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CHAPTER - I

A Profile of the Scheduled Castes

According to the 1981 Census, the total population of the Scheduled Castes in Madhya Pradesh is 73.59 lakhs which forms 14.10% part of the total population of the State. Thus, there are about 14.72 lakh Scheduled Caste families in the State, according to the general norm of 5 persons comprising a family.

Occupational categorization amongst the Scheduled Castes is shown in the Table below :-

As per 1971 Census, 8.94% of the total Scheduled Caste population was reported to be living in urban areas which has now increased to 13.19%.

In Madhya Pradesh there are 472 pockets in 42 districts (comprising 2396 villages) in which the percentage of the Scheduled Castes is more than 50. According to the 1981 Census, in 13 districts the percentage of the Scheduled Castes is 20 or more. There are 89 Blocks where the Scheduled Caste population is more than 20%.

Protective Measures :-

Under the Protection of Civil Rights Act, 1955, a Cell has been established in the State wide Tribal & Harijan Welfare Department notification No. F-4/13/70/2/25 dated 10th March, 1979. The basic work entrusted to the Cell is to take effective measures against untouchability.

As a first step towards the implementation of the Act, 1000 copies of the Act were printed and distributed to all the Police Stations, Collectors, Superintendents of Police and Officers of the Panchayat Department. 25,000 copies of the Act were printed in simple language and sent to all the districts for distribution in the rural areas. A State Level Seminar was organised on November, 1980 to discuss the problem of untouchability in which sociologists, educationists, religious leaders, psychologists, administrators and members of voluntary organisations participated.

Regular and effective publicity against untouchability is made through pamphlets, radio talks, films and voluntary organisations like the Harijan Sewak Sangh. Many sittings of the State Level Committee constituted under the Act have been held by now.

On the initiative of the Cell, 4 Mobile Courts have been established at Gwalior, Bhopal, Sagar and Bilaspur for dealing with the cases pertaining to atrocities against the Harijans. Crime figures pertaining to the last five years have been called ^{for} from all the districts for analysing the nature and frequency of crimes against the Scheduled Caste. The position of the cases pending in various courts under this Act is also reviewed by the Cell.

To create awareness among the police officials about the provisions of the Act, it has been included in ^{the} syllabus of the Police Training School, Sagar.

The M.P. Harijan Adiwasi Rahat Act, 1979, aims at providing immediate relief to the Harijans and the tribals who suffer physical injuries and losses in respect of property at the hands of the high castes.

There is a positive policy to promote inter-caste marriages, especially between Harijans and other caste-Hindus. A cash reward of Rs. 1000/- and a gold medal are given to the non-Harijan boy or girl marrying a Harijan. In addition, travelling allowance to the place where award is to be given is also granted to such couple.

Section 9 of the M.P. Panchayat Act, 1962, provides that a person punished under the Protection of Civil Rights Act, 1955, will cease to hold an office in the Village Panchayat or of the high level elected bodies under the Act. His right to vote is also forfeited for a period of 5 years.

Legal Aid Scheme is in force in the entire State for providing necessary help to the Scheduled Castes and other Backward Classes. Benefits to harijans are made available through Legal Aid Advisory Committee constituted in the districts. 24961 Scheduled Castes have received benefits upto 1982-83. 15115 Scheduled Castes are targetted to receive benefits during 1983-84. It is proposed to benefit 17,000 Scheduled Castes during the year 1984-85. Posts of retainers^{superwise} have been created in eight Districts of the State to the cases of the Tribals and Harijans

In each district one model Gram Panchayat is given a cash award of Rs. 3000/- for its efforts for the eradication of untouchability. At the Divisional level, 9 model Gram Panchayats are selected for an award of Rs. 5000/- each and a running shield.

Relaxation of Norms:

With a view to ascertaining the harijan predominant pockets, villages having 50% Scheduled Castes population according to 1971 Census were identified. A Scheduled Caste predominant pocket was delineated on the basis of the contiguous villages having a Scheduled Caste population of 50% or more. A few Departments were extending the benefits to the harijan families living in such pockets. The Government have

taken a conscious decision of extending schemes of direct economic benefits to all the Scheduled Caste families in the State wherever they are living.

Similarly, the infrastructural development and development of services, except under Irrigation sector, will now be taken up in those areas and villages which have a population of Scheduled Castes to the extent of 20% or more.

In respect of the irrigation works, the Government have decided to include those works under the Special Component Plan which :-

- (i) Benefit atleast 14% of the Scheduled Caste population or;
- (ii) 14% land in the command of these irrigation works belong to the Scheduled Castes.

Since the year 1984-85 happens to be the last year of the Sixth Five Year Plan period, the adoption of the above norms during this year will ensure the desired result of covering cent per-cent Scheduled Caste families in the VIIth Plan period under different schemes of Special Component Plan.

CHAPTER - II

Implementation, Monitoring & Evaluation

Implementation:

Earmarking of funds from different sectors out of their divisible State Plan resources for the development of the Scheduled Castes is the essence of the Special Component Plan. The normal field staff of the departments is utilised for the implementation of the schemes under the Special Component Plan. At the State level, each department has nominated an officer who looks after the SCP. The Forest Department has created a Cell to look after the planning and implementation of the departmental schemes in Tribal Sub-Plan area. In this Cell two officers, one from the Forest Department and another from the Tribal, Harijan & Backward Classes Welfare Deptt. have been posted. The proposal that this Cell should also look after the interests of the Scheduled Castes especially the 'Basors' is under consideration.

The Director, Harijan Development implements schemes not only for the development of the Scheduled Castes but also for the nomadic, semi-nomadic & the denotified communities. However, an Agency known as " Vimukta Jati Vikas Abhikaran " has also been registered at Guna during the year 1980-81 under the chairmanship of the Collector.

The details of this are available in Chapter-IV.

A separate Agency is contemplated to be set up exclusively for the welfare of the 'Banchhoras' and the 'Benias'.

The Madhya Pradesh Rajya Antyavavsayee-Sahkari Vikas Nigam (MPRASVN) has opened its branches in 34 districts of the State. In each branch at the district level the following staff is posted:

The MPRASVN is planning to open its branches in the remaining districts of the State.

A District Antyav avsayee Sahkari Vikas Samiti has been set up at the district level. The Collector has been designated as the Chairman of the Samiti and the District Organizer, Tribal Welfare, as the Executive Officer. As per the by-laws of the MPRASVN, 70% members of this Samiti should be Harijans and 30% Tribals and other economically backward people. The average yearly income of these members should not be more than Rs.4,500/- in the urban areas and Rs. 3,500/- in the rural areas.

One Development Officer posted at the Division level has been assigned the job of supervising the working of the MPRASVN and the Samitis at the district level.

Monitoring:

Monitoring of the SCP has been given priority by the State Government. A separate budget head has already been opened in which the allocations of various departments intended for the SCP are voted.

The Tribal, Harijan and Backward Classes Welfare Department fixes the district-wise targets under Point No. 7 of 20 Point Programme and directs the Collectors to disaggregate the targets Block-wise in their districts. In the new system of monthly reporting of Scheduled Caste families assisted through various measures, the Collectors have been made the nodal officers through whom all the information is collected.

So far as the monitoring and reporting of the implementation of the Special Component Plan schemes is concerned, periodical reports on the progress of these schemes are sent by all the concerned development departments to the Directorate, Tribal Area Development Planning. The Directorate, Tribal Area Development/has a Scheduled C_astes development wing. The reports are

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compiled and analysed and then sent on monthly and quarterly basis to the State Government.

A Time-Bound Programme has been evolved under which dates have been fixed for:

- (i) Disaggregation of physical and financial allocations district-wise and release of budget allotments by 30th April.
- (ii) Clearance of new items and sanctioning the allotments thereof by June.
- (iii) Review of quarterly progress in the months of August, November, February and May.

The review meeting held in the month of February gives an opportunity to assess the savings and additional requirements sectorwise. The budget is reappropriated suitably according to savings and additional demands. In this manner the fullest utilisation of the budget allotment is ensured. The review meeting fixed in the month of May assesses the allotment position which is supposed to be released districtwise by various departments. This vigilant watch over the implementation of the SCP has resulted in greater coverage of the beneficiaries during the year 1983-84.

Two Cabinet level Committees already exist for monitoring the progress of SCP alongwith the TSP. The constitution of the District Harijan Development Advisory

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~~Committees and State level Harijan Development~~

~~Implementation Committee is also under consideration.~~

Evaluation:

The evaluation of SCP with the objective of assessing the benefits accruing to the Scheduled Castes is proposed to be entrusted to the Tribal Research & Development Institute. Two Blocks, one in Sagar district and another in Betul district, have been selected for detailed study for assessing the actual benefits which the Scheduled Castes are receiving as a result of the implementation of the various schemes for the SCP.

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CHAPTER - III

Schemes under Twenty Point Programme

Point No.1.

Under Minor Irrigation (Irrigation Department) it is expected that a sum of Rs. 451.00 lakhs will be available for the Special Component Plan 84-85. It is hoped that a large agricultural land, belonging to 2255 small and marginal farmers of Scheduled Castes will be brought under irrigation. Under Agriculture, Rs. 219.89 lakhs have been proposed for irrigation wells and installation of pumps etc. in order to 3460 scheduled castes farmers of small and marginal holdings.

Point No.2.

Under Agriculture Production, pulses development scheme with a provision of 14.51 lakhs has been proposed for Special Component Plan. It is stated that about 1000 scheduled caste cultivators families shall be benefitted under this programme.

Point No.3.

In the new 20-Point Programme, there is a special mention of Integrated Rural Development and National Rural Employment Programme. Since more than 80% of the Scheduled Caste population lives in rural areas, these programmes assume significance for the development of weaker sections. For the year 84-85 under these two programmes a total sum

of Rs. 849.13 lakhs has been proposed to be spent over the scheduled castes of the State. Benefits are expected to accrue to more than 60 thousand families.

Point No. 5 & 6.

Labour Welfare department of the State is strengthening its Survey, Research & Analysis cell for the identification of bonded labourers belonging to the scheduled castes and scheduled tribes. The machinery for effective implementation of the provisions of Minimum Wages Act for the agricultural labourers in scheduled caste predominant areas is also being made more effective. Rs. 3.92 lakhs have been earmarked for the survey, research and rehabilitation of the Scheduled caste bonded labourers.

Point No.7.

It deals with the development of the scheduled castes and the scheduled tribes. During the year 1983-84 district-wise targets were fixed and the Collectors were asked to disaggregate the targets Block-wise. The Collectors were made the nodal officers for reporting the progress under Point no.7. As against the target of 1.96 lakh, 2,11,316 beneficiaries (108.16%) have been reported by different departments till Feb.,84. All

the schemes under different departments and corporations giving substantial benefits to the scheduled castes were identified. Department-wise targets and achievements in 1983-84 and the targets fixed for the year 1984-85 are given in the following table:

Point No.8.

During the year 1981-82, 1492 problem villages were identified having predominance of scheduled caste population to the extent of 50%. However, the number of problem villages having predominance of scheduled castes population rose to 1725 in 1982-83. All these villages have been covered during the year 1983-84. During the year 1984-85, it is proposed to provide one more hand pump to such problem villages which have a population of more than 500. It is proposed to provide 300 additional hand pumps to 300 villages. Piped water supply schemes shall also be initiated. With a view to providing maximum benefit to harijan population, the State Government have issued instructions that in villages where more than one source is to be provided one source must be in the harijan locality, and if only one source is to be provided it should be, as far as possible, near the harijan locality. Rs. 465.00 lakhs are proposed for the year 1984-85.

Point No.9.

During the Sixth Plan period, 52,000 scheduled caste families are to be allotted house sites and to be provided with financial assistance for building material. A target of allotting 26,637 plots to harijans

alongwith the assistance for construction has been fixed for the year 1984-85 under rural Housing. 233 houses under EWS and 84 under LIG are proposed by the Housing Board. The Housing schemes are also implemented by Backward Classes Welfare, Town & Country Planning and Urban Administration sectors.

Point No.10.

Under 20-Point Programme stress has been laid on the clearance of slums and improving the conditions of life in localities of backward areas. The department of Urban Administration and Slum Clearance Board have proposed to spend a sum of Rs. 91.21 lakhs for this. Among its schemes are construction of parks, public latrines/urinals, approach roads and drains. It is proposed that 49,950 scheduled castes will benefit from these schemes in slum areas.

Point No.11.

Under point No.11, it has been laid down that the boon of electricity has to be bestowed on all the villages. The programmes under SCP have been designed keeping this objective in view. During the year 84-85, the following programmes have been included under power:

Point No.12.

The directives under this point are to promote plantation and social forestry schemes and ^{develop} alternative sources of power like Bio-gas plants etc. The schemes under general forestry sector also benefit the scheduled castes. The scheme of Bio-gas plants has been included under the SCP and it has been decided to benefit 2000 Scheduled caste families by this programme.

Point No.14.

For the people residing in the backward areas, the emphasis is on establishing and strengthening of Primary Health Centres. Under Special Component Plan, a target of opening 30 mini-primary health centres and 200 sub-health centres was fixed for the Sixth Plan period. In the year 84-85, a total provision of Rs.91.40 lakhs has been made for opening such new health institutions and for health cover of the scheduled castes.

Point No.15.

No. 15 deals with the supply of nutrition to the under-nourished sections of the society. The Scheduled castes being economically backward are not able to meet this deficiency themselves. Therefore, a programme of special nutrition for scheduled castes in urban slums has been proposed by the department of Social Welfare with a budget provision of Rs. 33.00 lakhs for 1984-85. This sum is less keeping in view the total State plan provisions. Therefore, a sum of Rs. 29.10 lakhs more will be provided in the second supplementary budget. This will benefit children and lactating mothers. A similar programme of applied nutrition for the Scheduled castes has been suggested under Community Development Department with a provision of Rs. 4.96 lakhs.

Point No.16.

Emphasis has been laid upon providing educational facilities to the children belonging to the age group of 0-14 years. To cater to the needs of education of such children, the school education sector of the State has provided Rs. 369.94 lakhs for opening new Primary and Middle Schools. Social Welfare Deptt. has also provided Rs. 0.30 lakhs for the supply of

equipments to Balwadis run by Gram Sevikas in the harijan bastees. Students of backward areas and backward classes lack quality education for want of educational material and course books. Therefore, due importance is to be given to it. Technical education sector has provided Rs. 4.50 lakhs for this and 1350 scheduled caste students of technical institutes shall receive text books free of cost. Similarly, Collegiate Education sector has also allocated Rs. 12.00 lakhs for the supply of books and stationery to 11,000 scheduled caste students of the State. Harijan development sector has also undertaken a massive programme of supplying text books free to 4.60 lakhs scheduled caste school going children with a total cost of Rs. 16.00 lakhs.

Point No.13.

The development and modernisation of Handicrafts and Rural Industries are emphasised under this point. Rs. 145.88 lakhs from the State plan and Rs. 90.50 lakhs from the Special Central Assistance are earmarked for the development of Handloom, Powerloom, Khadi & Village Industries and Sericulture under SCP during the year 1984-85. It is expected that nearly 16,000 scheduled caste families will receive benefits from these programmes.

CHAPTER- IV

Programmes for the Most Vulnerable Groups

Scavengers, bonded labourers and nomadic, semi-nomadic and de-notified communities amongst the scheduled castes are the groups identified as most vulnerable. The various social and economic problems being faced by these communities will have to be identified. The areas of their concentration in the State will have to be located and their population estimated. However, the Special Component Plan 1984-85 envisages various programmes for the benefit of these groups.

These people will receive benefits from all the concerned development sectors along with the other scheduled castes. Programmes especially designed for these communities to help them in rising above the poverty line are outlined in this Chapter.

Scavengers:

During the year 1984-85, 1100 shops will be constructed by the Local Bodies. Out of these, 1000 shops will be given to sweepers/scavengers which will help them economically in a substantial manner. 75 children of these communities will receive scholarships for higher education. With a view to improve the working conditions of sweepers and scavengers, schemes like conversion of dry latrines into flush latrines and supply of wheel burrows, gum boots and gloves are proposed.

Bonded labour:

Action has been taken to solve the problem of bonded labour after the enactment of the Bonded Labour System (Abolition) Act, 1976. District Magistrate (Collector) is designated as the Competent Authority to implement the provisions of this Act. District Magistrates have been directed to carry out a survey to identify bonded labourers in their districts. Vigilance Committees have also been constituted at district and sub-divisional levels. Moreover, the Government have decided to give a reward of Rs. 25.00 to the informant of an individual bonded labourer. All the development departments have been directed to give preference to the identified and freed bonded labourers under the beneficiary oriented schemes implemented by them. Till March, 1983, 1,920 bonded labourers, most of them belonging to the scheduled castes, were identified in various districts of the State. Out of this identified number, 1277 persons did not come forward to seek assistance for rehabilitation and either got employment in the on-going developmental programmes or migrated elsewhere. To the remaining families assistance was provided under schemes like land development, milk production, distribution of poultry and goat units and assistance to artisan families.

The State Government have issued instructions to the Labour Department for periodic identification of bonded labourers in the State.

Nomadic, semi-nomadic and the denotified communities:

The Director, Harijan Development implements schemes of economic and educational development for the welfare of these communities. An Agency known as the "Vimukta Jati Vikas Abhikaran" was set up in 1980-81 under the chairmanship of Collector, Guna. Details about the net-work which has been evolved for the functions of the Agency have been given in the Chapter-II. Year-wise grants given to this Agency are as follows:

Financial:

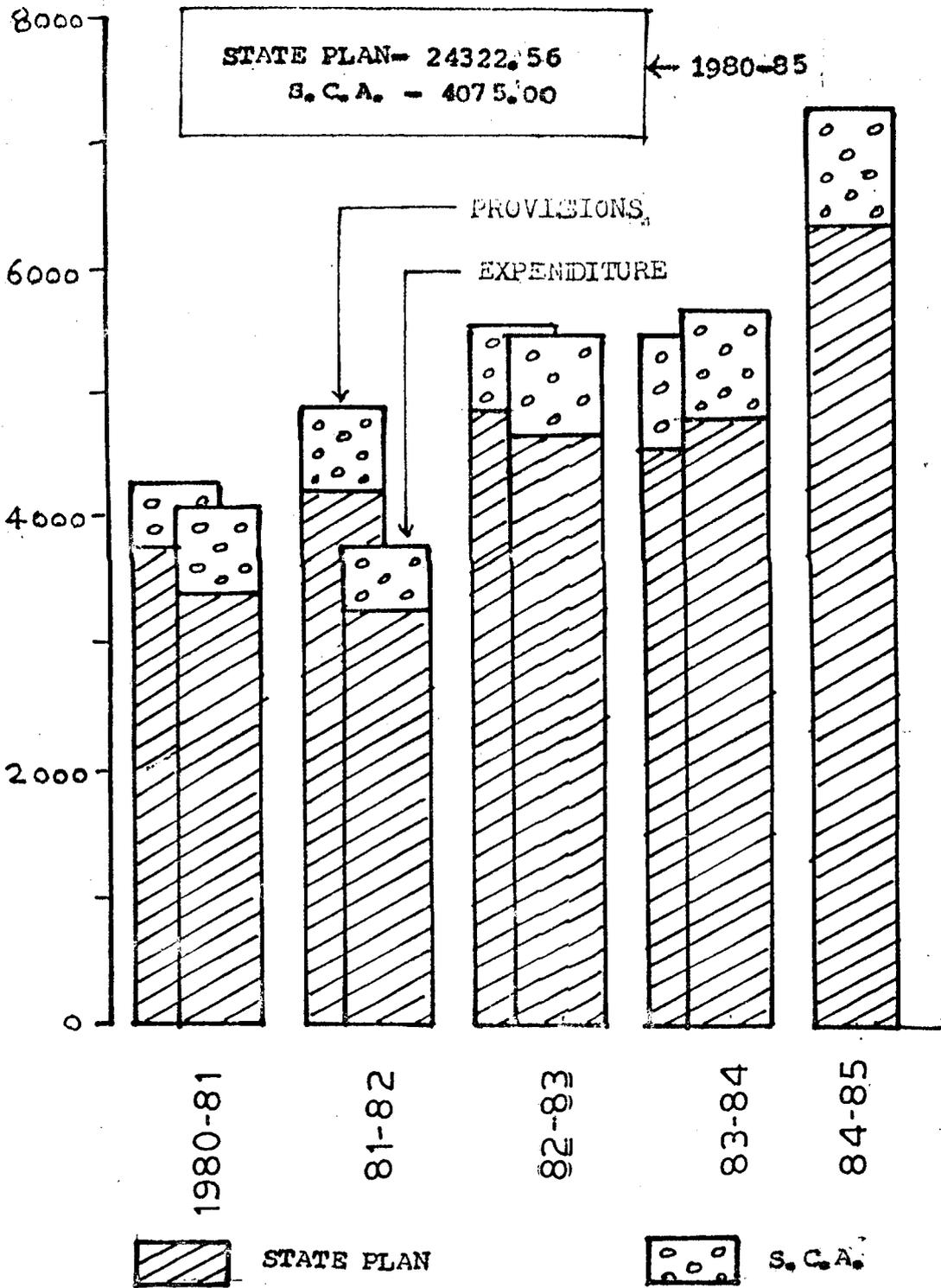

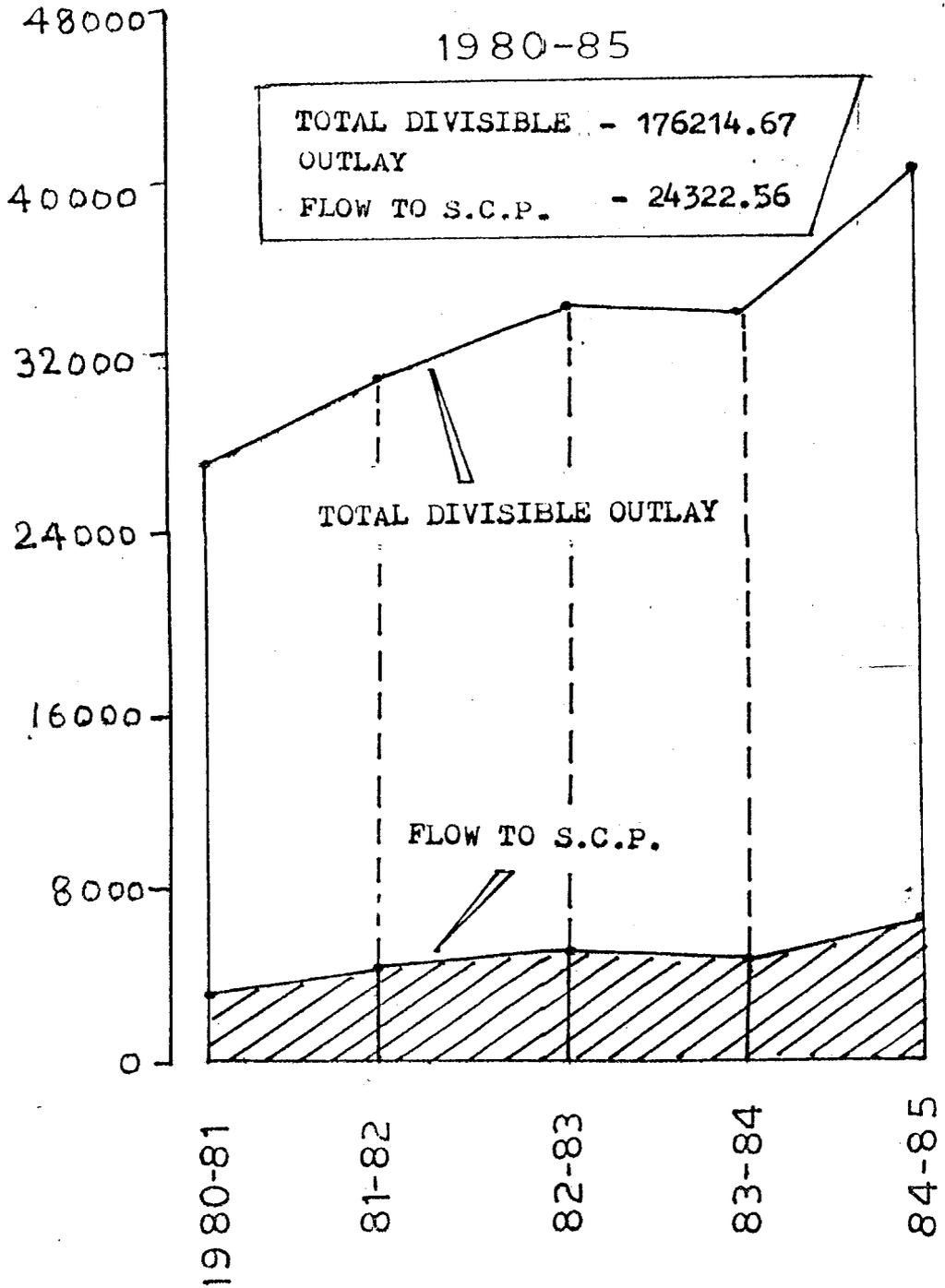

Yearwise analysis of the sum provided for the total State Plan shows that more than 46% of the total State Plan is divisible. The Table above reveals that yearwise flow to the Special Component Plan is more or less in line with the percentage of the Scheduled Caste population in the State i.e. 14.10%.

Out of the total State Plan envisaged for the Sixth Plan period, a sum of Rs.17685.55 lakhs was provided during the first four years of the Sixth Plan period. As against this provision, a sum of Rs.16353.74 lakhs (92.47%) was spent.

As regards the Special Central Assistance, out of a total sum i.e. Rs. 4075.00 lakhs indicated by the Government of India for the Sixth Plan period, Rs. 3010.71 lakhs were provided during the first four years. A sum of Rs. 2966.79 lakhs (96.54%) was spent during this period.

As is evident from the yearwise provision and expenditure figures, the performance under the Special Component Plan is steadily improving.

An abstract of Sectorwise provisions from the State Plan and yearwise expenditure is shown in Annexure No. I. Yearwise/Schemewise/Sectorwise provisions and expenditure have been shown in Annexure No. II (SCP-I). Yearwise/Sectorwise/Schemewise/Utilization of financial resources from the Special Central Assistance could be seen in Annexure No. III. Yearwise/Sectorwise/Schemewise physical targets and achievements from Special Central Assistance are given at Annexure No. IV. Yearwise/Sectorwise/Schemewise physical targets and achievements from the State Plan (SCP-II) are given in the Annexure No. V.

Coverage of the families:-

It is estimated that there are over 14 lakh harijan families in the State. Almost all of them lived below the poverty-line. It was decided that 50% of the total Scheduled Caste families in the State will be helped in crossing the poverty line. A target of 7.45 lakh was fixed for the Sixth Plan period. Yearwise targets fixed and

achievements in respect of coverage of the Scheduled Caste families are as follows :

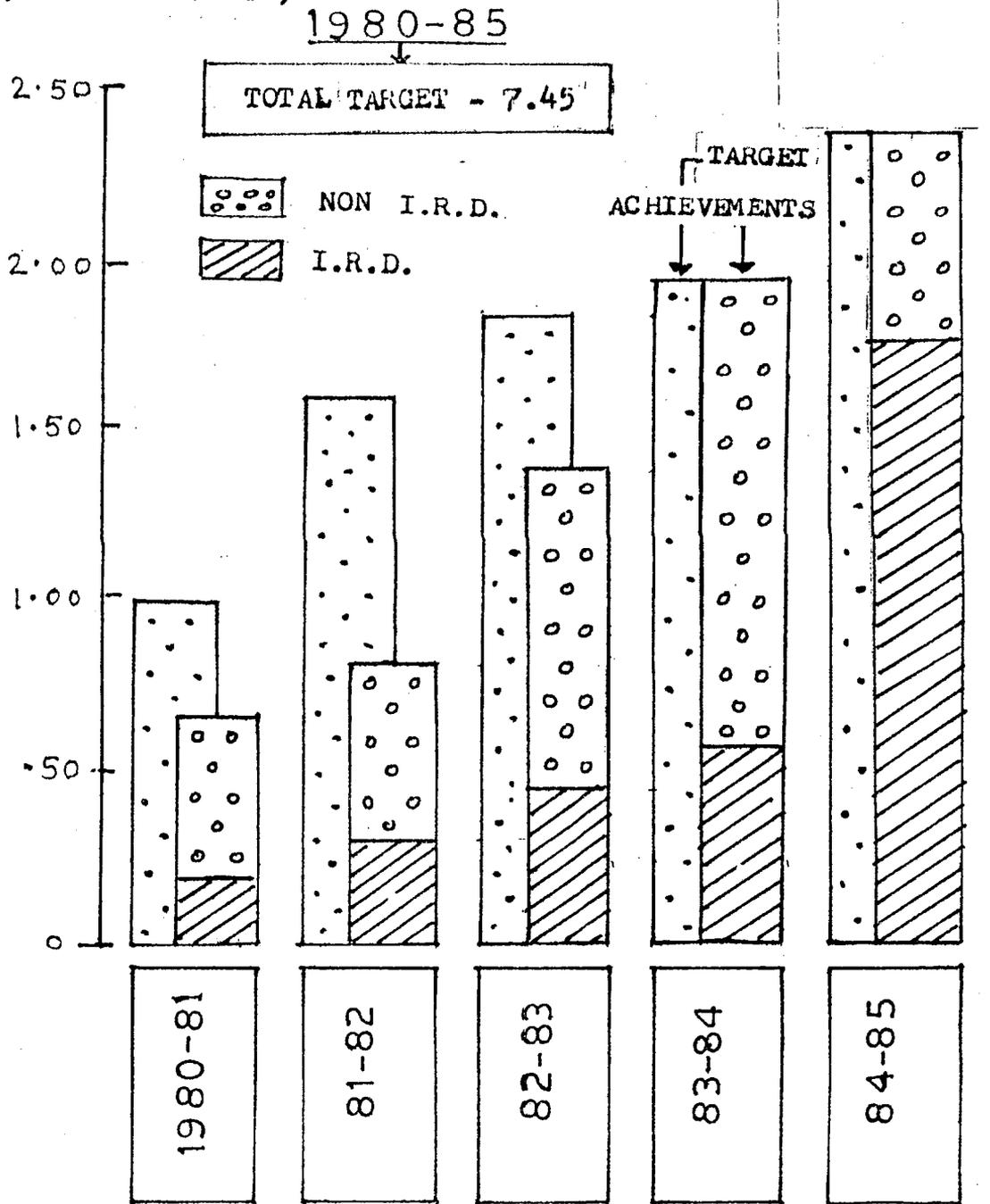

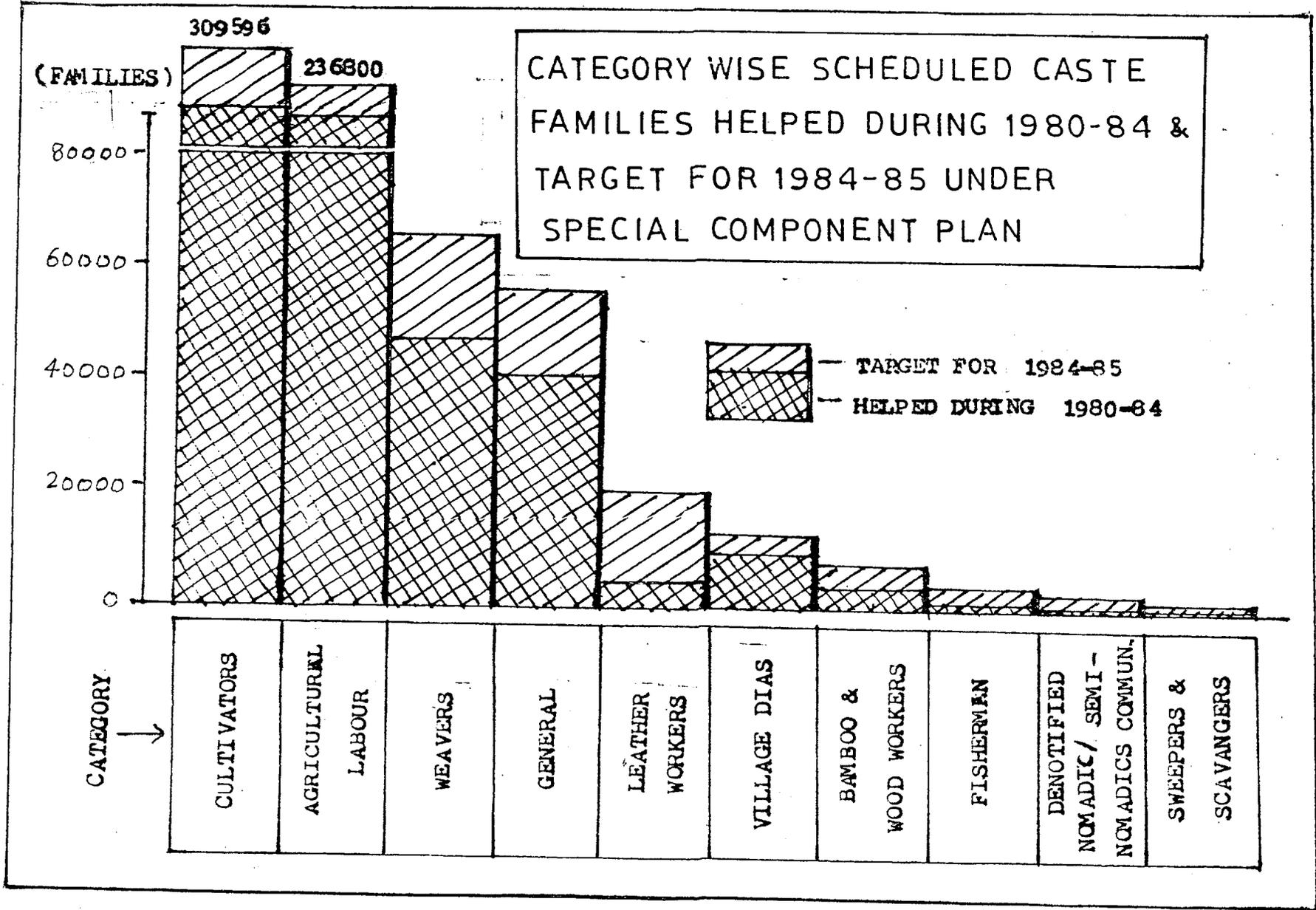

Due to paucity of resources the Leather Development Corporation has not started functioning in full swing. Therefore, the coverage of leather workers who form the majority amongst the Scheduled Castes in the State, is not adequate.

Schemewise/Sectorwise/Yearwise physical targets fixed and achieved under the Special Component Plan from the State Plan resources (SCP-II) are given at Annexure No.V.

Besides direct family benefit schemes, schemes pertaining to Area Development are also taken up under the Special Component Plan.

With a view to developing the road communication in the harijan predominant areas a target of connecting 109 harijan predominant villages with the main roads was fixed during the Sixth Plan. This target was achieved by the end of the year 1983-84. The State government have now decided to take up those villages also which have a population of 20% or more Scheduled Castes in a village.

Under Public Health Engineering, 1725 problem villages having predominance of Scheduled Caste population were identified. All these villages were covered with drinking water facility by the end of 1983-84. The norm of providing a source of drinking water with village having 50% or more Scheduled Caste population is now

relaxed to cover those villages which have 20% Scheduled Caste population.

Under Power sector also a good progress has been made in respect of providing electricity to the harijan bastees and energisation of pumps:

CHAPTER - VI

Programme Strategy for 1984-85

The formulation of the Special Component Plan for the Scheduled Castes in the year 1979-80 is a landmark in the efforts of ameliorating the socio-economic condition of these castes. In the initial years, the departments provided funds under the Special Component Plan mostly for the development of infrastructure in the predominantly Scheduled Caste pockets. There has now been a progressive shift towards family oriented programmes.

During the year 1984-85, it is proposed to include, by and large, only such schemes under the Special Component Plan which give direct and substantial economic benefits to the Scheduled Caste families thereby enabling them to cross the poverty line. Schemes for the development of infrastructure are to be taken up only if a development department has no family oriented schemes to offer, e.g., Public Works Department, Public Health Engineering Department etc. All pockets having a population concentration of 50% or above of Scheduled Castes have been covered. The State Government have now relaxed the limit to 20% concentration to benefit larger number of Scheduled Caste population under area development Programmes.

Under the family-oriented schemes, preference in the matter of identification and assistance will be given to the most vulnerable groups among the Scheduled Castes viz., sweepers and scavengers, bonded labourers, nomadic and semi-nomadic communities etc.

The main thrust in planning for the development of the Scheduled Castes is to help the Scheduled Caste families in crossing the poverty line, through the implementation of schemes of economic development, investment in human resources and area development. Outlays under these heads during the year 1984-85 in comparison to the year 1983-84 are as follows:-

A Time-Bound Programme has been chalked out for the effective and timely execution of Schemes under the Special Component Plan. Besides ensuring sanction of schemes and placing of allotments with the executing agencies in time, quarterly reviews of progress are also held at the Government level to ensure proper utilisation of funds and removal of bottlenecks to achieve the targeted coverage of the beneficiaries.

A number of development departments and corporations are executing the schemes for the economic benefit of the harijans. For the proper reporting of the benefits accruing to the harijans family oriented direct economic benefit schemes of all such departments and corporations have been identified. The departments also have to disaggregate their outlays sectorwise, schemewise and district-wise.

Financial : State Plan

A sum of Rs.24322.56 lakhs was the agreed outlay from the State Plan resources for the Sixth Plan period under the Special Component Plan. In the year 80-84 a sum of Rs.17685.55 lakhs was provided. Initially the total State Plan provision for the year 1984-85 was fixed at Rs.106068.00 lakhs out of which Rs.7009.37 lakhs were earmarked for the Special Component Plan. The divisible State Plan outlay was Rs.47855.55 lakhs and the sum provided for the Special Component Plan formed 15.16% part of the total State Plan outlay.

However, now the total State Plan outlay provided in the budget for 1984-85 is Rs.107479.31 lakhs. The outlay provided for the Special Component Plan is Rs.5910.04 lakhs.

The Irrigation Department will, however, be able to provide the outlay for the Special Component Plan for 1984-85 from the total State Plan outlay in the proportion agreed for the VI Five Year Plan period. In this manner, Rs.451.00 lakhs shall be provided in the coming supplementary Budget under Minor Irrigation (Irrigation Deptt.) for the Special Component Plan.

As the total divisible outlay under Industries is Rs.1277.50 lakhs, the Industries Department have expressed their inability to provide Rs.317.15 lakhs for the Special Component Plan. Thereffore, a sum of Rs.145.00 lakhs only has been provided in the Budget as flow to the Special Component Plan.

As escalated outlay was expected under Urban Development in the budget. As it could not be possible to have a higher total Plan outlay, the flow to the Special Component Plan has been reduced to Rs.65.00 lakhs.

The Social Welfare Department has been asked to provide Rs.64.44 lakhs for Social Education and Rs.62.10 lakhs for Nutrition in the supplementary budget. Similarly, under Harijan Development, a sum of Rs.561.00 lakhs will be provided.

It is hoped that when the provision under the sectors mentioned are revised the total outlay for the Special Component Plan will be Rs.6424.35 lakhs; 514.31 lakhs more than the present provisions in the Budget.

All the sectors from which there is a flow to the Special Component Plan are considered to be the divisible sectors.

The divisible outlay from the State Plan is Rs. 43704.05 lakhs. The outlay for the Special Component Plan i.e. ^{Rs.}6424.35 lakhs will be 14.70% of the divisible outlay.

Special Central Assistance:

Rs.3010.71 lakhs have been provided during the last four years from Special Central Assistance against the agreed outlay of Rs.4075.00 lakhs for the Sixth Plan period. Thus, Rs.1064.29 lakhs remained to be provided for the year 1984-85. Initially, Rs.1221.85 were proposed for the year 1984-85 on the basis of the demands under different sectors. As the Government of India have intimated the allocation of Rs.949.66 lakhs only from the Special Central Assistance, the same has been provided in the budget for 1984-85. An amount of Rs.0.76 lakhs has been shown less in two sectors viz. Industries and Social Welfare. The figures will be corrected in the next supplementary.

Sectorwise provisions from the Special Central Assistance are given in Annexure No.III . Sectorwise/ Schemewise targets and number of families likely to be benefitted are given in the Annexure:IV

Coverage of families:

As mentioned in Chapter V, 4.80 lakh families have been assisted in crossing the poverty line during the last four years as against the target of 7.45 lakh Scheduled Caste families for the Sixth Plan period. Thus, 2.66 lakhs Scheduled Caste families remain to be assisted in crossing the poverty line. With the financial resources available for the year 1984-85 it will be possible to assist 2.41 lakh

Scheduled Caste families only. A shortfall of 0.25 lakh families is thus anticipated owing to inadequacy of resources.

The target of families to be covered under different sectors during 1984-85 has already been given in Chapter No.III.

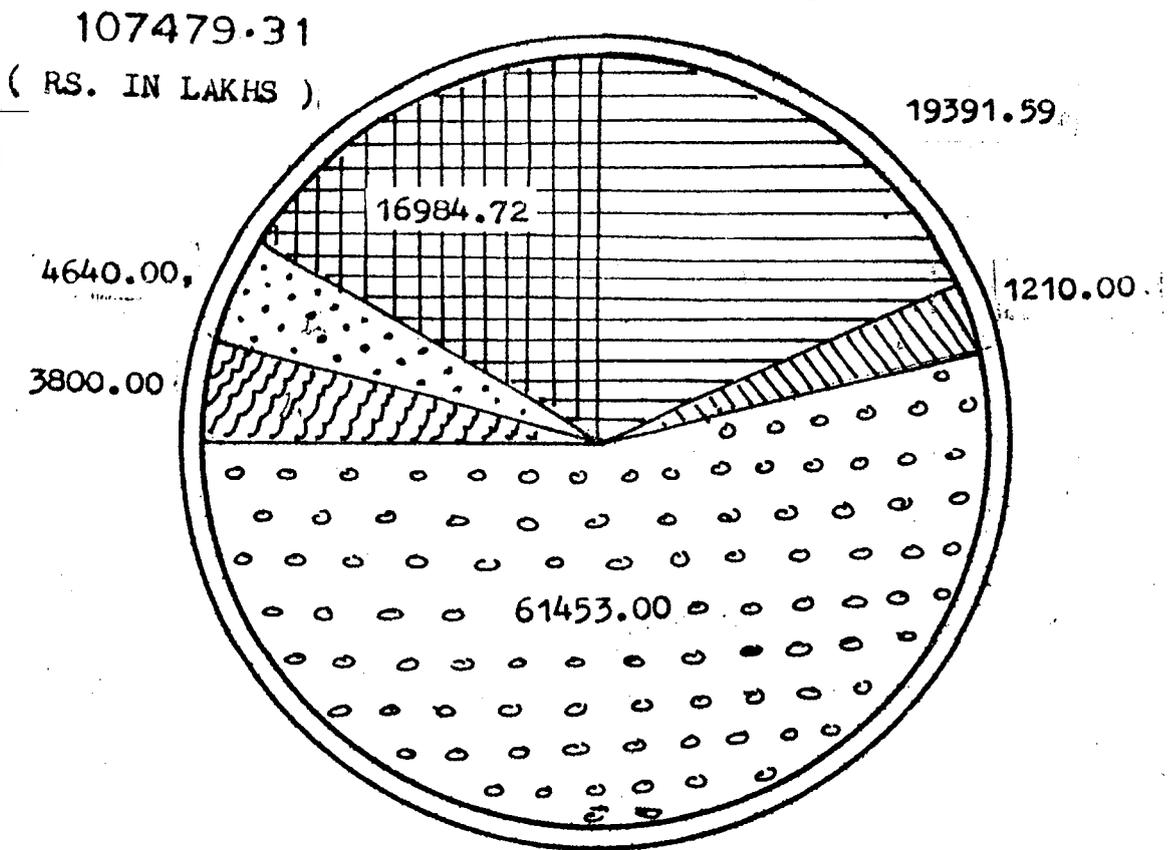

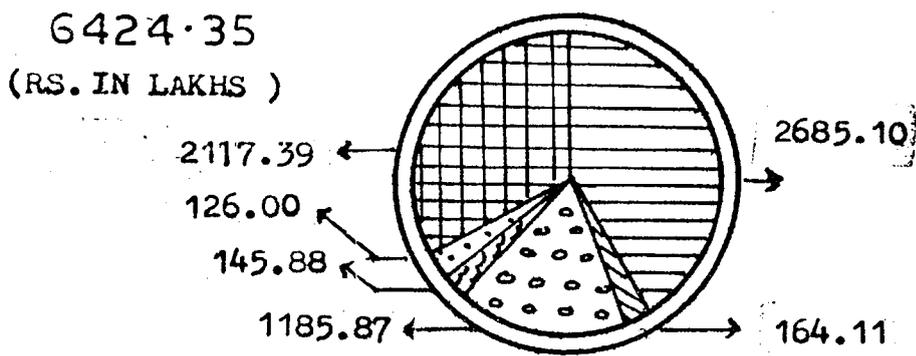

Agriculture •

With the establishment of a separate Directorate of Horticulture and Farm Forestry, the plan ceiling for agriculture sector has been divided into two distinct parts, viz.

- (a) Agriculture sector comprising agricultural production, minor irrigation, micro-minor irrigation and soil conservation, and
- (b) Horticulture and farm forestry

Accordingly, the Special Component Plans for these sub-sectors have also been prepared separately.

Outlays for the Agriculture sector are made available from the State Plan and Special Central Assistance both ;

The Sixth Plan of the State has an outlay of Rs. 17695.00 lakhs (as State share) for the Agriculture sector, out of which an amount of Rs.2787.90 lakhs or 15.75% is earmarked for the Special Component Plan. During the year 1980-81, 11.2% of the total outlay provided for the agriculture sector was earmarked for the Special Component Plan. 175% of the sum provided was spent. In the year 1981-82, 16% of the total outlay was provided for the Special Component Plan. 69.20% of the outlay provided was spent. Similarly, 19% of the total outlay was provided for the Harijan Component Plan during the year 1982-83 and 107.41% of the outlay provided was spent. 27.80% of the total outlay was provided during the year 1983-84. It is hoped that the expenditure will be 125.60% of the sum provided.

The Plan ceiling for the year 1984-85 for Agriculture has been fixed at 4620.00 lakhs, out of which an amount of Rs.974.27 lakhs (21.00%) has been earmarked for the Harijan Component Plan. An outlay of Rs.320.00 lakhs is provided for Horticulture and Farm Forestry, out of which an amount of Rs.50.00 lakhs is proposed for the Harijan Component Plan included in the above plan ceiling.

Special Central Assistance:

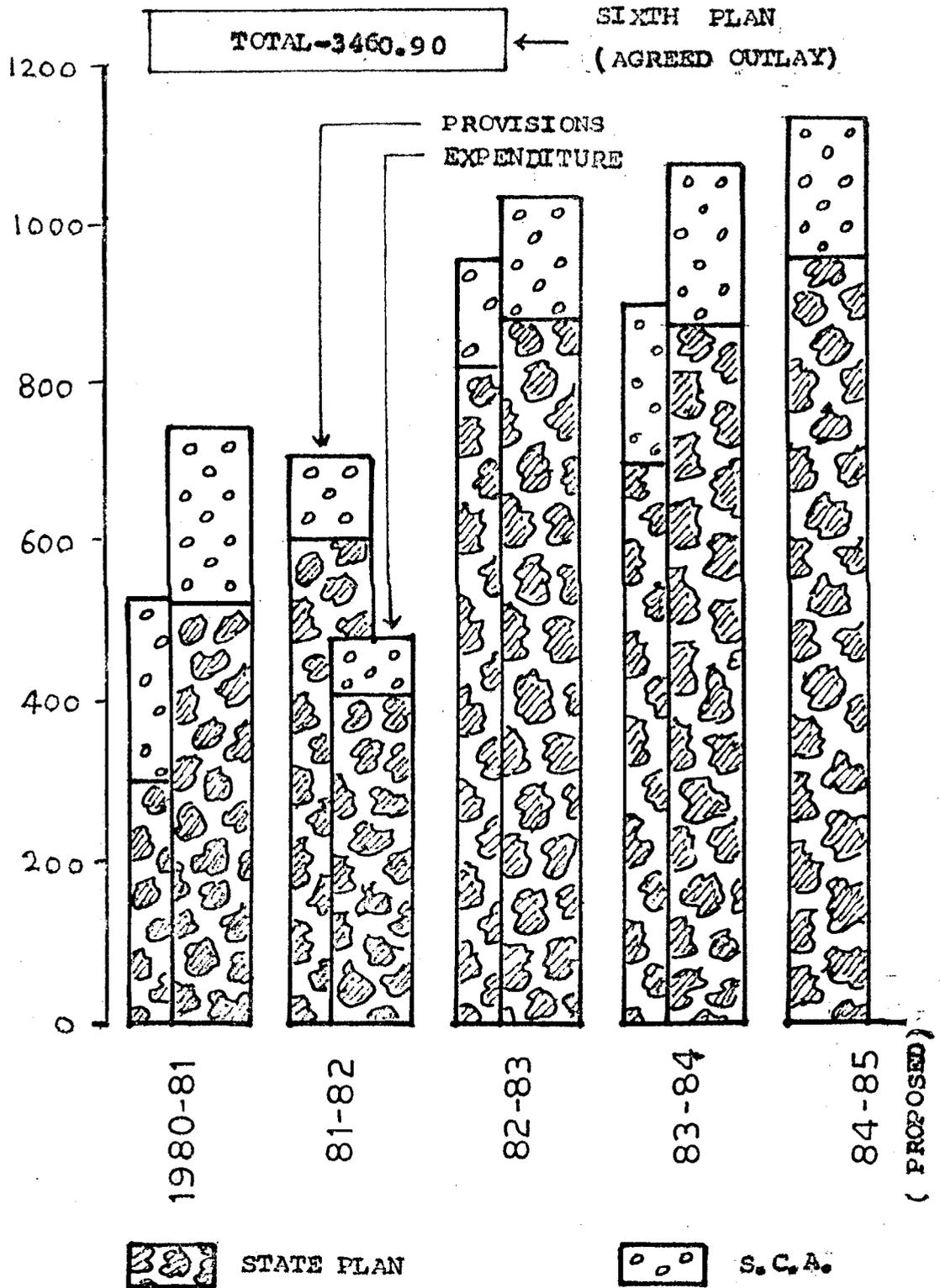

During the year 1983-84 Rs.64.89 lakhs were earmarked from the State Plan and Rs.73.60 from the Special Central Assistance.

No outlay from medium irrigation was provided during the year 1983-84 on the plea that there is hardly any scheme which has a potential of benefitting 50% Scheduled Castes out of the total beneficiaries. The same plea has

been taken in respect of minor irrigation during the year 1984-85 in providing a sum of only Rs.23.00 lakhs from the State Plan for the Special Component Plan. Therefore, a policy decision has been taken to include those irrigation works under the Special Component Plan which benefit at least 14% of the Scheduled Caste families or under which 14% land belongs to the Scheduled Castes in the command area. In the supplementary budget, therefore, a sum of Rs.451.00 lakhs is likely to be provided from the State Plan for the year 1984-85. Rs.50.00 lakhs have already been provided from the Special Central Assistance for minor irrigation.

It is estimated that 47115 families have benefitted from irrigation during the first four years of the Sixth Plan. It is proposed to benefit 5410 families from minor irrigation (Irrigation Department) during the year 1984-85

Land Reforms :

Two schemes, viz. free distribution of Bhu-Adhikar and Rin Pustikas and purchase of Bradma machines are included under the Land Reforms sector. 4.25 lakh harija have benefitted from the scheme of free distribution of Bhu-Adhikar and Rin Pustikas. A target of covering 0.50 lakh families has been kept for the year 1984-85. 0.24 lak khasra plots were prepared under the SCP. No outlay under this scheme has been shown in the SCP during 1984-85. A sum of Rs.7.74 lakhs has been proposed for the distribution of Bhu-Adhikar and Rin Pustikas.

Under Area Development programme, an outlay of Rs. 69.25 lakhs is proposed for the year 1984-05 for the following schemes :

Outlays are not earmarked for the SCP from DPAP because it is basically an area development programme meant for the benefit of all those who live in drought prone areas. But outlays are earmarked under IRD and NREP. Rs. 3238.19 lakhs (20.89%) were proposed for the SCP for the Sixth Plan under IRD and NREP both. As mentioned earlier, the provisions under community development were mixed with IRDP and NREP during the year 1980-81. A sum of Rs. 700.50 lakhs was provided for the SCP for all the three sub sectors against which Rs.205.03 lakhs were spent. However, separate provision of Rs.6.55 lakhs, for community development for the SCP was made for the year 1981-82 but Rs.535.00 lakhs were earmarked for two sectors i.e. IRDP and NREP combined together. Only Rs.152.09 lakhs could be spent against the provision. Rs.260.00 lakhs were provided for NREP and Rs. 450.00 lakhs for IRDP during the year 1982-83. The sum proposed for the NREP was spent in full and Rs.501.73 lakhs are reported to be spent under the I.R.D.P.

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The outlays for NREP and IRDP for the year 1983-84 were Rs. 293.60 lakhs and Rs. 525.00 lakhs respectively. These are proposed to be stepped up to Rs. 304.30 lakhs for NREP and Rs. 544.03 lakhs for IRDP during the year 1984-85. The number of scheduled caste beneficiaries under this sector is calculated to be 61,400.

The M.F. Leather Development Corporation (MPLDC):

The MPLDC was incorporated on 25th November, 1981. A tentative provision of Rs. 100 lakhs was made for the Sixth Plan period. Rs. 20.00 lakhs was provided for the year 1981-82 and Rs. 29.10 lakhs for the year 1982-83. Rs. 34.69 lakhs were provided for the year 1983-84. The activities of the MPLDC, which are basically meant to assist harijans, need to be expanded so that a larger coverage of harijan beneficiaries is ensured. Keeping in view this objective, Rs. 1001.00 lakhs were demanded from the Government Of India

as additional Central Assistance during 1983-84. However, this amount could not be made available. Rs.250.39 lakhs from State resources and Rs. 1001.00 lakhs from Special Central Assistance are proposed in 84-85 so that the schemes proposed during the year 1983-84 could be started now.

The Hastashilp Vikas Nigam (HVN):

The Nigam is launching a scheme to increase the earnings of those workers who are hereditarily engaged in the production of bamboo based articles. The demand of bamboo baskets in the mines of the State as also in other organizations like Bhilai Steel Plant etc. is tremendous but the item/^{is}at present being imported from other States. The Corporation intends to procure orders for bamboo baskets from these large units and distribute them among individual craftsmen so that they can work to their full capacity and increase their income. It also plans to develop cooperative societies and strengthen the existing ones with the cooperation of the MPRASVN so that the production of bamboo article in the State is brought on a more organised footing. An expenditure of Rs. 10.00 lakhs is proposed for this purpose in 1984-85.

M.P.Rajya Antyavasayee Sahkari Vikas Nigam:

MPRASVN, a financing institution was established in March, 1979, under the Madhya Pradesh Cooperative Act, 1960 for arranging credits to scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other weaker sections to enable them to establish their own trade or business. As per the byelaws of the Nigam, the membership ratio between scheduled castes and non-scheduled castes should be 70:30 and in the same ratio financial assistance should be provided. In the beginning the work of the Nigam was taken up in 19 districts. Later, 15 more districts were added. Thus, the Nigam has extended its activities in 34 districts. It has been decided to increase the number to 37 districts with the addition of Sidhi, Rajnandgaon and Khandwa districts. The business of the

Nigam is done through the district level Cooperative Development Societies which are also registered under the M.P.Cooperative Act,1960. The objectives and programmes of the Nigam are as under:-

- (i) To plan, promote, undertake and assist development programmes connected with individual oriented in-come generating schemes such as animal husbandry, small-scale, cottage and village industries, trades and business or such other activities as may enable the families of scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other weaker sections to earn a better living and help them to improve their standard of living.
- (ii) Development of rural and urban artisans.
- (iii) To provide financial assistance to educated unemployed persons.
- (iv) To provide working capital and share money to the affiliated societies by advancing loans and cash credit.
- (v) To co-ordinate, supervise and control over the activities of the affiliated societies.
- (vi) To plan and implement directly or through District Societies or through other societies or agencies, programmes for construction of buildings for various activities and instructions of Government/Semi-Government/Private agencies.
