Item No. 1.02 (a) : To approve the action taken on certain matters.

Arising out of Item No.1.02(b) (4), the Commission could not accept the arquments advanced by the Vice-Chancellor, Gujarat University and felt concerned about the action taken by the University to nromote students to the higher classes without axanination as this whuld in particular, lead to lowering of standards. In this connection, it was notad that the Vice-Chancellor had already moved the Suprame Court in appeal against the decision of the High Court. The Commission desired that the Chairman may take up the matter with the ppropriate authorities.

Item No, 2, 01: To receive the resolutions adopted and the decisions taken at the Conference of Education Ministers' held on 2nd June, 1981 with regard to the Programme of ndult Education.

The Commission endorsed the recommendations made at the Education Ministers' Conference held on 2nd June, 1981 regarding the programme of Aतult Education. The Commission stressed the need of giving priority to the post literacy and folloumup programme of AdUlt Education.

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The Commission generally approved the revi sed guidalines of idult $\&$ Continuing Education anc Extansion priqrammes as par fppondix-III and desired that these may bo rirculated to the universities and proposals be invited for the consideration of the Commission.

The Commission agreed that the universities be advised that the staff to be appointed uncer this programme be treated as non-vacation academic staff.

Item No.2,03: To consider the report of the committme appointed by the UGC to assess the proposal of the Indian School f Mines. Dhanbad for sotting up an Exam-nation Reform Unit.

The Commission considered the report of the Committee appointed to assess the proposal of the Indian ichnol of Mines, Qhanbad and agreed to support the setting up of an Examination Roform Unit in the School with the following facilities :-

It was agreod that in accordance with the normal practice, assistance would ba provided for a period of three years within an overall coiling of Rs. one lakh per annum in the first instance and the position raviswed thereafter.

Item.No. 2.04: To consider the report of the Committer appointed by the Commission to enquire into the procedure followed by the Vidya Bhawari G.G. Teachers' Training College, Udaipur for the installation of a language laboratory and its functional utility.

The Commiesion dasired that the Collego shauld take immediate action as recommended by the Committec for (a) appointment of a suitably qualified techrician, (b) appointment of a lecturer in English specially traired in language teaching and the use of lanquaco laboiatory or a taacher in English from the colloge be deputed to Central Institute of English and Foreign Languages for a one-year diploma course and arranga to have the laboratory put into working order. The additional expenditura involved in this be mat by the college from its oun resources. The Commission further desired that no fresh proposal from this college be considered in the sixth plan unless it has fulfilise the conditions indicated above.

In this connection, the Commission desirea that the universities/colleges be advised that whenevar any sbphisticated equipment is procured, it may be ensured that adequate technical staff is available for its effac:iva usa.

Iteg No. 2.05: To consider the guidelines suggested by the History Canel for revieuino the prescribed reference text-books in History and other subjects by the Universities in the light of tioe * recommendations made by the minorities Commission.

The Commission agreed that the guidelines for roviening prescribed text-books and other reading materials in $H$ i: tory and other subiects as at Appendix-IV, may be circulated to the universities for undertaking aireview of such books and materials to ensure that they conform to theso quidelines and take adequate corrective measure, uherever necessary.

(Raforances from Government)

Item No. 3.01: To consider the ronomendations of the Law Panel on a refarance recoived from this Ministry of Education and Culture, Government of India, regarding raorganisation of the faculty of Law in different Univarsities in Uttar Pradesh.

The Commission was of the viaw that there could be no objection to a single department faculty but felt that if a university so desired it could have more than one dapartment in such a faculty depending upor the academic negds ancl taking into account the stage of davelopment of the area concerned.

## Sectipr-4

(Spocial programmes)
Item No, 4, 01: To consider the recommendations of the
UGC Committee which considered the recommendations of the lyorkshop on 'Teaching and Research in Museology in Indian Univarsities held on 16 th to 18 th April, 1981.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Panel on Art-History and Museology, regarding teaching and research in Musbology and made the following observations in this regard:
(a) The Commission could not accept the suggestion to institute separate scholarships for all students admitted to the postgraduate course in Museology.
(b) It may not bo necessary to link tha scales of pay of Curator and other staff in the Museams with the scalos of pay of toachers.
(c) Universities may also provide facilities for post E.A./日. Sc. diploma course in Museology.

The Commission further desired that the nature of assistance that may be provided to the universities to introduce thase courses may ba determined and proposals invited from universities having adequate infrastructure for starting/strangthening such courses.

Itom No. 4.02: To consider the recommendation of the panel on Socioloqy \& Sacial Anthropology at its masting held on 4th \& 5th Soptember, 1981 regarding promotion of Folklore Studies in the Univarsities.

The Commission consiHarod the recommendations of
the Pannl on Sociology and Social Anthropology for the promotion of studies in folk-lore in the universities and desired that this may be brought to the notice of the universities with a suggestion that If so desired, they may includo spocific development proposal as part of their Sixth plan development programmo.

The Commission further desired that in view of the importance of the subjact, specific research projocts on folklore including tribal folklore may be invited, and financial assistance provided as per normal procadures and norms.

Item No. 4a3: To consider the rocommentations made by the Chemistry $P$ anel at its monting hasd on 23-24th Dctobor, 1981 ragarding tho assistance to be providad for implemantation of Research Project related to Colloid and surfaco Chemistry by Professor W.U. Malik Dapartment of Chemistry, Roorkee University, (now Vica-Chancellor, Kashmir University).

The Commission accepted tho recommendation of the Chemistry Panel on the report of the Expert Commjttee for the research project related to "Colloid and Surface Chemistry" in the gepartment of Chomistry, Rourkee University and approved the following oraits for a period of 3 years:

The Commission agreed that Dr. S.K. Srivastava, Reader, Department of Chemistry, Roorkeo University may be designated as the Co-investigator of the project during the period of absance of Prof. Wahid U.Malik as Vice-Chancellor of Kashmir University. The guidance of Professor Malik would, however, be availabla for implamentam tion of the project.

## SECTION-5 <br> (Grants to Univarsities \& Colleges)

Item No. 501: To consider further a proposal from Visva Bharati for a third Tubewell.
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The Commission accepted the propasal of the Visva Bharati for provision of additional tube-wells along with other accessories for augmenting the water supply facility in the campus of the Visva-Bharati at an estimated cost of Rs. 15 lakhs. It was noted that the expenditure involved wnuld be a charge on the campus devolopment.

Item No. 5.02: To consider a proposal from Saldiha College, Saldiha for an additional grant to complete the construction of teaching accommodatinn.

The Commission desired that before the proposal of the college could be considered it may be advised to submit the nocessary documents for the construction of the building already undertaken, with the grants earlier approved.

The Commission furthor desired that the proposal if any, for additional assistance will be considered, if the college would send the requisita documentary evirance of the State Government having agread to privide a grant of Rs. 3 lakhs for this construction to bs completor,

Itam No. 6, 02: To considar the suggestions if Prof. K.M. Lodha, Momber of the panel on 'Madern Indian Languages regarding the assignment of research projects to roputed scholars.

The Commission agread that it would be useful if the Panols pariodically review the priority areas of research so that the universities/colloges may formulate proposals accordingly. In this connection, the Commission was of the view that the panels may not ordinarily identify any spesific department or individual from whom resoarch proposals may be invited.

Itam No.6.03: To consider tha suggestion for providing equal opportunities to all the candidatos in the matter of award of D.Sc. degree by som: Universities.

The Commission tesired that the suggestion for providing equal opportunitias to all the candidates in the matter of award of $0 . S c$. degroe by some universities may be referred to the Association of Indian Universities.

Item No.6.04: To consider the present pasition of various building projects in Dolhi collages and the question of oroviding basic grants and other facilities during the sixth plan period
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The Cormission rafterated its earlier decision that it would not be in a position to provide assistance for construction of buildings etc. for the colleges which may now be establishad in Delfi.

The Commission further तesired that the question of provitling plan funsts for payment of grants th existing colleges for construction of their buildings may be persued with the planning Commission so that the extra funde required for the same are included in the plan allocation of tho Belhi Arministration.

The Commission taking into account the high cost of construction of buildinos of colleges in nelhi desirod that the existing norms abnut areas etc. may be reviewsd.

The Commission noted that only a provision of Rs. 2.5 crores has been made in the Sixth Plan for mbeting expenditure on the usual sharing basis for the construction of buildings of Delhi Colleges. Kesping in view the limited funds available, the Commission desired that this provision may be utilisod for the following:-
(a) to complate the on-going buildings and other projucts already acc:pted; and
(b) construction of the buildings for the Bhagat singh Collage, Maitrayi Collige for Jomen, Satyawati CoEducational Collegg and Zakir Hussain College.

The Commissian desired that proposals from Celhi Colleges for devolopmental purposes in future may be considered on the same basis as for colleges affiliated to othor Universities, and in accordance with the Sixth Plan guidelines.

Item No. 6. 85 : To consider further the guidelines for providing assistance to Arts, Science and Commerce and Multifaculty colleges for development during the Sith Pl

The Commission raviewed the guidelines for assistance to Arts, Science, Cnrmerce and Multi-faculty colleges for develcpment during the Sixth Plan in the light of the suggestions recelved from different universities and also the observations received from the Ministry of Home Affairs and adoptod the revised guidelines as per Appendix- $V_{0}$

Item No.6.06: To consider a suagestion from Dr. (Miss) Yashu Meht S.N.D.T. Iomen's Üniversity regarding directives to the Universities on giving extra time to the blind examinees for the language papers and interproter for the deaf students.

The Commission desired that the suggestion made by Dr. (Miss) Yashu Mehta for giving extra time to blind students ir the language papers and providing intarpreter to the deaf studar may be referred to the Association of Indian Universities.

Item Na.6.07: To consider certain establishment matters
of the UGC.
(1) Recommendations of the Selection Committee for Classer Post made at its meating held on 3rd Dacember, 1981.
(ii) Quastion of the conversion of the existing tomporary posts into permanent posts.

(iv) Revision of recruitment procedure for the cadres of Education Officer and Under Secretary.

The Chalrman reported that a note regarding these items had been received from Shri C.G. Somiah, Member, UGC, who could not attend the meeting.
(i) The Commission, while noting that none of the Scheduled Caste candidates called for interviow was found suitable, acceptor the recommondations of the Selsetion Committer for Class-I Posts made at its meeting held on 3rf December, 1981 and approved the selection of Shri B.R. Sachdeva for appointment to tho post of Librarian in the scale of pay of Rs. 1100-50-1500 in relaxation of age limit and by 'dexeservation' of vacancy.
(ii) The Commission agreen to the pormanent ennversion of the follawing tamporary posts, which have been in existence for two years, created for SR Division which are required for work of permanent nature:

1. Section Officer (Grade-II) -1
2. Assistant -3
3. Upper Division Clerk -2
4. Lower Division Clerk -2

As for conversion of the remaining temporary posts into parmanent posts, the Commissinn desired that as decided in the meating held on 20th October, 1981 the position may be roviewed after thoy have been in existence for atleast two years and the matter brought up before the Commission for consideration accordingly. In the meantime, the Commission agread that the existing tenure of these posts which is due to expire on 31 st march, 1982 may be extended upto 31 st March, 1903.
(iii) The Commission, while taking note of the eircumstances which necessitated bifurcation of Government of Intia scalo of pay of Section Officer into two to provids for two grades of Section Dfficers in the office of the Uniersity Grants Commiesion, agreed that the scale of pay of Rs. $650-960$ provided for Section Officer (Grade-II) may be upgraded to Rs. 650-30-740-35 880-ER-40-1040 to be a segment rif the unified scale of pay of Section officer in the Government of India.

(iv) Tho Commissinn could not.accept the proposal for merger nf tho cadros of Educatinn officer and Under Secratary into a single cartre. The Commission, however, agreer that the olement of promotion in the carre of Under Speretary may be increased form the existing $50 \%$ to 750 and the Codre and Racruitment Rules fir the post be amended accordingly.
(v) \& (v) The Cbmmissinn desired that these may, in the first instance, be raferred to the UGC Standing Committee on F.stablishment Matters.

The Commission alsn.authorised the Chairman, UGC to accept the Committee's recommendations as she deamed fit and to bring bafore the Commissinn only such of the recommendations which involvad policy decision.
(vii) The Commission accopter in principle the recommondations mado by the Unrking Group and dosired that necessary actinn may be takan for implemention. The Commission also inter-alia agreed to the provision of additinnal posts viz. 1 Senior st otistical officer, 4 Seninr Statistical Assistants and 14 Statistical Assistants as per recommandatinns of the lorking Group and desired that tho lage reserves may be nrovided later, in accordance wi.th the instructions on the subject. The Commission further dosired that the question of posts suggested fnr Divisional $H_{\text {mads }}$ and upward may be examined in the light of the position nbtaining in other Statistica organisations and the matter brnught up before the Commission accordingly.
(vili) The Commissinn could not agrea to the suggestinn to merge this post in the catre of Meputy Secretary and desired that the ex-carre post nf Principal Information $0 f f i c o r$ may be filled by Copulation with the period of deputation ordinarily not axcesting four years. The Commissinn desired that the draft Cadre and e.ocruitment Rules suggested for the post may be suitably rovisad accordingly.

Item No.6.08: To note the date and place fnr the noxt maeting of the Commission.

It was noted that the next mesting of the
Commission will be held on Fobruary 23,1982 at New Delhi.

## Any Other Item

The Commission agread that a committee under the Chatrmanship of Chairman, UGC, may bo appointed t? onquira into the working of the Contral Universities. The terma of raferenca of the committee may be as follows:
(a) to examine whether the Contral Universities are fulfilling the objactives set for them in their acts and statutes;
(b) to examine the gensral state of discipline in the Contral Universities, causes of periotic disturbances in the campuses and remedial action thereforo;
(c) to examina the adequacy mf the machinery in tre Central Univorsities th Heal with the grievances of students, teachers and the administrative staff and suggest measures for strengthoning corporate life in these universities;
(d) to examino the desirability of ounlving a cede of conduct for political parties and to set limits to their involvement in the University affairs; and
(a) to suggest such other moasures of refarm as are necessary for tho efficient functioning of Contral Universities and promoting an academi; atmosphero conducive to study and schalarshio on the campuses.

## I. Preface:

During the last docade, after the pronramme of continuing education was initiated in 197a, 21 Univorsitios uere belucted for the above programme.

Aftor the introduction of the National Adult Education Pangrame in 1978, En Universitias and 705 colleges are buing assisted for the above purpose.

An effort is made to roflact tho new naeds of the programme in the now guidelines in the light of oxperience gained in this area.

## II. Aproach and Focus ${ }^{\text {: }}$

1. Universities have been lornely concerned with two important functions $\forall i=0$, toachiag and resegrch. There to now a growing realisation that the universities though concerned with higher learning have an obligation to get intimately involved inthe development of the community. So far these institutions of hizher loarning have been accessible largely to limited number of people. In India large masses of people are deprived of any tangible benefits of our educational system as such. Consequently illiteracy, social and cultural deprivations and poverty are on the inorease. Thus large sections of our population are denied of the legitmate socio-economic opportunities so essential for removal of inequitable social order.
2. The country wich has accepted demooracy, socialism and secularism as its national goals to achieve devel, mont, cannot afford to restrict the knowledge only to a privileged few. plans to realise their objective of improving the level of living of all and to narrow the inequalities have to look towards a system of education which will achiove the masimum spread of knowledge and skills to less privileged and underprivileged sectors of population. Viewed in this perspective it is imperative that the universities and colleges becom sensitive to the learning needs of community and respond to same through relevant learning programmes and tools. The relevance of contimuing and extension educatinm, wich is the third essential function of universities, in addition to teaching and research should be conceived in a more comprehenaive nodn. 'It should ocmarisi nf both basic and continuing adult eaucation comprising all spheres of life. This will require in inorganic linkage between contiming. and aiult education on one side and teaching and research on the other.
3. In order to facilitote such comprehensivenessand integration, it is necessary to bering all espects of continuing education, adult education and pepulation education, planning forms etc. under a single umbrel=1a and adopt a uniform nomenclature for the Department, namely, $\mathrm{D}_{\mathrm{e}}$ pertment/Gentre of Continuing Edication and Extension work. This
Department/Centre should have the same status for the representation on academic bodies of the university, recognising its inter-disciplinary nature and functions. In concrete terms the Director of this department/ centre should enjoy the same status and privileges of any other uni-disciplinary subject head.
4. . The programes of contimuing and adult education and extension work should use non traditional approaches and innovatiwe methods which will be partidipatory and work contred in content. The techniques of distance edusction and miss modia should be explored and used. Different resources avail.able with the university and colleges should be used to the fullest for the promamus through contimous inter-action between different departments. The distinct characteristic and features of the institution sh uld lenve its mark on the programes undertaken.
5. 
6. It is not adequete that universities alcne should participate in this programe, it is imperntive to involve colleges in this work to extand this programme to absorb local needs. particularly, involvement of women's coilleges located in tribal/backward/rural areas and professional colleges dealing in areas like medicine, engineering, technology, egriculture, howe science, nursing, pharmacy, law, educntion etc. should be encouraged.

The programme of contiming and adult education and extension work should have interalia, following objectives, which are based on anproach and focus of the programme indicatod above.

## FII Qbjectivass

1. To enable the uaiversities to establish the necessary linkage with the comunity with a view to fostering social change through meaningful relationships and inter-actions, which are matually beneficial by offering need based and relevant educational progranmes that may ultimately facilitate elfurelience.
2. To provide opportunities for disseminating knowledge in all walks of life in different somments of population to enable individuals and groups to fill up the gaps in their intellectual growth, professional and technical competence and understanding of contemporery issues.
G. To cater to the felt meeds of all sections of society but specially to the needs of the less privileged and under privileged sections in crdor to gecure their erfoतtive partioiphtion in Cevslopment proces.
3. To errich hicher education by integrating contiming and adult education programes and extension work in the systen atid thus provide opportunities to remve its isolation.
4. Tb provide an opportunity to the faculty and the students to an exposition of field experiences and to sensitize themselves with the problems and realities.
5. Facuety and Student Participation in Extension Research and Action-Reseerch in selecter treas in relation to mejor problems of develcrment in co-operation with covernment.

## IV. Programes:

Programmes of contiming and adult education should be tailored to the felt needs and requirements of different target groups. The programmes could be of a general or progessional nature or of a specialised nature according to the needs to be serve ${ }^{\text {d }}$ iteluding function miteracy and mameracy. whth this general goal in view, universities and colleges should identify and adopt areas or commuities and through contimuing education and extension activities, extend the teneflits of knowledge and skills through their physical and human resources, to fulfil the new obligation.

The programmes can be planned by the Department of Continuing Education and Extension work at the unty ersity or the college independently or in collaboration with the academic departments of the university, voluntary organisations, industries, or other agencies whose co-operation is essential. However, the academic input would be the responsibility of the University Department or the college end should not be left solely to an outside agency. whon progremmes are planned in co-operation with other acedemic departments of $t_{p}$ university the academic inputs should generally come from the ecademic departments and the organigntional and co-crdinating inputs should be the responsibility of the department of Continuing Education and Extension work. The models for curricultm, linkage would differ from institution to institution depending on the thrust adopted.

The programes can broadly be conceived into four categoriess
4. Awarenoss and devilepment of general interest in contemporary affairs.
B. Imparting functicnal literacy and numeracy, post-literacy and supplementary education through non-formal programmes.
G. Imparting and improving skills and professional know through special training.
D. Developing curricular linkages with field and action.

The scope of each of the above categories is amplified hereunder illustrotively.
4. Awarenss gencrating and general interest programmes should bo developed with a view to -

- help pecple become increasingly aware of current and social problems in contemporary worid.

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- promote the social, eccnomic, literary, cultural and intallectual enrichment of the community.
- organise activitiss with reference to spocial interest groups like yoths, hcusewlves, retired people, age etce to enable them to make fruitful and productive use of their time.

7. Developmont of basic education and skills through -

- social awareness and motivational programes
- functional literacy and numeracy courses
- post literacy programmes
- skill and craft dovelopment courses
- supplomentary activities to motivate the community.

0. Imparting and smproving skills and. refe - it mol knowhow through -

- developing vocational skills and professiomal competence
- creating opportunities for inservice and refresher training to helf updatine scadediw and professional knowledge in order to keep pace with rapid changes
- training programmes for industrial workers, technicians, vocations and staff and administrative, personnel, etc.
- developing such skills as would generate solf-omployment and sflf-rolianco
- offering remedial/bridge programes for students, teachers parentsetc.
D. Developing curricular Iinkages by -
- Orferfing training programes for aiserert typas of personnel for continding and adult education programes.
- modulate extension programmes for each subject discipline to facilitate fts integration in the durriculum.
- involving students in integrated programes of area development or community development as a part and parcel of their learning process
p.t.o.


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## Target Groups:

The target groups for which the programmes are to be organised could be identified on the basis of the surveys. Wile doing this, as the resources of the universities are limited, it would be advisable to organise programme among the communities, groups of people and individuals in areas close to the universities and colleges instead of distant areas.

Inth regard to the target groups belonging to the less privileged and under privileged and under privileger sections of the society some sugcestions by way of an illustration are given belowt

- Wmen, in particular women of rural anत slum areas
- Scheduleत Gastes and Schoduled Tribes
- Drop-outs
- Unemployed and out of schcol youth.
- Handicapped
- Workers in the unorganisod sectors
- Wrks in the organised sectors.
- Teachers, teaching primary, secondary and handicapped children
- University students from under privileged rural groups and from slums.

VIII. Mcnitoring \& Evaluation \& Research:

The Universities will monitor and evaluate their ny own programmes and the colleges.

The UGC will encourage universities to undertale contin uous sustained and sequential research concerning the various aspects of adult, continuing and extension education like curriculam, m thods, evaluation with a view to devoloping and improving the content, methods and practice of adults, nnm contiming and extension education.



## Adult Education:

The education of adults has raceived vary low priority so far. But in view of the fact that it yields and early dividends, it should be accorded the itant highest ariority in the years ahead and even among adults, the oducation of thelarge number of poor and illitarate parsons should receive the utnest attention. The main objectives of this programme should be to educate and mobiliza the masses and to invalve them meaningfully in national development. It should also strive to make all adults (farticularly in the age group 21-35) functionally literate, and lay the greatest emphasis on the non-formal education of youth (age-group 15-21). A massive frogramme of motivating adults and enthusiag and training veluntary workrors and institutians will have to ba develcped for the purpsa.

EXTPNSION: If the universjty system has to discharge adequately its responsinilities to the entire educationt syetem and to the society as a whole, it must arcme ertens on as the third imoortant responsibil:ty and give it the same status as research and teacling. ihis is a new and extremely sjgnificant area whict stould ke develoned on the basis of high priority. As can be easily imarined, the extension programme of the university system will fall into two broad categories.
(1) Extension Services to Schools and Colleges : The universities-should work with the colleges which, in turn, should work with the secondary and elementary schools in their neighbourhood and help them to improve standards by in-service education of teachers, sharing of facilities, provision of enrichment programe for students and discovery and cultivation of talent. The develonment of a proper Research and Develonment ( $\mathrm{R} \& \mathrm{D}$ ) programme for the education system is aiso a special responsibjlity of the universities.
(2) Extension Service to the Community : The universjty system also has a great responsibility to the society as a whole. Alt universities and collares shaid develop close relationships of mutual seryices and support with their local communities, and all students and teachers must le involved in such programmes as an interral part of their education. The National Service Scheme (N.S.S.) programme should be expanded and improved, ultimately to cover all students. The fundamental purpose of these and other studer, programmes shald be to implant a spirit of cooperation and social commitment inter-related to moral development. It should be the obligation of the teaching communjty to give extensjon lectures to interpret recent trends in their fjelds to the community, to create scientific awareness, to participate in adult education and workers ${ }^{\text {i }}$ education prosrammes, etc. Universities can also help in the preparation of develomental projects for the commanjty:around them, including the rural communty. Buch involvement will also help in bringing greater relevance into the courses at the undereraduate and the postgraduate levels and into the research proarames.'

## Appendix IV to Item No, 2,05

GUIDELINES FOR UNDEFTAKING REVIEW OF PRESCRIBED TEXT BOOKS AND DTHER READING MATERIALS IN HISTORY
AND DTHER SUBJECTS.
Unity and integrity of the nation is ona of the main benofits/ehiectives which the constitution of India is dasign d to socura to all its citizans. It can best bo achiovad by tha observance of the fundamental Rights containad in Part.III of the constitution and Directive Principlos contained in part-IV. The State is, howevar, entitled to impose reasonable restrictions, if any, on the exercise of rights, the nature and edtent of which is spocifically laid down in respect of each fundamental right. For instance, with regard to the right of freedom of spach and axpression, reasonable restrictions can be imposed in tho interests of the sovaragnity, and intagrity of India, the security of the State, friendly relations with foreign states, public order, deconcy or morality and in relation to contempt of Court, dofamation or incitements to an offence.

History can play a vital rola in promoting a scibntific, rational, sscular, democratic and humane outlook, halpful to national integration, if the recommendod books writton with above mind, rofloct certain basic attitudss, consonant with the highest humanist idsals. No exhaustive list can be given, though some ossontials may ba spolt out viz.
(1) Unity of tha Indian pnoplo in diversity.
(2) Unhistericity of identification of race with nation and raligiaus community with nation.
(3) Falsity of the theory of racial purity or caste purity which breads contampt for supposedly impura races/castes.
(4) Appreciation, uniterstanding and raspect for variaty in culture, raligion and language of the difforent regions, including tribal areas.
(5) profass of continuous change whict fellows differant pattorns according to social structures and stages of sconomic development. This impliss simultaneous attention to structure and chango.
(6) Legitimacy of all roligious and secular aspirations provided they do not clash with ather such aspirations or or unity of the natian.
(7) Auaraness of cross-fertilization of cultures, religions languages and literatures which never devolop in exclusion and can never claim perfection without mutual 'give and take!

# Apnendix $U$ to Itan Ho. Hens $^{n g}$ <br> Guidelines for providing Assistance to Arts, Science, Commerce and Multi-Faculty Colloges for Development during the Sixth Plan period. 

## A ${ }^{\text {I }}$ Introduction

Development of colloges which are responsible in a major way for undergraduate education and to a great extent even for postgraduate education is an important area in Higher Education from the points of vieu of maintenance of proper standards, ensuring optimum utilisation of facilities, promoting innavation and change, relating education to emerging accupation pattern, viability and equalisation of educational opportunities for Jeaker Sections of Society particularly Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes and in educationally backward areas of the country.
2. The financial resources for higher education during the Sixth Plan being limited, the development need of the colleges will have to be carefully identified so that the resources are mainly utilised for such programmes which can make an appreciable impact on improvement, of standards through modernisation and rationalisation as well as diversification of undergraduate courses in Humanities, Social sciences, ficiences, Commerce etc. in the colleges.
3. For a majority of students going in for higher aducation, the first degrea leval is likely to be terminal. It is, therofore, necessary that the degree course offered should be adequately strengthened and diversified to make them worthuhile to the students. The uniergraduate coursos naed to be restructured to make them more relevant to mannower needs by developing appropriate skills which are significant not only to the students but to the local, regional and national needs and emphasise utilisation of the natural resources and halp to improve the employment opportunitios of students. lifth this end in view, the courses should be diversified to include both basic as well as emerging inter-disciplinary and epplication oriented areas and sufficient rreedom be allowed to the students to chooso the courses best suited to their interest and capability.
4. large number of non-viable colloges with low enrolment and inadequate facilities have come into existence in the past. Establishment of such non-viable colloges would have to be discouraged. Dnly in exceptional cases a new college could be set up in an educationally beckward, area where facilities for higher education do not exist. The resources avallable with the Commission in the Sixth plan would be largely utilised to provide adeq+ate leval of financial support for the improvement of existing arts, science and commerce collsges which are mainly responsible for undergraduate teaching. An effective machinery is, therefore, to be created at the state level for providing grant-in-aid to such colloges and the cores formulated in various states will have to be reviewed and revisad.

5. The Cnmmission's policy, therefore for developmont of undergraduate and p8otgraduate education in collages during the sixth plan period would havo two main aims (a) improvement of standards and quality of edtsation and (b) removal of तisparities and regional imbalances, in higher educational facim lities, to achieve these objectives the Cammission would provide smme assistance to all Arts, Sciance and Commerce colleges which fulfil minimum eligibility conditions to enable them to meet their basic naeds like improvemant of competance of teachers through faculty Improvement Programme, books and journals including Book $\mathrm{B}_{\text {ank }}$ and basic scientific equipment needed for praper instructions at undergraduate level. Further assistance far development would be provider only to such collnges which have the necessary viability, potential and are striving for better standards. lith a view to removing disparities and regional imbalances collages catering to the needs of Scheduled Caste and Schedulad Tribe students and one or two colleges in a district specially in educationally backward areas would als, be considered for assistance for devalopment of under-graduate education.

## B) Hasic Assistance

The Commission would provide basic assistance for development during the Sixth Plan Pariod to such arts, science, Commerce and multi-faculty colloges whe ih have at least 150 students in degree classes and above (beyond +2 stago) on 15 th Octobsr of the preceding year or the same year whichever is later and five permanent teachers excluding Principal and Physical Training Instructor/Director of Physical Education Training, in 100 , basis for (a) Faculty Improvement, (b) Books \& Journals including Book Banks and (c) Bquipment, as per details given below :-

Normally a teachir would beassisted only once in a two year pariod to attand such confarancas.

## iii) oifantation courses and short term training programmes

5. The univ-ersities and institutions of higher loarning in the country would bo organising orientation courses, short term training programmes of four to six weeks duration and sequential progra mes for insorvice college toachers during the Sixth plan period for which assistance would be provided by the Commission. Details in this regard would be intimated to the colleges by tho Universities/Institutions which organize such programmes.

## (b) Books and Journals:

6. The Cormission would provide assistance for purchase of books and journals and establishment/strengthening of books banks which would be calculinted 3 Rs. $50 / \mathrm{p}$ per student subject ta a maximum if R $40,000 /$ to a colloge in a Plan periad.
7. Tha colloga will have to utilise a minimum of $30 \%$ but not more than $50 \%$ of the book grant for setting up Book Banks and/or auoumenting facilities in the existing Book Banks. An amount upto 10\% of the grant can be used for appointment of temporary proigesional staff nendrad for accossion, procassing and cataloging of books and/or for stacking purposes.
(c) Equipment
8. Grant for equipment needed for strengthening teaching at undergraduata level will be providad nalv to such collegas which are offering degree and/or postgraduate courses which require laboratory exercises such as fhvsics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany, Geology, Home S.cience, Geography and Psychology etc.
9. Assistance for equipment will be calculated at the rate of Rs. 150/- per. student in the courses involving laboratory work subject to a maximum of Fs. 50ye00/- to a college.
10. The college may meet requirements of equipment of all its departments out of the sanctioned grant. An amount upto 10\% of this grant could be utilised, if necessary, for providing storage and for maintonance of the equipment including spares etc.
11. The grant for equipment is to be utilised for enhancement of facilities for existing courses only, improving traching and laboratory work but not for mesting running expenses of laboratories, purchase of consumables like Chemicals or glass-ware or items like Rafrigerator, Cooler, furniture or for administrative and other expenses which should continue to be provided by the college from its own budget. It should not be used to meet the conditions of affiliation for opening of new courses.
C. Assistance for devalopment of

Undergraduate education.

1. The Commission would provide further assistance for development of undergraduate education only to such colleges which fulfil the aligibility conditions as indicated below:-
a) The college has at least four departments with a minimum of two teachers in each of these repartments and at least ten permanent teachers excluding the principal and the Physical Training Instructor/Diractor of Physical Education.
b) The over-ali stument Teacher ratio in the Colloge is not more than $30 \%$ in any case (The mumber of part time teachar rould be taken into account on the basis of hours of work done by each teacher while calculating student teacher ratio provided there is adequate justification for employing part time teachers)
c) The college has at least 300 students in degree classes and above (beyond +2 stage) (Relaxable to 200 in the case of Women's colleges and colleges in backward/ rural areas〉.

The qualifications and mode of rocruitment to these posts wherever approved by the Commissinn will be the same as for similar posts in a university department and Com'ission's assistance for these posts will bis avililable upto 318t Mareh, 4985, providad these posts are created on permanent basis and tho State/Government/ College agrees to meat. the expenditure on these posts as committed expenditure from 1-4-1905.
4. The Commission may assess the requirements of postgraduate departments with the help of expert committoe aherever necessary.
E. Special Assistance to tolleges which may not fulfil the eligibility conditions under (c) atove.

1. With a vi $\begin{aligned} & \text {. } \\ & \text { to removing regional imbalances, }\end{aligned}$ achieving the objectives of squalisation of educational opportuniti’s and providing the bonefit of higher education to economically and educationally backward communitiss particularly to Schedulad Caste and Scheduled Tribes Students the Commission wauld provide spacial assistance to such colleyf which fulfil some mindmum norms of enrolment and staff strength so that these colleges are able to come up to the norms of a viable college in tue course of time. The schames under which such proposals could he considered for developrent of undergraduate aducation are indicated below:-
(i) Assistance for Intensive Dovelopment of Colleges situated in educatinnally backward areas (AID Collegos)
2. The Commission would consider providing assistance to not more than ons or two colleges in a district which do not have even one or two well develped colleges eligible for assistance for development of undergraduate aducation as under ( $c$ ) Such colloges having at least 150 sturtents and 5 permanent teachers would be considered for assistance upto a maximum of Rs . 4 lakhs.

The selection of such colleg's would be marle by tha * Comiscion in consultation with tha univarsity concorned which would in tho first instanen undartake the survey in the district concerned and assoss the needs of highor education in the arsa.
(ii) Collzoss cataring to the neods of Schoduled Caste and Schoduled Tribes Students.-
3. Colleges having at last five permanent teacher excluding Principal and phy:iral Training Instructor/Director of Physical Education and a minimum of 100 studnats in degree and post degree courses of where at last 35 belong to Scheduled Castes and Schedulnd Tribes would be considered for assistance upto a Ceiling of Rs. four lakhs. Lolleges with larger endol*oments would be considered for assistance only if the number of Schedulad Caete and Scheduled Tribe Students is not less than 20; of the total emolument in degree and postagree courses or at least 35 in case of . colleges with enfolments upto 175 students.
4. The itens of assistanca for the abova collages would be the same as for an undernraduata collone in a backward areas Preference would, however, be given to specific programmes like remodial/componsatory coursus for weaker sections of students, faculty improvement and providing hostel facilities of a dormitory typa accomodation for studeats.

## F. Preparation of develonment proposals by the Colleges

The Coll ${ }^{\text {ges }}$ will formulata composita proposals for development during the rixth Plan fariod for improving the standard of taaching at various lovels. For this purpose, the the college may include proposals for (a) books and journals with a view to augumenting the library facilities and improving reading habits amnng the students (b) equipmeñt needed for improving the standarts (c) remedial courses for students belonging to waker sections of sociaty with the help of senior sturents and part-time staff (d) axtension activities in the neighbouring areas for the benefit of the weaker sections of the socisty in the form of specific programmes (e) additional teaching and technical staff with a view to improving the standard of teaching (f) Faculty Improvamant Programmas ( g ) hostel farilitios for students and rasidential facilities for taaching staff and (h) extension of academic buildings including library and laboratories etc. The college may associate its faculty in the planning Board which may formulate development proposals after identifying the real needs. It is not necossary that a college should soek assistance for all the purposes indicated above. Tha Pattern of Assistance for various items is given in Annexure I. $^{\text {. }}$
2. Assistanca from the Commission for all the building projects including grants paid aftar 1.4.1981 for building projects approved in Uth or earlier plan period will in no

case exceed 35\% of thatotal o iling. Suildina nropnsals will be considmed only if those are part of the composite development olan of the collene and if anproved are taken up simultaneously $w i$ th the other approved schemes. It is expected that the college would mropose utilisatinn of at least 20, of the total orant for bnoks and Journals (including schemes for improving reading habits among the sturlentel, another $20 \%$ for equipment. and the remaining 25\% for creation of ouditional teaching and tachnical posts Faculty Improvement Programmes, extension programmes, remedial courses and ot'rer innovative programmes.
3. Assistance for all categories of posts approved in VI Plan will be available only upto 31 st March, 1995 on the specific condition that the posts are created on permanent bisis and firm commitment is given to meet full expenditure on these posts by the colleqe/state government from 1.4. 1985 as committed expenditure.
4. The colleges seeking assistance for development during the sixth plan period should prepare an integrated plan for all departinents and qeneral amenities within the ceiling prescribed and send the same duly completed in all respect to the Commission in the prescribed form throuoh the university ( proposals for $\leqslant$ ixth Plan should be generally made early so that they rould be completed within the plan period. Fresh proposals made in $1984-85$ may not be qenerally considered, except in very special cases. Only colleges which have fulfilled all conditions of affiliation prescribed by the University and are included under Section $2(r)$ and also $12(A)$ of the University Grants Commission Act, in case they have been set up after 17.6.72 are eligible to send their proposals. The University will qive nocessary certificates as required at appropriate places in the prescribed form while forwarding the proposals of colleges to the Commission. -
5. In preparing the proposals for development, the colleges have to qive first priority to the completion of projects uhich were taken up in the fifth plan or earlier plan Periods and which have not been completed. Expenditure incurred or grants paid by the Commission after Ist April, 1981 to the colleges for completion of the projects approved by the Commission in the Fifth Plan or earlier than periods would be treated as first charge. Bn the grants to be anproved during the Sixth plan period within the limit fixed for the concerned item. The college may review such building projects which were approved during the Fifth Plan Period but which were deferred to see whether priority could be given to those building projects to be taken up as now projects in the Sixth Flan Feriod.
6. While making a proposal for construction of hostel for students, the college should keep in view the need.for reservaing 20\% seats for students belonging to Scheduled castes and Scheduled Tribes which could be qiven to other students only if requisite number of $\mathrm{CC} / \mathrm{ST}$ students are not available.

7. The college need not send any plans and estimates. for various building projects at the time of sonding the initial proposal. The may only send a line plan and estimated cost and indicate the period requirad for completion of the building, alongwith justification for proposing construction of a particul 3 r building or extension of axisting building indicating the extent to which the prosent building is being utilisad. plans and certified estimates mav be got prepared as per guidelines only afterthe proposal is accepted in principle by the Commission. Each proposal will be considered by the Commission on merit and assistance will be approver for various items and programmes keeping in view the needs of the colloge and its viability. It is not obligatory for the UGC to accept all schemes and for the total amount of celling indicated for differont categorias of colleges.

## G. Dther proqrammes for the collequs

1. In addition to above programmes for general dovelopment, the Commission has initiated a number of special programmes for improving quality education in colloges. Selection of colleges for participation in these programmes will be made on the basis of criteria laid down for each such programmes. These schemes are COSIP, COSHIP, Restructuring of under graduate courses of studies in colliges, national adult aducation programmes, extension activitias and continuing education, autanomous collageso, Detailed information relating to such programmes may be obtained separately aither from the University or from the University Grants Commission.
H. Additional programmes for Faculty ImprovementParticdpation of_teachers in_International_Conferences.
2. Proposals for participation of teachers invited for presenting their papers in the International Conference may be sent separately alonguith (a) 4 copios of the paper to be prasented (b) a copy of the invitation letter and (c) the source from which $50 \%$ of the expenses are proposed to be met to reach the Commission's office at least 60 days before the date of the conferance for considaration by the Commission, as per procedure prescribed. No assistance from UGC can be given where the teacher attends such conforence without prior sanctions by the UGC. Normally, proposals for assisting a teachor once in a 3 year period will be considered for attending an International Conference.
ii) Participation in workshopse seminars otc.
3. The collage teachers may also participate in refershor courses, workshops, saminars, symposia and summer instituted which would continug to be organised by universities and other institutions of higher loarning with assistance from the Commission. Nocessary details in this regard may be obtained from the univarsity/instititution concerned which organises such seminars etc.
iii) Support for Rasearch
4. The Commission provides assistance to in servine teachers for undertaking minor/short term resoarch projects or advanced/major research projects in Humanitios including social sciences and scionces. Selection of toachors for assistance under this programme is made by the Commiasion on the recommendation of the panels/expert committers. Details and prescribed application form in this regard may either be obtained from the university nr from the
Commission's offica.

The Commission further agread that the Coordinator may be appointer in the scale of fis. 1100-1600. Howevar, if a teachor alroady working within the University is seconded to work as Coordinator, he may carry his own scale of pay.

The various brouhures and monographs brought out by the examination reform units and the results of sturles and invastigations carrion out by them should be made availabla also to othor universitiss in the region, An affort should bo made to involve univarsities in the rogion in the various activitias undertaken by the examination reform unit of a particular university.

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Item No.1.02(A) : To approve the action taken
on certain matters.
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(1) Gujarat University - Approval of higher initial start to the teachers.

The Commission during the Vth Plan approved certain teaching posts for various teaching departments of the Gujarat University. The University has given more than 5 increments to the following teachers in protection of the last salary drawn by them.

(2) To make correction in the allocation made to Gujarat Vidyapith for the construction of eight staff quarters vide its meeting held on 19 th
December, 1980.
The Commission in its meeting (Item No.5.01) held on 19 th December, 1980 approved the construction of eight staff quarters in Gujarat Vidyapith at an estimated cost of Rs. $2,88,000 /$. But in the
resolution, the amount was inadvertently mentioned as Rs.2,28,000/-. Since it was a typographical error, the approval for the construction of eight staff quarters at a cost of Rs. $2,88,000 /-$ vide letter No. F. 5-4/80 (B-2) dated 6.1.1981 has been conveyed to the Vidyapith.
(3) Travel grant to College Teachers for attending International Conferences abroad.

The Commission provides travel grant to college teachers on $50 \%$ sharing basis for attending International conferences abroad provided the other $50 \%$ is paid by the University/State Government/ College or any recognised organisation/trust. The decision in this regard is taken on the kasis of evaluation of paper which has been accepted for presentation at the conference. Following proposals were approved as per above procedure and admissible grants on $50 \%$ sharing basis would be provided to the colleges for participation of the teachers in the International Conferences abroad :

(4) Beneras Hindu University - Approval of grant for Development of Lalit Kala Mahnividyalaya.

The University Grants Commission generally accepted the recommendations made by the Visiting Committee which assessed the Fifth Plan development proposal of Laliit Kala Mahavidualaya, Banaras Hinanu University (Item No. 9 dated 13th November, 1998). The additional posts ( 4 lectureis, 7 technicians and 5 others) were approved as a first charge to Sixth plan ellocation of Banaras Hindu University (Item No.2(a) July, 1979). In view of the action taken by the Banaras Hindu University in filling up the posts and revision of syllabi for Lalit Kala Mahavidyalaya as desired by the Commission at its November, 1978 meeting, it has been decided to epprove the recurring grant of Rs. $45,000 /-\mathrm{p} . \mathrm{a}$. as detailed below to Banrias Hindu Univeisity for

(6) Contral Universities - Recommendations made by the Pablic Accounts Committee regarding income and expenditure from hostels.

The Public Accounts Committee in its 14th report 1967-68 had recommended as below regarding the expenditure of hostels :
"The committee hope that a final decision on the recommendation of the Review Committee: that 'the income and expenditure of the hostels shoulld be taken into account while determining the maintenance grants' will be taken soon. The committee also suggest that a uniform policy should be followed as far as possible for giving grants to Central universities for the running of hostels and that suitable scales incorporating a maximum for such assistance should be prescribed."

The Public fuccounts Committee had made the above recommendation taking into account the fac= that hostel deficit is met from the maintenance grant in respect of $\mathrm{d} \boldsymbol{d} \mathrm{lg} \mathrm{erh}$ Muslim University and Visvam Bhareti. The same approach had also been proposed at that point of time for Delhi University too, though in the case of Banaras Hindu University, the question of self-sufficiency of hostels had been recommentled by raising the hostel rent and reducing the mess staff consistent with the minimum amentities needed for the students. The action taken on the above recommendation as reported by the Government (Ministry of Educat: on) is as below :
"No final decision has so far been taken by the UGC on the tentative recommendation of the committee appointed to detemine the maintemance (block) grants of the Central Universities during the fouth plan period that the 'income and expenditure of the hostels should be taken into account while determing the maintenance grants'. As recommended by the Public Accounts Committee, a final decision in the matter will be taken soon and while doing so, the committee"s suggestion for following a uniform policy as far as possible for giving grants to Central Universities for the running of hostels and for prescribing a scale of maximum for such assistance will be kept in view."

In this connection it may be mentioned that the committee appointed by the UGC to consider the recommendations of the Estimates Committee to bring down hostel charges in Delhi University had decided that it would not be possible to reduce the charges in the hostel. The committee, however, recommended that in order to enable poor students to benefit from the hostel facilities, the best course would be to institute certain scholarships. A part of the students expenses could also be met by providing them with certain 'earn while you learn' opportunities in the institutions.

It may also be noted that the committee appointed by the Commission under the Chairmanship of Dr. C.D. Deshmukh to detemine the block grants of Central Universities for 1967-70 had inter-alia recommended that the income and expenditure of the hostels should be taken into account while determining the block grants. It was also the suggestion that a uniform policy should be followed as far as possible for giving grents to Central Universities for the running of hostels and for prescribing a scale of meximum for such assistance.

The recommendations of the PAC were placed before a committee constituted regariing determiration of maintenance grant to Central Universities arro the Institutions deemed to be universities. frie committee agreed "that it is necessary for al. Central Universities to evolve a uniform policy as far as possible in the matter of giving subsidy for running hostels.

It was noter that at present the Commission does not subsidise the messes, which have to be self supporting. However, the salary of the staft for the messes, i.e. cooks and bearers appointed according to the norms is taken into account for determining the deficit. The establishment fees, charged from the students is also treated as the income of the University. It was agreed that the existing arrangement may contimue. It may not be possible at this stage to aropt the procerure followed by the Inclian Institute of Technology.

The above recommontations of the Maintenance Grant Dftemination Committee have been accepted and the Ministry of Education infomed accordingly.

The UGC had been advising the Central Universities since March, 1970 that it was for the universities concerned to take a decision with regard to insurance of buildinga and equipment by themselves. The Commission also had then advised the Central Universities to include the requirements of insurance in the budget estimates which the Commission could take into account while determining maintenance grant of the universities. In spite of the above, no policy decision had been taken either by UGC or the universities concerned regarding insuring laboratory and other buildings

Luniversities on a limited liability basis. One of the
of the <Central Universities took up this question in 1974 with the UGC so that it could go ahead with the programme of insurance of the university's properties including the library and laboratory buildings housing sophisticated equipment etc.

The question of insuring laboratory and other buildings of the Central universities o:. a limited liability basis was placed before a committee constituted regarding determination of maintenance grant to Central universities ani Institutions deemed to be universities, fo: consideration. The Committee noted that tine Indian Institute of Technology do not instre laboratories and other buildings in view of the prectical difficulties involved. It was agreè that there is no need for insuring the laboretorles and other buildings of the Central Universities. This recommendation of the committee was accepted and communicated to the Central Universities.
(8) Payment of Ex-gratia grant by the UG, to Delhi University for meeting the cost medical treatment of Professor pikhamoy Chakravarti, Professor of Economics, Delhi University outside India.

The University of Delhi had sen a proposal for the payment of an ex-gratia grant for the expenditure, to be incurred for heart operation of Professor Sukhamoy Chakravarti, Professor of Economics to be performed outside Indita.

This case was considered in consultation with the Govermment of India, Ministry of Education and Culture. The Ministry of Education \& Culture had as a special case agreed to allow the university to meet the cost of medical treatment of Professor Sukhamoy Chakravarty outside India in relaxation of the rules and agreed that the expendicure to be incurred on this account be sanctioned on the following conditions.:

1) the expenditure incurred on medical treatment outside India, will be sanctioned as an exgratia grant;

1i) the expenditure that will qualify for this grant should be limited to the actual hospital fees, including the cost of othe: services rendered by the hospital, during hospitalisation and the actual expenditure incurred by Prof. Chakravarti for a period of three weeks as an out-door patient. The actual expenditure incurred on an attendant accompanying Prof. Chakravart」 during the period of his hospitalisation and stay as an out-door patient, will also be covered by the grant:
111) In case Professor Chakravarti and the attendant accompanying him are unable to secure free air-tickets, the cost of air travel may also be reimbursed; and
iv) the ex-gratia grant covering the cost of all items mentioned above will be subject to a ceiling of Rs. 2 lakhs.

The proposal of the Delhi University in
this behalf was accepted on the above conditions and a sum of Rs. $2,00,000 \%$ (Rupees two lakhs) has been released to the University of Delhi for the above purpose.
(9) Presidency College, Calcutta - Department of Special Assistance in Economics revised scale of assistance w.e.f. Ist September, 1978.

The Commission at its meeting held on September 26, 1977 accepted the recommendation of the Assessment Committee which reviewed the working of the Department of Economics, Presidency College

Calcutta, in 1977 as a Department of Special Assistance. The Commission agreed that revised scales of assistance recommended by the committee may be made available to the College for a period of five years as soon as the State Government/ Presidency College agreed to reminstitute Professorship in the Department in the scale of Rs.1500.2500 and also continue the three old posts of Professors in the Department in the revised scale of the professors (Res. No. 10 dated 26.9 .1977 ).

The Principal of the college intimated to the Commission that the Government of West Bengal has agreed to re-institute Professorship in the Department in the scale of Rs.1500-2500 and also continue three old posts of Professors in the department in the revised U.G.C. professional scale. The State Government had also agreed to bear the liability of the additional posts (teaching and non-teaching) as in the revised scale of assistance when the UGC's assistance ceased after five years. The college requested that the revised scale of assistance be made effective from Ist Septemier, 1978. The proposal was accepted and the dection conveyed to the Presidency College, Calcutta in September, 1978. (The delay in putting up the matter to the Commission is regretted).
(10) Extension of University Leadership Programme in Political Science Department, Panjab University for a further period of 2 years.

On the basis of the recommendations of the ULP Visiting Committee for the Department of Political Science, Panjab University, it has been agreed to extend the period of assistance to this Department for a further period of two years w.e.f. Ist January, 1982 to 31st December, 1983 and to provide the following financial assistance

(11) Increase in the allocation of grant approved for books and journals for the college in respect of the Department of Economics, Kurukshetra University participating in ULP.

The Commission vide Item 2(a)-24
dated 27 th April, 1979 approved an amount of Rs, $1,17,500 / m$ for books and journals for 47 colleges @ Rs. $2,500 \%$ per college in respect of the department of Economics, Kurukshetra University which is participating under ULP (University Leadership Project).

Later, it was agreed to provide an additional grent of Rs.12,500/- for a period of three years towards the purchase of books and journals for 5 additional colleges imparting instruction in Economics both at the undergiaduate and postgreduate levels.

It has now been agreed to allow the Department to distribute books and journals in 56 colleges instead of 52 colleges out of the grant of Rs. 1, 30,000/- already approved for the purpose.
(12) College Science Improvement Programme Approval of grant to COSIP Colleges.

The new COSIP proposals were forwarded to Convenors of State Advisory Committee for necessary evaluation on the basis of point formula. Accordingly, the proposal from Amolak Chand Mahavidyalaya, Yavatmal affiliated to Nagpur University has been examined and a grant of Rs.1.75,000/- has been approved for implementation of COSIP over a period of three years w.e.f. 18.12.1981.
(13) Extension of Major Research Projects in Science subjects under the Scheme Support Eor Research in Science Subiect'.

The University Grants Commission has been providing assistance to faculty members in the universities and affiliated colleges since year 1974-75 to enable them to implement suitable research projects. The projects are approved on the basis of recommendations of Subject panels initially for a threemyear period. The projects are extendable to a maximum period of another two years.

The approved research projects are to he monitored every year by the Monitor suggested by the respective panels. On the recommendations of Monitors the projects are extended for another term ranging from one year to two years. Ad-hoc extension for six months is accorded pending monitoring of the project as per suggestions of the Panels. This is necessary due to iate recelpt of proposals from the investigators andor delayed in reply from the monitor.

A list of the research projects where initial three year period is over and where ad-hoc extension for 6 months or regular extension for $1-2$ year has been accorded is attached (Annexure).
(14) Additional Contingency grant to

Dr, PC Gupta, University of Allahabad undor the research prolect.

Under the research project sanctioned to
Dr. PC Gupta, there was a provision for contingency grent of Rs.3,000/- p.a. On the recommendations of the Monitor on the request for enhancement, an additional contingency grant of RS. $1,500 /$ - under the project hes been approved for the third year.
(15) Assistance to university and colleges for organising National Integration programmes during 1981-82.

The UGC has been hitherto providing assistance to universities @ Rs. $2400 /$ - per annum and to the colleges @ Rs. 1200/- per annum for the work of the National Integration Samitis. The Commission, on the recommendation of the committee appointed by it to review the working of the National Integration Samitis decided that instead of providing assistance to the universities and colleges on the present pattern as indicated above, assistance may be provided to such institutions only which are genuinely interested in keeping up well defined activities and purposes to take up specific programmes related to promotion of National Integration during 1981-82.

Accordingly, the universities and colleges were requested to send proposals by 14.8.1981. 21 proposals were received from universities and 167 from colleges which were considered by a committee consisting of Dr. Prem Kirpal, Professor Chandran D.S. Devanesan, Dr. AJ Kidwai and Dr. (Smt.) Jyoti H. Trivedi at its meeting on September 29, 1981. The recommendations made by the committee that assistance to seven universities and twenty one colleges be providei for organising National Integration programme; during 1981-82 as per details given in Appendix. has been accepted. The Institutionsibelgotao for. the purpose have been requested to organise the approved programes which may also include Commomeration of National days, important National events and anniversaries of National leaders by the end of December, 1982.
(16) Starting of B. Phann Degree course by SNDT Women's University, Bombay.

Assistance would, however, be provided by the Commission on cent per cent besis outside the plan allocation of the university.

Grant of Higher Initial pay to Dr. G.K. Ghosal, Lecturer in Petrochemical Technology at the Laxminarayan Institute of Technology, and Dr. R.I. Nikore, Professor, Department of Phamaceutical Silences, Nagpur University.

Against the posts sanctioned by the Commission, the Nagpur University appointed Dr. GK Ghosal. Lecturer in Petrochemical Technology
at the Laxminarayan Institute of Technology on Rs.1020/- in the scale of Rs. $700-1600$ and Dr. RL Nikore, Professor in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences on Rs.1900/- in the scale of Rs.1500-2500 in order to protect the salaries already drawn by them. The grant of higher initial starting salary to the two incumbents has been noted.
(20) Approval for purchase of a Mini Bus for Kamala Nehru College, New Delhi.

The Kamala Nehru College, New Delhi submitted a proposal for the purchase of a Min.t Bus to replace the mini bus purchased in $196^{\circ}$ as it was becoming unsafe and uneconomical to use. The proposal of the college to replace the old mini bus by a new one was accented vide orders dated the 5th January, 1982. The Commission's share would be $50 \%$ of the actual cost after taking into account the sale proceeds of old mini bus.
(21) Applicability of Government of India Rules regarding revised rates of additional

On the recommentations of the Managing Committee of the UGC (Departmental) Centeen, the orders contained in the Govermment of India, Ministry of Home Affairs, Dopartment of Personnel and Administrative Reforms Office Memornadum Nos. 4/13/80-Dir(c) dated 4th December, 1981 and 3(2)/Dir (c) dated the Ist January, 1982 regarding revision of rates of additional Deamess Relie三 have been made applicable to the employees of the UGC (Departmontel) Canteen w.e.f. 1.4.1981 and 1.6.1981 respectively.
(22) Aligarh Muslim Univirsity - Construction of Men's Hostel for 500 students during VIth Plan poriode

The Ministry of Education and Culture after discussion with the Chairman, University Grants Commission made a reference to the University Grants Commission for the construction of hostel for 500 students against the urgent need of the university for 1000 students hostel building.

In view of the urgency of the situation the proposal of the Aligarh Muslim University for construction of Men's hostel for 500 students has been agreed to in principle, and the university has accordingly sent plans and preliminary estimates of Rs. 1.39 crores for the building.

The tentative allocation made to the IIligarh Muslim University for development proposal in the VIth Plan is Rs. 1.50 crores, against which proposals for Rs. 39.02 lakhs as first charge on VIth Plan allocation has so far been accepted including the cost esclation in respect of three buildings. Estimates for cost esclation for other buildings, if any, are awaited.
(23) Release of grant to Bhagat Singh College, New Delhi, for purchase of land,

The Commission agreed to pay to Bhagat Singh College, New Delhi, $50 \%$ of the cost of land to be acquired for the college. The college took possession of the land in 1975 after depositing necessary amount from rut of funds made available by the Delhi Administration. The college has submitted copies of lease deed and subject to finalization of actual cost by the D.D.A. on account grant of Rs. $50,000 /$ - was paid to the college vide orders dated the 28 th January, 1982. The balance grant, if any, would be released when the final cost is decided by the D.D.A.

The Commission may if it is satisfied that the univorsity has not been maintaining standards of insturction and or examination for an particular cours of study, the Commission may (after giving an opportunity to the university to show cause to the contrary direct.that the corresponding degree be derecognised tamporarily or permanently. on receipt of the direction the university shall give offect to it and shall not conduct instruction or examination for such a degree, provided however that if the Commission is satisfied that appropriate steps have bef taken by the university for the maintanance of standards, it may suspend or rescind the diractions. Nothing in this section shall affect the powers of tho Madical Council of India in relation to the recognition of degrees in Madicine.

## Section-2 <br> (Matters relating to standards)

Item No,2e1: To consider the recommendations made by the
Co-ordinating Committee appointed by the
Commission for organisation of a Workshop on
Marine Mineral Deposits in Collaboration with
the National Institute of Dceanography, Goa.

The Commission considered the suggestions made by the Geo-sciences Panel regarding organisation of a workshop on Marine Mineral Deposits in collaboration with National Institute of Oceanography, Goa. The Commission felt that decision may be taken in the light of the need and the likely impact of such a workshop and the matter reported to the Commission.

Item No. 2.02: To consider the recommendations made by the Committee at its mesting held in the office of the University Grants Commission on 6.3.82 to revieu the qualifications laid down by the Commission for recruitment to the post of Lecturers in Law in the Universities and Colleges.

The Commission agreed that the revisad qualifications for recruitment to the post of lecturer in Law may be as follows:
"LLM degres with good academic record."
The Commission agreed that these qualifications may not be insisted upon where a university appoints practicing advocate as part-time lecturer.

Item No. 2.03 : To consider the summary of rocommendations of the High Level Seminar on Moral Education held at Simla on May 27-28, 1981 forwarded by the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Culture.

The Commission while generally endorsing the recommendations

[^1]of the Seminar on Moral Education, desired that a working group may be appointed to prepard a plan of work for implementation of the rocormendations as far as these relate to higher eflucation.

Item No. 2.04: To consicier the recommendations made at the meeting of the Committer held on October 17, 1981 to work out tho details of Library sciences on a reginnal basis and to suggest inter Library Cooperation.

The Commission agreed 'in principle' to the setting up of regional library centres as recommended by the Committee, and desired that detailed information may be obtained from the universities concerned and also from Central Institute of English \& Foreign Languages, Hyderabad. A working group may then be constituted to make specific recommendations to the Commission in this regard. It may perhaps be necessary to also provide some grants to universities for tha acquisition of additional journals in subjects concerned in places where such regional centres are set up.

Item No. 2.05 : To consider the question of defining the term "good academic record" as laid down by the Commission in the qualifications for recruitment to the posts of. Lecturers in the Universities and Colleges.

It was agreed that the matter may be brought up before the Commission at its next meeting.

Item No.2.06 : To consider the minutes of the meeting of the Implementation Committee on Examination Reforms held on April 16, 1982.

The Commission generally accepted the recommendations of the Implementation Committee on Examination Reforms and desired that as suggested, a working group may be appointed to formulate a minimum programme on examination reforms for implementation by all universities.

Item No. 2. 07 : To consider the recommendations made by the Committee appointed by the Commission to review the quidelines for restructuring of courses at the Undergraduate level.

The Commission accepted the revised guidelines for restructuring of courses of study at the undergraduate level including the courses in actuarial science/insurance as surgosted by the Government of India. It was desired
that these guidelines as per Appendjx-IV may be circulated to the universities with a request thet these may be expeditiously considered by their academic bodies. The universities may be requested to send within the next three months their views, if any, and also action taken by them, including the phased programme for implamentation of the programme during the Sixth Plan period.

In this connection the Commission desired that in order that programmes of this type ara wall implemented and followmp action is taken, a suitable coordination and monitoring machinery may be set up in the UGC office.

Item No.2.08: To consider the recommendations made by the Committer appointed by the Commission to frame guidelinos for implementation of the Merit Promotion Scheme and Stagnation Removal Schome for College teachers.

The Commission considered the recommendations of the Committee to suggest guidelines for a Merit Promotion Schome for college teachers and desirad that the scheme may be modified in the light of the discussions held at the meeting. The schome as modified is given at Appendix-U. It was further agreed as follows :
(a) The Commission's assistance to the colleges for the implementation of the scheme would bo till 1984-85 only and be treated as a plan expenditure. The State Government concerned would heve to give an assurance that they will take over the additional liability after the Commission's assistanco ceases.
(b) The schame may be forwarded to the State Governments and they may be requested to indicate their views and acceptance of the scheme and also whether they would take over the additional liability at the and of the 198485. The State Government would be requested to send their views within two months at the latest.
(c) The minimum period for eligibility for consideration under merit promotion scheme for university appointed lacturers should also be 8 years as now racommended for college teachers.
(d) The Commission's assistance for implementation of the Merit Promotion Scheme both for university and college taachers will be available only after the scheme has been finally notified and not from retrospective effect.
(0) Tha Commission was not in favour of a provision for romoval of stagnation at this stage.

## Item No. 2.09 : To consider the procedure for monitoring of ndult Education and Extension Programme through Universities and Colleges.

The Commission agreed that the revised procedure for monitoring of ndult Education and Extension Programmes through universities and colleges as given in Appendix-VI, may be adopted. In this connection it was noted that the UGC would provide a feed back to the universities and colleges on the basis of the reports received in the UGC. The Universities may also be requested to ensure ragular submitsion of monitoring returns to the state Adult Education authorities.

## Section-3 <br> (References from Government)

Item No, 3.01 : To consider a reference from the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Culture regarding guidelines prescribing a precise frame work and modus operandi for stoppage of ragging in aducational institutions.

The Commission noted that the Ministry of Education had since circulated to universities certain measures which they may take immediately for prevention of ragging in educational institutions. The universities may be requested to send the implementation report on the action taken and the effoct of this implementation during the current academic year and any other suggestion to ensure that the ragging does not occur in the colleges and universities. The matter may be brought up before the Commission in the light of the views received from the universities.

Item No.3.02 : To consider a reference received from the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Culture regarding the views of the Commission on the suggestions made by Professor Narain Chand Prashar M.P. on "notified area" indicated in the Guidelines laid down by the Commission for providing assistance to colleges for development of undergraduate education in the Sixth Plan.

The Commisṣion agreed that the guidelines for assistance to Arts, Science and Commerce/Multi-Faculty Collegas uould need to be reviewed in regard to definition of rural areas, and that the matter brought up before the Commission again with specific proposals.

> Item No, 3,03 : To consider a reference received from the linistry of Education and Culture, regarding uniform staffing pattern and scales of pay of nonmetoaching employees in universities and colleges.

The Commission was of the view that it was primarily for the State Governments to take in consultation with the universities and colleges, measures with regard to the pattern of non-teaching staff required and the terms and conditions of the service of such employees including pay scales, as they are normally related to the conditions of service etc. for similar employees of the State Government.

The Commission felt that as situations in difforent States Vary widoly it would neither be desirable nor possible to suggest/prescribe a uniform pattern for non-teaching staff in the universities and colleges.

> Item No. 3.04 : To consider a referente from the Government of India, Ministry of Education and Culture rogarding the views of the U.G.C. on the recommendations of the meeting of the Expcutivg Committee, of the All India Council of Sports about improving Sports in Colleges and Universities and for propor utilisation of facilitiss available under the N.S.O. Programme.

> The Commission felt that there was an urgent need for the proper development of sports in our universities and colleges and the amount provided for the programme in the current plan are inadequate. A Working Group may be appointed to recommend steps to be taken to improve the facilities and training for sports in the universities and colleges, within the resources available.

## Sectiob- 4 <br> (Spocial Programmes)

Itam No. 4001 : - To consider the racommendation of the Panel on English and Foreign Languages for establishing five regional centres for preparing and circulating the up-tondate list of topics of Ph.D.

The Commission accoptod "in principle" the need for bringing out a bibliography on topics on on-going and completed research leading to Ph.D. and desired that
the matter be brought up before the Commission indicating the work already being done in this rugard by other agencies.

It日m No. 4.02 : To consider the reconmendations made
by the standing Committee for development of Computar facilities held on 27th January, 1982.
(i) The Commission accepted the recommendations made by the Standing Committee for Dovelopment of Computer Facilities at its meeting held on 27th January, 1982. The Commission agreed, among.other things, to provide funds for setting up of new computer centres at ii) Indian School of Mines, (ii) Sri Venkateswara University, (iii) Patna University, (iv) Inter-institutional computer centre to be located at Nagpur University and (v) for the universities in Hyderabad to be located at Osmania University. The Commission's assistance would be available for purchase and installation of these computers in accordance with the systems configurations recommended by the respective committees and on the sharing of the costs of computer, as indicated in nppendix UII. The Commission would, howaver, provide assistance in fül upto the amounts recommended in each case for purposes of installation of these new computers, including buildings, alterations to buildings and air-conditioning, etc., as may be required and for purposes of staff and maintenance as per norms prescribed.
(ii) The Commission agreed to a grant of Rs. $75,000 /$ - to Banaras Hindu University, Varanasi for purchase of an interpreter to provide printing facilities on punch cards in association with its computer, ICL-1904 system.
(iii) The Commission agreed to provide a grant of Rs. $50,000 /$ - per annum during oth Plan period for gurchase of computer time for their research needs to each of the universities of (a) Sambalpur University, (b) Kashmir University, (c) North Bengal University,' (d) Saurashtra University (o) Gujarat University and (f) Calicut University.
(iv). The Commission agreed that the proposal for upgradatior of the existing TDC syatems in respect of the universities of Karnatak, Jammu, Bombay, Jodhpur and Gauhati may be examined with the help of the committea suggested by the Standing Committee.
(v) The Commission accepted the revised norms for staff for different levels of computer systems as suggested by the Standing Committee ( $n$ ppendix-VII).
(vi) The Commission agroed with the other general recommendations made by the Standing Committee with regard to organisam tion of Department of Computer Science and Technology except the revision of scales of pay of the staff.

It was suggested that the universities which desire to have computers during the VI Plan may be requested to send their proposals by the end of the year thereafter these be examined in accordance with procedure to be nrescribed.
(vii) The Commission also agreed that the new course leading to the Master of Computer Application may be initiated in the universities already agroed to by it, keeping in vieu the general course structure suggested by the Joint Manpower Panel of the UGC and DOE and the unit assistance for each university identified for starting this course may be given for a period of five years.

Item No. 4.03 : To receive the report on status of Journalism and Comnunication Education prepared by the Panel on Mass Communication.

It was agreed that the report on the status of Journalism and Communication Education may be circulated to the Universities for consideration by their academic bodies. Their views and suggestions for effective implementation may be communicated to the Commission.

Item No. 4.04 : To consider the recommendations made by the Panel on English and Foreign Languages on the report of "Syllabi Reform in English".

It was agreed that the report on "Syllabi Reforms in' English" may be circulated to the Universities for consideration by their academic bodies. Thoir views and suggestions for effective implementation may be communicated to the Commission.

It may, however, be made clear that the Commission has not taken any decision regarding the suggestion for provision of two years of compulsory teaching of English for B. $\mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{M}}, \mathrm{B} . \mathrm{Sc}$. and B.Com. students.

Item No.4.05 : To consider the recommendations of the sub-committee constituted by the UGC to consider the working paper in research followships/issociateships awarded by the Commission.

Tho Commission considered the recommendations of the sub-committee and agreed that the revised terms and conditions of award of junior/senior research fellowships be as given in Appendix IX.

The Commission also agreed that award of postdoctoral fellowships may be discontinued and merged with the scheme of award of Research issociateship. The value of Research Associateship would be Rs. $900 /-$, Rs. 1100/-, Rs. $1300 /$, and Rs. $1500 /$ - P.m. under four categories of Type A, fype B, Type C and Type D respectively and the total tenure of Research issociateship would be limited to five years only. In this connoction, the Commission further desired as follows :
(a) The age limit prescribed for award of fallowships and research associatoships for women candidates may be raised by ten years.
(b) The minimum of acadomic record for eligibility for applying for Junior Research Fellowship/Senior Research Fellowship be the same as be prescribad for recruitment to the post of Locturer in that particular discipline.
(c) The universities be advised that the minimum conditions of academic performance for eligibility for registration to M.Phil and.Ph.D. courses should be the same as prescribed for recruitment to the post of lecturers irrespective of the fact whether a student has been awarded a fellowship or otherwise.
(d) Detailed guidelines for use of contingent grant by students who are awardod fellowships may also be prescribed and circulated to the universities.
(e) The Commission accepted in principle the recommendation of the committee to provide a lumpsum grant to the universities for meeting contingent needs of research scholars who may not have been awardad fellowships and desired that the purposes for which a grant could be used be worked out and brought up before the Commission.

Item No. 4.06 : To consider further assistance to the CAS in nstronomy at the Osmania University, Hyderabad.

The Commission considered the suggestions made by the Physics Panel with regard to developing the telescope facilitics availatle at Rangapur observatory and the Department of nstronomy, osmania University into one of the National Centres for purposes of promoting teaching, training and research in the field of Astronomy. It was felt that tho various recommendations made would require further consideration in depth, particularly with regard to organisation and administration of such a national centre, the meture of academic programmes to be devoloped and the utilisation of the facilitios available in the overall context of a national network for programmes in Astronomy. It was agrood that panding such consideration and final decisjon in this regard, the urgent requirements of the Rangapur observetory could bo agreed to, in consultation with the omania University.

# Item No, 4,07 : To consider the report of the submcommittee <br> of the UGC Standina Committes on deurlopment of computer facilities for starting one yoar Post-G. Sc. Diploma Programme in Eomeutire Science and application. 

The Commission accepted the racommendation of the Standing Committee on Development of Computer Facilities for starting the one-year post-B.Sc. Diploma Course in Computer Scisnce and Applications in accordanco with the plan of implementation and the course structure defined by its submommittee. This programme could be taken up as one of the activities within the allocation available for restructuring undergraduate courses during the VI Plan period and on a cost sharing basis with the DCE. The programmes may be initiated from 1982-83 in as many identified institum tions as possible and the quastion of adding more institutions could be considered, whenever necessary.

Item No. $4.08:$ To receive a note indicating the present composition of the Panels alonguith the broad items normally to be considered by the Panels.

The Commission noted the composition as well as the nature of work carried out by different subjecte panels of the UGC. It was noted that the panels were due to be reconstituted soon. In order that the panels work is well defined and impact maximised and their recommendations with regard to teaching and research in different disciplines. are speedily implemented, it is necessary to establish an adequate level of coordination and consultation and also to lay down specific terms af reference. It was suggested that a committea may formulate such switable terms of reference and guidelines.

Item No. $4.09: \begin{aligned} & \text { To consider a proposal for setting up of } \\ & \\ & \\ & \\ & \\ & \text { Nuciear Science Centre as a National }\end{aligned}$

The Commission emphasised the need for and importance of effective participation of the universities in the overall national research effort and the need for developing in the universities necessary facilities and capabilities for promotion of basic as well as applied research. In this context, it would be necessary to not only devolop sophisticated research facilities, but also locate some of the national facilities in the university campuses. In view of this, the proposal of the Physics Panel for sotting up of a fou Nuciear Scionce Centres as
regional inter-university facilities for promoting research and training in nuclear science, may be accepted in principle. The details of establishment of such centres, within the resources available, be considered with the help of a committee to be appointed for the purpose.

Item No 4 : 10 : To consider certain recommendations of the Panel on Mass Communication.

The Commission considered the racommendations of the Panel on Mass Communication and observod as undor :
(a) It was noted that within tho general publication grant placed at the disposal of universities, provision already exists for supporting such quality journals as are identified by the panels.
(b) The Commission was not in favour of a separate faculty for Mass Communication at this stage of the development of the subject.
(c) As regards the question of the desirability of including Journalism in the list of optional subjects for the Central Services examinations and prescribing Journalism/Communication as a qualification for recruitment to certain categories of jobs, it was suggested that these may be communicated to the Government of India for such action as they may consider necessary.

Item No.4,11:
To consider the report of the Committee on Centre of Advanced Study in Linguistics. nnnamalai University for support towards specific research projects.

The Commission agresd that assistance may be provided to the Centre if Advanced Study in Linguistics at Annamalai University towards the different research projects at an estimated cost of Rs, 7,55,000/- during the Sixth Plan period as detailed in nppendix-x.

Item No.4.12: To consider the recommendations of the Standing Committee for the programmes of Centres of Advancod Study and Special Assistance to Selected Departments made at its meeting held on 31.3.1982.

The Commission generally agreed with the suggestions and recommendations made by the Standing Committee for the programmes of Centires of Ndvanced Study and Special rissistance to selected dopartments at its meeting held
on 31.3.1982. Tho Commission, howover, desirod that tho rocommendations relating to the new departments identified for participation under the Special fissistance Programme may be brought up before the Commission again with full details.

The Commission accepted the recommendation that the Department of Molecular Biophysics, Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore, whose work under the special assistance programme had been evaluated, may now be recognised as a Centre of Advanced study and the grants amounting to Rs. 25 lakhs (Non-Recurring) and Ris. 1.5 lakhs per annum (Recurring) recommended by the assessment committee may be made available to the department for a period of five years.

Similerly in the case of Centre of fidvanced Study in Sociology, Delhi University, a nommrecurring grant of Rs. 2 lakhs for books and journals and a sum of Rs. 1 lakh for field work, seminars, etc., may be provided, pending remevaluation of its work at the end of next two years.

The Commission agreed that the provision available for national scholars working in different centres of Advanced Study, for purchase of books, may be enhanced from Rs. 100 to $\mathrm{Rs}_{\mathrm{s}} 200$ per annum w.e.f. 1982-83.

Item No. 4.13 : To consider the report of the expert committee on the proposal of the Perarignar finna University of Technology, Guindy, Madras for starting B. Tech. Programme in Computer Science \& Technology from 1982-83.

The Commission accoptod the recommendatiaps of the expert comittee for starting a yoyor B. Tech: programme in computer science and technology at the porarigniar nimp, Univarsity'; Metras with ffice from 1982-83 with an intake of 30 students and that $50 \%$ of the admissions may bo made from students coming from other states. The Commission agreed to provide for the purpose following non-recurring and recurring grants:-

(iii) The Commission moted that no stamp duty in such matters is payable by tho Central Government employees and desired that on that analogy a reference nay be made to the Ministry of Education and Culture to allow rolaxption in the matter of reimbursoment to tho UGC employees of the amount of stamp duty, etc. incurred by them on execution of the mortgage deeds under the schemes of House Building and Conveyance idvances, etc. The Commission agreed that in the meantime the present practice of reimbursement of such charges to its employees may continue in view of the fact that the Central Government employees are not required to pay any such charges on execution of the mortgage deeds, etc.
(iv) The Commission agreed to the convention of the post of Assistant Statistical Officer in the scale of pay of Rs.650-30-740-35-880-EB-40-960 into that of Junior Statistical officer in the scale of pay of Rs.840-40-1000-EB-40-1200 but desired that the conversion may be made effective from the date the reconverted post is filled in accordance with the provisions of the Cadre and Recruitment Rules.
(v) The Commission desired that this may be further examined and the matter brought up again before the Commission, if necessafy.
(vi) The Commission noted the progress in the Civil Writ Petition No. 26 of 1982 filed by Shri C.R. Raikwar, nssistant, in Delhi High Court.
(vii) The Commission while taking note of the advice received from the Ministry of Education and Culture vide its letter dated 18 th June, 1982 and in order to tone up the efficiency of the Socretariat of the Commission accepted the report of the Cominittee constituted by the Chairman, UGC in pursuance of the decision of the Commission taken at its meeting held om 23rd February, 1982 (item No. 6.04 (iv)) to consider the memorandum of demands presented by the UGC Staff fissociation to the members of the Commission on 23 rd February, 1982, as under :-
(a) to have an integrated scale of pay of Ps. 650-30-740-35-810-EB-35-880-40-1000-EB-40-1200 for Section Officers as in the Government of India as against the present practice of having Soction Officer (Grade-I) and Section Officer (Grade-II) in the scales of Rs.840-40-1000-EB-401200 and Rs.650-30-740-35-880-EB-40-1040 respectively which are the segments of the general scalo of pay of Section Officer in the Government of India Departments.
(b) to provide for three out of 11 posts of Personal Assistants in the Selection Grado of Rs.650~30 740-35-810-EB-35-880-40-1000-EB-40-1200 to serve as Private Secretary to Chairman and ViceChairman. These posts would be added along with Soction officers for solection of the incumbents to work as their Private Secretarias. In case any Section Officer is selectod by the Chairman or Vice-Chairman for appointment as Private Secretary in preference to an officer bolonging to the Selection Grade Personal issistant, the latter to be appointed as Section Officer in his place.
(c) to maintain a common list of Section officers and Selection Grads Pereonal issistants with references to their intermse seniority in thair respoctive grades for promotion to the grade of Under Secretary against $75 \%$ promotion quota as against this quota reserved for Section Officers (Grada-I) only as at present.
(d) to promote eligible nssistants as Section Officers after they have successfully. undergone training to be arranged by the office.
(e) to refer to the views/recommendations of the Committer made at its first and second meetings held on 27th Mpril, 1982 and 1st May, 1982, if and whon need be, with regard to other demands included in the memorandum of demands submitted by the UGC Staff nssociation.
(f) to make suitable amondments in the relevant Cadre and Recruitment Rules for the posts and to make these amendments effective prospectively.

Item No. 6. 15 : To note the date and place for the next meeting of the Commission.

It was noted that the next meeting of the Commission will bo held on nugust 2, 1982 at New Delhi. .

## Item No.6.16: To consider the subaplan for scheduled tribas and a spocial component plan for schoduled castos as part of the UGC's Eth five-year plan.

The Commission generally endorsed the recommendations of the Standing Committeo regarding submplan for scheduled tribes and the special componont plan for scheduled castes and desired that the following points may be brought up before the Commission:
(i) Relatimg the contents of courses with the specific needs of scheduled tribe students (para 22) in such colloges which have large number of $\mathrm{SC} / \mathrm{ST}$ students.
(ii) Orientation of teachers working in colleges catering to scheduled castes and tribes (para 27).
(iii) Relaxation of the minimum qualifications to enable recruitment of teachers from among the scheduled tribes and opportunities for their further training (para 27).
(iv) The legal implications of the suggestion to introduce additional eligibility critoria for colleges and universities to enforce reservation percentage. (para 57月)
(v) Provision of scholarships and reimbursement of travel, board and lodging expenses in connection with contact programmes for scheduled caste students enrolled in correspondence courses (para 62.10).

Item No. 6.17 : To consider a proposal received from Prof. B. Bhat, Mahavir Chair of Jain Studies, Punjabi University, Patiala regarding the standards of traditional institutions of learning in India.

Consideration of this was deferred.
Item No. $6.18: 10$ conjider further the proposal regarding tho creation of a Technical Cell in the UGC in the lioht of the latest communication roceived from the Ministry of Education.

The Commission noted that it had already been decided to set up a technical call in the UGC and agreed to provide for the staff as suggestad. In this connection the Commission desired that the Ministry of Education may be requested to use its good officos for tho location of the Cell in the C.P.W.D.
nrising out of this, the Commission desired that the matter relating to the construction of gdditional building for Commission's office already undor consideration may be brought up before it.

Item No. 6.19 : To consider the question of entrusting the construction works by the universities of Kerala Stato to the Kerala State Construction Corporation with 25\% extra cost to cover overheads and margin.

Consideration of this item was deferred.
Item No.6.20 : To consider the report of the committee appointed by the Cornmission to take noto of the teaching posts of Qandhigram Rural Institute at the time it was accorded "deemed to be university status" and to assess in terms of the objectivos of the Institute, the staffing pattorn required for the growth of each Department.

The Commission noted that the report of the committee Which had boen appointod to ovolvo the teaching staffing pattern of Gandhigram Rural Institute had been examined and agreed to the following :
(a) The lecturers who were in the scale of pay of Rs.600-1000 (promrevised) may be designated as Readers and placed in the scale of Rs, 1200-1900 provided they fulfil the prescribed qualifications otc. for recruitment to the post of Readers.
(b) The Commission also accoptod tho proposal for tha creation of a post of Librarian in the scala of Rs. 700-1300. With regard to the creation of a post in Physical Education, it may in the first instance be ascertained whether the Institute desires to create a post of Lecturer in Physical Education or a post of Director of Physical Education.

Item No. 21 : To consider the position of providing funds to colloges of Delhi University for construction of buildings and other purposes.

The Comission considered the present position of
bui ing enc other proposels acceptod in respect of colleges.
of Delhi University and agread that the proposals for construction of buildings for three other colleges which have been accepted in principle earlier may be approved. It was also agroed that the ceiling of allocation for construction of buildings during the VI Plan for Colleges of Delhi University may be raised to $\mathrm{R} s .4$ crores. The Commission also agreed to regularise the construction of lst Phase of college building of Mata Sunderi College for Woemn, the construction of which has already been started by the college without the plans and estimates being accepted by the Commission.

(11) Release of grant to Bhagat singh College, New Delhi ior purchase of land.

The Commission agrend to pay to Bhagat
Singh College, New Delhi $50 \%$ of the cost of land to be acquired for the college. The College took possession of the land in 1975 after depositing necessary amount from out of funds made available by the Delhi Administration. The college has submitted copies of lease deed and subjer.t to finalisation of actual cost by the DOA on account grant of RS. 50, ${ }^{7} 00 / \mathrm{m}$ was paid to the college vide orders dated the 28 th January, 1982. The balance grant, if any, would be raleased when the final cost is decided by the DDA.
(12) Aligarh Musilm University - Construction of Men's Hostel for 500 students during Vth Plan period.

The Ministry of Education and Gulture after discussion with the Chairman, University Grants Commission made a reference to the University Grants Commission for the construction of hostel for 500 students against the urgent need of the University for 1000 students Hostel building.

In view of the urgency of the situation the proposal of the Aligarh Muslim University for construction of Men's Hostel for 500 students has been agreed to in principle and the University has accordingly sent preliminary estimates of lis. 1.39 crores for the building.

The tentative allocation made to the Aligarh Muslim University for development proposal in the VIth Plan is Rs. 1.50 crores, against which proposals for li. 39.02 lakhs as first charge on VIth plan allocation has so far been accepted including the cost esclation in respect of three buildings. Estimates for cost esclation for other buildings, if any, are awaited.
(13) Appointment of Dr. Mazharul Trlam as Visiting Professor at Visva Bharati.

The Commission at its meeting held on 18 th September, 1981 (Item No.5.04) cons from Visva Bharati Santiniketan for appointment of Dr. Mazharul Islam as Visiting Professor and accepted the proposal in principle for a period of 2 years and agreed to provide additional grant to the extent necessary for the purpose. In this connection the Commission desired that Dr. Mazharul Islam may be requested to send a report on the work done by him so far as Visiting Professor at Calcutta University and also a detailed plan of the work proposed to be taken up by him at Visva Bharati.

Subsequently a report of the work done and the plan of the work proposed to be taken by Prof. Islam were received and the appointment of Dr. Mazharul Islam as a Visiting Professor at Visva Bharati for a period of 2 years was approved (27th Jamuary, 1982).
(14) Appointment of superannuated persons as Visiting Professors at Visva Bharati.

Visva Bharati University appointed the following persons/ Visiting Professors who were all above 65 years of age in 1977 and 1978 during 5th Plan period:-

The University had stated that it has always been their attention to offer Visiting Fellowships/ Visiting Professorships only to very outstanding persons in their respective fields of specialisation. They have also stated that the directives regarding the appointment of visiting Professors/Visiting fellows have been noted and will be guided by the same in future.

In view of the position explejned by the University, ex-post-facto approral hes been given for these appointments made by the Unirersity.
(15) Scrutiny of Plans and Estimates received from NEHU by the North Eastern Council, Shillong in respect of approved building projects.

As per existing procedure proposals of Central Universities for construction works involving an expenditure above Rs. 1,00,000 are referred to the Central Public Works Department for scrutiny of plans and estimates before conveying Commission's final approval. At a meeting of the Vice-Chancellor N.E.H.U. with the Chairman, UGC held on 10th February, 1982 it was suggested by the University that all proposals relating to works of NEHU may be technically scrutinised by the secretariate of the North Eastern Council on the basis of which the UGC may give the sanction. The proposal made by the Vice-Chancellor, NEHU was referred to the Ministry of Education \& Culture Govt. of India for seeking the views of the Ministry of Works Housing in this regard. The Govt. of India, Ministry of Education \& Culture (vide their letter No.F. 8 - $4 / 82$ (desk-U) dated 18th March, 1982) intimated that the Ministry of Works and Housing have concurred with the proposal made by the University. Accordingly it has been decided to refer the Plans and Estimates received from North Eastern Hill University to the North Eastern Council for scrutiny.
(16) Finalisation of the accounts of grants paid to NEHU for all purposes during 1973-7. 4 to 1978-79.

The Commission had paid grants amounting to Rs. 3,55,50,000 to North Eastern Hill University as on account grants for all purposes during the period from 1973-74 to 1978-79 on the basis of the audited accounts received from the University a sum of As. $3,42,48,353$ has been admitted as admissible

The research proposals received from the retired teachers of different universities and colleges under the scheme "Support for Research" in Humanities and Social Sciences have been accepted by the Commission for financial assistance during the year 1980 and 1981 as per list attached (Annexure).
> (18) Advance increments to Dr. Afzal Husain, Lecturer in History under the Programme of DSA, M.S. University of Baroda, Baroda.

The appointment of Dr. Afzal Husain, Lecturer in History, M.S. University of Baroda under the Special Assistance Program e against the post approved by the Commission on As.1020/- p.m. in the scale of Rs.700-40-1100-50-1300-50-1600 (involving eight advance increments) has been noted in view of his qualification, publications, performance at the interview and also taking into consideration the specific needs of the department regarding history scholar with knowledge of Persian Language.

## The decision has been commarated to the university vide this office letter No.F. 12-9/75 (HR-II) dated 29st May, 1982.

(19) Fxtension of time for the U.G.C. assistance to the Molecular Biophysics Unit, I.I.Sc. Bangalore in continuation of the first phase of the programme (1976-81) under DSA.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held on August 23, 1976, agreed to invite the Molecular Biophysics Unit, Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore to participate in the programe of Special Assistance to Selected University Departments. Consequent upon the completion of the initial five years on 1.10.1981, the working of the department under the programme and the progress achieved was assessed by an Expert Committee in July, 1981.

The recommendations made by the Expert Committee were placed before the Commission at its meeting held on September 18, 1981 for consideration. The Commission desired that these may first be referred to the Standing Committee for the CAS/DSA and the recommendations of the Standing Committee be brought before them for consideration.

The Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore had given an assurance to take over recurring liabilities with effect from 1.10.1981 as usual and included under its non-plan budget but this was not done by the institute. It has therefore been agreed to as a
special case that the recurring assistance as agreed to in the I Phase could be continued, beyond September, 1981 upto March 31, 1982, so that the working of the department may not suffer during that period. This has been conveyed to the institute vide U.G.C. letter NO.F. $1^{11}-21 / 76(S R-I)$ dated December 9, 1981.

The report of the Assessment Committee would be placed before the Standing Advisory Committee on CAS/DSA at the next meeting (31.3.1982).
(20) Award of fellowships at the CAS in Inorganic and Physical Chemistry, Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore and release of necessary grants on this account.
--
The Department of Inorganic and Physical
Chemistry, Indian Institute of Science was supported by the Commission from 1972 to 1979 under UGC Programme of special assistance to selected Departments.

The Commission during 1978 appointed an Assessment Committee to evaluate the work done by the Department. The report of the Committee was considered by the Standing Committee and subsequently by the Commission which recognised the Deptt. as C.A.S.

The Commission then appointed an expert committee to examine the question of financial assistance that may be made available to the centre by the JGC during 1980-85. The Committee in its report made certain recommendations which did not however mention any fellowships to be awarded by the CAS in inorganic and Physical Chemistry. The recommendations of the Committee were accepted by the Commission in its meeting held on 21st Nov. 1980 and conveyed to this Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore in December, 1980.

Although the Commission had not approved any fellowship under the CAS, the Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore has awarded four fellowships ( $2 \mathrm{SRF}+2 \mathrm{JRF}$ ) at the Centre during 1980-81 against the posts approved for the Department under the erstwhile scheme of department of special Assistance. In order to procoto research activities,
these awards have been anprovod and tre anprotict has been communicatod to the innes ine tutye of Science, Bangalore.

In pursuance of the discussion held with the VicemChancellor of the $P$.. . UNiversity of Technology, Madras, the Commission has approved the schemes involving a total ostimated expenditure of Rs. 43 (Rupees forty three lakhs only) as a part of VIth plan development schemes of the University, the details of which are given in nnnexuram. The details of the schemes, approved earlier by the Commission as a first charge to the Sixth plan allocation to the University including basic grant.s for books \& equipments amounting to $\mathrm{Rs} .26,74,000 /=$ are givon in nnnexurem. With this, the total assistance approved so far during the VIth plan period comes to Rs. $69,74,000 /$ against the total allocation of Rs. 250 lakhs for the 6th plan period.

The proposal of the University for the Construction of two hostols, one for 120 students (double seated) at Guindy Campus and another for 60 students at MIT campus were also accopted.

33 :- Madurai Kamraj University
Continuing Educntirn Frogramme

A pilot project proposal was rocgivod from Madurai Kamraj University under continuing education and extension programme. To enable the Univoroity to formulate proposal in accordance with the revisod guidelines a seed money of Rs. 10,000/- for conducting survey stc. has been approved (as per orders of the chairman datad 19.4.82)
34. Jamia Millia Islamiamproposal under Adult/Continuing Education \& Extension Programme.

The Commission at its meeting held on 18-1-1982 vide resolution No. 2.02 generally approved the revisad guidelines on Adult, Continuing Educotion and Extension and desired that these may be circulated to the universitios and proposals be invited. for thn considerstion of the Commission. Accordingly the proposal of Jamia Millia for the setting up of a Centre of Adult/Continuing Education \& Extension has been accepted with the following initial facilities to enable the university to go ahead with the programme vide Chairmen's orders dated 30.3.82:-

Rationalisation of pay scales of Registrars and othor functionaries of the Institutions deemed to be Universities.

The Commission appointed a Committee to consider the question of scale of pay of the nonacademic staff of the Institutions deemed to be Universities receiving maintenance grant from the Commission. The recomnendetions of the Committee was placed before the Conmission at its meating held on 24th and 25 th July, 1981 (vido itnm No. 6.04). The Commission had accepted the recommendations of the committee and had agreed that the scales of pay of these functionaries in all such degmod universities may be on par with those corresponding posts in the Central Universities. However the concurrance of the Government of India was sought for in this connection.

The Government of India has agreed to upgrade the scale of pay of Registrars in the deemed universities and to bring it at par with that in the central universities viz. Rs.1500-2000 wee.f. 1.2.1982. However the scale of pay of Deputy Registrar and Assistant Registrars in the Instituitions will continue to be Rs. 1100 m 1600 and Rs. 700 m 1300 as hers to fore. Nll Institutions deemer to be universities receiving maintenance grant from the Commission have been informed of this decision.

36: Delhi university constituent colleges -
Finalisation of the accounts of the maintenance grants paid by the University
Grants Commission during 1979-80

Maintenance grant to constituent/affiliated college's of Delhi University are being paid on $95 \%$ basis for meeting the deficit (i.e. approved expenditure minus approved income). In the case of university maintained colleges and evening classes of the colleges, maintenance grant is paid on i00\% basis against admissible deficit. 37:- Gurukul Kangri Vishwavidyalay - Fixation of salary. Df. Dr. Gyan Chand Nirjan - ................

The Gurukul Kangri Vishwavidyalaya has submitted a proposal for the fixation of pay of Dr. Gyan Chand Nirjan at Rs. 1200/- in the scale of Ro. 700-1600/- consequent upon his appointment as lecturer in the Institute. Dr. Nirjan prior to his appointment in the Gurukul Vishwavidyalaya was drawing a basic pay of Pr. 1150/- in the scale of fis 700-1600 in Govt. Degree College, Alwar. The Institute, has requested for the grant of 12 advance increment to facilitate protection to his pay at fo. $1200 / \mathrm{m}$. The Institute has obviously not meant to give 12 advanced incremant in which case the basic pay would have been Rs. $1300 /-$, whereas the intention of the Institute was to fix the basic pay at Rs. $1200 / \mathrm{m}$.m.

The proposal of the Institute to the grant of initial basic salary of Rs. 1200/- Dr. Nirjan has been accented in view of the fact that his date of increment is not being protected.

38 :- Commonwealth Academic Staff Fellowship and Scholarships

The UGC has been implementing the scheme of Commonwealth academic. Staff Fellowships and Scholarships in collaboration with the Association of Conmonwealth Universities in the United Kingdom since 1968. These awards are intended to help universities in the developing countries to enhance the experience of their academic staff in subjects other than Medicine and Surgery, by exposing them to universities or comparable institutions/universities in U.K. Normally teachers working in universities/colleges below the age of 40 years who have already completed their doctorate are eligible for a fellowship and these Who have already completed their postgraduate degree and are im the age groups of 22-28 years are eligible for a scholarship. The duration of the fellowships is one year while that of scholarships is two years. The scholarship is tenable for a programme of study or research normally leading to a university degree or diploma. For 1982-83, the position of Indian scholars recommended by U.G.C. and those finally selected is given below.

Dr. A.P. Garg of Meerut University was recommended by the U.G.C. for a scholarship but he has been awarded a Fellowship.

(39) Preparation of University level Books by Indian Authors - Extension oi tenure of the book writing projects of the retired teachers.

The University Grants Commission at its meeting held in May, 1981 decided that in future no award under the Retired Teacher Scheme whether for book writing or for research project shall be tenable beyond the age of 65 years.

While considering the proposal of Shri B. M. ? Prasad, retired Vice-Principal, Sahib Ganj for extension of his award beyond 2 years for completing the manuscript, it was agreed that the cases of retired teachers, who were working under the book writing scheme before the decision of the Commission may be considered in accordance with the rules prescribed at the time of their selection. Accordingly the tenures of Shri B.M. Prasad, who is $66 \frac{1}{2}$ years and Profess or Udai Shankar, who is 68 years have been extended by one year bey ond 2 years to enable them to complete the manuscript of the approved book writing projects.
(40) Assistance for the development of studies in the History of Science and Technology in the Universities.

The Commission had provided assistance towards the appointment of one Reader/Lecturer in the Universities of Poona, Aligarh, Banaras and Calicut towards the introduction of a course in the history of science and technology at the postgraduate level in the department of ancient Indian hietory, culture and archaeology. Assistance was provided on cent per cent basis upto the end of March 31, 1981.

As provision for this purpose exists in the Sixth Plan, the Commission has agreed to provide assistance to the above universities upto the end of 1984-85 towards the post of Lecturer/Reader for the course in the history or science and technology. The approval of the Conmission has been communicated to the University.
(41) Inaia $n$ Institute of Science, Bangalore payment of ex-gratia amount to contractors of certain building works due to escalation in prices.

On the recomendations of the Fourth Plan Visiting Committee, the Commiesion had accepted construction of certain building works at the Indian Institute of Sicience, Eengalore. The building works were entrusted by the Inctitute to various contractors during the years 1972 and 1973 after following the process of tenders. During the year 1973 there was a stepp rise in prices of all commodities and the cost of the building materials also increased enormously. The contractors made representations to the Institute for enhancement of their rates in view of the steep escalation in prices subsequent to the ir submission of tenders. The Council of the Institute consi dered the request in detail and ap proved the payment of Rs. $1,83,430 / \cdots$. Accordingly, a sum of Rs. $1,83,430 /-$ was paid by the Institute to the contractors as ex-gratia amounts.

While auditing the accounts of the Institute for the year 1977-78 and 1978-79, the Accountant General, Karnataka, Bangalore objected to the payment of ex-gratia amount of Rs. $1,83,430 /$ - as the payment of ex-gratia amount was not covered under the rules.

The Institute aproached the Commission to approve the ex-gratia payment of Rs. 1,83,430/-. After ascertaining the permitted percentage of rise in construction costs of buildings over the approved estimates during the years 1971 and 1972 from the C.P.W.D., it was agreed by the Commission that the proposal of the Institute for the payment of ex-gratia Erant to contractors may be decided in con eultation with the Government of India.

Accordingly, the matter was referred to the innistry of Education \& Culture and the Minisity conveyed the ex-post-facto approval of the Government of India to the expenditure of fis. $1,83,430 /-$ incurred by the Institute on account of ex-gratia payment to contractors due to escletion of costs.

The Comisision's approval was conveyed to the Institute vide letter dated 1.3.1982
: 69 :
Extension of UGC assistance to the Examinati on Reform Unit of Mys ore University upto 31.3.1983.

An Examination Reform Unit was approved for the Mysore University during the Fifth Plan Period with UGC assistance initially upto 31.3.1979. According to the noral procedure, the work of the Unit was reviewed by a Committee appointed by the Comission in August, 1979 and UGC assistance extended upto 31.3.1981. Sulbsequent ly the University requested the Commission to extend its assistance to the Examination Reform Unit beyond 31.3.1981. The Commission appointed a committee to assess the progress of the work done by the University in reforming its examination system and to help the University to achivate its Iuture programmes in this regard. The Conmittee visited the University on January 28-29, 1982. On the basis of the observations and recommendations of the Committee, UGC assistance towards the core staff of the Examinati on Reform Unit of the University (comprising one coordinator, one statistician, one stenographer and one clerk) has been extended upto. 31 st March, 1983 and a provision of Rs. $25,000 /$ - (Rupees Twenty five thousand only) has been made for meeting of the subject committees for developing question banks and formulating instructional objectives etc.
(43) Applicability of the Govt. of India orders relating to the grant. of special pay to Group 'D' Staff for operating Franking Machines to the employees of the UGC.

The Govt. of India orders contained in the Ministry of Finance, Department of Expenditure O.M. ## Appendix IV to Itgrunax <br> UNIUERSITY GRANTS COMMISSION

Revised Guidelines for restrueturing of courses of first Degree level in the Faculties of Arts, Social cionces and Science in Universities and Collegos.

## (A) Qbjectives

1. Within the general principles of relevance and flexibility, there is an immediate need for combining the academic component of courses at the First Degree level with relevant applied components suited to the real problems having a bearing and direct relevance to the local/religional needs and work experience so that courses at first degree level in Arts, Social Sciences and Scienco become relevant to the local environment and to the developmental needs of the community and are linked with work/field/practical experience and productivity. This would imply a good doal of integration and broad based remfaming of the courses at the degree level to give them a practical and rural application orientation.
2. The restructuring of courses implies re orientation of existing courses in subjects to the needs of the region/community and also the introduction of some relevant applied disciplines/aubjects related to basic subjects or subject groups. The component of academic subjects has essentially to be the same so that students pursuing these courses aro able to go in for post-graduato studios, but their orientation may be different in regard to application of knowledge of the concornod discipline to relevant situations.
3. The new courses of applied nature to be introduced do not have to be necessarily in the nature of professional and/or jobmoriented courses, but should involve development of appropriate skill and competance. The underlying idea in restructuring the courses is to make them relevant to the local needs and increase the horizon of the employability of science and Arts graduates. Existing courses aro to be reworiented in such a manner that students can apply theoretical knowledge to the problems of the rogion through field work, project work, extension etc. which would be undertaken as a part of study of the concerned discipline. In other words, the existing coriventional courses may be concerned with concrete problems and related to the development
of the region.
4. Restructuring of col rses has become particularly important in view of the intraduction of the new pattern of education which has enhanced the duration of courses leading to the first degree in arts, science, commerce etc. from 14 to 15 years in a number of states. The opportunity should obviously be utilised to modernise the course as well as to enrich the contents and to make them relevant to Societalneeds and aspirations.
5. The suggestions regarding foundation courses and applied projects are illustrative and not prescriptive in nature. The purpose of the scheme is not a mechanical addition to the content of courses but to make education more purposeful and to move away from highly formalised and narrow courses based on information and rote memory.
6. In this context, one neede to underscore the point that restructuring of courses would not necessarily lead to increase in worklaad of students as the purpose of this scheme is to improve quality of education rather than the quantum of work.
7. The restructured courses, it is expected, would emphasize those skills and values which would enable the student to have a better awareness of his self and environment, culture, tradition and heritage and the contemporaneous problems of the society.

## (B) ROLE OF UNIUERSITIES

The Universities have to take a lead in formulating courses at first degree level with the help of their boards of studies and faculties. The restructured courses may be generally on the lines indicated later in the guidelines. The content of courses in each subject which the University proposes to introduce may be broadly - laid down and facilities for examining the students in that subject be provided so that the colleges affiliated to the University are able to-choose the subjects keeping in view the local and regional needs. The Universities may for this purpose also consider setting up al Implementation Committee which may review the progress of the scheme of restructuring of courses periodically and evaluate the programme from time to time. Students may be associated with the selection of courses wherever considered essential. The college should also undertake survey in the area to assess the needs of the region before choosing a particular subject of study under the scheme of restructuring of courses.
(ii) The University may also consider taking up some of the courses proposed to be introduced as application ariented subjects within the programe of continuing education to see their impact and progress. The question of intiroducing the

## :3:

course as a part of restructuring of courses may be considered after assessing its impact and usefulness.
(iii) While framing content of courses for the subjects of applied nature, the univarsity may consult the Agricultural Universities and Tachnological Institutions other user institutions and locel industries in tho region. industries in the region.
(iv) After the courses havobeen formulated by the University, the next logical step would be to arrange workshops and orientation courses for teachers of colleges which have agreed to introduce the scheme of restructuring of courses so as to enable them to teach the subject more effectively with the new concept and by relating them with the problems connected with the development of the region concerned.

## (c) CONTENT OF COURSES

The courses at first degree level may have 3 components:
(a) Foundation Courses
(b) Core Courses
(c) Courses of Applied Nature.

## a) Foundation Coursos:

(i) With a view to creating greater awareness of one-self and of the social, cultural and natural environment, a study of foundation courses in the broad areas of knowledoe may be introduced for all degree students as part of restructuring of courses.. For this purpose, a number of alternative courses may be provided as part of foundation courses from whom. a student be given option to choose the stipulated number of courses. The alternatives should be so provided that there is some degree of equivalence as well as flexibility and the collegas are enabled to select relevent courses depending upon the teaching resources avallable with them. As the foundation courses are initiated for creating an awareness among the students, the responsibility for teaching them should rest with the existing teachers in the related disciplines after providing suitable short-term orientation courses, workshops, wherever necessary by the Universities. Assistance for organising such workshops may te made available by the Commission within the provisions of existing scheme of seminar and summer institutes as per norms laid down for the purpose.

## : $\mathrm{A}:$

(ii) It may not be necessary that foundation courses should necessarily and with a regular examination. Each University may exercise its discretion in this regard.
(iii) The Institution should give ample choics to students to select foundation courses of their choice instead of providing facilities in the stipulated number of foundation courses only to be taken compulsorily by all the students.
(iv) The foundation courses should be started only after all the details including syllabi, work schedule, lecture, programme, level of collaboration and interaction with other organisations and institutions in the city/region and other relevant details have been finalised by the institution concerned.
(v) The University/ ollege may also decide the duration of each foundation course. Each course may not necessarily be undertaken by a student during all the 3 years. Some of the courses could be taken and completed in one year while others in ? years. An illustrative list of courses which could be considered for including them in the foundation courses is given below:-

1. Language - English including literature and or regional language with a view to developing communication skill among the students.
2. Social and cultural History of India/Asia
3. History of Freedom Movement in India including National Integration.
4. Science in Everyday life/science and Society
5. Evolution of life.
6. Growth and development of scientific ideas.
7. Population health and Nutrition education.
8. Environmental study
9. Value systems
10. Resolution of Conflict in Society

11: Growth of Moral and spiritual ideas.
12. Educational Technology.
(t) Gome Eoures
(1) Study of 2 or 3 subjects not necessarily confined in the same faculty may be prescribed under Eore Courses, to give the sturient an opportunity to acquire a broad familiarity of disciplines of his choice including study of atleast/one of these subjects in depth. For this purpose, the University nu, comsider proccribing that one of the subjects under core coursss may bo taken as a major subject in which the student may if he so wishes pursue postgraduate studies whereas the other subject or subjects may be of subsidiary nature. The syllabi of variows courses may be determined bath as a major subject and as a subsidiary subject with the help of boards of studies, which may also incorporate field work, survey, extension and practical work, wherever necessary in the course content.
(ii) The Colleges may select subjects to be offered to students in their institutions kesping in view the local and regional needs and the facilities of teaching available with their institutions.
(c) Courses of Applied Nature.
(i) The third component of restructuring of courses would be to pravide for courses of aplied nature or application orisnted subjects which could be offered by a student along with the foundation and core courses of his choice. The combination of application oriented subjects with core couraps may be determined by the University and the colleges may selected these application oriented subjects keeping in view its local and regional needs and the industries in the region. An illustrative list of courses which may be taken up lith Science and Social solences subjects is given in the innoxurgen This list is merely illustrative and the University may prescribe such courses as they feel nacessary in their region. The content of courses as they feel necessary in their region. The content of coulses may be care fully worked out and the expertise available with other institutions and industrial undertakings in the region should be utilised for this purposit. The courses offered as payt of application oriented subjects may not nocessarily be the same as in agricqultural and technological universitios and may be introduced with a view to familiarising the students with that subject and equipping him with the skills/techniques which may help him in finding an employment with the local industries or start his oun venture/self-employment after graduation The cou'se should not introduced with the intention of enabling the students take up post-graduate studies in such subjects. In teaching these aplication orlented courses, it ma not be necessary to provide full time faculty for teaching all the papers.

## : 6 :

The expertise available in the other institutions and industries should be utilised by inviting them to deliver lectures as visiting faculty.
(ii) The response of studonts to those courses may be assessed periodically and if it is found that any pariticular course is not attracting students or it is not possible to run it effectively, the institution may sustitute it with other alternative courses prescribed by the University.
(iii) It would be useful and appropriate in the selection of application oriented subjects to try them as pilot projects under continuing education programmes for a year or so before incorporating them in the regular degree courses. If the course evokes qesponse as a part of continuing education programme, it could be incorporated in the regular degree courses.

## Post-BA/B.Sc./B.Com. Diploma courses to increase the employability of graduates

In addition to restructuring the gourses at first degree level as indicated above, the universities may consider introducing postmB. N.B.Sc./B.Com. diploma courses of one year duration in auch subjects which may incroase the area of employability of graduates. For this purpose, the University may undertake a survey of the region to determine the courses which would be useful for the graduates in finding employment in the industries and institutions in the region. The content of these diploma courses may be detrmined with the help of institutions and industries concerned. The colleges may select any subject within several diploma courses formulated by the University. In case there is some difficulty with the colleges to introduce such a course as a fulfledged cofrse after graduation, they may consider staggering the content of one year course to three years and introducing it as an additional course at degredlevel which may be undertaken by interested students in all the 3 years af the degree course as additional subject. In case, the University does not find it possible to formulate such a course after survey, a college having necessary infram structure facilities with it for running such a course, may introduce it and award diploma on successful completion of the course by the students.
P.t.o.

Supplementary measures
Several important measures as detailed belou will have to be adopted in order to secure the fullest advantage of the new pattern of education. It hardly needs to be emphasized that the proposed changes will require consi derable preparation, including the preparation of now courses/materials and the oriontation of teachers.
(i) New Mothods of Teaching:

The existing teaching methods which are largely based on rotememory, lectures and remproduction should be replaced by n : w teaching methods which awaken curiosity, encourage selfstudy habits and promote problemmolving skills.

It is necessary to recognize the importance of problem solving exarcises and seminar discussi ons in the case of science subject 3 and case studies, tutorials and seminars in the case of social sciences. There should, therefore, be adequatefime explicitly allocated in the time-table for tutorials, seminars, oolf-study sessions etc. It is suggested that a formal lecturing should not constitute more than two-third of the teaching-learning situation. Especially during the thrid year, the proportion of formal lecturing could be raduced even more and greater omphasis laid on guided selfastudy. Classmroom lactures should be substituted, to ain increasing extent, by seminar discussions with aview to ensuring a two-way participation in instruction. Individual and group assignments should beßiven evaluated and ifscusised frequently as an aid to batter learning.

It may not be possible to introduce project work for every student immediately but planning should be done in such a way that in about five years project bocomes an integral part of the curriculum.

There must be some component in the curriculum which requires every student to use the library for reference work. Once such a component is introduced, this should bo taken into account in strengthening the library for reading and reference materials, including journals.

## (ii) Examination Reforms

The entire philosophy of examination reform is that one who teaches must evaluate but the ultimate objective can be achieved through different paths in different universities. The purpose of sessional evaluation is not merely to increase the frequency of examinations or to supplement the final examinations by nid-term examinations. The main purposes is to bring about intaraction brtwon toaching and learning on a continuing basis $\pi$ 'o bost those skills and abilities which cannot be tested throtigh a written examination alone at the end of the term or
p.t.o.
course. The concept of question bank is to utilise the collective wisdom of teachers in framing qusetion items of imporoved type and properly related to the multiple objectives of the courses. luestion ranks bring about a better correlation between what is talight and what is to be examined. It is a means of reducting the element of chance and arbitratinees. The senester system, properly
linked with unit courses and eredits enables students to have greater flexibility in the combination of courses. The introduction of a system of credits and unit courses would also enable students to take up part of the courses in the neighbouring institutions and also facilitate stuclent modality. The essential fratures of these reforms should be incorporated in the courses to bring about a proper integration of teaching, learning and evaluation.

## (iii) Faculty Improvement

It has already been emphasized that the new courses and the new tochniques of teaching will not produce the desired results unless steps are taken for the professional enrichment of teachers. Universities and colleges should make the fullest use of the onmgoing faculty improvement program mmes of the Commission and also organise orientation and training courses for the college teachers in the new areas and also in techniques of teaching.

## (iv) Languane as a means of Communication :

It is important that universities pay adequate attention to language a means of communication either through the courses included in the curriculum or through remedical teaching programmes and enrichment programmes or other special courses using modern techniques of language teaching. Students should be taught to use and organise words clearly and effectively to make their thinking precise and accurate.

In this contest it may be mentioned that hours of work devoted to language teaching could be reduced in many universities if the courses are so romoriented that they emphasise language as a means of improving communication skills in the relevant subject arean rather than literary skills, criticism etc.
(F) Assistance from the Commission

Resourcas for the implementation of the programme of restructuring of courses may have to be found by each university within its existing resources. The Universities interested in thic programme may utilise the assistance available under the UGC schemes of "Summer Institute" and "Workshop" for organising remorientation courses for terchers in colleces whose proposals for restructuring of courses are acceptod by the Commission. The Commission may also provide assistance to universities for (a) -eed meney,
(b) Orientation of teachers and
(c) Preparation of Course materials, teaching aids etc. Universities may also be assisted for offering some courses on an experimental basis. Total assistance to a university for the above programme may bo limited to Rs. 5 lakhs for a period of 5 years.

The Commission may assist a college under this programme unto Rs. 1 lakh per annam, for appointing Core Staff, utilising services of part time staff and other non-recurring expenses for a period of 5 years. The core staff may be appointed wherever necessary in the new areas to be introduced as a part $\angle$ time staff may be drawn from other institutions and local industries. A meaningful interaction between there theory and its application to the needs of the region would be possible only when there is a regular interaction with the user agencies in the region.

Guidelines for implenentation of the
Merit Pronotion Schene for College Teachest

## Merit Promotion Scheme

a) Objectives

A scheme of Merit Pronotion is to ve incroduced during the 6th Plan period, wi th a view to providing suitable opportunities to the teachers working in the colleges for career advancenent in recognition of their significant contributions in the field of teaching, research and allied educational activities. The schene is intended to be in the nature of a flexible complenenting schene where a teacher after critical assessment of his work at the end of a specified period can be promoted to the next hifher level. and the position thus held by him is treated as personal to the incuabent and no resultant vaancy is required to be filled. It is felt that such a schene would go a long way in encouraging the teachers in coileges to engage in teaching, research and allied educationel activities and make a distinct contribution to the teaching profession and thus help to inprove the quality and standards of higher education.

## b) Method of Implementation

I. Teachers working in colleges affiliated to a university and included under section 2(f) and which come wi thin the purview of $12(\mathrm{~A})$ of the Jich fuct who have nade significant contribution and achievenent in the field of teaching and research may be considered for ikerit promotion, if they have put in a minimum of eight years of pormanent service as a teacher of which atleast four years have been in the institution where he/she is being considered for such assesshent for merit pronotion.
II. A teacher who häs been considered and not selected for merit pronotion in the initial presentation could, however, subnit his/her work again only after a lapse of three years.
III. College teachers wishing to have their work assessed and considered for ierit Pronotion should present the details of the re work to their college latest by 31st december, each yuar. For this purpose, the institutions may keep the profice of teachers wi th then in which the teachers niay at the end of each year indicate the details of their contributions to teaching, research, improvenent of their academic qualifications, curriculum developnent educational reforms and innovative teaahing
and other foms of academic work done by them in the institution as well as the work done in the field of extension and continuing educetion, sporis and cultural. activities etc. The enclosed proforma fnnexure could be used for this purpose and these profiles may we submi ited by the cullege to the University concemed along with the proposal of the teacher for assessment for lerit Promotion.
IV. The Vice-Chancellor or his nowince should refer the proposal of the teacher to atiest 2 experts in the subject/ aisclpline concemed out of a panel of names prepared by the Uni versi ty according to the procedpre prescribed by the University For such celection Committees.

The evaluation reporis frai the experts should be kept confidential and should be nade available atleast three weeks in advance to the selection Connaiitee. The fielection Commiotee would consist of the Vice-Chancellor or his nominee, two experts other than the referees and the Principal of the college where the lecturer is working.

Merit Promotion be given jy the appointing Authority to a teacmer only if the selection Comaitere and outside experts unanimously reconmend the sane.
V. While considering the proposal of a teacher for ikerit Promotion, only his acadonic merit may be taken into accoumt and other factors like seniority, etce may not be considered.
VI. Ihe University should generally talie a decision on the pronosal of a teacher for Merit Promotion as for as possible bufore the beginning of the next acadenic year so that such promotions can become effective from the date of the beginning of the next academic session.
VII. The promotion given to a person would be personal to the incimient concerned for the puriod he serves the institution where he has been granted promotion.
VIII. The prorsotion on nerit to a teacher under this schens will not entitie him to any other benefit or entitle him to any orler responsibility, administrative or otherwise such as Head of Department/Principal, except where he is even otherwise to be considered and will also not lead to any reduction in his teaching or other work.

IX. While promoting a teacher oll merit, his salary may be flxed in the prescribed scale of pay for the next higher post with marginal adjustant nearest to the salary veing drawn by the pronotee, as per usual rules of pay fixation. Since nost teachers in the colleges would be in the scale of a lecturer i.e. 700-1002, the teacher, on selection for terit pronotion may be placed in the scale of hs. 1200-50-1300-60-1900 and be designated lecturer in Selection Grade.
X. The financial involvenent will vary from istate to State but the Comaission would assist the Institution in the implementation of the Merit Pranotion wichene by making available an average contribution at the rate of Rs. $600 /$ per annum per teacher promoted to the next higher level in accordance wi th the guldelines laid down by the Commission upto 31st March, 1985 only, on the condition that the institution concerned ...atinues inplenentation of the scheme and meets expadi ure on the salary of the purson concerned as committed expenditure from 1st April, 1985 out of its own resources or with the assistanee of grant-in-aid from the state Goverment as the case may be.
XI. Lo person promoted by the College prior to the introduction of the UGC Schene and not in confornity with the guidelines laid down by the Comission will qualify for assistance from the Comnission.
XII. The University wouid furnish to the UGC, every year latest by 15th August, necessary particulars of the persons promoted in the coileges under its jurisdiction, under the Merit Pronotion Schene for College teachers along with the evaluation report of the experts and the recomen dations of the selection Committees and also the names of all the persons considered from each collegeg to enable the Conmission to consider renitting granus due to the concerned coileges.

Colleqe Lecturers.
(i) A candidate holding an M. Phil degree should possess atleast a second class Master's degree; or
(ii) a candidate not holding an M.Phil degree should possess a high second class Mastbi's degree and a second class in first Degree(BA/BSc./BCom.) examination; or
(iii) a candidate not holding an M.phil, but pdssessing a second class Master's degree should have obtained a first class in the first degree (BA/BSc/BCom) examination.

High second class may be determined as the mid point of the starting of the second class and starting of the first dlass of the university from where he has obtained the degree. The Commission also stressed that the qualim. fications now being preseribed by it for different categom ries of teachers are the minimum qualifications only to determine the eligibility for applying for the post.

Item NO.2.05: To consider the question of relaxation of qualifications of teachers of Engineering and Technological Institutions.

Keeping in view the present shortage of lecturass in Engineering and Technological subjects in the Engineening Colleges tho Commission agreed that whersver candidates with M.Tech. M.E. qualifications are not available or M.Tech. M.E. candidates are not found suitable for appointment the essential qualification may be relaxed and the institutions may appoint first class engineering graduates against the posts of Lectueres. Such relaxation will however be subject to the condition that the $\mathrm{c}_{\mathrm{a}}$ ndidates concerned shall have to obtain the M.Tech./M.E. degree within a period of five years. Item No．5．02：To consider the question of continuing U．G．C．financial assistance to B．H．U． for award of B．Ed．／M．Ed．Scholarship under Plan and Stipends／Scholarship to the students of Faculty of Oriental Learning and Theology at Banaras Hindu University under non－Plan．

The Commission desired that the Central Universities be advised to follow the guidelines issued earlier regarding award of scholarships／stipends w．e．f．next academic year and that in the meanwhile students already pursuing these courses may be paid studentship as hitherto for the duration of the course as per existing terms．

Item No. 5.03 : To consider the proposal of B.H.U. and<br>A.M.U. for assistance for special repairs to the old buildings and roads etc.

The Commission accepted 'in principle' to provide assistance to the Banaras Hindu University and Aligarh Muslim University for special repairs to the old buildings. The Commission further desired that the universities be advised to prepare in the first instance the estimates for repairs of such buildings which could not be deferred indicating the most urgent needs in consultation with C.B.R.I. Roorkee, if necessary, and send the same for consideration of the Commission.

Item Noe 5e04: To consider further the proposal from Saldiha College, Saldiha for an additional grant to complete the construction of teaching accommodation.

The Commission agreed to provide assistance to Saldiha College, Saldiha to complete the construction of the teaching accommodation undertaken by it earlier as per Sixth Plan guidelines for development of undergraduate education in affiliated colleges. It was noted that the maximum assistance that may be made available to the College would be Rs. 1.75 lakhs as UGC share.

In this connection the Commission desired that while examining proposals of the colleges for assistance for buildings under the sixth plan only such buildings should be accepted, as can be completed within the total amount admissible including the UGC share and the college matching share, as per 6th Plan guidelines.


The Commission accepted the proposal of S.N.D.T. Women's University, Bombay for developing a Diploma Course in Continuing and Adult Education and agreed to provide 'seed money' of Rs. 60,000/- for this purpose.

## Section - 6

(Miscellaneous)


The Commission considered a reference from the Ministry of Education and Culture with regard to the recommendations of the Estimates Committee of the Fifth Lok Sabha and was of the view that the proposed committee to examine the question of bringing about greater uniformity in educational standards and to identify the factors which make for relative success or otheruise of candidates in Civil Services Examinations from different States and regions, may be appointed by the Ministry itself.

Item No. 6.02 : To consider the report of the Committee which visited the Bharati Vidyapeeth's Institute of Management \& Enter-preneurship development, Poona to examine fts proposal for recognition under section 2(f) of the U.G.C. Act.

The Commission agreed to the inclusion of Bharati Vidyapeeth's Instituta of Management and Entrepreneurship Development, Pune as a recognised institute, under section 2(f) of the UGC Act, provided the Institutef Poona Univorsity implement the suggestions made in the report of the Committee which visited the Institute.

Item No. 6.03: To consider the revised proposal of the Rajasthan Vidyapith, Udaipur for declaring fit as an Institution deemed to be a University under Section 3 of the U.G.C. Act.

The Commission noted that the Rajasthan Vidyapith, Udaipur has agreed to accept the suggestions made by the UGC Committee which visited the Vidyapith earlier, and has sent a revised proposal in confirmity with the suggestions of the Committee. The Commission, however,
desired that the Vidyapith may approach the Commission after it has functioned for ono or two years under the revised set up.

Item No. 6.04: To revied the question of providing assistance for participation in Courses/ Programmes organisad by International Centre for Theoretical Physics, Trieste (Italy) and other Intornational agencies.

The Commission further considered the question of providing financial assistance for par\&icipation in programmes/courses organised by ICTP Trieste and other interraticnal bodies and agreed that $15-20$ teachers/ post-doctoral fellows in universities/colleges may be provided in a year one way rail/air fare for participation in such programmes/courses on the condition that (i) one way rail/air fare plus living expenses for the duration of the programme/course are provided by the host organisation or (ii) one way rail/air fare is provided by the State Government and/or the concerned university/college and living expenses for the duration of the programmelcourse by the host organisation.

Arising out of this, the Commission desired that the scheme of aseistance to university/college teachers for participation in International Conferences may be reviewed and (ii) step may be devised to encourage universities to establish at international level, effective interfaces in specific thrust/emerging areas of importance.

Item No. 6.05 : To consider the report of the Committee which visited the Janan Probodhini Institute of Psychology, Pune to consider its proposal for recognition under section $2(f)$ of the U.G.E. Act.

The Commission agreed to the inclusion of Janan Probodhini Institute of Psychology, Pune as a recognised institute under Section $2(f)$ of the UGC ACt, provided the Institute/University implonont the suggestions made in the report of the cummittee which visited the Institute。

Item No. 6.06: To consider a referonce from the Ministry of Erucation and Culture regarding representations made by Dr. B. V. Suryam narayana, Prof. \& Head of the Department of Indian Languages and the students of ' B.H.U. for special grant for development of Telugu in the University.

The Commission agreed that steps be taken to encourage teaching of South Indian Languages in universities in the Northern Region and that as a first step the Aligarh Muslim University, Banaras Hindu University and Delhi University may be asked to send proposals for development of these languages keeping in view the existing facilities already available and the real needs of students in this regard.

Item No. 6,07 : To consider the proposal of the I.C.A.R. for conferring "deemed to be University" status under section 3 of the U.G.C. Act 1956 to the I.V.R.I. Izatnagar.

The Commission took note of its earlier decision and also considered views of the ICAR regarding the proposal of declaring the Indian Veterinary Research Institute, Izatnagar as an institution deemed to be a University under Section 3 of the U.G.C. Act and felt that in view of the fact that main activity of the Institute is to carry out research in veterinary sciences, the purpose of the proposal could be served if the I.U.R.I. is identified/accepted by some of the universities as a "Recognised Research Institute" for purposes of preparing students for Ph.D. degrees.

Item No. 6.08: To consider the report of the Committee which visited Ananthacharya Indological Research Institute, Bombay to consider its proposal for recognition under section 2(f) of the U.G.C. Act.

The Commission agreed to the inclusion of
Ananthacharya Indological Research Institute, Bombay as a recognised institute under section $2(f)$ of the UGC Act, provided the Institute/University implement the suggestions made in the report of the Committee which visited the Institute, and that the Bombay University accurd polmentent ronagrition ton thie Inotitution

## Item Nocon09:

To consider the question of assurances from the state Government: for continuation of studentships/scholarslips in fppliod Gology/ Applied Geophysics aftor UGC Asoistance ceacas after 1983-B4.

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The Commission desired that the assistance for studentship/scholarship to students of nppliod Geology/ Geophysics at the rate of fis. 400 may be cuntinued to the universities/institutions where the state Government has given the assurance to contine the studentship/ scholarship to the studnets of Applied $G_{\text {aology/Geophysics }}$ at the rate of RE, 400/- p.m. after the Commission's assistance. osases in 1983-84.

Item Noe 6,108 To consider the question of release of salaries of substitute teaching staff appointed during fifth Plan Period in place of the resultant vacancies caused consequent upon the transfer of the permanent staff to the plan posts sanctioned by the Commission at Andhra University.

The Commission could not accept the arrangements resorted to by some universities in the manner of transferring its existing staff against new posts approved in a plan period. All new posts approved by the Commission are to be filled in accordance with the normal procedure of recruitment prescribed by the University.

In view of the above the Commission could not agree to the proposal of the Andhra University to aither pay for persons so transferred against the plan posts or for persoris recruited against the resultant vacancies in the same cadre.

Item No, 6.11: To consider the proposal of Satyawati Comeducational College (Delhi University) for entrusting the ubrk of construction of collego bliziting to the National Building Construction Corporation Limited (BBCC) by allowing supervision and planning charges $14 \%$ of the building cost.

The Commission considered the proposal of the Satyavati Comeducational College, Delhi Univarsity for entrusting the wor work of construction of the College building to the National Building Construction Corporation Ltd. (NBCC) and was of the view that the College may, if it so desires, entrust the building construction work to NBCC without inviting tenders provided the rates quoted by NBCC are comparabjto or lower than the raens quotod by the Epun for similar: constructions.'

Item. No. 6a12: To consider the revised guidelines lajd down by the Committee for declaring Institutions decmed to be Universities under Soction 3 of the UGC ict.

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The Commission accepted the revised guidelines for considering proposals for declaring an institution as deemed to be a university under Section 3 of the UGC nct as per Appendix VII.

Item No.6.13: To rec ai ve the report of the Committee appointed by the Commission to review the Joint Collaborative Project, between Frankfort University ( $F R G$ ) and Madurai Kamraj University, Madurai on 'Neurom Physiological Basis of the Behaviour of Bats' under IndomFRG CEP.

The Commission noted the observations/recommendations made by the Committee appointed to review the joint collaborative project between Frankfurt University (FRG) and Madurai Kamraj University on 'Neurophysiological $B_{\exists}$ sis of the Behaviour of Bats' under Indo-FRG CEP and desired that these be brought to the notice of the Madurai Kamraj University and kept in view while considering extension of the collaborative programme.

Item Noe 6,149 To consider a proposal received from Prof. B. Bhat, Mahnvir Chair of Jain Sturies, Funjabi University, Patiala regarding the standards of traditional institutions of learning in India.

The Commission agreed with the need for close liaison between traditional institutions and relevant departments of the universities and in this connection, desired that universities may take advantage of the Commission's scheme of visiting professors/fellows and also explore other possibilities for mutual academic interaction.

Item No. 6,152 To consider the question of entrusting the construction works by the Universities of Kerala state to the Kerala State Construction Corporation with 25 瓜 extra cost to cover overheads and margin.

The Commission considered the question of entrusting the construction works by the universities of Kerala State to the Korala State Construction Corporation with 25 fevy of the actual booked expenditure towards overheads, and margin and could not agree to the sharing of expenditure towards this payment. The universities may meet the extea cost nver and ehowo tho Uro norms from their oun funds.

(i) Tha Commission could not agree to the upgradation of tho scalo of pay of the post of Principal Information" Officer from Rs. $1500-60 \dot{1} 1800-100-2000$ to Rs. 2000-125/22250 and desired that the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting be approached again to locate a suitable officer for appointment as Principal Information officer in the scale of Rs. $1500-60-1800-100-2000$ by transfer on foreign service terms in accordance with the provisions of the Cadre and Rocruitment Rules for the post.
(ii) The Commission noted the position Eo allotment of additional land to the UGC by the Goverbment of India, Ministry of Works and Housing. The Commission also noted the present position with regard to the proposed construction of an annexe on the north side of the existing UGC Building to meet the immediate requirements and desired that the Ministry of Education and Culture be requested to communicate necessary concurrence at an early date in order that the construction work could be undertaken by the Contral Public Works Departmont, without any further delay after completion of the required formalities.

In this connection it fas also agreed that keeping in view that large number of Academics who have to come to Delhi from outside in connection with the work of the UGC, and who areput to considerabile hardship. for want of accommodation at a reasonablo fare, tho question of having a suitable guest house be explored.
(iii) The Chairman mentioned that she has been invited to attend the 31 st International Conference on World Education Fellowship to be held at Soeul (Korea) frum 9 th to 12 th August, 1982 and tu deliver a key-nntie

On has return journey she would be visiting Tokyo and Jakarta in connection with the work of N.C.E.R.T.Review Committee and also Singapore, and expected to return to India on 23 rd August, 1982.

While the expenditure for her stay in Tckyo and Jakarta and also additional expenditure involvec in the airmticket consequent to her visit to these two cities would be mat by the NCERT, the expenditure on other visits in accordance with the entitlement of the Chairman was agreed to be met by the University Grants Commission and the amount debited to the Budget Head for Th/DA.

Nward of National Scholarships under the Scheme of DSA in Sociology, Punjab University, Chandigarh.

Punjab University awarded three scholarships to internal students and one to external in vieu of the fact that there was only one candidate in the category of exted who had applied for national scholarship. In view of the justificatid given by the university the awards made by the University have been noted. The decision has been communicated to the university vide thil office letter No.F.2~13/76(HR/HR.II) dated 8th June, 1982.
S.N.D.T. Women's University - ManmPower Development Project under Adult/Continuing Education.

The VicemChancellor of S.i.D.T. Womon's University sent a proposal for assistance towards Man-Pouer Development Project to be taken up by introducing various courses in three phases. The proposal of the university has been accepted 'in principle' vide Chairman's Orders dated 3.5 .82 on $75: 25$ sharing basis in accordance with the revised guidelines. The university has been requested to undertake the management course for junior and middle level staff and the second course could be taken up after gaining experience of the Ist course. The posts in the cadre of Documentation Officer, Senior Stotistical Officer and Librarian which are also Group ' $n$ ' posts and included the element of direct recruitment failing to fill in the vacancies in these cadres by promotion/transfer on deputation have also been agreed to be included for the purposes of reservation of posts for Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes in the grouping of Group ' $n$ ' posts in terms of instructions contained in Chapter 6 of the Brochure on reservation of Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes in Services (fifth edition).

Shri R.K. Chhabra, Secretary, University Grants Commission proceeded abroad to Moscou (USSR) as a Member of an Indian Delegation to attend the meeting of the Joint Indo-Soviet Text Book Board for implementing Joint Indo-Soviet Text Book Programme on 18th May, 1082 and returned to Headquarters on $26 t h$ May, 1982 (forenoon). The absence for the period from 18-5-82 to 25-5-82 of Shri R.K. Chhabra had been agreed to be treated as on deputation abroad and during this period he received fuil pay and allowances at the rates admissible to him but for proceeding on deputation abroad vide orders dated the 12th May, 1982.

The expenditure on his travel from Delhi to Moscow and back as also the expenditure on excess baggage and provisions for gifts, entertainment, contingencies and embarkation charges was met by Government of India. As a body of experts in a subject area and related disciplines and interdisciplinary fields, and coming from universities, R \& D Laboratories and other Institutions, the panels could assist the Commission in continuously reviewing the activities of the different universities in education and research in the different areas on subjects, and in suggesting suit $\ddagger 18$ methods and measures for improvement of standards and relating education to emerging national needs. The panels could also give expert adice regarding measures for the improvement of the standards of teaching and research and supports for research by identifying thrust areas of importance and promote research offort by teachers and other research workers, by way of evaluation and monitoring of res@arch projects by individuals groups or departments as a whole, within the overall policy of the Commission for support of research in the universities and college system.

As regare specific items which may be included in the terms of reference of the subject panels, these may be as follows:-
a) Collect information and material to report on prevailing standards of teaching and examinations in thefr subject area.
b) Prepare periodically status reports regarding research Pacilities, research areas, performance and prespectives; and indicate areas of thrust and importance and suggest measures to promote greater research efforts in areas of national needs.
c) Examine research and other proposals referred to them in order to make suitable recommendations to the Commission.
d) Advise on measures for enhancing the guality of work in oducation and research and make recommendations in this connection, for consideration of the Commission.
a) Peepare a list of experts in the subjects concerned to gether with their areas of specialization; and
f) Ronder advice on such other matters as may be referred to them by the Commission.
(b) : Procedure for consideration of Major/Minor Research Projects in the Humanities, Social Sciences,Sciences and Engineer ing and Technology subjects:
a) College and University teachers may be invited to send minor research projects within a ceiling of Rs. $10,000 /-$ by a specified date, once a year and these should be considered uithin a period of three months.
b) The projects (ao undow (a) above) alongwith their synopses may be put up to committees specially constituted for the purpose for final recommendation.
c) University and college teachers may be invitad to send major research projects before a specified date, twice a year.

d) Major research proposals whom annual expenditure is below Rs. $20,000 /-$ may be reforred to two experts for their advice - in the matter.
e) On receipt of both referee comments, major research projo cts (as under d above) may be considered by the Crairman/ Vice-Chairman, for a decision regarding acceptance of otherwise. The matter may be reported to the panels concerned at the following meeting.
f) Major research projects involving an expenditure of over Rs. 20,000 per annum, may be put up to the pancls, for their consideration and recommendation. The recommendations will be put up to the Chairman/VicemChairman for final decision.
9) Each project involving a total expenditure of Rs. 2 lakhs or more uill be placed before the Commission for approval together with the recommendation of the Panel.

Revised guidelines laid down by the Commission for considering proposals for declaring an Institution as deemed to be a University under section 3 of the UGC Act.

| 1. | Section 3 of the UGC Act provides for declaring an . institution of higher education other than a University to be $I$ deamed to be a University' and when such an institution is deemed as a University, the UGC Act applies to it, as a University within the meaning of Gection 2(f) of the Act. |
| :---: | :---: |
| 2. | This provision has been made in the Act. to bring under the purview of the University Grants Comnission institutions which for historical and other reasons are not universities and yet are doing work of a high standard in an academic field and at University level, and that granting of the status of deemed to be a University would enable them to develop ideals belonging to the higher Education and Research. |
| 3. | Keeping in view the general concept of an institution to be deemed to be a University, the institution should generally aim at strengthening its activities in its field of specialisation rather than make efforts towards growing into multi-faculty university of the general type. |
| 4. | The type of institution that may be recognised as I deemed to be University', should generally be (i) an institution, engaged in teaching and research in chosen fields of spocialisation and it has mainitained the highest academic standards, (ii) in the fields of its specialisation, the institution has a very high standard, is making a dístinct contribution to university educational system including innovative undergraduate programmes and significant Extension activity and by bringing it under the UGC Act, the University system would be enriched, (iii) the granting of a deemed University status would further enhance the development of the area of specialisation, teaching and research activities, in that institution, and (iv) the institution has the necessary financial resources and viability and a management capable of contributing to university ideals and traditions. |

Item No. 2.03: To consider the report of the Committee appointed to assess (1) the working of the Centre of Fast African studies and oentre of Soviet Studies of the Bombay thiversity under the area studies programe and (ii) their requirements for the five yoar period beginning 1983.84.

- The Commission desired that recommendations of the Comittee regarding the organisational set up of the two centres of area studies may be referred to the University of Bombay for their views in the first instance and the matter brought up again alongwith the views of the university.

Item No. 2.04: To consider the racommendations of the committee on Archival Cells for strengthening/ establishment of Archival Cells.

- The Commission accepted the recomendations of the committee on Archival cells for strengthening/establishment of t.rchival dells in universities as detailed in lppendix-III. Assistance may be provided to the universities for a period of

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$$

five years from the date of approval on condition that on the expiry of this period, the [hiversity/State Covemment win] take over the recurring comitments. These universities may, if they so desire, also send proposals for instituting a diploma course in Archival Studies on the patterm recomnended by the comittee. While noting the general recomendations of the Committee, the Commission was of the view that in addition to other essential qualifications for different categories of staff, the Mrchivists/ Assistant Archivists should have a diploma from the School of Archival Studies or equivalent qualifications.

Item No. 2.05: To receive the report of the committee appointed by the commission to assess the requirements of the Area Study Programe of Osmania University on Urbán Development and Regional Planning in the Indian Occan for the five year period beginning 1933.84.

The Cominission accepted the report of the Committee and agreed to provide assistance to Osmania miversity for its area studies prorramme on Urban Development and Regional Plaming in the mijan Ocean as under for a five yaar period on the condition that ( $i$ ) programes relating to not more than six countries of the Indian Ocean are undertaken and (il) the injversity/State Goverrment would meet the liability of recurring expenditure after the period of UGC assistance comes to an end.

The Commssion further desired that other ober joms' recomendations made by the obmaittee may also be brought to the notice of the [niversity.

## SECTTON - 3

## (Reference from Govermment)

## Item No. 3.01:

To consider further a reference received from the Covernment of India, Ministry of miucation \& Culture regarding the views of the commission on the suggestion made by Professor Narain Chand Prashar, MP. on notified arean indicated in the guidelines lafd down by the Commssion for providing assistance to colleges for development of undergreduate education in the Sixth Plan.

The Comission agreed that for the purpose of identification of colleges located in rural areas, the definition aropted by the Ministry of Rural Feconstruction as given below mey o.lso be followed by the Commission.
"A rural area is an area which is covered by a community development block as distinguished from the area covered by municipality, corporation or a notified area committee. The area covered by corporations or municipality or notified areas annot be treated as rural areas."

The universities may be requested to identify such colleges keoping in view the above definition and make such a list available to the Commission for reference.

It was further desired that information with regard to definition of colleges located in the backward areas may be brought up at the next meeting of the commission.

## SECTION - 4

(Special Programmes)
Item No. 4.01:
To Feceive a statement indicating the position relating to the major research projects in Science, Enginoering and Technology and Humanities and Soctal Sciences sanctioned by the Commission during the period 1974-75 to 1980-81.

It was also desired that in the ase of other universities where similar MCA programme has been agreed to the universities may be advised to provide for a lateral ontry at the end of the first year of the three year course for students who have done one year postdegree diploma course in computer science and appliontions.

## $:-7$.

Itein No. 4.03: To consider the Report of the Committee for deve lopment of Department of zoology, Gujarat University, Nhmedabad, in a selected thrust area.

The Commission accepted the recommendations of the committee for development of the Department of 200 logy , Gujarat University, Ahmedabad and agreed that assistance may be proyided for the departmental research progremme for a period of three years as recormended by the committee subject to the condition that the University would fill up the vacancies of staff so as to bring it to an optimal level as suggested in the report.

## SECTTON - 5

(Grants to Universities \& Colleges)
Item No. 5.01: To consider à proposal of tata Institute of Social Sciences, Bonbay for continuing the posts of Assistant lecturers.

The Commission could not accept the proposal of the Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Bombay to continue the cadre of Assistant Iecturers and as already decided the Institution should take steps to convert these posts into lecturers.

The comission, however, agreed to enhance the remuneration of the Instructors from $\mathrm{Ps} .700 /-\mathrm{p}_{\mathrm{p}} \mathrm{m}_{\text {0 }}$ to Rs. 900/-p.m. (fixed) wee.f. Ist September, 1982. -

Item No. 5.02: To consider the proposal for sanction of travel grant to Professor G.S. Merwaha, Director, Indian School of Mines, Dhanbad.

- The Commission as a special case agreed to provide assistance on $100 \%$ basis to the Indian School of Mines, Dhañbad to enable Professor Gu S. Narwa to attend the National Seminar on Development of Mineral Resources to be held in Peshawar in October, 1982.

Ttem No. 5.03; $\mathrm{Tb}^{2}$ consider a proposal of the Gujarat Vidyapith for utilisation of Special Grant on the occesion of the Diamond Jubilee of the Jidyapith.

- The Gormission could not accept the proposal of Gujaret Vidyapith to create, an endowment fund out of the grents approved by the Commission on the occasion of ite Diamond Jubilee and desired that these grarits nay be used for the purpose already indicated. The cujarat Vidyapith could, however, create an endorment fund out of the amount collected by it from other sources, if it so desires and utilise the income for avard of scholarshjps/fellowships.

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## SECTTON 6

## (Miscellaneous)

Item No. 6.01:
To consider the recommendation of the Wbrking Group of Personnel Policy for bringing greater involvement of women in Science and Technology.

The oomission generally accepted the recormendetions of the Working Group of Personnel policy for bringing greater involvement of women in Science and Technology. The commission noted that a decision had already been taken to relax in the case of women candidates by ten years, the age limit prescribed for award of research fellowships/associateship. It was desired that the universities be requested to ensure that atjeäst $30 \%$ of such awards are made to women candidatos. The Commission further desired that in the case of post_doctoral awards for women students, the awards could be made on part-tine bas is and for longer duration as may be considered appropriate.

The matter with regard to orgentsation of specialised curses in the field of electronics may be further dis cus sed with the Department of mectronics to decide as to which of the courses could be organtsed by it and which other courses could be taken up by the university arants comalssion.

It was also sugges ted that, keoping in view the suitability and employmont opportunities for women in the field of electronic data processing and information sciences, the commission could assist a fow women's institutions in different regions to start post_degree diploma cours es in computer science and applications and provide them the necessary infrastructure facilitios required for the purpose. It was noted that the women's institutions could also introduce computer science as one of the subjects under the programe of restructuring of courses at the undergraduate level :
Ttem No. 6.02: Tb further consider the recommendations of the Standing Committee regaring Sub-plan for Scheduled Tribes and specjal Component plan for scheduled castes in so far as they relate to :

(i) The Comnission agreed that the colleges häving a jarge proportion of tribal stidents be advised thet while submitting proposals for restructuryng of courses they may give.speciel emphesis for such courses as would be relevant to the students ant the region conormed. Such courses may also be oven to other standents.
(ii) The Comnission could not consider it feasible to orgenise separate orientation courses for teachers catering to Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes, but felt that there was a need for organising orientation courses for all teachers with special emphas is on providing remadial courses for the $s$ tudents coming from weaker sections and particularly in languages and mathematics.
(1j1) The Commission refterated its earlier decision that it would not be desirable on academic grounds to relax the minimum qualifications for recruitment of Scheduled Cast/Scheduled Tribe teachers in colleges and universities.

Whth regard to the suggestion that SC/ST teachers from the schools may be given training to enable them to seek appointment in the colleges, it was suggested that the Dommission may consider framing a proposal under which such teachers could be awarded fellowships to enable them to improve their qualifications.
(iv) It was noted thet the Comirission has already recomended to the Central Covernment to amend the UGC Act to ensure that the colleges and the universities follow the guidelines of the USC/ Covermment of India regarding reservations of scheduled castes/ Scheduled Tribes in the natter of admissions and recruitment of staff.
(v) The ODmission was of the view that there should be no distinction in the matter of award of scholarships to SC/ST students pursuing their higher courses whether formal or through non- formal education (correspondenca) and was of the view that it be recomuended to the Ministry of Home Affairs that the SC/ST students enrolled in the Correspondence Courses be awarded scholarships on the same basis as for sturients admitted to the regular courses.

Item No. 6.03: To consider the question of reservation for Schoduled castes/Scheduled Tribes for the award of Teacher Fellowships.

- It was agreed that this may be brought up agein before the ommission alongwith the review of the teacher fellowship scheme.

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Item No. 6.04: To review the position of teaching and non-teaching staff belonging to Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe Communities as on Ist Jamary, 1981.

This was noted. In this comection, the Commission desired that a study may be made of the number of scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes recruited ageinst fresh vacancies that were available during 1977-78 to 1981-82 and hrought up before the Comrission.

The Commission agreed that National Fellowships be ärar red to the schnlars as recommended by the committee. The Commission also agreed thet:

$\bar{m}$ this connection, the Commission also desired that the possibility of increasing the total number of national fellowships available at any time may be explored.

Item No. 6.08: To consider the proposal of the Delhi University for exerption of scheduled castes/Scheduled Tribes students from the payment of Tuition Fee/ Idmiss ion fee of colleges affiliated to DEIhi University.

The Dommission noted that the Government of India has alreädy a schome under which SG/ST students are awarded postnatric/postmsecondary scholarships to enable such candidates to pursue higher education. It was further noted that Delhi Colleges are permitted to award freeships to students upto $20 \%$ of the total enrolment and as such the commission felt that the needs of the SC/S' cendidates for their tuition fees could be met out of the above two schemes and it may not be necessary to have a separate provision to provide for SC/ST candidates admittel to the colleges of delhi university, to be exenpted from payment of tuttion fees.

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In this connection, the ommission desired that the De lhi thiversity be advised to follow the guidelines laid dow for reservation of admission to SC/ST studenta both at the undergraduate and postgraduate levels, which are not being: adopted at present.

As a body of experts in a subject area and related disciplines and interdisciplinary fields, and coming from universities, R\&D Laboratories and other institutions the panels could assist the Commission in continuously reviewing the activities of the different universities in education and research in the different areas on subjects, and in suggesting suitable methods and measures for improvement of standards and relating education to emerging national needs. The panels could also give expert advioe regarding measures for the improvement of the standards of teaching and research and supports for research by identifying thrust areas of importance and promote research effort ty teachers and other research workers, by way of evaluation and monitoring of research projects by individuals groups or departments as a whule, within the overall policy of the Commis sion for support of research in the universities $\ddagger$ and cojlege system.

As regards specific items which may be included in the terms of reference of the subject panels these may be as follows:-
(a) Collect information and material to report on prevailing standards of teaching and examination in their subject area.
(b) Prepare periodicaily status reports regarding research facilities, research areas, performance and prespectives; and indicate areas of thrust and importance and suggest measures to promote greater research efforts in areas of national aeeds.
(c) Exanine research and other prop sals referred to them in order to make suitable recommendations to the Commission.
(d) Advise on measures for enhancing the quality of work in education and research and make recoumendations in this connection, for consideration of the Commission.
(e) Prepare a list of experts in the subjects concerned together with their areas of specialization; and
(f) Render advice on such other matters as may be referred to them by the Commission.
(b) Procedure for consideration of Major/Minor Research Projects in the Humanities, Social Sciences, Sciences and Engineering and Technology subjects:-
(a) College and University teaners may be invited to send minor research projects within a ceiling of Rs.10,000/by a specified date, once a year and these should be considered within a period of three months.
(b) The projects (as under (a) akove) alongwith their synopses may be put up to committees specially consitituted for the purpose for final recommendation.
(c) University and college teachers may be invited to send major research projects before a specified date, twice a year.
(d) All Major research proposals may be referred to two experts for their advice in the natter.
(e) On receipt of both referee comments, major research projects imolving an anmal expenditure of less than Rs,20,000/- may be considered by the Chairman/Vice-Chairman, for a decision regarding acceptance orotherwise. The matter may be reported to the panels concernedat the following meeting.
(f) Major research projects involving an expenditure of over Rs. 20,000 per annum, may be $y$ ut up to the panels, with such refree comments as have been received, for their consideration and recommendation. The recommendations will be put up to the Chairman/Vice-Chairman for finaldecision.
(g) Fach project involving a totale xpenditure of Rs. 2 lakhs or more will be placed before the Commission for approval toge ther with the recommendation of the panel.
(h) The above procedure would be applicable also in respect of research projects received from superanuated teachers, below the age of 65 years.

Allocation for development of Engg. \& Technology during 6th Plan period in respect of Dayalbagh Educational Instt., Agra.

Director, Dayalbagh Educational Instt., Agra, approached the Commission for provision of 6th plan allocation for Eng9. \& Technology in view of the fact that the said Instt. has been declared a"Deemed University".

On aprisel of the proposal received from the University a sum of Rs. 20.00 lakhs has been allocated to the Dayalbagh Educational Instt. for the development of Engg. \& Technology at the Institute.

St. Teresa's College, Ernakulam - Construction of $L_{i}$ brary Building - Mpproval of the expenditure of Rs. $76,976.63$ incurred before the issue of the approval of the Commission.

The construction of a Library Building at the St. Teresa's College, Ernakulam was approved at an estimated cost of Rs. $6,28,504 / \mathrm{m}$, the Commission's share being limited to Rs. $4,18,686$ under the 8 lakhs scheme of the College during Vth plan period. The Library building has been completed at a cost of $\mathrm{Rs}_{3} 7,85,042 /-$. The college incurred an expenditure of Rs. $76,976.63$ paisa before the issue of the Commission's approval letter for the purchase/of steel and other building materials in order to avoid escalation of cost.

The Accountant General of Kerala has asked the college to obtain Commission's aporoval for the expenditure incurred before the issue of the 'Commission'.s approval letter. Keeping in viau the circumstances explained by the College, approval has been given to the expenditure of Rs. $76,976.63$ which was incurred prior to the approval of the Commission for the construction of Library building of St. Teresa's College, Ernakulam.

Approval of grants for VI Plan to Universities for developfent of Science, Humanities, Social Sciences as first charge against II Plan allocation.

In pursuance of the U.G.C. decision (Item No. 6.15 dated hay, 1981) the following grants have been approved out of the II Plan allocation of Rs. 50 lakhs to Sri Sathya Sai Institute of figher Learning, Prasanthinilayam for development of Science, fumanities and Social Sciences at the discussions held by the Fhairman, U.G.C. with the Vice-Chancellor of the Institute on 24th July, 1982 :-

On the rocommendation of the All India Council for Technical Education, the Commission approved the introduction of B.Pharm. Course at S.N.D.T. Women's University, Bombay.

A proposal was received from the S.N. D.T. Women's University for granting leava with pay to Smt. Asha Patravali, a Reader in Pharmaceutical and Principal of C.U. Shah College of Pharmacy for doing Ph.D. It has been agreed that if the Univarsity could grant leave with pay to Smt. Patravali for two years, the Commission would provide for the expenditure on salary etc. for a substitute sanction if so provided....

Purchase of vehicles by the North Eastern Hill Uni versity

The Commisssion vide letters No. F.7-6/77(E-2) dated 29th February, 1980 and 7.7.1980 had accepted the proposal of the North Eastern Hill University for the purcahse of following vehicies:

1. Replacement of Ambassador Car and Jeep at Shillong Campus; and
2. Purcahse of a Ambassadmr Car and a Mini Bus for Aizawl Campus.

The North Eastern Hill University was however advised to consider if the purcahse of a mini bus rather than a bus will serve the purpose keeping in view the number of students in the Kohima Campus. In June, 1982 the North Eastern Hill University informe the Commission that one Mini Bus will not be sufficient to mest the requirements of the Kohima Campus. The University also sent the following proposal for the purcahse of vehicles which has been accepted (vide No.F.7-6/77(E-2) dated 17.7.1982). In view of the special needs of the area:

Creation of seven visiting professorships at the North Eastern Hill University.

The Executive Eouncil of the North Eastern Hill University at its mesting held on 24th May, 1982 considered the question of creation of floating posts of visiting professorships and regolved that seven floating posts of professors may be created, in addition to normal posts, for appointment from noted scholars who may be retiring or on the verge of retirement or from amongest those who may like to spend a year or two away from their normal assignments in sabbatical leave and so on. The proposal regarding provision of seven visiting professorships sent by the North Eastern Hill University has been accepted 'in principie' in vieu of the special problems of the NEHU. The University has however been requested to send full details of the propesal for Eommission's consideration and concurrences.

The Commission did not consiaer it annrobriate to include university and colloge terachers in the scheme of the Notional Awards for Teachors.

Itrm N2. 3.02 : To consicer the nuastion of creation of assets by the UP State Government for fulfilling certain conditions under Sretion 12-A of the UGG Act in resonct of Kuman University.

The Commission folt that it may not be nossible to exemot the university from providing adfauate number for traching positions as prescribed under the rules and desired that the State Government be advised to croate the rcouired number of nositions of Professors and Randers as alrnady indicated and university may take necresary stons to fill in these nositions. The mattor may be reviewnd after the State Governments/Tniversity has taken necessary action in this regard.

It was also felt that the university be zdvised that if any now coursos are to be instituted in the university, these should have soecial relevance to the area in which the university is located.

Item No. 3.03 : To consider a reference received from the Government of India, Ministry of Frucation \& CuIture, 1 regarding the ruestion of giving Statutory Status to the National Council of Reacher Educztion.

The Commission while endorsing the views already conveved to the Ministry of Educotion rearaing provision of statutory status to the National Council of Teachor Education, stressed that it was not in favour of qranting such a status to this Council.

Item No. 2.04: To consider a reference from the Government of India, Ministry of Education \& Culture regarding the vievis of the Commission on the scheme to establish Cooperative Stores for book trade in the Universities as framed by the Ministry.

The Commission welcomed the pronosal of the Ministry of Education for the establishment of coonerative stores in the universities and desired that the scheme, if introduced, may be imolemented airectly by the Ministry.

The workshon would be organised in accordance with the UGC norms.

Item No. 4.02 : To consicer further the recommentations made ky the Committee annointed by the Commission to review the proaramme of Tachor Fellowshio.

The Commission noted with satisfaction that the programme of teacher fellowshins has enarled a large number of teachers from colleass to improve their acatemic qualifications by acquiring M.Phil/ Ph.D. degrees. The Commission further noted that nrovjsion for such teacher fellowships has since been made under the Sixth Plan Schemes of assistance. to colleges as nart of the basic grants and also as nart of the developmental assistance availarle to the colleges. In viow of this the Commission riecided that:

1. The existing scheme of teacher fellowshins allocated to a "ertain number of identified denartments in the universities may not ke continued but those teachers who have already reen awarced teacher fellowshins may continue for the neriod of their awards.
2. Only additional teacher fellowshins of one year duration made availarle to the denartments narticiosting as Centres of Advanced Study and Denartment of Snecial Assistance may be continued to be utilised ry hoth university and college teachers on the existing basis.
3. If necessery, the amount of unner limit of assistance to colleges for faculty imnrovement oronosals as mirt of develonmental grants could be suitably enhanced.
4. The outstation ljving allowance may be increaser from 3. 250/-to ns. 500/- n.m. w.e.f. 1 st November, 1982. The contingency grant for teacher fellows resistered for Ph. D. may be increased from ?. 1,500 to ?. 3,000 per annum. There would be no increase in tho contingency grant for teacher fellowshins for M. Phil.
5. The Commission was not a favour of recerving teacher fellowshins for Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribe candidates, rut desired that a limited number of teacher fellowshins be awarded directly Yy the UGC to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Iribe teachers from colleges.
6. The universities be advised to complete the admission for M.Phil./Ph.D. course for teacher fellows before the end of Anril so thit the colleges would have aderuate time to make annointments of substitute teachers for the ensuing academic year. In this connection the Commission desired that the conditions nrescribed by the Commission to enable uriversities to institute M. Phil./Ph.D. orogrammes may re reviewed with a view to nroviding flexirility to organise these courses wherever necessary, without detriment to the academic standards, on $\exists$ bart time basis. In such cases, it may not be necossary either to provide for living allowance or nayment of suhstitute salary, but any other unavoidable incidental expenditure involved could be considered on the merit of each case.

7 The Commission reiterated its earlier decision that the UGC assistance under Faculty Improvement Programme of 「eacher Fellows (for both the substitute's salury as well as the contingent orant etc.), would ke availakle only for one year for M.Phil. and for a neriod not exceeding four years for Ph. D. course including the M. Phil. wherever provided.

## 3. Lucknow University ;

The Commission acconted the recommentations of the USIC Standing Committee and agreed that the UGC assistance for USIC level. I, merging the facilities available at the Central Instmmentation comnley with the USIC may be provided as per UGC norms. To complete the building under construction a grant of 7s. 1 lakh may be rrovided.

The Commission notrd that while some of the $R$ and $D$ activities and need-based training programme may be undertaken by the Regional Instmumentation Centres, the main functions of the USICs should be to nrovide serviens or maintenance and revatrs of the existing equinment in the university denartments and also in the colleges affiliated to the universities. Future develonment assistance to these Centres would be considered primarily in the light of efficiency of these services as suggested by the Standing Committee. Guidelines for the USICs may be suitably modified.
Item. No. 4.04 : To consider the scheme of assistarce to university/collaoe teachers for participation in Irternational Conforence.

The Comission agreed that the existing scheme for rroviding financial assistance to u ivarsj.ties na college teachers to particinate in international conferences may be revised as follows :
(a) Teachers who are not more than 35 years of . age (in the case of women 45 years) may send their japers to be presented at such conforences, and the present brocedure of evaluation through referees
may be continued. Such teachers who are selected for assistance may sond $2-4$ wneks in the country where the conference is held and they should utilise the neriod outside the conference days for visiting institutions in the surject field and the worknlan for such visits should be submitted alongwith the nronosal for trave? grant to the UGC. This procedure would also annly in the case of universj.ty teachors assisted under the unassigned grant, directly by the University.
(b) Senior toachers who are invited to chair a session/give a keynote address or lead a seminar discussion group at the International conforances may be assisted on $100 \% \mathrm{ky}$ the UGC to attend such conferences not more than once in a two year neriod. The Commissinn also agreed thet the oresent system of nrovidint $50 \%$ assistance in eases where teachers obtain 50\% exnenditure from other agencies already identified, may however continue.

In the case of unjversijty teachers the above nrocedure may be followad for burooses of utilising the unassigned rrant nlaced at the disnosal of the university. Only nronosals from the colleqe teachers may, however, continue to be sent to the UGC for consideration as per nrocedure brescribed.

Item No. 4. 05 : To consider the recommendations of the Standina Committee on College Science Improvement Programme (COSIP) made at its meeting held on 24th August, 198 ?

The Commission generalily accented the recommendations of the Standing Committ,fe for the College Science Improvement Prooramme and desired that further action may be taken on the recommendations.

As regards nublication of journals in each science education subject, the Commission felt that the auestion whether a signle journal cor all science educytion subjncts or soparate journals for each maior sukiect may be oublished as also the auestion of neriodicity may be senarately examined. Euch journals should, however, aim to become selfsub orting over a jerjod of 3 years.

The Commission noted that consineralle amount of material including laboratory and drmonstration equinment have reen ceveloned under the College Science Imnrovement Programme and there was need for taking stevs to manufacture and make them avajiable on a large scalf to the colleges. The manner in which such oroduction could bf undertaken, may be discussed with the Devartment of Science and echnology and other agencies concerned with science education programmes.

Item No. 4.06. : To consider the arestion of the Commission anoroving in advance the criteris to bo adopted by various Selection Committees for the award of JGC Scholarshins/ Fellowshios.

The Commission felt that it may not be possible to lay down detailrd quidelines for the Sflection Committees making recommendations for award of fellowshins/scholzrshiys. The Commission, however, dosired that the Selection Commlttees constituted for such awards may be reauested to indicate the criteria followed by them in making recommendations for award of such fellowshins/ scholarshins.

The Commission while taking note of the fact that normally it does not award any scholarshio for master's course in the different disciolines, and hence agreed that the scheme for award of scholarshin for LLM course may be discontinued w.e.f. next academic year 1983-84.

Item N2. 4.07 : To consider the recommendations of the Committee annointed by the UGC to consider pronosals received from colleges for second phase of COHSSIP held on May 10, 1982.

Item Na. 5.01 : To consjder the nronosal of Guiarat Vidyanith for starting corrosnondence courses in Gandhian Thousht at the Post-qraduate Dioloma level.

The Commission accented the nronosal of the Gujarat Vidyanith, Ahmedabad for starting corresnonतence courses in Gandhian thought as recommended by the Committee. It was noted that the assistance will be nrovided in accordance with the norms and financial coiling laid down for such purnoses.

Itom Na. 5.02 : To consider the nronosal of the Uriversjity of Delhi for onening two more Health Centres for its emplovees, one in East Delhi and the other in West Dolhi.

The Commission accented the nronosal of Delhi University for setting un of two health centros and agreed to nrovide assistance as indicated in Anpendix-IV. It was noted that the assistance for this would be provided urder 'non-nlan' as in the case of funds required for reimbursement under Health Services Scheme.

Item No. 5.03 : To consider the duestion of roviding assistance to Kashmir University, for construction of Girls Hostel, Foys Hostel and Teachers Hostel anproved during the fifth nlan period.

- The Commission noted that the Kechmir Triversity had proceeded to take un construction of hostel ruildinos without accentance of the blans and estimates hy the Commission. . The Commission, howeven, agreed to regularise these constriactions and to treat the grants avorovod during the Fifth Dlan nerjod to be naid as snill-ovor and the addjetonal expenditure, if any, as charge on tho Sjxth Plan allocation to the University.

Item No. $5 . \mathrm{nl}_{ \pm}$: To consirter the oronosal of the Ali arh Mislim Unjversity to run a coaching scheme for studentis belonging to Aligarh Muslim University.

The Conmission consiciered the nronosal of the Alioarh Muslim Inivorsity to organise a coaching scheme for students relonging to Aligarh Muslim Univorsj.ty. It was oointod out that the Vice-Chancellor had since written to the UGC that it would not set un such a centre at Delhi rut desired that some nrovision may be made to enarle a few nersons to be invited to Aliearh to deliver lectures at the centre functioning at Aligarh. The Commission further desired that this scheme of coaching should be available only to the students of the university at the AMU campus and in view of this it may neithoj be necessary to brovide scholarshins nor an additional hostel. I'he Commission arreed to provice assistance for prenaration of the reading materigl, provision for Dayment for guest strff for delivering lectures to the students and a small amount for the acarisition of books soncially reauired for such cozching purjoses. The detajls of this may ke worked out in consultation with the AMU and the exnonditure involved would be treated as mart of the nrovision made in the olan for Contimuing Arucation Programme.

Item No. 5.05 : To further consider the vronosal of the Indiar. School of Mines, Dhanbad for the establishment of a Centre of Mine Mechanizations.

The Commission accented the pronosal of the Indian School of Mines, Dhanbad for setting uo of a Centre of Mines Mechanisation with the recurring assistance gvailatle from tho Droartment of Coal, Government of India, and also to treat the recurring fxoenditure as committed exnenditure aftor the assistance of the devartment of coal (for five years) ceases.

It was noted that any other non-recurring reauirements for setting un of this Centre would have to be provided ky the Indian School of Nines, Dhanbad within its Sixth Plan allocation.

Item No. 5.06: To consider the nronosal of the Jawaharlal Nohru Unjvorsity, New Dolhi for rroviding grants for water suphly schemes.

The Commission agreed to nrovide an additional sum of $\mathrm{D} .34,940$ in connection with the construction of underground water tank already accented by the Commission. The Commission also agreed to the constmaction of $1 \frac{1}{2}$ lakhs gallons RCC ovorhead tank with necessary facilities in Sector IV at an estimated cost of $\mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{s}}$. 26 lakhs. The Commission accepted 'in nrincinfe' the nronosal for construction of $1 \frac{1}{3}$ lakhs galions RCC overhead tank in Sector VIII at an estimated cost of $\mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{s}} .30$ lakhs and noted that the work of this project will be initiated only after all the on-going projects which are in prograss are completed.

Item No. 5.07 : To consider a nronosal from the Vice-Chancellor, Visva-Fharati, for establishing the nosition of 'Writer-in-Residenco/Artist in Residence' at Visva-Eharati.

The Commission accented the nronosal of the Visva Iharati for institution of two nositions of 'Writer in Residenen/Artists in Residence' and agraed to nrovide outside the Sixth Plan allocation an exnenditure of unto is. 80,000 per annum for this purnose. It was notrd that such scholars invitad under this scheme may be naid an honorarium of ${ }^{5}$. 3,000/- ber month plus contingent allowance of $\mathrm{n}_{\mathrm{s}}$. 5,000/- ofr annum inclusjve of travel and othor expenses.

Section - 6<br>(Miscrllaneous)

Itrm No. 6.01 : To consider a note on the utilisation of the Siyth Plan D-volopment grants to universities for ruilding $\quad$ rojects.

The Commission while taking note of the decision taken rexarding the additionzl nxnenditure on construction of kuildings on account of escalation of costs of materials etc. arrond that the limit laid down in the 6th man guidelines for nrovision of construction of buildings may not be rigidly followrd and each case may be examined on its merit.

Item No. 6.02 ; To consider the mostion of aroviding a lumb sum grant to the universities for mecting contineent needs of research scholars who have not been awarded any fellowshios.

The Commission agreed to orovide a lump sum annual grant to the universities for mefting contingent needs of research scholars, who are not in reccint of any fellowshin/scholarshin. The assistance for tris nurnose may be given at two levels viz. "s. 25,000 for universities which have on average during the last 3 years on rolls uoto 100 full-time research scholars and As. 50,000 for university which have more than 100 such scholars.

The puroose for which the contingent grant may be used would be the same as in the case of general fellowshins allocated by the UGC.

Itom No. 6. 03 : To consider the report of the Expert Groun on Prorramnes for 'Alleviation of Poverty'.

Consideration of this item was deferred.

Itmm No. 6.04 : To consiren the torms and conditions for the anpointment of Visiting Professor in Gandhian Studies.
-••
The Commission acread to the following torms and conditions for the anoointment of visiting profossors in Gandhian Studies ;
(i) The duration of visit to a university by the Visiting Professor may be decided by the Professor according to his convenience.
(ii) Payment of honorarium/dajly allowance may be fixed by the Chairman.
(iiii) Actual travel exnenditure incured ty the professor may be reimbursed.

## Item No . 6.05 :

> To consider the renort of the Commjttee annointod ty tha Commission th consider the nronosal from the Government of Gujarat for givjng anoroval to the estarlishment of a Univorsity in North Guiarat Area.

The Commission while taking note of the views of th- Gujarat Government regarding establishment of a University in North Gujarat Area folt that it could only agroe to the setting un of such a university if the State Government agrers, to Drovide in the Act of the pronosod University that nostgraduate tezching will be done only in the deoartments of the university at its headauarters and that no postgraduate teaching would be allowed eithor in the collegns or in the post-graduate centros as current in the case of Gujarat University.
Item No. 6.06: To considor the guestion of reviving anoointment as Resnarch Associates such of the SC/ST candidntes who are not selected as Locturers by Selection Committeres.

The Commission could not accent the suggestion that nersons relonging to Schdulcd Cast-s/Scheduled Tribes who are not selected for the nost of Lecturers may be apoointed as research associates. In this connection it was noted that the Commission has already a schene under which rosearch associate. Shins are directly awarded by the UGC to the SC/ST candidates.

Item No. 6.02 ; To consider the question of additional allocation for Medical Education including hosnital in Central Universities.

The Commission agroed that the assistance to the Contral Iniversities for medical edunation for the nrasent may be nrovided for the commitments alrfady made and the ausstion of providing additional allocation be brought un before it along with the mid-term nlan review at its next meeting.

Item No. 6.08 ; To consianr the auestion of incornoration of rules framed ry the Central Govornment from time to time for firation of nay of re-emnloyed pensioners in the Statutes/Ordinanees of the contral Univorsjeties.

It was agreed that this may be taken un wj.th the Ministry of Education and Social Welfare for advice.

Item No. $6.09:$ To consider the renort of the Committee annointed ber the Commission to assess thr reguirements of the newly constructed 550 beded hospital attachod to the Mrdical College of the Eanaras Hindu University and other allied matters.

This was withdrawn, as the note on this item had not been circulated.

Item N2. 6.10 : To consider the views received from the universities rogarding the stomos ? of Regging in ecucational institutions.

This had bren withdrawn.
Item No. 6.11 : To review the rulns laid down by the Commission for grant of Sabbatical leave to Professors of a University.

Consideration of this was deferred.
Item No. 6.12 : To consider the pronosal of the Agra University for R-search Continaent grant for M. Phil, Courses in Phvsics, Chemistry, Mathematics and Zoology.

The Commission accepted 'in principle' to provide to the Agra University grant for mesting contingent exonnditure for the M. Phil course instituted by it. The pxact amount that may be naja for this purnose in 6 th nlan may be determined sevarately.
Itom No. 6.13 : To consider further tho proposal of the Delhi University to the taking over of the Kirori Mal College as a university maintained institution.

This was withdrawn as the note on this item was not circulated.

ItomNo. 6.14 : To consider the recommendations made fy the Committee to suggest norms for different tyne of assets which the uriversities may be reauired to create in order to fulfil the conditions laid down in the rules framed under Section 12-A of. the UGC Act about fitness of certain universities for grants.

Item No. 6.15 : To consider cortain estarlishment matters of the University Grants Commission.

(iii): Recommendations of the Departmental Promotion Committon for Class-II posts made at its meeting held on 12th Octoker, 1982.
(i) The Commission agreed to the reimbursement of actual travel charges to the local non-official members of the Committees, etc. constituted by the University Grants Commission instead of limiting the same to is. $30 /-$ as at nrosent in orier to mitigate hardshin to them.
(ii) The Commission'acconted the recommendations of the Denartmental Promotion Committce for Class-I posts made at its metjing beld on 4 th Seotember, 1982.
(iii) The Commission acenotad the recommendations of the Dinartmencal Promotion Committee for Class-II oosts made at its meeting hold on 13th Octoker, 198?.
Item No. 5.16 : To note the date and place for the next meeting of the Commission.

Itim No. 6. 17 : To consider the question of providing financial assistance for the purchase of books for presentation to the participants of tho State/Regional I-vel shorttorm Institute/Summer Institute/ Rnfresher Course organiscd different universities.

## The Commission was not in favour of nroviding furds for the nurchase of books "or presentation to the narticinats of the State/Regional Lrvel short-term Institute/Summ॰r Institute/Refresher Course.

Itcm Nio. 6.18: To consider the question of defining the term of colleges loczted in the backward areas for purboses of oroviding develooment,al assistance in the Sixth Plan.

The Commission considereत that the list of backward areas as given by the Plannjng Commission is based on orimary and middle stage school education only. The Commission drsired that for purposes of determining the educational backwardness of an area/district, a statement showing the enrolment in higher oducation in universitins and colleges per thousand of ponulation in the relevant zge-aroun may be prenared and blaced bofore the Commission for consideration.

Item No. 6. 19 : To consiner the Interim Fenort of the Committee to identify Disoarity/ Distortion in the scales of pay of different categories of nonteaching staff in the Contral Univ~rsitirs.

The Commission took note of the interim report submittod by the Committre regarding the disparity/distortion in the scales of nay of different categories of non-teaching staff in the Central Univorsities. It was agreed that the Committee may not only indicate the existing disnaritios in the scales of vay but also make specific recommendations to rectify these. It may also suggest suitable provision for nromotional zvenues on a rational basis for different categorins of non-tcaching emnloyees in the Central Universities. It was also agreed that the Chairman, if she so desires, may add additional membens to the Committee already qunointsd.

Accordingly a committee was oonstitiuted for the purpose and the repurt of the above committee was corsidered by the Commission at its meeting held on 20.2 .1978 where in it was decided that :"

## UNIVFRSITY GRANTS COMMISSION

Guidelines for implementation of the Merit Promotion Scheme for College leachers.

The role of the teacher is crucial in the maintenence of academic standards and discipline in an educationel institution. A great responsibility therefore, lies on the teacher to ensure that proper academic atmosphere is maintained in the institution and that all academic work is carried out efficiontly and with devotion to duty as a full-time employee of the institution. Every profession, for its orderely progress, needs certain rules of professional ethics, and education is no exception. In order to do justioe to this challenging task, the teacher has to be devotedly involved in programmes of teaching, research, examination and extension activities taken as a whole. There should be regular assessment of his work and also of the institution. At the same time, it is necessary that teachers are provided reasonable opportunities for career advancement, and recognition of merit.
a) Objectives

A scheme of Merit Promotion is to be introduced during the 6 th Plan Period, with a view to providing suitable opportunities to the teachers working in the Colleges far career advancement in recognition of their significant contributions in the field of teaching, research and allied educational activities. The scheme is intended to be in the nature of $a$ flexible complementing scheme where a teacher after critical assessment of his work at the end of a specified period can be promoted to the next higher level and the position thus held by him is' treated as personal to the incumbent and no resultant vacancy is required to be filled. It is felt that such ${ }^{3}$ scheme would go in a long way in encouraging the teachers in colleges to engage in teaching, researoh and allied educational activities and make a distinct contribution to the teaching profession and thus help to improve the quality and standards of higher education.
b) Method of Implementation
I. Teachers working in colleges affiliated to $\exists$ university and included under Section 2(f) and wich come within the purview of $12(\mathrm{~A})$ of the UGC Act who have made significant contribution and achievenent in the field of teaching and research may be considered for Merit Promotion, if they have put in 2 minimum

## Lpermanent

 of eight years of Lservice as a teacher of which at least four years have been in the institution where he/she is being considered for such assessment for merit promotion.II. A teacher who has been considered and not selected for merit promotion in the initial presentation could, however, submit his/her work again only after a lapse of three years.
III. College teachers wishing to have their work assessed and considered for Merit Promotion should present the details of their work to their college latest by 31 st December, each year. For this purpose, the institutions may keep the profile of teachers with them in which the teachers may at the end of each jear indicate the details of their contributions to teaching, research, curriculum development, educational reforms, innovative teaching and other. forms of academic work done in the institution as well as the work done in the field of extention and continu uing education, sports and cultural activities.etc. Improvement of academic qualifications should also be recorded. The enclosed proforma (Annexure) could be used for this purpose and these profiles may be submitted by the college to the University concerned along with the proposal of the teacher for assessment for Merit Promotion. In the case of teachers who are seeking assessment of their work, a consolidated repert. for the period of proceeding eight years may be made available, incorporating the major contributions made by the teacher.
IV. The Vice-Chancellor or his nominee shoutd reter the proposal of the teacher to atleast 2 experts in the subject/discipline concerned out of a panel or names prepared by the University according to the: procedure prescribed by the University for such Selection Committees.
The evaluation reports from the experts should be kept confidential and should be made availakle at least three weeks in advance of the Selection Committee. The Selection Committee would consist of the VioeChancellor or his nominee, two experts other tran the referees and the Principal of the College where the lecturer is working.

Merit Promotion be given by the appointing Authority to a teacher only if the Selection Committee recommends the same.
V. While considering the proposel of a teacher for Merit Promotion, only merit as defined in Para III may'be taken into account. All other factors being equal, seniority may be given due consideration.
VI. The University should generally take a decision on the proposal of a teacher for Merit Promotion as for as possible before the beginning of the next academic ycar so that such promotions can become effective from the date of the beginning of the next academic session.
VII. The promotion given to a person would be personal to the incumbent concerned for the period he serves the institution where he has been granted promotion.
VIII. The promotion on merit to a teacher under this scheme will not entitle him to any other benefit or entitle him to any other responsibility, administrative or otherwise such as Head of Department/Principal, except where he is even otherwise to be considered and will also not lead to any reduction in his teaching or other work.
IX. While promoting a teacher on merit, his salary may be fixed in the prescribed scale of pay for the next higher post with marginal adjustment nearest to the salary being drawn by the promotee, as per usuel rules of pay fixation. Since most teachers in the colleges wóuld be in the scale of a lecturer iee 700-16:0, the teacher, on selection for Merit Promotion may be placed in the scale of Rs.1200-50-1300-60-1900 and be designated lecturer in Selection Grade.
X. The financiel involvement will vary from Stato to State but the Commission would assist the Institution in the implementation of the Merit Promotion Scheme by making available on average contribution at the rate of $\mathrm{Es} .600 /$ - per annum per teacher promoted to: the next higher level in accordance with the guidelines laid down by the Commission upto 31st March, 1985 only, on the condition that the institution concerned continues implementation of the scheme and meets expenditure on the salary of the person concerned as committeed expenditure from 1 st April, 1985 out of its own resources or with the assistance of grant-in-tid from the State Government as the case may be.
XI. No person promoted by the College prior to the introduction of the UGC Scheme and not in confirmity with the guidelines laid down by the Commission will qualify for assistance from the Commisaion.
XII.. The University would furnish to the UGC, every yeer latest by 15th August, necessary particulars of the persons promoted in the colleges under its jurisdiction, under the Merit Promotion Scheme for college teachers along vith the evaluation report of the experts and the recommendations of the Selection Committees and also the names or all the persons considered from each colleges, to enable the Commission to consider remitting grants due tothe concerned colleges.

## GENERAT

1. The number of teachers promoted under Merit Promotion Gcheme will not exceed $25 \%$ of the total number of permanent posts in the college, spread over a period of 3 years.
2. The Lecturers who are given a Merit Promotion may be designated as Lecturer in the Selection Grade.
3. In the case of such colleges which also have posts of Readers and Professors as in the case 0 : University Departments, the Merit Promotion Scheme prepared separately by the University Grants Commission for University appointed teachers may be made applicable.

(b) The Commission agreed that candidates called for interview for research fallowships and research associateships from outside the State may be paid T. A. out of the contingency funds of the departments sanctioned under the Special Assistance Frogrammes. The total number of candidates to be called for interview should be limited to not more than 4 times the number of fellowships available.

In this connection it was suggested that the universities who have been allotbod research fellouships for award directiy should ensure that the guidelines prescribed by UCC are followed. It may be necessary for the Universities to give a certificate to this effect before claiming necessary assistance from the UGC.

The UGC at its meoting held in Februry, 1982 agreod that the Manipur University may be declared fit in terms of the rules framed under section 12-A of the UGC fot aftor the State Govornment has sent the revised anct/ Statutes of the university in the light of the recommendations mado by the committee which have already bean conveyed to the State Governmente The above decision of the Commission was conveyed to the Government of Manipur for Mecessary action.

The Government of Manipur have since amended the Act of the Manipur University after taking into account the suggestions made by the Committee appointed by the Commission. The Government of Manipur has been requested to amend certain Statutes in vied of the amended act particularly after the revised definition his been prescribed by the amended nct for "University Teachers" and "Iecognised teachers"

Since the main suggostions made by the conmittee on the fet of the Manipur University have been accepted by the State Government the university has since been daclared fit to receive central assistance in terms of the rules framed under Section 12-A of the UCC ict 1956 (as amended upto 17th June, 1972). The University would, however, be entitled to institutional development grant only after the state Government.has actually created the assets as stipuiated in the rules framed uner Section 12-A of the UCC Rot. The State Government and the Manipur UMiversity have been informed accordingly.
(7) A reference from the Government : India, Ministry of Education \& C It ure Department of Education) Regarding the Possibility of introducing a cafeteria type service in the hostels attached to Universities and higher educationd institutions.

The Government of India, Ministry if Educatior and Culture (Department of Education) in Mar, 1980 suggested that the possibility of introducing a cafeteria type service in the hs tels attached to Universities and higher educational institutions may be examinet in lieu of the messing arrangements which involve employment of a large number of employees. of five years from 1981- 82 to 1985-86. 拉 was interalia decided that the individual projects/ activities of university groups/scientists for funds will be cycled through the IMhP Co-ordination Committee Programme. The proje cts cleared by the Coumittee are to be transmitted to the Commission by the IMAP Progranme secretariat and the Commission would treat the process as its own clearing procedure. Necessary funcis are to be released by the Commission directly to the proje ct investigators through respective universities.

A total number of following nine research projects for participation in the IMAP have so far been considered and cleared by the IMAP Comordination Cormittee in accordance with the procedure agread to. The total expenditure involved $i_{s}$. worked out at Rs. 9,894 lakhs.

Since no communication has been received from the State Govt. in this regard. This may be pursued on roceipt of the views of the State Govt.

The onmitter noted that the Govt. of Karnataka: have fulfilled the conditions stipulated in the rules framod under Section 12-A of the UGC Act in respect of universities of Mangalora and Gulbarga a s far as it relates to physichl facilities and assests created in accordance with the above rules. It has also been assured by the stiate Govt. that a dditional funds would be provided to emable the universities to create additional staff in order to fulfil the conditions laid down in the rules undem Section 12- $n$ of the UGC Act. v. To consider a proposil received from the Govt. of Tamil Nadu for setting up a postgraduate Extemsion Centre at Palayamknttai under Madurai Kamaraj University.

The committee noted that the university postgraduate centre at Palayamkottai under Madurai Kamaraj University has already been mstablished. The committee also noted that the Madurai Kamaraj University has assured that the funds made available to it for development during the sixty plan period by UGC will be utilised only for the development of the university departments and that these funds wiid not be ciforitad to meet the requirements of the University Postgraruate centre at Palayamkottai. The committee felt the need for a university postgraduate centre at palayamkottai but the Commission oould nonsider providing a-ssistance to this Centre for its future development only after the following conditions stipulated in the guidelines to define the concept of university postgraduate centres have been fulfilled by the stato cinvt.:-

1. There gitwes a mimumum three departments of tenching at postgraduate levels to begin with.
2. Every teaching department, in the university postgraduate centre hais a providion for a minimum staff of one professor, two readre and an actequate number of lecturers alogowith the necessary supporting staff.
3. Arequate machinery for the health, residence and Welfare for the students has gither been provirlad or rasources are being mado avablable for this purpose to the university postgraduate centre.
4. The centre has beon provided with adequate facilities in respect of buildings, equinments books,library, hostel and staff quarters whoto aggregate value is not less than Ro. 100 lakis, alnogwith the developed land or the $S_{t}$ ate govt. is prepared to give asisurance to the Commission that a minimum amount of Ps. 100 lakhs shali be made available to the centre during the initial period of 5 years for the providion of the above mentioned facilities in addition the the cevenper land. The State Gnvt. woult also hove to give an assurance that the setting up of this centre is dolinked with any propnsal for.setting up, of a university in this area.
The Tamil Nadu Gout. hias been informed aconrdingly.
Vi. To consifer amefence received from the Guvt. of A.P. for the establishment of a Women's Univorsity in the Statre.

The committee was not iin favour of establishment of a women's university in the Andhra Pradesh. Tho decision has been womeyod to Andhra Pradesh Govemment.

Vdditional Allocatinn of Basic Grant amounting to Rs. 3.50 lakhs for the purchase of Books \& Journals to tho Dibrugarh University as charge on 6th plan allocation

In the year 1900-81, the Commissionhed allocetted a basic grant amounting to Rs. 2.00 lakhs towards the purchase of books journals to Dibrugarh University. Later, an the basis of the discussion held with the Vicem Chancellor, the Commissionfurther alloeated an additional grant df Rs. 4.00 lakhs for the purpise to the University. Thus making a total payment to Rs. 6.001 lakhs as first charge on 6th plan develnpment programmes The University submitted a statement of expentiture showing the utilisation of grant in full and requester the Commission to meet the excess exponditure of Rs. 3.50 lakhs incurred towards the purchase of bonks \& journals over and above the allocation of Rs. 6,00 lakhs. Taking intd consideration the justification put forward by the University and actual expenditure incurred for the purpose, it has further been aoreed to give an adritional grant of Rs. 3.50 lakhs to the University as first charge on 6th flan alloca tion pending the visit of 6th Plan Visiting Committee which is schedule to visit in February, 1983.

The approval/sanction the payment of the additional allocation of Rs. 3.50 lakhs has since been conveyed to tha University vide Commission's letter No.15-5/80(E-2) dated 6.11.1982.

## Appendix II to Item No. 4.02

Recommendations of the sut-committeo for the programmes of CAS/DSA
(1) Identification of the thrust area(s) should not be made too narrowly in a discipline of the subject.
(2) While suppnrting an identified area it should be ensured that a good proportion of the funding would strengthen the infrastructure of research in the department and equally important is the need for promoting an overall growth of the department by utilizing the general plan assistance in such areas in the department which are not being specially funded under CAS/DSA.
(3) The creation of additional posts must also take into account the harmonious and proportionate needs of the thrust area Vis-a-Visthe rest of the Development.
(4) Subject Panels may in future identify CAS/095 centres keeping in view not only the discipline in which a group in the department has made a special mark, but also the new thrust areas in which capability is to br built up.
(5) It should be ensured that the departments and the universities concerned follow the spacific guideIinss laid down by the UGC with regard to different aspects of the functioning of tha CAS/DSA including the funds. In cases where a university department is unable to observe the guidelines, serious notice should to taken and the grants with held until the guidelines are reasonably compiled with.
(6) It is essential to see that the advisory Committees function affectively and the annual reports on the working of the departments are considered by the Advisory Committees and sent to the Commission regularly. Any sulgestion/recommendation made by the Advisory Committee should be given due consideration expeditiously by the University/UGC. Progress/annual reports without being channeled through Advisory Committees may not be accepted, normally.
(7) It is desirable to obtain an accaptance, in principle, by the department and tho university concerned that in. case any of the departments were. to be selected for participation in these p-rogrammes, the University/Deptt. would implement the programme In accordance with the UGC guidelines relevant to these programmes.
(8) It is necessary to be flexible in utilization of recurring grants, grants alloxated for recurring items should be allowed to be carried forward to the extent of $50 \%$ from one year to the next subject to the overall ceiling operating for a five yc. year period, Similarly the department should be authorised to reappropriate upto $10 \%$ of the amounts available from one recurring budget bead to another to meet the emerging needs arising from the working of the departmont.
(9) It is necesgary to identify amongst the professors in the thrust area(s) concerned and designate the senior most person as the coordinator in cnnsultation with the university. If such a person were to reach superannuation during the porind of the programme, the next person in the discipline concerned could be designated as the conrdinator. This situation arises only where the hoad of the department happens to be a specialist in an area other than the thrust area identified. The University should delegate suitable powers to the conrdinator to utilize the funds without undue hindrance; it may ensure team work and cooperation by setting gip workable committee. It would not be appropriate to designate a superannuated persnn to be the conrdinator, but such a person can continue to be associated with the academic activities of the $C A S / D S \Lambda$ but may not. have any administrative responsibilities entrusted to them.
(10) The dopartments concerned should make all efforts to ensure recruitments to staff pnsition and award available fellowships on all India Basis and to provido for reservation as prescribed in the guidolines.
(11) Upto four National Scholarships may be institutod in each of the departmonts invitied to function as a CAS/DSA. in Science \& Engineering and Tochnology as being done in Humanities and Social Sciences.
(12) It may not be appropriato to provido separate contingent grant at tached to each fellowship as the contingent grant and working expenses in cas/ DSA would be utilized by the staff, research fellow ships and others involvad in the programmes. The provision for working expenses and contingency could be suitably enhanced keeping in view the total number af follows warking in the thrust areas concerned.
(13) It should be possible to add other thrust areas as they develop area.over a period of time keeping in view the basie principle that such groups are viable, have a distinct identifiable growth potential in a worthwhile area:
(14) It should be possible to provide for an evaluation of the research associates work at the end of the first three years and to provide for the next higher level of research associatoship in the extonded period.

Dalhi colleoes may be allowed to utilise upto $50 \%$ of the admissible ceiling fixed for development af undergraduate education for all approved building projects including furniture instan of $35 \%$ agreod to for colleges of State Universitios. It should not be restricted to building projects including grants paid after 1.4.1981 for building projects approved in the fifth olan or earm lier plan period as in the case of colleges of other universitieg. This should be in addition to the grant already agreod to bo previded by the Commission for completion of an going building projects and for completion on new buildings in respect of certein colleges affiliated to Delhi Univorskty for which propooals have alroarty been accoptod in principlo.
3. The balance of the $50 \%$ of the admissible ceiling may be utilise by the Delhi Colleges for bonks and journals and for equipment according to the noeds of each colloge.
4. The same definition/may 自e laid down from time to time for colleges located in rural and backward aroas will be applicable to the colleges affiliated to the Delhi University, also.
5. A college affiliated to Delhi University which was established on or after 17th June, 1972 will not be eligible to receive assistance from Central sources unless the college is permanently affiliated to the Delhi niversity in terms of the rules framed under soction 12-n of the UGC nct.
6. In view of the special natura of postgraduate teaching in Delhi University, Delhi colleges providing possibilities for postgraduate classes and which fulfil the norms laid down in the VI plan guidelines may be given assistance for books and journals in Humanities and Social sciences on a $100 \%$ basis subject to a maximum of 'Ris. $30,000 /-101$ subject for the sixth plan.
