#### CHAPTER 1

#### Third Plan in Outline

1.1 The Punjab Third Plan consists essentially of a practical programme of work in various socio-economic fields and has been framed on the basis of the actual needs of the State. It is also realistic in the sense that it is within the capacity of the State to finance and to execute. At the same time, the Plan which in a broad sense is a continuation of the Second Plan is designed to ensure that the self-generating process in the economy will be strengthened and a base will be provided which will facilitate further growth in all the sectors.

- 1.2. Main objectives.—The main objectives of the State Third Plan are:—
  - (i) Sizeable increase in agricultural production, primarily through the provision of more irrigation facilities and measures for anti-waterlogging and flood control;
  - (ii) Steady diversification of the State economy with a distinct orientation towards industrial expansion;
  - (iii) Creation of additional employment opportunities to absorb at least the new entrants into the labour force ;
  - (iv) Adequate expansion of social services with particular emphasis on the extension of technical education facilities ;
  - (v) Substantial improvement in the socio-economic condition of the backward classes and of backward areas, especially the hill areas.

1.3. Size of the Plan.—The State Third Plan envisages an outlay of Rs 231.39 crores that is 40 % more than the outlay of Rs 162.68 crores for the Second Plan. While determining the total size of the Third Plan, the felt needs of each department were carefully assessed and then graded according to priorities. Another important consideration was to secure balanced development of the different parts of the State so that the disparities in matters of development should be reduced. The particular conditions obtaining in the different areas of the State, their comparative level of economic development and the possibilities for growth were carefully considered while making allocations to the various regions and districts. The hill area allocation for instance is Rs 22.59 crores out of a total of about Rs120 crores which is the aggreg te of such schemes as can be related to specific areas as distinct from 'non-breakable' schemes benefiting the entire State. On the basis of population alone the hill areas plan would be much lower than Rs 22.59 crores, which outlay represents a distinct weightage in favour of these areas.

1.4. The governing factors in providing outlay of this order for the State Third Plan have been the general framework of the national Plan, the actual needs of the population and the executing capacity of the administration. Only priority items have been included in the Plan and the physical targets envisaged bear a realistic relation to the financial provisions.

1.5. One of the main items is agricultural production in which field the State must endeavour to achieve the national targets through the expansion of irrigation and through extensive measures for flood control and anti-waterlogging. Another item deserving priority is power generation for meeting the needs of an expanding industrial sector. Emphasis has also been laid on technical education since technically qualified personnel are of first importance in the implementation of development schemes. Further more, attention has been given to improving economic and social conditions of backward classes, backward areas and hill regions. In

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1.7. It will be observed that Agriculture and Irrigation and Power have between themselves been allocated more than the Second Plan provision in the terms of percentage. The increase in allocation for Industries from Rs 934.16 lakhs in the Second Plan to Rs 1,440 10 lakhs is also significant and is indicative of the emphasis laid on the industrial development of the State during the Third Plan.

The physical targets fixed for the Third Plan on the basis of these financial allocations are shown in Annexure I.

**1.8.** The programme of agro-industrial development which emerges as the basic task of the State Plan will contribute to the realisation of the objectives adopted in the national Plan, viz. self-sufficiency in foodgrains, increased production of agricultural cor modities which are raw materials of industries, expansion of employment opportunities and rise in the national income of over 5 % per annum. It has been estimated that the employment potential of the Punjab Third Plan in the public sector is 7,82,827 man years. This consists of 1,02,841 (13 %) administrative personnel, 1,45,591 (18 %) technical personnel, 71,604 (9 %) skilled workers not included in the category of technical personnel and 4,66,863 (60 %) other personnel including labour and lower level Government employees. Another objective of planned development namely the reduction of inequalities in income and wealth and a more even distribution of economic opportunities is also sought to be achieved through such programmes as assistance to backward classes and the weaker sections of society. The social services of Education and Health included in the Plan will also help to bring within the reach of the backward classes facilities so far not available to them. In the matter of industrial development an effort will be made to promote initiative by providing financial assistance to such entrepreneurs as cannot establish industries on their own. In correcting regional imbalances special consideration has been given to the development of the hill areas and also 'o the backward districts by providing suitable weightages in matte s of plan allocation. Detailed measures taken in this regard have been indicated in a separate chapter.

1.9. Financial resources.—As has been indicated, the total outlay in the Third Plan has been fixed at Rs 231.39 crores, out of which the share of the Central Government is Rs 134 crores and of the State Rs 97.39 crores. The State share is proposed to be raised in the following manner —

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Additional taxation alone thus is expected to provide Rs 40 crores over the 5 year period roughly Rs 8 crores a year. Considering that the total tax revenue in the year 1960-61 was about Rs 34 crores, increase of Rs 8 crores will substantially raise the level of taxation. Another important head from which resources are expected to be mobilized is of small savings. It is hoped that the effort and participation of the people needed for raising these resources will be readily forthcoming and the Plan will be duly implemented in full measure.

1.10, Balanced development.—The long-term objective of planning is not only to achieve a high rate of growth in respect of economic development but also to spread progressively the advantages of economic growth over a wider area so as to ensure all round prosperity and progress. In the initial stages there is bound to be concentration of economic activity in various centres where either raw material, mineral resources or trained man power 1s available or in areas which have potentialities of future development. Again, resources being limited, investment is confined to points within the economy at which the returns are likely to be most favourable. Equally there are inherent limitations in distributing the plan outlay over different regions. For instance, the outlay for agricultural production has to be related to the irrigated area for each district, the type of crops sown and the specific problems in a particular locality; outlay on minor Irrigation will depend on the percentage of irrigated area, conditions as regards sub-soil water etc; and cairying and milk supply schemes will have to be related to various milk pockets and areas where there is concentration of cattle. Aga n, the extent to which further development is possible in a limited period of time is determined by the level of development alr advachieved in that areas. Different areas thus have different capacity for development at any point of time and there ore the allocations made to them must be related to this capacity if the resources are to be utilized properly.

1.11. Backward areas in the State fall into two c tegories. One consists of districts or par s of districts which are backward in economic development but do not form a contiguous and homogeneous region, while the other category comprises hill and sub-montane areas which are even more backward but are generally contiguous. The needs of the areas falling in the fir t category are being taken care of in the district-wise distribution of schemes which are implemented at the district level and below, and special weightage is given to them by making relatively higher allocations. The hill areas cover the two districts of Kangra and Simla. Dharkalan C.D. Block of Gurdaspur District, 8 C.D. Blocks in the district of Ambala and 13 C.D. Blocks in the district of Hoshiarpur which are sub montane, and for these areas a separate plan has been prepared. At the same time, since the allocation to the hill areas has to be made from the State Plan, a balance has to be struck between the just claims of these backward areas and the minimum essential requirements of the rest of the State. Again, the backwardness of the hill areas is in itself a limitation on further development and any attempt at accelerating the pace of development without consideration of the capacity of these areas to absorb investment is certain to result in either heavy shortfalls or waste and mis-application of allocations. The broad approach in formulating this plan has been to emphasis the development of means of communication, speeding up of soil conservation measures, expansion of education, diversification of agriculture and spread of small scale industries and increase in the supply of power. Emphasis has also been laid on the development of horticulture particularly in the Kulu Sub-Division.

1.12. The total allocation for these areas has been fixed at Rs 22.59 crores out of a total plan of Rs 231.39 crores. On the basis of population percentage, the hill areas would have been entitled to only Rs 18.5 crores and the difference between the actual allocation and the possible allocation on population percentage basis represents the weightage given to them. In order to make a realistic assessment of local needs and priorities and to ensure its effective implementation in the field, a distinct administrative set up has been devised for these areas. A whole time Development Commissioner has been appointed and he will be assisted by Regional Officers for departments like Agriculture, Industries, Minor Irrigation, Animal Husbandry and Co-operation. It is trusted that the development programme will thus receive special attention at all stages of implementation, and the targets will be duly achieved.

1.13. Administration and Plan Implementation.—The success of the Third Plan will depend partly on the efficiency with which it is implemented. The targets set out in the Plan require a concerted and determined effort on the part of the implementing agencies and the assumption is that an effort far exceeding that of the preceding decade will be made for their realisation. The burden on administration will increase many times and strengthening will be necessary at numerous points before the Plan can be effectively executed. 1.14. It may be noted that the implementing capacity of the State has been rising steadily during the past years. The yearly outlay and the expenditure during the Second Plan set out below indicate the position in this regard:---

1.15. This shows that the implementing capacity of the State has been rising from year to year. The level of expenditure increased from Rs 24.21 crores in 1956-57 to Rs 34.84 crores in 1960-61 and the corresponding percentage performance increased from 57% to 96% in relation to annual plan outlays. Even at this pace of improvement in the execution capacity, however, the various targets fixed for achievement during the Third Plan are not likely to be achieved without special efforts, for the outlay visualized in the Third Plan (Rs 231 crores) is very much higher than that fixed for the Second Plan (Rs 162 crores). The annual plan size during the Third Plan is likely to rise from about Rs 39 crores in the first year (as against Rs 36.40 crores in the last year of the Second Plan) to about Rs 55 crores in the fifth year. The build up necessary in the implementing capacity is very considerable and will require continuous attention at all times.

1.16. For assessing the progress of implementation the total financial outlay has been distributed over various components such as staff, buildings, machinery and equipment and loans, subsidies and grants. It will be seen that the items on which the bulk of expenditure will be incurred are staff and buildings, and it is in relation to them that the pace of planimplementation will need to be stepped up substantially. It will be necessary to ensure that bottlenecks in financial sanctions which delay execution are removed, and there is a continuous supply of trained personnel of the requisite calibre and experience.

1.17. In order to avoid delay in the issue of financial sanctions it has been decided to delegate financial powers to the Administrative Departments and Heads of Departments on an extensive scale. The Administrative Departments may in future accord administrative approval irrespective of the amount involved while the Heads of Departments will have power to accord such approvals up to Rs 20,000. The departments will also take all the steps necessary for pre-planning immediately the annual plan is settled, and it would thus be possible in a large number of cases to issue administrative sanctions more or less at the commencement of the financial year and schemes could be launched directly afterwards. 1.18. More than one-fifth of the total Plan expenditure will be on staff schemes and the performance will very much depend on the staff being placed in position at the right time. To assess the requirements in respect of various categories of staff, it has been decided that the Departments should prepare administrative personnel plans well in advance and also make provision for the training etc., of personnel so that suitably qualified and trained staff is available when required. The Departments must also ensure that the requisitions are placed with the Public Service Commission and the Subordinate Services Selection Board well in time.

1.19. Land and buildings are another major item and out of the Plan of Rs 231 crores, Rs 60.21 crores will be spent on the land and buildings programme. The departments responsible for public works must, therefore, organise themselves for the increased work load. In this regard an important step proposed to be taken is the pre-planning of the building programme so as to reduce the time required for the selection and acquisition of sites and preparation of rough cost estimates. With a view to saving time and work, it is also proposed to standardise the designs of the buildings of a repetitive rature such as dispensaries, primary health centres, schools, and warehouses.

1.20. Another factor of importance for the implementation of the Plan is the extent to which the support of the people can be enlisted for it. The Third Plan is basically a people's Plan and their energy and initiative in dealing with tasks of development are essential for achieving success. The Panchayati Raj institutions which offer the means for mobilising the resources of the people have, therefore, a crucial role to play. Many items of development will be transferred to these institutions during the Third Plan period and they will implement a substantial proportion not only of the plan under C.D. and N.E.S. and Panchayats, but also under the other sub-heads of development. Even after this transfer, however, the departments will not be divested of the responsibility for the proper execution of the schemes because they must faithfully discharge the duty laid on them of providing the maximum assistance to the people's institutions.

# CHAPTER II

# Agriculture and Community Development

 $2 \cdot 1$ . Agriculture is the most important sector of Punjab's economy, measured not only by the yardstick of size but also viewed from the angle of its effect on the other Sectors Apart from meeting the food requirements of the population, agriculture must provide the basic raw material for industry particularly as Punjab lacks mineral resources. Farm and agriculture based industries, meeting largely the demands of consumption goods market, will thus be the principal lines of indistrial expansion, and the agrarian sector must provide the raw materials as well as the market for them.

#### **AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTION**

2.2. The total financial provision for the sub-head of Agricutural Production during the Third Plan is Rs 873 lakhs, the corresponding cutlay in the Second Plan having been Rs 440.28 lakhs. The breakup of this provision under the major groups of schemes is as follows :—

2.3. The pre-requisites of agricultural production are better seeds and fertilizers, and irritation and improved techniques. Elaborate arrangements are proposed in the Third Plan for the multiplicatin and distribution of improved seeds of major crops like wheat, rice, bajra, gram and maize. Special efforts will also be made for raising hybrid maize seeds as the production of double-cross seed is a difficult process. It is envisaged that by the end of the Third Plan, the entire area under wheat and paddy cultivation will be covered by the improved seed supply schemes. The crop-wise distribution is shown in the table below 5-

The target is that every C. D. Block should have a seed farm of its own by the end of The Third Plan, that is, a total of 228 farms.

2.4. Plant protection measures.—For the supply of pesticides and for other plant protection measures, Rs 38 lakhs have been provided and it is proposed to cover 10,830 acres of culturable land. Stocks of pesticides will be kept at key points in groups of villages and will be replenished from time to time from depots maintained at the Block and the District level. The imparting of know-how to the cultivators is a gradual 'extension' process and stocks of appliances will be maintained at central places for familiarising the farmer with the latest techniques.

2.5. Chemical Fertilizers.—The annual consumption of chemical fertilisers in the State at the end of the Second Plan was about 37,000 tons of nitrogen and 1,500 tons of phosphates. The target for the Third Plan is to raise the level of annual consumtion to 3,00,000 and 25,000 tons, respectively. Besides, measures will be taken to encourage green manuring the target of the area being 135 lakh acres. As to organic manure, animal dung cannot obviously meet the total requirements and, therefore, will have to be largely augmented by compost of farm and town refuse. It is expected that 850 lakh tons of such manure would be cosumed annually towards the end of the Third Plan.

2.6. Improved implements.—Improved implements are a matter of continuous research and experimentation in field conditions. The Thid Plan target is to sell about 5 lakh improved ploughs to farmers on a subsidized basis. The programme envisages the grant of subsidy against part of the cost and loan against part (through the co-operative credit structure. The outlay proposed on the subsidy is Rs 27.00 lakhs.

2.7. Development of commercial crops, horticulture and fruit preservation.—The present cropping pattern of Punjab is basically inferior on account of lack of water for irrigation particularly in the districts of Hissar, Rohtak, Gurgaon and Mahendragarh. As a result of this, in spite of a higher yield per acre, Punjab has a lower value of output per acre. While the cropping pattern is largely determined by the availability of irrigation, it is also related to the quality of the animal stock and to such factors as soil and climate and the techniques in use. Extension of improved techniques needs special emphasis in respect of cash crops and accordingly Rs 57.83 lakhs have been provided for cane development and cotton and oilseed extension.

2.8. Horticulture.—Another aspect of importance relates to the growing of fruits and vegetables. With increasing incomes, the demand for these items is bound to expand. More consumption is also necessary for providing protective and nutritive elements in the diet of the people. The total provision for the development c horticulture in the Plan is Rs 64 lakhs. On the physical side. it is proposed to bring 6,5 acres of land in the plains, and 4,000 acres in the hill areas under fruit cultivation. Leans at the rate of Rs 300 per acre in the plains and Rs 500 per acre in the hills will be given. The production of vegetables is estimated to increase from 6 lakh tons in 1960-61 to 12 lakh tons in 1956-66 and of fruits from 4.20 lakhs tons to 5.60 lakh tons.

2.9. Farm advisory service.—In order to bring the modern techniques of increasing food production including improved implements to the very door of the individual cultiwator, a wide-spread extension machinery is essential. Under the Farm Advisory Service, for which a provision of Rs 52 lakhs has been made, subject matter specialists will be appointed at the State, District and Block levels. The ultimate objective is to provide four subject matter specialists in each Block in addition to the existing Agriculture Inspector as recommended by the Agricultural Administration Committee of the Government of India.

2.10. Intensive agricultural district programme.—The objective underlying this proigramme is to achieve the maximum possible utilisation of the land potential and it covers the adoption of all organisational and other measures necessary towards that end. The application of expensive items like chemical fertilisers is a process of trial and error and it is also necessary that continuous guidance should be provided to the farmer for adopting improved agronomic practices and achieving a cropping pattern which yields the best results. For instance, trial-cum-demonstration farms should be set up on every new irrigation system in areas not familiar with irrigated farming. The time-lag which occurs in shifting to a better cropping pattern of using superior in-put combinations can indeed be reduced only by creating a specialised organisation competent to speed up this change over. Such an organisation arranges to provide to the cultivator improved seeds, fertilisers, implements, and means of plant protection and also facilities of credit as well as marketing and thus creates all the conditions necessary for the best utilisation of the land.

The district of Ludhiana has been selected for the Intensive Agricultural District Programme known also as the "Package Programme" and the outlay provided is Rs 90.20 lakhs.

2.11. Agricultural education and research.—Expansion of educational and training facilities in the field of agriculture is necessary not only to make available to the farmer the latest methods of cultivation but also bring about essential institutional changes in agronomy. Courses in technical education can be run more smoothly and effectively if they are co-ordinated and controlled by a full-fledged technical university. An Agricultural University is accordingly being established at Ludhiana which has the advantage that a well developed Agricultural College and Research Institute are already located there. Another Agricultural College is proposed to be established at Hissar. Various research sections such as for cereals, sugarcane, millets, vegetables, fruit, fodder and chemicals are proposed to be expanded. A special scheme to establish a bio-chemistry section has also been included in the Plan. The machinery for the collection of statistics and dissemination of agricultural information will be strengthened.

**2.12.** Agricultural marketing—Marketing facilities for agricultural produce are proposed to be made available to the farmers on a much larger scale than hitherto. This item is covered mainly under the sub-head of "Cooperation". The existing marketing section will be strengthened and the provision of the Agricultural Produce Market Act will be implemented.

2.13. Land Development.—A provision of Rs 40 lakhs has been made for the survey and reclamation of culturable waste lands the extent of which is estimated at 15-16 lakh acres. Out of this provision Rs 1 lakh has been earmarked for survey and Rs 4 lakhs for advancing loans for reclamation through manual and bullock labour.

2.14. Crop insurance.—A new field which is proposed to be covered is crop-insurance. The farmer is periodically subjected to the hazards and vagaries of nature and a stage has been reached where the State must take initiative to protect him from these scourages. So far the losses sustained by the cultivators on account of floods, draughts and locusts were met by the Government in part through remission or suspension of land revenue and through loans and gratuitous relief. Crop insurance will be a more scientific and adequate way of dealing with the problem. To begin with, this scheme will cover only 4 crops, namely, wheat, gram, cotton and sugarcane and will be operated at 6 centres of Nawanshahr, Moga, Kotkapura, Sunam, Hissar and Sonepat.

# MINOR IRRIGATION

2.15. Minor Irrigation schemes are in a sense complementary to major irrigation schemes particularly in areas where the benefits of canal irrigation cannot be extended or where the problem of water-logging is very acute. The total provision for minor irrigation schemes is Rs 752.00 lakhs while the corresponding outlay in Second Plan was Rs 547.46 lakhs. The scheme will be implemented on two sides, that is, Irrigation and Agriculture, the breakup being as follows :--

The schemes on the Irrigation side envisage mostly the construction of storage works (for winter irrigation in the non-perennial areas such as Mahinderagarh and Gurgaon Districts) and lift irrigation by pumps in hill and sub-montane areas. The programme also provides Rs 15 lakhs for exploratory tube-wells. On the Agriculture side, the provision is mainly for advancing loans for percolation wells, tube-wells and pumping sets. In respect of pumping sets for lift irrigation, the Plan target is to give loans for the installation of 4,900 sets. As regards tubewells, the sinking of 4884 tubewells will be financed. The total number of pumping sets and private tubewells at the end of the Third Plan will be 7654 and 7643 respectively. It is also proposed to repair/sink 1180 percolation wells in the plains and repair/construct 920 kuhls which lie exclusively in the hill areas. Besides, irrigation facilities will be provided for 55000 acres under the intensive Agricultural District Programme. Minor irrigation schemes implemented by the Irrigation Department alone will result in increase of the irrigated area from about 4.26 lakh acres to 5.63 lakh acres.

#### CONSOLIDATION OF HOLDINGS

2.16. One of the most important aspects of land development is the re-grouping of holdings so as to reduce their number and make the unit of cultivation for each farmer a compact one. Till the end of the Second Plan an area of 147.28 lakh acres out of a total of 219.50 lakh acres had been consolidated. The balance of 72.22 lakh acres is now proposed to be consolidated and for this a provision of Rs 165 lakhs(net) has been made in the Plan.

#### ANIMAL HUSBANDRY

**2.17.** Animal Husbandry is an integral part of agriculture particularly in the Punjab where about 14 % of the total income of the State comes from this sector alone. The importance of animal husbandry in agronomy is two fold; first, the cattle population maintained by the cultivators provides organic manure required for the crops, and, secondly, cattle breeding provides subsidiary occupation to small farmers and agricultural labourers. In the absence of large scale employment opportunities in the industrial sector, any subsidiary occupation of the magnitude that is provided by animal husbandry is of first significance as it serves to relieve the pressure on land and to reduce under-employment.

2.18. The total financial provision for the sub-head "Animal Husbandry" in the Third Plan is Rs 268 lakhs against the corresponding provision of Rs 205.22 lakhs in the Second Plan. The main aspects of the development programme are (a) livestock breeding, (b) disease control, (c) development of poultry, sheep and pigs, and (d) expansion of training facilities for veterinary personnel. The group-wise emphasis in the Second Plan and in the Third Plan is set out in the table below :—

**2.19.** Punjab's livestock population was reckoned at 134.6 lakhs in 1956, that was 4% of India's total livestock population. The livestock density was 285 per sq. mile which was slightly higher than 261 for the country as a whole. Of the total, 44 % were cattle (India 52 %), 28 % buffaloes (India 15 %), 23 % sheep and goats (India 31%) and 5 % of other animals (India 2 %). Punjab thus had a much higher percentage of buffaloes than the average for the country and this factor largely accounts for the high milk production in the State.

2.20. Livestock breeding.—The basic problem of cattle husbandry in the State is that of improving the quality of draught and milch animals in addition to increasing their number. For any improvement in the quality of animals, planned breeding is required. The long-term objective has, therefore, to be first, gradually to eliminate the uneconomic cattle by mass castration and removal to interior forest areas and secondly to transform the present marginal group into a profitable and economic category. The Government Livestock Farm at Hissar is one of the biggest institutions of its kind in Asia, covering an area of about 35000 acres and possessing nearly 10000 heads of cattle. The farm is being further re-organised and dcveloped under a Centrally-sponsored scheme at a cost of Rs 100 lakhs. Emphasis will be on Hariana breed as the average milk yield per day of the Hariana cow ranges from 14 lbs. to 17 lbs. The other breeds which will receive attention are Malwa (Ludhiana) and Shahiwal (Ferozepore) cows and Murrah bufaloes, the latter yielding 20 to 30 lbs. of milk per day.

2.21. Another important item in the context of livestock breeding is the Key Village Scheme on the lines of the pattern approved by the Government of India, the total provision being Rs 42.80 lakhs. Under this scheme 9 artificial insemination centres will be opened both in urban and rural sectors bringing the total number of these centres to 27 at the end of the Third Plan. In addition, artificial insemination sub-centres will be established under the programme of C.D. and N.E.S. Four semen banks are also proposed to be started.

2.22. Disease control.—For an efficient and effective veterinary service, there should be at least one doctor for every 10,000 cattle while at present the ratio is roughly one veterinary doctor for every 30,000 cattle. There were 452 veterinary hospitals and dispensaries in the integrated State of Punjab in November, 1956 and 56 permanent outlying dispensaries were opened during the Second Plan. The number is still insufficient and the provision in the Third Plan is to open 65 outlying dispensaries and to convert 50 of the existing dispensaries into regular veterinary hospitals. The Plan also provides for upgrading the district headquarters dispensaries and equipping them with modern diagnostic facilities and mobile units. Further, increased production and supply of sera and vaccines are planned. Special efforts will also be made to eradicate the dread disease of rinderpest.

2.23. Poultry, sheep and pig development.—The main difficulty coming in the way of larg>-scale production of poultry is the absence of an organised market. A scheme for the marketing of eggs and poultry will be undertaken during the Third Plan for which a provision of R s 3.48 lakhs has been made. The number of Poultry Extension Centres will be increased from 16 to 20. The development of poultry is an important measure in supplementing the diet of the masses, and from the point of view of the individual farmer also, it is a very useful pursuit since it requires only a small capital investment and does not involve much risk.

2.24. Sheep breeding.—A sheep breeding farm is proposed to be established in Kulu. A scheme for intensive sheep improvement on co-operative lines was launched in selected areas during the Second Plan and 32 centres were started. Sixteen such centres will be added in the current Plan. A Sheep Research Sub-station will also be opened for a fundamental research in the techniques of wool production, qualities of different breeds and problems relating to hybridisation. Besides, a sheep research unit will be established at the Government Livestock Farm, Hissar. 200 to 250 superior quality rams will be available in the fourth year of the Plan resulting in 10 % increase in the annual production of wool.

2.25. Piggery development.—The total provision for the piggery development in the Plan is Rs 9.38 lakhs. In order to give further stimulus to the industry and to improve the quality of the animals, it is proposed to start two bigger units during the Third Plan. A scheme for starting a bacon factory has also been included in the Plan.

2.26. Education and Research.—A provision of Rs 4 lakhs has been made for expanding educational as well as reserach facilities. Reserach will particularly be undertaken into warble infestation in cattle; toxic plants and herbs lethal to domestic animals; salmonella infections; and morphological, biochemical and haematological aspects of blood in farm animals. Re-organisation and expansion of Government Veterinary College, Hissar, which was started in the Second Plan will be completed at a cost of Rs 6.57 lakhs.

#### DAIRYING AND MILK SUPPLY

2.27. Augmentation of milk supply can be attempted only by wider adoption of improved animal husbandry practices in respect of breeding, feeding and maragement. Maintenance of cattle in towns creates serious problems such as of feeding and sanitation while the organisation of cattle colonies is a very costly project. The solution lies in developing a system of milk production in the country-side on the basis of mixed farming which should then be linked with processing and marketing in the urban areas. From this stand point dairying continues to remain a rural industry providing subsidiary occupation to the farmer and supplying the surplus production to the urban centres. The farmer is also assisted in that he has an enlarged supply of cattle manure.

The financial outlay provided for dairying and milk supply schemes in the Third Plan is Rs 180 lakhs against the Second Plan provision of Rs 84.50 lakhs. The aim is to cover all the cities in the State with a population of more than one lakh, and 4 milk supply schemes will be started at a total cost of Rs 70 lakhs. With the completion of these schemes, an organised market will be brought into operation to handle the entire surplus milk supply. For improving the quality of milch cattle, a scheme for advancing loans to private breeders has been prepared with a lump sum provision of Rs 20 lakhs. It is also proposed to establish 2 rural creameries in selected milk pockets at a cost of Rs 20 lakhs. The composite milk plant at Amritsar which envisages the collection of 2,500 maunds of milk from the surrounding rural areas and the establishment of 3 milk production-cum-dairying centres, will be completed during the Plan. Start will also be made on a milk products factory which willcost Rs 41 lakhs to complete.

#### FORESTS

2.28. The area under forests in the State is only 12 % of the total while the national target is to attain the figure of at least 20 %. In the Punjab special emphasis on forests is necessary inasmuch as there is the twin problem of water erosion from the north-east and wind erosion from the south-west. The problem of waterlogging is also one of very great seriousness and the forests have a crucial role to play in meeting it. The financial outlay provided in the Third Plan is Rs 467 lakhs, the break-up under the major groups being as follows :--

2.29. The target is to bring an additional area of 15,200 acres under forest. It is also proposed to raise plants along canal strips, roads and railway lines covering approximately 11,000 miles. A provision of Rs 38 lakhs has been made for the development of forest communications and Rs 50 lakhs for timber operations and forest utilisation. Improvement in the means of communications is an urgent necessity since on the one hand it will help to reduce the present wastage of timber and on the other open the possibility of using modern equipment in the forests.

2.30. Development of timber in the forests is also essential for starting industries requiring wood as raw material. One such industry is manufacture of paper and it is proposed to establish a newsprint factory in the district of Kangra and a paper factory at Panipat. To meet the raw material requirements of these factories, measures will be taken to develop für, spruce, bamboo and 'bhabbar' grass. Other forest-based industries are furniture making, wood working, bark crushing, resin and sports goods.

2.31. Soil conservation.—As against the Second Plan provision of Rs 69.68 lakhs for schemes for checking soil erosion caused by wind and water action, the provision now is Rs 189 lakhs. In addition, Rs 152 lakhs will be spent on soil conservation schemes in the catchment areas of Sutlej and Beas under a Centrally-sponsored programme. Soil conservation measures in these catchments are of outstanding importance in so far as the operative life of the Bhakra Dam and of the Pong Dam will be determined by the extent to which flow of silt into the reservoirs can be controlled. These schemes will be implemented in close collaboration with the Government of Himachal Pradesh.

2.32. The main targets fixed for the Third Plan are set out below :---

Besides these schemes the Irrigation Department is undertaking a scheme for 'thur' reclamation for which there is a separate provision of Rs 70 lakhs.

2.33.—Wild life preservation.—A pilot scheme has been formulated for the preservation and development of wild life and the provision for it is Rs 4 lakhs.

#### FISHERIES

2.34. The total financial outlay provided for the sub-head 'Fisheries' in the Third Plan is Rs 45 lakhs against the provision of Rs 11.2 lakhs in the Second Plan.

Of the reservoir fisheries, Gobindsagar (25,000 acres), Badkal Bund (125 acres) and Dhoj Bund (40 acres) are the important sources. The chief lake sources are the Bhupindra Sagar (5,000 acres) and the Chandigarh Lake (250 acres). The Plan provides for the development of these sources, and for a scheme for the demonstration of fish culture in impounded waters. The latter scheme is of significance because the rural population being largely non-fish eaters are indifferent and demonstration of the profitability of fish culture through model farms will be very useful.

2.35. Education and research.—One of the difficulties in the way of fishery schemes particularly stocking of fish in impounded waters, has been the shortage of trained personnel. Senior officers will be deputed for a two-year training course at the Central Institute of Fisheries Education, Bombay, and junior officers for a 12-month course in inland fisheries at the Central Inland Fisheries Research Institute, Barrackpore (Calcutta). It is also proposed to establish a research station-cum-acquarium and museum at Chandigarh at a total cost of Rs 4.04 lakhs.

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT AND NEW EXTENSION SERVICE

2.36. The programme of Community Development and National Extension Services has come to occupy an important place for taking the technological advances, particularly in the field of agriculture, right to the door of the farmer. The basic problem in re-building the rural economy is the organisation of the agricultural effort at the village level, and the role of the Community Development programme in organising this effort is of crucial significance.

Rapid increase in food production is a national objective and therefore, particular emphasis is being laid on the aspects of the Community Development programme which help in increasing food production. The other activities are in the field of Animal Husbandy. Irrigation, Co-operation, Village Industries, Health and Rural Housing. The ultimate objective of the programme is the development of the rural community and of the individual through the promotion of the habits of self-reliance, solidarity and co-operative action.

2.37. The total outlay provided for the Community Development and Extension Services in the Third Plan is Rs 1,230 lakhs. The number of Community Development Blocks to be started in the State is 228, out of which 153 Blocks were functioning at the end of the Second Plan. According to the scheduled programme, the entire State will be covered by Blocks by April, 1963. This outlay of Rs 1,230 lakhs has been worked out in accordance with the budgetary pattern approved for the three stages of Blocks that is Pre-extension, Stage I and Stage II Blocks taking into account the expenditure on the existing Blocks and on those proposed to be started in the Third Plan. The entire expenditure after Siage II, however, is the liability of the State Government and the provision for it has to be made outside the Plan.

2.38. One of the most significant aspects of the Community Development programme is that it enlists the voluntary participation of the people in the formulation and implementation of the development plans and thus mobilizes the public effort. It also paves the way for creating effective and vitalized local authorities, namely, Zila Parishads and Panchayat samitis which form the very basis of democratic decentralisation.

#### **CO-OPERATION**

2.39. The total outlay for the development of the Co-operative movement in the Third Plan has been placed at Rs 450 lakhs against the Second Plan provision of The co-operative movement registered a significant progress during the Rs 246 lakhs. first two Plans; the number of co-operative institutions of various types increased to 32,169 with a membership of 20 lakhs and a working capital of Rs 76.25 crores and nearly 90% of the villages and 50% of the rural population were brought within the fold of co-operation. In the Third Plan emphasis will be laid on consolidating the gains already registered in various directions.

2.40. Service co-operatives.-A chain of service co-operatives will be established covering every single village and the marketing societies will be expanded simultaneously. The primary function of these co-operatives will be to supply short and medium term credit, agricultural and other pre-requisites of production and facilities for processing and marketing agricultural produce. About 80 % of rural families will be covered by the programme by the end of the Third Plan. The extent of short and medium term credit that the co-operatives will be able to channelise will be Rs 26 crores annually. For storing the produce on the security of which credit will be advanced, a provision of Rs 53 lakhs has been made for loans and subsidies for the construction of 530 rural godowns.

2.41. Marketing, processing and warehousing.—The Plan provides for an outlay of Rs 121.54 lakhs for extending and improving marketing, warehousing and processing facilities. It also includes a provisions of Rs 22.70 lakhs for the construction of cold storages on co-operative basis. 10 warehouses will be constructed and 15 marketing cooperatives will be set up in mandis and 28 processing units like rice-mills, rice-hullers, fruit canning units and manure mixing units will be started. The Punjab State Cooperative Marketing Federation will facilitate the marketing operations of the various mandi level societies and also arrange for the supply of fertilizers, seeds, insecticides and agricultural implements.

2.42. Co-operative farming.—It is proposed to start 20 pilot projects in co-operative farming for which a provision of Rs 32.55 lakhs has been made. For each project, a few villages will be selected as starting points and co-operative farming societies will be organised in and around them on the scale of 10 societies per Block. The State will contribute towards the share capital of these societies, provide medium term loans, render assistance for the construction of godown-cum-cattle sheds and make available managerial subsidy.

2.43. Other schemes.—The other principal programmes relating to co-operation will be co-operative consumers' stores, labour and construction societies and co-operatives among women. A comprehensive programme has also been drawn up for the establishment of industrial co-operatives of various types and in particular, a provision of Rs 35 lakhs has been made for setting up a co-operative sugar factory.

#### PANCHAYATS

2.44. It is necessary for the success of the panchayati raj that panchayats should be organised on sound lines and this involves action in two directions :---

- (i) making the panchayats financially viable; and
- (ii) training the members elected to these bodies so that they can discharge the responsibilities placed on their shoulders.

In the Second Plan Rs 18 lakhs out of the total provision of Rs 100 lakhs were earmarked for financial assistance to panchayats for developing such of their resources as would provide income on an ever increasing scale. In the current Plan, the provision is Rs 51.35 lakhs and will be utilised for developing shamlat lands, providing irrigation facilities and tractors and for developing village industries. For training, an outaly of Rs 19.50 lakhs has been provided and centres will be started at the district and the division level for the training of panchayat secretaries, sarpanches, panches and panchayat samiti members. The scope of the work is indicated by the fact that at present there are about 1,350 panchayat secretaries and this number will increase still further.

2.45. Training and education of the members.—The other important schemes are the construction of office buildings for 100 Block Samitis and a panchayat-ghar at Chandigarh. This will serve as a central information centre for panchayat activities and provide a venue for panchayat conferences, seminars and refresher courses for field officers. The major portion of the cost of the panchayat-ghar will be met from contributions by panchayats. The programme also provides for the creation of training reserves, production of literature for panchayati raj functionaries and holding of 'sammelans' for non-officials

#### RESETTLEMENT OF LANDLESS AGRICULTURAL WORKERS

2.46. The principal measures for eliminating the elements of exploitation and social injustice from the agrarian system are (i) abolition of intermediary tenures, (ii) reform of tenancy laws including regulation and reduction of rent and security of tenure, and (iii) ceilings on land holdings. Legislation in this behalf has been enacted in the Punjab and enables the utilisation both of the area surplus after the enforcement of the ceilings on land holdings and of the culturable waste remaining uncultivated for six harvests. The surplus area will be used for settling tenants who are or may be ejected while the culturable waste land will be given to landless Harijans.

2.47. The total provision made for the resettlement of agricultural workers is Rs 100 lakhs. The scheme includes subsidy to 20,000 landless families at the rate of Rs 100 per family for the reclamation of land and loans to 11,000 families at the rate of Rs 500 per family for the construction of houses. Loans will also be advanced to 2,000 families at the rate of Rs 500 per family for irrigation facilities. Culturable waste land will be let out to 12,500 landless Harijans at the rate of 10 acres for each individual cultvator.

#### CHAPTER III

#### IRRIGATION AND POWER

**3.1.** Irrigation and power are among the most important aspects of development in the State sector and found their place as such in the First as well as in the Second Plan. While increase in agricultural production in the initial phase is largely dependent on extension of irrigation facilities, any large-scale industrialisation turns essentially on the provision of power. Almost half the State Plan is thus devoted to the creation of irrigation and power potential, whether by way of smaller and scattered minor and medium irrigation schemes and thermal generating plants or by way of multi-purpose projects which involve the harnessing of the major rivers in the State.

3.2. Prior to the partition, the Punjab possessed a vast net work of canals regarded as the finest in the world, but thereafter only a small part of the canal system came to its share. The result was that the State became deficit in foodgrains whereas previously it was a large exporter. Reliance could be placed on the dynamism of the farmer of Punjab which expressed itself in the use of relatively better techniques and harder labour, but the crucial role was that of irrigation and the maximum emphasis had to be placed in making up the deficiency in that sphere. As a result of this, the irrigated area of the State rose continuously from the beginning of the First Plan; the figures increased from 49.43 lakh acres to 60.74 lakh acres during the First Plan, while in the last year of the Second Plan the area was 76.26 lakh acres. It is expected that with the full development of the Bhakra-Nangal Canal system, the irrigated area will rise further to 87.30lakh acres. This clearly represents statisfactory progress, although the work is far from complete and much stil remains to be done.

3.3. Canal irrigation has, however, brought with it the serious problem of waterlogging in several areas where seepage water penetrates into deeper sub-soil and raises the underground water table. When the water level reaches the root zone it seriously affects plant growth and further more waterlogging results in salt infestation. Large areas have thus been rendered unfit for cultivation whereby the yields have been depressed and in certain areas the cropping patterns have also been affected. This problem has become particularly acute in the districts of Amritsar, Ferozepore, Hoshiarpur, Sangrur, Jullundur and Gurdaspur. The situation has apparently arisen through failure to pay adequate attention to the drainage of the area and has been accentuated by a cycle of unusually heavy rains over a period of years. Whatever the reasons for waterlogging, remedial measures have to be devised as a matter of urgency.

3.4. The total outlay provided in the Plan for Irrigation and Flood Contro<sup>1</sup> operations is Rs 37.75 lakhs, the break-up being as indicated below :---

3.5. High priority is being given to flocd control, drainage and anti-waterlogging because the optimum realisation of the agricultural potential of this State is connected directly with the effective solution of these problems. Within this group, particular emphasis will be laid on flood control and drainage which deal with the problem of surface accumulations of water. At the same time, the problem of sub-soil water will receive attention especially in tracts where the level is less than 5 feet below the matural surface of the ground.

3.6. Research and Investigation.—Adequate provision has also been made for investigation, research and planning. Investigation was included in the Second Plan also and has been repeated in the Third Plan because exploratory work on new schemes on the three eastern rivers and on the Jumna is not yet complete.

3.7. Physical targets.—The important physical targets set for the Third Plan are:

A blief description of important items of work is given below.

#### IRRIGATION

#### (Multipurpose Projects)

3.8. Bhakra-Nangal • Project (Irrigation)—This project provides for the constiruction of a straight gravity concrete dam (740 feet) with a reservoir on the river Sutlej at Ehakra and a net work of canals for irrigation. It also provides for two power plants and for

transmission lines for power distribution. The top of the dam will be 1,700 feet above sea level and the reservoir will impound 8 million acre feet of water. Additional irrigation facilities will be provided for 10 million acres of land. The project will be completed within the first two years of the Third Plan, the financial provision on the Irrigation side being Rs 354 lakhs.

Beas Project (Irrigation).—The waters of three rivers, namely, Sutlej, Beas and Ravi have been allotted to India under the Indus Basin Treaty and this project is being undertaken for harnessing the water and power resources of the river Beas by means of storage and diversion works. The Project consists of two parts : Unit I (Beas-Sutlej Link) will transfer the waters of the Beas to the Sutlej upstream of the Bhakra Reservoir and Unit II (Dam at Pong) will impound 5.5 million acres feet of water. The total cost of both the Units is estimated at Rs 167 crores out of which the Third Plan provision is Rs 47.50 crores. The major part of this expenditure will be on Unit II (Rs 34.50 crores), the aim being to complete the storage works by about 1970. It has been decided that Unit I will receive concurrent priority with Unit II (Pong Dam) but in the Third Plan work will be undertaken only to the extent of Rs 13 crores. The rest will be completed in the Fourth Plan. The comparatively low allocation to Unit I in the Third Plan will enable executing capacity to be spared for taking up short-term hydro-electric projects from canal falls and through the extension of the Uhl River Scheme.

#### MAJOR IRRIGATION

Sirhind Feeder Project.—This project was substantially completed during the Second Plan and provision of Rs 10 lakhs only has been made in the Third Plan for gates and gearings and similar items.

Western Jumna Canal Remodelling and Extension.—There were numerous small schemes in the Second Plan relating to the Western Jumna canal tract, but some of them could not be completed during that Plan. All these schemes have been grouped together with the addition of the Gurgaon Canal Project and the Western Jumna Canal Feeder Project and a provision of Rs 5,05 lakhs has been made for the unified scheme.

#### MEDIUM IRRIGATION

The total outlay provided in the Third Plan for medium irrigation schemes is Rs 135 lakhs. This includes spill-over schemes such as the Madhopur Beas Link. There is also a provision of Rs 30 lakhs for schemes to utilise the Sutlej waters released by the construction of the Sirhind Feeder. Investigation, research and planning schemes have also been provided.

3.9. Utilisation of irrigation potential.—In regard to the utilisation of the irrigation potential the record of the major irrigation schemes in the State has been generally satisfactory in recent years and the time lag between the two stages of creation of potential and its utilisation has been decreasing. The experience as regards medium irrigation projects has also been satisfactory.

#### FLOOD PROTECTION AND DRAINAGE

3.10. The Third Plan for flood control and drainage is based on a Master Plan drawn up for the entire State and estimated to cost Rs 28.4 crores. This Master Plan provides for the construction of 5,185 miles of drains and 560 miles of training and controlling 'chos' and 290 miles of bunds. The provision made in the Third Plan is of Rs 12 crores and the programme envisages the completion of the schemes started during the Second Plan and of additional urgent ones. In order to provide partial relief with immediate effect, the drains have been constructed to a capacity lower than is ultimately intended for them. They will later be widened to the minimum capacity of 4 cusecs per square mile of catch nent area which is essential for proper drainage during the monsoons. Apart from the outlay provided in the Plan, it is expected that a substantial measure of contribution will be for theoming from the people. About half of the land which constitutes approximately 20 per cent of the total cost of flood control and drainage scheme is being taken out of the common pool in the course of consolidation of holdings. Further work on link drains, it is envisaged, will be done by zamindars on a voluntary basis. About 400 miles length of link drains have in fact already been constructed by them. One of the major schemes under the flood control pro gramme is that of the Ghaggar Project. Ghaggar river is notorious for the havoc it causes during monsoons and it is proposed to control it by constructing a 220 feet dam on it at a cost of Rs 920 lakhs. The stored water will be utilised, for providing irrigation in Ambala District and for supplementing the drinking water supply in Chandigarh. The work will commence towards the end of Third Plan, the provision during the Plan being Rs 50 lakhs.

**3.11.** Anti-waterlogging and thur reclamation schemes.—Anti-waterlogging schemes which deal with the problem of sub-soil water as distinct from drainage of surface accumulations have to be undertaken on an emergent basis because of the grave threat posed by water-logging. The provision made in this regard is Rs 293 lakhs. It is estimated however that eventually a sum of over Rs 55 crores will be required if remedial measures to settle the entire problem of water logging have to be taken. The programme *t* is essentially of an experimental nature at this stage because alternative remedies, e.g., seepage drainage, linking of channels, construction of deep discharage wells, and seepage-cum-pumping schemes have to be tried out in different areas before one or more of them are adopted for general application. Shallow tube-wells also offer a remedy but no specific provision has been made for such wells in the anti-water logging scheme. Instead the minor irrigation programme will be adjusted so as to meet the needs of anti-water logging and the tube-wells sunk under the former programme will be planned in aid of and in conjunction with anti-waterlogging operations. A provision of Rs 7 lakhs has also been made to cover 'thur' reclamation schemes.

#### POWER

3.12. The prime importance of the development of power resources in a State like Punjab needs little emphasis. In fact power is the mother industry from which alone other industries can develop and the State's Third Plan is essentially based on the success of the power plan. The progress in the building up of the load has also been satisfactory and this is of particular significance in hydro-electric schemes, where initial capital cost involved are relatively high. Apart from the large industrial potential which is being built in the urban areas, the demand in the rural areas is also increasing. According to estimates of the Central Water and Power Commission, the requirements at the end of the Third Plan will be in the region of 675,000 kW. exclusive of the demand from neighbouring States which is estimated at 150,000 kW. The total demand will thus be about 800,000 kW. As regards supply, it is expected that at the end of the Third Plan the power generating capacity of multipurpose and other projects will be about 700,000 kW. which will leave a gap of about 100.000 kW. still to be filled.

3.13. The energy resources in Punjab are mainly hydel and as the planning and constrution of hydro power projects require a long period spread over a number of years, investigations have to be carried out in advance on numerous schemes, both large and small, in order to be able to formulate a long term plan. Provision has been made in the Third Plan so that the necessary investigations can be duly conducted.

**3.14.** Thermal plants have been included in the Plan as complementary to hydroelectric power. A provision of Rs 250 lakhs has been made for diesel sets with a view partly to covering the shortage which is expected between 1962 and 1964.

3.15. The total allocation for Power Projects is Rs 32.22 crores out of which Rs 17.72 crores are for generation schemes and Rs 14.50 crores for distribution schemes. Besides this provision of Rs 17.72 crores, the Multipurpose Projects include a provision of Rs 35.42 crores for power generation raising the total to Rs 53.14 crores. The break up of this outlay under the different schemes is as indicated below ;—

#### (A) POWER GENERATION

#### Multipurpose Projects :

3.17. (i) Bhakra-Nangal Project (Power).—One part of this Project was largely completed in the Second Plan and for it only spillover expenditure has been provided in the Third Plan. This part covers the construction of the Left Bank Power House at Bhakra, with five units of 90/53 MW. each, and of power stations at Ganguwal and Kotla, each of them with two units of 24 MW and another unit of 29.5 MW. Work on three units at the Bhakra Left Bank Power House and on one unit each at Ganguwal and Kotla has to be completed in the Third Plan. On the other part of the project, namely, the Right Bank Power House, only preliminary work was started in the Second Plan and the major portion of the work will be completed during the Third Plan. The project consists of the installation of four units of 120/72 MW. each which will enable optimum utilisation being made of the water storage in the Bhakra Reservoir

(ii) Beas Project (Power).—This is a multipurpose project designed to harness the irrigation and power potential of River Beas. The project is planned in two parts:—

- (a) Beas Sutlej Link (Power).—This part of the project envisages the construction of a diversion dam at Pandoh in Kulu Valley whereby the waters of Beas will be transferred to Bhakra Reservoir through tunnels and open conduits. A fall of 1,000 feet is available enroute at Dahar, and will be utilised for the generation of power. The minimum flow available will be 7,500 cusecs for a period of seven to eight months in the year and 1,800 cusecs during the other months. It will be possible to convert some of the secondary power produced at Dahar into primary power by coordinating the work at the Dahar Power House and the Bhakra Power Houses. In order to firm up the entire capacity a thermal set shall be added to the system at a later date.
- (b) Pong Dam (Power).—The project envisages the construction of a storage dam on Beas to catch the monsoon flow and to release regulated supplies into the Rajasthan Canal and the Punjab Canal system emanating from Harike Headworks. The waters so released will also be utilised for the generation of power, by installing a power-house downstream of the Pong Dam. The firm power from this scheme is estimated at 122 M.W.

The Beas Project will take about 10 years to complete and the earliest benefits in the matter of power will become available about eight years after the commencement of construction. Other short-term schemes will, therefore, be investigated in the intervening period, and provision has been made accordingly.

#### Hydro Schemes other than Multipurpose :

**3.18.** (i) Extension of the Uhl Hydro-Electric Scheme.—This scheme provides for the utilisation of the tail waters from Jogindernagar Power House, at a distance of about three miles. A fall of 1,124 feet is available and the proposed installed capacity is 45,000 kW. Construction on this scheme will start towards the end of 1963-64.

(ii) Canal falls on the Upper Bari Doab and Western Jumna Canal-(a). Three falls are available on the Upper Bari Doab Canal within a distance of about ten miles between Madhopur and Malikpur. The flow in this canal throughout the year is 2,000 cusecs, and the gross head at the three falls being 50 feet, 56 feet and 39 feet. The total installed capacity will be 30,000 kW. The power houses will be located very close to the existing load centres, and will also be near the existing 132 kV. Trunk Transmission System of the Uhl River Scheme. As a result the scheme offers attractive prospects.

(b) A low head canal fall is available on the Western Jumna Canal near Tajewala Headworks where about 10,000 kW. firm capacity can be generated. This scheme is still under investigation.

#### Thermal Schemes :

**3.19.** (i) Steam Station.—Firming up of hydro power by steam power is customary as well, a necessary both for reliability and economy. It is proposed to start with a nucleus scheme of one unit of 50,000 kW. at or near Delhi. The capacity can be expanded later according to the needs.

(ii) Diesel Sets.—In order to meet the gap between the load curve and the available supply of power between 1962 and 1964, it is proposed to instal diesel sets of a total capacity of 25,000 kW. at various centres such as Faridabad, Chandigarh, Jagadhri, Faridkot, Sangrur and Hoshiarpur. As the delivery period for diesel sets is relatively short being six to eight months and the period needed for installation also is short, such sets can provide immediate relief in the matter of supply. The estimated cost is Rs 250 lakhs.

#### **(B) POWER DISTRIBUTION**

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3.20. A considerable part of the transmission system has already been laid in the State under the Bhakra-Nangal Project. The additional targets fixed in this regard are as below :

All the places with a population of more than 10,000 and most of the localities with a population between 5,000—10,000 have already been electrified. The areas still to be electrified are rural ones and particular emphasis has, therefore, been laid on extension of power to these areas. Out of the total number of 21,049 villages in the State, 3,016 villages were electrified by the end of the Second Plan and another 1,600 villages will be electrified in the Third Plan Im fact, if financial resources permit the intention is to raise this target from 1,600 to 4,400 villages.

#### CHAPTER IV

#### INDUSTRIES AND MINERALS

4.1. One objective of planned development is the diversification of the economy leading to gradually expanding secondary and tertiary sectors, that is, large and small scale industries and services, trade and commerce. From this standpoint the Third Five Year Plan for industries is an integrated programme of agro-industial development in which agriculture serves to provide the raw materials required for establishing resource-based industries. This will in turn sustain an expanding market for industrial goods through increase in agricultural incomes. The strategy of industrial growth has, therefore, been so devised as to facilitate the process of industrialisation in response to agricultural growth.

4.2. The overwhelming bulk of the State's population is still employed in agricultural occupations and industrial employment is at present restricted to only about 4,00,000 persons. In 1956, the secondary sector (comprising small scale and large scale industries) was less important in the economy of the State than in the country, in as much as it contributed 11.3 % of the net output and 9.3 % of the employment as against the figures of 17.5 % and 10 % respectively for India as a whole. Major developments will doubtless take place in the field of agriculture during the Third Plan, but the manpower requirements of that sector are not likely to rise. In fact an increasing percentage of the agricultural population are becoming available for other pursults and there will as a result be the need for absorbing them in industrial activity. Expansion of industrial activity is thus of importance from the points of view both of expanding the employment opportunities and of increasing the State income.

4.3. A singular feature of the Punjab's industrial rattern is the predeminance of small sized units. It is estimated that the number of such units is about 25,000, the out put being as follow. The value of machine tools and agricultural implements preduced amounted to about Rs 7.6 crores during 1960-61. Batala alone was responsible for the manufacture of over 50 % of the country's production of machine tools in the private sector. In respect of bicycles and sewing machines components, the production totalled about Rs 9.7 crores. The leather tanning and manufacturing industries acccunted for an output of over Rs 8.2 crores. In the field of textiles the organised sector of the handled industry produced about 386 lakh yards of cloth and 68.6 lakh yards of khadi. As against this, the picture in respect of large and medium scale industries is an unsatisfactory one. This can be attributed partly to the deficiency of natural resources, especially minerals for heavy and basic industries, and partly to lack of capital in large blocks backed by the requisite calibre of enterpreneurial capacity. In any event the industrial pattern dominated as it is by small scale units is organisationally weak and unable to compete with large scale units outside the local markets and is technically either inferior or tends to minimise the importance of quality.

4.4. Another feature of the industrial pattern of the State is that there is preponderance of consumer goods industries. This is the result of various factors such as suitability of the natural resources to the production of consumer goods, the paucity of industrial finance, and the growing demand for consumer goods as a consequence of increasing incomes. The producer goods industries that exist are engineering industries which manufacture tools, agricultural implements, diesel engines and industrial machinery. As to large scale industries, the development has been dictated by the availability of raw materials and has been confined to cement and paper factories.

4.5. In this background the following strategy of industrial development is envisaged for the Third Plan :--

(a) expansion of farm and forest-based industries;

- (b) expansion of engineering industries producing intermediate products and light producer goods;
- (c) production of durable consumer goods to take advantage of the rising purchasing power particularly in the rural areas; and
- (d) introduction of large-scale industries, wherever feasible.

4.6. The total outlay provided for the programme of industrial development in the Third Plan of the State is Rs 1440.10 lakhs. Its break-up under the various heads is indicated below :---

4.7. During the course of the Third Plan, it will be necessary for the State to make distinct progress in the field of large and medium scale industries while increasing the tempo of development of small-scale and village industries. The proportion of the total population engaged in industry must also be increased during the next 5 years but this will be possible only if there is all round development of industrial activity, large scale as well as small scale and in both urban and rural areas.

**4.8.** Large and medium Industries.—A machine tool factory will be established at Pinjore which will be a public sector project exclusively under the Government of India. In the State Plan, provision has been made for contributing towards the share capital of two large scale industries for which raw material is available in the Punjab. Rs 2 crores will be contributed to the share capital of a Newsprint Factory and Rs 50 lakhs to that of a Cement Factory. Both these factories will be established in the District of Kangra.

4.9. Mineral development.—Not much progress has so far been made in the field of mineral extraction, but a number of surveys is being undertaken by the Geological Survey of India. Existence of various valuable minerals has been reported from time to time, but systematic work for determining the economics of their exploitation has not been undertaken. In the Third Plan this work will be taken up on a larger scale than until now, and 5 parties will be deputed in the different areas of the State for survey and investigation. Three parties will work in the district of Mahinderagarh and investigate iron ore, lime stone, and copper in that area, while the other two parties will explore coal, bauxite. limestone and gypsum reserves in the sub-montane regions.

4.10. Small scale industries.—The total provision for small scale industries is Rs 969.75 lakhs. The important schemes are the establishment of 89 Industrial Estates and 10 Industrial Development Areas at a total cost of Rs 245 lakhs, In industrial estates sheds will be provided to the industrialists on rent, while in industrial development areas, which will be located in and around urban towns and in suitable rural centres, sites will be sold for establishing factories. It is intended that apart from several rural industrial estates each district should have at least one urban industrial estate and one industrial development area. Provision is also being made for assistance in the form of loans to individuals desiring to establish themselves in these estates and areas.

**4.11.** Industrial finance.—An important facility essential for the growth of industry is the provision of industrial finance and for this purpose Rs 416.54 lakhs have been allotted for advancing loans and Rs 108.56 lakhs for giving subsidies and grants-in-aid. Under the head of loans Rs 339.30 lakhs are for extending credit facilities to small scale industries. Loans in excess of Rs 25,000 will continue to be channelled through the Punjab Financial Corporation, and Rs 45 lakhs will be placed at the disposal of the Corporation. The institutional framework for the financing of small scale industries, whether privately owned or in the cooperative sector has, however, still to be built up and the existing facilities have to be expanded. A very significant step in this reg rd will be the establishment of a Punjab State Small Industries Corproation with the object of counselling, financing and promoting the interests of small scale industries by providing raw material at reasonable cost and also more marketing facilities for the finished products. The paid up capital of the Corporation will be Rs 40 lakhs. It is also proposed to utilise the cooperative banking institutions and other specialised banking agencies for extending industrial credit facilities.

**4.12.** Industrial cooperatives.—About 5,900 small scale industrial cooperative societies will be established during the Third Plan. Roughly half of these societies are likely to take up the production of engineering items. Subsidies will be given for managerial and other expenses incurred by the societies during the first three years of their working and a provision of Rs 45 lakhs has been made for this purpose.

4.13. Handlooms.—The main problem facing handloom industry is its low competitive capacity vis-a-vis mill production. Efforts will therefore be concentrated on improving efficiency, quality and design. To assist the industry, direct incentives in the form of rebates and subsidies will be continued, the provision being Rs 45 lakhs. The entire assistance will be given through cooperative societies. The number of weavers in the coopeative fold in the State increased from 4,000 to 12,000 during the Second Plan and the target for the Third Plan is to bring about a further addition of 10,000 weavers. There is also a Centrally sponsored scheme for the conversion of handlooms into powerlooms for which a provision of Rs 63.39 lakhs has made. It may be observed that handloom industry being labour incentive is of first importance in expanding employment opportunities.

**4.14.** Handicrafts.—A provision of Rs 61.25 lakhs has been made for the development of handicrafts. In this programme training schemes will continue to occupy an important place, and it is proposed to establish 13 additional training centres in new crafts. Emphasis will also be laid on increased production through cooperatives for which purpose assistance will be given in the formation of 100 new coopeative societies from amongst the ex-trainees of the departmental institutions. Marketing facilities for handicrafts will also be provided in an organised manner. For the improvement of designs and for the modernisation of techniques of production, a central Design and Reserach Unit will be set up as an adjunct to the Government School of Arts.

**4.15**. Sericulture.—The programme for the development of sericulture covers planned cultivation of mulberry plants on private farms and provision has been made for giving subsidies for that purpose. Filature and experimental research stations will also be established. The total financial outlay provided for the programme is Rs 22 lakhs. The target is that the production of silk seed should be more than doubled as compared with the level at the beginning of the Plan and the production of raw silk should be increased from 20,000 pounds to 45,000 pounds.

**4.16**. Khadi and village industries.—Khadi and village industries are handled by the State Khadi and Village Industries Board. A provision of Rs 10 lakhs has been made in the Plan for sharing the expenditure incurred by this Board over the development of these industries.

#### CHAPTER V

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## TRANSPORT AND COMMUNICATIONS

#### ROADS

## Date.....

5.1. There is special need for building roads in Punjab on an extensive scale because rail communications have been static for many years and no new railway line has been laid since 1947, except for the restoration of a small strip of previously dismantaled link. Southern and south-eastern parts of the State particularly suffer from lack of adequate rail transport while with the extension irrigation from Bhakra, there has been a persistent demand for further transport facilities for this region. It is also relevant in considering the requirements that there is no concentration of industrial activity in particular blocks and the main trend of industrial development is in the field of small scale industries which are dispersed in the smaller towns. Again, expansion of the communication system is essential for transporting and markeing agricultural production which is being increased, and for the full utilisation of the forest wealth. In the forest areas the need is for roads as well as a net work of ropeways in the terrain which has steep inclines and drops.

5.2. The region which merits particular attention in respect of roads is the hill region because communications are the first step towards the development of this area. Indeed developmental plans in all sectors depend on the progress under this head. Accordingly, out of over-all outlay of Rs 12 lakhs for roads in the State Plan, Rs 341.25 lakhs have been provided for the hill areas, that is 28.4 % of the total. This takes into account the fact that the cost of construction of roads in the hill areas is higher than in the plains and also that in the past these areas did not receive their due share and there is deficiency which requires to be made up. The Plan also includes the construction of roads from villages to main roads, towns and railway stations. The provision for this scheme is Rs 70 lakhs but villagers will in addition make a contribution in the form of labour and land. The broad objective is that movillage in a developed and agricultural area should remain at a distance of more than 4 miles from a metalled road and of more than  $1\frac{1}{2}$  miles from any type of road.

#### ROAD TRANSPORT

5.3. There are two separate schemes under this sub-head the one relating to the erstwhile Pepsu area and the other to Mandi-Kulu area. The total financial outlay provided is Rs 60.00 lakhs as follows :---

The latter scheme is intended to co-ordinate the road and the rail services and improve their efficiency with the object of promoting tourist traffic in that area. Apart from these two autonomous Corporations, the transport services will be run under direct departmental m anagement,

#### CHAPTER VI

#### SOCIAL SERVICES

#### **GENERAL EDUCATION**

6.1 The main consideration in formulating the educational policy has been to provide a firm and broad base of educational structure within the minimum possible period, special attention being given to the expansion of education in the rural area. The programme has also to be linked with opportunities for employment and with this end in view, there will be a distinct shift of emphasis from general education to technical education. The provision made in the State Plan for General Education is Rs 1777 lakhs as follows :---

6.2. Elementary education.—The national target in respect of elementary education during the Second Plan was to achieve an enrolment of 60 % in the age group 6-11 years. Against this, the enrolment in Punjab was about 57 %. The proportion of boys and girls attending schools was 75 and 39 % respectively, against the national average of 79 % for boys and 40 % for girls. The target for the Punjab in the Third Plan is 90 % for boys and 70 % for girls. It is estimated that facilities for 16.86 lakhs children will have already been provided during the Second Plan, while 6.69 lakhs children will be covered during the Third Plan, the total being 23.55 lakhs. The actual number however is likely to be much higher, that is about 7.19 lakhs, because under the policy of free and compulsory primary education, enrolment cannot be restricted to the age group 6-11 years. This will require the recruitment of 12,000 additional teachers on the basis of a teacher student ratio of 1 : 50 and also increased expenditure on equipment, furniture and other teaching aids.

The teachers will be 'basic-trained' so that the quality of education at the elementary stage is improved. Provision has been made for setting up new training institutions and for increasing the intake capacity of the exisitng ones. Equipment at the rate of Rs 100 per school will be provided for giving basic orientation to primary schools. One model basic school will be opened in each district and school committees will be set up for the maintenance and development of primary schools. Residential quarters will be provided for women teachers in rural areas and books and stationery will be allowed free to poor girl students in backward areas.

6.3. Secondary education.—The target in the Second Plan in respect of secondary education for the age group 14-17 was to achieve an enrolment of 15 % but the achievement in Punjab was 12 %. Special efforts will, therefore, be necessary to make up the

deficiency. The target is to upgrade 100 Government middle schools and convert 250 high schools into the higher secondary pattern. No new higher secondary schools will be opened and there will instead be gradual up-grading of middle schools and high schools to the higher secondary level. It is purposed to introduce science and humanities groups in these schools and special arrangements will be made with the Punjab University for securing science teachers with post-graduate qualifications A college will also be set up to train teachers for the Home Science group in higher secondary schools.

6.4. University education.—Provision has been made under the head of University Education for specialized higher education in Agriculture, Veterinary Science, Medical, Public Health, Engineering and other technical subjects. It is also proposed to establish a Punjabi University which will serve to develop Punjabi lanugage and literature. Another important scheme is to introduce the three-year degree course in all the colleges. Better facilities will also be provided, particularly on the science side, in accordance with the norms set by the University Grants Commission. To meet the greater demand for facilities for higher education, especially for women, four new degree colleges will be started in the backward areas of the State. A new Home Science College will also be set up.

6.5. Sports and physical education.—Particular attention will be given to the development of games and sports under a Centrally sponsored programme Rs 52 lakhs. A College will be established with emphasis on sports and games. National Cadet Corps and Auxiliary Cadet Corps will also be expanded at a cost of Rs 25 lakhs. Further free supply of milk will be arranged for 20 lakhs school children in collaboration with "CARE", for which a provision of Rs 20 lakhs has been made.

#### **TECHNICAL EDUCATION**

6.6. Under the pattern of industrial development in the State, the requirement of technical personnel will increase manifold. It has accordingly been decided to accord high priority to technical education in the State Plan and the total allocation is Rs 728.36 lakhs against the provision of Rs 240.99 lakhs in the Second Plan. Besides, provision has been made for training carftsmen under the sub-head "Labour Welfare" while other specialized training has been provided for separately.

The main aims of the technical education programme are :---

- (i) Consolidation of the institutions set up during the Second Plan ;
- (ii) Introduction of new courses both at the degree and the post-graduate level ;
- (iii) Increase in the intake capacity of the degree and the diploma institutions; and
- (iv) Provision of adequate financial facilities to deserving students drawn from the lower income groups.

The important schemes included in the Plan are the establishment of a Regional Engineering College at Kurukshetra, the expansion of degree courses in the Engineering Colleges at Patiala and Ludhiana, and the development/establishment of polytechnics. The annual intake capacity for the degree courses will be increased by 370 taking the total to 850 in addition to 30 seats in architectural engineering at the Engineering College at Chaindgarh. The annual intake capacity in the various Polytechnics will increase by 1,320. A beginning will also be made in the direction of advanced and specialized training by providing 20 seats for post-graduate courses in the Punjab Engineering. College, Chandigarh —10 seats for rotodynamics and 10 for electrical power engineering. Again, there is provision for technological training facilities in various industries such as textiles and leather.

A School of Arts will be established at Chandigarh at a cost of Rs 15 lakhs as also a State Museum. Financial assistance will be provided to Art Academies and scholarships will be given for training in dancing and other arts.

6.7. Languages.—Rupees 22.01 lakhs have been provided for the development of regional languages. The main schemes are the development of Hindi and Punjabi and their introduction in the administrative sphere and financial assistance to Hindi and Sanskrit pathshalas.

#### HEALTH

**6.8.** The maintenance of an efficient organisation both for the prevention and cure of disease is among the primary responsibilities of the State and this objective has been kept in view while formulating the health programme for the Third Plan. Specific schemes have been prepared for improving environmental sanitation for providing safe drinkng water in urban and rural areas and for controlling communicable diseases. Provision has also been made for institutional facilities and for training medical and health personnel. The total allocation under this sub-head is Rs 1310 lakhs, the breakup being as follows:—

It is proposed to consolidate the existing primary health services and to open 75 more health centres in collaboration with the Community Development Organisation. It is also proposed to link the primary health services with referral hospitals at the tahsil level and then with fully equipped hospitals at the district level.

6.10 Medical education, research and training.—To cope with the increased demand for trained doctors on the expansion of medical facilities. 100 seats will be added to the M.B., B.S. course at the Medical Colleges at Patiala and Amritsar. A new Medical College was also started at Rohtak with an annual intake capacity of 50 students. For meeting the demand for teachers for these medical colleges, a Post Graduate Research and Medical Institute will be established at Chandigarh. This Institute will provide post-graduate education and training facilities for D.O.M.S., D.T.D. and Diploma in Anaesthesia courses, and in addition offer research facilities in the following branches:—

- (i) Medicine;
- (ii) Surgery;
- (iii) Aneasthesia;
- (iv) Eye;

(v) ENT;

- (vi) Pathology;
- (vii) Bacteriology;
- (viii) Virology;
  - (ix) Bio-chemistry;
  - (x) Radiology;
  - (xi) Neuro Surgery; and
  - (xii) Midwifery and Gynaecology.

While the total outlay on this scheme has been estimated to be about Rs 6 crores, the expenditure in the Third Plan will be of the order of Rs 3.10 crores. A hospital with 500 beds will be attached to this Institute. Facilities for the training of nurses, auxiliary nurse midwives, laboratory technicians and radiographers will also be expanded.

6.11 Control of communicable diseases and family planning—The bulk of expenditure under this group is for the eradication of malaria and diseases like small pox, hook-worm and leprosy, the amount provided for the eradication of malaria and small pox being Rs 243.50 lakhs and Rs 40 lakhs respectively. The programme of BCG vaccination will be continued as before.

In view of the very heavy increase in the population positive steps are necessary for reducting the birth rate. Rs 90 lakhs have been provided for the family planning programme, out of which the share of the State Government will be Rs 34 lakhs. In addition to the primary health centres which serve as family planning centres as well 50 separate family planning clinics will be opened. Sterilisation will also be encouraged by providing incentives in the form of compensation for the loss of the working days resulting from vasectomy operations.

6.12. Ayurveda.—The provision made for the expansion of Ayurvedic facilities is Rs 48 lakhs. The programme consists of the addition of 50 beds in the existing Ayurvedic Hospital, Patiala, the expansion of the Central Pharmacy for the manufacture of ayurvedic medicines and the establishment of 55 Ayurvedic/Unani dispensaries in the hill areas.

#### WATER-SUPPLY SCHEMES

**6.13.** (a) Rural water-supply.—The national objective is that every village which is without a community source of drinking water-supply should be provided with safe drinking water, which incidentally is an important factor in building up resistance to disease. Normally, the simpler types of water-supply schemes will be provided, but in certain areas with a low water table or insufficient and brackish/saline water, resort to piped water-supply is essential. Again in the sandy regions in the south of the State sanitary wells and hand-pumps are not useful and supply has to be provided through canal filtration or deep tube-wells. The total provision for rural water-supply schemes is Rs 75 lakhs and the target for the Third Plan is to cover 170 villages thus raising the total number of villages with water-supply facilities to 470 by the end of the Plan.

(b) Urban water-supply.—The provision for urban water-supply and drainage schemes is Rs 280 lakhs. These schemes are implemented by local bodies and the sum provided in the Plan is to be advanced to them in the form of loans and grants to be supplemented by a matching contribution. Efforts will also be made to secure additional funds from outside the Plan. The target is to provide water-supply facilities in 32 towns and drainage facilities in 28 towns raising the total number to 57 and 72, respectively.

#### HOUSING

6.14 In a developing economy, there is pressure for better housing facilities in the urban as well the rural areas. In Punjab not only has there been a phenomenal increase in the population in the last decade from 161.34 lakhs to 202.98 lakhs but there has also been a shift of population towards the urban areas. According to the 1961 census, 799 persons but of 1,000 lived in rural areas and 201 in towns while the corresponding figures in 1951 were 810 and 190. The provision for housing schemes in the Third Plan is Rs 240 lakhs as follows :--

In addition, there is a Centrally sponsored scheme for 'Land acquisition and development' for which Rs 150 lakhs will be provided by the Central Government outside the State Plan.

6.15. Subsidized industrial housing.—The provision of Rs 50 lakhs for industrial housing will be supplemented by private employers and co-operative societies of industrial workers to the extent of Rs 10.50 lakhs taking the total to Rs 60.50 lakhs. 1,370 houses will be constructed under this scheme, the work of construction being undertaken by the Public Works Department as well as by employees and co-operative societies.

**6.16.** Low income group housing.—It is proposed to advance loans for the construction of 2,710 houses under the Low Income Group Housing scheme. Efforts will be made to supplement the allocation by intitutional finance. A Housing Board/Corporation will also be set up directly after the necessary legislation in this regard has been passed by Parliament.

Village housing project.—Housing conditions in the rural areas are very un-satisfactory at present both as regards sanitation and planning and it is proposed to deal with this problem on an integrated basis. Rs 42 lakhs will be advanced in the form of loans for the contruction of residential houses up to a maximum of Rs 2,000 per individual, provided he contributes  $33\frac{1}{3}$  per cent of the amount in the shape of cash or manual labour. The Rural Housing Cell will be further strengthened by the appointment of an officer of the rank of Superintending Engineer, with supporting staff. The work under the scheme will be continued from year to year in 200 villages up to the end of 1967-68.

**6.17.** Slum clearance.—The problem of slums is two-fold (i) to clear and improve the existing slums, and (ii) to check the creation of new slums. The provision in the Third Plan for this work is Rs 50 lakhs out of which the share of the State Government is Rs 12.50 lakhs. The slum clearance schemes are implemented by the local bodies after they have been scrutinized and approved by the State and the Central Governments. Besides positive measures for clearing and improving the existing slums, the schemes involve a strict enforcement of bye-laws and building regulations.

Land aquisition and development.—Availability of building sites in sufficient numbers and at reasonable rates is essential for the successful implementation of any housing programme. A provision of Rs 150 lakhs has therefore been made for taking up large scale acquisition and development of land at appropriate places all over the State in accordance with a Master Plan. The experience gained in developing Chandigarh Capital will be utilized in these areas, and self-contained colonies and subsidiary townships will be set up. Particular mention may be made of Faridabad and Gurgaon areas which are contiguous to the metropolis of Delhi and which require to be developed for absorbing the increasing population and as well as the expanding industries.

Organisational set up.—At present housing schemes are being implemented through special agencies in an un-coordinated manner because of lack of adequate technical and administrative staff in the Housing Department. This is, to a largest extent, responsible for the delay in the execution of the various housing projects. A separate Town and Country Planning Organisation is therefore proposed to be set up which will work out and execute a comprehensive scheme for controlled organisation covering on the one hand the preparation of master plans and on the other planned regulation of building activities under all heads.

## LABOUR AND LABOUR WELFARE

**6.18.** Labour welfare.—The programme under the sub-head 'Labour Welfare' aims primarily at maintaining industrial peace and ensuring proper working conditions for labour. The provision in the Plan is Rs 12 lakhs. The State has been divided into five conciliation regions and each region has been placed under one whole-time conciliation officer instead of the working being undertaken by Labour Inspectors on part time basis. This will avoid delay in the implementation of awards and agreements so that the major cause of friction between the employers and the employees would be reduced if not eliminated. The machinery for the enforcement of the Minimum Wages Act in the 18 industries to which this Act applies im this State will be strengthened.

**6.19.** Employees State Insurance Scheme.—The total provision for this scheme is Rs 48 lakhs out of which the share of the State Government is Rs 6 lakhs. The scope of the scheme will be extended to bring all industrial centres with 500 or more industrial workers under it so that the benefits of the scheme will be available to approximately 30,000 workers.

Employment Exchanges.—Ten Employment Exchanges and Offices and 21 Rural Employment Information Assistance Bureaux will be opened while one District Employment Exchange will be upgraded to a Divisional Exchange. Besides, University Vocational Guidance and Employment Assistance Bureaux and a special employment exchange for highly qualified applicants are proposed to be set up. Special surveys and research in respect of the various trades in the private sector will be undertaken and studies will also be made to ascertain the trend of occupational diversification. Facilities for vocational guidance and employment counselling will be further extended and 12 independent V. G. Units and 12 employment exchanges will be set up.

6.20. Craftsmen training.—Keeping in view the higher demand for trained craftsmen arising from the expansion of the industrial sector and the modernisation of agriculture, a provision of Rs 327.5 lakhs has been made for establishing a chain of Industrial Training Institutes. Out of this amount of Rs 327.5 lakhs, the share of the State Government will be Rs 131 lakhs. It is proposed to establish 13 new Institutes with a capacity of 5,080 seats, whereby the number of the Institutes will rise to 28 and the number of seats to 9,928 by the end of the Third Plan. Evening classes will be run to enable industrial workers to utilize their spare time for improving their qualifications and therefore their economic prospects.

## DEVELOPMENT OF BORDER AREAS (LAHAUL SPITI)

6.21. Lahaul and Spiti, bounded by Ladakh, Himachal Pradesh and the Kulu Sub-Division form the Scheduled Areas in this State. The total area is 4,695 sq., miles and the propulation, according to 1961 census, is 20,478. These areas are inaccessible for most part of the year as the passes situated at a height of 13,000 ft. to 15,000 ft. remain closed for eight months. The inhabitants are economically very poor and socially very backward. The main cash crop is 'kuth'. a medicinal herb, although wheat and barley are also grown. The chief items of trade are wool and pashmina but since these commodities used to be procured from Tibet, the trade has dwindled of late.

6.22. The first pre-requisite for the development of these areas is a well developed system of communications and therefore the highest priority has been given to the construction of roads and bridges, for which a sum of Rs 24 lakhs has been earmarked out of the total provision of Rs 114 lakhs. In order of priority, education is only second to communications and the provision made for the expansion of educational facilities is Rs 18.13 lakhs. It is proposed to open 15 new primary schools, convert 12 primary schools into the basic type, upgrade five primary schools to the middle standard and convert the high school at Keylong to the higher secondary type. Stipends will be given to students to encourage them to join the educational institutions the provision made for irrigation is Rs 16 lakhs which includes the investigation and construction of suitable kubls and the repair and maintenance of the existing 'kubls'. Funds have falso been earmarked for electrification, drinking water supply facilities and dispensaries. Efforts

will be made for the development of forests to provide timber for the construction of buildings and fuel for domestic use. Afforestation of about 70,000 acres is envisaged during the Third Plan, in addition to plantation of 10 acres in the Spiti Valley. A provision of Rs 20 lakhs has been made for spill over expenditure on schemes which could not be completed during the Second Plan.

#### WELFARE OF SCHEDULED CASTES, BACKWARD CLASSES AND VIMUKAT JATIS

**6.23.** One of the notable socio-economic objectives of the country is the uplift of those sections of the society which have so far remained neglected and poor. Out of the total polpulation of 203 lakhs in the Punjab, the population of Scheduled Castes and Vimukat Jatis is \$1.39 lakhs. Most of them are economically poor and follow hereditary professions such as leather tanning, scavenging and weaving. The total outlay provided for measures to improve the conditions of these classes is Rs 222 lakhs. In addition, Rs 44.09 lakhs have been provided under a Centrally Sponsored Programme.

A sum of Rs 152 lakhs has been earmarked for giving special educational concessions to these classes in the form of scholarships and reimbursement of fees. 2,24,200 students will benefit from this scheme. 1,973 persons will be given industrial training at a total cost of Rs 9.9 lakhs. Subsidies totalling Rs 37.92 lakhs will be given to 1.896 families for the purchase of land and Rs 5.83 lakhs for the purchase of houses and building sites. The plan also provides Rs 5 lakhs for safe drinking water supply in areas inhabited pre-dominantly by the backward classes. Rs 44.09 lakhs are provided under the Centrally Sponsored Programme which includes an additional scheme for the supply of wheel barrows and hand carts to scavengers.

#### SOCIAL WELFARE

6.24. The broad objective of the social welfare Programme is to bring about am improvement in the conditions of life of the individual within the family and the community. Owing however to financial limitations, the scope of the programme has been restricted to providing relief to special categories of persons like juvenile delinquents, physically and mentally handicapped children and adults, aged and infirm persons and beggars. The programme also covers schemes for social defence and moral hygience. The provision made in the Plan is Rs 74.30 lakhs as follows :---

The schemes have been framed in consultation with the various all India agencies such as the Central Social Welfare Board. They include holiday homes for children, protective homes for women, a Bal Bhavan, children's clubs and extended facilities under the After-Care Programme. Provision will also be made for foster-care service for orphans and destitute children. An institution for deaf and dumb children and a training centre for adult blind persons will be established in addition to the expansion of the existing centres. There is also a scheme for conducting surveys and reasearch on the problems relating to these handicapped sections of society. Besides the sum of Rs 74.30 lakhs provided in the State Plan, Rs 32.38 lakhs will be spent under a Centrally Sponsored Programme.

## **PUBLIC CO-OPERATION**

6.25. Co-operation by the public and their active participation in the Plan are of basic importance particularly in a country which aims at achieving economic development through democratic agencies. The total outlay provided for the schemes under this sub-head is Rs 11.75 lakhs, of which the State share is Rs 4.70 lakhs. All the schemes are Centrally Sponsored. Rs 3 lakhs will be given as grants for starting Lok Karya Kashetras to such voluntary organisations as have experience in specific fields of development. Subsidies amounting to Rs 0.85 lakh will be given to labour co-operative societies in the early stages to assist them in engaging essential technical staff and office establishment. A sum of Rs 7.50 lakhs will be spent on demonstrating, through pilot projects, the value of voluntary effect in implementing developmental schemes. Rs 0.40 lakh has been provided for educational work on prohibition through voluntary organisations in selected areas with a large industrial population.

#### CHAPTER VII

#### MISCELLANEOUS DEVELOPMENT SCHEMES

#### CAPITAL PROJECT

7.1. On the partition of the country in 1947, Lahore, the capital of the joint Punjab fell to the share of Pakistan and the newly formed East Punjab Government as it was then designated provisionally adopted Simla as the seat of the Government. Owing however to its difficult approach and to the inclement climate, it could not serve as the permanent capital. The available sites in the State were therefore surveyed and Chandigarh was selected as the most suitable.

7.2. A provision of Rs 18,78.23 lakhs was made during the First Plan, and later Rs 6,58.58 lakhs more were provided because the scope of the project had to be expanded to meet the additional demand for accommodation arising from the merger of the erstwhile States of Punjab and Pepsu.

7.3. Nearly all the major buildings included in the Project have been completed and essential works like roads, under-ground drainage and sewerage have been provided. The main items which are still outstanding and which have been included in the Third Plan include the completion of the Assembly Chamber, the extension of the High Court building, the construction of the General Hospital and the Medical Research Institute and the Community Theatre. A gross provision of Rs 850 lakhs has been made for this work in the current Plan. Out of this amount, Rs 350 lakhs will be recovered from the sale of plots and the net provision will be Rs 500 lakhs.

#### PRINTING

7.4. The printing and stationery department is primarily a 'service' Department and the expansion of the State activities has its direct impact on the volume of the work handled by it. The increase in the printing work during the last decade has as a result been exceptionally heavy and the existing accommodation and machinery are not adequate to cope with even half the present load. The total provision made for the sub-head of "printing" the Third Plan is Rs 46 lakhs as against Rs 16 lakhs in the Second Plan. The important schemes are : establishment of a separate unit for printing of forms, additional machinery and equipment for the existing press, and construction of stationery stores and a book depot at Chandigarh. It is also proposed to establish a separate press for printing nationalized textbooks at Chandigarh at a cost of Rs 14.45 lakhs and to set up four sales depots for these books at other places at a cost of Rs 5.30 lakhs. This printing will be undertaken on a commercial basis and is expected to yield a profit of Rs 8 lakhs a year.

#### STATISTICS

7.5. With the expanding scope of economic planning in the country, it is essential to secure reliable and adequate data on various indicators of socio-economic progress. Both the headquarters and the field agencies of the State Economic and Statistical Organisation were accordingly strengthened during the Second Plan. In the Third Plan, the Organisation will be expanded further. Training facilities will also be provided for the staff of the various departments entrusted with the collection and compilation of statistics e.g., progress assistants and village level workers. It is also proposed to set up a machenical tabulation unit for compiling the date collected in the various rounds of the National Sample Survey. A separate State Income Section will be opened at the headquarters to collect data on the various constituents of the State income and its distribution over the different sectors. Along with income estimates data will be collected in respect of public finance which will assist in formulating policies with regard to the tax structure from the point of view of raising resources and distributing the tax burden equitably. Demographic studies too, will be undertaken to ascertain the trends of population growth,

#### PUBLICITY

7.6. The main aim of the publicity programme is to disseminate information on the parious aspects of the Plan and to secure the active participation of the masses in the impleinduction of the development schemes. The total provision under this sub-head in the Third han is Rs 50 lakhs against the corresponding provision of Rs 22.26 lakhs in the Second Plan. The programme provides for at least one community listening set in each village, information feetures at the divisional headquarters, documentaries and feature films concerning the Plan and exhibitions for giving publicity to the development projects. It is also proposed to construct an auditorium-cum-information centre at Chandigath and to install a teleprinter ine between Chandigath and Jullundur to assist the local language newspapers.

#### TOURISM

7.7. Efforts for the development of the various places of tourist interest in the State were started on an organised basis in the Second Plan. The programme is being extended in the current Plan and the provision that has been made is Rs 22 lakhs. The main scheme is for the development of the hill areas particularly Kulu Valley and Simla which are the two important centres of attraction both for foreign and local tourists. Bhakra which attracts a large number of tourists is being developed with special emphasis on the Gobindsagar Reservoir. A hostel to cater for the middle class tourists will be constructed at Nangal and five pavilions and a cafeteria will be built near the Reservoir. Water-skiing and boating ficilities will also be provided there. As to the other centres, bungalows for middle class tourists will be built at Kothi, Palampur, Manikaran, Baijnath and Anandpur Sahib.

## SPECIAL DEVELOPMENT IN URBAN AREAS

7.8. With the progress of industrialisation, the trend towards urbanisation has become more pronounced and extensive growth of urban areas is taking place. The development lowever is haphazard and uncontrolled which has accentuated the problems of the urban local bodies in the spheres of sanitation, safety and convenience. The financial resources of the local bodies are meagre and they are unable to undertake any extensive programme for providing basic amenities. The sources of income moreover are comparatively inelastic, and scope for further taxation is very limited. With these considerations in view, a provision of Rs 65 lakhs has been made in the Third Plan for subsidy as well as loans for local bodies with which works of public utility of the categories indicated below can be undertaken : -

- (a) Filling of low-lying areas and stagnant depressions
- (b) Laying out of parks ;
- (c) Construction of public health centres ;
- (d) Construction of swimming pools.

The local bodies to which loans will be advanced under this scheme will be required to arrange at least 25 % of the total cost from their own resources and to provide the staff for the execution of the programme. The allocation for subsidies is Rs 16 lakhs, and will be utilised to assist local bodies which are financially handicapped.
