4. Data about the academic and professional qualifications of working teachers with special reference to Science and mathematics.

CHAPTER - I

1.1. General Information

Jalandhar, is an ancient town which in the social and economic spheres can be considered as one of the premier towns in the state. It is a sort of political capital of the state being seat of vernacular press - as many as thirteen newspapers are published daily with wide circulation from this place. Two important mass media stations i.e. All India Radio and the T.V. centre are also located here.

The district, which is centrally located in the present physical layout of the re-organised state shows visible strides in development which the state has made in the fields of Agriculture, industry, trade and commerce communication ,health and education and in raising the standard of living through modern and luxurious houses and Villas. Geographically , it forms an irregular triangle , bounded by Hoshiampur District in the North-East, Kapurthalla District in the west and Ferozepur and Ludhiana districts in the south. The Sutlej river forms its natural southern boundary separating it from Ludhiana and Ferozepur districts. It lies between 30-58' and 31.57' north latitude and between 75.58' 75.03' and 76-15' east longitude in the apex of the Bist Doab, the territory lying between Sutlej and Beas rivers. Alongwith Hoshiampur and Kapurthalla districts, it forms Doaba region of the state.

Origin of Name:-

The district is named after Jalandhar, a demon King , who finds a mention in the puranas and Mahabhatta. According to another legend Jalandhar was the capital of the kingdom of Lava , son of Rama . According to yet another version

Jalandhar is said to have derived its name from the vernacular term (Jalandhar) i.e. the tract lying between the two rivers Sutlej and Bias, still another name of Jalandhar had been Trigartha, as it was watered by three rivers Sutlej, Beas and Ravi.

#### Area:-

According to Surveyor General, India, the district covers an area of 3401 Sq. Kms. and occupies 10th position in the ranking order from the top among the 12 districts of the state, the largest district with an area of 5874 Sq. Kms. is Ferozepur and the smallest occupying an area of

of 1633 Sq.Kms. is Kapurthala. Tehsilwise area is indicated below :-

#### Climate:-

The district lying mainly in the Punjab plains is extremely hot in summer and severely cold during winter. The maximum temperature during May-June shoots upto 46 C but in winter tumbles down to 2 C in the month of December and January. Monsoon rains which are comparatively more important for crops are normally active during June -September and winter rains during December-January. The average rain fall during the five years 1970 to 1974 is 638 m.m.

#### Topography:-

The land of the district is alluvial and its soil at different places consists of varying degrees of clay loam and sand. The only mineral found here and there is Kanker (Calcarious nodules) which is used for road making or is burnt into lime.

The District has three natural Sub-divisions namely the Sutlej low land comprising Bet area of Nawanshahar, Nakodar and Phillaur Tehsils, the uplands East of the main stream and uplands West of the Bein stream. The uplands of the three Tehsil give the appearance of a continuous Plain, except for parts West of Nakodar, where low sand ridges are found.

#### Population

The district has a total population of 17,34,574 persons (91,6,379 males and 81,8,195 females) as per 1981 census. Rural and Urban population of the district is as under:-

There is an improvement in sex ratio of the district, it being 893 at 1981 census compared to 883 at 1971. As compared to state, the district has a higher sex ratio, the state ratio being 879 females per 1000 males.

#### Scheduled caste/Scheduled Tribes Population.

The district has relatively much higher percentage 36.28% as compared to 26.87 for the state. The percentage of Scheduled caste population in urban area of the district is 26.39 which is significantly lower than the proportion of 41.68% in rural area. Adharmi, Balmiki, Chamar and Megh are the important scheduled castes in the district.

The district has a total scheduled caste population of 46,9,983 (24,9,071 males and 22,0,912 females) in rural area. In urban areas total scheduled caste population is 15,9,314 (85,541 males and 73,773 females as per 1981 census).

### Density of population:

The density of population as recorded at 1981-census works out to 510 persons per Sq.Kms. which is substantially higher than the state density of 333 persons per Sq.Kms.

### Literacy:

The district has recorded substantially higher literacy rate of 49.18 % as against the corresponding state literacy of 40.86 %. The literacy rate for males and females are 55.18 % and 42.46 % respectively. It ranks second in terms of literacy the first being Ludhiana District with literacy % rate of 56.50 %

### Level of Industrialisation:

Jalandhar occupies a place of pride on the industrial map of the state alongwith Ludhiana. These two districts are the homes of manufacturing, servicing and repairing units. The two are a sort of traditional bases of small industries and are well known all over the world. As Ludhiana is the hub of hosiery industry so is Jalandhar for sports and leather goods. There were 3000 small scale and 15 medium and large scale industrial units in the district in 1980.

The large and medium sized factories are engaged in multifarious industrial activities such as fabricated products, metal furniture and fixtures, hand tools, general hardware, sewing machines, utensils, cutlery, agriculture machinery parts, fans, sports goods, rubber, plastic goods, leather products, brass and chromium fitting, surgical instruments, motor body building, electrical machinery apparatus, appliances, chemical and chemical products, auto parts, paper and paper products.

As per 1980 economic census, out of a total of 44,6,132 (90.7 %) non agricultural enterprises maximum number 62,579 ( 13.0 %) of enterprises were recorded in

Amritsar followed by Ludhiana 57,562 ( 12.96%) and Jalandhar 51,932 ( 11.7% ).

Out of the total 12,59,358 persons usually working in the non-agriculture enterprises ,the maximum 21,0,054 (16.7%) were recorded in the Ludhiana district followed by Amritsar 17,2,589 (13.7%) and Jalandhar 15,8,899 ( 12.6 %) There has been a decline of 4.0 % in working population of primary sector during the decade 1971-1981 and corresponding gain in secondary and tertiary sector which is an indication of the shift in the over all economy of the district from agriculture to industries. Among the exportable manufactured articles are sports goods, steel furniture , cycle parts sewing machines and improved agriculture implements, Khadi cloth , sugar , hand tools furniture , auto parts . The important imports to the district are tea , salt, kerosene oil , chemicals , rubber goods , motor spirits, tractors and agricultural implements , metals , gunny bags, cotton pieces goods , cotton yarn , warm cloth, cement, machinery and vanaspati ghee.

#### Agricultural Development:

The trade and commerce activities of the district are mainly dependent on its agrobased economy .Agriculture is increasingly getting commercialised instead of being a way of life as hitherto fore. New innovations in terms of improved seeds and chemical fertilizers have given an impetus to the agriculture produce. Farmers plan cash crops in such a way that they get maximum return in money value. Main crops are wheat, gram , potatoes during rabi season and Maize ,Paddi , groundnut and sugar cane during Kharif season. A number of important grain markets exist in the district for sale and purchase of food grains. Vegetable growing and marketing has picked up tremendously in the recent years.

As per 1980 economic census ,out of a total of 4,61,238 enterprises in the state 63,367 ( 13.7%) enterprises per recorded in Amritsar district followed by Ludhiana 60785 (13.2%) and Jalandhar 53677 (11.6%) . In case of Urban areas too Jalandhar maintained its 3rd position pertaining to number of enterprises within and without premises. In case of rural area , first place was acquired by Hoshiarpur district followed by Amritsar, Gurdaspur and Jalandhar in that order. In respect of Agricultural enterprises ,Jalandhar again occupies 3 rd position with 1745 while Ludhiana return the highest 3223 and Gurdaspur the 2nd with 1909 such enterprises.

Level of development in Cultural fields:

Two important mass media stations i.e. All India Radio and T.V. Centre play an important role in development of the cultural fields. The plays, Discussions, folk dances and the classical songs broadcast by All India Radio Jalandhar and telecasted by the T.V. Centre Jalandhar are milestones in this fields.

Every year Harbalabh Mela is organised here in the month of December in which Sangeetkars from all over India participate.

K.L. Sehgal Memorial raised in the memory of late Sh. K.L. Sehgal organised various competitions in the literary field.

## FIFTH ALL INDIA EDUCATIONAL SURVEY

With the universalisation of Elementary Education in order to fulfil the constitutional obligation, considerable expansion in schooling facilities has taken place, to some extent, at the cost of relegation of qualitative improvement to a second place. The All India Educational Surveys, four so far were conducted with the main objective of identification of rural habitations and provision of educational facilities for them at different stages. These surveys also attempted to collect information on physical and other facilities available in schools which might directly or indirectly help in the qualitative improvement and provide a basis for educational policy makers, planners and administrators.

To provide the starting point for the planners and to determine the discrepancy gradient, the Fifth All India Educational Survey was conducted. The date of reference of this survey was 30.9.1986. The main objectives of this survey were :

- i) To assess the present position of educational facilities at various school stages in respect of coverage of school going population.
- ii) The distance to be covered by a child to reach a school.
- iii) Enrolment in schools in general, scheduled caste and girls' students in particular.
- iv) To assess the availability of Physical facilities like school buildings, playground, drinking water, furniture, medical checkup, blackboard, chalk, library, laboratory, bookbank etc.
- v) To know about the academic and professional qualifications of working teachers with special reference to teaching of Science and mathematics.

To fulfil these objectives, information through structured questionnaires were collected. Three forms viz Village Information form (V.I.F.), Urban Information form (U.I.F.) and School Information form (S.I.F.) had been developed keeping in view the objectives of the survey.

Village Information Form:

The items of information collected in this form were Male and Female population in 1981 and corresponding population of scheduled castes, Actual/Estimated population of the Village, Actual/Estimated child population in various age group, schools available for various age groups, schools available in various habitations, distance at which different schooling facilities available, habitations predominantly populated by scheduled castes and scheduled tribes, centres for non-formal Education, adult Education, disabled pre school Education, their number and enrolment in these centres.

Urban Information Form:

The main items of information in this form were Actual/Estimated population of the city/town, and also the slum areas, actual/estimated child population in various age groups, number of institutions of different types, centres for non-formal education, actual education, pre-school education.

School Information Form:

The main items of information collected from all recognised schools were Management of the school, classes taught, type of school buildings, total covered area and number of class rooms, number of additional rooms required, availability of facilities like playgrounds, furniture, text book bank, Library, blackboard, games and sports material, medical checkup, drinking water, lavatories, number of teachers working as various school stages, their qualifications, enrolment in class I to XII and corresponding enrolment of scheduled caste/tribe students, Qualifications of teachers teaching Science and Maths at secondary and Higher secondary stages, vocational guidance facilities in secondary/higher secondary schools, vocationalisation at +2 stage and courses offered.

After getting the necessary training for a period of eight working days in the office of S.C.E.R.T Chandigarh and required clarification and guidance from the N.C.E.R.T. staff, an orientation programme for about six days was organised for the Block Primary Education Officers. They were acquainted with the forms, mode of the distribution and collection of forms, scrutiny of the filled in forms, preparation of Block tables and Block wise Block Primary Education Officers, in turn explained to the heads of the schools the procedure for

~~Filling the forms~~. The village information form and school information forms were supplied to the Head of the Institutions.

The filled in forms were scrutinised by the Block Primary Education officers and the data collected from the concerned C.D. Block were tabulated at the block level. Two copies (one original and one carbon copy) of the Block tables were prepared.

At the district level, two sets of the district tables based on the block tables were prepared with the help of Block Primary Education Officers.

Since the village Information forms is to be provided by the Patwari, who is under the Revenue Department, the help of this Department was sought. Population figures were obtained from the Directorate of Census operations. In collecting information about number of institutions and enrolment in P.U.C/Intermediate classes attached to three colleges, the help of the Directorate of Collegiate Education was sought.

#### Concepts and Definitions.

Some of the important concepts and terms used in this survey are as under:-

(i) Habitation: A habitation is a distinct cluster of houses existing in a compact and contiguous manner with a local name. A village may have one or more than one habitation, except when it is a deserted/uninhabited/ becharag one.

Any habitation with population less than 10 in hilly/desert /sparsely populated area or with population less than 25 in plains areas is not given a separate status of a habitation and its population is included in the nearest habitation of the same village. But this condition will not apply to a village with one habitation only.

(ii) Village: Village is used in the same way as in census. It is a parcel of land the boundaries of which are defined and settled for revenue purposes.

(iii) Urban area: All areas which were identified as urban at the time of 1981 census or subsequently notified to be so are to be treated as urban.

(iv) Rural Area: Areas which are not urban shall be treated as rural.

(v) School stages: Primary stages comprises classes I to V, at upper Primary stage the set of —— classes

include VI-VIII, at secondary and Higher Secondary, Senior Secondary stages, classes include IX to XI/XII.

(V) Section: A school with classes IX has three sections - one primary section, one upper-primary section and one Secondary section.

(VI) Block: Block in this survey connotes, the block under the community project Administration. In this survey the block is the unit for collection and compilation of data.

(VII) Recognised Schools: A recognised school is one in which the course(s) of study followed is/are prescribed or recognised by Government (Central/state) or a university or a Board constituted by law or by any other agency authorised in this behalf by central or state Government and which satisfies one or more of the authorities i.e. Directorate of Education, Municipal Board, Secondary Board etc. with regard to its standard of efficiency. It runs regular classes and sends candidates for public examination, if any.

(VIII) Management: The authority which runs a school determines type of its management. It may be Government, Local body or private body receiving Government aid or not receiving Government aid. The Schools may, therefore, be classified according to their management as Govt. Schools, Local body, private aided schools and private unaided schools.

Shahkot C.D. Block is the largest in respect of number of habitations i.e., 183 . Rurka Kalan C.D. block has comparatively the fewer habitations i.e., 59 .

CHAPTER 32

Main findings of the Fifth All India Educational Survey

Primary Education

2.1. Out of 1236 habitations of the district, 1091 habitations have primary schools/sections within the habitation.

It served the population of 12,33,790 out of total population of 12,64,532, (the percentage being 97.57%)

126 habitations have primary schools/sections upto a distance of 1.0 K.M.

Only 19 habitations are there in the district which have primary schools/sections at a distance of more than 1.0 K.M.

There are 8 habitations in the Nawanshahar C.D.

Block 4 habitations in the Aur C.D. Block, 2 habitations each in Jalandhar East, Jalandhar West, and one habitation each in Nakodar, Phillaur and Nurmahal have primary Schools/sections at ~~more~~ a distance of more than 1.0K.M.

2.2. Out of 1236 habitations of the district, 1217 habitations have primary schools/sections within a distance of 1.0 K.M.

4 habitations in the C.D. Block Nawanshahar are proposed for opening a primary school in accordance with the norms. The name of the habitations proposed are as under:-

2.3 There are 59 Villages in the district which have zero proportion of S.C. in the village. Out of these 59 villages, 20 have facilities for primary education. Out of next set of 258 villages which have proportion of S.C. upto 25 in the village, 211 villages have facilities for primary Education. Out of 547 villages which have a proportion of 26-50 S.C. in the village, 531 have facilities for the primary Education. Out of 281 villages which have a proportion of 51-75 S.C. in the Village, 257 have facilities for primary. Out of 75 villages which have more than 75 S.C. in the village, 59 villages have facilities for primary Education.

The information regarding villages according to proportion of scheduled tribes population and availability of primary schools in them is as follows:

2.4 There are 1037 Govt. Primary School in the rural area of the district. There is no Primary school run by local bodies and private unaided agencies in this area. Total number of primary classes/Section in rural area is 1039 (2 upper primary Schools run by private unaided agencies have primary sections attached with them.)

In the urban area of the district, there are 119 schools of Govt., 5 are of Local bodies, 11 Governed by private aided agencies and 4 run by private unaided agencies. Total number of primary Schools in the urban area is 120. Total number of primary sections in the urban area is 200.

The district has a total figure of 1176 primary schools (including 1156 of Govt., 5 of local bodies, 11 private aided and 4 of private unaided) Total number of primary schools sections are 1239.

Out of 1037 primary schools in the rural area of the District, 790 schools have pucca building, 203 have partly-pucca building, 47 have kachcha buildings and 4 are housed in thatched huts.

Adampur C.B. Block have the largest of Kucha buildings i.e. 35 out of total of 55 (the remaining 23 two have partly pucca building(s) Jalandhar East, Nawan-sahar and Aur C.B. block have the maximum No. of pucca buildings.

Immediate attention is needed towards the 33 kucha buildings of Adampur C.B. Block and 5 of Shahket Block. Condition of 4 schools of the Shahket Block housed in thatched huts is to be improved.

In urban Area , all the 139 schools have pucca buildings. Out of 1176 primary schools of the district , 46 of the rural area have no instructional room at all . 71 schools in the rural area have ~~xxxm~~ only one rooms for instructional purposes. These are 369 schools having 2 instructional rooms available.

In urban areas , there is no such schools which have less than 2 instructional rooms.

Out of 1137 schools in the rural area, 250 schools have no requirement so far as the additional rooms is concerned , 179 schools require one additional room each, 269 schools require two additional rooms each , 185 schools have a requirement of 3 rooms each, 88 schools have a requirement of 4 rooms each and 48 schools require 5 and more than 5 rooms each.

Out of 139 schools in the urban area, 63 schools require no additional room , 35 schools require one room each ; 15 schools require two rooms, 9 schools have a requirement of 3 rooms each, 5 schools require 4 rooms, each and 12 schools have requirement of 5 and above rooms each.

To assess the availability of physical facilities like playground, drinking water, furniture, black board, reading library, laboratory, book bank etc, this survey provides sufficient information. It in turn shows the clear picture concerning availability of the black boards in primary schools which is one of the basic teaching aids in the schools.

126 primary schools of the district have 6698 sections of which 1417 sections have no black

Out of 1417 sections having no black board at all, the maximum number of sections requiring black board is in the Shahkot block i.e. 210 sections. Almost similar number of schools (187) are in Jalandhar West C.D. block. These schools should be provided with the essential teaching aids immediately.

In urban area 139 primary schools have 904 sections out of which 285 sections have no black boards, 18 sections have unusable black boards and 601 sections have usable ~~black~~ black boards.

2.9. To assess the availability of ancillary facilities like drinking water, lavatory, medical check-up in primary schools, the information was collected in this survey. Out of 1196 primary schools in the district, 1070 schools have a facility of drinking water, 852 schools have urinals in 275 schools have separate urinals for girls, 171 schools have a facility of lavatory, 114 schools have separate lavatory for girls.

407 schools have a facility of medical check-up in schools.

There is great need for separate urinal and lavatory for girls in primary schools. Frequent medical check-up of the students is required.

2.10 There is no school without teacher in the district. Of course out of 1176 primary schools, 98 schools are single teacher schools. Maximum number of single teacher schools are in Shahkot C.D. Block (the number of being 40).

Jalandhar East and Adampur C.D. blocks do not have single teacher school.

2.11 There are 3910 trained primary teachers (1699 male and 2213 female) in rural area, out of 1697 male trained teachers, 2 have a qualification below middle, 21 are middle pass, 1475 are matriculates, 87 are Higher Secondary and 42 are graduate and 14 are post-graduates. There are 24 teachers (not covered above) and 32 other teachers.

Out of 2213 female teachers, 2 are below middle, 49 are middle pass, 1813 are matriculate, 139 are Higher secondary, 38 graduates, 1 post graduate, 158 language teachers and 13 others.

In rural area there is no shortage of female teachers.

In urban area there are 1747 trained primary teachers (554 male and 1193 female). Out of 554 male trained teachers, 448 are matriculate, 51 are higher secondary, 16 graduate, 2 post graduate and 8 Language teachers. Out of 1193 female trained teachers, 1110 are matriculate, 52 higher secondary, 21 graduate and 16 language teachers.

2.12 The enrolment at primary stage is 2,01,688 (1,06,179 boys and 94,909 girls)

The schedule caste enrolment at primary stage is 91666 ( 51152 boys and 40514 girls)

There is no schedule tribes enrolment in the district. 91% boys and 93.7 % girls are enrolled in in the age group 6-11 in rural area. 61.17 % boys and 64.15 % girls have been enrolled in the age group 6-11 in urban areas.

### CHAPTER - III

#### Main findings regarding upper Primary Education

3.1 Out of 1236 habitations of the district, 304 habitations have upper primary/sections with in the habitations. It served the population of 6,09,255 out of total population of 12,64,532 (the percentage being 48.19) 281 habitations have upper primary schools/sections upto distance of 1.0 K.M. It served the population of 21,7,654 ( the percentage being 17.21) 316 habitations have upper primary schools/sections at a distance of 1.1 to 2.0 K.M. It served the population of 2,44,482 ( the percentage being 19.33) 247 habitations have upper primary schools/section at a distance of 2.1 to 3.0 K.M. It served the population of 1,43,937( the percentage being 11.38) 88 habitations are there in the ~~rurka~~ rural area which are served with a upper primary schools at a distance of more then 3.0K.M. It served the population of 2,93,104.

Bhogpur and Shahkot C.D. Blocks are there in the district which have least number of upper primary schools with in the habitation. Out of 95 habitations at - Bhogpur only 16 are there which have upper primary schools with in the habitation. Out of 183 habitations of Shahkot , only 19 have upper Primary schools with in the habitation. Nawanshahar C.D. Block has maximum number of habitation i.e. 24 which have upper primary schools at a distance of more than 3.0.K.M. The total population served by these habitations is 13,571 .Jalandhar West C.D. Block has 12 habitations (having total population of 6,813 ) and Nurmahal C.D. Block has 10 habitations ( having total population of 5,515) which are served with upper primary schools at a distance of more than 3.0K.M.

3.2. Item 2 shows the number of habitations already served with an upper primary schools/section with in a distance of 3.0 K.M. and number of habitations where a new upper primary school may be opened.

Out of 1236 habitations of the district 1148 habitations are there, which have upper primary schools/sections within a walking distance of 3.0K.M. The total population served by these habitations are 12,15,328 .

88 habitations ( having total population of 49,204 ) have a upper primary school at a distance more than 3.0. K.M.

Total 36 habitations have been selected for opening a new upper primary school on the basis of the given criteria ; Maximum number of habitation proposed are in Nawanshahar C. D. block as e.g. 10.

3.3 Out of 59 villages which have zero population of Scheduled caste in the village. Only 2 have facility for upper primary education. Out of next set of 258 villages which have a proportion of scheduled caste upto 25 in the village., 61 have facility for upper primary education out of 547 villages which have a proportion of 26-50 scheduled caste in the village, 176 have facility for upper primary.. Out of 281 villages which have a proportion of 51.75 schedule caste in the village , 44 have facility for upper primary . Out of 75 villages which have more than 75 schedule caste in the village , 6 have facility for primary education.

The Information regarding villages according to proportion of schedule tribes population and availability of primary schools in them, is nil as there is no schedule tribe in the district.

3.4 There are 150 upper primary schools in the district . This includes 148 schools of Government and 2 schools run by private aided agencies.

Total number of primary classes/sections in the rural area is 349 .

In the urban area of the district , there are 56 schools of Government , one school of Local body , 47 schools governed by private agencies and 14 schools run by private unaided agencies . The total number of upper primary sections in the urban area is 118 .

The district has a total figure of 164 upper primary schools having 467 upper primary sections in them.

3.5 Out of 350 upper primary schools in the rural area of the building, 143 schools have pucca buildings, only 7 have partial pucca building . Nakodar and Shahkot C.D. block have 2 schools each , which have partial pucca buildings .

In the urban area , all 14 schools have pucca buildings .

3.6 Item 6 shows the availability of Library facility in upper primary schools . 133 Government upper primary schools and 2 schools Governed by private aided agencies have library facility in the rural area . In the urban area , 3 Government upper primary schools and 2 private aided schools have library facility .

3.7 . Item 7 reveals the position of ancillary facilities in upper primary schools . In rural area 143 Government schools 2 private aided and one private unaided school have drinking water facility for students . 140 Government schools , 2 private aided , 1 private

unaided school have urinal facility for the students. Only 92 Government schools, one private aided and one private unaided school have separate urinal for girls students. Only 60 Government schools, 2 private aided and one private unaided have lavatory.

30 Government schools and one private aided school have separate lavatory for girls. Only 77 government schools and one private aided have a facility of medical check-up of the students.

In urban area 10 Government, 2 private aided and one private unaided have drinking water facility.

10 Government, 1 private aided and one private unaided school have urinal facility for students. 5 government schools one private aided and one private unaided school have separate urinal for girls student. 5 Government schools, 2 private aided and one private unaided school have lavatory facility. 4 government schools, one private aided and one private unaided school have separate lavatory for girls.

4 Government schools, one private aided and one private unaided have medical check-up facility for students. There is great need of separate urinal and lavatories for girls students. This work should be done the basis of top priority.

- 3.8. In the rural area there are 1593 teachers working at upper primary school (stage) (947 male and 646 female) 248 male and 196 female are matriualte trained teachers, 113 male 76 female are higher secondary trained teachers 454 male and 327 female teachers are trained graduates 59 male and 12 female teachers are trained post graduates . 34 male and 26 female teachers are language teachers, 39 male and 9 female are teachers belonging to other than the above mentioned qualification.

In the urban area there are 270 teachers ( 164 male and 106 female ) working at the upper primary stage . 8 male and 5 female teachers are trained matriculate 73 male and 19 female are trained teachers having qualification upto higher secondary . 78 male and 76 female are graduate trained teachers . 3 female teachers are post graduates . 5 male and 3 female teachers are language teachers .

3.9. There are 94133 & 51518 boys and 42615 girls at upper primary stage in the district . In rural area there are 31952 boys and 25670 girls .

In urban areas there are 19566 boys and 16945 girls .

Out of 94133 , 18686 boys and 13386 Girls are scheduled castes in the district . In the rural area schedule caste enrollement at upper primary stage is 12719 boys and 8638 girls .

In the urban area scheduled caste enrollement is 5957 boys and 4748 girls .

There is no scheduled tribe enrollement in the district .

## Chapter - IV

### MAIN FINDINGS REGARDING SECONDARY AND HIGHER SECONDARY ( Plus 2 stage).

4.1 Out of 1236 habitations of the district, 119 have secondary schools / sections with in the habitations. It served the population of 4,26,659.

1,222 habitations have secondary schools / sections upto a distance of 8 K.M. (the population being 12,55,250)

Only 14 Habitations (having population of 8,602) have to go a distance of more than 8 K.M.

Maximum number habitations are in Na Newarshingar C.D. Block i.e 4, which have secondary school/ sections at the distance of more than 8.00 K.M. It served the 1.41 % of the population.

However, Janga C.D. Block has only 2 habitations which have secondary schools at a distance of more than 8 K.M., but it served the 2.35 % of population.

Similarly Aur Block has 3 habitations which have secondary school at the distance more than 8.0 K.M., but it served the population of 2.61 %.

4.2. Table No. 2 shows the number of habitations and their population served with a higher secondary school at the distance upto 8.0 K.M. and beyond 8.0 K.M.. There are 835 habitations in the district where a higher secondary school is upto a distance of 8.0 K.M. It served the population of 8,98,199.

401 habitations in the district are such which have higher secondary school at a distance of more than 8.0 K.M. It served the population of the 3,66,333.

4.3 There are 187 secondary schools (171 Govt., 13 private aided and 3 private unaided) in the rural areas.

There are 70 secondary schools ( 33 Govt., 1 Local Govt, 33 private aided and 1 private unaided) in the urban area.

The total No. of schools having secondary classes are 199 in the rural and 105 in the urban area, comprising a total of 304 classes in the district.

4.4. There are 12 higher secondary schools (8 Govt., and 4 private aided) in the rural area.

There are 27 higher schools (12 Govt., 1 in local body, 12 private aided and 2 private unaided)

Total Higher secondary schools in the whole district are 39.

- 4.5 (i) 107 secondary schools out of 187 in the rural area have library facilities. The % age being 89.3%  
All the 78 schools in the urban area have a facilities of library, the % age being 100.

(ii) 11 higher secondary schools out of 12 in the rural area have a facility of library.

All the 27 higher secondary schools in the urban area have library facility.

- 4.6 Item 6 reveals the number of teachers teaching secondary classes and their qualifications.

In rural area of 1874 teachers at secondary stage (1065 male and 809 female) 132 male and 102 female are matriculate trained teachers. 41 male and 13 female have a qualification of higher secondary. 377 male and 354 female teachers are trained graduates. 192 male and 98 female teachers are trained post graduate. 231 male and 142 female teachers are trained language teachers. 92 male and 81 female teachers belong to categories other than mentioned above.

In urban area out of 1064 teachers at secondary stage (431 male and 633 female) 32 male and 43 female are matriculate trained, 151 male and 66 female are higher secondary trained, 34 male and 261 female are graduate trained, 187 male and 20 female are post graduate trained, 17 male and 112 female are language trained teachers and 10 male and 131 female belonging to other category than mentioned above.

7. In rural area out 112 teachers (110 male and 32 female) teaching at the higher secondary stage, 6 male and 2 female teachers are matriculate trained, 8 male and 1 female are higher secondary trained, 55 male and 15 female are graduate trained teachers, 22 male and 9 female are post graduate trained teachers, 17 male and 2 female teachers are language teachers, 2 male and 3 female teachers are belonging to other categories.

In urban area out of 872 teachers ( 374 male and 498 female) teaching at higher secondary stage, 201 male and 245 female are graduate trained teachers, 76 male and 43 female are post graduate trained teachers 66 male and 98 female are language trained teachers, 31 male and 12 female teachers belong to other categories.

4.8 In rural area out of 171 Govt. schools, 156 schools have science laboratory, all the 13 private aided and 3 private unaided schools have science laboratories. Only 21 Govt. Schools have no Science Laboratory in the rural area.

In the urban area all the 33 Govt. Schools, 33 private aided and 1 local body school have Science laboratories. Out of 11 private unaided schools only 2 have no science laboratory.

4.9 There are 14 Govt. Higher Secondary schools in the district teaching science subjects, out of which 9 schools have separate laboratories for Physics, Chemistry and Biology and 5 schools <sup>are</sup> having combined laboratories for all subjects.

There is only one school of the local body teaching science subjects. It has a facility of separate laboratory for Physics, Chemistry and Biology.

Out of 14 private aided schools teaching science subjects, 5 schools have separate laboratories and 5 schools have combined laboratories for all science subjects. Out of 2 private unaided schools teaching science subjects. One school has separate laboratory and one has combined laboratory.

4.10 Item 10 shows the number of Science teachers teaching Science subjects at the Secondary and Higher Secondary stage and their qualifications:-

(i) At secondary stage, there are 2 teachers having Ph.D/M.Phil qualification. 38 Science teachers are M.Sc. trained, 1 is trained B.Sc.(Hons.), 558 are trained, 30 are trained matric with science 4 trained teachers teaching at secondary stage are without Science qualification.

ii) At the higher secondary stage, 1 teacher have Ph.D/ M.Phil qualification, 27 teachers are M.Sc. trained, 74 teachers are B.Sc. trained, 2 are untrained teachers with inter science qualification, 12 teachers are trained matric with science.

There are 3860 ( 21518 boys and 17162 girls) in the district at secondary level, and 3748( 2406 boys and 1382 girls) at higher secondary level.

In rural area there are 24981 (12674 boys and 9307 girls) are at secondary level and 714 (578 boys and 136 girls) at higher secondary level.

In urban area 16698 ( 8844 boys and 7854 girls), are at secondary level and 3034 (1828 boys and 1206 girls) at higher secondary level.

Out of 265 secondary schools of the district 227 schools have drinking water facility and 200 schools have urinal facility, 17 schools have separate urinal for girls and 170 schools have separate lavatories and 133 schools have separate lavatories for girls.

There is a great need for separate urinal and lavatory for girls.

Out of 39 higher secondary schools of the district, 22 schools have drinking water facility and 24 have urinals and 15 schools have separate urinals for girls and 14 schools have lavatories and 10 schools have separate lavatories for girls.

Item 13 shows the number of schools having physical education teachers in secondary and higher secondary schools.

In rural area there are 244 schools having physical education teachers at secondary stage and 8 schools at higher secondary.

In urban area there are 99 schools having Physical Education teachers at secondary stage and 4 schools at higher secondary stage.

Item 14 shows the No. of higher secondary schools having various streams, (Arts, Science, Commerce etc.) and vocational courses etc.

CHAPTER VOTHER EDUCATIONAL FACILITIES.

This survey reveals sufficient information regarding other educational facilities like non-formal education, adult education, pre-primary education and schools for the disabled.

1. Item No. 1 shows the number of non-formal education centre and enrolment. There are 32 centres in the rural area having total enrolment of 996 ( 425 boys and 571 girls) in the age group 6-11.  
There are 18 centres in the urban area having total enrolment of 571 ( 228 boys and 343 girls)
2. Item No. 2 shows the adult education/ functional literacy facilities and enrolment. There are total 265 centres for adult education in the rural area having total enrolment of 11046 ( 1645 men and 9401 women)  
There are total 65 centres in the urban area having 2754 enrolment (374 men and 2380 women.)
3. Item No. 3 shows the schools for the disabled ( Handicapped)  
There is only one C-Educational centre for deaf and dumb situated at Jalandhar.  
There are two villages in the rural area having 2 independent pre-primary schools.  
In the urban area only one town/city is Jalandhar having the facility of Independent pre-primary school (The number being 4)

In rural area 8 Govt. Schools offer Arts and 4 Science courses, 4 private aided schools offer Arts and 3 Science courses.

In the urban area 12 Govt. Schools offer Arts and 10 Govt. Schools offer Science course, 2 commerce, 1 Technical course and one home science and 1 school offer vocational courses. 1 school run by local body offer Arts and Science course. 12 Schools run by private aided agencies offer Arts, 11 schools offer Science course, 2 schools offer commerce, 2 schools offer home science.

2 schools run by private unaided agencies offer Arts, and science courses and one school offer Vocational course.
