FOREWORD

Providing free and compulsory education to all children upto the age of 14 years is mandatory. The Government of Andhra Pradesh is taking all possible initiatives to fulfil this directive. Some of the initiatives worth mentioning in this regard are Andhra Pradesh Primary Education Project (APPEP), Operation Black Board (OBB), Non-formal Education, Open Schools, Audio-Visual Education etc. These initiatives are increasing the access for schooling, improving enrolment, retention of children and their attainment of minimum levels of learning.

In addition, strategies are being evolved by Government for the education of adults through Total Literacy Campaigns (TLCs) in all districts of the State which are area specific and outcome oriented. These strategies are warranted to achieve the goal of Education for All. Education for All involves two components : 1. Education of adults 2. Education of children. INTRODUCTION

It is no exaggeration that valid and reliable data sets are essential for the formulation of policies, plans and programmes and their implementation on sound lines in any field. The field of education is no exception in this regard. As such, there is an imperative need to build up a good and elastic database to carry out these exercises by educational planners, administrators and researchers in accordance to the needs and requirements. The Department of Education, Government of Andhra Pradesh has taken a lead in this direction in April/May, 1994 and published a book entitled "Education For All - the Andhra Pradesh Scene" depicting the demographic, literacy and educational scenario of the state during the last one and half decades. The educational data presented in this book reflects the position of A.P. state. The SCERT, Hyderabad took the responsibility of production of the material.

Now, in this second publication on "Education For All - the A.P. scene", the contents of the earlier publication were updated to reflect the educational progress made by the state in 1995-96, achievements made on several new fronts and interventions started in the areas of school education and adult education. The document is prepared with the following objectives in view

- to compare the position of Andhra Pradesh with India with respect to population growth and literacy
- to compare the literacy of Andhra Pradesh with South Indian States
- to understand the historical trends in the behaviour of key educational indicators like literacy rates, institutions, enrolment of students, teachers etc., in all the 23 districts
- to understand the level of inputs and achievements of important programmes of educational development like the education of the Physically handicapped, non-formal education, adult education, AV education etc.
- to understand the gross enrolment ratio, drop-out rates, teacher-pupil ratio in all the 23 districts of the State.

In this publication, data have been provided on the following items additionally besides updating the existing position on institutions, teachers, enrolment in formal and non-formal education sectors and budget allocations for education.

2. Joyful Learning in Class I - a project with UNICEF assistance
3. Implementation of DPEP in the selected 5 districts in the state
4. Teachers' centres in the state
5. Primary schools with A.V. equipment
6. Vocational education in Secondary schools
7. Mandal vocational Educational Centres
8. Residential schools, teachers and enrolment
9. Social Welfare Residential Schools, teachers and enrolment
10. Location of A.P. Residential schools
11. Results of S.S.C. examinations, March, 1996
12. Plan Budget and Expenditure on Education in A.P. during VIII plan period
13. Sectorwise plan outlays in four Southern States and India
14. Enrolment in Total Literacy campaign of adult education

Besides a brief commentary/notes is given for the data in the tables wherever necessary for a better understanding of the reader.

I hope this publication will serve various educational clientele in a more purposeful and beneficial way in meeting their academic, administrative and research requirements.

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DEMOGRAPHY

Andhra Pradesh with a population of 665 lakhs (1991) and 2.75 lakhs sq.km. of area accounts for 7.9% of the country's population and 8.4% of the area of the country respectively. The Scheduled Castes population numbering 106 lakhs in the state is widely distributed across the geographical space and accounts for 15.93% of the total population of Andhra Pradesh and the population of Scheduled Tribes in the state with 42 lakhs accounts for 6.31% of the total population.

The growth rate of population during the year 1981-1991 is 24.20 in the state as against 23.85 in the country. The decadal growth rate shows a slight upward trend from 23.10 in 1981 to 24.20 in 1991.

The density of population has increased from 195 per sq.km. in 1981 to 242 in 1991. The districts with high density of population are West Godavari(454), Krishna(424) and East Godavari(420). The urban district of Hyderabad has the highest density of population viz. 14,499 while Adilabad district has the least density of population viz. 129.

The population of Andhra Pradesh constitutes 7.86% of the total population of India as per the 1991 census. During 1951-91, the population of the state has increased by 113.75%, while the increase was 63.19 % between 1901 and 1951. While the decennial population growth rate of India had decreased by 0.81 between 1981 to 1991, the growth rate of A.P. had increased by 1.10 in the corresponding period.

GROWTH OF POPULATION 1901 - 1991





The population of the state comprises of 50.70% of males and 49.30% of females. Rural population constitutes 73.10% of the total population in the state. Scheduled caste and Scheduled tribe population constitute 15.93 % and 6.31 % of the population of the state respectively. These population characteristics are more or less in conformity with the population characteristics of India. (Male : 51.9 %; Rural : 74.27 %; SCs : 16.43 %; STs : 8.08%)















In 1991 census, the population decennial growth rate of Andhra Pradesh (24.20) is more by 0.35 than the growth rate of India. While the birth rate of A.P. (2.63) is more by 0.28 than that of India, the death rate of the state is less by 0.07 than the death rate of India(0.98). The proportions of Urban, S.C. and S.T. population of the state are more or less the same with that of India.


POPULATION CHARACTERISTICS

INDIA vs ANDHRA PRADESH


GROWTH RATE




BIRTH RATE




DEATH RATE











DENSITY OF POPULATION



RURAL AND URBAN POPULATION



DISTRIBUTION OF SCHEDULED CASTES POPULATION







AREA, POPULATION AND DENSITY OF POPULATION, 1991


AREA

The density of the population in Hyderabad district is about 60 times of the density of the state. Among the other districts West Godavari district had the highest density (454) and Adilabad district has the lowest density (129) of population in the state. The coastal districts from Srikakulam to Guntur which are geographically contiguous are more densely populated in the state. The density of population of each of these 7 districts is significantly higher than the State average density (272).

(DISTRICTS)



(DISTRICTS).**



(DISTRICTS)**





POPULATION OF RELIGIOUS AND LINGUISTIC MINORITIES, 1991








Andhra Pradesh has the lowest literacy rate (44.09) among the four southern states of India. While, Kerala and Tamilnadu are having much higher literacy rates, Andhra Pradesh is having literacy rate much less when compared with the national average (52.21). LITERACY RATES OF ANDHRA PRADESH VS SOUTHERN STATES 1991



In the post-independence period (1951-91), the literacy rate of the state had increased by 28.88 %. There was almost a three-fold increase in the literacy rate from 1951 (15.21) to 1991 (44.09). The female literacy rate which was only 7.62 in 1951 had increased to 32.72 by 1991 i.e. a four-fold increase.

LITERACY RATES IN ANDHRA PRADESH 1901-1991



The literacy rates among S.C. and S.T. population are much less than the state average. While about one-third of the S.C. population are literate, not even one-fourth of the S.T. population are literate.

The position of female literacy is causing more concern. While only one-third of the females in general are literates, one-fourth of the S.C. females and not even one-tenth of the S.T. females are literates. These findings highlight the importance of the need for more efforts in the direction of education of S.C.s and S.T.s in general and girls' education in particular.

LITERACY RATES OF ANDHRA PRADESH 1991






While, Hyderabad district is having the highest literacy rate (71.52), Mahabubnagar district is having the lowest literacy rate (29.58). West Godavari, Krishna, Chittoor and Rangareddy are some of the districts that have fairly high literacy rates. The literacy rates are low in the districts of Nizamabad, Adilabad, Medak, Vizianagaram and Srikakulam. DISTRICT WISE LITERACY RATES IN ANDHRA PRADESH, 1991





NUMBER OF PRIMARY SCHOOLS - MANAGEMENT WISE (1995-96)



NUMBER OF UPPER PRIMARY SCHOOLS - MANAGEMENT WISE (1995-96)



NUMBER OF HIGH SCHOOLS - MANAGEMENT WISE (1995-96)



PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN 1995-96 OVER 1982-83



PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN 1995-96 OVER 1982-83



PERCENTAGE INCREASE IN 1995-96 OVER 1982-83







RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS IN A.P. 1995-96







1956-57 to 1995-96





TEACHERS IN UPPER PRIMARY SCHOOLS (1995 - 96)







TRAINED GRADUATE TEACHERS





ENROLMENT IN ANDHRA PRADESH 1956-57 to 1995-96



ENROLMENT IN PRIMARY SCHOOLS (1995 - 96)



ENROLMENT IN UPPER PRIMARY SCHOOLS (1995-96)



ENROLMENT IN HIGH SCHOOLS (1995 - 96)



CLASS I - ENROLMENT FROM 1977-78 TO 1995-96





SCHEDULED CASTES



SCHEDULED TRIBES







ENROLMENT IN OPEN SCHOOL STUDY CENTRES 1995-96



ENROLMENT IN RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS (1995-96)



EXCLUDING DAY SCHOLARS





SCHEDULED CASTES











CLASSES I - V 1995-96



CLASSES I - V 1995-96



CLASSES I - V 1995-96



CLASSES I - VII 1995-96



CLASSES I - VII 1995-96



CLASSES I - VII 1995-96



 1995-96



DISTRICT WISE PASSES



DISTRICT WISE PERCENTAGE OF PASSES



OPEN SCHOOLS IN ANDHRA PRADESH (1995-96)







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









ESTIMATED POPULATION OF HANDICAPPED CHILDREN IN ANDHRA PRADESH 1993





ENROLMENT IN THE TOTAL LITERACY CAMPAIGN (1995-96)



PER CAPITA EXPENDITURE ON EDUCATION IN ANDHRA PRADESH






FROM 1992-93 TO 1996-97 (VIII PLAN PERIOD)**






