#### ORDER

The Delhi School Education Act & Rules was enacted in 1973 and thereafter, many changes occurred in the field of education in the last four decades. Meanwhile, the Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act, 2009 came into force w.e.f. 1<sup>st</sup> April, 2010 for making Right to Education a Fundamental Right. In view of the developments and changes that took place in the education-field, a need is felt to comprehensively review DSEAR '73 with respect to RTE Act, 2009.

Accordingly, the Govt. of N.C.T. of Delhi har decided to constitute a committee with terms of references as mentioned below.

- Only 44 Aided Schools are running under MCD but no one is running on Govt. allotted land.
- Inspection is regularly done in respect of MCD and aided schools. The
  recognised schools were not frequently inspected due to shortage of staff.
  However, a circular is being issued to carry out the inspection of recognised
  schools regularly.
- 1593 unrecognised primary schools were found running, as per survey conducted in the year 2008. (copy enclosed as Annexure- I)
- The figure in respect of the students who pass out class V from unrecognised schools and take admission in class VI in GNCTD schools can be obtained by the Director of Edn, GNCTD.
- As per MPD- 2021, the land requirement for recognition of primary School is minimum 800 sq.m. and the MCD is regularly giving recognition to the primary schools which applied for recognition and fulfils the norms.
- 6. The MCD has also passed a resolution to grant relaxation in respect of land requirement and sent it to the Secretary, Ministry of Urban Development, Govt. of India, Nirman Bhawan, New Delhi. The competent authority for granting relaxation in MPD 2021. One letter & two reminders have already been sent. (copy enclosed as Annexure-II). So far as concerned with sending the note of DDA, it has come to the notice that an online survey was conducted in this regard by Director of Education, GNCTD. Therefore the matter of granting relaxation in area may be put forward by the Directorate of Education, GNCTD on the basis of online survey.
- The conditions of recognition stipulated under RTE is feasible but the condition of land requirement is not feasible in the context of Delhi Urban areas.

I am directed to enclose herewith a copy of the Corporation Resolution No. 739 dated 12.01.09 on the above noted subject. The cases for grant of recognition which had a minimum 200 square yards of land and fulfill other norms were being considered. Section 4.2.2.8 of MPD-2021 provides that in all unauthorized colonies whether on private or public land, from time to time, it must be ensured that for improvement of physical and social infrastructure, the minimum necessary / feasible land of services and community facilities are provided. For primary school it is 800 sq. m per 5000 population. Similarly the planning norms prescribed on Table 13.3 of MPD-2021 prescribes an area of 0.2-0.4 hectare for a primary school for 10,000 populations.

A preamble was put up before the Corporation for approval of Consolidated Revised Guidelines for Recognition of Private School. The Education Committee vide its resolution No. 14, dated 13.10.08, approved as under: -

"Having considered the proposal of the Commissioner as contained in his letter No. F.33/PE/1730/C&C dated 23.09.08 resolved that it be recommended to the corporation through the Standing Committee that proposal as contained in the letter referred to above, be approved subject to the following modifications: -

(1) MCD should consider all those cases for private schools running in unauthorised or authorised colonies for recognition which are running on a piece of land measuring 200 sq. yards including space of 80 sq. yards for play ground as already approved in the Corporation Vide its Resolution No. 435 dated 17.01.2000.

- (2) That area of the land (for school) including 40% for play ground should be 200 sq. yards up to 7 section, 300 sq. yards upto 10 section, 400 sq. yards upto 12 sections, 800 sq. yards for more than 12 sections and annual tuition fee as proposed in the consolidated. Revised Guidelines for recognition of Private Schools in Para 3 (10) be not charged.
- (3) Hence forth, Rs. 5,000/- in place of Rs. 1000/- be charged as processing fee from the Private School applying for recognition without aid.

According to the information provided by the Director of Education in MCD there are a total of 1593 unrecognised schools with an enrolment of 1.63,908 in the meeting dated 12.08.2011 with Director (Education), MCD I had asked for information on unrecognized schools which included information on how far the unrecognised schools need the bench-mark for space set out in RTE.

The response of the MCD does not refer to this at all although the case for relaxation of land norms is said to have been referred to Ministry of Urban Department.

The Review Committee feels that unless a survey is conducted to see what percentage of the unrecognised schools meet the prescribed bench-marks, it will be difficult to make a recommendation. Kindly direct for a quick survey (not detailed) to be undertaken to see that what percentage of schools might qualify for recognition under RTE and those which would remain outside the fold even after some relaxation is given.

On the basis of the data the Review Committee can formulate its recommendation.

With reference to your letter F. No. 1/CH/RC/2011/36 dated 14-09-2011 addressed to the Commissioner, MCD whereby directions were given to conduct quick survey(not detailed) of the unrecognized schools for obtaining the information regarding percentage of such schools which might qualify for recognition under the RTE Act, 2009 and those which would remain outside the fold even after some relaxation is given including information on how far the unrecognized schools need the bench-mark for space set out in RTE.

In this regard, it is submitted that the RTE Act, 2009 does not specify the benchmark in respect of land for recognition of primary schools whereas MPD 2021, specifies minimum of 800 Sq.Mtrs area as one of the eligibility conditions for recognition of primary schools. This condition is operative with effect from 07-02-2007.

It is further submitted that as per the directions given, the department conducted a quick survey of 257 schools through zonal Dy. Directors. The reports received from the zonal Dy. Directors have been compiled and the same is annexed as Annex. "A". The report reveals that 43 cases (16.73 %) out of 257 are eligible as per the MPD 2021 norms. It is pertinent to mention here that prior to 07-02-2007, the eligibility criteria adopted by the department for processing cases for recognition was minimum of 200 sq. yards. If the previous criteria in respect of land is used as benchmark after relaxation then 159 cases (61.86%) out of 257 would become eligible.

At the outset the Chairperson welcomed the members of the Committee and the officers of the Department of Education and informed them of the aims and objectives of the meeting which was to understand the issues and challenges faced by the Department in implementing the Act and the Rules and to hear their suggestions on what needed to be done. She clarified that later it was proposed to hear representative groups from the private and aided schools and other stakeholders depending on written responses received to the public notice and the relevance of the applications sent to the Committee .

#### 1) Assistant teacher qualification

- Decision taken: Smt. Satia, Deputy Director of Education will give a base paper indicating critical areas and will suggest solutions.
- B) Mr. Marcel Ekka, ADE (Act), Dte. of Education will locate the departmental file in which this issue was taken up.
- C) After this is done a request will be made to DIET to workout a phased programme for orientation of teachers as determined.

#### 2) Resignation of teachers of private school

A) It was pointed out that the time taken for approval of Director under Rule 114 is too short. This leads to a number of complaints and cases. It was suggested that provisions for taking approval of Director is unnecessary and cannot be adhered to. After discussion it was found that the provision itself is not unworkable, rather the implementation has been difficult due to administrative problems. It was decided to prepare a suggested process plan for administering this provision.

# Employing under qualified teachers by private schools

A) It was suggested that a website be created and every school should be expected to fill up the details regarding qualifications of every teacher. Any problem /case/complaints regarding under qualification would need to be referred to a Tribunal or Ombudsman after following due process which would be suggested.

#### 4) Inspections of schools

It was found that inspection of every school in every district every year is a requirement of the existing Act. However basis of selection of schools to be inspected and proforma for inspection needs to be revisited, Mrs. Neelam Verma agreed to prepare a paper on this.

#### 5) Punitive measures:

It was pointed that there is absence of internal provisions for taking action against school not following Govt. rules/orders. There were no provisions for acting against the management except cases of extreme violation. It was decided that 1) Mrs. Setia would prepare a paper for occasional /frequent violation listing the situations encountered in order of priority. 2) Mr. R.N. Sharma will examine how punitive provisions have been enforced in area like Child Rights Commission/MCD civic provisions etc. and he would give suggestions which provisions are more suitable for the education sector.

After these papers are received and the views of all stakeholders taken into account, a legal formulation would be prepared through Assistant Legal Advisor for being incorporated in due course in the Report.

Referring to the issues discussed in earlier meeting held on 03.06.2011 the issues taken up were as :-

- Regarding approval of Director to be taken on the resignation of an employee of an
  unaided school: All the divergent points of view were considered; it was felt that it would be better
  if Regional Director of Education was empowered to hold a fixed day monthly meeting with the
  aggrieved party and the school management (as is done in PGC) to decide the case on merit. Either
  party, if aggrieved, can then appeal to the Tribunal Mrs. Abha Joshi will prepare an organogram setting
  out the procedure to enable a more detailed discussion.
- Capacity of Existing Tribunal: Mr. Marcel Ekka, ADE (Act) would find out the total no. of pending cases with the Tribunal so as to as certain whether existing Tribunal can be asked to adjudicate over these cases or establishment of new Tribunal/ new bench/or any other alternative be recommended.

Mr. Marcel Ekka, ADE (Act) would also try to find out the number and nature of existing cases handled by the Tribunal. If it is felt that there is a need to create another Tribunal then a separate section for the same would be drafted.



3. Employment of under-qualified teachers by un-aided schools: The suggestion that schools may be asked to create a website and may be asked to upload certain information like pupil-teacher ratio, qualification of teachers etc on the website of the school, which would be accessible to parents (stake-holders) was discussed. The requisite details of such information would be prepared by Mrs. Abha Joshi. Doing so may require a section to be included so that schools may be asked to follow it. Mr. Manish Gaur, Member was assigned the job of drafting such a Section. However the practicality of the measure would be examined by also looking at the existing system adopted by some progressive schools.

- 4. Fee-regulatory committee for private schools: It was decided to examine this strategy further to see whether a parallel could be drawn with a similar approach adopted in respect of colleges affiliated with the Department of Higher Education. However, it was stated felt that since the number of schools is very large, functioning of such a committee would be feasible only if some sort of accreditation was done. Possibility of assigning this job of accreditation to an outside agency was to be explored. Ms. Shailaja Chandra informed that she would talk to Ms. Rukmini, Director, ASER Centre to see the modalities followed by Government of India in asking ASER to conduct assessments for schools across the country.
- 5. Inspections (a): With a view to seeing that the provisions for annual inspection of schools is carried out faithfully. It was felt that the possibility of re-assigning the responsibility may be explored as is done in the case of some other departments. A CA selected by proper procedure, may also be included in the team so as to examine financial details of the schools.
- (b) It was agreed that there is a need to empanel auditors for examining annual returns already submitted by the schools under Rule 180 of the existing Act. Mr. Ekka was asked to bring a CA in the next meeting so as to discuss broad modalities and also get a rough estimate of the expenditure that might be involved.
- 6. Violations under Section 10 of the existing Act: The members agreed that this problem may be tackled at the level of Regional Director who may hold monthly meeting with the complainant and the management and pass orders on merit. If aggrieved by the order, the party may approach the Tribunal for further relief. The modalities to be followed to cut short unnecessary paperwork would be suggested by Ms Abha Joshi.
- 7. Shri Manish Gaur(ALA) was requested to look in to the punitive measures under the Existing Act and suggest necessary changes to take care of a variety of situations that were encountered which were described in the meeting.
- 8. Mr. Deshpande was asked to go through the e-mails and correspondence received till date and advice. He was also requested to prepare a summary of best practices/relevant aspects of the Report of the intern (AT) and brief the Committee with his own research.
- 9. It was decided to hold consecutive meetings in the following week with the identified bodies/individuals on days that would be decided later. In the meantime the Member Secretary would remind the officers that had not furnished the papers they had undertaken to in the meeting held in early June.

At the outset the Chairperson welcomed all members present and hoped that their inputs as representatives of the largest group of schools would be beneficial. She emphasized the need to inculcate values of inclusive education while underscoring the need for imparting quality education and also to foster a healthy relationship between the Government, the school management and other stakeholders.

To ensure a smooth discussion, she suggested that the issues be categorized and then deliberated one by one. The main issues raised were:

- 1. Autonomy of Schools: School representatives advocated grant of greater autonomy to private un-aided schools in matters related to finance, admission processes, selection of teachers and management. It was also pointed out that over 90 percent of the tuition fee collection goes into the payment of teacher salaries. As this is their only source of income, they demanded that the schools be allowed to keep a surplus of 20-30 percent so that they can contribute to further growth of the school system.
- 2. Accountability of Schools: The representatives accepted that along with grant of autonomy to private schools, provisions for accountability and responsibility of management too should be introduced. They were open to the suggestion to place all relevant information already being provided to the Government and even to CBSE on a website for being viewed by the stakeholders.
- 3. Status of School: There was a demand that the status of private unaided schools need to be clarified i.e. whether they are to be considered as non-profit institutions or commercial institutions because the Govt. levies property tax, electricity charges etc on commercial rates. An example given was that 12% service tax on buses provided to the schools was being levied.

- 4. Fee hike: The representatives pointed out that though there is no cap of 10 percent fee hike under the existing Act, but even so, the Department interferes in the fee-fixation done by management. Moreover, fee-structure of schools depends on teacher-pupil ratio and infrastructural facilities provided by them. This fact is not taken into account by government representatives.
- 5. Right to Education Act: The school representatives were aggreed that the parents were using the Right to Education Act to harass schools. They also pointed out that in the absence of any code of conduct for children, problem of indiscipline were increasing. They emphasized that the duties of parents and children should be clearly laid down.
- 6. Shortage of Schools: It was generally accepted that the crux of the problem lay in the increasing gap between demand and supply of quality schools and to solve it, land should be allotted to more and more societies to enable schools to come up.
- 7. Problem due to Section 10 of DSEAR'73: Some representatives were of the view that Section 10 of DSEAR'73 be repealed because it was not feasible to give full salary to teachers as stipulated as the overall income of the schools was too low.

It was suggested that a better option would be to give minimum wages to a freshly appointed teacher. After grooming for a few years, management may consider grant of full salary to him/her.

However, there were some members who were of the view that Section 10 of DSEAR'73 should not be repealed because it may lead to exploitation of teachers. They instead suggested that a better option would be to allow appointment of contractual teachers.

- 8. Vocational Courses after school hours: There was a suggestion from school representatives that the schools be allowed to run vocational courses etc. after school hours so that their fund collection is augmented. The rationale given was that this may ease the quantum of fee hike.
- 9.Non -receipt of reimbursement amount : The school representatives lamented that although they had admitted 25 percent of children as per the provisions of the RTE, they are yet to receive any re-imbursement from Government.
- 10.Interference of department: The school representatives were aggrieved by what they considered as too much interference by the Departmental officials. Often the schools are asked to comply with certain orders like installing fire safety equipments and producing necessary certificate within 24 hours. The Act should be simplified so that there is minimum interference from Department.



- 11. Age criteria at nursery level: It was also pointed out that the issue of minimum age at nursery level needs to be reconsidered because as per the RTE Act, 2009, a child of 6 years should be admitted in class-I which implies that a child of 4+ years be admitted in nursery. Presently a child of 3+ years is eligible for nursery.
- 12. Child Protection vis a vis harassment: Most of the schools felt that they were getting a number of complaints from DPCPR regarding harassment of children which were baseless. They asserted that definition of child protection vis a vis harassment needs to be clarified.

Chairperson agreed that a separate meeting with the officials of DPCPR shall be held to discuss this aspect although it would need to be resolved administratively and not through law.

- 13. As regards the issues related to minority schools, the Chairperson held that a separate meeting will be held to discuss their issues.
- 14. All the representatives were of the view that they should be provided with an institutionalized forum to hold regular meetings with the Director when their experiences can be brought to his notice. This would obviate the need for having to go to the Court to settle administrative disputes.
- 15. Chairperson then sought their views on initiating some sort of accreditation of schools so that a fee regulation committee may be constituted on the lines of department of higher education. She also sought their views on the creation of a website where schools may give information regarding fee structure, teacher -pupil ratio, qualification of teachers etc. Some of the schools representatives were against the idea of accreditation. The apprehension was that this would jeopardise their interest. The Chairperson clarified that accreditation would be in the form of ranking on the basis of financial outgo and the information would be restricted to information on the teachers' names and qualification, number of classes and duties and salaries paid. As regards the concept of a web site, the representatives were not averse to this idea.

In the end the Chairperson proposed that the representatives present give in writing a clear perspective on all issues in the following format:

Chairperson welcomed the members and sought their views on the existing provisions of DSEAR'73.

At the outset, a view was expressed by Shri Ashok Rao that the demographic profile of children studying in Aided schools had altered drastically and the purpose for which the schools were set up was being fulfilled elsewhere leaving the Aided schools serving a different kind of clientele. This should be studied before taking a look at the situation and what should be done to address it. The Chairperson requested the Member-Secretary to try and get a status paper prepared to see whether in fact there had been a big change in the socio-economic status of the families that admitted their children in the Aided schools and to also give an idea of the categorisation of the schools into those which were being managed well and produced good educational outcomes and those which were deficient on one or more scores with the main reasons for deficiency, in order of priority.

 The representatives were quite vocal about the grievances of management of Aided Schools. They contended that during the past so many years Aided schools had been fulfilling their social responsibilities to the best of their capacity.



But gradually due to non-cooperative attitude of the department, the managements were finding it difficult to run the schools due to paucity of resources. The solution offered was that Government should allow them to augment their finances as per the existing provisions of the Act or it should provide them sufficient funds to maintain the schools.

- 2. Some of the proposals for raising funds were:
- The schools should be allowed to charge development funds under provision of Rule 151.
- b) The management should be allowed to run another private school or vocational courses after the normal school hours were over or to allow use of the space and playgrounds to raise resources for educational activities.

c) The Government should provide grants for furniture, equipment, library, repairs and maintenance as it was not possible for the schools to raise resources for this with their hands tied down by various embargoes.

The Chairperson expressed her view that while the provisions of the Act gave sufficient scope for augmenting resources, there was every need for transparency in the management of the funds raised and all such details would need to be declared on a website to be viewed by all stake-holders. She suggested ways in which this could be done and monitored and none of the members present took an exception to the ideas which were basically to bring in transparency and financial accountability.

- 3. The management representatives expressed anguish over the lack of independence that exists over matters like recruitment of teachers and that they have to seek approval of the department before starting the process of recruitment. They opined that the posts of Principal and Vice-Principal should be made selection posts to be filled on merit.
- 4. Under RTE Act, 75% members of the managing committee of Aided schools were required to be form among parents who would monitor the school functioning and other aspects. This had led to a situation where the Principal had no final say which affected the discipline and general administration of the school adversely as there was diffusion of authority.

The representatives suggested that a provision of a' governing council 'may be introduced and the task of overall administration may be assigned to it.

- The representatives were of the view that Rule 120 should be amended so that once a
  disciplinary committee, in which DE's nominee was present, approved the penalty, there should
  be no further need to again obtain the approval of the Director which entailed a long and slow
  process.
- 6. The committee was informed by one of the representatives that during nineties a Reconciliatory Committee had been constituted in District south and it comprised of five to six members under the Chairmanship of the Deputy Director. The purpose of the committee was to sort out any conflict between employees and management. This was reported to have worked well at that time.

The idea was taken note of among the possible alternatives.

Concern was expressed that the existing Act was silent on the issue of children with special abilities. It was felt there is an urgent need to open more schools for such children.

One of the members was of the view that instead of inclusive education separate schools with hostels should be provided especially when the challenges faced by the student called for special handling.

In the end, the Chairperson asked the representative to submit their views on each issue in the following format. Mr. Rao agreed to submit the same with in two weeks.

- Mrs. Satia had raised the issue of different recruitment rules for assistant teachers in government and aided schools. In this regard Mr. Ekka was reminded to bring the original file of the department in the next meeting so that department's view in the matter may be ascertained. Mr. Ekka was also asked to bring a chartered accountant in the next meeting to discuss certain aspects of balance sheets of schools.
- 2. Mrs Setia had also raised the issue of imposing penalties on unaided as well as aided schools for non-compliance or violation of the provisions of the act. As desired in the earlier meeting dated 03.06.11, Mr. R. N. Sharma had submitted a note on the penalty provisions in other Acts. The Chairperson asked Mr. Manish Gaur, ALA to examine it and give his comments.
- Since Mrs. Neelam Verma has not submitted the inspection proforma till date, the Chairperson desired that she be reminded once again.
- The Chairperson asked Mr. Manish Gaur, ALA to examine how more powers, in addition to the existing ones, can be given to the Tribunal. It was agreed by all that there was a need to enhance punitive powers.
- As regards fee regulation, it was agreed that a meeting with Mr. Reghunathan who is the Chairman of fee-regulatory committee working for department of Higher Education, may be held so as to get an insight into its functioning and its relevance for fee fixation in schools in similar cases.

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- 6. As regards selection process for teachers in aided schools ,it was agreed by all that the method adopted by colleges of Delhi University may be studied to explore the feasibility of adopting the same for aided schools. For this a meeting with the Principal of Dayal Singh college a Delhi University maintained college would be held in forthcoming week.
- 7. As regards financial issues ailing most of the aided schools , the Chairperson desired to hold a meeting with the former ( retired) Secretary Education ,Ms. Geeta Sagar and also with some officials of the department so as to get a view why financial resources which can raised under existing provisions of the Act have been withheld as the lack of funds is eroding the viability of these schools. The officials identified for the purpose of briefly the committee were Mr K.S.Yadav, Ms. Tirkey, Mr.V.K.Sharma and Mrs. Satia.
- It was also decided that in the forthcoming week a meeting will be held with Mr. Amod Kanth, Chairman, DCPCR, to discuss issues related to children as a result of alleged support given to them which was increasing indiscipline.
- It was also decided to hold a meeting with Ms. Rukmini Banerji, ASER to get a view of the modalities and the criteria of judging a school in terms of infrastructural facilities available and its financial status.

The Chairperson welcomed the representatives of private unaided minority schools and requested them to state their case. The views expressed by different representatives included the following:-

- That private schools have helped in maintaining the standard of education and they are
  fulfilling their social responsibility with utmost sincerity. However, they were opposed
  to the imposition of 25% admission under freeship category under RTE because it would
  put tremendous pressure on their finances which will impact adversely on the over all
  quality of education imparted by them.
- That already private unaided schools have approached the Hon'ble Supreme Court against this provision and a decision is likely to come by mid August.
- That DOE officials do not understand the special character of the minority /missionary schools and often try to impose the same rules as are applicable on non-minority schools. It is therefore necessary that some sort of training is imparted to them.

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- That the autonomy of the minority schools must be retained at least to the extent it is provided in DSEAR.
- That while revamping DSEAR the bottom line of the whole exercise should be to maintain the autonomy of minority schools.
- The Chairperson, after listening their views, clarified that the aim was to devise a way out to deal with complaints made against the schools, without infringing on their autonomy. These complaints generally pertained to:
  - 1. Employing under qualified teachers
  - 2. Diversion of funds taken from parents for some other purpose
  - 3. Not paying full salary to the employees
- The Chairperson sought their views on adopting the following measures to sort out these complaints; The delegation was agreeable to the following:-
  - A Grievance Redressal/Recociliation committee may be constituted by the department either at the level of Regional Director or at the district level where parties involved could come across the table. The party aggrieved by the decision may approach Tribunal. This proposal was accepted by them.
  - A template of each school may be created in which the qualification as well as salary paid to each teacher may be mentioned. This web site may be approached by all the stake holders of the school. The representatives were not averse to this idea either. Some of them even proposed that schools be asked to pay salary through ECS.
  - The schools may be asked to place their financial returns on the web site for the sake of transparency. The schools did not accept this proposal .Their view was that this would create more problems for them. However they were ready to give whatever information was sought by the department.
  - A fee-regulatory committee may be constituted on the same pattern as is done in Department of Higher Education. This was essential because government has a social responsibility to ensure that schools do not dictate terms to a captive group of parents who had no option but to agree to pay. All the schools opposed this idea; their contention was that in TMA Pai judgment hon'ble Supreme Court had upheld the right of minority institutions to fix up their fee—structure. ALA Manish Gaur clarified that in PAlnamdar case the Hon'ble Court had held that fee can be regulated.

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The argument given by the schools was that TMA Pai judgment was given by a 11 judge bench while PA Inamdar judgment was delivered by 07 judges, so it can not over-ride the TMA Pai judgment.

- The Chairperson asked ALA Manish Gaur to prepare a note on the issue clarifying all the legal position so that the same may be sent to Law Secretary for opinion as it affected the whole question of conclusion /exclusion of minority schools from this regulation.
- 4. Minority schools once again emphasized that they should be differentiated from non-minority schools. The Chairperson assigned Fr. Binny to prepare a note on situational analysis. highlighting the following-

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- Actual situations of harassment encountered
- Provisions of the Act under which this is supposedly done in the name of Regulation.
- Changes sought

Fr. Binny agreed to submit this by 15th August

- 5. Some more suggestions given by schools for improving the educational standards were-
  - Private schools with expertise be allowed to advise government schools on improvement of quality of education.
  - While conducting inspection of government schools, private schools should be associated so that idea of sharing good teaching practices could be worked.

Meeting ended with vote of thanks to all.

At the outset the Chairperson welcomed Sh N. P. Kaushik. She then sought very appropriate information about the number of cases pending before DST so that it may be decided whether it would be fruitful to recommend constitution of more than one Tribunal. She also sought his views on the formation of reconciliation committees either at district level or at Regional Director Level. Sh. Kaushik's opinion was -

- The number of cases before Tribunal is very large because generally aggrieved parties directly approach Tribunal. Only a small number comes after exhausting the opportunity to settle the grievance with the intervention of the DDE.
- However he welcomed the idea of creating a Redressal Committee where all the concerned
  parties could be brought on the same table and effort to settle the differences made. Doing
  so would divide the cases into two categories-
  - 1. which need conciliation/mediation
  - 2. which need adjudication.
- As regards creation of more benches of the Tribunal, he asserted that for this an estimated figure of pending cases pertaining to service matters of employees of schools need to be taken from Registry of Hon'ble High Court.
- The existing section 8(3) should be amended to bring all service matters of employees of private recognized schools under the ambit of the Tribunal.
- The powers of Tribunal should be enhanced i.e. in Section 27 of existing act the Tribunal should be given the same powers as are laid down under Section 340 CrPC. Penalty under section 27 should be made chargeable on per day basis. Exemplary powers should be entrusted to the Tribunal under Section 11(6) of DSEAR'73.

The Chairperson asked ALA Manish Gaur to look into these proposals and prepare a note which may be discussed by him and Abha Joshi with Sh. N. P. Kaushik.

- At the outset the Chairperson welcomed Ms. Geeta Sagar and briefed her about the issues taken up till date by the Review Committee. She sought her opinion on the following issues:
  - i) Enhancement of the powers of the Tribunal.
  - ii) Constitution of Redressal Committee at Regional Director level on the pattern of PGC.
  - iii) Creation of a web-site on which the school be asked to put up the vital information. The web-site would be so designed that if a school does not fill up a particular field, exception reports would pop-up. The pass-word of the site would be with the stake holders only. This would enhance transparency in the function of school system.
  - iv) Designing of a financial statement by a Chartered Accountant which will project main financial aspects of a school. This may be helpful in categorising a school for the purpose of feeregulation.
  - v) Issue of appointment of teachers in aided school.
  - vi) Allowing aided schools to raises resources under the existing provisions like using premises for conducting educational activities after school hours.



- Ms. Geeta Sagar opined on the issues raised above as -
- i) That instead of creating a Grievances Redressal Committee under Regional Director there should be an Arbitration machinery just as it happens in matters related to co-operatives. This would be more beneficial and effective because officials of the department are already overburdened and more over, it is always better to get any disputed matter resolved by an external party. For this purpose a panel of arbitrators may be prepared.
- ii) The aided schools should be allowed to raise funds as per existing provisions. If an aided school desires to discontinue aid the department should accept their proposal provided the land was not given to the school by any government agency. For this detailed information about every school like its enrolment and status of land should first be compiled so that an appropriate policy decision may be taken.
- iii) Before considering creation of more than one Tribunal or enhancing its power, provision of Tribunal vis-a-vis provisions of prosecuting authority under RTE should be examined so that there is no conflict between the two Acts.

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iv) Tribunal should be an appellate body i.e. complaints of any nature may first be referred to Grievance Redressal Committee under Regional Director who may pass appropriate orders. In case the order is not complied by the school, action against the school may be taken by the Director.

If the school / complainants are aggrieved by the order, they may be go in appeal to the Tribunal.

Similarly, dispute between management and employees may first go for arbitration. If any party is aggrieved by the decision of arbitrator, it may go in appeal to the Tribunal.

- v) The proposal of creating a web-site for the purpose of over-all transparency is a worthwhile proposal.
- vi) However, for better management of aided schools a Governing Body should be constituted for every aided school just as is done in government aided colleges and in this Governing Body at least 50% representatives should be of government.

For carrying out maintenance work in aided schools out of funds provided by the government, every school should constitute a 'building committee' in which at least one member should be either of S.E. or E.E. level.

- 3. The Chairperson concluded the meeting with thanks to Ms. Sagar for her valuable suggestions and with following directions —
- Mr. Manish Gaur, ALA would draw a procedural note on arbitration mechanism to be adopted for resolving disputes between employees and management of private schools. For this he should also work out the details for selection of arbitrator.
- Mr. Deshpande, Intern Consultant would develop a format to seek land status and other information from aided schools. Data would need to be collected for which Member Secy was asked to take up officially and quickly.

A meeting was held at 12.30 p.m. on 21-07-11 with Dr. I. S. Bakshi, Principal Dayal Singh college and Ms Rukmini Bannerji, from Pratham. Review Committee officers present in the meeting were:

- 1) The Chairperson thanked the two invitees for having come at her request and told them that since both of them had extensive experience of a) the University and college systems for University funded colleges( which were in principle like aided schools broadly) and b) the school sector with special reference to quality of education/ engagement of NGOs for maintaining oversight as in the case of Pratham, they had been invited. The Chairperson briefed each invitee about the issues before the committee and sought their advice on steps taken to safeguard use of public resources while giving due flexibility to the institution. In particular, base on their experience:
- i) How to make process of selection of teachers in aided schools more transparent?
- ii) How to categorise the private schools for the purpose of fee-regulation?
- Dr. Bakshi explained the process followed in Delhi University which managed UGC funded colleges according to which —
- i) University invites applications for vacant posts in different colleges. Applications against each post are categorized in seven categories as per qualifications and achievements of candidates. Such categorization ensures that candidates with higher achievements are not ignored when individual colleges call for the interview. Panel of selected candidates is prepared and Government aided colleges can appoint lecturers on ad hoc basis only out of candidates from the panel prepared by the university.
- 3) The Chairperson was informed by Mrs Joshi that in the existing procedure for selection of teachers in aided schools weightage is given to the academic performance of candidates and detailed instructions to be followed by managing committee of the school right from the stage of advertisement to be given for the post in newspapers to the final selection which are already in place.



4) All the members were further informed that from this year qualifying TET (TEACHER ELIGIBILITY TEST) has been made compulsory for all those who want to apply for assistant or trained graduate teacher. CBSE has been assigned this job and it will conduct this examination every six months.

The Chairperson asked whether for PGTs, SCERT can be asked to conduct a test and aided schools may be asked to call only those candidates who have qualified this test.

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- 5) Ms. Rukmini Bannerji explained how ASER exercise was conducted and how it could be helpful in micro level planning. The Chairperson explained to her the idea of categorization of private schools for the purpose of fee-regulation. She asked Mrs. Bannerji to prepare a formulation with proper vocabulary for undertaking the process of categorisation. Mrs. Bannerji agreed to do so and assured that she would prepare it shortly. She offered to give a suggestion relating to a ward level enquiry done for all schools in a particular ward which would be very revealing. She indicated that although ASER covered all schools in India's districts, it did not cover Delhi in the ASER study. It was purely an NGO effort and was not outsourced by Government.
- 6) The committee also gave a hearing to Dr. Ranjana Kaul, Chairperson, SHIV NIKETAN Education Society. Ms Kaul pointed out that under RTE only recognized schools can function. But the land norms followed by DoE as well as by DDA in MPD 21 are a great hindrance. She pleaded that if land norms are not revised then most of the schools shall have to be closed down

The Chairperson assured her that the status prevailing in DDA would be ascertained and the point of view reflected.

A meeting of Review Committee was held at 4.00 p.m. on 21-07-11 with Mr. A. K. Sood, Chartered Accountant of Sood Associates and with Mr. Anil Kumar Mittal from NIC. resent were:

At the outset the Chairperson explained to Mr. Sood the purpose for which the Review Committee was considering designing of financial statement forms in respect of private unaided schools.

- DSEAR 73 already provides under section 18 read with rule 180 that every recognized unaided school shall submit its audited accounts as per appendix ii
- Since the number of schools is very large, it is a huge task for the existing staff of education department to examine the returns in a time bound manner
- iii) Moreover, all the officers of education department are not competent to scrutinize the returns because of their lack in proficiency in accountancy.

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Therefore, the Chairperson urged Mr. Sood to design a simple financial statement which would project the crucial financial details of every school. This would facilitate in laying down minimum standards for every school and it would also be helpful in fee-regulation. The submitted returns would be examined by a cell created for the purpose comprising basic level accountancy staff.

She further explained that opinion of finance department would be taken for empanelling chartered accountants for the purpose of scrutinising those returns which appear incomplete or irrational on first level scrutiny.

- 2) Mr. Sood agreed to take up the exercise and for this he desired to have copies of returns for three years in respect of some private schools. He desired that schools be selected on random basis i.e some may be high profile schools, some may be of middle level and rest may be of lower level preferably the ones functioning in rural areas. Apart from this he desired to have a copy of appendix ii of the ACT, Section 10 and the order dated 11-2-09 regarding fee-hike.
- 3) The Chairperson asked Mrs Joshi to select 10 schools from each region and give a list to Mr Ekka who will get hold of their returns for last 03 years in the next 15 days and hand these over along with other desired documents to Mr. Sood. Mr. Sood sought 15 days to complete the exercise.

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4) The Chairperson asked Mr. Anil from NIC whether it would be feasible to create a web site in which if a school does not fill up specified information or if there is a mismatch between data filled up, say for eg. there is mismatch between expenditure shown on salary and the number of employees in the school, a default report will flash up. She further clarified that the idea was not to catch defaulters but to guide them in maintaining proper accounts. Mr. Anil was quite positive about the idea and sought 15 days to work on this.

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At the outset Mr. Jain informed that there are nearly 1950 private unaided schools recognized by DoE and MCD. He further informed that an equally large number schools catering mainly to pre-primary classes are functioning in Delhi as un-recognized schools. He expressed concern about:

- a) Under MPD21 minimum area for a primary school was 800 sq.mts. But most of the nursery schools particularly those in rural areas are running from a much small area. As required under the provisions of RTE all schools shall have to seek recognition. Since most of the schools will not be able to fulfill the land norm, they shall have to be closed down thus jeopardizing the fate of thousands of children who were studying in these neighbourhood schools.
- b) People are mis-using the provision of action against corporal punishment under RTE. There have been incidents where parents and children have used this provision to harass the school authorities. There have been incidents where parents have lodged false FIR against the school as a result of which school has to face a lot of problems. Schools were being harassed by various authorities and schools are unable to find whether they are answerable to them or not. Moreover this was causing indiscipline in schools.

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- c) The schools which till date have been recognized up to primary ,middle or secondary should be given permission to run middle, secondary or senior secondary respectively in second shift and should be granted recognition for the same ( he preferred to call it broken recognition ).
- d) The school management should be given free hand in terminating the services of any employee because they are the appointing authority.
- e) The schools which are charging very low fee, a fact recognized even by Bansal Committee, cannot pay salary as per government norms to their employees. So Section 10 of DSEAR 73 should be amended.
- f) Under RTE apart from EWS category another category of disadvantaged groups has been created. This was putting a lot of pressure on private unaided schools and ultimately the burden is passed on to parents.
- g) Presence of political persons in the management committees of aided schools will vitiate the atmosphere of the schools . This provision of RTE needs to be amended .
- Electricity charges and property tax etc are charged from unaided schools at commercial rates. It should be same as for government schools.
- Aided / Unaided schools manager should be given a salary because it is a full time job. In the absence of remuneration it is difficult for anyone to devote full time to the school.
- 2) The Chairperson gave him a patient hearing and informed him that most of the issues raised have already been addressed. As regards land norms the matter will be soon discussed with DDA. She also explained the idea of Grievance Redressal Committee where the aggrieved party may go for grievance redressal and then may go in appeal before the Tribunal. As regards harassment by police, she asked Mr. Jain to prepare details of such cases alongwith the copies of FIRs and also the section under which police took action. Only then the committee would be able to make appropriate recommendations. She asked Mr. Jain to prepare a detailed note on all the issues discussed .The Chairperson also expressed her desire to visit some of such unrecognized schools particularly in slum/unauthorised colonies. Mr. Jain agreed to draw out the plan.

At the outset the DDEs enumerated the issues that frequently come up in respect of aided schools:

- Enrolment in a large number of aided schools is falling because of their falling standards.
   Except for a few the results of most of the aided schools was less than of government schools.
- A large number of aided schools have opened an unaided unrecognized primary school in the same premises. The managements are more interested in running the unaided school at the cost of aided school.
- 3) Managements are unable to raise funds for the upkeep of the school.
- 4) The amount paid to aided schools for the electricity, water or telephone bill of the school is not sufficient. Most of the managements find it difficult to raise resources to cover those costs.



- In -service training is not done for teachers of aided schools as a result of which the teachers are unable to update themselves. This affects their results.
- 6) There are some managements which explicitly express their desire to close down the aided school and instead run an unaided school. Since the department does not give them permission therefore, the management purposely lets the enrolment fall to an non-viable number.
- 7) There a maximum number of complaints at the time of recruitment of teachers. In spite of detail instructions for recruitment process, vested interests do play a role. It would most appropriate if the recruitment of teachers is handed over to DSSSB.
- 8) Aided schools should be given one time maintenance grant so that safety of children is ensured. Even amounts given for recurring expenditure should be enhanced so that schools are able to meet these essential expenses.
- 9) Often more than one managing committee put up the claim of being the genuine managing committee. This mainly happens when the recruitment of teachers is about to begin. There is no provision under the existing Act to take action in such disputes which affects the academic atmosphere of the school.

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- 10) When managements do not comply with the directions given by the Director, the only penalty clause available in the existing Act is stoppage of grant-in aid which affects only the employees of the school. Some penalty clause should be inserted for manager. The Chairperson desired that:
- Data be compiled regarding the schools which are on government land and the schools which are on private land.
- Even if the land is private the conditions under which the society was allowed to run school should be found out.
- Categorisation of the schools on the basis of their results and enrolment for last three years be done so that a proper view may be taken.
- 4. Action taken by Dte. by way of show-cause notices etc when schools were setting up dual unrecognised schools in the school area and failing to fulfil their obligations. Is action taken invariably? With what outcome? Copies of typical letters written / action taken to be asked for by the Member Secy.

She suggested that just as CBSE is conducting Teacher Eligibility Test for the candidates who want to apply for the post of Assistant Teacher and Trained Graduate Teacher, SCERT may be asked to conduct a similar eligibility test for those who want to apply for the post of PGTs Aided Schools may then be asked to select only from candidates that have cleared the test.

As regards the problem of disregard of repeated complaints made to land owning agencies against managements of aided schools having opened an unaided school in the same premises the Chairperson asked for the copies of correspondences made to the land-allotting agency by the department to see whether the steps taken were adequate and whether a legal solution was at all required.

The meeting ended with vote of thanks.

The Chairperson explained to them the issues taken up by the committee till date and sought their opinion on these. The issues discussed were —

- As per recruitment rules for assistant teachers in aided schools, the essential
  qualification is B.Ed while for government school teachers it is JBT/ ETT.In case the
  committee makes recommendation for amending RR for aided schools to bring them at
  par with those for government schools, will it be possible for SCERT to impart training
  to a large number of assistant teachers already employed in aided schools.
- Is it possible for SCERT to conduct some test on the lines of TET (Teachers Eligibility Test) for candidates desirous for applying for the post of PGT in aided schools?
- In case it is feasible for SCERT to hold this test, then it may suggest not only the organogram for conducting this test but also the legal and administrative requirement for doing it. Financial implications for doing it to may be indicated.
- 4. One of the reasons for falling results of most of the aided schools given by the officers of the department in one of the meetings held with them is that their teachers are not provided in- service training in their subjects so they are not able to update themselves.

Ms Rashmi Krishnan, Director SCERT informed that NCTE (National Council for Teacher Education) has already laid down a training programme for teachers taking classes up to elementary level. She was also positive about holding eligibility test, if asked, for PGTs. She said that it was feasible to take such tests through computers and agreed to work out the details., However as regards in-service training for teachers of aided schools Ms Pratibha, Jt.Director SCERT informed that in past such in-service training programmes were organized for aided school teachers. She suggested that it was more necessary to conduct training programme for teachers of unaided schools.

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Ms Krishnan further informed that there were many complaints of increasing indiscipline among school children. Since a conference of a few Heads of Schools was going on in the premises of SCERT, the Chairperson expressed her desire to interact with them to which she agreed.

The Chairperson told them that her purpose was to ascertain whether the account of growing indiscipline were really serious or whether these were minor aberrations and the problem was peripheral in nature. Ms Jyoti Gulati, Principal of SV Jangpura, stressed that the stories of indiscipline were real. She said that parents have become outrageous in their behaviour. They want to enroll their child in the school but do not want to fulfil their duties. They take advantage of the word 'mental harassment' in RTE to pressurize school authorities.

Other Principals too corroborated her statement. Some of them were of the view that the no detention policy up to VIII is causing main harm because there is no deterrence of attendance nor of examination.

Some Principals were of the view that though the system of CCE introduced from class IX onwards is very good ideally yet it is not workable when classes are full upto brim. It was just not possible for a teacher to give individual attention to children when there nearly 100 students in every class.

A representative of an NGO working in schools of Gujarat explained how they were trying to make CCE more useful and workable in schools.

In the end the Chairperson thanked them for sharing their experience with her and assured them that she would try to make necessary recommendations to the Government.

At the outset Mrs. Kataria was asked about the problems faced by MCD in the management of its schools. Mrs. Kataria informed that :

- There were 400 aided and 700 unaided schools in the jurisdiction of MCD.
- These schools were not among the high profile schools and as such they did not face much problem with these schools.
- 3) There is no case of employees of private schools before the Tribunal.
- 4) That to solve the problem of shortage of teachers in government schools MCD engages contract teachers who are paid basic pay plus grade pay. Selection of teachers is done on the basis of their achievement in X, XII and training which are given 25%, 45% and 30% weight age respectively.
- 5) Some problem comes while making appointments in aided schools. It would be appropriate if their selection too is handed over to DSSSB. Moreover there were some managements which wished to close down the aided schools.
- 6) Due to shortage of inspecting staff inspections of unaided schools was not done. However, inspection of government and aided schools is done.
- No problem is faced in the implementation of 25% quota of admission under RTE.

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The Chairperson posed the following specific question to Mrs. Kataria:

i) How many aided schools were running on government allotted land?

ii) How many inspections are done in each category of schools? The reasons for not

inspecting every school annually be given.

iii) What is the total number of unrecognized schools in the jurisdiction of MCD?

iv) Where do the children of these unrecognized schools get admitted? Approximate figures be given for the children getting admission in government schools and the number going

to unaided schools.

v) Status of unrecognized schools vis a vis the criterion laid down under RTE for recognition

as given in schedule be given in which it may be mentioned how many are fulfilling the laid

down criterion up to say 80%, 60% or 50% and whether they will be able to meet infrastructural

facilities within the specified time of three years.

vi) It was explained to her that under RTE all schools have to seek recognition. The main

hurdle that most of the schools are going to face is regarding land because a very few schools

possess 800 sq. mts. of land. Therefore, Director Education, MCD has to send a note on the need

to review land norm because 90% of unrecognized schools are primary schools and they are

catering to the need of nearly one lakh children This note can then be sent to DDA to be placed

before review committee for MPD21.

The Director was also asked to comment on the feasibility of conditions of recognition

imposed by RTE on the basis of actual conditions prevailing in these schools so that the Review

Committee could dwell on the periodical aspect.

The Chairperson asked Mrs. Kataria to sent all the details within 10 days. Meeting

ended with vote of thanks to all.

.At the outset the Chairperson welcomed the Principals and then sought their opinion on the following issues-

- Which factors should be taken into consideration for fee-regulation of private unaided schools?
- 2. How to make the whole school system more transparent and answerable to stakeholders without letting them too much interference in day to day affairs of school administration?



She explained to them that the purpose was not to stifle the autonomy of private schools. Rather the purpose was to make the schools a living identity so that all information pertaining to it is available just on a click of mouse. For e.g. creation of a web-site in which schools may be asked to put up all the details like no. of classes, sections, no. of teachers engaged and their qualification, teacher-pupil ratio fee schedule etc. Making it mandatory for every school to fill up these details would itself be a deterrent from making false statement.

The Principals appreciated the idea but stressed that such a system may lead to harassment of schools by unscrupulous people. The Chairperson allayed their fears on the ground that pass-word of such web-site shall only be with stakeholders. It was also pointed out that there might be many schools which do not have computer facility. However this problem could be solved if a group of such schools hire a computer and get all data entered.

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As regards Fee-Regulatory body the Principals were initially opposed to the idea because in their opinion when fee is decided by managing committee in which department's nominee is also present, there is hardly any need of such a body. However when their attention was brought to Para 65 of the judgment in CWP7777 of 2009 where the hon'ble court has directed that such a regulatory body be set up by government, they acquiesced to this idea. But they emphasized that such a regulatory body must be truly conceptual in nature and not the one to take away autonomy of schools to decide their fee structure.

The Chairperson explained to them that the process was already followed in Department of Higher Education. Though they have devised their own mechanism by way of which weightage is given to different factors, on the same pattern a set of factors can be worked out for private schools that may determine the fee structure of schools. She sought their views in working out such factors.

The Principals stressed that members of private unaided schools must be included in such a fee regulatory committee. They also expressed their apprehension that since unlike in higher education the number of schools is very large, this whole exercise may be time consuming and may not finish before the beginning of new session.

The Chairperson further explained to them that schools may be asked to fill up two forms-form1 in which the school shall fill up details like no. of classes, no. of sections, teacher-pupil ratio, no. of teachers at each level and their qualifications and the infrastructural facilities available with the school; form2 in which the schools may fill up financial details of income and major expenditure. NIC is being asked to develop a web-site where any mis-match between two forms shall be flashed and further action may be taken. Chartered accountants may be empanelled by the department to look into the financial returns of a few such schools and make a thorough examination.

Mr. S.L.Jain informed the Chairperson that the department had long back constituted a committee for determining fee- structure of private schools and this committee had developed some Proforma for the purpose. The Chairperson asked him to send the Proforma for consideration.

In the end The Chairperson thanked them for their valuable suggestions.

At the outset the Chairperson welcomed the representatives of NGOs- Save the Children and SARTHAK Advocates & Solicitors. She explained to them the purpose of the committee and its constraints that it cannot suggest any changes in RTE because it was a central act. However she sought their suggestions for changes that might be incorporated in DSEAR.

The representatives informed that they had carried out a survey regarding implementation of RTE. They wanted to explain the shortfalls in its implementation and also the changes that need to be incorporated in DSEAR so that both the Acts got tuned to each other. For this purpose they sought time and date to give power point presentation.

The Chairperson appreciated their efforts and fixed 13-9-11 for power point presentation at 2pm. prior to that she asked them to mail their slides of power point to Review Committee mail ID and to the personal mail ID of Abha Joshi. The representatives accepted the proposal and the meeting ended with vote of thanks to them.

Next meeting was held at 4.00 p.m. with Ms Mani Gupta and Mr. Abhishek representing Sarthak an association of lawyers working for the cause of education.

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The Chairperson explained to them the terms of reference of the committee and also its constraints. She then sought in brief their views on the issues. Ms. Mani stressed that DSEAR was poorly worded in the sense that it does not clearly specify the things that are prohibited as a result of which people have been finding the ways to circumvent its provisions. She also stressed that there was need to tune both the Acts.

The suggestions given by them in their mail were briefly discussed. One new idea given by them was that companies registered under section 25 of Companies Act should be allowed to open schools because these are much more transparent and better regulated. According to them the traditional societies or trusts are not financially transparent and often take recourse to shoddy means to cover up financial bungling. On the other hand companies registered under section 25 are strictly regulated because liability of any irregularity lies on Directors of the company.

The Chairperson asked them to prepare a two page note on this issue giving examples and also highlight relative merit and demerits of such a system over the prevailing one. Mr Abhishek further pointed out how due to lack of clear directions many schools have been diverting funds in a surreptitious manner. To prevent this, contour of diversion need to be clearly specified in the Act itself. The Chairperson appreciated their ideas and asked them to prepare a note on what should be included in balance sheet of a school so that the scope of financial mismanagement is minimized.

Ms. Mani Gupta and Mr. Abhishek agreed to prepare both the notes and submit it to the committee within one week.

The meeting ended with vote of thanks to them.

The Chairperson gave an idea to the invitees about the terms and conditions of the Review Committee. She also explained to them that the committee was expected to dwell on all aspects of the running of private schools- aided and unaided. She asked the officials present to throw light on the issues which were most crucial for aided schools and also to give suggestions to deal with problems faced by aided schools so that their deterioration could be stalled and the standard restored to their earlier primacy.

Dr. Kanwal gave a brief history of the aided schools and their gradual downfall due to change in social aspirations of people, change in the attitude of management which was no longer inspired by philonthropy and the step-motherly treatment of the Department. It was accepted that the aided schools were catering to that segment of society which cannot pay fees levied by unaided schools.

The Chairperson explained to them that the Review Committee was of opinion that aided schools be assisted financially as per the existing provisions but it should be in an upfront manner i.e the schools would have to fill up all details of money received, projects undertaken and amount spent. They shall also have to acquire arm's length certificate from a chartered accountant. It was agreed that the government should pay contingent grant on electricity, water etc on actual expenditure or also allow some resources to be raised to pay for the same as donations had dried up.

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Mr. Ahuja stressed that it was very difficult for management to collect 5% amount as its share towards salaries and in fact this contribution is raised by the employees themselves. They also argued that the government abolished all fees and pupil fund in aided schools treating them at par with its own schools but it did not give them any funds to conduct the Annual function, publish a magazine or excursions which are an integral part of education. Government provide funds to its own schools to carry out these very functions. Thus children of aided schools are deprived of these. It was agreed that aided schools should be allowed to levy fees and pupil fund from children. They assured that parents would be willing to pay these charges because this was a pittance as compared to fees paid in unaided schools

The Chairperson agreed with their proposal and was of opinion that aided schools were providing service to the society and drawing analogy with government hospitals which charge a nominal amount for special service, she felt that aided schools should be allowed to levy fee upto a maximum of Rs.150/pm from children of class IX onwards. The amount collected could be used for meeting 5% share of management. Moreover since the government was not allocating them funds to carry out curricular activities, pupil fund should be revived. The schools should even be allowed to levy admission fee from class IX onwards. However, it shall have to be ensured that all expenditures are placed on web-site for all stake- holders to see and all accounts would need to be audited.

The Chairperson sought their opinion on the action to be taken where enrolment was falling and management was no longer willing to run the school. The unanimous opinion was that a threshold enrolment as per post fixation norms be fixed and management be given three years time to improve it failing which if the land is government allotted, it should be returned to the government. If the land is private then too the management be given three years time to improve failing which its land and assets may be taken over by paying compensation at the rate of depreciation as quoted in balance sheet.

Similar unanimity was in the matter of schools which were in taken over state for more than 5 years that section 20 be amended to take over the land and assets of the school if no genuine proposal comes at the expiry of the term to take back the school.

In the end the Chairperson thanked all of them and meeting came to an end.

The Chairperson welcomed the two professionals from the institute and then explained to them the issue before the Review Committee i.e. the preparation of standard financial return performs which the private unaided schools may be asked to fill up on line followed by hard copy as well as audited returns. She also asked them to quote their charges for examining the financial returns of those schools where major irregularity will be detected.

Mr. Singh told that the Institute was ready to assist the committee in developing the financial return performa free of cost however as regards fee for scrutiny, he assured to submit the same in writing within a few days.

The Chairperson thanked them for their offer.

The Chairperson at the outset explained to them the issues which the committee has already dealt with and the proposed solutions for each. She then asked them to give a bird's eye-view of the issue which still need to be considered or any aberrations committed by private schools that need to be addressed.

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Mr. Aggarwal first of all pointed out the issue of job security of employees of private unaided schools. He informed that recently Hon'ble court had held that under the existing provision an employee could be kept under probation as long as managing committee desired because the rule 105 was not properly worded. In his opinion after two years an employee should be deemed confirmed.

As regards imposing pecuniary penalty on schools he desired that in the corresponding rules it may be clearly mentioned that the amount would in no case be charged from school funds nor would it be passed on to children and if anyone was found doing so, he would be liable for criminal offence. He wanted that such fine must be on the concerned person or on the society.

As regards fee-regulatory committee he informed the Review Committee that TamilNadu had framed a separate Act for this purpose which has been upheld even by Hon'ble Apex court. The Chairperson asked him to provide a copy of the same.

Mr. Aggarwal was critical of the those private schools which were perpetuating luxurious cultures in schools and thus making schools less affordable to middle cl-ass. He stressed that the fee should be determined keeping in view the paying capacity of middle cl-ass. He also asserted that the Government should take it upon itself to make people aware of the ill-effects of such luxuries like airconditioned class-rooms on health of children.

In the end Mr. Aggarwal emphasized that all the policies should be child-centric as propounded by Ganguly Committee. He also desired that government schools too should be brought under the ambit of the act and agreed to work out a proposal on this. The Chairperson thanked him for his valuable inputs and meeting ended.

The group wanted to present power-point presentation on difference between provisions of RTE and DSEAR'73. Their aim was to highlight the area where there are glaring inconsistencies.

The Chairperson asked them to point out in brief such areas. The representatives stressed on following issues-

- Provisions of Corporal punishment still exists in DSEAR'73.
- 2) There should be a provision in RTE for school Managing Committee in unaided schools for monitoring and planning if this was not possible then at least 25% representation be given to parents of EWS children in PTA of the school.
- If amended in RTE is not possible then parent representative of EWS children be given a place in school managing committee under rule 59.
- Fee regulation mechanism be set up.
- Representative of this Association be assigned duty to monitor EWS admission.
- There should be full fine teachers for core subjects.

The representatives offered to submit a copy of CAG report on financial anomalies by private schools.

The Chairperson thanked them for their suggestions and meeting ended.

# The framework for school inspection


The framework for school inspection in England under section 5 of the Education Act 2005, from September 2009

The framework for school inspection shows how the general principles and processes are applied to inspections of maintained schools and several other types of school in England. It sets out the statutory basis for inspection and summarises the main features of school inspections carried out under section 5 of the Education Act 2005 from September 2009.

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#### Introduction

#### What is the purpose of school inspection?

- The inspection of a school provides an independent external evaluation of its
  effectiveness and a diagnosis of what it should do to improve, based upon a
  range of evidence including that from first-hand observation. Ofsted's school
  inspection reports present a written commentary on the outcomes achieved and
  the quality of a school's provision (especially the quality of teaching and its
  impact on learning), the effectiveness of leadership and management and the
  school's capacity to improve.
- 2. Ofsted's inspections of schools perform three essential functions. They:
  - provide parents¹ with information; this informs their choices and preferences about the effectiveness of the schools their children attend or may attend in the future
  - keep the Secretary of State (and parliament) informed about the work of schools. This provides assurance that minimum standards are being met; provides confidence in the use of public money; and assists accountability
  - promote the improvement of individual schools, and the education system as a whole.

#### How does inspection promote improvement?

- 3. The inspection of a school promotes improvement by:
  - setting expectations: the criteria and descriptors set out in the inspection framework and guidance illustrate the standards of performance and effectiveness expected of schools
  - increasing the school's confidence by endorsing its own view of its effectiveness when that is accurate, and offering a sharp challenge (and the impetus to act) where improvement is needed
  - recommending priorities for future action by the school and, when appropriate, checking subsequent progress
  - fostering constructive dialogue between inspectors and the senior leaders and staff of the school
  - complementing the school's self-evaluation and promoting its rigour, thereby enhancing the school's capacity to improve.

- 4. The general principles and processes which underpin all Ofsted's inspection and regulatory work are set out in an over-arching framework: *Ofsted inspects: a framework for all Ofsted inspection and regulation.*<sup>2</sup>
- 5. The framework for school inspection shows how these general principles and processes are applied to inspections of maintained schools and several other types of school in England.<sup>3</sup> It sets out the statutory basis for inspection and summarises the main features of the school inspections that are taking place in England from September 2009.
- 6. More detailed guidance is available on Ofsted's website in *The evaluation* schedule for schools and *Conducting school inspections*. From time to time, further guidance is published to supplement or update these core documents.

# What are the key features of this framework and the school inspection arrangements from September 2009?

- 7. Under the revised school inspection arrangements from September 2009 inspectors give particular priority to:
  - promoting improvement: inspectors make specific recommendations based on their diagnosis of the school's strengths and weaknesses
  - evaluating the achievement and wider well-being of pupils as a whole and of different groups of pupils, and assessing the extent to which schools ensure that all pupils, including those most at risk, succeed
  - evaluating learning and teaching: inspectors spend a high proportion of their on-site inspection time in the classroom
  - assessing how well schools promote equality of opportunity, and how effectively they tackle discrimination
  - checking schools' procedures for safeguarding keeping children and young people from harm
  - fostering the engagement of headteachers, schools' staff and governors in the process of inspection so that they understand the judgements made
  - gathering, analysing and taking into account the views of parents and pupils
  - assessing how effectively schools work in partnership with other providers in order to promote better outcomes for pupils.
- 8. The revised inspection arrangements also extend the principle of proportionality, in that the frequency of inspection is proportionate to need.

#### How is this document structured?

- 9. *The framework for school inspection* has three sections.
  - Part A: The school inspection system. This section sets out the principles and legal framework for inspection and provides information about the timing and frequency of inspections.
  - Part B: The focus of school inspections. This section summarises the evaluation schedule the judgements that inspectors make.
  - Part C: The process of inspection. This section explains how inspections are carried out.

#### Part A: The school inspection system

#### What are the legal requirements for the inspection of schools?

- 10. Under section 5 of the Education Act 2005, schools are required to be inspected at prescribed intervals and inspectors must report on:
  - the quality of the education provided in the school
  - how far the education meets the needs of the range of pupils at the school
  - the educational standards achieved in the school
  - the quality of the leadership in and management of the school, including whether the financial resources made available to the school are managed effectively
  - the spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the pupils at the school
  - the contribution made by the school to the well-being<sup>4</sup> of those pupils
  - the contribution made by the school to community cohesion.
- 11. In addition, the Education and Inspections Act 2006 requires Ofsted to carry out its work in ways which encourage the services it inspects and regulates to:
  - improve
  - be user-focused
  - be efficient and effective in the use of resources.
- 12. Regulations that apply from September 2009 require all maintained schools to be inspected within five school years<sup>5</sup> of the end of the school year in which they were last inspected. This inspection framework applies to all maintained schools, including special schools and pupil referral units. It also covers academies,<sup>6</sup> city technology colleges, city colleges for the technology of the arts and some non-maintained special schools in England. It does not apply to any other independent schools.
- 13. Some schools are designated by the Secretary of State as having a religious character under section 69(3) of the School Standards and Framework Act 1998. The content of collective worship and denominational education in such

- schools is inspected separately under section 48 of the Education Act 2005. The governing body, in consultation with its associated faith body, is responsible for arranging the section 48 inspection and can seek to have this coincide with the school's section 5 inspection.
- 14. Early years registered provision is inspected under section 49 of the Childcare Act 2006. Where the provision is managed by the school, the section 49 inspection is carried out concurrently with the section 5 inspection and the quality of the provision reported in a single inspection report. However, where registered provision on a school's site is managed by a private, voluntary and/or independent provider, it is inspected separately under the Childcare Act 2006; in these circumstances the inspection is scheduled to take place at the same time as the school's section 5 inspection, whenever possible.

#### What determines the timing of a school's inspection?

- 15. From September 2009, Ofsted is varying the frequency of schools' inspections depending upon the results of their previous inspections and an annual assessment of their subsequent performance. The latter involves an analysis of the school's public performance data. It also includes the views of parents, pupils and others and from 2010, the views of parents will influence the choice of which schools are to be inspected. Where the data are not available or are inconclusive, the school's previous inspection report is analysed.
- 16. From September 2009, schools judged good or outstanding at their previous inspection are inspected at approximately five-year intervals unless:
  - the annual assessment of their performance suggests that they should be inspected earlier
  - safeguarding and/or welfare concerns suggest they should be inspected earlier
  - Ofsted has received and investigated a qualifying complaint<sup>7</sup> about a school, which, taken alongside other available evidence, suggests that it would be appropriate to bring forward the school's inspection
  - they are part of an annual sample selected to ensure that the Annual Report of Her Majesty's Chief Inspector (HMCI) reflects evidence from a cross-section of schools of all types, phases and effectiveness
  - they are part of a 'statutory hard federation' or share important aspects of their provision, thereby making it necessary and/or desirable to inspect schools in the 'partnership' at the same time
  - they are:

- a special school
- a pupil referral unit
- a school with residential provision
- a school with registered provision for 0–3-year-old children.
- 17. If Ofsted decides that a school previously judged good or outstanding is not to be inspected three school years from the end of the school year in which its last section 5 inspection took place, Ofsted will publish an interim assessment. The interim assessment will be published after a factual accuracy check by the school and the school will be required to send the assessment to others (see paragraphs 86–87). It provides a summary of key information about the school and explains why the school will not be inspected for the year following the date of the interim assessment.<sup>8</sup> This interim assessment may be superseded by the proposed School Report Card.
- 18. Schools which were judged satisfactory at their previous inspection are inspected within three school years from the end of the school year in which that inspection took place. A significant proportion of these schools will receive monitoring inspections to check on their progress following their last full inspection.
- 19. Schools judged inadequate in their overall effectiveness continue to receive monitoring visits. They are reinspected after a specific period. (See paragraphs 29–30.)
- 20. Inspections can take place at any point after the end of the first complete week of the autumn term. If a primary or nursery school has a new intake of pupils at the beginning of the spring or summer term, Ofsted does not inspect that school in the first full week of the term.
- 21. In exceptional circumstances specified in Ofsted's 'deferral policy', and following a request by the school, an inspection might be cancelled or deferred after it has been scheduled. Normally, however, if pupils are receiving education in the school, an inspection goes ahead even if, for example, the headteacher is out of school or building work is taking place.

#### What are the principles of inspection?

- 22. The overarching principles of Ofsted's inspection and regulation are set out in *Ofsted inspects*. They apply to all inspections carried out by, or on behalf of, Ofsted. The principles are intended to ensure that:
  - Ofsted's statutory duties are carried out efficiently and effectively

- the interests of children, young people and parents are foremost
- the findings of inspection contribute to improvement
- full account is taken of Ofsted's policies on safeguarding, equality and diversity.
- 23. Ofsted's principles for the inspection of maintained schools set out below are based on those in *Ofsted inspects*.

#### Ofsted's principles: school inspection

School inspection acts in the interests of children, young people, their parents and employers. It encourages high-quality provision that meets diverse needs and promotes equality. The following principles apply to school inspection. School inspections will:

#### Support and promote improvement by:

- adjusting the focus and type of inspection to have the greatest impact
- ensuring inspections are of high quality and rigorous
- identifying precise actions to underpin recommendations.

#### Be proportionate by:

- adjusting the frequency of inspection according to the outcomes of previous inspection reports and risk assessment
- deploying resources where improvement is most needed or where inspection can add most value.

#### Focus on pupils' and parents' needs by:

- taking account of pupils' and parents' views when Ofsted plans and carries out inspections
- drawing on pupils' and parents' views to inform inspectors' judgements and the outcomes of inspection
- minimising the risk to children, young people and adults by evaluating the effectiveness of schools' procedures for safeguarding
- evaluating the work of schools in eliminating discrimination, promoting equal opportunities and encouraging good race relations
- encouraging schools to strive to meet the diverse needs of all pupils.

#### Focus on the needs of schools by:

- providing high-quality and timely communication with schools
- making use as far as possible of the existing documentation and systems of the schools inspected and avoiding placing unnecessary burdens on them
- taking account of schools' self-evaluation.

#### Be transparent and consistent by:

■ making clear and transparent judgements based on sound evidence

- inspecting and reporting with integrity
- having clear success criteria, procedures and guidance which are well understood by schools and users and are readily available.

#### Be accountable by:

- reporting the outcomes of inspection without fear or favour
- publishing clear, accurate, timely reports which provide parents with an authoritative, independent assessment of the quality of education provided by the school, thereby informing parents' choice of school
- striving to inform inspection activities by gathering the views of pupils and parents and those who have a significant interest in the school.

#### **Demonstrate value for money by:**

- targeting inspection resources and deploying them effectively and efficiently
- evaluating the outcomes and processes of inspection and making improvements where necessary.

# What is the relationship between school self-evaluation and inspection?

24. Self-evaluation is now a well-established activity in maintained schools, providing the basis for their planning for development and improvement. Inspection takes account of and contributes to a school's self-evaluation.

### Who inspects schools?

Her Majesty's Inspectors (HMI) are employed directly by Ofsted. They lead a high proportion of secondary school inspections and a substantial minority of primary school inspections. Other inspections are led by additional inspectors who are recruited, trained, assessed and employed directly, or contracted by, inspection service providers. These are independent commercial organisations contracted by Ofsted to provide inspection services, and they have responsibility for the administrative arrangements for inspections. Ofsted prescribes the qualifications and experience required by additional inspectors, the initial and continuing training that they should receive, and the standards that they are required to meet. Ofsted also publishes the names of additional inspectors. Additional inspectors are authorised to conduct an inspection of a school under section 5 where the inspection is supervised by an HMI, or where the additional inspector has previously conducted a section 5 inspection under the supervision of an HMI and to the satisfaction of the HMI. Ofsted also quality assures section 5 inspections (paragraph 73) and all section 5 inspection reports are signed off by HMI (paragraph 80).

# What inspection grades are used by inspectors when they make judgements?

26. All school inspections carried out by Ofsted use the same grading scale:

■ Grade 1: outstanding

■ Grade 2: good

Grade 3: satisfactoryGrade 4: inadequate

#### What happens to schools judged to be inadequate?

- 27. Many schools emerge with credit from their inspections. A few, though, raise concerns. If inspectors judge that a school's overall effectiveness is inadequate, they must then decide whether it requires special measures or requires significant improvement (commonly known as a notice to improve). These two categories of schools causing concern are defined below:
  - Special measures: the school is failing to give its pupils an acceptable standard of education, and the persons responsible for leading, managing or governing the school are not demonstrating the capacity to secure the necessary improvement in the school.
  - Notice to improve: the school requires significant improvement, because either:
    - it is failing to provide an acceptable standard of education, but is demonstrating the capacity to improve, or
    - it is not failing to provide an acceptable standard of education but is performing significantly less well than it might in all the circumstances reasonably be expected to perform.
- 28. These judgements are subject to moderation by senior HMI, and HMCI signs off all judgements of special measures. A school made subject to special measures is not permitted to appoint newly qualified teachers without prior permission from Ofsted.

## Part B: The focus of school inspections

# What are the key features of the evaluation schedule of judgements for school inspections?

29. What follows is a summary of the key features of the full evaluation schedule of judgements, which is published separately. The full evaluation schedule sets out the aspects of a school's performance and effectiveness that inspectors must evaluate. It provides **outline guidance** about sources of evidence and contains **grade descriptors** for each judgement.

# Summary of the evaluation schedule of judgements for school inspections

30. The full evaluation schedule of judgements covers the broad range of a school's work. Inspectors make judgements about outcomes for pupils, the quality of the school's provision, its leadership and management and capacity to improve, and also its overall effectiveness. The judgements as they are reflected in the full evaluation schedule are shown in the shaded boxes below. The first shaded section in the evaluation schedule deals with seven main judgements for pupils' outcomes.

#### The seven judgements for pupils' outcomes

- 31. There are seven main judgements about **pupils' outcomes**, which take account of any variation between groups. These are the five Every Child Matters outcomes, pupils' behaviour, and their spiritual, moral, social and cultural development.
- 32. If the **pupils' achievement and the extent to which they enjoy their learning** are judged to be inadequate, the school's overall effectiveness is also likely to be judged inadequate.

#### The different judgements are as follows.

- 1. Pupils' achievement and the extent to which they enjoy their learning taking into account:
  - pupils' attainment
  - the quality of pupils' learning and their progress
  - the quality of learning for pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities and their progress
- 2. The extent to which pupils feel safe
- 3. Pupils' behaviour
- 4. The extent to which pupils adopt healthy lifestyles
- 5. The extent to which pupils contribute to the school and wider community
- 6. The extent to which pupils develop workplace and other skills that will contribute to their future economic well-being

taking into account:

- pupils' attendance
- 7. The extent of pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development

#### The provision

33. The three main judgements about the **effectiveness of the provision** relate to the quality of teaching, including the effective use of assessment, the curriculum, and the care, quidance and support provided by the school.

#### The provision judgements are as follows.

#### 1. The quality of teaching

taking into account:

- the use of assessment to support learning
- 2. The extent to which the curriculum meets pupils' needs, including, where relevant, through partnerships
- 3. The effectiveness of care, guidance and support

#### Leadership and management

- 34. Inspectors make eight main judgements that relate to the **effectiveness of the leadership and management** of the school.
- 35. Where a school is judged to be inadequate in relation to the **quality of the school's procedures for safeguarding** and/or the extent to which the school **promotes equality and tackles discrimination**, inspectors treat these as 'limiting' judgements and the school's overall effectiveness is also likely to be judged inadequate.

The leadership and management judgements are as follows.

 The effectiveness of leadership and management in embedding ambition and driving improvement

taking into account:

- the effectiveness of the leadership and management of teaching and learning
- 2. The effectiveness of the governing body<sup>9</sup> in challenging and supporting the school so that weaknesses are tackled decisively and statutory responsibilities met
- 3. The effectiveness of the school's engagement with parents

- 4. The effectiveness of partnerships in promoting learning and well-being
- 5. The effectiveness with which the school promotes equal opportunity and tackles discrimination
- 6. The effectiveness of safeguarding procedures
- 7. The effectiveness with which the school promotes community cohesion
- 8. The effectiveness with which the school deploys resources to achieve value for money

#### **Early Years Foundation Stage**

36. Where relevant, inspectors make a judgement about the **effectiveness of the Early Years Foundation Stage**, taking important aspects of the school's work into account.

The Early Years Foundation Stage judgements contribute to the other judgements about the school and are as follows.

#### Overall effectiveness

taking into account:

- outcomes for children in the Early Years Foundation Stage
- the quality of provision in the Early Years Foundation Stage
- the effectiveness of leadership and management of the Early Years Foundation Stage

#### Sixth form

37. Where relevant, inspectors make a judgement about the **effectiveness of the sixth form,** again taking important aspects of the school's work into account.

The sixth form judgements contribute to the other judgements about the school and are as follows.

#### **Overall effectiveness**

taking into account:

- outcomes for students in the sixth form
- the quality of provision in the sixth form
- the effectiveness of leadership and management of the sixth form

#### **Boarding/residential provision**

38. Where relevant, inspectors make five judgements about the **effectiveness of boarding/residential provision**, including whether the school meets the appropriate national minimum standards.

The boarding/residential provision judgement contributes to the other judgements about the school and is as follows.

# Overall effectiveness of the boarding experience/Overall effectiveness of the residential experience

- outcomes for boarders/outcomes for residential pupils
- quality of boarding provision and care/quality of residential provision and care
- boarders' safety/residential pupils' safety
- leadership and management of boarding/leadership and management of the residential provision

#### The final three judgements that are made about a school

39. The three judgements that follow bring together all the judgements above. The judgement about the overall effectiveness of the school is the last judgement that inspectors make.

#### **Outcomes for individuals and groups of pupils**

40. Before making the judgement about a school's overall effectiveness, inspectors make two key judgements. The first is a judgement which brings together the separate outcomes judgements, called **outcomes for individuals and groups of pupils**. In making this overall outcomes judgement, inspectors weigh the significance of how well the pupils are doing across all of the seven outcomes judgements for pupils listed above (paragraph 34).

The overall outcomes judgement for individuals and groups of pupils is as follows.

Outcomes for individuals and groups of pupils

#### The school's capacity for sustained improvement

- 41. The second key judgement is about **the school's capacity for sustained improvement**. This reflects the effectiveness of leadership and management
  in securing improvement in the past and ensuring the school will continue to
  make progress. The capacity judgement takes the following into account:
  - the school's track record and whether this shows it has maintained outstanding performance or has been successful in improving teaching, other provision and outcomes for pupils since its last inspection
  - the school's self-evaluation and whether this provides the school with an accurate appraisal of its effectiveness, and whether its plans reflect what it needs to do to consolidate success and secure further improvement
  - the current leaders' and managers' effectiveness in tackling weaknesses and overcoming barriers to improvement.

The capacity to improve judgement is as follows.

The school's capacity for sustained improvement

#### **Overall effectiveness**

- 42. Before making the **overall effectiveness** judgement, inspectors must take all aspects of the school's work into account. **The overall effectiveness** judgement places a particularly strong emphasis on the outcomes for pupils and the school's capacity to improve. Inspectors must consider the following.
  - This is the final judgement, to take into account all of the available evidence.
  - Any limiting judgements are considered before the overall effectiveness judgement is made. These relate to the quality of the school's procedures for safeguarding, the extent to which the school promotes equality and tackles discrimination, and pupils' achievement.
  - Inspectors should consider fully the main judgements about outcomes for individuals and groups of pupils; the quality of provision, that is, teaching, the curriculum, care, guidance and support; and the school's capacity for sustained improvement, including leadership and management, **before** making the overall effectiveness judgement.

■ Any recommendations for improvement.

The overall effectiveness judgement is as follows.

Overall effectiveness: how good is the school?

### Part C: The process of inspection

#### What happens before the inspection?

#### When are schools notified of their inspection?

- 43. Schools receive between zero and two working days' notice of a section 5 inspection. The vast majority receive between one and two days' notice, and the contractor (inspection service provider) informs the school that it is to be inspected. Normally, lead inspectors make contact with the school as soon as possible after notification (and always within 24 hours of notification).
- 44. HMCI may arrange for an inspection of a school to take place without notice where there are particular reasons, for example, connected to pupils' welfare. Ofsted also inspects without notice where there are safeguarding concerns, where a school's academic standards have shown rapid decline, or where there is a strong 'voice' of concern raised by parents.
- 45. About 40% of schools judged to be satisfactory and all schools judged inadequate will receive monitoring visits. Monitoring inspections of satisfactory schools and schools with a notice to improve are conducted at very short notice as are the fourth and fifth monitoring inspections of schools in special measures. However, schools in special measures receive up to two days' notice for the first three monitoring inspections.

#### What information do inspectors use before the inspection?

- 46. Inspectors gain an understanding of the school and the issues for the inspection before they begin their work onsite, so that they can use their time in school as effectively as possible. Lead inspectors begin by reading and analysing the school's self-evaluation (if available), taking full account of the school's analysis of its own performance. This features strongly when the issues for inspection and plans for the deployment of the team are discussed with the school, although it does not limit the range of the inspectors' investigations should they have concerns about aspects of performance not raised by the school.
- 47. The lead inspector then prepares a concise pre-inspection briefing for the school and the inspection team using any self-evaluation evidence provided by the school and additional pre-inspection evidence from the following:
  - data from the most recent RAISEonline report
  - where relevant, the sixth form PANDA and any Framework for Excellence<sup>10</sup> performance indicators

- the report from the previous inspection
- the reports from any subject or aspect surveys carried out by Ofsted in the school
- the reports from any monitoring inspections carried out by Ofsted
- the reports from any section 48 inspection (see paragraph 13)
- information from any upheld complaints about the school from parents to Ofsted
- the results of any surveys showing the views of both the pupils and their parents
- any additional information the school wishes to bring to the inspectors' attention.

#### How do lead inspectors contact the school?

- 48. Within 24 hours of the school being made aware that it is to be inspected, the lead inspector contacts the headteacher or, in the absence of the headteacher, the most senior member of staff that is available. Pre-inspection activities and telephone contact with the school are intended to ensure that:
  - good communication and effective working relationships are established with the school
  - senior leaders and all staff are encouraged to engage with the inspection process so they understand the judgements being made
  - the demands on the school are kept to a minimum
  - pre-inspection evidence is analysed thoroughly and discussed
  - the issues for the inspection are identified and discussed
  - arrangements for the inspection are agreed (lead inspectors do not normally inform schools which lessons are to be visited, but brief meetings with key staff are agreed as quickly as possible).

# How do inspectors seek the views of registered parents, pupils and other partners about the school's work before and during inspection?

49. Once informed that an inspection is to take place, schools are required to take reasonable steps to notify parents, including registered parents of pupils who have been excluded or are away from school. Schools are also required to notify the local authority and Young People's Learning Agency. Ofsted provides governing bodies with a standard letter for the purpose of notifying parents. This is available in a range of community languages. The letter includes a brief questionnaire for parents, enabling them to provide their views of the school to inspectors. Responses to the questionnaire are returned, in confidence, to the lead inspector for analysis. Completed questionnaires are gathered by administrators and analysed by inspectors as early as possible in the inspection. If a parent should ask to see an inspector, the team does all it can to

- accommodate such requests, within the constraints on their time. When parents, pupils and staff meet inspectors, they should be able to do so in private.
- 50. During the inspection, inspectors talk with pupils including those from different groups and those holding representative responsibilities, for example as members of the school council. In addition, they gather the views of pupils during the inspection via a pupils' questionnaire.
- 51. Lead inspectors also take account of any external views of the school's performance. This may include the local authority's evaluation of the school's performance against its targets. In all cases the lead inspector asks to see and read the school improvement partner's latest monitoring report (or equivalent).
- 52. From September 2009 inspectors will be able to gather the views of staff through a questionnaire. However, participation in this type of survey is voluntary. If a staff survey is carried out, individual members of staff can elect not to participate. The views of staff are used to help inspectors plan the inspection but they are not normally reported in the inspection report.
- 53. Following the start of the new arrangements, surveys will be introduced to gather pupils' and parents' views between inspections, the latter being of vital importance in the new framework. Parents' views will also contribute to the information used by Ofsted to plan when schools should be inspected. In time, pupils' views might also be a key element in this process.

# What happens during the inspection?

#### How many days do inspectors spend in the school?

54. Inspections do not normally last longer than two days, but the number of inspectors involved varies according to the size and nature of the school.

#### How do inspectors use their time during the inspection?

- 55. The time allocated to on-site inspection is intended mainly for gathering first-hand evidence. It is not usually used for drafting the report. Lead inspectors ensure that:
  - sufficient evidence is gathered so that judgements about the school are secure and reliable
  - the main judgements about the school are agreed by the inspection team
  - teachers receive well-informed and helpful feedback on lessons observed
  - staff have opportunities for high-quality professional dialogue with inspectors

- the headteacher and other senior leaders receive well-informed and helpful feedback about the overall effectiveness of the school and the main findings of the inspection
- the school is left with full and clear recommendations for improvement.
- 56. Much of inspectors' time on site is spent observing lessons, the quality of teaching and pupils' learning. The observation of teaching and learning provides direct evidence for most aspects of the inspection judgements. It informs judgements about the outcomes for pupils, the effectiveness of provision, leadership and management and the school's capacity for improvement. It is also a major focus for the inspectors when setting out their detailed recommendations for improvement.
- 57. While on site, inspectors may also 'track' potentially vulnerable pupils, such as those with special educational needs, those with disabilities, those who are gifted and talented, and children in care. Inspectors give specific attention to the quality of learning for different groups of pupils, both in separate provision and within mainstream lessons. The particular groups to be tracked are identified in the pre-inspection briefing and/or through subsequent discussion with the school and in response to any emerging issues, for example from discussions with pupils.
- 58. Other first-hand evidence gathered by inspectors includes discussions with pupils and scrutiny of their work; scrutiny of school records, documentation and parents' questionnaires; and meetings with staff, governors and school partners where appropriate. Information held by the school must be made freely available for inspectors, and the school must cooperate in the inspectors' task of gathering evidence.

#### How is evidence recorded?

- 59. During the inspection, inspectors gather, analyse and record evidence and their judgements on evidence forms. The overall judgements made about the school are recorded by the lead inspector on a template included in the inspection report.
- 60. The evidence forms, together with any briefings, plans or instructions prepared by the lead inspector and the parents', pupils' and staff questionnaires, contribute to the evidence base for the inspection. The lead inspector is responsible for compiling and assuring the quality of the evidence base.

#### How are judgements secured?

61. The lead inspector has the responsibility for ensuring that judgements about the school are corporately agreed by the inspection team, with reference to the grade descriptors in the evaluation schedule, and that they are supported convincingly by evidence. Inspectors identify the strengths and weaknesses of the school and what it must do to improve. Emerging findings are discussed

- with the headteacher and, where appropriate, senior staff, at regular intervals. The headteacher is given every opportunity to provide further evidence should s/he wish to do so.
- 62. The overall judgements reflect all the evidence considered by the inspection team. Final judgements are made only when all first-hand evidence has been collected and considered. Final judgements represent the corporate view of the inspection team. They are subject to moderation prior to publication of the report.
- 63. At the end of the inspection, the team considers whether the school falls into either of the two categories of schools that are a cause for concern. The requirements are set out in Part A of this document, paragraphs 29–30. The final decision about whether a school is to be placed in a category takes place after the moderation process.

#### How do the headteacher and senior staff engage in the inspection?

- 64. Inspection has the strongest impact on school improvement when the school understands the evidence and findings that have led to the judgements. The lead inspector therefore ensures that the headteacher and senior staff:
  - are kept up-to-date with how the inspection is proceeding
  - understand how the inspection team reaches its judgements
  - have opportunities to clarify how evidence is used to reach judgements
  - are given the opportunity to present additional evidence.
- 65. Headteachers are invited to:
  - give their views on the issues for inspection as part of the pre-inspection discussions
  - participate in joint lesson observations, as agreed with the lead inspector
  - receive regular updates from the lead inspector

and, unless there are compelling reasons not to do so:

- attend the formal inspection team meetings at the end of each day of the inspection
- discuss the inspectors' recommendations to ensure that these are understood.
- 66. The headteacher's participation in such inspection activities as attendance at team meetings and participation in dual observations is not mandatory and s/he may choose whether or not to accept.

#### What is the code of conduct for inspectors?

67. Inspectors are required to uphold the highest professional standards in their work and to ensure that everyone they encounter during inspections is treated fairly and with respect. These standards are assured through a code of conduct which is set out below.

#### Inspectors' code of conduct

#### Inspectors should:

- evaluate objectively, be impartial and inspect without fear or favour
- evaluate provision in line with frameworks, national standards or requirements
- base all evaluations on clear and robust evidence
- have no connection with the provider which could undermine their objectivity
- report honestly and clearly, ensuring that judgements are fair and reliable
- carry out their work with integrity, treating all those they meet with courtesy, respect and sensitivity
- endeavour to minimise the stress on those involved in the inspection
- act in the best interests and well-being of service users
- maintain purposeful and productive dialogue with those being inspected, and communicate judgements clearly and frankly
- respect the confidentiality of information, particularly about individuals and their work
- respond appropriately to reasonable requests
- take prompt and appropriate action on any safeguarding or health and safety issues.
- 68. When inspectors meet pupils, parents, staff, governors and other stakeholders, every endeavour should be made to protect the origin of individuals' comments if they are used to pursue an issue further. However, there may be circumstances in which it is not possible to guarantee the anonymity of the interviewee. Additionally, inspectors have a duty to pass on disclosures which raise child protection or safeguarding issues and/or where serious misconduct or potential criminal activity is involved.

#### How should school staff engage with inspectors?

- 69. To ensure that inspection is productive and beneficial, it is important that inspectors and schools establish and maintain an appropriate working relationship based on courtesy and professional behaviour. Inspectors are expected to uphold the code of conduct but Ofsted also expects school staff to:
  - apply their own codes of conduct in their dealings with inspectors
  - enable inspectors to conduct their visit in an open and honest way
  - enable inspectors to evaluate the school objectively against the framework
  - provide evidence that will enable the inspector to report honestly, fairly and reliably about their provision
  - work with inspectors to minimise disruption, stress and bureaucracy

- ensure that the health and safety of inspectors is not prejudiced while they are on their premises
- maintain a purposeful dialogue with the inspector or the inspection team
- draw any concerns about the inspection to the attention of inspectors promptly and in a suitable manner
- understand the need of inspectors to observe practice and talk to staff and users without the presence of a manager.

#### What feedback do inspectors give during the inspection?

70. Inspectors offer oral feedback to teachers and other staff about the work they see in order to promote improvement. Constructive dialogue is essential between inspectors and staff, and particularly between the lead inspector and the headteacher.

#### How is the quality of inspection assured?

- 71. All inspectors are responsible for the quality of their work. Lead inspectors ensure that inspections are carried out in accordance with the principles of inspection and the code of conduct. In addition, Ofsted monitors the quality of inspections through a range of formal processes. Some schools are visited by an HMI or by a representative of the inspection service provider to assure the quality of the inspection. Their assessments are confidential to the inspectors and contractors concerned. In other cases the inspection evidence base may be evaluated.
- 72. Where an inspection report is judged by Ofsted to be seriously misleading, or an inspection is judged to be seriously flawed, the school is notified and may be re-inspected.
- 73. All schools are invited to take part in a post-inspection survey so that the views of headteachers, governors, staff and others are obtained and contribute to the development of inspection.

#### What happens after the inspection?

#### What feedback is provided to the school?

- 74. Before leaving the school, the lead inspector is required to ensure that the school is clear:
  - about the grades awarded for each judgement required under the evaluation schedule
  - that the grades awarded may be subject to change
  - that the main points provided orally in the feedback will be referred to in the text of the report
  - about the recommendations for improvement

- about the procedures leading to the publication of the report
- about the complaints procedure
- where relevant, about the implications of the school being deemed to require special measures, being given a notice to improve, or judged satisfactory overall.
- 75. After the inspection team has reached its conclusions, the judgements are discussed with a representative of the governing body and the senior leadership team. Any aspects that have been judged inadequate or outstanding (or where the judgement is different from that which the school might have expected), are explained in the feedback.

#### What are the written outcomes of the inspection?

- 76. Following the inspection, the lead inspector writes a report about the main findings of the inspection. The findings should be consistent with those explained orally to the school.
- 77. A brief letter to pupils is provided as an appendix to the report. This is addressed to the pupils and is aimed at the older pupils in the school. For schools with sixth forms, the letter is aimed at pupils in Key Stage 4, as sixth formers may be expected to read the full report.

#### How is the quality of inspection reports assured?

78. The lead inspector provides a first draft of the report to the inspection provider and, following editing, the inspection provider forwards the report to the school for a factual check. One working day is allocated to the school to comment on the draft, unless the school is placed in a category of concern, in which case five days are allowed for comments. The final report is 'signed off' by an HMI. Where a school has been placed in special measures HMCI signs off the report.

#### When is the report issued?

- 79. The report is published on Ofsted's website (www.ofsted.gov.uk/reports) within 15 working days of the end of the inspection.
- 80. For maintained schools, a copy of the report is sent to:
  - the headteacher of the school
  - the local authority
  - the governing body where the local authority is not the appropriate authority, or proprietor
  - the person or body responsible for appointing foundation governors, if the school has them (including diocesan or other appropriate authorities in the case of schools with a religious character)

- other prescribed persons.
- 81. For secondary schools with a sixth form, a copy of the report must also be sent to the Learning and Skills Council for England and Young People's Learning Agency.
- 82. In exceptional circumstances Ofsted may decide that the normal period for completion of the inspection report should be extended.

# What must the governing body/appropriate authority (or proprietor where relevant) do when the inspection report or interim assessment is received?

- 83. The governing body/appropriate authority (or proprietor) must send a copy of the inspection report to all registered parents and carers of pupils at the school within five working days of receiving it. HMCI also expects schools to ensure that all pupils are made aware of the findings of the inspection (see paragraph 79).
- 84. If a good or outstanding school has received an interim assessment (see paragraph 17), a report is issued. The governing body/appropriate authority (or proprietor) must send a copy of the interim assessment report to all registered parents and carers of pupils at the school within five working days of receiving it.
- 85. The governing body/appropriate authority (or proprietor) must also make a copy of the inspection report available upon request to members of the public. A charge, not exceeding the cost of reproduction, can be made for copies of the inspection report. The governing body/appropriate authority (or proprietor) must make one copy of the interim assessment free of charge on request.

#### How do schools complain about their inspection or inspection report?

- 86. Any concerns the school has about the inspection should be raised with the lead inspector during the inspection and, where possible, resolved. Concerns may also be raised with a quality assurance inspector should one have been allocated to the inspection. If the concerns are not resolved by these means, or the person expressing the concern does not feel that due weight is being given to the concerns, or an independent view is sought, then the person raising the concern, or someone acting on his or her behalf, should contact the Ofsted helpline on 0300 123 1231.
- 87. Similarly, any concerns the school has about the inspection report should be raised with the lead inspector or inspection service provider as soon as possible.
- 88. If it has not been possible to resolve concerns raised then individuals or schools may decide to lodge a formal complaint. The complaints procedures are available on Ofsted's website.

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## Introduction

This inspection was carried out by four additional inspectors. The inspectors observed 18 teachers and 28 lessons, and held meetings with members of the governing body, staff and groups of pupils. The team also looked at documents and policies including those relating to the safeguarding of pupils. They also looked at all the information the school had collected about pupils' progress and the school's records of its monitoring of the quality of teaching. They observed the school's work and analysed 294 questionnaires from parents and carers, 252 from pupils and 51 from staff.

The inspection team reviewed many aspects of the school's work. It looked in detail at a number of key areas.

- What has been the impact of strategies to improve attendance?
- What is the impact of improvements in the Early Years Foundation Stage?
- How good is the quality of teaching and learning at Key Stage 2?
- What is the impact of the school's review of the curriculum?
- How well does the school use data and target setting to sustain good progress particularly at Key Stage 2?

## Information about the school

Ayresome is a much larger than the average primary school. The proportion of pupils known to be eligible for free school meals is much higher than average. The proportion of pupils from minority ethnic groups, is much higher than average as is the proportion of those who speak English as an additional language and those at an early stage of learning English. There are 21 different languages spoken in the school. The proportion of pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities, including those who have a statement of special educational needs is lower than average. A much higher than average number of pupils, enter or leave, during the school year and part-way through their primary education. The school holds a number of awards, including Healthy Schools status and the Activemark.

## **Main findings**

Ayresome Primary School is a good school that serves its multi-cultural community well. The majority of pupils and their families are very positive about all aspects of the school's provision.

The school has a number of outstanding features. These include the care, guidance and support it provides for pupils, including provision for safeguarding pupils. The school is an extremely inclusive community because all pupils have an outstanding opportunity to be successful through well-targeted interventions. Pupils from a diverse range of cultures get on well with each other and behaviour is good.

Partnerships with local religious groups and pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development support pupils' learning and personal development exceptionally well. Pupils know how to stay safe in a range of contexts and know how to keep themselves healthy. Although pupils enjoy school, their attendance is no better than broadly average. However, the school has good strategies in place to promote regular attendance and these are having a positive effect.

Since the previous inspection, there have been many improvements, including the progress pupils make and the standards that they attain. From a very low starting point on entry to the school, pupils make good progress and pupils' attainment in English and mathematics by the end of Year 6 is broadly average. The school is effective in ensuring

that the many pupils who arrive at varying times during their primary education, often with low levels of English, make good and sometimes exceptional progress.

The standard of teaching has improved and is good overall. Teachers provide stimulating and varied activities that engage pupils' interest well. Work is marked effectively and pupils know their targets and how to improve. Pupils really enjoy their learning and say it is 'fun'. The curriculum is good and meets pupils' needs well. There are, however, insufficient opportunities to use information and communication technology (ICT) in lessons and links between subjects are not developed sufficiently well to develop pupils' skills in a range of contexts. Outstanding care, guidance and support are integral to the work of the school. Staff provide extremely effective support to eliminate barriers to learning for potentially vulnerable pupils and those who arrive with little or no English. Arrangements for transition ensure that pupils' continued good progress is sustained. The Early Years Foundation Stage has improved since the last inspection with enhanced provision and leadership. However, there is still insufficient challenge in outdoor learning.

The headteacher and leadership team have effectively promoted a sense of common purpose amongst all staff, so that they have a very clear understanding of what the school aims to achieve. Thorough, accurate self-evaluation that identifies clear areas for improvement has made a significant difference in improving the school's performance. Along with recent improvements to pupils' attainment and progress and to teaching and the curriculum, this shows that the school's capacity to improve further is good.

## What does the school need to do to improve further?

- Improve outdoor learning for children in the Early Years Foundation Stage by ensuring that the outdoor provision provides more challenging child-initiated learning.
- Improve the school's curriculum by:
  - giving pupils more opportunities to use information and communication technology (ICT) in all lessons to promote their use of basic skills.
  - giving more opportunities to link subjects together to develop pupils' ability to transfer and use their basic skills.

## Outcomes for individuals and groups of pupils

From starting points in the Nursery, which are typically well below those expected, pupils achieve well. Progress is good for all groups of pupils. Those who have special educational needs and/or disabilities and those who speak English as an additional language make good progress because of well-targetted intervention. Pupils thoroughly enjoy their lessons. They told inspectors this was because their teachers help them to understand what they need to learn. This was seen to very good effect in lessons where pupils were motivated and on task because their needs were being well met through effective planning and assessment.

Although significant numbers of pupils start at the school at different times during the school year, well-thought out strategies ensure that there is no disruption to the learning of others. The school makes good use of two specialist intervention rooms. These rooms allow staff to use creative resources and strategies to work with small groups and individuals to provide support for both learning and emotional needs, including the one-to-one support for pupils who enter the school with little or no understanding of English.

Pupils feel safe and secure in school and understand issues around keeping safe. Effective strategies have been used to improve attendance and this is now broadly average. Pupils understand well what it means to have a healthy lifestyle and the benefits of taking on responsibilities through, for example, the work of the school council to suggest or carry out improvements. There are opportunities for pupils of all ages to take on responsibility, including being playground leaders. Pupils' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development is outstanding because of the school's strong commitment to personal development. A quiet area is dedicated to developing pupils' understanding of different faiths. Pupils celebrate each others' cultures particularly well and pupils work and play together well in this harmonious community.

## How effective is the provision?

Teachers are knowledgeable and create a calm and well-ordered learning environment. Lessons proceed at a good pace with a wide range of activities. There are good relationships between teachers and their pupils. A range of support staff provide competent and confident intervention and support that enables pupils with special educational needs and/or disabilities and those who speak English as an additional language to have full access to lessons and activities. Teachers' marking is very helpful, making clear the next steps pupils need to take in their learning.

The school is in the process of reviewing its curriculum and, although it is well adapted to meet the needs of different groups of pupils, there are insufficient links between subjects to ensure that it contributes enough to developing their basic skills in context. The curriculum is enriched by many visitors and visits, contributing very effectively to pupils' personal and social development. The school has invested heavily in some aspects of ICT, though it is not used well in lessons to promote pupils' basic skills and as a tool for learning.

One of the key strengths of the school is the way in which it looks after pupils as individuals, particularly those who are potentially vulnerable. Those pupils who join the school beyond the normal starting points are quickly integrated into the life of the school so that they make similar progress as others. There are many examples of significant successes in the way in which the school helps pupils overcome their difficulties and barriers to learning, so that they achieve well. This is exemplified by the many successes of pupils who enter the school speaking little or no English. Parents and carers appreciate the support given to their children, including the provision of a well-run breakfast club. Links with the neighbouring secondary schools are strong, enabling pupils to make a smooth transition and quickly settle into their new schools.

## How effective are leadership and management?

The headteacher, in a strong partnership with the deputy headteacher, has developed a common vision and purpose amongst the staff. All adults are dedicated to enabling pupils to achieve their best in all aspects of school life. The school's self-evaluation is accurate with challenging targets set to drive up standards. For example, the recent focus on improvement in English throughout the school has had a significant impact on raising pupils' attainment. Currently, all groups of pupils make good progress, reflecting outstanding equality of opportunity for all. Leaders at all levels play a significant part in monitoring and evaluating the work in their areas. The governing body knows the school well and what it needs to do to improve. It is effective in helping to shape the direction of the school. Safeguarding procedures are outstanding, with clear policies and secure risk assessment systems in place. The school is particularly effective in its procedures and practices for ensuring the safety and well-being of potentially vulnerable pupils, including excellent liaison with parents and carers. Community cohesion is strong and a strength of the school. Pupils have a good understanding of different ethnicities and cultures, and different social aspects of the local, United Kingdom and international communities through links with a number of different schools across the country. The school has extremely effective partnerships that have contributed to the school's recent improvements. Partnerships have had a marked effect on raising not only standards, but also pupils' self-esteem.

## **Early Years Foundation Stage**

Children enter the Nursery with skills and knowledge well below what is expected, particularly in communication and language and literacy. Many speak little or no English on entry. Excellent welfare arrangements and relationships with parents and carers, along with good trusting relationships with staff, ensure children feel safe and secure and settle quickly. Children make good progress during their time in the Early Years Foundation Stage, and attainment has risen to just below what is expected by the time that they enter Year 1. Children's communication skills are enhanced well through specialist support and intervention.

The indoor learning environment is spacious, well resourced and provides stimulating activities for the children to plan their own learning as well as receiving well-focused support from adults. Outdoor provision complements this well, however, sometimes there is insufficient challenge to ensure children's learning is maximised, particularly in terms of activities initiated by children, outside. Staff provide a variety of engaging and creative activities which sustain children's interest. This helps to develop self-esteem and ensures children enjoy their learning. The new leader has a very good understanding of what needs to be done and a strong commitment to improving and refining provision so that it offers the very best opportunities for children to learn. The use of data to identify areas for development has been developed well, particularly in planning for the next steps children need to take in their learning and is having a positive impact on children's progress.

## Views of parents and carers

Almost half of the parents and carers returned their questionnaires. They were overwhelmingly positive about all aspects of the school's work. For example, most felt their children are safe and enjoy school. This enjoyment of learning was very evident to the inspectors. A very small minority of parents and carers did not agree that the school informed them of their children's progress, or helped them to support their children's learning. The inspectors felt that on the evidence found, these were aspects that the school did extremely well. Some parents and carers also felt that bullying was not dealt with effectively and evidence showed that the school is very effective in dealing with pupils' personal development.

#### Responses from parents and carers to Ofsted's questionnaire

Ofsted invited all the registered parents and carers of pupils registered at Ayresome Primary School to complete a questionnaire about their views of the school.

In the questionnaire, parents and carers were asked to record how strongly they agreed with 13 statements about the school.

The inspection team received 294 completed questionnaires by the end of the on-site inspection. In total, there are 615 pupils registered at the school.

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#### Proposal to include Pre-primary classes for 4 and 5 years olds in Primary Schools.

#### Introduction

- 1. The National Policy on Education (1986) acknowledged Early Childhood Care and Education (ECCE) for children below 6 years to be a significant input for primary education, both as a feeder program for school preparation and as a support program for girls' education and specified policy guidelines for its curriculum and implementation.
- 2. ECCE refers to education and care of children below 6 years. It includes provision of education, nutrition and health care. Within the ECCE stage two sub stages are identified :- (a) an Early Stimulation stage for children 3 years and below who require home based programmes , and (b) an Early Childhood Education stage for children between 3 to 6 years through play based preschool /pre primary education.
- 3. It is now being globally accepted on the basis of research that children between the ages of four to six years become maturationally ready for a more structured, but play based, learning environment. Children from disadvantaged communities in particular, require at this stage a school readiness curriculum which should have continuity with the early primary curriculum in a 'bottom up' mode and not as a downward extension.
- 4. School readiness does not imply starting to teach reading, writing and numeracy prior to grade
  1. It refers instead to providing children with an environment and materials that help to nurture in children the following:
  - (a) Reading readiness through pre –reading activities for shape and sound discrimination/ phonetics, picture word matching, expanding children's vocabulary and verbal expression and developing interest in reading and learning to handle books through access to picture story books and a print rich environment. In cases of multi lingual contexts activities for facilitating children's transition from home to school language since this is the critical age for language development.
  - (b) Writing readiness through activities involving eye hand coordination and fine muscle development like joining dots, colouring, drawing, pattern drawing, threading beads and understanding the need to write for communication etc.
  - (c) Number readiness through activities for developing pre number concepts related to size, length, width, height, volume, space etc; number concept, skills of classification, sequential thinking reasoning and problem solving.
  - (d) A joyful environment for helping children develop positive social and personal habits, develop habits of regular attendance, perseverance on a task, and above all inculcating an interest in and bonding with school.

5. The subject of Early Childhood Care and Education in the GOI's Rules of Business, which was earlier with MHRD, was transferred to MWCD in 2006, since the ICDS was considered the main scheme for ECCE in the public sector. It is now proposed that preschool education for 4 to 6 year old children be made an integral part of primary education and every primary school have an attached preschool class as the point of entry.

#### **Justification**

- 1. Globally, especially in the context of EFA, where all children are to come into the school system, the school readiness component has been empirically found to be a critical input for ensuring a smooth transition for children into formal education. There is research evidence to prove that it has a positive impact on children's retention, attendance and performance at the primary stage and thus contributes significantly to the attainment of primary education goals. It therefore becomes a very effective investment for primary education.
- 2. The concept and coverage of ECCE is now being extended from 6 to 8 years, since children have been observed to have similar developmental characteristics and modes of learning as the preschoolers and also because of the need for continuity in the curriculum from school readiness to the early primary stage in grades 1 and 2. On the basis of this rationale the preprimary and early primary grades are increasingly being considered as an Early Learning Unit which serves as a transition/foundation programme for elementary education. Most education systems in the developed countries have pre primary as the entry point to primary education.
- **3.** Empirical evidence from the field of neuroscience, economics and education, both globally and within the country, has established beyond doubt the significant impact of ECCE not only in facilitating primary education goals and more efficient utilization of investments but also having a sustained impact in adult life, particularly for children from underprivileged backgrounds. In India too there is evidence of 15 to 20 percent better retention in primary grades among 4 to 5 year old children who participated in preschool education as compared to those who did not, on a cohort of 38000 children across 8 states.( NCERT, 1994).
- 4. While ICDS is the main public sector programme for ECCE and getting universalised, preschool education is considered across the states as its weakest component since it does not have appropriate physical infrastructure, staffing, training or institutional support for this area of education, especially for pre primary education for 4 to 6 year olds for which a structured activity based school readiness curriculum is required to be developed and transacted. In a large number of states, ICDS continues to be perceived as a nutrition programme. As a result, in the absence of an effective provision, a large number of children from under privileged communities are missing out on the opportunity for preschool education in these critical years, which is likely to place them at risk for dropping out or underperforming in school. "In unequal societies that have high levels of poverty, a level playing field even at age 6 or by the time a child enters school may already be unfair for poor children. By intervening early ECD programs offer

all children the possibility to fully benefit from school and to succeed in the market place. (Birdsall, 1999).

- 5. In 23 out of 35 states and UTs, the entry age for primary school in Grade 1 is currently 5 years. With the RTE implementation the entry age is expected to be raised to 6 years so that the 5 to 6 year olds who are in primary school currently will also become a part of the pre primary stage and will have to be catered to. In such a case 4 to 6 years will become the pre primary unit for school readiness prior to grade 1.
- **6.** Recent field surveys (AUD, 2011) have demonstrated significant shifts in parental aspirations and increased demand for school education for their children, reflected in steady migration even in rural and tribal areas of 4 to 5 year olds from the AWs to the private preschools, in which the curriculum may not be developmentally appropriate and is in many cases, not of acceptable quality. Some state governments like Nagaland, Assam, Jammu & Kashmir, at their own initiative, have added preschool classes to the primary schools in view of this spiralling community demand.
- **7.** The private school system, which is the pace setter and in great demand and which is mushrooming even into the rural /tribal areas now, structurally also begins at the preschool stage in almost all cases. In the absence of preschools in government schools, parents with even meagre incomes are sending their 4 year olds to the private preschools at the preschool stage.
- 8. The NAC has also made a clear recommendation that children upto 4 years could be provided ECCE experiences through the ICDS in the AW with a dedicated worker and a year of pre primary class to be attached to every primary school to ensure school readiness for all children. If the age for Grade 1 gets raised to six years, this would amount to 2 years of preschool education which could contribute significantly to a sound foundation for learning for all children.

#### **lequirements for adding Pre primary sections in Primary Schools**

his section details the requirements for an effective establishment of a pre-primary component in chools at the various levels of implementation.

#### A. School level:

B. Teacher: At the school level it is envisaged that 1:25 adult child ratio will need to be maintained. A regular teacher, trained in Pre primary education and school readiness will be required who should have similar academic qualifications and be at par in terms of pay and benefits as the primary teacher.

- C. Classroom: A classroom per 25 children with adequate space, ventilation and storage facility for transacting an activity based curriculum which requires movement, use of variety of materials and flexible seating arrangements.
- D. Toilet and Outdoor play space. The outdoor space provided with outdoor play equipment for children.

  - (a) Play Material like Building blocks, jigsaw puzzles, beads, manipulative play material for shape, colour, size concepts, material for imaginative play etc

  - (c) Stationery, crayons etc –on a recurrent basis.
  - F. Equipment for storage, sitting mats, few small tables.

# Translating Policy into Practice: Right to Education Act Case Study of a Municipal Ward in Delhi<sup>1</sup>

**Background:** The Right of Children to Free and Compulsory Education Act 2009 was notified to come into force on April 1, 2010. What does guaranteeing "education" mean in the context of a low income urban area? The objective of this exercise is to understand what will be needed to translate RTE into reality in a set of urban locations. In each participating city, one municipal ward has been selected as a sample location. This selection is typically a mixed or low income area in the city. We hope that the methods, measures and findings from this exercise act as a "demo" or "pilot" for two purposes: (a) to understand how to do a rapid assessment of schools and schooling and gauge what needs to be done in terms of RTE for this particular location (b) use the actual census of one ward to guide the steps that need to be taken for city wide assessment and planning for RTE.

**Cities covered so far:** The first pilot exercise was done in Delhi during June- July 2010. Subsequently, census of one municipal ward each has been conducted in the cities of Jaipur, Patna and Hyderabad during April-May 2011. In this handout, the findings from Delhi are discussed. Similar analysis for the other cities (Hyderabad, Patna and Jaipur) are currently underway.

**Description of the selected ward:** The surveyed ward is situated in trans-Yamuna area in the northeast section of Delhi bordering Uttar Pradesh. This neighbourhood is like many others in east Delhi. It is densely populated with mixed habitation patterns. The area has three distinct kind of settlements: a large part of the locality is a "resettlement colony". The ward also has small flats and unauthorized settlements which were regularized by the government some time ago. The second types of settlement are the "JJ clusters or jhuggi-jhopri or slum clusters"; these have existed in this area for almost thirty years. The last kind of housing is the area that used to be a village but has slowly become urban with the growth of the city. The entire area is crowded with shops, houses, factories and schools existing side by side. Many people in this area work in the small scale factories and enterprises within or in adjoining areas. Also given the high population density there are employment opportunities in what is referred to as 'service sector' for selling goods and services.

**Findings from the educational census:** The door to door census of this municipal ward generated information of 8,162 households and 50,807 individuals. From these households we collected data on all

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10,402 children in the 6-14 year age group and listed all the schools where children of this ward are enrolled. Like in the rest of Delhi, here too, there are three types of schools: schools run by the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD), schools run by Delhi Government and private schools.

#### School enrollment:

The Right to Education Act guarantees education to all children between the ages of 6 and 14 years. Table 1 suggests that a very high proportion of children in the neighbourhood are enrolled in school. At the time of the survey in June 2010, in this ward, about 3% children were not enrolled in school. The total of 322 children who were currently not enrolled in school included 201 who had dropped out of school at some stage and 121 who have never been to school. It is possible that since June, some of these children, especially the younger ones have been enrolled in school.

The RTE Act mentions that in the case of out of school children, special arrangements need to be made by the government to ensure age appropriate mainstreaming to regular schools. These arrangements will have to be made keeping in mind the special characteristics of the non-enrolled children. While the number of out of school children is not high as compared to the entire child population, it is well worth remembering that the "last mile" problem is often very hard to solve. However, the law requires that special plans be made that will enable to a few hundred children in the neighbourhood to be mainstreamed into school. Overall, in terms of universal enrollment, this municipal ward is quite close to the norm of "every child in school".

#### Type of school:

The educational census data has information about type of school attended by children. Who goes to which kind of school? Are there differences by grade level? Like in other parts of Delhi, in our study area as well, school going children attend three different kinds of schools,: Municipal primary schools, Delhi government upper primary schools and private schools.

The data indicates that in this low income and mixed neighbourhood, the government school sector (MCD and Delhi govt schools) dominate. The incidence of private school enrollment is higher in the lower age group than in the higher age group. Among the children going to private schools, a much higher proportion are males as compared to females.

Delhi has a unique school provisioning arrangement. Two different government systems provide schooling services to Delhi's child population. A network of almost 2000 municipal primary schools feed into Delhi government schools after Std 5. Barring a few hundred Delhi government schools which are composite schools (e.g. go from primary all the way to secondary level), most others start at Std 6 and go till high school level.

Table 5 indicates that while MCD schools and private schools have an almost equal share in enrollment in Std 1, the share of private schools is lower in higher grades. By Std 5, two thirds of all children in the area are studying in municipal schools. There is a significant and substantial transition in Std 6 to Delhi government schools. After Std 5, the proportion of children studying in private schools declines further; well over 85% of all children in middle school attend Delhi government secondary schools in the neighbourhood.

#### School Facilities vis-à-vis RTE School Norms:

The Right to Education Act stipulates a variety of norms that all schools must adhere to. Here are some of the important norms: the number of students per teacher should be 30 in primary school and not to exceed 40 in any case. The school should be open for at least 200 days and total teaching hours should not be less than 800 in primary schools during the year. Every class teacher should have a separate classroom. Every school should have a library with books, magazines and newspapers. In terms of infrastructure, the school should have a playground, separate toilets for boys and girls and secured wall or fencing as a boundary around the school. The Act prohibits corporal punishment of any kind and prescribes serious action against the concerned teacher or staff in case of the violation of this provision.

Although the children from our municipal ward attend a large number of schools in East Delhi, a majority (88%) of all enrolled children of this ward attend 24 schools. 15 of these schools are run by the government (10 MCD and 5 Delhi government schools) and 9 are private schools.

We focused on these schools and asked: how are these schools doing vis-à-vis the RTE norms? Available information suggests that the five Delhi government schools have pupil teacher ratio of around 31 or below. In the ten MCD schools the ratio ranges from 32 to 44. All fifteen government run schools have rooms for library and playgrounds. Teachers are professionally qualified for teaching (DISE School Report Card, 2009-10). In other words, by and large, the government schools meet the basic infrastructure norms as stated in the Act. It is difficult to get similar information about infrastructure, teachers' appointment or qualification in private schools in the area. While physically visiting the actual locations, it is clear that seven out of nine private schools are run in buildings built for residential purposes. Therefore, it is unlikely that they meet the norms like separate room for every teacher/class or playground. With the high population density in the area and relatively high real estate prices, it is improbable that any of these private schools can add to their present infrastructure in order to meet the requirement as per Right to Education norms. Thus, the picture for school facilities vis-a-vis norms is mixed. While the government schools meet the facilities norms, it is not clear how the private schools in the area will be able to comply even in the next three years.

#### **Guarenteeing "education":**

The Right to Education law guarantees "education". The RTE Act specifies that the curriculum be completed in certain timeframe- ".... complete the entire curriculum within the specified time" ( 24 (1)(c). If this has to be the case, then it is worth looking at what children can do as compared to what they are expected to do at different grade levels in different subjects.

Delhi schools follow the NCERT textbooks for all subjects. For ordinary people, subject wise textbooks indicate what is expected of children in different grades. These benchmarks are helpful in trying to assess expected versus actual learning levels. Figure 1 and 2 are examples of what children are expected to read in the Hindi textbooks of different grades. From these examples we can see that by the middle of Std II, children are expected to read simple text fluently and do a number of different reading, comprehension and writing activities based on what they have read. By Std V, the text has become longer and the sentence structure and vocabulary more complex.

For an assessment of children's basic learning we used few simple tasks in reading, arithmetic and English. In the reading task, children were asked letters, simple words and basic texts. The highest level of text was at Grade 2 level. In maths children were asked to recognize one digit, two digit and three digit numbers. In English, children read letters, words and sentences.

The figures in Table 6 are about reading levels of children by grade and school type. In terms of being able to read simple Hindi text fluently, approximately half the children in Std V in MCD schools and Delhi government schools are able to read at Std II level. This means that half the children currently in Std V, after five years of schooling have not yet reached the level expected of them in Std II. The proportion of children in private schools who are able to read the given text fluently is far higher for every grade. In fact the proportion of children in private schools in Std III who are able to read at this level is similar to the proportion of children who are able to read at Std II level in Std V in the government schools.

The substantial and significant private school learning advantage is basic Hindi reading is maintained even after controlling for family background (e.g. variables like home ownership, mothers' education) and supplemental help (child going to tuition)<sup>3</sup>. Even using a simple indicator like reading level at Std II level of difficulty, the data indicates that in the same neighbourhood for similar children, going to private schools gives children at least a two grade years of learning advantage.

Results indicate that the mothers' education variable is significant if the mother has had more than primary education. Tuition is highly significant. But even after controlling for a variety of factors, the probability of reading at Std 2 level is much higher in private schools than in the other types of schools. This already substantial learning advantage is even stronger when we compare reading skills in English in private schools versus other kinds of schools.

Being able to recognize numbers and name them - these are very basic aspects of number knowledge. In the educational census in our study area, for maths, children were shown sets of numbers from 1 to 100 and then from 100 to 10000 and asked to name them. Here too, the basic findings and patterns are similar to that in the case of basic reading. Std II textbooks in maths have games and activities requiring children to be comfortable with numbers till 100. Leave aside Std II, even in Std III, about half the children in MCD schools and a third in government schools are struggling with basic number recognition.

The educational census data from this area on learning achievement shows stark differences in children's ability to read or do arithmetic between government schools and private schools. Children are entering middle school with severe and perhaps insurmountable academic disadvantage. In terms of meeting RTE infrastructure norms and student pupil criteria, the government schools are doing fine, but they are unable to "guarantee" learning. Conversely, the private schools that operate in this neighbourhood do not meet RTE norms and yet have children who are performing substantially higher. Even after controlling for family background and tuition, the private school learning advantage is strong and substantial. But since the bulk of children in the study area go to government school, it is fair to say that the situation is very grim if we view the education status of children using the learning lens.<sup>4</sup>

**Conclusion:** The analysis from one municipal ward in Delhi gives some ideas on the challenges in translating the policy into practice. There are schools in the neighborhood. Almost all children are enrolled in school. There are teachers. We know for sure that all teachers of MCD and Delhi government are trained and qualified, all government schools have adequate infrastructure as specified by norms. Yet these factors within themselves were not enough to ensure learning. On the other hands, of the nine private schools, at least seven do not have visible infrastructure as stipulated by the Act, we do not know about the teachers' qualification and number of teaching days, yet the learning outcomes of children are substantially higher.

What are the implications of the findings? From a children's learning point of view, the answer to the inability of the government schools to guarantee an effective education is not to privatize the school system. What needs to be done, is to focus on all schools to figure out how the teaching-learning and organizational processes in schools can lead to "learning for all".

The key learnings from this study are the following: first, the school system must hold each school responsible for reaching learning goals for the year. Strategic and urgent planning is needed to set out "do-able" learning goals and all training, monitoring and teaching aligned to achieving this goals. Second, if parents have to take charge of their children's learning, as opposed to children's schooling, a lot more has to be done to engage parents directly in the process of their children's learning. The issue of schooling and learning needs to be demystified. Finally, heavy investment in the SMC functioning is needed in these early stages to ensure that SMCs begin to become what was envisaged for them in the Law.

The spirit of the law is that all children must get a good and effective education. If we cannot guarantee children's learning, then the law will be meaningless. Now that the Right to Schooling is in place, the Right to "Education" needs to be in place.

# THE DELHI SCHOOLS (REGULATION OF COLLECTION OF FEE) BILL, 2012

An Act to provide for the regulation of collection of fee by schools in the National Capital Territory of Delhi and matters connected therewith and incidental thereto.

BE it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Tamil Nadu in the Sixty- second Year of the Republic of India as follows:—

- **1. Short title, extent and commencement. -** (1) This Act may be called the Delhi Schools (Regulation of Collection of Fee) Act, 2012.
  - (2) It extends to the whole of the National Capital Territory of Delhi.
- (3) It shall come into force on such date as the Government may, by notification, appoint.
  - **2. Definitions. -** In this Act, unless the context otherwise requires,—
    - (a) "academic year" means the year commencing on the first day of June to the last day of May;
    - (b) "aided school" means a school receiving any sum of money as aid out of the Government funds;
    - (c) "committee" means the committee constituted under section 5;
    - (d) "District Committee" means the committee constituted under section 11;
    - (e) "fee" means any amount, by whatever name called, collected directly or indirectly by a school for admission of a pupil to any standard or course of study;
    - (f) "Government" means the Lt. Governor of the National Capital Territory of Delhi appointed by the President under article 239 of the Constitution and designated as usch under article 239AA of the Constitution:
    - (g) "Government School" means a school run by the Government or any local body;
    - (i) "management" includes the managing committee or any person, body of persons, committee or any other governing body by whatever name called in whom the power to manage or administer the affairs of a school is vested.
    - (j) "private school" means any pre-primary school, primary school, elementary school, secondary school or senior secondary school, established and administered or maintained by any person or body of persons and recognized by the competent authority under any law for the time being in force, but does not include,—
    - (i) an aided school;
    - (ii) a school established and administered or maintained by the Central

Government or the Government or any local body or local authority;

(iii) a school giving, providing or imparting religious instruction alone but not any other instructions;

Explanation.—For the purpose of this clause,—

- (1) (i) pre-primary school shall consist of Pre-KG to UKG;
- (ii) primary school shall consist of LKG to Standard V or Standards I to V;
- (iii) elementary school shall consist of LKG to Standard VIII, Standards I to

VIII or Standards VI to VIII;

- (iv) secondary school shall consist of LKG to Standard X, Standards VI to X or Standards IX and X;
- (v) Senior secondary school shall consist of LKG to Standard XII, Standards I to XII, Standards VI to XII or Standards XI and XII.
- (2) aided schools conducting any classes or courses, for which no money

is paid as aid out of the Government funds, shall be construed as a private school in so far as such classes or courses are concerned.

- **3. Prohibition of collection of excess fee.** (1) No Government school or aided school shall collect any fee in excess of the fee fixed by the Government for admission of pupils to any class or course of study in that school.
- (2) No fee in excess of the fee determined by the Committee under this Act shall be collected for admission of pupils to any class or course of study in a private school,—
  - (a) by any person who is in charge of, or is responsible for, the management of such private school; or
  - (b) by any other person either for himself or on behalf of such private school or on behalf of the management of such private school.
- (3) The fee collected by any school affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education shall commensurate with the facilities provided by the school.
- **4. Fixation of fee by Government**. The Government shall fix the fee for admission of pupils to any class or course of study in Government schools and aided schools.
- **5.** Constitution of Committee. (1) The Government shall constitute a Committee for the purpose of determination of the fee for admission to any class or course of study in private schools.
  - (2) The committee shall consist of the following members, namely:—
    - (a) A retired High Court Judge, nominated by the Government. Chairperson;
    - (b) Engineer-in Chief (PWD) to be nominated by Government;- *Exofficio* Member;
    - (c) Controller of Accounts of Finance Department to be nominated
    - by Government, Ex-officio Member
    - (d) Director of Education, Ex-Officio Member Secretary.

- (3) The term of office of the Chairperson shall be for a period of three years from the date of his nomination and in the case of vacancy arising earlier, for any reason, such vacancy shall be filled for the remainder of the term.
- (4) The Chairperson shall be eligible to draw such rate of sitting fee and travelling allowance as may be prescribed.
- (5) No act or proceeding of the committee shall be invalid by reason only of the existence of any vacancy in, or any defect in, the constitution of the committee.
  - (6) The Chairperson shall preside over the meeting of the committee.
- **6. Factors for determination of fee**. (1) The Committee shall determine the fee leviable by a private school taking into account the following factors, namely:—
  - (a) the location of the private school;
  - (b) the available infrastructure;
  - (c) the expenditure on administration and maintenance;
  - (d) the reasonable surplus required for the growth and development of the private school;
  - (e) any other factors as may be prescribed.
- (2) The Committee shall, on determining the fee leviable by a private school, communicate its decision to the school concerned.
- (3) Any private school aggrieved over the decision of the Committee shall file their objection before the committee within fifteen days from the date of receipt of the decision of the committee.
- (4) The Committee shall consider the objection of the private school and pass orders within thirty days from the date of receipt of such objection.
- (5) The orders passed by the Committee shall be final and binding on the private school for three academic years. At the end of the said period, the private school would be at liberty to apply for revision.
- (6) The Committee shall indicate the different heads under which the fee shall be levied.
- 7. **Powers and functions of the Committee**. (1) The powers and functions of the Committee shall be,—
  - (a) to determine the fee to be collected by private schools;
  - (b) to hear complaints with regard to collection of fee in excess of the fee determined by it or fixed by the Government, as the case may be. If the Committee, after obtaining the evidence and explanation from the management of the private school or aided school concerned or from the Government school, comes to the conclusion that the private school or the Government school or aided school has collected fee in excess of the fee

determined by the committee or fixed by the Government, as the case may be, it shall recommend to the appropriate competent authority for the cancellation of the recognition or approval, as the case may be, of the private school or aided school or for any other course of action as it deems fit in respect of the private school or Government school or aided school.

- (2) The Committee shall have power to,—
  - (i) require each private school to place before the committee the proposed fee structure of such school with all relevant documents and books of accounts for scrutiny within such date as may be specified by the Committee;
  - (ii) verify whether the fee proposed by the private school is justified and it does not amount to profiteering or charging of exorbitant fee:
  - (iii) approve the fee structure or determine some other fee which can be charged by the private school.
- (3) The Committee shall have power to,—
  - (i) verify whether the fee collected by the School affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education commensurate with the facilities provided by the school;
  - (ii) to hear complaints with regard to collection of excess fee by a school affiliated to the Central Board of Secondary Education; and
  - (iii) to recommend to the Central Board of Secondary Education for disaffiliation of the school, if it comes to a conclusion that the school has collected excess fee.
- (4) The committee shall have the power to regulate its own procedure in all matters arising out of the discharge of its functions, and shall, for the purpose of making any inquiry under this Act, have all the powers of a civil court under the Code of Civil Procedure, 1908 (Central Act V of 1908) while trying a suit, in respect of the following matters, namely:—
  - (i) summoning and enforcing the attendance of any witness and examining him on oath:
  - (ii) the discovery and production of any document;
  - (iii) the receipt of evidence on affidavits;
  - (iv) the issuing of any commission for the examination of witness.
- **8. Regulation of accounts.** The Government may regulate the maintenance of accounts by the private schools in such manner as may be prescribed.
- **9. Penalties**. (1) Whoever contravenes the provisions of this Act or the rules made thereunder shall, on conviction, be punishable with imprisonment for a term which shall not be less than three years but which may extend to seven years and with fine which may extend to fifty thousand rupees:

Provided that the court may, for any adequate and special reason to be mentioned in the judgment, impose a sentence of imprisonment for a term of less than three years.

- (2) The person convicted under this section shall refund to the pupil from whom the excess fee was collected in contravention of this Act, such excess fee.
- 10. Offences by companies. (1) Where an offence against any of the provisions of this Act have been committed by a company, every person who, at the time the offence was committed, was in charge of, and was responsible to, the company for the conduct of the business of the company, as well as the company, shall be deemed to be guilty of the offence and shall be liable to be proceeded against and punished accordingly:

Provided that nothing contained in this sub-section shall render any such person liable to any punishment, if he proves that the offence was committed without his knowledge or that he has exercised all due diligence to prevent the commission of such offence.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-section (1), where any such offence has been committed by a company and it is proved that the offence has been committed with the consent or connivance of, or is attributable to any neglect on the part of any director, manager, secretary or other officer of the company, such director, manager, secretary or other officer shall be deemed to be guilty of that offence and shall be liable to be proceeded against and punished accordingly.

Explanation. - For the purposes of this section, -

- (a) "company" means any body corporate and includes a trust, a firm, a society or other association of individuals, and
- (b) "director" in relation to—
  - (i) a firm, means a partner in the firm;
  - (ii) a society, a trust or other association of individuals, means the person who is entrusted under the rules of the society, trust or other association with the management of the affairs of the society, trust or other association, as the case may be.
- **11. District Committee**. (1) There shall be a District Committee in every district, which shall consist of the Deputy Director of Education of the district as Chairperson and such other members as may be prescribed.
- (2) The District Committee or any member of the said committee authorised by it in this behalf may, inspect any record, accounts, register or other document belonging to such private school or of the management, in so far as any such record, accounts, register or other document relates to such private school and seize any such record, accounts, register or other document for the purpose of ascertaining whether there is or has been any such contravention.
- **12.** Cognizance of offences. No court shall take cognizance of any offence under this Act except with the sanction of the Government or such officer as the Government may authorise in this behalf.
- **13.** Compounding of offences. (1) Any offence punishable under section 9 may be compounded by such officer or body as may be specially authorised by the Government in this behalf, either before or after the institution

of the prosecution, on payment for credit to the Government of such sum as such officer or body may impose:

Provided that such sum shall not, in any case, be less than fifty thousand rupees and, exceed the maximum amount of the fine which may be imposed under this Act for the offence so compounded:

Provided further that in the event of charging of excessive fee by the school than the notified fee, the amount of compounding fee shall not be less than double the amount of fee excessively charged or fifty thousand rupees, whichever is higher.

(2) Nothing in sub-section (1) shall apply to a person who commits the same or similar offence within a period of three years from the date on which the first offence committed by him was compounded.

Explanation.-For the purposes of this sub-section, any second or subsequent offence committed after the expiry of a period of three years from the date on which the offence was previously compounded, shall be deemed to be a first offence.

- (3) Where an offence has been compounded under sub-section (1), no proceeding or further proceeding, as the case may be, shall be taken against the offender in respect of the offence so compounded, and the offender, if in custody, shall be discharged forthwith.
- **14. Operation of other laws.** Save as otherwise provided in this Act, the provisions of this Act shall be in addition to, and not in derogation of, any other law for the time being in force.
- **15. Protection of action taken in good faith.** No suit, prosecution or other legal proceeding shall be instituted against the committee or its members, Government or any officer, authority or person empowered to exercise the powers or perform the functions by or under this Act for anything which is in good faith done or intended to be done under this Act or the rules made thereunder.
- **16. Power to remove difficulties.** If any difficulty arises as to the first constitution of the committee after the date of commencement of this Act or otherwise in giving effect to the provisions of this Act, the Government may, by notification, make such provision, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as may appear to them to be necessary or expedient for removing the difficulty:

Provided that no such notification shall be issued after the expiry of five years from the date of commencement of this Act.

- **17. Power to make rules**. (1) The Government may make rules for carrying out all or any of the purposes of this Act.
- (2) Every rule made by the Government under this Act shall be laid as soon as may be after it is made before the House of the Legislative Assembly of Delhi while it is in session for a total period of thirty days which may be comprised in one session or in two or more successive sessions, and if, before the expiry of the session immediately following the session or the successive sessions

aforesaid the House of the Legislative Assembly agrees that the rule should not be made, the rule shall thereafter have effect only in such modified form or be of no effect, as the case may be; so, however, that any such modification or annulment shall be without prejudice to the validity of anything previously done under that rule.

- d) Whether there is any complaint against the management / functioning of the school? If yes, the same may be looked into.
- e) Any Complaint received from parents & staffs against the school.
- f) Whether lady teachers have to suffer any kind of exploitation, sexual harassment, overstay, overwork etc.?

#### 4. ACADEMICS

- a) I) How has the teacher planned his lesson?
  - II) The type of lesson / notes written by the teacher and how far are they useful.
- b) Whether the teacher has covered the specified course and syllabus for the term and has adhered to it in the programme of teaching?
- c) Was the lesson taught on the day of inspection already scheduled and planned for the day?
- d) I) Were the questions put to the students thought-provoking and well-distributed?
  - II) How far the teacher encouraged the students to put questions to him on the subject?
- e) What types of audio-visual aids were used by the teacher in the class and how far were they effectively used?
- f) I) Did the teacher write a proper black-board summary?
  - II) How far was it a true synopsis of the lesson taught?
- g) Are the assignments given by the teacher and if so, are they judicious and scientifically given?
- h) I) Does the teacher give the class-work to students regularly?
  - II) If so, is it regularly corrected and corrections followed up?
- i) I) How much home work is given by the teacher?
  - II) Is it regularly corrected and followed up?
- j) I) How far is the assignment for class work and home work assessed and evaluated?
  - II) Has any record of such assessment been kept by the teacher and if so, how?
- k) I) Are periodical tests held? If so, at what intervals?
  - II) What type of papers are given to the students?
  - III) How are they evaluated?
- I) How are the tests and examinations in schools organized?

- m) I) What remedial steps have been taken by the teacher to remove the weakness of students in different areas?
  - II) Does he keep any record of such students and of the progress achieved by them?
- n) I) What efforts has the teacher made in helping the gifted children?
  - II) Is there any record of their progress and achievement kept?
- o) How does the teacher encourage love for the subject and love for reading amongst the students?
- p) Comparative result of Class IX, X, XI, & XII alongwith enrolment in these classes be examined.
- q) Whether students have been admitted and classes are being carried out without getting the statutory recognition / permission?
- r) Whether additional illegal Sections are being run in school class without proper sanction?
- s) The details of number of court cases / cases pending against the school management in various courts / authorities / commission be examined and documentary evidence be provided along with their latest status.
- t) Whether election of PTA has been held or not?

# 5. FACILITIES IN SCHOOL

- a) Whether the school has requisite infrastructural facilities as per provisions of Section 4 read with rule 50 & 51 of DSEAR'73?
- b) Whether the school has received certificates from the local authorities in r/o building completion, drinking water facilities and so on?
- c) Whether the school has Fire Safety Certificate from competent authority?
- d) Latest Health Certificate from the competent authority may also be procured.
- e) Whether the school / class rooms are spacious enough for housing the school students?
- f) Whether playground is spacious enough for students and whether it is in good condition or not?
- g) Whether school toilets and environment is hygienic or not?

#### 6. FINANCIAL

- a) Whether the school has transferred any fund to any Society or Trust, and if so, the details along with the name of Society / Trust, amount, date etc.?
- b) Whether school is maintaining all vouchers of each item of expenditure? All vouchers of major expenditure may be physically checked to find whether expenditure items were justified and genuineness of vouchers be looked into.
- c) Whether school has given any loans / advances to society / any other institution?
- d) Whether the school has raised / charged fee and other dues from students which are not consistent with the department instructions and the provisions contained in the DSEAR'73?
- e) Whether the school management has maintained its accounts as per provision of Rules 173 &175 of DSEAR'73?
- f) Whether the school is regularly filing the statement of the fees to be levied by such school during the ensuing academic session as per the provision of Section 17 of DSEAR'73 since the date of its recognition?
- g) Whether the school is regularly filing the annual return under Section 180(1) of DSEAR'73 since the date of its recognition? (Financial returns for the last three years be also furnished along with the inspection report.
- h) Whether the school management is paying salary to the teachers and staff as per the recommendations of 5<sup>th</sup> Pay Commission or whether it is violating provision of Section 10(1) of DSEAR'73?
- i) Whether money collected by the school is utilized for the development activities and / or for augmenting the existing facilities, providing safely measures etc. of the school.
- j) Whether the Managing Committee of the school is financially viable to manage affairs of the school?
- k) Whether donations in any form are demanded by the school management at the time of admissions to the school or when results are declared by the school?

## 7. MISCELLANEOUS

- a) Whether there has been regular auditing of the school account and if yes, copies of the same for the last three years be obtained.
- b) Whether there is an extension counter of any bank operational in the school and whether that is meant only for the payment of fees by the students and salary to the teachers. And whether the school has taken permission from the DOE to run such a counter or not?
- Any other point which the inspection team deems appropriate in the interest of the students / education.

- 7. The Test check of the Vouchers, Cash Books and Stock Registers may be made and remarks about their maintenance be given.
- 8. Are the stocks verified annually and if so, what action has been taken on the deficiencies noted, if any?
- 9. Is the Cash Book regularly maintained and verified by the Head of school?
- 10. Who handles the cash in the school and what are the arrangements of keeping it safe?
- 11. How are the accounts of fees and funds maintained in the school (General report may be given)?

The schools to be inspected will be given advance intimation for the inspections and the inspecting team will ensure that a copy of the inspection report is sent to the school concerned within 15 days from the date of inspection positively under rule 190(6) of DSEAR'73. A copy of consolidated report along with all documents shall also be sent to the DE through Act branch within 10 days of the inspection.
