





Learners By Caste








The new year dawned auspiciously for Pudukkottai, on Pongal Day-14th January 1974. She became a separate unit of administration, a district in her own right.

Historical

Pudukkottai has a long history, going back to the days of the Cholas and the Pandyas Pudukkottai's art and architecture are of a high order and show the influence of both Chola and Pandya and in later years Pallavas The temples at Thirukkattalai and Kodumbalur are the living monuments of the Cholas The 'Muvarkoil' at Kodumbalur is an unfailing delight to the scholars with an antiquarian bent. The shrine of Sri Brahadambal, tutelar deity of the ruler of Pudukkottai, on a hillside, is largely rock-cut

Pudukkottai was responsive to "every wind that blew" and looked beyond its frontiers. India's renowned freedom fighter, S. Satyamoorthy cut his political milk—teeth there. He was born and bred and educated in Pudukkottai to which he was devoted to the very end of his life.

Economical

The ruler of Pudukkottai state took the initiative and raised some topes, with Mango, Jack, Cashew, Coconuts, Palmyrah and Tamarind as the tree species Plantations of casurina also were raised in the fringes of rivers and an extent of 6 square miles was thus brought under casurina. Cashew, being a dollor earner, is an important tree—crop

Sociological

It is generally believed that what is now region of the Pudukkottai District had been inhabited in remote times by the Kurumbars and Vedars who were amongst the earliest inhabitants of South India. In later times this region was also inhabited by the Karalars and Vellalars, who were agriculturists, the chettiars who were traders and the Marawars and Kallars, who were the celebrated warriors of the Tamil country.

Geographical:

This District is bounded on the north by Tiruchirapalli district, on the east by Thanjavur district and Bay of Bengal and on the south and west by Ramanathapuram district. Present area of the district comprises the former Pudukkottai State and portions of Tiruchirapalli and Thanjavur districts. The tail end of the Cauvery river and Mettur Canal irrigate a part of Arantangi Taluk and make it fertile.

Panorama of The Scheme

The Government of Tamil Nadu has accorded sanction in G. O. Ms. No. 2066, Education Department 6-11-1979 for the implementation of the State Plan Scheme of National Adult Education Programme in 100 Centres in each of the 61 Blocks where the Self Sufficiency Scheme is being implemented.

Accordingly in Pudukkottai District the following three blocks have been selected.

- 1. Annavasal
- 2. Kunnandarkoil and
- 3. Viralimalai

All these three blocks combine together to form the Kulathur Taluk in Pudukkottai District.

dentification of Centres:

The respective Panchayat Union Commissioners and the Deputy Inspectors of Schools have selected 100 centres in each block. The animators were also selected by them.

Training for the Animators:

The animators were given training in two batches each batch consisting of animators in the respective union head quarters. Under the guidance of this District Adult Education Officer, the Deputy Inspectors of Schools of the respective ranges conducted the training programme.

Training for the Animators:

The Deputy Inspectors of Schools were assisted by three other resource persons who had already undergone Adult Education Training. This was followed by monthly one day in-service training.

Supervisors:

The Chief Educational Officer, Tiruchirapalli conducted interviews and selected nine young men with B. Ed., qualification and posted them to this District. They all joined duty immediately.

They had their initial training from 5-3-1980 to 14-3-1980 at Thanjavur. Then they were given, Orientation Training for five days from 26-8-'80 to 30-8-'80 at the T. E. L. C. Higher Secondary School Pudukkottai. The Divisional Development Officer, Aranthangi, The Youth Coordinator, Nehru Yuvak Kendra, Pudukkottai, The Field Publicity Officer, Trichy (Government of India) and other officials belonging to the various development departments were the chief participants of the Seminar.

Project Officer :

Project Officers have been drawn from the cadre of Non Gazetted Head Masters of High Schools and each Project Officer has been placed in charge of one block. The Project Officer is assisted by three Supervisors.

The Project Officers had their initial training in Adult Education for 10 days from 5–3–1980 to 14–3–780 in the Boiler Plant Girls' High School, Kailasapuram, Tiruchi. The then Director of Non-Formal and Adult Education Thiru J. A. Ryan visited the Training Camp and delivered a lecture on the duties and responsibilities of the Project Officers and impressed upon them the importance of the task. He was followed by the Joint Director Thiru S. A. Subramanian who stayed in the camp for three days and took part in the various deliberations. Dr. Padmanabha of the National Institute of Education was with the Project Officer-Trainees for three days and gave very interesting talks on the various features of this National Adult Education Programme and enthused the Project Officers to use this occasion to strive hard to wipe out illiteracy from their mother land.

Thus being initiated into the scheme, the Project Officers did their job well.


This training was followed by a five day orientation training at the 8 L. B. Higher Secondary School, Nagerkoil 22-7-1980 to 26-7-1980 which was followed by a three day Evaluation Training at the Government Teacher Training Institute for women, Thanjavur from 15-10-1980 to 17-10-1980.

Phasing of the Programme

The first phase of the STATE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMME was conducted during 1980 with 300 centres in Annaysal, Kunnandarkoil and Viralimalai blocks. 300 animators of all the centres were given training

This training was followed by a five day orientation training at the 8 L.B. Higher Secondary School, lagerkoil 22-7-1980 to 25-7-1980 which was followed by a three day Evaluation Training at the Government feacher Training Institute for women, Thanjavur from 15-10-1980 to 17-10-1980.

Phasing of the Programme

The first phase of the STATE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMME was conducted during 1980 with 300 centres in Annavsal, Kunnandarkoil and Viralimalai blocks. 300 animators of all the centres were given training

for more than 200 days. The various relevant details pertaining to all the above blocks have been a given separately in Tables, with special notes wherever necessary. A map showing the coverage of blocks also finds a place in this report.

District Adult Education Board:

The District Adult Education Board have been formed with the Collector as Chairman and the District Adult Education Officer as Secretary. All the Development Officers, Project Officers of the Adult Education Programme, Commissioners, members of Legislative Assembly and member of Parliament are members of the Board.

Monthly Meeting of Project Officers:

The monthly meetings were conducted periodically to discuss the various issues concerning the programme. Proper Guidance for the effective implementation was given. Block level visits to centres were systematically carried out

Functions - Block Level and District Level:

Besides the frequent functions at the various centres to make the people aware of this national scheme the valedictory functions were celebrated at the blocks and Pudukkottai.

The Valedictory function at Pudukkottai was celebrated on 21–12–80. The revered Director of Non-Formal and Adult Education Dr. (Tmt) Stella Soundararaj presided. Hon'ble Minister Thiru R M. Veerappan, delivered the Valedictory address. Thiru C. Adhimoolam, M.A., B.Sc., B.T., Assistant Director Non-Formal Education, Thiru V. Hasthamalagam, B.A., B.T., Chief Educational Officer, Pudukkottai, Thiru Marimuthu' M. L. A., and a host of others graced the occasion.

"Monitoring and Evaluation are regarded as complementary processes their aim being not to 'Prove' but to 'improve'. (N. A. E. P., The 1st Year Book Published by the Ministry of Education and Culture—New Delhi). Evaluation helps us to assess how far we have been successful in achieving the aims and objectives of the scheme. After the completion of this ten months period evaluation was conducted in all the 300 centres. To assess the literacy and numeracy skills a common test paper for all the 300 centres was prepared and the test was administered by the animators in their respective centres.

Besides this internal written test, external e aluation was also conducted. Three centres were selected in each block and a committee consisting of the District Adult Education officer and three other members visited those centres and assessed the general achievement of the learners.



Aims and Objectives

"Education does not end with schooling. But it is a life long process. From the point of view of society it is good that adult Education Programmes are promoted as much as possible. Thereby there would be greater national productivity and as the result better standard of life for people. In a democracy the function of Adult Education is to provide every Adult Citizen with an opportunity for Education, of the type which he wishes and which he should have for his personal enrichment professional advancement and effective participation in social life".

In a developing country like ours the Adult Education assumes special significance Every citizen should participate in the national building activities, willingly, intelligently and efficiently. The first step to achieve this end is to eradicate illiteracy from the country.

The main objectives are (1) imparting literacy and numeracy (i.e.) basic know-ledge in reading writing and simple arthmetic. (2) creating awareness (3) stepping in functionality. In fact this may be called as "functional literacy" as this will advance the occupational and Vocational interests of the learners. This helps in improving their means of livelihood. It also ensures that they do not relapse into illiteracy.

Eradication of illiteracy is the main problem. Out of 68 crores, of our country's population, nearly 44 crores are illiterates as per the latest census. So the future of the country depends not only on the economic field but on the education point too, particularly in the field of Adult Education.

Report With A Brief Analysis

1 Introduction:

Annavasal is one of the three Blocks in Pudukkottai District where the National Adult Education Programme was inaugurated in January 1980. Out of 100 centres 50 centres were opened on 18—1—80 and 50 centres were opened on 1—2—80.

2 Selection Of Centres:

In consultation with the Commissioner, Panchayat Union, Annavasal and the Deputy Inspector 100 centres were identified and selected. The centres were located in school buildings, temples, Balwadis and in common open places. The Non-Electrified Centres were provided with Hurricane lights.

3. Selection of Learners:

This was done with the help of local teachers and supervisors. Most of them were enrolled by door to door canvassing.

4 Selection of personnel:

- a. The Project Officer was appointed by the Director of Non-Formal Education.
- b. Supervisors were appointed by the Chief Educational Officer.

5 Training:

A. Animators:

Adult Education Training was given to the animators in two batches of 50 animators per batch at Pudukkottai and Annavasal. In addition to this one day In-Service Training was conducted every month.

B. Supervisors:

The training was given to the supervisors at Thanjavur

C. Project Officers:

All the 61 Project Officers of the entire blocks of the state were given training at Truverambur, Trichy District by the resource persons drawn from the R. F. L. P. and the Directorate

6 Materials and Supplies:

Slates, Note books, Slate pencils and lead pencils were supplied to all the 30 learners in each of the 100 centres. The books "Muthal Nool, Iniya Vazhvai Nokki and Oli Vilakkii" published by the Directorate of Non-Formal Education were distributed. Brochures, posters and leaflets of the various development agencies were also distributed to almost all the centres.



State Adult Education Programme

I PHASE 1980

Aims and objectives

The paramount aim of the State Adult Education Programme is to impart Literacy, Numeracy, Functionality and awareness of the most productive section of the illiterate masses of India. Our country's development depends upon those illiterates who form the majority in the population of our country. This new project is particularly intended to bring up the illiterates on par with those who are socially, culturally and economically in an advantageous position.

One of the real aspects of this State Adult Education Programme is to make the rural masses feel the importance of Education and also make them culture-minded. The drop-outs are also highly benefited by this programme since the Adult Education is a golden opportunity for them to learn in their leisure time especially during nights. Those who lost the chance of getting Education in their younger age are now taught at their own villages without any expenses. The learners by virtue of this scheme begin to realise the importance of health habits, social services, handicarafts, literacy, numeracy, functionality and awareness to some extent. Their behaviour in society has also been changed appreciably Their thinking capacity in every activity has grown much.

Hence this State Adult Education Programme is highly appreciated and thanks to the Government of Tamil Nadu this programme has been implemented successfully.

STATE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAME

I Phase 1980

BLOCK REPORT & ANALYSIS OF THE PROGRAMME

The Project was inaugurated in the Kunnandarkoil Block on 18—1—1980. One Hundred centres were opened with the consultation of Commissioner, Kunnandarkoil Block and the concerned Deputy Inspector of Schools—All the 100 centres were functioning smoothly by the guidance of Thiru V. K. Hasthamalak, the then District Adult Education Officer and Thiru T. P. Murugesan, the present District Adult Education Officer.

Selection of Centres: The concerned Deputy Inspector of Schools and the Panchayat Union Commissioner, Kunnandarkoil were consulted and 100 centres were opened in the rural and slum areas.

Selection of Animators: Those who were interested and opted were selected. Preference was given to the natives of the areas. They were young, industrious and dedicated and service-minded persons. So 91 animators were selected for hundred centres. Teachers were given preference.

Supervisors: Young and energetic trained graduates were appointed by the Chief Educational Officer. Trichy to supervise and guide the Adult Education centres. They were given training at Thanjavur and Pudukkottai. Every supervisor has to supervise 33 centres (one supervisor 34 centres) They assisted the animators in bringing the development agencies to the centres and arranged cultural activities and film-shows and recording as well.

Particulars of Centres: Twentyfive centres were electrified out of 100. Most of the centres were located in school buildings. The animators were given one-day training every month. Problems were discussed and solved. A pocket allowance of Rs. 6/- was paid to each of them.

Materials and Supplies: Slates, note-books, slate-pencils, rollup black-boards and hurricane lamps were supplied to them. Booklets from other departments and posters were also supplied.

Project Officer: The Project Officer is in-charge of all 100 centres in the Project area. The centre is to function $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours per day and 20 days in a month and on the whole 200 days. A trekker has been provided for visiting the centres now and then.

The animator is to take initial survey of his area and submit initial report after starting the centre. At least 30 learners are to be enrolled in every centre.

Registers at this centre: 1. Initial survey, 2. Attendance Register, 3. Admission, Register, 4. Stock and Issue Register, 5. Visitor's Bock, 6 Monthly Report (Office copy)

Registers maintained by the Supervisors: 1. Diary, 2. Visit-chart, 3. Honorarium recommendation-roll (Office-copy) 4. Stock and Issue Register, 5. Pocket-book, 6. Block-Map.

The animators are given an Honorarium of Rs. 50/- per month Rs. 10/- as lighting charges and Rs. 5/* as contingent expenses. The amount is paid by the Project Officer by Money Order.

In all the 100 centres, Literacy, Numeracy, Functionality and awareness were imparted efficiently and enthusiastically. The supervisors assisted the animators in all possible ways.

Literacy, Numeracy, Functionality and awareness have been much imparted among the learners in all 100 centres. Villagers helped much to run the centres efficiently by associating the animators in their needs. For example an elementary school has been opened with the co-operation of villagers at Parapatti in Kunnandarkoil Block. Social service activities were undertaken in the same village. Furniture and a Transistor-set have been donated to the Parapatti centre by the villagers. Excursions were made in some centres.

Evaluation: At the end of the Programme the achievements of the learners were evaluated externally and internally. External evaluation was made in the centres and internal evaluation was also made in all 100 centres. Their achievements were thus assessed by these evaluations.

The learners in all 100 centres were issued certificates for the programme they attended. The Animators were also issued certificates.

Validictory Function: At the end of the Programme, the Validictory function was held at Block level at Keeranur on 16—12—80. The function was presided over by Thiru V. K. Haschamalak, the then Chief Educational Officer, Pudukkottai. Thiru T. Marimuthu, M. L. A distributed the certificates to all the learners and blessed them.

Conclusion: Thus the State Adult Education Programme has made a tremendous impact in the first phase successfully. In the first phase of the Programme 2303 men and 886 women have become literates in the 100 centres in the Kunnandarkoil Block.



Adult Education—Aims and Objectives

The national Adult Education Programme was formally launched on the 2nd October 1978. The main aim of this Programme is to wipe out illiteracy and to raise the standard of living of the teeming millions who are below the poverty line by helping them improve their functionality and social awareness and also to give them a knowledge of what all the Government is doing to alleviate their suffering by explaining to them the various developmental activities undertaken by the Government in order to improve their economic and social status.

As far back as 1943, Mhatma Gandhi said "For the poor, education means food and clothing". For Gandhi, education was the primary method of development (N. A. E. P.) The Ist year—Book published by the Ministry of Education and Culture—October 1979). "Mass illiteracy is India's sin and shame and must be liquidated"—Mahatma Gandhi.

Adult Education aims at liquidating this "sin and shame" by its three pronged attack on illiteracy—Adult Education does not rest content with imparting literacy and numeracy skills but it also aims at raising their functionality and social awareness.

Adult Education emphasises the impartion of literacy skills to persons belonging to the economically and socially weaker sections of the society. The summum bonum of Adult Education is that it is

- a) relevent to the environment and learner's needs.
- b) flexible regarding duration, time, location, instructional arrangement etc.
- c) diversified in regard to curriculum, teaching and learning materials and methods and
- d) systematic in all aspects of organisation (N. A. E. P. An Outline. Booklet published by the Ministry of Education and social welfare 1979)

"As many as 75000 villages in India do not have a primary school at present. It has been estimated that in 2000 A. D. 40% of the world's illiterates will be in India. Adult Education is therefore, essential to tone up the knowledge and the consciousness of the vast majority of our people" (Paradigm for Adult Education—The Hindu dated 28—10—80).

The special feature of the Adult Education Programme is that Education is taken to the doorsteps of the Rural Adults at a time most convenient to them and the programme aims at imparting not only literacy skills but it tries to raise their functionality and social awareness as well.

In Pudukkottai District, Annavasal, Kunnandarkoil and Viralimalai Unions have been selected under this scheme.

Democracy without education is meaningless. It is education and not freedom that makes a nation great but the situation prevailing in our country in this respect is not only distressing but also disgraceful.

Generally, educationally backward countries are economically backward and therefore all the members of the family even the smallest child join together to earn for bread. Sending a child to school will mean a sacrifice on the part of the parents as it involves a decrease in the income.

Of the total of 783 million illiterates in the world, about 579 million illiterates are found in Asia alone. That is why Asia is called the "Largest store house of illiterates" in the world.

The foregoing facts impress upon us the need and necessity for Adult Education Programme.

"The increase in the literacy ratio from 29.45% ten years ago (1971) to 36.17% in 1981 now is sizeable. But while the number of literates increased by 8.2 crores in the last ten years, the country also added 4.8 crores to the stock of illiterates" (The Hindu dated Sunday 22-3-81).

"It is distressing to note that Tamilnadu has slipped from the second to the third position in literacy rate among states, yielding its place to Maharashtra, the first being Kerala. According to 1981 census the pecrentage of literates in Tamilnadu is, males 57:19% (in 1971 it was 51:78%), and Females 34:12% (in 1971 it was 26:86%)". (The Hindu dated 24–3–81).

"Without Adult Education and Adult literacy it is not possible to have the range and speed of economic and social development which we require". Dr. V. K R. V. Rao.

Selection of centres

The Deputy Inspector of schools of this range and the Panchayat Union Commissioner selected the centres keeping in view the backwardness of the locality, availability of local instructors and other minimum facilities like lighting, accommodation etc.

Selection of Personnel (a) ANIMATORS

Those who showed some interest in social service and dedication were selected all Animators by the Deputy Inspector of Schools. Preference was given to local residents. 100 animators were selected for all the 100 centres. Preference was given to day school teachers.

(b) SUPERVISORS:

Supervisors were interviewed and selected by the Chief Educational Officer Tiruchirappalli and all the three joined duty on 18—1—80 All are B. Ed., trained graduates. They are young and energetic and sincere to their vocation. Two Supervisors were incharge of 33 centres each and the third one was incharge of 34 centres.

Particulars of Learners:

Usually learners are within the age group 15—35. They are illiterates. Most of them live below poverty line. They are either agriculturists or agriculture labourers. (Table II, III & IV.)

Particulars of Centres:

Out of 100 centres 29 were electrified 64 centers were run in school buildings. To suit the convenience of the learners who are mostly labourers the working hours were between 6 p. m. & 8 p. m. (Table IX, X & XI).

Training of Personnel:

Now a days training of personnel in any discipline is a must. The mind and soul of the individual has to be oriented towards the aims and objectives of the profession they have chosen.

The 100 animators were given training in two batches, from 12—12—79 to 21—12—79 and from 22—1—80 to 31—1—80. The training was given in St. Theresa Middle School Viralimalai.

The Animators were given one day inservice training every month. A pocket allowance of Rs. 6/- was given to them.

The Supervisors had their initial training at Thanjavur from 5—3—80 to 14—3—80. Then they were given orientation training for five days in the T. E. L. C. Higher Secondary School, Pudukkottai, from 26—8–80 to 30—8—80

The Project officers had their initial training for 10 days from 5—3—80 to 14—3—80 in the Boiler Plant Girls' High School B. H. E. L. Kailasapuram, Tiruchirappalli. Then they underwent a training for five days in the S. L. B. Higher Secondary School, Nagarkoil from 22-7-80 to 26—7—80. Evaluation training for three days was conducted for the Project officers in the Government Teacher Training Institute for Women, Thanjavur, from 15—10—80 to 17—10—80. Materials and Supplies:

The learners in the Adult Education centres were supplied free of cost the following materials.

1. States, 2. State Pencils, 3. Note Books, 4. Black lead Pencils, Books like "INIYA VAZHVAI NOKKI", "MUDHAL NOOL", and "OLI VILAKKU" were also supplied to these centres free of cost.

The centres were provided with 3 Hurricane lights and 2 Roll up black boards.

The centres were provided with 3 Hurricane lights and 2 Roll up black boards.

Plan of Implementation:

The Project is headed by a Project Officer with the following staff:

1. Assistant-1

- 2. Junior Asst. cum Typist—1 (This post has not been filled up ever since the inception of the Project).
 - 3. Supervisors 3
 - 4. Basic Servant 1

The centre is to run for one and half hours a day for 20 days in a month and on the whole it should run for 200 days. A Trekker (T N P 795) has been supplied to the District Adult Education Officer to be shared by the officer and the three Project Officers (SAEP) of this District.

The animators are given a monthly honorarium of Rs. 50/- and Rs. 5/- as contingent expenditure. Besides this a sum of Rs. 10/- is paid every month for providing lighting facilities in the centres

Co. ordination of other Agencies:

This item of work forms the backbone of the scheme. By co-ordinating with the various Development department officials, the learners are motivated to a great extent and they get themselves involved in the various development schemes, and this provides ample opportunities for their economic uplift and also help them satisfy their felt needs.

Achievements:

At the Alagampatti village the Adult Education centre was held in a thatched shed. The learners took interest and got single point (Janata) electrification for this centre.

An Adult Education centre was run in the Panchayat Union Middle School at Naduppatti. The learners evinced much interest and they raised funds and electrified the school building and two tube lights were fitted in the building.

In Kadappillaiyarpatti village the animators helped some of the learners to get loans from the Nationalised Bank for the purchase of milch cattle.

In Kalappanur each learner planted a tree either in front of his house of in his field and celebrated Vanomahotsava.

Many of the learners who attended the Adult Education centres have become members of the co-operative match units (Small village units) started in this area.

Festivals and functions:

Almost all the centres celebrated the world Literacy Day. Local festivals were celebrated with great pomp. Independance day was celebrated in many centres.

Evaluation:

Evaluation is the process through which one can assess the attainment of the learners Written evaluation test covering almost all the aspects of the scheme was conducted in each centre after the conclusion of 10 months.

The attainment of the learners was assessed on a three point scale. (1) Below average, (2) Average, (3) Above average.

After this the external evaluation was conducted on 28 th and 29-th November, 1980. The following members served on the external evaluation committee.

Hasthamalak presided over the function. Thiru T. Marimuthu, M. L. A. of this constituency distributed certificates to the learners. The District Adult Education Officer, distributed certificates to the animators.

The District level function was celebrated (comprising of all the 300 centres in the three blocks where the S. A. E. P. is in operation) on 20—12—80. Our revered Director Tmt. Stella Soundararaj, M.Sc., (Lon) B.T.Ph.D. presided over the function Honourable Thiru R.M Veerappan Minister for Endowments, distributed the certificates to the learners.

The first phase of the State Adult Education Programme functioned in 61 Blocks, each block with 100 centres.

- 7 Districts had 5 blocks each (Chingleput, Dharmapuri, Kanyakumari, Madurai, Northe Arcot, South Arcot, and Thanjavur)
 - 4 Districts had 4 blocks each (Nelgiris, Salem, Thirunelveli and Tiruchy)
 - 3 Districts had 3 blocks each (Coimbatore, Pudukkottai and Ramnad)

Perivar was the single District which had only one Project.

Out of the 6066 centres, Women centres formed the largest percentage being 45.4% Mencentres being 43% and Mixed centres being 11.6% only 4 Districts had more than half the number of centres for women (Kanyakumari 76%, Nilgiris 60%, Tirunelveli 52%, Chengleput 50%). Two Districts had less than 30% for women, Madurai 29% and Periyar only 27%. Two Districts had the highest percentage of Mixed centres Periyar 32% and Madurai 30%. It is very impressive from a study of Table I, to note that Kanyakumari sets the example to open more and more women centres in the future in other Districts also

9 Districts had continued all the number of centres throughout the I phase (Dharmapuri) Thanjayur and Madurai had discontinued the functioning of about 10 centres each.

Introduction

The total number of adults in the age group 15-35 years brought under instruction in the State Adult Education Programme is 2,07,924. It is a notable and encouraging feature that the number of women literates is 1,04,302 as against the men literates of 1,03,622. This already shows that there is more awareness among women about their being educated. A similar feature in regard to the enrolment of Scheduled Caste (both men and women) can be revealed by a glance at the Table.

Scheduled Castes:

The total number of scheduled caste learners is 75,759 which is 34.8% of the total enrolment. Out of this 40,663 are men and 35,091 are women. Thanjavur comes first in respect of enrolment of Scheduled Caste people the percentage being 65.6 while Kanyakumari District touches a percentage of 20. This is due to the fact that Kanyakumari District already stands first in literacy rate among other Districts of the State including Scheduled Caste while in Thanjavur District the Scheduled Caste people who are working in the farms from very early days had been given very little or no chance of being educated (or sent to school) as they had to be with their parents for the whole day. The state Adult Education Programme has now given them the opportunity of getting some literacy and which enables these depressed people feel happy-of having been educated to some extent.

However the number of women brought under this scheme is less than that of men except in the case of Kanyakumari, Nilgiris, Tirunelveli and Tiruchy Districts. This is, perhaps, due to the reason that more attention was paid for enroling more women in those districts. It is planned to bring more illiterate women under instruction in the future phases of the programmes.

The percentages worked out here are only with reference to the total number of adults enrolled.

Scheduled Tribes

The total percentage of enrolment of Scheduled Tribe to that of the total number of learners is just 1.4 only. This is due to the number of low Scheduled Tribe population in this State. The enrolment is 7.25%, 4%, 3.5% and 3% in the Nilgiris, Dharmapuri and Salem Districts respectively where there are hill areas. Steps are being taken to achieve cent percent coverage under the succeeding Adult Literacy Schemes. The number of women attending Adult Education centres in these areas is slightly less than that of men i. e. 1204 as against 1410. The total number of Scheduled Tribe learners is 2614.

Other Communities

Among other communities, 1,31,215 adults have been enrolled out of whom 68,649 are women and 61,561 are men again hereby showing an increase in the enrolment of women. This also clearly shows that there is an awakening among women for getting some education. There is an average record of 60% enrolment among other communities with reference to the total enrolment.

At this rate of enrolment we expect to reach the maximum or even cent percent coverage of literacy among all communities within two or three years.

In general in all the Districts the average percentage of enrolment between the age group 15 to 35 is 90.2%. Periyar district exceeds all the other districts with a percentage of 96.7 percent and Thanjavur with 81.5 percent is at the lowest in the group.

In the age group 35 and above more admission is found in Thanjavur, and the least in the criyar District In the age group 15 to 35 none of the districts fall below 80%.

The majority of learners are labourers, their number is 84470. They form 40% of the total number of learners. Agriculturists form 33% of the total learners, who had benefitted by this scheme.

Casual labourers are next in this list with 12.4% of the learners totalling to 25189 out of the total learners.

The maximum number of learners are labourers. Madurai with 10031 (60%) and the Nilgiris 5568 (55%) top the list. Next we find Tanjore with, 9769 and Coimbatore 4992 working out to 5% of the total enrolled in their districts. Also in this category we find Trichy with 3272 (22%), keriyar with 865 (26%) and Dharmapuri with 4371 (27%) find themselves in the lower rungs of the ladder.

Nxt in Agriculture we find South Arcot with 9029 and Pudukkottai with 4858 employing about 5% of the learners of the districts. Also Trichy 7951 (51%) comes next. Kanyakumari with 101 (7%) Coimbatore 1403 (12%) Tanjore 2420 (13%) come at the fag end of the series.

Then to Casual labourers, Periyar 1219 (39%), Chengalpet 3744 (22%) are in the top of the list. Allowe find Dharmapuri 1922 (12%) Ramnad 420 (4%) North Arcot 922 (4.7%) are the tail end nother series.

With regard to Artisans we find that Thanjavur with 1955 (11.6%), Chengalpet 1387 (7.5%) Tharmapuri 1251 (7%) top the list. Also Ramnad with 81 (0.008%) Pudukkottai 154 0.22%) and South Arcot 105 (0.6%) are at the fag end of the list.

Next from the table with regard to self-employed learners we find that Periyar 198 (6%). Salem 45 (4%) Dharmapuri 751 (4%) are the top runners. Also Madurai 69 (0.003%) South Arcot 9 (0.5%) Thanjavur 149 (0.4%) are the lowest in the list.

Next, the business men who have benefitted are as follows:-Periyar 129 (3.8%) Dharmapuri 374 (3.3%) are the topped and the least are at Tirunelveli 53 (0.003%) and Madurai 48 (0.002%)

Finally with regard to others in the series we find, Tirunelveli 1871 (12%), Ramnad 994 (9%) coimbatore 733 (8%) are the toppers. Also we find the Nilgiris 70 (0.7%) Pudukkottai 8 (0.9%, Thanjavur 162 (1%) are the least.

From this table it is seen that 6030 Animators are working in 6067 centres functioning under the State Adult Education Programme in 61 Blocks. From this it is clear that 37 Animators are conducting two centres each. only about 40% of the Animators are in the ideal age group 25—35.

In the age group 30-34, 35-54 and 55 and above men are more interested in he field than women. But in the age group 15-24, 25-29 ladies are more interested to come in the field of Adult Education. This shows a gradual progress among the womenfolk of Tamil ladu to participate in the field.

In the first phase of 61 National Adult Education Projects 6030 animators have worked. In this 3070 were Men (50.7%) and 2960 were Women (49.3%) animators.

Among the animators 46% were School Teachers; 7% were unemployed trained teachers; 2% were Retired Persons and 45% were unemployed youths.

Five districts had more than 50% as Women animators. They were Kanyakumari (85%); Nilgiris (63%); Chengleput (54.3%); Tirunelveli (54%) and Trichy (51%).

More than 50% of animators were unemployed youths in seven districts. They were Kanyakumari (81%); Periyar (70%); Ramnad (65%); North Arcot (63%); Nilgiris (60%); Trichy (53%); and Salem (50%).

Chingleput, Coimbatore and North Arcot Districts employed Ex-servicemen also as animators.

In ten districts retired persons came forward to work as animators. The total number of such animators was 112.

408 unemployed youths and 2778 employed teachers were also employed in this programme as animators.

In Tamil Nadu State Adult Education Programme has been implemented in 61 projects spread over 15 districts in all. In these projects 6030 animators have been appointed out of which 3069 were men and 2961 were women. The percentage of men and women animators was 51% and 49% respectively.

It is needless to stress the fact that the residence of the animators in the State and the location of the centre nearer is very essential for effective and efficient implementation of the scheme.

With regard to the residence of animators, 4525 reside in the same locality, 644 reside within one K. M and 860 reside in places beyond one K. M. their percentage being 75, 10.4 and 14.6 respectively.

In general, proper care has been given in appointing local animators. Trichy District stands first in this respect. In this District 85% of the animators reside locally. In Pudukkottai the % of local animators is 50. This is the lowest percentage in the state.

The statement appended below will clearly give an idea of the residential particular of the animators.

There were 6066 Adult Education centres functioning in the State in 15 Revenue Districts. The centres were accommodated in school buildings, private houses, Panchayat Offices etc. On an analysis of the centres by location it is evident that 51% of the centres were accommodated in school buildings and in this respect Pudukkottai, Tirunelveli and North Arcot districts top the list—by having 69%, 6% and 66% respectively. Among the centres located in private houses Kanyakumati district stands first by having 54%. It is to be noted that 15% of the centres in Ramanathapuram district were accommodated in Panchayat offices.

On the whole 51% of the total centres were located in school buildings, 26% in private buildings, 4% in Panchayat Offices, 0.5% in reading rooms, 2.5% in Balawadi centres, 8% in public buildings and 8% in other buildings like temples and churches. As the success of this scheme depends partially on the location of these centres with all the other amenities like Black-board and lighting facilities, Radio Receivers etc. it is good if almost all the centres are accommodated in school buildings provided there is a school in the locality.

Though Adult Education policy speaks of flexibility of running the centres according to the convenience of the learners, out of 6066 centres, 56% of the centres work between 6 and 8 p. m. and 40% of the centres work from 8 p. m. and above. So it is evident that Adult Education centres are mostly favoured from 6 p. m. and above. It is continued from the table 4 i. e. centres by occupation that this timing is most suited for Agriculturalists and labourers.

Usually people will think that adults will not attend centres in the mornings that is between 6—10 a.m. But in the district of the Nilgiris there are six centres which were during this timing. In the same district 97 centres worked from 1 to 6 p. m. which suggests that learners prefer this time because of the climatic and geographical nature of the location.

Similarly in the Kanyakumari District 18 centres work from 1 to 4 p. m and 47 centres work between 4-6 p. m. This suggest that the most of the fishermen in this district prefer this time.

The women learners are more predominent in Kanyakumari district, North Acot and Chengleput district as seen in Table II centres by caste and sex. From Table XI it is observed that Adult Education centres in these districts work between 6—8 p. m. & 8 p. m. above. So it is evident that women learners also prefer the timings between 6—8 p. m. and 8 p. m. above
