been identified and trained to mentor the institutions. These are experienced faculty who have been forthcoming on the call of AICTE, to help the institutions in accreditation. Institutions going for accreditation are encouraged to associate themselves with well-established institutions and seek Margdarshan from 26 institutions selected under scheme Margdarshan to facilitate institutions in getting NBA accreditation. Thus, a hub-and-spoke system is in place under the Margdarshan Scheme, with an institute of repute pivoting itself as a Mentor (hub) to guide and disperse knowledge to ten technical institutions (spokes) to encourage best practices.

Progress of Margdarshan and Margdarshak Scheme handled by Margdarshak cell is given under Section 4.4 of this Report.

3.2.4 Promoting Innovations/ Start-ups

The objective of this initiative is to train the graduating students in applying the knowledge acquired during their course to solve problems. Several other skills get developed in the process of preparing the students making them well-rounded. This in turn helps in creating an enabling ecosystem for innovations and an ideal entrepreneurial ecosystem in technical institutions which can be intensified by strong inter-institutional partnerships and also those with industries.

3.3 Constitution of National Fee Committee

AICTE constituted National Fee Committee duly approved by Ministry of Education under the Chairmanship of Justice (Retd.) Srikrishna in September, 2020 to review the existing fee structure and recommend minimum and maximum fees to be charged by Technical institutions, so that quality education become affordable.

The terms of reference of the Committee are as follows:

- review the existing fee structure.
- study the request received from different stakeholders including legal cases related to fee regulation.
- to fix norms and guidelines for charging tuition and other fees with minimum and maximum limit of fees for the students of technical institutions.
- to suggest necessary steps to prevent commercialization of technical education in the country i.e. to provide no scope for 'profiteering' but allow for marginal surplus for continuous improvement/ development.
- to examine the issue of exemption of fees to SC/ST Students.
- any other issues, if required, which may evolve out of discussion, as decided by the Chairman and other members.

The Committee has so far held 8 meetings and interacted with State Fee regulators, Associations of Management of Technical institutions, and also with parents and students of technical institutions.

The Experts' Committee met twice at AICTE through online mode, to discuss feasibility and implementation of imparting technical education in regional languages/Mother tongue, on 27-11-2020 and 15-12-2020.

Also, a survey on learning of Undergraduate Programs in Regional Languages/ Mother tongue in AICTE Approved institutions was conducted and it is noticed that, students having Tamil, Hindi, Telugu and Marathi as their mother tongue are comparatively more inclined to have their technical education in their regional languages. The committee submitted its report which includes its action plan to MoE for taking it forward for consideration by the Apex Committee set up under the Chairmanship of Secretary, Ministry of Education. The committee recommended the introduction of the same from academic year 2021-22.

The scheme started in 2013-14 supports government/ government-aided engineering colleges/ University departments/ Polytechnics for construction of men/ women hostels in their campus. The objective is to provide accommodation along with social experience towards better personality development opportunities for students/researchers belonging to SC&ST/ Differently-abled/ NER. Funding of up to Rs. 3.25 crore, provided to institute to complete the project within the period of 3 years. During 2020-21, Rs. 1445.46 lakh were released to 14 institutions for construction of Hostel.

4.1.3 Modernisation and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROB) Scheme

The scheme is aimed to upgrade the infrastructural facilities, laboratories, workshops, and computing facilities to enhance teaching, training and research capabilities in the AICTE approved institutions. The limit of funding is Rs 20 lakh and project duration is 2 years. AICTE has been operating this Scheme, to enhance the functional efficiency of technical institutions for teaching, training and research activities by helping in timely upgradation of infrastructure.

During the financial year 2020-21, for 270 projects Rs. 33.55 crore were sanctioned and Rs. 28.20 crore released. In addition, Rs. 34.87 lakh were released to MODROB project sanctioned in previous year, as first/second instalment during 2020-21.

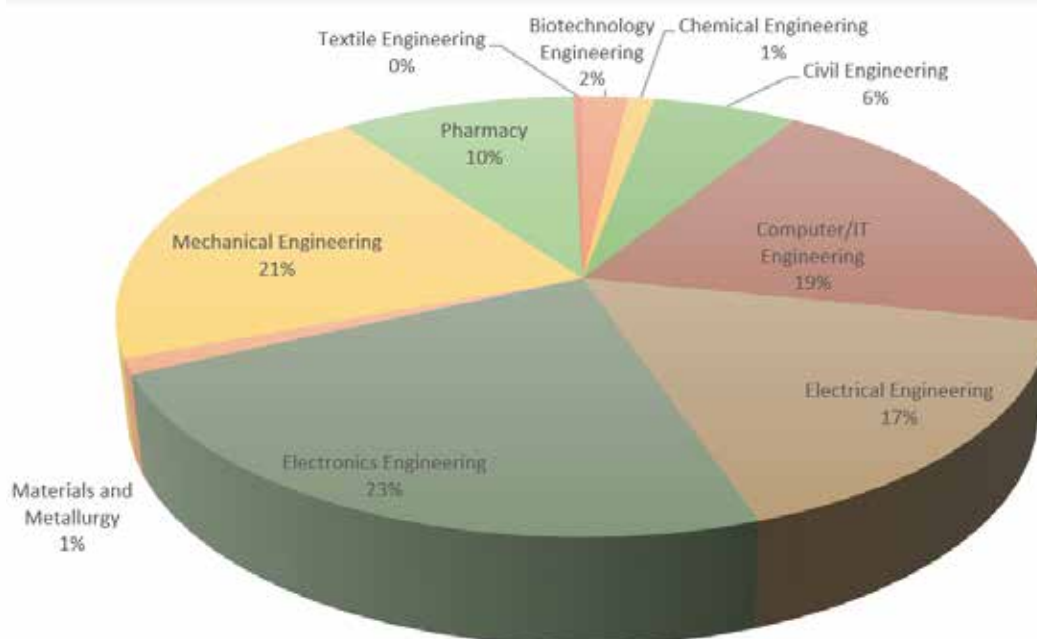


Fig. 4.1.1: Subject-wise distribution of grant under MODROB Scheme during 2020-21

A variant of the Scheme, MODROB-RURAL (2019-20) was introduced with focus on institutions located in disadvantaged rural settings, besides allowing them to submit in regular MODROB Scheme. The Government/ Government-aided institutions and University department could submit up to 5 proposals, while self-financed could submit 3 proposals. 4.1.4 Skill and Personality Development Programme Centre for SC/ST Students (SPDC) Scheme

The scheme promotes the establishment of a SPDP Centre in institutes to empower the SC and ST students by providing special skill trainings apart from regular study. The training is provided with the help of modules on communication, personality development and proficiency in English language. Thus, it boosts the confidence of SC and ST students and provides them with better career opportunities, so that, their employability in the industry increases. Maximum funding to the institute under this scheme is Rs. 25 Lakh, to be spent within three years.

During 2020-21, an amount of Rs. 1.26 crore were released as second/ third instalment to the 28 beneficiary institutes and Rs. 4.68 crore to 63 beneficiary institutes as first instalment.

In view of the pandemic, institutions were permitted to conduct online (National/ International) conferences instead of regular onsite conferences with financial support not exceeding Rs. 50,000. During 2020-21, Rs. 90.18 lakh were released to 70 institutions for organizing conferences.

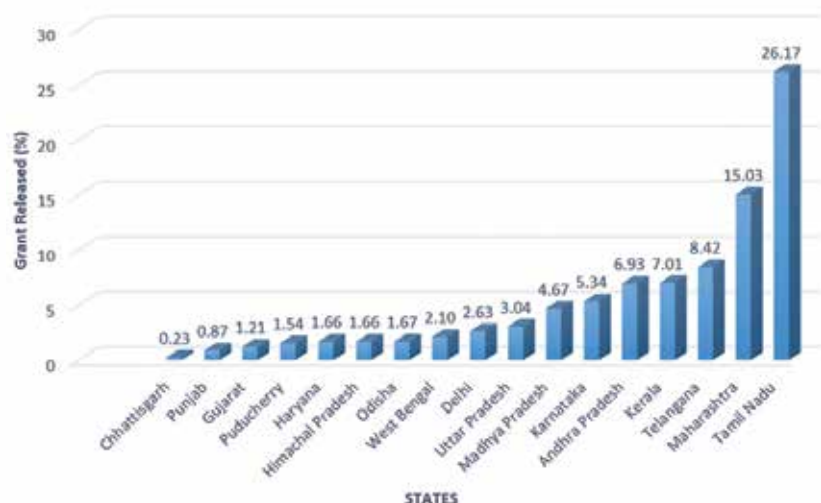


Fig. 4.1.2: State-wise distribution of grants under GOC during 2020-21

Proposals were invited from institutions having 10 successive EoA (Extension of Approval) in immediate preceding years and at least one live accredited course. Proposals were received and were subjected to evaluation, for funding from AICTE's own funds.

4.1.7 e-Shodh Sindhu Scheme

The Scheme provides subscriptions of e-Resources like Web of Science, Scopus, ASME, ASCE and Bentham Science to institutions. Free subscription to e-Journals/ e-Resources to AICTE approved Government/ Government-aided institutes is provided by INFLIBNET Centre, Gandhi Nagar, Gujarat at the behest of AICTE.

During 2020-21, Rs. 3.70 crore were released to INFLIBNET Centre for the subscription to ASCE, ASME & Bentham Science to 78 institutes and Rs. 7.43 crore for the subscription to Web of Science & Scopus to 96 institutes.

4.1.8 AICTE-Scheme for Promoting Interests, Creativity and Ethics among Students (SPICES)

As first of its kind initiative, focussing on student's clubs, SPICES was launched during this year to energize and position students club/ Chapters/ Societies as facilitating entity for pursuit of individual interests, creative work, showcasing talent, networking and teamwork opportunities, social experience, organization and management skills, exposure to professional ethics etc. Each beneficiary institution gets Rs. 1 lakh which it must match from its own resources, to develop a chosen student club as a model club and develop other clubs on similar lines. During 2020-21, Rs. 1.80 Crore were released to 180 institutes under this scheme.

4.2 Student Development Schemes

4.2.1 Pragati Scholarship Scheme for Girl Students

AICTE awards Pragati Scholarship to girl students with an aim to provide assistance to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to give young women the opportunity to pursue higher technical education and prepare them for a successful future. The scheme launched on National Educational Day in 2014, allows two girls per family to benefit provided family income is less than Rs. 8 lakh per annum. 4000 scholarships are offered under the scheme: 2000 for Diploma and 2000 for Degree students.

The candidates should have been admitted to the first year of the Degree or Diploma programme in any of the AICTE approved institutes during the current academic year through the centralized admission process of the State / Centre Government. Tuition Fee of Rs. 30,000 or at actual, whichever is less and Rs. 2,000 per month for 10 months as incidental charges each year is paid under this scheme. Reservation to 7.5% ST, 15% for SC, and 27% for OBC candidate is applicable.

4.2.2 Saksham Scholarship Scheme for Differently-abled Students

AICTE awards Saksham Scholarship to differently-abled students with an aim to provide encouragement and support to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to provide young differently-abled students an opportunity to study further and prepare for their successful future. This scheme launched on National Educational Day in 2014 is available to students having more than 40% disability and whose family income is not more than Rs. 8 lakh per annum.



1000 (500 for Diploma and 500 for Degree) scholarships are available to candidates admitted to the first year of the Degree or Diploma programme in any of the AICTE approved institutes during the current academic year through the centralized admission process of the State/ Centre Government. The scholarship covers tuition fee of Rs. 30,000 or at actual, whichever is less and Rs. 2,000 per month for 10 months as incidental charges each year. Reservation to 7.5% ST, 15% for SC, and 27% for OBC candidate/applicant is available.

4.2.3 Postgraduate (PG) Scholarship Scheme

In order to ensure development of technical education in India, AICTE offers scholarship to GATE/GPAT qualified students @ Rs. 12,400/- per month through its Postgraduate (PG) Scholarship Scheme for 2 years. The students of final years of dual degree integrated programmes are also eligible for PG Scholarship from the 9th semester onwards i.e. only for one year in final year.

Scholarship is awarded to students admitted to PG courses in Engineering/ Technology, Architecture and Pharmacy courses, including integrated courses in AICTE approved institutions and University/Departments and within the approved Programme/ intake plus maximum 10% for EWS category students (fulfilling the eligibility conditions for scholarship), if EWS quota is implemented by the respective institutions.

During the financial year 2020-21, an amount of Rs. 27,602.17 lakh were released, directly into the bank accounts of students through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT).

4.2.4 AICTE Doctoral Fellowship (ADF)

The scheme was launched from the academic year 2018-19 as National Doctoral Fellowship (NDF) for admitting full time meritorious research scholars in Ph.D. programmes. From the academic year 2020-21, NDF has been transformed to AICTE Doctoral Fellowship (ADF) and 339 seats were allotted to the 39 universities across different states of India. The admission against the allotted seats is done directly by the concerned university by following minimum eligibility criterion as prescribed by AICTE.

The fellowship is for a period of 3 years with the provision for one-year extension on the recommendation of the respective university based upon the performance of the scholar. Selected researchers receive a fellowship of Rs. 31,000 per month for first two years and thereafter Rs. 35,000 per month, and House Rent Allowance (HRA) as per government norms. In addition, an amount of Rs. 15,000 per annum as contingency grant is given.

4.2.5 AICTE-MITACS Globalink Research Internship (GRI) Scheme

An MoU was signed between MITACS (Mathematics of Information Technology and Computer Systems), Canada and AICTE on 23-02-2018, for 'the AICTE-MITACS GRI Scheme' to foster cross-border partnerships focused on creating a platform for collaborative research between Canada and India to a pool of student talent in India, which has been implemented for a period of five years from 2018 to 2023.

MITACS Globalink internships are open for third year/ final year students in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) disciplines in AICTE approved institutes in India. The interns undertake research in Canadian universities.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic situation prevailing all over the world, it had been decided to conduct 2021 cohort virtually. The total value of the internship comes to be CAD \$ 3400 per student, and AICTE contribution will come out to be CAD \$ 850 per student i.e. 25% of the total internship value.

During the year 2020-21, MITACS selected 364 students, for undertaking internships online through Canadian universities, which started from the first week of May 2021.

4.2.6 AICTE Lilavati Award - 2020

AICTE Lilavati Award-2020 based on the theme 'Women Empowerment' was launched by Hon'ble Minister of Education Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' Ji on 17-11-2020. It intends to recognize efforts being made by AICTE approved institutions to treat women with 'equality and fairness' in all spheres of their lives. Under the initiative, applications are invited from the eligible teams, comprises either of students/ faculty/ NGO both from AICTE approved technical institution/ Deemed to be University for remarkable intervention in the following six sub- themes: - Women Health, Self Defence, Sanitation & Hygiene, Literacy, Women Entrepreneurship, Legal Awareness.

The award in the form of prize money is given to the 18 winning team (three under each sub-themes) - Winner: Rs. 1,00,000; First Runner-up: Rs. 75,000; Second Runner-up: Rs. 50,000

4.3 Faculty Development Schemes

4.3.1 Quality Improvement Programme (QIP)

With the objective of upgrading qualification and capabilities of the faculty members of degree level technical institutions, the Government of India launched the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) in the year 1970, now being implemented and monitored by the Council. From 2001, QIP has been extended to the teachers in approved diploma level technical institutes.

Selected institutions offer Master's and Doctoral programmes to faculty members selected under this programme who are paid monthly scholarships @ Rs. 9,000/- and Rs. 15,000/- respectively. Under this scheme, faculty of AICTE approved institutions are given an opportunity to enhance their qualifications. Certain selected institutions offer Master's and Doctoral programmes to faculty members selected under this programme. .

In order to upgrade the knowledge and skills of teachers working in different institutions in the country, AICTE provides financial assistance for organizing Short-term Training Courses (STC) in emerging areas of Engineering & Technology and other disciplines. The maximum grant limit is 20 numbers one-week course @ Rs. 15,000/- per participant with initial limit of 30 participants per programme. For every additional participant over 30, to be charged @ 10,000/- per participant.

Due to pandemic situation during 2020-21, AICTE introduced conducting of STC by QIP Centres through online mode, without any limit on numbers of participants, financial assistance of Rs. 93,000.00 for each one week STC and Rs. 1,86,000.00 for two week STC with restriction of total duration of combined courses not exceeding 20 weeks in a Financial Year.

The number of QIP Centres increased from 83 in 2016 to 116 under AQIS 2020-21. In this period, number of faculty deputed for Ph.D. under QIP increased from 466 (in 2016) to 763 in 2020-21. QIP (Pharmacy) Nodal Centre was also revived after 06 years of dormancy during the year.

During the year 2020-2021, AICTE contributed Rs. 7.17 crore towards scholarships as incentive for existing faculties to upgrade their knowledge for the benefit of students and institutes they belonged. This figure is on lower side as compared to previous year because of slower process of receiving demands and subsequent release of funds due to unprecedented Pandemic COVID-19 effect. However, The delayed demands raised for this period amounting up to Rs. 7.50 Crore is being processed to be released in FY2021-22 apart from demand to be met for FY 2021-22 itself.

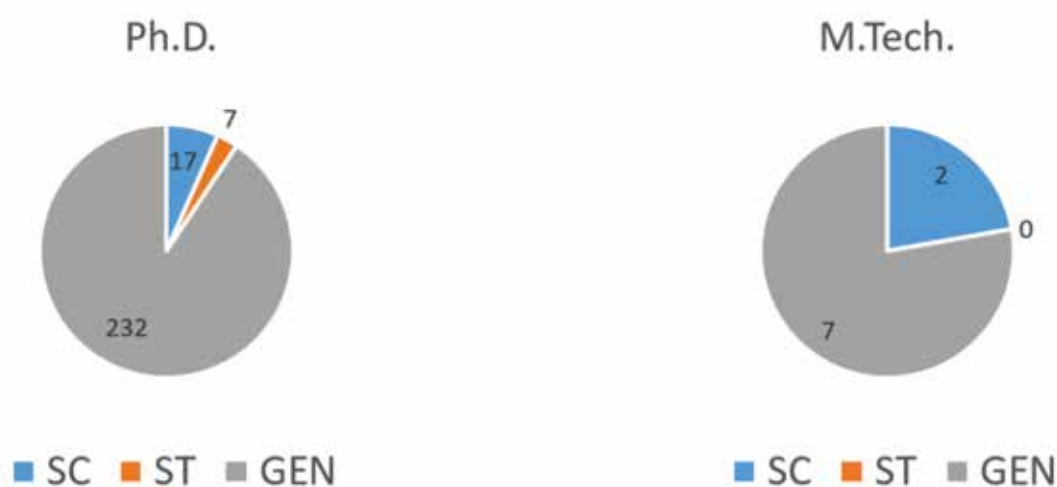


Fig. 4.3.2: Distribution of QIP beneficiaries Category-wise

4.3.2 Faculty Development Programme (FDP)

The FDP scheme provides financial assistance for organizing training which will facilitate up gradation of knowledge, skill besides providing opportunities for induction training to teachers employed in technical disciplines. AICTE approved institutions/ University Departments imparting technical education are entitled for this grant of Rs. 7 lakh to conduct this proposed/ approved FDPs of two week duration.

Due to ongoing pandemic of COVID-19, online FDPs have been allowed. Under the FDP scheme, during the year 2019-20, 409 FDPs conducted online successfully. During the year 2020-21, 409 two-weeks FDPs conducted successfully.

4.3.3 Short Term Training Programme (STTP)

The STTP Scheme was launched in the year 2018 to provide financial assistance limited to Rs. 5 lakh per programme to conduct a six-day residential programme to enable faculty in the field of technical education, to introspect and learn techniques that can help prepare students for active and successful participants in a knowledge society.

Rs. 1599.72 lakh were sanctioned as grant-in-aid for 506 proposals. An amount of Rs. 1530.5 lakh was released for 486 proposals during the year 2020-21. The region-wise and institution wise number of proposal sanctioned and grant released under STTP.

4.3.4 Short Term Training Programme (STTP) for NER, UT: J&K and Ladakh

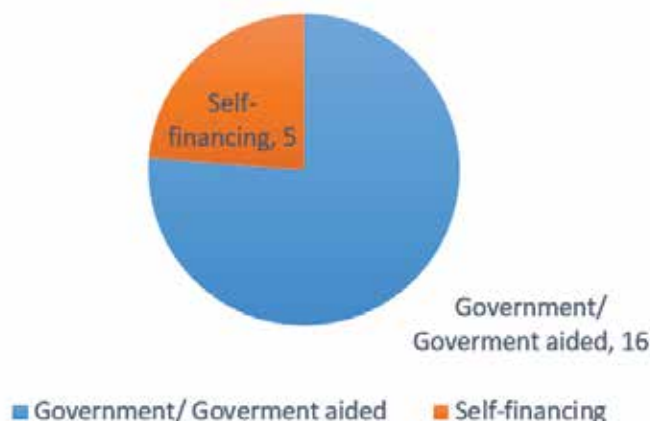

4.3.5 Research Promotion Scheme (RPS)

Research Promotion Scheme aims to promote research in technical disciplines and innovations in established and emerging areas. Research and development activities are considered as an essential component of higher education because of their role in creating new knowledge insight by imparting excitement and dynamism to the educational process. The objective of this scheme is to create and update the general research capabilities of the faculty members of the AICTE approved technical institutes for which funds limited to Rs. 25 lakh per project are provided. During the year 2020-21, 166 projects were sanctioned which included RPS, RPS (NER) and RPS (SC & ST).

RPS (NER) is a dedicated scheme focused on the institutions of North Eastern Region (NER) of India. In tune with the Government of India initiatives, the scheme of RPS is has been extended for empowering the faculty belonging to Scheduled Caste & Scheduled Tribe in AICTE approved institutions. 18 Project were sanctioned and funds amounting to Rs. 285.48 lakh were released for RPS Projects in the year 2020-21.

4.3.6 AICTE-ISTE Induction/ Refresher Programmes

An MoU was executed between AICTE and ISTE for conducting 100 Refresher Programmes and 50 induction Programmes sponsored by AICTE, with a ceiling of Rs. 3 lakh per programme for teachers in AICTE approved technical institutions. 40 faculties per programme are trained in Pedagogical Training, Subject related Training to teachers employed in disciplines: Engineering & Technology, Management, Pharmacy, Architecture etc; Training related to Moral Values, Ethics, and behavioural Sciences & Attitude etc; Training for teachers regarding orientation of newly admitted students; Training for supporting technical and administrative staff including Librarian.

In addition, similar number of programmes are conducted under self-financing mode. All these programmes are considered for the Career Advancement Scheme of AICTE.

An amount of Rs. 2,51,40,000/- was released to ISTE for conduct of AICTE-ISTE programmes during the year 2020-21.

4.3.8 STTP for Physical Education Directors/ Sports Officers

An STTP of two weeks (residential programme) for Physical/ Sports-Games Teachers/ Director of Sports/ Sports officer (Faculty designated) was initiated, as a pilot, with the following objectives: -

- to train the trainer especially for Sports, Fitness Management and Sports Engineering.
- to make the trainer able to conduct physical fitness activities for a large group of students at a time.
- orientation of trainers for the mass physical activities which will create interest and enhance participation of today's mobile glued youth.
- participant should be able to relate traditional sports and games for fitness of youth (Sports of all)
- participants will get training from the International Olympics Committee approved "TAFISA Certified Leadership Course" certification in "Sports for All" under internationally recognized speakers.
- participants will learn about Sports Facilities Management.
- participants will be able to contribute in final year students' projects based on sports engineering like sports analytics, Performance measurement and enhancement, etc.
- to create awareness about Sports Engineering as potential, value added specialized engineering discipline.

Two institutes were approved for funding during 2020-21, namely Amity School of Physical Education and Sports Sciences, Amity University, Noida and Department of Physical Education, Bharathiar University, Coimbatore, and Rs.13 lakh were released to the institutes.

4.3.9 AICTE Professional Development Fund

This scheme provides financial assistance to regular faculty of the AICTE approved institutes and AICTE officers on regular and deputation basis to present their research papers at international conferences abroad, within India, to enrich themselves with new knowledge and learn best practices.

Under this scheme, every year lists of conferences/ seminars/ symposiums/ workshops proposed to be held abroad and within India is prepared and the applicants, with an invitation, eligible to receive financial assistance.

The quantum of funds is pre-decided and fixed, depending upon the location of countries or average amount travel is Rs. 1.05 lakh and minimum Rs. 50,000.00 (for locations within India). Under the scheme Rs. 646679/- were released in the year 2020-21.

4.3.10 AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professors (DVP) Scheme

4.4 Margdarshak Scheme

In order to maintain the quality of technical education in the country, it has been made mandatory that 60% of the eligible courses are to be accredited. In the absence of such accreditation, AICTE shall not grant further extension of approval. Accordingly, Margdarshan initiative has been introduced by AICTE for facilitating the technical institutes to improve the quality mandate as a whole. The initiative solicits support from senior academicians and well established institutes to handhold and mentor other institutes aspiring for accreditation.

The senior academicians from IITs/NITs/other AICTE approved institutes (serving or superannuated) are nominated as Margdarshak (individual mentors) for guiding beneficiary institutes. Their principal role shall be to guide, support and encourage the beneficiary institutions in their development as they work to achieve accreditation in alignment with the broad objectives of quality mandate.

AICTE has already nominated 336 senior academicians as Margdarshak, out of which 309 Margdarshak (MD) have been mapped with 522 beneficiary institutes for mentoring. In a similar manner, well-established AICTE approved institutes are being nominated as Margdarshan institute or Mentor institute (MI) who shall adopt/guide other technical institutes in vicinity for achieving accreditation from NBA.

Presently 47 such institutes have been nominated as MI and are mapped with 502 Mentee beneficiary institutes. Thus, 1024 (522+502) Mentee Beneficiary Institutes (MBI) have been facilitated under the scheme, aiming at accreditation from NBA in next few years.

The scheme has also been re-structured with greater thrust towards mentoring MBIs to attain accreditation from NBA. The revised Guidelines on Margdarshan initiative was launched on 10-11-2020, to expand the pool of MDs and MIs. To streamline the entire process for MDs, AICTE is working on a mobile application that will help in efficient management of the activities including the tour approvals, reports & making of payment of TA & Honorarium.

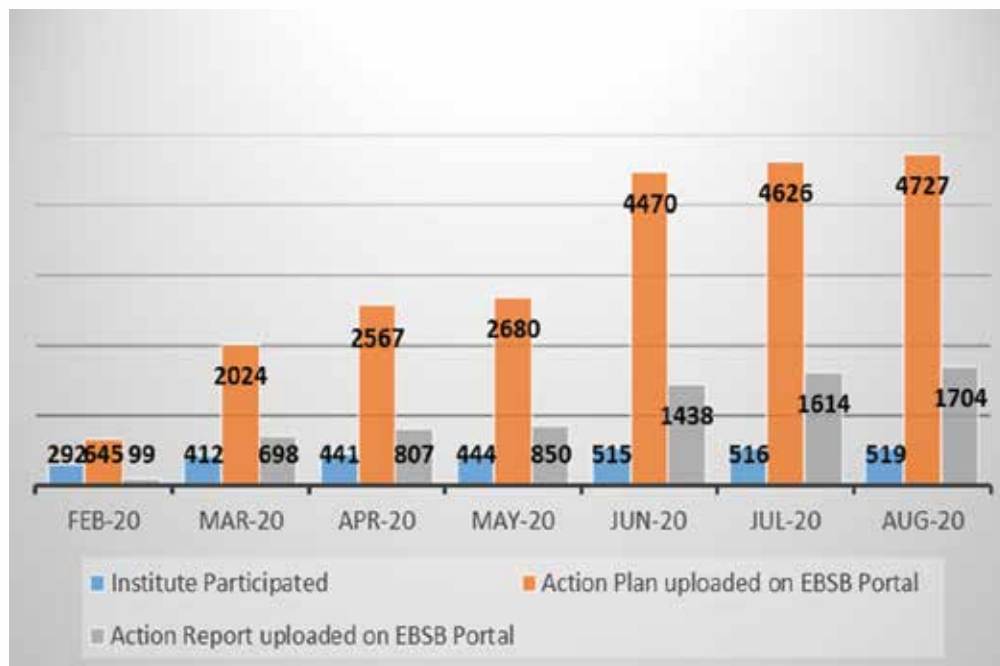


Fig. 5.1.1: Progress of participating institutions on EBSB Portal

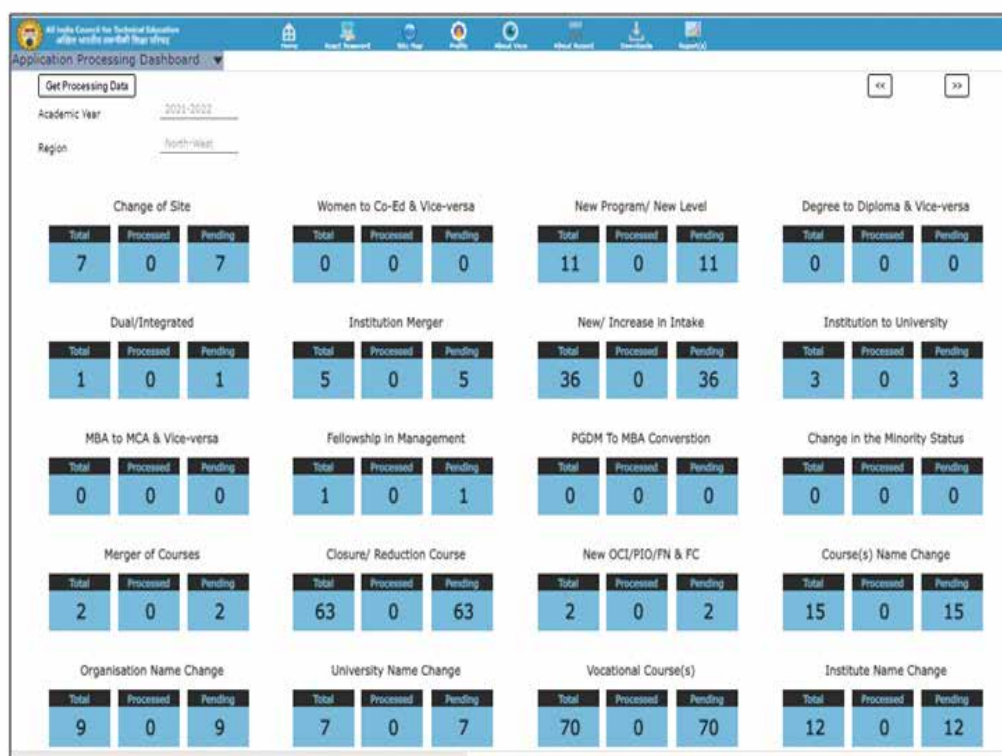
5.1.3 AICTE Approval Portal

New features added on AICTE web portal

- Successful implementation chatbot facility to provide the instant solution to the queries of institutions.
- Centralized Grievance system for Approval Process and PG scholarship.

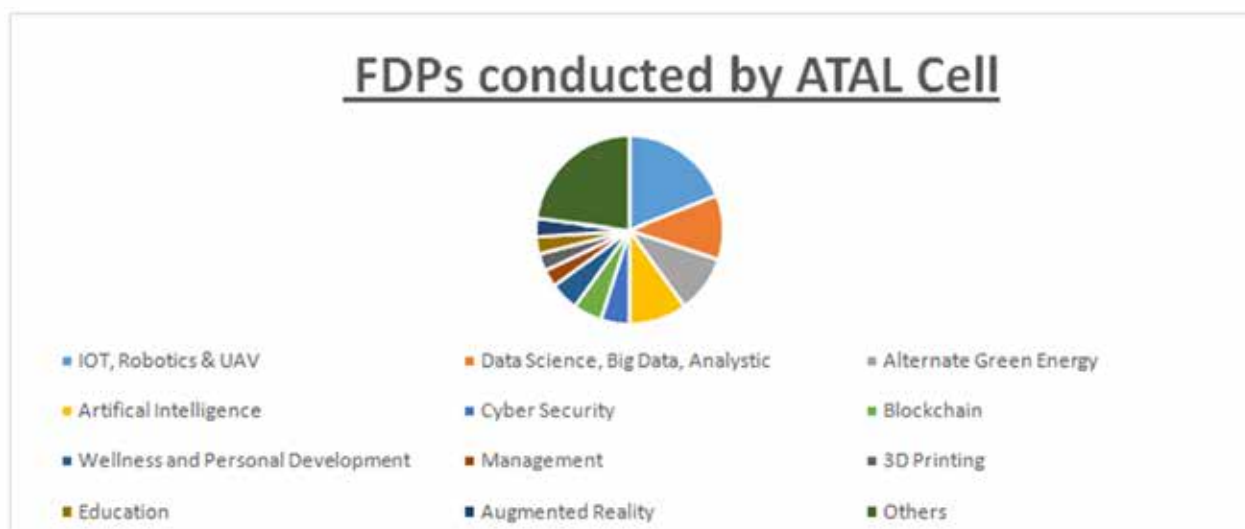
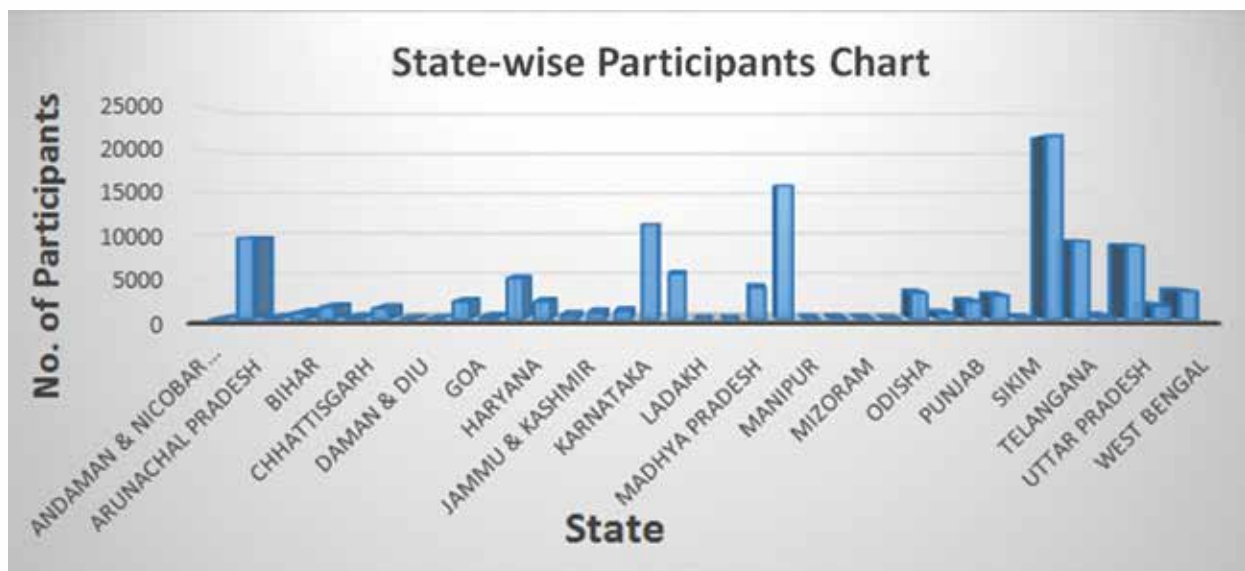


- Successful implementation of facility to automatically send the different reports through portal to institutions.

5.2 AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academy Cell

Training with the latest tools and technologies is vital to keeping an institute competitive and more productive. It is required for increasing the knowledge and skills of students to make them more employable to acquire global competencies. Picking up from the recommendations of a committee that prepared Perspective Plans for technical education in India specifically on emerging technologies, it was decided to set up AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academies; first ones being at Jaipur (Rajasthan) followed by Vadodara (Gujarat), Thiruvananthapuram (Kerala), Guwahati (Assam) and Murthal (Haryana).

Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs) are conducted by the ATAL Academies in emerging technology areas like: Artificial Intelligence, Internet of Things, (IoT), Blockchain, Robotics, Quantum Computing, Data Sciences, Cyber Security, 3D Printing & Design, Augmented Reality (AR)/ Virtual Reality (VR) and other Emerging Areas. The training programmes are conducted by highly qualified faculty from IITs, NITs, IIITs, Central & State Universities, and other renowned AICTE Approved Colleges/Institutes. During the year, more than 1,65,000 faculties from across the country undertook 948 courses that were conducted via online mode.

5.3 Induction Programme Cell

5.3.1 Faculty Development Programme (FDPs for SIP)

The Induction Programme Cell has been established in AICTE to coordinate and oversee all activities related to the Student Induction Programme (SIP). The purpose of the SIP is to help new students adjust and feel comfortable in the new environment, inculcate in them the ethos and culture of the institution, help them build bonds with other students and faculty members, and expose them to a sense of larger purpose and self-exploration.

The effective implementation of SIP requires training for faculty (through FDP) who have to conduct the SIP that is mandatory for all UG courses and introduced in the model curriculum of Diploma courses also. AICTE has formed a National Coordination Committee for Induction Programme (NCC-IP) which oversees and guides organization of FDPs of 3 days & 7/8 days throughout the country.

5.3.3 Project Sunshine with HCL Software

AICTE signed anMoU on 30-06-2020, with HCL Software and under it, launched Sunshine project for students of MCA and B Tech (II stream) from AICTE approved institutions, with no registration charges. HCL Software completed 1st Phase of the Sunshine project aimed to enhance industry-oriented skill of students with limited colleges in Bengaluru and NCR region as a pilot.

Students were trained in most sought after skills in- Cyber Security, End Point management, Testing Automation and DevOps. In all, 211 Students were certified in the first batch. Feedback received from students to HCL are encouraging with overall score of 4.6 at program level.

5.4 National Educational Alliance for Technology (NEAT) Cell

NEAT is a public-private partnership model involving the Government (through its implementing agency AICTE) and the Education Technology companies of India. NEAT was conceptualized to bring the best technological solutions in pedagogy to the students and youth of the country. The Artificial Intelligence-based NEAT portal helps the learners get a personalized experience. NEAT also has provision free seats to students of economically and socially weaker sections of society which are distributed by AICTE through the portal.

13 EdTech Companies were shortlisted for NEAT 1.0 offering services in areas like Assessment Test, Certification Course, Class Management and Placement Support, Coding and testing, e-Content. NEAT 2.0 was launched on 16-02-2021 to allow Ed-Tech Company to sell products in B2B mode. Each Ed-Tech Company will offer 25% coupons in advance for each selected product/course to AICTE, subject to a minimum of 500 seats, to be offered as free seats for distribution to disadvantaged students by AICTE as per the policy of Ministry of Education.

Buckets/ categories in NEAT 2.0 include e-content for niche areas having highly marketable skills, Certification courses, Assessment tests, Psychometric tests/ Myers–Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) tests, Laboratory tools, Coding skills and testing, Learning games, Career counselling, Internship support, Placement support, Aptitude Test, Cognitive skills, Mathematical Skills, Management, Accounting and Finance, Any other product/course related to the degree/diploma of engineering/ Pharmacy/ Management student. More than 90 products from over 50 EdTech companies are available.

AICTE and GUVI (product of this company is shortlisted for NEAT) collaborated to set a Guinness World Record for “most numbers of users to take a programming lesson in 24 hours”. More than 6 lakh users across 28 states registered and around 1.43 lakh users completed the face recognition app in the online workshop.

AI Translation tool

NEAT Cell, AICTE has developed AICTE Translation Automation AI tool to translate online courses in English into eleven different Indian languages Hindi, Bangla, Marathi, Telugu, Tamil, Gujarati, Kannada, Malayalam, Punjabi, Assamese & Odia. For access to students wanting to learn in their language.

ELIS Portal (AICTE Free E-resources)

The outbreak of the COVID pandemic in India caused extreme distress to the students and is a setback to academic activity. Many companies came forward and offered their e-learning contents free of cost to support the student community across the country. The Enhancement in Learning with Improvement in Skills (ELIS) portal (<http://free.aicte-india.org/>) designed by NEAT Cell was launched on 12-04-2020 by Prof. Anil Sahasrabudhe, Chairman AICTE.

AICTE Students Helpline (<https://helpline.aicte-india.org/>)

With a view to bridge the gap between colleges and their stranded students AICTE launched a helpline during lockdown. An internet tool for supporting poor, needy, and stranded students in the midst of the lockdown due to COVID-19 was launched by the Hon'ble Minister for Education Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal “Nishank” 04-04-2020. Marginalised and weaker sections of the society always suffer the most when the crisis. This came as a huge relief to the students and their families who were concerned about the courses and career.

Indian Knowledge System (IKS) portal

In order to promote interdisciplinary research on all aspects of Indian Knowledge Systems, preserve and disseminate these Systems for further research and societal applications, MoE desires to create a database of individuals and organizations who have contributed by way of research, teaching, publication, and preservation of ancient and contemporary rich Indian Knowledge Systems. These span from art, music, dance, drama, mathematics, astronomy, science, technology, life sciences, environment, and natural sciences, health care, yoga, law, jurisprudence, economics, social sciences, psychology, philosophy, management, linguistics, oral traditions of India, knowledge hidden in Sanskrit, Prakrit, Tamil, Pali etc. NEAT Cell developed a portal to collect, scrutinize, verify and populate it, besides archival and dissemination of this rich knowledge.

5.5 Skill Development Cell (SDC)

5.5.1 Vocational Degree/ Diploma Programmes

AICTE running Vocational Degree/ Diploma Programmes leading to Degree or Diploma in Vocational Education under National Skill Qualification Framework (NSQF) for AICTE approved institutions. Under this scheme, education Component is taught by the institute and the skill component by industry Partner or Skill Knowledge Provider (SKP) approved by AICTE or NSDC or any Government Agency.

During 2020-21, the AICTE offered sixteen specializations of different sectors under Bachelor of Vocation (B.Voc) and Diploma of Vocation (D.Voc). It received applications from 318 institutes to run Vocational Courses, out of which, 272 institutes were approved, with an intake of 23,940.

5.5.2 AICTE – Vishwakarma Awards 2020

AICTE instituted Vishwakarma Awards in 2017, to encourage and motivate young students and institutions to raise their performance in their specific domains leading to significant contribution towards the growth and development of the nation as a whole. In the year 2020, AICTE called applications with different themes in two distinct categories:

Chhatra Vishwakarma Awards (CVA)- for Outstanding Innovative Team (for Students & Mentor). with the theme "India's Economic Recovery Post Covid; Reverse Migration and Rehabilitation Plan to support "Atmanirbhar Bharat".

Utkrisht Sansthan Vishwakarma Award (USVA) - for exemplary institutional intervention with the theme "India fights Corona".

The main objective of this award to bring attention of the students, faculty and institutions towards the Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan and also to realize them that how smartly they can reduce the consumption or exploitation of natural resources such as paper, water, energy by deployment of digital technology. Other aspects such as effective waste management, sustainable transport, air pollution etc can also be achieved by ‘smart’ use of technologies.

In the year 2020, this award also aligned with two aspects: a) AICTE Environment policy b) Indian Knowledge system.

5.5.4 AICTE-UKIERI Technical Education Leadership Development Programme (TELDP)

AICTE signed an implementation agreement with the Department for Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy (DBEIS), UK, for joint operation of the activities under UK India Education and Research Initiative (UKIERI) Phase-III. Under this the Council is conducting the Technical Education Leadership Development Programme (TELDP) for the senior faculty of AICTE approved institutions. Participants selected for TELDP workshop have to attend three workshops in a year and carry out a Change Management project in their organization to get a certificate from Chartered Management Institution (CMI), UK.

In view of COVID-19 pandemic, COHORT-6 was offered online for AY 2020-21, by Dudley College of Technology. First online workshop was conducted on 20-10-2020 with participants divided into 12 groups each comprising 8 to 9 participants. Second online workshop was conducted on 15-12-2020 by Dudley College of Technology.

5.5.5 National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM)

NEEM aims to offer on-the-job practical training to enhance employability of a person pursuing graduation/ diploma in any technical or non-technical stream. Under the scheme, AICTE has registered NEEM Facilitators who are giving NSQF compliant industrial training to students for duration of 3 to 36 months. There are 48 NEEM Facilitators and around 5.9 lakh student trainees are enrolled and benefiting from them.

5.5.6 Jammu & Kashmir Employability Enhancement Training (JEET) Programme

AICTE signed an MoU for Jammu and Kashmir Employability Enhancement Training (JEET)) on 06-12-2020 with ICT Academy for the final and pre-final year students in the Union Territories of J&K and Ladakh. Through this MoU, ICT Academy will enhance the technical skill of 5000 students to make them more employable.

JEET programme was virtually launched on 23-02-2021 in the presence of principals, deans, director, HOD & senior faculty members from Engineering & Technology, Management and Polytechnic Colleges, approved by AICTE in Jammu, Kashmir and Ladakh Region. Against the targeted 2500 students for the year 2021, 2879 have enrolled under JEET.

5.5.7 Community College Scheme (CCS)

The Community Colleges offer credit based courses, which allows multipoint entry and exit for skill upgradation or employment market, banking on credits and allows re-entry into the higher education. Under the CCS, the Council releases grant-in-aid to Polytechnics to run Vocational Diploma Programme under NSQF Level 3 to 5. This, they can do partly by utilizing their own resources and partly by mobilizing the resources available at the higher technological institutions. The scheme was initially started for 3 years from the A.Y. 2013-14 to 2015-16 with financial assistance and further extended from the A.Y. 2016-17 to 2018-19 without financial assistance from the AICTE. The scheme has been closed for central funding.

Based on the Certificate of willingness to continue the course countersigned by respective DTE, approval was given to the following polytechnics without any financial assistance, for the A.Y. 2020-21:

- 1) Mehr Chand Polytechnic, Punjab
- 2) B.V.V.S. Polytechnic (Autonomous), Karnataka.
- 3) B.R. Ambedkar institute of Technology, Port Blair, A&N Islands.

5.5.8 AICTE-CII Industry-linked Technical Institute Survey 2020 Awards

The AICTE-CII Survey is aimed to assess the current status of partnership between technical institutions and industry on six basic parameters such as curriculum, faculty, governance, infrastructure, placements and research and services/project & skill development. The AICTE-CII Survey is being jointly conducted with the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) since 2012.

The survey maps industry linkages of Indian technical institutes in four broad streams– Engineering, Management, Architecture and Pharmacy. It showcases the best practices of partnerships with industry and highlights the strengths and weaknesses of the ecosystem of technical education in India.

At the end of the survey, awards and citations are given to the best industry linked institutes. 11 winners were also announced during CII Education Summit held on 10-12-2020 and 11-12-2020.

5.6 Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS)

Special Scholarship Scheme for the Union Territories of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh is an initiative of Ministry of Education, Government of India aimed at the students entering into higher education, responsibility of whose implementation is entrusted with the PMSSS Cell, AICTE. The scholarship provides assistance to the youth for study higher education outside the UTs.

The Scheme is operational since 2012-13 and has undergone some radical changes during the last few years for the benefit of students. This includes enhanced budget allocation, rationalization of the number of scholarship in different streams, payment of fixed maintenance allowance of Rs. 1.00 Lakh to each beneficiary and payments made through Aadhar-based DBT system etc. Special emphasis has also been given to ensure quality education by including NBA Accredited/ NIRF and NAAC Ranked institutions /Universities through online counseling process conducted by AICTE. In the pandemic struck academic year 2020-21, AICTE took all necessary steps towards awareness of the Scholarship Scheme among aspiring students and conducted Webinar in Kathua, Jammu, Rajouri, Doda in Jammu Region, Baramulla, Kupwara, Anantnag and Srinagar in Kashmir Region and Leh and Kargil in Ladakh Region. As a special consideration, the students offered admission letter during academic year 2020-21 were allowed to join their institution online.

This year AICTE was successful in achieving the target of admission of 5000, provided by the Ministry of Education, Govt. of India.

5.7 SWAYAM

5.7.1 SWAYAM MOOCs Platform

SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) is an initiative of MHRD designed to achieve three cardinal principles of Education Policy viz. access, equity and quality. SWAYAM has emerged as one of the world's largest Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) integrated platform and portal for online courses, using ICT, covering subjects from high school to higher education besides skill sector courses, to ensure that every student benefits. The courses hosted on SWAYAM are in 4 quadrants – (1) video lecture, (2) specially prepared reading material that can be downloaded/printed (3) self- assessment tests through tests and quizzes and (4) an online discussion forum for clearing the doubts. Steps have been taken to enrich the learning experience by using audio-video and multimedia and state of the art pedagogy/ technology.

SWAYAM 2.0

In compliance with the decision taken by MHRD, the higher version of SWAYAM 2.0 MOOCs platform was developed by IIT, Madras during May, 2019 which has attributes like, higher scalability and performance; enhanced features for faculty and students; improved assessment and evaluation; internationalization; translation of online courses into eight different Indian regional languages and more; local chapters and mentors and offering of on-line degrees etc.

5.7.2 Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT)

MHRD launched the Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT) under PMMMNMTT Scheme on 13-11-2018, a major and unique initiative towards online professional development of 1.5 million higher education faculty using SWAYAM. AICTE has been nominated as a National Coordinator (NC) for ARPIT by MHRD.

ARPIT-2018

70 National Resource Centers (NRCs) were identified by MHRD during 2018 for developing discipline-specific online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new & emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum. During the year 2018, SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 6.909 Crore from MHRD for disbursement to 47 NRCs @ Rs.14.70 lakh to each NRC. AICTE released grant @ Rs.14.70 lakh to each NRC for conducting discipline-specific online courses for faculty of higher education institutions. 71 discipline-specific courses were developed under ARPIT-2018.

ARPIT-2019

21 discipline-specific NRCs were identified by MHRD during 2019 for which SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 5.29 Crore from MHRD for ARPIT 2019 for disbursement to 21 discipline-specific NRCs @ Rs.14.70 lakh. The grant was disbursed to the eligible NRCs, based on the Utilization Certificate and Receipt & Payment Accounts for the expenditure incurred during FY 2018-19. 48 discipline-specific courses were developed under ARPIT-2019.

ARPIT-2020

Ministry of Education decided to run again all 48 discipline-specific Courses offered in 2019 as ARPIT-2020 in the wake of unprecedented COVID-19. Accordingly, all 48 courses are being run under ARPIT-2020.

Role of AICTE as a National Coordinator

MHRD appointed AICTE as a National MOOCs Coordinator (NC) for courses that do not fall in purview of any of the existing NCs, including foreign university courses, apart from being an NC for ARPIT courses. AICTE has so far developed 12 self-paced courses and successfully conducted 4 Yoga online courses developed by S-VYASA, Bangalore. One credit course is on-going and yet to be fully completed. 5.7.3 Translation of SWAYAM online engineering courses by AICTE

MHRD has fixed a target of 80 online Courses for translation into 8 different Indian regional languages - Hindi, Tamil, Malayalam, Kannada, Telugu, Marathi, Bengali and Gujarati by IITM/AICTE. Out of 48 Courses, IITM has taken up the translation of 27 SWAYAM/NPTEL online Engineering Courses and 21 Engineering Courses have been allotted to AICTE for translation into eight different Indian languages. AICTE completed translation of 6 Online Courses into 8 different languages.

AICTE Translation Automation AI tool, has been developed with a vision to translate English language online courses into eight different Indian languages for students wanting to study engineering in their language. Translation of remaining online Courses assigned to AICTE, is being done through Translation Portal.

5.8.1 Smart India Hackathon (SIH)

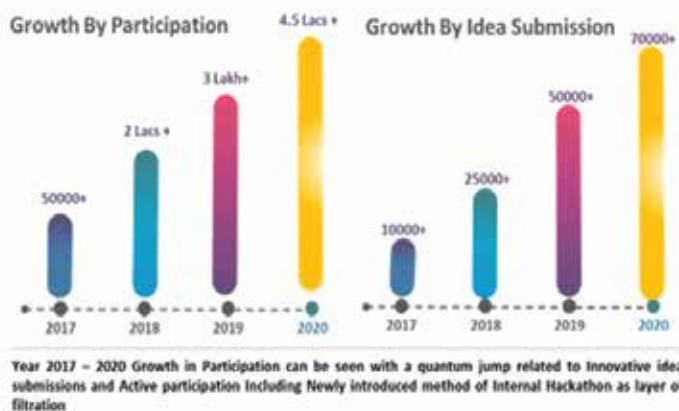
SIH is a national initiative by the Ministry of HRD (GoI), and implemented by MoE's Innovation Cell (MIC) at AICTE. Over the years, SIH has evolved as the world's biggest open innovation model. SIH is a unique initiative to identify new and disruptive technological innovations for solving the challenges faced by our country. The fourth edition of SIH was conducted in the year 2020.

5.8.2 IDEathon

Realizing the importance of orienting the community of scientists and technologists around the country at this crucial time to scout technological solutions that can help the society and government in effectively handling the crisis arising in light of the pandemic, Fight Corona IDEathon, a 2-day online Ideathon, was jointly organised by AICTE, MoE's Innovation Cell, InnovatioCuris, Forge as organising partners and MEITY Startup Hub, DST, and other organisations of global and national prominence offered support in terms of Technology, Knowledge, Outreach, etc.

This event was conceived and executed in a short span of 8 days. With 21 partners, the IDEathon witnessed more than 5500 participants, including student innovators, researchers, and startup founders.

5.8.3 MoE's SAMADHAN

The mega online challenge SAMADHAN was launched by MIC and AICTE in collaboration with Forge and innovatioCuris to test the ability of students and Educators to innovate. The participants in this challenge will design, simulate and develop such measures that can be made available to the government agencies, health services, hospitals and other services for quick solutions to the Coronavirus epidemic and other such calamities. Apart from this, through this "SAMADHAN" challenge, work will be done to make citizens aware, to motivate them, to face any challenge, to prevent any crisis and to help people get livelihood.

5.8.4 ASEAN-India Hackathon

As per the vision expressed by Honourable Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi in second edition of India Singapore Hackathon, the ASEAN-India Hackathon was conceptualized and conducted in February 2021 through digital mode. The Hackathon comprised of students from India and all 10 ASEAN nations with more than 300+ students and 30+ mentors and evaluators joining in from different parts of the countries. The student worked in collaboration with students from at least 3 nations in a team, that helped bring a great understanding of culture, work ethic of each other and underlined similarities in the heritage of and problems faced by participant nations. The hackathon focused on Blue Economy and Education themes and experts from Coast Guard, INCOIS and Indian Maritime University were identified to evaluate the solutions.

5.8.5 Toycathon 2021

To make India Aatma Nirbhar in toy sector, as conceptualized by Hon. Prime Minister, Shri Narendra Modi, Toycathon 2021 was launched on 05-01-2021. Hon. Minister for Textiles and WCD, Smt. Smriti Irani and Hon. Minister for Education, Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank' launched the initiative and its website in a press conference. The grand finale of the Toycathon 2021 is scheduled to be organized from 22-06-2021 to 24-06-2021.

The Toycathon 2021 saw enormous participation from the participants with registration of 14130 teams and 1,32,837 users. These teams submitted more than 17000+ ideas across 68 Problem Statements and 8 Open innovation Themes. Each idea was then evaluated by a panel of 4 experts from various academic and industrial experience professionals. A total of 1567 teams in Online mode while 904 teams in the offline mode were shortlisted and expected to participate across 80+ Nodal Centers across the nation.

5.8.6 Network of Institution Innovation Councils (IIC)

IICs programme was launched in 2018 and so far, more than 2500 IICs have been established in higher education institutions across the country to encourage, inspire and nurture students to develop ideas and convert them into prototypes during their formative years. MIC-IIC prescribes an annual calendar of suggestive activities to conduct national, regional and institute level programmes such as developing cognitive skills, design thinking, IPR, Business plan development etc.

More than 6000 faculties from IIC institutions have been trained and deployed as innovation Ambassador to drive the campus I&E ecosystem. Moreover, a national level innovation contest (NIC) was also institutionalized to scout innovations from IIC institutions. For the NIC 2020, more than 29000 ideas, and innovations were scouted for handholding support at IIC institute level and MIC level. MIC organized a series of training and mentoring rounds for shortlisted innovations to validate their innovations and business plan development.

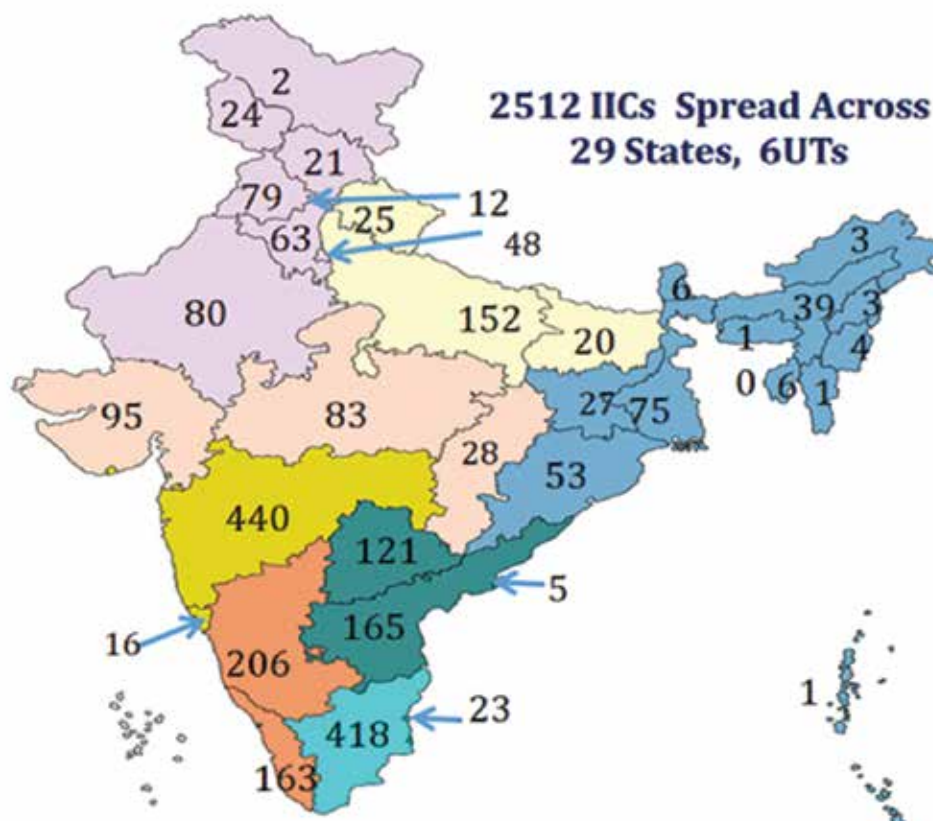


Fig. 5.8.2: Zonal Distribution of IICs



5.8.7 Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA)

ARIIA is an initiative of the Ministry of Education (MoE) launched in 2018 to systematically rank all major higher educational institutions and universities in India, on indicators related to innovation and Entrepreneurship Development. The ARIIA also provides a directional approach to HEIs and defines the I&E ecosystem objectively with measurable parameters.

Two editions of ARIIA have been successfully completed by now, participation of more than 1000 major HEIs from 33 states and UTs. The result of the second edition of ARIIA was announced on 08-08-2020 by Hon'ble Vice President of India and 332 HEIs received ranks and bands in 5 sub-categories under two major categories of public funded institutions and self-finance/private institutions.

5.8.8 National Innovation and Start-up Policy (NISIP)

NISIP is a unique guiding framework for higher education institutes for defining new incentivizing methodology for faculty and students keen on pursuing innovation and entrepreneurship activities along with academics. The programme heavily focuses on mechanisms for IP ownership, equity sharing between institutes and incubated start-ups, time allocations for start-up activities, etc. towards implementation of NISIP, nominations of a senior faculty from each higher education institute were invited for orientation and offering handholding support in the implementation process.

More than 1980 HEIs have nominated the faculty for coordinating implementation of policy at their university and institutes. Call for nomination from HEIs for third phase training is currently open. More than 2000 faculty have been trained and hand-held so far in policy adoption, implementation and impact creation. 250+ HEIs have formulated their own policy in line with NISIP and sensitized about it to over 1 lakh stakeholders including students, faculty and staff.

5.8.9 MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV)

A new academic programme, MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV), was introduced. This course is designed with a balanced approach of experiential learning which comprises core and elective Courses on innovation and entrepreneurship and integrates skill certification, capstone projects and Action Learning Segments to connect theory of innovation and entrepreneurship with practice and enabling students to acquire skills. The outcome oriented syllabus offers opportunities for students with innovative and problem-solving mind-set to work on challenging ideas and successfully build ventures while simultaneously earning the Master's degree. The programme was rolled-out as pilot in four institutes across India in 2019-20. In 2020-21, another 11 HEIs received approval to offer the program with a maximum intake capacity of 30 students per year.

5.8.10 Yukti2.0

Yukti2.0 was launched virtually in June 2020 by the Union Minister of Education. This is an initiative to systematically assimilate innovations and technologies with commercial potential, from HEIs and academic startups and providing funding and mentorship support to academic innovators.

On the Yukti2.0 platform, more than 19,000 innovations at various stages of development have been received from students, startups, faculty, institutes and technology incubators. These innovations belong to more than 20 domains including Electronics, IoT, Agriculture and allied industries, Healthcare and Pharma, ICT, etc. These innovations are eligible to receive funding and/or mentorship support as per the recommendations of the evaluation committee.

Process of selection in the first round of 2021 is currently ongoing. First round of evaluation is complete and second round of evaluation of more than 600 innovations is under process to consider these for funding support.

The pre-finalists of first round shall be assessed for funding support and would be hand-held through linkages to technology business incubators for incubation of their innovation and technologies. The shortlisted academic innovators shall also be given an opportunity to avail mentoring support from MIC and enable them to develop their innovations and compete again for funding support in next round of year.

5.8.11 Drug Discovery Hackathon (DDH)

DDH2020 was envisaged with a vision and mission to establish an 'Open Innovation Model' for in silico drug discovery against Covid-19. The targets/tools/lead molecules identified through the process shall be further taken forward for synthesis followed by subsequent steps in routine drug discovery programs. The hackathon was launched virtually in July 2020 by the Union Minister of Education and the Union Minister of Health & Family Welfare. Phase-I of the Hackathon is complete, wherein 377 entries were received for the 29 problem statements in track 1, track 2, track 3.

During phase-II, for 7 entries, selected will involve further development for which funding and mentoring support will be provided through MIC and AICTE. For capacity building in the area of computational drug discovery, a 6-months Mentorship Program is being designed encompassing online mode of Mentoring, Research, open-source tools, Training Lectures, etc.

5.8.12 KAPILA: Kalam Program for IP Literacy and Awareness

A systematic holistic effort 'KAPILA: Kalam Program for IP Literacy and Awareness' has been proposed to create appropriate awareness regarding the need of IP filing, mechanism and methodology involved in filing IP in India and globally, especially amongst students and faculty of higher education institutions.

KAPILA was launched on 15-10-2020 by Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank', Hon'ble Minister of Education National Intellectual Property Literacy Week (NIPLW), during 15-08-2020 to 23-08-2020 and carried out activities like IP Clinic, Case studies/articles regarding innovation & intellectual Property and till date 46,556 users were registered for KAPILA. As part of KAPILA initiative 3 IPR Course were developed by the expert committee:

1. Introduction to Intellectual Property (UG)
2. Foundations of Intellectual Property (PG)
3. Intellectual Property and Innovation (Ph.D)

5.8.13 Online Innovation Ambassador Training Program

This program is to strengthen the mentoring capacity of teachers for Nurturing and handholding ideas from students. Through this program, we proposed to train 50000 teachers in CBSE school that will help students to generate new innovative ideas. This will help in establishing a culture where the student will become part of innovative thinking and idea where their school teachers will help nurture those ideas.

Five modules of (72 Hours) have been created in this programme

1. Design Thinking & Innovation (26 Hours)
2. Idea generation & Ideal hand-holding (15 Hours)
3. Intellectual Property Rights (12 Hours)
4. Product/ Prototype development (13 Hours)
5. Finance/ HR/ Sales (6 Hours)

Schools registered till 31-03-2021 are 8061, while teachers registered so far are 33000. The launch of this program is scheduled tentatively during June 2021.

6.2 Hindi Cell

6.2.1 Meetings of Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC)

For proper compliance of Official Language Act (1963), Official Language Rules (1976) and augment progressive use of Hindi in the Council, an Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC) headed by the administrative head of the Council has been set up to assess the progressive use of Hindi and oversee compliance of the orders issued by Ministry of Human Resources Development and Department of Official Language, Ministry of Home Affairs from time to time. Meetings of OLIC were held on 28-10-2020 and 31-03-2021.

6.2.2 Takniki Pathyapustak Puraskar Yojana (TPPY) Scheme

With a view to pave the way for imparting higher technical education through Hindi medium, AICTE has been operating the Technical Hindi Textbook Award Scheme since 1998. This is aimed encourage preparation of high-level technical textbooks, undergraduate, postgraduate, diploma and technician level in Hindi (writing and translating original books) and 15 awards are given every year under this Scheme. Awards have been given to 110 writers in the last 16 years.

6 awards being distributed by the Council presently were given away by Hon'ble Minister of State for Education, Shri Sanjay Dhotre on 10-11-2020 in a function held in AICTE.

6.2.3 Financial Assistance Scheme for publication of manuscripts in Hindi

Under this scheme, funds to teachers/writers are given every year for original manuscripts. The financial aid was provided to 12 authors by Hon'ble Minister of State for Education, Shri Sanjay Dhotre in a function organized on 10-11-2020.

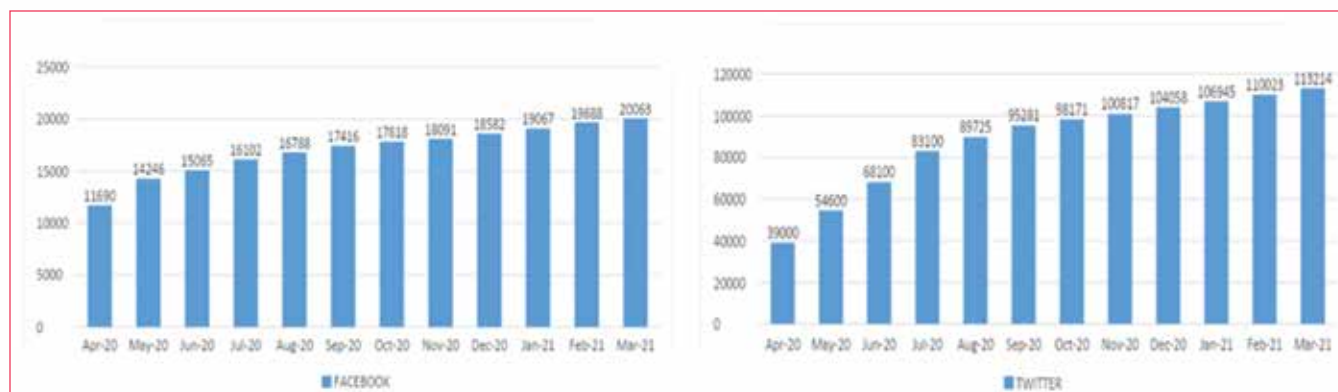


Fig. 6.3.1: AICTE followers during the year 2020-21, on Facebook and Twitter

6.4 Library

- Open Source Library Software Koha 4.18 was installed for computerization of library resources. Data entry of 1000 books has been completed out of 5000 books available in the library along with patrons' database.
- Over 69 English/ Hindi books were purchased and processed after accessing during 2020-21.
- Higher and Technical Education related news snippet from media, includes 16 newspaper received in the library as well as online information, were collected and catalogued for the year 2020.

07 | FINANCE

7.1 Finance

AICTE receives grants-in-aid from the Ministry of Education, Government of India towards implementation of various schemes. During the Financial Year 2020-21, AICTE received grants to the tune of Rs. 38500.00 lakh for AICTE Schemes, Rs. 12,800.00 lakh for J & K Scholarship Scheme, Rs. 150.00 lakh for SWAYAM MOOCs and Rs. 96.60 lakh for TEQIP under Plan Head from Ministry of Education, Government of India. Ministry of Education, Govt. of India had not released any grants under Non-Plan head and AICTE has been incurring expenditure under Non-Plan head from its own generated funds. The unspent balance of the previous year 2019-20, was Rs. 14,604.53 lakh and Rs. 2,21,306.25 lakh for Plan and Non Plan respectively. Grants from the AICTE own generated funds have also been released to Indian Knowledge System (Rs. 100.00 lakh).

7.2 Allocation

7.2.1 Plan Allocation (Ministry of Education)

The grant released by Ministry of Education (MoE) during the Financial Year 2020-21 was Rs. 51,546.60 lakh for AICTE Schemes, J & K Scholarships Scheme, SWAYAM MOOCs and TEQIP. Rs. 14,604.53 lakh were the unspent balance of the previous year and the miscellaneous receipts during the Financial Year 2020-21 amounted to Rs. 2,378.28 lakh.

7.2.2 Non-Plan Allocation (AICTE own Generated Funds)

No grant was received from Ministry of Education as Non-Plan Grants during the Financial Year 2020-21 for AICTE Schemes. Rs. 2,21,306.25 lakh were the unspent balance of the previous year 2019-20 and there was miscellaneous receipt of Rs. 12,349.49 lakh during the year 2020-21.

7.2.3 Innovation Cell

During the Financial Year 2020-21, no grant was paid to Innovation Cell account from AICTE own generated funds (Non-Plan). There was Rs. 338.61 lakh as unspent balance from the previous year 2019-20 and there were miscellaneous receipts of Rs. 401.86 lakh during the year 2020-21.

7.2.4 Indian Knowledge System (IKS)

During the financial year 2020-21, Rs. 100.00 lakh were paid to Indian Knowledge System from AICTE own generated funds (Non-Plan). There was no unspent balance from the previous year 2019-20 and miscellaneous receipt amounted of Rs. 1.05 lakh during the year 2020-21.

Appendix | 1.1

POWER AND FUNCTIONS OF THE COUNCIL (Extracted from AICTE Act, 1987)

It shall be the duty of the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical and management education and maintenance of standards and for the purposes of performing its functions under AICTE Act, the Council may:

- a. undertake survey in the various fields of technical education, collect data on all related matters and make forecast of the needed growth and development in technical education;
- b. coordinate the development of technical education in the country at all levels;
- c. allocate and disburse out of the Fund of the Council such grants, on such terms and conditions as it may think fit to:
 - i) Technical Institutions, and
 - ii) Universities imparting technical education in coordination with the Commission.
- d. promote innovations, research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies to meet developmental requirements and for overall improvement of educational processes;
- e. formulate schemes for promoting technical education for women, handicapped and weaker sections of the society;
- f. promote an effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems including research and development organizations, industry and the community;
- g. evolve suitable performance appraisal systems for Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education, incorporating norms and mechanisms for enforcing accountability;
- h. formulate schemes for the initial and in service training of teachers and identify institutions or centres and set up new centers for offering staff development programmes including continuing education of teachers;
- i. lay down norms and standards for courses, curricula, physical and instructional facilities, staff pattern, staff qualifications, quality instructions, assessment and examinations;
- j. fix norms and guidelines for charging tuition and other fees;
- k. grant approval for starting new technical institutions and for introduction of new courses or programmes in consultation with the agencies concerned;
- l. advise the Central Government in respect of grant of charter to any professional body or institution in the field of technical education conferring powers, rights and privileges on it for the promotion of such profession in its field including conduct of examinations and awarding of membership certificates;
- m. lay down norms for granting autonomy to technical institutions;
- n. take all necessary steps to prevent commercialization of technical education;
- o. provide guidelines for admission of students to Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education;



- p. inspect or cause to inspect any Technical Institution;
- q. Withhold or discontinue grants in respect of courses, programmes to such technical institutions which fail to comply with the directions given by the Council within the stipulated period of time and take such other steps as may be necessary for ensuring compliance of the directions of the Council;
- r. take steps to strengthen the existing organizations, and to set up new organizations to ensure effective discharge of the Council's responsibilities and to create positions of professional, technical and supporting staff based on requirements;
- s. declare technical institutions at various levels and types offering courses in technical education fit to receive grants;
- t. advise the Commission for declaring any institution imparting technical education as a Deemed University.
- u. set up a National Board of Accreditation to periodically conduct evaluation of Technical Institutions or Programmes, on the basis of guidelines, norms and standards specified by it and to make recommendations to it, or to the Council or to the Commission or to other bodies, regarding recognition or de-recognition of the Institution or the Programmes.
- v. Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

INSPECTION

1. For the purposes of ascertaining the financial needs of technical institution or a University or its standards of teaching, examination and research, the council may cause an inspection of any department or departments of such technical institution or University to be made in such manner as may be prescribed and by such person or persons as it may direct.
2. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or University the date on which any inspection under sub-section (1) is to be made and the technical institution or University shall be entitled to be associated with the inspection in such manner as may be prescribed.
3. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or the University, its views in regard to the results of any such inspection and may, after ascertaining the opinion of that technical institution or University, recommend to that institution or University the action to be taken as a result of such inspection.
4. All communications to a technical institution or University under this section shall be made to the executive authority thereof and the executive authority of the technical institution or University shall report to the Council the action, if any, which is proposed to be taken for the purposes of implementing any such recommendation as is referred to in sub-section (3).

Appendix | 1.2

COMPOSITION OF THE COUNCIL

ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS 2020-21



1. Accounts

- a) The Financial Statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and generally on the accrual method of accounting unless otherwise stated.
- b) Separate set of accounts are maintained by the Council in respect of Plan, Non-Plan, Innovation Cell, Indian Knowledge System and CPF activities.
- c) All Receipts on account of fees/subscription and refund of unspent grants are accounted on cash basis.

2. Grants-in-Aid

Grants are recognized on receipt basis & taken to credit of Income & Expenditure account except to the extent of expenditure of capital nature incurred (which amount is credited directly to the capital fund). Any Non monetary grant received free of cost is reflected at nominal amount of Rs. 1/-.

3. Fixed assets and Depreciations

- a) Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less depreciation. Fixed assets received by the AICTE without consideration has been capitalized in the financial statement at a nominal value i.e. Rs. one.
- b) On periodical physical verification, the obsolete and non-usable assets are identified and cost thereof written off by debit to the capital fund account.
- c) Receipts, if any, on the sale of these assets is taken as income under the head Misc Receipts.

4. Depreciation

Depreciation has been charged on Straight line method as provided in new format of standardization of accounts issued by Ministry of Education. In respect of additions to fixed assets during the year, depreciation is provided for full year and in respect of deductions from the fixed assets, no depreciation is charged.

5. Specific Expenses/ Payments

- a) Printing & Stationery

The amount spent for printing of publications, is treated as expenditure as and when incurred. No adjustments are made in accounts for the closing stocks, as the value is not determinable.

b) Telephone Deposit

Deposit for telephone and allied facilities is written off during the year of installation/commissioning and charges/ expenditure bills are accounted for at the net value after adjustment, if any, for initial deposit, by the concerned department.

6. Interest on All Deposits/ Investments is accounted for on accrual basis.

7. Employees Salaries/Benefits

- a) Central Government Employees service rules are by and large, made applicable to the employees of the Council.
- b) The certification Audit from the office of the Director General of Audit (Home, Education and Skill Development) for the financial year 2019-2020 has suggested to have Actuarial valuation of the employee benefits given in the form of Gratuity & Leave Encashment. During the financial year 2020-2021, the Council has conducted Actuarial valuation of the employee benefits. According to the report of Actuarial valuation, the Council has made a provision of Rs. 4,06,05,188/- for Gratuity & Rs. 4,27,43,193/- for Leave Encashment in Income & Expenditure Account. This additional Provisioning has resulted excess of expenditure over income of Rs. 8,33,48,381/- in Income & Expenditure Account.
- c) The Council maintains a separate Notified Provident Fund account and National Pension System (NPS) for its employees.



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1. Grant received from Government, based on budget approved by the Parliament, constitute main source of receipts of the Council. Though the grants received (after the adjustment of expenditure of capital nature) are taken to income and expenditure account, the effective income of the Council is nil in the light of restrictions that without sanction of Government, the unspent balance of Grants can not be carried over from one financial year to another. Thus this does not attract any Income tax liability.
2. Grants to individual institutions being voluminous in nature is not part of annual accounts & shown in books of accounts.
3. Surplus funds under Non-Plan and CPF head are kept temporarily with Schedule Bank in fixed deposit account with higher net interest earnings. No restrictions exist on utilization of amount at any point of time.
4. Expenditure on Establishment, Printing and Stationary and Telephone deposits have been given the accounting treatment as per accounting policy.
5. An advance of Rs.1,74,90,46,217/- has been given to CCE (R & D Central, DRDO) upto 31.03.2021 (previous year Rs. 1,74,90,57,715 – 11,498 refunded by DRDO during the year)] for construction of AICTE H.O. building at J.N.U. Campus New Delhi. During the year (2016-2017) DRDO has handed over the possession of the building. The Council has not Capitalized in Building account as Expenditure Statement submitted by DRDO is under examination. Since the building is yet to be capitalized, the council is not charging any depreciation on it. The council will allocate the accumulated depreciation on the building for all past financial years on the date on which the building will be capitalized in the books.
6. The Council has availed a tax exemption status from Department of Direct Taxes, Government of India. Accordingly if Council has any income from any activity related to education or from bank accounts in the form of interest, no income tax is applicable.
7. The Council has deposited a sum of Rs 4.29 crore as security with NDMC for premises taken on rent at Mayur Bhawan building which was vacated on 30.06.2016 by the Council. The Council has filed a legal suit in the court of law to recover the aforesaid security deposit which is still pending.
8. An advance of Rs.2,45,62,000/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Guwahati up to 31-03-2021 (previous year balance Rs. 2,45,62,000/-) as Advance for construction of AICTE building at Guwahati.
9. An advance of Rs.9,04,39,952/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Jaipur up to 31-03-2021 (previous year balance Rs. 33,38,137/-) as Advance for construction of AICTE building at Jaipur.
10. An advance of Rs.34,02,563/- has been paid to National Board Accreditation, up to 31-03-2021 (previous year balance Rs. 34,02,563/-) as Advance for Conducting Workshop.
11. An advance of Rs.3,10,000/- has been paid to JNTU, up to 31-03-2021 (previous year balance Rs. 3,10,000/-) as Advance for Renovation of Building.
12. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs.3,85,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as Grant in Aid for AICTE Schemes.
13. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs. 1,28,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for J&K students scholarship scheme.
14. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs. 1,50,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for SWAYAM MOOCS Project.
15. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs. 96,59,802/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for TEQIP-III Project.



16. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs. Nil has been sanctioned from AICTE Internal Resource Funds (Non-Plan) for Innovation Cell.
17. During the financial year 2020-21 Rs. 1,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned from AICTE Internal Resource Funds (Non-Plan) for Indian Knowledge System.
18. During the financial year 2020-21, grants amounting of Rs. 37,70,02,434/- has been sanctioned as GIA on various schemes (Non-plan schedule 10) from the Interest earned on security Deposit and AICTE internal resource funds.
19. As per Section 16 (2) of AICTE ACT, the Council deposits its receipts and make investment in various nationalized banks from time to time, which are detailed in Schedule 6 of annual accounts.
20. Advances made and shown are recoverable are adjusted to final head of account/recovered on receipt of final bill/ receipt from the concerned party/department.
21. From the Financial Year 2011-12, Security Deposit paid by newly approved Institutes has been earmarked and invested in Fixed Deposit Receipts.
22. As per the Approval Process Hand Book (APH) 2010-11, the Technical Institutions were required to create Security Deposits in favor of AICTE for a period of 8 years. After completion of the period, the principle amount will be returned to the concerned institution and the interest generated thereon will be retained by AICTE. During the financial year 2018-19, principle amount of Rs. 74,17,58,553/- was received, out of which Rs. 23,04,86,348/- has been returned to the concerned institutions. Rs. 51,12,72,205/- remained with the council as on 31-03-2019. During the financial year 2019-20 principle amount of Rs. 18,05,43,522/- has been received and an amount of Rs. 49,41,13,814/- has been returned to the concerned institutions. Rs. 19,77,01,914/- remained with the Council as on 31-03-2020. During the financial year 2020-21 principle amount of Rs. 1,60,00,000/- has been received and an amount of Rs. 5,34,00,000/- has been returned to the concerned institutions. Rs. 16,03,01,914/- remained with the Council as on 31-03-2021.
23. In financial year 2019-20 the auditor pointed out that the Council was not recording the details of fixed deposits matured and fixed deposits renewed through its receipts & payment account. In financial year 2020-21 the Council has adopted the same practice and recorded all the maturity and renewals of fixed deposits through receipt and payment account.
24. The investment in Government Securities out of CPF Account was as per the face value of the Government securities.
25. Previous year figures have been regrouped wherever considered necessary.

**Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts
of All India Council for Technical Education, New Delhi
for the year ended 31st March 2021**

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of All India Council for Technical Education (Council), New Delhi as at 31st March 2021, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1971 read with Section 19 of the AICTE Act, 1987. These financial statements include the accounts of 11 units (8 Regional offices and 3 Camp offices) of AICTE. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.

3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

4. Based on our audit, we report that:

i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.

ii. The Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Education, Government of India vide order No. 29-4/2012-FD dated 17 April 2015 subject to the observations in the report.

iii. In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the Council in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.

iv. We further report that:

A. Balance Sheet

A.1 Fixed Assets (Schedule 4) - Rs.25.70 crore

A.1.1 The Council released an advance of Rs. 174.90 crore to Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) upto 31.03.2021 for construction of building of AICTE Hqrs, New Delhi. The building was completed and handed over to the Council in 2016-17 (August 2016) and put to use. However, it has not been capitalised as the expenditure statement submitted by DRDO is under examination. This resulted in understatement of Fixed Assets and overstatement of Loans, Advances & Deposits. Further, depreciation (at the rate of 2%) has not been charged on this building by the Council during the years 2016-17, 2017-18, 2018-19, 2019-20 and 2020-21. Although this position has been given in the note number 5 of the Notes to Accounts but non settlement of huge capital advances for more than five years indicate poor internal control in the Council which has resulted in non-capitalisation of fixed assets and non charging of depreciation. This is being pointed out since 2016-17 but no remedial action has been taken so far.

B. Grants-in-aid

The Council received grants-in-aid of Rs. 515.47 crore {General: Rs. 385.00 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 1.50 crore, PMKVY- Nil, TEQIP: Rs. 0.97 crore, PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs. 128.00 crore} during 2020-21. Out of this grant, Council received Rs. 33.50 crore {Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 1.50 crore, PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs. 32.00 crore} in the month of March 2021. It had its own receipt of Rs. 26.57 crore {Refund of unspent grant: Rs.20.23 crore, Interest earned & Misc. Income: Rs. 6.34 crore (Rs. 3.55 crore + Rs. 2.79 crore)}. The Council had an opening balance of Rs. 146.05 crore {General: Rs. 84.38 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 9.61 crore, PMKVY: Rs. 28.97 crore, TEQIP: Rs.0.03 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs. 23.06 crore}. Out of total amount of Rs. 688.08 crore, it utilised Rs.590.79 crore {General: Rs. 452.35 crore (includes Rs. 3.23 crore refund of interest to Ministry of Education), Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 1.25 crore, PMKVY: NIL, TEQIP: Rs. 0.62 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs.136.57 crore}.

The Council had a closing balance of Rs. 97.29 crore {General: Rs. 39.85 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 10.80 crore, PMKVY: Rs. 30.85 crore, TEQIP: Rs. 0.38 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme) Rs. 15.41 crore} as of 31st March 2021.

C. Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Member Secretary, AICTE through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.

vi. Annexure to Audit Report

1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System

The Council has an Internal Audit cell. The Internal Audit System of the Council needs strengthening in following areas :-

- No audit of Regional Offices was planned and conducted during the year.
- During the year 2020-21, out of 24 Bureaus/ Cells at AICTE Hqrs, internal audit of only 5 Bureaus/ Cells was planned and conducted during 2020-21.
- 53 internal audit paras were outstanding as on 31.03.2021.

2. Adequacy of Internal Control System

The Internal Control System of the Council needs strengthening in following areas: -

- The internal audit reports pertaining to 5 Bureaus/ Cells of Council conducted by the Internal Audit cell during the year 2020-21 revealed deficiencies viz. discrepancies in award of contracts, non-submission of UC of advances given, excess fee payments, non-commencement of project works by Institutions.
- Non adjustment of National Board of Accreditation Workshop Advances of Rs. 34.03 lakh and advance of Rs. 3.10 lakh to JNTU since 2012-13 and 2007-08 respectively.

3. System of physical verification of fixed assets

- The physical verification of Land and Building has been conducted upto 2020-21.
- The physical verification of Computer and accessories has been conducted upto 2020-21.
- The physical verification of Furniture and fixtures has been conducted upto 2019-20.
- The physical verification of library books has been conducted upto 2020-21.

4. System of physical verification of inventory

- The physical verification of inventories like stationery and consumables has been conducted up to 2019-20.

5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

- As per annual accounts, no payment over six months in respect of statutory dues was outstanding as on 31.03.2021.
