

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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 About Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA)

The aim of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is to provide useful and relevant elementary education for all children in the 6 to 14 age group by 2010. There is also another goal to bridge social, regional and gender gaps, with the active participation of the community in the management of schools.

Useful and relevant education signifies a quest for an education system that is not alienating and that draws on community solidarity. Its aim is to allow children to learn about, and master their natural environment in a manner that allows the fullest harnessing of their human potential both spiritually and materially. This quest must also be a process of value based learning that allows children an opportunity to work for each other's well being rather than to permit mere selfish pursuits.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan realizes the importance of Early Childhood Care and Education and looks at the 0-14 age as a continuum. All efforts to support pre-school learning in ICDS centres or special pre-school centres in non ICDS areas will be made to supplement the efforts being made by the Department of Women and Child Development.

1.2 **Objectives of Present Study**

The present study is regarding Monitoring and Evaluation of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of

District Badaun of Uttar Pradesh. The objectives of the study include:

- (i) Assess the progress of implementation of approved plans at district level and state level.
- (ii) To check progress in achievement of some key outcome indicators through sampling.
- (iii) Verify process and procedures undertaken for implementation of SSA.

1.3 Scope of Work

The programme to be covered includes:

- (i) Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan
- (ii) Mid-Day Meal Scheme
- (iii) Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya
- (iv) Nation Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level.

1.4 <u>Study Sample and Design</u>

There are 2065 primary and 773 upper primary schools. There are 21 Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalay in the district. A sample size of 5% of the schools has been selected as follows.

The sample for survey in primary and upper primary schools is drawn on the basis of stratified proportionate random sampling method. The sample primary and upper primary schools are taken from each of the 5 blocks of the district. The study sample consists of 90 primary and 24 upper primary sample schools of the district.

The information relating to primary schools and centres of alternate learning is collected in pre-structured schedules and subsequently the information is tabulated for analytical interpretation.

Apart from the above, 11 NPEGEL centers running at upper primary schools of the district have also been covered in the sample.

The other information relating to the functioning and progress of SSA programme in the district have also been collected from SP Office at the state level and from the office of the District Basic Shiksha Adhikari.

The following Table 1.2 provides the distance-wise break-up of the sample primary and upper primary schools from BRCs and NPRCs of the district.

CHAPTER II

EDUCATIONAL PROFILE OF DISTRICT -BADAUN, UTTAR PRADESH

2.1 Introduction

Budaun, is a city in the north-central Uttar Pradesh, a state of northern India. The city is the headquarters of <u>Budaun district</u>. Budaun is an ancient city in India. This is holy land of Sufi's & Saint's. It is situated near holy river Ganga at Lattitude 28 Degree 02 Minute 30 Second East & Longitude 79 Degree 01 Minute 20 Second north on Globe.

It is evident from Table 2.1 that there has been an increment in the literacy rate of the district from 24.64 per cent to 38.83 per cent over the years 1991 and 2001. Though this has been a marked increase in literacy rate of the district but it was found to be lower than the state average, i.e. 57.36 per cent. The male literacy rate (49.85 percent) is far higher as compared to the female literacy rate (25.53 percent) in the district during the year 2001.

In the ensuing part of this chapter all the interpretations are based on information provided by the office of the BSA, Badaun.

2.2 <u>Status of Schools</u>

As per information made available from the office of the BSA, Badaun, there were 2065 primary and 773 upper primary schools available as on 31.03.08. Total number of 57 (29 PS and 28 UPS) were sanctioned to be opened in the district during the current financial year 2008-09. All the sanctioned primary and upper primary schools were opened during this period. Current status of PS & UPS in the district including newly opened schools indicates that there are 2094 primary schools and 801 upper primary schools.

2.5 <u>Teachers' In Service Training</u>

In order to maintain teaching standard, the target of teachers training has been fixed for the teachers training of the primary and upper primary schools of the district. As per data presented in Table 2.5, a total of 4396 primary school teachers were targeted to be trained. Out of these 2299 (52.29 per cent) were provided training up to 31.03.08. Around 48 per cent teachers of primary schools are still to be provided training. In case of upper primary schools target is to provide training to 192 teachers. As against this target, 188 (97.91 per cent) teachers have been trained till 31.03.08.

2.7 Teaching Learning Material (TLM) Grant

As per information given in Table 2.7, 7277 and 1570 teachers belonging to primary and upper primary schools respectively were found eligible to receive TLM grant during the financial year 2008-09. A total sum of Rs.30,20,000.00 was sent by BSA as grant to VECs account for primary schools teachers. Along with this Rs.7,87,500.00 was also sent by the BSA to VECs account for upper primary school teachers. The date of receipt of TLM grant was 18/02/09, same for primary and upper primary school teachers.

2.8 Distribution of Text Books

The Information regarding text-books distribution (Table 2.8) indicated that books were distributed among the 243265 children of primary schools of the district in the month of July 2008 from SSA funds. Out of Total recipient students, 202208 were girls (83.02 percent) and 41057 (16.88 percent) boys belonging to SC category. Apart from this, free text books have also been distributed among 168813 students of primary schools from state government funds.

In case of upper primary schools text books were distributed among 57723 students. Of these 12016 (20.81 percent) were boys belonging to SC category and 34601 (79.19 percent) were girl students. Apart from this, free text books have also been distributed among 46864 students of Upper primary schools from state government funds.

2.9 Civil Works

The sanction of new buildings and their progress in construction for primary and upper primary schools is presented in Table 2.10. The available information indicates that construction of 29 new primary schools and 28 upper primary schools have been sanctioned for the financial year 2008-09 in the district. The work is reported to be in progress in both types of schools buildings. Apart from this, the sanction of additional 150 rooms in existing primary schools of the district is reported for the financial year 2008-09. However, the work is completed for 136 primary schools. In other primary schools it is under progress.

The technical supervision of the existing civil works of primary and upper primary schools is being undertaken by the Junior Engineer of rural engineering services (RES) of the concerning development block.

The information relating to the drinking water and toilet facilities in the primary and upper primary schools of the district indicated convergence of 485 drinking water facilities with swajaldhara and 86 toilet facilities with the total sanitation campaign.

2.10 School Grants

The details as presented in Table 2.11 indicate that the grant of 2838 primary and upper primary schools is approved for the year 2008-09. Out of total schools for those grants are approved for this year, 2065 are primary and 773 upper primary schools. The funds have also been released for all the schools. The funds have been transferred to the VEC accounts on 16 th July, 2008. The total released amount turns out to be Rs. 157.36 lakhs. Out of this, Rs. 103.25 lacs taken are released for primary schools and Rs 54.11 lacs for the upper primary schools of the district Badaun. The details regarding the utilization of funds by VECs up to 31.01.2009 are Not Available at BSA's office. There has been no centralized purchase for schools from this grant by the BSA.

2.11 Education Guarantee Scheme (EGS)/AIE Centres

There has been a sanction of 95 EGS/AIE centers as on 31.3.08 in Badaun district. Out of these 77 EGS/AIE centers were found in position. Besides this, there are 92 more EGS/AIE centers sanctioned during the financial year 2008-09. Table 2.12 contains this information and further indicates that only 76 centers are found in position as against 92, which are sanctioned during this year. There has also been a provision of upgrading EGS in to new primary schools during this financial year. So far 3 teachers have been sanctioned for these upgraded primary schools.

2.12 Students Enrollment in the EGS/AIE Centres

2.13 Training and Qualification of Education Volunteers (EVs)

There are no EVs reported to be working in the district of Badaun.

All the EGS/AIE centers running in the district have a coordinator who has been oriented. The funds have been released for the upgradation of these centers in the current financial year i.e. 2008-09. The amount of Rs. 7.6 lakhs have also been transferred to VEC account for the same. The land for the construction of the upgraded primary schools for EGS has also been identified. Four teachers have also been sanctioned for these. The monitoring of existing EGS centers is done through a format supplied at the district level by SPO.

2.14 Children Mainstreamed From EGS/AIE Centres:

There are 583 children actually mainstreamed from EGS/AIE centers as on 30.09.2008 in the current financial year 2008-09. All such children belonged to the government schools of the district (Table 2.15). Free books for all subjects have been distributed to the children of EGS/AIE centers. Text books are being used in all the centers.

2.17 <u>National Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level (NPEGEL)</u>

As per details available in this respect as presented in Table 2.18, there is a target of 162 model schools clusters for the year 2008-09. 2.19 <u>Details About District Information System for Education (DISE)/</u> Educational Monitoring and Information System (EMIS)

The district has EMIS with required computers and computer operators in position. The data capture formats have been supplied to all the schools, and the data collected and compiled by the BSA has been sent to the SPO. BRC coordinators have been given assignment for verifying 5 percent of the data collected in the district. CRC/BRC coordinators of the district have been trained for this work. The training was imparted fromSeptember only 8 block, at BRC centers.

2.20 <u>Village Education Committees (VECs)</u>

There are 1069 village/school level management committees in the district where only 80% of the members of VEC are oriented with required training.

2.21 Staffing at District Level SSA Office

The district has full-fledged staffing for running SSA programme. The position of BSA, AAO, DC-5, accountant, steno, computer operators and MIS Incharge are sanctioned and duly appointed in the district of Badaun.

CHAPTER III

INFRASTRUCTURAL FACILITIES IN SCHOOLS

3.1 Establishment and Construction of Primary Schools

Out of total sample schools, about 62 per cent have been established before ten years. More than 70 per cent primary schools and about 33 per cent upper primary schools were established ten years back or even before. On an average, rest of the 38 per cent sample schools was established within 10 years. As against this more than 56 per cent schools were constructed within last 10 year. In case of primary and upper primary more than 44 per cent and 52 per cent school have been constructed during last 10 years. On an average 4 percent of upper primary schools are running on rented premises.

Findings and Suggestions

Most of the primary schools (70 per cent) were established long back in the district but the construction of more than 45 per cent was done within last ten years. Thus, most of the constructions were for completing backlogs. More emphasis is required on the establishment of new schools and subsequently their construction.

3.2 Availability and Utilization of Classrooms

Availability of classrooms and their utilization for classroom teaching is presented in Table 3.2 shows more than 8 rooms available only in 1 primary school out of 90 sample schools in the district of Badaun. But none of the sample primary school of the district uses more than 8 rooms. The availability of 5 rooms is found in maximum number (30) of sample primary schools constituting 38.88 per cent. But at the same time use of 4 rooms for classrooms is recorded in 30 schools constituting 33.33 per cent of the sample primary schools. The availability of 1 room is found in 2 primary schools(2.22%), 2 rooms in primary schools is seen only in case of 5 schools, constituting 5.55 per cent.

In case of upper primary schools, a minimum of 4 rooms are recorded to be existing in the 24 sample schools. The maximum 8 rooms are also found in 1 school. But the number of rooms for classroom teaching ranged from 1 to 5. A maximum of 45.83 per cent sample schools have 3 rooms for teaching.

3.3 Availability of Infrastructure in Schools

In case of sample primary schools only 58 schools have school boundaries. But the availability of playground is recorded in 81 schools. Sports items are also found in 53 primary schools. The availability of mats, furniture is 82 schools & blackboard in classrooms is found in all the schools. Despite the availability of sports items, their use is found only in only 37 schools. 84 primary schools have verandah in the school building.

As against primary schools, only 11 sample upper primary schools have boundary. The playground is available in 23 schools. The availability of sports items is found in 22 schools. In the schools having with sports items their use is confined to only 2 schools. The availability of mats and furniture is found in 21 upper primary schools. The blackboards are found in all of the 100 per cent schools. 18 upper primary schools have verandah

3.6 School Environment

About 86 out of 90 primary schools have good atmosphere and in 80 schools students are satisfied with proper ventilation in the classrooms. Proper space for students sitting is also reported by 84 schools at the primary schools. In upper primary levels almost students of all the sample schools were satisfied by atmosphere & ventilation. In 21 upper primary schools students of 21 schools were satisfied by the proper seating arrangements.

But the health facilities are reported to be provided for last six months only in 24 primary sample schools and 13 upper primary schools.

The availability of food under MDM programme has not been the problem in the sample schools but the availability as per menu has been a problem in 39 per cent schools. Proper monitoring by BRC/NPRC staff should ensure proper compliance or else report the matter to higher authorities

5.2 Infrastructure of MDM Programme

There are only 2 sample primary schools and 7 sample upper primary sample schools without the kitchen facility.

All of (100.00 per cent) schools have proper register for MDM. There are more than 86 per cent of the sample schools with required utensils in the kitchen. The funds for purchasing utensils are made available from SSA in 100 per cent schools. The use of LPG as fuel for cooking is seen in only 64 per cent schools. But fuelwood is used in about 33 per cent schools.

5.3 <u>Cleanliness and Inspection of MDM</u>

The awareness about washing hands before taking meal, use of clean utensils and other norms relating to ideal social order is found in majority of the sample schools.

The process of cooking food was not found to be safe in majority of schools. 80 of the sample primary schools & 21 of the upper primary schools should take more care to avoid accidents.

The regular inspection of MDM programme is found only in 71 primary & 14 upper primary schools.

66 of the sample primary schools & 18 of the upper primary schools reported that MDM has created positive impact on Attendance, enrollment & health of the students.

5.4 Supply of Micro-Nutrients

The supplement of micro-nutrition to the students is available only in 18 primary & 4 upper primary schools. In all the cases where this is found available, 100 percent is provided by the ANM. The schools where micro-nutrition supplements are made available, these were provided once in a month in 55 per cent cases. In rest of the 45 per cent schools it was provided twice in a month.

Average number of VEC members is found to be low due to under representation of parents. The female and caste-wise composition of VEC is as per norms. The parent's representation in VECs should be emphasized.

6.2 <u>VEC Meetings</u>

As per norms VEC meetings are to be held every month in every school. But the survey indicated that meetings were held only in 58 per cent schools. The frequency of meetings was also recorded to be low. Two to three meetings on an average were held in schools during the last six months.

The agenda of meetings comprised of school maintenance, mid-day meal, students' scholarship, enrolment and attendance, etc., are presented in Table 6.3.

According to 4 primary & 7 upper primary schools of the sample called it good. 19 primary & 3 upper primary schools of the sample called it satisfactory. Findings and Suggestions

VECs' role in improving overall school conditions were found to be the best by only 6 per cent teachers of upper primary schools. Their satisfactory role was reported by 50 per cent teachers. More than 7 per cent teachers regarded their role as bad in this respect in primary schools. The role of VECs' should be deemed more important for improving school conditions. Hence, VEC members should play more active role in this respect.

6.5 Grants for Primary Schools

As per information collected from the school register and pass books regarding receiving and expenditure of school grants of primary school for the year 2008-09, the received grants under the head of honorarium to para-teachers are utilized only to the level of 81.61 per cent. This is found to be deliberate and amounts to delayed payment of honorarium despite timely receipt of the grant.

 Money has been withdrawn from account in some cases but construction
- Money has been withdrawn from account in some cases but construction work has not been started.
- For different types of constructions, unutilized grants are found.
- Thorough monitoring of construction work and fund utilization is needed to achieve expected results.

6.6 Availability of Construction Records with VEC

The survey results indicated only 22.22 per cent primary and 33.33 per cent upper primary schools village committees having construction work manual. Only about 40 per cent and 41.66 per cent VECs have proper up keeping of funds records at primary and upper primary levels. More than 57 per cent VECs have no school construction related account.

The security system for teachers and girls living in hostel is also not available in the school.

8.1 <u>National Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level (NPEGEL)</u>

There are 162 NPEGEL of the district. As per survey conducted in 11 NPEGEL centres of the district, a grant of the Rs.127670 was received for 7 NPEGEL during the financial year 2008-09. Two of the 11 NPEGEL has electricity supply. One center of the sample is having Centre for Children Education (CCE). Out of total 4 have received grant for TLM, Library, Games and Training. There are total 278 girls found enrolled in these NPEGEL. The free books have been supplied in 11 NPEGEL centres. All the 11 NPEGEL centers are located in the buildings of the Upper Primary Schools.



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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 About Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA)

The aim of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is to provide useful and relevant elementary education for all children in the 6 to 14 age group by 2010. There is also another goal to bridge social, regional and gender gaps, with the active participation of the community in the management of schools.

Useful and relevant education signifies a quest for an education system that is not alienating and that draws on community solidarity. Its aim is to allow children to learn about, and master their natural environment in a manner that allows the fullest harnessing of their human potential both spiritually and materially. This quest must also be a process of value based learning that allows children an opportunity to work for each other's well being rather than to permit mere selfish pursuits.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan realizes the importance of Early Childhood Care and Education and looks at the 0-14 age as a continuum. All efforts to support pre-school learning in ICDS centres or special pre-school centres in non ICDS areas will be made to supplement the efforts being made by the Department of Women and Child Development.

1.2 Objectives of Present Study

The present study is regarding Monitoring and Evaluation of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of

District **Bareilly** of Uttar Pradesh. The objectives of the study include:

- (iv) Assess the progress of implementation of approved plans at district level and state level.
- (v) To check progress in achievement of some key outcome indicators through sampling.
- (vi) Verify process and procedures undertaken for implementation of SSA.

1.3 Scope of Work

The programme to be covered includes:

- (v) Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan
- (vi) Mid-Day Meal Scheme
- (vii) Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya
- (viii) Nation Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level.

1.4 <u>Study Sample and Design</u>

As per DISE data there are 2006 primary and 616 upper primary schools i.e total 2622 schools in the district. A sample size of approx. 5% of the schools has been selected as follows.

The sample for survey in primary and upper primary schools is drawn on the basis of stratified proportionate random sampling method. The sample primary and upper primary schools are taken from each of the 5 blocks of the district. The study sample consists of 82 primary and 26 upper primary sample schools of the district.

The information relating to primary schools and centres of alternate learning is collected in pre-structured schedules and subsequently the information is tabulated for analytical interpretation.

Apart from the above, 9 NPEGEL centers running at upper primary schools of the district have also been covered in the sample.

The other information relating to the functioning and progress of SSA programme in the district have also been collected from SP Office at the state level and from the office of the District Basic Shiksha Adhikari.

CHAPTER II

EDUCATIONAL PROFILE OF DISTRICT -BAREILLY, UTTAR PRADESH

2.1 Introduction

Situated between the latitudes of 28 degree 10 minutes & 28 degree 54 minutes and longitudes of 78 degree 58 minutes & 79 degree 47 minutes, Bareilly, onetime kingdom of the Rohila Emperors, has always made its presence felt since ancient time.

It has not only a glorious past but a thrilling present and promising future also. Based on the bank of river the Ramganga, this city was the mainstay of the freedom struggle. During the great revolt of 1857, when rest of the country was surmounted by Britishers, Bareilly remained free from the clutches of English forces for almost one year under the leadership of Khan Bahadur Khan. Since then people of Bareilly actively participated in every movement.

After Independence many economic as well as cultural activities started taking shape in 1961, Camphor & Allied Products Ltd. Company established its manufacturing unit in Bareilly. Now it is one of the largest Camphor making units of the world.

IFFCO has also its urea making plant and marketing office here in Aonla Tehsil. Apart from these two large scale industries Bareilly is also a leading manufacturer of handicrafts items mainly based on bamboos & woods. There are some other items viz. Cane furniture, Zari Zardozi, Surma, Patang Manjha on which Bareilly boost.

Bareilly has also been the centre of cultural & educational activities in the province. From Pt. Radhey Shyam Kathawachak to Wasim Bareilvi this city has galaxy of literary. The Rohilkhand University, hub of educational activities of tarai region, attracts thousands of students.

It is evident from Table 2.1 that there has been an increment in the literacy rate of the district from 32.88 per cent to 47.99 per cent over the years 1991 and 2001. Though this has been a marked increase in literacy rate of the district but it was found to be lower than the state average, i.e. 57.36 per cent. The male literacy rate (59.12 percent) is far higher as compared to the female literacy rate (35.13 percent) in the district during the year 2001.

In the ensuing part of this chapter all the interpretations are based on information provided by the office of the BSA, Bareilly.

2.4 <u>Recruitment of Teachers</u>

2.5 Teaching Learning Material (TLM) Grant

As per information given in Table 2.7, 7650 and 2236 teachers belonging to primary and upper primary schools respectively were found eligible to receive TLM grant during the financial year 2008-09. A total sum of Rs.31.98 lacs was sent by BSA as grant to VECs account for primary schools teachers. 2.6 Distribution of Text Books

The Information regarding text-books distribution (Table 2.8) indicated that books were distributed among the 257481 children of primary schools of the district in the month of July 2008 from SSA funds. Out of Total recipient students, 217563 were girls and 39918 boys belonging to SC category. Apart from this, free text books have also been distributed among 180201 students of primary schools from state government funds.

In case of upper primary schools text books were distributed among 55285 students. Of these 11820 were boys belonging to SC category and 43465 were girl students. Apart from this, free text books have also been distributed among 30860 students of Upper primary schools from state government funds.

2.8 <u>Civil Works</u>

The sanction of new buildings and their progress in construction for primary and upper primary schools is presented in Table 2.10. The available information indicates that construction of 340 new primary schools and 52 upper primary schools have been sanctioned for the financial year 2008-09 in the district. The work is reported to be in progress in both types of schools buildings. Apart from this, the sanction of additional 500 rooms in existing primary schools of the district is reported for the financial year 2008-09. However, the work is completed in 875 primary schools and is in progress in 38 schools. The remaining rooms work could not be started due to lack of space in school premises.

The technical supervision of the existing civil works of primary and upper primary schools is being undertaken by the Junior Engineer of rural engineering services (RES) of the concerning development block.

2.9 School Grants

The details as presented in Table 2.11 indicate that the grant of 2631 primary and upper primary schools is approved for the year 2008-09. Out of total schools for those grants are approved for this year, 2017 are primary and 614 upper primary schools. The funds have been released to only 1615 schools out of which 2015 are primary and 600 upper primary. The funds have been transferred to the VEC accounts in August 2008. The total released amount turns out to be Rs. 146.79 lakhs. Out of this, Rs. 104.79 taken is released for primary schools and Rs 42.00 lakhs for the upper primary schools of the district Bareilly. The details regarding the utilization of funds by VECs up to 31.01.2009 are Not Available at BSA's office. There has been no centralized purchase for schools from this grant by the BSA.

Findings and Suggestions

Most of the primary schools (79 per cent) were established long back in the district but the construction of only 30 per cent was done within last ten years. More emphasis is required on the establishment of new schools and subsequently their construction.

3.2 Availability and Utilization of Classrooms

Availability of classrooms and their utilization for classroom teaching is presented in Table 3.2 shows more than a maximum of 8 rooms is available only in 1 primary schools out of 82 sample schools in the district of Bareilly. But the maximum use is of 5 rooms that too only in 30 sample primary school of the district. The availability of 5 rooms is found in maximum number (23) of sample primary.

In case of upper primary schools, a minimum of 2 rooms are recorded to be existing in the 2 sample schools. The maximum more than 8 rooms are also found in 1 schools. But the number of rooms for classroom teaching ranged from 2 to 6. A maximum of 11 sample schools have 4 rooms for teaching.

3.3 <u>Availability of Infrastructure in Schools</u>

In case of sample primary schools only 29 schools have school boundaries. But the availability of playground is recorded in 75 schools. Sports items are also found in 49 primary schools. The availability of mats, furniture is 76 percent and blackboard in classrooms is found to be in 80 schools. Despite the availability of sports items, their use is found only in 31 schools.

As against primary schools, sample upper primary schools have boundary in 11 schools and the playground is available in 23 schools. The availability of sports items is found in 22 schools. In the schools having with sports items their use is confined to 21 schools. The availability of mats and furniture is found in 24 upper primary schools. The blackboards are found in all of the 100 per cent schools.

3.6 School Environment

About 78 primary schools have good atmosphere and about in 82 schools students are satisfied with proper ventilation in the classrooms. Proper space for students sitting is also reported 76 schools at the primary levels.

About 25 upper primary schools have good atmosphere and 26 schools students are satisfied with proper ventilation in the classrooms. Proper space for students sitting is also reported in 23 schools at the upper primary levels.

But the health facilities are reported to be provided for last six months only in 25 sample primary schools & 22 upper primary schools.

The availability of food under MDM programme has not been the problem in the sample schools but the availability as per menu has been a problem. Proper monitoring by BRC/NPRC staff should ensure proper compliance or else report the matter to higher authorities.

5.2 <u>Infrastructure of MDM Programme</u>

There are only 2 sample primary schools and 16 sample upper primary sample schools without the kitchen facility.

All of (100.00 per cent) schools have proper register for MDM. There are more than 98 per cent of the sample schools with required utensils in the kitchen. The funds for purchasing utensils are made available from SSA in 100 per cent schools. The use of LPG as fuel for cooking is seen in only 83 per cent schools. But fuelwood is used in about 16 per cent schools.

5.3 <u>Cleanliness and Inspection of MDM</u>

The awareness about washing hands before taking meal, use of clean utensils and other norms relating to ideal social order is found in majority of the sample schools.

The process of cooking food was not found to be safe in majority of schools. 80 of the sample primary schools & 25 of the upper primary schools should take more care to avoid accidents.

The regular inspection of MDM programme is found only in 82 primary & 26 upper primary schools.

72 of the sample primary schools & 17 of the upper primary schools reported that MDM has created positive impact on Attendance, enrollment & health of the students.

5.4 Supply of Micro-Nutrients

The supplement of micro-nutrition to the students is available only in 23 primary & 6 upper primary schools. In all the cases where this is found available, 100 percent is provided by the ANM. The schools where micro-nutrition supplements are made available, these were provided once in a month in 41.37 per cent cases. In rest of the 58 per cent schools it was provided twice in a month.

Average number of VEC members is found to be low due to under representation of parents. The female and caste-wise composition of VEC is as per norms. The parent's representation in VECs should be emphasized.

6.2 <u>VEC Meetings</u>

As per norms VEC meetings are to be held every month in every school. But the survey indicated that meetings were held only in 63.88 per cent schools. The frequency of meetings was also recorded to be low. Two to three meetings on an average were held in schools during the last six months.

6.3 <u>VEC Training</u>

The training for VEC members was organized only in 52 primary and 9 upper primary schools. Only 46 per cent of VEC members have been trained. The VEC members of schools where training was imparted indicated their opinion about the quality of training. In none of the schools, members regarded training as best. According to 16 primary & 5 upper primary schools of the sample called it good. 17 primary & 4 upper primary schools of the sample called it satisfactory. 29 primary schools of the sample called it bad. All the VEC members are trained by BRC and NPRC coordinators.

Findings and Suggestions

VECs' role in improving overall school conditions were found to be the best by none of the teachers in primary & upper primary schools. Their good/ satisfactory role was reported by 92 per cent primary school teachers and 96 percent by upper primary school teachers. More than 7 per cent primary school teachers & around 4 percent upper prmary school teachers regarded their role as bad in this respect. The role of VECs' should be deemed more important for improving school conditions. Hence, VEC members should play more active role in this respect.

6.5 Grants for Primary Schools

As per information collected from the school register and pass books regarding receiving and expenditure of school grants of primary school for the year 2008-09, the received grants under the head of honorarium to para-teachers are utilized only to the level of 89.19 per cent. This is found to be deliberate and amounts to delayed payment of honorarium despite timely receipt of the grant.

6.6 Availability of Construction Records with VEC

The survey results indicated only 24.39 per cent primary and 23.07 per cent upper primary schools village committees having construction work manual. Only about 40.24 per cent and 46.15 per cent VECs have proper up keeping of funds records at primary and upper primary levels. More than 63 per cent VECs have no school construction related account.

6.7 <u>Teaching Learning Materials (TLM)</u>

There are 199 teachers in primary and 61 teachers in upper primary schools in the sample to receive TLM amount in the district. Training of teachers regarding use of TLM was imparted in only 33 primary schools and 10 upper primary schools of the sample. The display of TLM was found in only 51 schools of our sample. The use of TLM by the students was also found was also found to be very low.

The existing furniture is required to be changed as it is not sufficient to meet the class room and hostel requirements. The security system for teachers and girls living in hostel is also not available in the school.

8.2 National Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level (NPEGEL)

There are 154 NPEGEL of the district. As per survey conducted in 9 NPEGEL centres of the district, a grant of the Rs. 126545 was received for 4 NPEGEL during the financial year 2008-09. 1 of the 9 NPEGEL has electricity supply. 1 centers of the sample are having Centre for Children Education (CCE). Out of total 3 have received grant for TLM, Library, Games and Training. There are total 162 girls found enrolled in these NPEGEL. The free books have been supplied in 8 NPEGEL centres. All the 9 NPEGEL centers are located in the buildings of the Upper Primary Schools.



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CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION

1.1 About Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan (SSA)

The aim of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is to provide useful and relevant elementary education for all children in the 6 to 14 age group by 2010. There is also another goal to bridge social, regional and gender gaps, with the active participation of the community in the management of schools.

Useful and relevant education signifies a quest for an education system that is not alienating and that draws on community solidarity. Its aim is to allow children to learn about, and master their natural environment in a manner that allows the fullest harnessing of their human potential both spiritually and materially. This quest must also be a process of value based learning that allows children an opportunity to work for each other's well being rather than to permit mere selfish pursuits.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan realizes the importance of Early Childhood Care and Education and looks at the 0-14 age as a continuum. All efforts to support pre-school learning in ICDS centres or special pre-school centres in non ICDS areas will be made to supplement the efforts being made by the Department of Women and Child Development.

1.2 **Objectives of Present Study**

The present study is regarding Monitoring and Evaluation of Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan of District

Shahjahanpur of Uttar Pradesh. The objectives of the study include:

- (vii) Assess the progress of implementation of approved plans at district level and state level.
- (viii) To check progress in achievement of some key outcome indicators through sampling.
- (ix) Verify process and procedures undertaken for implementation of SSA.

1.3 Scope of Work

The programme to be covered includes:

- (ix) Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan
- (x) Mid-Day Meal Scheme
- (xi) Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalaya
- (xii) Nation Programme for Education of Girls at Elementary Level.

1.4 <u>Study Sample and Design</u>

As per DISE data there are 2115 primary and 768 upper primary schools and 139 EGS/AIE centers, 192 model school clusters. There is 05 Kasturba Gandhi Balika Vidyalay in the district. A sample size of approx. 5% of the schools has been selected as follows.

The sample for survey in primary and upper primary schools is drawn on the basis of stratified proportionate random sampling method. The sample primary and upper primary schools are taken from each of the 5 blocks of the district. The study sample consists of 81 primary and 29 upper primary sample schools of the district.

The information relating to primary schools and centres of alternate learning is collected in prestructured schedules and subsequently the information is tabulated for analytical interpretation.

Apart from the above, 13 NPEGEL centers out of 192 running at upper primary schools of the district have also been covered in the sample.

The other information relating to the functioning and progress of SSA programme in the district have also been collected from SP Office at the state level and from the office of the District Basic Shiksha Adhikari.

The following Table 1.2 provides the distance-wise break-up of the sample primary and upper primary schools from BRCs and NPRCs of the district.

CHAPTER II

EDUCATIONAL PROFILE OF DISTRICT -SHAHJAHANPUR, UTTAR PRADESH

2.1 Introduction

District Shahjahanpur is situated in South East of Rohilkhand Division. It was established in 1813. Before its creation it was a part of district Bareilly. Geographically, it is situated at 27.35 N Latitude and 79.37 E longitudes. Adjoining districts of the Shahjahanpur are Lakhimpur Khiri, Hardoi, Farrukhabad, Bareilly, and Budaun & Pilibhit. Geographical area of it is 4575 Sq. Meter. This is an Agriculture based District of Uttar Pradesh. Ramganga, Garrah & Gomti are the main rivers of district. Kathana, Jhukma & Mensiare are the attached rivers of Gomti. Garrah is the main river. Khannaut, Suketa and Kai are the attached rivers of Garrah. Flood - mostly affects Jalalabad Tehsil. Major crops of the district are Wheat, Gram, Millet & Potato.

It is evident from Table 2.1 that there has been an increment in the literacy rate of the district from 32.07 per cent to 48.79 per cent over the years 1991 and 2001. Though this has been a marked increase in literacy rate of the district but it was found to be lower than the state average, i.e. 57.36 per cent. The male literacy rate (60.53 percent) is far higher as compared to the female literacy rate (34.68 percent) in the district during the year 2001.

2.09 Civil Works

The sanction of new buildings and their progress in construction for primary and upper primary schools is presented in Table 2.10. The available information indicates that construction of 68 new primary schools and 86 upper primary schools have been sanctioned for the financial year 2008-09 in the district. The work is reported to be in progress in both types of schools buildings. Apart from this, the sanction of additional 274 rooms in existing primary schools of the district is reported for the financial year 2008-09. The construction work of additional 195 rooms in these schools is reported to be completed.

In case of existing upper primary schools 171 additional rooms are sanctioned for construction during the financial year 2008-09. The construction work of additional 120 rooms in these schools is reported to be completed. 2.10 School Grants

The details as presented in Table 2.11 indicate that the grant of 2883 primary and upper primary schools is approved for the year 2008-09. Out of total schools for those grants are approved for this year, 2115 are primary and 768 upper primary schools. The funds have been released to only 2735 schools out of which 2072 are primary and 664 upper primary. The funds have been transferred to the VEC accounts in August 2008. The total released amount turns out to be Rs. 120.14 lakhs. Out of this, Rs. 104.63 lacs taken is released for primary schools and Rs 15.51 lakhs for the upper primary schools of the district Shahjahanpur. The details regarding the utilization of funds by VECs up to 31.01.2009 are Not Available at BSA's office. There has been no centralized purchase for schools from this grant by the BSA.

2.12 Students Enrollment in the EGS/AIE Centres

2.16 Children With Special Needs (CWSN)

There are 8276 CWSN children identified in the district during the financial year 2008-09. There are only 893 students (10.79 per cent) out of the total CWSN children who have been provided with aids and appliances during the financial year 2008-09. Findings and Suggestions

Most of the primary schools (71 per cent) were established long back in the district but the construction of only 50 per cent was done within last ten years. More emphasis is required on the establishment of new schools and subsequently their construction.

3.2 Availability and Utilization of Classrooms

Availability of classrooms and their utilization for classroom teaching is presented in Table 3.2 shows more than a maximum of 8 rooms is available only in 1 primary school out of 81 sample schools in the district of Shahjahanpur. But the maximum use is of 3 rooms that too only in 31 sample primary school of the district. The availability of 4 rooms is found in maximum number (24) of sample primary schools.

In case of upper primary schools, a minimum of 3 rooms are recorded to be existing in the 16 sample schools. The maximum more than 8 rooms are also found in 1 school. But the number of rooms for classroom teaching ranged from 2 to 5. A maximum of 16 sample schools have 3 rooms for teaching.

3.3 Availability of Infrastructure in Schools

In case of sample primary schools only 38 schools have school boundaries. But the availability of playground is recorded in 73 schools. Sports items are also found in 64 primary schools. The availability of mats, furniture is in 79 schools and blackboard in classrooms is found to be in 81 schools. Despite the availability of sports items, their use is found only in 54 schools.

As against primary schools, sample upper primary schools have boundary in 17 schools and the playground is available in 28 schools. The availability of sports items is found in 25 schools. In the schools having with sports items their use is confined to 24 schools. The availability of mats and furniture is found in 28 upper primary schools. The blackboards are found in all of the 100 per cent schools.

3.6 School Environment

About 81 primary schools have good atmosphere and about in 79 schools students are satisfied with proper ventilation in the classrooms. Proper space for students sitting is also reported 77 schools at the primary levels.

29 upper primary schools have good atmosphere and 29 schools students are satisfied with proper ventilation in the classrooms. Proper space for students sitting is also reported in 28 schools at the upper primary levels.

But the health facilities are reported to be provided for last six months only in 43 sample primary schools & 12 upper primary schools.

Considering the social categories in Primary schools more than 63 per cent cooks are belonging to OBC groups, 3.9 per cent SC and remaining 32.67 per cent to the other classes. Regular payment to cooks is found in about 95 per cent schools. The average amount of monthly payment to cooks turns out to be Rs.900.

Findings and Suggestions

The availability of food under MDM programme has not been the problem in the sample schools but the availability as per menu has been a problem. Proper monitoring by BRC/NPRC staff should ensure proper compliance or else report the matter to higher authorities

5.2 Infrastructure of MDM Programme

All the sample primary schools have got the kitchen facility, but 6 sample upper primary schools are without the kitchen facility.

All of (100.00 per cent) upper primary schools have proper register for MDM but 2 Primary schools did not have proper MDM register. There are more than 98 per cent of the sample schools with required utensils in the kitchen. The funds for purchasing utensils are made available from SSA in 100 per cent schools. The use of LPG as fuel for cooking is seen in only 57.27 per cent schools. But fuelwood is used in about 42 per cent schools.

5.4 Supply of Micro-Nutrients

The supplement of micro-nutrition to the students is available only in 37 primary & 6 upper primary schools. In all the cases where this is found available, 67 percent is provided by the ANM. The schools where micro-nutrition supplements are made available, these were provided once in a month in 48 per cent cases. In rest of the 52 per cent schools it was provided twice in a month.

Average number of VEC members is found to be low due to under representation of parents. The female and caste-wise composition of VEC is as per norms. The parent's representation in VECs should be emphasized.

6.2 <u>VEC Meetings</u>

As per norms VEC meetings are to be held every month in every school. But the survey indicated that meetings were held only in 46.36 per cent schools. The frequency of meetings was also

recorded to be low. Three to four meetings on an average were held in schools during the last six months.

The agenda of meetings comprised of school maintenance, mid-day meal, students' scholarship, enrolment and attendance, etc., are presented in Table 6.3.

6.3 <u>VEC Training</u>

The training for VEC members was organized only in 50 primary and 18 upper primary schools. Only 62.87 per cent of VEC members have been trained. The VEC members of schools where training was imparted indicated their opinion about the quality of training. In none of the schools, members regarded training as best. According to 28 primary & 11 upper primary schools of the sample called it good. 22 primary & 7 upper primary schools of the sample called it satisfactory.All the VEC members are trained by BRC and NPRC coordinators.

Findings and Suggestions

VECs' role in improving overall school conditions were found to be the best by only 3-4 per cent teachers. Their good & satisfactory role was reported by 80 per cent teachers. More than 6 per cent teachers regarded their role as bad in this respect. The role of VECs' should be deemed more important for improving school conditions. Hence, VEC members should play more active role in this respect.

6.5 Grants for Primary Schools

As per information collected from the school register and pass books regarding receiving and expenditure of school grants of primary school for the year 2008-09, the received grants under the head of honorarium to para-teachers are utilized only to the level of 92.64 per cent. This is found to be deliberate and amounts to delayed payment of honorarium despite timely receipt of the grant.

- > There is delayed payment of honorarium to para-teachers in many cases.
- Money has been withdrawn from account in some cases but construction work has not been started.
- For different types of constructions, unutilized grants are found.
- Thorough monitoring of construction work and fund utilization is needed to achieve expected results.
