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# $\frac{\text{Chapter} - I}{\text{GENERAL}}$

#### INTRODUCTION :--

It has been directed in our constitution that "The State shall promote, with special care, the educational and economic interests of the weaker sections of the people, and in particular of the Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes and shall protect them from social injustice and all forms of exploitation". In conformity with this provision vigorous and systematic efforts are being made by the Government to bring about socioeconomic amelioration of the weaker sections of the society in general and of the backward classes in particular.

The backward classes of Gujarat comprise of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Nomadic Tribes and Denotified Tribes. According to 1971 census, the population of Scheduled Castes is 18.25 lakhs against population of 266.97 lakhs which forms 6.84% of the total population of the State. The total population of Scheduled Castes of India is about 825 lakhs. Thus Gujarat's Scheduled Castes population constitutes 2.20% of the total Scheduled Caste population of the country.

According to 1971 census, literacy amongst the Scheduled Castes is 27.74% as against the General literacy level of 35.79% of the State. It is therefore necessary to spread literacy amongst the Scheduled Castes speedily by all possible means including grant of various educational concessions.

efforts

All/are being made for the welfare of the scheduled castes. The main objectives have been of promoting their educational and economic development coupled with their constant progress towards equality and social justice and integration with the advanced sections of the society. Though considerable work has been done for the development of the Scheduled Castes in different spheres, much more remains to be done. The Sch. Castes in Gujarat are scattered over all the districts. The following districts have

It can thus be seen that 484 villages having population of scheduled castes of 25% and above need to be specifically attended to.

The Ministry of Home Affairs appointed a working group in December 1977 for the formullation of the strategy and programe priority for the welfare of Scheduled Castes and other backward classes during the Medium Term Plan 1978-83. On the recommendation of the working group for formulation of a special Component plan, the State Government prepared a plan for the year 1979-89, for the welfare of the Scheduled Castes within the frame work of the state annual plan of K.392 crores. A flow of K.9.06 crores is expected for the welfare of the Scheduled Castes from the general sectors. For the year 1980-81 K.15 crores are expected to flow in favour of Schedulæd Castes in respect of individual/ Family oriented and target grouporiented schemes. (including contribution from Central Ministries & Institution Finance).

8. Establishments of the Scheduled Cestes Economic Development corporation in 1975.

The main objectives of the corporation are as unders-

(1) to achieve economic amelioration.

- (2) to identify the problems of economic backwardness.
  - (3) to implement schemes for the benefit of scheduled
     Castes either directly or through agencies.
  - (4) to promote diversified employment opportunities.

The State Government provides grants to the scheduled Gastes Economic Development Corporation for implementing various schemes and programmes for the benefit of the scheduled Castes.

The corporation has also framed a few schemes which ... attract loans under the D.R.I. Scheme from the Banks against the guarantee from Government e.g. Loans a for purchasing milch cattle, loans to Scheduled Caste powerloom weavers weaving cotton, loans to Scheduled Caste persons engaged in Brick manufacturing, loan to bamboo workers etc. In addition the corporation envisages schemes for advancing loans to wool weavers, poultry farmers, leather workers and other occupational groups among the Scheduled Castes. whe Corporation has recently been registered as a Government company with a share capital : ...

#### stratedys

State Government had issued orders under Govt. Circular No. ADP-1874/ 55434-B, dated the 3rd pecember, 1976 to quantify \* benefits flowing to individuals/families from identified schemes in the general sectors and to ensure that at least 7% of the funds under those schemes were utilized for individuals/ families belonging to scheduled Castes. Specific schemes were also formulated in agricultural fallied Sectors with carmarked funds for the members of the scheduled castes. However, in view of the Government of India's supported for individuals of the various individual/Family oriented schemes of different sectors/Sub-sectors of development do flow to the dispersed population of the scheduled Castes in the state. The aims is to earmark at least 7% of the provision under the individual higher oriented schemes and a much  $\angle$  percentage thereof in respect of schemes where the beneficiary target group comprises of a larger number of Scheduled Castes, such as schemes for meavers, landless labourers, leather workers etc. A special Component Plan ha has the following distinct features:-

- 1. To catter to the special needs of the scheduled castes population in the state.
- To earmark atleast 7% of the provision of each individual/ family or group oriented scheme in favour of scheduled castes.
- B. To earmark even a larger percentage of the provision under specific schemes looking to the number of scheduled Castes among the target group.
- 4. In framing the plan provisions available under the State plan for individual/Family oriented Schemes as also under Centrally Sponsored Schemes are taken into consideration along with institutional finances.

#### <u>CHAPTER-II</u> P<u>lan in outline</u>:

Consequent upon the recommendation of the working group appointed by the Ministry of Home Affairs for formulation of the strategy and programme priority for the relfare of the Scheduled Castes and other Backward Classes, the State Govt. had formulated the Special Component Plan for Sch.Caste: for the year 1979-80 with an outlay of Rs.9.06 crores in respect of individual oriented scheme against the total State provision of Rs.4810.31 lakhs forming 19% of the provision for individual oriented schemes.

For the year 1980-81 it is proposed to provide Rs.15 crores for the individual/family oriented and grup targeted programme in favour of Sch.Castes. The total State utlay for the schemes for the year 1980-81 is proposed to be to the tune of Rs.6457.40 access out of this 1149.66 lakhs proposed to be earmarked for the Special Componant Plan which workout to 18% of the individual/family oriented schemes under various sector/sub-sectors.

As discussed in the various chapters, individual/Family orr:iented Schemes in the State Plan were carefully examined and the flow of funds to the Sch.Castes was determined keeping in view the need and capacity of the Sch.Castes and also the possibility off ensuring the required flow from the general sectors. Schemewisse details have been given in the accompanying statements. Br:ief indication of the sectorwise position is as follow:-

#### Agriculture and Allied Services:

1. Agriculture :

Thirteen schemes with a total outlay of Rs.222.21 lakhs "we me idlemtified as useful. A provision of Rs.29.04 lakhs is earmarked out of these for the special component plan.

The schemes include adequate spread of extension services, demonstration, supply of seeds, fertilizer, pesticides, Agricultural implements etc. at subsidised rates and also incentives for Compost-pits and Gobar gas plants.

Schemes for grant of subsidy for seeds and for fertilizers are exclusively meant for Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe Cultivators.

As a result of these schemes 1749 quintals of improved seeds and 997 tonnes of fertilizers are expected to be distributed. About 108 compost pits will be dug and 153 Gebar gas plants will be installed. About 1680 hectores will be brought under irrigated Cotton and 726 hectores will be covered under Summer groundnut.

#### 2. Minor Irrigation:

In the general sector of the State plan a scheme exclusively for the Sch.Cates is prepared. The scheme provides subsidy for digging of irrigation wells, the rates of subsidy have been liberalised. Because well continues to be a major source of irrigation for Agriculture in the state. Another Scheme in the general sector provides for the improvement of excisting wells by boring and blasting.

Against a total provision of R. 19.00 lakhs under these schemes, a provision of R. 7.84 lakhs has been carried out for the Special Component Plan. It is proposed to construct 109 new - wells, install 136 pump-sets, 89 meters of boring and 2266 blastings from this provision.

#### soil Conservation :-

Soil Conservation in Gujarat is taken ' up on watershed basis. Against a provision of Rs.150.00 lakhs, a provision of Rs.11.00 lakhs is earmarked for the Special Component Plan. Soil Conservation works in 2266 hectores will be worked out from this provision under the Special Component Plan.

#### Drought prone Area programme :-

This programme is implemented in 41 talukas of 10 districts viz. Ahmedabad, Amreli, Banaskantha, Bhavnagar, Jamnagar, Kutch, Mehsama, Panchmahals, Rajkot and Surendranagar. The programme is primarily an area development programme. Subsidy is given to identify beneficiaries of rural population (Small and marginal farmer and agricultural labourers) at the rate of 25% for S.F. and 33.1/3% for the M.F.A.L. During the year 1979-80 R.2.10 are provided which are likely to be spent by the end of the year, extending benefits to 1119 persons. For the year 1980-81 an amount of R.5.49 lakhs are earmarked for gch.Castes benefitting about 1387 persons.

## Small Farmers and Marginal farmers and igricultural Labourers :------

puring the year 1979-80 --- and an amount of \$8.90 lakhs for is provided under this programme, whereas 15.8.90 are propothe sed to be earmarked benefitting about 2509 identified 980-81 sch. castes persons.

#### Animal Husbandry :-

Animal Husbandry plays a vital role in the Agricultural economy of the state. Oattle are the main source of drought power in agricultural operations and the rural transportation. Milch animals, poultry, Figgeries, sheeps etc. are valuable sources of mutrition and supplementary income to the rural power.

Schemes of intensive cattle development, supply of milch animals, subsidy for cross-bred hiefers, poultry programme and programmes for poultry, sheep and pig production are included in the Special Component Plan. With a flow of M. 11.00 lakhs, it is expected to benefit about 2900 families directly. Additionally, 5 pig units and 259 poultry units will be established.

#### community pevelopment :--

Community Development Programme mainly consists of Abhinav gram Nirman Karyakram, Antyodaya, local development works, Block level planning for employment and our season relief works.

puring the year 11979-80 Rs. 148.35 lakes are provided under these programmes, the amount provided is likely to be expended by the end of the current year.

#### lakhs

For the year 1980-81 Rs.46.45 /are proposed to be earmarked for the welfaire of the sch.caste under the community Development programme.

Under antwodaya programme, the poorest families are granted pensions and fimencial assistance, this scheme has been introduced during the year 1979-00 it is proposed to be earmarked an amount of Rs. 34.00 lakhs under special component plan, benefitting about 13000families of sch. castes.

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#### co-operation :-

Labour Co-operative societies and family cooperation Societies are two important activities benefitting the scheduled Castes, Members of the sch.Castes find it difficult to contribute the initial share capital and therefore are totally deprived of the benefits of this very important activity. Share Capital and subsidy for encouraging them to enrole as members of co-operatives are therefore granted by the Government. An amount of Rs.75,000 is earmarked for this purpose under the special component Plan.

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#### Land Reforms :-

With a view to help economically backward tenant purchasers to pay up their arrears of purchased plots as well as to acquire new vi rights conferred on them under the Bombay Tenangyand Agricultural Lands Act, a scheme is in operation in the State since the fifth five year plan. During the year 1980-81 an amount of Rs.12.00 lakks has been provided under the scheme. Provision under the Special Component Plan is earmarked at Rock? Rs.1.20 lakks out of this. The amount will be utilized for granting loans to the benant cultivators for purchase of occupancy rights.

#### Power Development Rural Electrification :-

Electric power is basic and krs infra-structure in a growing do nomy and also an important factor in the societ economic transformation of the rural area. In order that the schedule may be pill be attention in regard to the minimum levelopment of their area, a higher priority is given in the programme under Special component plan. The main emphasis has providing electricity for agricultural purposes and supplying electricity for sch. Castes bastis. It is proposed to provide Ks.200.00 lakhs for the Special Component plan for the year 1980 and against provision of Ks.115.00 lakhs for the year

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#### village and Small Scale Industries :-

Ten schemes with a total outlay of R.916.00 lakhs have been identified for inclusion in the Special Component Plan. An amount of R.248.56 lakhs is earmarked for the Scheduled Castes under these schemes.

The scheme includes Financial Assistance to Small Scale Industries, Subsidy on Power Consumption, Industrial self employment, Khadi and handloom industry, Carpet weaving and Tanning project through the leather corporation. The schemes provide for training financial assistance through subsidies and interest webates as well as marketting facilities. The schemes of handloom weaving and tanning project are almost exclusively addressed to the Sch. Castes. Handloom weaving the state is traditional craft of the Sch.Castes known as 'Vankars'. Tanning is similarly an occupation exclusively adopted by the Sch. Castles. Under the tanning project 40 tanneries and 200 flaying centres were approved by the Government in 1978-79. Establishment of 5 tanneries and 25 tanning centres was taken up during the year 1978-79. The scheme was not completed during the year and is continued during 1979-80. During 1980-81 it is proposed to establish 12 tanneries and 60 flaying centres in twelve districts. The programme is to be implemented through the Gujarat Leather Corporation.

Schemewise details are given in the accompanying Statements.

#### General Education:-

out of the total cutlay of %.675.00 lakhs for the General Education, M.213.51 lakhs were provided for individual/Family Criented Scheme during the year 1979-80. M.15.04 lakhs were provided for the Special component Plan for the year 1979-80. It is expected that the amount quantified in favour of Sch.Castes would be spent at the end of the current year. At the end of the year 1979-80, 279 teachers belonging to sch.Castes will be appointed against the proposed target of 176.

under Adult Education Programme 5670 Adults are e likely to be covered. Under the programme of Book-Banks in secondary Schools 1705 students are likely to be benefitted.

cut of Rs.403.58 Lakhs, proposed for the individual/ Family oriented schemes for the State as a whole, an amount 26.85 of Rs.<del>27.11</del> lakhs are proposed to be provided for the Sch. Castes students during the year 1980-81.

More emphasis has: been given to primary education, including financial as:sistance to talented Sch.Castes girls. Introduction of non-formal Education for the age group 9-14.

#### Technical Elucation:-

The scheme of int:roduction of remedial teaching in Government Polytechnics and Govt. Engineering Colleges is 039 proposed with a financial outlay of Rs. 0.26 lakhs for the year 1980-81.

#### Medical and public Health ;-

During the year 1979-80, Rs.2.45 lakhs were provided for the schemes viz. Intensive Family planning, Training for Murses, Awards. It is likely that the amount provided would be spent at the end of the current year. For the year 1980-81 Rs.4.65/are proposed to be earmarked in favour of sch.Castes under the programme.

#### Sewage and water supply :-

High Pri rity is given by the State Government for the rural water supply programme, this programme consists of piped water supply, tube wells with hand-pump, digging of simple wells. For the year 1979-80, Rs. 90.00 lakhs were earmarked as flow from the general sector for the benefits of Sch.Castes under the rural water supply programme. For

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the year 1980-81 an amount of Rs. 135.00 lakhs is proposed to be earmarked under this programme.

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#### Housing:-

Housing is one of the basic necessities of life. The problems of housings that assumed urgency due to growth of population, rapid industrilisation and urbanisation. These programme consists of assistance for improvement of Rural houses, construction of houses on alloted house-site plots, house-sites for landless rural labourers.

For the year 1979-80<sup>o</sup> Rs.66.90 lakhs were expected tobe spent for the Sch.Castes. About 4550 persons would be getting assistance for comstruction of houses on allotted house-sites. For the year 1980-81 Rs.20.72 lakhs are proposed tobe provided four the welfare of Scheduled Castes under this programme.

#### Urban Development :-

During the year 1979-80 Rs.18.55 lakhs are provided in favour of sch.Castes. The main programme is enviormental improvement of slums. The scheme envisages to grant financial assistance for providing certain essential facilities and services like water supply, drainage, community bath-room, latrines etc.

The slum areas, to some extent are populated with sch. Castes people, it is therefore felt necessary to propose  $|\Im \cdot |D|$ an amount of Rs. 25.00 lakhs: for the year 1980-81.

#### Labour and Labour Welfare:

It mainly comprises of (Craftmen training, national apprenticeship training, career development courses, relief for educated unemployed etc.

puring the year 1979-80 Rs.31.00 lakhs are provided for the benefits of sch.Castes unler the Craftsmen Training Programme. The number of seats created in the plan programme by the end of 1979-80 His 1288, out of these seats, 108 seats are filled in amongst the sch.gastes candidates.

For the year 1980-81 an amount of Rs.21.13 lakhs is proposed to be earmarked for the benefits of sch.Castes. About 223 seats will be filled in from amongst the sch. Castes candidates, besiddes about 70 scheduled Castes candidates would be provided training under the programme of career development Courses.

#### welfare of Backward Classes :-

The Backward classes in Gujarat comprises of the Sch.Castes, Sch.Tribes, Nomadic Tribes and Denotified Tribes. In addition to certain communities have been declared as socially and educationally backward. Out of Rs.860.00 lakhs Rs.155.64 are earmarked for the benefit of sch.Castes during the year 1979-80, the amount is likely to be spent by the end of the year.

The programme consists of -

- (1) Education
- (2) Economic uplift
- (3) Health-housing and other schemes.

For the year 1980-81, out of the proposed outlay of Rs.950.00 lakhs Rs.178.84 lakhs are proposed for the welfare of sch. castes for the about above programme.

#### social welfare;-

Social welfare Programme dovers destitute and deliquent children, afflicted young girls and women, orphans, beggars and various categories of physically handicapped.

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During the year 1979-80 Rs. 1.08 lakhs are earmarked for special component plan, which is likely to be spent by the end of the year.

For the year 1980-81 Rs.2.15 lakhs are proposed tobe earmarked fc. the Sch. Castes. The main scheme is financial assistance for maintemance of the cld and physically Handicapped destitutes. An amount of Rs.2.00 lakhs would be required to grant assistance to about 258 pensioners.

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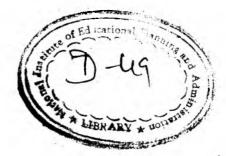
