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## PREFACE

Keeping in view the increasing demand of statistics for the planned development of education in the State, an attempt has been made for the first timeto bring out this hand book proecting the progress of education from 1965-66 to 31st March, 1969. It contains a detailed and comprehensive account of statistics relating to the various aspects of education. It is hoped that this publication will not only serve as a reference book but will be of in the planning and formulation of sound development programme and projects in specified fields and be of great interest to educationists and research workers.

To facilitate correct interpretation of the data presented in this booklet, the concepts and definitions used in the Tables have been explained briefly at the beginning and necessary footnotes and sources of data have also been indicated at relevant places.

This report is based on the material supplied by the District Education offices, Principals of colleges and Heads of various Directorates engaged in imparting technical, professional and vocational education. It is mainly restricted to the presentation of the factual positions.

## EXPLANATIONS

1. Academic Year.-For the sake of uniformity the academic year in these Tables is taken to coincide with financial year.
2. Recognised institutions are those in which the courses of stu ly followed are :hose pescribed or recognised by the Government or by a University or by Board of Secondary Education constituted by law and which satisfy one or more of these authorities as the case may be that they attain to a reasonable standard of efficency. They are open to inspection and their pupils are ordinarily eligitle for admission for public examination and tests held by the Government or the University or the Board.
3. Enrolement.-The enrolement relates to 31st March of the year.
4. Expenditure.-In calculating the expenditure from Government, Municipal $B$ oard Funds all payments or contributions from fees and other sources which are credited to such fund are deducted.
5. Indirect expenditure represents the amount incurred on direction, inspection. buildins, urnit:Ire, scholarships, hostels, and other miscellaneous items. The expenditure in some of these items cannot be apportioned to each type of institutions.
6. Institutions which were exclusively or mainly meant for girls have been classified as girls institutions and the remaining as boys institutions.
7. All statistics refer to Recognised institutions only.
8. Data pertaining to the year $1968-69$ is provisional.

## CHAPTER I

## GENERAL

This chapter in general deals with growth of population, area, number of institutions imparting general and professional education and the number of students stulying there in, total number of teachers and total expenditure (Direct and Indirect) on education in Haryana State.

## AREA AND POPULATION

The Haryana State consists of 6,670 inhabited villages out of which 5,476 villages were served with schools in 1968-69 as compared to 5,309 in 1965-66, 1,016 villages were served by schools in the neighbouring villages and 178 villages were without any educational facilities. They all fall in population group of less than 300 persons.

To understand effectively and to make a realistic approach for the successful implementation of various educational programmes, it is necessary to equip us with the background of the growth of population in the State. The decennial per centage variations in the last three decades (1951 to 1971) works out to $7.60,33.79$ and 31.36 respectively. The density per square kilometer ranges from 151 (Hissar District) to 293 (Rohtak District) in Haryana State giving 225 on an average. The ratio of population between rural and urban areas of the State stood at 82.18. The decennial percentage variation in literacy on an averaged increased from to 29.69 in the year 1971 over the year 1961. The literacy among females showed an appreciable improvement. i. e., from 9.21 to 14.68 as against from to 37.20 among males during the period under reference.

## INSTITUTIONS

The total number of recognised institutions in the State has increased from 5918 in 1965-66 to 6073 during 1968-69 showing an increase of 2.6 per cent. There has been no substantial change in the pattern of distribution of institutions by management. During ihe year 1968-69, about 93.76 per cent of institutions were managed by Government, $5.66 \%$ by private bodies and the remaining $0.58 \%$ by local bodies.

## PUPILS

During the year 1968-69 nearly 85.80 , per cent of the pupils were in institutions managed by Government (Central and State) ; 13.60 per cent managed by private aided bodies and the rest managed by Local Bodies and Universities. In comparison to 1965-66 the percentage of students in institutions managed by Government have slightly increased and the enrolment in institutions managed by local bodies has decreased to nearly the same extent.

The number of pupils has increased in all stages of education. The highest (49.42 per cent) increase has been in middle education during the period 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The total number of students in institutions of all types and levels in 1968-69 was 13,48,375. Of this 44,064 students were enrolled in colleges of General Education as pared to $3:, 410$ and 2,374 students in colleges for professional and other education re ipectively. The enrolment at school stage for general education was about 12.8 lakhs. Th; institutio is of school level for vocitional and piofessional education had an enrolment of 2261 in 1968-69.

## TEACHERS

There were 39708 teachers in Haryana in 1968-69 in institutions of different types and levels. Of this 25.4 per cent were women. Of the total number of teachers 13962 were in primary/junior basic schools, 7521 in middle/senior basic schools and 15614 in high/higher secondary schools. The number of teachers in col'eges for general education was 1637 and in colleges of professional education were 1270 teachers. The percentage of women teachers in primary schools was 25.6 , in middle schools was 26.8 and 24.5 per cent in high/higher secondary schools. Of the total number of teachers in colleges for general education 3.8 per cent were women teachers during the year under reference.

## EXPENDITURE

The total expenditure on education amounted to $1,65,934$ thousand rupees in 1968-69 as compared to 96,313 thousand rupees in 1965-66. This showed an increase of 72.3 per cent. Of the total !expenditure Rs $1,40,230$ thousands was direct expenditure and Rs 25,704 thousands was indirect exp nditure. The corresponding amounts in 1905-66 were Rs 75,523 thousands and Rs 20,790 thousands respectively. The total expenditure incurred on boy's institutions wa; Rs $1,50,653$ tho sands and that on girl institutions was Rs 17,803 tho :sands. Of the total expenditure 89.43 percentage was incurred on boy's in titutions. The per capita expenditure on education during $1968-69$ was Rs 124.93 as compared to per capita expenditure of Rs 67.05 in 1965.66. The expenditure on education as percentage of State fincome was.............during 1968-69. The percentage contribut on of the different sources to the total exnenditure remained more or less the same d'ring the period under reference.

The total direct expenditure increased during the period by 64,707 thousand rupees. Of the total direct expenditure 13.5 per cent was spent on universities, colleges and research institutions. The expenditure on general schools education was 68.6 per cent. The expenditure on vocational and professional education schools formed 1.23 per cent of the total direct expenditure. Of the total direct expenditure 77.63 per cent was spent on salaries of teachers and 9.91 percentage on salaries of other staff. Equipments and other appliances formed 7.00 percentage of the expendiue and 5.44 percentage of the total direct expenditure was incurred on other items during the уеӑг 1968-69.

The total indirect expenditure increased from Rs. 20,790 thousands in 1965-66 to Rs 25,704 thousands in 1968-69. The indirect expenditure under all headsshowed increase excpting in the case of others. Of the indirect expenditure 14.6 p .centage was spent on direction and inspection, 28.9 percentage on buildings, 20.9 perceatage on scholarships and 16.5 percentage on equipment and other appliances. The pecentage expenditure on hostels was 5.4 in 1968-69 and the corresponding percentases were $16.2,32.01,22.09,16.1$, and 3.01 respectively during the year 1965-66.

## EDUCATION IN RURAL AREAS

There were 5194 institutions in rural areas of different levels and types in 1968-69. This formed 85.4 per cent of the total number of institutions in the State. There were 12 colleges of geteral education and 3 colleges fer professional ecucation in the rural areas forming 25 per cent and 5.2 par cent of the total number $i$ the State. Among the schools for general education 82.20 percentage ware in rual areas, 19.2 percentage of schools for vocational and professional education and per cent of schools of special "education and $\uparrow 19.2$ per cent of schools for other education (including Social Education) were in rural area;

The total enrolment in rural areas which was 966632 forming 71.54 percentage of the total inrolment in educational institutions in the State. Of the total enrolment in schools for general education 74.45 percentage and 22.84 percentage of the enrolment in schools for professionaland vocational education was in the institutions in rural are as. As regarls, professional education at collegiate level 12.82 percentage of the total enrolment in professional and 15.50 percentage of total enrolment in institutions and colleges for general education was in rural areas.

## CHARIMK H

## PRIMARY EDUCATION

This chapter deals with Primary Education which consists of classes [-V covering the children of 6-11 age-group. At this stage of education, efforts are being made to improve the quality alongwith the quantitative expansion since the Constitution of India enjuins on the State to provide free and compulsory education for all children up to th: age of 14. Efforts to fulfil this objective were, however, hampared largaly because of the difficult position of financial resources.

A brief account of the progress achieved in the fleld of primary education on account of various developmental activities up to the year 1968-69 after the inception of Haryana State hảs been given at infra:-

Schools.-On 31st March, 1969 there were 5,579 institutions (primary'Junior Basic School and Primary Sections attached with other schools) as against 5,490 on the same date in the year 1966. Of the total number of institutions, 462 were exclusively meant for girls only, the others for boys, or co-educational schools. The number of rural institutions imparting primary education was 5,051 which constituted as mich as 91 per cent of the total number of such institutions during the corresponding period.

The distribution of primary schools except Mahendragarh District showed a decline ranging from 6 to 47 during the year 1968-69, indicating that large number of primary schools had been upgraded.

Pupils.-The enrolment at primary stage rose from 804,616 in 1965-66 to 852,072 in 1963-5), thus making a marginal increase of about 6 per cert. Of the total of 239,784 girls enrolled at primary stage, 57.3 per cent were studying in girls institutions during the year $1968-69$ as against 55.1 par cent in the year 1965-66.

In order to have the magnitude of wastage and stagnation in classes I-V as against an enrolment of 100 in Class $I$ in 1904-65, there were 52 in Class V in 1968-69, thus showing wastage as high as 48 per cent.

Of the total number of 4,279 primary schools during the year 1958-69, 683 were single teacher schools which constituted 14.3 per oent of the total as against 22 per cent in 1965-66.

Teachers.-The number of teachers in primary schools rose from 11,781 in 1965-66 to 12,958 in 1963-69 thus showing an increase of nearly 10 per cint Governmeat teachers formed 97 per cent of the total whereas the trained teaciers constituted 99.48 per cent of th: total in $1968-69$ as against 98.58 pe: cent in 1965-66, and the number of teachers engaged in teaching at the primary stage increased from 16,800 to 19,507 during the corresponding period.

Expenditure.-The pattern of expenditure according to different management so:rces during these years remained more or less the same.

The direct expenditure on primary schools during the year 19:8-0.0 was $20 \cdot 6$ per cent of the total expenditure on education in the State ageinst 23.25 per cent in 1965-6; showing a decrease of 3.7 per cent during the period under review. The average annual cost per pupil in primary schools rose from Rs 33.00 in 1965-66 to Rs. 67.00 in 1968-69.

Expenditure on Buildings.-The total indirect expenditure on buildings amounted to Rs. 46,174 in 1968-69 as against Rs. 9,294 in the year 1965-66 and formed 0.16 per cent only of the total indirect expenditure on all types of institutions. Government constributed 82.5 per cent during the year 1968-69.

Scholarships and Stipends etc.-The total number of students in the primary schools who were in receipt of various scholarships and stipends from different sources during the year 1968-69 came to 532 (including 178 girls) as against 1,215 (including 262 girls) during the year 1965-66. The total amount disbursed was Rs 22,057 in 1968-69.

Educational in RuralAreas.-During the year 1968-69 there were 3882 primary schools (including 101 for girls) situated in rural areas which constituted nearly 90 per cent of the total number of primary schools in the State. 11,075 teachers engaged in these schools to teach 433,788 pupils. The teacher-pupil ratio in primary schools improved from 1:43 in 1965-66 to 1:39 in 1968-69.

The total expenditure direct and indirect (excluding expenditure on direction and inspection) on primary schools in rural areas came to Rs. 2,34,92,087 (di ect Rs. 2,33,16,704 and indirect Rs. 1,75,383) during the year 1968-69 as against Rs. 1,46,77,987 (direct Rs. 1,46,45,272 and indirect Rs. 32,715) in the year 1965-66. Government spent vearly 98 per cent of the total direct expenditure in 1968.69 Further the direct expenditure incurred in rural institutions, constituted nearly 84.15 par cent of the total direct expenditure on all primary schools.

The data on primary education have been presented in the following table for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

## CHAPTER III

## MIDDLE SCHOOL EDUCATION

The education statistics pertaining to the middle stage eduoation have been dealt in this chapter. A brief analysis of the qualitative and quantitative progress achieved on account of various developmental activities in H aryana State has been attempted in the following lines:-

Schools:The total number of middle schools was $720(609$ for boys and 111 for girls) in 1965-66 as against 768 ( 664 for boys and 104 for girls) in 1968-69. This indicates an increase of 6.7 per cent whereas there was a decline of 4 and 8 in Gurgaon and Hissar districts respectively in the middle schools exclusively meant for girls during the corresponding period, indicating upgrading of these schools.

In addition to the middle schools, the middle sections attached with high and higher secondary schools also increased from 545 to 781 in 1968-69 over the year 1965-66. Such sections formed 50.39 per cent to the total number of institutions imparting education to the classes VI to VIII.

Pupils:Like the schools, the enrolnent at middie stage also showed an appreciable increase ( 49 per cent). The pupils strength rose from $2,06,037$ ( $1,64,410$ boys and $41,627$ girls $)$ to $3,07,868(2,42,932$ boys and 64,936 girls). Further out of 69,209 girls studying in middle schools, 34,147 ( 48 percent) were studying in boys' schools during the year 1968-69.

The percentage of enrolment in classes VI to VII to the the population in the age group 11-14 years was 44.61 in 1968-69 as against 31.85 in 1965-66.

Teachers: During the period under discussion the total number of teachers in middle schools was 7,521 ( 5,492 men and 2,029 women) in 1968-69 as against 7,165 ( 5,332 men and 1.833 women) in 1965-66. The percentage of trained teachers to the total also improved 98.20 in 1965-66 to 99.16 in the year 1968-69. The average number of pupils per teacher in middle stage was 33 in 1968-69 as against 28 in 1965-66.

Expenditure: The total direct expenditure on middle schools (including Senior Basic Schools) amounted to Rs. 1,91,62,287 during 1968-69 as against Rs. $1,25,51,509$ in $1965-66$. This gives an increase of Rs. $66,10,778$ or $52 \cdot 2$ per cent The pattern of expenditure (by source) almost remained more or less the same during the period under reference. 93.40 per cent of the expenditure on middle schools was met from Government coffers. Other main sources of expenditure were fees ( 4.43 per cent), endowment ( 1.94 per cent) and local bodies ( 0.23 per cent). Of the total direct expenditnre on middle schools the lion's share ( 88.78 per cent) was expanded on salaries of teachers during the year $1968-69$ as against 91.10 per cent in 1965-66.

The percentage of direct expenditure on middle school education to total expenditure on education was 13.66 per cent in 1968-69 as against 16.61 in 1965-66.

The average direct cost per pupil in middle schools was Rs. 62 in 1968-69 as against Rs. 51 in 1965-66.

Buildings: During the year 1968-69 the total direct expenditure on buildings for middle schools amounted to Rs. 2,79,793 of which 32 per cent was met from Government funds as against 0.3 fer cent in 1965-66.

Education in Rural Area: The number of middle schools increased from 666 (591 for boys and 75 for glrls) to 719 ( 645 for boys and 74 for girls) giving an increase of 53 during the year 1968-69 over 1965-66 Of the total middle schools 95.53 per cent were in rural areas in 1968-69. The enrolment in these institutions was $2,24,561$ (including 52,100 girls) which was 94.49 percent of the total enrolment in middle schools in 1968-69. The pupil teacher ratio in middle schools in rural areas was 34 in 1968-69 as against 36 in 1965-66.

The total direct expenditure on these schools was Rs. 1,72,36,153. Percentage of direct expenditure on middie schools in rural areas to total direct expenditure on middle school was $89 \cdot 94$. Rs. 68,097 were spent on buildings.

## CHAPTER IV

## SECONDRY EDUCATION

This chapter deals with statistics prrtaining to Secondary Education which consists of high/aigher secondary schools. The Haryana State after her inception on 1st November, 1966 continued efforts for expansion and improvement of secondary education. Facilities for teachers Training were expanded and improved greater opportunities for science education were also provided. Schemos for the improvement of science laboratories, libraries, constriction of n $\mathrm{n} \omega \mathrm{w}$ buildings and improvement of existing ones etc., were actively pursued.

The progress achieved in the field of secondary education has been given in the following lines ;

Schools.-The total number of high/higher secondayy schools increased from 548 ( 447 for boys and 101 girls) to 783 ( 653 for boys and 130 for girls) thus giving an increase of 43 per cent during the period 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The district-wise distribution of high/higher secondary schools showed increase in number in all the districts of the State. The highest increase in number of high/higher secondary schools was reported by Rohtak district (55) followed closely by Gurgaon and Hissar (42 each) and Karnal (40).
79.35 percent of high/higher secondary schools were managed by Government in 1968-69 as against 71.72 per cent in 1965-66 There was a continuous decrease ( $28 \cdot 1$ per cent to 21.5 per cent) in the number of schools controlled by Private Bodies during the corresponding period.

Pupils.-The number of pupils in liigh/higher sccondary stage was $1,17,463$ ( 95,059 boys and 22,404 girls) in 1968-69 as against 84,963 ( 69,534 boys and 15,429 girls) in 1965-66 projecting an increase of 37 per cent. Figures of enrolement in high/ higher secondary schools increascd from 3,26,475 ( $2,46,979$ boys and 79,496 girls) to $5,09,998$ ( $3,85,502$ boys and $1,24,496$ girls) during the corresponding period. The higest increase in enrolement has been reported by Rohtak District followed closely by Ambala and Karnal Disticts.

Co.education.-The number of girls in high/higher secondary schools incisesed from 79,496 in 1965-66 to $1,25,213$ in 1968-69. Of this 29 per cent of the total were studying in boys schools in 1968-69 as against 17.9 per cent in 1965-66.

Teachers. - The number of teachers in high/bigher secondary schools increased from 10,397 ( 7,933 men and 2,464 women) to 15,614 (11,742 men and 3,872 women) in 1968-69. Women teachers constituted 24.8 per cent of the total as against 23.7 per cent in 1965-66. The percentage of thained teachers was 93.3 per cent in 1965-66 as against 94.2 in 1968-69 The average number of pupils per teacher in high/higher secondary stage remained the same (17) in 1968-69 as it was in 1965-66.

Expenditure.-The expenditure on high/higher scondary schools increased from Rs. $2,61,03,780$ (Rs. 1,49,77,142 on high schools and Rs. 1,11,26,638 on higher secondary schools) to Rs. $5,37,97,659$ (Rs $3,72,46,580$ high schools and R: $1,65,51,079$ on higher secondary schools). This gives an increase of more than 1.6 per cent. The percentage of expenditure met from Government funds was 75.41 , lrcal bodies 0.15 , fees 19.37 and endowment and other sources 5.06 during the year 1968-69.

The distribution of expenditure on high/higher secondary schools managed by different agencies was more or less in the same pattern as in 1965-66.

The percentage of expenditure on high/higher seconoary school to the total direct expenditure on education was 38.36 . Of the total direct expenditure in high/higher secondary schools 78.79 par cent was expended on salaries of teachers, 10.93 per cent in salary of other stalf, 7.14 per cent on equipment and other appliances (recurring) and 3.14 par cent on other items in 1965-66 and the corresponding figures were $82 \cdot 12$ per cent, $8.71,8.13$ and 1.04 per cent, respectively in 1968-69.

Buildings.-The expenditure on high/higher secondary school buldings amounted to Rs. $8,36,425$ in 1968-69 as against Rs. 4,20,494 in 1965-66 recording an increase of 90.6 percent. Out of the total amount, 15.85 per cent was contributed from Government funds as against 0.98 per cent in 1965-66.

Scholarships, Stipends Freeshings and other Financial Concessions, etc.-Of the total enrolement in high/higher secondary schools 14,320 pupils (includes 1,428 girls) or $20.63 \%$ were awarded scholarships/stipends amounting to Rs $12,63,049$ during the year 1968-69. The number getting other financial concessions was 5253 (including 970 girls) and the corresponding amount spent was Rs. 2,20,526. The enrolement in institutions where edacation was free was 61,203 (includes 11,893 girls) which wis 12 parcent of the total enrolement of high/higher secondary schools.

Education in Rural Areas.-The number of high/higher secondary schools in rural areas increased from 331 ( 317 for boy and 14 girls) to 539 ( 513 for boys and 26 for girls) giving an increase of 218 (196 for boys and 12 for girls) or 66 per cent during the period under review. Of the total high/higher secondary schools $69.17 \%$ in 1968-69 were in rural areas as against $60.40 \%$ in 1965-66. The enrolement in these institutions was $2,97,666$ (including 40,272 girls) constituting $58.93 \%$ of the total enrolement in high/ higher secondary schools. The pupil-teacher ratio in high/higher secondary schools in rural areas was 33 in 1968-69 as against 29 during the year 1965-66 in all such institutions.

The total direct expenditure in high/higher secondary schools in rural areas was Rs $2,54,77,368$ of which $79,30 \%$ was met from Government funds. Percentage of direct expenditure in high/higher secondary schools in rural areas to the total direct expenditure in high/higher secondary schools was 48.76 in 1968-69 as against 45.87 in 1965-66.

Of the indirect expenditure in high/higher secondary schools in rural areas Rs $4,35,484$ were spent on buildings in 1968-69.

This section projects statistics on secondary education in Haryana State for the year 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.01 shows the number of high and higher secondary schools and their percentage by type of management during the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.02 describes the number of high and higher secondary schools (Districtwise) both for boys and girls separately from the year 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.03 indicates the number of students in high/higher secondary schools by the type of management for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.04 provides information regarding enrolement at high/higher secondary stage (District-wise) during the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The figures relating to educational facilities for children in the age-group $14-17$ and its percentage to the total population in the corresponding age-group have been given in table 4.05 .

Table 4.06 projects the single age distribution of pupils $\ln$ classes IX-XI along with percentage of different age groups to total enrolement for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.07 details the relevant statistics about girls enrolled in high/higher secondary schools in Haryana for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The percentage enrolement of girls to the total at secondary stage has been presented in table 4.08 during the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The data regarding total number of teachers (Government and non-Government) in high/higher secondary schools bave been projected in Table 4.09.

Table 4.10 describes the number of teachers (trained/untrained) in high/higher secondary schools during the years 1965-60 to 1968-69.

Table 4.11 indicates the number of teachers (trained/untraincd) at high/highesecondary stage for the ycars 1965-66 to 1968-69 for the State as a whole and District wise for the year 1965-66 to 1968-69 only.

Table 4.12 shows the pattern of expenditure according to different managements during the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The distribution of total direct and indirect expenditure on high/higher secondary schools according to different sources has been given in table 4.13 for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 4.14 provides the statistics on direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools by items of expenditure and their percentage to the total.

Table 4.15 presents information of direct expenditure on high/higher secondary schools (for boys and girls separately) and percentage of expenditure on secondary education met from different sources and average annual cost per pupil.

Table 4.16 gives the detailed figures of indisect expenditure on buildings for high/higher secondary schools for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69 for Haryana State as a whole and District-wise for the years 1968-69 only.

Table 4.17 shows the data about scholarships, stipends and other financial concessions, free studentship, etc., awarded to students of high/higher secondary schools

Detailed statistics of high/higher secondary schools in rural areas of Haryana State have been given in Table 4.18 from the year 1965-66 to 1968-69 and districtwise for the year 1968-69 only.

Distribution of direct and indirect expenditure on high/higher secondary schools in rural areas has been explained in Table 4.19.

## CHAPTER V <br> HIGHER EDUCATION

This chapter gives a brief account of the main developments in the field of higher education (general, professional and special) imparted in the universities, collieges and other institutions for higher education. For the qualitative improvement several academic programmes were initiated. The developmental activities of the Sitate included the improvement of salary scales of teachers, construction of student hostels and staff quarters. strengthening of laboratories and libraries etc. Besides. fellowships and scholarships were instituted for Post-graduate studies.

Colleges.-The number of colleges affiliated to universities or recognised by State Government and other institutions of higher education was 65 in 1965-66 before Haryana State came into existence as compared to 105 in 1968-69. Of the total number of institutions for higher education 38 were arts and science colleges and 27 colleges for professional and other education. The corresponding figures were 48 and 57 respectively during the year 1968-69.

The private aided bodies managed nearly half of the total number of such institutions ( $50 \%$ ) while the government controlled about 47 per cent. Of the institutions and the share of universities was $3 \%$ only.

Pupils.-The total number of students receiving instructions for higher education was 29518 ( 23646 boys and 5872 girls) in 1965-66 as compared to 61391 (49981 boys and 11410 girls) during the year 1968-69. Of these 1402 were receiving instructions in universities teaching departments, 44297 in colleges of general education, 9,464 in professional and other education, 6,014 in teache s training and 214 in other institutions.

Of the total enrolment of 6648 as many as 440744 ( $66.29 \%$ ) were recsiving general education, 22392 ( $33.68 \%$ ) professional education and 18 ( $0.03 \%$ ) were getting other education. Of the students receiving general cducation 1.5010 ( $34.05 \%$ ) were studying in pre-university, 27974 ( $63.47 \%$ ) in B. A./B.Sc. (Three years Degree Course) and 895 ( $2.03 \%$ ) in M.A./M.Sc. and $185(0.42 \%)$ were engaged in research/Doctorate studies during the year 1968-69.

In professional cducation, Teachers' Training attracted the largest number of students ( 12479 or $55.72 \%$ ). Next in order were Engineering Technology ( 3109 or $13.88 \%$ ) Industrial ( 2368 or $10.58 \%$ ), Medicine ( 985 or $4.39 \%$ ), Commerce ( 1574 or $7.02 \%$ ), Agriculture ( 1147 or $5.12 \%$ ) and Veterinary Science ( 51.6 or $2.30 \%$ ) during the year 1968-69 and the corresponding percentages were $23.77 \%$ or $4036 \%, 16.43 \%, 6.23 \%, 4.94 \%, 4.25 \%$ and $3.16 \%$, respectively in $1965-66$.

Co-education.-Of the total number of 14493 girls studying in institutions for higher education, 5883 girls ( $40.6 \%$ ) were studying in co-educational institutions in the year 1968-69. In university and other teaching departments, cent per cont girls were studying in co-educational institutions. In colleges for gemeral education which enrolled $78.0 \%$ of the total number of girls, more tran $50 \%$ were studying in co-educational institutions. In Teachers' Training Colleyes as mamy as $82.0 \%$ were receiving education in co-education institutions, in professional and other education, nearly 90 per cent girls were studying in co-education institutions.

Teachers.-The total number of teachers in institutions fo: righer education rose from 1912 ( 1650 men and 262 women) in 1965-66 to 3303 ( 2825 men and 483 women) in 1968-69. Of the total number of teachers $4.2 \%$ were in university teaching departments, $49.4 \%$ in colleges for general education, $38.3 \%$ in colleges of professional (excluding Teachers' Training) and other education and $7.7 \%$ in Teachers" Traming institutions during the year 1968-69.

Expenditure.-The total direct expenditure on institutions for higher education amounted to Rs 36488 thousands in 1968-99 as compared to 15441 thousand rupees in 1965-66. $47.89 \%$ of the expenditue was met from government funds, more than one-third ( $35.67 \%$ ) from fees, Universitys' share was to the extent of $10.23 \%$ only. Local Bodies contributed only $0.30 \%$ of the expenditure. The rest was met from endownments and other sources.

The percentage of expenditure cn institutions for higher education was substantially met from governm nt funds ( $47.48 \%$ ) followed by fees ( $45.89 \%$ ), University fonds $10.44 \%$ and endowments ( $5.88 \%$ )during the year 1968-69.

The figures of average annual cost per pupil in colleges for general, professional and other education show wide variations. The average annual cost per pupil wa: Rs. 355 in Arts and Science Colleges, Rs. 1501 in colleges for professiopal Eduction and Rs. 310 colleges for Teachers' Training in 1968-69.

While allalysing the total direct expenditure on various types of institutions for bigher education, it has been found'that salaries of teaching staff claimed as much as $56.06 \%$ of the total direct expenditure as against $19.27 \%$ on salaries of other staff and $7.48 \%$ expenditure on equipment and other appliances and $17.19 \%$ on other items.

The total indirect expenditure on buildings amounted to 6942 thousand rupecs 1968-69 as compared to 4831 thousand rupees in 1965-66, thus giving an increase of $43.69 \%$. Its break-up according to the various types of institutions for higher education was as under :-

University and teaching departments Rs 1211 thousands or $17.43 \%$, Rs. 1345 thousands ( $19.32 \%$ ) for the buildings of Collt ges for General Education Colleges for professional and other education Rs 4337 thousands or $62.48 \%$. The major portion of expenditure was thus incurred on buildings of colleges, professional and other educétion.

Scholarships.-The extent of scholarship/stipends and other financial concessions varied from year to year. The total number of students in universities and colleges who were in receipt of various scholarships and stipends from different sources during the year 1968-69 come to 17175 (including 2008 girls). The total amount disbursed to them on this account was Rs 38,33,258 (including Rs. 2,54,202 fo girls). Of the total amount government (including Central and State Governments and UGC) spent $74.76 \%$, local bodies $0.73 \%$, universities $12.89 \%$ and the remaining $11.62 \%$ was spent by other sources such as endowments, foreign organisations and the institutions themselves etc.

Apart from scholarships 3745 stipends, many students in universities and coileges received financial concessions from various sources for purchase of books, equipneat etc. As many as 5147 students in higher education got the benefits of free studentship, during the year 1968-69.

Education in Rural Areas.-There were 15 institutions of higher cducation in rual area. These constituted $14 \%$ of the total number of institutions for higher education. Of the total Twelve were colleges for general education. One Teacher's Training and Two colleges for Professional (Excluding Teachers' Training) and other edication.

The number of students enrolled in various institutions.for higher education in rural areas was 8669 and constituted 14.8 per cent of the total number of studeats in institutions for higher education. Maximim namber of stadents ( 81.7 pr دea:) ware studying in colleges for general education during the year 1968-69.

The total numbar of teachers in the institutions for higher education in rura ${ }^{1}$ areas was 350 and constituted narly 11 per cent of the the total number of teachers in institutions for higher education.

The total direct expenditure on institutions for higher education in rutal areas amounted to Rs 44.69 thousands and formed 12.48 per cent of the total direct expenditure on all institutions for higher education. The Government contributed to the extent of 10.80 per cent towards the direct expenditure institutions for higher education in rural areas.

The data pertaining to the progress achieved in the field of higher education bave been given in the following Tables.

## CHAPTER VI

## MISCELLANEOUS

This chapter deals with all those topics such as Pre-primary Schools, Education of the Handicappsd, Girls and Women and Scheduled Castes and comparative statements (State-wise) which have not been included in the preceding chapters.

Pre-Prlmary Education.-Pre-primary education is a preparatory stage of education which precedes the formal education, that commences at the primary stage It usually covers the age-group from 3 to 5 years. Since the formation of Haryana State there has been no change in the number (2) of Pre-primary schools, the number of pupils showed a marginal increase of 5 in 1968-69 over the year 1965-66. The total direct expenditure on pre-primary schools amounted to Rs 17,257 as compared to Rs 11,155 in 1965-66, resulting the annual average cost per pupil to increase from Rs 123 to Rs 183 during the corresponding period. With the fall in the number of teachers the pupil teacher ratio increased from 1.18 to 1.24 in 1968-69 as against 1965-66.

R?formatories and Special Schools for Handicapped.-Government of Haryana continued to emince keen interest in promoting education of the handicapped. In Haryana State education of the handicapped is bing imparted through institutions for the ply ically handicapped children only. The number of such institution remained the same (5) during the period under review whereas the number of students showed a slight increase from 324 to 353 in 1968-69 as compared to 1965-66.

The total direct expenditure on reformatories and schools for the physically handicapped was Rs $1,92,381$ in 1968-69 as compared to Rs $1,23,323$ in 1965-66. Of the total, 81.50 per cent was met by the Governm :nt 2,43 per cent by the local bodies and 16.07 per cent from endowments and other sources in $1965-66$ and the corresponding figures were 86.19 per cent, zero per cent and 13,81 per cent respectively during the year 1968-69.

Education of Girls and Women.-As the saying goes "By educating one girl you educate the family". Realising the importance and significance of education girls and women, strenuous efforts for the promotion of women education continued during the period under review. To ensure a faster pace of expansion of education to girls at all stages, the National Council for Womens' Education at its seventh meeting held in February, 1965 recommended that (i) special programmes for promoting girls' education included in State Sector be shifted to Central Sector and safeguards should be devised against diversion of these funds to other sectors, (ii) requisite expanditure from the general provision for education should be ensured for promoting girls' education at all stages and in all sectors, (iii) elementary education for girls should be free where it is still on a fee paying basis.

During the yoar 1953-59, there were 464 reoognised institutions for girls as against 563 in 1965-66. These formod 7.7 per cent of the total number of institutions.

The total number of girls studying in all types of institutions including those in boys' institutions increased from $2,85,530$ to $3,35,434$, i.e., by 17.48 per cent. The corresponding increase of boys was from $8,47,505$ to $10,12,941$ i.e. by 19.52 per cent. Of the $t$ tal number of girls only_———per cent were studying in institutions meant exclusively for girls and the rest were on the rolls of co-ed scation institutions. According to type of education, 79.42 per cent of girls were receiving general education, 0.30 per cent special and other education and the remaining 2.28 per cent professional and tech ical education in 1968-69. The corresponding figures were 97.81 per cent, 0.38 per cent and 1.81 per cent during the year 1905-66.

The total direct exponditure on iastitutions for girls i.1 1955-66 was Rs 96453 as against Rs $1.64,518$ in the year 1958.69. This showed an increase of 70.57 per cant. Th; total direct expenditure on girls' institutions formed 9.91 per cent of the total direct expenditure on all institutions.

Education of Scheduled Castes.-To achieve the all round development the spread of education among the weaker sections of society is an essential pre-requisitc. With this aim in view, the framers of our Constitution made it one of the Directive Principle of State policy to promote with special care, inter-alia, the educational interests of the weaker sections of the society, particularly of scheduled castes.

The enrolment of scheduled caste students at Primary Stage has shown decliue from 63,877 to 62,893 in 1968-69 as compared to 1965-66, whireas the number of students both at middle and secondary stages increased from 23,020 to 24,514 and 26,000 to 44,029 respeotively during the period under discussion.

Due to their extreme poverty it is not possible for the Scheduled Castes children to attend educational institutions whether for pre-matric or post-matric studies. The total number of beneficiaries among scheduled castes at school stage increased from 20,844 to 21,145 in 1968-69 as compared to 1965-66. Of the total beneficiaries, 1,707 were girls during the year 1968-69.

The total amount disbursed as scholarships, stipends, other financial assistance and freeships increased from Rs 94,755 to Rs 14,66,016 in 1968-69 over the year $1965-66$ and per beneficiary amount disbursed came to Rs 43 and Rs 69 respectively during the corresponding period.

The educational development of this section as revealed above are given in the following Tables :-

Table 6.01 prosents the statistics on Pre-Primary Schools in respect of number of schools, enrolment, teachers, total direct expenditure, annual average cost per student and pupil/teacher ratio during the year 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 6.02 projects the number of reformatories and special schools for handicapped in Haryana for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 6.3 details of the statistics on total direct expenditure amount spent (item-wise) on reformatories and special sohools for tho handicapped for the period 1965-66 to 1968-69.
Table 6.04 indicatos number of institutions for girls and percentage of girl institutes to the tatal for the years 1905-66 to 1968-69.

Table 6.05 and 6.06 show the enrolment of girls in recognised institations for general education and recognised institutions for professional \& other education respectively over the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The figures pertaining to the direct expenditure on girls institutions and their porcontage to total expenditure by type of institution have been set out in Table 6.07.

Table 6.08, 6.09 and 6.10 described the enrolement of scheduled caste students at primary, middle and secondary stages respectively and their percentage to total enrolment (Distriot-wise) for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

Table 6.11 gives soholarshios, stipends, frooship and other financial assistane e to scheduled caste students and amount disbursed at school stage for the yoar 1955-66 to 1963-69 of Haryana State as a whole and districi-wise for the year 1968-69 only.

Statistics on social (Adult) education during the period 1965-66 to 1968-69 have been projected in Table 6.12.

Table 6.13 shows the figures pertaining to schools of vocational and professional education for the years 1965-66 to 1968-69.

The statistics of percentage of enrolment to population in the corresponding age-group 6-11, 11-14 and 14-17 (States-wise) have been projected for the year $1965-66$ and $1968-69$ in Table $6.14,6.15$ and 6.16 respectively.

Table 6.17 presents the percentage of expenditure on Education to total Plan Expenditure (State-wise).

Table 6.18 depicts the expenditure of Anaual Plan, (1969-70) versus total expenditure of State Plan (State-wise).

The figures of allocation of funds for education in Fourth Five-Year Plan (1969-70 to 1973-74) have been shown in Table 6.19.

Statement showing the total State's budget and budget on general education for the year 1969-70 and percentage thereof has been depicted in Table 6.20.
