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HISTORY OF THE UNIVERSITY

The years 1905-05 are memorable ones in the annals of Bengal and indeed in the annals of India. The attempt by the Government to partition Bengal led to a country-wide agitation and intense nationalist movement, which, although political at the outset, had important economic and cultural aspects as well. The economic aspect of the movement found expression in the production and use of "Swadeshi" goods. The cultural aspect found expression in many forms, in the regeneration of Indian art and music, but most of all in the boycott of the then prevalent system of education and the establishment of a new system based entirely on national lines and intended to serve only national purposes.

It was in this way that the National Council of Education was started in 1906 "to impart education—literary and scientific as well as technial and professional—on national lines and exclusively under national control, not in opposition to, but standing apart from the existing system of primary, secondary and collegiate education, attaching special importance to a knowledge of the country, its literature, history and philosophy and designed to incorporate with the best Oriental ideals of life and thought, the best assimilable ideals of the West, and inspire students with the genuine love for and desire to serve the country." The foundation of the National Council of Education was rendered possible by the munificence of three generous donors, the late Raja Subodh Chandra Mallik, the late Brajendra Kishore Roy Choudhury of Gouripur and the late Maharaja Surya Kanta Acharyya Choudhury Bahadur of Mymensingh. The first President of the Council was Sir Rash Behari Ghosh, and with the early days of the N.C.E. were associated nearly all the notable figures of the time, some of whom later won world recognition, men like Poet Rabindranath Tagore, Sri Aurobindo and others.

In 1906, the year of the foundation of the National Council of Education, Bengal, there was established another body known as the Society for the Promotion of Technical Education in Bengal, also under the Presidentship of the late Sir Rash Behari Ghosh, with the object of imparting scientific and technical education to the Indian people, calculated to further their industrial progress. Under the auspices of this Society there was started the Bengal Technical Institution (later known as the College of Engineering and Technology, Bengal), financed mainly by the late Sir Taraknath Palit. In 1910, the Society for the Promotion of Technical Education in Bengal was amalmanated with the National Council of Education.

The national Council at first maintained both Arts and Science and Technical Departments, but finding the public

demand for Technical education more insistent, the Council came to devote almost the whole of its resources to technical education through its College of Engineering and Technology.

In 1921, the Council had the good fortune to secure a donation of about 13 lacs of rupees under the will of the late Sir Rash Behari Ghosh. This princely bequest enabled the Council in 1924 to erect extensive buildings and workshops on its present site at Jadavpur. Besides the donations and endowments of the founders mentioned above, the Council received a sum of about 10 lacs of rupees as donations from various persons. The present site of the Jadavpur University is a gift of the Corporation of Calcutta, which leased out to the Council 64 acres of land on a nominal rent.

In view of the fact that the College of Engineering & Technology, Bengal, had been virtually functioning as a University and in order that the degrees of the National Council of Education, Bengal, should receive statutory recognition, the Government of West Bengal with the concurrence of the Government of India has enacted the necessary legislation, for the establishment of a University at Jadavpur under the name of "JADAVPUR UNIVERSITY" which came into being on the 24th of December, 1955.

The Jadavpur University act provides—"Any degree conferred by the National Council at any time between the first day of January, 1944 and the commencement of this act shall for all purposes, be demed to be a degree corresponding to such degree of the University as may be declared by the State Government."

The University would like to put on record its sense of gratitude for the generous support it had been receiving from the Central Government, the University Grants Commission, the Government of West Bengal, the Corporation of Calcutta, some Public Trusts and benevolent persons.

University Campus:

The University stands on an area of 58 acres of land on Raja Subodh Chandra Mallik Road in Jadavpur, in the southern outskirts of Calcutta, 8 km, by rail form the Scaldah Railway Station and 11 km, from Howrah Railway Station. The location is in the immediate vicinity of the Jadavpur Station and is also approachable by bus from all parts of the city.

SRI AUROBINDO BUILDING with its annexe houses the main administrative offices of the University namely those of the Vice-Chancellor, Registrar, Deputy Registrar, Assistant Registrar, and the Meetings, Records, Despatch, Admission, Estate, Information, Statistics Sections, Director of Youth Westere, Dean of Students, University Engineer and the Committee Room on the Ground floor. On the other floors of the building, the offices of the Controller of Examinations, Stude

mts' Roll, Accounts, Stipends and Scholarships, Establishment, Appointment Unit, Cash, Purchase, Finance Officer and Placement & Training are situated.

HIRENDRA NATH DATTA BUILDING accommodates the Electrical Engineering Department, Class-rooms, Laboratories, Departmental Library. The High Tension Laboratory is housed in an adjoining building at the south west of the Campus.

PRAFULLA CHANDRA RAY AND BRAJENDRA KISHORE BUILD: No. provide the Chemical Engineering Department with Laboratories, Class rooms and Departmental Library.

ASUTOSH CHAUDHURY BUILDING is at the east of the Campus and provides the Class rooms, Departmental Library-cum-Meeting room and the Mechanical Engineering Department.

THE HYDRAULICS BUILDING accommodates the Laboratories and a gas plant and on the right side of this building is the Cosmic Ray nut facing the beautiful jheel. In addition to the Mechanical Engineering Building, Blue Earth Workshop and Machine Shop are also accommodated in sheds while the Foundry is in the ground floor of the integrated Course Building.

THE DEPARTMENT OF FOOD-TECHNOLOGY & BIO-CHEMICAL ENGINEERING is housed to the east of the P. C. Roy Building. This new building provides the offices, Laboratories and the Class-rooms of the above department.

CIVIL ENGINEERING BUILDING accommodates the Civil Engineering and the Electronics & Tele-Communication Engineering Departments and houses the Offices, Class-rooms and Laboratories.

Integrated Course Building provides the class-rooms, Laboratories, Photographic Club, and the Department of Library Science and adjacent to this building, the annexe accommodates Professor G. C. Sen Memorial Machine Tools Research Laboratory.

Engineering Science Building accommodates Physics Laboratories and classes for Engineering Students.

THE MULTI-STORIED building at the west overlooking the University Campus and its surroundings, houses the Post-graduate Civil, Electronics & Tele-Communication Engineering, Computer Centre, Instrumentation & Electronics Engineering. Architecture and general engineering classes.

METALLURGICAL ENGINEERING BUILDING is at the east of the University Library and provides the office of the Department of Metallurgical Engineering, Class-rooms, and Laboratories.

LIBRARY BUILDING provides the University Central Library. It is a three-storied building having a total floor space of about 30,000 sq. ft. The three large reading rooms, accommodate 500 readers and the library work has been distributed into 13 units of essential work. The library is well-decorated and in a quiet and congenial atmosphere. Dr. Tarak Nath Das Research

Centre in International Relations is housed in an extended block of this building.

OLD BOYS' HOME is in the centre of the Campus having the offices, meeting room of the Alumni Association. The ground floor is used as pavilion of the sports clubs facing the greengrassed large play-ground of the University.

Guest House on the extreme east of the Campus provides, board and lodging facilities for guests. The lobby on the ground floor is utilised as Faculty Club.

GANDHI BHAVAN is named after. Mahatma Gandhi. It accommodates a library as Gandhian Study Centre on the first floor and provides a dais and a spacious hall with a lounge.

Press Building houses the University Press in its twostoried building.

The Departments of Arts and Science are accommodated in the two wings of the buildings standing to the north of the Jheel. The Post-Graduate Arts and Science classes and laboratories are also accommodated in separate building. The Post-Graduate Arts Building houses the Departments of History, Sanskrit, International Relations and a Common-room for the students. In an adjoining building, the offices of the Dean of the Faculty of Arts, the Departments of English, Bengali Comparative Literature, Economics, Philosophy and a Senior Common-room and a Lady Students' Common-room are accommodated. Adjacent to this building, the Annexe, houses the Departments of Mathematics, Chemistry and also a part of the Department of Geological Sciences.

VIVEKANANDA HALL is named after Swami Vivekananda. The hall provides a spacious dais, green-room and has sitting accommodation for 600 persons.

Post-Graduate Science Building accommodates a part of the Department of Chemistry (Physical), the Department of Geological Sciences and Laboratories, Class-rooms for the students and the office of the Dean, Faculty, of Science.

The RESEARCH AND THE RADIO CHEMISTRY BUILDING to the north of the Jheel provide research facilities to the science students.

PHARMACY BUILDING is at the north of the Campus beside the Post-Graduate Science Building and provides Laboratories. Library, Class rooms and office of the Department of Pharmacy. Adjacent to this building, the annexe, provides the Animal House.

COMPUTER CENTRE BUILDING is Located to the east of Civil Engageering Building.

HEALTH CENTRE BUILDING is at the extreme east of the campus where specialists hold clinics according to a programme throughout the year and the Medical Superintendent is a whole-time officer.

BIDHAN CHANDRA VIDYARTHI BHAVAN provides the students.

Common-Room with facilities for all sorts of Indoor Games and a canteen exclusively for students.

Besides the above the University has the following other buildings on the Campus; Men's and Women's Hostel blocks, the Recreation Centre (Indoor Stadium), the Hobby Centre, Central Stores, N.C.C. Buildings for accommodating N.C.C. office, five buildings for residential quarters for University staff including the Teachers' Hostel.

The four main blocks of the University Hostel are situated outside the Campus in the neighbourhood of the University. Besides these, the following buildings are also in the Campus; Acharya Prafulla Chandra Roy Polytechnic (Jadavpur Polytechnic), the School of Printing Technology and the Testing Laboratory of the West Bengal State Electricity Board the Jadavpur University Branch of the State Bank of India, the Jadavpur University Post Office, Indian Institute of Chemical Engineers, the Jadavpur Vidyapith (including the office of National Council of Education, Bengal), Jadavpur Vidyapith College of Education and the Regional Computer Centre.

Coat of Arms:

The University adopted for its Common Seal and Coat of Arms the design of three flamed lamp encircled in lotus petals executed under the direction of Late Nandalal Bose. The lamp represents knowledge, the three flames representing, intellectual training, cultivation of emotions and imagination and spiritual development. The petals of the lotus on the periphery represent the Fine Arts and Culture.

Limate of Calcutta :

Calcutta is situated at an altitude of 21 feet above sea level in a climatic region which has been variously classified as Monsoon and sub-tropical humid.

The continental influence on the climate of Calcutta is evident in the temperatures through the year. The coldest month is January and the mean maximum and the mean minimum temperatures of the city are 110° (40° C) and 45° F (8° C) respectively.

Features of Jadavpur University:

This is a unitary teaching University with its teaching Departments grouped into the three Faculties of Arts, Science and Engineering & Technology. All authority is vested in one body—the University, which has four main advisory councils—the Academic Council, the Finance Council, the Working Council and the Development Council besides a number of other small bodies. The University has emanated from the National Council of Education, and has before it the objects of the Council. It has a great heritage and has to live up to the noble traditions set up by the Council.

The following are some of the leading features of the University:

- (a) intimate relationship of the teacher and the taught with a joint Teacher Student Committee in each Department
- (b) close and intimate association of the ex-students
- (c) lively extra curricular activities
- (d) the tutorial system
- (e) a disciplined student-body inspired by high ideals of duty and service.

The unitary University is in spirit and intention, though perhaps not in actual fact a residential institution and as such puts the greatest emphasis on the development of a corporate life among students. Students are expected to participate in extra-curricular activities for enriching their potentialities, and personality, as well as for the development of corporate life.

We remember these great men who conceived of, established and nurtured the National Council of Education, Beagal from which this University has emerged in December, 1955.

Academic Session and Vacations

The Academic Session of the Faculties are as follows:

- (a) For all Undergraduate Courses: Ist July to 30th June.
- (b) For Postgraduate Courses: 1st August to 31st July.

The session is divided into two semesters:

First Semester —Ist July to 30th November.

Second Semester —Ist December to 30th June.

The Vacations are as follows:

Summer Vacation—During May—June, except for the periods during which the examinations are held.

Puja Vacation:—From the Mahalaya to Bhratridwitiya, both the days inclusive.

Office Hours

The Offices of the University are open from 10-20 a.m. to 5-15 p.m. daily except on Saturdays when it closes at 1-40 p.m. Enquires except in cases of urgency, should be made between 11 a.m. and 4 p.m. in as much as old records have to be referred to for supplying the necessary information in many cases.

Cash Hours

The University Cash Section remains open from 11 a.m. to 2-00 p.m. on weekdays and from 11-00 a.m. to 12-00 noon on Saturdays excepting on University holidays. For Evening students the Cash Section remains open between 5-15 p.m. and 7-15 p.m. on weekdays excepting on Saturdays.

Sales Hours

The Sales Counter of the Information Office remains open from 11 a.m. to 2-00 p.m. and from 2-30 p.m. to 4 p.m. on weekdays and from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturdays excepting University holidays.

Recess

Recess period for students is from 1-40 p.m. to 2-10 p.m. while for the office-staff is between 2-00 p.m. and 2-30 p.m. on all working days except Saturdays.

COURSES UNDER VARIOUS FACULTIES AND RULES OF ADMISSIONS

All communications relating to admission in any particular course should be addressed to the Registrar by designation.

FACULTY OF ARTS

Courses:

- Undergraduate Courses: (a) Honours Courses of three years' duration leading to the Bachelor of Arts in Bengali, Comparative Literature, Economics, English, German, History, Philosophy, Political Science and Sanskrit.
- 2. Bachelor of Library & Information Science degree of one year's duration (open to graduates only).
- 3. Post-graduate Courses: (a) Two years' Courses leading to the Master of Arts degree in Bengali, Comparative Literature, Economics, English, History, International Relations, Philosophy and Sanskrit.
- (b) Post-graduate Evening Courses: Three years' duration in Bengali, Economics, English, History, Philosophy, and Sanskrit. The Evening Courses are open to employed persons preferably the School teachers.
- 4. Master of Philosophy (M. Phil.) Courses of two years' duration in English, International Relations, Philosophy and Comparative Literature.
 - 5. Ph.D. (Arts) and D. Litt. degree.
- 6. Language Courses: (a) Certificate Courses in German, French and Russian.
 - (b) Diploma Courses in German, French and Russian.
 - (c) Advanced Diploma Course in German and Russian.

The Courses are of one year's duration and are open only to the students of this University.

(d) Certificate Course in Bengali.

Eligibility:

1. Undergraduate Courses: A student who has passed the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of any Statutory Board of Higher Secondary Education or the Intermediate Examination of any Indian University or the Indian School Certificate Examination or any other recognised equivalent Examination is eligible for admission in the first year class of the Under-graduate Course. Candidates who have not passed the Higher Secondary/equivalent examination at least in 2nd Division are not eligible for admission.

2. Library & Information Science Course: A student who has passed the Bacheler's degree of Jadavpur University or of other recognised Indian Universities is eligible for admission.

A person who is a Pass Course Graduate is eligible if at least one of the following conditions are satisfied; (i) that he has a Master's degree; (ii) that he is a working Librarian and applies through his institution; (iii) that he has a Certificate in Library Science which is recognised by this University; (iv) that he scored at least 50 per cent marks in the Bachelor's degree examination, (v) that he had First Division in the Public Examination immediately preceding the degree examination.

3. Post-Graduate Courses: A student who has passed Bachelor's degree in Arts of this University or of any other Indian University is eligible for admission to the first year Post-graduate Class. But the Candidates who have passed the Higher Secondary or its equivalent examination in the 3rd Division and did not Pass B.A. with Honours need not apply.

In the event of any candidate seeking admission to a Post-graduate Course in a subject of Arts Faculty in which he does not have the Bachelor Honours degant should as a pre-requisite for admission pass an examinination comprising of two papers of 100 marks each covering substantially the B.A. Honours Course in similar subject of this University to be conducted by this University.

Such students as have studied similar subjects in B.A. pass course and qualified may be exempted from this pre-requisite examination on the recommendation of the department concerned after interview.

On satisfying the above pre-requisite such candidates may be admitted in order of merit only if there be vacancy after admitting the honours graduates in that subject.

4. Post-graduate Evening Courses:

A Candidate who has passed the Bachelor of Arts Examination and is in permanent employment, is eligible for admission to the first year Post-graduate Evening Courses. School teachers are given preference for admission. The classes are held normally is the evening from 6 p.m. to 9 p.m.

5. Master of Philosophy:

(i) INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS: A candidate who has passed the Master of Arts Examination in International Relations of this University or Political Science of any

recognised Indian University with specialisation in International Relations or Modern History of Sociology or Economics securing at least 50% marks in aggregate is eligible to apply for admission.

- (ii) ENGLISH: A candidate who has passed the Master of Arts Examination in English or Comparative Literature of this University or of any recognised Indian University securing at least 50% marks in aggregate is eligible to apply for admission.
- (iii) Philosophy: A candidate who has passed the Master of Arts Examination in Philosophy of this University or of any recognised Indian University securing at least 50% marks in aggregate is eligible to apply for admission.
 - (iv) COMPARATIVE LITERATURE: A candidate who has passed the Master of Arts examination in Comparative Literature, English, Bengali or any other literature of this University or of any recognised Indian University Securing at least 50% marks in aggregate is eligible to apply for admission.
- 6. The University offers in this Faculty the Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) and Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.) degrees, the rules whereof are available separately.
- 7. Language Courses: All students of the University are eligible to take up Certificate Course in Language (French, German or Russian). Holder of Certificate and Diploma in particular language will be eligible for admission to Diploma and Advanced Diploma Course respectively. The language classes are normally held at the University between 9-30 a.m. and 10-30 a.m.
- 8. Certificate Course in Bengali: A graduate of any University or a foreign student is eligible for admission. The course is open only to non-Bengali students.

Procedure:

Application for admission has to be made on the prescribed form. The form along with a Handbook of Information may be obtained at the Information Office on cash payment of Rs. 3.00 or on remitting Rs. 4.00 by Crossed Postal Order payable to 'Jadavpur University'. The form duly filled in and together with the necessary certificates and the prescribed fees has to be submitted to the Registrar by the dates fixed for the purpose. Incomplete or irregular forms will not be considered. The application registration fees are not refundable.

An application which has been registered for one course will not be considered for a different course.

Admission will be made on the basis of merit subject to an interview by the Admission Board whose decision regarding the selection of a candidate will be final.

A candidate who fails to appear for interview may be refused admission.

In the case of the Undergraduate Course the percentage of total marks secured at the last University or Board Examination will be the basis of merit, or on the basis that will be decided by the Admission Board of the University.

In the case of the Post-graduate Courses the total marks secured at the Bachelor of Arts Examination will be the basis of merit or on basis that will be laid down by the Admission Board. Applicants to Post-graduate Evening classes should submit a no-objection certificate from the Head of the Institute/Secretary in which they are employed.

The last date for taking admission to any course will be a date not later than 30 days of the commencement of classes in the course.

A student who has already obtained the Master's degree from an Indian University is not eligible for admission to the Post-graduate course of this University in the same subject in which he/she has obtained such degree.

Students who come after passing an examination from another University will be required to submit a migration certificate within four months from the date of admission, failing which admission is liable to be cancelled.

INTAKE

The following are the annual intakes in the different courses of the Faculty of Arts:

First year Under-graduate class of each course ... 40 Bachelor of Library and Information Science Course ... 50 First year Post-graduate class (Evening) of each course... 50 First year Post-graduate class of each course ... 50 Certificate Course in Bengali ... 30

Subject of Studies for Hons. Courses in the Faculty:

All students of the Honours Course shall study 6 papers in non-Honours subject during their first 2 years and they are examined in these Papers in B.A. Part I Examination at the end of the 2nd year. The 8 Honours Papers are studied during the 3 years and they are examined in these Papers in the B.A. Final examination at the end of the 3rd year class.

Subjects of study other than Honours are as follows:

- (i) Bengali (Non-Bengali students and students of Bengali Honours course will offer Alternative English in lieu of Bengali. Any student who though a Bengali has not studied Bengali of the higher standard during school career may be permitted to offer Alternative English, and he/she should apply to the Dean of Faculty for this purpose immediately after admission to the 1st year class).
- (ii) English (Students of English Honours Course will offer Alternative Bengali. However, if such a student has not studied Bengali of the higher standard during school career, he/she may be permitted to offer "special English" in lieu of Alternative Bengali. For this purpose, he/she should apply to the Dean of the Faculty immediately after admission to the 1st year class).
- (iii) 2 Papers in the subsidiary Subject. There is a Subsidiary Course of 2 Papers in the 9 subjects of the Honours Course. Students of Economics Honours are also permitted to offer Mathematics as their Subsidiary Subject.
- (iv) 2 Papers in General Education.
 - (a) "Everyday Science"—This is common for all the Honours Course.
 - (b) "Humanities" or "Social Science"—Students of Economics, History and Political Science Honours Courses are required to study the "Humanities" Paper. And students of Bengali, Comparative Literature, English, German, Philosophy and Sanskrit Honours Courses are required to study the "Social Science" Paper.

Ninth Paper of the Honours Course:

The break-up of the 100 marks of the Paper is as follows:

40 for the Annual Examination;

40 for Tutorials in course of all the 3 years; and

20 for Viva Voce test as a part of the B.A. Final Examination.

The Annual Examination is held when the College re-opens after the summer vacation of the first session and students join the 2nd year class.

FACULTY OF SCIENCE

Courses:

- 1. Undergraduate Courses: Honours Courses of three years' duration leading to the Bachelor of Science degree in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Geological Science. The university has no pass courses for the B.Sc. degree.
- 2. Post-graduate Courses: Two years' Courses leading to the Master of Science degree in Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics (both Pure and Applied) and three years' Courses leading to the Master of Applied Geology.
- 3. Post-graduate Evening Courses in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics of three years' duration.

The Evening Courses are open to School teachers only. A permanent employee of any institution is also eligible to apply.

4. Ph.D. (Science) and D.Sc. degrees.

ADMISSION

Eligibility:

1. Under-graduate Courses: A student, who has passed at least in the second division in the Higher Secondary Examination (10+2) of any Statutory Board of Higher Secondary Education or the Intermediate in Science Examination of any Indian University or the Indian School Certificate Examination or any other recognised equivalent Examination with Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics, is eligible to apply for admission in the First Year Class of the Under-graduate Course.

Candidates for the Under-graduate Course in Geological Science must be physically fit and those candidates with glasses shall have the power of eyesight correcting lenses not to exceed 3.5.

2. Post-graduate Courses: A student, who has passed the Bachelor of Science Examination of this University or of any

other Indian University or any examination recognised equivalent by this University with Honours is eligible for admission to the First Year Post-graduate Class who has not passed the Bachelor of Science Examination with Geology, is not eligible for admission to Applied Geology The case of a candidate who has not secured Honours in B.Sc. Examation seeking admission to Mathematics course may be considered provided seats are available. should however, obtain at lest 50% marks in Mathemaites in B.Sc. Examination. A student who has passed the B.A. Examination with Honours in Mathematics is eligible for admission to the Post-graduate course in Mathematics, provided he/she is prepared to take the same course of study and the same examination as those prescribed for the Science and he/she will be awarded the Arts (M.A.) degree on passing the prescribed examinations.

- 3. Post-graduate Evening Courses: Eligibility for admission to Post-graduate Evening Courses is the same as that of Day Course but Candidates should be bonafide school teachers, having at least one year's teaching experience. A permanent employee of any institution is also eligible to apply.
- 4. Doctorate Degree: The University offers in this Faculty the Doctor of Philosophy (Science) (Ph.D.) and Doctor of Science (D.Sc.) degrees, the rules whereof are available separately.

Procedure :

Application for admission has to be made on the prescribed form to be issued for the particular course by the University. The form along with a Handbook of Information may be obtained at the Information Office on cash payment of Rs. 3.00 or on remitting Rs. 4.00 preferably by Crossed Postal Order payable to "Jadavpur University". The form duly filled in and together with the necessary Certificates and the prescribed fees has to be submitted to the Registrar by the dates fixed for the purpose. Incomplete or irregular forms will not be considered. The application registration fees are not refundable in any circumstances. A student of this University is exempted from paying the registration fee.

An application which has been registered for one course will not be considered for a different course,

Admission will be made on the basis of merit subject to an interview by the Admission Board whose decision regarding the selection of a candidate is final.

A candidate who fails to appear for interview may be refused admission.

In the case of Undergraduate Courses, admission shall be on the basis of marks obtained in the subject or subjects, considered to be relevant to a particular course by the Admission Board.

In the cases of the Post-graduate Courses the percentage of total marks obtained in the Bachelor of Science Honours Examination of this University or of any other Indian University will be the basis of merit. [If seats are available, candidate who has not obtained Honours may be selected for admission to Post-graduate Mathematics (both Pure and Applied) provided he/she secures 50% marks in Mathematics in the B.Sc. Examination.]

The Admission Board, may without prior notice, change the procedure of selection for any particulars course.

In all cases the decision of the Admission Board regarding selection of a candidate is final.

Students who come after passing an examination from another University will be required to submit a Migration Certificate within four months of admission failing which admission will be cancelled.

B.Sc. Preliminary Examination is held at the end of the 1st year on compulsory subjects.

ADMISSION

Eligibility:

1. (a) Undergraduate Courses in Engineering:

Candidates who have passed the Preparatory Science Examination of this University or Pre-University Science Examination of any recognised Indian University or Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination in general Stream of West Bengal Council Higher Secondary education or any other equivalent examination of a recognised University/Board with Physics, Chemistry, Mathematics and English is eligible for admission to the First year class of the Undergraduate Courses, provided they satisfy the prescribed medical fitness.

(b) Underground Course in Pharmacy:

Candidates who posses (i) qualifications are detailed in (a) above or (ii) Diploma in Pharmacy recognised by the Pharmacy Council of India will be eligible for admission. They will be required to satisfy the condition of medical fitness.

(c) Degree Courses in Food Technology & Bio-Chemical Engineering and Instrumentation & Electronics Engineering:

Candidates who have passed B.Sc. Examination of any University with Chemisty Honours with Physics & Mathematics as subsidiary subjects are eligible for admission to

3-year Course in Food Technology & Bio-Chemical Engineering, Science Graduates with Honours either in Physics or Mathematics are eligible for admission to 3-year Course in Instrumentation & Electronics Engineering. They will be required to satisfy the condition of medical fitness.

(d) Part-time (Evening) Degree Courses in Engineering:

Candidates who have passed the Diploma Examination of the National Council of Education, Bengal/any Indian University/Government/Statutory Board in Civil/Electrical or Mathematical Engineering or equivalent diploma in relevant Subject recognised by this University and are in actual Service are eligible to apply for admission to the First year class of the Part-Time (Evening) degree Courses in Engineering. An Information Brochure regarding condition of eligibility in details is available separately.

2. Post-graduate Courses:

A student who has obtained the Degree of Bachelor of Engineering in any course in Engineering/Pharmacy/Technology at this University or any other recognised Indian University or Institution with at lest 60% marks is eligible for admission to the Post-Graduate course in Engineering/Pharmacy/Technology in the corresponding subject. A student who holds B.Tech. Degree in Food Technologo & Bio-Chemical Engineering or equivalent recognised degree is eligible for admission to the Post-graduate Course in Food Technology. A student holding the Bathelor of Pharmacy degree is eligible for admission to the Post-graduate Course in Pharmacy. A student who holds B.Tech. degree in Instrumentation and Electronics Engineering or B.E.Tel.E. degree is eligible for admission to the Post-graduate Course in Electronics and Tele-Communication Engineering.

Candidates for admission to the Electrical and Civil Engineering Departments should have at least one year's

practical experience after graduation.

3. Post-graduate Diploma Courses in Engineering & Technology:

A student who has obtained the degree of Bachelor of Engineering in the specific Course in Engineering / Technology at this University or at any other recognised Indian University or Institution is eligible for admition to the Postgraduate Diploma Course in Engineering/Technology in the corresponding subject. A student who holds the Bachelor of Prod. Engg. degree/B.E. (Aeronautical) or B.E.Tel.E./B.Tech. (Instrumentation & Electronics) with proper background is eligible for admission to the Post-graduate Diploma Course in Mechanical Engineering. Electronics & Tele-Communication Engineering respectively. A student holding the B.Tech. (Food and/or Bio-Chemical Engineering/Chemical

Engineering/Chemical Technology or B.Ch.E./B.Agl. (Engg.) or M.Sc. (Food-Technology or equivalent in each Course with proper background is also eligible for admission to the Diploma Course in Food-Technology & Bio-Chemical Engineering.

4. Post graduate Diploma Course in Computer Science:

Engineering graduates and candidates with Master's drgree in Physics and Mathematics are eligible to apply. Scheme of the Course may be found under the heading computer Centre,

5. Ph.D. (Engineering):

Rules for the Doctor of Philosophy (Engineering) and Doctor of Engineering Degrees are available separately.

Medical Fitness:

Candidates seeking admission to all degree courses in Engineering as well as Pharmacy Course should possess good health and physique with sound mind and should be capable of undergoing N.C.C. Training. They should not have any physical deformity or infirmity and should not be suffering from any disease or illness that might incapacitate him/her in future. They should not be suffering from any infectious or contagious disease. Eye-sight standard; a) should not be colour blind, be allowable defect—myopia or miopic astigmatism correcting lens not exceeding 3.5. Candidates are to produce recent certificate showing the acuteness of added vision and the power of glass at the time of medical examination prior to admission.

Procedure of Admission:

1. a) Undergraduate Course in Engineering:

All candidates should appear at the Joint Entrance Examination conducted by the "West Bengal Board of Examination for Admission to Engineering Degree Colleges".

The prescribed application form for appearing at the Joint Entrance Examination may be obtained from the Information office of the University or from the office of the West Bengal Board of Examination at the Bengal Engineering College. Shibpur, Howrah-3 on cash payment of requisite fee. The form duly filled in should be sent to the office of the said Board of Examination with a Crossed Indial Postal Order for the amount precribed by the said Board, payable to 'West Bengal Board of Examination for admission to

Engineering Degree Colleges' and a stamped self-addressed envelope.

A Separate Application for admission to this University has to be made on the precribed form, obtainable on application to the Registrar with a Postal Order Rs. 2/- payable to Registrar, Jadavpur University enclosing a self-addressed envelope or from the Information office on cash payment of Re. 1/-. The form duly filled in together with necessary certificates/mark sheets and the prescribed fee has to be sumbitted to the Registrar within the prescribed date. Particular care should be taken to incorporate on the application form the Registration Number of the candidate given by the "West Bengal Board of Examination for Admission to Engineering Degree College", failing which the application will be rejected. Selection will be made on the result of joint Entrance Examination.

(b) Undergraduate Course in Pharmacy:

For admission to Pharmacy Course the candidates (other than Diploma Holder in Pharmacy) will be selected on the marks of English. Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics of the Joint Entrance Examination conducted by the 'West Bengal Board of Examination for admission to Engineering Degree Colleges', C/o B. E. College. Howrah-3. They will be required to sit for the Joint Entrance Examination along with the other Candidates willing to be admitted to the Engineering Degree Courses.

Candidates who intend to be nominated by the Government of West Bengal in the reserved seats shall have to apply to the State Governmet, Department of Health & Family Planning within the specified date.

The Post-Graduate Diploma in Engineering Technology [P. G. Dip, (Engg./Tech.)] will be awarded to the successful candidates.

POST-GRADUATE DIPLOMA COURSE IN COMPUTER SCIENCE

The University has instituted a Computer Centre which offers a Diploma Course:

1. One-year Computer Science Post-Graduate Diploma Course:

This Course is open to all engineering graduates and M. Sc.'s in Physics and Mathematics. The maximum intake per year will be 20. Two Streams of students will be taken in. A common Course covered in two papers, viz. Digital Computers Principles and Introduction to numerical methods and Computer programming will be offered to both groups. Specialization could involve a choice between engineering orientation or software orientation. Candidates. Electronics & Tele-Communication degree in Engineering Electrical Engineering (with strong backgrnund in Electronics), Radio Physics and Applied Physics will be considered for specialisation in Computer Technology and candidates with degrees in Mathematics, Physics, Statistics and other branches (with strong background in Mathematics) will be considered for the software group. The course will lead to Post-graduate diploma of the University. diploma students will receive a scholarship of Rs. 400/- per month except the sponsored candidates drawing pay from respective institutions. The session is expected to commence from the first week of August.

FURTHER DEGREE FOR ENGINEERING GRADUATES

Students having degree in one branch of Engineering who are allowed to be admitted to study in another branch of Engineering in the Faculty of Engineering and Technology, provided seats are available may be allowed to be admitted in 3rd year classes according to the curriculum as in practice.

PART-TIME (EVENING) ENGINEERING DEGREE COURSE

The University has instituted the Part-time Degre (Evening) Courses in Civil. Mechanical and Electrical Engineering of 5-years duration leading to the degree of B. E. (civil), B.E. (Mech.) and B. E. (Elec.) respectively. Classes are held daily from 6 p. m. to 9-15 p. m. Those who hold the diploma of the National Council of Education, Bengal, or of any University or of any Government or Statutory Board in Civil, Mechanical or Electrical Engineering or have passed B.O.A.T. Examination for diploma in Electrical or Mechanical Engineering or equivalant diploma in relevant subject recognised by this University and are in actual employment are eligible for admission. Students admitted under the scheme are required to be in employment during the course of study. Selection of admission will be made in order of merit on the basis of results of the admission test and Viva Voce by the Admissian Board. The following will be the subjects of the Test: (i) Mathematics. (ii) Engineering Mechanics and in addition to those (iii) Surveying for candidates of Civil Engineering.

Those students who did not study surveying in their diploma classes will have to take special classes on surveying during holidays and pass in the subject. The number of intake is 30 for each of the courses.

A separate Information Brochure containing the syllabuses of admission test and other information is available at the Information office of the University on payment of Re. 1.00.

Rules relating to admission, examination, studies, payment of fees etc. which govern the regular students will also apply to the Part-time Course students unless they conflict with any rules specially mentioned here. Rules are subject to alternation by announcement on the Notice Boards.

In the case of the 1st year students the entire tution fee amounting to Rs. 180/- will be payable in advance at the

time of admission.

TRAINING COURSES

Higher Services Examination Training Course: Higher Services Examination Training Course Commences from January every year to prepare candidates who have passed M.A., M.Sc., B.A. (Hons)., B.Sc. (Hons), B.Com., (lst class), B.E. or L.L.B., Examination. The candidates must have attained the age of 21 years and their age should not be over 24 years on the 1st August of the year of training.

Classes are held between 6 p.m. and 9 p.m. Only 25 students are admitted every year. Admission is made in order of merit on the results of written and Viva-Voce test to normally held in November/December each year. The following will be the subjects of the test: (i) English and (ii) General Knowledge. Tuition Eee is Rs. 250/- for the entire course of study and the amount is to be paid at the time of admission.

ADMISSION

Eligibility:

- 1. A student seeking admission to M.Sc. (Home Science) in Home Management course must have passed B. Sc. (Home Science) of Jadavpur University or an examination recognised as equivalent thereto of other University.
- 2. A student seeking admission to M.Sc. (Home Science) in Child Development course must have passed
 - (i) B.Sc. (Home Science)

(ii) B.Sc. with Psychology or

(iii) B.Sc. with Chemistry & also B.Ed. Examination.

The student from any other University shall be required to do the courses that may be considered as the prerequisites for the various branches before she is qualified for the final examination.

- 3. A student seeking admission to B.Ed. (Home Science) course must have passed B.Sc. (Home Science) of Jadavpur University or other exmamination recognized as equivalent thereto of other University.
- 4. A student who has passed Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination of any statutory Board or equivalent examination of any Indian University or Board recognized by the Jadavpur University is eligible for admission to the First Year B.Sc. class of 3 years Honours course in Home Science.
- 5. A student who has passed the Higher Secondary (10+2) Examination of any statutory Board or equivalent examination of any Indian University or Board recognized by the Jadavpur University is eligible for admission to the Diploma in Early Childhood Education Course.
- 6. A student who has passed the Madhyamik Pariksha (Secondary Examination) of any statutory Board recognized by the Jadavpur University is eligible for admission to the
- (1) Certificate Course in Home Science (one year) and

(2) Certificate Course in Art in Everyday Life (one year).

Application for admission has to be made on the prescribed form obtainable on payment of Rs. 2/- on application to the Principal. Application must be accompanied by original marksheet & two attested/photostat copies of the mark-sheet along with a passport size copy of candidate's photograph.

Candidates for M.Sc. and B.Ed. course may have to appear for a selection test and interview at their own cost.

JADAVPUR VIDYAPITH COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

The College was started on Sept. 15, 1969 under the direct management of the National Council of Education, Bengal.

Courses: (i) From the year of inception i.e. 1969, the College offers a Teacher-Education course in Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.).

- (ii) From 1975, the college offers, in addion another professional course in Bachelor of Education, (Physical Education), B.Ed. (Phy. Edn.),
- (iii) From July, 1977, a Post-Graduate course in M.A. in Education, is being offered.

Duration of the Course: (a) The B.Ed. Course, as in (i) above, covers a period of fifteen months, commencing on the first day of July, every year.

- (b) The B.Ed. (Phy. Edn.) course, as in (ii) above, now covers a period of twelve months, commencing on the first day of July, every year. (It was originally a 15-month Course)
- (c) The M.A. in Education course, as in (iii) above. covers a period of three years, comprising two examination-parts, Part—I and Part—II.

The dates for commencement of the session are duly

notified every year.

The theoretical classes are held in the evening from 5-30 p.m. to about 9-00 p.m. and the practical classes are held in the morning. afternoon or evening, as the case may be, according to the needs and nature of topics relating to different courses.

'Teaching practical' classes and Experimental classes, when needed, are periodically held in a few selected schools or institutions concerned.

(i) For B.Ed. Course: The minimum qualification for admission is a degree in Arts, Science or Commerce. The intake capacity of the College, so far as the B.Ed. course is 200 Secondary school teachers and Freshers with good academic qualifications are admitted to the course on a 50: 50 basis. It is a Co-educational course.

Application for admission are to be made on prescribed forms available from college office on notified dates and terms. A teacher-candidate is required to furnish a certificate in the prescribed form from the Headmaster, Headmistress or Secretary of the Institution concerned to the effect that the institution has no objection to the candidate's joining the course and also to releasing him/her for all teaching or other relevant practical classes, as and when necessary.

Selection (for admission) is made on the basis of the applicant's merit as ascertained and judged from his/her past achievements and records alongwith other certificates and testimonials, supplemented by an admission test and/or interview. A candidate who fails to appear at the admission test and/or interview is not considered for admission. The decision of the College authority in the matter is final.

Age limit for the teacher-candidates is normaly 40 years (relaxable upto 45 years in exceptional cases) and that for fresher-candidates is 30 years.

(ii) For B.Ed. (Phy. Edn.) Course:

The minimum qualification for admission is a Degree in Arts, Science or Commerce.

The intake capacity of the college so far as this Course is 60. Secondary School teachers and Freshers with good academic qualification are admitted to the course on a 50: 50 basis.

Applications for admission are to be made on prescribed forms available from college office on notified dates and terms.

Only male candidates are eligible for admission to this course at this college. It is a residential course and as such, all selected candidates are to stay in the college hostel.

Selection (for admission) is made on the basis of the applicants merit as ascertained and judged from his past/achievements and records alongwith other certificates and testimonials supplemented by an admission test, practical test and interview.

A candidate who fails to appear at the admission test, practical test and interview is not considered for admission. The decision of the college authority in the matter is final.

Age limit for the teacher candidate is 40 years and that for the freshers is 30 years.

(iii) For M.A. in Education Course:

The minimum qalification for admission is a good degree in Arts, Science or Commerce and a good B.Ed./B.T. degree of a recognised University.

Preference is given to those who hold Post Graduate and/or Honours Degrees.

The Course is a Co-educational one and the intake capacity of the college, so far as this course is concerned, does not ordinarily exceed 40.

A teacher-candidate is required to furnish a certificate in the prescribed form to the effect that the institution

has no objection to his/her joining the course and also to releasing him/her for all kinds of practical and experimental work, as and when necessary.

The age limit for this course is normally 40 years, relaxable upto 45 years in exceptional cases.

Migration: A candidate who has passed his/her last examination from a university other than the Jadavpur University shall have to produce a migration Certificate and pay the requisite Registration fee to the Jadavpur University within four months from the date of admission failing which his/her admission to the college is likely to be cancelled.

Programme of study and work at the College:

The College intends to offer, through all these courses, a total education to the candidates and the courses of study accordingly include, interalia, formal academic work, professional and/or other activities/work programmes of practical and psycho-social nature, (including curricular and Co-curricular activities.)

Participation in all such relevant activities and workprogrammes is obligatory on the part of all the college students.

University Examinations:

As the College is affiliated to the Jadavpur University, it is subject to such rules of the University in the matter of admission, courses of study, examination degree-award, etc. as come within the purview of affiliation.

N. B.: Information Brochures containing syllabus, courses of study, etc. are available separately from the college office on payment of requisite charges.

In addition of the above, every student will be required to pay the following:

- a) Re. 2.00 for membership of Students' Health Home.
- (b) Rs. 11.00 for membership of University Consumer Co-operative Stores (refundable).
- 3. Tuition fees are to be paid regularly before the end of every month along with the tuition fee-book (available on payment of Re. 1/- per fee-book per year from the

Information office) after having made all the relevant entries therein. Payment should be made during the scheduled hours as notified from time to time.

- 4. For default of payment in any particular month, a fine of .12 paise per month will be payable along with the fees in arrear. A defaulter's name is liable to be struck off the Roll. In such cases, the student may be re-admitted on his/her applying for the same and on payment of all his/her dues in arrear as well as on payment of an enrolment fee of Rs. 2.00.
- 5. Admission once taken shall be for one whole academic session and the student shall be liable to pay fees for the entire session.
- 6. A student, who due to some unavoidable reasons, is unable to continue his/her studies in a particular session may withdraw his/her name for the unexpired period of the session provided his/her dues have been paid upto the time of such withdrawal. He/she will be eligible for readmission in the following session without having to pay the dues of the unexpired period of the previous session.
- 7. No student is allowed to withdraw unless under Rule 6 above or unless he/she has been permitted to migrate from the University.
- 8. A student who migrates from another University in the middle of the session shall have to pay the admission fee and tuition fee from the month after that on which he/she last paid tuition fee at the last University.
- 9. (a) Caution money deposit for working in the laboratories, workshops and other practical classes is refundable at the end of the students' career at the University after deduction for breakage or dues, if any. The student must apply for its refund from the University within two years after he/she leaves the University and if he/she fails to do so, his/her deposit money will be forfeited.

At the beginning of each session students are to pay the breakage charges of the previous session.

- (b) Library Deposit is refundable at the end of the students' career at the University or earlier on application.
- c) The share money of Rs. 10/- may be refunded by the Co-operative Stores to the member-student on application after completing the course of studies, at this University.
- 10. All casual students of this University shall have to pay the Casual students' fee of Rs 10/- by the 30th December and shall have to apply to the Controller of Examinations stating the papers/subject they want to appear in.

STIPENDS, SCHOLARSHIPS, FREE-STUDENTSHIP AND PRIZES

The University awards full or half-free studentship to poor and meritorious students not exceeding 10% of the total strength of students on the rolls in the Faculty. Continuance of the concession awarded in subsequent session depends on good progress, regular attendance and good conduct.

Holders of full or half-free studentship if they leave the University without sufficient and satisfactory reasons must pay fees for the full period for which they had enjoyed such studentships.

If a candidate at the time of award is enjoying free-studentship by virtue of having been awarded a scholarship on the result of his/her school leaving or University examination awarded by the Government or some authority other than this University, the scholarship to be awarded shall be paid in cash equivalent of full-free studentship.

Students who enjoy merit scholarship and are entitled to a free-studentship by virtue of securing position of merit in a University examination are precluded from enjoying freestudentship by the condition of the scholarship but they will be given Certificate of Merit.

Loan scholarship in lump-sums to meet examination and tuition fees are awarded to deserving final year students under straitened pecuniary circumstances.

Financial assistance, mainly in the form of loan, is awarded to deserving students from the "Rector's Aid Fund". The loans are repayable only after three years of graduation.

Awards are also made to deserving and poor students from Students' Aid Fund operated in co-operation with Students' Unions.

Following are the earmarked stipends/scholarships for students of different Faculties:

Scholarship in the form of Free-studentship for the next session is awarded to students who secure places of merit at the B.A. Part I examination in the following manner, provided they secure an average of 60% marks. The scholarship will continue for two consecutive sessions.

MEDIUM OF INSTRUCTION

English is at present the medium of instruction for all the courses except for Bengali and other Modern Indian languages.

The students of B.A. or B.Sc. (Honours) offering subsdiary subjects out of schedule of subjects of the Undergraduate Courses have also the option to answer their examination papers in Bengali in these subjects.

ADVANCED STUDY AND RESEARCH

The University undertakes research studies on the various problems in different faculties of the University. Due to lack of financial resources, the expenses are normally borne from the fees accrued from the specific testing or research works done by the members of the teaching staff. Besides the financial grants from the Government of India, the Government of West Bengal and the University Grants Commission, such organisations as the Council of Scientific & Industrial Research (CSIR), the Railways, Glaxo Laboratories, Kuljian, Hoechest Pharmaceutical, Indian Council of Agricultural Research, Indian Council of Social Science Research, Department of Atomic Energy, U.S. Department of Agriculture for Research, East India Pharmaceutical Works, Lalbhai Patel Postgraduate Research, U.S. Department of Commerce for Research and P.L. 480 administration etc. finance specific schemes of research or investigation of problems.

The Department of Geological Sciences has a "Special Assistance Programme" sanctioned by the University Grants Commission for development of teaching and research since 1972. The Department has been selected for UNESCO/UNDP assistance in the form of exchange of teachers, and also for procuring equipment, spare parts and books worth \$30.000 (Thirty thousand dollar).

There is also a Study Group in Mathematics and a Centre of Advanced Study in applied Mathematics which has been recognised by the UNESCO. It receives aid from the UNESCO in the form of Visiting Professors from U.S.S.R. and training fellowships and equipment. The Economics Department has, in its Applied Economics section, a research unit carrying on continuous research on demographic, Input-output Analysis and other problems.

The Department of Philosophy has been selected by the University Grants Commission for development under the Programme of special Assistance (5th Plan). Additional teaching and research personnel, floor spare and financial assistance have been sanctioned by the UGC to help it to develop as a major Centre for higher study and research in Philosophy.

The Master degree holders in Arts or Science also enjoy the Postgraduate Research Scholarships in Humanities and Science to the extent of seven in number each year in addition to the Senior and Junior research fellowships in Engineering. Science and Humanities offered by the University Grants Commission.

The University is in the practice of sponsoring research works undertaken by the eligible persons permissible under Doctorate Rules of the University.

Research and Industrial consultancy continue to be part of the important activities of the University. The volume of research work increased considerably and the total expenditure on research stands at Rs. 39.58 Lakhs approximately in 1979-80. About 200 Research Follows worked on about 145 different research projects during the year 1979/81. It can be seen from the following data that a considerable progress in the field of research work has been made during the past few years:—

AROUND THE CAMPUS

UNIVERSITY LIBRARY

The University Library is housed in a three-storied building on the Campus. It has a total shelf and working space of 31.000 sq. ft. The three reading rooms. carrels, and an alcove for bound volumes of journals provide sitting accommodation for 500 readers. The Library's stacking capacity is for 2,50,000 volumes.

At present the Library has 2,50,000 volumes books, bound volumes of journals and theses, and 35,000 non-book materials such as reports, pamphlets, maps, micro-forms. About 1650 current journals are received regularly. A considerable part of the Library's acquisitions consists of gifts from individuals and institutions, the largest book donations having been from Sri Uday Kumar Das, Kumar S. C. Nandy of Cossimbazar, the British Counsil, U. S. I. S., Asia Foundation, Late A. K. Chanda, Sri M. N. Mitra and others. The gift collections contain a good stock of old material valuable for humanistic research.

The Library has been organised into 13 working units. The Reprography unit has photostat and microfilming apparatus, a microfilm reader and 3 xerox-photocopying machines.

The normal working hours of the Library are from 10-15 a.m. to 7-15 p.m. on weekdays and from 10-15 a.m. to 4 p. m. on Saturdays. The Library remains closed on Sundays and holidays.

The construction of an 8-storeyed annexe to the present Library building has started.

Departmental Libraries:

At present the library facilities have been extended to various departments of different faculties, i.e. Mechanical, Electrical, Electronics & Tele-Communication, Food Technology & Bio-Chemical Engineering, Civil, Architecture Departments besides the Departments of Comparative Literature, Pharmacy, Chemistry, Sanskrit, International Relations. In these departmental libraries, reading facilities are given to the staff and students of the respective department.

Students' Union Library:

The Engineering Students' Union has organised a Text Book Library offering reading facilities to the students at the Department of Electrical Engineering.

STUDENTS' BUILDINGS AND HALLS

Bidban Chandra Vidyarthi Bhavan is a spacious building situated at the heart of the Campus and serving as an ideal amenity centre for students. It houses a well equipped Cafeteria and two common rooms, one for boys and one for girls, with Indoor game facilities. In front of this building a spacious Gymnasium with Indoor game facilities is nearing completion.

There is an open-air theatre having accommodation for about 8000 people. Besides Gandhi Bhavan, there is another lecture hall—Vivekananda hall—with a stage and a sitting accommodation for 600 people.

GUEST HOUSE

Faculty Club

The Guest House with boarding and lodging for six persons is housed within the campus of the University. The room are single-seated and well furnished. The spacious room of the ground floor is being used by the members of the Faculty Club.

The faculty Club is one more welcome addition to the growing Jadavpur University. It is an ideal place for refreshment, relaxation and recreation. The club promises to develop into one of the main centres of community life in the University. For teachers serving two shifts—day and evening—the club also provides a happy interlude. The lounge overlooking the jheel to the south present an eye-filling profile for the out-sider. The interior decor is tastefully designed and the cuisine carefully planned. It has a long-felt need of the teachers.

It is perhaps the one of the very few of its kind in India. It has become a popular rendezvous within a short span of time. The University is considering provision of further amenities in the club for which there is ample scope.

THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The National Council of Education, Bengal, was the first to start Alumni Association in this country. Alumni Association, the only recognised association of the University, was registered under Act XXI of 1860 on the 24th September, 1929. The Association, though not a part of the University, is associated with the University very intimately

and plays a vital role in its affairs. The President of the Association is an ex-officio member of the University under the Act.

Inheriting as it has, the tradition of the National Council of Education, the University feels that its affairs can best be managed and its ideals realised by the ex-students, who have thoroughly been imbued with the spirit and tradition of the Institution.

The main objects of the Association are to foster the spirit of comradeship and growth of healthy fellow feeling, promote co-operation and mutual help, maintain unity amongst ex-students and protect their interest and to keep the Association in touch with the Alma Mater.

The Association donated to the National Council of Education and the College of Engineering & Technology more than one lakh of Rupees on various occasions for purposes of construction of buildings, purchase of equipment and helping teacher to undergo training abroad.

At present the Association has eleven Branch offices throughout India and the total number of regular members on roll being approximately 1500.

ORIENTATION PROGRAMME FOR THE FRESHERS

Orientation programme for the freshers joining the Undergraduate Courses in the Arts, Science and Engineering Faculties is now being regularly arranged at the beginning of every session since 1965. The Dean of Students and the Director of Youth Welfare are in charge of organising the programme with the assistance of young teachers and senior students.

BOARD OF STUDENTS' WELFARE

The Dean of Students is an officer who is entrusted with the maintenance of an ordered and disciplined life and for the promotion of extra-curricular activities of the students of the University. He is in over-all charge of the students' residence, Health. Students' aid, sports and games, youth welfare activities, various clubs, training and placements, counselling and guidance of students in general. But some of his allotted duties may from time to time be assigned to any other officer of the University.

There is another officer—the Director of Youth Welfare who has the supervision of the schemes concerning students' welfare and activities of the different students' unions and the extra-curricular bodies.

The Officer of Placement and Training is for looking after the practical training and employment of graduates of the University. His office furnishes all information of interest to students regarding employment opportunities in India. The University has joined hands with the Government in seting up a University Employment Information and Guidance Bureau. The function of both these sections being identical; the Officer of Placement and Training has been deputed as the Chief of this Bureau. By registering at this Bureau, the graduates of this University become entitled to the same facilities and privileges as Employment Exchange registants.

The Director of Physical Education is for the promotion of Sports, Games and Physical Culture. The University has a Sports Board besides different Sporting Clubs. Training facilities are being offered to the students by experienced coaches. Students interested in Sports, Games and Athletics should meet him and the girl students may contact the Physical Instructress.

Students Amenities:

For the promotion of extra-curricular activities and for providing amenities for students the following organisations and means exist:

CO-OPERATIVE STORES

A Co-operative Store (Jadavpur University Consumer Co-operative Stores) with a share capital of about Rs. 80,000/-subscribed by the staff and students, functions on the campus besides the students' cheap stores. Books, papers, drawing instruments and other students' requirements are sold there at a comparatively cheap rates. Except these, there are three canteens on the campus run by private parties. A staff-student body from time-to-time checks the price and supervise the management affairs.

HOBBY WORKSHOP

There is a Hobby Workshop in the University for undergraduate students. The Workshop was established in 1966 to help students in the cultivation of their hobbies. It provides facilities for the following hobbies:

(i) Carpentry, (ii) Sheet Metal work, (iii) Photography, (iv) Leather work (exclusively for girls)

Training courses are organised for recitation, public speaking and drama, both in English and Bengali. Classes are also held for training in First-aid.

STUDENTS' UNION

As it is a unitary teaching University with its teaching Departments, grouped into the three Faculties of Arts, Science and Engineering & Technology, the University has three students' unions for the three Faculties. The students' Unions have been established mainly with a view to promote a corporate life and to foster among the students love and loyalty to the University and to help the growth of closer social and cultural reactions between the teachers and students and to foster a spirit of co-operative activities among the students in helping the growth of closer relations with the students of other Universities in India and abroad.

The Union arranges debates and lectures and provides facilities for indoor games and canteens.

INFORMATION SERVICE

For all inportant information regarding Examinations and other affair of academic and non-academic interests and Routines, Stipends, Scholarships, Concessions, Admissions, the relevant information concerning facilities for higher studies abroad and other educational opportunities in India,

the students may refer for information and guidance to the Senior Superintendt of Information in Sri Aurobindo Building. The University publications, application forms for admissions, prospectuses, employment forms, fee-books, concession forms etc. are available from this office between 11 a.m. and 2-00 p.m. & between 2-30 p.m. and 4 p.m. on weekdays and between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on Saturdays excepting University holidays.

UNIVERSITY NEWS

The News Bulletin of the Jadavpur University is published four times a year covering the period of vacations. The issues are free of cost. Matters meant for publication should be sent to the Information Office by the 15th of each month.

Authors and publishers wishing to have books reviewed should send them to the Registrar and the application for exchange of journals from Learned Societies or Editors of other periodicals should also be addressed to the Registrar of the University.

RECOGNITION OF EXAMINATIONS

Degrees and Diplomas of all Indian Universities established by Statutes and recognised by the University Grants Commission, have been recognised as equivalent to similar examination, degrees and diplomas of Jadavpur University for purpose of admissions.

VISITING:LECTURERS

The University has a system of inviting distinguished academicians, engineers or technical experts from learned societies, reputed industrial and commercial houses to deliver series of lectures to the students of the different faculties with a view to foster better understanding and knowledge in specific field of study. These visiting lecturers normally attend these courses throughout the session. There is also arrangement for visiting lecturers from aboad on exchange basis.

STUDY HABITS

To help the students in developing regular habits of consulting reference books at the Library as well as of contacting teachers for all difficulty, Library hours and contact periods have been introduced in the weekly routine of students. During the contact periods the teachers concerned stay in their rooms and receive them there.

TUTORIALS

The Tutorial Scheme introduced since the inception of the University and has become compulsory for students studying at the Undergraduate and the Postgraduate classes of the University. The tutorials are intended to complement the instruction given through lectures by additional studies based on discussion and written work, and these are intended to train students within the scope of their study programmes in the use of sources, independent thinking and proper organisation and presentation of materials. Requisite percentage of marks have been allotted on the attendance and work of the tutorial classes.

STUDENTS HEALTH SERVICE

The University has a comprehensive health service scheme covering both day and evening students. There is a Health Centre on the campus with a full-time Medical Superintendent in charge of it. Qualified Specialists in Medicine, Eye, Skin, E. N. T. and Dental diseases visit the Health Centre either twice or thrice a week. A pathologist comes to the centre four days a week. So also a Lady Doctor attends the Health Centre every day and visits the Lady's Hostel. Medicines are given free to the students and the normal clinical tests of blood, urine, stool etc are done free of cost. A part-time Medical Officer visits the boys hostels every morning and attends the Health Centre in the afternoon. There are two Pharmacists attached to the Health Centre.

Complicated cases needing special investigation and/or hospitalisation are sent to Students' Health Home to which the University subscribes universal membership. The University bears the expenses of all clinical and radiological tests.

Medical checking of the students is made almost every year with the assistance of the Students' Health Home. Calcutta. Every student undergoing that check-up is furnished with a healthcard.

The Medical Superintendent lives on the Campus and is available, at any hour, in case of emergency.

SPORTS, GAMES AND EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

There is, on the campus, a spacious play-ground offering all-time facilities for sports, games and athletics. Besides football, cricket and hockey, there are grounds for basketball and lawn tennis. Indoor facilities are there for games like badminton. Swimming and rowing facilities are also provided to the willing students through arrangments with appropriate clubs at the Dhakuria Lake. The University regularly participates in all Inter-Collegiate and Inter-University sports meet organised by different educational institutions as well as Inter-University Sports Board of India. So also this University organises Inter-Collegiate tournaments in different games. Under the supervision of the experts, training in gymnastics and body building is given to the students at an well-equipped gymnasium at the Main Hostel. A modern gymnasium on the campus is nearing completion.

Debates, Quiz Contest, film shows, dramas, seminar etc. are the regular feature of the campus life. Social service camps and educational tours are organised all through the year.

Technical, Scientific and Educational Exhibition is one of the most attractive and educative annual events of the University. For closer contact of students with their teachers, the University has made it a point to encourage the participation of both teachers and the taught in different club and societies of the University.

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

The National Service Scheme has been introduced in this University since the academic session 1968-69. Starting form a humble beginning the scheme has now grown into a mighty movement covering about 600 students grouped into six working batches. Various programmes from running a Literacy Centre to the construction of roads in rurol areas are regularly undertaken by the National Service Scheme. N.S.S. cadets are also trained in First Aid, Adult Literacy, Fire Fighting etc. Besides regular programmes, vacational and weekend camps are held for different groups. There are also arrangements for assessing the attainment of cadets through written and oral tests. Qualified candidates are awarded certificates as well as Udiversity Blazers.

One senior teacher supervises the activities of different groups as National Service Scheme Co-ordinator.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS. (N.C.C.)

This institution realised the importance of military training as a co-curricular activity of students many years before the establishment as a University and was one of the first to adopt the N.C.C. scheme in its attempts to spread Military Education and to make it popular to students community.

This institution organised an intensive training programme for two months for 500 boys under the auspices of West Bengal National Volunter Force (W.B.N.V.F.) even before the N.C.C. was thought of. The Corps. was expanded to make this training available to all students by adding various wings of Technical Army, Naval and Air Force-units long before it was made compulsory on all India level.

At the present the students of all Faculties have unique scope to avail the opportunity to receive military training in the following types of units of N.C.C. viz. the Engineers, E.M.E., Signals, Infantry, Naval unit, Air Squardon (flying). Technical Air Squardon for the boy-students and a unit for girl-students. Such of the girl students who do not opt for N.C.C. training are required to undergo compulsory Cocurricular Activities training. Postgraduate students in all Faculties, final year students of all undergraduate courses, students of Evening Courses, foreign students, students above 26 years and the casual student are exempted from the N.C.C. training.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CENTRE

The Centre offers short and medium courses on many important and topical subjects like Industrial Administration, Computer Programming etc. The classes are held in the evening from 6-30 p.m. to 8-30 p.m.—2 hours per day and 5 days for a week. The Director of the Centre is available in his office on the 1st floor of the Electrical Engineering Building of the University.

HOSTELS

The University has at present Hostels with seats for about 770 students of which 120 are girls.

For allotting Hostel seats, which are limited in number, preference is given to students who come from outside the city. Hostel admission is for one year only and may not be renewed next year, if examination results and/or the conduct of the boarder in the Hostel are unsatisfactory.

A boarder is to pay a seat rent for the whole session even if the boarder stays for shorter period.

Application forms for Hostel accommadation are available from the Hostel Superintendent and also from the office of the Dean of Students or Information office.

Every Hostel has its own Mess Committee. Mess dues are to be paid in advance every month. Non-payment of mess and other dues of the Hostel in time, may lead to the forfeiture of a boarder's right to the seat in the Hostel.

Boarders are not permitted to stay in the Hostels during vacations except in special circumstances.

Hostels rules are to be observed strictly by all boarders. Any serious breach of rules may lead not only to the cancellation of Hostel seat but also to expulsion from the University.

The University Medical Superintendent may be available for consultation at a short notice. Boarders may consult any outside physician only with prior permission from the Hostel Superintendent.

Any case of sickness mus be recorded in the Medical

Register kept in the Hostel.

Boarder should contact the Hostel Superintendents in all academic and personal matters. Any application from a boarder to Vice-Chancellor, Registrar, Dean of Students, or Director of Youth Welfare must be forwarded through the Hostel Superintendent.
