The following Act of Parliament received the assent of the President on the 26th May, 1973 and is hereby published for general information:

THE NORTH-EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY ACT, 1973

No. 24 of 1973

[26th May, 1973]

An Act to establish and incorporate a teaching and affiliating Univers-ity for the hill areas of the North-Eastern region

WHEREAS it is expedient to establish and incorporate a teaching and affiliating University for the benefit of the people of the hill areas of the North-Eastern region and to develop the intellectual, academic and cultural background of the said people;

AND WHEREAS in pursuance of clause (1) of article 252 of the Constitution, resolutions have been passed by the Legislatures of the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland to the effect that the setting up of a Central University for the hill areas of the North-Eastern region shall be regulated by Parliament by law;

BE it enacted by Parliament in the Twentyfourth Year of the Republic of India as follows:-

University Act. 1973.

1. (1) This Act may be called the North-Eastern Hill Short title, extent and commence-

ment.

- (2) It extends to the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union Territories of Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram.
- (3) It shall come into force on such date as the Central Government may, by notification in the Official Gazette, appoint.
- 2. In this Act, and in all Statutes made hereunder, Definitions, unless the context otherwise requires,-
 - (a) "Academic Council" means the Academic Council of the University:
 - (b) "academic staff" means such categories of staff as are designated as academic staff by the Ordinances:
 - (c) "Board of Studies" mean the Board of Studies of the University;
 - (d) "Chancellor", "Vice-Chancellor" and "Pro-Vice-Chancellor" mean, respectively, the Chancellor, Vice-Chancellor and Pro-Vice-Chancellor of the University:
 - (e) "College" means a College maintained by, or admitted to the privileges of the University;
 - (f) "Court" means the Court of the University;
 - (g) " Department" means a Department of Studies, and includes a Centre of Studies;
 - (h) "employee" means any person appointed by the University, and includes teachers and other staff of the University;
 - (i) "Executive Council" means the Executive Council of the University:

- (j) "Hall" means a unit of residence or of corporate life for the students of the University, College or institution, provided, maintained or recognised by the University;
- () "Institution" means an academic instruction, not being a College, maintained by, or admitted to the privileges of the University;
- (1) "North-Eastern region" means the North-Eastern region of India comprising the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union Territories of Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram:
- (m) "Principal" mea-ns the Head of a College or an Institution, and includes where there is no Principal, the person for the time being duly appointed to act as Principal, and, in the absence of the Principal or the acting Principal, a Vice-Principal duly appointed as such;
- (n) "recognised teachers" means such persons as are recognised by the University for the purpose of imparting instruction in a College or an Institution admitted to the privileges of the University:
- (o) "School" means a School of Studies of the University;
- () "Statutes", Mordinances" and "Regulations", mean, respectively, the Statutes, Ordinances and Regulations of the University for the time being in force;
- (q) "teachers of the University" means Professors,
 Readers, Lecturers and such other persons as may be
 appointed for imparting instruction or conducting
 research in the University or in any College or
 Institution maintained by the University and are
 designated as teachers by the Ordinances;
- (r) "Universaity" means the North-Eastern Hill University.

3. (1) There shall be established a University by the name of North-Eastern Hill University".

The Univer-

- (2) The headq-warters of the University shall be at Shillong and it shall have campuses in the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland; it may also establish campuses at such other places within its jurisdiction as it may deem fit.
- Chancellor and the first WiceChancellor and the first members of the
 Court, the Executive Council and the
 Academic Council and all persons who may
 hereafter become such officers or members,
 so long as they continue to hold such office
 or membership, are hereby constituted a
 body corporate by the name of "North-Eastern
 Hill University".
- (4) The University shall have perpetual successions and a common seal, and shall sue and be sued by the said name.
- 4. The objects of the University shall be to disseminate and advance knowledge by providing instructional and research facilities in such branches of learning as it may deem fit; to pay special attention to the improvement of the social and economic conditions and welfare of the people of the hill areas of the North-Eastern region and, in particular, their intellectual, academic and cultural advancement.

Objects.

5. The University shall have the following powers. namely:-

Powers of the University.

(1) to provide for instruction in such branches of learning as the University may, from time to time, determine and to make provision for research and for the advancement and dissemination of knowledge;

- (2) to take such academic steps as would contribute to the improvement of the economic conditions and welfare of the people of the hill areas of the North-Eastern region.
- (3) to grant, subject to such conditions as the University may determine, diploms or certificate to and confer degrees and other academic distinctions on the basis of examinations, evaluation or any other method of testing, on persons, and to withdraw any such diplomas, certificates, degrees or other academic distinctions for good and sufficient cause;
- (4) to organise and to undertake extra mural studies and extension services;
- (5) to confer honorary degrees or other distinctions in the manner prescribed by the Statutes:
- (6) to provide instruction, including correspondence and such other courses, to such persons as are not members of the University, as it may determine;
- (7) to institute principalships, professorships, readerships, lecturerships, and other teaching or academic posts required by the University and to appoint persons to such principalships, professorships, readerships, lecturerships or other posts;
- (8) to recognise persons for imparting instruction in any College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University:
- (9) to appoint persons working in any other University or organisation as teachers of the University for a specified period:
- (fo) to create administrative, ministerial and other posts and to make appointments thereto;

- (11) to co-operate or collaborate with any other University or authority in such manner and for such purposes as the University may determine:
- (12) to establish such campuses, centres, specialised laboratories or other units for research and instruction as are, in the opinion of the University, necessary for the furtherance of its objects;
- (13) to institute and award fellowships, scholarships, sometimes, medals and prizes;
- (14) to establish and maintain Colleges, Institutions and Halls:
- (15) to admit to its privileges Colleges and Institutions not maintained by the University; to withdraw all or any of those privileges in accordance with such conditions as may be prescribed by the Statutes; and to recognise Halls not maintained by the University and to withdraw any such recognition;
- (16) to declare a College, an Institution or a Department as an autonomous College or an Institution or a Department as the case may be:
- (17) to determine standards for admission into the University, which may include examination, evaluation or any other method of testing:
- (1') to demand and receive payment of fees and other charges;
- (19) to supervise the residences of the students of the University and to make arrangements for promoting their health and general welfare;
- (20) to make special arrangements in respect of women students as the University may consider, desirable;
- (21) to regulate and enforce discipline among the employees and students of the University and take such disciplinary measures in this regard as may be deemed necessary;

- (22) to make arrangements for promoting the health and general welfare of the employees;
- (23) to acquire, hold manage amd dispose of property movable or immovable, including trust and endowment properties for the purposes of the University:
- (24) to borrow, with the approval of the Central Government on the security of the property of the University, money for the purposes of the University:
- (25) to doall such other acts and things as may be necessary, incidental or conducive to the attainment of all or any of its objects.
- Jurisdic- 6.(1) The jurisdiction of the University shall extend to the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union Territories of Arunachal Pradesh and Mizoram.
 - (2) No College or Institution situated within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the University shall be compulsorily affiliated to the University, and affiliation shall be gra-nted by the University only to such College or Institution as may agree to accept the Statutes and Ordinances.
 - (3) Any College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University shall cease to be associated with, or be admitted to the privileges of any other University.
 - 44) No College or Institution situated within the local limits of the jurisdiction of the University but not admitted to its privileges, shall be associated with, or be admitted to the privileges of, any other University except with the previous approval of the Government of the State in which, or the Administrator of the Union Territory in which such College or Institution is situate.

University open to all classes, castes and creed.

7. The University shall be open—to persons of either sex and of whatever race, creed, caste or class, and it shall not be lawful for the University to adopt or impose on any person any test whatsoever of religious belief or profession in order to entitle him to be admitted therein, as a teacher or student, or to hold any office therein, or to graduate thereat:

Provided that nothing in this section s-hall be deemed to prevent the Univers-ity from making special provisions for admission of students of the weaker sections of the people in the North-Eastern region and, in particular, of the Scheduled Castes and the Scheduled Tribes.

Visitor

- 8. (1) The president of India shall be the Visitor of the University.
 - (2) The Visitor shall have the right to cuase an inspection to be made by such person or persons as he may direct of the University, its buildings, laboratories and equipment and of any College or Institution maintained by the University or admitted to its privileges and also of the examinations, teaching and other work conducted or done by the University and to cause an inquiry to be made in like manner in respect of any matter connected with the administration or finances of the University, Colleges or Institutions.
 - (3) The Visitor shall, in every case, give notice of his intention to cause an inspection or inquiry to be made,—

Contd/ .. 9 ..

- (a) to the University, if such inspection or inquiry is to be made in respect of the University, College or Institution maintained by it, or
- (b) to the management of the College or Institution, if the inspection or inquiry is to be made in respect of a College or an Institution admitted to the privileges of the University,

and the University or the management, as the case may be, shall have the right to make such representations to the Visitor, as it may consider necessary.

- (4) After considering the representations, if any, made by the University or the management, as the case may be, the Visitor may cause to be made such inspection or inquiry as is referred to in sub-section (2).
- (5) Where any inspection or inquiry has been caused to be made by the Visitor, the Univers-ity or the management, as the case may be, shall be entitled to appoint a representative who shall have the right to be preset and be heard at such inspection or inquiry.
- (6) The Visitor may, if the inspection or inquiry is made in respect of the University or any College or Institution maintained by it, address the Vice-Chancellor with reference to the result of such inspection or inquiry and the Vice-Chancellor shall communicate to the Executive Council the views of the Visitor with such advice as the Visitor may be pleased to offer upon the action to be taken thereon.

- (7) The Visitor, may, if the inspection or inq-uiry is made in respect of any College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University, address the management concerned through the Vice-Chancellor with reference to the result of such inspection or inquiry, his views thereon and such advice as he may be pleased to offer upon the action to be taken thereon.
- (8) The Executive Council or the management, as the case may be, shall communicate through the Vice-Chancellor to the Visitor such action, if any, as it is proposed to take or has been taken upon, the result of such inspection or inquiry.
- (9) Where the Executive Council or the management does not within a reasonable time, take action to the satisfaction of the Visitor, the Visitor may, after considering any explanation furnished or representation made by the Executive Council or management, issue such directions as he may think fit and the Executive Council or management as the case may be, shall comply with such directions.
- (10) Without prejudice to the foregoing provisions of this section, the Visitor may, by order in writing annul any proceedings of the University which is not in conformity with this Act, the Statutes or Ordinances:

Provided that before making any such order, he shall call upon the University to show cause why such an order should not be made, and, if any cause is shown within a reasonable time, he shall consider the same.

(11) The Visitor shall have such other powers as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

Chief 9. The Governor of the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland Rector shall be the Chief Rector of the University.

Officers
of the
University.

- 10. The following shall be the officers of the University:-
 - (1) The Chai ellor:
 - (2) The Vice-Chancellor;
 - (3) The Pro-Vice-Chancelloss;
 - (4) The Deans of Schools;
 - (5) The Registrar;
 - (6) The Finance Officer; and
 - (7) Such other officers as may be declared by the Statutes to be officers of the University.

The

- Chancellor 11.(1) The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Visitor in such manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
 - (2) The Chancellor shall, by vittue of his office, be the Head of the University.
 - (3) The Chancellor shall, if present, preside at the convocations of the University held for conferring degrees.
- The Vice- 12.(1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Visitor in such namer as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
 - (2) The Vice-Chancellor shall be the principal executive and academic officer of the University, and shall exercise general supervision and control over the affairs of the University and give effect to the decisions of all the authorities of the University.

(3) The Vice-Chancellor may, if he is of opinion that immediate action is necessary on any matter, exercise any power conferred on any authority of the University by or under this Act and shall report to such authority the action taken by him on such matter:

Provid d that if the authority concerned is of opinion that such action ought not to have been taken, it may refer the matter to the .

Visitor whose decision thereon shall be final:

Provided further that any person in the service of the University who has aggrieved by the action taken by the Vice-Chancellor under this sub-section shall have the right to appeal aga-inst such action to the Executive Council within three months from the date on which decision on such action is communicated to him and thereupon the Executive Council may confirm, modify or reverse the action taken by the Vice-Chancellor.

(4) The Vice=Chancellar shall exercise such other powers and perform such other functions as may be prescribed by the Statutes or Ordinances.

The Pro-Vice-Chancellors. 13. Every Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed im such ma-nner and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

Deans
of
Schools.

14. Every Dean of a School shall be appointed in such manner and shall exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

The 15.(1) The Registrar shall be appointed in such Registrar.

manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

(2) The Registrar shall have the power to enter into agreements, sign documents and authenticate records on behalf of the University and shall exercise such other powers and perform such other duties as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

The Finance Officer.

16. The Finance Officer shall be appointed in such manner and shall exercise such powers and perform such dutés as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

Other Officers.

17. The manner of appointment and powers and duties of other officers of the University shall be prescribed by the Statutes.

Authorities of the University.

- 18. The following shall be the authorities of the University:-
 - (1) The Court;
 - (2) The Executive Council;
 - (3) The Academic Council:
 - (4) The Bourds of Schools; and
 - (5) Such other authorities as may be declared by the Statutes to be authorities of the University.

The Court.

- 19.(1) The constitution of the Court and the term of office its members shall be prescribed by the Statutes.
 - (2) Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Court shall have the following powers and functions, namely:
 - (a) to review, from time to time, the broad policies and programmes of the University and to suggest measures for the improvement and development of the University;

- (b) to consider and pass resolutions on the annual report and the annual accounts of the University and the audit report on such accounts;
- (c) to advise the Visitor, in respect of any matter which may be referred to it for advice: and
- (d) to perform such other functions as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

The Executive Council.

- 20.(1) The Executive Council shall be the principal executive body of the University
 - (2) The constitution of the Executive Council, the term of office of its numbers and its powers and duties shall be prescribed by the Statutes.

The Academic Council.

- 21.(1) The Academic Council shall be the principal academic body of the University and shall subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes and Ordinances, co-ordinate and exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University.
 - (2) The constitution of the Academic Council, the term of office of its members and its powers and duties shallbe prescribed by the Statutes.

Other authorities of the University.

22. The constitution, powers and functions of the Boards of Schools and of such other authorities as may be declared by the Statutes to be authorities of the University, shall be prescribed by the Statutes.

Plann-ing Board

- of the University which shall advise generally on the planning and development of the University and keep under review the standard of education and research in the University.
 - (2) The Planning Board shall consist of -
 - (a) the Vice-Chancellor, who shall be the Chairman, and
 - (b) not more than eight persons of high academic standing who shall be appointed in such manner as may be prescribed by the Statutes.
 - (3) The Visitor may determine a date with effect from which the Planning Board shall stand dissolved.

lower to rake Statutes.

- 24. Subject to the provisions of this Act, the Statutes may provide for all or any of the following matters, namely:-
 - (a) the constitution, powers and functions of the authorities and other bodies of the University as may be prestituted from time to time:
 - (b) the election and continuance in office of the members of the said authorities and bodies, the filling of vacancies of members, and all other matters relative to those authorities and other bodies for which it may be necessary or desirable to provide;
 - (c) the appointment, powers and duties of the officers of the University and their emoluments;
 - (d) the appointment of teachers of the University and other academic staff and their emoluments;

- (e) the appointment of teachers and other academic staff working in any other University or organisation for a specified period for undertaking a joint project;
- (f) the conditions of service of employees including provision for pension, insurance, and provident fund, the manner of termination of service and disciplinary action;
- (g) the principles governing seniority of service of employees:
- (h) the procedure for arbitration in cases of dispute between thiployees or students and the Univers-ity;
- (i) the procedure for appeal to the Executive Council by any employee or student against the action of any officer or authority of the University;
- (j) the establis-hment and recognition of Students' Union or Associations of teachers, aca-denic staff or other employees;
- (k) the participation of students in the affairs of the University;
- (1) the conferment of honorary degrees;
- (m) the withdrawal of degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions:
- (n) the institution of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, medals and prizes;
- (o) the maintenance of discipline among the students;
- (p) the establishment and abolition of Schools, Departments, Halls, Colleges and Institutions:
- (q) the conditions under which Colleges and Institutions may be admitted to the privileges of the University and the withdrawal of such privileges:
- (r) the delegation of powers vested in the authorities or officers of the University; and
- (s) all other matters which by this Act are to be, or may be provided by the Statutes.

Statutes how made.

- 25.(1) The first Statutes are those set out in the Schedule.
 - (2) The Executive Council may, from time to time make new or additional Statutes or may amend or repeal the Statutes referred to in subsection(1):

Provided that the Executive Council shall not make, amend or repeal any Statute affecting the status, powers or constitution of any authority of the University until such authority has been given an opportunity of expressing an opinion, in writing on the proposed changes, and any opinion so expressed shall be considered by the Executive Council.

- (3) Every new Statute or addition to the Statutes or any amendment or repeal! of a Statute shall require the approval of the Visitor, who may assent thereto or withhold assent or remit to the Executive Council for consideration.
- (4) A new Statute or a Statute amending or repealing an existing Statute shall have no validity unless it has been assented to by the Visitor.
- (5) Notwithstanding anything contained in the foregoing sub-sections, the Visitor may make new or additional Statutes or anend or repeal! the Statutes referred to in subsection (1) during the period of three years immediately after the commencement of this Act.

Provided that the Visitor may, on the expiry of the said period of three years make, within one year from the date of such expiry, such detailed Statutes as the may consider necessary and such detailed Statutes shall be laid before both Houses of Parliament.

- Ordina-nces. 26.(1) Subject to the provisions of this Act, and the Statutes, the Ordinances may provide for all or any of the following matters, namely:-
 - (a) the admission of students to the University and their enrolment as such;
 - (b) the courses of study to be laid down for all degrees, diplomas and certific term of the University:
 - (c) the nedium of instruction and examination;
 - (d) the award of degrees, diplomas, certificates and other academic distinctions, the qualifications for the same and the means to be taken relating to the granting and obtaining of the same:
 - (e) the fees to be charged for courses of study in the University and for admission to the examinations, degrees and diplomast of the University;
 - (f) the conditions of award of fellowships, scholarships, studentships, medals and prizes;
 - (g) the conduct of examinations, including the term of office and of appointment and the duties of examining bodies, examinors and moderators;
 - (h) the conditions of residence of the students of the University:
 - (i) the special arrangements, if any, which nay be made for the residence, discipline and teaching of women students and the prescribing of special courses of studies for them;

- (j) the appointment and encluments of employees other than those for whom provision has been made in the Statutes:
- (k) the establishment of Centres of Studies,
 Boards of Studies, Special Centres,
 specia-lised laboratories and other
 Conmittees:
- (m) the creation, composition and functions of any other body which is considered necessary for improving the academic life of the University;
- (n) such other terms and conditions of service of teachers and other academic staff as are not prescribed by the Statutes;
- (o) the management of Colleges and Institutions established by the University;
- (p) the supervision and nanagement of Colleges and Institutions admitted to the privileges of the University; and
- (q) all other matters which by this Act or the Statutes may be provided for by the Ordinances.
- (2) The first Ordinances shall be made by the Vice-Chan-cellor with the previous approval of the Central Government and the Ordinances so made may be amended, repealed or added to at any time by the Executive Council in the manner prescribed by the Statutes.
- Regulations 27. The authorities of the University may make
 Regulations consistent with this Act, the
 Statutes and the Ordinances for the conduct of
 their own business and that of the Committees
 appointed by them and not provided for by this
 Act, the Statutes or the Ordinances in the
 manner prescribed by the Statutes.

Annual Report

- 28.(1) The annual report of the University shall be prepared under the direction of the Executive Council and shall be submitted to the Court on or after such date as may be prescribed by the Statutes and the Court shall consider the report in its annual meeting.
 - (2) The Court shall submit the annual report to the Visitor along with its comments, if any.

Annual accounts.

- 29.(1) The annual accounts and balance-sheet of the University shall be prepared under the directions of the Executive Council and shall once at least every year and at intervals of not more than fifteen months be audited by the Comptroller and Auditor-General of India.
 - (2) The angual accounts when audited shall be published in the Gazette of India and a copy of the accounts together with the report of the Comptroller and Auditor-General shall be submitted to the Court and the Visitor along with the observations of the Executive Council.
 - (3) Any observations made by the Visitor on the annual accounts shall be brought to the notice of the Court and the observations of the Court, if any, shall, after being considered by the Executive Council, be submitted to the Visitor.

Conditions of service of employ-

- 30.(1) Every employee shall be appointed under a written contragt which shall be lodged with the University and a copy of which shall be furnished to the employee concerned.
 - (2) Any dispute arising out of a contract between the University and any employee shall, at the req-uest of the employee, be referred to a

Tribunal of Arbitration consisting of one member appointed by the Executive Council, one member nomin ated by the employee concerned and an umpire appointed by the Visitor. The decision of the Tribunal shall be final, and no suit shall lie in any civil court in respect of the natiers decided by the Tribunal. Every such request shall be deemed to be a submission to arbitration upon the terms 1940 of this Section within the meaning of the Abbitration Act, 1940.

Proce— 31.(dure of appeal and arbitration in disciplinary cases against students.

- 31.(1) Any student or candidate for an emamination whose name has been removed from the rolls of the University by the orders or resolution of the Vice-Chancellor, Discipline Committee or Examination Committee, as the case may be and who has been debarred from appearing at the examinations of the University for more than one year, may, within ten days of the date of receipt of such orders or copy of such resolution by him, appeal to the Executive Council and the Executive Council may confirm, modify or reverse the decision of the Vice
 Chancellor or the Committee, as the case may be.
 - (2) Any dispute arising out of any disciplinary action taken y the University against a student shall, at the request of such student, be referred to a Tribunal of Arbitration and the provisions of sub-section (2) of Section 30 shall, as far as may be, apply to a reference made under this sub-section.

Right to appeal.

52. Every employee or student of the University or of a College or Institution shall notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, have a right to appeal, within such time as may be prescribed

by the Statutes, to the Executive Council against the decision of any officer or authority of the University or of the Principal or the management of any College or Institution, as the case may be, and thereupon the Executive Council may confirm, modify or revers the decision appealed against.

Provident 33.(1) The University shall constitute for the benefit and of its employees such pension or provident funds.

fund or provide such insurance schemes as it may deem fit in such manner and subject to such conditions as may be prescribed by the Statutes.

(2) Where such provident or pension fund has been so constituted the Central Government may declare that the provisions of the Provident Funds Act, 1925 shall apply to such fund as if it were a Government provident fund.

as to constitution of University authorities and Bodies.

34. If any q-uestion arises as to whether any person has been duly elected or appointed as, or is entitled to be a member of any authority or other body of the University, the matter shall be referred to the Visitor whose decision thereon shall be final.

Constitution of Committees.

35. Where any authority of the University is given power by this Act or the Statutes to appoint Committees such Committees shall, save as otherwise provided consist of the members of the authority concerned and of such other persons (if any) as the authority in such case may think fit.

Filling of casual vacancies.

(Other than ex-officio members) of any Authority or other body of the University shall be filled, as soon as conveniently may be, by the person or body who appointed elected or co-opted the member whose place has become vacant and the person appointed elected or co-opted to a casual vacancy shall be a member of such authority or body for the residue of the term for which the person whose place be fills would have been a member.

Proceedings of University authorities or bodies not invalidated by vacancies.

37. No act or proceedings of any authority or other body of the University shall be invalidated merely by reason of the existence of a vacancy or vacancies among its members.

Protection of action taken in good faith.

58. No suit or other legal proceedings shall lie aga-inst any officer or employee, of the University for anything which is in good faith done or intended to be done in pursuance of any of the provisions of this Act, the Sta-tutes or Ordinances.

Mode of proof of University record.

39. A copy of any receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding, resolution of any authority or Committee of the University, or other documents in possession of the University, or any entry in any register duly maintained by the University, if certified by the Registrar, shall be received as prima facie evidence of such receipt, application, notice, order, proceeding or resolution documents or the existence of entry in the register and

shall be admitted as evidence of the matters and transactions therein where the original thereof would, if produced, have been admissible in evidence, notwithstanding anything contained in the Indian Evidence Act, 1872 or in any other law for the time being in force.

Power to remove difficulties.

40. If any difficulty arises in giving effect to the provisions of this Act, the Central Government may, by order published in the Official Gazette, make such provisions, not inconsistent with the provisions of this Act, as appear to it to be necessary or expedient for removing the difficulty.

Provided that no such content shall be made under this Section after the expiry of three years from the commencement of this Act.

41. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Transitional Act and the Statutes - provisions.

- (a) the first Chancellor and the first
 Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by
 the Visitorand each of the said officers
 shall hold office for a term of five
 years;
- (b) the first Registrar and the first
 Finance Officer shall be appointed by
 the Visitor and each of the said officers
 shall hold office for a term of three

- (c) the first Coart and the first Executive Council shall consist of not more than thirty members and eleven members respectively, who shall be nominated by the Visitor and shall hold office for a term of three years;

- (e) the first Academic Council shall consist of not more than twenty-one members, who shall be nominated by the Visitor and sha-11 hold office for a term of three years.

Provided that if any vacancy occurs in the above offices or authorities, the same shall be filled by appointment or nomination, as the case may be, by the Vibitor, and the person so appointed or nominated shall hold office for so long as the officer or member in whose place he is appointed or nominated would have held office, if such vacancy had not occurred.

Completion of courses of students in Colleges or Institutions affiliated to the University.

42. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Act, or in the Statutes or the Ordinances, any student of a College or Institution, who, immediately before the admission of such College or Institution to the privileges of the North-Eastern Hill University, was studying for a degree, diploma or certificate of the Gauhati University, shall be permitted by the North_Eastern Hill University to complete his course for that degree, diploma or certificate, as the case may be, and the North-Eastern Hill University and such College or Institution shall provide for the instruction and examination of such student in accordance with the syllabus of studies of the Gauhati University.

The Vice-Chancellor

- 1.(1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be a whole-time salaried officer of the University.
- 2. The Vice-Chancellor shall hold office for a term of five years from the date on which he enters upon his office and shall be eligible for re-appointment for not more than another term:

Provided that notwithstanding the expiry of the said period of five years he shall continue in office until his successor is appointed and enters upon his office:

Provided further that the Visitor may direct that a Vice-Chancellor, whose term of office has expired shall continue in office for such period not exceeding a total period of one year, as may be specified in the direction.

- (3) Notwithstanding anything contained in clause (2), a person appointed as Vice-Chancellor shall, if he completes the age of sixty-five years during the term of his office or any extension thereof, retire from office
- (4) The emoluments and other terms and conditions of service of the Vice-Chancellor shall be as follows:
- ** *(i) There shall be paid to the Vice-Chancellor a salary of two thousand and five hundred rupees per mensem and he shall be entitled without payment of rent, to use a furnished residence throughout his term of office and no charge shall fall on the Vice-Chancellor personally in respect of the maintenance of such residence.

****(ii) The Vice-Chancellor shall not be entitled to the benefits of the University Provident Fund:

Provided that where an employee of -

- (a) the University or College or Institution mainta-ined by, or an filtated to it; o.
- (b) any other University of College or Institution maintained by, or affiliated to that University,

is appointed as Vice-Chancellor, he shall be allowed to continue to contribute to the provident fund to which he is a subscriber, and the contribution of the University shall be limited to what he had been contributing immediately before his appointment as Vice-Chancellor.

- (iii) The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to travelling allowances at such rates as may be fixed by the Executive Council.
 - (iv) The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to leave on full pay for one-elevent of the period spent by a monactive service.
 - (v) The Vice-Chancellor shall also be ontitled, on medical grounds or otherwise, to leave without pay for a period not exceeding three months during the term of his office:

Provided that such leave may be converted into leave on full pay to the ex-tent to which he is entitled to leave under sub-clause (iv).

(5) If the office of the Vice-Chancellor becomes vacant due to death, resignation or otherwise if he is unable to perform his duties owing to absence, illness or any other cause, the Pro-Vice-Cha-ncellor or if there is more than one Pro-Vice-Chancellor, the senior-most Pro-Vice-Chancellor, shall perform the duties of the Vice-Chancellor until a new Vice-Chancellor assumes office or until the existing Vice-Chancellor attends to the duties of his office, as the case may be:

Provided that if a Pro-Vice-Chancellor is not available, the senior-most Professor shall perform the duties of the Vice-Chancellor.

- 2.(1) The Vice-Chancellor shall be ex-officio Chairman of the Court, the Executive Council, the Academic Council and the Finance Committee, and shall, in the absence of the Chancellor preside over at the Convocations of the University held for conferring dogrees. The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to be present at, and to address, any meeting of any authority or other body of the University, but shall not be entitled to vote thereat unless he is a member of such authority or body.
 - (2) It shall be the duty of the Vice-Chancellor to see that this Act, these Statutes, the Ordinances and the Regulations are duly observed, and he shall have all powers necessary to ensure such observance.
 - (3) The Vice-Chancellor shall have the power to convene or cause to be convened meetings of the Court, the Executive Council, the Academic Council and the Finance Committee.

Pro-Vice-Chancellors 3.(1) Every Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor:

Provided that where the recommendation of the Wice-Chancellor is not accepted by the Executive Council, the matter shall be referred to the Visitor who may, either appoint the person recommended by the Vice-Chancellor or ask the Vice-Chancellor to recommend another person to the Executive Council:

Provided further that the Executive Council may, on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, appoint a Professor to discharge the duties of a Pro-Vice-Chancellor in addition to his own duties as a Professor.

(2) The term of office of a Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall be such as may be decided by the Executive Council but it shall not in any case exceed five years or until the expiration of the term of office of the Vice-Chancellor, whichever is earlier, and he shall be eligible for re-appointment:

Provided that a Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall retire on attaining the age of sixty-five years.

- (3) The emoluments and other terms and conditions of service of a Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall be such as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
- (4) A Pro-Vice-Chancellor shall assist the Vice-Chancellor in respect of such matters as may be specified by the Vice-Chancellor in this behalf, from time to time, and shall also exercise such powers and perform such duties as may be ass-igned or delegated to him by the Vice-Chancellor.

Registrar

4. (1) The Registrar shall be a whole-time salaried officer of the University. *See Page - 75

(2) The emoluments and other terms and conditions of service of the Registrar shall be such as may be prescribed by the Ordinances:

Provided that the Registrar shall retire on attaining the age of six y years:

Provided further that a Registrar shall, notwithstanding his attaining the age of sixty years, continue in office until his successor is appointed and enters upon his office or until the expiry of a period of one year whichever is earlier.

- (3) When the office of the Registrar is vacant or when the Registrar is, by reason of illness, absence or any other cause, unable to perform the duties of his office, the duties of the office shall be performed by such person as the Vice-Chancellor may appoint for the purpose.
- (4) (a) The Registrar shall have power to take disciplinary action against such of the employees, excluding teachers and academic staff, as may be specified in the orders of the Executive Council and to suspend them pending inq-uiry, to administer warnings to them or to impose on them the penalty of censure or the withholding of increment:

Provided that no such penalty shall be imposed unless the person concerned has been given a reasonable opportunity of showing cause against the action proposed to be taken in regard to him.

- (b) An appeal shall lie to the Vice-Chancellor, against any order of the Registrar imposing any of the penalties specified in sub-clause (a).
- (c) In a case where the inquiry discloses that a punishment beyond the powers of the Registrar is called for, the Registrar shall, upon conclusion of the inquiry, make a report to the Vice-Chancellor along with his recommendations:

Provided that an appeal shall lie to the Executive Council against an order of the Vice-Chancellor imposing any penalty.

- (d) to conduct the official correspondence of the Court, the Executive Council and the Academic Council;
- (e) to arrange for and superintend the examinations of the University in accordance with the manner prescribed by the Ordinances;
- (f) to supply to the Visitor, copies of the agenda of the meetings of the authorities of the University as soon as they are issued and the minutes of such meetings;
- (g) to represent the University in sutterproceedings by or against the University, sign powers of attorney and verify pleadings or depute his representative for the purpose; and
- (h) to perform such other duties as may be specified in these Statutes the Ordinances or the Regulations or as may be required, from time to time by the Executive Council or the Vice-Chancellor.



- (4) The Finance Officer shall be ex-officio Secretary of the Finance Committee, but shall not he deemed to be a member of such Committee.

 - (a) exercise general supervision over the funds of the University and shall advise it a regards its financial policy; and
 - (b) perform such other financial functions as may be assigned to him by the Executive Council or as may be prescribed by those Statutes or the Ordinance:

Provided that the Finance Officer shall not incur any expenditure or make any investment exceeding ten thousand rupees without the . previous approval of the Executive Council.

- (6) Subject to the control of the Executive Council the Finance Officer shall,-
 - (a) hold and manage the property and investments of the University including trust and endowed i property;
 - (b) ensure that the limits fixed by the Executive Council for recurring and non-recurring expenditure for a year are not exceeded and that all moneys are expended on the purposes for which they are granted or allotted;

- (c) be responsible for the preparation of annual accounts and the budget of the University and for their presentation to the Executive Council;
- (d) keep a constant watch on the state of the cash and bank balances and on the state of investmens:
- (e) watch the progress of the collection of revenue and advise on the methods of collection employed;
- (f) ensure that the registers of buildings lands, furniture and equipment are maintained up-to date and that stock-checking is conducted, of equipment and other consumable materials in all offices Special Centres, specialised laboratories, Colleges and Institutions maintained by the University;
- (g) call for explanation for unauthorised expenditure and for other financial irregularities and suggest disciplinary action against persons at fault; and
- (h) call for from any office, centre, laboratory, College or Institution maintained by the University, any information or returns that he may consider necessary for the performance of his duties.
- (7) The receipt of the Finance Officer or of the person or persons duly authorised in this behalf by the Executive Council for any money payable to the University shall be sufficient. discharge for payment of such money.
 - 6. (1) Every Dean of a School of Studies shall be appointed by the Vice-Chanceller from among the Professors in the School for a period of three years and he shall be eligible for re-appointment.



Deans of Schools of Studies. Provided that a Dean on attining the age of sixty years shall cease to held office as such:

Provided further that if/any time there is no Professor in a School, the Vice-Chancellor, or a Pro-Vice-Chancellor if authorised by the Vice-Chancellor in this behalf, shall exercise the powers of the Dean of the School.

- (2) When the office of the Dean is vacant or when the Dean is, by reason of illness, absence or any other cause, unable to perform the duties of his office, the duties of the office shall be performed by such person as the Vice-Chancellor may appoint for the purpose.
- (3) The Dean shall be the Head of the School and shall be responsible for the conduct and maintenance of the standards of teaching and research in the School. The Dean shall have such other functions as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
- (4) The Dean shall have the right to be present and to speak at any neeting of the Boards of Studies or Committees of the School, as the case may be, but shall not have the right to vote themselves he is a nember thereof.

7. (1) In the case of Departments which have more than one Professor, the Head of the Department shall be appointed by the Executive Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor from among the Professors.

(2) In the case of Departments where there is only one Professor, the Executive Council shall have the option to appoint, on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, eather the Profess-or or a Reader as the Head of the Department.

Provided that it shall be opened to a Professor or a Reader to decline the offer of appointment as the Head of the Department.

- (3) A parson appointed as the Head of the Department shall hold office as such for a period of three years and shall be eligible for re-appointment.
- (4) A Head of a Department may resign his office at any time during his tenure of office.
- (5) A Head of a Department shall perform such functions as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
- 8. (1) Every Dean of Students' Wolfare shall be appointed from amongst the teachers of the University, not below the rank of a Reader, by the Exocutive Council on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (2) Every Dean appointed under clause (1) shall be a whole time officer and shall hold office for a term of three years and shall be eligible for re-appointment;

Provided that the Executive Council may, if it is considered necessary, appoint, on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor, a teacher, not below the ra-nk of a Reader, to discharge the duties of the Luan of Students Welfare in addition to his duties as such teacher, and in such a case, the Executive Council may sanction a suitable allowance to be paid to him.

(3) A person who is appointed as a Dean of Students' Welfare shall continue to hold his lien on his substantive post and shall be eligible to all the benefits that would have otherwise accrued to him, but for his appointment as the Dean of Students' Welfare.

- (a) to exercise general supervision over the academic policies of the University and to give directions regarding methods of instruction, co-operative teaching among Colleges and Institutions, evaluation of research or improvements in academic standards;
- (b) to bring about inter-School Co-ordination, to establish or appoint Committees or Boards, for taking up projects on an inter-School basis;
- (c) to consider matters of general academic interest either on its own initiative or on a reference by a School or the Executive Council and to take appropriate action thereon; and
- (d) to frame such regulations and rules consistent with these Statutes and the Ordinances regarding the academic functioning of the University, discipline, residences, admissions, award of fellowships and studentships, fee. concessions, corporate life and attendance.
- 16.(1) The members of the Planning Board shall be
 The Planning appointed by the Visitor and shall hold office
 Board.

- (2) The Planning Board, shall in addition to all other powers vested in it by this Act, have the right to advise the Executive Council and the Academic Council on any academic matter.
- (3) On the date determined by the Visitor under sub-section (3) of Section 23 this Statute shall coase to have effect.

17. Schools of Studies and Departments.

- (1) The University shall have such Schools of Studies as may be specified by the Ordinances.
- (2) Every School shall have a School Board. The members of the first School Board shall be nominated by the Executive Council and shall hold office for a period of three years.
- (3) The powers and functions of a School Board sha 11 be prescribed by the Ordinances.
- (4) The conduct of the meetings of a School Board and the quorum required for such meetings shall be prescribed by the Ordina-nces.
- (5) (a) Each School shall consist of such
 Departments as may be assigned to it
 by the Ordinances.
 - (b) No Department shall be established or abolished except by these Statutes:

Provided that the Executive Council may, on the recommendation of the Academic Council, establish Centres of Studies to which may be assigned such teachers of the University as the Executive Council may consider necessary.

- (c) Each Department shall consist of the following members namely:-
 - (i) teachers of the Department:
 - (ii) persons conducting research in the Department;
 - (iii) Dean of the School or Deans of the Schools concerned;
 - (iv) honorary Professors, if any, attached to the Department's and
 - (v) such other persons as may be members of the Department in accordance. with the provisions of the Ordinances.
- Boards of Studies, one for Post-Graduate Studies and the other for Under-Graduate S tudies.
 - (2) The constitution of a Board of Post-Graduate Studies and the term of office of its members shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
 - (3) The functions of a Board of Post-Graduate
 Studies shall be to approve sabjects for
 research for various degrees and other
 requirements of research degrees and to
 recommend to the concerned School Board
 in the manner prescribed by the Ordinances:-
 - (a) courses of studies and appointment of examiners for Post-Graduate courses, but excluding research degrees;
 - (b) appointment of supervisors of research; and
 - (c) measures for the improvement of the standard of post-graduate teaching and research.

Provided that the above functions of a Board of Post-Gra-duate Studies shall, during the period of three years immediately after the commencement of this Act, be performed by the Department.

- (4) The constitution and functions of a Fourd of Under-Graduate Studies and the term of office of its members shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
- 19. (1) The Finance Committee shall consist of the Finance following members, namely:-
 - (i) The Vice-Chancellor:
 - (ii) & Pro-Vice-Chancellor appointed by the Executive Council;
 - (111) Three persons nominated by the Executive Council, out of whom at least one shall be a member of the Executive Council; and
 - (iv) Three persons nominated by the Visitor.
 - (2) Five members of the Finance Committee shall form a quorum for a meeting of the Finance Committee.
 - (3) All the members of the Finance Committee, other than ex-officio members, shall hold office for a term of three years.
 - (4) A memb-er of the Finance Committee, shall have the right to record a minute of dissent if he does not agree with any decision of the Finance Committee.
 - (5) The Finance Committee shall meet at least twice every year to examine the accounts and to scrutinise proposals for expenditure.
 - (6) The annual accounts and the financial estimates of the University prepared by the Finance Officer shall be laid before the Finance Committee for consideration and comments and thereafter submitted to the Executive Council for approval.

(7) The Finance Committee shall recommend limits for the total recurring expenditure and the total non-recurring expenditure for the year, based on the income and resources of the University (which, in the case of productive works, may include the proceeds of loans).

Selection .

- 20.(1) There shall be Selection Committees for making recommendations to the Executive Council for appointment—to the posts of Professor, Reader, Lecturer, Librarian and Principals of Colleges and Institutions maintained by the University.
 - (2) The Selection Committee for appointment to the posts specified in column 1 of the Table below shall consist of the Vice-Chancellor, a Pro-Vice-Chancellor appointed by the Executive Council, a nominee of the Visitor and the persons specified in the corresponding entry in column 2 of the said Table:

Reader/ Lecturer (i) The Head of the Department concerned.

- (ii) One Professor to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
- (iii) Two persons not in the service of the University, nominated by the Executive Council, out of a panel of names recommended by the Academic Council for their special knowledge of or interest in the subject with which the Reader or Lecturer will be concerned.

Librarian

- (i) Two persons not in the service of the University, who have special knowledge of the subject of Library Science/Library Administration to be nominated by the Executive Council.
- (ii) One person, not in the service of the University, nominated by the Executive Council.

Principal of College of Institution maintaned by the University.

Three persons not in the service of the University of whom two shall be nomine-ted by the Executive Council and one by the Academic Council for their special know-ledge of or interest in a subject in which instruction is being provided by the College or Institution.

- NOTE 1: Where the appointment is being made for an inter-disciplinary project, the Head of the project shall be deemed to be the Head of the Department concerned.
- NOTE 2: The Professor to be nominated shall be a Professor concerned with the speciality for which the selection is being made and that the Vice-Chancellor shall consult the Head of the Department and the Dean of School before nominating the Professor.

- (3) The Vice-Chancellor, or in his absence, the senior-most Pro-Vice-Chancellor, shall preside at the meetings of a Solection Committee.
- (4) The meetings of a Selection Committee shall be convened by the Vice-Cha-ncellor or in his absence, by the senior-most Pro-Vice-Chancellor.
- (5) The procedure to be followed by a Selection Committee in making recommendations shall be laid down in the Ordinan-ces.
- (6) If the Executive Council is unable to accept the recommendations made by a Selection Committee, it shall record its reasons and submit the case to the Visitor for final orders.
- (7) Appointment to temporary posts shall be made in the manner indicated below :-
 - (i) If the temporary vacancy is for a duration longer than one academic session, it shall be filled on the advice of the Selection Committee in accordance with the procedure indicated in the foregoing clauses:

Provided that if the Vice-Cha-ncellor is satisfied that in the interests of work it is necessary to fill the vacancy, the appointment may be made on a purely temporary basis by a local Selection Committee referred to in sub-clause (ii) for a period not exceeding six months.

(ii) If the temporary vacancy is for a period less than a year, an appointment to such vacancy shall be made on the recommendation of a local Selection Committee consisting of the Dean of the School concerned, the Head of the Department and a nominee of the Vice-Chancellor.

Provided that if the same person holds the offices of the Dean and the Head of the Department the Selection Committee may contain two nominees of the Vice-Chancellor:

Provided further that in case of sudden casual vacancies of teaching posts caused by death or any other reason, the Dean may, in consultation with the Head of the Department concerned, make a temporary appointment for a month and report to the Vice-Chancellor and the Registrar about such appointment.

- (iii) No teacher appointed temperarily shall, if he is not recommended by a regular Selection Committee for appointment under these Statutes, be continued in service on such temporary employment, unless he is subseq-uently selected by a local Selection Committee or a regular Selection Committee, for a temporary or permanent appointment, as the case may be.
- 21.(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in Statute 20
 the Extecutive Council may invite a person of high
 academic distinction and professional attainments
 to accept a post of Professor or Reader or any
 other academic post in the University, as the
 case may be, on such terms and conditions as it
 may deem fit, and on the person agreeing
 to do so, appoint him to the post.
 - (2) The Executive Council may appoint a teacher or any other academic staff working in any other University or organisation for undertaking a joint project in accordance with the manner laid down in the Ordinances.

Appointment for a fixed tenure.

22. The Ex ecutive Council may appoint a person selected in accordance with the procedure laid down in Statute 20 for a fixed tenure on such terms and conditions as it deems fit.

Recognised teachers.

- 23.(1) The qualifications of recognised teachers shall be such as may be prescribed by the Ordinances.
 - (2) All applications for the recognition of teachers shall be made in such manner as may be laid down in the Ordinances.
 - (3) No teacher shall be recognised as a teacher ex-cept on the recommendation of a Selection Committee constituted for the purpose in the manner laid down in the Ordinances
 - (4) The period of recognition of a teacher shall be determined by Ordinances made in that behalf.
 - (5) The Academic Council may, by a special resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting, withdraw recognition from a teacher:

Provided that no such resolution shall be passed until a notice it writing has been given to the person concerned calling upon to him to show cause, within such time as may be specified in the notice, why such resolution should not be passed and until his objections, if any, and any evidence he may produce in support of them, have been considered by the Academic Council.

(6) Any person aggrieved by and order of withdrawal under clause (5) may, within three months from the date of communications to him of such order, appeal to the Executive Council which may pass such orders thereon as it thinks fit.

Committees.

24. Any authority of the Univers-ity may appoint as many standing or special committees as it may deem fit, and may appoint to such committees persons who are not members of such authority.

Any such committee may deal with any subject delegated to it subject to subsequent confirmation by the authority appointing it.

Terms and
Conditions of
service of
University
teachers

- 25.(1) All the teachers of the University, shall, in the absence of any agreement to the contrary, be governed by the terms and conditions off service as specified in these Statutes, the Ordinances and the Regulations.
 - (2) Every teacher of the University shall be appointed on a written contract, the form of which shall be prescribed by the Ordinanoes. A copy of the contract shall be deposited with the Registrar.

Seniority lists.

26.(1) Whenever, in accordance with these Statutes, any person is to hold an office or be a member of an authority of the University by rotation according to seniority, such seniority shall be determined according to the length of continuous service of such person in his grade, and, in accordance with such other principles as the Executive Council may, from time to time, prescribe.

- (2) It shall be the duty of the Registrar to prepare and maintain, in respect of each class of persons to whom the provisions of these Statutes apply a complete and up-to-date seniority list in accordance with the provisions of clause (1).
- (3) If two or more persons have equal length of continuous service in a particular grade or the relative seniority of any person or persons is otherwise in doubt, the Registrar may, on his own motion and shall, at the request of any such person, submit the matter to the Executive Council whose decision thereon shall be final.

Removal of

27.(1) Where there is an allegation of misconduct against a teacher, or a member of the academic staff, the Vice-Chancellor may, if he thinks fit, by order in writing, place the teacher under sus-pension and shall forthwith report to the Executive Council the circumstances in which the order was made.

Provided that the Executive Council may, if it is of the opinion, that the circumstances of the crae do not warrant the suspension of the teacher or a member of the academic staff, revoke such order.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the terms of his contract of service or of his appointment, the Executive Council shall be entitled to remove a teacher, or a member of the academic staff on the ground of misconduct.

- (3) Save as aforesaid, the Executive Council shall not be entitled to remove a teacher or a member of the academic staff except for good cause and after giving three months! notice in writing or on payment of three months! salary in lieu of notice.
- (4) No teacher or a member of the academic staff shall be removed under clause (2) or under clause (3) until he has been given a reasonable opportunity of showing cause against the action proposed to be taken in regard to him.
- (5) The removal of a teacher or a member of the academic staff shall require a two-thirds majority of the members of the Executive Council present and voting.
- (6) The removal of a teacher or a member of the Academic staff shall take effect from the date on which the order of removal is made:

Provided that where a teacher or a member of the academic staff is under suspension at the time of his removal, the removal shall take effect from the date on which he was placed under suspension.

(7) Notwithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, a teacher, or a member of the neadenic staff may resign by giving three months' notice in writing to the Executive Council or on payment of three months' salary in lieu thereof.

Removal of
employees other
than teachers of
the University.

- 28.(1) Notwithstanding anything contained in the terms of his contract of service or of his appointment, an employee, other than a teacher or a member of the academic staff may be removed by the authority which is competent to appoint the employee-
 - (a) if he is of unsound mind or is a denf-mute or suffers from contagious leprosy;
 - (b) if he is an undischarge insolvent;
 - (c) if he has been convicted by a court of law of any offence involving moral turpitude and sentenced in respect thereof to imprisonment for not less than six months;
 - (d) if he is otherwise guilty of misconduct:

Provided that no employee shall be removed from his office unless, a resolution to that effect is massed by the Executive Council by a majority of two-thirds of its members present and voting.

- (2) No employee shallbe removed under clause(1) until he has been given a measonable opportunity of showing cause against the action proposed to be taken in regard to him.
- (3) Where the removal of such employee is for a reason other than that specified in sub-clause (c) or sub-clause (d) of clause (1), he shall be given three months! notice in writing or paid three months! salary in lieu of such notice.

- (4) Notw-ithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, an employee, not being a teacher or a member of the academic staff, shall be entitled to resign,—
- (i) If he is a permanent employee, only after giving three months' notice in writing to the appointing authority or paying to the University three months' salary in lieu thereof;
- (ii) if he is not a permanent employee, only after giving one month's notice in writing to the appointing authority or paying to the University one month's salary in this lieu thereof:

Provided that such resignation shall take effect from the date on which the resignation is accepted by the appointing authority.

29.(1) The Executive Council may, on the recommendation of the Academic Council and by a resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting make proposals to the Visitor for the conferment of honorary degrees:

Provided that in case of emergency, the Executive Council may, on its own make such proposals.

(2) The Executive Council may, by a resolution passed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting withdraw, with the previous sanction of the Visitor, any honorary degrees conferred by the University.

Withdrawals of degrees, etc.

70. The Executive Council may, by a special resolution passed by a monajority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting, withdraw any degree or academic distinction conferred on, or any certificate or diploma granted to, any person by the University for good and sufficient cause:

Provided that no such resolution shall be passed until a notice in writing has been given to that person calling upon him to show cause within such time as may be specified in the notice why such a resolution should not be passed and until his objections, if any, and any evidence he may produce in support of them, have been considered by the Executive Council.

Maintenance of discipline among students of the University.

- 31.(1) All powers relating to the discipline and disciplinary action in relation to students of the University shall vest in the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (2) The Vice-Cha-ncellor may delegate all or any of his powers as he deems proper to a Proctor and to such other officers as he may specify in this behalf.
 - (3) Without prejudice to the generality of his powers relating to the maintenance of discipline and taking such action, as may seem to him appropriate for the maintenance of discipline, the Vice-Chancellor may in the exercise of his powers, by order, direct that any student or students be expelled, or rusticated, for specified period, or be not admitted

College, Institution or Department of the University for a stated period, or be punished with fine for an amount to be specified in the order, or be debarred from taking an examination or examinations conducted by the University, College, Institution or a Department for one or more years, or that the results of the student or students concerned in the examination or examinations in which he or they have appeared be cancelled.

- (4) The Principals of Colleges, Institutions,
 Heads of Special Centres, Deans of Schools
 of Studies and Heads of teaching Departments
 in the University shall have the authority
 to exercise all such disciplinary powers
 over the students in their respective
 Colleges, Institutions, Special Centres,
 Schools and teaching Departments in the
 University as may be necessary for the
 proper conduct of such Colleges, Institutions,
 Special Centres, Schools and teaching in the
 Departments.
- (5) Without prejudice to the powers of the Vice-Chancellor, the Principals and other persons specified in clause (4), detailed rules of discipline and proper conduct shall be made by the University. The Principals of Colleges, Institutions, Heads of Special Centres, Deans of Schools of Studies and Heads of teaching Department in the University may also make the supplementary rules as they doem necessary for the

aforesaid purposes. Every student shall be supplied with a copy of the rules made by the University and a copy of the supplementary rules shall be supplied to the students concerned.

- (6) At the time of admission, every student shall be "equired to sign a declaration to the effect that he submits himself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the Vice-Chancellor and other authorities of the Univers-ity.

- Admission of Colleges, etc., to the privileges of the University.
- 33.(1) Colleges and other Institutions situated
 within the jurisdiction of the University
 may be admitted to such privileges of the
 University as the Executive Council may
 leges
 decide on the following conditions, namely;
 - (i) Every such College of Institution shall have a regular_y constituted Governing Body, consisting of not more than fifteen persons approved by the Executive Council and including, among others two teachers of the University to be nominated by the Executive Council and three representatives of the teaching staff of whom the Principal of the College or Institution shall be one. The Procedure for appointment of members of the Governing Body and other matters affecting the management of a College or an institution shall be prescribed by the Ordinances:

Provided that the said condition shall not apply in the case of Colleges and Institutions maintained by Government which shall however, have an Advisory Committee consisting of not more than fifteen person which shall consist of, among others, three teachers including the Principal of the College or Institution, and two teachers of the University nominated by the Executive Council.

- (ii) Every such College or Institution shall satisfy the Executive Council on the following matters, namely :-
 - (a) the suitability and adequacy of its accommodation and equipment for teaching;
 - (b) the qualifications and adequacy of its teaching staff mathe conditions of their service;
 - (c) the arrangements for the residence, welfare, discipline and supervision of students;
 - (d) the adequacy of financial provision made for continued maintenance of the College or Institution; and
 - (e) such other matters as are essential for the maintenance of the sandards of University education.
- (iii) No College or Institution shall be admitted to any privileges of the University except on the recommendation of the Academic Council made after considering the report of a Committee of Inspection appointed for the purpose by the Academic Council.
 - (iv) Colleges and Institutions desirous of admission to any privileges of the University shall be required to intimate their intention to do so in writing so as to reach the Registrar not later than the 15th August, preceding the year from which permission applied for is to have effect.
 - (v) A College or an Institution shall not, without the previous permission of the Executive Council and the Academic Council, suspend instruction in any subject or course of study which it is authorised to teach and teaches.

(2) Appointment to the teaching staff and Principals of Colleges or Institutions admitted to the privileges of the University shall be made in the manner prescribed by the Ordinanees:

Provided that nothing in this clause shall apply to Colleges and Institutions maintained by Government.

(3) The service conditions of the administrative and other non-academic staff of every College or institution referred to in clause (2) shall be such as may be laid down in the Ordinances:

Provided that nothing in this clause shall apply to Colleges and Institutions maintained by Government.

- (4) Every College or Institution admitted to the privileges of the University shall be inspected at least once in every two academic years by a Committee appointed by the Academic Council, and the report of that Committee shall be submitted to the Academic Council, which shall forward the same to the Executive Council with such recommendations as it may deem fit to make. The Executive Council, after considering the report and the recommendations, if any of the Academic Council, shall forward a copy of the report to the Governing Body of the College or Institution with such remarks, if any, as it may deem fit, for suitable action.
- (5) The Executive Council may, after consulting the Academic Council, withdraw any privileges granted to a College or Institution, at any time it or siders that the College or Institution does not satisfy any of the conditions on the fulfilment of which the College or Institution was admitted to such privileges:

Provided that before any privileges are so withdrawn, the Governing body of the College or Institution concerned shall be given an opportunity to represent to the Executive Council why such action should not be taken.

- (6) Subject to the conditions set forth in clause (1), the Ordinances may prescribe -
 - such other conditions as may be considered necessary;
 - (ii) the procedure for the admission of Colleges and Institutions to the privileges of the University and for the withdrawal of those privileges.

Convocations

34. Convocations of the University for the conferring of degrees or for other purposes shall be held in such manner as may be prescribed by the Ordanances.

Acting Chairman of meetings 35. Where no provision is made for a President or Chai and to preside on a meeting of any authority of the University or any Committee of such authority or when the President or Chairman so provided for is absent, the members present shall elect one from among themselves to preside at such meeting.

Resignations

36. Any member, other than an ex-officio member of the Court, the Executive Council, the Academic Council or any other authority of the University or any Committee of such authority may resign by letter addressed to the Registrar and the resignation shall take effect as soon as such letter is received by the Registrar

Disqualifications

- 37.(1) A person shall be disqualified for being chosen as, and for being, a member of any of the authorities of the University -
 - (a) If he is of unsound wind or is a deatmute or suffers from contagious leprosy;
 - (b) if he is an undischarged insolvent;
 - (c) if he has been convicted by a court of law of an offence involving moral turpitude and sentenced in respect thereof to imprisonment for not less than six months.
 - (2) If any question arises as to whether a person is or had been subjected to any of the disqualifications mentioned in clause (1), the question shall be referred

for the decision of the disitor and his decision shall be final and no suit or other proceeding shall lie in any civil court against such decision.

Residence condition for membership and office

38. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, no person who is not ordinarily resident in India shall be eligible to be an officer of the University or a member of any authority of the University.

Membership of authorities by virtue of membership of other bodies. 39. Notwithstanding anything contained in these Statutes, a person who holds any post in the University or is a member of any authority or body of the University in his capacity as a member of a particular authority or body or as the holder of a particular appointment shall hold such office or membership only for so long as he continues to be a member of that particular authority or body or the holder of that particular appointment, as the case may be.

Alumni Association

- 40. (1) There shall be an Alumni Association for the University.
 - (2) The subscription for membership of the Alumni Association shall be prescribed by the Ordinances.
 - (3) No member of the Alumni Association shall be entitled to vote or stand for election unless he has been a member of the Association for at least one year prior to the date of the election and is a graduate of the University of at least five years' standing:

Provided that the condition relating to the completion of one year's membership shall not apply in the case of the first election. Ordinances how made.

- 41. (1) The first Ordinances made under subsection (2) of Section 26 may be amended repeal ed or added to at any time by the Executive Council in the manner specified below.
 - (2) No Or inance in respect of the matters enumerated in Section 26, other than those enumerated in clause (n) of sub-section (1) thereof, shall be made by the Executive Council unless a draft of such Ordinance has been proposed by the Academic Council.
 - (3) The Executive Council shall not have power to amend any draft of any Ordinance proposed by the Academic Council under clause (2), but may reject the proposal or return the draft to the Academic Council for re-consideration, either in whole or in part, together with any amendment which the Executive Council may suggest.
 - (4) Where the Executive Council has rejected or returned the draft of an Ordinance proposed by the Academic Council, the Academic Council may consider the
 - draft is re-affirmed by a majority of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting and more than half the total number of members of the Academic Council, the draft may be sent back to the Executive Council which shall either adopt it or refer it to the Visitor whose decision shall be final.

- (5) Every Ordinance made by the E-xecutive Council shall come into effect immediately.
- Council shall be submitted to the Visitor within two weeks from the date of its adoptic. The Visitor shall have the power to direct the University within four weeks of the receipt of the Ordinance to suspend the operation of any such Ordinance and he shall, as soon as possible inform the Executive Council about his objection to the proposed Ordinance. The Visitor may, after receiving the comments of the University, either withdraw the order suspending the Ordinance or disallow the Ordinance, and his decision shall be final.

Regulations.

- 42.(1) The authorities of the University may
 make Regulations consistent with this
 Act, and these Statutes and the Ordinances:-
 - (a) laying down the procedure to be observed at their meetings and the number of members required to form a quorum;
 - (b) providing for all matters which are required by this act, these Statutes or the Ordinances to be prescribed by Regulations;
 - (c) providing for all other matters solely concerning such authorities or committees appointed by them and not provided for by this Act, these Statutes or the Ordinances.

- (2) Every authority of the University shall make Regulations providing for the giving of notice to the members of such authority of the dates of meetings and of the business to be considered at meetings and for the keeping of a record of the proceedings of meetings.
- (3) The Executive Council may direct the amendment in such manner as it may specify of any Regulations made under this Statute or the annulment of any such Regulations

Delegations of powers

43. Subject to the provisions of this Act, and those letatutes, any officer or authority of the University may delegate his or its powers to any other officer or authority or person under his or its respective control and subject to the condition that overall responsibility for the exercise of the powers so delegated shall continue to vest in the officer or authority delegating such powers.

Amendments to the Act/Statutes/Ordinances of the North-Ea-stern Hill University

1. The following provise has been added to Statute 33(1)(iv) vide Ministry of Education, Government of India letter No.F.10-15/73-L.U dated 18th September, 1973:

"Provided that colleges and institutions desirous of admission to any privileges of the University during the academic years 1973-74 and 1974-75 shall be required to intimate their intention to do so in writing so as to reach the Vice-Chancellor not later than 15th September, 1973".

2. The following amendments have been made to the existing Statute 1(4)(i) and the first part of Statute 1(4)(ii) vide Ministry of Education, Government of India, letter No.F.1 0-42/75-Leg.Unit dated January 3, 1976:

Statute 1(4)(i):

"There shall be paid to the Vice-Chancellor a salary of three thousand rupees per mensem and he shall be entitled without payment of rent to use a furnished residence throughout his term of office and no charge shall fall on the Vice-Chancellor personally in respect of the maintenance of such residence.

Provided that the provision under sub-section 4(i) shall be deemed to have come into force from 19th July, 1973".

Sta-tute 1 (4)(11) - First part :

"(ii) The Vice-Chancellor shall be entitled to such terminal benefits and allowances as may be fixed by the Executive Council with the approval of the Visitor from time to time:"

Provided that

- The following Statutes and consequential amendments 3. have been made vide Government of India, Ministry of Education letter No.F.10-16/76 LU(U2) dated 17th July, 1976:
 - "1. These Statutes may be called the North-Hastern Hill University (Amendment) Statutes. 1976.
 - 2. In the Statutes set out in the Schedule to the North-Eastern Hill University Act. 1973 (24 of 1973),—
- Short title.
- (a) Statute i shall be re-numbered as Statute 1A and before iA as so re-numbered, the following Statute shall be inserted, namely, -- "a. These Statutes may be called the Morth-Eastern Hill University Statutes";
- (b) after Statute 10, the following Statute shall be inserted, namely,-

Court.

"10A(i) The Court shall consist of the following members, namely:-

Ex-Officio members

- (i) Chancellor, ex-officio. (ii) Vice-Chancellor, ex-officio
- (iii) Pro-Vice-Chancellor, if any, ex-officio
 - (iv) Dean of Students' Welfare, if any, ex-officio.
 - (v) Registrar, ex-officio.
 - (vi) Librarian, ex-officio.
- (vii) Proctor, if any, ex-officio.

Representatives of Schools and Departments

- (viii) Deans of Schools of Studies, ex-officio.
 - (ix) All Professors, ex-officio.
 - (x) Heads of Departments, who are not Professors, ex-officio.
 - (xi) Two Readers, who are not Heads of Departments, and two Lecturers to be appointed by rotation in the manner prescribed by Ordinances.

Representatives of affiliated colleges

- (xii) Seven Principals of colleges in the State of Meghalaya, four Principals of colleges in the State of Nagaland and three Principals of Colleges in the Union Territory of Mizoram by rotation according to seniority, which shall be determined with reference to the date of establishment of the colleges concerned, to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
- (xiii) Six teachers from affiliated colleges, out of which three will be from colleges in the State of Meghalaya, two from colleges in the State of Nagaland and one from colleges in the Union Territory of Migoram, to be nominated by the Visitor on the recommendation of the Vice-Chancellor.

Representatives of Parliament

(xiv) Six representatives of Parliament, four to be nominated by the Speaker of the Lok Sabha from among the members thereof and two to be nominated by the Chairman of the Rajya Sabha from among the members thereof.

Persons representing learned professions and special interests

(xv) Ten members representing learned professions and special interests including representatives of industry, commerce, trade unions, ba-nking and agriculture, to be nominated by the Visitor.

Representatives of the Registered Graduates

- (xvi) Six representatives of the Registered Graduates of the University to be elected in the manner prescribed by Ordinances.
- Explanation: For the purpose of this Clause, students who have graduated as regular students from the colleges now affiliated to the University, prior to the date of such affiliation, shall also be eligible to be registered.

Representatives of students

(xvii) Four students to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.

Other members

(2)

- (xviii) (a) Not more than five persons to be nominated by the Visitor.
 - (b) Not more than two persons to be nominated by the Chancellor.
 - (c) Not more than two persons to be nominated by the Chief Rector.

Representatives of the non-teaching staff

(xix) Two members of non-teaching staff to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.

Representatives of State Governments and Union Torritory Administrations

(xx) Two representatives of each of the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and one representative of the Union Territory of Mizoran to be nominated by the State Government concerned or, as the case may be, the Union Territory Administration.

Remaining members of the Executive Council

(xxi) Members of the Executive Council, who are not otherwise, members of the Court.

Provided that no employee of the University or of a college or institution affiliated to the University shall be eligible to be a member of the Court under Clauses (xiv), (xv), (xvi) or (xviii).

- (i) All members of the Court other than ex-officio members a-nd members representing students shall hold office for a term of three years.
- (ii) An ex-officio member shall cease to be a member of the Court as soon as he vacates the office by virtue of which he is such member.

Contd/...

- (iii) Members representing students shall hold office for a period of one year or till such time as they continue to be students, whichever is earlier.
 - (c) in clause (4) of Statute !1, for the words "Twelve members", the words "Thirty members" shall be substituted.
 - (d) for Statute 12, the following Statute shall be substituted namely:-

Executive Council.

- "12. The Executive Council shall consist of the following members, namely:-
 - (i) Vice-Chancellor, ex-officio.
 - (ii) Pro-Vice-Chancellor, if any, ex-officio.
 - (iii) Four Deans of Schools by rotation according to seniority; to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (iv) One Professor, other than a Dean by rotation according to seniority, to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (v) One Reader by rota-tion, according to seniority, to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (vi) Three Principals, one each from the colleges located in the State of Meghalaya, in State of Na-galand and the Union Territory of Miz-oram, by rotation, according to seniority, to be determined with reference to the date of establishment of the colleges concerned, to be nomina-ted by the Vice-Chancellor.
 - (vii) Directors in charge of Collegiate Education in the States of Meghalaya and Nagaland and the Union Territory of Mizoram.
 - (viii) Two members of the Court, to be nominated by the Visitor, none of whom shall be an employee of the University or a college or an institution affiliated to or recognised by the University.
 - (ix) Four persons to be nominated by the Visitor.

(2) All the members of the Executive Council other than ex-officio members chall hold office for 'a term of three years.

(3) Seven members of the Executive Council shall form a quorum for a meeting of the Executive Council".

Manner of election to various authorities.

(e) after Statute 36 the following Statute shall be inserted, namely:-

"36A Election of members to various authorities of the University, wherever provided in these Statutes shall be held in accordance with the system of proportional representation by means of single transferable vote".

STATUTE ON THE CONSTITUTION OF THE AGADEMIC COUNCIL

(As approved by the Visitor, vide Ministry's letter No.F.16-17/77-U.2 dated 26.5.78).

NORTH EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY (AMENDMENT) STATUTE 1978

Whereas it is necessary to make provision for the constitution of the Academic Council of the University and its terms of office and also to make consequential amendments to the Statutes of the University.

Therefore, the Executive Council in exercise of the powers under Section 25(2) of the North-Eastern Hill University Act, 1973, makes and amends the Statutes as follows:-

These S-tatutes may be called the North-Eastern Hill University (Amendment) Statutes, 1978.

In the Statute set out in the Schedule to the North-Eastern Hill University Act, 1973 (24 of 1973),-

(a) Statute 14 shall be renumbered as Statute 14A and before it is so renumbered, the . following shall be inserted as Statute 14.

Constitution of the Academic Council.

14(1) The Academic Council shall consist of the following members, namely:

Ex-officio members

- (i) Vice-Chancellor
- (ii) Pro-Vice-Chancellor, if any
- (iii) Deans of Schools
- (iv) Deans of Students' Welfare
- (v) Heads of Departments and Centres of Studies
- (vi) Librarian
- (vii) Principals of Colleges maintained by the University

Professors to be nominated by the Vice-Chancellor

(viii) All Professors, other than the Heads of Departments, and Centres to be nominated by the Vico-Chancellor

Contd/...

Principals of Affiliated Colleges

(ix) Six Principals of Colleges admitted to the privileges of the University - three from Meghalaya, two from Nagaland and one from Mizoram - to be nominated by the Vice-Chandellor by rotation according to seniority.

Representatives of teachers of the University

(x) Five teachers of the University other than those under (i) to (viii) above by rotation according to seniority, of which two shall be Readers and three Lecturers.

Visitor's Nominees

(xi) Four persons not being employees of the University or of a College or institution maintained by or affiliated to it to be nominated by the Visitor for their special knowledge

Representatives of teachers of affiliated colleges admitted to the privileges of the University

(x11) Six teachers of the colleges admitted to the privileges of the University - three from Meghalaya, two from Magaland and one from Mizaram - elected from amongst themselves.

Representatives of the Post-Graduate students of the University

- (xiii) Two PG students of the University one from Sciences and one from Humanities and one Research Scholar to be selected on academic nerit in the manner prescribed by an Ordinance.
- Term of office

 2. All members of the Academic Council, other than the ex-officio members, shall hold office for a term of three years.
 - (b) Statute 14A shall be substituted by the following:

Quorum Statute 14A

"Half of the total members of the Academic Council shall f-orm a quorum for a meeting of the Academic Council".

NORTH-EASTERN HILL UNIVERSITY STATUTE (AMENDMENT) 1978

(As approved by the Visitor vide Ministry's No. F.8-2/78.Desk(U) dated 14.6.78).

(To be incorporated into the First Schedule to the NEHU Act, 1973).

Definit on:

1. This Statute may be called the North Eastern Hill University Statute (Amendment) 1978.

Commencement:

- 2. This Statute shall come into force with immediate effect.
- The following shall be inserted as Statute 1A before the existing Statute 1:-

1 A

"The Chancellor

(1) The Chancellor shall be appointed by the Visitor from a panel of not less than three persons recommended by the Executive Council:

Provided that if the Visitor does not approve of any of the persons so recommended, he may call for fresh recommendations from the Executive Council:

- (ii) The Chancellor shall hold office for a term of five years and shall be eligible for re-appointment."
- 4. The following sub-chauses (ii) and (iii) shall be included in the existing Clause (1) of Statute 1 after re-numbering the Clause (1) as sub-clause (i):
 - (ii) "The Vice-Chancellor shall be appointed by the Visitor from a panel of not less than three persons who shall be recommended by a Committee consisting of three members:

Provided that, if the Visitor does not approve Contd/...

of any of the persons so recommended, he may call for fresh recommendations.

- (iii) "Two members of the Committee shall be persons not connected with the University or an institution recognised by, or associated with the University nominated by the Executive Council and one member shall be a person nominated by the Visitor who shall also be the Convener of the Committee".
- 5. The following words shall be added to the existing Clause (1) of Statute 4 after deleting the full stop:

"and shall be appointed by the Executive Council".

6. The following words shall be added to the existing Clause (1) of Statute 5 after deleting the full stop:

"and shall be appointed by the Executive Council".
