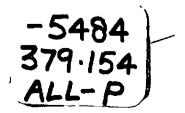

# WORKING GROUP ON EDUCATION (PLANNING COMMISSION)

# Gist of Plan Discussions (dated 5-12-87) On Annual Plan of 1988-89

Note on discussions held with Sri M. R. Korhatkar, Adviser (Edn) Planning Commission, New Delhi, on 5th December, 1987.

The Annual Plan of 1988-89 of Education Department of our State was discussed with the officials of the Planning Commission at New Delhi on 5-12-1987. Sri M.R. Korhatkar, Adviser (Edn) Planning Commission, New Delhi, presided over the meeting.

In the discussions, Secretary Education (Sri R. Parthasarathy, I.A.S.) was assisted by Kum. K. Sujatha Rao, I.A.S. (D.S.E.) Smt. Chaya Ratan, I.A.S. (D.T.E.), and Dr. K. Subramanyam, Deputy Director of Higher Education. The discussions started at 1.00 p.m. and ended by 3.30 p.m. First, the programmes of elementary and Adult Education were discussed. Later, there was discussion on Secondary and Higher Education. At the end, the schemes pertaining to Technical Education, Art and Culture, Sports and Youth Services were discussed.

The outlays proposed by the State Government for 1988-89 and the outlays agreed to by the Planning Commission under each item are given below:

# Planning Commission (Education Division)

# Subject: Comments on Annual Plan 1988-89—Education-Andhra Pradesh

The State Government of Andhra Pradesh has proposed an amount of Rs. 95.67 crores for Annual Plan 1988-89 as against current years' approved outlay of Rs. 63.50 crores, budgetted outlay of Rs. 89.64 crores and anticipated expenditure of 62.36 crores. The likely expenditure in the first three years of the plan would be Rs. 144.07 crores. The sub-head wise progress of expenditure during 1985-87, outlays in current year and proposed next year may be seen at Annexure I. The following points emerge for consideration:

- (i) The proposed outlay on total education, in-dieates a step up of 51 per cent over the current year's approved outlay.
- (ii) Being educationally backward state Planning Commission in the Seventh Plan allocated an outlay of Rs. 96 crores for Elementary Sector, but the State has budgetted only Rs. 61 crores against this.
- (iii) Although under Elementary, the actual expenditure improved over the budgetted outlays in 1985-87, the performance in Adult Education had been poor. During 1985-86 only Rs. 1.10 crore against Rs. 2.15 crore approved, in 1986-87 only Rs. 1.51 crore against Rs. 4 crores.
- (iv) The physical achievements too were lower than targetted in the Elementary and Adult Education, over the years.

- (v) Under Secondary Education the proposed set up is very high *i.e.* 34 per cent of the budgetted outlay. At the same time the anticipated expenditure is much less than budgetted *i.e.* only Rs. 8.36 crores against Rs. 24.70 crores.
- (vi) The anticipated expenditure under University Education, is much lower than budgetted i.e. Rs. 12.97 crores against Rs. 16.02 crores.
- (vii) There is no increase in the proposed outlays for Technical Education and Sports & Youth Services.
- (viii) An amount of Rs 6.82 crores has been proposed for capital works under Elementary & Secondary Education.

#### 2. Elementary Education (MNP):

Against the approved outlay of Rs. 2385.00 lakhs, budgetted outlay of Rs. 3472.00 lakhs and anticipated expenditure of Rs. 2870.88 lakhs in the current year, the proposed outlay is Rs. 3150.46 lakhs for 1988-89. Some of the schemes for which very high outlays have been proposed are as under:

3. About 7 lakh additional target of enrolment was approved under 20 Point Programme, at the Elementary Stage. The G. N. 3 statement indicates a target of 7800 against 7839 at primary stage and 1863 against 1946 at middle stage in the current year. Also the anticipated achievement is lower than the target indicating a short fall of 3 lakh children at primary and 89 thousand children at middle stage. The proposed additional target for 1988-89 is enrolment of 5 lakh at primary and 2.66 lakh at middle stage (tolal 7.66 lakh children). A back log of enrolment

of 3.89 lakh children would still remain to be covered. Iff the State Government is aiming to achieve universalisatiom by 1990, the physical performance needs to be accelerated both by formal and non-formal system of Education.

The teacher pupil ratio is highest in the State i.e. 1:522 at primary and 1:41 at Middle Stage as compared to AllI India's 1:41 and 1:36 respectively. The G.N. 3 statement has not indicated number of teachers to be appointed at various levels. This may be ascertained.

- 4. Adult Education: There is slow progress in implementation of this programme. In the current year keepings in this view, the outlay was kept low, i.e. Rs. 290 lakhis against Rs. 400 lakhs in 1986-87 (Actual expenditure only Rs. 151.21 lakhs). In view of the low literacy rate in the state the targets need to be achieved fully. For next year, although the proposed outlays are higher than the current year, the physical targets have been kept same i.e. 4.618 lakh adults. The State may explore the possibility of taking up low cost programmes to improve literacy rate.
- 5. Secondary Education: As against current year's budgetted outlay of Rs. 2470 lakhs and anticipated expenditure of Rs. 836 lakhs, the State Government has proposed Rs. 32.99 lakhs for 1988-89 which includes a capital content of Rs. 305 lakhs. Major step up is indicated in the following Schemes:

# 6 Direction, Administration and Supervision:

As against current year's budgetted outlay of Rs. 84.66 lakhs, the likely expenditure is only Rs. 6.00 lakhs. For 988-89, a sum of Rs. 86.01 lakhs has been proposed. Of this Rs. 71.69 lakhs is for continuance of 263 Mandal Educational Officers in the cadre of Dy. Inspectors of Schools (the anticipated is nil against budgetted outlay of Rs. 50.00 lakhs in the current year). The new scheme is for continuance of 26 Accounts Officers posts for each DEO office and for the Directorate with an outlay of Rs. 9.17 lakhs. This may be discussed.

**Higher Education:** The proposed outlay is Rs. 1685.00 lekhs (capital Rs. 104.55 lakhs) as against current year's anticipated Rs. 1297.32 lakhs. In the current year, a number of new schemes have been taken up which include, () Establishment of Telugu Chair in Madurai University, (2) Construction of Govt. Jr. College, Hindupur, (3) Contimation of P.G. Courses sanctioned during 1986-87, (4) Grants-in-aid to private degree colleges, (5) Sanction of one Deputy Director and staff in Directorate of S.G. Plan Sheme, (6) Special Coaching programme to S.G. students, (7) Creation of 3 Residential Jr. Colleges for Scheduled Castes, (8) New Jr. College in S.T. area, (9) Construction o' S.G. Hostels, (10) Computer Application Course, (11) Continuation of new government colleges started during current year, 4 Junior and 7 degree colleges. The State Covernment may be requested to concentrate on consoliation of existing colleges, improve facilities and quality of taching. The strength of students, faculty and other information may be ascertained. An amount of Rs. 550 lakes theludes Rs. 300 lakhs for Telugu University) as grant-inaid to various universities, is proposed.

Technical Education: The outlays have been proposed atourrent year's level i.e. Rs. 516.00 lakhs, with a capital content of Rs. 87.00 lakhs. The State Government needs reprovide adequately for consolidation and modernisation. Most of the capital is for the polytechnics but it is not clear many of them have building component. The proposed outlays have been considerably increased for the scheme of Assistance to Universities for technical education (Rs. 70 lakhs) and Engineering/technical colleges & institutions (Rs. 10 lakhs). The new scheme of the current war is scholarships and for next year, scheme of Book Promotion is envisaged. A list of 9 new schemes has been

given in the Draft proposals, outlays for which have been proposed under the Board heads mentioned above.

Art and Culture: An amount of Rs. 195.74 lakhs; have been proposed for 1988-89 against the Planning Commission's current year's approved outlay of Rs. 234 lakhs,, budgetted outlay of Rs. 134 lakhs and anticipated expenditure of Rs. 172 lakhs. The Working Group on Education suggested that the State's contribution towards the Zonall Cultural Centre should be fully provided in 1987-88. It is mentioned that only an amount of Rs. 19 lakhs was sance toned towards this and for next year, only Rs. 20 lakhs has been proposed. The names of schemes where high outlays have been proposed, are as under:

# Sports and Youth Services:

The proposed outlays have been kept at current year's level i.e. Sports (Rs. 98 lakhs) Youth Services (Rs. 14 lakhs) and Yuvashakti (Rs. 36 lakhs). The activities include conduct of rural Sports, inter-district-tournaments, for tribal youth and school children, coaching camps, cash awards to National Championships, International and Asian games and provide financial assistance to Sports Clubs, Sportsmen and women in indigent circumstances. No new schemes are envisaged.

There has been a steady growth in the number of Schools number of teachers appointed resulting in an impressive increase in the enrolment figures in respect of Elementary Education and Secondary Education. The following figures speak for themselves.

It can be observed that there has been all round progress in establishment of new schools, increase in strength of teachers resulting in significant growth in the school going children. The 3000 and 600 primary schools have been upgraded into upper primary schools. The addition of 860 high schools is remarkable in the sense that on an average every district registered an increase of 40 high schools.

Similarly, the figures of teachers show that after (1983) 14,300 primary 6200 upper primary 6380 high school teachers have been appointed. As a result of the

above measures, there have been substantial increase and in the enrolment of school going children, primary schools according on an increasing of 10.63 lakhs, upper primary schools 4.07 lakhs, High Schools 4.60 lakhs. The enormous increase of nearly 20 lakhs students in various schools is a notable achievement.

It is proposed to enrol 5 lakhs students every year in the age group of 6-11 and 2.66 lakhs in the age group of 11-13 every year *i.e.*, in primary and upper primary schools.

Comparative enrolment figures of boys and girls are shown in the appended statement (appended). From the year, 1982-83 onwards in respect of primary upper primary and High schools. The statement also shows the breakup in respect of S.C. and S.T. students. The increase in the enrolment of girls is higher than the boys in general.

#### **Secondary Education:**

This Government took a decision as a policy matter to establish Government High Schools at Mandal Head-quarters to fill in gaps where there are no high schools under any management. There are only 84 Mandal Head-quarters where there are no high schools at all, as from 1983 as many 860 high schools have been established. During 1986-87 orders were issued to establish 20 high schools, at a cost of Rs. 67 lakhs and it is programmed to cover the remaining Mandals in the next couple of years.

In order to impart Secondary Education according to the revised curricula giving weitage to Science Education, providing of science equipment to secondary schools gained importance and during the 1985-86. Government sanctioned Rs. 11.92 lakhs to 159 Z.P. High Schools and Rs.4 lakhs to 54 Government High Schools in the state. A sum of Rs.50 lakhs was sanctioned in 1986-87. It is proposed to increase the allocation by Rs.100 lakhs during 1987-88 besides Rs.33 lakhs already sanctioned.

It can be seen that the Budget Provision has been increased three fold in respect of Elementary Education under Plan and doubled in case of non-plan. There has been ten fold in budgetory allocation for Secondary Education under Plan and nearly doubled in case of non-plan. Similarly the allocation in respect of Language Development has been doubled. The increased budget allocation was necessitated for expansion of educational Programme such as Universalisation of Education, Welfare of teaching community, grant of scholarships and distribution of free Text Books, Dresses etc.

# (c) Non-Formal Education

It has been introduced in the state from 1979-80 to enrol drop-out children of age group 9-14 into the fold of Primary Education. There were only 6780 centres with as many instructors covering only 169500 children. But by the end of 1986-87 the number of centres increased to 17,792. These 17,792 instructors with 263 supervisors the enrolment has touched new heights of 4,44,800. At present, the centres numbering 24,572. It is heartening to note that out of the above centres 1012 are exclusively meant for girls. Budgetory provision is as follows:

As per the new education policy and its guidelines it has been decided to adopt project approach to facilitate better supervision of NFE centres. The project approach is briefly as follows:

- (a) Conversion of existing centres into projects at the rate of 100 centres into one project.
- (b) Strengthening of District Level administration by providing one Asst. Director with supporting staff, one Project Officer and one part time Supervisor at the rate of 8—12 centres.
- (c) Conversion of 25% co-educational centres into Girls centres (planned by state)
- (d) Providing re-orientation of 20 days to the instructors.

Besides taking steps to spread education to each nook and corner of state the Government have been taken several measures for the welfare of teacher community.

#### School Buildings:

The programme of construction of school building has been taken up on a massive scale. By the end of 6th plan there were 18655 schools without pucca buildings. Under the assistance of 8th Finance Commission it is proposed to construct 2992 buildings by 1990. During 1983-84, 3560 class rooms in 330 former Panchayat Samithi and 4064 class rooms and school buildings under the control of Zilla Parishads were constructed upto November, 1985. Under NREP programme it is proposed to construct 5588 buildings by 1990 of which 4621 buildings were constructed upto November, 1985. The number of school buildings taken up during 1985-86, 1986-87 are as follows:

Besides survey was made under Operation Black Board, covering 3826 schools. Out of which it was lound that 3148 class rooms are to be constructed. An amount of Rs. 420 lakhs for construction of 1952 class rooms was sanctioned during the year 1987-88 by the Govt. under the 8th Finance Commission. The rest of the class rooms are proposed to be covered under RLEGP/NREP and other unspent plans.

# **Scholarships**:

Apart from the existing scholarships the State Govt: have introduced novel scholarships by name Telugu Vignana Parithoshikam which provides award of scholarship to the meritorius students who secure top rank in marks every year for 7th Class common examination irrespective of caste, creed, community or economic status of the candidate. Scholarship is awarded to the first 150 students in each district which consists of Rs. 500 p.a. which will be continued for 3 years i.e., up to 10th Class. Number of beneficiaries during 1987-88 is 10350 in 10th Class, 6099 in 9th Class and 3450 in 8th Class. It involves an expenditure of Rs. 51.75 lakhs this year. Similar Parithoshikam scheme is available for students passing 10th class in merit.

#### Text-books

Prior to 1983 books were priced according to number of pages it contained and some text books such as Maths VIII class used to cost Rs. 16 as it was a bulky volume. Now there has been a revision of the rates. The Government have decided that no text book should cost more than Rs. 6 and the price structure has been rationalised. Another step taken in the right direction was that price of the textbook will not increase year after year.

The system of distribution of books through HMs and other agencies which was not running smoothly has been revised and now the books are distributed through FEDCON single agency on a commission of 8%. FEDCON in turn distributes the books at village level to Primary Co-operative Societies.

# Free Distribution:

The Government have introduced the system of free distribution of text books and dresses (two pairs) for children of green card holders studying in class 1 and 2 during 1985-86 and extended to the children of 3rd class also during 1987-88. The number of beneficiaries during 1986-87 was 18 lakhs and it expected to increase to 22 lakhs during 1987-88.

# Vocationalisation:

The curriculum in High Schools is not related to the world work and to the needs of the children to face their life with confidence. The Government of A.P. have therefore, decided to introduce vocational course at V-II 3x

School level in order to develop productive Schemes in students. Accordingly during 1984-85 vocational courses were introduced in 105 schools and during 1985-86 it was extended to 240 Schools.

The objectives of these courses are:

- 1. To expose the students to Vocational practices in the fields relevant to the socio economic activities of the area.
- 2. To make the students appreciate the need for skilled man-power requirement in the community service sector and unorganised sector and to take up the work willingly.
- 3. To prepare the students in such a way that they become employment worthy and would take up wage or self employment after apprenticeship training.

The following are the courses introduced.

- A. Economic and Commercial Stream:

  Knitting and Garment Making, Laundry, Darning and Dry Cleaning.
- B. Technical and Crafts Stream:
  - 1. House wiring and Domestic Electrical appliances.
  - 2. Radio, Transistor and T.V. Repairs and servicing.
  - 3. Farm Machinery Repairs and General Mechanic.
  - 4. Composing, Printing and Book Binding.
  - 5. Carpentry.
- C. Sericulture and allied subjects Stream:
  - 1. Poultry
  - 2. Pisciculture
  - 3. Horticulture
  - 4. Sericulture.

The Government is very keen in providing vocational education to as many students as possible in phased manner during 7th and 8th commission. It has been decided to establish workshops in every mandal head-quarters for covering practical training in the vocational courses.

#### TRIBAL EDUCATION

With a view to improving the Tribal education, Government have opened 4 offices of D.E.Os. and 4 offices

of DDEOs, under the integrated tribal development agencies. One thousand Teachers have been appointed in Tribal areas to cover the Villages where there is no School. It is also programmed to appoint another 1090 teachers in Tribal areas.

#### Urdu Medium Schools in Andhra Pradesh

Government of Andhra Pradesh is very liberal in promoting Urdu language at Secondary level vide G.O.Ms. No. 472, dated 4-7-77 it was ordered that Primary Education in Urdu Medium shall be provided wherever there are a minimum of 10 pupils and to open a school if 30 pupils are available. Like that for Secondary class the minimum strength is 15 and for school 45. The number of Urdu Medium schools including sections are as follows.

#### Text Books:

Andhra Pradesh is the first State to Nationalise Text Books from Class I to X and prepare the entire syllabi in Urdu. Text Books are printed and supplied to all schools in the State. At present there is no problem of Urdu Medium Books in the state.

Roaster System: Govt. vide G. O. Rt. No. 2138 dt. 19.11.82 relaxed the roaster system in respect of Urdu Medium teachers recruitment.

There are only 4 TTI's were existing. In 1984 three are at Guntur, Kurnool and Vikarabad are started with an intake capacity of 50 students.

# Urdu Academy:

With an intention to promote Urdu language and literature in A.P. at School level and College level Govt. of Andhra Pradesh has enhanced the grant of Urdu Academy from Rs. 5 lakhs to 8 lakhs from 1986-87. Previously the grant of Urdu Academy was only 5 lakhs.

#### Urdu Medium Residential School:

Before 1983 there were no Urdu Medium Residential Schools in the State. There was constant pressure on the Government to open one Urdu Medium residential school in the State.

Government of Andhra Pradesh sanctioned one Urdu Medium Residential school in the year 1986-87 at Hyderabad. This Urdu Medium residential school is first of its nature in the entire country.

# Language Policy:

Government of Andhra Pradesh permitted the Urdu Medium students to opt three language formula under which the Medium of Instruction is Urdu. Second Language Telugu starts for Class III and English from VI Class. This facility of three language formula is extended to Urdu Medium vide G.O. Ms. No. 294 dated 4-7-86.

# Recruitment and filling up of Urdu Medium vacancies:

It was brought to the notice of the Department that there are several vacancies falling vacant due to mass recruitment of Urdu teachers. Director of School Education has given instructions to all District Educational Officers to fill up the vacancies in the year 1986-87.

# Permission to appoint even untrained Medium Graduates:

Government issued orders vide G.O. Ms. No. 709 Edn dt. 17-8-82 to fill up the vacancies by untrained graduates if trained graduates are not available.

- (A) Future Plan: In view of the day by day expansion of Urdu Medium Schools and strength under plan scheme of 1988-89 it is proposed to Government to sanction the following posts:
  - 1. 68 B.Ed. Asst. Posts.
  - 2. 54 Urdu Pandits.
  - 3. 205 SGBT (Urdu Medium)

An amount of 71 lakh rupees per annum required.

- (B) IX Finance Commission:
- 1. Under IX Finance Commission it is proposed to sanction 1908 SGBT posts involving an expenditure of 378 lakhs.
- 2. 13,586 B.Ed. Asst. posts are proposed under IX Finance Commission which involves 3577 lakhs per annum.

# A. P. RESIDENTIAL EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS SOCIETY

The Society is a Registered Society, established with a view to providing residential educational facilities. Prior to 1983-84 there were 10 schools and 2 colleges established by the society. From 83-84 to 87-88 the Govt. have sanctioned 69 schools and 4 colleges. Thus it may be seen that there is an enormous increase in the activities. The number of students benefited prior to 83-84 was 5,116 and from 83-84 to 87-88 there is an increase of 19,837 students nearly about four times. The number of teachers prior to 83-84 was 640 and during 83-84 to 86-87 2,265 teachers were appointed. The expenditure increased 10 fold from Rs. 121.13 lakhs in 83-84 to 1316.59 lakhs during 86-87. One of the features of the society is that the lodging and boarding facilities are provided to the students free of cost.

The following amenities are provided to the ST students:

- (a) School Uniforms, Bed Sheets, Towels and Games, Uniforms, Trunk Box, Chappals are supplied to the students of STs free of cost.
- (b) To and fro fares are being paid to the students to go to their homes during vacation.

- (c) Text Books and Note Books are supplied free of cost.
- (d) Cosmetic material and compas boxes are supplied free of cost.

# ADULT EDUCATION SCHEMES IN ANDHRA PRADESH

(For the upliftment of the poorer sections of the society)

The state of Andhra Pradesh is implementing Adult Education Schemes with the major objective of eradication of illiteracy in this State. In addition to imparting literacy and numeracy, it also aims at inculcating social awareness among the illiterate population and to improve their functionality.

# Programme at present:

The different projects functioning at present are as under:

- (i) Rural Functional Literacy Projects:— This is a major centrally sponsored scheme under which funds are provided on cent per cent basis in accordance with the approved financial pattern. The number of Rural Functional Literacy projects in the state at present are 26.
- (ii) State Adult Education Projects: At present the number of State Adult Education projects in the state is 26.

In the sixth and seventh five year plan (1980-85 and 1986-90) priority had been given to the programme of Adult Education by including it in the minimum heeds programme. All the illiterate Adults in the age group 15.35 shall have to be covered under literacy programme, by 1990. Special emphasis is laid on enrolment of women the programme. In order to achieve the objective of the order of Adult illiteracy the following strategies were adopted during the sixth and seventh plan period.

- To cover districts with literacy rate below national level; priority to the target group of women, SCs. STs. and other Weaker sections of the society.
- To provide grant-in-aid to voluntary agencies in the field of Adult Education which have no communal leanings.
- To strengthen post literacy programme to avoid relapse in to illiteracy of the neo-literates and

— To utilize the mass media for eradication of illiteracy and for motivational purpose.

In the seventh Five Year Plan an outlay of Rs. 2050 lakhs was provided in the budget under State Programme and the enrolment target is 14.04 lakhs and the achievement both under Physical and financial target are as follows:

Adult Education through Voluntary Agencies: There is a central scheme of assistance to Voluntary Agencies working in the field of Adult Education under this scheme. The Registered Voluntary Societies are sanctional literacy and post-literacy. The grant is given on projects, basis at the rate of 100% on programme cost and 75% on administrative cost for field projects. At present 6 Voluntary Agencies are provided grant-in-aid in the state

It could be seen from the above statement that there is an all round development in the Higher Education activities whether it be in terms of the increase in number of Colleges and Universities or in respect of budgetory allocation.

The following are some of the innovative Schemes introduced by this Government since 1983.

#### 1. Vocational Education:

The present system of Education is not in a position to throw open employment avenues to the students coming out from Colleges. With a view to linking the Employment source with the studies this Government has introduced vocationalisation of Education not only at this school stage but also at the Intermediate (+2) stage. As a result of this it is hoped that the students coming out from these Colleges will have full potentiality to enter into gainful employment. In the next 3 years about 40 crores of Rupees will be spent under this Programme.

# 2. Scholarships:

In addition to the existing Scholarships of Social Welfare Department and National Scholarships etc., this State Government has introduced a novel scholarship by name Telugu Vignana Paritoshikam. It envisages award of meritorious Scholarships to the merited students irrespective of caste, creed, community or any other economic status of the students. For the 1st top ranking 100 students in every district who secure highest marks in the SSC Public Examinations a cash award of Rs. 750/-P.A. will be paid during the two years Intermediate Course. So also for the 1st 50 students in each district who secure highest marks in Intermediate Examination will be awarded a cash prize of Rs. 1000/- P.A. for the 3 Year Degree Course. The number of beneficiaries during 1985-86 was 3,450, during 1986-87 6,900 and during 1987-88 it went up to 10,350.

# 3. Special Coaching Scheme:

Centralised coaching for select research students appearing for Engineering and Medical Courses has been introduced from 1985-86 onwards. Progressive Regional Coaching at select places is introduced for Senior Intermediate Class Students for enabling them to prepare for Intermediate final Examination.

# 4. Computer application Courses:

This Government is committed to encourage computer application courses which will provide better job opportunities to the youth. During 1987-88 an amount of Rs. 100 lakhs has been provided for this Scheme.

#### **College Service Commission:**

With a view to streamlining the recruitment of the teaching staff to private Degree and Junior Colleges this Government have established A.P. College Service Commission.

#### Universities:

From January, 1983 two General Universities and One Professional University have been established. They are (i) Sri Padmavati Mahila Viswavidyalayam to promote interests of women's education. (ii) Telugu Vignana Peetham intended to promote the glorious heritage of the Telugu Speaking People. These acclaimed as unique Institutions.

The Government has strengthened the Open University.

The Syndicates in these Universities have been reconstituted with compact bodies.

There is a vast increase in the number of branch libraries and libraries as a result of increased budget provision during 1983-84 to 1986-87.

Plan provision has gone up to Rs. 80 lakhs from 10.00 lakhs. Non-Plan provision has also steadily increased from 248.08 lakhs to Rs. 394.41 lakhs. The libraries cess collections have improved from Rs. 143.35 lakhs to about Rs. 250.00 lakhs. The total book stock has steadily increased from 87.92 lakhs to about 105 lakhs. The percentage of literate population covered has gone up from 58.09 lakhs to 70.00 lakhs. During 85-86 and 86-87 as many as 634 branch libraries have been sanctioned with a view to open one branch library in each of the 1,104 mandal headquart-The Government have also decided to provide Information Centre in each of the branch libraries by naming them as "Telugu Vignana Samachara Kendram". A State Institute of Library Education Research & Training has been set up during 86-87. Government have decided to introduce Mobile Libraries in all districts, provide modern gadgets and audio-visual aids in all village libraries in a phased manner.

### STATE ARCHIVES

As on now the Central office is having very valuable records in Persian, Urdu, Marathi, Telugu, Hindi and English totalling more than 10 millions. It is considered to be one of the bigest store houses of Persian records in the entire world. It has an Interim Repository in Secretariat storing about 14,00,000 Government Records. Scientific Preservation of these valuable old records of Historical importance has received the attention of Government. It is programmed to get a large number of old Telugu manuscripts and palm-leaf documents from Saraswathi Mahal Library, Tanjavur by microfilming. Similarly old records in the custody of Ex-Maharaja of

Vizianagaram will also be micro-filmed. A Computer has been installed in the office. Photographic and Micro-filming Cameras and processing equipment have been provided. It is publishing a highly acclaimed Research Journal called 'Itihas'. Rare documents like Mackenzie and Brown collections and some diaries and manuscripts of eminent persons like T. Prakasam, Gurajada Appa Rao etc., are preserved.

## Progress Report so far and Points for Consideration

Under operation Black Board this year 1987-88 schools in 100 mandals are taken up. Next year it is proposed to take up to cover 250 mandals if any backlog is thereof this year it will be taken up next year.

An exhaustive note is given separately.

Audio-Visual: The building programme of schools is essential to introduce audio-visual scheme to ensure safety.

For Elementary education an allotment of Rs. 27 crores is proposed (23+4). Out of this 17 crores required set apart for supply of uniforms dresses and Text Books the amount left out is very meagre. Therefore 400 lakhs is provided for this year and next year only token grant is provided to the extent of 10 lakhs under supply of uniforms and text-books.

Urdu Medium Schools:- It is suggested that for each region one Residential School of Urdu Medium will be taken up in three regions of State as there is a representation from minorities to start such schools.

In Tribal areas 1600 schools are newly opened. The funds are going to be met out of allotment from the 8th Finance Commission.

Much of the budget allocation for School Education is towards salaries only. With the result the amount for other programmes is not sufficient.

It was desired that under social service massive 2 provision to the tune of Rs. 50 lakhs is required for introducing technical training centres i. e. crafts etc. for 3 students.

An amount of Rs. 250 lakhs is provided for laboratory equipment, but it is reduced to allocation of Rs. 150 lakhs.

National Institute of Educational

An amount of 12 crores is to be required for grant-in-aid for covering schools of Z.P. and Municipalities.

In each mandal one M. E. O. post is to be created with the projectisation of N. F. E. programme certain number of supervisors will be available being surplus for post of M. E. Os.

Under introduction of Vocational Courses it is desired to have workshop in each mandal headquarters.

An amount of 80 crores is required for all Mandals to be covered. An amount of 100 lakhs this year and 600 lakhs for next year is provided for the workshops.

It is desired that each district an Accounts Officer under D. E. O. is required and Chief Accounts Officer in D. S. E. office. The proposal is under process.

Extra number of teachers will be required to maintain teacher pupil ratio. An amount of 200 lakhs is required for about 1250 lecturers posts to be created in this regard, especially there is dearth in mathematics and science. T. T. I. schools also required 75 lakhs for creation of posts of teachers. This has to be taken up in phased programme.

Physically handicapped schools are transferred to Education Department since G. O. transferring the said subject from Education to Women and Child Welfare Department is kept in abeyance. The Director physically handicapped informed that a list of schools with budget non-plan has been intimated to D. H. E. One Brainy Institute in each district has to be considered.

Physical education one additional college for each district may be considered. The cost of each college will be about 100 lakhs.

Under S. C. E. R. T. and S. I. E. T. the staff existing is now sufficient. Creation of some more staff is required.

Grant-in-aid to the extent of 300 lakhs is required for private aided schools in addition to 1200 lakhs required for Z.P. and Municipal schools.

50 mandals D.I.E.T. programme is taken up.

U.K. project proposal scheme are to be finalised.

It is proposed for construction of school buildings to have an amount of Rs. 400 lakhs and 150 lakhs

for the schools in rural and urban areas respectively. Apart from this an allotment of Rs. 30 crores from N.R.E.P. Vimukti Scheme is going to be explored.

An amount of 53 lakhs at the rate of 150 pupils for each district is provided under this vignana parithoshikam scheme pass out for 7th Class will be given merit scholarships Rs. 500 per annum for each for 8th, 9th and 10th classes restricting to number of 150 students for each district in order of merit and depending upon their performance in those classes.

There is immediate necessity of creation of teacher posts under OP. B, N. F. E. etc.

While allocating the funds the allocation under S.C.P., and T.S.P. and T.P.P. is to be kept in view.

#### D.H.E.

It is informed that in allocations 14% per S.Cs. and 6.5% S.Ts. were considered.

For ongoing schemes Rs. 1200 lakhs is provided against the total allotment of 1685 lakhs provided for 1988-89. New schemes are being taken in the year 1987-88 as indicated below. The same schemes are continued in the year 1988-89.

It is desired to have book banks in some of the selected Colleges and Universities.

Under U.G.C. Grants the amounts to be borne by

Under U.G.C. Grants the amounts to be borne by the state after five years commitment of payment by U.G.C. is to be indicated by each of the Universities. Universities are addressed in this regard, the Andhra University and Kakatiya Universities and Osmania Universities informed only a matching share of 50% is to be provided for construction of buildings under plan schemes. So far as salaries amounts to be borne by the State after 5 years

and 20% share to be borne by the state in U.G.C. scale for the succeeding years a provision is to be made in blocks grants which is included in the Non-Plan. And there are no other commitment for the state towards Universities.

Under U.G.C. guidance certain autonomous colleges have been opened.

Grant-in-aid: An amount of 57 crores is being given under non-plan. Apart from this an amount of 5 crores is required for admitting colleges to grant-in-aid in this year. More number of colleges are going to become eligible in coming years for admission into grant-in-aid. And a huge amount is required in this regard.

Every year 20 new colleges both junior and degree colleges are coming up. Number of lecturers required 400 approximately.

An amount of 95 lakhs is to be provided for construction of degree colleges matching with 50% share of the U.G.C./Centre.

An amount of 10 lakhs is provided for Residential Colleges in S.T. areas this includes construction of school buildings.

2 Regional Directors posts are created under Higher Education and Accounts Officer are to be provided.

There are 159 Government degree colleges and 396 Government Junior colleges. There are 202 private degree colleges and 248 private junior colleges. There is necessity of upgrading existing junior colleges to degree colleges. Every year 10 colleges can be upgraded the amount required for each junior college to be upgraded is 7 lakhs. This is to be on optimum basis.

Under Vocational courses scheme there are at present 115 colleges taken up for vocational courses with 26 vocational courses. These vocational courses are taken up in Scheduled Tribe areas also.

It is desired that one Residential College for each district both for degree as well as junior college is to be taken up. The amount for each college required is Rs. 40 lakhs. Girls colleges also are required to be considered.

The buildings for junior colleges with 100% satisfactory are available to the extent of 10% only. There is need for provision for construction of buildings.

It is desired to have P. G. Centres in each district headquarters. Presently centres sanctioned in Mahboobnagar, Nalgonda, Nizamabad and Siddipet are to be transferred, to Universities (Osmania University) with a condition that qualified lecturers in Government should be taken in the said colleges.

### (C) Minorities

For the continuance of Urdu Medium Residential schools started during 1986-87 an amount of Rs. 8.28 lakhs was provided in the Annual Plan 1987-88 and 23 posts were sanctioned for the purpose. A sum of Rs. 9.11 lakhs is proposed in the Annual Plan 1988-89.

It is also proposed now to sanction the post of Urdu lecturers wherever necessary. It is also proposed to start residential schools at Cuddapah, Mahabubnagar, Nalgonda and Warangal. (Parakal). It is further proposed to start exclusively for girls a Urdu Junior College in R. R. District.

Under 20 Point programme for Elementary Education an amount of Rs. 135.00 lakes was allocated for the entire VIIth Plan.

### SCHOOL EDUCATION

#### 7. Evaluation

#### A Brief Introduction

The first meeting was organised on 19-6-87 and 20-6-87 to review the work of the Dist. Educational officers to get feed back from the field level. Detailed discussions were held on enrolment, construction of School Buildings, supply of Text Books, opening of new schools/recognition, teachers grievances, filling up of vacancies, pension cases, auditing and financial management etc. In all the items of work, specific targets have been fixed for each district and the Dist. Educational officers have been requested to achieve the targets as fixed.

The minutes of the meeting were communicated to all the Dist. Educational officers vide D.O.Lr.No. 900/E1787, datd 4-7-87 to take necessary action at field level.

The minutes of the meeting were again reviewed by the Director of School Education on 12th and 13th August, 1987. Several important items like free distribution of dresses and text books, school complex programmes, improvement of standards in schools, construction of school buildings, accounts etc., were discussed in detail and Dist. Educational Officers were asked to submit the information as per the time schedule given for each item of work. The Dist. Educational officers were asked to strictly adhere to the prescribed time-schedule.

Inspite of the instructions given it is observed that progress on certain items like free distribution of books/dresses, proposals of upgradation of schools, monitoring of plan schemes, grading of inspectors and their work are not found to be satisfactory.

Therefore, it is felt that further review is necessary to accelerate the work at field level. The Dist. Educational officers are requested to submit their plan of action on the items already discussed in the previous meetings. They are also requested to ensure that prompt action is taken on the proposed items in the present conference.

### (A) Universalisation of the Elementary Education:

By the end of 1990 the estimated population of children of age groups 6 to 11 and 11 to 13 is 89.38 lakhs and 31.59 lakhs respectively. By the end of VI Plan i.e 1984-85,

the enrolment of children in the age group 6-11 was 64.88 lakhs and, 11 to 13 was 12.68 lakhs. It was targetted to enrol 25.00 lakhs children in the age group 6-11 and 13.30 lakhs in the age group 11-13, additionally by 1990, to achieve 100% enrolment in the age groups of 6-11 and 11-13.

During the current year *i.e.* 1987-88 targets have been fixed district-wise and communicated to all the District Educational Officers for the age groups 6-11 and 11-13.

### (C) Audio-Visual Education:

Primary School instruction with the help of Audiovisual aids is being attempted for the first time in the country in Primary Schools. Under the first phase, 600 schools predominantly in rural areas have been supplied with equipment, at the rate of 200 each in Krishna, Chittoor and Nalgonda Districts. An estimated 60,000 children will be covered. Instructional material through Audio-visual aid has been prepared for Classes I and II in the first instance.

The detailed particulars of the scheme with regard to the expenditure incurred, schools covered, and children benefited for 1986-87, 1987-88 is as shown below:—

The Dist. Educational officers have been asked to provide watch and ward in the selected Primary Schools where the Audio-visual Education is introduced and equipment supplied.

### (D) Social Forestry Programme/Gardening in the Schools:

Government have decided that the programme of afforestation should be taken-up under the scheme of Social Forestry in the schools with the co-operation and co-ordination of Forest Department (District Forest Officer). Based on these instructions orders were issued to all the Dist. Educational Officers to implement the programme. So far many of Dist. Educational Officers have not yet taken-up the programme. Recently, Government have issued orders to implement the programme effectively and ordered to allot half-an-hour every day to the social forestry programme for gardening in the schools. Accordingly all the Dist. Educational Officers were requested through this office D. O. L. No. 482 NEP. I. 2/87 dated 7-9-1987 to implement the above programme.

### Action Point:

All District Educational Officers are requested urgently identify the schools having water facility and obtain seedlings for raising a fence as well as a garden.

## (E) Non-Formal Education

### Budget:

The budget provided for the year 1987-88 is Rs. 682.318 lakhs. The State Government's share is 412.66 lakhs and that of Government of India's is Rs. 269.658 lakhs. Budget for the first 6 months was released to all the districts in the State. Monitoring of plan schemes for the year 1986-87 was reviewed in the District Educational Officers conference held on 12th and 13th August, 1987. The Expenditure incurred is shown vide annexure-II. Five Dist. Educational Officers have yet to furnish the particulars of plan expenditure for the year 1986-87.

## Monitoring of Inspections and Visits by field Functionaries:

To streamline monitoring and evaluation of Non-Formal Education it has been decided and being put into practice that the Non-Formal Education Supervisors have to submit their inspection reports by 5th of every month to the co-ordinators who have to review them and submit a review report along with their inspection reports to the S.L.R.C. by 10th of every month. S.L.R.C. has to review them and submit a review report to Director of School Education by 15th of every month. It has been observed that the reports from the supervisors and the co-ordinators have not been received regularly vide annexure-I.

### Projectisation:

The National Policy of Non-Formal Education envisages project approach to facilitate supervison of N.F.E. Centres over vide geographic area. Based on the guidelines provided it is proposed to adopt the project approach in Andhra Pradesh in two phases. Under phase-I 100 projects are proposed to be constituted in 10 districts at the rate of 10 projects in each district from 1-11-87. Projectisation will be proposed to be implemented in the remaining districts from the next financial year. In the new scheme of Non-Formal Education under project approach,

there will be one project officer with supporting staff for every 100 centres, a supervisor for every 9 to 10 centres and an Assistant Director with supporting staff at District level to assist the District Educational Officer and to monitor the scheme. The scheme covers 7,336 centres of which 4,500 are primary centres, 1940 are girls and 896 are upper primary centres.

## Difficulties Encountered in Implementing the Scheme:

- (i) Irregular attendance of the pupils.
- (ii) Unwillingness of the pupils due to physical strain of days work.
- (iii) Insufficient accommodation and poor lighting arrangements in the locality of the centres.
- (iv) In-adequate remuneration to the teachers and late payment of remuneration.
  - (v) Absence of co-operation of the Villagers at some of the places.
  - (w) Getting qualified and women instructors.
  - (vii) Lack of incentives to learners.

### **VOCATIONAL EDUCATION**

Vocational Education has been introduced in 345 High Schools in the State (in classes VIII to X) at the rate of 15 High Schools in each district; covering 1,12,337 children. So far an amount of Rs. 324.55 lakhs has been spent as hereunder:

All the 345 Vocational High Schools have been inspected by a team of Officers comprising of an Officer of Office of the Director of School Education, concerned District Educational Officer and Principal of the local Government polytechnic and it is found that

- (a) Unqualified part time instructors have been appointed in some of the Vocational Courses,
- (b) All the required machinery equipment has not been supplied,
- (c) In some places equipment supplied is sub-standard and,
- (d) No accommodation and infrastructural facilities have been provided.

Accordingly all the District Educational Officers in the State were requested to urgently take action on points mentioned above and send a report.

I. Constitution of Screening Committees to screen the Instructors:

Instructions were issued by the Director of School Education in Director's Procs. 1048/VE. 1/87 dt: 24-8-87 to constitute a four member screening committee to screen the Instructors already appointed.

# II. Reallocation of periods for Vocational Courses in Vocational High Schools

As per the decision taken in the last District Educational Officers Conference, the Director of School Education has issued instructions in her Procs. Rc. No. 1048/VE. 1/87, dt. 24-8-87 to all the District Educational Officers in the State reducing 10 periods of 40 minutes per week to 6 periods of one hour duration for Vocational Courses. Copies of these proceedings were sent to the Head Masters also.

# III. Meeting the Expenditure on raw material by the Private managements:

Out of 345 Vocational High schools, 62 schools are Private Aided. So far Rs. 44.00 lakhs worth of equipment and machinery have been supplied to these schools. It has been suggested to Government to enter into an agreement with the managements for maintenance and also meeting the recurring costs, such as purchase of raw-material, Remuneration etc., to the part-time Instructors etc. In the meanwhile the District Educational Officers were requested to check-up the position and send a report.

### IV. Sale of Finished Products of Vocational Courses:

It is suggested to sell the finished goods/products of Vocational Courses and remit the sale Products through challan for recirculation of amounts for purchase of raw-materials and for children who manufacture these items at a lesser cost (i. e. 10% less).

### V. Requirement of Additional Teachers:

In view of the fact that several Vocational Teachers (Craft Instructors) employed in Educational Institutions were not being put to use and paucity of funds to appoint more part-time Vocational Instructors, all the District Educational officers were requested to urgently identify the Vocational Teachers (Craft Teachers) in their Districts. V II—6

### BUDGET:

An amount of Rs. 248.25 lakhs has been provided in the Budget Estimate for year 1987-88 under continuing schemes towards meeting the expenditure on remuneration to the part-time Instructors, purchase of raw materials and equipment. Out of Rs. 248.25 lakhs an amount of Rs. 48.54 lakhs constitutes salary component to part-time Vocational Instructors. Government Orders are awaited in the matter.

### (H) Plan Schemes:

(1) Continuance of 1000 S.G.B.T posts on regular scales sanctioned during 1985-86

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 126.00 Lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 1000 posts. As per the information received from the Dist. Educational officers to date the total physical achievements is 858 and the expenditure incurred is Rs. 80.199 lakhs.

(2) Continuance of 750 SGBT Women Teacher posts on regular scale sanctioned during 1984-85

The amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 18.90 Lakhs and the physical target proposed was 750. According to the information received sofar from the Dist. Ednl. Officers the expenditure incurred on the scheme is Rs. 18.209 Lakhs and the physical targets achieved is 500.

(3) Continuance of 4 Sanskrit pandits posts sanctioned during 1985-86.

As against the total amount sanctioned ie., Rs. 0.50 Lakhs the reported expenditure is Rs. 0.524 Lakhs. The Physical targets have been achieved.

(4) Continuance of High Schools at Mandal Head Quarters sanctioned during 1986-87.

As against the sanctioned amount of Rs. 4.860 lakhs and physical targets proposed was 20 for the scheme the expenditure incurred is Rs. 0. 256 lakhs and the physical target achieved is 13.

(5) Supply of equipment under Socially useful productive work programme.

As against the amount of Rs. 18.00 lakhs sanctioned the reported expenditure is Rs. 3.625 Lakhs and physical target achieved is 440 against the proposed target of 920.

(6) Supply of Science equipment to 213 High Schools under Government and Zilla Parishads sanctioned during the year 1986-87.

As against the total amount sanctioned for the scheme i. e., 50.00 lakhs and the physical target proposed ie., 213 High Schools, and the expenditure incurred is Rs. 17.592 lakhs and the Physical targets achieved is 93.

(7) Continuance of 20 B.Ed. posts and 13 Language Pandits sanctioned during the year 1985-86.

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme is Rs. 6.620 lakhs and the physical targets proposed is 33. According to the information received from the Dist. Educational Officers so far the total expenditure incurred is Rs. 2.046 lakhs and the physical target achieved is 13.

(8) Continuance of 313 SGBT posts on regular scale sanctioned during the year 1985-86.

As against the total amount sanctioned *i.e.*, Rs. 39.44 lakhs and the physical target proposed *i.e.*, 313. The expenditure incurred is Rs. 3.194 lakhs and the physical target achieved is 73.

(9) Continuance of 100 SGBT posts on regular scale (Special component Plan) sanctioned during the year 1985-86.

As against the scheme the total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 12.60 lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 100 posts. As per the information received from the Dist. Educational Officers to date the total physical achievements is 83 and the expenditure incurred is 12.176 lakhs.

sanctioned during the year 1985-86 (SCP)

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 6.30 lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 50 posts. As per the information received from the District Educational officers to date the total physical achievements is 37 and the expenditure incurred is Rs. 2.89 lakhs.

(11) Continuance of 90 B.Ed. Posts on Regular Scale.

(The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was RS. 15.65 Lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 90 B.Ed posts. As per the information received from the

D.E.Os to date the total physical achievements is 42 and the expenditure incurred is 3.94 lakhs.

(12) Continuance of Upper Primary Schools by creating 90 B.Ed. posts and 90 Language Pandits.

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 16.77 lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 180 Posts. As per the information received from the Dist. Educational Officers to date the total physical achievements is 66 and expenditure incurred is 1.802 lakhs.

(13) Opening of 1000 Primary Schools in Schoolless Habitations (TSP):

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 145 lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 1000 Schools. As per the information received from the Dist. Educational Officers to date the total physical achievements is 571 and the expenditure incurred is Rs. 35.43 lakhs.

(14) Maintenance of VIII and IX Class in 30 Ashram Schools:

The total amount sanctioned for the scheme was Rs. 25.82 lakhs and the physical targets proposed was 30 Posts. As per the information received from the Dist. Educational Officers to date the total physical achievements is 10 and the expenditure incurred is Rs. 3.00 Lakhs.

### I. School Buildings:

As per fifth all India Educational Survey, 63,568 Class Rooms are required to be constructed. As against this during VI Plan period, 18,562 have been constructed and an amount of Rs. 2727.78 was spent. School Buildings are being constructed under VIII Finance Commission N.R.E.P., R. L. G. P., U. A. E. etc. In this connection it may be mentioned here that under VIII Finance Commission an amount of Rs. 1196. 80 lakhs for construction of 2992 School Buildings at rate the of Rs. 40,000/each sanctioned. Out of these 2992 School Buildings, 2492, are under plain area and 500 in Tribal area. As per the particulars received from 15 Dist. Educational officers, 360 School buildings are completed. The Dist. Educational officers are being requested to take up the buildings sanctioned in operation Blackboard (O.B). Under O.B. area, it is proposed to construct 3203 classrooms by June, 1988.

### (J) Recruitment of Teachers:

The District Educational Officers are aware that Government have issued orders in M. No. 758/Ser-A/83-1 GAD dt. 19-5-1983 that all Posts which are under the purview of Andhra Pradesh Public Service Commission, should be notified to that agency only and that no posts under this category should be filled by the appointing authorities under any circumstances. Government have also issued orders in M. No. 360/Ser-A/87-2 GAD dt. 14. 3. 1987 that further recruitments in the Districts as well as in State Capital for all categories of posts pending a detailed assignment of the recruitments etc., should be stopped forthwith.

Recruitment of Teachers through Andhra Pradesh Public Service Commission:

As per the instructions issued by Government in M. No. 758/Ser-A/83-1 GAD dt. 19. 5. 1983 a requisition was sent to A. P. P. S. C., for the recruitments of 346 Posts of School Assistants in Government institutions all over the State. The Service Commission has already conducted the written test and on enquiry by the Director of School Education with the Commission, it was informed that they would finalise interviews and sponsor candidates very shortly. A statement showing the District-wise break up of School Assistants which was sent to the Service Commission is appended to this note. The District Educational Officers are requested not to recruit any posts of teachers in Government instituuntil further orders from the Director/Govern-This was also reiterated in Director's proceedings Rc. No. 1784/TG. III-4 (G4)/87 dt. 30 - 9 - 1987. Inspite of these instructions, the District Educational Officers Srikakulam and Visakhapatnam have filled sizeable number of posts of attenders inspite of the fact that good number of posts of Junior Assistants, Record Assistants and Attenders are rendered surplus consequent on fomation of Mandals and that the Department is striving very hard for their absorption.

### Position in Telangana Area:

The District Educational Officers are aware that consequent on formation of Zilla Parishads in 1959 and consequent on transfer of Government Institutions to the

Panchayat Raj Bodies, large number of Govt. Schools along with the staff were shifted to the control of Panchayat Raj Bodies. There were standing instructions from Government in G. O. Ms. No. 1539-Edn., dt. 27-9-1971 that the Government Teachers working in Panchayat Raj Schools should be withdrawn to Government pool as and when vacancies arise in the latter pool. These instructions did not undergo any change and District Educational Officers in Telangana Area should not fill up any posts except through withdrawal of teachers. However, the posts notified to A. P. P. S. C., by these District Educational Officers should be kept vacant.

Recruitment of Teachers Under Panchayat Raj Bodies Through District Selection Committees:

The posts of teachers in the Educational Institutions under the control of Panchayat Raj Bodies are under the purview of District Selection Committees. The District Educational Officers are aware that Government have issued orders in G.O. Ms. No. 393-P.R. dt. 24-6-1987 and G.O. Ms. No. 463- P.R. dt. 21-7-1987 constituting the DIS-TRICT SELECTION COMMITTEES for recruitment of certain categories of teachers in the institutions under these Government have also lifted ban in 11967/Eatt-VIII/85-1 P.R. dt. 17-1-1986, which was imposed in M.No. 101972/Estt-VIII/85-2 P.R. dt. 30-10-1985 inrespect of these posts. The Chairman, Zilla Praja Parishads were also requested through Director's D. O. Lr. No. 1784/G4/87 dt. 14-7-1987 to fill all the vacant posts of Teachers in the Schools under Panchayat Raj Bodies through District Selection Committees in the beginning of the academic year so as to avoid poor results. A few District Development Officers have reported that they are taking action to fill up the posts.

A statement showing number of posts reserved to be filled through District Selection Committees is appended.

### Teachers Grievances:

The District Educational Officers are aware that instructions were issued that they should convene Consultative Committees every month, invite representatives of teachers Unions (both recognised and un-recognised) solve their problems and send compliance reports to the pame address of the Director of School Education. They are requested to report the action taken by them.

In the conference held by Hon'ble Minister for Education at Vijayawada on 8-9-87 it was decided that the following problems of the teachers should be solved immediately.

- 1. Scrapping of GO. Ms. No. 157 Fin. Dept. dt: 11-6-86.
- Promotion of Panchayat Raj teachers to the higher posts in Education Department in proportion to their numerical strength.

The following information is needed for the scrapping of G.O.Ms. No. 157 Fin. dt: 11-6-86.

- 1. (1) No. of Teachers (Management-wise) in Category-III of regrouped scales who availed the S.P.P. Promotion and retired before 16-11-86 (i.e. date of conducting of PAT) and after 25-3-85 without passing the PAT and whose pay require regulation under G.O. 157 for the purpose of calculating pension.
- (2) No. of Teachers (Management-wise) in Category-HI of regrouped scales who availed the benefit of S.P.P. and died during the period from 25-3-85 and 16-11-86.
- (3) Financial commitment involved in scrapping G.O. 157 in respect of those teachers who retired during the above period and their pension is not received (Management-wise).
- (4) Financial commitment involved in scrapping G.O. 157 in respect of those teachers who died during the above period and their pension is not received (Management-wise).
- 2. (1) The following D.E.Os have not sent information about the unaided strength, Panchayat Raj and Govt. teachers as called for in D's. Pros. Rc. No. 119 G4/86. dt: 26-5-86. So far the D.E.Os at Ongole, Chittoor and Adilabad have sent full information.

(1) Srikakulam (He has sent only in respect of Govt. Teachers) (2) Vizianagaram (3) Visakhapatnam (4) East Godavari (5) West Godavari (6) Krishna (7) Guntur (8) Nellore (9) Kurnool (He has sent only in respect of Govt. Teachers) (10) Cuddapah (He has sent in respect of Govt. Teachers) (11) Anantapur (12) Ranga Reddy (13) Medak (14) Warangal (15) Khammam (16) Nalgonda (17) Karimnagar (18) Mahabubnagar and (19) Nizamabad.

They are requested to expedite the information immediately.

#### Accounts:--

The reports received are as follows:—

(a) Submission of Number Statements:

The District Educational Officers, Adilabad, Medak and Vizag have submitted all the statements. The remaining 20 District Educational Officers have submitted their statements partly. The details of the statements due from them are furnished in the Annexure.

### (b) Submission of Estimates:—

None of the District Educational Officers have sent the estimates in a complete shape. The response from the District Educational Officers, Adilabad, Nellore, Prakasham, Ranga Reddy and West Godavari is very poor, as they have not sent the estimates under a single head of account. The details of the number of the sub-heads due from each District Educational Officer are furnished in the Annexure:

(c) Submission of monthly reconciled statements of expenditure:

The District Educational Officers should have sent the statements from April and up to August, '87 by this time. No District Educational Officer has furnished the statements up to August, '87. Six District Educational Officers (Adilabad, Chittoor, East Godavari, Kurnool, Mahabubnagar and Ranga Reedy) have not furnished the expenditure statements right from April, '87 to August, '87. The details of the statements due are furnished in the Annexure:

(d) Continuation of Accounts cell in the District Educational Officers' Offices:

Only 12 District Educational Officers have reported that they have constituted accounts Cell in their Offices. There are no reports from the remaining eleven District Educational. Officers, viz., Anantapur, Chittoor, Hyderabad Krishna, Kurnool, Nalgonda, Prakasham, Ranga Reddy, Vizianagaram Visakhapatnam and West Godavari District

### (e) Closure of Bank Accounts:—

Nine District Educational Officers have proposed to close the existing Bank accounts shortly. The District Educational Officers, Adilabad and East Godavari have proposed to open Personal Deposit Accounts for operation of the crossed cheques/Demand Drafts received from other offices. This will be examined separately. The District Educational Officer, Nizamabad has stated that he has opened account with the Bank as per orders of the Commissioner for Government Examinations and requested clarification to close the account.

There are no reports from the remaining fourteen District Educational Officers as per the details in the Annexure.

(f) Recovery of outstanding amounts for sale of Nationalised Text Books/Note Books:

The Disrtict Educational Officers, Chittoon and Nizamabad have stated that there are no amounts due to be realised on the above account.

The District Educational Officers, Adilabad, East Godavari, and Karimnagar have furnished the amounts of recoveries and reported the stage of their recovery.

There are no reports from the remaining 18 District Educational Officers. The details may be seen from the Annexure.

(g) Release of contingent grants and obtaining the Utilisation Certificates:—

The District Educational Officers, Adilabad, Guntur and Khammam have stated that the instructions in this regard are noted and so far no grants were released. The District Educational Officers, Medak, Nizamabad and Warangal have noted the instructions. The District

Educational Officer, Mahabubnagar has reported that the grants are being released on receipt of Utilisation Certificates.

There are no reports from the remaining fifteen District Educational Officers as can be seen from the Annexure.

### (h) Review of 6% contingent grants:

The District Educational Officers, Guntur and Nizamabad have not conducted any reviews so far, the District Educational Officer, Adilabad has proposed to make a review while releasing the grants to the Panchayat Raj Bodies.

There are no reports from the remaining 19 District Educational Officers.

# Accountant General's Audit Reports, Audit Objections and Utilisation Certificates:

During August, 1987, staff of this office were deputed to the District Offices for the spot collection of the replies to Audit paras and objections as well as Utilisation Certificates. The material furnished from the District Educational Officers is under the process of transmission to the Accountant General after due scrutiny.

Annexures placed below:-

### (K) All India Educational Survey:

The data Collection on School Information forms, Village Information forms and Urban Information forms must have been completed and all the forms received were duly verified at Mandal level by 31-8-1987, as per Schedule.

DISTRICT LEVEL SCRUTINY of the Mandalwise forms and reconciliation of discrepancies, if any is considered to have been over by 30-9-1987. The District Educational Officers are requested to report the position prevailing in their respective districts:

- (1) Whether collection of forms from all the agencies is over as per Schedule. If not, to please indicate the steps they would take to collect the same and the time required therefor.
- (2) Whether all the forms received have been verified, got reconciled the discrepancies. If not, to please report the status.

The mandal level and district level consolidation forms are being supplied to each district for the compilation and consolidation of data received. The staff of Survey Unit of the Directorate will be visiting the districts to guide the Direct Survey Officers in the consolidation work and also to over see the work. The consolidation of data of each mandal should necessarily be over by 31-10-1987 and District Survey Officers should complete the consolidation of particulars at district level and submit the District tables to the Director of School Education by 15-11-1987 as the sanction of their posts will be over by 30-11-87. This schedule has to be adhered to scrupulously.

### (L) Operation Black Board

Under 20% Survey of Operation Black Board undertaken by the Department, data as Collected in respect of 16,484 Primary Schools from out of the total number of 44,299 District-wise number of Primary Schools functioning as on 30-9-1986, the number covered under Operation Black Board Survey so far and those in respect of which Survey has yet to be conducted is furnished in Annexure-I.

Under 20% Operation Black Board Survey:

Proposals are being submitted to Government of India for the sanction of additional posts of S. G. B. T. teachers and required funds to provide teaching aids, physical facilities, play material etc., to the extent of 3,826 Primary Schools functioning in 121 Mandals of the State. The list of mandals is furnished in Annexure-II.

The essential component of Operation Black Board project is "Provision of at least two reasonably large room that are usable in all weather with a deep verandah alongwith separate toilet facilities for boys and girls."

Of the 3,826 schools covered under Operation Black Board for the current year additional rooms are required as detailed below:

The District Educational Officers are informed that no separate funds are being provided under Operation Black Board for construction of Primary School buildings. The funds provided under VIII Finance Commission N.R.E.P., R.L.E.G.P. have to be used as Government of India clarified that.

- (i) Necessary land for construction of school buildings including land for games and sports, has to be provided by the local community.
- (ii) The local community, preferably village Education committees, have ito give a formal undertaking that they ishall take responsibility for repair and maintenance of the buildings.
- (iii) The local community has also to take responsibility for an appropriate fencing around the school compound. It could be pucca wall or hedge or barbed wire, but sufficient to prevent the school compound becoming a thoroughfare for humans and cattle.
- (iv) Each of the rooms to be constructed should be approximately 30 Sq. meters in area and the verandah of approximately 9-10 feet depth. Even if there are two rooms in existence at present, but their area is much less and they are not satisfactory, new rooms may be constructed.
- (v) Provision of separate toilets for boys and girls must form part of the construction activity.

The District Educational Officers are requested to take action on the above items quickly.

The District Educational Officers may inform if they have got with them any balance of printed forms so that the same may be reduced while supplying the printed forms to them. The District Survey Officers should check-up, compile and consolidate the mandal-wise data by 15-11-1987.

### (M) Performance Appraisal

Visits to Schools and riview of tour diaris: Performance appraisal of the district educational officers:

The District Educational Officers were requested to submit a report on the various items of work they attended to in the course of a month so as to reach the Director of School Education by 5th of subsequent month.

The District Educational Officers are expected to visit the Primary, Upper Primary, High Schools, Non-Formal Education Centres, to panel inspections; review the work of Mandal Educational Officers, Dy. Inspector of Schools; Deputy Educational Officers, Supervisors of Non-Formal Education; attend the co-ordination meetings; do review of work in Vocational Educational Schools; Conduct annual inspection of the offices of Mandal Educational officer's offices, Dy. Educational Officer's offices, Parishad Educational Offices etc.

It has been observed from the reports received from all the District Educational Officers during the last two months August and September, 1987 that their performance was very low except the case of one or two items.

The various items of the work were graded on a four point scale as detailed below:

Grade:	Achievement percentage
A	75% and above
В	50% and below $75%$

C

25% and below 50% ... Below 25%

The performance of all the District Educational Officers during August and September, 1987 was assessed and it is found to be 'D' Grade on an average,

They are requested to achieve the targets fixed and showlimprovement in their performance in coming months.

# Improvement of Standards in Schools:

The above subject came up for discussion during the last conference of District Educational officers held on 12th and 13th of August, 1987. The general consensus arrived on the subject is that immediate remedial measures are to be taken for curbing the high drop out rate/ wastage and high percentage of failures in the 10th class Examinations. The following suggestions are made in this regard as guidelines for all the Inspecting offices to achieve the results, creation of congenial environment for children to attend schools regularly can be achieved through:—

- (i) By providing required infrastructure-buildings, playground, library, laboratory etc.
- (ii) By providing good syllabus and curriculum which provides not only study but also extra-curriculum activities Yoga, gardening etc.
- (iii) By providing teachers with good teaching faculty through motivation.

The above can be very well achieved through effective visits to schools, and regular inspections. These visits and inspections should not be mere perfunctory superficial. In addition, the Inspecting officers through their visits and inspections should undertake the following tasks for improving the academic standards in Education.

- 1. Listing out the Inspecting officers who do not have classroom experience and required training.
- 2. To submit the Inspection report by Inspection Officer within 3 days of their inspection.
- 3. The District Educational Officer should obtain, and submit the Inspection Report made by Mandal Education Officers/Deputy Educational Officers within 3 days of their inspection.

- 4. The District Educational Officer should grade and consolidate the total Inspections conducted by the Inspecting Officers of the Department and submit to the Director of School Education along with their monthly diaries by 5th of every month.
  - 5. The District Educational Officer should grade the teachers as good/ satisfactory/ poor require inservice training/ undesirable and unfit, by engaging the subject experts in class-room instruction in every one of the High Schools.
  - 6. The District Educational Officer in his inspection should list out for submission to Director of School Education third category teachers for providing Inservice Training. Severe action should be taken against lazy and indifferent teacher.
- 7. The schools must also be graded as good/ average/ poor considering overall discipline, standards of teaching levels, performance in examinations etc.
  - 8. The teachers are to be motivated through various techniques like check-up of home work etc.
  - 9. By organising school complex centres. Good teachers are to be identified for Training as Resource person.
- 10. The District Educational officers should convene meetings at Mandal levels of the Mandal Educational Officers/Deputy Educational Officers/ Headmasters.

The District Educational Officers have submitted their reports. They were reviewed in this office. Most of the reports are not satisfactory. Many District Educational Officers did not convene meetings at Mandal levels and grade the Mandal Educational Officers.

They have also not graded the teachers and the schools. Resource persons in schools are not identified and school complexes are not organised in many districts.

### Toning up of District Administration

In pursuance of the Review meeting of Teachers' problems held by the Hon'ble Minister for Education at Vijayawada on 8-9-87 and also as per the discussions, the Director of School Education had with the District Educational Officers in June and August, 87, instructions were issued in Director's proceedings Rc. No. 245/E/ Estt.

IV-4 /85, dated 19-9-87 that the District Educational Officers should hold the meetings with the Representatives of all Recognised and Un-Recognised Teachers Unions every month and that the minutes of the meeting should be submitted to the Director of School Education in her name cover. It was also informed that non-receipt of the minutes will be treated as though the said meetings have not been held.

Necessary arrangements have been made and the Entrance Test for admission of children into these institutions was conducted on 23rd August, 1987 in selected places in the districts. The results are awaited.

The Director, Navodaya Vidyalaya Samithi, New Delhi has requested the State Government to take all necessary steps for acquiring land buildings that were earlier proposed for the establishment of these institutions in order to take up the construction work or repairs wherever necessary. Consequently, the Director of School Education has requested all the District Educational Officers concerned on 14-9-87 to take immediate steps to complete the formalities for acquiring the land buildings. So for none of the District Educational Officers have given compliance reports regarding the progress made in this matter.

Regarding recruitment of staff in these Vidyalayas necessary instructions were already issued to all the Dist. Educational Officers in the previous year as well as this year to call for the willingness of the staff to work on deputation. Interviews have also been conducted by the Assistant Commissioner, Kendriya Sangathan, Secunderabad who is the Liasion Officer.

### Higher Education Plan Schemes 1988-89.

The proposed outlay on plan schemes for Higher Education for the year 1988-89 was fixed at almost the same level as for the previous year 1987-88. The proposed outlay is for Rs. 1685.19 lakhs.

A sum of Rs. 237.64 lakhs is proposed to be spent on the special component plan constituting 14.1 per cent of the total outlay. Likewise a sum of Rs 110.00 lakhs is proposed to be spent on Tribal Sub plan constituting 6.5 per cent of the total outlay.

Out of 237.64 lakhs earmarked for special component plan 187.64 lakhs are earmarked for new schemes. The naw schemes consists of the following:—

The total amount on New schemes including S.T./S.C., and other schemes come to Rs. 433.85 lakhs. Out of the proposed outlay Rs. 1685.19 lakhs. The rest of the plan amount amounting to Rs. 1251.34 lakhs will be spent on on-going schemes.

The Needs of Higher Education are very large specially with regard to the provision of infrastructure facilities to the Government Junior Colleges and Government Degree Colleges in the State. Out of 159 of Government Degree Colleges only 55 have permanent buildings constituting 33%. Like-wise out of 397 Junior Colleges 111 Junior Colleges are having permanent buildings and they constitute 28%. Even in a phased maneer if construction of buildings for 90 Degree Colleges and 111 Junior Colleges along with additional accommodation for 286 Junior Colleges are to be taken up the amount required is estimated to be Rs. 137.6 crores.

Review of Grant-in-aid rules to cater out the selective support to the needy Institutions:

At the meeting of the working group on Education, Planning Commission held in New Delhi on 9-12-1986, Government of India suggested that the grant-in-aid rules needed to be reviewed to cater out the selective support to the needy institutions. Selections of the need based institutions for admission to grant-in-aid, may be made on the following criteria:—

- (a) Colleges started in backward area/tribal area.
- (b) Colleges which started restructured courses providing skills to the students of undergraduate courses for e.g. electronics, rural development, forestry, fisheries, dairy science, etc.,
- (e) Colleges started in predominantly S.T./S.C. areas and maintaining adequate strength.

(d) Colleges which have maintained a good level of performance in term of passes and also less drop outs over a period.

Openining of new Colleges/Upgrading of Junior Colleges to Degree Colleges:

Whenever a Degree College is newly started at a place where a Government Junior College is in existence, Government have sanctioned a separate Principal, separate teaching staff and non-teaching staff to function in the same premises to ensure that there is no immediate problem for accommodation, furniture etc., Government may take a policy decision whether to continue the above policy or to upgrade some of the existing Junior Colleges into Degree Colleges if there is demand for admission for Degree Colleges in such places where Junior Colleges are located. If upgradation is permitted in independent Government Jr. Colleges (without High Schools sections) the post of Principal may be upgraded to that of a degree College Principal, Teaching staff and additional supporting staff are also to be given.

For opening a Degree College with Arts. and Commerce and Science Courses the recurring annual expenditure on Principal, Teaching and Non-teaching staff will be Rs. 7.51 lakhs. For upgrading/starting 10 Degree Colleges per year with B.A., B.Sc., and B.com., Degree Courses annual financial commitment would be Rs. 75.10 lakhs.

B. A./B. Com. .. Rs. 61.60 lakhs for 10 colleges.

B. Sc. only. .. 44.50 lakhs additional for 10 colleges.

B. A./B.Com./B.Sc., .. 75.10 lakhs for 10 colleges.

### **Autonomous Colleges:**

The U. G. C., have declared the following Number of colleges under various Universities fit for autonomy.

1. Andhra University. ... 7 Colleges.

2. Osmania University. ... 5,

3. Kakatiya University. ... 4 ,,

4. S. V. University. ... 4 ,,

5. Nagarjuna University. ... 5 ,, list enclosed.

The University Grants Commission have promised an additional amount of Rs. 2 lakhs minimum for each autonomous College per year depending upon their strength. The assistance is to meet the needs of the colleges for the supporting staff needed for making admissions, conducting tests, examinations and declaration of results and funds needed on meetings, T. A., D.A., Stationery etc.

#### Permanent affiliation:

There are 159 Govt. Degree Colleges in the State out of which 84 are having only temporary affiliation from the Universities to which they are affiliated. Unless and until they acquire permanent affiliation from the respective Universities, they will not be recognised under section 12(A) of the U. G. C., Act. To get permanent affiliation, the Universities are insisting upon permanent buildings, qualified staff, furniture, equipment, library, play ground etc. While qualified staff are appointed and sufficient furniture, equipment also books are made available in the Government Colleges, the building programme has not made much headway. Hence a phased programme for construction of buildings for the college is to be taken up.

### **Buildings for Government Degree Colleges:**

Out of 159 Degree Colleges only 55 are having permanent buildings. Only when the colleges have permanent buildings the Universities concerned grant them permanent affiliation, as possession of permanent buildings by the College is one of the factors insisted upon by the University for grant of permanent affiliation. 91 Colleges are not having permanent buildings. Only when permanent affiliation is obtained the Colleges become eligible to seek U.G.C., aid under section 12 (a) of U.G.C., Act. Hence Government propose to take up construction of buildings for the Degree Colleges in a phased manner to ensure permanent affiliation for the Government Degree Colleges and also enable the colleges to obtain U.G.C., assistance for various programmes.

### Financial Commitment: Degree Colleges.

The buildings required for Colleges are to be constructed over a period of 5 years at the rate of 18 buildings per year at an average cost of each College building is about Rs. 40.00 lakhs. Thus annually the amount required for

18 Colleges works out Rs. 720.00 lakhs. The total amount required is Rs. 36 crores, over a period of 5 years.

### Junior Colleges:

Out of 397 Junior Colleges in the State 31 are having their own buildings. Over a period of 5 years, the Andhra Pradesh Government propose to construct buildings for 110 Government Junior Colleges. For each building the cost is estimated at Rs. 40.00 lakhs and the amount required is Rs.  $110\times40$ : 4400 lakhs or 44.00 crores. Likewise additional accommodation is to be provided for 286 Government Junior Colleges at the rate of Rs. 20.00 lakhs per College. It involves an expenditure of Rs. 286.20 equal to Rs. 5720 lakhs or Rs. 57.2 crores. For all three Junior Colleges alone buildings are estimated to cost Rs. 101.6 crores.

#### **Vocational Courses:**

- In G. O. Rt. No. 362 Edn. (VS) Dt. 7-3-1983 the Government have constituted V. R. Reddy Committee in order to make the vocationalisation programme more effective and purposeful and to extend the coverage to a large number of students through appropriate planning. Further it was envisaged to divert 20,000 students into vocational stream at +2 stage during 7th Plan period. To meet this target the sanctioned intake into Vocational Courses is proposed to be raised to 10,000 as against existing 2,000. The total recurring and non-recurring expenditure for this during 1985-90 approximately amounts to Rs. 675.00 lakhs.
- (2) At present 172 Government Junior Colleges are running (21) Vocational Courses. Out of these, 82 Colleges have been strengthened by creating additional staff as per V. R. Reddy Committee Report. However due to non-appointment of permanent staff and engaging only part time staff, the actual expenditure is only Rs. 31 lakhs during 1987-88. It is proposed to strengthen all these Junior Colleges having vocational courses by appointing full time employees. The expenditure is Rs. 118.00 lakhs during 1988-89 for full time employees as against Rs. 31.00 lakhs of proposed expenditure for part time staff during 1987-88. Government propose to introduce 10 Vocational sections under Special Componant Plan under Government Junior Colleges to increase the enrolment in vocational courses in plus 2 Stage. This will

involve an additional expenditure of Rs. 15.00 lakhs for 10 Colleges.

### Residential Government Junior Colleges:

A. P. Government propose to start one residential Junior College in each District. These residential Junior Colleges numbering 20 may be opened in a phased manner over a period of 5 years at the rate of 4 Residential Junior Colleges per year. Regarding expenditure involved on Principal, teaching staff, non-teaching staff, ministerial staff and stipends, the annual cost per College will be Rs. 14.80 lakhs towards Recurring expenditure and non-recurring expenditure will be Rs. 18.10 lakhs per college. Non-recurring expenditure is Rs. (34.50) lakhs per college and hostel buildings. At the rate of 4 Colleges with Staff and hostel buildings the expenditure is estimated at Rs. 269.60 lakhs.

### Residential Junior College for Girls:

Opening of Residential Junior College for Girls may be given preference, one in each region-Telangana, Rayalaseema and Circar.

# Urdu Medium Classes and Residential Junior College for Girls:

It is Government Policy to encourage Urdu Medium also wherever needed. At present 73 Junior Lecturers posts intened for Urdu Medium sections are vacant. The expenditure involved for filling up the vacant posts will be Rs. 26.28 lakhs at the rate of Rs. 3000 per Junior Lecturer per month. It is also proposed to start Urdu Medium Junior College of the Residential type for Girls in a phased manner. The cost involved in starting one Urdu Medium Residential Junior College will be Rs. 67.40 lakhs per year.

### Prime Minister's 15 Point Programme: Minority Cell:-

In order to monitor the progress of educational welfare measures for minorities as per Prime Minister's 15 Point Programme, a Minority Cell is proposed to be created by the State Government in the office of the Directorate of Higher Education, A.P., Hyderabad consisting of the following staff:—

For this an amount of Rs. 22,000 is required for 3 months during 1987-88 and is Rs. 88,000 - is required during 1988-89.

#### National Service Scheme:

National Service Scheme is a centrally sponsored scheme where the expenditure is shared between the Central and State Governments in the ratio of 7:5. During 1987-88, the accepted student enrolment is 92,000 and for Special Camping, the N.S.S., volunteer strength is 46,000. The total expenditure to the State Government on N.S.S. scheme is Rs. 50.00 lakhs.

The A.P. Government have accepted the increased strength of 1,27,600 towards enrolment for the year 1988-89. 50% of the enrolment will come under Special Camping Programmes. An amount of Rs. 82.41 lakhs under State share and 115.37 lakhs under Centrally sponsored schemes. The required State's share has been included in the plan budget for 1988-89.

### Vignana Paritoshikam:

The State Government has introduced a special scheme for merit awards viz., Telugu Vignana Paritoshikam with effect from 1985-86. The number of Awards under the scheme for post S.S.C., students is 2300, 100 per each district at the rate of Rs. 750 per annum for each scholar. The number of awards to post Intermediate, 50% students per district is 1150, at the rate of Rs. 1000/- per annum for each scholar. The expenditure on this scheme is Rs. 74.00 lakhs.

### Economically Poor persons Scholarships:

The Scholarship for economically poor persons are sanctioned to the following students. Under graduate professional (Degree and Post Graduate students residing in University Hostels or hostels attached to the Colleges including Intermediate students.

- 1. Intermediate I and II years.
- 2. Degree I, II and III years.

- 3. Post Graduate Courses I and II years.
- 4. Higher Technical and Professional courses like B.E., M.B.B.S., B.Tech., B.Sc., (Agri.) B.V.Sc., I&II, III&IV years.
- 5. M. Phil. Courses.
- 6. Diploma courses in Medicine and Engineering like Polytechnic Indian Medicine.
- 7. Certificate courses in Engineering, Medicine, Technology and Architecture.

Students whose parental/guardian income is Rs. 12,000/- or less, are eligible for the above scholarships limited to the number decided by the State Government. These scholarships are sanctioned districtwise based on merit-cum-means to the students who are persuing the course of study.

#### Tribal Area:

In order to provide more educational facilities in Tribal area, where Naxalite influence is prevailing, the A.P. Government propose to take intensive measures to provide all facilities to the Colleges located in the Tribal areas of the Districts of Srikakulam, Vizianagaram, Visakhapatnam, Adilabad, Karimnagar, Khammam and Warangal. There are a total of 16 Colleges, Degree and Junior and Residential. List is enclosed. Each college may be provided Rs. 10 lakhs towards infrastructural facilities. Total additional amount required is Rs.  $16 \times 10 = 160.00$  lakhs.

### Urdu Medium Sections:

5 Government Junior Colleges at Chinnoor, Nalgonda Narsampet, Adoni, Tadpatri having Urdu Medium Sections require 6 posts for teaching at + 2 stage through Urdu Medium. For 6 posts in each college, at the rate of Rs. 3000/- per lecturer per month, the amount involved is Rs. 2,61,000/- per college. For 5 Colleges, it was worked out Rs. 10,80,000/- A.P. Government propose to open Urdu Medium sections in Government Junior Colleges, Mahabubnagar, Nalgonda, Warangal, Cuddapah, Hyderabad and Secunderabad. Each college requires 10 posts for Urdu Medium to teach Maths, Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, Economics, Civios, Commerce and

Urdu. At the rate of Rs. 3000/- per month per Lecturer the expenditure per college for 10 posts will be  $6 \times 10 \times 12 \times 3000 = \text{Rs.} 21,60,000 \text{ lakhs per year.}$ 

### **B.** Degree Colleges:

In the Government Degree Colleges in the State, 39 posts of Lecturers for Urdu Medium sections are required to be created during the year 1988-89. The expenditure involved is Rs.  $3100 \times 12 \times 39$  amounting to Rs. 14.508 lakks per annum.

### Private Colleges Admitted to Grant-in-aid:

Degree Colleges and Junior Colleges:— Non-plan—There are 202 private colleges in the state out of which 143 are admitted to Grant-in-aid. At present Government are spending Rs. 3304.13 lakhs per annum towards grant-in-aid on these private Degree Colleges and the figure is likely to go up to Rs. 4279.617 lakhs per annum if and when the U.G.C. scales 1986 are implemented.

There are 246 private Junior Colleges in the State out of which 97 are admitted to grant-in-aid. Government are spending Rs. 780.39 lakhs per annum with the extension of the pay revision commission's scales of 1986 to the private Junior Colleges staff.

There are also 48 oriental colleges in the State which are admitted to Grant-in-aid out of a total of 49 private oriental colleges. Government are spending Rs.155.17 lakhs per annum on these oriental colleges towards grant-in-aid and with the proposed introduction of U.G.C. scale the expenditure will rise to Rs.162.62 lakhs per annum.

Besides, the imminent rise in figures due to the introduction of U.G.C. scales and the introduction of P.R.C. scales, Government have a commitment to pay U.G.C. arrears amounting to Rs.958.45 lakhs and P.R.C scales arrears Rs. 201.66 lakhs making a total of Rs. 1160.11 lakhs.

#### Plan:

Under plan, four colleges have deen admitted to grantin-aid so far during the plan period and the amount required for the year 1988-89 towards grant-in-aid to these 4 colleges if U.G.C. scales are implemented, is Rs. 24.96 lakhs. Besides, there will be a commitment to pay U.G.C. arrears to the tune of Rs. 6.89 lakhs and Rs. 1.57 lakhs as P.R.C. scale arrears, making a total of Rs. 8.46 lakhs for these 4 colleges:—

During the year 1987-88, full time regular lecturers could not be appointed and only part time lecturers were engaged. Therefore the anticipated expenditure in respect of these 61 posts is Rs. 7.00 lakhs only. However for the year 1988-89 when full time regular lecturers are appointed, the expenditure will come to Rs. 13.70 lakhs.

### U.G.C.

The U.G.C. has a scheme providing for assistance in respect of College buildings which require extension on 50:50 sharing of estimated cost of construction.

To avail this facility, the state Government have provided its share of Rs. 94.55 lakhs towards extension of buildings in 26 colleges (List enclosed).

### Computer Education:

To introduce computer education in the Government colleges in the State, the following 20 institutions from the different districts of A. P. have been selected and (120) lecturers are to be trained for computer education at the University centres. The expenditure involved for the Training programme which includes payment of remuneration to the resource persons is estimated to cost Rs. 100 lakhs. A provision for 100 lakhs has been made for the plan schemes for 1988-89.
