Item No.11: To further consider the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for setting up a School of Education.

The Commission desired that an Expert Committee may be appointed to examine in all its aspects the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for the development of Teacher Education in the university.

Item No.12: To consider the proposal of the University of Delhi for a special grant towards meeting matching contribution arising out of the implementation of the Agreement between the University(Centre of Advanced Study in Physics) and the International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste.

The consideration of this was postponed.

Item No.13: To consider a note from the Vice-Chancellor, Calcutta University, Calcutta, regarding the problems of the University and its proposal for future development.

The Commission noted in this connection the recommendation made by the Education Commission. The Commission desired that a committee may be appointed with wide terms of reference to examine the developmental problems of the Calcutta University in all its aspects, including structuring(if necessary) of the university and solving up fautonomous colleges inter-alia keeping in view the recommendations that may be made by the Committee on Governance of Universities (under the Chairmanship of Dr.P.B.Gajendragadkar) in this regard.

Item No.14: To further consider the proposal of the Gujarat University for setting up an Institute of Social Change.

The Commission after considering the relevant aspects of the proposal for an Institute of Social Change, regretted its inability to accept it, at this stage.

Item No.15: To consider the position of development posts sanctioned and filled during the Third Plan period but not continued by the Shivaji University during the Fourth Plan period.

The Commission desired that a full note giving all the relevant information may be placed before the Commission in the light of the discussion held at the meeting.

Item No.16: To further consider the proposal of the Poona University for the establishment of Centre of Latin American Studies.

The Commission noted the views of the Government of Maharashtra and agreed that the proposal may not be pursued further at the Poona University.

Item No.17: To consider the proposal of the Punjabi University for introducing correspondence course for the B.Ed.Degree.

The Commission desired that this may be discussed with the Punjabi University and the State Government and the matter brought up before the Commission.

Item No.18 : To consider further the proposal of the Rajasthan University for setting up a Department of Teacher Education.

The Commission desired that the views of the Rajasthan Government may be obtained for the establishment of a Department of Teacher Education in the Rajasthan University and it may be ascertained whether the Government would take over the recurring liabilities after the Commission's assistance ceases at the end of 1973-74.

Them No.19: To consider further the proposal of the Andhra University for setting up a Research Unit in the Department of Economics for studying problems of Education.

The Commission noted the recommendations of the Standing Committee and agreed that the proposal of the Andhra University for setting up a Research Unit in the Department of Economics may not be accepted.

Item No.20: To consider a proposal of the Madhabdev College Dikrong(Dibrugarh University) for financial assistance for the construction of a Women's hostel.

The Commission agreed, in principle, to assist the Madhabdev College, Dikrong for the provision of hostel accommodation and desired that the college may plan for the construction of two hostels - one for boys and the other for girls.—and that a revised proposal to construct the hostels(in phases) may be invited from the College.

Item No.21: To consider the request of M.R.Government Sanskrit College, Vizianagram(Andhra University) for a centenary grant of Rs.One lakh.

The Commission agreed to provide a Centenary grant of Rs.one lakh to the M.R.Government Sanskrit College, Vizianagram.

Item No.22: To consider the proposal of Smt.V.G.College of Arts and Science for Women, Gulbarga, for the construction of a Women's hostel.

The Commission agreed to the payment of a grant of Rs.2,60,755/- towards the construction of a Women's hostel to the Smt.V.G.College of Arts and Science for Women, Gulbarga.

Item No.23: To further consider allocation of the UGC for the development of engineering and technological education in universities for the Fourth Plan.

This was noted.

The Commission desired that this may be further discussed with the Ministry of Education and Youth Services.

The Commission desired that this may be discussed with the ICAR, and further action taken in the light of the discussion, during the Fifth Plan.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATESHIPS SCHEME

The scheme of <u>National Associateships</u> in science, humanities, social sciences, engineering and technology, and agriculture, is intended to assist outstanding university/college teachers - <u>below the age of 35 years</u> - engaged in research, to visit and work for short periods (a few months at a time), at periodic intervals, at university centres/research institutions/National Laboratories which have special facilities (c.g. research groups, laboratory/library facilities, etc.) relevant to their respective fields of work.

1. Maintenance of a roll

Initially it is proposed to invite upto 100 teachers from universities and colleges to participate in the programme. These persons will be kept on the "National Associateships" roll for a period of upto 5 years, and within this period can plan to visit the institutions of their choice in India (including universities, national laboratories, and other establishments engaged in research), for a maximum of three times, once in a year, for periods of not more than 12 weeks. This roll of "National Associateships" will be reviewed during and year initially and thereafter every year to invite more persons to participate as and when positions become open.

2. Nominations and selection

Each University may be requested to send upto ten nominations from amongst the young teachers in its departments and affiliated colleges. These teachers should be actively engaged in research. Applications may also be invited through advertisement in Press. However, persons who may be selected on basis of direct application will have to obtain the concurrence of the university before their selection is finalised. These nominations can be considered by a committee which would prepare a short list of 100 persons and a reserve list of another 25 to 50 names; subjectwise in order of priority. Awards should be used for collaborative work with the institutions to be visited on a previously agreed basis and not for attending symposia, seminars or short-term courses etc.

3. Planning the visits

Each National Associateship holder will carefully plan his visit well in advance, in consultation with the host institution, indicating clearly the programme of work to be pursued, exact period, type of facilities to be used, and send the same to the UGC, atleast one month palor to the date scheduled for beginning the visit to the Institute, each time.

It should also be accompanied by a certificate from the Paremt institution that the period is treated as on duty with full pay and a certificate from the host institution accepting the visit by the National Associate and to make available necessary facilities for the work, mutually agreed upon. At the end of the visit a brief report of the work done would be sent to UGC countersigned by both partners.

4. Financial Assistance from UGC:

The UGC will agree to meet the actual cost of travel of the National Associate, once each way from his place of work to the place of host institution and back. The travel will be undertaken by the class (rail or air) to which he is normally entitled according to his institution's rules. In addition each associate will receive an allowance of Rs. 500/per calendar month to cover his living expenses either in part or full. No travel or living expenses will be available in cases where host institution is located in the same city. No other allowances will be available for meeting laboratory expenses or persons accompanying the visit or for any other purpose. In case of real need, the parent institution may consider giving assistance for such special requirements from out of the "Unassigned grant" or "grant for support of research" placed at the disposal of the University by the UG(C during the plan period.

Nomination may be sent to reach the UGC not later than December each year. The selection should be made by Let February and awards communicated before Ist March so that awards will become effective from the month of April, beginning of financial year.

This was noted. It was suggested that copies of the model national building code for the country being prepared by the I.S.I.(New Delhi) be circulated to the universities.

Item No.7: To receive a note on the proposal from the Danforth Foundation, U.S.A., for assistance to Indian Universities.

This was noted.

Item No.8: To consider the recommendations of the Standing Committee for scholarships and fellowships.

The Commission agreed that the value of the Scholarship for Postgraduate Studies in Arabic/Persian be increased from Rs.100/- to Rs.120/- per month with effect from the current academic year.

With regard to "protecting" the salary and emoluments of university/college teachers selected for award of Senior Research Fellowship, the Commission desired that the cases may be placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No.9: To consider the recommendations of the UGC Committee for retired teachers about increasing the number of awards under the retired teachers scheme.

The Commission agreed in principle to increase the number of awards under the scheme of retired teachers; and desired that the question of expanding the scope of the awards be referred to the UGC Advisory Committee of Vice-Chancellors.

Item No.10: To consider further the recommendations of the committee on the establishment of High Level Institutes for the study of Sanskrit and Ancient Hindu Thought, and Islamic Thought, Culture and Literature.

The Commission after considering the relevant aspects was not in favour of establishment of a separate institute, and felt that the interests of the subject would be better served by strengthening existing departments, selected on the basis of their present work and potentiality for further development.

The Commission further desired that 10 to 20 Scholarships for Honours and Postgraduate Studies in Sanskrit, and other subjects under reference may be instituted (on the pattern of Scholarships for Arabic and Persian studies), and that a Committee be appointed to work out the relevant details.

Item No.11:

To consider the points raised by the A.G.C.R. while auditing the accounts of the UGC regarding release of grants to Saugar University towards the construction of (i) Social Science Block, (ii) Language Block, (iii) Commerce & Economic Block.

The Commission accepted the procedure adopted by the Saugar University as regards the construction of the 'blocks' for Social Science, Language and Commerce.

Item No.12: To consider the report on the proposal of V.D. Shah College of Education, Modasa, for the development of Teachers' Training Programmes during IV Plan period.

This was withdrawn.

Item No.13: To consider the comments received from University/Institutions regarding migration of students and recognition of Degrees.

It was desired that the matter may be discussed with the Inter-University Board.

- Item No.14: To consider the following proposals of the Delhi University:
 - (i) Assistance for installation of a dark room processing unit (automatic) and appointment of staff in the W.U.S.Health Centre;
 - (ii) Treating the expenditure incurred on the excursions of students offering Geography as a subject for undergraduate course, as approved expenditure for purposes of maintenance grant to colleges.
- (i) The Commission agreed in principle to assist the Delhi University to improve the essential facilities provided by the Health Centre, and desired that the University may be requested to send a consolidated proposal for consideration of the Commission.
- (ii) The Commission agreed to assist Universities as regards study tour/field work of geography students, and desired that guidelines for the same may be prepared and placed before the Commission.
- Item No.15: To consider the following proposals of the Banaras Hindu University:
 - (i) Creation of additional teaching posts for introduction of Hindi as an alternative medium of instruction;
 - (ii) Assistance for additional works of construction and electrification in connection with the safety of Bharat Kala Bhavan;
 - (iii) Payment of honorarium to members of staff in connection with the preparation of the Historical Grammar of Hindi Language Literature.
- (i) It was agreed that this may be discussed at the next meeting of the Committee of Vice-Chancellors of Central Universities, in the first instance.
- (ii) The Commission desired that this may be further discussed with the University.
- (iii) The Commission noted that a full-time Director had been appointed for the scheme, and in view of this and the earlier assurance by the University as regards honorarium to members of the Department, the Commission regretted it could not accept the proposal for payment of honorarium.

The Commission agreed to the appointment of a full-time Research Assistant @ Rs.360/- per month as proposed by the University. The Commission further desired that the University be informed that the scheme should be completed within the stipulated period of two years.

Item No.16: To consider the proposal of the Karnatak University for assistance towards the post of a professor in the Department of Library Science for starting M.Library Science Course.

The Commission regretted it could not accept the proposal of the University in its present form. The Commission desired that a committee be appointed to assess the present level of facilities for M.Lib.Science courses available in the country and to make recommendations for their further development (quality of courses and also expansion of enrolment) in relation to the likely needs for trained persons in this field.

Item No.17: To consider the proposal of the Nagpur University for payment of honorarium to Dr. D.B. Shesh for writing the report of a research study on "the Socio-Psychological determinants of juvenile delinquency & evaluation of the existing Child Welfare Techniques in the various Child Welfare agencies in Nagpur Region".

The Commission agreed to the payment of an honorarium of Rs.500/- to Dr. D.B. Shesh.

Item No.18: To consider a proposal received from Presidency College, Calcutta (Calcutta University) for the development of its postgraduate department of Physics during the Fourth Five Year Plan period.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Presidency College, Calcutta, for development of postgraduate department of Physics, and agreed to provide, as UGC share, Rs.1,10,000/- for equipment and library books/journals.

- Item No.19: To consider the proposals of the following Colleges for the construction of a Women's hostel:
 - (i) Dr. S.K. Sinha Women's College, Motihari (Bihar University);
 - (ii) Kanohar Lal Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Meerut (Meerut University).
- (i) The Commission accepted the proposal of the Dr. S.K. Sinha Women's College, Motihari, for the construction of a hostel for 37 students. In this connection the Commission desired that the College be advised to prepare the Plan for the hostel as proposed (that is for 74 students), but in the first phase the construction should be limited to accommodation for 37 students.
 - (ii) This was withdrawn.

Item No.20: To review the limit of approved expenditure
on furniture for hostels.

The Commission accepted in principle to raise the limit of approved expenditure on furniture for hostels, and desired that the matter be referred to the Standing Committee on Buildings.

Item No.21: To consider the resolutions of the first meeting of the National Board of Adult Education held on May 4, 1970.

This was noted.

Item No.22: To further consider an increase in the allocation of universities for publication of research works of doctoral theses during the Fourth Plan period.

The Commission agreed to increase the ceiling of assistance to the Universities for publication of research works of doctoral theses, in the Fourth Plan period, as given in Appendix III.

Item No.23: To note the date and place of the next
meeting of the University Grants Commission.

It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will be held on 4th November 1970 at New Delhi.

Item No.24: To receive a note on the work done by the Standing Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to work out the details of College Science Improvement Programme.

This was noted.

Item No.25: To consider the minutes of the 5th meeting of the Standing Committee on Engineering Education held on 3rd February 1970.

The Commission desired that the recommendations of the Standing Committee regarding indigenous development and fabrication of special laboratory equipment/instruments be brought to the notice of the Universities.

Item No.26: To consider a reference received from Ministry of Education & Youth Services regarding facilities for students to appear in universities examinations as external students.

The Commission noted that the subject under reference had several important aspects and implications, and agreed that the question of students appearing at university examinations as 'external students', as also another reference by the Ministry with regard to external students in the Central Universities, may be referred to a committee.

Item No.27: To consider a reference received from the Ministry of Education & Youth Services regarding the setting up of a National Centre for Training and Research in Regional Development at the University of Mysore.

The Commission agreed to recommend to the Government of India that a request be made to the Economic and Social Council of the U.N.O. to set up in India one of the proposed National Centres for Training and Research in Regional Development.

Item No.28: To receive the proposal of Jawaharlal Nehru University for setting up a Centre of German Studies.

The Commission welcomed the proposal of the Jawaharlal Nehru University for setting up a Centre of German Studies with assistance from Federal Republic of Germany.

- Item No.29: To consider the following proposals of the Delhi University:
 - (i) Creation of an additional post of Professor in the Centre of Advanced Study in Zoology.
 - (ii) Additional grant for the Master of Business Administration Course.
- (i) This was withdrawn.
- (ii) The Commission noted the position regarding availability of funds for the Fourth Plan period, and regretted its inability to provide additional assistance to the Delhi University for the Master of Business Administration Course.

Item No.30: To consider a proposal from the M.S. University of Baroda for instituting model diploma courses in Technology under the Indo-USSR Credit Agreement of December 1966.

The Commission agreed to provide assistance on 50 per cent basis to the M.S. University of Baroda for instituting "model diploma courses in Technology" under the Indo-USSR Credit Agreement.

Item No.31: To consider the following proposals of the Jadavpur University:

- (i) For the creation of posts of two Professors one for South East Asia and the other for East Pakistan in the South East Asia Studies Centre of the University.
- (ii) For assistance towards the field trip of Shri N.R. Chanda, Research Fellow, Department of International Relations, Jadavpur University, to Paris in connection with his dissertation on "The United States Cambodia Relations between 1953 and 1965".
- (i) The Commission agreed to the creation of a professorship for the South East Asia Studies at the Jadavpur University under the scheme of Area Studies.
- (ii) The Commission regretted its inability to accept the proposal of the University.

Item No.32: To consider the proposal of the Vikram University for assistance towards undertaking a research scheme on Bhoja's Sanskrit and Prakrit Works on different branches of Indological Studies.

The Commission desired that the proposal of the Vikram University for research on Bhoja's Sanskrit and Prakrit Works may be discussed with the University (as regards scope of the proposal and the resources likely to be available), and brought up again before the Commission.

Item No.33: To consider further the question of providing assistance to Karnatak Uni-versity towards Architect's fee and work charged establishment for building projects financed by the UGC.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Karnatak University for treating the provision made upto 5 per cent of the building cost for services rendered by the University Engineering Department for purposes of grant.

In this connection the Commission noted that future guidance norms for the purpose have been laid down by the Commission.

Item No.34: To consider the proposal of the Gujarat Vidyapith for assistance towards the establishment of an Institute of Peace Research at the Vidyapith.

The Commission desired that the proposal of the Gujarat Vidyapith for setting up of a Peace Research Institute may be discussed with the Ministry of Education & Youth Services along with a similar proposal received from the Gandhi Peace Foundation.

Item No.35: To receive the report of the Committee appointed by the Commission to consider the lines on which the Kanpur University may develop during the Fourth Plan period.

The Commission generally accepted the report of the Committee, and desired that the University may be requested to prepare its development proposals taking into account the recommendations made in the report.

Item No.36: To receive a note regarding National Competition for the design of the Master Plan of the Jawaharlal Nehru University Campus.

This was noted.

Item No.37: To receive the minutes of the meeting of the Committee appointed by the UGC to consider proposals received from the universities and colleges for assistance under the programmes of National Sports Organisation.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the Committee for assistance to the Universities and Colleges for construction of the gymnasium as given in Appendix IV. The Commission further desired that in the future it would be desirable to allocate a certain portion of the funds for improvement of "playing fields", and that the Commission's assistance towards this may be on a sharing basis of 75:25.

Item No.38: To consider the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for construction of additional hostels under the Students! Amenities Scheme.

The Commission desired that the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University for construction of additional hostels may be further examined (keeping in view that a sum of Rs.50 lakhs will be available to the University under the students amenities programme).

Item No.39: To consider further the proposal from the Karnatak University for the construction of Canteen building at an estimated cost of Rs. two lakhs.

The Commission desired that provision and improvedment of canteen facilities in universities/colleges should be a part of the students amenities programme.

The Commission accepted the proposal of the Karnatak University for the construction of canteen building at an estimated cost of Rs. two lakhs and agreed to provide a sum of Rs. one lakh, on 50:50 matching basis, under the students amenities programme.

To consider the proposal of Bhagat Phool Singh Memorial Girls College, Khanpur Kalan, Rohtak (Panjab University) for the construction of a women's hostel.

The Commission accepted the proposal of Bhagat Phool Singh Memorial Girls College, Khanpur Kalan, Rohtak, for the construction of a women's hostel and agreed to provide a grant of Rs.66,525/- on the usuall sharing basis.

Item No.41: To consider the request of Kishori Raman Shiksha Samiti, Mathura, for using the hostel building of Kishori Raman (Boys) College, Mathura, for the Kishori Raman (Girls) College, Mathura.

The Commission desired that Kishori Raman Shiksha Samiti, Mathura, be informed that the hostel building be used for the purpose for which it was sanctioned.

Item No.42:
To consider a reference received from
the Kothari Scientific & Research Institute,
Calcutta, with regard to assistance from
the Institute for students going abroad
for research studies.

The Commission accepted with thanks the offer of Kothari Scientific & Research Institute, Calcutta, and desired that a Committee may be set up to work out the relevant details/guidelines.

Item No.43: To consider the proposals received from University/Colleges for participation in the College Science Improvement Programme.

The Commission accepted the proposals received from the following Universities/Colleges for participation in the College Science Improvement Programme and agreed to provide assistance, as indicated below, spread over a period of three years.

Item No.2(a): To approve the action taken on certain matters.

(1) Centre of Advanced Study in 3iochemistry, Indian Institute of Science Bangalore - Creation of two additional sholarships in Molecular Bio-chemistry for the academic year 1970-71.

The Head of the Centre of Advanced Study in Biochemistry approached the Commission in August, 1970 for two additional scholarship for the post M.Sc. Diploma Course in Molecular Biochemistry for the academic year 1970-71. The Commission has sanctioned six scholarships of the value of Rs.250/- p.m. each for the post M.Sc.Diploma Course in Molecular Biochemistry. A provision of Rs.1,000/- per student towards working expenses subject to a maximum of Rs.6,000/- has been sanctioned. The Centre proposed to admit 8 students this year in view of 2 other highly qualified candidates seeking admission to this course. The proposal has been accepted as a special case for the academic year 1970-71 only and 2 additional scholarshi and Rs.2,000/- for working expenses have been approved.

(2) Grants to Teacher, Training olleges.

In accordance with the pattern apploved by the Commission, assistance has been provided to the following colleges during the Fourth Plan period:

(3) Creation of a post of Development Officer in the Kerala University.

The University Gramts Commission at its meeting held on 3rd October, 1969 decided that the Universities may be assisted for the creation of a post of 'Development Officer in the scale not exceeding Rs.700-50-1250. On a proposal from the Kerala University for the creation of a post off Development Officer in the same scale as that of Deputy Registrar in the University i.e.Rs.800-1100, the Commission has agreed to the proposal of the University for the creation of the post in the scale of Rs.800-1100 in order to keep uniformity of scales of corresponding posts in the University.

(4) Assistance for additional accommodation at the Arts and Science College, Secunderabad from out of the allocation of Rs. 10 lakhs towards the Golden Jubilee Celebrations of Osmania University.

The University Gramts Commission has earlier allocated an amount of Rs. Ten lakes to Osmania University towards its Golden Jubilee Celebrations. The Commission subsequently approved the following schemes to be financed from out of the special grant:

On a proposal from the Vice-Chancellor, Osmania University that the University may be permitted to utilise the allocation accepted earlier by the Commission for the construction of additional women's hostel for providing additional accommodation at the Arts and Science College, Secunderabad, a university maintained college, the Commission has agreed to the university utilizing the amount of Rs.2 lakhs ffrom out of special grant of Rs.Ten lakhs for the construction of additional accommodation at the Arts and Science College, Secunderabad in place of the construction of additional Women's hostel.

Transfer of the Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, Delhi to the Jawaharlal Nehru University.

The Centre for the Study of Developing Societies, Delhi was receiving aid from the funds of the Asia Foundation and was largely dependent on that assistance.

In 1967-68, the Government of Inc a decided to ban the operations of the Asia Foundation. Emultaneously, it was also decided that if there were any good programmes by the institutions which were being supported by the Asia Foundation, they should not be allowed to die out and that assistance from Government funds should be provided to such institutions and programmes insisted. Accordingly the Government of Indiæ has been paying to the centre a grant of Rs.2.5 lakhes, per annum on an ad hoc basis from the year 1968-69.

The future of the above centre was under the consideration of the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services. The matter was however, taken up by the Government of India with the Jawaharlal Nehru University, New IDelhi whether that University would agree to take over the Centre which is located in Delhi.

The Jawaharlal Nehrus University has agreed to take over the Centre for the study of Developing Societies, Delhi subject to the following terms and conditions:

- The members of the research staff of the Centre will be taken over by the University for a period of two years in the first instance. Their appointment in the regular cadre of the University would be determined by procedures laid down in the Statutes of the University in this regard.
- (ii) The members (of the research staff would continue to draw their basic pay in their existing scales of pays and they will also be entitled to the allowances as fixed by the Executive Council from time to time.
- (iii) The designations of the research staff will correspond to the nomenclature adopted by the University. Thus Senior Research Fellows will be designated as Senior Fellows, Research Fellows as Feellows and Research Associates as Associate Fellows.
 - (iv) The University will have he right to assign the research staff to different centres of the Schools of Studies of the University.
- The University will appoint such members of the administrative staff of the Centre as could be usefully employed by the University and as are willing to join it on the terms and conditions offered by itt. It would be the responsibility of the Ministry of Education to take care of members of the administrative staff of the Centre who could not be employed by the University.

- (vi) The grant made annually by the Ministry of Education for the Centre should in future be given to the University through the University Grants Commission.
- (vii) The formalities relating to the winding up of the Centre and the dissolution of the registered society would be the responsibility of the Ministry of Education.
- It has been agreed that the Jawaharlal Nehru University may take over the Centre subject to the conditions indicated above.
 - (6) Provision for construction of six tubewells etc., at an estimated cost of Rs.7,48,100/- at the Jawaharlal Nehru University campus.

The Jawaharlal Nehru University had sent estimates of Rs.7,48,100/- prepared by Central Lublic Works Department for provision of six tubewells, static tanks, pump-houses and installation of pumps for the University campus(in addition to the two tubewells estimate at Rs.1,34,370/- already sanctioned by Gowernment of India). The estimates of Rs.7,48,100/- sent by the Jawaharla Nehru University for the provision of tubewells etc., have been accepted.

(7) Aligarh Muslim University -Completion cost of the construction of New Post Office Building

The Commission at its meeting held on 6th November, 1963 (Item No.2(a)(26)approved the construction of a new post office beilding at Aligarh Muslim University at a cosst of Rs.8,633/-subject to the condition that the expenditure was accommodated within the provision available for campus development of the University for the Third Plan period. The University has completed the building at Rs.8,834.03 The increase in expenditure is reported to be due to the increase in the area from 408 sq.ft. to 621 sq.ft. as desired by the Post Master. The completion cost of Rs.8,834.03 has been accepted.

Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore Acceptance of the schemes (i) Renovation
of the Old Industrial Management and N.C.C.
Building and (ii) Renovation of Kitchen Rooms
and Dining Halls in the hostel.

The Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore included the following schemes under amenities for staff and students within the overall Fourth Plan allocation. The Institute sent the plans and estimates as detailed below:-

(i) Renovation of the old Industrial Management and N.C.C.building Rs.1,00,000

(ii) Renovation of kitchen rooms and dining halls in the hostels Rs. 63,000

As the estimates mainly involved additions and alterations to the existing buildings, the same had been accepted without reference to Central Works Department.

(9) Palli Siksha Sadana (Agricul ural and Social Sciences Wings) Wisva-Bharat - Treating the recurring expenditure as par of the Block Grant

The Commission at its meeting held on the 3rd October 1969(Item No.18) agreed that the approved recurring expenditure at the end of 1969-70 for the running of the Palli Siksha Sadana (Social Sciences and Agricultural Sciences Wings), Visva-Bharrati mmay be treated as committed expenditure with effect from 1970-71. It was however noted that the development; needs of the Agricultural Wing of the Palli Siksha Sladana would be met by the . I.C.A.R. The above decision of the Commission was conveyed to the Visa-Bharati and the University was requested to include the approved recurring expenditure on the above account in its Revenue Budget for the year 1970-71. Simultaneously, the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services were also approached for its concurrence for treating the approved recurring expenditure estimated to be Rs.7, 50,000/- on account of running of Agricultural Wing and Social Sciences Wing of the Palli Siksha Sadana as committed expenditure with effect from 1970-71. The Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services has since conveyed its concurrence for treating this expenditure as par, of the Block Grant.

(10) Delhi University (Constituent Colleges - Finalisation of the accounts of the maintenance grants paid by the University Grants Commission.

The Commission has been paying prior to 1967-68 maintenance grants to the (Constituent/Affiliated colleges of Delhi University other than University maintained colleges and evening classes on the basis of 90% of the net deficit (approved expenditure minus approved income.). From 1967-68 onwards, the maintenance grant to these colleges is payable on the basis of 95% of the net deficit.

(11) To receive the revised financial terms for foreign visitors coming to India under the Cultural Exchange Programmes.

The Government of India have decided to prescribe the following terms for the foreign visitors to India under the Cultural Exchange P'rogrammes:

- I. For individual visit; ors and upto a group of 3 persons
- At places where European plan prevails in hotels i.e. hotel expenses include expenses on lodge and breakfast, but exclude expenses on board.
 - i) Bed and breakfast: in 4 or 5 standard hotel depending upon the status of the visitor.
 - ii) An allowance of Rs.55/- per day per person to cover expenses om meals, cigarettes, laundry, cultural shows, etc. and out-of-pocket allowance.

Where breakfast is mot provided an additional amount of Rs.5/- may be giwen. But to that extent the lodging expenses will be less. Care should also be taken that the lodging charges do not include laundry charges as these are provided for in the above allowance.

- iii) An allowance of Rs.15/-per day permember for local transport, if no staff car is provided.
- B. At places where American plan prevails in the hotel i.e. hotel expenses included both board and lodging including breakfast:

 Same as at (A) albove except for item (ii) where an amount of Rs.20/— will be provided for incidental expenses.
- II. For groups exceeding 3 persons ard performing delegations:

Same as above but where the number of visitors exceeds 20, a bus would be provided by the Ministry and no conveyance allowance would be paid.

The Ministry of Education and Youth Services have further informed that the foreign visitors coming to India may be given the terms as provided under each of the Cultural Exchange Prog; rammes with the respective countries concerned, or the above terms which should be considered as the ceiling for providing the facilities to the foreign visitor's coming under Cultural Exchange 'Programmes.

The above terms have been accepted by the Commission for implementation.

(12) To receive items allocated to UGC for implementation under Indo-Mongolian Cultural Exchange Programs for the years 1970-71 and 11971-72.

The Ministry of Education and You h Services have forwarded a copy of the finalised "Ico-Mongolian Culturall Exchange Programme for the years 1970-71

(13) Junior Research Fellowship in Science - Shri Ram Kumar - Extension of tenure beyond three years.

Under rules, Junior Felllowships are tenable for a period of three years.

On the recommendations of the supervisor and the Dean Post-Graduate studies Panjab Agricultical University, Ludhiana, the tenure of Shiri Ram Kumar. Junior Research Fellow in Bió-Chemistry simce 7.11.1967 has been extended beyond three years by three months from 7.11.70 to 6.2.1971 to enable him to complete this research work.

(14) Research Scholarships of the value of Rs.250/-p.m. 1969-70: acceptance of the proposal of the Osmania University for malking the avards tenable from the beginning of the academic session.

Under rules, the U.G.C. Research Scholarships are effective from the date on which the scholar reports for research work at the UJniversity/College or the date of issue of the award letter to the scholar whichever is later.

The proposal of the Osmania University for making the scholarships awarded by it against the allocation made for 1969-70 from the beginning of the academic session viz., 1.7.1969 has been agreed to.

Research Sicholarships in Humanities including Social Sciiences and Sciences - Extension of tenure beyond three years.

Under rules, the University Grants Commission Research Scholarships of the vvalue of Rs.250/-p.m. are tenable for a period of three years.

On the recommendations of the supervisor and the University concerned, the tenure of eight scholars has been extended beyond three years to enable them to complete the work for the doctoratce degree as per details given below:

(16) Financial assistance to teachers in universities and colleges for research or learned work in Humanitiess including Social Sciences - Second Award during 1970-71

Since 1963-64, the University Grant Commission has been giving grants to the teachers in uni prsities and colleges for field work, books, chemicals, equipment and for publication of monographis, research papers etc., needed by them for their research work but which are not normally available at the institution where they work. Assistance upto a maximum of Rs.5,000/- may be provided to a teacher. Two selections are held in a year under the scheme. First selection is held in March and the second in September.

For second award diuring 1970-71, the Commission received 422 applications in Humanities and Social Sciences as per details given in Annexure I. The applications received in Humanities and Social Sciences were scrutinised by the Selection Committee (Annexure II) at its meeting held on 17th September, 1970. The Selection Committee recommended a total grant of Rs.93,4+50/- for 140 teachers. Subjectwise details of grants recommended are given in Annexure I.

The recommendations of the Selection Committee has been accepted and a total graint of Rs.93,450/- has been approved for 140 teachers as per details given in a nexure III.

(17) Book grants to colleges : 19/0-71

The Commission at its meeting held on 6th May, 1970 accepted, interalia, the recommendation made by the Standing Advisory Committee on Coolleges that assistance be provided to colleges for the purchase of books every year, on a cent per cent basis. In view of this, it has been decided to provide book grants for 1970-71 to colleges of arts, science, commerce and law, physical education, music and oriental learning, on the list under Section 2!(f) of the UGC Act, on a cent per cent basis, according to studient enrolment for 1969-70 as indicated below:

- 1. College with a student enrolment below 500 Rs. 4,500
- 2. College with a student enrolment between Rs.5,500
- 3. College with a student enrolment of 1,000 and above. Rs.6,500
 - (18) Grant of Imterim Relief to the employees of the University Grants Consission

The Government of India's orders contained in the Ministry of Finance(Depairtment of Expenditure)0.M.No.F.8(5)_E.III(A)/70 dated the 30th September,1970 regarding grant of Interim Relief to the Central Government employees with effect from Ist March,1970 have also been made applicable to the employees of the University Grants Commission with effect from the same date i.e. Ist March,1970.

(10) School level Summer Science Institutes organised by N.C.E.R.T.

The N.C.S.E. at its meeting held on 8.9.16 0 decided that the responsibility for the organisation of school level Summer Science Institutes may be transferred to the N.C.E.R.T. in view of the difficulties experienced by the University Grants Commission in regard to the organisation of institutes at institutions not covered by the Act of University Grants Commission viz., I.I.T's and some leading schools. The suggestion of NCSE has been accepted and accordingly the proposals received from the universities and colleges for the organisation of Summer Science Institutes for school teachers during 1971 have been passed on to N.C.E.R.T. for further action.

(21) D.N.R.College, Bhimavaram(Andhra University) - Establishment of Hobby workshop

The establishment of a hobby workshop at the D.N.R.College (previously W.G.B.College, Bhimavaram) was approved in November 1959. The hobbies for which facilities had to be provided in the workshop were smithy, carpentry, electronics and photography. The Commission's assistance was limited to Rts.10,000/- for build g and Rs.10,000/- for equipment. The college: Incurred an expending of Rs.18,055/- for building (against the estimated cost of Rs. 2,200/-) and Rs.17,10/2/- for equipment (against the approved cost of Rs. 5,000/-)

The Accountant Generall, Andhra Pradesh, audited the accounts of the college, and intimatted that provision for photography had not been made in the hobby workshop, costly equipment had been purchased, and the use of the building and equipment had been delayed. The college has stated that competent technical guidance was not easily available, and equipment, particularly the lathe and drilling machine could be acquired only in 1964. Since the college has already made provision for tathe work, carpentry and electronics, and purchased equipment for these hobbiess, and since the workshop is being used for repairing laboratory equipment and giving training to students interested in the activities being conducted, the accounts of the project have been settled and the approved grants paid.

Item No.2(b): To receive items of information

(1) Central Universities - Acceptance of the recommendation of the Public Accounts Committee by the Government of India for presentation of the Audited Accounts of the Central Universities along with the audit reports thereon to Parliament and making necessary provision in the Acts of incorporation of the Central Universities.

The Commission, at its meeting held on the 4th August 1965(vide Item No.57), after carefully considering the matter relating to a reference from the Ministry of Education regarding the recommendation of Public Accounts Committee (1964-65) for presentation of Audit Reports of Central Universities before Parliament, reiterated its earlier view that in the best interests of the proper functioning of universities and from the point of view of academic freedom it would not be desirable to amend the Act of the Central Universities to make provision for placing the accounts of these universities before the Parliament. The Commission however, added that as a safeguard suitable directions could be given to the C.A.G. on the lines suggested in Commission's earlier Resolution (Resolution No.6 of the meeting held on 3rd/4th February, 1965). It was agreed also that this matter be further discussed by a Committee consisting of the Chairman, the Finance Secretary and the Education Secretary. The matter was considered by the Committee which agreed that the earlier decision of the Commission be reiterated that in the best interests of the proper functioning of Universities and from the point of view of academic freedom, it would not be desirable to amend the Acts of the Central Universities to make provision for placing the accounts of these Universities before the Parliament. Committee also felt that as the decision taken in the case of Central Universities would be extended to the State Universities. the Government of India be advised to take up this matter at the highest level before any decision is taken The Government of India in the Ministry of in the matter. Education was informed accordingly and in this connection, its attention was invited to certain extracts from the Report of the Committee on Higher Education in U.K. under the Chairmanship of Lord Robbin regarding the audit of Universities in U.K.

The Government of India in the Ministry of Education has now intimated that the matter relating to the demand of the Public Accounts Committee Committee Committee alongwith Audit Reports thereon to the Parliament etc., had been considered by Government on several occasions but the recommendation of the Committee had not been accepted and that in its 75th Report(1968-59), the Public Accounts Committee again expressed its anxiety that a decision on the question of laying the accounts of the Central Universities on the Table of Parliament should be reached at an early date. The matter has therefore, been reconsidered by the Government of India and

taking note of the fact that the Public Accounts Committee is an august body of Parliament and it has been consistently reiterating this recommendation, the Government has decided that the recommendation of the Committee may be accepted and necessary provision made in the Acts of incorporation of Central Universities for presentation of their audited accounts alongwith the audit reports thereon to Parliament.

(2) Minuttes of the Sub-Committee on National Emblem for National Integration Samiti held on 2rnd September, 1970.

The Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services has sent the minutes of the meeting of the Sub-Committee on INational Emblem for National Integration Samiti held on 2nd September, 1970. A copy of the minutes is attached for imformation of the Commission (Annexure).

Report made to Unesco Headquarters by Dr.(Mrs)E.N.Odintsova, Head of the Laboratory of Test Cultures of the Institute of Photosynthesis of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR., who visited the Centre of Advanced Study in Botany, University of Madras as Unesco Consultant on Vitaminology from 6th December, 1969) to 5th April, 1970.

Under the Unesco/UNDP Technical Assistance Programme for Centres of Advanced Study Project in Indian Universities Dr. (Mrs.)E.N. Odinitsova, Head of the Laboratory of Test Cultures of the Institute of Photosynthesis of the Academy of Sciences of the USSR, visited the Centre of Advanced Stud in Botany, University of Madras as Unesco Consultant on Vitaminology from 6th December 1969 to 5th April, 1970. During her stay, the consultant delivered a series of lectures on vitamins and their biosynthesis by microorganisms, and one other selected subjects at the University of Madras and various other scientific establishments, with a view to initiating students in vitamin microbiology. She has also deallt with practical problems of applied microbiology of particular interest to India. On completion of her assignment; in India, she made a report to Unesco Headquarters, a copy of which is attached as Annexure for information. The report has been sent to the Head of the Centre.

> Youth Services, Government of India for transfer of the scholarship and fellowship schemes of the U.G.C. to the proposed National Schoolarship Board.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held on 2nd September, 1970 did not support the proposal of the Ministry of Education and Youth Services, Government of India, for transfer of the scholarshi and fellowship scheme of the UGCC to the proposed National Scholarship Board (Item No.9)).

In this connection, it was also desired that the CSIR, the Atomic Energy Commission and the ICAR may be requested to intimate the decision taken by them on the proposal of the Ministry of Education and Youth Services. On enquiry the CSIR, and ICAR intimated that they have not agreed to the transfer of their fellowships to the proposed National Scholarship Board. The Department of Atomic Energy, Government of India at Delhi was not able to give any information since then fellowships are managed by their office in Bombay.

(5) Award of Commonwealth Academic Staff Fellow-ships during the year 1970-71.

The Commission vide item 2(lb)(6) and Item 2(b)(3) of the meetings held on 4th February, 1970 and Ist July 1970 respectively was informed of the candidates selected for the award of Commonwealth Academic Sttaff Fellowships for the year 1970-71. Subsequently, the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in U.K. has made one more additional fellowship award to Dr.Sushil Das Gupta, Professor & Electrical Engineering, Jadavpur University to work at University of Cambridge. According to the information received from the Commonwealth Scholarship Commission in U.K., the position of the Indian Fellows taking up their awards in 1970 is as under:

- on the recommendation of the University Grants Commission the Ministry of Education and Youth Services, Govt. of India, agreed to include Library staff in universities and Colleges in the scheme of revilsion of salary scales, 1966-1971 w.e.f. 1.4..966. Under the revision of salary scales of

Library staff for the period 1966-71, certain qualifications have been prescribed (e.g., M.A., M Sc., M.Com plus B.Lib or diploma in Library Science for professional seniors and B.A./B.Sc./B.Com with M.Lib or M.A./M.Sc./B.Com with B.Lib for professional juniors).

A number of Teacher Associations from different States brought to the notice of the Commission that a large number of universities and College Library staff would be denied the benefit of the revision of 1966-71 if the prescribed qualification were insisted upon. These Associations desired that the Library staff in Universities and Colleges who have had the benefit of earlier salary revision, may continue to receive the same under the revision for 1966-71 with the provision for relaxation of qualifications etc.

The Commission received similar proposals from the Central Universities for relaxation of qualifications for placing existing Library staff in the revised scale of 1966-71. matter was referred to the Standing Committee on Establishment Matters of the Central Universities which recommended that those who have had the benefit of 3rd pllan salary revision, may be placed in the revised scale of payy for the period 1966-71 irrespective of the prescribed qualifications and experience and the Committee was also of the vriew that it was not necessary to screen them before placing them in the revised scale. The Committee recommended that the revised qualifications prescribed for the different posts under 1966-71 revision would be made applicable to all future promotions/appointments. Commission accepted the recommendation of the Committee and approached the Ministry of Education and Youth Services for approval of the same.

The Ministry of Education and Youth Services have informed the Commission of their acceptance of the recommendation of the Commission in extending the benefit of revision of salary scales to existing Library staff in Universities and Colleges for the period 1966-71 with the provision of relaxation of qualifications and experience and without subjecting them to go through the screening procedure.

The Ministry of Education & Youth Servides, Govt. of India, accepted the recommendation of the University Grants Commission for revision of salary scales of university and college teachers w.e.f. Ist April 1966. Among other things, a scale of Rs. 250-15-400 had been recommended for Demonstrators/Tutors in affiliated colleges (both undergraduate and postgraduate). The Commission felt that all college teachers (including Demonstrators/Tutors) who hold postgraduate qualifications (M.S./M.S&c.) should be given a minimum basic pay of Rs. 300/- per month under the salary revision for the period 1966-71. The Ministry of Education & Youth Services have accepted the recommendation of the Commission and have idecided that the benefit of a minimum pay of Rs. 300/- may be given to the Demonstrators/ Tutors in affiliated colleges in the scale of

Rs. 250-15-400 with a personal pay of Rs. 5/- at the time of fixation of pay which would be absorded in the next increment.

- (b) Arts and Crafts instructors in affiliated colleges had not been included in the revision of salary scale for the period 1966-71. A number of representations were received by the Commission for inclusion of this category of teachers under the purview of the revision, 1966-71. The Commission approached the Ministry of Education with the request to include this category of teachers under the purview of the revision (1966-71) in the scale of Rs. 250-15-400, recommended for Demonstrators/Tutors in affiliated colleges. Ministry of Education & Youth Servides, Government of India have accepted the recommendation of the Commission and have agreed that the scale of Rs. 250-15-400 under the scheme for Demonstrators/Tutors should be given to Arts & Crafts instructors in affiliated colleges provided that such instructors actually handle degree cllasses and possess at least a diploma and the necessary experience as prescribed by the University.
- Report made by IDr: C.L. Mahajan, Reader in Zoology, Rajasthan University on his visit to U.K. under the programme of Exchange of visits by Younger Scientists between India amd U.K.

Dr. C.L. Mahajam, Reader in Zoology, Rajasthan University went to U.K. under the programme of Exchange of Younger Scientists between India and U.K. during October 1969 June 1970. He had been accepted by Dr. Lajtha, Director of Research at Christia Hospital and Holt Radium Institute initially for four months begining October 1969 which was subsequently extended to the end of June 1970. A copy of the report made by Dr. Mahajan on his visit to U.K. under the Programme is attached as Annexure.

Minutes of the meeting of Sub-Committee on National Emblem for National Int:egration Samitis held on 2nd September, 1970 at 33.30 P.M. in the University Grants Commission's Office.

The Sub-Committee to recommend the National Emblem for National Integration Samitis met under the Chairmanship of Prof. Tapas Majumdar, the convener. It was attended by Dr.Kothari, Prof.K.S.Narang,, Shri Pradeep Majumdar, Shri Viay Prabhakar and Dr.S.C.Seth.

- It was recommended that in order to obtain a suitable Emblem, a national competition may be arranged in which the student community alone would be invited to participate. The National Emblem should reflect the theme of national integration and should be artistic in its design.
- An Assessment Committee consisting of four well-known artists and headed by Shri Gajendragadkar would decide the best entries. Seven enttries may be selected and awarded the following prizes:

First Prize - Rs.500/Second Prize - Rs.250/Five Prizes - Rs.100/- each

Five Prizes

- At least one member of the Assessment Committee should have a sufficient background of making metal emblems.
- The report of the Assessment Committee would be submitted to the National Emblem Sub-Committee which would then make its final recommendations to the Ministry. Dr.Kothari specifically desired that the supply of these emblems should be completed by January 26, 1971. He also advised that, between the announcement of the competition which should be done using all media, the Television, Radio, Newspapers and official circulars to the Vice-Chancellors - and the submission of the entries atleast a period of two moniths should be given to the. student artists to submit their entries.
- The Sub-Committee also observed that the finally selected emblem may then be: used on the Identity Cards to be issued to the members; of the National Integration Samitis by the Vice-Chancellor/Principal of the University/ College concerned as well as on the stationery to be used by the Samitis.
- The Sub-Committee agreed that the Education Ministry should handle this work.

Work and travel schedule

arrived in New Delhi according to plan on December 6. 1969 and proceeded the same day to Bombay in order to participate in the Third International Conference on the "Global" Impacts of Applied Microbiology". I participated in the Conference as a delegate from 7 to 12 December. In order to attend to official affairs and to visit the Indian Agricultural Research Institute, I visited New Delhi on 13 December and stayed until 17 December. From 17 December 1969 until 17 March 1970 I worked at the University of Madras delivering lectures and conducting scientific research. During the same period I participated in the work of the First International Symposium on the Taxonomy and Biology of Blue-green Algae held under the auspices of the University of Madras. Following a suggestion by Dr.D.Shankar Narayan, Joint Secretary of the UGC, I visited Bangalore on 7 February 1969 to give lectures at the Indian Institute of Science and visited the brewery, distillery and the laboratory preparing concentrated malt extract. I also visited Vellore at the imvitation of the Christian Medical College and saw their clinics and laboratories. I lelivered lectures in the Christian Medical College on 24 January 1970. Between 18 and 24 March I visited the Universities of Allahabad, Agra and Delhi. In Delhi University I visited the Departments of Bottany and Chemistry as also the Patel Chest Institute, where I delivered lectures twice.

Scientific Work

Determination of viitamins

The higher plant iss characterized by the most intensive biosynthesis of vitamins of the B-group which are concentrated in green leaves. Therefore, the studies of leaves of different plants growing in the region of Madras and

also their seeds was of great interest.

The following plant samples were examined: rice leaves (two varities) from two periiods of vegetation in natural conditions. Leaves of two kiinds of rice, grown in laboratory conditions, leaves of betal, seeds of two kinds of rice from two periods of wegetation, snake gourd fruit, the cells of Nostoc from synthetic medium deprived of vitamins and yeasts from a brewery (received in Bangalore), Using microbiological methods (yeast tests) the following vitamins of the B-group were determined:

meso-inositol;

biotin;

- pantothenic acid;
- vitamin B; (5) Pyridoxine; (6) ·nicotinic acid;

para-aminobenzoice acid.

The preliminary data showed that all leaves and other natural materials, excluding yeasts, were very poor in the two vitamins of the B-group: biotin and pantothenic acid. According to our views the se two vitamins take part in the biosynthesis of proteins. Consequently, edible preparations containing high quantities; of these two vitamins are necessary. Such a product, which represents the concentrate of autolysate from brewing yesasts, was prepared for demonstration and its productiom recommended.

Several kinds of appearatus necessary for vitamin determination using microbiological micromethods were assembled in the Department of Botany, Madras University.

A special report concerning the possible production of vitamins of the B-group from brewing yeasts was submitted to the University Grants Commission (See Appendix 2).

Micro-organisms of sour milk

Sour milk is one of the widespread food products of the population of India. The hot climate of this country has certainly had an inflluence on the natural selection of active strains of lacttic acid bacteria and other microorganisms of the sour millk. Therefore, the microflora of samples of several kinds of sour milk from Madras and Allahabad was studied. These substrates contain three different groups of micro-organisms: latic acid bacteria, streptococcus lactis, yeasts of the species saccharomyces lactis and other species; of yeasts.

It was found that sour milk in India contain excellent types of microbes of the oretical and practical value. These are first of all the main micro-organisms of sour milk which are very big in size and belong practically to a single species, homofeermenting thermophilic lactic acid bacteria. After their issolation in a pure state they can be recommended for the iindustrial production of lactic acid.

In the samples of sour milk in Allahabad there have been seen cells of streptococcus lactis in significant quantities. This bacteria is also very valuable in the production of aromatic substances. Excellent cells of

oidium lactis and saccharumyces lactis were seen as well in significant amounts in Allahabad kinds of milk. At present the isolation of these micro-organisms in pure cultures is being carried out. Knowledge of their composition will make it possible to organize in India the industrial production of sour milk, as a valuable food. Further study of these Indian microbe cultures is necessary.

Publication of a manual in microbiology and the training of specialists.

The development of microbiclogical research in India and the training of specialists require the publication of handbooks which should include the main knowledge in general and modern microbiology, especially in cytophysiology, some practical information concerning the organization of laboratory work and some modern equipment.

It seems to me that the book I have in mind to write might be useful. I plan to write it after my return from India taking as the basis the programme of my lectures for Indian scientists, plustselected chapters on modern microbiology, some methods and techniques for cytophysiological studies, and apparatus and techniques for vitamin determination. I hope that my work in this direction will be welcomed by Indian scientists and Unesco.

During my stay at the University of Madras, I had the opportunity of beginning the training of some specialists in my field for India. Two postgraduate students of the University College in Bangalore, C.S.Lakshminarayana and K.M.Jagadeesh attended my lectures in the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore. They accompanied me during my visit to the distillery, attended discussions there and then came to work with me in Madras. They stayed with me for two weeks and had the opportunity of studying the methods and techniques for microbiological vitamin determination. These two students showed extreme interest in this field of science and I can express the highest appreciation of their work. If they have the possibility of continuing to work in this direction I could train them to become specialists qualified in microbiology, vitaminology and physiology.

Recommendations:

The data collected imdicate the necessity of carrying out vitamin research in the broadest sense in India. It is highly important to ascertain the cause of an insufficient content of biotin and of paratothenic acid in the vegetarian diet and whether it is connected with the high temperatures of some southern regions. It will be necessary to find ways of increasing the vitamin content in these plant products.

There is urgent necessity to organize as quickly as possible the production of yyeast autolysates rich in aminoacids and vitamins of the B-group.

In spite of the presence in sour milk in India of very valuable microbe associations, there is a danger that the multiplication of not toxic,, but undesirable "milk mould" (Oidium Lactis) may take place. Therefore, it is recommended to cultivate in laboratory conditions a standard "ferment" for sour milk preparation, which should be made widely available in shops.

No less important aree the investigations of the contents of vitamins of the B-group in human blood.

This very brief and iincomplete list of problems to be studied requires the organization of a special laboratory. Such a laboratory might stairt with two scientific workers and one technical assistant..

Its equipment would mot be expensive and would include an electro-photo-nephelometeer of high sensitivity, a thermostat for 30°C and a thermostat for 45°-48°C, microscopes and the necessary accessories, a refrigerator, an apparatus for the semiautomatical pourring out of the media, sterile water and other solutions, some flasks and vessels, pipettes and cases for them, big and ordinary tubes (no less than 1500-2000).

All the above-mentioned appratus and the necessary glass accessories were assembled by me in the University of Madras. Since it appears that it may remain unutilised there, it might be transferred to the proposed laboratory.

- (a) The proposed labboratory could be organised in Patel Chest Institute affiliated with the University of Delhi or in Nehru University.
- (b) Later, the laboratory should have a type culture collection including the main microbial cultures of different countries and valuable Indian cultures.
- (c) The productive twork of such a laboratory must rely on the training of specialists.
- (d) Senior and Junicor fellowships for studies in the USSR may be advrisable for this purpose, perhaps with assistance: from Unesco.

PRODUCTION OF B-VITAMINS FROM BREWING YEASTS

Professor Dr. Odintsova C.N. Unesco Expert in India

The vitamins of the B-group play an important role in the metabolism of living cells. Their exclusively high physiological activity and, (consequently, their distribution in cells and tissues in smalllest concentrations have made practically impossible the usse of any chemical or physicochemical methods of their quantitative determination. At present we employ enough quick and exact microbiological methods for the determination of these vitamins using suitable microbe cultures as biological test-objects.

The microbiological micromethods suggested by us allow for vitamin determination using only one ml of the total volume of the medium and can be used for determining vitamins in different substrates: in the soil, in microbe cells, plant and animal tissues, including the blood. For the determination of vitamins of the B-group in the blood it is enough to have only one ml of the blood taken in the usual way (from the finger of a person or from the jugular vein of an animal) and to determine in this small quantity of blood eight main vitamins of the B-group. Thee following vitamins of the B-group can be determined: meso-inositol, biotin, pantothemic acid, thiamine, pyridoxine, nicotimic acid, para-aminobenzoic acid, orotic acid.

The green plant, the main supplier of vitamins of the B-group on the earth, concentrates them in the leaves and this organ contains enormous quantities of these vitamins.

It was shown by us that the leaves of different plants growing in Madras (and its region) including the leaves used for food, contain very small quantities of two main vitamins of the B-group: motion and panitothenic acid.

Some facts already known give the grounds to suppose that these two vitamins of the B-group take part in the biosynthesis of proteins. The relative concentrations of different vitamins can have an influence on the activity of protein biosynthesis in the living cells as well. The following experimental data confirm this statement. The cells grown in a medium with the addition of optimum doses of the main vitamins of the B-group were capable of synthesizing only 19mg of proteins. From the same food material, in the presence of the same vitamins, but added in the concentrations corresponding to their content in one of the natural products rich in these vitamins the ssame cells had the possibility to synthesize 76mg of proteins.

The replenishment iin the vicamins of the B-group can be carried out by using the autolysates of brewers yeasts.

These yeasts, after their utilization in breweries are sold (mostly in dry state). But in this state they can be used as a food product only in very small quantities: human gastric juice and gastric enzymes cannot destroy the thick walls of the yeast cells and the proteins (the yeasts contain 50% of proteins), as well as the vitatins of the B-group connected with cell proteins, cannot be utilized.

Using the proper protecolytic enzymes of these cells, it is possible (by a very simple procedure) to convert these proteins into aminoacids and thus to receive in a free state the vitamins of the B-group connected with the proteins. Such a kind of preparation, the so-called yeast autolysate, must be concentrated, and the concentrated yeast autolysate will contain all proteins of the cells in a good assimillable form, in a form of water soluble aminoacids, the complete amount of water-soluble vitamins of the B-group and some inorganic compounds as well. As concentrated preparation, this product can be used in a very small quantity. One gramme, or a half a gramme of such a preparation must contain the daily human dose of vitamins of the B-group.

Due to their extremely high capacity of accumulation the vitamins of the B-group, during the period of fermentation, the trewing yeasts and the yeasts; of the wine industry, are very rich in these substances. Thus, in the period of fermentation; the yeast cells accumulate practically all the vitamins of the B-group from barley malt or grape juice, which are very rich in these vitamins.

In India there is little wine industry and therefore it is possible to use only brewing yeasts.

This kind of preparattion, the concentrated autolysate of brewing yeasts is presented for your attention. It was obtained in the University off Madras in the priod of my scientific work there, from the yeasts of a brewery in Bangalore. Fresh yeasts were washed and dried at the temperature not higher than 45°C. From these dry yeasts there was prepared a 10% water autolysate. After boxiling (2-3 minutes) the not necessary cell walls were seeparated, washed and dried. They can be used as food for animals. The autolysate was concentrated the convenient form of use: in tablets or pills (the filling with chalk, e.g. Ca CO₃).

From 20 g of brewing dry yeast we could obtain about 7 g of dry cell walls and about 17 g of concentrated autolysate. A portion of this autolysate was put into capsules (picture attached).

It would be expedient to organize in India a central laboratory for yeast autolyssate preparations. The brewing yeast can be transported in the dry state (the temperature for drying pressed yeasts must not be higher than 45°C), and as pressed yeasts as well. The necessary equipment is simple and not expensive.

REPORT OF DR. C.L. IMAHAJAN, READER IN ZOOLOGY, RAJASTHAN UNIVERSI'TY, ON HIS VISIT TO U.K. UNDER THE PROGRAMME OF EXCHANGE OF VISITS BY YOUNGER SCIENTISTS BETWEEN! INDIA AND U.K. (OCT. 1969 - JUNE 1970.)

The visit will be described under the following sub-headings:

- I. The work done at the Paterson Laboratories, Christie Hospital and Holt Radium Institute, Manchester where the major part of the stay was spent.
- II. The work done at the British Museum (Natural History) London.
- III. Visits to other University departments, laboratories, institutes etc:

1. WORK DONE AT THE PATERSON LABS. MANCHESTER:

The main aim of thie visit was to get familiar with some of the latest techniques in modern cell biology in particular those involving this sue culture, autoradiography and electron microscopy.

The work done may be divided into the following:

A. Experiments with shrew coe: 11s

Fibroblasts grown in mono-layers from embryonic lung tissue of both the malle and fenale shrew (Serex auraneus Linn.) Most of the experiments were carried out; between passages 20 to 35. The purpose of these experiments; was to find out if this could be used as a regular cell-line for future experimental work. So, an attempt was made to establish the following criteria:

(1) <u>Karyotype</u>

Preparations using; the Freeze-drying method were made, chromosomes were photographed, measured and an idiogram prepared in the usual manners. On the basis of this, a computer program (a modification from that currently in use for human chromosomes in the Laboratorry) was prepared by Dr. Gilbert. Making use of this programmes, chromosomes were measured on the x-y reader and an idiogram of both the male and the female obtained. The computer method was found to be very successful and reliable.

(2) The Cell Cycle and the labelling pattern of chromosomes.

Using autoradiographic techniques, the cell cycle in the male fibroblast cells was found to be as follows:

Using appropriate methods, a cell synchrony up to 96% could be obtained. The interesting aspect of the synchrony obtained was that the cells continue to grow in the usual manner and in not seem to carry over the colcemid effect.

(3) <u>DNA extraction</u>

With the help of Dr. B.Fox, DNA extractions were made from male shrew cells using Kirby's method. While the purpose was mainly to get familiar with the technique, it is hoped to use the DNA to get further information regarding the base ratios which could be of comparative interest.

B. Study of RNA synthesis in Chinese hamster cells

In collaboration with Dr. C.H. Ockey an experiment involving EM autoradiography was done to make a quantitative study of RNA synthesis im nucleolus. The material needs further processing.

G. <u>Miscellaneous</u>

Apart from the laboratory work, useful discussions on a variety of subjects of topical interest in the field of cell biology were made particularly in weekly seminars of the Cytogenetics and occasionally of the Radiation Biology and Cell Biology groups.

I also attended the one week course (15 lectures, 5 demonstrations and a discussion meeting) on Radiation Bilogy organised by the Patersom Laboratories.

Lectures arranged under the auspices of the Journal Club, were found to be very useful and informative. I had also the opportunity of giving a talk entitled "Sex chromosomes and sex genes - from fish to mammals".

This is only a preliminary report. It is hoped to publish the results of the investigations in appropriate journals.

II. THE WORK DONE AT THE DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY BRITISH MUSEUM (NATURAL HISTORY) LONDON.

The last fortnight of June was spent at the British Museum (Natural History), London where I had useful series of discussions with Dr. IP.H. Greenwood, Senior Principal Scientific Officer, incharge of Freshwater Fish Section of the Museum. As a resullt, a research paper (based on the work previously done by mme) entitled 'Sisor rabdophorus - a study in adaptation and Natural relationship - IV The Cranial and pectoral musculature' was finalised and is expected to appear shortly in Journal of Zoology of the Zool. Soc. of London. In addition, I had an opportunity to examine the world-wide collection of siluroids in general and those of the family Sisoridae im particular. The identification and proper systematic position of some of the specimens in my

collection was confirmed as a mesult of this study.

III. VISITS TO OTHER UNIVERSITY DEPARTMENTS, INSTITUTES ETC.

Visits to various centress of research were made to get familiar with the work being dome there. These visits allowed me to hold discussions and exchange information with the scientists engaged in problems of mutual interest either in teaching or research.

A meeting of the Standing Aldvisory Committee on Area Studies was held on 6th August, 19770 at 3 PM at the UCC office, New Delhi. A copy of the proceeding of the meeting is attached (Annexure I).

The recommendations of the Committee in regard to the development proposals received from Area Studies Centres are given in the enclosed minutes. The Committee also considered the recommendations of the Sub-Committee consisting of Professor Tapas Majumdar, Professor K.N.Raj, Shri Gi. parthasarathy and Professor Abdul Aleem regarding the over-all pattern to be followed in the organisation and planning of area studies in Indian Universities. The Committee accepted the report (Annexure II) and particularly welcomed the classification of area studies centre into (a) Specialised (b) Centres with a core staff and drawing members from different departments and (c) Units based in single departments.

The Committee also endorsed strongly the idea of providing special assistance to scholars and testing viability of approved projects with scholars for some time before considering the establishment of a Unit or Centre.

The Committee also accepted the recommendation of the Sub-Committee regarding the classification of the existing centres or Area Studies as under:

The Committee also endorsed strongly the idea of providing special assistance to scholars and testing viability of approved projects with scholars for some time before considering the establishment of a Unit or a Centre. - Item II The Committee noted the progress report of the South East Asia Studies Unit at the Jadavpur University and desired that a Committee consisting of Dr. J.N. Khosla and Dr. Shanti Swarup may visit the University to discuss the proposals submitted by the University for further development of the Unit.
- Item III

 The Committee welcomed the proposal for establishing a chair in Indonesian/South East Asian Social Studies in an Indian University under the exchange programme should be available for a period of at least two years.

Proceedings of the meeting of the Committee on the formulation of a perspective plan for Area Studies.

The Standing Advisory Committee on Area Studies at its meeting held on 5th December 1969 set up a Committee consisting of Professor Tapas Majjumdar, Member University Grants Commission, Professor K.N. Raj, Wice-Chancellor, Delhi University, Shri G. Parthasarthy, Vice-Chancellor, Jawaharlal Nehru University and Professor Abdul Aleem, Vice-Chancellor, Aligarh Muslim University to formulate a ten-year perspective plan for the development of the Area Studies programmes in the Indian Universities.

- The Committee held two meetings, the first on December 5, 1969 and the second (on May 5, 1970. As desired by the Committee at its first meeting, information was obtained from the Area Studies Centres supported by the University Grants Commission regarding the specific research interest of the centres, their programmes and publications etc.

The Committee noted that in pursuance of the recommendations of the Advisory Committee on Area Studies appointed in 1965, proposals were invited by the University Grants Commission from the Universities for developing Centres of Area Studies. The following centres are at present functioning with hundred per cent assistance from the Commission outside the plan ceiling of the university towards the approved facilities:

The Committee was of the view that in formulating a perspective plan for the development of Area Studies Centres, due consideration should be given to the importance of geographical areas selected for intensive study and research, the interest of the existing departments of the University in the area selected for study and the availability of facilities for inter-disciplinary approach to study and research. There should be a high degree of flexibility in the organisational set up and functioning of Area Studies Centres to permit each University to adopt an organisational pattern best suited to its needs and facilities.

- The Sub-committee suggested that the Area Studies Programme may be implemented in a variety of ways offering scope for flexibility and that, for this purpose, the following institutional forms may be considered.
- (a) Specialised institutes like the Indian School of International Studies:



Universities with a full fledged school of International Studies and a School of Foreign Languages like the Jawaharlal Nehru University, are to be treated on a different footing. They would be concerned with intensive studies of a number of areas. The programme would lay special emphasis on language orientation, and a thorough study of international political and economic developments in the area, the historical background, international relations and diplomacy. The Committee did not anticipate that there would be any need felt for setting up any new School in the near future.

(b) Centres

A Centre could either have a core staff consisting of a Director and Language Specialists with staff in the concerned disciplines located in their departments or a core staff comprising the Director, Language Specialists as well as the whole or part of the staff in the disciplines concerned within the Centre itself. It would be desirable in the latter case to have a cooperative arrangements whereby persons located in the Centre are fully associated with teaching and research programmes of the departments and similarly persons directly attached with the departments are associated with the activities of the Centre. The Committee suggested that a new Centre should be set up only after detailed consideration of its workability because of the human factors involved in coordinating work in a number of departments.

(c) Units within a particular department

An area studies unit in a university department should specialise either in one country or in a small group of countries which form a homogenous unit on the basis of enthrolinguistic, socio-cultural, geo-political or economic factors. It was suggested that generally before approving a new unit it may be worthwhile to offer special assistance to Scholars in the department for some time and examine the viability of the approved projects.

(d) Special assistance to scholars for working on a problem relating to a specified area.

An attempt must be made to indentify scholars in the universities and colleges who have made a significant contrivution to study and research in a specific area and who have also some competence in the language of the area. Special assistance could be provided to such scholars for continuing their work on the area of their specialization. Assistance may continue even if the scholar moves to someother university/institution. Assistance may be made available towards research investigators, field work, purchase of books and journals, publication of report etc. The Committee suggested that the UGC should be very libral in the choice of scholars for help in this category.

On a reference from the Commission, the committee considered the proposals from the universities of Poona and Delhi and the Indian School of International Studies for strengthening cultural relations and contacts with El Collegio De Mexico and expressed the view that exchange of teachers would be more beneficial if it has a direct bearing on specific research projects and teaching programmes in the concerned countries. An attempt should be made to indentify Indian teachers who have developed interest and expertise in Latin American Studies and Latin American teachers who are interested in Indian Studies. Exchange of such teachers would be mutually advantageous and the cultural exchange programme should be built around them. The period of exchange should be at least two years in the case of language teachers in order to have some continuity in instructions.

9. The Committee also considered a letter referred to it by the Commission from Shri H.C. Guha, Vice-Chancellor, Jadavpur University regarding the creation of the post of two professors, one for South East Asia and the other for East Pakistan in the South East Asia Studies Centre of the University and recommended that one professor may be provided to the Centre either for South East Asia or for East Pakistan and that the appointment may be made according to the normal selection procedures of the University.

Item No.6: To receive a note regarding evaluation of the quality and standard of books produced by Indian authors in English and other Indian languages.

The Commission in consultation with the Ministry of Education and Youth Services has decided to award a small number of fellowships each of Value of Rs.500/-p.m. plus annual contingent grants of Rs.2,000/- to enable a proportion of outstanding students in science, humanities and social science subjects after their Master's degree to associate themselves with the distinguished teachers for purposes of undertaking of writing of quality books at the university level. The purpose of the scheme is to bring out quality books, monographs, translations which could be used by a number of universities and colleges in the country either as text books or as a reference books.

The proposals were invited from the teachers in the university departments and colleges willing to undertake the work as supervisors with the help of a fellow attached to them. A copy of the circular issued to the universities in this regard is attached as Annexure I.

The proposals were scrutinised by the committee of experts which selected 26 teachers in science subjects and 17 teachers in humanities and social science subjects for undertaking this work as supervisors. The minutes of the meeting of the committee are attached as Annexure II.

The universities have been requested to give the details about the title and the contents of the proposed book to be written by these teachers. It is proposed that these details would be forwarded to the respective subject panels in science and humanities and social science subjects for scrutiny. It is also proposed that the panels interalia may suggest a Committee of three persons, which would be in constant touch with the supervisors and offer such suggestions as considered necessary to ensure required standard.

It is proposed to award annually 100 such fellowships under the scheme. Second selection from the applications received would be made later during this year.

Copy of Circular No.F.29-12/69(Sc.I) dated 28th April, 1970 addressed to all the Universities.

Subject: Award of fellowships for undertaking writing of books at university level in association with distinguished university teachers.

The University Grants Commission in consultation with the Ministry of Education, has decided to award a small number of fellowships, each of the value of Rs.500/-p.m. plus an annual contingent grant of Rs.2,000/- per annum to enable a proportion of outstanding students in Sciences Humanities and Social Science subjects, after their Master's degree, to associate themselves with distinguished university teachers for purposes of undlertaking writing of quality books at the university level. The purpose of the scheme is to encourage preparation and publication of quality books at the university level in the country. The scheme is in the nature of a "pilot scheme", and would be modified in the light of experience gained. The programme would supplement the efforts being made by the universities and the State Governments for production/t:ranslation of books in regional languages during the Fourth Plan period. The essential purpose of the scheme is to bring out qualitybooks, monographs, translations, which could be used by a number of universities and colleges in the country, either as textbooks or as reference books; and to develop a pool of young competent scholars actively interested indigenous preparation of quality books in the country. The books could be written in English or any of the Indian languages.

The Commission also propose to organise suitable workshops to enable such scholars to receive some training in techniques of book writing, use of controlled vocabulary, translation etc. and such workshops could be organised in a few universities on a subject basis.

The University Grants Commission would be grateful if the above scheme is brought to the attention of teachers in the university departments and colleges and suitable proposals from outstanding teachers willing to undertake this work as Supervisors with the help of fellows attached to them, forwarded to reach the Commission by the middle of May, 1970. The proposal should give the following information:

- 3. Books or monographs published, if any, indicating the title of the book, name of the publisher, year of publication, price, whether it is prescribed as a textbook and the approximate number of copies sold so far.
- 4. Subject and title of the book to be taken up for original writing and a brief outline indicating important aspects and usefulness of the proposed publicatiom.
- 5. Name and particulars of the person to be associated as a fellow(if already identified)
 Other features of the scheme are indicated in the Appendices I and II.

Scheme for the award of fellowships for undertaking writing of books at university level

- 1. In pursuance of the recommendations of the Education Commission (1964-66), the Mimistry of Education and Youth Services and the University Grants Commission have formulated a centrally sponsored scheme to encourage writing of original books/monographs and production/translation of quality books for use by students at university level. The scheme will be implemented by the U.G.C. in collaboration with other organisations.
- of suitable guides or supervisors with whom scholars could be associated for writing books. The supervisors will be chosen by a Committee of Experts in each subject who would also give suggestions regarding books required urgently in each subject. The association of a senior teacher with a younger scholar/scientist, the provision of the younger scholars with the leisure and library facilities to devote full time to writing, the provision for critical reviews during the preparation of manuscript and for classroom testing and evaluation before final publication are the key factors of the scheme.
- 3. A number of fellowships of Rs.500/- p.m. will be awarded each year during the Fourth Five Year Plan period ending 1973-74.
- 4. Each fellowship will be tenable for a period of 3 to 5 years and besides the fellowship, each fellow will receive a grant of Rs.2000/- p.a. as contingency charges, for meeting expenditure connected with the writing of the books as per rules prescribed for the purpose (attached as Appendix II)
- Persons holding a first class M.A./M.Sc. or Ph.D. will be eligible for the award of fellowships.
- 6. In the case of in service teachers willing to accept the fellowship, they will be permitted to draw <u>leave salaries</u> due to them from the <u>parent</u> institution according to the rules of the Institutions.
- 7. Fellowship will be generally made available to scholars who have a good academic record and aptitude for writing books and who would be willing to give an undertaking to work under this scheme for the full duration of the award or upto the time of the completion of the manuscript whichever is earlier.
- 8. The fellows under this scheme would work under the guidance of wellknown teachers in the universities, who would be their Supervisors.
- 9. The fellowships will be distributed amongst the universities, based on the number of Supervisors invited to participate in this programme from the university concerned. Generally a Supervisor will have only one fellow working with him under the scheme.
- 10. The fellows, after selection, may be given suitable training, say for about three months, in the techniques of book construction, writing in controlled vocabulary, and the techniques of translations etc. Such workshops would be organised for a subject or a group of subjects at selected universities.



- 11. To keep the fellows in touch with the subjects, it is expected that each fellow will be given some teaching assignment, say 1-2 periods a week. A series of monographs written by different groups on selected topics within a subject could be co-ordinated so that the set could be used as a book on the subject.
- 12. The possibilities of providing other incentives/benefits by way of awarding suitable academic diplomas or degrees to fellows whose books are finally accepted for publication and also providing a suitable royalty to be shared between the fellow and the supervisor are under consideration.

Appendix II



Rules and regulations for utilization of regular and contingent grants admissible to the U.G.C. fellows undertaking w iting of books at university level

A contingent grant of Rs.2,000/- per annum would be available to each Fellow and may be utilised an following items with the approval of the Supervisor and the University:

- 1. Purchase/obtaining on loan, books, journals, photostat copies and Micro films needed for the approved project.
- 2. Typing, photographic materials, stationery, postage, and clerical or other assistance, essential for preparation of manuscriptof the book.
- 3. Visits to libraries for purposes of collection of reference material.
- 2. The contingent grant is not intended for meeting expenditure on furniture etc., items normally provided by the University/College, and payment of examination or other fees.
- 3. On termination of the fellowship, the books, apparatus and other non-consumable articles purchased out of the contingent grant will become the property of the University or College where a fellow works.
- 4. For all expenditure out of the contingent grant, a certificate to the effect that the expenditure incurred was for the approved project will be necessary.
- 5. The travelling and daily allowance for field work/travel outside the place of his work, undertaken by a fellow in connection with the approved project will be admissible according to the rules applicable to the teaching staff of the University/College.
- 6. The contingent grant for the first year of the fellowship tenure will be released to the Head of the Institution concerned on receipt of the joining report and statement of particulars etc. The contingent grant for the subsequent years will be released only on receipt of details account of expenditure incurred out of the previous instalment of grant duly certified by the Supervisor through the University/College.
- 7. The amount left unspent at the end of each year of the fellowship tenure will be adjusted against the contingent grant payable for the subsequent year. Similarly the amount left unspent outof the contingent grant on the date of expiry of the fellowship will be refundable to the Commission.

The Committee discussed in general the nature of the scheme. Most of the members felt that the scheme had not received wide publicity and as a result the response from the university teachers(except in few science subjects) was generally limited. It was felt that it would be desirable to bring the scheme to the notice of the academic community through advertisements in newspapers also. It may also be necessary to give more time and remind the universities again. The Commission has constituted panels of experts in various fields and members of these bodies may also be requested to participate in the programme themselves or suggest others whom they consider suitable to undertake this type of work.

The Committee felt that the scope of the scheme may in the first instance restricted to writing of books in English, as there its ample scope for translation and for writing books in megional languages under the scheme in operation under the various state Boards with the support of the Ministry of Education and Youth Services, Government of India. The details of the books could be left to the panels of experts and the Committee could select suitable teachers from the proposals received from the universities. It was felt that such demand is greater for books in Humanities and Sociial Science subjects and in Biological and Earth Sciences as the books written by foreign authors generally give examples to be found in other countries, which are generally not quite applicable to the Indian situation.

Some members raised doubts about the selection of fellows and it was felt that the selection if left to the supervisor alone may not be proper. However, the committee felt that the responsibility of bringing out good books should be the supervisor's and for efficient working of the team, the fellow could be selected by the supervisor himself. The Commission could however lay down minimum



qualifications for fellows and selections made may also be subject to the approval of the Commission. There may be advantages in associating junior teachers as fellows instead of fresh M.A., M.Sc. as the latter would be better suited for research work. The panels concerned should be in constant touch with the work in progress in various stages of preparation of manuscript of the book. The supervisor and the fellow may prepare chapters of books and send them periodically to the panels for evaluation or for suggesting improvements. The same panels should scrutinise also the final manuscript before it is accepted for publication. The books need not be written according to syllabus of any particulair university, as these books could be used as reference material or text-books at different levels depending on the treatment of the subject. In some cases groups of authors could be requested to --- prepare monographs also on different topics, which put together could be used as a text book.

The Committee further noted that another committee appointed by the Ministry of Education will be approaching experts in various fields to request them to take up work under "Core Books Programme". In case some teachers required special leave for writing books without the assistance of a fellow, this may be provided under the scheme.

The Committee then scruttinised the proposals received from the universities in various subjects and recommended the teachers (As given in Appendix I) who may be requested to take up the work, subject to approval by the expert panels appointed by the Commission. The Committee also decided that the proposals ffrom the persons given in Appendix II may be referred to the same panels for scrutiny and accepted if the pamels recommended them.

Item No. 7: To consider a proposal received from the Ministry of Education & Y.S. for financial assistance to Universities/Colleges for deputing their teachers for training at the Indian Photo-interpretation Institute, Dehra Dun.

The Government of India, in collaboration with the Government of Netherlands, has set-up a Photo-Interpretation Institute at Dehra Dun with-in administrative frame-work of the Survey of India. The Institute provides: facilities for specialised training and research at post-graduate level in the application of Photo-Interpretation techniques in the disciplines of Geology, Forestry and Soil Survey. Its annual intake capacity in each of the disciplines of Forestry, Geollogy and Soil Survey or Soil conservation is fifteen, out of which the Institute is prepared to allot 1/3 to the teachers to be sponisored by the Indian Universities. The duration of the courses is twelve months each and the candidates sponsered by Central/State Govt. departments and autonomous bodies, including Universities, are exempt from training charges.

The response to the courses offered at the Institute is stated to have been quite encouraging but many Universities/Colleges could not take advantage of these facilities due to financial implications involved in deputing teachers to this course. The Ministry of Education has, therefore, suggested that the Commission may consider the question of providing financial assistance to Universities/Colleges to depute their staff members for training at the Institute and to make alternative arrangements for teaching in their places.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

The main observations and recommendations of the Committee are as under:

Raipur is able to attract a fairly large number of studemts to its postgraduate courses, as indicated below, inspite of the fact that M.A. course im Political Science is offered by two other colleges in the town:

- The examination results of the college during the last two years have been excellent. The pass percentage was 91 at the M.A. (Final) Political Science Examination in 1968-69 and 93 in 1969-70.
- The College is situated in a relatively backward area of Madhya Pradesh and has in fact passed through a period of financial stringency. The buildings and furniture in the class-rooms are inadequate for meeting the needs of a postgraduate college. The library of the college is also ill-equipped, both in regard to the reading seats and the number of volumes. The college has, however, been able to overcome some of the difficulties by local contributions and other means.
- It was noted that the Commission had during the Third Plan period sanctioned a total grant of Rs. 1,30,483/- to the college (the share of the UGC being limited to Rs. 66,741/-) for the appointment of additional staff, construction of building, purchase of furniture, equipment, books and journals. The schemes could not be implemented by the college as it was unable to provide its matching contributions. The sanction was subsequently withdrawn in May 1966.
- The Committee was assured by the members of the managing committee and the Principal of the College that the College is now in a position to provide its matching share in respect of the schemes that may be sanctioned by the University Grants Commission.
- In view of the needs and requirements of the college as assessed by the Committee and the financial difficulties faced by the college during the last 8-10 years and the recommendations of the university in support of the proposal of the college and the fact that the college has not so far received any assistance from the Commission for its postgraduate courses, it is recommended that assistance may be provided to the college for the following programmes:

The Committee visited the Chhatisgarh Postgraduate College, Raipur on 21st and 22md August 1970 and discussed the proposal of the College for the development of postgraduate studies in Political Science amd Public Administration with Shri B.C. Srivastava, the Principal of the college, and members of the staff and members of the managing committee. The main observations and recommendations of the committee are as under:-

- The Chhatisgarh College was established in 1938 and is the oldest institution in Chhatisgarh division imparting instruction for university level courses. The college is at present offering postgraduate courses in two subjects viz. Political Science and Public Administration. Permission to offer post-graduate teaching in Political Science was accorded to the college in 1949. The postgraduate course in Public Administration has been started from the current academic session.
- (b) M.A. courses in Political Science are offered by two more institutions in the town viz. Durga Mahavidyalaya, Raipur and the Government Girls Degree College, Raipur. The Chhatisgarh College is, however, able to attract a fairly large number of students to its post, graduate course as shown below:-

- (c) The staff in the Department of Political Science consists of the principal who is the head of the department, one assistant professor and two lecturers. The staff in the department of public administration comprises one assistant professor and one lecturer. The teacher/pupil ratio of 1:25 in Political Science and 1:45 in public administration is highly unsatisfactory.
- (d) The examination results of the college during the last two years have been excellent. The pass percentage was 91 at the M.A. (final) Political Science examination in 1968-69 and 93 in 1969-70.
- (e) The college is situated in a relatively backward area of Madhya Pradesh and has in fact passed through a period of financial stringency. The buildings and furniture in the class-rooms are inadequate for meeting the needs of a post-graduate college. The library of the college is also illequipped, both in regard to the reading seats and the number of volumes on the shelves. The college has, however, been able to overcome some of the difficulties by local contribution and through a lottery instituted by it about two years ago.
- (f) It was noted that the Commission had during the third plan period sanctioned a total grant of Rs. 1,30,483/to the college (the share of the U.G.C. being limited to Rs. 66,741/-) for the appointment of additional staff, construction of building, purchase of furniture, equipment, books and journals. The schemes could not be implemented by the college as it was unable to provide its matching contributions. The sanction was subsequently withdrawn by the Commission in May 1966.
- (g) The committee was assured by the members of the managing committee and the principal of the college that the college is now in a position to provide its matching share in respect of the schemes that may be sanctioned by the University Grants Commiss ion.
- (h) It was noted that one of the schemes for which the college had sought the assistance of the Commission is in regard to the extension of the building on the first floor of the college. The Committee, however, found that a part of the extension has already been completed by the college. This includes the construction of two lecturers halls, a library and a seminar room. The expenditure incurred by the college of extension of the building, including bills to be paid amounts to approximately Rs. 88,000/-. It would be difficult for the

Commission to assist the college towards the part of the building which has already been completed. The Commission may, however, consider sympathetically the question of giving assistance to the college for the remaining part of the building viz. 3 lecture halls and one staff room.

(i) In view of the needs and requirements of the college as assessed by the Committee and the financial difficulties faced by the college during the last 8-10 years and the recommendations of the university in support of the proposal of the college and the fact that the college has not so far received any assistance from the Commission for its postgraduate courses, it is recommended that assistance may be provided to the college for the following programmes.

The University Grants Commission accepted in February 1970 the recommendation of the Area Studies Committee that an expert committee may visit the Rajasthan University to examine its proposal for the development of the South Asia Study Centre. Accordingly, a committee consisting of the following members was appointed to discuss the proposal with the university authorities:

The Committee visited the South Asia Studies Centre of the Rajasthan University on September 3, 1970 and discussed the proposal with Professor S.P. Verma, the Director of the Centre and his colleagues.

- 2. The report of the Committee is attached (Annexure).
- 3. The main observations and recommendations of the Committee are as under:-
 - (a) The South Asia Studies Centre at the Rajasthan University has a good record of research done

during the past seven years. All the research projects which have either been completed or are at various stages of preparation reveal that their exclusive concern has been it the governmental system and politics of South Asian countries, namely, India, Pakistan, Nepal, Ceylon and Afghanistan.

- (b)... Although the conceept of area studies necessarily implies studies and research on an inter-departmental basis. the committee thinks that the focus of studies in the South Asia Studies Centre at Rajasthan University need not be changed to conform to some theoretical framework which is not immediately at:tainable in the university.
- Fellowships and research associateships available with (c) the South Asia Studies Centre are, in theory, open to all social science; students but, in practice, most of these fellowships are availed of by the students of the Political Science departments. The Centre might consider, the possibility of making fuller use of its fellowships to attract first-class students of other disciplines to undertake research in the Centre.
- (d) The committee noted that all the books of the Political Science Department and also of the South Asia Studies Centre are located in the central library of the University where they are accessible to the students of other social sciemces. It is understood that the University library will provide, as soon as the new library wing is ready, separate space for books and journals concerned with South Asian Studies.
- (e) The committee does not think that provision for language teachers (Urdu; Bengali, Nepali, Sinhali) is an immediate need. Even part-time language teachers will have very little work considering the number of students who are engaged im South Asian studies at the Centre. The needs of the (Centre could be met adequately by sending its studemts to Delhi where there are adequate facilities for teaching these languages.
- (f) The need for establishing documentation facilities is The Centre may be helped in establishing this obvious. facility.
- Schemes like travel grant for teachers and research **(**g) scholars for going abroad, junior research fellowships for students of South Asian countries outside India, national seminars, and visiting lecturers from South Asian countries and publication grants could be considered by the Commission on merit whenever a proposal is received from the University in this behalf.

Draft report of the committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposals of the Rajasthan University for the development of its South Asia Study Centre.

The University Grants Commission accepted in February 1970 the recommendation of the Area Studies Committee that an expert committee may visit the Rajasthan University to examine its proposal for the development of the South Asia Study Centre. Accordingly, a committee consisting of the following members was appointed to discuss the proposal with the university authorities:-

The committee visited the South Asia Studies Centre of the Rajasthan University on September 3, 1970 and discussed the proposal with Professor S.P. Verma, the Director of the Centre and his colleagues.

Present Position:

of Rajasthan in October 1963 in the Department of Political Science. In July, 1966 the university accepted a grant from the Asia Foundation which comprised of rupee and foreign exchange assistance to be provided by the Foundation over a period of three years. The rupee funds were to be utilised to cover the salary of one staff member, 2 senior and 3 junior research fellowships and costs associated with bringing foreign specialists from neighbouring countries. The grant also provided for the establishment of a revolving publication fund and for seminars. The foreign exchange component of the grant was to be utilised by the members of the teaching staff for visiting countries in South Asia Region in connection with their research and for buying specialised materials for the library. The university accepted this assistance with the concurrence off the University Grants Commission.

With the closure of the activities of the Asia Foundation in India, the university of Rajasthan approached the Commission to support its programme of the South Asia Centre. On the recommendation of the Advisory Committee on Area Studies, the Commission accepted in May 1968 and proposal of the university of Rajasthan for assistance under the Area Studies programme for the development of the South Asia Study Centre and sanctioned the following facilities upto 1973-74 outside the fourth plan allocation of the university, subject to the condition that the recurring expenditure on this scheme would be meet by the university/state government after the Commission's assistance ceased in 1973-74:

1. Library

2. One Reader

Rs. 36,000/-

3. Two Senior Research Fellowships.

Ps. 42,000/-

4. Three Junior Research Fellowships.

Rs. 1,45,000/-

Courses offered at various levels:

At present the South Asia Study Centre is offering courses relating to political system of South Asian countries in the B.A.(Hons) and postgraduate course in Political Science. In addition, the Centre has a post-graduate diploma course of one year in international relations in which one of the papers is on Area Studies with special reference to government and politics in the South Asia Region. There is another Post-M.A. Diploma course in Indian government and politics in which students have to offer a paper on politics of developing countries. The proposed third Post-M.A. diploma course in South Asian Studies in entirely devoted to the Area Studies of this region. A fuller description of the courses having a bearing on South Asia studies offered by the Centre is attached (Appendix I).

The staff of the department of Political Science of the university of Rajasthan consists of two professors, three readers and 17 lecturers. The staff of the South Asia Studies Centre consists of the Hony Director, one research Associate, two senior and three junior fellows, one university research fellow and one UGC research fellow.

Proposals of the Centre:

The Director of the Centre placed before the committee his proposals for the devellopment of the Centre during the fourth five year plan. These incliude: 2 research associates in the lecturer's grade, 5 language teachers on an honorarium of k, 200/- p,m. 1 stenographer, 1 peon, a documentation Centre, 2 senior research fellowships in the grade off a lecturer, 2 junior research fellowships, assistance towards foreign experts and visiting lecturers from foreign countries of South Asian region, travol grant for teachers and research scholars, junior research fellowships for students of the South Asian countries outside India, national seminars, library

development and contingencies. The estimated expenditure of these proposals for the period ending 19172-73 was estimated by the Centre to be of the order of over \$.4.50,000/-.

The Centre proposes to undertake research under the following broad categories during the rest out the fourth plan period:

- 1. A study of the infra-structure and the emerging political system in South Asian countries.
- 2. A study of the contemporary political systems in South Asian countries.
- 3. A study of the political systems in South Asia in the regional and intermational set up.
- 4. Foreign policy and political development in Pakistan, Nepal, Ceylon and Afghainistan.
- 5. Short-term projects on:
 - i. Federal Problems in Pakistan
 - ii. Role of Judiciary in Pakistan
 - iii. Political Development in Bhutan and Sikkim.
 - iv. China and the Himalayan Kingdoms.
 - v. Emerging Elite in Neppal (coming up as a result of the working of Panchayati Raj Institutions).
 - vi. Islam and Modernisat: ion in Pakistan 1958-68.
- 6. Bureaucracy in South Asiian countries.

Details of these projects are given in Appendix II (Attached.)

Observations of the Committee:

- l. The South Asia Studies Centre at the Rajasthan University has a good record of research done, during the past seven years. A statement indicating research projects (Ph.D. dissertations) completed and under preparation, books and monographs published and ready for press and on-going research projects is attached (Appendix III).
- 2. All the research projects which have either been completed or are at various stages of preparation reveal that their exclusive concern has been with the governmental system and politics of south asian countries, namely India, Pakistan, Nepal, Ceylon and Afghanistan. This confirms the belief that the studies conducted by the Centre are based almost exclusively in the Political Science department of the university.
- 3. It was understood that there is some provision for interdisciplinary teaching at the M.A. stage. The students of the political science department can offer two out of eight papers in the departments of Sociology, Public Administration or Economics. Similarly students of M.A. in Public Administration Study a number of papers in the Political Science Department. A number of students of M.A. final



class in Political Science have offered two papers namely Public Finance and elements of statistics, including the sources of Indian economic data, in the departmeent of Economics. It was also understood that there have been somme cases of the selection of postgraduate students in Roonomics. Public Administration and Sociology as senior or junior research flellows under the programme of South Asian Studies. The Director ouf the Centre indicated that there is a committee consisting of the Heads of the Departments of Economics, Political Science, Public Administration, Sociology and Statistics which has framed the courses of study for the Post- M.A. diploma in South Asian Studies and whilch is responsible for the selection of research staff of the Centre. Notwithstanding this, it can be stated that the South Asian Study Centre is based in the Political Science department of the university and that its activities are focussed almost entirely on the governmental system and politics of South Asia. Although the concept of area studies necessarily implies studies and research con an interdepartmental basis, the committee thinks that the focus of studies in the South Asia Studies Centre at Rajasthan University need not be changed to conform to some theorteical framework whiich is not immediately attainable in the university.

- 4. Ideally, the programme of area study in the Centre should have by now found its roots im the departments of Sociology, Economics, Public Administration and Statistics, This, however, has not happened and these departments, it is understood, do not have any arrangements whereby their students could offer optional papers in the department of Politicall Science. Part of the reason may be that the heads of these departments, though members of a committee responsible for framing all courses and for selection of research staff of the South Asia Studices Centre, do not seem to be actively associated with the teaching and research conducted by the Centre. The Heads of these departments could perhaps have been invited to a discussion with the present committee and this should have been of some advantage to the Centure.
- 5. As already indicated above, fellowships and research associatships available with the South Asia Studies Centre are, in theory, open to all social schence students but in practice most of these fellowships are availed of by the students of the Political Science departments. The Centre might consider the possibility of making fuller use of its fellowships to attract first-class students of other disciplines to under take research in the Centre.
- 6. The committee was given a rather ambitious proposal for strengthening the library with a non-recurring grant of k.1.00,000/and recurring grant of k.10.000/- during the fourth plan period. Discussion with the Director of the Centre and the librarian of the Rajasthan University revealed! that this assistance would be utilised for Xerox Machine, duplicating equipment, micro-film equipment and for acquiring copies of four or five daily newspapers of four or five countries in the region brought out during the past 25 years. This expenditure did not seems to be of an urgent nature considering the fact that in the B.A.(Homs) course in Political Science there are not more than 8 or 10 students and not many students offer South Asia Studies as an optional subject at the postgraduate level. The Post-M.A. Diploma in international affairs had 16 students in 1968-69, 3 in 1969-70 and 12 during the current year. There are hardly any facilities in the affiliated colleges of Rajasthan.



University for offering coursess in South Asia Studies or conducting research in this particular fieeld nor is Rajasthan University so located that students from other parts of the country would readily utilize the library holdings off the Rajasthan University. Facilities for acquiring newspapers and periodical literature will have to be built up gradually and perhaps at a Centre which is already developed and is easily accessible to scholars from other parts of the country. It is, however, recognised that the library of the South Asia Studies Centre needs to be strengthened.

- The committee noted that all the books of the Political Science Department and also of the South Asia Studies Centre are located in the central library off the university where they are accessible to the students of other sociall sciences. It is understood that the university library will provide, as soon as the new library wing is ready, a separate space for books and journals concerned with South Asian Studies.
- The committee does not: think that provision for language teachers (Urdu, Bengali, Nepali, Sinhali) is an immediate need. Even part-time language teachers will have very little work considering the number of students who are engaged in south asian studies at the Centre. The needs of the Centre could be met adequately by sending its students to Delhi where there are adequate facilities for teaching these languages. This should neet be difficult in view of the fact that the students of the Centre are reported to be frequently visiting the School of International Studies, Jawaharlal Nehru University, New Delhi for consulting its library.
- The need for establishing documentation facilties is obvius. The Centre may be helped in establishing this facility.
- 10. Schemes like travel greant for teachers and research scholars for going abroad, junior research fellowships for students of south asian countries outside India, mational seminars, and visiting lecturers from south asian countries and publication grants could be considered by the Commission on merit whenever a proposal is received from the university in this behalf.

I. A Study of the Infra-s tructure and the Emerging Political Systems in South Asian Countries.

Under this heading a study of the historical, anthropoligical, sociological, economic, demographic and other back-grounds of the various countries of the region could be made. Separate studies of each country from each aspect might lead to nearly two dozen monographs.

Studies in Comparative Politics could also be carried on in this field.

The Centre is thinking of taking up the following studies:

- (1) Role of Religion in -
 - (a) Ceylon and Burma (Buddhism)
 - (b) India and Nepa.1 (Hinduism)
 - (c) Pakistan and A.fghanistan (Islam)
- (2) Role of Languages in South Asta
 - (a) Attitudes towards the imperial language-A Comparative study of India, Pakistan, Ceylon, etc. could be made.
 - (b) Decision-making processes regarding the fixing up of official language/languages.
 - (c) Relationship between two official languages (Pakistan, Cey'long, Afghanistan).
 - (d) Problems arising out of the official language of one country being the language of large section of people of another country (Bengali in East and West Bengal).
- (3) Minorities in South Asia. This could be broken up in several projects.
- (4) South Asia in the United Nations A Study in Intraregional relationships.
- A Study of the Contemporary Political Systems in South Asian Countries both in their (a) organisation (structure), and (b) working (functions).

This study also could be carried on country-wise, and could be broken up into a more detailed study of the political institutions (legislature), executive, judiciary, civil service, political parties, pressure groups, interest-groups, public opimion, etc. etc.) both on a demestic and intra-regional basis.



- III. A Study of the Political Systems in South Asia in the Regional and International set-up. This would involve a study of the foreign policies of different South Asian States, which could be further broken up into the study of relations of each country with (a) major world powers, and (b) with each neighbouring country. Several studies of the problems and prospects involved in the development of South Asia as a region could also be made.
- IV. We also propose to take up a number of studies in an entirely virgin field of Political Science. Political Science studies, even in their advanced stage in the United States today, are generally demarkated into two independent sectors. -
 - (a) Domestic Politics and
 - (b) Foreign Policies.

The Princeton University publications on Political Development, for example, deal with Communications and Political Development, Bureaucracy and Political Development, Political Parties and Political Development, Political Parties and Political Development, Education and Political Development, etc. but there is mo volume on Foreign Policy and Political Development. A study of inter-relationships and inter-dependence between the two is likely to throw up a completely new dimension in Political Science. The Centre could take up studies like -

- (i) Foreign Policy and Political Development in Pakistan
 (ii) " " in Nepal
 (iii) " " in Ceylon
 (iv) " " in Afghanistan
- V. The Centre has a number of short-term research projects, on which it proposes to start work at the earliest. A few are listed below:-
 - (1) Federal Problems in Pakistan
 - (2) Role of Judiciary in Pakistan
 - (3) Political Development in Bhutan and Sikkim
 - (4) China and the Himalayan Kingdoms.
 - (5) Emerging Elite in Nepal (coming up as a result of the working of Panchayati Raj Institutions).
 - (6) Islam and Modernisation in Pakistan, 1958-68.
- VI. Bureaucracy in South Asian Countries.

Studies in the bureaucratic sturctures and their operationalised behaviour could be made both on the basis of individual countries as well as on a comparative basis.

Item No.10: To consider the report of the Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to examine the proposal of the Government College satus for the development of postgraduate studies.

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The University Grants Commission appointed a Committee consisting of the following members, to assess the requirements of the Government College, Satna (Awadesh Prattap Singh University, Rewa) for the development of its post-graduato departments of Chemistry, Mathematics, Political Science, Economics and Findi:

The Committee visited the college on 18th September, 1970 and had discussions with Shri M.G. Nene, the Principal of the College and Heads of the postgraduate departments concerned regarding the proposal of the college for the construction of library and laboratory buildings, appointment of additional teaching staff and purcahse of books & journals and equipment. The Committee also had a general discussion with the teachers of the college on various issues concerning the standards of teaching.

The report of the Committee is attached (Annexure).

The main observations and recommendations of the Committee are as under:

(a) It is felt that the existing staff strength of the college, viz. one Professor, ome Assistant Professor and five Lecturers in Chemistry; one Professor, one Assistant Professor and two Lecturers in Mathematics; one Professor, two Assistant Professors and two Lecturers in Pol. Science and two Assistant Professors and three Lecturers in Hindi, is adequate considering that the enrolment in NoA./M.Sc. classes is limited to a maximum of 20 students in each cubject and could be increased to 40 after 5 years from the date of starting postgraduate classes in a subject.



- (b) The main problem facing the college in so far as the teaching staff is concerned is that of frequent transfers, sometimes during the middle of the session. The Committee would suggest that the University and the State Government may consider the desirability of having a convention that no teacher would be transferred for atleast five years, except under special circumstances.
- (c) As the construction of the first floor of the college building in the new campus may take some time, it is suggested that the science classes (B.Sc. and M.Sc.) may be shifted to the new campus as early as possible, i.e. after provision is made for sanitary and electrical installations and furniture and equipment. The humanities and social science departments may be shifted only after the first floor of the building has been completed. It would also seem desirable that new furniture is provided to the college and the Commission shares the expenditure in this respect in so far as M.Sc. Chemistry laboratories are concerned.
- (d) The question of putting up a library may be considered after the first floor of the building is completed and the humanities and social science departments are likely to be shifted to the new campus.

The Committee visited the college on 18th September 1970 and had discussions with Shri M.G. Nene, the Principal of the college and Heads of the postgraduate departments concerned regarding the proposal of the college for the construction of library and laboratory buildings, appointment of additional teaching staff and purchase of books & journals and equipment. The committee also had a general discussion with the teachers of the college on various issues concerning the standards of teaching.

The Government College, Satna was established in 1948 and is at present affiliated to Awadesh Pratap Singh University. In all, the Awadesh Pratap Singh University has 39 colleges, of which 25 are private colleges and the remaining 14 are Government Colleges. 11 of the 14 Government colleges offer instruction up to the postgraduate level. In Satna itself, which is a small township with a population of about 85,000 there are four colleges, viz. Kamla Nehru Girl's Degree College, Law College, Vanijya Mahavidyalaya (all under the same governing body) and the Government College. Vanijya Mahavidyalaya offers B.Com. and M.Com. courses and the M.A. course in Economics.

The Government College, Satna offers courses for B.A. (English, Hindi, Pol. Science, Economics, History and Sanskrit) B.Com. M.A. (Hindi, Economics and Pol. Science) and M.Sc. (Chemistry and Mathematics). Postgraduate classes in Economics, Mathematics and Chemistry were started in 1965 and in Hindi and Pol. Science in 1967.

There were 1828 sttudents in the college in 1969-70 719 in B.A., 801 in B.Sc., 122 inn B.Com., 152 in M.A. and 34 in M.Sc. Admissions during the current year are still going on as there were large scale disturbances iin the college during 1969-70 as also cases of unfair means in the examinations, leading to cancellation of the regular examinationns in March-April, A special examination was held in July 1970 for B.A./B.Sc. and in August 1970 for M.A./M.Sc. So far, the college has addmitted 765 students, 268 in B.A., 399 in B.Sc., 57 in B.Com., 22 inn M.A. 18, in M.Sc. and one for Ph.D.

With effect from the current academic session, the Madhya Pradesh Government has laid down an intake of 10 for M.A./M.Sc. Previous and 10 for M.A./M.Sc. Previous and 10 for M.A./M.Sc. Final in each subject, provided that the number of seats in the previous and final classes can be doubled after five years, from the date of starting postgraduate classes in the subject. This would imply that the college could plain for a maximum number of 40 students in each post-graduate subject: in regard to additional staff, library & laboratory facilities, class-rooms, etc.

The College is att present housed in an old and dilapidated building which was meant too serve as a rest house of the ex-Ruler of Rewa. The building is not only functionally unsuitable for a college imparting instruction upto the postgraduate level but even class-room accommodation, library and laboratory facilities are grossly inadequate for meeting the present requirements of the college. Laboratories are ill-equipped and furniture in the class rooms is not only out-dated but has outlived its utility. The library of the college is housed in a small ill-ventilated room with no reading seats for estudents.

The college has put up a new building at a distance of about 4 kilometres from thee city on the Satna - Rewa road. The total area available for the college campus is 84 acres. The ground floor of the building has theen completed, except in regard to sanitary and electrical insstallations which were tempered with as the Government did not provide the services of a watchman. The building has nine rooms of 25' x 35' and eight rooms of 15' x 25'. The building could provide adequate accommodation for the present student enrolment after the first floor is allso completed. The plans of the building, however, do not include thee provision for a spacious library,

The college library has a collection of 12,000 books which is inadequate considering the emrolment of about 1800 in the college. The number of books in subjects in which the college offers instruction at the postgraduate level is also very limited. There are 600 books in Chemistry, 1000 in Mathematices, 950 in Economics, 2000 in Hindi and 900 in Pol. Science. The number of journals subscribed to varies from 2 to 4 in subjects like Cheemistry, Economics, and Political Science.

Considering the inadequacy of the physical and academic facilities in the college, it iss surprising that the college is able to produce good results. The peass percentage was 93 in M.Sc. (Chemistry), 50 in M.Sc. (Mathematics), 92 in M.A. (Pol.Science) and 100 in M.A. (Economics) and M.A. (Hindi). in 1968-69 (the results of postgraduate examinations held iin 1969-70 are yet to be declared). This phenomenon can to some exteent be attributed to the fact that the college has good staff selected by the Public Service Commission.

The main recommendations of the committee regarding the proposal of the college for the development of postgraduate studies in the Humanities, Social Sciences and Science subjects are as under:

- (a) It is felt that the existing staff strength of the college, viz. one Professor, one Assistant Professor and five Lecturers in Chemistry, One Professor, One Assistant Professor and two Lecturers in Mathematics, one Professor, two Assistant Professors and two Lecturers in Political Science and two Assistant Professors and three lecturers in Hindi, is adequate considering that the enrolment in M.A/M.Sc. classes is limited to a maximum of 20 students in each subject and could be increased to 40 after 55 years from the date of starting postgraduate classes in a subject. There may also be some difficulty in sanctioning additional staff in a Government College, since the incumbents are transferable. The college authorities also agreed with the view of the committee that the need for additional teachers was not of an urgent nature.
- (b) The main problem fascing the college in so far as the teaching staff is concerned is that of frequent transfers, sometimes during the middle of the sessiom. In fact, most of the teachers whom we met including the Principal of the college had joined the college on transfer with effect from the present academic session. This is a serious matter affecting not only the continuity of instruction, but also the teacher-student relationship and the devotion of the teachers and their identification with the institution. The committee would suggest that the University and the Government may consider the desirability of hawing a convention that no teacher would be transferred for atleast five years, except under special circumstances.
- of the college building in the mew campus may take sometime. It is, therefore, suggested that the science classes (B.Sc. and M.Sc.) may be shifted to the new campus as early as possible, i.e. after provision is made for sanitary and ellectrical installations and furniture and equipment. The humanities and social science departments may be shifted only after the first floor of the building is completed.



It would also seem desirable that new furniture is provided to the college and the Commission shares the expenditure in this respect in so far as M.Sc. - Chemistry laboratories are concerned.

(d) It has already been mentioned that in the plans of the new building, adequate provision has not been made for a separate library. The question of putting up a library may be considered after the first floor of the building is completed and the humanities and social sciences departments are likely to be shifted to the new campus. The college could at the appropriate time seek assistance from the Commission for the purpose either under \$3.3 lakks scheme for the development of affiliated colleges or under the scheme for the development of postgraduate studies or both.

(e) The most urgent requirement of the college is in respect of library books, furniture and equipment as at present the college provides only a modicum of these facilities. The committee, therefore, recommends the following grants to the college towards the development of its postgraduate departments.

The Banaras Hindu University has proposed the establishment of a School of Education with the following aims and objectives:

- 1. To promote research and make research specialists available for Departments and colleges of education.
- 2. To provide opportunities for teachers from different subjects to collaborate and jointly conduct courses as well as research.
- 3. To create for teacher trainees and senior scholars of educational studies suitable "envirous" and climate which are at least as educative as the day to day class room programme.
- 4. To bring under one umbrella training of teachers at various levels.
- 5. "To extend to schools the findings of research conducted in the School and of relevance to teachers and school programmes."

The teachers college at Banaras Hindu University offers at present facilities for B.Ed. and M.Ed. and Doctoral work.

The following new courses are proposed to be introduced with the establishment of the School of Education:-

- 1. Ph.D. Course in Education with a view to giving the scholars training in thesis writing and methods of research together with prescribed advanced course work.
- 2. Two-Year M.A. Course in education as recommended by the U.G.C. review Committee on Education and the Education Commission.
- 3. Diploma in Advanced Techniques of Research meant for postgraduate and research students of related social science and disciplines and for persons working as principal investigators, project directors of various research agencies, the State Departments of education and State Institutes of Education.
- 4. Teaching Diploma and Certificate for pre-primary education to develop an integrated and compressive programme of training for teachers at various levels including Nursery schools, Kindergartens and classes for infants.
- 5. Diploma in the teaching of Hindi as a second language

It may be mentioned in this connection that the Commission has already agreed 'in principle' to develop the Central Institute of Education, Delhi as a School of Education during the Fourth Plan period. The Institute is being transferred from the N.C.E.R.T. to the Delhi University and it is understood that the Delhi University is working out the details of a proposal for developing the Institute into a School of Education.

The recommendation of the Education Commission with regard to the setting up of School of Education is reproduced below:-

In each selected university, a Department or Institute or preferably a School of Education should be established to develop research and training programmes in collaboration with other disciplines.

Its main functions would be:

- (1) to conduct undergraduate and postgraduate courses in education;
 - (2) to conduct courses in professional education for different categories of teachers - pre-primary, primary and secondary;
 - (3) to provide extension services to a few institutions of teacher education at all levels and to assist them to grow;
 - (4) to organise summer institutes and inservice programmes in subject content as well as in professional education;

- (5) to work in close collaboration with a few schools of all types with a view to developing research and evolving better curricula and techniques of teaching; and
- (6) to promote research in education, especially with an inter-disciplinary approach.

A practice should also be adopted of appointing eminent professors in different disciplines as part-time professors in the Schools of Education to explain new developments in their fields and the manner in which they will affect education at the school stage. Apart from the intrinsic value of such contacts for improving professional education itself, this measure will incidentally help in raising the status of professional education and in interesting leading intellectuals in school education.

Item No. 12: To consider the proposal of the University of Delhi for a special grant towards meeting matching contribution arising out of the implementation of the Agreement between the University (Centre of Advanced Study in Physics) and the International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste.

The proposal of the University of Delhi for special grant of Rs. 22,500/- towards meetting matching contribution arising out of the implementation of the Agreement between the University of Delhi (Centre of Adivanced Study in Physics) and the International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste was considered by the Commission at its meeting held on 2nd April 1969 (Item No. 15 (c) (Annexure I). The Commission desired that further information be obtained from Delhi University regarding the benefits derived from the agreement between Delhi University and the International Centre for Theoritical Physics, Trieste during the last two years and the matter brought up again before the Commission.

Accordingly, Prof. F.C. Auluck, Head of the Centre of Advanced Study in Physics has intimated that the Centre was able to send Dr. V.K. Gupta of the Physics Department to Trieste for a 12 week seminar on Nuclear Theorey from January 1969 to March, 1969 under this programme. The transport and the living expenses amounting to \$ 1500/- were provided to Dr. V.K. Gupta by the Trieste authorities from The seminar was extremely beneficial to their ruras. Dr. Gup... who was able, on his meturn, to share his experience with several of his Theoretical Physics colleagues at Delhi University. Prof. F.C. Auluck and Prof. A.N. Mitra also undertook visits to Trieste during 1968-69 and the Centre's proposal to depute one person to Triest this year has also been accepted. Prof. Auluck has indicated that further implementation of the agreement has however been kept in abeyance as the University could not meet its part of the financial obligations.

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The Centræ of Advanced Study in Physics, University of Delhi has approached the Commission for a special grant of 18,22,500/- (equivalent of \$7,3000) to meet matching contribution arising out of the implementation of an Agreement between the University of Delhi and the International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste, for the two years 1968 and 1969.

Under the Agreement, the Delhi University can send Scientific workers to Trieste, on the basis of parity of financial grants, with a maximum obligation of \$1,500 from wither side each year.

The proposal submitted by the Delhi University, which was referred to the Government of India in the Ministry of Education for clearance, did not imply any additional financial obligation to be borne by the Commission. It was expected that the matching share to the extent necessary would be met from out of the grants already provided for the Centre of Advanced Study in Physics, Delhi University under the heads 'Travels', 'visiting Fellows' and 'Other Expenditure'. The Head of the Centre has now intimated that it is not possible for the Centre to meet the matching contribution under the Agreement from out of the recurring grants approved under these heads. It is understood that the I.C.T.P. authorities have agreed to defer this obligation till the end of this year when a second amount of \$1500 for the year 1969 will also be due. Accordingly, a special grant of Pa22,500/- has been requested for the purpose. It has been further stated that in the absence of Commission agreeing to make available the necessary funds, the Federation Agreement may have to be terminated this year 1969. In any case the Commitments for 1968-69 will have to be met and payment of &.12,000 will have to be made for which a specific grant would be necessary as the Centres' funds have already been exhausted.

Item No.13: To consider a note from the Vice-Chancellor, Calcutta University, Calcutta, regarding the problems of the University and its proposal for future development.

The Government of India, Ministry of Education & Youth Services have forwarded a copy of the note which the Vice-Chancellor, Calcutta University alongwith some members of the Senate of the University handed over to the Education Minister on 3rd September 1970 regarding the problems of University and its proposals for future development for the consideration of the U.G.C. A copy of the note in question is attached (Annexure).

The Vice-Chancellor in his note, has discussed various problems being faced by the University on account of lack of finances, accommodation and physical facilities. The Development Committee of the University had provisionally calculated that the University would need a capital amount of &.2 crores in the next five years, in addition to the recurring grant of k.1 crore for the same period. The Vice-Chancellor has suggested that a Review Committee consisting of one representative each of the Ministry of Education & Youth Pervices, the U.G.C., the State Education Department and the Calcutta University may examine the various schemes of development of the University and suggest suitable measures for financing the approved projects. The Committee may give its report within 5 to 6 months so that the task of providing increased and better facilities for the students of the University could be taken up without much loss of time.

In this connection, the following are brought to the notice of the Commission:

- (a) The UGC had in 1958, appointed a Committee to consider the question of reducing number in the big colleges in the city of Calcutta. The report of the Committee was forwarded to the Government of West Bengal and in response, the West Bengal Government sent a proposal for establishing five new colleges in Calcutta. This was considered by the UGC in September 1962. The Commission agreed that non-recurring financial assistance be given to the Calcutta University for the creation of five new colleges subject to the condition that 50% of the non-recurring expenditure (excluding land) not exceeding a ceiling of Re6 lakks for each college be paid by the UGC. The Commission has, thus, to provide assistance to the extent of Re30 lakks to the five colleges in Calcutta. The amount has not been drawn by the colleges so far.
- (b) As a follow-up of the report of the Banaras Hindu University Enquiry Committee, the Commission had appointed a Committee to look into the amenities of the students in Banaras Hindu University. The Commission had accepted the report of the Committee and the programmes



of student amenities are being worked out by the University. The Commission also decided that the question of providing student amenities in other Centrall Universities and Calcutta University may also be looked into. A Committee has been appointed for this purpose.

- (c) The U.G.C. at its meeting held on 5th August 1970 while receiving a note on the imcrease in enrolment in colleges in Calcutta felt that as a matter of priority, in consultation with the Calcutta University, as study should be made of the minimum needs of the Calcutta colleges as regards library, laboratory, hostels and other essentials so that reasonable standards of education could be achieved for the very large and rapidly growing student population. The Commission suggested that the Committee to be appointed, may also examine the desirability and possibility of establishing University Centres and 'autonomous colleges' in Calcutta, on the lines proposed by the Education Commission. The views of the Commission had been brought to the notice of the Vice-Chancellor, Calcutta University and it was suggested to him that if he agreed with the approach of the Commission, he may suggest some names for the proposed Committee, which are awaited.
- The Vice-Chancellor along with some members of the Senate (d) of the University had discussions with the Chairman. UGC on 4th September, 1970 regarding some of the difficulties experienced by the University with regard to implementation of the development programmes. Another important item which was raised at the meeting was payment of maintenance grant to the colleges. It was pointed out that several colleges in Calcutta were experiencing difficulties with regard to payment of salaries to their teachers and the expenditure on running their institutions, and also the grant paid appeared to be very inadequate even to meet the minimum needs of the college. It was agreed that a meeting may be held as soon as possible between the State Covernment, the University and the UGC. Apart from the question of maintenance grant, the question of matching contribution to avail of the development grant from the UGC may also be discussed. The Commission accordingly, addressed the State Government of West Bengal who have now intimated that the State Government has already decided to appoint a Committee to go into the whole question of administration of affiliated colleges including the state of their finances.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

The University of Calcutta is unique in many respects. It is the oldest among the modern universities in India. In relation to its total student-enrolment, it is the largest University in the world. Its present student strength is about two hundred thousand taking account of its graduate and under-graduate students reading in its 54 Graduate Departments and more than 206 affiliated coileges. This year more than 95 thousand students have appeared at the B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. (Part I) examinations. Its graduate enrolment exceeds 13,000 studying in 7 University Colleges and other Departments.

Whatever its early glories, the University has now been facing great difficulties caused by its large size. The University has always suffered from extreme paucity of funds. The block grant given to the University by the State Government was fixed at 18.16 lakhs in 1951-52. It has not been increased since then, though the University has long been trying to induce the State Government to raise the grant. The financial position of this University is compared to some other Indian universities had been portrayed in the Convocation speech of the Vice-Chancellor for 1969. We have the largest number of students among Indian universities. But 10 other universities (Punjab, Kerala, Bombay, Madras, Bihar, Patna, Rajasthan, Gauhati, Mysore and Osmania) possessed larger revenued than we had in 1966-67. The University of Kerala had 1.40 lakh students - the second largest university - but had an income of Rs.180.35 lakhs, larger than ours by 64 per cent. The University of Punjab was the third in size - with an income which exceeded ours by 92 per cent. The Universities of Bombay and Madras - our sister in age - had about 50 per cent of the total number of students as compared to our University. But both of them possessed incomes which were 20 to 30 per cent higher than that of ours. In another place, the Vice-Chancellor had pointed out, - "If we take the case of the big affiliating universities, and include all students reading in the affiliated colleges, we shall see that in that year (1966-67) the Calcutta University received less than &.72 per student from all sources of income. The income-student ratio was, by comparison, &.192 in Madras University, &.171 in Bombay University, &.164 in Punjab University, &.165 in Burdwan University, %.129 in Kerala University and %.100 in North Bengal University."

The University had thus to look after the educational needs of the largest number of students with the lowest per capital income and a stationary block grant. The situation has become worse with the passing years. The number of students has risen by large percentages. As more and more students come out of the Higher Secondary Schools, they are clamouring for admission to the various courses in the colleges. The resulting pressure on colleges has forced the University to accept the demands of the colleges for the grant of affiliation to a large number of courses. The University in its turn has been forced to admit larger number of students to the different Post-Graduate courses without being in



a position to provide adequate facilities in accommodation, libraries, laboratories, etc. Even then, we have been able to admit only a very small section of the students who have passed the B.A., B.Sc. or B.Com. examination. In Physics, for example, we have been able to admit only such number of students as have secured at least 55 per cent marks in their Honours examination. In almost all other Science subjects it has not been possible to admit all the Honours students in spite of the opening of new sections or shifts in some of the Departments.

We are now very much cramped for space. Admission to more M.Sc. courses at the Science College campus at 92, Acharya Prafulla Chandra Road cannot be done as there is no more accommodation available in the old Building. The Departments of Physiology, Psychology and Applied Psychology have to remain satisfied with purely makeshift arrangements in accommodation. Bare justice requires that they should be provided with more space. The same is true with respect to the Department of Physics, which was once the pride of this University. Any one who walks in the corridors of the Asutosh Building which houses the Arts and the Commerce colleges during the full session will find it difficult to move freely on account of the very large number of students including lady students proceeding from one class to another. The University College of Commerce must have a new building if it is to provide the bare minimum facilities for its large number of students and to develop its research wing properly. Though the oldest University, Calcutta unfortunately lacks a Sociology Department, which cannot be established without a separate building. The University must also develop a mottern linguistics Department along with its Department of Comparative Philology. But this cannot be done in the extremely cramped space available in the Asutosh Building.

The University, is, therefore, preparing plans for opening a new Science campus, a Social Science campus and a separate Commerce College. It has set up a Development Committee which is dealing with the various projects for the development of the University both from the short-run and the long-run points of view.

This University is unfertunately passing through a period of scute student unrest which the present administration is trying to face as boldly as is possible under the circumstances. A considerable part of this student unrest has, of course, been due to the impact of current political forces operative in this State. But there is no doubt that a large amount of discomfort has been brought about by the lack of facilities for study available in this University, - crowded classes, inadequate lectures, insufficient laboratory and library facilities, very small student amenities for higher study, research, and amenities it would serve to neutralise a large amount of student unrest. The Vice-Chancellor has often to say to the demonstrating students that he cannot provide the facilities domaided by the students on account of lack of funds even though many of them may be just. The inevitable reply that the unfortunate Vice-Chancellor received from the students is that they are not concerned with "funds", but they must have those minimum facilities.

/etc. If the University is in a position to offer much better facilities

According to the provisional calculations of the Development Committee, the University would need a capital grant of two crores of rupees in the next 5 years. In addition, it would be necessary



to provide for recurring grants of about &.1 crores for 5 years. Long years of neglect by the successive State Governments coupled with the 'education explosion' has brought the University to this state when only a large-scale injection of funds will serve to put matters right. Inspite of everything this University is fortunate in having, almost every year, some of the best students of this country. What it now lacks is adequate physical facilities, accommodation, and funds. Given a solution of these deficiencies it will be able to contribute a lot to the advancement of learning in the country. The amount of funds that we need is at present beyond the resources of the State Government. Now that the governance of this State has become the responsibility of the President, and the Ministry of Education is headed by one of the most distinguished educationists of the country who is thoroughly familiar with the traditions and achievements of this University, we hope that the case of this long neglected University will be taken up seriously by the Union Government and all possible measures will be adopted for the smooth running and development of the oldest University of India. May we suggest the setting up of a small Review Committee consisting of one representative of the Union Ministry of Education, one of the U.G.C., one of the State Education Department and one of the Calcutta University to examine the various schemes of development of the University and to suggest suitable measures for financing the approved projects? The Committee may finish its work within 5 to 6 months so that the task of providing increased and better facilities for the students of the University may be taken up without much loss of time.

Item No.14: To further consider the proposal of the Gujarat University for setting up an Institute of Social Change.

The University Grants Commission, at its meeting held on 1st April, 1970 considered the proposal from Dr. Ramesh Shah of Seton Hall University, South Orange, New Jersey to set up an Institute of Social Change at the Gujarat University and desired that the proposal may be referred to the Indian Council for Social Science Research for advice. The Commission also desired that it may also be ascertained whether the Council could provide financial assistance towards the implementation of the proposed scheme (Resolution No.24 dated 1.4.1970).

The note placed before the Commission is attached (Annexure). The note gives the goals, programmes and techniques of the Institute. It has been suggested that the Institute may have a staff of 13 people consisting of the Director, Assistant Director, ten Associates and one Secretary. The Institute is to be located at the Gujarat University, Ahmedabadi and will be associated with the University School of Social Sciences and will have an autonomous organisation within the School. It is planned to start the Institute for a period of three years: the future to be determined by the availability of finances.

The matter was referred to the Indian Council of Social Sciences Research, as desired by the Commission. The Council is of the view that "it is entirely within the jurisdiction of the Commission to take a decision on the proposal and it would not be proper for the Council to offer any comments on the subject."

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

The University Grants Commission has received a proposal from Dr.Ramesh Shah of Seton Hall Urniversity, South Orange, New Jersey to set up an Institute of Socieal Change at the Gujarat University.

The goals of the Institute are as follows:-

- 1. Assist in the accelleration of the process of modernization of the social institutions.
- 2. Bring that synthesis of science, technology, and human relations which will provide the maximum benefit to every member of thee society.
- 3. Find that coordinatted arrangement of the social, political, and economic institutions which will accelerate the developmental process.

The Programmes and Techniques of the Institute are indicated below:-

- 1. The Institute will conduct problem-oriented studies that would identify factors of retardation and develop techniques of eliminating them.
- 2. It will examine resources and social institutions, and it would develop the programs of maximizing the use of resources in a suitable social framework.
- 3. It will examine the national programs of planning and development and develop proper arrangements of priorities and suitable allocation of resources for an accelerated nation—building process.
- 4. It will examine the status of science and technology and develop the methodis of adapting new technology and science to the Indian conditions.
- 5, It will study the factors disintegrating India and formulate programs, of integration and unity of India.
- 6. It will conduct specific studies such as:
 - a. Education reforms.
 - b. Transportatiom in cities.
 - c. Corruption in politics.
 - d. Influence of fforeign cultures.
 - e. Religious malpractices.
 - S. The role of youth in society.
 - g. The role of art and culture in social change.
 - h. Population comtrol.
 - i. The role of women in social change.
 - j. Introduction of technology to the rural society.



k. Preparation of the mmodern technological, scientific knowledge for the developments in India.

The number of such studies can be innumerable depending upon the need and resources.

- 7. It will conduct regular seminars on a specific problem or a community in order to develop practical programmees.
- 8. It will have a programme of training leaders who will work for different organizations to bring necessary change.

The Institutes will be located at Gujarat University, Ahmedabad. It will be associated with the University School of Social Sciences and will have an autonomous organization within the School.

It is planned to start the Institute sometime in 1970. Initially the Institute will be established for a period of three years and its future will be dietermined by the availability of finances.

It has been suggested that the Institute may have a staff of 13 people consisting of the Director, Assistant Director, 10 Associates, and one secretary. Dr.Ramesh Shah who is presently reported to be teaching at three institutions of higher learning and who is a consultant to two institutes for Urban Research and Planning in America has agreed to return to India and direct the operations of the Institute.

The Vice-Chancellor of the Gujarat University has informed the Commission that the Academic Council of the University has recommended that a department on the lines indicate above may be established in the University School of Social Sciences and that this recommendation is being placed before the appropriate authorities of the University for their approval. He has no doubt that it will be possible for the University to institute this department provided necessary financial assistance is made available to the university for the purpose. The Vice-Chancellor has inquired about the nature and the exteent of the assistance that the UGC would provide for this purpose.

Item No.15: To consider the position of development posts sanctioned and filled during the Third Plan period but nost continued by the Shivaji University during the Fourth Plan period.

On the basis of the report of the Visiting Committee appointed by the University Grants Commission to assess the requirements of the Shivaji University during the Third Plan period, the Commission accepted the development proposals of the University amounting to Rs.26,17,500/- The schemes included the post:s of one Professor in Economics, one Professor in English and a Reader in History. The University was informed that in the case of recurring expenditure on schemes which are of a permanent nature (i.e. staff), the Commission would provide assistance for the duration of the Third Plan only and that after the Plan period, the liability for the continuance of the schemes was to be borne by the University and/or State Government. The University was requestted to assure the Commission that the schemes of a continuing nature would be maintained by the University after the assistance from the Commission ceased at the end of the Third Pllan period. Later, the Commission agreed that assistance towards the appointment of staff may be provided for a period of five years to be counted from the financial year in which the scheme was approved by the Commission. Since the development schemes of the Shivaji University were approved iin September 1963, the assistance of the Commission was made available to the University for the period ending 31sst March, 1968.

The University filled all the posts sanctioned by the Commission during the Third Plan period, except that it appointed a Reader against the post of Professor in English accepted by the Commissiom. Grants on this account were claimed by the University upto 31st March, 1968.

The University was requested to confirm that the above posts were being continued during the Fourth Plan period with effect from Ist April, 1968. The Commission has been informed that the post of the Reader in History is lying vacant with effect from 197th September 1969 and the post of Professor in Economics with effect from 31st December, 1968. The post of Reader in English is, however, being continued by the University.

A statement indicating the number of posts in existence on 1.4.66 and the vacancies on 1.9.69 against sanctioned posts in the Humanities and Social Science departments of 31 Universities is attached (Annexure). Information from other universities is awaited. It will be seen that 33 of the 219 Professors' posts, 85 of the 402 Readers Posts and 164 of the 1141 Lecturers posts in these 31 universities were vacant on 1.9.1969.

Item No. 16: To further consider the proposal of the Poona University for the establishment of Centre of Latin American Studies.

In September, 1909 the University Grants Commission appointed a Committee consisting of the following members to examine the proposal of the Poona University for setting up of Centre for Latin American Studies.

- 1. Shri G. Para thasarthi, Vice-Chancellor, Jawaharlal Nehru University.
- 2. Shri V.H. Coelho, Secretary, Ministry of Esternal Affairs.
- 3. Prof. A.J. Dastur, Bombay University.
- 4. Dr. J.N. Kaul,
 Development (Officer,
 University Grants Commission.

The Committee made the following suggestions and recommendations:

- The Centre for Latin American Studies would undertake area studies and research in the economic, political and sociological fields in respect of the geographical areas of Central and South America and the Caribean.
- A pre-requisite for studies relating to this area would be proficiency in the Spanish and Portuguese languages, apart from English. (Though most of the Central and South American countries are Epamish speaking, Brazil which has a population of approximately one-third of the whole area has Portugese as its language). University personnel chosen for the Centre should therefore have or acquire, within a reasonable time, proficiency in Spanish and/or Portugese.
- 3. Personnel selected for the Centre should have an intrinsic interest in area studies relating to Latin America and be able to sustain a sense of commitment to the Centre over a period of years. They should also undertake to acquire proficiency in Spanish and/or Portugese within one or two years.

- In the proposed studies emphasis should be placed on the contemprary economic, political and sciological scene with such knowledge of history and culture as is necessary for a proper appreciation of that scene. In view of India's need to develop trade and economic: relations with the countries in the area, special importance should be given to economic studies.
- An Advisory Committee consisting of the professors who have sponsored the scheme to establish the Centre for Latin American Studies, a representative of the Ministry of External Affairs and of the UGC should be set up to guide the proposed Centre in formulating its broad policies and programmes of study, language, training and research. A senior member of the Advisory Committee will function as the Convener of the Committee and be responsible for its; functional activities.
- In the initial stages, after the selection of the personnel for the Centre has been carried out, attention would be directed towards acquiring the requisite language skills; (a) Spanish and (b) Portuguese Efforts would be made to conduct intensive courses in Spanish aimed at reaching the Advanced Level within a period of one year.
- For the purpose of Spanish studies, the offer of assistance made by the De Nobili College, Poona, may be availed of until such time as the University is able to have its own Spenish Language instructor. The Centre will also take early steps to recruit a Portuguese language instructor. The Centre could explore possibilities of getting qualified Spanish and Portuguese language Instructors through existing cultural or Educational Exchange Programmes with Latin American countries.
- 8. The building up of an up-to-date and comprehensive library (Documentation Centre) is also one of the initial steps required to be taken so that the centre has at its disposal primary source material for its studies and research. It would be desirable if the existing available literature on the area in the Gokhale Institute, etc., and the proposed additions, are located within the building where the Centre is proposed to function.
- 9. For the collection of books and journals, an approach could be made to the various Indian Missions in Latin in American countries to recommend comprehensive lists and to indicate availability either through purchase or as gifts. A similar approach could also be made to well-known centres of Latin American Studies in universities in the U.S.A. and Europe for information and guidance.
- 10. Simultaneously with the steps taken to select personnel, to give them necessary language instruction and to establish the library, the Advisory Committee will draw up the Centre'd programmes of study and research and an agreed order or priorities.
- 11. The Advisory Committee will seek to generate and sustain interest, both in India abroad, in the Centre's programmes of study and research. The Advisory Committee may also examine the possibilities of getting professors/scholars from abroad under cultural or Educational Exchange Programmes.

The financial implications of the recommendations of the Committee are given below:

The Commission at its meeting held on 5th November, 1969 accepted, in principle, the recommendations of the Committee for setting up a Centre for Latin American Studies at the Poona University and desired that views of the University and the Government of Maharashtra be invited regarding this. The University of Poona has informed that the Executive Council of the University has already accepted the proposal to set up a Centre for Latin American Studies and appointed a Committee to suggest to the Executive Council concrete steps to be taken in this regard. The Government of Maharashtra has stated that it cannot support the proposal of the University of Poona in view of the substantial financial liabilities to the State Government involved in the proposal after the assistance from the University Grants Commission ceases, at the end of 1973-74.

The Standing Advisory Committee on Area Studies at it meeting held on 6th August 1970 considered the matter and felt that in view of the reply of the Government of Maharashtra, there would be no advantage in setting up the Centre if it cannot be maintained after the UGC assistance ceases.

The question of setting up a Centre of Latin Americar Studies was also discussed at a meeting held in the Ministry of Education & Youth Services on 4th September 1970 between Shri B.K. Sanyal, Indian Ambassador in Argentina and the officials of the Ministry. The Ambassador stated that if it is not possible to establish a Chair in the Poona University, the question of establishing the same at some other University like awaharlal Nehru University, may be considered.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No.17: To consider the proposal of the Punjabi University for introducing correspondence course for the B.Ed.deg;ree.

The proposal of the Punijabi University to introduce correspondence courses for the B.Ed.Degree was placed before the Commission at its meeting; held on 2nd July, 1969. A copy of the note placed before the Commission in this connection is attached (Annexure). The Commission desired that the question of introduction of correspondence courses for B.Ed.Degree at the Punjabi University be referred to the Committee on Teacher Education.

The University, however, on reconsideration of its original scheme for the introduction of B.Ed.course as contained in the annexure attached proposed that the admission to the proposed B.Ed.correspondence course may be confined to the inservice teachers only as according to the latest statistics a large number of trained teachers were unemployed and the university would not like to add to the number of unemployed teachers. On the other hand the university felt that there was a considerable number of untrained teachers working in the government and private schools who had no excilities to take up teachers training course even though any of them had been doing teaching work for a number of years.

In pursuance of the decision of the Commission, the proposal of the Punjabi University for introduction of correspondence course at the B.Ed.level was referred to the Standing Advisory Committee on Teacher Education which met on 30th and 31st July, 1970.

The Committee while noting the review made by the four Regional Colleges of Education of the progress made in implementing the scheme of correspondence courses for B.Ed., felt that no high priority be given to the proposal at this stage. Inservice teachers of this region could avail of the facilities for B.Ed., correspondence course at one of the centres(four regional colleges, C.I.E. and Bangalore University which have facilities for correspondence course for B.Ed., students.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Copy of note placed before the Commission at its meeting held on 2nd July, 1969 vide Item No.69(ii).

The Punjabi University has requested the Commission for permission to start correspondence courses leading to the B.Ed. Degree through the medium of Punjabi except in the case of languages. The duration of the course would be one academic year for JBT/OT graduate teachers, and 18 months for untrained graduates. The estimated expenditure(less income) would be Rs.42,456/- per annum as detailed in Appendix.

The Commission has already approved the scheme of Punjabi University to introduce correspondence courses for PUC/B.A. (Resolution No.25 dated 7th February, 1968). The University has introduced correspondence courses for the following:

- (i) Preliminary Course in Punjabi One Year (Punjabi Praveshika)
- (ii) Honours in Punjabi(Gyani) One Year
- (iii) Pre-University One Year
- (iv) B.A. Three Years

It may be mentioned in this connection that the Central Institute of Education and the four Regional Colleges of Education at Bhopal, Ajmer, Bhubaneswar and Mysore are already conducting correspondence courses for the B.Ed.Degree. Information about these courses is given below:

The proposal of the Rajasthan University for starting M.Ed.classes and research in education was placed before the Commission at its meeting held on Ist July, 1970. A copy of the note placed before the Commission in this connection is attached (Annexure). The Commission desired that the proposal of the University may be referred to the Advisory Committee on Teacher Education and Research.

In pursuance of the decision of the Commission, the proposal of the Rajasthan University for setting up of a Department of Teacher Education was referred to the Standing Advisory Committee on Education which met on 30th and 31st July, 1970. The observation of the Advisory Committee on the proposal of the University is reproduced below:

"The Committee agreed that the proposal of the Rajasthan University for setting up a Department of teacher education may be accepted in principle and the proposal be examined by a Visiting Committee and that the matter may be considered by the University Grants Commission in the light of the report of the Visiting Committee".

The Rajasthan University has sent a proposal for starting M.Ed.classes and research in education.

A Diploma Course in Adult Education was started in the university from July, 1967. Recently, the Academic Council of the University has accepted, in principle, a proposal to change the name of this course to that of Bachelor's Degree in Adult Education and it is likely to be implemented from July 1971 after some changes have been made in the syllabus of the course to bring it to the level of the degree of Bachelor of Education. The students passing this course will be eligible for admission to the M.Ed.Course.

The University has stated that there are 14 teachers training colleges in Rajasthan but only three of them are affiliated for post-graduate studies and all of them are non-government colleges. The university proposes to develop the existing teaching unit of the Department of Adult Education into a full-fledged Department of Education by providing additional facilities for M.Ed.course and research. It is not intended to start B.Ed.classes as ample facilities are already available in the affiliated colleges. The University Department of Education will take up such optional areas for M.Ed. as are not offered by any affiliated college or which the University, in view of its better resources, can handle more efficiently than the affiliated colleges. It is proposed that the department may offer six optional areas.

The Rajasthan University has calculated that the department will need at least one professor, one reader and four lecturers and one research assistant. A provision of Rs.5,000/- per year is considered desirable for visiting lecturers and a provision of Rs.10,000/- per year for purchase of books and journals. Two junior fellowships of Rs.300/-p.m. and one senior fellowship of Rs.500/-p.m. will be necessary for research. The department would need additional space. It is estimated to cost Rs.50,000/- The financial implications of the proposal are given below:

Item No. 20: To consider a proposal of the Madhabdev College, Dikrong (Dibrugarh University) for financial assistance for the construction of a women's hostel.

The Dibrugarh University has sent a proposal of the Madhabdev College, Dikrong (North Lakhimpur), for the construction of a Women's hostel for 58 students at an estimated cost of Rs. 3,27,074/- (including Rs. 8,700/- for furniture). The built up area of the proposed hostel building is within the norms suggested by the Commission for hostel buildings.

The College, established in 1964, is affiliated to the Dibrugarh University. The student enrolment during the last four years was as follows:-

The Principal has stated that about 100 girl students desire hostel accommodation. The Acting Vice-Chancellor, Dibrugarh University has stated:

"The Madhabdev College has rightly decided to construct one 58 seated women's hostel. It is true that the present enrolment of girls in the college is less than that number and the enrolment varies from year to year. For example while last year the enrolment of girl students in the college was 21, it has almost tripled to 58 this year. And many students who would normally like to join Madhabdev College have to go to other places because Madhavdev College is unable to provide residential accommodation".

Dr. B.R. Seth, Vice-Chancellor, earlier strongly recommended the proposal of the college and informed the Commission as under:-

"I visited the college and found it to be very well run. The students are excellent and disciplined. They need accommodation very badly".

No assistance has so far been provided to the college for projects covered by the financial ceiling of Rs. three lakhs.

If the proposal of the college is accepted, the Commission's grant @n75% will be limited to Rs. 2,45,305/- against the estimated cost of Rs. 3,27,074/-.

Item No. 21: To consider the request of M.R. Government Sanskrit College, Vizianagram (Andhra University) for a centenary grant of Rs. one lakh

The Andhra University has recommended that a centenary grant of Rs. one lakh may be provided by the Commission to the M.R. Government Sanskrit College, Vizinagaram, for teaching accommodation, a library hall and an open-air theatre, and has stated as under:

"The college has been in existence for over a century and has a most creditable record of work to its credit. This age-old institution has been rendering valuable service in teaching oriental languages in the traditional Vedic system, and it has the unique distinction of producing hundreds of renowned scholars in South India. The Vice-Chancellor was invited to this institution and he was greatly impressed by the utter devotion with which the teachers are doing their work....This is an institution out of the ordinary. The Vice-Chancellor strongly recommends that the U.G.C. may see its way in helping the college at the time of its centenary celebrations."

A note on the history and achievements of the institution sent to the Commission by the Andhra University is attached (Annexure).

The College came into existence in 1860, and has intimated that it was then affiliated to the Sanskrit College, Banaras. The college was affiliated to the Madras University in 1911. Since 1961, it is an affiliated college of the Andhra University. The college was taken over by the Government of Andhra Pradesh in 1949. It has been certified that the institution has been functioning continuously as a Sanskrit College from its inception in 1860. The college is on the list under 2(f) of the U.G.C. Act, and has a student enrolment of 197. No assistance has so far been provided to the college.

A centenary grant of Rs. one lakh is provided to an institution which has either existed as an affiliated college for 100 years, or has completed at least 50 years of its existence as an affiliated college and the remaining period as a recognised school.

The matter is put up for the Commission's consideration.

Government M.R. Sanskrit College, Vizianagram

BRIEF HISTORY AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Early in 1860 His Highness Maharaja Sri Vijayarama Gajapati Raj, K.C.S.E., founded the Institution with a great love for Bharateeya Dharma - Vedic Culture and Sanskrit, Shastras and Learning. His Son, High Highness Maharajah Ananda Gajapati Raj, G.C.I.E., encouraged it still further and learned Pandits enjoyed every privilege and High esteem. All branches of Sanskrit Learning flourished eloquently.

In 1900 the College attained a new status. Under Dr. K. Ramajujachari, M.A., B.L., D.Lit, who served as the First Principal from 1900 to 1928, the Institution grew from strength to strength.

Originally it was affiliated to the Benares Sanskrit College and served as a Centre for all Examinations for the whole of South India.

In 1911 the Madras University framed rules regulating Oriental Studies and introduced Examinations to award Oriental Titles. This College was one of the foremost Institutions recognised as a Sanskrit College. It was for a long period the only College serving the needs of South India in general and Andhra Pradesh in particular. Since then, studemts are going for examination continuously thus keeping safe the traditional ritage of Indian culture and learning at its glory.

When Andhra University, Waltair, has been formed the College has come into its territory from 1927-28.

It is keeping pace with the changing times. The Maharajas of Vizianagram maintained it very carefully and efficiently. A nice building and a rich Library and their gifts to the Institution besides other amenities created for the scholars.

On the abolition of the Zamindaris, the College has come into the direct management of the Government of the State from 1949 to 1955.

It now consists of a College section, a High School Section and a Vedic Section.

Lecturers of the College and Vedic Section are brought under the purview of the UGC scales with effect from 1.4.1966.

The Institution provides instruction and prepares pupils for the following examinations:

- 1. Bhasha Praveena Sanskrit and Telugu Equal to M.A.degrec. 2. Vidya Praveena - Sanskrit Main :
 - a) Sahitya Equal to M.A.Degree
 - b) Vyakarana- -do-
 - c) Nyaya -do-

Further Rigveda, Yujurveda and Samaveda Texts are taught by Indian ancient Methods.

Maham hopadhyas, Kala Prapurnas, Celebrated Poets were produced through this Great Institution and Vedic Pandits in large numbers flourished. This is certainly a great achievement. The Lecturers and Pandits have produced standard works on Sanskri Grammar and the Books have won International Recognition. It now endeavours to continue to serve the country at its best.

Item No. 22: To consider the proposal of Smt.V.G.College of Arts and Science for Women, Gulbarga for the construction of a women's hostel.

The proposal of Smt. V.G..College of Arts and Science for Women, Gulbarga for the comstruction of a hostel for 80 students was accepted by the Commission in Feb., 1970. Against an estimated cost of \$3.57.590/- (building: \$3.45.590/- plus furniture: \$.12,000/-) the Commission's contribution for the project was limited to \$3.2.60,7755/-.

The college undertook the construction of the building soon after submitting its proposal to the Karnatak University, prior to the Commission's approval. The building has been completed, but an additional kitchen and dinning block for vegeterian students has also been constructed. The built up area has thus been increased from 16,467 sq.ft. to 22,069 sq.ft. The cost of the building as certified by the P.W.D. is &.4,53,900/- as against the estimated cost of &.3,45,288/-.

The report of an officer of the Commission and the Registrar, Karnatak University, who visited the college on 25th September, 1970 is attached (Annexure).

The following suggestions are made for the Commission consideration:

- (1) In view of the pressing need for hostel accommodation, the commencement of the construction of hostel before the Commission's approval was obtained, may not be objected to.
- (2) Since the college agreed to great the cost of the excess area constructed, the Commission's contribution of \$2,60,755/~ as already agreed to may be made available for the project, addject to the receipt of the usual completion documents.

Report of the Committee on their visit to Smt. V.G. College of Arts and Science For Women, Gulbarga.

As desired by the Commission we visited the college on 25th September, 1970. We had discussions with the Principal and the President, managing committee of the college. We visited the hostel building and tallied it with the plans submitted by the college to the Commission.

So far as the starting of the construction work, prior to the receipt of Commission's sanction, is concerned, the President of the Managing Committee gave the following justifications:-

The construction work was started in a hurry, in anticipation of Commission's sanction becase there was no other Girls Hostel at Gulbarga and the women students were being put to lot of inconvenience.

- ii. The managing Committee of the college thought that since they had fulfilled all the conditions of the grant and they were constructing the building according to the plans submitted to the Commission, the Commission will have no objection in releasing the required grants.
- iii. Moreover, they had the necessary funds which were to be spent, in any case, and therefore they thought that if they could start the construction work early they would be facilitating the students by providing them hostel accommodation before the start of the next session and will also be economising the cost of construction.

Regarding the question of inviting tenders for the construction work, the President stated that despite notification, no tenders were received and hence the work was entrusted to an engineering firm in Gulbarga at 5% above the P.W.D. schedule of rates. The College has produced certificate in original from the Executive Engineer P.W.D. to the effect that even for P.W.D. works exceeding Rupees one lakh, the current charges range from 2.02% to 6.56% above the prevailing schedule of rates. The P.W.D. has also valued the building at R.4.54 lakhs.

We are satisfied with the explanations given by the President of the managing committee of the college. The H.K.E. Society which is managing a number of institutions in Gulbarga and other parts of the Mysore State, is known for its educational activities. It is also running an Engineering college, a Law College, a Medical College and an Institute of Sciences at Gulbarga. We appreciate the anxiety of the managing committee for providing all possible facilities to the young students at Gulbarga for their educational advancement. The building is a nice piece of workmanship,

which is of a high order. The construction is neat and clean. The building has been completed in accordance with the plans submitted to the Commission and presents an imposing look. The only change is that they have provided an additional dining and kitchen block for Vegetarian students. The material used is of a very good quality.

We recommend that the technical mistake committed by the college in having started the construction work in anticipation of Commission's sanction may be condoned and the admissible grants may be released to the College.

Item No.23 : To further consider allocation of the UGC for the development of engineering and technological education in universities for the Fourth Plan

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held on Ist July 1970 received a note on the requirements of the Commission for the Fourth Plan period (1969-74) for the development of engineering and technological education. The Commission expressed the view that the present allocation of Rs.9.10 crores was very inadequate to meet even the existing commitments (which exceed Rs. 10 crores) in respect of the development schemes of the engineering and technological education as recommended by the AICTE/UGC Visiting Committees. It was estimated that the requirements for the development of engineering and technological education in the universities would be of the order of Rs.29 crores for the period ending 1973-74. The Commission desired that the Government of India may be approached for enhancing the provision made for this purpose in addition to the allocation already made in the Fourth Plan

The Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services on a reference have intimated that the present notal allocation for technical education in the Central Sector is Rs.67 crores. Out of this provision, it has been decided to allocate Rs.11 crores against the revised allocation of Rs.9.10 crores intimated to the U.G.C. earlier for schemes of technical education by suitable re-adjustments of the provision for other schemes in the Central Sector. this revised allocation of Rs. 11 crores (including the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore), the UGC has to accommodate their programmes including first degree, postgraduate and management courses. There is no possibility of raising this outlay at present. It has further been intimated that the Ministry is implementing certain programmes for improving the quality of technical education through faculty and curriculum development programmes and for this purpose, separate provision has been made in the Fourth Five Year Plan of Technical Education. The programmes include training of teachers, summer institutes, short-term courses of training of inservice teachers, setting up of curriculum centres etc. The programmes to be implemented under this scheme will also cover the university teachers and the expenditure would be met from the provision made in the Ministry's budget.

Item No.24: To consider a reference from the Chancellor, Universities of M.P. with regard to the affiliation of the School of Indian Music and Dance, Mauritius with the Indira Kala Sangeet Vishvavidyalaya, Khairagarh.

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The Chancellor, M.P. Universities has asked for the advice of the University Grants Commission with regard to the proposal of the Indian Council for Cultural Relations for the affiliation of the School of Indian Music and Dance, Mauritius with the Indira Kala Sangeet Vishvavidyalaya, Khairagarh. The Act of the University has the following provision with regard to the jurisdiction of the University:

> "Provided further that any institution not admitted to the privileges of any other University incorporated by law, which imparts instruction in music or fine arts or both and which is situated outside Madhya Pradesh may apply to the Vishvavidyalaya for being admitted to the privileges of the Vishvavidyalaya and the Vishvavidyalaya may, subject to such conditions and restrictions as it may think fit to impose, admit such institutions to the privileges of the Vishvavidyalaya."

It has been stated that at the instance of the Government of India, the Indian Council for Cultural Relations has been rendering financial assistance in the form of salary of two music teachers of the School of Indian Music and Dance, Mauritius. The High Commissioner for India in Mauritius has recommended the School's affiliation with one of the universities in India and the Indian Council for Cultural Relations has suggested the Indira Kala Sangeet Vishvavidyalaya, Khairagarh.

The University has at present no institution outside the country affiliated to it.

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The Commission in its meeting held on 2nd September, 1970 vide item No.8(B)(a) while accepting the recommendations of the Standing Committee on Centres of Advanced Study desired that generally only departments recognised as Contres of Advanced Study should be included for assistance under external aid programmes available for the "Centres of Advanced Study Project". It further desired that the present list of Centres included in the Unesco Programme of Assistance may be reviewed and a note placed before it for consideration.

The Unesco Programme of Assistance to the Centres of Advanced Study in Indian Universities began in 1963-64 which was based on a plan of operation worked out by an Unesco Advisory Mission during the end of 1962. The Plan provided for assistance to the following departments, begining from the bijannium 1963-64:

- 1. Calcutta/Jadavpur Universities : Applied Mathematics
- 2. Osmania University: Geology/Geophysics
- 3. Delhi University : Physics
- 4. Delhi University : Chemistry
- 5. Madras University : Bottany
- 6. Madras University: Physics

The following additional three departments were included to receive assistance under the Programme from the biennium 1965-66:

- 1. Delhi University : Bottany
- 2. Osmania University: Chemistry
- 3. Bombay University : Chemical Technology

The Programme was evaluated by a Unesco Mission early in 1967. On the basis of the suggestions of the Unesco Evaluation Mission and the discussions with the Dy.Director general of Unesco and also the recommendations of the Advisory (Committee on Centres of Advanced Study, it is proposed that assistance to the following departments under the Programme may be discomtinued from the biennium 1971-72:-

- 1. Calcutta/Jadavpur Universities: Applied Mathematics
- 2. Madras University : Physics
- 3. Osmania University : Clhemistry
- 4. Osmania University : Geology/Geophysics

The following five Centress are instead suggested to be included to recoive assistance under the Programme from the biennium 1971-72,

keeping in view the collaborative research programmes already existing between the concerned Centres and the Universities/Institutions in U.S.S.R.:-

1. Panjab University : Geology

2. Panjab University : Mathematics

3. Madras University: Ramanujan Institute for Advanced

Study in Mathematics

4. Indian Institute of Science

Bangalore : Biochemistry

5. Delhi University : Zoology

Thus, the total number of Centres which will receive assistance under the Programme from the biennium 1971-72 will be ten for the present. Two/three more University Departments, recognised as Centres of Advanced Study, could be included in the Programme later when the question of recognition of new Centres of Advanced Study is considered by the Commission.

Item No. 29: To receive the Revised Estimates for 1970-71 and Budget Estimates for 1971-72 under Plan.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held on 5th November, 1969 received a note on the revised estimated for 1969-70 and budget; estimates for 1970-71 under Plan. The Commission had been informed that the requirements of the UGC for 1970-71 were of the order of ks. 25.25 crores (including ks. 75 lakhs for hospitals attached to Aligara Muslim University and the Banaras Hindua University.) Although the needs of the Commission in respect of corpolidation of programmes already in progress and implementation of new programmes were much more than the amount indicated above, but the estimates had been reduced to the barest minimum keeping in view the availability of resources. The Government of India, however, agreed to an amount of ks. 21.86 crores.

The revised estimates for the current year and the budget estimates for 1971-72 have; been worked out in the attached statement (annexure).

Revised Estimates for 1970-71

The revised estimates for plan projects for 1970-71 amount to Rs. 24.83 crores. No provision has been mde for the hospitals attached to the medical colleges of Aligarh Muslim University and the Banaras Hindu University as it is felt that the amount already received during 1968-70 from the Government of India would be sufficient to meet the requirements on this account. The significant increases in the different sectors are:

- (a) Development of Humanities & Social Sciences Departments
- Rs. 6 lakhs
- (b) Development of Schience Departments including Centres of Advanced Studyr.

(This amount is on account of the payment under Dollar Loan Scheme for equipment)

The Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services had suggested that the provision for the following programmes may also be made during the current year:

The UGC at its meeting held on 2nd September 1970 welcomed these programmes of student welfare and agreed to the provision being made as above. The revised estimates for 1970-71 accordingly, provide for these programmes, in addition to the welfare programmes being continued from previous year by the Commission.

The revised estimates for 1970-71 have been calculated on the basis of the grants released to universities and colleges during the current year so far and on the estimated requirements of the institutions during the remaining part of the year. Many of the projects initiated during the earlier plan periods are nearing completion and the demand for funds from the universities is very heavy. The rising cost of building materials has also contributed to rising cost of approved projects with the result that additional grants have to be paid to the universities to honour the commitments already made. Apart from these, the programmes accepted by the Commission within the Fourth Plan allocation have also been initiated and the universities would require large allocation of funds.

Budget Estimates for 1971-72

The requirements of the Commission for Plan projects for 1971-72 amount to Rs. 33.07 crores. No provision has been made for the hospitals attached to Aligarh Muslim University and the Banaras Hindu University. Although the needs in respect of the programmes already in progress and for the new programmes would exceed the amount indicated above, but the



requirements have been kept to the barest level. These estimates are based on the requirements of the universities for schemes already in progress and also for some of the new programmes accepted by the UGC on the recommendations of the Visiting Committees for the Fourth Plan period. The estimates for 1971-72 include the provision of Rs. 3 crores for payment under the Dollar Loan Scheme for equipment. Together with the provision of Rs. 2 crores made in the revised estimates for 1970-71, it is felt that the commitments on account of expenditure for 52 universities under Rs. 10 lakhs Ceiling Scheme and 42 colleges under Rs. 1 lakh Ceiling Scheme and the requirements of engineering colleges would be met. is presumed that the proposal of the Commission to the Government of India for agreeing to the phasing of the payment of loan during the current financial year and the next financial year would be agreed to.

The Covernment of India had separately agreed that the provision on account of "Cultural Exchange Programmes" may be made under non-Plan. This has been done accordingly. An amount of Rs. 3 crores has been provided for continuation of the programmes of student welfare suggested by the Government of India, Ministry of Education & Youth Services and referred to above.

Item No. 30: To receive the report of the Survey undertaken by the Directorate General of Employment and Training on the employment pattern of engineering graduates and diploma holders.

The Directorate General of Employment and Training, Ministry of Labour, Employment and Rehabilitation, Government of India conducted a survey in 1968 with a view to ascertain the employment pattern of engineering graduates and diploma holders passed out during 1965 and 1966. The Survey covered all engineering institutions other than the University of Roorkee whose alumini had already been subject of an earlier survey conducted in 1967. Out of a total of 62,888, alumini addressed about 23,000 responded. The following are the main findings of the Survey.:-

- (1) 61.4% of the degree and diploma holders reported that they were employed at the time of survey, 30.7% were unemployed and about. 8% were students/apprentices.
- The rate of unemployment was the highest among diploma holders (37.9%) followed by postgraduate diploma holders (35.7%) postgraduate degree holders (15.8%) and degree holders (11.2%).
- (3) Unemployment is highest among Mining engineers followed by Civil, Mechanical and Electrical.
- 6.2% of the I.I.T. products and 11.1% of the university products are among the unemployed. Among the unemployed are also 6.3% of the Honours degree holders, 17.6% of the I division holders and 36.0% of the IInd division holders.
- (5) Two-thirds of the employed alumni were working in professional and technical jobs and about 28% were employed in jobs akin to craftsman and production process workers.
- (6) 27.2% of the total number of respondents had not been able to secure my employment at all since completing their engineering education.

- More than one-third of the unemployed were looking for jobs for less than 12 months, 29.7% for one year or more but less than 2 years and another or third of the total were looking for a job for two years or more.
- A study of the proportion of those who received practical training to total respondents according to type of award revealed that nearly 24% off degree and diploma holders had undergone some training while only 13.6% of the respondents who were postgraduate degree holders underwent training.
- (9) One fifth of the trainees were working as unpaid apprentices.
- (10) About 60% of those having degree/postgraduatee degree hail from urban areas.
- (11) 11.5% of the I.I.T. products and 6.1% of the university products go in for higher education.
- (12) 80% of the alumni who obtained IIIrd division got their first employment within six months; the corresponding percentage in case of the Ist. and IInd divisioners being 76.91 & 72.4% respectively.
- (13) About 61% of the engineers are employed in the public sector, 30% in private sector and 9% in educational institutions.
- (14) A larger percentage (53.8%) of those in the private sector enjoyed permanency than in the public sector where even according to current status only 20% were permanent.
- (15) Emoluments were better in the educational institutions and the private sector as compaired to the public sector. Forsons employed in educational institutions were in receipt of higher emoluments, 38.5% of them got more than Rs. 400/- per month in their initial employment.
- Quite a number of engineers left India for employment or studies abroad (for specialising in various fields such as Rocket Engineering, Computer Technology/systems Engineering, Reactor Design and Kinstics, Petro-chemical industries, Aerodynamics and Aero-Astronautics). In most of the cases the alumni had to pay their own finances for journey and stay abroad.

Item No. 31: To receive a note on the programme in connection with Lenin Centenary Celebrations.

The Lemin Centenary Celebrations Committee presided over by the Union Education Minister at its meeting held on 11th March 1970) had inter-alia decided that seminars may be held in universities and colleges to give an opportunity to students to know about Lenin and the Soviet Union. The matter was subsequently discussed by the Chairman, UCC with the Vice-Chancellor. Delhi University. The University proposed an All University Seminar on Lenin and Comparative Analysis of the political, economic and social conditions and policies in Russia in the decade after the Revolution and in India after Independence.

The details of the seminar were approved by the Education Minister in his capacity as the Chairman of the Lenin Centenary Celebrations Committee. The Government of India have sanctioned a grant-in-aid of Rs. 25,000 to Delhi University for the seminar.

The Delhi University has decided to hold the seminar from 28th November, 1970 to Ist December, 1970.

Item No.32: To consider a reference from the Government of India, Ministry of Education & Youth Services with regard to procedure for recognition of degrees by the Universities.

The Ministry of Education & Youth Services have informed the Commission that they have come across a case where the Udaipur University have recogmised the 'Bharati' degree of the Mahila Gram Vidyapith, Allahabad as equivalent to B.A. degree for purpose of admission to M.A. or B.Ed. classes. The 'Bharati' degree has not been recognised by the State Government of U.P. or any other State or Central Government for purposes of employment under them. They have also quoted another case where a candidate who passed the 'Bharati examination of the Mahila Gram Vidyapith, Allahabad and B.Ed. of Udaipur University has claimed the post of a B.A.B.T. teacher in Delhi. The Ministry of Education & Youth Services have suggested that a uniform procedure in the matter of recognition should be adopted in such cases by universities and that the matter may considered by the UGC and the views of the Commission rmunicated to the Ministry.

It may be pointed out that the Universities are autonomous bodies and recognition of degrees is done by the universities themselves for purposes of admission to higher courses. The 'Bharati' degree has mot been specified by the Commission under the UGC Act. As such, any institution can award it. The question of its recognition as equivalent to B.A. degree is for the University itself to decide. This matter could perhaps be taken up by the Inter-University Board of India & Ceylon.

Item No. 33: To consider the payment of allowances to Shri K.R. Sharma and Smt. Veena Das, Visiting Felllows in the Department of Chinese and Japanese Studies and Sociology department of the Delhi University.

In January 1969, the University Grants Commission invited applications from the universities for the award of Visiting Fellowships to post-doctoral scholars and teachers for training and research at the universities having well-developed area studies programmes. The value of the fellowship was to be as under:-

(1) Post-doctoral scholars.

Rs. 500/- p.m. and contingencies of Rs. 1,000/- p.m.

(2) University teacher.

Total emoluments drawn by the teacher in his present institution plus 20% of the basic salary and Rs. 1,000/-p.a. as contingent empenditure.

On the basis of the recommendations of the Selection Committee appointed by the Commission, Shri K.R. Sharma, Lecturer, Hindu College, Delhi University and Site Veena Das, Lecturer in the department of Sociology, Delhi University were selected for the award of Visiting Fellowships. The University was informed that the amount of fellowship will be the total emoluments drawn by them in the positions held before taking up the fellowship plus 20% of basic pay per month.

In January 1970, the Delhi. University pointed out that 20% additional allowance allowed to the lecturers on their appointment as Visiting Fellows under the area studies probramme could be justified only in the case of persons working at places other than Delhi. Payment of such allowances would not seem to be justified to teachers serving in the University campus. It was accordingly because that the visiting featows selected from the Delhi University under the area studies programme to work in the University departments may be permitted to draw their basic pay plus other allowances which would have been admissible to them in their previous assignment. The University was also informed that the visiting fellows could draw all allowances including provident fund which they would have drawn had they continued in their parent department provided that this did not conflict with the rules of the University.



Smt. Veena Das has on her own foregone the allowance of 20 percent. Shri Sharma has, however, represented that the payment of 20 percent allowance and provident fund contributions should not be stopped merely on technical grounds. It may be mentioned in this connection that in so far as the provient fund is concerned, the University has informed that according to C.P. Y. rules, Shri K.R. Sharma is not eligible to subscribe towards the provident fund because he has niether completed + years of service nor has he been confirmed on any post in the university.

The Commission may consider whether in the circumstances pointed out above, 20% allowances and facilities for provident fund contribution may be allowed to Shri K.R. Sharma and Smt. Veena Das.

Item No. 34: To consider a proposed from the Roorkse University regarding equipment imported for Engineering Department unit Dealler Loan Programme.

The Commission at its meseting held on 4th March 1970 (Item No. 10) and 2nd September 11970 (Item No. 43) agreed to pay from its own funds the cost off equipment not exceeding Rs. 10 lakhs in the case of a university and not exceeding Rs. 1 lakh each for their affiliated colleges including Medical Colleges. The cost of equipment agreed to be met by the Commission in respect of universities covered only those indented through the University Grants Commission for their Science Departments. The Commission agreed to give the equipment to the Universities and their Colleges on a grant basis, subject to ceilings mentioned above, outside fourth clan allocations.

The Vice-Chancellor, Rocarkee University has suggested the Commission to include the cost; of equipment indented by the Roorkee University for its Engineering/Technology Departments within the ceiling fixed by the Commission for the Science departments of the university. The Vice-Chancellor, has mentioned that, "all the departments of the University act as one unit and the Scientific equipment ordered by one department is available to all the departments of Science and Engineering. Thus there is no rigid rule that equipment purchased for the Engineering and Technology Departments is not to be used by the Science Departments or vice-versa. The allotment of funds for the purchase of equipment is made to different departments depending on the maximum use of equipment in that department and its ability to look after its proper use and maintanance. The mere fact that an equipment has been purchased for an Engineering Department should not mean that it must be charged to the grant under Technology". The Vice-Chancellor has indicated that, in view of the special circumstances prevailing at the Roorkee University and the desirability of having inter-departmental collaboration between Science and Technology Departments to the maximum extent, the Commission may agree to include the cost of equipment indemted for Engineering Departments within the ceiling of Ms. 10 lakhs approved for the Science Departments as the cost of equipment ordered for Science. Departments is about Rs. 4,70,000/-. It may be mentioned that the equipments for Engineering /Technology Departments of the Seventeen Universities was indented by the Ministry of Education and Youth Services out of its own allocation of Dollar loan.

The Ministry, after placing the indeants with the India Supply Mission, Washington, had requested the Commission to assure the Ministry that the Cost of equipment indented for university departments/ colleges of Engineeringg and Technology would be paid to the Government of India by the Institutions concerned. The Ministry of Education and Youth Services had also addressed letters to the institutions concerneed to keep funds reserved for this purpose. A summary statemeent of the cost of equipment indented by the Engineering/Technology Departments/Colleges is attached (Annexure,)

It may also be mentioned that out of 12 million dollar loan Project an amount of \$ 14.70 million (against an allocation of \$4.87 million dollarss to be made) has been utilised by the Commission for importt of equipments for the Science Departments of 53 universities (Rs. 3.92 crores) and 42 colleges (Rs. 33 lakhs approx.) (including Medical colleges). The total rupee cost of the U.S. equipment for the Science Departments the universities and for Affiliated colleges inclusive of freight, insurance and other charges amounted to No. 4.25 crores. The Commission has already agreed to provide upto Rs. 10 lakhs to a university and upto Rs. 1 lakh to a college outside the IV Plan allocation towards the import of the U.S. equipment for Science Departments ornly involving an additional expenditure of Rs. 3.20 crores on thee part of the Commission. The cost of the U.S. equipment for the Engineering/Technology Departments of 17 universities under the dollar loan Project is about Rs. 59 lakhs. Out of these 17 universities (having faculties of both Science and Engineering), four universities we indented U.S. equipment for theeir Science Departments rth over Rs. 10 lakhs each. The remaining 13 universities have asked for US. equipment for theeir Science Departments varying between Rs. 1.85 lakhs to Rs. 8.99 lakhs and for their Engineering Departments between Rs. 47,200/- and Rs. 7.83 lakhs.

In case the ceiling of Rss. 10 lakhs is allowed to cover the cost of US equipment for Engine ering/Technical Departments also, the total commitment of the Commission on this account would be about Rs. 35 lakhs in addition to Rs. 3.20 crores already agreed to for the Science Departments in universities and affiliated colleges within the ceilings fixed.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No.36: To consider a note regarding assistance to colleges for new courses of study.

The Commission's assistance to colleges for library and laboratory acilities, accommodation for teaching, workshops for science departments, hostells, non-resident student centres etc., as per details given in Annexure, is subject interalia to the following condition:

Grants are not proviided for the establishment of a college for starting; a new course of study, and for enabling a college too fulfil the conditions of affiliation. The Commission's support is meant for development, and is mot available for fulfilling the basic requirements off the courses of instruction as laid down by the university concerned. The conditions of affiliation for the full course (upto the final year of the degree course) should be fulfilled, and students admitted upto the final year of the course, before a proposal is made by the college concerned for assistance for the deevelopment of existing facilities.

Commission's assistance to a college for the development of postgraduate studies is also subject to an assurance that the college has fulfilled the conditions of affiliation prescribed by the university for postgraduate teaching in the subjects concerned for which the 'assistance is required".

Some colleges, which have fulfilled the conditions of affiliation for a specific course of study, have sought assistance from the Commission for starting new courses and for fulfilling the basic conditions and requirements of such courses, as required by the universities concerned. In some areas facilities for higher education are relatively meagre, and the existing colleges which are sometimes affiliated for instruction in the Humanities and Social Sciences find it difficult to start new courses, particularly Science Clourses, which require a heavy initial outlay. Thus regional imbalances in educational opportunities continued to exist. In view of this the following points are for the Commission's considerations:

- (i) Whether in the case of colleges which are serving the needs of backward areas, assistance may be provided for stairting new courses of study, on the special recommendation of the university concerned.
- (ii) Whether such assistance should be limited to new courses leading to the first degree or should be extended to the starting of postgraduate studies also.

The essential conditions and requirements for obtaining the assistance mentioned above are as follows:

ELIGIBILITY:

(i) The proposal cof a college, affiliated to a university is considered only after it has been brought under the purview of the UGC Act, 1956, im acc ordance with the regulations framed under Section 2(f), read with Section 26(1) (d) of the Act, which is reproduced below:

"No College shall be recognised by the University Grants Commission as included in the University concerned for the purposes of the University Grants Commission Actt, 1956 unless it (1) provides instruction upto the first degree, or upto a postgraduate (degree or for a postgraduate degree only and (ii) is affiliated to, forms a constituent member of, or is run directly as a University College by the University, in accordance with the provisions of their respective Acts, and Statutes and Regulations made under those Acts."

- (ii) Assistance for the projects mentioned above is at present not available to colleges of agriculture, engineering and technology, and medicine. The Commission has a separate Scheme for helping teachers training Colleges. There are separate grant-in-aid rules for the non-Government affiliated / constituent colleges of the Delhi University.
- (iii) Grants are not provided for the establishment of a college for starting a new course of study, and for enabling a college to fulfil the conditions of affiliation. The Commission's support is meant for development, and is not available for fulfilling the basic requirements of the courses of instruction as laid down by the university concerned. The conditions of affiliation for the full coarse (upto the final year of the degree course) should be fulfilled, and students admitted upto the final year of the course, before a proposal is made by the college concerned for assistance for the development of existing facilities.
- (iv) The Commission's assistance is available to collebes which have functioned well for a reasonable length of time. The minimum period for which a college should have so functioned would as a rule be the duration of the degree course conducted by it.

- (.) A college should have a minimum student enrolment of 400 in courses conducted by the university to which it is affiliated. In the case of colleges of Uttar Pradesh, having a two-year degree course, the minimum enrolment should be 270 in degree and postgraduate classess.
- (vi) The proposals of a college that is temporarily affiliated, but has fulfilled thee conditions of affiliation for the full degree course conducted by it, and which has functioned well at least for the duration off the degree course, may be considered by the UGC, if the university is satisfied that the college is running on sound liness, and expects the college to secure permanent affiliation in the near future.
- (vii) Since the Commiss-ion's assistance to colleges is available for the period ending March 1974, the development proposals of colleges may be suitably phased, in accordance with the order of priority to be determined by the colleges concerned, in the light of their essential needs and requirements for development, and the proposal to which the first priorit is given may be sent to the Commission with the relevant information. In case a college allready has a building project under implementation with the Commission's assistance, a fresh proposal for a building project may normally be sent after the earlier project is completed or is nearing completion.

OTHER 'WAIDEINONS

- (i) The Commission's assistance is not available for purchase or acquisition of land. The college concerned has to give a contificate that it has; undisputed ownership and possession of the land on which the construction is to be made.
- (ii) No assistance is given if or purchase or acquisition of an existing building, or for the renovation, dismantling and repairs of an existing structure. The Commission's grant is available for new construction or extension of existing building.
- (iii) The college has to send the plans (in duplicate) and detailed estimates drawn up and signed by a qualified architect or engineer together with a certificate from the architect or engineer indicating the total built-up area provided, and stating that the estimates have been prepared according to the current PWD schedule of rates for the area concerned. A certificate from the State PWD to the effect that the rates provided in the estimates are according to the current PWD schedule of rates for the area concerned has to be send to the Commission after the proposal is accepted.
- (iv) The plans and estimates may be drawn up keeping in view the norms suggested as guide lines by the Commission, regarding the accommodation to be provided in student hostels, teachers hostels, staff quarters, libraries and non-resident student centres. A college may, lif it so desires, make adjustments or changes considered necessary in the light of special needs. However, in case the total built up area

indicated in the plan and estimates exceeds the total area as per norms suggested, the Commission's grant will be: reduced proportionately keeping in view the totall built up area admissible and the balance of the expenditure on the project over and above the Commission's grant shall have to be met by the college concerned.

- Laboratory buildings may be planned keeping in view, the developmeent needs of the science departments concerned, the requirements of the course of instruction, the number of batches for which practical work is to be conducted etc., Lecture rooms or threatres, small staff rooms, and accommodation for departmental library may be provided, if considered neecessary.
- (vi) The Commission's assistance is not available for the maintenance cof laboratories and purchase of routine chemicals and glassware.

PROCEDURE

- (i) Proposals should be sent by the college through the University too Which it is affiliated.
- The proposals should be complete in all respects. In the case of construction projects, plans (in duplicate) and detailed estimates prepared and signed by a qualified Engineer or architect appointed by the college should be sent with the proposal. The following documents/assurances are also required:-
 - (a) A note, supported by the relevant information, regarding the need and justification of the project proposed to be undertaken.
 - (b) Basic (data about the college in the prescribed proforma.
 - (c) The matching contribution for the project is available and all expenditure over and above the Commission's grant, if any, shall be met by the college.
 - (d) The college has undisputed ownership and possession of land on which the construction is to be made.
 - (e) A certificate of qualified engineer/architect appointed by the college, to the effect that the estimates for the project for which the Commission's assistance is sought have been prepared according to the current PWD schedule of rattes for the area concerned.
 - (f) The project will be completed within (here indicate the period).



- (iii) In the case of propposals for the construction/ extension of laboratory buildings, and purchase of science equipment, it may be certified that the requirements are for curses leading to the first degree.
- (iv) Lists of equipment and books should not be forwarded to the Commission.
- (v) For convenience of college, proformue for the submission of proposals for the Commission's assistance are enclosed*.
- (vi) Correspondence regarding the proposals may be carried on by the Princi pals under their signatures.
- The colleges may engage any qualified engineer/
 architect for preparation of plans and estimates
 and for supervision. The Commission maintains
 no list of approved architects/ engineers, and the
 selection of a compostent architect/engineer is
 entirely the responsibility of the institution
 concerned. No communications from architects or
 engineers engaged by collebes are entertained by
 the Commission.

GUIDELINES FOR UNIVERSITIES.

When the development proposal of the colleges are received by the university, they may please be considered in the light of the criteria and suggestions made above. In case, the university is of the opinion that the essential conditions are satisfied, and the assistance, sought by the college may be given by the Commission, the proposal concerned may be sent to the Commission with the specific; recommendation of the university, and the following certificates/assurances:

- (i) There is real need and justification for the project proposed to be undertaken;
- (ii) The assistance sought by the college is not for fulfilling any condition of affiliation;
- (iii) The college has been functioning well and the university is satis: fied with its progress and performance. In case, the college is temporarily affliated, it may be certified that the college has fulfilled the conditions of affiliation and has been running on sound lines and is expected to secure permanent affiliation in due course.
- (iv) The college has managerial ability to execute and complete the project for which assistance has been sought from the Commission.



In the case of colleges, which meet the educational needs of backward areas, it has been the practice of the Commission not to insist on strict adherence to the conditions relating to the minimum enrolment and the length of time for which the college should have been functioning. In such cases, if the conditions of aiffiliation for the full course of study (upto the final year of the degree course) conducted by such a college have been fulfilled, and the university is satisfied that the college has made satisfactory progress and deserves the Commission's assisstance, the reasons for relaxing the normal rules in favour of the college together with the opinion of the Vice-Char ellor on the proposal of the college should be communicated to the Commission along with the certificates/assurances referred to above.

It would be helpful if the requisite information and papers relating to the proposals are sent to the Commission, complete in all respects, to enable the Commission to communicate its decision expeditiously to the University and the colleges concerned.

Item No.37: To consider the quesstion of establishment of another University iin Delhi.

During the course of ddiscussion on the Delhi University (Amendment) Bill in thhe Lok Sabha on August 31, 1970 some members raised the question of a second University in Delhi. In reply, the Education Minister had stated as under:

"This is a question which will be examined sooner or later becausse many people seem to feel that a University has got something like a ceiling on the number of students, the number of collegess etc. and there will be need for a new univversity. I have an open mind. I am prepared to get it examined."

The Government of India, Ministry of Education & Youth Services have desired that the matter may be examined by the UGC.

In January 1969, during the course of discussion with the Chairman, UGC relating tto admission and other related matters, the Vice-Chancellor and the Pro-Vice-Chancellor, Delhi University had pointed out that tthe standards of education attained by the University were tthreatened by the large explosion in numbers and that thee University may not be able to maintain the tradition of schoolarship, which it had built up in several subjects during thee last two decades. It was difficult for the students even to make use of facilities at the university library and particcipate in games, debates and other extra-curricular activitiess in the University. Transport was another serious problem for the large number of students who had to come from very long distances. It was felt that there was an urgent need for a University Centre in Delhi which would be a part of the mairn campus. The Centre could be located somewhere near the non-campus colleges in the south of Delhi. To start with, it may provide facilities for postgraduate teaching in Mathemattics, History, Hindi, Political Science and Sanskrit and also for B.Sc. (Hons). in Physics and Chemistry. A Committee with the following members was appointed to work out the details of the project

The Committee worked out the cost for the establishment of such a Centre at Rs. 45 lakhs (non-recurring) and Rs. 33 lakhs (recurring for first three years). The Committee also felt that the South Campus should be treated as an extension of the University and there should be collaborative teaching not only with the help of teachers of the colleges located in the South of Delhi but also with those of the colleges in the North. The Commissiom considered the report of this Committee at its meeting held on 7th May 1969 and felt that this would require further examination and discussion with the University and the Mimistry of Education & Youth Services taking into account the availability of resources. Commission also agreed that if the Delhi University so desired, the possibility of setting up in New Delhi an Evening Post-graduate Institute on the lines of that in the University campus may be explored by the University. University however, expressed its anxiety to have a Centre for Postgraduate Studies in the south of Delhi for day students in view of the heavy rush for admissions to M.A. The University also suggested that they would like to have a Centre for honours teaching in Physics and Chemistry in the South of Delhi.

The matter was considered by the Commission again and it was decided that i.t may be discussed with the Ministry of Education & Youth Services. Subsequently, in December 1969, the proposal of Delhi University regarding the setting up of Delhi University Campus in South Delhi was discussed with the Vice-Chancellor and Pro-Vice-Chancellor of Delhi University and the Additional Secretary, Ministry of Education. The Vice-Chancellor felt that in the light of some developments e.g. large increase in admission to the Law Faculty and the Postgraduate (Evening) Institute, the earlier proposal of the University would need modification. The conclusions arrived at in the meeting are summarised below:

(a) There is an immediate need for a second Campus (or Centre) in the South of Delhi. For proper working the Departments in the new Campus should be under separate heads, as suggested by the University. The Centre would provide postgraduate and les courses. The selection of postgraduate subjects rould need exceful study. To begin with, courses would be limited to Arts and Social Sciences.



- (b) The second campus woulld also provide guidance and assistance to college: s located in the South of Delhi as regards their development programmes and general administration.
- (c) The Delhi University would work out the financial implications for the establishment of the proposed Campus, on a phased basis.
- An area of 50-100 acres may be required for the new Campus. The UGG would explore informally if such an area could be available. The Delhi University would take this up with the Lt. Governor, Delhi.
- As it would take some time before the new Campus could be set up, the IDelhi University would examine the possibility of using existing college buildings and facilities with a view to organising in 1970 courses in subjects for which there was a larger and urgent demand. Additional staff would, of course, be required.
- of the Science subjects to selected colleges should be examined. The facilities in the Departments released as a consequence of the transfer could be utilised to increase the M.Sc. admissions.

A meeting was taken by the Education Minister in Annil 1970 to consider the propossal of Delhi University for the establishment of a second campus. A copy of the minutes of the meeting is attached (Annexure). It was felt in the meeting that the question of setting up another campus of the University was a complex one and would require detailed consideration of the various aspects involved - administrative, financial and academic. The expenditure involved in the proposal could not be justified in the context of present resources. However, it was important that the University took steps to meet the immediate needs of the students in South Delhi such as postgraduate teaching in certain subjects, evening classes, zonal libraries, honours teaching in science and hostels. was agreed that the following steeps may be taken for the provision of additional facilities beginning with the session 1970-71:

- Postgraduate classes in Hindi and English may be organised in a collegee in South Delhi to be selected by the University:
- Arrangements may be made for evening classes in Law in a college in South Delli to be selected by the University:
- The feasibility of organising B.Sc. (Honours) courses in the colleges (situated both inside and outside the compus of the University) may be considered. The possibility of starting in Scuth Delhi a University College in Science for Honours courses may allso be explored in consultation with the Chief Executive Counsellor, Delhi.



- (4) Zonal Text Book libraries may be established by the University in appropriate places. These libraries should remain open for long hours on working days and also on holidays.
- Necessary steeps may be taken for constructing an additional University hostel for women students in the Campuss of the University.

It was further agreed that the University may formulate proposals for acquiring the minimum requirements of land for putting up essential buildings for the permanent location of the facilities agreed to in the meeting and for constructing hostels for students. The University may negotiate with the D.D.A.. the minimum price at which such land would be available and put up proposals to UGG. The DDA may also be requested by the University to earmark additional land that may be required in the future.

On a proposall from the Delhi University, the Commission has agreed to the University starting Postgraduate Classes in South Delhi irn English, Hindi and Commerce. Arrangements have also been made to shift the evening class for L.L.B. course in a reented building in New Delhi.

With regard to acquisition of land, the Delhi Development Authority have agreed to provide 100 acres of land in the South Delhi to Delhi University for locating the campus. The University has been requested to send a parete proposal with regard to acquisition of land in the light of the decisions taken in the meeting held in April 1970 referred to above.

In this connection, it may be mentioned that the Jawaharlal Nehru University has already been established in New Delhi.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

The Vice-Chancellor expllained the background of the proposal of the University for the establishment of a second campus in South Delhi. He stated that the proposal was originally mooted several years black as it was felt that the establishment of a campus of the University in South Delhi would alleviate the hardship to which a large number of B.Sc. (Honours) and postgraduate studemts residing in that part of the city were subjected on accoumt of the distance from their place of residence to the campus of the University. The University was situated in the extreme north of the city and almost all development of the citty was taking place in the South. Subsequently, Government decided to establish a fullfledged University for the students in the South Delhi as also for the reason that the total number of students seeking facilities for study in the Delhii University had gone beyond the capacity of the various depairtments of the University. Therefore, the proposal for the establishment of a campus of the University in South Delhi was nott pursued.



- The Bill introduced by Government for the establishment of a second University for Deellhi was completely changed by Parliament and the Jawaharlall Nehru University was set up as a unique institution with no reesponsibility as such for the Thus the Delhi University education of Delhi students. continues to bear the total responsibility in this behalf. The: pressure on the Delhi Universsity has become tremendous on account of the growth of the city and the consequential growth in the student population. Att some point of time in the near future, another University would need to be established in Delhi to relieve the pressure on the Delhi University. recognition of the fact that ffull development of any new University takes time, the Deellhi University has revived the proposal for the establishmentt of a campus in South Delhi to make available to the residerntts of that area the essential facilities near to their place of residence. The proposed campus would have a good library and facilities for postgraduate education both in science and in liberal arts. The University contemplates that the existing staff of the University would also participate in the academic activities of the South Campus. It is the hope of the Universalty that in course of time, the proposed Campus would provide a good nucleus for the establishment of a separate [Umiversity.
- The Pro-Vice-Chancelllor stated that the Delhi Development Authority (DDA) lhad located about 100 acres of land in South Delhi which there would be willing to sell to the iniversity at the rate of Rs. 25,000/- per acre excluding evelopment charges. DDA had also indicated that the University could take as much land out of this as is needed at present and the rest could be earmarked for the use of the University and make available as and when recquired.
- Education Minister feelt that the question of setting up another campus of the University was a complex one and would require detailed consideration of the various aspects involved administrative, financial and academic. He did not think that expenditure of the order envisaged would be justified at present. He considered it important and urgent that the University takes steps to meet the immediate needs of the students in South Delmi, such as postgraduate teaching in certain subjects, evening classes, zonal libraries, Homours teaching in Science and hostels. It was agreed that the following steps may be taken for the provision of additional facilities beginning with the session 1970-71:-
 - (1) Post-graduate classes in Hindi and English may be organised iin a college in South Delhi to be selected by the: University;
 - (2) Arrangements many be made for Evening Classes in Law in a collegge in South Delhi to be selected by the University;
 - (3) The feasibility of organising B.Sc. (Honours Courses) in the colleges (situated both inside and outside the Campus of the University) may be considered. The possibility of starting in South Delhi a University College in Science for Honours Courses may allso be explored in consultation with the Chief Executive Councillor, Delhi.



- (4) Zonal Text Book libraries may be established by the University iin appropriate places. These libraries should remain open for long hours on working days and also on holidays.
- (5) Necessary steps: I may be taken for constructing an additional University hostel for woman students in the Campus off the University.
- 7. It was further agreed that the University may formulate proposals for acquiring the minimum requirements of land for rutting up essential buildings; for the permanent location of the facilities agreed to in the meeting and for constructing hostels for students. The University may negotiate with the D.D.A. the minimum price at which such land would be available and put up proposals to U.G.C.. The D.D.A. may also be requested by the University to earmark acaditional land that may be required in the future.
- 8. The question of amendment of the Delhi University Act was also discussed at the meetiing. The Education Minister stated that the Government hadd already approved the proposal to introduce an Amendment Bill! to make provision for private candidates to appear at the examinations of the University. As for the proposal of the morree than one Pro-Vice-Chancellor, the Education Minister felt that an amendment of the Act for this purpose was not necessary; as the main object of the liversity was to make provision for this office to look after the various colleges. This mayy be done by creating the office of a Dean of Colleges in the University and the University may take up the matter formally witth the University Grants Commission.

Item No.39: To receive a proposal to invite the Presidents of Iraqi Universities on a 3 week visit to Indian Universities.

The Ambassador of India in Barhand had suggested that the Presidents of Iraqi Universities, who are powerful personalities with the personal rank of Cabinet Ministers, be invited on a three week visit to Indian Universities for, if they had an opportunity to have an on the spot look at the teaching talent available in India both quantitatively and qualitatively the Indian teaching element in Iraqi Universities would go up, as they are sortely pressed for manning their teaching positions in scientific and engineering subjects. A copy of the letter is attached (Annexure I).

This was referred to the Ministry of Education and Youth Services for getting the proposal examined and to communicate to the UGC the views of the Government of India; and, in case the proposal was agreed to, to place the funds at the disposal of the UGC for meeting the expenditure for their journeys from Baghdad to Delhi and back and for local hospitality.

The Ministry of Education & Youth Services have informed that the proposal to invite the Presidents from Iraqi Universities had not been accepted by the Ministry for the current year. However, the UGC might further consider the possibility of inviting at least one Vice-Chancellor from the University of Bagdad as recommended by the Ministry of External Affairs during the current year. They have indicated further that it would not be possible for the Ministry to provide funds for the proposed visit to the UGC due to paucity of funds at their disposal. A copy of the Ministry's letter is attached (Annexure II).

Copy of D.O. letter No. BAG(ISI) 321(3)69 dated 20th December 1969 from the Ambassador of India in Bagdad to the Chairman, University Grants Commission, New Delhi.

We had suggested in our budget proposals for Cultural Activities Programme of the Ministry of Education and Youth Services for the year 1970-71 that the Presidents of the five principal Iraqi Universities - Boghdad, Mustansiriya, Mosul, Suleimaniya and Basrah - be invited on a three-week visit to Indian Universities particularly technical ones. In reply they have asked us to take up this matter directly with the University Grants Commission.

- About 50 Indian torsing personnel, almost all of whom are teaching scientific and engineering subjects are employed in Iraqi universities.
- The Iraqi universities are sorely pressed for manning their teaching positions in scientific and technical subjects. Their current sources for filling up these vacancies are East European countries, the U.A.R., Pakistan and India.
- We have felt that if the Presidents of the Iraqi Universities, who are powerful personalities with the personal rank of Cabinet Ministers, had an opportunity to have an on the spot look at the teaching talent available in India both quantitatively and qualitatively the Indian teaching element in Iraqi universities would go up. would be of tremendous benefit both to Iraq and India as the youth and the potential leaders of the country would come in direct contact with our professors. (About a year ago the then President of the Basrah University visited India and was able to secure the services of medical professors. He was highly satisfied with this vist and felt that similar on the spot high level Iraqi visits to India on similar missions would greatly benefit the Iraqi universities. Since then, I have been mentioning to the Presidents of all the Iraqi Universities, whenever I meet them, that they should consider visiting India.)
- I feel that the time is ripe for our taking the initiative and actually inviting the Presidents of the Universities as our guests. The financial implications will be transport first class international air fare from Baghdad to New Delhi and back about Rs. 20,580 and local hospitality (we have no idea as to how much cost is incurred on looking after VIPs of this tanding) for the period described. They would of course travel by Air India from Kuwait to Bombay or Delhi and back and by Iraqi Airways from here to Kuwait.
- 6. I shall be grateful if you would kindly let us have your reaction.

However, it would not be possible for this Ministry to provide funds for the proposed visit to the U.G.C. due to paucity of funds at our disposal.

Item No.41: To consider the proposal of Pelhi University for naming the Concert Hall as 'Sir Shankar Lal Concert Hall'.

The Commission at its meeting held on 7th August 1963 while approving the proposal of Delhi University for starting M.A. Course in Hindustani Music with effect from 1963-64 desired that the work of the Department of Music which was started on an experimental basis in the University of Delhi be reviewed by a Committee of experts. Accordingly a Committee was appointed which visited the University on 21st November 1963. The Committee reported inter-alia, that, the University received a donation from Sir Shankar Lal Charity Trust of a total sum of Rs. 10 lakhs spread over a period of 8 years. Half of this amount was earmarked for the construction of a Concert Hall. The donation was made on the understanding that the University would maintain a Department of Music to be called "The Sir Shankar Lal Institute of Music" as one of its regular department. On the basis of the recommendation of the Committee the Commission at its meeting held on 1st April 1964 agreed inter alia, the construction of a building with a plinth area of 38,000 g. ft. at an approximate cost of Rs. 10 lakhs and the University was to meet an expenditure of Rs. 5 lakhs from Sir Shankar Lal Charity Trust Fund. The University invited tenders, and on that basis the estimated cost of the project worked out to be Rs. 7,50,000 Those Commission was approached for additional funds. In November 1966 the Commission accepted the proposal of Delhi University for a payment of a grant not exceeding Rs. 2,50,000/- for the completion of the Concert Hall. A grant of Rs. 60,000/- against the Commission's share of Rs. 2,50,000/was paid. One of the conditions of the grants was that the building shall not be named after any person without the approval of the Commission.

The Delhi University has now int mated that Sir Shankar Lal Charity Trust had offered in 1958 a sum of R. 10 lakhs for establishing a Department of Music in the Delhi University to be called Sir Shankar Lal Institute of Music. Out of this amount a sum of R. 5 lakhs was to be utilised for the construction of a Concert Hall and the income on the ramaining R. 5,00,000/- was to be utilised for meeting the expenses of the Institute. The Universit as further intimated that the Executive Council in its meeting held in January 1958 had accepted the condition of the Donor that the Institute be called 'Sir Shankar Lal Institute of Music'. The Concert Hall being a part of the Institute has also to be named after 'Sir Shankar Lal'. Keeping in view the decision of the Executive Council and the fact that a major portion for the construction of the Hall has come from 'The Sir Shankar Lal Charity Trust' and that a substantial sum has been made available by the Trust as Endowment for meeting the expenditure



on 'other charges' of the Department of Music every year the University has suggested that it would be appropriate to name the Hall as "Sir Shankar Lal Concert Hall ". The approval of the Commission is sought for this.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No. 42 (i) To consider the proposal of the Banaras
Hindu University for setting up of a Tulsi Chair
in the Hindi Department.

The Banaras Hindu University has approached the Commission for permitting it to set up a Tulsidas Chair in the University Department of Hindi in connection with the 400th Anniversary of Ramcharit Manas. It may be mentioned in this connection that Sant Tulsidas spent most of his time in Varanasi in writing Ramcharit Manas and is one of the most popular poets of Hindi.

During the Second Plan period, the Commission had agreed to the establishment of Tagore Chairs by creating an endowment of Rs. 4 lakhs to be shared between the Commission and the State Governments of a 75:25 basis. Later, it was decided to provide recurring assistance towards the establishment of Tagore Chairs in the same manner as provided for other development posts, on the sharing basis of 75:25%. Commission at its meeting held on 5th November 1969 considered proposals for the establishment of Guru Nanak Chairs and agreed that Universities which may desire to set up Chairs to be named after Guru Nanak may do so within the total Plan allocation of the University. The Commission noted that, as in the case of other posts sanctioned for postgraduate departments, assistance from the Commission for this purpose would be available (within the Plan allocation), on a 100% basis for the period ending 1973-74 (Resolution no. 9).

The proposal of the Banaras Hindu University to set up a Tulsidas Chair in the Department of Hindi is placed before the Commission for consideration.

Item No. 42 (ii); To consider the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University to continue the M.Lib. Sc. Course.

The University Grants Commission, at its meeting held on 5th August 1970 considered the report of the Committee appointed by it to examine the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University to continue the M.Lib. Science Course (Item No. 8).

The Commission noted that the Banaras Hindu University had restarted M.Lib. Science Course for the academic year 1969-70 on the basis that no additional assistance for this purpose would be required from the U.G.C. The Commission, therefore, regretted its inability to accept the proposal of the Banaras Hindu University (requesting U.G.C. assistance outside the Fourth Plan allocations) for continuation of the M.Lib. Science Course and desired that, as recommended by the expert committee, the University may take steps to strengthen the B.Lib. Science Course and increase the admissions to this course. Proposal for U.G.C. assistance for this purpose be sent to the Commission for consideration. This decision was communicated to the University on 21st August 1970.

The Vice-Chancellor of the University has now informed the Commission that the university has accepted the report of the Committee regarding consolidation of B.Lib.Sc. Course and would be sending proposals to the Commission in this regard. He has further mentioned that in view of a pressing demand the university has decided to continue the M.Lib. Science Course and the university would try to accommodate the expenditure in the Fourth Five Year Flan, if assistance outside the plan is not possible.

It is for consideration if in view of the above, the university may be permitted to continue the M.Lib. Science Course. The Visiting Committee had recommended the provision of one Professor+one Reader+12 Locturers for this course.

The U.G.C. at its meetings held or 5.8.1970 considered the proposal of the Madras University to accommodate within the 4th Plan allocation an amount of R. two lakes as its contribution towards the cost of the furniture and furnishing of the World University Service (Ceentre in Madras. A copy of the note placed before the Commmission is enclosed (Annexure). The Commission regretted its inability to accept the proposal of the Madras University for allocating an amount of R.2 lakes out of the 4th Plan allocation off the University towards the cost of furniture and furnishing of the World University Service Centre in Madras.

The Commission subsequently requested the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Youth Services to obtain the views of the Ministry of Law as to whether it will be technically correct for the University Grants Commission agreeing to provide to the Madras University an amount of Rs. two lakes towards the cost of furniture and furnishing of the World University Service (Ceentre when the building of the centre would belong to the Woorld University Service, Madras Branch and not to the Madras University. An extract of the reply received from the Minnistry of Education and Youth Services is reproduced below:

"It appears from the note urder reference that Madras University has instincted the University Grants Commission that the assects created out of the furds of the Commission would vest in that University. Therefore, the furniture and furnishings of the World University Servicee Certre pruchased with the amount of grant of IRs. 2.00 lakes would vest in Madras University. The fact that the building will belong to the World University Service seems to be immaterial so long as the assets created with the amount of grant vests in Madras University. In this view such a grant; will not contravene any of the provisions of the UUGC Act, 1956."

The University of Madrass was also requested to intimate whether the Building umdder reference with furniture and furnishings which according to the present proposal the Madras University will proviide, will be for the exclusive use of the University and its afffiliated colleges; and who would determine the conditions (lease, charges, fees, etc) relating to the services to be provided. In extract from the letter received from the Vice-Chaancellor Madras University in this regard is reproduced below.

"In regard to the points raised in the second para of your letter, I am to state that the furniture and furnishings which are proposed to be provided by the University to the W.U.S. centre will be for ... the exclusive use of the University and its affiliatted colleges. The pattern of the functioning of the centre, the conditions including the rates of service charges and fees payable for availing the facilities in the centre will be determined by the W.U.S. Committee, Madras centre, which consists of the Vice-Chancellor and Registrar, University of Madras, as President and Treasurer respectively and Principals of colleges affiliated to the committee and student representatives nominated by the Principals at the rate of one representative from each such college as members.

As per the Constitution, the W.U.S. Committee will have as many Principals of colleges as are affiliated to the Committee and an equal number of student representatives. This means, 25 Principals and 25 student representatives. This; is the present situation. The number may increase as new colleges come in. In addition, there will bee only 10 members nominated by the President (Vice Chancellor) in his discretion from amongst educationists, medical practioners and social workers. This means that for all intents and purposes the Committee is a University Committee.

The University of Madras in its proposals to be accommodated within the Fourth Plan allocation of the University has provided an amount of Rs. 2 lakhs as its contribution towards the cost of the furniture and furnishings of the World University Service, Centre in Madras. The World University Service, Madras Branch has constructed a Multipurpose Students Centre near the University Sports Pavilion on a piece of land given by the Government of Tamil Nadu as a gift. The Centre will provide the following facilities:

- 1. Hostel accommodation for research scholars, bachelor teachers, foreign students:
- 2. Dormitories for short stay for visiting youth from foreign countries:
- 3. A fulfledged health centre
- 4. Auditorium for literary and cultural activities
- 5. Hobby workshop
- 6. Co-operative consumer's Stores and Canteen
- 7. Book Bank and Library
- 8. Society for Community Services

The estimated total cost of the project is Rs. 22.28 lakhs as under:

- (a) Building including all services Rs. 16 lakhs
- (b) Equipment for the Health Centre Rs. 2 lakhs
- (c) Furniture and furnishings Rs.4.28 lakhs

The Indian National Committee of the World University Service has managed to obtain a grant of Rs. 16 lakhs from the Danish Government towards the capital cost of the building and Rs. 2 lakhs towards the cost of the equipment required for the Health Centre. The Madras University has also agreed to provide R. 50,000/- towards the project from out of their own resources. Apart from the proposal of the University for allocating Rs. 2 lakhs from out of the Fourth Plan allocation, the University has not approached the State Government or Central Government for any financial assistance for this purpose. The uncovered amount of Rs. 1.78 lakhs is proposed to be arranged locally with the help of local welfare organisations and philanthropists. The University of Madras has agreed to bear the responsibility for the maintenance of the building and the assets created out of the funds of the Commission would vest with the University.



The project is to be inagurated on August 22,1970 and the World Assembly of the World University Service would be meeting in the Centre from August 22 to 30, 1970. An extract of the letter dated 20th July 1970 from the Vice-Chancellor, Madras University, to the Chairman, University Grants Commission is attached (Appendix.)

Extract of letter No.V.1420 dated 29-7-1970 from Vice Chancellor, Madras University to the Chairman University Grants Commission.

While acknowledging with thanks receipt of the letter referred to above, I have pleasure in furnishing the details here below as required therein.

Background about World University Service in Madras.

Madras University Committee of Morld University Service was established in the year 1951 and the Committee is registered under the Society's Act of 1860. The Office of the Committee are located in the University Examination Hall in the Marina. The Committee has implemented a number of student welfare projects such as students wards (separately for men and women) at General Hospital, Madras; wards at Tuberculosis Sanatorium, Tambaram for both men and women students; Op-operative Canteen at Vaishnav College, etc. Beside, a medical consultation centre as well as lending library scheme are also functioning at the World University Service Officer in the University Examination Hall.

Madras Morld University Service Centre:

The newly built multi-purpose student centre is located at Spurtank Road, Egmore, Madras, adjoining the Madras University Sports Favilion on a piece of land alienated by the Government of Tamil Nadu as gift. The centre will house the following facilities:

Basement: - a departmental store, laundry, hair dressing saloon, reception counter.

Ground floor: - a co-operative canteen and a sub-office of the State Bank of India.

<u>Mazzanine floor:</u> World University Service Officer and Juest suite.

First floor: (long-wing) Auditorium with a capacity of 450 scats for cultural and literary activities and also for film shows (16 m.m. projector).

(Short-wing) dormitory for accommodation of 18 persons.

Second floor - (long-wing) 17 rooms (double seater) out of which two rooms are bath attached.

(short-wing) a full-fledged Health Centre comprising of consultation room, E.N.T. Eye, Dental, X-Ray department etc.

Third floor: (long-wing) 17 rooms (double seater) out of which two rooms are bath attached.

(short-wing) Library, reading room and Book-Bank.



Fourth floor: - (long-wing) 17 rooms (double seater) out of which; h two rooms are bath attached.

(short-wing) dormitory for 18 beds.

Fifth floor: (long-wing) a large hall which will provide facilities for establishing crafts centre, music: ; club, photographic society, type-writing and Duplication centre for poor and needy students, Society for Community service etc.

(short-wing) Secretary's quarters.

Note: Hostel accommodation is meant for Research Scholars, bachelor teachers and foreign students numbering on hundred and two in all. Two dormitories with a total capacity of 36 beds will serve for short stay for visiting students and youth from foreign countries as well as other parts of our country.

Total cost of the project amounts to:

(a) Building including all services (viz.) Electricity, water supply, sanitary, lift installations etc.

Of the total cost of Rs. 22. 22 lakhs involved in the project, the Indian National Committee of the World University Service has manageded to obtain a grant from the Danish Government a sum of Rs. 16 lakhs towar dsls the capital cost of the building and Rs. 2 lakhs towards the cost of entire equipments required for the Health Centre at the Building through the kind courtesy of International Committee of World University Service and d with the concurrence of the Ministry of Education, Government of India.

Apart from our request to the University Grants Commission for r a grant of Rs. 2 lakes, we have not approached the Central or State Government nor have they given any funds for the project. The University of Madras, on its part, has agreed to give Rs. 50,000/- from its own fundeds. The remaining sum of Rs. 1.78 lakhs required for the project towards implementing various projects at the Centre will have to be found locally and steps have already been taken to bridge gap with the help of local welfare organisations and philanthrophists.

Maintenance of the building:

The University of Madras having agreed to bear the responsibillity for the main tenance, there will be no problem about this aspect.

Recurring cost:

The rent charges collected from the inmates of the hostel will! be the main source of recurring income. The colleges affiliated to Madras WUS will pay affiliation fees. Revenue is also expected throughh



letting of Seminar Hall/Auditorium to non-political service organisations. No problem is, therefore, foreseen in covering recurring costs. Careful consideration has been given to the aspect of continued maintenance. It is my considered view that this is a viable project.

The WUS enjoys the support of the University, the colleges and the Overnment of Tamil Nadu as well as organisations and individuals.

The project will be inaugurated on the 22nd August, 1970. In that Centre, the World Assembly of W.U.S. is to meet from 22nd August to 30th August and the participants numbering about 150 will have to be accommodated in that Centre itself. The urgency for the completion of the project in all respect has become all the more greater because of this. Excepting for equipments for the Health Centre and furnishing of the building, all the other works have been completed. The equipments required for the Health Centre have been already ordered for by the International World University Service. Geneva and are in different stages of supply. The International W.U.S. will ensure prompt supply. I am sure, you will agree, that the building should be fully furnished at the time of inauguration to serve all purposes expected of this massive project.

Item No. 44: To consider a note orn the scheme for institution of National Associateships.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held in September 1970 while considering a note relating to the Federated Associateship instituted in the International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste, ifelt that it would be useful to initiate a similar programme of Associateships on a national level, to enable outstanding young teachers and research workers to visit institutions of their choice in India for the period extending from 6 to 12 weeks for albout three times within a five year period. The Commission fully endorsed the value and role of such Associateships in the promotion of research activities and desired that relevant details may be worked out with the help of a Committee.

Accordingly a committee consisting of the following was constituted:

- 1. Prof. A.R. Varma, Director, National Physical Laboratory, New Delhi.
- 2. Prof. R.C. Mehrotra, Head of the Deptt. of (Chemistry, Rajasthan University, Jaipur.
- 3. Prof. T.P. Srinivasan, Department of Mathematics, Panjab University, Chamdigarh.
- 4. Prof. S. Krishnaswamy, Head of the Department of Biology, Madurai University, Madurai.
- 5. Prof. S. Maheshwari, Department of Botany, Delhi University.

The Committee met on 23rd October 1970 in the office of the University Grants Commissiom. Professor R.C. Mehrotra could not attend the meeting. The Committee welcomed the institution of the scheme of Associiateships by the Commission. The details of the scheme, as finallised with the help of the above committee are given in the amnexure. The estimated annual expenditure on the implementation of the scheme would be about Rs. 3 lakks per annum.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.



NATIONAL ASSOCIATESHIPS

1. Objectives

To provide opportunities, on a planned basis, to scientists and scholars actively emgaged in research, to visit and work for short periods, at other institutions having special facilities required for promotion of their research in Sciences, Humanities and Social Sciences. These specialised facilities may be in the nature of sophisticated equipment, library services, active group of research workers, etc.

2. Maintenance of a roll

Initially it is proposed to invite upto 100 teachers from universities and colleges to participate in the programme. These persons will be kept on the "National Associateships, roll for a period of upto j years, and within this period can plan to visit the institutions of their choice in India (including universities, national laboratories, and other establishments engaged in research), for a maximum of three times, once in a year, for periods of not more than 12 weeks. This roll of "National Associateships" will be reviewed during the 3rd year initially and thereafter every year to invite more persons to participate as and when positions become open.

3. Nominations and selection

Each University may be requested to send upto ten nominations from amongst the young tteachers in its departments and affiliated colleges. These teachers should be actively engaged in research. Applications may also be invited through advertisement in Press. However, persons who may be selected on basis of direct application will have to obtain the concurrence of the university before their selection is finalised. These nominations can be considered by a committee which would prepare a short list of 100 persons and a reserve list of another 25 to 50 names; subjectwise in order of priority. Awards should be used for collaborative work with the institutions to be visited on a previously agreed basis and not for attending symposia, seminars or short-term courses etc.

4. Planning the visits

Each National Associateship holder will carefully plan his visit well in advance, in consultation with the host institution, indicating clearly the programme of work to be pursued, exact period, type of facilities to be used, and send the same to the UGC, atleast one month prior to the date scheduled for beginning the visit to the Institute, each time. It should also be accompanied by a certificate from the Parent institution that the period is treated as on duty with full pay and a certificate from the host institution accepting the visit by the National Associate and to make available necessary facilities for the work, mutually agreed upon. At the end of the visit a brief report of the work done would be sent to UGC countersigned by both partners.

5. Financial Assistance from UGC:

The UGC will agree to meet the actual cost of travel of the National Associate, once each way from his place of work



to the place of host institution and back. The travel will be undertaken by the class (rail or air) to which he is normally entitled according to his institutions rules. In addition each associate will receive an allowance of Rs; 500/--per calendar month to cower his living expenses either in part or full. No travel or living expenses will be available; in cases where host institution is located in the same city. No other allowances will be available for meeting laboratory expenses or persons accompanying the visit or for any other purpose. In case of real need, the parent institution may consider giving assistance for such special requirements from out of the "Unassigned grant" or "grant for support of research" placed at the disposal of the University by the UGC; during the plan period.

Nomination may be sent to reach the UCC not later than Ist December (each year. The selection should be made by Ist February and awards communicated before Ist Marchi so that awards will become effective from the month of April, beginning of financial year.

Item No. 45: To consider the general question of number of English Language Teaching Summer Institutes to be held during 1971.

The Summer Institutes in English Language Teaching are organised by the University Grants Commission in collaboration with the British Council and the Central Institute of English, Hyderabad. These Institutes are primarily meant for college teachers engaged in teaching English at the Pre-University or first year general English Institutes course . 'are designed to meet the need for a fresh approach to teaching English language: a need which has arisen partly as a result of the changed rolle of English in India.

offering six-week intensive course

These Institutes were organised for the first time So far 53 Institutes have been held and 2558 teachers have participated in these as shown below:

The Advisory Committee on ELT Summer Institutes at their meeting held in November 1969 recommended 18 Institutes to be held during 11970. The Commission, however, decided to provide assistance for 13 Institutes (item 35, Meeting December 3, 1969).

The Evaluation Conference of the Directors of English Language Teaching Summer Institutes (1970) held on July 20-21, 1970, recommended that there should be at least one ELT Summer Institute in each State. The Advisory Committee on EIT Summer Institute and follow-up programme considered this recommendation at their meeting held on October 9, 1970,

and advised that subject to the necessary preparation being done and the adequate faculty members being available, one Summer Institute may be held in each State. The Commission has already invited proposals from the universities for organising ELT Summer Institutes during 1971. These will be placed before the Advisory Committee on ELT Summer Institutess which will be meeting on November 29, 1970, to consider these proposals.

As in the case of the ELT Summer Institutes in the past, the British Council will be providing the services of experts.

The question of number of ELT Summer Institutes that may be held during 1971 may be determined for the guidance of the Advisory Committee as also for advising the British Council about the definite number of experts that may be required for the 1971 programme.

Item No H6: To consider certain Establishment matters of the UGC.

To consider a request from Dr. (Mrs.) Vina Majumdar, Education Officer, UGC for permission to accept the Post of Professor of Political Science, Berhampur University and her release from the study leave bond, and keeping her lien in the UGC for a period of two years and exemption from refund of study leave pay.

Dr. (Mrs.) Vina Majumdar, applied for the post of Professor of Political Science at Berhampur University through the Commission in Nov. 1969. She has now been offered a post of Professor of Political Science on a pay of Rs. 1,480/• in the scale of pay of Rs. 1100-50-1300-60-1600.

In January 1970, she received an offer of Fellowship of Rs. 1600/- p.m. from the Indian Institute of Advanced Study, Simla to undertake research work on "University Education and Social Change in India". The Fellowship was available for 2 academic years of the Institute terminating on the 30th November 1971. On her request, she was sanctioned study leave for the purpose w.e.f. 13th April 1970 to 30th November 1971 to undertake the project under a bond executed by her as prescribed under the Study Leave Rules containing, inter-alia, the condition that in the event of her resigning or retiring from service without returning to duty after the expiry of the study leave, or at any time within the period of 3 years after her return to duty, she would forthwith pay to the UGC or as might be directed by the UGC, on demand, a sum of Rs. 24,000/- which was double (approximately) the amount of the leave salary which was likely to be drawn at the rate of Rs. 600/- p.m. during the period of the study leave.

Since she has received an offer from the Berhampur University, she has requested vide her letter dated 6th October *annexure1970 (copy enclosed)* that :-

- She may be permitted to accept the offer of the Berhampur University by releasing her from the bond executed by her when she was sanctioned study leave for the period from 13th April 1970 to 30th November 1971:
- to terminate her study leave from 1.10.1970 and grant her leave without pay from Ist October 1970 to 31st December 1970;



- (iii) to exempt her from the refund of the study leavweve sa paid to herr for the period from 13th April 197000 to 30th September 1970; and
- (iv) to permit ther to retain her lien on her post off f Education (Officer in the UGC for the period fromm 1.1.1971 to 31.12.1972.



This is to confirm that I would like to accept the offer of the Berhampur University for the post of Professor of Political Science from Ist January 19771. May I therefore request the Commission to:

- i) permit me to accept the cffer of the Berhampur University by releasing me from the bond executed by me when I was sancticored study leave for the period 13th April 1970 ttc 30th November 1971:
- ii) terminate my study leave from 1.10.70 and grant me leave without pay from 11.10.70 to 31.12.70:
- exempt me from the refurnd of the study leave allowance paid to me for the period 13.4.70 to 30.9.70 in view of my past service in the U.G.C. and the work already dorne by me on the research project approved by the Commission. I have completed two papers on the subject, and expect to complete one more before leaving this Institute in December. I have also been appointed Convener and Editor of a Seminar of Management and Organisation of Indian Universities, which is proposed to be held at Mysore in January 1971, and at the request of the Director, I.I.A.S. have prepared the working plan for the Seminar; and
 - iv) permit me to retain a lii€n on my post in the UGC, for two years, viz. from 1.1.71 to 31.12.72.

Item No. 47: To consider whether the grants already sanctioned to the University on the basis of the Visiting Committee's recommendations for development of teacher education programmes for the period ending 1973-74 should be paid out of the amount of Rs. 8 crores provided for teacher education in the Fourth Plan allocation of the University Grants Commission.

The Commission at its meeting held on 3rd October, 1969 considered the proposal of the Indore University for assistance for the College of Education under the provision available to the University Grants Commission for improvement of teacher education in universities and teacher training colleges during the Fourth Plan period. The Commission agreed that for the present, assistance to universities for the development of teacher education programme, already agree to may be provided within the overall allocations made to be for the pariod ending 1973-74; and the matter reviewed next year in the light of funds made available to the University Grants Commission (Resolution No. 13 dated 3rd October 1969).

The Indoore Universith has again approached the Commission with the request that the provision of Rs. 5,07,500/-made by it within the IV plan allocation for the college of education, as destailed below, may not be taken into account while considering the schemes to be accommodated within its overall Fourth Plam allocation:-

A statement indicating the commission's commitment to universities for development for their education departments during the currentt plan period is attached (Annexure).

It may be mentioned in this connection that the Government of India while intimating the Plan allocation of the UGC included the scheme for the development of teacher



education to be undertaken by the Commission. Some of the programmes initiated by the Commission under the scheme of development of teacher education such as fellowships; inter-disciplinary research etc. are already being assisted outside the plan allocation. The visiting committees apposinted by the Commission to examine the development proposals of education departments in the universities have also recommended that assistance to the universities concerned may be provided outside the plan allocation and out of fundls provided for teacher education.

It is for consideration whether the proposal of the Indore University for assistance towards the College off Education outside the plan allocation be accepted and a similar decision taken in respect of other universities.

The matter is placed before the Commission for consideration.
