






# ANNUAL REPORT & ACCOUNTS 2021-22







## **Preface**

AICTE, having been established through an Act of Parliament as a statutory body, provides direction to improve the quality of technical education in the country through regulations and policies. Although a regulator, AICTE has established itself as a facilitator addressing the interests of all its stakeholders. AICTE continues to extend financial, intellectual and policy support in the matters of students (admission, courses, fees, scholarships); faculty (qualifications, salary, development and promotion), institution (approvals, infrastructure, accreditation, innovation and research); industry (curriculum, emerging areas, internships); and, the society (disadvantaged sections, meritorious, societal challenges).

Despite unprecedented COVID-19 blow to the entire society, AICTE oversaw successful conduction of examinations, approval to new institutions and courses, admission of students, running of the courses even as the world waited for the pandemic to wane out. The potential of communication technology was used to the hilt, not only to complete the processes but also integrate them in its functioning.

On the policy front, on one hand AICTE widened the entry level by offering 14 subjects to choose from, for admission in engineering courses; on the other, model curricula for several UG courses were developed. AICTE signed an MoU with DRDO to launch a Master's Programme in Defence Technology and with CBSE, for a gamut of activities benefiting students as well as teachers in the schools. The guidelines for Open & Distance Education and for Online Education in technical courses were released, mindful of their popularity after the pandemic and mainstreaming, for enhanced access to higher education.

Conforming to a recommendation of the NEP 2020, AICTE took up the mammoth task of providing engineering education in Indian languages, for which preparation of text-books aligned with outcome-based education (OBE) was taken up for first year books of both UG and Diploma courses. This was aggressively followed-up with their translation in 12 different languages, even as AICTE allowed extra intake for students wanting to study engineering in their own language. AICTE shall have to take up challenging task of preparation of books for subsequent years- in both English and Indian languages.

The support to strengthen the institutions continued through MODROBS (for laboratories), CAFES (for hostels), SPICES (for student clubs), GAINER (for solving water, electricity and internet woes in institutions in the North-Eastern states) and GOC (for conferences). During the year, 48 AICTE-IDEA (Idea Development, Evaluation & Application) Labs and two ATAL IDEA Labs were sanctioned, focused on imparting 21<sup>st</sup> century skills to the students and preparing faculty for the same. AICTE launched Scheme Promoting ACcessible Education (SPACE) with an objective to make students with disabilities in technical education as comfortable as other students and empower them to complete their studies (Accessible Education).

The teachers are pivotal in education systems and their development is the key to maintaining quality of education. Faculty in large numbers benefitted from QIP, FDP, STTP, PDP, Induction/Refresher Programmes etc. by keeping themselves updated with knowledge. The ambit of these schemes was expanded to benefit Librarians, Sports Officers and non-technical staff and made more focussed to remote states. During the year, even as ATAL Academy continued with the online FDPs on emerging technologies, training of faculty on UHV courses continued unabated. MoUs were signed with Technical Universities and NITs in different states to help faculty update their domain knowledge. Professional development of teachers was facilitated, also through funding of research projects, e-resources for research and e-conferences.



AICTE came out with the Student Learning Assessment-PARAKH portal, which allows students to assess their academic, social, cognitive, critical and behavioural development during their course, unlike a conventional examination. Concerned as it remains to the students, AICTE launched the SWANATH Scheme offering financial support to children who are orphans, or children of martyrs, or whose parents both or one of their parents died due to COVID19. During the year more than 4100 students from the Union Territories of J&K and Ladakh benefitted under the PMSSS, with female students making almost 40%, doubling in 5 years.

Indian Knowledge System (IKS) Cell of the Ministry of Education operating from AICTE, organized webinars throughout the year on wide-ranging topics related to Higher Education, Archaeology, Management, Physics, Metallurgy, History, Ayurveda, etc. During the year, NEAT 3.0 was initiated, expanding the scope to onboard companies that can cater to the skilling and reskilling needs of students across the levels of education. The Ministry's Innovation Cell (MIC) among other things conducted the Toycathon 2021 (Digital Edition), India-ASEAN Hackathon, besides introducing School Innovation Ambassadors Training Programme.

Based on the experiences and success of preceding year, of online engagement with its stakeholders, AICTE organized virtual events throughout the year. Webinars were organized on schemes of AICTE, its Quality Initiatives, Good Governance, Dyslexia Awareness, to name a few. AICTE organized Energy Literacy Training, workshop on Universal Human Values, Vigilance Awareness, Physical Fitness etc., for its employees and set an example for others. My colleagues documented various initiatives and achievements of AICTE during the pandemic in a booklet form as well as and a documentary, which are widely appreciated.

During the year, ATAL Cell won accolades from the World Book of Records for the second successive year for training the largest number of faculty. The tableau of the Ministry of Education & Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship conceptualized with the theme 'Vedas to Metaverse' by MIC, showcased during the Republic Day was declared the best among those of Ministries/ Department. The Parliamentary Committee on Papers Laid on the Table in Rajya Sabha visited us in September 2021 and was appreciative of the way AICTE left no stone unturned to constantly improve its performance during the pandemic. These recognitions will continue to motivate us to be proactive and do more to benefit all our stakeholders in the coming years.

# AICTE & ITS STATUTORY BODIES

### 1.1 Statutory Bodies & Their Composition

All India Council for Technical Education has been established through an Act of Parliament (Act No. 52 of 1987) with a view to carry out the proper planning and co-ordinated development of the technical education system throughout the country, the promotion of qualitative improvement of such education in relation to planned quantitative growth and the regulation and proper maintenance of norms and standards in the technical education system and for matters connected therewith. In order to effectively function and discharge its duties, AICTE seeks directions, guidance and advice from different statutory bodies.

### 1.1.1 The Council

The Council is a 51-member body and has a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Member Secretary with tenure appointments as per AICTE Act. The Council includes amongst others, representatives of various Departments of the Government of India, the Lok Sabha and the Rajya Sabha, Government of States and Union Territories, representatives from the Statutory Boards and Committees of the Council, Professional Bodies and organizations in the fields of concerned areas of technical education and research and also organizations in the field of industry and commerce, etc. The AICTE Act empowers the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical education. The powers and functions assigned to the Council are given in **Appendix 1.1**. The Council performs its functions in consultation with State Governments, Universities, State Boards of Technical Education, Professional Bodies and experts etc.

On completion of the term of the previous constituted Council on 10-04-2018, MHRD advised AICTE vide its letter No. 1-1/2018-TS-II dated 25-10-2021 to conduct meetings of Council with total 49 members including ex-officio and members representing various organizations as per the laid down procedure. The letter of MHRD is placed at **Appendix 1.2.** 

### **1.1.2 The Executive Committee**

The Executive Committee is a 21-member body constituted by the Council and discharges such functions as may be assigned to it by the Council. The Executive Committee is chaired by the Chairman of the Council and includes Vice-Chairman of the Council; Secretary to the Government of India; two Chairmen of the Regional Committees of the Council; three Chairmen of the All India Boards of Studies of the Council; one member of the Council representing the Ministry of Finance, Govt. of India; four members of the Council representing States/UTs; four members with expertise and distinction in areas relevant to technical education; Chairman of the University Grants Commission; Director of the Institute of Applied Manpower Research and Director General of the Indian Council of Agricultural Research. The Member-Secretary of AICTE is also the Member-Secretary of the Executive Committee.

In exercise of the powers conferred by Clause 12(1) of the AICTE Act, 1987, the AICTE had reconstituted the Executive Committee on 29-09-2021 for a period of three years vide notification dated 17-11-2021. The composition of the Executive Committee is given in **Appendix 1.3.** 

### 1.1.3 All India Boards of Studies

The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in their areas of concern including norms & standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses etc. The areas of concern, constitution, functions and powers of the Boards of Studies are such as may be provided by the Council through appropriate Regulations. Initially, the AICTE Act provided for the establishment of five Boards of Studies. Now total 11-Boards are in existence. Boards of Studies have 10-15 members each and are headed by subject experts of eminence.



The All India Boards of Studies advise the Executive Committee on academic matters falling in respective areas of concern including norms and standards, model curricula, model facilities and structure of courses, academic facilities and any other academic matter from time to time. The 10-Boards were reconstituted on 03-01-2020 for a term of 3 years and All India Board of Applied Arts, Craft and Design was formed for the first time w.e.f. 10-09-2018 for a term of 3 years, was reconstituted on 10-09-2021.

In pursuance of the powers conferred under Clauses 13(1) and 13(2) of the AICTE Act, in all 11 All India Boards of Studies have been constituted by the Council for advising the council in their areas of specialization.

The composition of various All India Boards of Studies is given in **Appendix 1.4** and the names of the Chairpersons are given below.

### 1.1.4 Regional Committees

According to Clause 14(3) of the AICTE Act, each Regional Committee advises and assists the Council on all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their regions. In pursuance of Clauses 14(1) and 14(2) of the AICTE Act, Regional Committees were constituted by the Council at Kolkata, Chennai, Kanpur and Mumbai on 18-04-1990 and subsequently three more Regional Committees were set up for the Regional Offices in Bangalore, Bhopal and Chandigarh in the year 1994 and other added for the one in Hyderabad on 08-03-2007.

Each Regional Committee, is headed by an engineer/ technologist of eminence, 15-20 members from industry, technical institutions, universities, State/ Central government organizations and professional bodies/ societies working in the areas of technical education, industry & policy making. The term of office of the Chairman and other members except exofficio members is of three years from the date of constitution of the Committee. Following Regional Committees were functioning during the reporting period:

### **1.2 Meetings of Statutory Bodies**

Statutory bodies, during the year under report, met several times to deliberate on the matters falling in their ambit and thus, provide directions required in the interest of technical education and its stakeholders. These bodies have given a number of recommendations and accorded relevant approvals.

### **1.2.1 Council Meetings**

The Council met once during the year for its 63<sup>rd</sup> meeting on 13-07-2021 and its important decision are reflected below:

While inviting the applications for this Scheme during the year 2013-14, Diploma Institutes were also included in eligibility criteria. As per available records, grant-in-aid for construction of hostel for SC/ST Students were released to 19 such institutions till date. In the meantime, the CAG while conducting an Audit inspection for financial year 2018-19 pointed out that AICTE had released the grants to non-entitled institutions i.e. Govt./Govt. aided Polytechnic institutions, against the eligibility criteria rendering such grants as unauthorized and CAG directed AICTE for initiating action to get this grant back from such institutions.	
		In this regard, AICTE had written the letter to all such Polytechnic institutions to refund the entire grant along with interest earned on it. In response, these Polytechnic institutions requested Secretary, MoE to intervene in this matter, in which grant was utilized by the Polytechnic institutions. MoE in turn, had requested AICTE to "look into the matter and take necessary action in this regard as deemed fit."	
		The matter was placed before the Executive Committee in its 137 <sup>th</sup> meeting held on 30.09.2020, in which, the EC approved the inclusion of Government Polytechnics retrospectively and not to seek refund from these 19 Govt. Polytechnics which were issued grants for construction of Hostel for SC/ ST Students from 2012-13 onwards. The Executive Committee also opined that a specific approval in this regard may also be requested from MoE and thereafter CAG be informed accordingly.	
		The Council was informed that MoE vide its Letter F.No. 1-3/ 2018-TS. II dated 28th June, 2021 has advised AICTE to place the proposal for extension of the scheme in its Council Meeting for concurrence, retrospectively from 2013-14.	
		The Council deliberated and in conformity of the decision of the Executive Committee held on 30.09.2020, approved the proposal retrospectively from 2013-14, since polytechnics are also engineering colleges running Diploma programmes. All these institutes are Govt./ Govt. aided institutions. Moreover, in the revised scheme guidelines, Polytechnics are covered too.	



### **1.2.2 Executive Committee Meetings**

On a query, CoA has confirmed that CoA shall start approving diploma programmes in architecture. Balakrishnan, former Deputy Director, IIT-Delhi, for taking initiatives for enabling differently abled students by providing accessibility to learning and other infrastructure facilities in institutions and equal opportunities of empowering them for taking better education through various other measures has been submitted. The salient suggestions of the aforesaid committee, in some selected model colleges in different states for Phase-I includes:  a) Accessibility Standards for Students with Disabilities Studying in Technical Institutions;  b) Framing Syllabus on Disability, Accessibility and Universal Design;



- c) Introduction of a New Elective Course on Design of Assistive Technologies (for other than Civil Engg. and Architecture Students);
- d) Suggested online SWAYAM course(s) and the list of faculty members who will be able to offer these courses;
- e) Suggested to conduct one seminar for NGOs and Department of Rehabilitation who are already working in this area for sensitizing people and create awareness on this issue;
- f) Suggested to Design short term certificate diploma course of oneyear duration for teachers;
- g) Suggested to AICTE to take initiative for the promotion of proactive engagement of college community (students and staff) with NGOs working for the people with disability in the neighbourhood.

The Executive Committee appreciated that the suggestions of the Committee will enable students not only for providing accessibility to infrastructural resources, but also to other educational facilities for differently abled friendly educational resources.

The Executive committee considered to develop one model college in some selected states, which will be having all provisions as mentioned in the recommendations by the committee and approved the tentative proposed budget of Rs.75.00 crore (Rupees Seventy-five Crore only) for 15 states @ Rs.5.00 crore per institute. The detailed proposal for making institute differently abled friendly with learning assistive devices with Rs.5.0 crore expected outlay will be submitted to the Executive committee in the forthcoming meeting. The funds for the proposed budget will be met from the IRG of AICTE.

### Item No. 143.03.09

To consider reservation of Seats in Degree Level technical courses for State / UTs lacking in such facilities.

The Executive Committee was informed that Ministry of Education (MoE), vide their letter dated 25th May, 2021 has stated that in MOE there is an ongoing scheme of reservation of seats in Engineering / Technology / Architecture / Pharmacy courses conducted at Degree level technical institutions approved by AICTE and Universities for States and UTs which do not have Engineering Colleges or lack facilities for education in specific fields of technical education, and for certain categories including foreign students.

MoE vide the aforesaid letter has requested to work on the development of a portal to manage allocation of those seats in AICTE affiliated Institution / Colleges allocated through CSAB for effective implementation of the scheme. The beneficiary States / UTs and Agencies under the scheme may be consulted to rectify the issues, if any.

The Executive Committee considered and deliberated on the matter and approved the proposal that supernumerary seats may be allocated under the scheme for the following States / UTs / Islands / Agencies:

- i. 8 North Eastern State including Sikkim
- ii. 2 Islands territories of Andaman & Nicobar Island and Lakshadweep.
- iii. Daman & Diu and Dadra & Nagar Haveli



		iv. Central Tibetan Schools Administration (CTSA)
		v. Indian Council for Child Welfare (ICCW) – for recipients of children's bravery awards.

The Executive Committee considered and approved the proposal for conduct of five two-week online training workshops for preparing application based questionnaire for five core engineering disciplines mentioned above, @ Rs. 93,000.00 each. The EC further approved the proposed training to be conducted in collaboration with Dr. P. R. Swarup, Member Secretary, (ECI) led team comprising best industry leadership, workmanship from Construction Industry Development Council (CIDC). The total budget estimate of Rs.4,65,000.00 shall be met through AICTE's Non-Plan Head of expenditure i.e. IRG of AICTE. The EC also approved the new scheme "AICTE Student Learning Assessment Project" under STTP. However, it was suggested that a suitable name be considered for this project.

The Executive Committee placed on record its appreciation for Col. B. Venkat, Director (FDC), AICTE and his team to have handled a mammoth task of development of student assessment portal in a time-bound and efficacious manner.

### Item No. 146.03.04

To consider and approve for admission to supernumerary seat in B. Tech Programme without appearance in entrance test. The Executive Committee was informed that a letter from Vice Chancellor Manipal Academy of Higher Education (MAHE) requesting to grant approval for admission under a supernumerary seat in B. Tech program without appearance in entrance test for gifted children arising due to inherent talent of a student.' The Executive Committee deliberated on the proposal and appreciated the initiative of AICTE to encourage gifted children. The EC re-iterated that NEP 2020 provides every student a holistic multidisciplinary education creating a well-rounded personality and support for gifted children.

The Executive Committee considered and approved creation of two supernumerary seats per institute in B. Tech. program. The Executive Committee further approved that two supernumerary seats may be accorded by AICTE in its approved institutions for empowering gifted and talented students to seek admissions against these seats, which will provide a motivating and unique opportunity for such students in line with NEP recommendations. The Executive Committee also resolved that the same may be provisioned in the forthcoming AICTE Approval Process Handbook (APH) 2022-23. It was decided that AICTE shall devise norms for selection of gifted children under supernumerary quota and the final admission under supernumerary quota shall be approved by AICTE.

### Item No. 146.03.10

To consider and approve the research proposal to develop Faculty Assessment Tool and Funding Requirement. The Executive Committee was informed that a proposal has been received from Avantika University, Ujjain for developing a Faculty Assessment Tool that will align itself to the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020. The project will also identify faculty who are familiar with the history, perspectives on education, role of faculty, role of students, understanding of the environment and the future requirements of the education process. The EC was further informed that research activities



Meanwhile, AICTE and Technology. opened up the window of opportunity by broadening the entry level qualifications. The Executive Committee in one of meetings, deliberated and decided to provide 14 subjects as possible options for admission to engineering. However, there were lots of reactions for and against the same which were addressed by the authorities at the AICTE for clarifying the misconceptions regarding the decision taken by the stakeholders.

The EC was further informed that keeping in view the reactions of the stakeholders, AlCTE decided to extend the mandate of the Committee with addition of some more members to the group from across the disciplines and from all kinds of Institutions. Accordingly, the committee was expanded by including special invitees. The committee also took the views of various stakeholders from industry and academia, Finally, the committee has submitted its report/recommendation to AlCTE after deliberating rigorously and conducting frequent meetings.

Prof. K. K. Aggarwal, Chairman, NBA who was a 'Special invitee', presented the findings and recommendations of the Committee to decide eligibility for entry to Engineering/Technology programs.

The Executive Committee deliberated on the matter and approved the report/recommendations of the Committee regarding eligibility for entry to Engineering/Technology programs. The EC recorded its deep appreciation to the Chairman and members of the Committee for the exhaustive exercise done on deciding the eligibility for entry to Engineering/Technology programs. The EC also suggested for sharing the Committee report and decision of the EC to NITI Aayog.

### Item No. 148.01.02

To consider and approve the recommendations of the Committee to review Moratorium on "AICTE Approval to New Engineering Institutions from Academic Year 2022-23 onwards".

The Executive Committee was informed that AICTE put a moratorium on opening new institutions in traditional areas of Engineering & Technology at Degree, Diploma and PG Level from 2020-21 onwards for two years in 2019. Further, the EC was informed that a committee was constituted in Oct, 2021 for "Reviewing Moratorium on Approval to New Engineering Institutions from Academic Year 2022-23 onwards" under the chairmanship of Shri BVR Mohan Reddy who was also the Chairman of the Committee to review the moratorium in the year 2019. After detailed deliberations and assessing future technical manpower needs of the country, submitted its report on 31.12.2021.

The Executive Committee deliberated, considered and approved the recommendations of the Committee to review Moratorium on "AICTE Approval to New Engineering Institutions from Academic Year 2022-23 onwards for two years", as Annexed to the Agenda, highlighting the major contents of the report as follows:

### 1. Undergraduate (B.Tech) Programmes:

**New institutions:** Moratorium on new engineering institutions should continue barring a few exceptions mentioned in the Report:



- a. AICTE may allow well-meaning philanthropists, educationists or educational foundations to create new institutions of excellence. Such institutions should create a capacity of 3000 seats in line with NEP 2020 guidelines. Further, these institutions should have large owned campus and student amenities comparable with that of globally reputed institutions. AICTE may suitably frame the financial and infrastructure requirements for creating such institutions. These should offer core and interdisciplinary courses with emphasis on emerging technologies and employable skills, have collaborations with reputed foreign educational institutions, partner with corporates, and gain an NIRF ranking of <100 in the first five years and <50 in 10 years of their founding.
- b. As per Government of India guidelines, every aspirational district in the country (220 of them) should have an engineering college. Currently, only 180 districts are covered. The State governments be given the flexibility to start engineering colleges in the remaining 40+ districts. The State governments must provide necessary budgets for infrastructure, faculty and labs before seeking approval to set up an engineering college in districts that do not have one.
- c. Facilitate conditional capacity creation in existing institutions: While the situation of low enrolments is concerning, continuing a blanket ban on new capacities may be detrimental to the future sustenance of quality engineering education. It will be prudent to facilitate limited and conditional capacity creation based on the following guidelines: It is observed that a few institutions have reported more than 100% enrolments in 2021. A number of institutes have reported >80% enrolments. It would be prudent that extra capacities be permitted to institutions with good NIRF ranking (<100) that have reported >80% enrolments last three years as below:
- i. 95-100+% enrolments additional capacity of 25% be permitted
- ii. 80-95% enrolments additional capacity of 15% may be permitted

Colleges that have more than 50% of enrolment should be allowed to start new courses in emerging technologies within their existing capacity. At the same time, the capacity in core engineering disciplines such as mechanical, electrical, electronics and civil engineering cannot be reduced by more than 50% of the approved capacity. Address the demand-supply imbalance through supply-side corrections. In the existing installed capacity, we need to shift focus to quality education to enhance foundational skills and industry-linked internships.

### Digital technologies:

Digital technologies should become integral to curricula across all engineering disciplines. A minor in digital technologies may be offered for all the disciplines. Programmes in digital technologies at UG level have limited visibility in the industry. Focus on faculty training, blended learning, projects and industry



internships is necessary to improve specialised skill talent. Capacities in four-year programmes in digital technologies should be reviewed and modulated on an annual basis keeping the industry needs and skill shortages in view.

### • New Disciplines & Specialisations:

Introduce new disciplines that are industry-relevant – Communication and Security Engineering, Manufacturing Engineering (additive, subtractive, 3D printing, etc.), Transport Engineering, Energy Engineering, Information Engineering, Public Health Engineering (water, environment, pollution, sewage etc.), Healthcare Engineering, Computational Engineering, Environmental Engineering, Geomatics/ Geospatial science & technology/ Geoinformatics, etc (indicative list, not exhaustive). Some of these could be made available at masters' level. Thematic undergraduate programmes in Circular Economy, Sustainability, Environment, etc.

• Introduce new specialisations - Microelectronics and VLSI, smart mobility, EV technology, Transportation, Highway engineering, Renewable Energy, Climate Change, Earth System Sciences, Future Communications especially 5G, Sustainable Development & Circular Economy, Waste Management, Product Design, Al plus technologies like CRISPR – Cas 9 (indicative list, not exhaustive).

### · Electives & Credits:

Have a large number of elective credits available across disciplines. For example, a student in ME does 50% basic of ME, then they get to choose from a large number of electives and are given the flexibility to do a full semester internship with the industry.

The total number of credits for graduation must be reduced from the current 160-180 to 135-140. The objective is to encourage students to give more time to self-study, group discussions/projects and peer group learning. This would nurture the culture of self-directed learning as opposed to being confined to passive classroom learning for more time.

- Core disciplines (ME, EE, EC, CE) need urgent revamp to cater to the rapidly evolving needs of the industry and rapid changes occurring in technologies. Core engineering industry should proactively support engineering institutes to produce engineers of the required skill set in their own interest. Each engineering industry should tie up with or adopt core engineering departments of at least 3-5 engineering colleges, help them develop curricula in core engineering branches, and mentor the students and faculty.
- Encourage start-up and entrepreneurship activity in core branches by setting up innovation hubs and tinkering labs, providing financial and mentoring support to students of core branches with innovative ideas, and providing credits for spending time on such ideas.
- Provide a chance for core disciplines to do a Double Major by undertaking extra credits.
- Start centres of excellence (CoEs) in core branches and involve students to get them excited to take up various projects.



### 2. Post Graduate (M.Tech) Programmes:

The enrolment trends in post-graduate programmes confirm that there is no state, discipline or institution category (government/private) for which the moratorium of approval to PG programmes in engineering institutions can be lifted. Existing PG programmes need to be restructured and made R&D and Industry Centric. Institutions/universities should replace the courses that have lost relevance with those in demand from the industry and those in line with government vision.

### 3. Diploma Programmes:

- i. The enrolment trends in diploma programmes confirm that about 50% of existing capacity is lying vacant. This warrants us not to add any new capacity.
- ii. There is an urgent need to review the curricula of diploma programmes. In the Western world, diploma holders, who primarily graduate from what are known as community colleges, find a lot of relevance in the industry. Indian industry is suffering on account of the non-availability of such relevant and well-trained manpower. This needs serious attention.
- iii. Laboratory equipment is poorly maintained and is outdated. For India to emerge as a globally competitive nation across sectors, it is essential to strengthen this stream of basic engineering talent.
- iv. Industry-academia connect is critical for diploma holders. Internships and apprenticeships need to be used extensively.

The Executive also resolved that the suggested recommendations of the said Committee may be incorporated in the forthcoming "AICTE Approval Process Handbook 2022-2023."

The EC also opined that the Core disciplines viz. ME, EE, CE may also include the name of the emerging specialization programme viz. ME (specialization in AI). The EC suggested that AICTE may write to the State Governments/UTs requesting respective to amend their Recruitment Regulations in view of emerging disciplines to avoid undue hardship for the prospective employment opportunities and equivalency matters being received at AICTE. The EC also suggested that AICTE in its APH must complete the work of nomenclature of UG & PG courses.

The Executive Committee considered and approved the proposed Scheme document and additional budget of Rs.1.90 crore for SIU and its activities for a period of 5 years, in addition to Rs.75.00 crore already approved in the 143rd meeting of the EC. The funds for the same shall be met through AICTE's internal resources i.e. IRG of AICTE.

The EC also approved to increase such colleges from 15 to 20 in case more states need to be covered.

### Item No. 149.03.04

To consider and approve AICTE- Scheme for Promoting Accessible Education (SPACE) regarding. The Executive Committee was informed that in its 143<sup>rd</sup> meeting, approval was granted for developing one selected model college each in majority of the states, which will be having all provisions in support of Accessible Education and approved an amount of Rs. 75 crore for 15 states (@ Rs. 5 crore per institute). Accordingly, it is proposed to initiate AICTE- Scheme for Promoting Accessible Education, by creating model institutes that will comprehensively address the needs of students with disabilities, so that the true spirit of access, equity and inclusion in technical education is achieved. These institutions will become a role model in Accessible Education for emulation by all institutions imparting technical and other higher education.

It was further informed that raising a model institute imparting Accessible Education, will involve establishing an Office of Accessibility & Assistive Technology (OAAT); procuring readymade products to enhance accessibility; developing facilities using the in-house capability of students & faculty; and sharing the new products developed, best practices & experiences among such model institutions. By show-casing themselves, these model institutions would be able to inspire others, so that all institutions eventually impart Accessible Education. It is also proposed to establish a Scheme Implementation Unit (SIU) which will inter alia oversee implementation of 15 projects, facilitate their periodic review; conduct outreach programs promoting Accessible Education in other Institutions.

The Executive Committee considered and approved the proposed Scheme document and additional budget of Rs.1.90 crore for SIU and its activities for a period of 5 years, in addition to Rs.75.00 crore already approved in the 143rd meeting of the EC. The funds for the same shall be met through AICTE's internal resources i.e. IRG of AICTE.

The EC also approved to increase such colleges from 15 to 20 in case more states need to be covered.

### Item No. 149.03.07

To consider and approve the revised report of National Fee Committee. The Executive Committee was informed that in its 147th meeting held on 01-12-2021, recommended to constitute a sub-committee to review the fee structure recommended in the National Fee Committee(NFC) report and comments received from different States/UTs in respect of the programmes of Planning, Design and Applied Arts & Crafts. The sub-committee noted that the required faculty student ratio was higher (1:16 for Planning 1:10 for Design Applied Arts and crafts) than other professional programmes and permitted intake limited to only 60, 90 and 180, therefore, per student fee for these programmes works out to be quite high.

The Executive Committee was further informed that the NFC report was placed before the All India Board of Applied Arts, Crafts & Design (AIB-AACD) and All India Board of Town and Country Planning (AIB-TCP).

The AIB-AACD has recommended the faculty-student ratio of 1:15 for both UG and PG related courses in Applied Arts and Crafts and the AIB has not suggested any changes for Design domains and Planning.



In view of the revised ratio, following the norms and methodology stated by NFC Report of 2021. The minimum and maximum fees for these programs are mentioned in the following Table:

The Executive Committee after exhaustive deliberations, considered and approved the recommendations of the National Fee Committee (NFC) with the minimum and maximum fees for all professional programmes by considering Norms and Standards prescribed by AICTE in its Approval Process Handbook 2020-2021. The EC also approved the recommendations of the sub-Committee for the programmes of Planning, Design and Applied Arts & Crafts as mentioned in the aforesaid table as recommendations of the National Fee Committee in totality.

The Executive Committee further decided that the Fee Regulatory Committee of each State/UT should ensure that the minimum and the maximum fee defined by the NFC in various disciplines should be adhered by the institutions. The State Fee Regulatory Committee should verify the audited accounts of the respective institutions in respect of fee being charged as per the recommendations of the NFC to prevent commercialization of education.

The Executive Committee approved the National Fee Committee recommendations as modified by the review Committee headed by Dr. M.K. Tiwari, Director, NITIE, Mumbai.

The Executive Committee resolved that the recommendations of the NFC and the sub-committee along with the aforesaid decisions may be forwarded to the Ministry of Education for further notification and apprising the Hon'ble Court in the ongoing matter, accordingly. The Executive Committee placed on record, appreciation for Dr. M.K. Tiwari, Director, NITIE, Mumbai (Chairman of the Sub-committee) and other members of the sub-committee for their contribution and timely submission of their recommendations.



### Item No. 149.03.12

To consider and approve core branches as recommended by committee on "Reviewing Moratorium on Approval to New Engineering Institutions from academic year 2022-23 onwards."

The Executive Committee was informed that the recommendations of the committee under the chairmanship of Prof. BVR Mohan Reddy, on "Reviewing Moratorium on Approval to New Engineering Institutions from academic year 2022-23 onwards" was approved in the 148<sup>th</sup> emergent meeting held on 13-01-2022.

Further, the Executive committee was apprised that the following branches of engineering are to be considered as core branches from A.Y. 2022-23 onwards



Also, an institute is permitted to change the intake or add new courses by reducing seats in other approved courses but not exceeding the reduction by 50% of the earlier intake. Complete closure of any core branch is not allowed for getting the new courses keeping in view of the future requirements of engineers from the core branches of engineering.

The Executive Committee, based on the recommendations of the aforesaid committee approved the following provisions to be enabled in the Approval Process handbook (APH) 2022-23:

- a) In view of the large number of vacant seats in various Programmes during the last few years and the likely future demand, the Council shall not grant approval to the new Technical Institutions at the Diploma/ Under Graduate/ Post Graduate Level. However, establishment of new Technical Institutions in Engineering and Technology shall be permitted only in cases where: -
- State Government / UT (based on their perspective plan) is providing financial assistance for establishment of Technical institutions in order to offer the Engineering and Technology Programme / Courses at DIPLOMA/UG/PG level where NO Government /Government Aided Technical Institution offering the same level in Engineering & Technology is already available in that particular district. The Government must have a budget provision of minimum Rs.10.00 crore and requisite land for establishment of New Institute.
- State Government proposes to start a New Polytechnic (Engineering and Technology) for conducting courses in Emerging/Multidisciplinary/ Skill/Vocational area including PPP mode.
- New Institutes (Engineering and Technology) with courses in Emerging Area as well as in Traditional/ Conventional Area for NE States, J&K, Ladakh and in Aspirational Districts of different States/ UT.
- Philanthropical organization existing for more than 25 years and running other educational institutes having minimum enrolment of 10000 students having NIRF (if applicable) Ranking within 100.





### 1.2.3 All India Boards of Studies Meetings

The 11 All India Boards of Studies (AIB) duly constituted by the Council for advising the council in their areas of specialization, in all had 10-Meetings during 2021-22 for deliberating on various proposals/ issues received from stakeholders and also for model curriculum preparation for various courses in their domain. ### 1.2.4 Regional Committees Meetings

As per the provisions of the AICTE Act, the Regional Committees advise and assist the Council in all aspects of planning, promoting and regulating technical education within their respective regions. These Committees are mainly helpful in implementation of Clause 10 (k) of the Act i.e. grant of approvals for new technical institutions and for the introduction of new courses or programmes.





## **APPROVAL BUREAU**

### 2.1 Growth of Technical Education

AICTE continues to promote quality technical education in the country in a coordinated and integrated manner through appropriate policies, programs, funding and recognitions. The progression has been furthered by the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP) which aims to bridge the gap between current learning outcome that brings the highest quality, equity and integrity into the system.

In line with NEP, AICTE has reoriented its role as a regulator to be a objective facilitator and usher in more changes in technical education. Relevant changes have been incorporated in the annual Approval Process Handbook with focus sharpened on quality of education, simplicity of procedure and transparency in implementation. New Provisions introduced in the APH 2021-22 are as follows:

### **Chapter I [For New Institutions]**

- 1) As per recommendation of BVR Mohan Reddy Committee, moratorium for setting up new Engineering Colleges has been extended for two years (AY 2022-2024). However, approval would be granted wherein state government / UT (based on its perspective plan) is providing financial assistance for establishment of technical institutions in order to offer the Engineering and Technology programme/ courses at diploma/ UG/ PG level where no government/ government aided technical institution offering courses are already available in that particular district.
- 2) New Institutes (Engineering and Technology) with courses in Emerging area as well as in Conventional/Traditional area for NE States, J&K, Ladakh and in Aspirational Districts of different States/ UT.
- 3) As per directions of Hon'ble Supreme Court, for the existing institutions offering courses in Architecture or Pharmacy Programme, approval by the Council of Architecture (COA) or Pharmacy Council of India PCI is mandatory but AICTE approval is not necessary. However, for the purpose of getting benefits of AICTE schemes as per the prevailing policies/norms, interested Architecture / Pharmacy Institutions may apply to the AICTE for approval, after getting approval of CoA/ PCI.
- 4) To ease submission of application on AICTE web portal, Digitally Signed facility has been introduced and Institutes/ organisation were informed through public notification.
- 5) Online Scrutiny/ Re-scrutiny/ EVC with a provision for physical ones done under extra ordinary circumstances.

### **Chapter II [For Existing Institution]**

- 1) Keeping in view of the pandemic situation, Council not only modified the processing and submission of application online but also provided online support system for other purposes, related to existing institutes.
- 2) No TER charges are levied for Government-aided institutions, even if running some self-financing courses.
- 3) Conversion of Diploma level into Degree level and vice-versa.
- 4) Merger/ addition of new courses in conventional/ traditional discipline is not permitted.
- 5) Existing institutions shall continue to be permitted to start new program/course(s) in Engineering and Technology only in emerging/multi-disciplinary areas.
- 6) Existing institutions of the same Trust/ Society/ Company operating in the same location/ city shall be permitted to merge into a single institution with all the facilities at the proposed parent institution and/ or part/ full facilities of the child institution(s), if necessary/required.
- 7) Child Institutions shall be allowed to submit their application only for EOA (No changes will be permitted) if merger is not approved.
- 8) Total land required shall be the highest amongst the programs/levels being offered by the Institute. However, institute



- shall have sufficient built-up area to cover all the requirements of all the programs/ levels conducted as per the provisions of Approval Process Handbook.
- 9) Introduction/ continuation of supernumerary seats for Foreign Nationals/Overseas Citizen of India (OCI)/ children of Indian workers in Gulf countries. The institution shall submit online application mandatorily for each course. (If required/ interested) for continuation of Approval for supernumerary seats for admitting Foreign National/ Overseas Citizen of India (OCI)/children of Indian workers in Gulf countries, as a part of application of Extension of Approval, every year, giving details of faculty and other facilities.
- 10) Increase in intake/is allowed to institutions with accredited courses for up to 4 divisions NBA validity of one accredited course can be used for increase in intake of their Non-Accredited course in emerging/multi-disciplinary area courses only.
- 11) Increase in intake (over and above the maximum allowed intake per course) of one division is allowed for a course in regional languages, for only in the conventional accredited courses.
- 12) The existing Institutions having total "Approved Intake" exceeding the "Maximum Intake Allowed" seeking for approval for Increase in Intake/ Additional Course(s) (without NBA accreditation) in the same Level in the same Programme (Diploma/ Under Graduate/ MCA/ Management) shall have to apply for the Reduction of Course(s) as per the Procedure and shall apply for increase in Intake/ Additional Course(s) in lieu of the same, without exceeding the total "Approved Intake" as well as the number of Courses/ Divisions as specified in the Approval Process Handbook, subject to "Nil Deficiency" based on Self-Disclosure on AICTE Web-Portal. Number of New Courses/ increase in intake in Conventional / Emerging / Multidisciplinary area allowed, shall be restricted to FOUR (in terms of Divisions) per Programme/ Level (Diploma / Under Graduate / MCA / Management). New Course shall be allowed ONLY in case of more than 50% overall Enrolment in last year at respective level/ programme.
- 13) Affiliation with two different universities for same Programme/ Course shall not be permitted.
- 15) All the benefits/ facilities applicable for the minority institutions (converted from Non-Minority to Minority) shall come into force only from the subsequent academic year.

### **CHAPTER- III [For Collaboration & Tiwinng Programme]**

- 1) Collaboration and twinning shall be allowed with a foreign university having ranking within top 500 as per the QS World Ranking and Indian University shall be within top 100 NIRF Ranking in the preceding year.
- 2) Collaboration and twinning shall also be allowed between AICTE approved institutions (having valid NBA accredited courses) and an institute of national importance passed by an Act of Parliament or any other AICTE approved institutes (having valid NBA accredited courses) with institutes falling within top 100 in NIRF ranking.
- 3) Collaboration and twinning shall also be allowed between AICTE approved Institutes (having valid NBA accredited courses) and Category-I Universities. Lateral Entry and supernumerary seats shall not be allowed in Foreign Collaboration and Twinning Programme.

### **CHAPTER- IV [For University]**

- 1) Universities/ Institutions deemed-to-be-universities shall be permitted to run PGDM/PGCM course(s) along with other programmes.
- 2) Council shall not grant Approval for any integrated programme(s)/course(s) without NOC from respective regulatory body.
- 3) Application for partial Approval of any Programme(s) /Course(s)/ Intake at any level shall not be permitted.

### CHAPTER-V [For Open & Distance Learning (ODL) & Online Learning (OL)]

1) Grant of approval for ODL/ online for Standalone Institutions/ Institutions Deemed to be Universities / Universities shall be as per AICTE (Open and Distance Learning Education and Online Education) Guidelines, 2021 notified on 3<sup>rd</sup> March, 2021.

### **CHAPTER- VI [For Vocational Course under NSQF]**

- 1) Grant of approval through online application for Vocational Education Courses under NSQF.
- 2) All institutions initially shall be eligible for a maximum of four (4) sectors/ specializations per location, consisting of a maximum 120 students with a batch size of 30 students or (1) sector/specialization with maximum 120 students with batch size as 120 students.
- 3) The institutions can also apply for closure/reduction in intake of existing courses and can apply for vocational courses with sector/ specialization to a maximum of 120 intakes.



4) The approval for vocational courses shall be valid for ONE year. TER charges are not applicable for vocational courses.

### **CHAPTER-VII** [Norms and Requirements]

- 1) Induction training of 3 weeks and 2 weeks is mandatory for First Year UG and Diploma students respectively.
- 2) The technical institutions shall initiate MoUs with the industries for the internships of the students and report the outcomes of the same in their website. The industry with whom MoU is signed shall be a registered industry having valid TIN/GST number.
- 3) Starting other academic course(s)/ institutions (technical/ non-technical) in the excess built-up area/land, arising out of the courses approved for closure, not started, etc., is permitted. However, the applicant has to make material/ non-material amendment of the building plan, site plan, etc. approved by the concerned Competent Authority to suit the requirements of the new programme.
- 4) Under Tuition Fee Waiver (TFW) Scheme, admission up to a maximum of 5% of "Approved Intake" per Course shall be available. These seats shall be supernumerary in nature and shall be available only to such course(s) in an institution, where a minimum of 50% of the seats in approved intake were filled up in the last academic year.
- 5) The TFW Scheme will be implemented by the respective PGDM/PGCM institutes as per their institution policy (following general guidelines issued by AICTE).

### **CHAPTER-VIII** [Penal Action in case of Violation of the Norms and Regulations]

- 1) Any changes in the Schedule for any of the approval (including academic) related activities as notified by the Council from time to time is binding on all the AICTE Approved institutions/ Universities.
- 2) AICTE has strengthened the grievance redressal system to address the grievances of faculty. If the grievance is not addressed initially at the institution and University (UG & PG level) or DTE (Diploma level), then only the faculty can approach Council.




Fig 2.2.1: Programme-wise count of AICTE Approved New institutes in 2021-22




Fig 2.2.2: New Approvals accorded to Postgraduate Programmes during 2021-22




Fig 2.2.3: New Approvals accorded to UG Programmes in 2021-22




Fig 2.2.4: Programme-wise count of AICTE Approved New institutes in 2021-22 (New + Existing)




Fig 2.2.5: New Approvals accorded to Postgraduate Programmes during 2021-22






Fig 2.2.6: Diploma (New + Existing) for 2021-22

### 3.1 New Policies/ Regulations

The National Education Policy envisions an education system rooted in Indian ethos that contributes directly to transforming India, that is Bharat, sustainably into an equitable and vibrant knowledge society, by providing high-quality education to all, and thereby making India a global knowledge superpower. The policy envisages that curriculum and pedagogy of our institutions must develop among the students, a deep sense of respect towards the Fundamental Duties and Constitutional values, bonding with one's country, and a conscious awareness of one's roles and responsibilities in a changing world.

### 3.1.1 Flexibility in Eligibility Criteria for admission in U.G. course

In order to adopt the NEP 2020, a committee under the chairmanship of Prof. K.K. Aggarwal, NBA Chairman suggested relevant 14 subjects at 10+2 level for students aspiring for B.E/ B.Tech courses admissions of different disciplines. AICTE opened up the window of opportunity by broadening the entry level qualifications by offering 14 subjects to choose from, for admission in engineering.

Further out of 14 subjects at class XI & XII level, if a student has not studied a subject essential for the study of a specific discipline of engineering, then the student shall have to take the prerequisite additional courses either as a MOOC before joining the degree programme or at least in the first year of engineering before proceeding to learn the advanced courses in Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry and Biology or even spend an extra year so that proper foundation is created. ### 3.2 MoUs with various Organizations/ Institutions

AICTE is making concerted efforts to improve the standard of technical education and towards this AICTE has signed Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with number of organizations, for the benefit of institutions and students at large. AICTE entered into MoU with 9 institutions during 2021- 22:

- 2) Aspire for Her Management & Consultancy Private Limited (Aspire for Her) on 13-10-2021 to collaborate for enabling future-ready workforce with focus on Women Empowerment.
- 3) **Eduskills Foundation** on 10-11-2021 to promote internship opportunities to engineering and polytechnic students of all branches and all years.
- 4) **Veterans India** on 25-12-2021 for overall development of UG and PG students by bringing in touch of discipline and nationalism that enable the youth to grow in all three dimensions [Mansa, Vacha and Karmana).
- 5) Indian Railways Institute of Signal Engineering and Telecommunications (IRISET), Ministry of Railway on 13-01-2022 to introduce Safety Critical Railway Technology subjects 'Automatic Train Protection: Kavach' and 'Railway Signal Engineering' for B. Tech and M. Tech programs in India.

- 7) Commission for Scientific and Technical Terminology (CSTT) on 07-03-2022 to evolve and define scientific and technical terms in Hindi and in other modern Indian languages for Teaching & Learning Process, Content Creation as textbooks, Faculty Development Programme (FDP), Skilling and vocational education (Promotion in Hindi and regional languages), Promotion of Indian Knowledge System in Hindi and regional languages, Localization of technology.
- 8) **Mahatma Gandhi National Council of Rural Education (MGNCRE)** on 15-03-2022 to promote internship opportunities to engineering students, opting to join the Rural Entrepreneurship, Rural Management and Rural Engagement.
- 9) **National Testing Agency (NTA) & Eduquity Career Technologies Pvt. Ltd** on 19-03-2022 to facilitate and provide resources from AICTE approved institutions to conduct NTA online examinations through Eduquity across the nation.



### 3.3 Open and Distance Education and Online Education Guidelines 2021

- 1) In order to make Online & ODL Education more accessible and fulfil the objectives of NEP-2020, AICTE framed and notified comprehensive guidelines in March, 2021 and relaxed the norms for offering the same by technical institutions (NAAC Score 3.26 to 3.01 or NBA 700 to 650).
- 2) The institution has to acquire NBA accreditation with a minimum score of 650 points on a scale of 1000 in next 2-years from the date of initial approval.
- 3) These Guidelines are now applicable to management and allied areas, computer applications, artificial intelligence and data science in the engineering & technology domain, logistics, and travel & tourism.

### 3.4 Quality Initiatives

### 3.4.1 Undergraduate Engineering Programmes in Regional Languages/ Mother Tongue

Learning of UG programmes in Regional Languages/ Mother Tongue is being promoted by AICTE and approval was accorded to 19 institutions to offer them from 2021-22. AICTE has undertaken the translation of books of first year courses and MOOCs for important foundational engineering courses available in SWAYAM/ NPTEL in the 12 Indian languages. AICTE plans to initially start the education at degree level in languages such as Assamese, Bengali, Gujarati, Hindi, Kannada, Malyalam, Marathi, Odia, Punjabi, Tamil, Telugu, and Urdu.

### 3.4.2 AICTE & DRDO join hands to launch M. Tech in Defence Technology

AICTE joined hands with DRDO to launch a regular M.Tech. Programme in Defence Technology in technical institutions across India. The Institute of Defence Scientists & Technologists (IDST) will provide support to the universities and institutions for conducting this course with six specialized streams- Combat Technology, Aero Technology, Naval Technology, Communication Systems & Sensors, Directed Energy Technology and High Energy Materials Technology. During the programme students will get an opportunity to pursue their major project in distinguished DRDO labs, Defence PSUs and Private Sector Defence Companies.

### 3.4.3 Standards for Accessibility to Differently-abled (PwD) Students

AICTE set up a committee under the Chairmanship of Prof. M. Balakrishanan, IIT Delhi to decide on standards for accessibility to PwD students studying in technical institution which recommended the following:

- 1) Accessibility standards for Students with Disabilities studying in technical institutions like wheelchair, ramp, provision of lifts, accessible toilets, proper signage, provision of Braille Signage, issue of notes/ handouts in advance, provide digital book reading device, training of teachers and use of Universal Design techniques, special provision in the exams and support systems like financial assistance (scholarship, sponsorship, etc.).
- 2) Framing of syllabus on Disability, Accessibility and Universal Design.
- 3) Introduction of a new elective course on Design of Assistive Technologies (for other than Civil Engineering and Architecture students).
- 4) Online SWAYAM course(s) and the list of faculty members who will be able to offer these courses.



- 5) Conduct one seminar from NGOs and Department of Rehabilitation who are already working in this area for sensitizing people and create awareness on this issue.
- 6) Design short term certificate diploma course of one-year duration for teachers.
- 7) AICTE to take initiative for the promotion of proactive engagement of college community (students and staff) with NGOs working for the People with Disability in the neighbourhood.

### 3.4.4 Awareness on Dyslexia among the Students, Teachers and Parents.

AICTE organized a webinar on Dyslexia on 13-10-2021 with the panelist Ms. Rama Tandon, Ms. Noopur Jhunjhunwala and Mr. Vivek Khare, who expressed their views on the problems related to Dyslexia and importance of awareness regarding it.

On 26-10-2021, Second webinar on Dyslexia was conducted where Dr. Induamthi Rao identified the areas needing for improvement for Inclusion of Dyslexic children into the mainstream education cohort. Prof. Sheffali Gulati shared her experience while working in AIIMS with children with SLD and helped figuring out traits at early stages that would help children in need. Sh. Balendu Sharma shared some online tools (transcription and voice to text) for dyslexic.

### 3.7 Review of Sydney and Dublin Accords

A committee chaired by Prof. K. K. Aggrawal, Chairman, NBA was constituted by AICTE to recommend whether India should become a signatory to the Sydney Accord and Dublin Accord. The committee recommended that India should be signatory to Dublin Accord meant for Engineering Technician Education, i.e., 3-years Diploma in Engineering Courses imparted in India as vast job market may be tapped by Indian Diploma holders in the member countries. The report was submitted to MoE for consideration.

### 3.8 Launch of Happiness Rankings on Blockchain and Blockchain courses

On 13-01-2022, AICTE announced that it has collaborated with Blockchain network 5ire to create the world's biggest happiness blockchain named, YourOneLife (YOL) app on 5irechain. YOL aims to create a sustainable model of happiness in the world.

By incorporating sustainability into India's technical and higher education regulation through YourOneLife (YOL), AICTE has engaged a central tenet of the for-benefits economy and its mission to accelerate the United Nations 2030 agenda for Sustainable Development. This application would be helpful to provide access to the thousands of affiliated institutions in creating and developing a sustainable model of Happiness in the world. The model of YOL essentially has three key features:

- 1) Assessing the Happiness Index of an individual and an institution
- 2) Assessing the mindshare of an individual or an institution
- 3) Setting the mind map of an individual or an institution

### **4.1 Institutional Development Schemes**

### 4.1.1 Campus Accommodation & Facilities Enhancing Social Experience (CAFES) Scheme

The scheme started in 2013-14 supports government/ government-aided engineering colleges/ University departments/ Polytechnics for construction of men/ women hostels in their campus. The objective is to provide accommodation along with social experience towards better personality development opportunities for students /researchers belonging to SC/ ST/ Differently-abled/ NER. Funding of upto Rs 3.25 crore, provided to institute to complete the project within the period of three years. During 2021-22 Rs. 35.55 Crore were released for construction of hostel.

### 4.1.3 Modernisation and Removal of Obsolescence (MODROB) Scheme

The scheme is aimed to upgrade the infrastructural facilities, laboratories, workshops, and computing facilities to enhance teaching, training and research capabilities in the AICTE approved institutions. The limit of funding is Rs 20 lakh and project duration is 2 years. AICTE has been operating this Scheme, to enhance the functional efficiency of



technical institutions for teaching, training and research activities by helping in timely upgradation of infrastructure.

During the financial year 2021-22, for 279 projects costing Rs. 34.13 crore were sanctioned and Rs. 27.30 crore released. In addition, Rs. 2.52 crore were released to MODROB project sanctioned in previous year, as first/second instalments during 2021-22.

### 4.1.4 Skill and Personality Development Programme Centre for SC/ST Students (SPDC) Scheme

The scheme promotes the establishment of infrastructure in the form of a SPDP Centre in institutes to empower the SC and ST students by providing special skill training apart from regular study. The training is provided with the help of modules on communication, personality development and proficiency in English language. Thus, it boosts the confidence of SC and ST students and provides them with better career opportunities, so that, their employability in the industry increases. Maximum funding to the institute under this scheme is Rs. 25 lakh, to be spent within three years.

During 2021-22 an amount of Rs. 4.20 Crore was released, being the second and third installment to the 84 beneficiary institutes under SPDC scheme.

### 4.1.5 Grant for Organizing Conference (GOC) Scheme

The scheme provides financial assistance to institutions for organizing conferences at national and international level in various fields of technical education. In view of the pandemic, institutions were permitted to conduct online (National/International) conferences instead of regular onsite conferences with financial support not exceeding Rs. 4 lakh. During 2021-22, Rs. 130.35 lakh were released as first & second instalment to 123 institutions for organizing conferences.

### 4.1.6 AICTE- IDEA (Idea Development, Evaluation & Application) Lab Scheme

A new scheme AICTE-IDEA (Idea Development, Evaluation & Application) Lab was approved by the EC during the year. Facilities for supporting translation of Ideas into prototype and training of students are being created under one roof, to train students on 21st century skills so that there employablity enhances.

Proposals were invited from institutions having 10 successive EoA (Extension of Approval) in immediate preceding years and at least one live accredited course. Proposals were received and were subjected to evaluation, for funding from AICTE's own funds. 48 institutions spread over 17 states/UTs selected to establish an AICTE IDEA Lab were announced on 14-06-2021, and an amount of Rs. 23,85,95,000 was released by 31-03-2022.

2 ATAL IDEA Labs were sanctioned to Deenbandhu Chhotu Ram University of Science and Technology, DCRUST–Murthal (Haryana) and Visheswaraya Techological University– Muddenhalli (Karnataka) to be evolved as model labs at a cost of Rs. 4.42 Crore each. These will largely be conducting FDPs and offering internship on a continuous basis. The list of institutions sanction IDEA LABS is given in Annexure 4.2.

### 4.1.7 e-Shodh Sindhu (ESS) Scheme

Free subscription of e-Journals/ e-Resources to AICTE approved Government/ Government-aided institutes is provided through INFLIBNET Centre, Gandhi Nagar, (Gujarat) at the behest of AICTE and MoE. During 2021-22, Rs. 2.74 crore were released to INFLIBNET for the subscription to ASCE, ASME & Bentham Science to 77 institutes so far.



### 4.1.8 AICTE-Scheme for Promoting Interests, Creativity and Ethics among Students (SPICES)

As first of its kind initiative, focussing on students' clubs was launched during this year to energize and position students club/ Chapters/ Societies as facilitating entity for pursuit of individual interests, creative work, showcasing talent, networking and teamwork opportunities, social experience; organization and management skills, exposure to professional ethics etc. During 2021-22, Rs. 45 lakh were released to 45 institutes under this scheme Rs. 180 Lakh having been released in previous year.

### **4.1.9 AICTE-Scheme Promoting Accessible Education (SPACE)**

AICTE launched the Scheme Promoting ACcessible Education (SPACE) aimed to eliminate the difficulties learners are faced with, due to impairment of any kind with an overarching objective of encouraging more students to enroll for technical education and make them as comfortable as other students and empower them to complete their studies.

For this purpose, AICTE proposes to create one model institute in 15-20 major linguistic states, to offer Accessible Education and this involves establishing a sensitive and responsive Office of Accessibility & Assistive Technology (OAAT) in each institute. OAAT shall be the repository of all resources and proactively catering to the requirement of students. The institutes selected shall be procuring ready-made products to enhance accessibility; developing facilities/ solutions using the in-house capability of students & faculty; and sharing the new products developed, best practices & experiences among such model institutions. By showcasing themselves, these model institutions should be able to inspire others, so that over time all institutions impart Accessible Education.

### **4.2 Student Development Schemes**

### 4.2.1 Pragati Scholarship Scheme for Girl Students

AICTE awards Rs. 50,000 per annum under Pragati Scholarship to girl students with an aim to provide assistance to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to give young women an opportunity to pursue higher technical education and prepare them for a successful future.

The scheme launched on National Educational Day in 2014, allows two girls per family to benefit provided family income is less than Rs. 8 lakh per annum. 10000 scholarships per annum from 23 States/ UTs (5000 for Diploma and 5000 for Degree), and all eligible girl students from remaining 13 States/ UTs (including North Eastern Region, J & K, etc.)

The candidates should have been admitted in AICTE approved institutions either in the first year or second year (Lateral entry) of the Degree or Diploma level programs during the academic. Reservation of 7.5% for ST, 15% for SC, and 27% for OBC candidates is available.

### 4.2.2 Saksham Scholarship Scheme for Differently-abled Students

AICTE awards Rs. 50,000 per annum under Saksham Scholarship to differently-abled students with an aim to provide encouragement and support them to pursue technical education. This is an attempt to provide young differently-abled students an opportunity to study further and prepare for their successful future.

This scheme launched on National Educational Day in 2014 is available to all students having more than or equal to 40% disability and whose family income is not more than Rs. 8 lakh per annum.

All the eligible specially-abled student admitted to first year or second year (Lateral entry) of the Degree or Diploma level programs during the academic year can apply for this scholarship.

### 4.2.3 AICTE-Swanath Scholarship Scheme

AICTE launched 'AICTE-Swanath Scholarship Scheme' in September 2021 to provide support to orphans; wards of parents who died due to Covid-19 and wards of Armed Forces and Central Paramilitary Forces martyred in action (Shaheed) to pursue courses offered by AICTE approved institutions.

Under this scheme 2000 scholarships (1000 for Degree Students and 1000 for Diploma Students) are awarded every year to eligible candidates. Rs. 50,000/- per annum for every year of study that is, scholarship of maximum 4 years' duration for first year admitted Degree students and maximum 3 years for Diploma Students are given. Total 828 applications were received in the year 2021-22.

### 4.2.4 AICTE-Post Graduate (PG) Scholarship Scheme

In order to ensure development of technical education in India, AICTE awards Scholarship to GATE/ GPAT/ CEED qualified student, an amount of Rs. 12,400/- per month for 2 years. The students of final years of dual degree integrated programmes are also eligible for PG Scholarship from the 9<sup>th</sup> semester onwards.

PG Scholarship is awarded to students admitted in Master of Engineering/Technology/ Architecture/ Pharmacy/ Design courses including integrated courses in AICTE approved institutions and University/ Departments, within the approved programme/ intake plus maximum 10% for EWS category students (fulfilling the eligibility conditions for scholarship), if EWS quota is implemented by the respective institutions.

During the financial year 2021-22, an amount of Rs. 26,763.82 lakh was released, into the bank accounts of students through Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT).

### **4.2.5 AICTE Doctoral Fellowship (ADF)**

The objective of the scheme is to promote research culture in AICTE approved institutions, collaborative research between institute and industries leading to start ups. For the academic year 2021-22, in all 363 seats were allotted to 42 Universities across different states of India. The admission against the allotted seats is done directly by the concerned University following the minimum eligibility criterion as prescribed by AICTE. The duration of the fellowship is 3 years and one-year extension may be given by AICTE on the recommendation of the University, based on the performance of the research scholar. Selected researchers receive a monthly fellowship of Rs. 31,000 as JRF for first two years and thereafter Rs. 35,000 as SRF, besides house rent allowance (HRA) as per government norms. In addition, an amount of Rs. 15,000 per annum as contingency grant is given.

### 4.2.6 AICTE-MITACS Globalink Research Internship (GRI) Scheme

An MoU was signed between MITACS, Canada and AICTE on 23-02-2018, for implementing (the AICTE-MITACS GRI Scheme) to foster cross-border partnerships focused on creating a platform for collaborative research between Canada and India to a pool of student talent in India, for a period of five years, from 2018 to 2023.

MITACS Globalink Internships are open for third year/ final year students in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) disciplines in AICTE approved institutes in India. AICTE provides support to 300 students to undertake internship in Canadian universities. This time, it has been decided to conduct 2022 cohort visit physically (offline). The total expenditure of the internship is CAD\$12000 per student and AICTE contributes CAD\$3000 per student which is 25% of the total internship.

In the year 2021-22, 621 students were selected for undertaking internship physically in the Canadian universities, which will start from the first week of May 2022. MITACS is willing to support full cost of internship for extra students selected beyond 300.

### 4.2.7 AICTE-Youth Undertaking Visit for Acquiring Knowledge (YUVAK) Scheme

Study Tour of Atal Tunnel (Himachal Pradesh), was launched on 21-05-2021 as a part of YUVAK scheme. Financial support is given to the team of one faculty and 10 students from selected AICTE approved institutions having NIRF ranking between 1 to 500. Students should be from second and third year of B.E./ B.Tech. or Integrated M. Tech. pursuing Civil, Mechanical and Structural Engineering disciplines. Each year a grant of Rs. 1.7 lakh and Rs. 2 lakh is given to 25 institutions from NRO & NWRO and 75 institutions from remaining regions respectively.

During the year 2021-2022, 15 institutions from NRO & NWRO and 74 institutions from remaining regions were selected. Due to snowfall, bad weather and operational reasons, ATAL Tunnel was closed from Jan 2022 to Mar 2022 and therefore, remaining 28 institutes will complete their visits by 30-07-2022.

### 4.2.8 AICTE-Student Learning Assessment (PARAKH)

AICTE-Student Learning Assessment (PARAKH) aims to assess and improve the skills of engineering students in India. A bank of 1.22 lakh questions in the field of Engineering, MBA and MCA was used for assessment during 13-09-2022 to 31-03-2022 a dedicated portal (http://aslap-aicte-india.org). 98376 students from 1235 AICTE approved institutes registered themselves for assessment and out of which 67501 finally took the assessment. Fig 4.2.7 gives an overview of students who took PARAKH assessment across the country. The top 5 states in terms of participation in India (highest to lowest) are Tamil Nadu, Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra and Uttar Pradesh.

### **4.3 Faculty Development Schemes**

### 4.3.1 Quality Improvement Programme (QIP)

With the objective of upgrading qualification and capabilities of the faculty members of degree level technical institutions, the Government of India launched the Quality Improvement Programme (QIP) in the year 1970, now being implemented and monitored by the Council. From 2001, QIP has been extended to the teachers in approved diploma level technical institutes. Selected institutions offer Master's and Doctoral programmes to faculty members selected under this programme who are paid monthly scholarships of Rs. 9,000 and Rs. 15,000 respectively.

### 4.3.2 Faculty Development Programme (FDP) - (UT, J&K, Ladakh & NER)

The FDP scheme provides financial assistance for organizing training which will facilitate upgradation of knowledge, skill besides providing opportunities for induction training to teachers employed in technical disciplines. Applications were called under AQIS 2021-22, focusing on J&K, Ladakh & NER. AICTE approved institutions/ University Departments imparting technical education are entitled for this grant of Rs. 7 lakh to conduct this proposed/ approved FDPs of two-week duration.

An amount of Rs. 7.33 lakh was released to two institutions for conducing the FDP during the F.Y. 2021-22.

### **4.3.3 Short Term Training Programme (STTP)**

In order to upgrade the knowledge and skills of teachers working in different institutions in the country, AICTE provides financial assistance of Rs. 3 lakh for organizing short-term training programmes (STTP) in emerging areas of Engineering & Technology and other disciplines. Major centres are allowed to offer upto 20 courses in a year while minor centres can offer upto 10 courses only.

### 4.3.4 Short Term Training Programme (STTP) - (UT-J&K, Ladakh & NER)

Proposals for Short Term Training Program (STTP) in UT-J&K, Ladakh and NER were considered by AICTE during the year. Financial assistance limited to Rs. 5 lakh per programme to conduct a 6 days' residential programme in these regions was approved. This was with an objective to train faculty in the field of technical education, to introspect and learn techniques that can help prepare students for active and successful participation in the knowledge society.

An amount of Rs. 23.23 lakh was sanctioned and released to 8 institutions for conducing the STTP during 2021-22, details of which are tabulated below:

### 4.3.7 AICTE-ISTE Induction/ Refresher Programmes

An MoU was executed between AICTE and Indian Society for Techinal Education (ISTE) under which ISTE conducts Refresher/Induction Programmes for teachers in AICTE approved institutes. AICTE provides upto Rs 3 lakh per programme. These programmes are considered for the AICTEs Career Advancement Scheme for the faculty. A total grant-in-aid of Rs. 6.975 crore for conducting 3 STTP each in 250 institutions in online mode was given.

### 4.3.8 AICTE-Technical University Joint Training Programmes for Teachers and Librarians

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been executed between AICTE and different technical universities to conduct



joint training programmes for teachers and librarians in AICTE approved technical institutions. The expenditure per training programme is limited to Rs. 3 lakh shared equally between AICTE and the technical university. AICTE provides a maximum grant of Rs. 1.5 lakh to meet the expenditure on TA/DA/ Honorarium to resource persons, TA to outstation participants and course material for participants. Technical university also spends to the extent of Rs. 1.5 lakh to cover expense on boarding & lodging of participants, Honorarium to Programme Coordinator and Working expenses. Each university has to conduct 10 programmes for the teachers and 1 programme for Librarian in a financial year. During 2021-22, AICTE released Rs. 85.66 lakh to 9 technical universities for conducting training programmes.

### 4.3.9 STTP for Physical Education Directors/ Sports Officers

An STTP of two weeks (residential programme) for Physical/ Sports-Games Teachers/ Director of Sports/ Sports officer in the AICTE approved institute was initiated, During 2021-22, grant-in-aid of Rs. 52 lakh was released to 6 institutions, taking the count of beneficiary to Following institutions have organized these STTPs.

### 4.3.10 AICTE Professional Development Fund

This scheme provides financial assistance to regular faculty of the AICTE approved institutes and AICTE officers on regular/deputation basis, to present their research papers in international conferences abroad or within India, to enrich themselves with new knowledge and learn best practices. AICTE sponsored its four officers during the 2021-22, who went abroad to present their research papers.

### 4.3.11 AICTE-INAE Distinguished Visiting Professors (DVP) Scheme

The scheme introduced in 2015-16 envisages promotion of industry-institute interaction by facilitating the dissemination of knowledge through experienced and knowledgeable persons from industry, to integrate their rich industrial experience with technical education. The Distinguished Visiting Professors are nominated from among the eminent scholars/ experts in their field, working in an industry/ R&D organization such as CSIR/ DRDO Labs to teach the technical students of graduation & post-graduation level for one-week duration.

### 4.3.13 Professional Development Programme for Non-Teaching Staff

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) was signed between AICTE and several technical universities to conduct Professional Development Programme (FDP) of two-week duration for non-teaching staff for enhancing/ refreshing their knowledge and skills.

Under the MoUs signed during 2018-2019 and 2019-20, each university was to conduct 4 FDP's during 2021-22. For each FDP the cost of Rs. 3 lakh is shared between AICTE and university equally. AICTE released grant-in-aid of Rs. 2.28 Crore to 19 technical universities during 2021-22.

### 4.3.14 Teacher Training programme by NITs of NER and UT, J&K, Ladakh

Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) has been signed between AICTE and NITs of NER and UT (J & K and Ladakh) to conduct Teacher Training Programmes during 2021-22 for the faculty of AICTE approved institutions around these NITs.

AICTE released grant-in-aid of Rs. 30.49 lakh in 2021-22, to NIT-Silchar (Assam); NIT-Yupia (Arunachal Pradesh); NIT-Dimapur (Nagaland); NIT-Shilong (Meghalaya); NIT-Agartala (Tripura); NIT-Imphal (Manipur); NIT-Ravangla (Sikkim); NIT-Aizwal (Mizoram); NIT-Srinagar (J&K).

### 4.4 Margdarshak Scheme

In order to maintain the quality of technical education in the country, it has been made mandatory that 60% of the eligible courses are to be accredited. In the absence of such accreditation, AICTE shall not grant further extension of approval (EOA). Accordingly, Margdarshan initiative has been introduced by AICTE for facilitating the technical institutes to improve the quality mandate as a whole. The initiative solicits support from senior academicians and well established institutes to handhold and mentor other institutes aspiring for accreditation.

The senior academicians from IITs/NITs/other AICTE approved institutes (serving or superannuated) are nominated as Margdarshak (individual mentors) for guiding beneficiary institutes. Their principal role is to guide, support and encourage the beneficiary institutions in their development and achieve accreditation in alignment with the broad objectives of quality mandate. AICTE has already nominated 330 senior academicians as Margdarshaks, out of which 260 Margdarshaks (MD) have been mapped with 444 beneficiary institutes for mentoring.

In a similar manner, well-established AICTE approved institutes are being nominated as Margdarshan Institutes or Mentor Institutes (MI) who adopt/guide other technical institutes in the vicinity for setting accreditation from NBA. Till date 44 such institutes have been nominated as MI and are mapped with 430 Mentee beneficiary institutes. Thus, 858 (444+414) Mentee Beneficiary Institutes (MBI) have been facilitated under the scheme, aiming at accreditation from NBA in next few years.

Based on the feedback, the guidelines are being revised so as to invite more participation from experts. The revised Guidelines on Margdarshan initiative was launched on 10-11-2020, to expand the pool of MDs and Mls. Further, to streamline the entire process for MDs, AICTE is working on a mobile application that will help in efficient management of the activities including the tour approvals, reports & making of payment of TA & Honorarium.

Umang App provides information about all the AICTE approved institutions. Here students can apply for scholarship or for DBT application and they can also track the application status.




Fig 5.1.1: UMANG Application

### 5.1.3 Exhibitions

The Ministry of Science and Technology, Ministry of Earth Sciences, and Vijnana Bharati have jointly initiated annual "India International Science Festival" (IISF) in 2015. Till date six Festivals have been organized in different parts of the country to celebrate science with people, to nurture creativity and imagination.

With the wholehearted support of the Government of Goa, the 7th edition of IISF was organized in a hybrid mode (physical and virtual) at Panaji, Goa, from 10-12-2021 to 13-12-2021. The theme of IISF 2021 was 'Celebrating Creativity in Science' exhibited through 12 programmes of the event. IISF 2021 had a special focus on Aazadi ka Amrit Mahotsav, as country is celebrating the 75<sup>th</sup> year of Independence. AICTE participated enthusiastically and demonstrated its achievements/ activities/ schemes etc. in its pavilion at IISF-21 Expo, Goa.

### 5.2 AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) Academy Cell

### 5.2.1 ATAL FDPs

AICTE in its endeavour to boost up excellence in technical education has enhanced impetus on the development of the faculty in its colleges across the country. The AICTE Training and Learning (ATAL) is one such initiative through which various Faculty Development Programmes are being conducted with focus on emerging areas like IoT, ML, AI, Robotics, Block-Chain, Renewable energy, AR/VR, etc, with a view to keep the faculty abreast of latest technologies. During the year ATAL Cell collaborated and invited experts from various leading corporates such as ARM India, Cadence Design Systems, Adobe, Ford Motors, Google, Amazon, Metaverse, Tata Energy, LinkedIn, TCS, Wipro, Infosys. The Cell collaborated with Microsoft, SAP and Edunet Foundation to build the technical capacity of institutes and drive the large-scale skilling of teachers under the TechSaksham Programme.

Given the unprecedented COVID-19 in 2021-22, 1507 FDPs were conducted in online mode, with 2,42,117 registered and 1,39,276 certified participants. Peer Review Assessment by academic/ industry experts and comparative learning curves have been resorted, to assess the effectiveness of the FDPs. ATAL Academy has been recognized and conferred awards by the World Book of Records – London, Asia Book of records and India Book of records for outstanding contribution to faculty development.

### **5.3 Induction Programme Cell**

### **5.3.1 Mandatory Student Induction Programme**

All the AICTE approved institutions have to conduct 3-week Student Induction Programme aimed at creating level playing field, adjustment to new environment, developing confidence, ownership, sensitization to society, dignity of individual, human values, teacher student relationship making life in campus smooth and inspirational. Each institution is required to have one Student Activity Cell (SAC) for implementation of this Programme and related follow-up activities. Each institution has to also ensure that in every department there is at least one faculty trained on Universal Human Values (UHV). It is expected that there is a UHV Faculty Mentor for every 20 newly joined students. Further, it has to ensure that in every department one faculty is trained in UHV-I for every 60 newly joined students for UHV-I.

During the year 2021-22, two FDP-SI workshops were conducted in offline mode where 58 faculty completed the programme successfully. 43 Workshops were conducted in online mode in which 38592 faculty attended. The overall statistics of FDP-SI workshops (for Faculty) are as follows:

### **5.3.2 Mandatory UHV-II Course**

A UHV-II has been introduced as compulsory course for all UG Degree Programmes in Engineering & Technology, with three exclusive credits. It is recommended that the colleges offer this in First, Second, Third or Fourth Semester.

In order to operationalize this, institution has to ensure that in every department there is at least one faculty trained in UHV-II, for every 120 newly joined students.

### **5.3.3 Minor Degree in Universal Human Values**

AICTE has framed the curriculum for minor degree in Universal Human Values (UHV) which will facilitate developing sufficient number of teachers to impart value-based education right from primary to higher education across the country.

Minor degree will carry 18 to 20 credits in addition to the credits essential for obtaining the Under Graduate degree in a major discipline. This minor degree will be offered from 2022-23, initially in the form of MOOC on SWAYAM.

### 5.3.4 Prof. Rishi Raj Gaur Award for Excellence

As a tribute to his contribution AICTE has instituted Prof. RR Gaur Award which will be awarded to three Institutions for their outstanding contribution towards Universal Human Values for holistic development and excellence. This award will be given from AY 2022-23 onwards.

### 5.3.5 Internship opportunities for students of Jammu & Kashmir

With a view to provide internship opportunity to students of J&K in institutes of higher learning like IITs and IISERs for inspiring, empowering, and enhancing their employability, and research interests, AICTE has signed MoUs with IIT Guwahati, IIT Kanpur, IIT Bhubaneswar, IIT Ropar, IISER Kolkata and IISER Pune.

For Winter 2020, 143 seats were allocated to students as per merit, on the seats provided by IITs and IISER. The internship is completed in virtual mode. For Winter 2021 also 143 seats were allocated.

### **5.3.6 Project Sunshine with HCL Software**

AICTE signed an MoU with HCL Software on 30-06-2020 and launched the Sunshine project for students of MCA and B Tech (IT stream) for AICTE approved institutions. HCL Software completed the First phase of the Sunshine project aimed to enhance the industry-oriented skill of students with limited colleges in the Bengaluru and NCR region as a pilot study.

For second batch, which was started on 08-10-2021 with an orientation session, the target was to train 500 students covering 12 colleges across the country. But HCL Software allowed 530 students to attend the programme in the six-course streams i.e. Testing Automation, Cyber Security, Endpoint Management, DevOps, Digital Marketing, and Cloud-Native Database. The college wise details of this programme are as follows:

### 5.4 National Educational Alliance for Technology (NEAT) Cell

NEAT Cell is mainly handling National Educational Alliance for Technology (NEAT) Scheme; AICTE Internship Portal; AI Translation Tool; and, ELIS Portal (AICTE Free E-resources).

NEAT is an integrator for EdTech companies which are offering courses to students/youth of the country for enhancing their employability skills, bridge their learning gaps and providing personalized learning experience. NEAT is also providing free seats (25% of the sale) to students of economically and socially weaker sections of society.

NEAT is also promoting Indian EdTech Companies with the mission of "AATMANIRBHAR BHARAT" and bridging the gap between EdTech Companies and Academic Institutions.

In NEAT 3.0 more courses shall be added focusing on Vocational, upskilling, and reskilling for School and other HEIs Students, leading to enhancement of Skill and employability. EdTech courses shall also be available in Indian Languages and Indian Traditional, Cultural and Knowledge courses.

### **5.4.1 AICTE Internship Portal**

Many institutions were facing difficulties in arranging internships for their students and to overcome this problem, AICTE Internship enterprise portal (https://internship.aicte-india.org) was developed by NEAT Cell. It was launched on 04-06-2020 by Hon'ble Minister of Education and Hon'ble Minister of Housing and Urban Affairs. The portal brings together the internship opportunities in the Government sector like MoHUA, NHAI, Railways, MoSJE, MSMEs, Corporates Sector, NGOs, Start-ups, and Research organizations. It is envisioned to reach a target of 1 crore internships by 2025 and more than 1 crore students registered on internship portal with more than 14 lakh internships are posted so far. NEAT Cell also conducted AICTE Internship day on 25-08-2021.

### **5.4.2 AI Translation Tool**

Many students in rural area can excel as professionals if the technical courses are taught in mother tongue or in Indian languages. Keeping this in mind, NEAT Cell has developed "AICTE Translation Automation AI Tool" to translate English language online courses into twelve different Indian languages like Hindi, Bengali, Marathi, Telugu, Tamil, Gujarati, Kannada, Malayalam, Punjabi, Assamese, Odia, and Urdu.

The translation tool has the features like Auto converted content in a particular language for reference; Edit and typing



feature for providing the input in the required language; Audio recording facility (with play and pause button); Save as draft function; The mathematical expression input function; and, drag and drop function.

During the session 2021-22, books of B. Tech. First Year were translated and printed in various regional languages. The translation work for next semester is in progress. SWAYAM courses are already translated and many are in progress. Documents received from the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, NCVET and other government departments were translated.

#### **5.4.3 ELIS Portal (AICTE Free E-resources)**

The outbreak of the COVID pandemic in India has caused extreme distress to the students hitting the academic activity. Many companies have come forward and offered their e-learning contents free of cost to learners. In order to foster digital learning and support the student community across the country, the Enhancement in Learning with Improvement In Skills (ELIS) portal (http://free.aicte-india.org/) has been designed and is being managed by NEAT Cell. This is a round the year activity and a lot of new courses have been onboarded in the year 2021-22. NEAT Cell continuously approaches the EdTech companies to onboard their courses on this portal for the benefit of the students.

To encourage more participation in the projects/scheme of the stakeholders, the cell organized/conducted meetings with the Directorate of Technical Education (DTE) of Uttar Pradesh, Rajasthan, Haryana (online), Himachal Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Karnataka, Sikkim, Meghalaya and Goa, during the year.

#### 5.5 Skill Development Cell (SDC)

#### 5.5.1 AICTE-UKIERI Technical Education Leadership Development Programme (TELDP)

Under TELDP, Dudley (UK) College had proposed the introduction of an Action Learning Cluster initiative supporting an initial 40 delegates (10 from each region of the country) to develop local clusters of good practice in their home regions. These delegates were drawn from the most successful candidates of UKIERI Leadership programme by Dudley College.

In the project of Master trainer TELDP programme, 40 participants have been selected from all four regions, who have been divided in 8 groups of five participants each.

AICTE conducted three UKIERI Master Trainer L&M Training workshops of 4 days in Online/ Offline modes in different centres. Common inaugural Session for all Master trainers, 160 participants, regional offices was conducted with all 8 teams in online mode on 23-11-2021 from AICTE HQ.

A combined Valedictory Session for all Master trainers, 160 participants, was conducted with all 8 teams in online mode on 25-03-2022 anchored by AICTE and with its Regional officers also plugged in.

#### 5.5.2 National Employability Enhancement Mission (NEEM)

NEEM aims to offer on-the-job practical training to enhance employability of a person pursuing graduation/diploma in any technical or non-technical stream. Under the Scheme, AICTE has registered NEEM Facilitators who are giving NSQF compliant industrial training to students for duration of 3 to 36 months. There are 48 NEEM Facilitators and around 5.9 lakh student trainees enrolled and benefiting from them. The NEEM scheme and regulations are being revisited by the Ministry.

#### 5.5.3 AICTE-CII Industry-linked Technical Institutes Survey 2021 Awards

The AICTE-CII Industry-linked Technical Institutes Survey is aimed to assess the current status of partnership between technical institutions and industry on six basic parameters such as curriculum, faculty, governance, infrastructure, placements and research and services/project & skill development. The AICTE-CII Survey is being jointly conducted with the confederation of Indian Industry (CII) since 2012.

The survey maps industry linkages of Indian technical institutes in four broad streams- Engineering, Management, Architecture and Pharmacy. It showcases the best practices of partnerships with industry and highlights the strengths and weaknesses of the ecosystem of technical education in India.

At the end of the survey, awards and citations are given to the best industry linked institutes. The winners for the year 2021 will be announced by 10-05-2022.



#### 5.5.4 Community College Scheme (CCS)

The Community Colleges offer credit based courses, which allows multipoint entry and exit, skill upgradation for employment market, banking of credits and allows re-entry into the higher education. Under the CCS, the Council releases grant-in-aid to Polytechnics to run Vocational Diploma Programme under NSQF Level 3 to 5. This, they can do partly by utilizing their own resources and partly by mobilizing the resources available at the higher technological institutions. The Scheme was initially started for 3 years from the A.Y. 2013-14 to 2015-16 with financial assistance and further extended from the A.Y. 2016-17 to 2018-19 without financial assistance from the AICTE.

Based on the Certificate of willingness to continue the course countersigned by respective DTE, approval was given to the following polytechnics without any financial assistance, for the A.Y. 2021-2022.

- · Mehr Chand Polytechnic, Punjab
- Goverment Polytechnic, Kolhapur, Maharashtra
- · Pesiyar Centenary Polytechnic-College, Thanjavur, Tamil Nadu

# 5.6 Prime Minister's Special Scholarship Scheme (PMSSS)

PMSSS for the Union Territories of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh is an initiative of Ministry of Education, Government of India, aimed at providing higher education for these exclusive regions of the country PMSSS Cell of AICTE drives this starting from inviting applications, counseling, seat alloattment to disbursement of scholarships.

The major objectives of the Scheme are to build capacities of the youth by educating, enabling and empowering them to compete at national level; and, to provide the youth an exposure on the culture, language and livelihood of other Indian states to promote national integration.

The scheme offers financial assistance that covers academic fee (tuition & other admissible fee) and maintenance allowance (to bear expenses on account of hostel & mess charges, cost of books and other incidental charges) to students belonging to Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh. The student eligible are the ones who, after passing Class XII or equivalent examination, secure admission through AlCTE's online counselling process under supernumerary quota created by the Government and seats provided by different Regulatory Bodies except medical stream courses. The scholarship is tenable in select pool of institutions of repute having NBA/NAAC Accreditation and NIRF ranking and other Centres of Excellence available on AlCTE Portal, as per the methodology approved by Inter-Ministerial Committee (IMC), Government of India, and are outside the UTs of Jammu & Kashmir and Ladakh. In Medical Stream courses, the students have to take admission after qualifying NEET, attend State Level NEET counselling and report on the portal of AlCTE with proof of admission.

2705 fresh scholarships were awarded and 10548 renewed, amounting to Rs.182.52 crore. AICTE has thus been on an elevated track in getting increased number of participation by the students in PMSSS scheme. In the pandemic struck situation during academic year 2021-22, AICTE took all necessary steps towards awareness of the scholarship scheme among aspiring students and even conducted Awareness Workshops in Kathua, Jammu, Rajouri, Doda in Jammu Region, Baramulla, Kupwara, Anantnag and Srinagar in Kashmir Region and Leh and Kargil in Ladakh Region. As a special consideration, the students offered admission letter during academic year 2021-22 were also allowed to join their institution online.




Fig 5.6.1: Overview of access to Education facilitated through PMSSS




Fig 5.6.2: Woman enrollment and amount disbursed to them under PMSSS

# **5.7 SWAYAM**

#### **5.7.1 SWAYAM MOOCs Platform**

SWAYAM (Study Webs of Active-Learning for Young Aspiring Minds) is an initiative of MHRD developed by AICTE designed to achieve three cardinal principles of Education Policy viz. access, equity and quality. SWAYAM has emerged as one of the World's biggest Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) integrated platform and portal for online courses, using information and communication technology (ICT), covering subjects from high school onwards till higher education and also skill sector courses to ensure that every student benefit from learning material through ICT. The courses hosted on SWAYAM are in 4 quadrants – (1) video lecture, (2) specially prepared reading material that can be downloaded/printed (3) self-assessment tests through tests and quizzes and (4) an online discussion forum for clearing the doubts. Steps have been taken to enrich the learning experience by using audio-video and multimedia and state of the art pedagogy/ technology.



#### SWAYAM 2.0

In compliance of the decision taken by MoE, Government of India, New Delhi, the higher version of SWAYAM 2.0 MOOCs Platform was developed by IIT, Madras during May, 2019 which has the attributes like, higher scalability and performance; enhanced features for faculty and students; improved assessment and evaluation; internationalization; translation of online courses into eight different Indian regional languages and more; local chapters and mentors and offering of on-line Degrees, etc.

#### **5.7.2 Adoption of Credit Transfer of SWAYAM courses**

AICTE has adopted the credit transfer on UGC pattern and has issued a letter on 09-11-2021 to All Universities/ Colleges to allow credit transfer upto 40% of the total courses being offered in a semester through SWAYAM. It is urged to encourage the students of the Institute/ College to take advantage of online courses through SWAYAM Platform and utilise Credit Transfer facility of SWAYAM as much as possible.

#### **5.7.3** Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT)

MHRD launched the Annual Refresher Programme in Teaching (ARPIT) under PMMMNMTT Scheme on 13-11-2018, a major and unique initiative towards online professional development of 1.5 million higher education faculty using SWAYAM. AICTE has been no-minated as a National Coordinator (NC) for ARPIT by MHRD.

#### • ARPIT-2018

70 National Resource Centers (NRCs) were identified by MHRD during 2018 for developing discipline-specific online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new & emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum. During the year 2018, SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 6.909 Crore from MHRD for disbursement to 47 NRCs @ Rs.14.70 lakh to each NRC. AICTE released grant @ Rs.14.70 lakh to each NRC for conducting discipline-specific online courses for faculty of higher education institutions. A total number of 71 discipline-specific courses were developed under ARPIT-2018.

#### • ARPIT-2019

21 discipline-specific NRCs were identified by MHRD during 2019 to prepare online training material with focus on latest developments in the discipline, new & emerging trends, pedagogical improvements and methodologies for transacting revised curriculum. SWAYAM Cell in AICTE received a grant of Rs. 5.29 Crore from MHRD for ARPIT 2019 for disbursement to 21 discipline-specific NRCs @ Rs.14.70 lakh. The grant was disbursed to the eligible NRCs, based on the Utilization Certificate and Receipt & Payment Accounts for the expenditure incurred during FY 2018-19. A total number of 48 discipline-specific courses were developed under ARPIT-2019.

#### • ARPIT-2020 (Re-Run)

Ministry of Education decided to re-run all 48 discipline-specific Courses as ARPIT-2020 in the wake of unprecedented COVID-19. Accordingly, all 48 courses were re-run under ARPIT-2020. ARPIT-2020 was held on 10-04-2021.

#### 5.7.4 Role of AICTE as a National Coordinator

MHRD, appointed AICTE as a National MOOCs Coordinator (NC) for all MOOCs that do not fall in purview of any of the existing NCs, including foreign university courses apart from being a NC for ARPIT courses. AICTE has so far developed 38 self-paced courses and already successfully conducted four 20 Yoga online courses developed by S-VYASA, Bangalore. One credit course is on-going and yet to be fully completed. The status of self-paced & credit courses presently being conducted by AICTE is given as under:

# 5.8 MoE's Innovation Cell (MIC)

MoE's Innovation Cell has been established by MoE at AICTE to systematically foster the culture of innovation, entrepreneurship, and start-up in Higher Educational Institutes (HEIs) across the country. MIC has conducted various activities in the following categories to build and streamline the innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem in HEIs in the country.

#### 5.8.1 Smart India Hackathon (SIH)

Over the years, SIH being implemented by MIC at AICTE has evolved as the world's biggest open innovation model. SIH is a unique initiative to identify new and disruptive technological innovations, for solving the challenges faced by our country. SIH involves registration of teams from institutions. Single Point of Contact (SPOC) and evaluators. The number of registrations has grown over the years, reflecting the popularity of SIH. The fourth edition of SIH was conducted in the year 2021.

#### 5.8.2 Toycathon

To make India Aatmanirbhar in toy sector, as conceptualized by Hon'ble Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi, Toycathon 2021 was launched on 05-01-2021. The initiative and its website was launched by Hon'ble Minister for Textiles and Woman & Child Development Smt. Smriti Irani and Minister for Education Shri Ramesh Pokhriyal 'Nishank'.



Around 1.2 lakh participants from across India registered and submitted more than 17,000 ideas. Of these, as many as 1,567 ideas were selected for the three-day finale of Digital Edition. 117 teams were announced winners on 26-06-2021 in three categories, comprising of the school students, college students and start-ups & professionals across different themes and tracks. The physical edition of Toycathon 2021 was postponed in view of surge in pandemic.

#### 5.8.3 INDIA-ASEAN Hackathon

In this Hackathon, 11 problem statements from Blue Economy and Education were shortlisted which were provided by the Indian Coast Guard, Indian Maritime University, Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Services (INCOIS) & Directorate General of Lighthouses and Lightships (DGLL)

57,700 USD (Rs.43,24,861) was spent as prize money awarded for the participants of INDIA-ASEAN Hackathon. 11 teams were declared winner and prize money of \$450 was offered to each team member; Member of 11 runner-up teams were given prize money of \$250. Appreciation Cash Prize of \$100 was given to other participants.

#### **5.8.4 MANTHAN**

Ministry of Education and AICTE launched MANTHAN 2021 Hackathon on 26-08-2021 which was organised by Bureau of Police Research and Development (BPR&D) in coordination with the Innovation Cell of the Ministry of Education. MANTHAN was inaugurated by Sh Neeraj Sinha, Additional Director General, B.P.(R&D) and other senior dignitaries. The Hackathon sought to identify innovative concepts and technology solutions to address security challenges of the 21st century faced by our security and intelligence agencies. During the launch program, BPR&D released 20 challenge statements which offered unique opportunity to all our youngsters to think out-of-the-box and develop innovative concepts for solving some of the daunting problems.

Participants were expected to develop digital solutions under six themes for 20 different challenge statements released using new technologies including artificial intelligence, deep learning, augmented reality and machine learning, for everchanging security-related challenges, which include photo/ video analysis, fake content identification along with the information of creator, and predictive cyber-crime data analytics.

Around 2200 ideas were submitted in the initial round. Of which 115 teams were shortlisted for the grand finale organised from 08-12-2021 to 10-12-2021. This was organized as an online event in view of the ongoing COVID scenario. 14 winners were declared including one joint winner and 7 teams provided certificate of merit.

#### 5.8.5 UNESCO-India-Africa (UIA) Hackathon

Based on proposal received from the Permanent Representative of India (PRI) to UNESCO, Ministry of Education's Innovation Cell (MIC), AICTE in collaboration with the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), and UNESCO is planning to organize UNESCO-INDIA-Africa (UIA) Hackathon in June/July 2022.

24 African countries and 1 Central American country, have agreed to participate by appointing nodal agencies and have also nominated their SPOCs and experts for Problem Statements (PS) creation. Most of the experts have already submitted their PS as per the given theme of the hackathon i.e. Education, Renewable Energy/Sustainability and Environment/ Climate Change. It is a unique initiative and a good opportunity for India to collaborate with African nations for establishing sustainable innovation ecosystem in this region.

#### 5.8.6 Republic Day Tableau of Ministry of Education (MoE)

This year Ministry of Education (MoE) and Ministry of Skill Development & Entrepreneurship (MSDE) had been selected to showcase their Tableau based on National Education Policy (NEP 2020) through the theme 'Vedas to Metaverse' during the Republic Day Parade on 26-01-2022 at Rajpath.

MIC was involved in the concept design, fabrication and display of the Tableau during the Republic Day parade which was awarded the First prize among Ministries/ Departments of tableaus of the Government of India. It was on display at Red Fort Complex during Azadi Ka Amrit Mahotsav ceremony organized by Archaeological Survey of India (ASI), Ministry of Culture during the month of March 2022.

#### 5.8.7 Atal Ranking of Institutions on Innovation Achievements (ARIIA)

As attempt to benchmark the innovation and entrepreneurship practices in Higher Education Institute (HEI), ARIIA was introduced in 2019. So far 3 annual editions have been completed to rank all major HEIs based on their innovation and start-up ecosystem development efforts and achievements. The participation from both technical and non-technical HEIs increased substantially during the year and there was participation of record high 1438 HEIs for ARIIA 2021. Registration for 4th edition (ARIIA 2022) has been opened.



#### 5.8.8 National Innovation and Start-up Policy (NISP)

A policy level intervention to enable HEIs to plan, build and sustain a streamlined innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem in campuses, adoption process is under progress. So far, more than 2500 higher education institutes (both technical and non-technical) have adopted the policy in accordance with Innovation and Startup policies at center and received training and guidance on designing innovation policy at institute level. Majority of HEIs have developed institute specific innovation and entrepreneurship development action plans and implemented it. Policy adoption in HEIs can be accessed at https://nisp.mic.gov.in/

#### 5.8.9 Institution's Innovation Councils (IICs) in HEIs

The momentum to institutionalize innovation and start-up culture in HEIs and further to create, streamline and strengthen existing ecosystems in HEIs, is being built through the mechanism of Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) since 2019. So far, more than 3100 IICs have been established in all major HEIs spread across states and UTs to drive the innovation and entrepreneurship ecosystem both at institute and community level. More than 28000 faculty members, 50000 students and 7000 external experts are part of the collaborative platform of the IIC network, conducting activities/ events throughout the year.

In addition to this, 255 high performing institutions with established ecosystems are working as mentor to 450 IIC institutions. 10000 faculty members have been trained as innovation ambassadors to lead and drive innovation and start-up agenda at the institute level. During the year 202 IIC institutions organized 808 impact lectures (online) delivered by 800 external experts and ecosystem enablers on varied topics of innovation, entrepreneurship, and IP. Furthermore, to support, innovations, IIC institutions became instrumental in scouting more than 29000 ideas and MoE's Innovation Cell provided mentoring, training support and finally 75 innovations were supported with grant assistance up to Rs. 10 lakh per team to transform these into start-ups.

#### 5.8.10 MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV)

AICTE introduced MBA/PGDM in Innovation, Entrepreneurship and Venture Development (IEV) in 2019, designed with a balanced approach of experiential learning which comprises core and elective courses on innovation and entrepreneurship and integrate skill certification, capstone projects and Action Learning Segments. This outcome oriented syllabus offers opportunities for students with innovative and problem-solving mind-set to work on challenging ideas and successfully build ventures while pursuing the course. Rolled-out as pilot in four institutes across India in 2019-20, during the year 2021-22, total 21 HEIs received approval, for this programme with a maximum intake of 30 students in each institute.

#### **5.8.11 School Innovation Ambassadors Training Programme**

The School Innovation Ambassadors Training Program was inaugurated jointly by the Hon'ble Union Education Minister and Hon'ble Union Tribal Affairs Minister in July 2021. It is aligned with the NEP 2020 that emphasizes on promoting out-of-the-box thinking among students for which the role of a teacher as mentor is highly significant.

The Programme comprises of 5 modules with video content which each teacher has to go through and pass each module. The teacher after completing five modules becomes the Innovation Ambassador of the Ministry of Education. The five modules are on Design thinking and innovation module; Intellectual Property Rights; Idea Generation and Idea Handholding; Finance/ Sales/ HR; Entrepreneurship and Prototype/ Product Development;

The program aims at training 50000 teachers in schools. So far, 11196 schools and 55883 teachers have registered for the training. The program has made substantial progress and 8489 teachers have completed all the five modules as of 20-01-2022.

#### 5.8.12 KAPILA (Kalam Program for IP Literacy and Awareness)

KAPILA was launched on 15-10-2020 to create awareness on the need of IP filing, mechanism and methodology involved in filing IP in India and globally, especially amongst students and faculty of HEIs. KAPILA will help in establishing the much required IP filing ecosystem in the educational institutions and thus create a culture of systematically protecting new ideas, research and innovation. Three IPR Courses catering to different levels are developed: Introduction to Intellectual Property (UG); Foundations of Intellectual Property (PG); and Intellectual Property and Innovation (PhD).

SWAYAM MOOC Course on Introduction to Intellectual Property for UG students is in progress. 912 institutes had registered on the KAPILA portal and are in process of submitting their patent application for funding support.

#### 6.2 Hindi Cell

#### 6.2.1 Meetings of Official Language Implementation Committee (OLIC)

For proper compliance of Official Language Act, 1963; Official Language Rules, 1976 and propagation of the progressive use of Hindi in the Council, an Official Language Implementation Committee has been set up in the Council headed by its Administrative Head to assess the progressive use of Hindi and to comply the orders issued by Ministry of Education and Department of Official Language (Ministry of Home Affairs) from time to time. A meeting of the Committee was held on 30-03-2022 and many important decisions were taken to increase official work in Hindi.

#### 6.2.2 Takniki Pathyapustak Puraskar Yojana (TPPY) Scheme

To achieve the goals of planned and coordinated development of technical education and to implement the provisions of the Official Language Policy of the Government of India, AICTE (Akhil Bhartiya Takniki Siksha Parishad- Abhaatship), has introduced Takniki Pathyapustak Puraskar Yojana with a view to provide state of the art knowledge of Engineering and Technology in Hindi Language.

This scheme has been continuously run by AICTE since 1998-1999 and is aimed to promote the translated and written textbooks in Hindi for the students at Degree (UG/PG) level, Polytechnic/Diploma level and ITI /Technician level subjects.

Under this scheme, 15 awards are given every year. Which have been given to 110 technical book writers in the last 16 years. This scheme has been proved very popular and has been widely successful in achieving its goals.

For 2020, six writers were selected for prizes and they were felicitated in a function organized on 16-11-2021 by celebrated Hindi poet, writer and humorist Padma Shree Surender Sharma,

#### 6.2.3 Financial Assistance Scheme for manuscipts in Hindi

In order to solve the problems faced in the publication of technical books in Hindi language and for providing sufficient books in Hindi on engineering, management and other technical subjects, a Scheme was started in the year 2018. Under this scheme, funds for teachers/writers are given every year for original manuscripts. The financial aid was provided to 10 authors during the year.

#### 6.2.4 Hindi Pakhwada (Fortnight), September 2021

In accordance with the instructions of the Department of Official Language (Ministry of Home Affairs), Ministry of Human Resources Development and in compliance with the Official Language Policy of the Union Government, Hindi Pakhwada (Fortnight) was organized in the Council Headquarters, New Delhi from 14-30 September 2021.

Competitions were held on Sulekh, Typing, Noting/Drafting, Administrative Terms and Translation, Speech, Essay Writing, Geet/ Kavita, Prasn-Manch (Quiz), Debate for all officers to ensure 100% participation of all. In these competitions over 280 officials participated and 89-won cash prizes who were felicitated by Prof. Anil D. Sahasrabudhe (Chairman AICTE), Prof. M.P. Poonia (Vice Chairman AICTE), and Prof. Rajive Kumar (Member Secretary AICTE) in a function in which Prof. Rajendra Kakde (Adviser AICTE), Mrs. Gujju Manusree, (Director (Admin.) AICTE), and Mrs. Reena Sharma (Hindi Officer, AICTE) were also present.

#### 6.2.5 Hindi Incentive Scheme

#### 6.3 Media Cell

Media Cell was created in October, 2019 with an aim to enhance the outreach and communication of AICTE through the means of print & social media. #### 6.4 Library

- Open Source Library Software Koha 4.18 was duly installed for computerization of library resources. Data entry of 1100 books has been completed out of 5500 books available in the library along with patrons' database.
- Higher and Technical Education related news Snippet from Media, includes 16 newspaper received in the library as well as online information, were collected and catalogued during the year.



- Details of the AICTE programmes/ activities are archieved in electronic form by the library since October 2018 for retrieval in future.
- Library staff presented the paper entitled "Future Libraries: Transformation for Sustainability Beyond COVID-19" during the International Conference of Emerging Trends in Socio-cultural Outlook, Information Policies and Education in India and Europe organized by Jawaharlal Nehru University during 11-08-2021 and 12-08-2021.







#### 7.1 Finance

The All India Council for Technical Education (AICTE) receives grants-in-aid from the Ministry of Education (MoE), Government of India towards implementation of various schemes. During the Financial Year 2021-22, AICTE received grants to the tune of Rs.41600.00 lakhs for AICTE Schemes, Rs.18400.00 lakhs for J & K Scholarship Scheme and Rs.216.00 lakhs for SWAYAM MOOCs under Plan Head from MoE. MoE has also released an amount of Rs.1000.00 lakhs to Indian Knowledge System (IKS). However, Ministry of Education, Govt. of India had not released any grants under Non-Plan head and AICTE has been incurring expenditure under Non-Plan head from its own generated funds. The unspent balance of the previous year i.e. 2020-21 was Rs.9729.49 lakhs and Rs.197256.00 lakhs for Plan and Non Plan respectively. Grants from the AICTE own generated funds have also been released to Innovation Cell Rs.981.28 lakhs and Plan Rs.938.15 lakhs. The scheme/head wise details of expenditure for the Financial Year 2021-22 are given in Chapter 07 of the Annual Report.

#### 7.2 Allocation

#### 7.2.1 Plan Allocation (Ministry of Education)

The Grants released by Ministry of Education during the financial year 2021-22 was Rs.60216.00 lakhs for AICTE Schemes, J & K Scholarships Scheme, SWAYAM MOOCs and TEQIP. An amount of Rs.9729.49 lakhs was the unspent balance of the previous year and the miscellaneous receipts during the Financial Year 2021-22 amounted to Rs.6708.57 lakhs.

#### 7.2.2 Non Plan Allocation (AICTE own Generated Funds)

An amount of Rs. NIL was received from Ministry of Education as Non-Plan Grants during the financial year 2021-22 for AICTE Schemes. There was Rs.197256.00 lakhs as unspent balance of the previous year 2020-21 and miscellaneous receipt of Rs. 25527.85 lakhs (net) during the year 2021-22.

#### 7.2.3 Innovation Cell

During the financial year 2021-22, grant of Rs.981.25 lakh was paid to Innovation Cell Account from AICTE own generated funds (Non-Plan). There was Rs.206.27 lakhs as unspent balance of the previous year 2020-21 and miscellaneous receipts of Rs. 223.31 lakhs during the year 2021-22.

#### 7.2.4 Indian Knowledge System

During the financial year 2021-22, an amount of Rs.1000.00 lakhs was received from MoE to Indian Knowledge System. There was 89.02 lakh unspent balance of the previous year 2020-21 and miscellaneous receipts of Rs.3.23lakhs during the year 2021-22.

# **Appendix 1.1 Powers and Functions of the Council**

(Extracted from AICTE Act, 1987)

It shall be the duty of the Council to take all such steps as it may think fit for ensuring coordinated and integrated development of technical and management education and maintenance of standards and for the purposes of performing its functions under AICTE Act, the Council may:

- a. undertake survey in the various fields of technical education, collect data on all related matters and make forecast of the needed growth and development in technical education;
- b. coordinate the development of technical education in the country at all levels;
- c. allocate and disburse out of the Fund of the Council such grants, on such terms and conditions as it may think fit to;
- i) Technical Institutions, and
- ii) Universities imparting technical education in coordination with the Commission:
- d. promote innovations, research and development in established and new technologies, generation, adoption and adaptation of new technologies to meet developmental requirements and for overall improvement of educational processes;
- e. formulate schemes for promoting technical education for women, handicapped and weaker sections of the society;
- f. promote an effective link between technical education system and other relevant systems including research and development organizations, industry and the community;
- g. evolve suitable performance appraisal systems for Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education, incorporating norms and mechanisms for enforcing accountability;
- h. formulates schemes for the initial and in service training of teachers and identify institutions or centres and set up new centers for offering staff development programmes including continuing education of teachers;
- i. lay down norms and standards for courses, curricula, physical and instructional facilities, staff pattern, staff qualifications, quality instructions, assessment and examinations;
- j. fix norms and guidelines for charging tuition and other fees;
- k. grant approval for starting new technical institutions and for introduction of new courses or programmes in consultation with the agencies concerned;
- I. advise the Central Government in respect of grant of charter to any professional body or institution in the field of technical education conferring powers, rights and privileges on it for the promotion of such profession in its field including conduct of examinations and awarding of membership certificates;
- m. lay down norms for granting autonomy to technical institutions;
- n. take all necessary steps to prevent commercialization of technical education;
- o. provide guidelines for admission of students to Technical Institutions and Universities imparting technical education;
- p. inspect or cause to inspect any Technical Institution;
- q. withhold or discontinue grants in respect of courses, programmes to such technical institutions which fail to comply with the directions given by the Council within the stipulated period of time and take such other steps as may be necessary for ensuring compliance of the directions of the Council;
- r. take steps to strengthen the existing organizations, and to set up new organizations to ensure effective discharge of the Council's responsibilities and to create positions of professional, technical and supporting staff based on requirements;
- s. declare technical institutions at various levels and types offering courses in technical education fit to receive grants;
- t. advise the Commission for declaring any institution imparting technical education as a Deemed University:
- u. set up a National Board of Accreditation to periodically conduct evaluation of Technical Institutions or Programmes, on the basis of guidelines, norms and standards specified by it and to make recommendations to it, or to the Council or toe the Commission or to other bodies, regarding recognition or de-recognition of the Institution or the Programmes.
- v. Perform such other functions as may be prescribed.

#### **INSPECTION:**

1. For the purposes of ascertaining the financial needs of technical institution or a University or its standards of teaching, examination and research, the council may cause an inspection of any department or departments of such technical



institution or University to be made in such manner as may be prescribed and by such person or persons as it may direct.

- 2. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or University the date on which any inspection under subsection (1) is to be made and the technical institution or University shall be entitled to be associated with the inspection in such manner as may be prescribed.
- 3. The Council shall communicate to the technical institution or the University, its views in regard to the results of any such inspection and may, after ascertaining the opinion of that technical institution or University, recommend to that institution or University the action to be taken as a result of such inspection.
- 4. All communications to a technical institution or University under this section shall be made to the executive authority thereof and the executive authority of the technical institution or University shall report to the Council the action, if any, which is proposed to be taken for the purposes of implementing any such recommendation as is referred to in sub-section (3).







## ACCOUNTING POLICIES & NOTES TO THE **ACCOUNTS** 2021-22

### PRINCIPLE ACCOUNTING POLICIES

### 1. Accounts

- a) The Financial Statements are prepared on the basis of historical cost convention and generally on the accrual method of accounting unless otherwise stated.
- b) Separate set of accounts are maintained by the Council in respect of Plan, Non-Plan, Innovation Cell, Indian Knowledge System and CPF activities.
- c) All Receipts on account of fees/subscription and refund of unspent grants are accounted on cash basis.

### 2. Grants-in-Aid

Grants are recognized on receipt basis & taken to credit of Income & Expenditure account except to the extent of expenditure of capital nature incurred (which amount is credited directly to the capital fund). Any Non monetary grant received free of cost is reflected at nominal amount of Rs.1/-.

### 3. Fixed assets and Depreciations

- a) Fixed Assets are stated at cost of acquisition less depreciation. Fixed assets received by the AICTE without consideration has been capitalized in the financial statement at a nominal value i.e. Rs. one.
- b) On periodical physical verification, the obsolete and non-usable assets are identified and cost thereof written off by debit to the capital fund account.
- c) Receipts, if any, on the sale of these assets is taken as income under the head Misc Receipts.

### 4. Depreciation

Depreciation has been charged on Straight line method as provided in new format of standardization of accounts issued by Ministry of Education. In respect of additions to fixed assets or reduction (sale) of fixed asset during the year, depreciation is provided for full year irrespective of date of addition or reduction.

### 5. Specific Expenses/ Payments

a) Printing & Stationery

The amount spent for printing of publications, is treated as expenditure as and when incurred. No adjustments are made in accounts for the closing stocks, as the value is not determinable.

b) Telephone Deposit

Deposit for telephone and allied facilities is written off during the year of installation/ commissioning and charges/ expenditure bills are accounted for at the net value after adjustment, if any, for initial deposit, by the concerned department.

### 6. Interest on All Deposits/Investments is accounted for on accrual basis.

### 7. Employees Salaries/Benefits

- a) Central Government Employees service rules are by and large, made applicable to the employees of the Council.
- b) For accounting of employee benefit, the council conducted actuarial valuation. According to the report of Actuarial valuation, the Council has made a provision of Rs.56,74,335/- for Gratuity & Rs.51,59,141/- for Leave Encashment in Income & Expenditure Account. This additional Provisioning has resulted excess of expenditure over income of Rs.1,08,33,476/- in Income & Expenditure Account.

c) The Council maintains a separate Notified Provident Fund account and National Pension System NPS) for its employees.

### **NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS**

- 1. Grant received from Government, based on budget approved by the Parliament, constitute main source of receipts of the Council. Though the grants received (after the adjustment of expenditure of capital nature) are taken to income and expenditure account, the effective income of the Council is nil.
- 2. The unspent balance of Grants is considered as liability and is carried over from one financial year to another. Thus this does not attract any Income tax liability.
- 3. Grants to individual institutions being voluminous in nature is not part of annual accounts & shown in books of accounts.
- 4. Surplus funds under Non-Plan and CPF head are kept temporarily with Schedule Bank in fixed deposit account with higher net interest earnings. No restrictions exist on utilization of amount at any point of time.
- 5. Expenditure on Establishment, Printing and Stationary and Telephone deposits have been given the accounting treatment as per accounting policy.
- 6. An advance of Rs.1,74,90,46,217/- has been given to CCE (R & D Central, DRDO) up to 31.03.2021 for construction of AICTE H.O. building at J.N.U. Campus New Delhi. During the year (2016-2017) DRDO has handed over the possession of the building. During FY 2021-22, the Council has capitalized the Building and other fixed assets. As per the financial statements, the council has capitalized a sum if Rs 1,34,81,65,346/- as Building, a sum of Rs 7,70,45,031/- as furniture and fixtures, a sum of Rs 16,83,90,916/- as office equipment and a sum of Rs 15,54,21,924/- as Electric Installations. The council has also charged depreciation on the aforesaid assets for the period FY 2016-17 to FY 2021-22. Depreciation charged for the period on building is Rs.16,17,79,842/-, on furniture and fixtures is Rs.3,46,70,264/-, on office equipment Rs.7,57,75,912/-, on electric installation Rs.4,66,26,576/-



- 7. In the previous audit report issued by C&AG, the audit team pointed out that the Council was not accounting salary for March in a particular financial year. This was because for salary purpose the Council was taking financial year from March to February. During financial year 2021-22 the Council has accounted for the salary of March and hence in this particular financial year salary for thirteen months has been taken.
- 8. The Council has availed a tax exemption status from Department of Direct Taxes, Government of India. Accordingly, if Council has any income from any activity related to education or from bank accounts in the form of interest, no income tax is applicable.
- 9. The Council has deposited a sum of Rs 4.29 crore as security with NDMC for premises taken on rent at Mayur Bhawan building which was vacated on 30.06.2016 by the Council. The Council has filed a legal suit in the court of law to recover the aforesaid security deposit which is still pending.
- 10. An advance of Rs. 12,07,03,140/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Guwahati during FY 2021-22 (previous year balance Rs. 2,45,62,000/-) as Advance for construction of AlCTE building at Guwahati. Accordingly, the total advance given up to 31.03.2022 is Rs. 14,52,65,140/-. The council has also received a running bill of Rs 5,93,71,000 during FY 2021-22 which has been shown as work in progress under the head fixed assets. The remaining sum of Rs.8,58,94,140/-is left as outstanding balance of advance with Executive Engineer CPWD.
- 11. An advance of Rs.9,04,39,952/- has been paid to Executive Engineer, CPWD, Jaipur up to 31-03-2022 (previous year balance Rs. 9,04,39,952/-) as Advance for construction of AICTE building at Jaipur. The council has also received a running bill of Rs 4,46,46,659 during FY 2021-22 which has been shown as work in progress under the head fixed assets. The remaining sum of Rs.4,57,93,293/-is left as outstanding balance of advance with Executive Engineer CPWD.
- 12. An advance of Rs.34,02,563/- has been paid to Various Institutions, up to 31-03-2022 (previous year balance Rs. 34,02,563/-) as Advance for Conducting NBA Workshops.
- 13. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs.4,16,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as Grant in Aid for AICTE Schemes.
- 14. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs. 1,84,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for J&K students scholarship scheme.
- 15. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs.2,16,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for SWAYAM MOOCS Project.

- 16. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs. 9,38,15,274/- has been sanctioned from AICTE Internal Resource Funds (Non-Plan) for Plan as GIA.
- 17. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs. 9,81,25,000/- has been sanctioned from AICTE Internal Resource Funds (Non-Plan) for Innovation Cell.
- 18. During the financial year 2021-22 Rs.10,00,00,000/- has been sanctioned by the Ministry of Education as grant in aid for Indian Knowledge System.
- 19. During the financial year 2021-22, grants amounting of Rs. 53,79,80,386/- has been sanctioned as GIA on various schemes (Non-plan schedule 10) from the Interest earned on security Deposit and AICTE internal resource funds.
- 20. As per Section 16 (2) of AICTE ACT, the Council deposits its receipts and make investment in various nationalized banks from time to time, which are detailed in Schedule 6 of annual accounts.
- 21. Advances made and shown are recoverable are adjusted to final head of account/recovered on receipt of final bill/receipt from the concerned party/department.
- 22. From the Financial Year 2011-12, Security Deposit paid by newly approved Institutes has been earmarked and invested in Fixed Deposit Receipts.
- 23. As per the Approval Process Hand Book (APH) 2010-11, the Technical Institutions were required to create Security Deposits in favor of AICTE for a period of 8 years. After completion of the period, the principle amount will be returned to the concerned institution and the interest generated thereon will be retained by AICTE. Up to FY 2020-21, the principle amount of Rs. 93,83,02,075/- was received, out of which Rs. 77,80,00,162/- has been returned to the concerned institutions. Rs. 16,03,01,913/- remained with the council as on 31-03-2021. During the financial year 2021-22 principle amount of Rs. 8,28,40,801/- has been received and an amount of Rs. 3,17,00,000/- has been returned to the concerned institutions. Rs. 21,14,42,714/- remained with the Council as on 31-03-2022.
- 24. The investment in Government Securities out of CPF Account was as per the face value of the Government securities.
- 25. Previous year figures have been regrouped wherever considered necessary.

# Separate Audit Report of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India on the Accounts of All India Council for Technical Education, New Delhi for the year ended 31st March 2022

We have audited the attached Balance Sheet of the All India Council for Technical Education (Council) as at 31st March 2022, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account for the year ended on that date under Section 19(2) of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (Duties, Powers & Conditions of Service) Act, 1977 read with Section 19 of the AICTE Act, 1987. These financial statements include the accounts of 11 units (8 Regional offices and 3 Camp offices) of AICTE. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Council's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

- 2. This Separate Audit Report contains the comments of the Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) on the accounting treatment only with regard to classification, conformity with the best accounting practices, accounting standards and disclosure norms, etc. Audit observations on financial transactions with regard to compliance with the Law, Rules & Regulations (Propriety and Regularity) and efficiency-cum performance aspects, etc., if any, are reported through Inspection Reports/CAG's Audit Reports separately.
- 3. We have conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in India. These standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidences supporting the amounts and disclosure in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.
- 4. Based on our audit, we report that:
- i. We have obtained all the information and explanations, which to the best of our knowledge and belief were necessary for the purpose of our audit.
- ii. The balance Sheet, Income & expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report have been drawn up in the format prescribed by the Ministry of Education, Government of India vide order No.29-412A 12-FD dated 17 April 2015 subject to the observations in the report.
- iii In our opinion, proper books of accounts and other relevant records have been maintained by the council in so far as it appears from our examination of such books.
- iv. We further report that:
- A. Balance Sheet
- A.1 Assets
- A.1.1 Fixed Assess (Schedule 4) Rs. 178,80 crore

### Electrical Installation and Equipment - Rs. 15.54 crore

The above includes an amount of Rs. 220.401akh towards Public Addressing (PA) System of at AICTE HO building, New Delhi capitalized in current Financial Year 2021-22 with retrospective effect from Year 2016-17.

Audit observed that an amount of Rs.66.12 lakh been charged as depreciation (@ 5% P.A.) on PA system. As the format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education, Depreciation rate 7.5 % is applicable on PA system. Accordingly, depreciation of Rs. 99.18 lakh needs to be charged on PA system.

This has resulted in understatement of Depreciation by Rs. 33.06 lakh (Current year Rs. 5.51 lakh and Prior Period Depreciation Rs.27.55 lakh) and over statement of Excess of Income over Expenditure by the same amount.

Further, format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education specifies that PA system needs to be shown as separate Class of Fixed Assets in the accounts. Thus, AICTE needs to add "Public Addressing System" as a separate class of assets in the Fixed Assets (Schedule 4). This has also resulted in overstatement of Electrical Installation and Equipment (Net Block) and understatement of Public Addressing System (Net Block) by Rs. 121.22 lakh.



### B. Income and Expenditure Account

### B.1 Income

### B.1.1 Income from Investments (Schedule-11)-Rs. 123.56 crore

AICTE received Security Deposits in year 2010-11 as per Approval Process Hand Book (APH)2010-11, These security deposits were required to be returned to respective institutes after 8 years in 2018-19 and the interest on these Security Deposits was to be retained by the AICTE. These security deposits along with the interest was inadvertently released by the AICTE in 2018-19 to the respective institutes.

During the year, AICTE received interest of Rs. 13.06 crore (from some Institutes and not all). Audit observed that:

The recognition of cumulative interest of past 11 years (from year 2010-11) of Rs.13.06 crore as income for the current year is not in accordance with accrual accounting and matching concept. The interest for prior periods (up to 2020-21) should have been shown distinctly as Prior Period Income (Schedule-14) as per Para I5 of AS-5.

Since Council is accounting interest income on Security Deposits from the Institutes on cash basis, this facts should be suitably disclosed in the Schedule of Significant Accounting Policies.

### **B-2** Expenditure

### B-2.1 Prior Period Expenditure (Sehcdule-22)-Rs.6.26 crore

AICTE capitalized an amount of Rs.174.90 crore for AICTE HO building, New Delhi (Building Rs. 134.82 crore, Furniture and Fixtures Rs.7.70 crore, Office Equipment's Rs. 16.84 crore, Electric Installations Rs.15.54 crore) in Year 2021-22 with retrospective effect from Year 2016-17 (from date of handed over the building) based on audit observation issued in previous Financial Years.

The AICTE charged depreciation amounting to Rs. 31.89 crore during current year on these assets in the Income and Expenditure Accounts.

Since the Assets were erroneously capitalized in the 2021-22 instead of year 2016-17, the charge of Depreciation for the full period as Deprecation of the current year is not in accordance with AS-5 and format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education. This has resulted in overstatement of current year Depreciation by Rs. 26.57 crore and understatement of Prior Period Depreciation by the same amount.

Further, the accounts also contravene disclosure requirement of AS-5 and the format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education as the Note-6 of Notes to the Accounts (Schedule 4) does not disclose the nature and amount of Prior Period Expenditure in the accounts in a manner that their impact on the current year profit can be perceived.

### C. Income and Expenditure Account (CPF Accounts)

### C.I Income

### C.I.1 Interest on Government Securities: Rs. 24.75lakh

Reference is invited to Accounting Policy No. 6, which states that Interest on All Deposits/investment is accounted for on accrual basis.

AICTE accounted interest received on Government Securities during the year amounting to Rs. 24.75 lakh whereas the interest (accrued and due) on these Government Securities works out to be Rs. 36.71 lakh.

Non- accounting of interest on accrual basis has resulted in Understatement of Interest Accrued on Investment by Rs.11.96 lakh with corresponding Overstatement of Income from Non Plan by same amount.

This has further resulted in overstatement of Staff Payment & Benefits (Establishment Expenses)-Schedule 15 and Understatement of Excess of Income over Expenditure by the same amount of the main Accounts of AICTE.

C.1.2 It has been observed that an amount of Rs.98.92 lakh pertaining to Investment in 5 Government Securities,



relating to Previous Years (2016 to 2021), has not been taken in accounts, as the same was yet to be received by AICTE.

This has resulted in understatement of Current Assets - Interest Accrued on Investment with corresponding Overstatement of Income from Non-Plan by Rs. 98.92 lakh.

This has further resulted in overstatement of Staff Payment & Benefits (Establishment Expenses)-Schedule 15 and Understatement of Excess of Income over Expenditure by the same amount of the main Accounts of AICTE.

### D. Principle Accounting Policies & Notes to Accounts

As per the format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education, the claims against the institution pending against in court/s needs to be recognised as Contingent Liability and disclosed suitably in accounts.

During the course of audit, it was observed that an amount of Rs. 2.27 crore, as claimed by petitioners in various legal suits, was pending in various court/s as on 31 March 2022. The accounts of the AICTE, however, did not disclose existence of any Contingent liability. The existence of Contingent Liability of Rs. 2.27 crore should have disclosed in the accounts as per the format of accounts prescribed by Ministry of Education and Accounting Standard.

### E. General

AICTE has made a provision of Rs. 4.63 crore for Gratuity of its employees (including NPS Subscribers) as per Actuarial Valuation. As per the Ministry of Education direction dated <u>27 January 2022</u>, CCS (Pension) Rules 1972 are not admissible for payment of gratuity to Employees of Autonomous Bodies covered under NPS. Flowever, Payment of Gratuity Act 1972 can be made applicable to the employees of Autonomous Bodies covered under NPS. Further as intimated by the Ministry of Education the process of notifying the Autonomous Bodies under Payment of Gratuity Act 1972 is underway. This fact needs to be disclosed in the Notes to Accounts.

### F. Grants-in-Aid

The Council received grants-in-aid of Rs. 602.16 crore {General: Rs. 416.00 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs.2.16 crore, PMKVY- Nil, TEQIP: Nil, PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs. 184.00 crore) during 2021-22. It had receipts of Rs.67.08 crore {Refund of unspent grant: Rs.12.71 crore, Interest earned & other receipts: Rs.54.37 crore (Rs. 3.32 crore, Rs.41.67 crore and Rs.9.38 crore)}. The Council had an opening balance of Rs. 97.29 crore {General: Rs. 39.85 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 10.80 crore, PMKVY: Rs. 30.85 crore, TEQIP: Rs.0.38 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs. 15.41 crore). Out of total amount of Rs. 766.53 crore it utilized Rs 711.09 crore {General: Rs. 486,32 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs. 11.59 crore, PMKVY: Rs. 31.38 crore, TEQIP: Rs. 0.38 crore and PMSSS (J&K Scheme): Rs.181.42 crore). The Council had a closing balance of Rs. 55.44 crore {General: Rs.34.04 crore, Swayam MOOCs: Rs.2.02 crore, PMKVY: Rs.0.01 crore, TIIQIP: Rs, Nil and PMSSS (J&K Scheme) Rs. 19.37 crore) as on 31st March 2022.

The Council also received grants-in-aid under Indian Knowledge System of Rs. 10.00 crore (General: Rs. 10.00 crore) during 2021-22 and earned interest of Rs. 0.03 crore during the year, The Council had an opening balance of Rs. 0.89 crore (General; Rs. 0.89 crore). Out of total amount of Rs. 10.92 crore, it utilised Rs.4.32 crore leaving a closing balance of Rs.6.60 crore as on 31st March 2022.

### G. Management Letter

Deficiencies which have not been included in the Audit Report have been brought to the notice of the Member Secretary, AICTE through a Management Letter issued separately for remedial/corrective action.

- v. Subject to our observations in the preceding paragraphs, we report that the Balance Sheet, Income & Expenditure Account and Receipts & Payments Account dealt with by this report are in agreement with the books of accounts.
- vi. In our opinion and to the best of our information and according to the explanation given to us, the said financial statements, read together with the Accounting Policies and Notes on Accounts, and subject to the significant matters stated above and other matters mentioned in Annexure to this Audit Report, give a true and fair view in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in India:



- **a.** In so far as they relate to the Balance Sheet of the state of affairs of the All India Council for Technical Education as at 31 March 2022; and
- **b.** In so far as they relate to the Income and Expenditure Account of the surplus for the year ended on that date.

### **Annexure to Audit Report**

### 1. Adequacy of Internal Audit System

The Council has an Internal Audit cell. The Internal Audit System of the Council needs strengthening in following areas:-

- No audit of Regional Offices was planned and conducted during the year.
- During the year 2021-22, out of 24 Bureaus/ Cells at AICTE Hqrs, internal audit of only 6 Bureaus/ Cells was planned and conducted during 2011-22.
- 32 internal audit paras were outstanding as on 31.03.2021.

### 2 Adequacy of internal Control System

The Internal Control System of the Council needs strengthening in following areas: -

- The internal audit reports pertaining to 6 Bureaus/ Cells of Council conducted by the Internal Audit cell during the year 2021-22 revealed deficiencies related to non-receipt of utilisation certificates, non- adjustment of interest accrued on grants and cases related to receipt of unspent grants from various institutions after long durations.
- Non adjustment of National Board of Accreditation Workshop Advances of Rs. 34.03 lakh since 2012-13.
- Non conducting of physical verification of some fixed assets and inventories during the year.

### 3. System of physical verification of fixed assets

- The physical verification of Land and Building has been conducted upto 2021-22.
- The physical verification of Computer and accessories has been conducted upto 2020-21.
- The physical verification of furniture and fixtures has been conducted upto 2020-21.
- The physical verification of library books has been conducted upto 2021-22,

### 4. System of physical verification of inventor

The physical verification of inventories like stationery and consumables has been conducted upto 2020-21.

### 5. Regularity in payment of statutory dues

• As per annual accounts, no payment over six months in respect of statutory dues was outstanding as on 31.03.2022.
