PART-I

DEVELOPMENTAL ACTIVITIES OF STATE EDUCATIONAL RESEARCH AND TRAINING FOR THE YEAR- 1987-88

The Department of State Educational Research and Training came into existence in the year 1975 in Uringing all the academic Units of the Department of Public Instruction under one Directorate. The main objective of this Directorate is to improve the quality of school Education in all respects. The academic Units of this Directorate organise Orientation Courses, Workshops, Seminars and Exhibitions etc., on various subjects required for the qualitative improvement on school Education.

The following are the academic Units working in the Directorate.

- 1. State Institute of Education(SIE)
- 2. State Institute of Science (SI S)
- 3. State Evaluation Unit(SEU)
- 4. Educational Vocational Guidance Unit(EVG)
- 5. Educational Rechnelogy Coll(ETC)
- 6. Audio Visual Education (AVE)
- 7. Directorate of Text Books (DTB)

These academic Units take up Educational Programmes every year under Plan and Non-Plan Schemes in the State Budget for Education. Secondly, these Units serve as co-ordinating agencies at the State Level for the implementation of N.C.E.R.T. C.C.R.T, UNICEF World Bank and Government of India Aided Projects.

The details of Educational Programmes taken up in each unit during the year 1987-88 are as follows.

I. STAFE INSTITUTE OF EIUCATION:

This Unit takes up activities for the improvement of Teacher Education, academic supervision of Teacher Training Institutes, Programmes on Orientation training of various subjects, Innovations and Fublications.

(1) ORIENTATION TRAINING PROGRAMME:

The Programmes on techniques of teaching Kannada to Non-Kannada Pupils was prranged at Dharwad. The purpose of conducting this programme is to develop new techniques in teaching of Kannada. The duration of the Course is 4 days. 40 High School Teachers were called for the programme, out of which 27 were attended.

(2) EXCELLINCE IN PRIMARY EDUCATION:

A Programme of Excellence in Primary Education was taken up. Projects on problems of primary education were collected from Primary School Peachers by wide propoganda, and it was screened by the judging committee and the award worth Rs.500/- each was given to the best eight Projects.

(3) PUPLICATION OF PRATHAMIKA SHIKSHAKA:

This is a quarterly Magazine and was given for printing for the quarters ending June-September and December 1987 in order to provide scope for innovations in Education. The articles from various Educational Officers/Teacher Educators/Teachers were collected as usual.

Academic guidance visit was launched by the Officers of S.I.E. Unit. They visited Teacher Training Institution reviewed and necessary academic guidance was given to the Teacher Educators on regular and C.C.V.C. Courses.

(4) S.U.P.W. PROGRAMME TOR HICH SCHOOL TEACHERS AND PRIMARY SCHOOL TEACHERS.

Workshops were conducted for Primary School Teachers at Tumkur, Mysore, Kanakapur, Mangalore and Bellary. The main concept of the programme is reaffirmation of the Gandhian concept of Socially Useful Productive Work and moulding the shapes of young generation in the Present system of education,

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During the year 1937-88, five workshops have been conducted and 207 teachers have been benefitted.

NATIONAL PROGRAMME OF MASS ORIENTATION FOR SCHOOL TEACHERS

The National Policy on Education install hopes to bring transformation in Educational arena to meet the challenges of the present and future of our society. It reposes faith in the teaching community for the great task ahead. It envisages to over-haul the system of teacher education. It recognises Teacher Education as a continuous process and its preservice and Inservice components are inseparable". Hence, the G vernment of India have formulated the programme of mass Orientation for School teachers in 1986. Now we have completed second yearly cycle of the programme : The modalities of the Programme were developed and administered by the National Council of Educational Research and Training, New Delhi. The Government of Karnataka administered the programme through the Department of State Educational Research and Training, Bangalore 560004. The NCERT has provided General guidelines to the State Implementing Agency. Accordingly Rs.57.5 lakhs was sanctioned for Orientating 474 Resource Persons and 18,277 Primary and 4,095 Secondary Teachers in about 116 Centres. The Karnataka State have made a budget provision of Rs.6.00 lakhs to meet the travelling expenses of the participating teachers. Orientation programmes were organised in 116 Centres in four cycles from 26-5-1987 to 7-7-1987, 18,499 Primary and 3,974 Secondary School teachers were participated. 448 Resource Persons(including course Directors) conducted 449 Camps.

II. STATE INSEITUTE OF SCIENCE:

This Unit deals with activities for qualitative improvement in teaching of Science and Mathematics at Primary and Secondary

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stages. The following activities have been undertaken during the year 1987-88.

1. ORLENTATION-CULI-MIRVODCLOGY PROGRAMME:

6 Programmes on Content Orientation-cum-Methodology courses in Science for higher Frimery School teachers level were conducted. The purpose of this programme is to enlighten about the new trends of teaching of science through environmental and encuiry approach for Primary school teachers to equip them with the use of improvised apparatus and to raise the standard of Science Education. These programmes were conducted at Davangere, Nelamangala, Pavagada, Hunsur, Gowribidanur and Karwar with a duration of 3 days for each programme. The total number of Higher Primary School teachers invited for these 6 Courses were 360. 342 Teachers attended the programme and were benefitted.

(2) MOBILE SCIENCE VAL PROGRAMME:

In order to create interest and gurigsity in Science among rural children and also to provide an opportunity to Primary School Teachers to demonstrate experiments, the mobile science von programme was developed and the same is found to be useful also. The staff members of the Science Unit of D.S.E.R.T. Attended and demonstrated the science experiments to primary school teachers and pupils 350 teachers and 9,708 pupils were covered in this programme during the year 1987-88.

(3) STATE LEVEL SCIENCE SEMINAR:

A Science Seminar Programme was organised at State Level at V.I.T.M. Auditorium, Bangalore, to develop Scientific attitude and to realise the social relevance of science to society. The duration of Seminar was one day only. 41 Participants attended the seminar.

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(4) <u>DISTRICT LEVEL SCLENCE EXHIBITION</u>:

Exhibition at District level was conducted at district head quarters on the similar lines as at State level and 105 deserving students were given prizes.

(5) STATE LEVEL SCIENCE EXHIBITION:

State level Science Exhibition was organised at Dharwad for a period of 5 days in order to develop interest and Scientific skills in Science, 100 tenchers and 200 students attended the exhibition, 19 students and also 6 schools won awards in this connection.

(6) SOUTHERN INDIA SCIENCE FAIR: -

Zonal level Science fair was conduted at Madras for a period of 6 days. 55 teachers and 70 condidates participated in the fair. Scholarships to 3 students and cash swards for 3 teachers were given.

(7) CENTRES FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION:

. .

After the implementation of (10+2) pattern of school Education in Karnataka and due to new curriculam, it was falt necessary that Proper Orientation in this filld was as ntial. Therefore, the NCERT, New Delhi has set up C atres for continuing aducation in collobatation with the State Government at 12 places.

The main objective of these centres is to orient the Secondary School teachers in various subjects selected from the revised syllabi.

There are 12 C.C.E. Centres in the State. They are located at
D.S.E.R.T., Bongolore, Government Practising school, Mangalore,
D.R.R.High School, Devengere and 9 Centres at Government Junior C 19
Jolleges situated at Gulbarga. Dharwar, Belgaum, Reichur, Bellary
Bijapur, Mysore, Shimoga and Karwar. They provide tutorials for
correspondence courses in various subjects, arrange contact
programmes and also out as consultancy centres.

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During 1987-88, 102 programmes were conducted covering 3,020 teachers, under the above programme.

(8) ORIENTATION TRAINING CENTRE AT D.S.E.R.T.

There is one Orientation training Centre in the Science Block, D.S.E.R.T., Bangalore. Training is imparted to the inservice Teachers of Higher Primary Schools on Science and in teaching of Science. Inservice teachers will be deputed by the Assistant Educational Officers for 30 days. In the academic year 3 to 5 batches of teachers were trained under the above programme.

The aims and objectives of the Training are as follows: -

 To enable the teachers to present the fundamental concepts of Science in a simple and procise manner and also to relate these concepts to experience and activities in life situations.
 To improve the brokground knowledge of the teachers through lecture-cum-Demonstration, I spans and Discussions.

3. To provide good training in the improvisation of apparatus and experiments by using locally available inexpensive materials.

4. To improve the Acthodelogy of Science teaching by using various Methods.

During the year 1987-38, 91 teachers have undergone training in this centre. Due to economy measure it was unable to conduct programme for 2 more batches.

III. STATE EVALUATION UNIF:-

This unit was storted with the sole intention of improving evaluation techniques at Primary and Secondary levels. The emphasis is to suggest remodies at Primary and secondary level through prenaration of unit plans and unit tests.

PROGRAMMES . OFIENTATION TRAINING:-

10 Evaluation Orientation Courses were arranged during the year 1987-88 for the selected teachers of Primary and Secondary Schools at Bidar, Mulbagal, Belgaum, Chitradurga, Haveri, Hospet, Sagar, Bidar, Calbarga and Bagalkote covering preparation of Unit Plans, Unit tests, preparation of question papers and question bank.

Two Evaluation Orientation programmes exclusively for Urdu and Kannada languages teachers were arranged at Gulbarga and Bidar.

In all, Rs.74,343-65 have been spont on these programmes and the total number of beneficiaries covered in 10 camps were 404.

Cyclostyce copies of the Brochure containing the literature on Evaluation and the Unit Plans and Tests/Sample Question maners developed at the workshops were also brought out in 10 camps.

Analysis of S.S.L.O. Results of 1987 for fresh and private students was taken up and instructions were issued for zero percent and below 20% High Schools to improve the performance in the ensuing years. All the Deputy Directors of Public Instruction were informed to take suitable action for good performance in the High Schools of Zero to 20% of S.S.L.C. Examination results. The staff of Evaluation Unit also visited the Zero percentage High Schools and guided the concerned Headmasters and staff for improvement. Total number of such schools visited were 29, out of which 28 schools have improved their results in S.S.L.C. Examination held in March 1988.

IV. EDUCATIONAL VOCATIONAL GUIDANCE UNIT: -

The main work of this unit is to help the students to help themselves to solve their Educational, Vocational and personal problems. Orientation programmers were organised for the burfit of the Hard Masters, Assistant Masters of Sceondary Schools, students

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of B.Ed.Colleges and Teacher Fraining Institutes on Educational and Vocational Guidance.

During the year 1987-88, the following programmes were taken up in the Unit.

(1) ORLENTATION PROGRAMMES TO MEAD MASTERS:-

Four Orientation programmes to Head Masters of High School were conducted by Bangalore. Gulbarga, Belgaum and Mangalore for a period of two days at each place on Guidance. 180 Headmasters were invited. Out of which 122 participants attended and were benefitted.

(2) CAREER MASTERS PROGRAMME FOR HIGH SCHOOL TEACHERS: -

Two Career Mosters programme were organised for a period of 14 days each at Belgaum and Mysore for High School Teachers. 90 participants were called for, out of which 58 persons attended the programme and were benefitted.

(3) ORIENTATION PROGRAMME FOR THE STUDENTS OF B.ED COLLEGES AND T.T.T'S.

Orightation Programmes for the students of B.Ed.Colleges and Teacher Training Institutes were taken up in 15 B.Ed. Colleges & 2 Teacher Training Institutes. 1650 Condidates were benefitted in B.Ed.Colleges and 150 condidates in Teacher Training Institutes.

Similarly; 2 High Schools/ Junior Colleges were also covered under this programme and 300 students were benefitted.

(4) PRE-VOCATIONAL TRAINING:

There are seven Pre-vocational training Centres in the State. These Contros were started with a view to develop educational as well as Vocational skills to educationally backward children. The course is for three years with General and craft subjects. Admission for this course is IV Standard.

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After the completion of IH year P.V.T.C. they are eligible to join VIII Standard of high school or take up job in factories or selfemployment. These institutions are located at Anekal. Challakere, Malavalli, Kota, Hansabhavi, Almatti and Koppal in Karnataka State.

2,000 copies of Guidance Journal were printed and distributed.

V. EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY CELL:-

This cell consists of one Deputy Director and two Script-cum-Programme writers. It bots as a liason between All India Radio and Department of Public Instruction in the Projuction and broad casting of the Educational Programmes in the State. The two important Programmes takenup are Parimala[®] and "Nandanavana".

ACTIVITIES:

(1) CLASS PROJECT ON COMPTIERS: -

Class Project was started during the year 1984-85 by National Council of Educational Research and Training (N.C.E.R.T), New Delhi. with the assistance of E.T.Cell. The Project is implemented in a phased manner. In the first phase of 1984-85, seven Junior Colleges were benefitted with B.B.C. Micro-Computers in order to bring about the awareness of computerisation among teachers and students. Three teachers in each college were trained so as to fater the mode of the Pre-University students on computerisation.

In the Second and Third Phases, 16 & 23 Junior Colleges were benefitted with J.P.C.Micro Computers during the years 1985-86 and 1986-87.

On similar lines, 40 Junior Colleges With Schools were taken up in the 4th Phase during the year 1987-88 under class Project.

The Educational Technology Coll has produced three computer soft ware package in Science and Mathematics topics. These are distributed to class Projects institutions for being used as teaching aids.

2. PRODUCTION OF AUDIO PAPES:

Cosettes of Konnada Poems from the prescribed texts of V. VI Standard have been produced by Educational Technology Cell one set each alongwith a tape recorder were supplied to 78 Primary Schools through Assistant Educational Officers for using these as teaching hids in class room to encourage effective teaching of the language 425 casettes and 48 type-recorders were supplied.

Radio panel Meeting for preparation of syllabus in respect of primary and Secondary brond cast was conducted by AIR, Bangalore, the lessons of which are then to be broad casted as per scheduled time.

3. ENCOURAGEMENT TO CULPURAL PROGRAMME: -

Deputation of Primary and Secondary School Teachers are being made for encouragements cultural programme every year.

(i) Orientation Course for High School teachers organised by Centre for cultural Resource and Training, New Delhi, 114 Assistant Teachers of High Schools and 16 Head Masters of High Schools were deputed for the Orientation course on Arts and Culture.

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(ii) Puppetry course for High School Teachers.

16 Teachers from High School were deputed for puppetry course at New Delhi.

(iii) <u>Puppetry course for Primary School Teachers</u>, 93 Assistant Teachers and 12 Headmosters of Higher Primary School were deputed for puppetry course on Education.

(iv) Socially Useful Productive Wark, 26 teachers were deputed for the SUPW Programme.

(v) Cultural Talent Search Scholarship Scheme.

49 applications received for the above scholarship have been sent to C.C.R.T, New Delhi.

Workshop on role of Schools the conservation of cultural and Natisel Heritage was conducted by C.C.R.T., New Delhi during the year 1987-88. 19 High School Teachers attended the training programme.

4. DI STRI BUTION OF TWO-IN-ONES TO THE PRIMARY SCHOOLS:-

Under the Black Broad Scheme, 3,754 Primary Schools have been selected for the distribution of Two-in-Ones to improve the standard of education. The Government of India is financing for the above scheme.

VI. AUDIO VISUAL EDUC/TION UNIT:-

This Unit being the Technical wing of the Department, is incharge of Matters pertaining to Audio-Visual Technology. As a part of this, the Unit deals with all the Technical Matters like Educational Films, strips sliders and the conventional teaching aids like charts, maps, globes, Models specimen etc. Further, it deals with Herdware and Software inclia and inputs.

In the direction of promotion Audio-visual-Education in the State, the Unit circulated 1500 Education Films of 16 M.M. format on content and Methodology to 280 A.V.E. Centres.

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Under this programme, about 2,50,000 children of Higher primary schools, High Schools and Junior Colleges were the beneficiaties.

On an average each AVE Centre has screened 40 to 50 films during the year.

All the Assistant Educational Officers in the State were supplied with filmstrips and slides on various aspects with the intension that they should use them in their respective taluks with the help of either the Film-Strip-cum-slide Projectors provided to them by the Department or utilising the Projects in the nearby schools. Thus they were provided to use these soft-ware items year after year through the Teachers Associations, Shikshak Bhavans and also through the Schools themselves.

To facilitate School systems to have ulti-media approach to teaching-learning situations, a large number of institutions were permitted to purchase out of their own resources diverse audio-visual equipments like Radio, Twomin-one Recorder, Television, Filmstrips cum-slide Projector, over-head Projector, slide viewers, Reflex viewers Public address system and 16 m.m. sound Movie Projectors.

VII. NATIONAL PALEN? SEARCH EXAMINATION-1987.

The National Council of Elucational Research and Training N.C.E.R.T. New Delhi, has decentralised the scheme of conducting the National Talent Search Examination and vested the responsibility of conduct of I Phase to State Authority and the II Phase is attended by the N.C.E.R.T. New Delhi. In Karnataka, this examination was started from the year 1984.

OBJECTIVES:

The main objectives of this scheme is to identify, encourage and develops talent among young pupils.

PROSPECTS:

Those who emerge as National Talent Search in the I and II phase and then in Final Interview are eligible for scholars hips

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awarded by N.C.E.T., New Delbi, till they complete their higher course in the faculty selected by them. The scholarships are owarded every month. The amount of Scholarship depends on the Course of study. In addition to the monthly Scholarship in the beginning of the year, book grants and cloth grant will also be given.

ELICI BILITY:

The National Talent Search Examination is conducted for bonafide X Standard Pupils who have scored 55% at their IX standard Examination and in the case of Scheduled caste and Scheduled tribes pupils, the percentage of Marks is 45%

I PHASE OF EXAMINATION BY STATE:-

The first Phase of Examination comprises two papers namely.

1. General Mental Ability Test (GMAT)

2. Scholastic Apptitude Test (SAT)

Each paper consists of 100 objectives type of items. The first is common for all condidates where as, the second paper is an optional one. Out of eight subjects, pupil conselect any four from Thysics, Chemistry, Mathematics, Biology, Civics, History, Geography and Economics.

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DETAILS OF THE N.T.S. EXAMINATION CONDUCTED DURING

1. The first Phase of National Talent Search Examination was conducted on 6th December 1987 in all the 21 District Centres in the State. The total number of candidates appeared for the Examination was 4,210, out of which 155 candidates were selected for the II Phase Examination.

2. These 155 candidates appeared for the II Phase Examination conducted by the N.C.E.R.T. New Delhi during May 1988 at Bangalore. Out of these 155 candidates, 57 candidates were eligible for the interview.

3. Again, there we condidates appeared for the interview, out of which 24 condidates encounceded in the interview and they were awarded the scholarship from D.V.C. and on ards level till they complete -their study in the scleeted faculty.

XII. DIRECTORATE OF TEXT BOYS: -

The Directorate of Text Books is headed by the Director who is of the rank of Director of Public Instruction. It comprises of 5 sections whose set up and functions are as below:-

2. Preparation of Curriculum and Syllabus and Preparation, prescription of Text Books various special examinations. such as Kannada Pandit, Urdu Munshi, in Hi Vidwan Courses and Courses in Sanskrita, Art, Music, Dance, Course eve., coming under the perview of the department of Fublic Instruction.

3. Preparation of Reacher's hand Books 1 to 10 Source Books, work books, glossary etc.

4. Undertaking research projects for qualitative improvement of Text books.

5. Conduct of workshops, training programme review of Text books and Seminars.

6. Production of Children's literature.

7. Participation in Book Fairs Seminars and Conference.

8. Recommendation of supplementary Readers and copy writing books in various languages for Frimary classes.

9. Revision and review of syllabus and text books as and when required.

10. correcting the reprints of Text Books for further printing.

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II. ADMINISTRATIVE SECTION: -

The administrative section has an Administrative Officer with supporting stoff. The functions of the administrative section are as follows.

1. Assisting the Director, Deputy Director and Other Officers in the administrative and establishment matters.

2. Arranging for payment of royalties to copywright holders.

3. Appointment of Proof readers.

4. Matters relating to allotment of condessional paper.

III. TEXT BOOKS MONITORING SECTION: -

Consists of a Senior Assistant Director of Public Instruction with supporting staff. Its main functions are.

1. Furnishing statistics, relating to requirement of Text books to the Government Text Book Press, Mysore.

2. Sending corrected copies of text books for printing.

3. Watching the progress of printing and distribution of text books.

4. Attending to grivences regarding supply of text books.

5. Visiting Government Text Book Depots. and Distribution Centres.

IV. ACCOUNTS SECTION: -

Consists of an accounts Officer with supporting staff from State Accounts Department. Its main functions are.

1. Assisting in financial matters relating to all aspects pertaining to all sections of Text Book Unit.

2. Sending proposals regarding budget and allotment.

3. Offering remarks on financial bills.

V. PRINTING SECTION:-

It is headed by the Deputy Director of Text Books (Printing) with head quarters at Mysore. The Government branch text book press at Gulbarge comes under its control. Two divisional Joint Directors and 19 District Deputy Directors act as Ex-officio Joint Director and Deputy Directors of Text Books.

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THE FUNCTIONS OF THE STORION:-

- 1. Collection of Indents and essessing the Print runs.
- 2. Calling for Printers, assessing the technical potential

of Printers and giving print orders.

- 3. Supply of concessional and cover paper and other materials to printers for setting their bills.
- 4. Watching the Progress of printing.



Karnataka is one of the States which has #ccented implementetion of the Project. Greater emphasis is placed on Health and Environmental Satitation concepts Particularly where they provide the opportunity to incorporate messages relating to other sectoral programme such as Health and water into the formal primary curriculam.

OBJECTIVES: -

The objective of the scheme is to help teachers understand ۲۲ and practice the technique of integrating nutrition, Health concepts of the Primary School Curriculam.

2. To develop instructional materials on Nutrition Health Education and Environmental Sanitation suited for Primary Stage and to develop teacher guide clso.

3. To devise means for the benefit of Public especially for Women and children of scheduled caste and scheduled Tribes.

"At State level, Department of State Educational Research and Training, Bangalore is the implementing agency of the Project.

ORGANI SATION: -

As a part of the activities of the Project, 100 schools are selected from Chitradurga and Heriyur Taluks (50 Schools each) of Karnataka State. The Project was started in July 1983 onwards: Projects Assistants were appointed in July 1983 and were given Training in November 1983 in Avienshilingan Home Science College, Coimbature.

PROGRAMMES AND ACTIVITIES: -

.1. During the year 1987-88, one Orientation course for the Teachers on tools and techniques of Pryout materials for 1 to IV Standard for a period of 3 days was conducted.

2. During the year 1987-38, the meeting of Community Members from 25 selected yillages for period of one day. 25 Participants were attended. In two meetings, discussed about 10 messages, its impaction villages.

A test was conducted in school to see the Result of improvement regarding the Nutrition Health and Environmental Semitation Education concepts.

1. An Orientation course for filling up of M.T.S. (Master Tabulation sheet) of F.A.T. (Pupkl Achievement Test) is conducted to 14 Participants.

2. An Orientation course for filling up M.T.S. (Master Tabulation Sheet) of G.C.P.(Community Contact programme) is conducted to 14 Participants.

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3. A meeting of Teachers and Parents was conducted to findout the future community contact Programme for followup of UNICEF messages.

PUBLICATIONS; -

1) Supplementary Readers for Standard I toIV each Class one booklet (4,000 Copies) were got printed.

2) Teacher-Guide for-I to IV Standard-Teachers on Nutrition Health and Environmental Sanitation Education was prepared and 4,000 copieswere got printed.

3) .2,500 copies.of a Test booklet for conduct of pupil Achievement Test and Instruction materials to Teachers/Headmasters were got printed.

Totally 6520 students were attended and for improvement of NHEES concepts; it has been tabulated and results shows that 60% to 80% has been achieved.

3,324 families of 25 villages were surveyed for Community Contact Programme on 10 WNICEF messages.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATION:-

Rs.89,463-70 has been spent for the Project work as per the Plan of action during the year 1987-88.

PRIMARY EDUCATION CURRICULUM RENEWAL PROJECT:

This Project.was started in the year 1977 in the three districts of the State at Bangalore City South, Kodagu and Mangalore as first phase. In the year 1980 the Project was extended to 10 more districts at Mysore, Chickmanolore, Shimoge, Tumkur, Chitradurga, Kolar, Bellary, Raichur, Sali and Abdar.

At Present the Project is being implemented in 13-districts covering 127 Primary Schools at the rate of 10 schools in each District. Further, the Districts have been grouped into four different clusters taking into account the Socio-Economic, Geographical and cultural variations of the places.

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The Primary Schools Teachers of remained education are involved and trained in the implementation of the Project. These project schools are attached to the nearby relected Teacher Training Institutes for Guidance and Supervision.

OBJECTIVES: -

The main objectives of this Project are.

1. To develop innovative curriculam which can meet the Educational needs of different groups of children. especially children belonging to disadvantaged sections of the society.

2. To adjust the curriculam qualitatively to the life style of the child and Socio-Economic opportunities likely to be available i.e. need based curricula.

3. To make the existing Primary Education more effective by infusing gradually into school chrriculam through the innovative ideas.

4. To enable the teachers on concentration of Minimum Learning continuam.

PROGRET ":-

1. During the year, 13 Programmes were conducted at Bangalore, Mysore, Odipi, Kudige, Shimoga, Chickmagalur, Tumkur, Kolar, Malladihalli, Bidar, Sindhanur, Kamalapurwand Bellary for a period of eight days. 538 Teachers of I to IV Standards were called for the training. Out of which 462 participants attended & benefitted.

2. Training to Inspecting Officers at District and Taluk level, 13 Superintendents from Teacher Training Institutes and 15 Assistant Educational Officers were Oriented at D.S.E.P.L, Bangalore.

3. INTRODUCTION OF TIXE DOORS OF PROJECTS:-

During the year 1984-85, text books of I Standard was introduced-and during the year 1985-86, text books of 11 Standard (Instruct tional materials) have been distributed to-all-130 Project schools -through the Teacher Training Institutes concerned for implementation of the Project for II Standard. During the year 1987-88, text books, of 111 Standard in 60 titles have been distributed to all the 130 Project Schools and also 60 Books for the year 1988-89.same books have been supplied in advance to 13 Teacher Training Institutes... During 1988-89; IV Standard Instructional Materials developed in all six subjects on all 13 titles printed and supplied to all 13 Yek hers Training Institutes and 127 Project Schoolg.

II Standard Tryout reports have been collected from the selecte schools. On the basis of these Tryout reports, II Standard Instructional Materials will be revised for wider adoption. III Standard and IV Tryout reports were designed and prepared and distributed to all the 13 Teacher Training Institutes for collection of data.

FINANCIAL IMPLICATION: -

Finance for this Project is from two sources. The first source is from the UNICEF Funds. The Second Source is from the STATE Funds The expenditure on academic work is met from UNICEF funds. The maintenance of Project Volicles and transportation charges of equipments and materials are met from State funds.

PARTICIPATION:

This Project was started during the year 1977 alongwith i Project II with an establishment of two Community Centres at Ambalpadi and Kudlur in South Kanara and Kodagu. Districts in the I Phase. In the II Phase during 1981, three more Centres were started at Belagumba, Kengunte, Halladakeri in Tumbur. Chitradergo and Bider Districts. respectively. Thus at present five community Centres are working and they are financed mainly by UNICEE funds.

OBJECTIVES:-

- 1. To improve the health condition of children and young mothers.
- 2. To make the people participate through community activities and education for their improvement.
- 3. To reduce the Educational Wastage at Primary legal.
- 4. To reach the goal of Universalisation of Primary Education. ORGANISATION:-

The implementation Agency at State Level is Department of State Educational Research and Training, Bangaloxe. These five Centres are attached to the nearby Teachers Training Institutes for supervision and Guidance. The Supervisory staff of these Teacher Training Institutes have been trained with reference to the Project work. The Primary, School Teachers are, appointed as Secretaries and Assistants in these community Centres." Officers and officials of other Department at District level extend their

assistance. Each Gentre has four persons to Carry out the Programmes and they are community workers, Assistant Community Workers, Helpers and Craft Peachers. All these workers are paid nominal Honorarium from the DFLCEF funds. All these Centres are supplied with articles like Educational Toys, Radio, PL-y materials, children Library Public Address Equipment System Carpenter Kit, Cycle Repair Kit, Agricultural Implements and petromax lights etc., State Government is assisting these Centres to the extent Rs.2000/- per Centre per year.

ACTIVITIES:-

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The activities of these Centres are divided into four graups according to agg i.e. (0-3 years), -(3-6 years), 6-14 Years) and (15-35 Years) and above. The details of activity are as follows.

I Group: (On3 Years) In this group, pregnant wamen and, young mothers are involved. Health Care for children and preventive measures for infent diseases are taken up by arganizing comps in these Centres with the Assistance of Medical Department and Supply of M Nutritions food by World Health Organization.

II Group (3-6 Years)

This group relates to Pre-^Primary. Children, Play materials and Toys for the young children have been installed in the premises of the Gentres for recreation of Children, Children between (3-6 Years) attend the Classes run by the Centres and they are called as Pre-Primary. Schools or Angenawadi Literacy is introduced to some extent, Children are fed and they are encouraged to use of playmaterials supplied by UNICEF.

III Group (6-14 years)

In this group, literney and numerary are introduced. Nonformal Centres are attached to these Centres for conducting classes

in the exeming Booklets are supplied to these Centres. Training on Gardenning, Socially Useful Productive Work Programmes are introduced. Clay modelling, Paper work stc., are also arranged. Uniforms for all-the Children are supplied and Medical Examination for Children also taken up.

IV. Group (15-35 Years)-

Adult Education Centrosacre arranged for teaching language and Arithmetic Elgmentary Knowledge of agricultural operations, Poultry, Small Scale industries with regard to local community activities are given to them various other programmes like sports; Recreation National Programmes, Droma, Bhajans, Film shows etc., are conducted. or State Celebrations are also Organised. Thus & local Community activities alongwith school Education are taken up in these Centres to develop closer interaction of schools with the Community Centres, During the year 1987-88, Re-organisation programmes for Community ... workers was conducted at Bider. The Participants were Superintendents of attached Teacher Training Institutes, Teacher Educators who are actually involved in the activities of these centres, Community workers and members of Yuvaka and Yuvathi Mandalis. They were Orjented regarding utilising the available sources for the development of the centres. Apart from it, more activities of Socially Useful Productive Work were actually demonstrated for the benefit of Community people to enable them to select any of the activities

60 Smokeless Chullas were installed in all the 5 Centres, Head Masters and Teachers of Project Schools were oriented.

FINANCE: -

Rs. 57,880 was allotted from UNICEF for the implementation of the programmes, during the year 1987-88, out of these 32,380 was spent. Rs.15,000 was allotted from the State Fund and

IV. FARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION :-

This UNLCEF essisted Project was implemented in the year 1982 after_selecting 65 experimentel pre-school Combues attached to., Government Primery School and Located in Backward areas.of Karnataka All_the Districts have these_Centres, Five_Teacher Training Institions were selected for strengthening the nursery training for teachers.

The main objectives of this Unit are:-

- 1. To strengthen the Pre-Primary Education and Teacher Training in the State.
- 2. To develop basic learning and play materials for Pre-School going children.
- 3. To introduce activity-cum-Pleyway Method in order to reduce dropout rate at higher level. This method is extended to classes I and II to attract the children and to-make it a supporting system for Universi lisation of Education.
- 4. To improve the health condition of children and alround development of the children.

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ACTIVITIES:-

1... Refresher course for school Mothers in Music and puppetry was conducted for ten days involving an expenditure of Rs.5000/-. This was conducted in two batches with 25 teachers in each during April 1987.

2. Workshop for preparing low cost teaching aids on-Several topics and subjects for standard I. Training was-conducted for ten days with 45 participants. The expenditure incurred on this account was Rs.45,000/-

5. Toys and Play materials alongwith- steel almirahs were supplied to the Centres. These gift materials from UNICEF were worth Rs.85,000/-

Thus, all the Pre-school Centres are equipped with furniture, Play and Learning materials.

COMPREHEISTVE ACCESS OF PRIMARY EDUCATION:-

. The Project was started in the year 1979 with a programme for the minimum Educational needsof large number of non-school going children of age group 6 to 14 years by why of Non-formal education. Non-School going children of age group 6 to 14 years are involved in this project.

The Government has made sincere efforts for the Universalisation of Primary Education. Inspite of these efforts, our literacy rate has not shown appreciable progress. Many children will either drop out or Stagnate in the Primary education level. The reasons are, many. The Major problem is how to relate aducation to the Socio-Economic development of the children and community as a whole. Several programmes have been to be the Universalisation of Primary education. The responsibility of Monitoring is given to N.C.E.R.T. and is aided by UNICEF. The implementing agency at State level is the Department of State Educational Research and

Training for Karnataka State. "The Project envisages to combat twin evils of westage and stagnation in Primary Education...

The Project asgumes that the goal of universalisation of Primary Education can be achieved through providing of full-time as well as <u>Part-time</u> schooling with provision for the convergence of Formal and Non-formal Education.

OBJECTIVES: ..

The main objectives of the Project are:-

To develop relevance based, problem Centred self-learning material (Learning episodes) in sufficient quantity and variety to cater to the needs of children, particularily to those belonging to disadvantaged sections of the society in rural areas.

1. The curriculum developed under CAPE Project is based on four major principles.

- a) Relevance.
- b) Flexibility
- c) Local Specificity
- d) SUPV and Speinl Service.
- 2. Establishing Learning Centres.
- 3. Establishing Evoluation Centres, 1

The Project aims at developing the non-formal approach of Education which is different from formal system of Education. It aims at evolving a flexible and decentralised curriculum relevant, to children of the age group of 6 to 14 years Our objectives are not

only to achieve literacy, numeracy etc., but also to improve life is villages by developing competencies required to solve their problems. Hence, it is called " COMPREHENSIVE ACCESS TO PRIMARY EDUCATION".

A Special curriculum which is totally different from discipline oriented formal school curriculum is being developed in the Project.

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This project is mainly concerned with all children in the age group of 6 to 14 years who need compensatory education, particularity those who are out of formal class rooms.

Progress Achieved During 1987:

2. Two meetings were conducted with all the Superintendents of Teacher Training Institute to take stock progress Achieved by ther during the previous year and functioning of the Centres. 77 Heads, of the Institutions were participated 78 learning Centres have been started by them.

3. 4 Workshops for developing illustrations for learning materials were conducted and illustration for 18 modules work prepared. 49 participants were attended the workshops.

4: 5 Workshops for-development of learning episades in numeracy and and literacy were conducted and 11 modules were prepared 70 participants have attended the workshops.

5. 10 Modules have been edited by language and subject experts. 6. Budget allocation for the year 1987 was 5.54 lakhs. The total expenditure for 1987 (January to December) were 5.26 lakhs.

7. Percentage of progress(utilisation) were 95%.

POPULATION EDUCATION PROJECT: -

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The population Education Project was started in 1980 and the Project period-was from 1980 to December 1985. But now the Project period has been extended upto 1990. State Unit in DSERT is the implementing outbority of the State Level. OBJECTIVES:-

The main objectives of this project are to

Create on awareness of the Population among young generation.
 To build a favourable attitude towards the small family size among the future parents.

3. To help students to develop an insight into inter relationship between population growth and Socio-Economic development at family Society levels.

4. To identify the plug points in the Present Text Books on concept of population Education. The Project has carried out the activities of developing integrated curriculum for I to X Standard T.C.H. level and B.Ed.Course in Marnataka.

ACTIVITIES:-_

I Development of Materials:-

(a) An integrated curriculum in population Education has been developed at + 2 Stage (P.U.C. I and II) through the work-shop approach. A bogklet entitled population education curriculum at + 2 Stage has been brought out.

(b) The Population Education curriculum for Non-formal Sector but the been developed for the age group 6-14 is in three different areas Viz Kannada, Environmental studies and mathematics.

(c) Instructional materials in population Education has been developed in different subject areas at +2 Stage. The material has been refined and is in the process of Printing.

(d) 80 Posters and 75 Charts on various schemes of Population Education have been developed.

II. Training

a) During the year, 800 Primary and 800 Secondary School Teachers have been trained alongwith 16 Assistant Educational Officers of the Districts.

(b) .30 Principals of Junior Colleges have been trained as Key Persons.

(c) 153 Key persons such as Asst. Educational Officers and Instructors in Non-Formal Education Centres have been trained.

(d) 275 Lecturers at + 2 Stage have been trained under this Programme.

(e) 100 Instructors in Non-Formal Education Centres have also been trained .

III. Distribution of Bookst-

The Population Education 1 oks at Primary and Secondary level have been distributed to ill-Assistant Educational Officers and Deputy Directors of Public Instruction in the State. Hence, the work regarding distribution of Books is completed.

IV. Quiz Competition:-

After the National Workshop at Bangalbre during at 1988, the process of organising the Quiz-competition on Population Education Themes at the District level and State level was undertaken.

The Village adoption programmes by the Schonla has bren" initiated through the Deputy Director of Public Instruction in State.

V. FINANCIAL IMPLICATION:-

Out of 9.57 Lakhs sanctioned during the 1988 a sum of Rs.5.00 lakhs has been spent from January to December 1988.

POPULATION EDUCATION COMPONENT UNDER INDIA POPULATION PROJECT-III:

This Directorate is entrusted with the task of implementing Population Education Programmes in the Six Project Districts of Belgaum and Gulbarges Divisions.

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This Project is for a period of five years from 1984 to 1989 which is now extended upto 31-3-1997. The finances are provided from the world Bank and Government of India with 12% of funds through the State Government. Total allocation for the Project implementation is nearly Rs.70 Crores x out of which Population Education Component has provided Rs.59.51 Lokhs.

The Main Objectives of the Population Education Component are: 1. To Create owareness of Population Problems.among the younger generation as well as adults through formal and Non-Formal approach. 2. To develop a positive attitude amongst the younger generation towards a small family Norm.

3. To train the opinion leaders for carrying the message to the community.

4. To Orient Officers of the District and Block level to incorporate Population Education concepts in their activities.

ORGANISATIONAL SET-UP: -

At the State Level, Project is located at D.S.E.R.E. Bangalore. At regional level, there are two Regional Ropulation Centres, ong at University College of Education, Dharwad and another at Government College of Education, Gulbarga. At district level, there are six district Papulation education Centres situated in Teacher Training Institution at the District hand quarters of Belgaum, Dherwad, Bijapur, Gulbarga, Bidar and Raichur.

The Over-all_responsibility will vest with the Director of Research and Training (DSERF), Bengalare.

ACTIVITIES:-

STATE POPULATION, EDUCATION CENTRE:

II. Regional Population Elucation Centres Dharwad and Gulbarga:

1. Four Key personnel Training Programmes have been organised" covering teacher Educators of B.Ed.Coffleges and Teacher Training Institutions. 200 Personnel have been trained.

2. Two Orientation Programes have been conducted to Orient the Officers at the Tlack level. 100 persons have been oriented in these programmes.

3. One filmstrip " My Willage" has been developed by the Regional Population Education Contro, Dharwad.

4. Two impact studies on the programmes have been conducted at the Regional level.

III. District Population Education Centres :-

1. Training of Field Morders have been taken up by the District Population Education Centres, Multipurnose workers from Health Department, Grass root level workers from other Departments, Adult Education Workers, Youth Clubs, Mahila Mandals have been given two day training in Population Education.

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Financial Component :-

As against the total financial target of 59.5 Lakhs, a sum of Rs.40.09 lakhs have been utilised by the nine different centres at the State, Region and District level (67.3%).

All efforts are being made to cover the backlog of 1984-85 and 1985-86.

INTEGRATED EDUCATION JEVELOPMENT SCHEME IN PRIMARY SCHOOL:

Government of Karneteka has been implementing I.E.D. Scheme for the Past-couple of years. The Department of Public Instruction in-general and Department of State Educational Research and Training. Bangalore in particular have been assigned-the responsibility of implementing this Project by the State Government as desired by Government of India.

This centrally sponsored scheme which fetches 100% grants for implementation is gaining momentum in Karnetaka. The State Government Public and parents of the des Aled-children-coupled with voluntary organisations, are evening lot of interest in augmenting the implementation of the Scheme.

As the Prime objective of this acheme is to provide sufficient opportunities for disabled children in joining the mainstream in" terms of educational, Social, Mental and Physical aspects everyone has reclised its importance thus paving a way for its successful implementation.

- This scheme is being implemented in 22 schools which are being rum by both Government and repistered and recognised societies. At present about 300 children are being integrated. The nature of

of disabilities include arthopendically bandicapped, visually impaized, Hearing impaired and mentally retarded. The following woluntary service organisations are also doing their best and are integrated about 500 children.

There is a strong nove on the Part of I.E.D cell to Catalyse Voluntary Organisations so as to take up this Project in their respective institution by starting of new special schools and thereby converting existing Special schools in to resource Centres.

There has been a feeling, that disabled have not been, given what they are expected to be given one of the pertiment reasons for this chaotic State is lack of do-ordination among and between various organisations which are striving their best for the cause of disabled in a golitary manner.

Anyhow with all the draw-backs that are prevailing in implementing the Project because of cultiforious reasons the I.E.D Cell in Karnatake has a strong will to march forward in taking up this aspect as a Challange and set a model to other States. There is a strong move to embark an UKICH is stated Project P.I.E.D. (Project on Integrated Education for the disabled) at the earliest possible time.

In the light of the excilence of like Clear-ant I.E.D. Scheme as mooted by M.H.R.D, Department of Direction, New Delhi, the excellent academic inputs being provided by special Education Cell, N. C.E.R.T. New Delhi, exceptory co-operation being extended by voluntary organisation determined efforts on the Part of I.E.D. Cell would go a long why in implementing the Project on sound lines which would be testified by the frict that majority of the disabled would reap the multiple dividends in due course of time.

PART-III TEACHER FDUCATION

Apart from the developmental activities of the academic units and UNICEF Projects, this Directorate is dealing with the academic guidance of all Teacher Training Institutes, Inservice Training Centres and correspondence-cum-Vacation Courses.

The list of different types of Teacher Training Institutes and their statistical information are as follows.

1. Pre-Primary Teacher Training Institutions:-

Pre-Primary Education has a dual importance now-a-days. It helps to reduce wastage and stagnation and attracts children.for School environment and further helps to attain the goal of Universalisation of Primary Education. Children of age group 3 to 6 years will be admitted to the Pre-Primary Schools. Tre-Drimary Education also requires trained teachers especially females. This is-a one year Course. Those who have passed one year teacher training course, will be required for Nursery Schools.

There are 48 Pre-Primcry Jeacher Institutions in the State. Out of which, five are povernment and the rest are private i.e. unaided. The total enrolment in these Institutions are 1741. Government has proposed to ettach a Pre-Primary School to single teacher schools in a phased menner.

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II Primary Teacher Training Institutions :-

Teacher Training Certificate of Higher Course is for two years. The minimum qualification for admission to this course is S.S.L.C. pass with fixed percentage of marks.

There are 128 Teacher Training Institutions in the State out of which 35 are Government 93 are private. There are 26 Women institutions and the rest are co-educational. The total strength of candidates during 1987-88, in I and II year are 19,370 out of which 9877 are boys and 9493 are gipls. There is one evening Teacher Training Institution for inservice Teachers at Bangalore with an intake of 50 Inservice teachers only.

III COLLEGE OF HUUCANTO" (B.EA.College)

Every yessimew Bish Schools are being opened in the State. For the existing and newly started high schools, trained-Teachers are essential. Hence, B.Ed.Colleges are the source for training teachers. There are 64 B.Ed.Colleges in the State out of which 8 are Government (includes 2 NCERT Institutes) and 56 are Private. There is one Women B.Ed.Colleger(St.Ann's College of Education) at Mangalore. Minimum qualification for admission is a degree of recognised university. The duration of the course is one year. The total enrolment of B.Ed College during 1987-88 was 6,969 out of which 4,512 boys and 2,457 were girls.

IV. English Language Teaching Contres.

The main objectives of these Centres is to improve the English Language Teaching at Primary and Secondary Level. There are 6 English Language teaching Centres in the State. Out of which, 4 are Primary English Language Teaching Centres located at Mysore, Bangalore, Dharwad and Gulbarge on 1.2 Secondary English Language Teaching Centres, Iteated at Mysore and Dharwad. The inservices Teachers of Primary and Secondary Schools will be deputed to this course in batches. The duration of the courses are 40 and 30 days respectively. The total number of teacher trained; during the year 1987-28 were 704.

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Out of them 575 were men and 129 were women.

V. Teacher Centres:

There are two tencher centres in Karnataka State- One at Dharwad and another at Vidyanagar, Bangalore. Only inservice School teachers are admitted for these courses. Duration of the Course is 7 days only. The Teachers are deputed in batches selected by Agsistant Educational Officers. Training is imparted on languages and core subjects.

During the year 1987-88, 4,866 men and 2,477 women teachers have been trained in those two teachers centres.

VI. Orientation Training Centres:-

There is one-Orientation-Centre at D.S.E.R.T. under State Institute of Science Unit. Training will be imparted to Inservice Primary school-Teachers on Science and Biology involving writing of lesson plans and improvisation of teaching aids. The duration of the course is 30 days. The training will be conducted in batches for the inservige teachers of Primary Schools.

During the year 1987-88, 91 Teachers have been Oriented in 4 batches.

VII. Correspondance-cum-Vocation Course Centres(C.C.V.C);

The correspondence-cua-Vacation Course-(T+C.H) for Untrained inservice Primary School Lebebers is being run in 16 Centres in Karnataka State. Two Correspondence-cum=Vacation Course Centres located at Chickmagalur and bellery are now shifted to Shimoga and Raichur. Feachers working in Government or Private Schools with two years teaching experience are eligible formadmission to this course. Deputy Directors of Public Instruction will select the untrained teachers according to the geniority. Two personnel quantation and the other of 15 days duration during Summer Vacation and the other of 15 days duration during Mid-term holidays which will be hold. each year in the Centres attacked to the Teacher Training Institutions covering Demonstration lessons, practice

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teaching and practical work in Graft etc., with minimum of 80% attendance during the contact programmes. Duration of Course 19 2 years like regular T.C.H. Course.

During the year 1987-88, 35% untrained teachers have undergone C.C.V.C.Training.

VIII. Special Institution of Drama and Dance:

There are two Special Institutions of Drama and Dance at.Bangalore The purpose of these institutions is to improve the art of Dance and Drama. Private condidates and Deputed candidates will be admitted to these courses. During the year 1987-88, engolment of candidates was 40. Out of them 8 are men and 32 are women.

IX. Pre-Vocational Training Centres(P.V.T.C).

These Centres were storted with a view to give educational and job skill to the educationally been ad Thildren. The qualification for admission is a pass in IN Standard for first years of P.V.T.C. The subjects prescribed is general subjects of V. VI and VII Standard Plus the study of Craft subjects. This is a Course for 3 years with intake of 30 dandidates per standard, equal to V. VI and VII Standards of general system of education.

After the completion of III Year, they are eligible to join VIII Standard of High School or take up jobs in factories or selfemployment.

The teaching staff of P.V.T.C. consists of graduates for general subjects and Craft teachers for technical subjects.

The total strength of P.V.T.C. during the year 1987-88 were 306, out of which 268 were boys and 38 were girls.

X. Inservice Training Dentres: ----

There are 18 Inservice Centres in Karnataka State. They are

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located in the Government Teacher Training Institutions, Kolar, Mysore, Nagamangala, Mangalore, (Men T.T.I), Hassan Dharwad (Men T.T.I) Hungund, Bellary, Tumkur, Kumta, Sindhanur, Kamalapur, Bider (K), Chickmagalur, Hudige, Shimoga, Chitradurga Orientation Training Centre at Doddabellapur.

During the year 1937-88, the inservice Training for Teachers was conducted.and 2,788 teachers were trained.

Rs.7,77,217 has been spent for the training programmes in the inservice training Centres.
