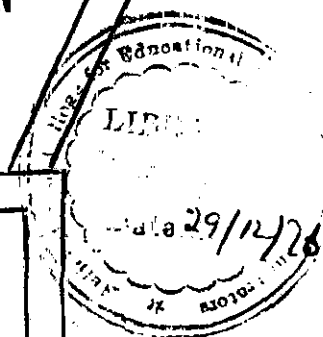

A GLIMPSE OF HIGHER EDUCATION IN RAJASTHAN

1. Rajasthan State lies between 23° 3' and 30° 12' north latitudes and 69° 30' and 78° 17' east longitudes covering an area of 3.42 lakhs Sq. Km. In 1971, the population of the State was 257.6 lakhs and the estimated population to-day is about 296 lakhs. There are 33,305 villages, 145 towns and cities and 26 districts subdivided into 83 sub-divisions with 196 tehsils under them. According to the last census report, 19.07 percent of the total population was literate.

2. In 1949, when 22 Princely States were merged to form Rajasthan, there was only one University at Jaipur. Two other Universities-Jodhpur and Udaipur-came into existence in 1962. In addition to this, there is Birla Institute of Technology and Science at Pilani (B. I. T. S.) which has the status of a 'Deemed as University'. There are 104 affiliated and constituent colleges. Of these, 50 are Government Colleges. (including 7 Girls' Colleges,) 7 privately managed colleges (including 28 aided), and 7 Constituent Colleges. 90 Colleges of General Education are affiliated with the University of Rajasthan, 5 with Udaipur University and 2 with Jodhpur University. The location of the Government Colleges has been so planned that there is at least one College in each district except in the districts of Jhunjhunu and Jodhpur, where private Colleges/University Centres are catering to the needs of higher education.

3. The State Government, despite financial constraint, have provided 16.2 percent or 84.34 crores for education out of a total State budget of 521.28 Crores of estimated expenditure for 76-77. About 10.5 percent of the education budget is being spent on higher education. This includes 6.1 percent for Government and aided Colleges and 4.4 percent as assistance to three Universities.

4. The total enrolment in all the institutions of higher education to-day is about 97,354 of which 29 per cent is in the Universities/Constituent Colleges, 44 per cent in Government Colleges, 22 in aided colleges and only about 5 per cent of the student population is studying in unaided private colleges.

5. Facilities for higher education in a variety of disciplines in the faculties of Humanities, Social Sciences, Science, Engineering, Sanskrit, Ayurveda, Medicine, Law, Education and Commerce, are available within the State. The University of Rajasthan has established Departments of European Languages (French, German and Russian) and Library Science, besides a separate Institute of Management, namely R. R. Poddar Institute of Management, catering for M.B.A. and other courses in Management. This University has further established advanced study centres to promote research in Humanities, Social Studies, Creative Art, Jainism, Study of Rajasthan and Science Education and Research. The Udaipur University, which is primarily an Agricultural University, has started a College of Home Science. The University of Jodhpur has opened a centre for Desert Studies besides a Computer Centre. Pilani (B.I.T.S.) has special facilities for electronic research.

6. There has been considerable emphasis on quality improvement of higher education for which the following actions have been taken by Rajasthan University:

- (i) introduction of Semester System of examination at the Post-graduate level;
- (ii) abolition of Supplementary Examination at the First and Second year levels;
- (iii) updating of Question Banks for First and Second Year;
- (iv) internal evaluation at all levels;
- (v) internalisation of Practical examination;

- (vi) assessment of answer books by the concerning teacher;
- (vii) introduction of M. Phil. Programme;
- (viii) promotion of research;
- (ix) introduction of three year Honours Course; and
- (x) modernisation of curricula.

7. There has been limited expansion in the field of higher education during the current session. Three Post-graduate Departments have been added to the existing Government Post-Graduate Colleges, besides Commerce in two Government Degree Colleges. No new Government College has been opened although two Arts Private Colleges (including 1 Girls' College) have come into existence while another private Degree College has been raised to a Post-graduate College in Commerce. Existing Government Degree Colleges have been strengthened by opening Commerce classes (including a Girls' College) Sanskrit in two, Persian in one and Music in two other colleges.

8. The percentage of literacy among women in our State was only 8.46 per cent in 1971 as compared to 18.44 per cent for the whole country. The State Government has, however, taken necessary steps to increase the facilities for higher education among girls. Girls studying in Government Colleges are exempted from payment of tuition fees if the annual income of their parents is less than Rs 10,000. Against 4 Women Colleges with the enrolled strength of 1200 girls at the time of independence, we have to-day 18 Girls' Colleges having an enrolment of 17,395 girls. There is a separate College of Home Science at Udaipur. To encourage girls to study Commerce, the faculty of Commerce has been added in two Girls' Colleges—one at Kota and the other at Jaipur. There are two privately managed Post-graduate Girls' Colleges where apart from other subjects, facilities for specialisation in foreign languages (French and German) Drawing and Painting and Music, also exist. It is significant that the girls have secured many merit positions in the examinations of 1976 held by the Universities of Rajasthan, Udaipur and Jodhpur.

9. Another remarkable development has been the extension of facilities for higher education to the under-privileged section of the society. Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes students are provided with scholarships, text books, financial assistance and hostel facilities. The number of Scheduled Caste students has increased from 6,304 in 1975-76 to 6,498 in 1976-77. To-day we have 2313 Scheduled Tribes students in Universities and Colleges. The Directorate provided facilities for special coaching in English to Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribes students in the University of Rajasthan for six weeks during the summer vacation of 1976. There is a separate institute at Jaipur for coaching Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribes students for appearing at competitive examinations.

10. One of the significant developments in the field of higher education is the facility to all students residing within Rajasthan for 2½ years to appear privately in the degree and post-graduate examinations in the faculties of Arts, Commerce and Sanskrit studies. The University of Rajasthan has also introduced Correspondence Courses in the faculties of Arts, Commerce and Education. This has enabled a large number of persons, (about 7366) who could not join a College for one reason or the other or who are employed, to continue their studies and improve their education standards.

11. To provide social consciousness and commitment amongst students at the under-graduate level by inculcating a sense of discipline and dignity of labour among them, the National Service Scheme has been organised. More than 6000 students have been involved in regular work. 44 institutions organised special camp during the Dusshera Break in which 1100 students had participated. The University of Rajasthan has initiated a massive literacy drive under the N.S.S in Jaipur to eradicate illiteracy from the capital within two years. 65 Programme Officers of N. S. S. have been trained by the Delhi School of Social Work during the current year.

12. Adequate attention has been given to promote Games and Sports in Universities and Colleges. Our students have shown excellence in Basket Ball and Volley Ball. Some of the outstanding Basket Ball players and wrestlers belong to

the affiliated colleges. The Rajasthan University teams have been the runners up in the Inter-University Basket Ball and North Zone Women's Table Tennis Tournament this year. Arrangements for Special Coaching in Games and Sports exist.

13. To create awareness of need for planned development amongst the students and the community around, Planning Forums have been organised. To-day 92 Planning Forums in Universities and Colleges are engaged in the dissemination of the Plan goals by organising debates, seminars, surveys, arranging exhibitions and holding General Knowledge tests etc. 13 Colleges have published their Surveys and Project Reports.

14. The N. C. C. Cadets and Rover Scouts are rendering valuable Service to the students. The N. C. C. organisation in our State has covered about 10 per cent of the regular students population comprising of Army, Navy, Air and Girls Division. A Girls Air Squadron has been raised at Banasthali. The students enrolled in these activities are getting increasingly involved in community projects.

15. The State Government have been giving special attention to students welfare activities. Students Unions are organising inter-college debates, dramas, music competitions, science and painting exhibitions. Facilities for Water Coolers, Canteens Common, Rooms and Cycle Sheds have been extended. Efforts are being made to establish Health Centres in a large number of colleges and also to set up Milk Booths in Universities and selected colleges.

16. Under the 20 Point Economic Programme, steps have been taken by the State Government to supply essential articles at concessional rates in the University/College hostels and stationery at controlled prices to the students. 99 Book Banks having 2,65,000 books have been established in the college for the benefit of 20,000 students belonging to low income groups. 38 Co-operative Stores are operating in colleges. 30,719 saplings have been planted against a target of 23,000.

17. Financial assistance is extended to the meritorious and needy students studying in Universities and colleges. There is provision for 4200 scholarshias (in addition to 10 per-cent free-ships and 10 per-cent half free.ships) amounting to Rs 18.94 lakhs under different schemes such as National Scholarships, Need-cum-Merit, Low Income Group, children of political sufferers and wards of school teachers and deceased Government servants Besides, National Loan Scholarships are available to 2747 students amounting to Rs. 18.60 lakhs. The Directorate has published a booklet dealing with "Rules for various kinds of Scholarships" for general information. In addition to these, students Aid Fund is available with U. G. C. assistance.

18. The Rajasthan University and College Teachers Association has a Teacher Home in the campus named as 'Derashri Shikshak Sadan' after the name of late Professor Satya Deo Derashri of Jodhpur University. The first phase of the building costing Rs. 50,000 has already been completed and the construction of the second phase estimated to cost further Rs. 50,000 is in progress. Teachers of Universities and Colleges (and members of their families) visiting Jaipur are entitled to stay in the Shikshak Sadan on payment of a nominal rent.

19. To promote research and creative writing, the State Government have been granting cash rewards and merit pay to meritorious teachers from time to time. During the session 1976-77 three members of Rajasthan Education Service have been granted cash rewards besides continuing monthly merit pay to another four.

20. The Department has finalised the seniority list of 1967 Officers of Rajasthan Education Service. The Departmental Screening and Promotion Committee has promoted 22 Officers to the selection scale and 94 Officers to the senior scale including Post-Graduated Vice-Principal Post-Graduate Heads, Associate Post-Graduate Heads and Degree Principals and Vice-Principals.

21. The State Government have introduced the U. G. C. Scheme for Faculty Improvement Programme for raising the academic and professional competence of teachers in affiliated colleges. Teachers selected by the U. G. C. under this scheme are entitled to academic leave with full pay and allowances during the entire period of Fellowship which will be counted for the purpose of increment and pension.

22. Another significant measure of the State Government for the teachers is the implementation of U.G.C. Pay Scales for the Universities and the Revised New Pay Scales for Government employees with effect from 1-9-1976. Special provision has been made for grant of advance increment to Government employees drawing basic pay of less than Rs. 1000/- per month and who have completed 10/20/30 years of service. Fresh Lecturers in Rajasthan Education Service (Collegiate Branch) with Doctoral Degree or published work of equal merit of high standard shall get higher start of Rs. 810- in the pay scale of Rs. 750-1350.

23. The Directorate has so far organised five training programmes in Educational Administration for Principals/Vice-Principals/Senior Officers of the Department. This was possible due to the cooperation extended by the Harish Chandra Mathur State Institute of Public Administration. 30 Principals/Vice-Principals participated in this Programme in October 1976 and exchanged their experiences and acquainted themselves with innovations and management techniques in educational administration.

24. In spite of the above achievements of the Department in the field of higher education, much remains to be done yet. The dearth of finances is there, but there is also scope for reorganisation of higher education. More attention may have to be given to the consolidation of the existing facilities instead of expanding them without qualitative improvement. It is hoped that through collective efforts of all concerned and dedication of the teachers we can achieve the goal of academic excellence.
