FOREWORD

There has been considerable expansion in the field of Vocational and Technical Trainings and Education. However, no attempts had been made so far to conduct a survey of the existing institutions and facilities available in them. The Third All India Educational Survey has afforded the State Education Department an opportunity of collecting basic information about this important field of educational activity. The efforts of Planning, Statistics and Survey Unit of the Education Department, supplemented by those of the Institute of Applied Manpower Research, New Delhi, have yielded a valuable compendium of statistical data relating to institutional man-power training in this sphere. The survey reveals that the State has developed a broad based structure for imparting relevant vocational and technical training at various levels and in a wide range of subjects and skills.

Now that a policy decision has been taken to introduce work experience and vocationalization at various stages of general education, it is hoped that an integrated programme would be drawn up to avail of existing facilities by the schools to diversify education and to reduce expenditure by avoiding duplication of similar facilities in the schools themselves. Secondly, the Survey would undoubtedly stimulate action for a co-ordinated plan for training in socially and economically useful fields linked to man-power requirements of Development Plans. Such a plan, taking into account not only the present situation but the potential needs over a long period, will enable the institutions to modify their courses and plan their expansion accordingly. The urgency of such a co-ordinated and comprehensive plan has been felt for quite some time in our State, particularly in view of the chronic shortage of middle-range technicians in many important areas of economic activity.

It would be a fitting reward for the efforts of the Education Department in compiling this Survey if the information is not only welcomed widely but found worthwhile by the concerned Institutions, Departments and Organisations as well as individuals.

INTRODUCTION

1.1. A Survey of Institutions of Vocational and Technical Education and Trainings outside the University system as a part of the Third All India Educational Survey, has been conducted in the State under the aegis of the Institute of Applied Manpower Research, New Delhi. The object of this Survey is to make a proper assessment of the existing facilities in the field of Vocational and Technical Education and Trainings in the State on the supply side and to provide bench mark data for formulating realistic plans.

1.2. The first phase of the Survey, dealing mainly with collection of basic data has just concluded. In this phase, an inventory of all institutions of Vocational and Technical Education and Trainings in the State has been prepared. The reference date for the survey has been taken as December 31, 1973 and thus the coverage of the Survey extends to only 138 institutions though, in fact, as of date, the number of such institutions in the State is 188. Secondly, the selected data, that will enable functional appreciation, relating to these institutions have been collected and compiled.

1.3. The proformae devised by the I. A. M. R., New Delhi have been adopted for collection of data for ensuring uniformity at the national level. The Survey has been conducted on census basis within a record period of two months. This report contains some selected information gleaned from the data submitted to I. A. M. R., New Delhi. The Report has been arranged under the following three parts:—

Part I—Main Features of the Survey.

Part II—District-wise Maps showing location of Institutions.

Part III—Directory of Vocational and Technical Institutions.

1.4. The Survey Unit of the Education Department assisted by trained statistical personnel drawn from the Directorate of Evaluation and Statistics under the able guidance of Shri M. M. Kapoor, Assistant Director Education (Planning, Statistics and Survey) has been primarily responsible for speedy completion of the Survey. I also take this opportunity to thank the Departments of Planning, Social Welfare, Agriculture, Forest, Medical—Education, Public Works, Health, Industries, Handicrafts and Revenue who extended their full co-operation for its successful completion. Thanks are also due to the Institute of Applied Manpower Research, New Delhi who have met the entire cost of collection of information for the Survey and to Prof. M. Krishana, Chief Co-ordinator and Mr. Q. U. Khan, Head of Division of the Institute for their continued expert guidance.

PART—I

I. THE STATE

1.1. The State of Jammu and Kashmir is one of the largest States of the Indian Union situated in its north-west between 32.17° to 36.58° North Latitude and 73.76° to 80.30° East Longitude. The State occupies an area of 222,870 Sq. Kms. and 2/5th of its area lies under illegal occupation of Pakistan and China. As per 1971 Census, the population of the State was 46.17 lakhs with a density of population of only 33 per sq. km. 81 % of population lives in rural areas and only 30% of the total population is economically active. In consonance with the pronounced rural character of the population in the State, the occupational distribution is distinctively biased in favour of agriculture and 68% of the total working population constitutes of cultivators and agricultural labourers. Due to climatic factors and innate artistic skill of the people, handicrafts have been a flourishing occupation among a large number of ruralities in the Valley. The products of Kashmir Handicrafts are world renowned and enjoy a unique distinction in the international market for their sophistication, workmanship and originality.

II. DEVELOPMENT OF TECHNICAL EDUCATION

2.1. Technical and Vocational Education in Jammu and Kashmir has its remote origins in the apprenticeship system which has persisted to this day. It was more than 100 years back that the first craft school was opened by State for orphan children in 1873-74. This school admitted 87 boys and provided facilities for training in Wood Carving, Safogari, Chikandozi, Khirati, Sheeraji and Kharadi. But it was not earlier than 1918 when Amar Singh Technical Institute was opened in Srinagar for the first time to provide technical education on modern lines in the State. Later another Technical Institute was established in Jammu City. Gradually the number of entrants to these two institutions increased and the curriculum also underwent continual changes. The last Dogra Ruler, Maharaja Hari Singh (1925-47) established six more similar technical institutions for sub-overseers, smiths, builders, embroiders, basket makers etc. at Kishtwar, Bhaderwah, Samba, Mirpur, Barantulla and Anantnag to meet growing demands of trade and industry for technical personnel. Re-organisation of technical education also took place by fits and starts.

2.2. The Education Re-organisation Committee of 1938 recommended the removal of the control of the Industries Department over Technical Education and accordingly in 1940 it was transferred to the Education Department. A proposal to reorganise these Institutions into efficient Secondary Vocational Schools remained un-implemented due to the out-break of the Second World War.

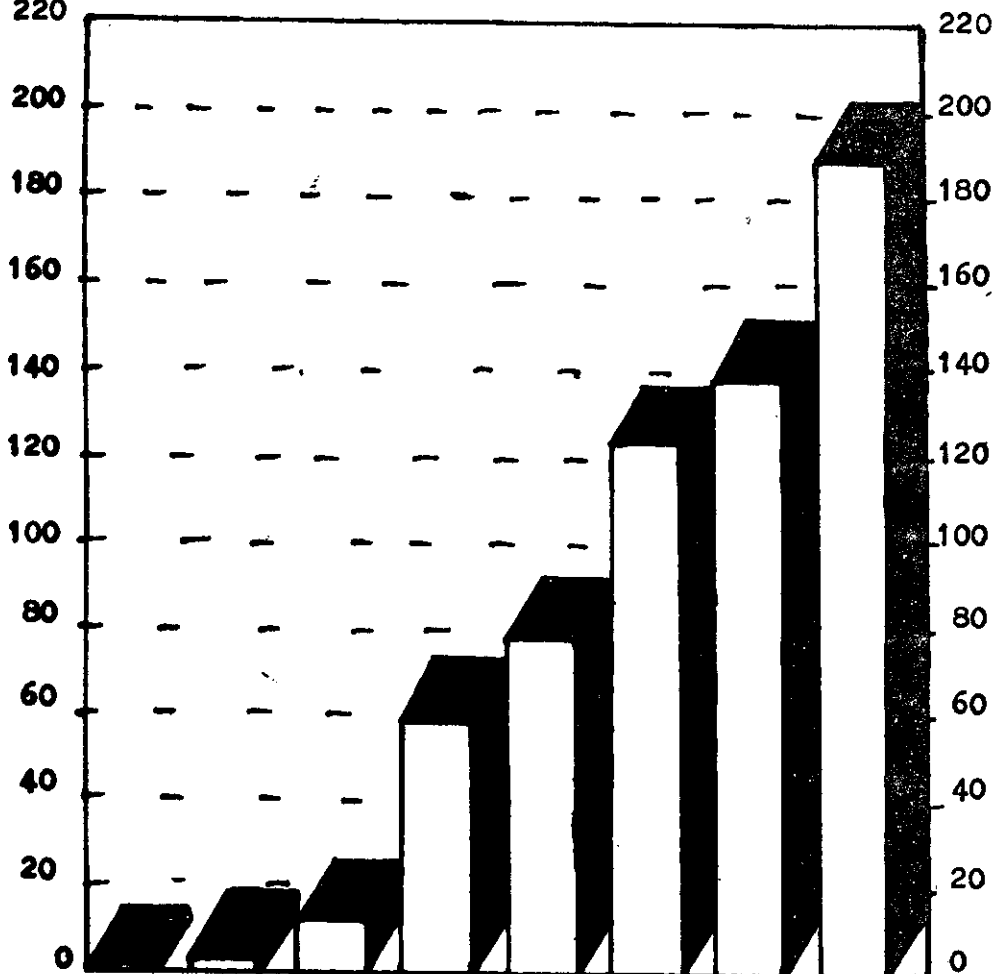
2.3. It was during Second and Third Five Year Plans that a planned and serious attempt to introduce technical education in the State was made. In 1956, a Polytechnic was started in Srinagar covering electrical, mechanical and civil engineering. A Commerce College was set up by a private organisation in Jammu in 1955 and two Industrial Training Institutes for a number of engineering and non-engineering trades also came up in 1958. The Third Plan period from 1960-65 can be considered

as a golden period for development of higher technical and professional education in the State. During this period in addition to opening of five Industrial Training Institutes and one Polytechnic, one Medical College, Tribes College, an Agricultural College, Regional Engineering College, and a State

as a golden period for development of higher technical and professional education in the State. During this period in addition to opening of five Industrial Training Institutes and one Polytechnic, one Medical College, a Tibya College, an Auyrvedic College, Regional Engineering College and two Agricultural Colleges were also opened in the State.

2.4. In spite of rapid progress made in recent years in the field of technical, vocational and professional education in the State, there is as such no proper co-ordination of various types of institutions with the actual manpower requirements of the State. Integrated and sustained growth needs effective co-ordination between these contributing agencies, which have all to concern themselves not only with the immediate problems on hand but also with an intelligent appreciation of the future needs of a continued growth.

2.5. Lack of co-ordination of development of the technical institutions with the manpower requirements of the State resulted in unemployment among professional and technical personnel. The Agriculture College of R. S. Pura (Jammu) and Government Polytechnic of Srinagar were consequently closed down in 1970-71 and the intake of other technical institutions was also reduced. However, the Polytechnic of Srinagar has been re-started in 1972-73. On the recommendations of Bhagwan Sahay Committee on Education in the State (1972), the Government has started Vocational Education in four Higher Secondary Schools from 1974-75.

III. MAIN FEATURES OF THE SURVEY

3. Number of Institutions

3.1. At present there are 188 Institutions in our State which are imparting Vocational and Technical Education. From 1973 to 1974, the number abruptly increased by 50 institutions due to various programmes of training implemented under "Half-a-Million Jobs Programme."

Out of 138 institutions up to December 31, 1973, 33 were for boys, 93 for girls and 12 for co-education. Most of these centres are run by the Social Welfare Department and the Department of Handicrafts.

3.2. Out of the existing 188 institutions only one existed prior to 1947 and the rest were established after independence as is evident from the following table ;—

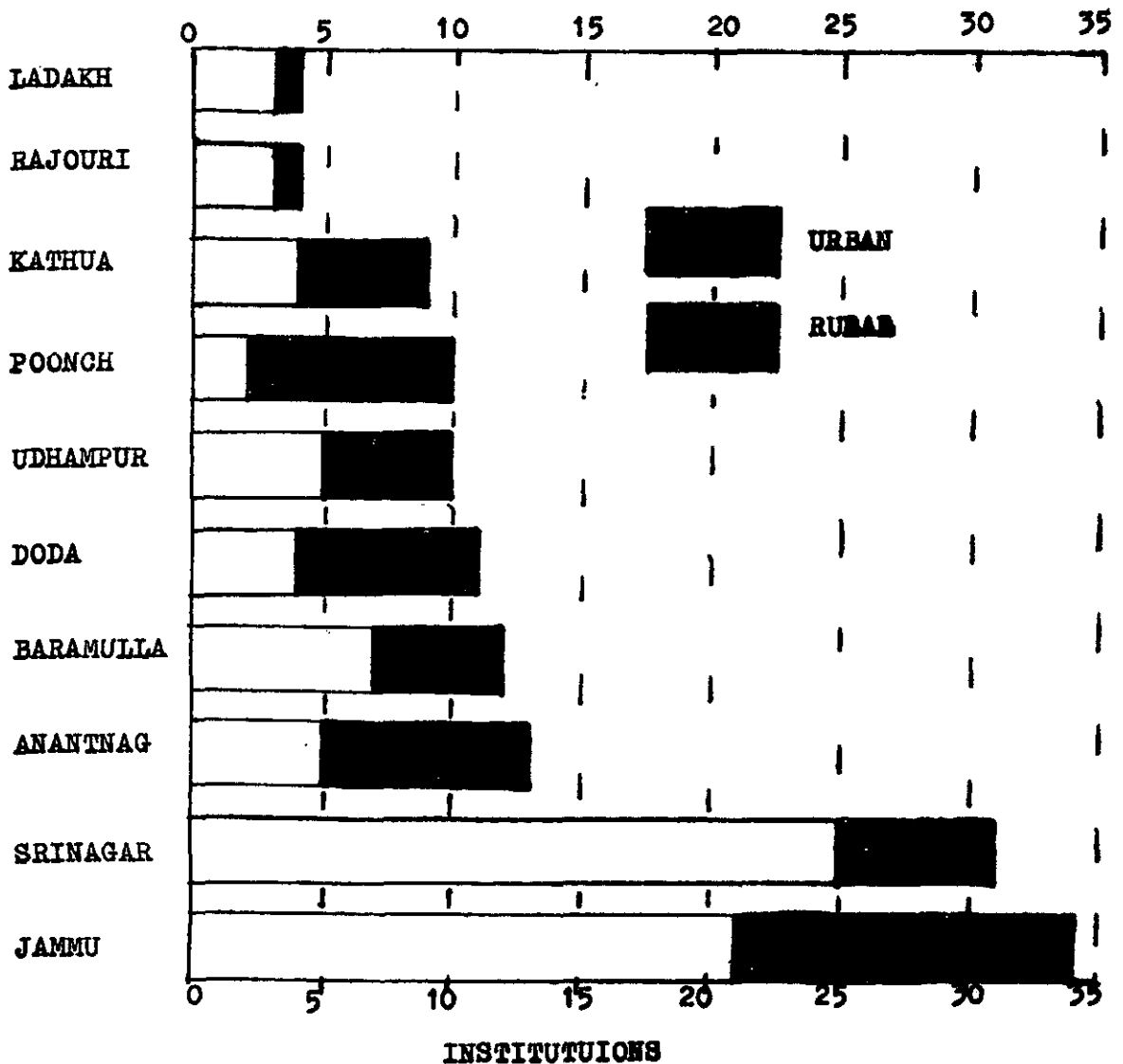

3.4. Jammu has the largest number of institutions and is followed by Srinagar and Anantnag while Leh and Rajouri Districts have the lowest number of Institutions.

3.7. None of the institutions shown above has facilities for part-time courses but all of them have provision for full-time courses only. The schools for Handicrafts represent as much as 81% of the total institutions and their district-wise break-up as shown in the following table reveals that Jammu Province has 60% of the total institutions :—

4.2. Out of nine institutions which are completely residential three are for boys and six are for girls. Among 13 institutions with partly residential facilities, six are for boys, four for girls and three are co-educational.

5. *Teaching and other staff*

Against 1119 sanctioned posts of teaching and non-teaching staff, 1070 were working on the reference date of the Survey and about half of the total staff consisted of teachers including Principals/Heads of Institutions as indicated in the following table :—

6. *Enrolment*

The enrolment in all types of Institutions, Technical and Vocational and Training Centres, as on December 31, 1978 was 6645 out of which 40% were girls. 554 students belonged to scheduled castes which count for only 8% of the total enrolment. The maximum enrolment of 2977 was in schools for training in Handicrafts followed by Industrial Training Institutes with 1289 students. The enrolment in all types of Institutions has been given in the following table :—

7. *Provision and Popularity of Courses*

None of the Institutions has provision for part-time courses and the duration of courses varies from three months to three years. There are no pre-matric courses in Polytechnics, Animal Husbandry Schools, Schools for Commercial Education and other types of Technical and Vocational Schools. All the remaining institutions have provision for both post-matric and pre-matric courses except schools for handicrafts and fisheries where there is provision for only pre-matric courses. Following table gives a comparative picture of sanctioned capacity of various courses in the institutions and actual admission in 1972-73 session :—

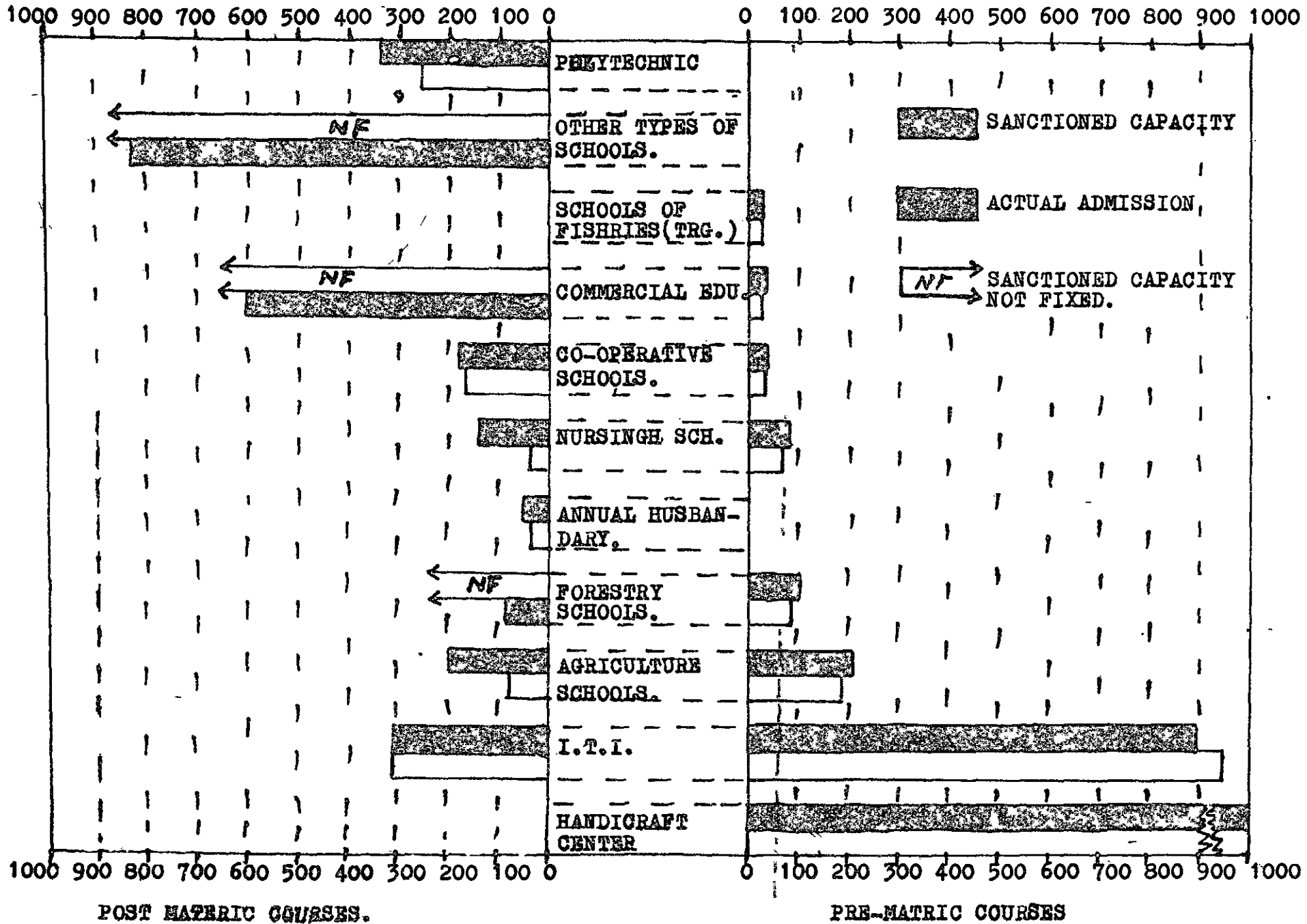

Leaving aside the training centres for Departmental candidates, position in other institutions except the Polytechnics seems to be satisfactory. But the Course-wise variations among various types of institutions as given in the annexure to this part of the Report reveal the correct picture about the popularity of courses. In the two Polytechnics all the courses have less enrolment than the sanctioned capacity. The Industrial Training Institutes have popular post-matric courses where enrolment has edge over sanctioned capacity but in the case of pre-matric courses except watch repairing, instrumental, mechanical trade, motor mechanic, cutting and tailoring, other trades like sheet metal, knitting, blacksmithy etc. are rather un-popular.

In case of Agricultural Schools almost all courses have less enrolment than the sanctioned capacity. Similar is the case with Schools of Animal Husbandry, Nursing and Co-operation.

Schools for Handicrafts have rather very popular courses specially in crafts where the enrolment is much more than the sanctioned capacity.

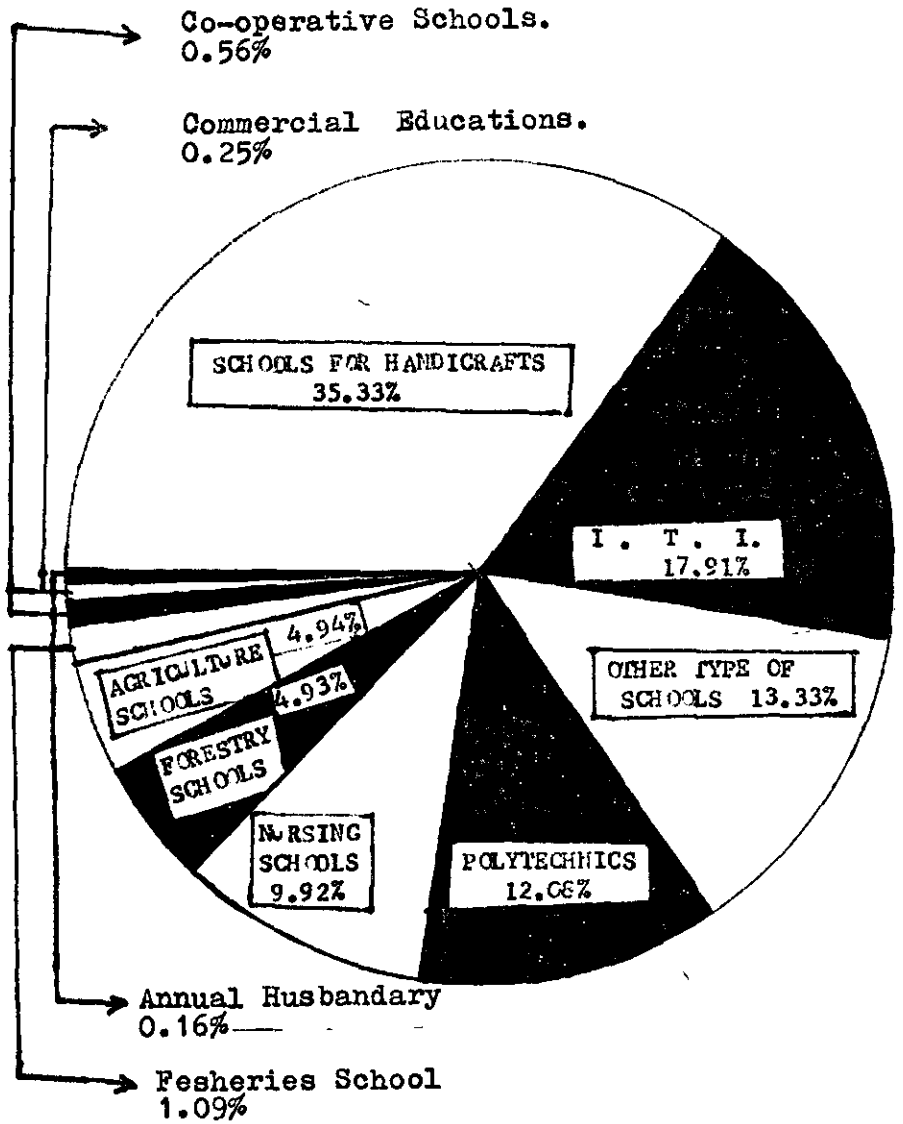

9. *Finances*

188 out of 188 institutions being Government institutions, there is only marginal contribution from private sources. The following table gives details of expenditure on recurring and non-recurring items :—
