PART 'A'

INTRODUCTION

The Director of School Education is the major head of the department in charge of School Education, while the Director of Government Examinations is in charge of Examinations and the Director of Adult Education and Non-Formal Education is incharge of Adult Education and Non-Formal Education at school level.

2. The Chief Educational Officers at the Revenue district level, the District Educational Officers at the Educational District level, Inspectresses of Girls Schools (incharge of Girls High Schools in one or two Districts each) Assistant EducationalOfficers (incharge of Panchayat Union Schools at Block level) and the Deputy Inspectors of Schools at the range level, watch the progress and development of School Education in their respective jurisdiction. The Government Schools are administered direct by the Department. The Inspector of Anglo-Indian Schools supervises the Anglo Indian Schools in the State and the Inspector of Matriculation Schools supervises the Matriculation Schools.

3. The Aims and Objects:

The General aims and objectives of the Education Department as enunciated by the State Planning Commission, in their document "Towards a Learning Society" are:

Development of the personality of the child and its discrete and harmonious growth as a member of a group bearing on its affective life and work experience; Understanding of the culture and history of the State, the Country and the world, Instruction in the moral and spiritual values of the country;

Acquisition of Scientific, technical and professional skills:

Promotion of research to push back the frontiers of knowledge and solve the technical and developmental problems faced by the State and the Country;

Demo ratization of education through meeting the growing demand for education and the provision of social compensation for the condition of the poor majority of the States' population.

The specific objectives of the School Education Department are:

- 1. To expand schooling facilities and achieve cent per cent enrolment of the pupils of the age group 6—11 and 11—14 and improve the enrolment of age group 14—16,
- 2. To improve the quality of Education in Schools by providing (or assisting in the provision of) adequate school buildings, Laboratories, School Libraries play grounds etc., promoting science education in a sustained manner, creating additional posts of teachers for the additional enrolment of pupils; improving the professional competence of School teachers by giving inservice training etc. improving methods of evaluating the scholastic attainments of pupils and implementing schemes like free supply of midday meals to poor pupils in elementary schools and free supply of books and informs to the needy pupils.
 - 3. To provide such incentives as may be necessary for the welfare of students and teachers.

The Director of School Education is assisted at the headquarters by one Additional Director 4 Joint Directors (One for Personnel one for Elementary Education and SCERT, One for Secondary Education, and one for Higher Secondary Education) 6 Deputy Directors (one for Elementary Education, One for Secondary, 2 for Higher Secondary Education, One for Midday Meals and one for Educational Technology Cell) and other Assistant Directors to look after special aspects of education like Science Education, Libraries, Audio-Visual Education, Educational Statistics, Chief Minister's Nutritious Meal Programme Scheme etc., besides One Financial Controller and One Administrative Officer. At present there are 16 Chief Educational Officers—One each for all the revenue districts in the State.

There are 51 District Educational Officers, 14 Inspectresses of Girls Schools, One Inspector of Anglo-Indian School, One Inspector of Matriculation Schools, 366 Assistant Educational Officers and 480 Deputy Inspectors.

The details of the recognised special schools under the control of the School Education Department are as follows—

Sainik school (Amaravathi Nagar) 1.

The Sain's school at Amaravathi Nagar prepares boys academically, Physically and psychologically for entry into the National Reference Academy or into other walks of life. Boys are admitted to the Schools through a common All India Entrance Examination held once a year during January and February. Scholarships are santioned by the Government of Tamil Nadu from their funds to the students of Tamil Nadu domicile, studyingin the Sainis School on income-cum-merit basis. Students are holding Tamil Nadu Governmentscholarships. The rate of Scholarship is Rs. 4,000 per head per annum of the first year and Rs. 3,750 for the subsequant year.

A sum of Rs. 7 lakhs per year is spent on the six pre-vocational training centres in the state. School drop-outs of the age group 11-14 are admitted in the centres and given education-cum-craft training for three years.

There are now 48,000 inmates in the 432 homes for children, half of whom are certified destitutes, belonging to this State and studying in recognised schools. Grants are given on behalf of the inmates between the ages of 5 to 20 (5 to 25 in the case of physically handicapped children).

School Education in Tamil Nadu is free at all stages. An important scheme of scholarships is the Rural talent Scholarships tenable for the entire school course (inclusive of Higher Secondary Classes) which are awarded from 1971-72 Under the scheme, Sholarships are awarded every year newly to four students in each Panchayat Union.

The S.C.E.R.T. formed in May 1975 by integrating the three units namely State Institute of Education, State Evluation Unit and State Institute of Scence Education is incharge of Educational Reseranch and Training at School level. From 28th August 1978, the S.C.E.R.T. has been transferred from the control of Director of Government Exminations to the Control of the Director of School Education. Till February 1975, the Director of School Education was also the Commissioner for Government Examinations. From February 1975, the Government have appointed a separate head of the department, the Director of Government Examinations in charge of examinations at School Education Level.

The Director of Government Examinations conducts about 40 examinations every year,, some of them annually and some twice a year including the S.S.L.C. and A.I.S.L.C. examinations and from May 1980, the H.S.L.C. examination. There are now two Regional offices for the, department at Madurai and Coimbatore. One more Regional Office has been formed at Tiruchirapalli in 1982 83 with skeleton staff and it will become full fedged in 1983-84. There are now 1 Additional Director 1 Joint Director and 1 Deputy Director at the headquarters.

With successive liberalisation of the pension scheme for Non-Government Teachers, originally introduced from 1st April 1955, the teaching and non-teaching staff of all Aided Schools as teachers in local Body Schools are now eligible for pension and other retirement benefits as teachers is shown under School Education since the bulk of the beneficiaries belong to and local body schools.

PERFORMANCE BUDGET FOR 1983-84. COLLEGIATE EDUCATION.

PARTA-.

Introduction:-

The Directorate of Collegiate Education, formed in October 1965, is responsible for planning and expansion of Collegiate Education. The development of Collegiate Education has gained considerable momentum after the formation of a separate Directorate. Before the formation of this Directorate, there were only 92 Arts Colleges and 18 Colleges of Education. With the opening of a new Government Arts College at Chidambaram in 1982-83, there are now, 188 (53 Government and 135 Aided Arts Colleges and 23 (7 Government and 16 Aided) Colleges of Education in Tamil Nadu. Consequent on the opening of a new Physical Education College for Women at Salem under Aided management from the year 1982-83, the total number of other Colleges including two Government Music Colleges has risen to 24 in the State. In addition, evening courses are conducted in many Colleges with an enrolment of about 6,000 students. With the constitution of two more new Universities viz. Bharathiar University at Coimbatore and Bharathidasan University at Tiruchirapalli, there are now 5 Universities in Tamil Nadu. Besides the Tamil University was se. up at Thanjavur in September 1981.

The Director of Collegiate Education is assisted by Joint Director, Deputy Director, Chief Accounts Officer, Senior Accounts Officer, Personl Assistant, Assistant Director, Two Special Officers for Scholarships and One Special Officer for English. Five Regional Offices in Madras,

Madurai, Tiruchirappalli, Tirunelveli and Coimbatore with Deputy Directors of Collegiate Education and other auxiliary staff are functioning from 1979-80. For assisting the Deputy Director in the day-to-day functioning of the Regional Offices, one Assistant Director has been posted to each Regional Office from 1982-83.

With the constitution of two more Universities at Coimbatore and Tiruchirappalli there are, at present, 5 Universities in the State. Besides the Tamil University has been set up at Thanjavur in September 1981. Steps are being taken to start a new University at Karaikudi combining all the institutions of higher learning there. A sum of Rs. 50 lakhs has been set apart for the opening of a Women's University at Kodaikanal during 1983 84. The report of the Expert Committee and the draft bill for establishing the Women's University are under consideration.

Tamil University:

The Tamil University does not duplicate the work done in the Departments of other Universities. The research programmes are broad based and inter disciplinary in nature. It awards D.Litt. degree study and research and the minimum qualification required for admission is a Ph.D. degree of an Indian or a Foreign University or an established record of research.

Recurring block grant are sanctioned to these Universities for meeting the normal expenditure. On the recommendations of the Committee constituted in 1981 82, the quantum of annual block grant to Madras, Madurai Kamaraj and Annamalai Universities has been revised from the year 1981-82. Special grants are also sanctioned as and when proposals are received from the Universities concerned for meeting certain special items of expenditure. Further, grants for various plan schemes are also sanctioned to these Universities. Grants to the extent of Rs. 3-67 crores have been released in 1982 83 to the newly formed Bharathiar, Bharathidasan and Tamil Universities for Land acquisition, construction of Buildings, immediate expenses, etc.

(a) Government Colleges:

During the year 1982-83, 11 Degree courses and 6 Post Graduates Courses were additionally stated in the existing Government Colleges. Besides, four degree courses were started in the newly opened Government Arts College, Chidambaram in the first instance. With this new College the total number of Government Arts Colleges in the State has become 53. B.Com., degree course was started in the Evening Colleges attached to Raja Serfoji Government College, Thanjavur and Government Arts College, Thiruvarur.

Various schemes for provision of Buildings, Laboratory equipments, furniture, students amenities and play field facilities in Government Colleges are being implemented. During the last two years about 210 Assistant Professors were additionally appointed in Post-Graduate courses in the recent years. Sums of Rs. 3 lakhs for opening of new Degree courses, Rs. 5 lakhs for opening of new Post-Graduate courses and Rs. 1 lakh for the opening of additional evening course in Government Colleges have been provided in 1983-84. Further, sums of Rs. 19 lakhs for building schemes in the existing Government Colleges and Rs. 10 lakhs for the construction of building for the new Government Arts College at Chiambaram have been made in Budget Estimate, 1983-84. Orientation courses were conducted for the benefit of teachers handling English.

(b) Aided Colleges:

The Aided Colleges get assistance from Government by way of teaching, building and equipment grants as per Grant-in-Aid Code. At present, there are 135 Aided Colleges (Arts and Science) in the State. The staff in aided Colleges are eligible for the same scale of pay, retirement benefits including family pension, leave benefits, free medical attendance in Government hospitals and Group Insurance Scheme. Orders have been issued in 1982 83 to the effect that Sons/Unmarried daughters/Wife/near relatives of staff in Aided Colleges who die in harness shall be given preference in appointment in Aided Colleges without reference to employment exchange, subject to certain conditions. From 1st April 1980, the salaries to the teaching and non-teaching staff of Aided Colleges are paid directly through Banks wherein at the approved staff salary Accounts are maintained.

(a) Government:

The total number of Government Colleges of Education in the State continues to be 7 in 1982-83 also. An Extension Service Centre functions at the Government College of Education' Saidapet. Evening M. Ed. courses in 4 Government Colleges of Education and Part-time courses in "Diploma in Higher Education" in three Government Colleges of Education are conducted.

(b) Non-Government:

There are 16 Aided Colleges of Education which are getting grants-in-aid from Government, as in the case of Arts and Science Colleges Extension Service Centres function in 3 Aided Colleges of Education and each centre gets maximum grant of Rs. 25,000 from the State Government.

(a) Government:

The expenditure on Government Music Colleges at Madras and Madurai have been shown under "a Government". Apart from the regular day time course, the Madras Music College conducts Part-time evening course at 4 different centres in Madras City to teach Vocal, and Violin for the benefit of employed persons. The strength of the College during 1982-83 is 310 in regular classes and 168 in 4 Evening College centres. The students' strength in Madurai Music College is 85 in 1982-83.

For solving the accommodation problem at the Madras Music College, the construction of four additional class rooms, visitors hall and provision of toilet facilities has been sanctioned at a cost of Rs. 5.30 lakhs in 1982-83. Besides, three development schemes viz. (1) Research and Curricula development in Music Colleges (2) Special demonstration and lecture for the benefit of students in Music Colleges and (3) Provision of teaching aids like Audio and Video tapes with necessary recording and other instruments at Madras Music College to impart adequate training to the students are being implemented from the year 1982-83.

It is proposed to start four new courses in Kadam, Kanjira, Nuharsangam and Nattuvangam in Madras Music Collge from the year 1983-84. In order to train the students in pronouncing the words properly and to understand their usage etc., one language lecturer each in Tamil and Telugu in each of the Government Music Colleges at Madras and Madurai will be appointed.

Certain additional staff will also be sanctioned to the Madras Music College for strengthening the administration suitably. For these developments schemes, a provision of Rs. 1.42 lakhs has been made in the Budget Estimate 1983-84.

(b) Non-Government:

The special institutions under Aided managements which come under this category are described below:—

(1) Physical Education Colleges:

With the opening of a new Physical Education College for Women at Salem, by Sri Saradha Educational Trust from the academic year 1982-83 (viz. Sri Sarada College of Physical Education for Women) there are, now, 4 Physical Education Colleges in the State and all of them are maintained by private agencies. In 1982-83 there were 401 students and 36 teachers in these colleges.

(2) The Madras School of Social work :

The Madras School of Social work founded in 1952 has been affiliated to the University of Madras from July 1976. It conducts M.A. course in Social work. The Village adoption programme is also undertaken by this institution and one village called Karlapakkam has been adopted, where medical facilities, Adult Education Programme, and Family planning are implemented. 97 students are on the rolls in 1982-83.

(3) The Madurai Institute of Social work:

This institute (Post Graduate College) was formed in 1969 and is affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University. It trains candidates every year on full time basis for the profession of social work by offering two years Post-Graduate courses. There were 97 students in 1982-83. Besides, two year Post-Graduate Diploma course in Personnel Management and Industrial Relations (49 students in 1982-83) One year Post M.A. Dilpoma course in Social Rehabilitation and three months certificate course in Science of Creative intelligence are also offered by the Institute.

(4) Oriental colleges:

There are 15 Oriental colleges in Tamil Nadu under private management with 1615 students and 153 teachers in 1982-83.

(5) Rural Higher Institute:

There is one Rural Institute of Higher Education viz. The Gandhigram Rural Institute (Deemed University) at Gandhigram in Madurai District. This Institute was conferred the status of a deemed University from 1976-77 by the Government of India. The emphasis of this Institute is to impart practical programme in rural communities in addition to theoratical instruction and it stands for Gandhian ideals in education. This Institute gets an annual block grant of Rs. 1.5 lakhs from the State Government. It has 623 students onrolls and 76 teach rs in 1982-83.

An incentive stipend of Rs. 180 per year is paid to every student studying through Tamil medium in Degree classes and a provision of Rs. 35 lakhs has been made for this purpose in the Budget Estimate 1983-84.

The imporatnt item covered under this category are explained below :-

Institute of Mathematical Science, Madras:

The Institute of Mathematical Science which was started in 1962 is jointly financed by the State Government and Government of India. Every year, the Institute gets a contribution of Rs. 5.00 lakhs from the State Government and Rs. 5.00 lakhs from Central Government. This Institute has been modelled on the Institute for advanced study at Princeton, U.S.A., and has Ph.D. programme. Students from various Universities in India holding Master's Degree can get their Ph.D. degree from their parent Universities, working under the guidance of the academic staff of the Institute. Besides, the Institute organises twice or thrice a year, conferences and seminars on current trends in research on several aspects of Mathematics and theoretical physics. Summer schools on advanced topics in these subjects for the benefit of lecturers in Post-Graduate Colleges, bright students in M.Sc., classes and other research workers are also conducted. The Library of the Institute contains important journals and books in the area of Mathematical Science and they are useful to the research scholars in various educational institution.

Institute of Traditional Cultures:

This Institute is located at the University of Madras. It gets an annual grant of Rs. 16,000 from the state Government. It promotes studies and research in traditional cultures with emphasis on Tamil Culture.

National Service Scheme

The National Service Scheme was first started in 1969 with an initial strength of 2,000. This scheme was introduced in the University to provide opportunities to the teachers and students to gain valuable experience in community service, while working for the poor and under-previleged people during the vacation and spare time. This Scheme helps to arouse social awareness and consensus by means of discussion and services. Its strength gradually increased and has reached 50,000 in Colleges in 1982-83. The cost of the scheme is met by the State Government and Government of India in the ratio of 5:7.

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TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

Technical Education is one of the key sectors catering to the Scientific and Technological manpower needs of the country for its developmental and productive activities. Hence, realising the need, this department was formed during 1957.

The Department of Technical Education plans, promotes, and Co-ordinates the Technical Education activities of the State at various levels viz., the Higher Secondary Schools (Vocational) Polytechnics, Colleges of Art and Crafts and Sculpture and Engineering Colleges.

The Department has under its control of 7 Engineering Colleges 59 Polytechnics (which includes 9 Women's Polytechnics and 8 Special Institutions) and 14 Higher Secondary Schools (Vocational).

.Book Banks:

Book Banks have been established in all the technical Institutions except the institutions started after 1979-80 to help the poor and needy students with the assistance from the State Government and voluntary contribution from Private agencies. Book banks will be established shortly in the remaining institutions also.

Book Bank, exclusively for Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe have been established in all the Engineering Colleges except in Government College of Engineering, Tirunelveli with the Central assistance of Rs. 2.55 lakhs.

.Placement Section:

As part of the career guidance programme, placement sections have been created in all the stechnical Institutions to help and guide the passed out students in securing employments.

Award of Prizes for Project Works:

Under the Scheme of award of prizes for the best project works, the Government sanction Rs. 30,000 every year for the award of prizes to the final year students of Engineering Colleges and Polyetchnics who produce the best project works.

Faculty Development:

Under Quality Improvement Programmes, teachers of Engineering Colleges are sent to Institutes of Higher Learning like Indian Institutes of Technology and Indian Institute of Science, Bangalore toacquire Doctorate Degree. So far 9 members have obtained Doctorate Degree and out of 39 members who were undergoing studies 7 have rejoined in their institutions after studies and they are expected to submit thesis. During 1983-84, 5 more staff members will be deputed to higher studies (These figures exclude the staff transferred to Anna University).

As regards Polytechnics, the teachers are deputed to Technical Teachers Training Institute, Madras. Till date 335 teachers have been trained, 45 are undergoing training and 30 more will be deputed during 1983-84.

Industrial Training:

Under the scheme, teachers of Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics are sent to various Industrial establishments for short-term training every year, so that they may acquaint themselves with the latest practices prevailing in the industry. So far 528 staff members have been trained.

Continuing Education Programme:

Under Continuing Education Programme, members of Faculty are deputed every year to attend seminars, Short courses, Summer/Winter Schools, etc., organised periodically by various technical Institutions in the Country.

Consultancy Services:

Staff members of the teaching Institutions undertake approved technical consultancy services for Industry and Private Organisations and Charges are collected for services so rendered. Besides, testing services are undertaken in different laboratories of technical Institutions.
