

1. INTRODUCTION:

a. <u>Brief history, objectives and rational of the Mid Day Meal</u> **Programme:**

Mid-Day-Meal Programme is being implemented by Mid Day Meal Directorate under Administrative Control of RD & PRD Department in Rajasthan. Mid-Day-Meal is provided to all eligible students studying in approx. 74690 Govt., Govt. aided, school run by local bodies and EGS /AIE centers. State Government started providing cooked meal in mid-day-meal programme from July, 2002. To provide cooked meal, State Government was providing Rs. 0.50 per student per day for conversion charges since July 2002. Under this programme the recipes were ghooghari / Dalia etc. From January, 2005 cooking conversion cost was increase to Rs. 1.50/- per student per day. The new recipes were Dal-Bati, Dal-Roti, Roti-Sabji, Sweet / Namkeen Rice, Khichadi, Dalia, Pulav etc. From March 2, 2006 cooking conversion cost was increased to Rs. 2/- per student per day. The recipes were Dal-Bati, Dal-Roti, Roti-Sabji. There is provision to provide seasonal fruits once a week along with mid-day-meal.

d. <u>Nutrition status, including data on malnutrition, anaemia, Vitamin A,</u> other micro-nutrient deficiencies, etc.

Specific Study regarding nutrition status of students taking Mid Day Meal has not been carried out by the Department. However, Medical & Health Department of the State carries out medical checkup of the students and deficient students are given medical aid and micro nutrients such as Vitamin A. iron folic acid, multi vitamin, Deworming tablets etc. Every deficient student is provided micro nutrients for 100 days.

During the year 2006-07, Medical & Health Department has completed Health Checking Campaign. Under this campaign, out of total 62 Lakh students, 22.37 Lakh students have been identified for medical and micro nutrient aid. To ensure effective implementation of this activity. M&H Department has prepared a detailed work plan amounting to Rs. 17.15 crores. To fund this requirement, Mid Day Meal Directorate has provided a sum of Rs. 09.62 Crores from the Mid Day Meal State Budget for procurement and distribution of micro nutrients. The remaining amount will be provided by the Medical Department of the State.

During the year 2005-06 the Department has provided Rs. 15.92 crores for this activity to Medical & Health Department for benefiting approx. 22 Lakh students.

Independent evolution agency appointed by the Department has been directed to consider this aspect in their evolution field work.

Specific Study regarding nutrition status of students taking Mid Day Meal has not been carried out by the Department. However, Medical & Health Department of the State carries out medical checkup of the students and deficient students are given medical aid and micro nutrients such as Vitamin A. iron folic acid, multi vitamin, Deworming tablets etc. Every deficient student is provided micro nutrients for 100 days.

During the year 2006-07, Medical & Health Department has completed Health Checking Campaign. Under this campaign, out of total 62 Lakh students, 22.37 Lakh students have been identified for medical and micro nutrient aid. To ensure effective implementation of this activity, M&H Department has prepared a detailed work plan amounting to Rs. 17.15 crores. b. Regularly and wholesomeness of mid day meals served to children reasons for programme interruption, if any.

- Hot cooked meal is being served on all the school working days to all present students. The day wise menu decided by State Government is welcome by every section.
- In some schools, sometimes the programme is interrupted due to unavoidable circumstances. The reasons for programme interruption are natural calamities such as flood in some part of Rajasthan, irregular/excessive rain fall, high temperature and teachers on leave (schools where only single teacher is working).


d. Food grains management, including adequacy of allocation, timeliness of lifting, transportation and distribution, and suitability of storage at different levels.

Claims for allocation of food grains are submitted on time to GOI. Immediately after receiving allocation from GOI, Districts are informed about their entitlement of food grains. Para No. 5 of detailed guide-lines issued by the Department is self explanatory and all Districts are following the Govt. instructions. Following are the high lights of food grain transportation system in Rajasthan.

- i) RAJFED has been designated as State Nodal Transportation Agency.
- ii) CEO, Zila Parishad provides monthly requirement to RAJFED.
- iii) Food grains are lifted before the commencement of every month. For example, for implementation of Mid Day Meal Programme for the month of March 2007, food grains are supplied to the schools by the end of February 2007. Sometimes food grains are lifted to cater the requirement of two months.

- iv) District Collector/CEO Zila Parishad/District Elementary Education Department issues an authorization letter by deputing one officer for every Block.
- v) A Committee constituted for ensuring FAQ of food grains first inspects the FCI Godowns.
- vi) After the recommendation of this Committee, food grains are lifted by transportation agency.
- vii) Transportation agency picks up the food grains according to Block-wise requirement.
- viii) Block level transportation agency distributes the food grians at door-step of every school.
- ix) In case food grains are to be stored then they are kept in a godown under double-lock system. One key of the godown remains with BDO/BEO and the other key with the transport agency.
- x) Transportation agency submits the food grains distribution receipt to BDO/BEO.
- xi) Every school submits it food grains receiving information to BEO. BEO/BDO cross-checks the food grains distribution/receipt information submitted by two independent sources and in case any difference is found, due action is taken.
- xii) Generally no separate godowns are available at school level. However, Kitchen-cum-stores are being constructed in schools. Under this construction, sufficient space for storage has been designed.
- xiii) Following is the food grains lifting/distribution chart:

Transportation subsidy is directly released by GOI to the State Nodal Transport Agency or Zila Parishad without intimation to GOR. Therefore, exact figures are not available with the Department.

At present, cooking assistance @ Rs. 2.00 is being shared by GOI @ Rs. 1.50 per student and GOR @ Rs. 0.50 per student per day.

In addition to cooking conversion assistance Rs. 0.50 per student per day, GOR is also providing assistance @ Rs. 0.07 per student per day towards medical facility to provide micro nutrients and other related activities.

Apart from this during famine 2006, approx. Rs. 200 crores were provided by GOR/by dovetailing funds from different developmental schemes, and construction of about 16000 kitchen cum store in relief works were undertaken.

g. System for release of funds provided under cooking costs (Central and State)

During the year 2005-06, cooking-conversion assistance @ Rs. 1.50 per student per day (GOI Rs. 1.00 and GOR Rs. 0.5) was being provided. From 01-04-06, cooking conversion cost was enhanced to Rs. 2.00 per student per day (GOI Rs. 1.00 and GOR Rs. 1.0). Later on, after enhancement in GOI cooking conversion assistance to Rs. 1.50 per student per day, state assistance was reduced to Rs. 0.50 per student per day w.e.f. July 1, 2006. Average cost of meal per day Rs. 2/- per student including cost of oil, pulse, condiments etc. At present, cooking assistance @ Rs. 2.00 is being shared by GOI @ Rs. 1.50 per student and GOR @ Rs. 0.50 per student per day.


For all kind of assistance (i.e. cooking conversion, construction of kitchen, procurement of equipments, MME) following is the fund flow system in Rajastan:

- i) Fund released by GOI first comes in the State exchequer.
- After receiving GOI allocation, MDM Department submits the file to State Finance Department (Ways& Means) for confirmation of fund received in State account.
- iii) After confirmation of fund receipt, concurrence of Planning Department is taken.
- iv) Planning Department internally seeks approval from Finance Department (Expenditure).

- v) After concurrence of Planning Department, administrative orders to release the funds are issued by MDM Department. The funds are allocated in proportion to the enrollment.
- vi) After Department's administrative sanction, Finance Department (Budget) releases Budget Transfer orders to all Treasury Officers.
- vii) On production of MDM Administrative sanction and budget transfer letter issued by Finance Department, Treasury Officer transfers the funds in Zila Parishad PD account.
- viii) After transfer of funds in Zila Parishad PD account, Zila Parishad in turn releases the funds to BDO/BEO according to enrollment of the area, who in turn releases the funds to SDMCs/schools on quarterly basis.

The funds flow chart is as under:-



h. System for procuring cooking ingredients (fuel, condiments, oil, etc.)

Mid Day Meal to every eligible and present student is being provided either by meal cooked at centralized kitchen or meal cooked at school level. Cooking ingredients for centralized kitchen are purchased by the concerned NGO. Ingredients for decentralized cooking are locally purchased by the cook of the school or any authority in schools from the local markets.

i. System for cooking, serving and supervising mid day meals in the school.

i) The overall responsibility of cooking and supplying meals up to schools is of the concerned NGO running/operating centralized kitchen.

- ii) In decentralized/school cooking, the meals is cooked by a local resident preferably a women.
- iii) A group of women (called as Annpurna Women Cooperative Society) is also providing Mid Day Meal in 2 Panchayats of every Block. Meal is cooked either at school of Panchayat/village level. And is then distributed to all schools of the Panchayat/village. Presently 463 Annapurna Women Cooperative Societies are providing meal in approx. 3500 schools benefiting more than 3 lakh students.
- iv) A local committee comprising of school headmaster, teacher, representative of Panchayat, a local woman, ANM/VLW, constituted at school level supervise the meal distribution work.
- v) School Development & Management Committee is overall responsible for effective implementation of the Programme at school level.

Vi) Presently following centralized kitchen are functioning in the State:

j. Status of construction of kitchen sheds from (i) funds released under the Mid Day Meal Scheme and (ii) funds from other development programmes, such as SGRY, BRGF, etc.

- So far more than 33000 kitchen cum store have been sanctioned/constructed by dovetailing funds from various developmental schemes in the last 2 years.
- ii) A sum of Rs. 2816.18 Lakh were released by GOI for construction of 4694 kitchen on 15-11-06. Immediately after receiving GOI allocation, District wise targets were decided by the Government, keeping in view the exact requirement of the concerned districts. As central funds have not yet been released to Districts/Panchayats, therefore, construction of kitchen has not yet been started.

- state Government has declared 22 districts as draught affected area, directions have been issued to use central funds for material component and utilize labout from relief works by dovetailing the works and to construct more kitchens than allocation.
- National Rural Employment Gurantee scheme is being implemented in 6 districts of Rajasthan. As construction of kitchen for Mid Day Meal is not an approved activity, under this scheme works could not be dovetailed with this Scheme.
- v) BRGF Scheme has not yet been started on the ground, therefore, dovetailing could not be done.
- vi) Due efforts are being made to construct more and more kitchen from SGRY and other developmental schemes.

k. Status of procurement of kitchen devices from (i) funds released under the Mid Day Meal Programme (ii) other sources

- i) A sum of Rs. 339.33 Lakh were released by GOI for procurement of kitchen devices etc. for 6787 schools @ Rs. 5000/- per school on 10-11-06. Immediately after receiving GOI allocation, District wise targets were decided by the Government, keeping in view the exact requirement of the concerned districts. As central funds have not yet been released to Districts/Panchayats, therefore, kitchen devices have not yet been procured.
- llowever, directions have been issued to all Zila Parishads that procurement may be done from the State budget amount, at school level without waiting for central government funds in their accounts. Later on, this amount would be readjusted.
- State Education Department has issued orders to utilize amount received under 'Sarva Siksha Abhiyan' for procurement of utensils etc.
- iv) Local residents and donors are being requested to provide serving/eating/cooking utensils for effective implementation of MDM Programme.
- v) By all possible efforts, so far approx. 40000 schools have been provided adequate serving/eating/cooking utensils.

1. Capacity building and training conducted for different categories of persons involved in the Mid Day Meal Programme under programme of SSA, DIETs, etc.

- i) So far, no major training programme has been conducted for capacity building and training for different categories of persons involved in MDM Programme.
- ii) However, State Education Department has been requested to incorporate Mid Day Meal Agenda as a part of Teachers' Training.
- NGOs running centralized kitchen have been requested to impart training to persons of nearby area who are directly involved in implementation of MDM Programme. Trainings to members of Annapurna Women Cooperative Societies have been given in 4 districts namely Bhilwara, Udaipur, Chottorgarh and Rajsamand.

m. Management Information System at School, Village / Gram Panchayat, Block, District and State Level.

Mid Day Meal Programme implementation is the overall responsibility of SDMC at school level. Head Master/Teacher Incharge of MDM maintains the day to day record of the Programme. There are only two registers to be maintained at school level. One register for funds and second for other details.

At the end of the month, every school submits its monthly progress report to nodal school of the area (generally upper primary school located in the village or at Panchayat level). This nodal school further conveys the MPR to Block level Officers. Block level officers compile the reports received from various schools and communicate to District level officers (i.e Zila Parishad or DEO), who in turn compile the entire district progress and forward to the Government.

Report received from various districts are compiled at Govt. level and thereafter, due analysis of the progress is done. All Districts are communicated comments about their progress.

Detailed online software has been developed by the department. This software is available on department's web site. Further Panchayati Raj Department has developed a complete project 'CARISMA' connecting all 32 districts, 237 blocks and approx. 1000 gram panchayats. This project is likely to be completed 10-03-07. After the completion of this programme, all blocks and districts would be doing online reporting.

Out of the MME funds provided by GOI, permission has been granted to hire one computer with operator at Block level. In this all 237 Blocks are having one extra hand for MDM Programme table works.

n. Systems to ensure transparency and openness in all aspects of programme implementation, including inter alia, food grain management, ingredients procurement, cooking and serving, appointment of cooking staff, construction of kitchen sheds, procurement of cooking devices.

To ensure transparency, following steps have been taken:

- i) Weekly menu is displayed on the 'notice board' by permanent marking (painted) at every school.
- ii) Honorarium payable to cook is also displayed on notice board.
- Department has designed a suitable format to receive key information from the schools. Whenever officers from Block/Districts visit the Programme, they are required to submit inspection report in the prescribed formats.
- iv) Kitchen cum store construction activity is being carried out by Gram Panchayat. Gram Panchayat submits its reports in fortnightly panchayat meetings, Gram Sabha and in social audit.
- v) Due audit as per government procedure is being done by respective department.
- vi) Food grains utilization are checked in proportion to students benefited.
- vii) Public Private Partnership:- Hon'ble Chief Minister and Minister Panchayati Raj are taking keen interest for effective implementation of this programme. The main thrust of the Government is involving Boards, Industrialist, Charitable Trust, NGOs for voluntary community support.

Temple Boards, Industrialist, Charitable Trust and NGOs are being encouraged and invited to contribute toward providing a wholesome meal to children. There are many social occasions like Festivals, Marriage etc., when local families are happy to contribute a special dish or sweet to school mid-day-meal programme.

Hon'ble CM has requested to leading Industrialist, NGOs, Temple Boards to provides PPP for MDM programme

- viii) Department has issued detailed guidelines on 17.01.2006 for involving NGOs, Trust, Corporate Houses.
- o. Overall assessment of the manner in which implementation of the programme is contributing to the programme objectives and an analysis of strengths and weaknesses of the programme implementation.
 - Intensive on the spot checking has been conducted in the month of September & November 2006, in all districts on campaign basis without pre intimation to schools, through district/block level officers. In one campaign, more than 60% schools of the districts were covered within 1 or 2 days time. Overall implementation of the Programme was found to be satisfactory.
 - ii) According to feed back being given by the District Collectors and various other officers and public representatives, the implementation of the Programme has been ranked above satisfaction.
 - iii) All senior officers/Secretary in-charge of the Districts are frequently inspecting the Mid Day Meal Programme during their visits to the Districts. All of them have appreciated the implementation of the programme.
 - iv) Any district level, block level officer whenever visits the area, inspects the MDM Programme and submits his report to District Collector.
 - v) Monthly targets have been fixed for various District/Block level officers for inspection of the programme. After inspection the report is submitted in prescribed format.

- vi) A simple format has been designed for public representatives who are also regularly inspecting the Programme.
- vii) Analysis of the Programme has been done by various independent agencies like CUTs. UNICEF, etc. who have found the implementation satisfactory.
- Budget Analysis Centre, Rajasthan has taken a number viii) of information under 'Right to Information Act'. They have cross-checked/verified the information provided by Government with the help of other 20 local NGOs intimation Government/District to Collector/BDO/School authorities and they have found implementation of the Programme the quite satisfactory.
- The department has fixed the Agenda for Block/District level meetings which cover all aspects of the Programme implementation. Copy of the minutes received by the Government is analysis thoroughly. So far in none of the minutes adverse comments have been given about the implementation of the Programme.
- x) Local, State level and national tevel news papers regularly write articles on the implementation of the Programme.
- xi) No serious complaint has been received by the Government about the irregularities in MDM Programme.
- xii) No case of malnutrition has been registered.
- Department's efforts to enhance Public Private Partnership have been welcome by Corporate/NGO etc. So far approx. Rs. 13.42 crores have been provided by various NGOs/Trusts/Corporates etc. for creation of infrastructure. In addition to this every NGO associated with the Programme is providing atleast Rs. 1.00 per student per day from own resources towards value addition (in addition to Government resources). So far more than 25 crore rupees have been provided by different NGOs for value addition.

- For proper utilization of Public Private Partnership, Mid Day Meal Trust, Rajasthan has been constituted under the Chairmanship of Chief Secretary, GOR. So far Rs. 25.07 Lakh have been received in this Trust. Matter for Tax exemption under Income Tax Act is pending with Ministry of Finance, Govt. of India.
- The Government is trying to follow all best practices of other states. In this regard, recently a team of Government officials visited Tamil Nadu State and likely to visit some other states also.
