#### SCHOOL EDUCATION

#### PART A.

#### Introduction.

The Director of School Education is the major head of the department in-charge of Schoo, Education (while the Director of Government Examinations is incharge of Examinations and the Director of Adult Education and Non-Formal Education of Adult Education and Non-formal Education at School level. The Director of School Education is assisted by 3 Joint Directors 6 Deputy Directors, 2 Personal Assistants, 1 Financial Controller, 1 Administrative Officer. 1 Senior Accounts Officer and other Assistant Directors to look after the special items of work,

- 2. The Chief Educational Officers at the revenue district level, the District Educational Officers at the Educational district level, Inspectresses of Gi rls Schools at the circle level (in respect of Girls Schools) and the Deputy Inspectors of Schools at the range level watch the progress and development of School Education in their respective jurisdiction. The Government schools are administered direct by the department. The Inspector of Angle-Indian School supervises the Anglo-Indian schools in the State and the Inspector of Matriculation Schools supervises the Matriculation schools.
  - 3. The aims and objects of the School Education Department are :-
- 1. To expand schooling facilities and achieve cent per cent enrolment of the pupils of the age groups 6-11 and 11-14 and improve the enrolment of age group 14-17.
- 2. To improve the quality of education in schools by providing (or assisting in the provision of) adequate school buildings, laboratories, school libraries, play grounds, etc., promoting science education in a sustained manner; creating additional posts of teachers for the additional enrolment of pupils; improving the professional competence of school teachers by giving inservice training, etc., improving methods of evaluating the scholastic attainments of pupils and implementing schemes like free supply of midday meals to poor pupils in elementary schools and free supply of books and uniforms to the needy pupils.
  - 3. To provide such incentives as may be necessary for the welfare of students and teachers.
- 4. The expansion in schooling facilities in Tamil Nadu over the years, will be seen from the following figures:

The Director of School Education is assisted at the head quarters by 3 Joint Directors (one for Personnel and ElementaryEducation one for Secondary Education, and one for Higher secondary education), 6 Deputy Directors (one for Elementary Education, one for Secondary, 2 for Higher Secondary Education, one for Midday meals and one for Educational Technology Cell) and 11 officers to look after special aspects of education like Science Education, Anglo—Indian Education, Audio Visual Education, Educational statistics etc., besides one Financial Controller and one Administrative Officer. At present there are 14 Chief Educational Officers-one for Coimbatore and the Nilgiris, one for Tiruchirapalli and Pudukkottai and one each for all the other 12 Revenue Districts in the State.

There are 50 District Educational officers, one Inspector of Anglo Indian Schools, 1 Inspector of Matriculation Schools and 458 Deputy Inspectors. There are also 7 Inspectresses of Girls Schools.

The expenditure on maintaining Government elementary schools and on payment of grants to local bodies and aided managements for running their elementary schools is debited to this head.

The expenditure on salaries of the additional posts of teachers created during the Fifth Plan Period in elementary and higher elementary schools under the State Plan schemes for additional enrolment of pupils of the age groups 6—11 and 11—14 was shown under the plan sector of the Budget till end of 1978—79. From 1979—80 only the expenditure on the additional posts created from 1979—80 will be shown under plan, that on the additional posts created during the fifth plan period being transferred to non-plan from 1979—80 as committed expenditure. 94.64 per cent of the children of the age group 6—11 and 59.68 per cent of the age group 11—14 had been enrolled by 1979—80.

About 20.25 lakhs of pupils studying in Stds. I to VIII of elementary schools in the State are getting free midday meals at an expenditure of about Rs. 5 crores supplemented by gift food from CARE of the value of about Rs. 7 crores per annum. More details of this scheme are given in the Education Demand Note for 1980—81.

The expenditure on maintaining the Government high schools and that on the teaching and other grants given to Aided and Municipal High Shools are shown under this classification. Teaching grant and maintenance grants are paid to aided secondary schools as per the rules in force. Grants are given at two-thirds of the net approved expenditure, to Corporations and Municipalities for maintaining their high schools.

The expenditure on the additional posts created during the fifth plan period on the State Plan scheme for additional enrolment of pupils of age group 14—17 was shown under the plan sector of the budget till the end of 1978—79 and it has been transferred to Non-plan from 1979—80.

Under the Plan Scheme for improving facilities for teaching science, about 993 high schools had got science laboratory grants by 1979—80. From 1974—75 the rate of grant is Rs. 55,000 each for Government schools and Rs. 40,200 for non-Government schools... Twenty Five more schools will be covered in 1980—81. There are now 42 mobile science laboratory vans serving high schools in rural areas without any science laboratory facilities.

The various kinds of recognised special schools in the State and their numbers are shown below:

The Sainik School at Amaravathinagar prepares boys academically, physically and psycholo gically for entry into the National Defence Academy or into other walks of life. Boys ar admitted to the school through a common All India Entrence Examination which is held once a year during January and February. The strength of the school includling new admissions is 606. Scholarships are sanctioned by the Government of Tamil Nadu from their funds to the students of Tamil Nadu Domicile studying in the Sainik school on income-cum-merit basis. 493 students are holding Tamil Nadu Government scholarships.

A sum of about Rs. 5 lakhs per year is spent on the six pre-vocational training centres in the State. School drop-outs of the age group 11—14 are admitted in the centres and given education-cum-craft training for three years.

A Regional Pre-vocational Training Centres is also functioning attached to the M.Ct. Muthiah Chettiar High School, Purasawalkam.

The institutions which are primarily homes for children, having facilities for the education of the inmates are admitted to aid from State Funds. Atleast 50 per cent of the inmates in the Homes for children shall be certified destitutes belonging to this State and shall be studying in recognised schools. Grants are given on behalf of the inmates between the ages of 5 to 20 (5 to 25 in the case of Physically handicapped children), There are 375 homes for children in the State. The number of inmates in these homes is 48,000.

School Education in Tamil Nadu is free at all stages. An important scheme of scholarships is the rural talent scholarships tenable for the entire school course which are awarded from 1971-72. Under the scheme, scholarships are awarded every year newly to four students in each panchayat union.

These S.C.E.R.T. formed in May, 1975 by integrating the three units namely State Institute of Education State Evaluation Unit and State Institutute of Science Education is incharge of Educational Research and Training at School level.

From 28th August, 1978, the S.C.E.R.T. has been transferred from the Director of Government Examinations to the Director of School Education. The provision for 1980-81 includes Rs. 3.50 lakhs for new building.

Till February 1975, the Director of School Education was also the Commissioner for Government. Examinations. From February 1975, the Government have appointed a separate head of the department the Director of Government Examinations in-charge of examinations at School Education Level.

The Director of Government Examinations arranges for preparing and conducting a number of examinations under his control, publishing the results and despatching the certificates. About 36 examinations are conducted every year some of them annually and some twice a year including the S.S.L.C. and A.I.S.L.C. examinations and from May 1980, the H.S.L.C. examination.

With successive liberalisations of the pension scheme for non-Government teachers originalld introduced from 1st April 1955, the teaching and non-teaching staff of all aided schools any colleges and Technical Education Institutions as well as teachers in Local Body Schools are now eligible for pension and other retirement benefits. This item is shown under school education since, the bulk of the beneficiaries belong to Aided and Local Body Schools.

The admission fees and special fees such as Library, Laboratory and Medical inspection fees received in all Government High Schools and training schools are credited to the above head. Overpayments made to local bodies while releasing Education Grants and Midday meal grants are also credited to this head, when recovered. The other items of receipts are:—

- (i) Audit fees paid by management of aided schools;
- (ii) Stipends recovered from students for failure to fulfil the terms of their agreement;
- (iii) Examination fees paid by students; and
- (iv) Other Miscellaneous recoveries.

#### COLLEGIATE EDUCATION.

#### PART A.

#### INTRODUCTION.

The Directorate of Collegiate Education, which was formed in October 1965, is the authority for planning and execution of programmes relating to Collegiate Education. It is responsible for executing co-ordinated development and expansion of Collegiate Education. The development and expansion of Collegiate Education gained considerable momentum after the formation of a separate Directorate. Before the formation of this Directorate, there were only 92 Arts Colleges and 18 Training Colleges, whereas in 1979–80 there are 187 (51 Government and 136 Aided) Arts Colleges and 23 (Government 7 and Aided 16) Training Colleges in the State. During the year 1979–80, one College viz., Pre-University College, Annamalai University ceased to function due to abolition of Pre-University Course in Tamil Nadu. Besides, there are 23 other colleges in the State. In addition to this, evening courses are conducted in 30 Colleges.

The Director of Collegiate Education is assisted by a Joint Director, a Deputy Director, a Senior Accounts Officer, a Personal Assistant, an Assistant Director and Two Special Officers—One for Scholarships and the other for English. All these Officers have state-wide jurisdiction. During the year 1979-80, Five Regional Offices in Madras, Madurai, Tiruchirappalli, Tirunel—veli and Coimbatore with Regional Deputy Directors of Collegiate Education and other auxiliary staff were created.

There are three Universities in the State viz., the University of Madras, Madurai Kamaraj University and Annamalai University (apart from the Tamil Nadu Agricultural University at Coimbatore and the Perarignar Anna University of Technology, Madras). Recurring Block grants are sanctioned to them, every year, for meeting the normal expenditure. In 1979-80, the quantum of Block grant to Annamalai University and Madurai Kamaraj University has been enhanced. Special grants are also sanctioned as and when proposals are received from the University concerned for meeting certain special items of expenditure. Such grants are sanctioned since 1971-72 for conducting orientation course for college teachers in Universities. Further, grants for various Plan Schemes are also sanctioned to the Universities. The Annamalai University is of unitary type and has celebrated the Golden Jubilee in December 1979. The University Grants Commission scales of pay have been extended to the teaching staff of Universities also. Provisions of Rs. 1 00 lakh each have been madein the Budget Estimate for 1980-81, for the establishment of new Universities at Coimbatore and Tiruchirappalli.

The emphasis on qualitative improvement is the chief feature of development of Government Colleges during the past few years. During the year 1979-80, 46 additional degree and 5 Post graduate courses were started in Government Colleges. Evening Courses were continued to be conducted in certain Government Colleges.

There are continuing schemes for provision of buildings, laboratory equipments, students amenities and play-field facilities for Colleges.

To have effective control over the financial matters of Government Colleges, posts of Bursars have been created since 1974-75 and 41 posts have so far been created.

The scales of pay of teachers in Colleges have been revised on the basis of the recommendations of the UGC with effect from 1st April 1974 with monetary benefits from 1st January 1977.

#### (b) Aided Colleges.

The Aided Colleges get assistance from Government by way of teaching, building and equipment grants and contributions to the Provident Fund of their teachers. The total number of Aided Colleges in 1979-80 has reduced to 136 from 137 in 1978-79, as one College, viz. Pre-University College, Annamalai University ceased to function consequent on the abolition of Pre-University Course in Tamil Nadu. The Scales of pay and other allowances to which the staff in Government Colleges are eligible are applied to the staff in Aided Colleges also for computing the grant-in-aid.

From the year 1972-73, teaching grant was paid at 80 percent of the net deficit of Aided Colleges on the basis of the actual income. The Government have revised that pattern of grant-in-aid from 1st June 1977, under which the entire net deficit on salary expenditure is met by the Government. Further the Government have recently ordered the *direct* payment of salary to staff of Aided Colleges. A non-salary grant at 80 percent of the approved items of expenditure on repairs, upkeep, contingencies, stationery etc., is released annually.

Evening M.Ed., Courses are conducted in 6 Government Training Colleges and Part-time courses in "Diploma in Higher Education" were started from 1977-78 in three Government Training Colleges.

#### (b) Non-Government.

The Special Institutions under Aided Managements come under this category and they are described below:—

- 1. Physical Education Colleges.—The three Physical Education Colleges, viz., Y.M.C.A., College of Physical Education, Madras, Alagappa College of Physical Education, Karaikudi, Maruthi College of Physical Education, Perianaickanpalayam, Coimbatore are maintained by private agencies.
- 2. The Madras School of Social Work.—The Madras school of Social Work founded in 1952 has been affiliated to the University of Madras from July 1976. It conducts M.A. Course in Social Work and 95 students were on the rolls in 1979-80.
  - 3. Madurai Institute of Social Work.-

The Madurai Institute of Social Work was formed in 1969 and is affiliated to Madurai Kamaraj University. It trains candidates every year on full time basis for the profession of Social Work by offering two-year Post-graduate Course. There were 79 students in 1979–80. One year M.A. Diploma Course in Social Rehabilitation has been started from 1977–78 and from the year 1979–80.

Two year Post-graduate Diploma Course in Personnel Management and Industrial Relations

Three months Certificate Course in Science of Creative Intelligence.

have also been started in the Institute.

- 4. Oriental Colleges.—There are 15 Oriental Colleges in Tamil Nadu under Private Managements with 1784 Students and 133 teachers in 1979-80. An Ayurvedic College is also functioning with an intake of 32 students and with 5 staff members.
- 5. Rural Higher Institute.—There is one Rural Higher institution, viz., The Gandhigram Rural institute (Deemed University) at Gandhigram in Madural District. It is affiliated to the National Council for Rural Higher Education of the Union Ministry of Education. The emphasis of the Institute is to impart practical field programmes in rural communities in addition to theoretical instruction and it stands for gandhian ideals in education. It gets a grant of Rs. 1-50 lakhs per annum. The Institute had 443 students and 75 teachers in 1979-80. It has been declared a Deemed University from 1976-77.

The important items covered under this head are explained below:

#### Institute of Mathematical Science, Madras:-

The Institute of Mathematical Science was started in January 1962. It is jointly financed by the State Government and the Government of India. Every year the State Government make a contribution of Rs. 3.5 lakhs and the Government of India 3.5 lakhs. This Institute is modelled on the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, U.S.A. and has Ph. D. Programme. Students from various universities in India holding Master Degree can get their Ph.D. Degree from their parent Universities working under the guidance of the academic staff of the Institute.

Besides fulfilling the functions of a University at Higher levels of Post M.Sc., education, the Institute organises, twice or thrice a year, Conferences and Seminars on current trends in research in several aspects of Mathematics and Theoretical Physics and conducts summer school on advanced topics in these subjects for the benefit of lecturers in Post-Graduate Colleges and bright and promising students in M.Sc. Classes and other Research workers.

#### Institute of Traditional Cultures:

The institute is located at the University of Madras. It gets an annual grant of Rs. 16,000 from the State Government. It promotes studies and research in traditional cultures with emphasis on Tamil Culture.

#### Conduct of Training Course for College Teachers:—

To improve the quality of English Teaching, in service training programmes in the teaching of English at the College level are conducted periodically with the collaboration of the British Council and the Universities.

#### National Service Schemes:-

The National Service Schemes was first started in November 1969 with an initial strength of 2,000. Its strength gradually increased and has reached 40,000 in 1979-80. The cost of the scheme is met by Government of India and the Government of Tamil Nadu in the ratio of 7:5 A sum of Rs. 45 lakhs has been provided in the year 1980-81 for meeting the States' share of the expenditure. The object of the programme is to arouse the Students' Social consciousness and utilise their Services for the Community especially in literacy work.

#### Preparation of College Text-Books in Tamil:

Provisions of Rs. 3 lakhs in Revised Estimate for 1979-80 and Rs. 3:00 lakhs in Budget Estimate for 1980-81 have been made for paying grants to the Tamil Nadu Text Book Society for bringing out Collegiate Books in Tamil.

# 22 PERFORMANCE BUDGET, 1980-81

#### TECHNICAL EDUCATION.

#### INTRODUCTION.

One of the important factors which determines the level of economic and social development is the progress made in the field of Technical Education. Such realisation forged the formation of separate department and also the constitution of State Board of Technical Education and Training in 1957. At the end of First Five Year Plan there were only three Engineering Colleges and six Polytechnics. Now the department has under its aegis, 6 Engineering Colleges, 40 Polytechnics (which include 3 Women's Polytechnics and 8 special Institutions) and 14 Technical High Schools, which have since been converted as Higher Secondary Schools (Vocational) from the academic year 1979-80. This department is responsible for ensuring the co-ordinated development of Technical Education at degree and diploma levels. According to the varied need of the Industries, a number of diversified, job-oriented courses have also been introduced in the institutions as recommended by the State Board of Technical Education and Training, Tamil Nadu.

#### FINANCIAL REQUIREMENT.

The financial requirements for the Technical Education Department in 1980-81 are detailed below:—

Consequent on the introduction of 10+2 pattern of education in the State, the 14 Technical High Schools, under the control of this Department have been converted into Higher Secondary Schools (Vocational) and are affiliated to the Board of Higher Secondary Education from 1979-80. The Government have provided an amount of Rs. 2-40 lakks towards conversion of these Institutions.

In 1979-80, the teacher, student ratio in the Higher Secondary Schools was 1: 12 and the per capita expenditure on students was Rs. 4,550 (for entire course).

The details of annual in take of these institutions are given in Appendix.

These institutions educate and train technicians, who constitute an intermediate category between the craftsman and the Engineer. These institutions offer 45 Diploma, 18 Post-Diploma and 17 Certificate courses in various institutions. The intake particulars are given in Appendix.

In 1979-80, the teacher students ratio in the Polytechnics was 1:13 and the per capita expenditure on student was Rs. 5,300 (for entire course).

#### New Polytechnics.

A new Government Polytechnic at Krishnagiri has started functioning from the academic year 1979-80. The Government have also sanctioned the establishment of an Institute of Textile Technology at Komarapalayam and a Women's Polytechnic at Thanjavur under private management. During 1980-81, it is proposed to take advance action to establish a Government Polyechnic at Pudukottai District where there is no Polytechnic at present.

#### WOMEN'S WING.

In order to meet the demand from girls students seeking admission to Polytechnic course s the Government have permitted the opening of Women's Wingin the following men's Polytechnics

- 1. Government Polytechnic, Trichy.
- 2. Government Polytechnic Tuticorin.
- 3. Valivalam Desikar Polytechnic, Nagapattinam.

The Government have also permitted the admission of girl students in Men's Polytechnics as and when found necessary within the overall intake of the institution.

#### COMMUNITY POLYTECHNIC.

As per the recommendations of the All India Council for Technical Education, certain Polytechnics have been selected by Government of India to act as focal points to promote transfer of Technology to rural community and such polytechnics have been designated as Community Polytechnics. The following Polytechnics have been selected under the scheme:

- 1. Sri Ramakrishna Mission Vidyalaya Polytechnic, Coimbatore.
- 2. Annamalai Polytechnic, Chettinad.
- 3. Bakthavatchalam Polytechnic, Kancheepuram.

The Government of India provide cent per cent financial assistance for this scheme.

#### Upgradation of Arts and Crafts Institutions.

After take over of these institutions by the Technical Education Department, many developments have taken place. The erstwhile certificate courses offered at Tamilnadu Institute of Architecture and Sculpture, Mamallapuram have been upgraded into Diploma courses and subsequently restructured to widen the employment avenues.

B.Sc., degree courses in the following specialisation have been introduced at the College of Arts and Crafts, Madras from the Academic Year 1978-79.

- (i) B.Sc., Degree course in Industrial Design, (Textile Design and Ceramic Design) and
- (ii) B.Sc., degree course in Visual Communication.
- These courses are affiliated to University of Madras.

A Special Advisory Committee of Arts and Crafts Institutions was constituted to advice on development programmes.

#### **AUTONOMY**

Autonomy has been granted so far to four Polytechnics at Institutional level and at departmental levels to 5 Institutions. It is proposed to extend the concept of autonomy to some more institutions.

#### COLLABORATION WITH COLOMBO PLAN STAFF COLLEGE, SINGAPORE

The Colombo Plan Staff College wanted to associate 3 to 4 Technician Institutions in India for co-operation and collaboration with their programmes in Technician Education, Planning, Curriculum Design and development of research work. The Government of India have recommended Central Polytechnic, Madras for implementation of such Programmes and to co-operate with the Colombo Plan Staff Colleges for Technician Education, Singapore.

#### EXPANSION OF LIBRARY FACILITIES

The library is a vital resource Centre for the educational institution. The Government are annually spending substantial amount for the development of Libraries. So far, the Libraries in Polytechnics have not been manned by qualified librarians. This proved a great handicap, in effectively making use of the library by the students. To over come this difficulty, the Government have created posts of qualified librarians in all the Polytechnics.

The figure of annual intake of the Engineering Colleges are shown in Appendix. These institutions offer 17 Undergraduate courses, 43 Post-graduate course and 9 Post-graduate diploma courses.

During 1979-80, the teacher students ratio was 1:10 and the per capita expenditure on students was Rs. 15,900 (for the entire course).

A Planetarium has been established at the Government College of Engineering, Salem which was declared open for public on 6th February 1979.

An additional hostel building was constructed at the Government College of Engineering, Salem at a total cost of Rs. 3.26 lakhs.

During the recent years, efforts have been made to encourage Ph. D. registration of both full-time and part-time students in Engineering Colleges. To support this activity in private Engineering Colleges, the Government have sanctioned a recurring expenditure of Rs. 1.00 lakh every year.

For the development of Engineering, Technology and allied science and for furthering the advancement of learning and prosecution of research in Engineering, Technology and Allied Sciences, the Perarignar Anna University of Technology was established on 4th September, 1978-

The University is of unitary type and the College of Engineering, Guindy is the principal seat of the University. The following four departments formerly of the University of Madras, located in the A. C. College of Technology, Madras, viz.—

- (i) Department of Chemical Technology
- (ii) Department of Leather Technology
- (iii) Department of Textile Technology
- (iv) School of Archieture and Town Planning.

form part of the University. In addition, the Madras Institute of Technology, Chrompet, Madras also forms part of the University.

Book Banks have been established in all the Technical Institutions to help the poor and needy students with assistance from the State Government and Voluntary Constributions from private agencies. The Government of India have recently sanctioned a sum of Rs. 2.55 lakhs towards establishment of Book Bank exclusively for Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribes students in Engineering Colleges.

#### PLACEMENT SECTION.

As part of the career guidance programme, Placement Sections have been created in all the technical institutions in recent years to help and guide the students in securing suitable placements.

An Officer at the level of the Head of Department is nominated on part-time basis as Placement Officer.

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#### AWARD OF PRIZES FOR PROJECT WORKS.

Under the scheme on award of prizes for Best Project Works, the Government sanctioned Rs. 8,400 every year for the award of the prizes to the final year students of Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics who produce the best project works. The Government have since enhanced the value of the prizes amount from Rs. 8,400 to Rs. 16,800 from 1979-80.

#### Faculty Development.

Under Quality Improvement Programme, teachers of Engineering Colleges are sent to Institutes of Higher Learning like Indian Institutes of Technology and Indian Institute of Science Bangalore to acquire Doctorate Degree. So far 59 members have obtained Doctorate Degree and 42 members are currently undergoing studies and 10 members were deputed in 1980-81.

As regards Polytechnics, the teachers are deputed to Technical Teachers' Training Institute, Madras. Till date 271 teachers have been trained, 40 are undergoing training and 30 more will be deputed in 1980-81.

#### Industrial Training.

Under the scheme, teachers of Engineering Colleges and Polytechnics are sent to various Industrial establishments for short-term training every year, so that they may aquaint themselves with the latest practices prevailing in Industry. So far, 465 staff members have been trained.

#### Continuing Education Programme

Under Continuing Education Programme, members of Faculty are deputed every year to attend seminars, short-courses, Summar Schools, etc. organised periodically by various technical Institutions in the country.

#### Consultancy Services.

Staff members of the teaching Institutions undertake approved technical consultancy services with Industry and private organisations and charges are collected for services so rendered. Besidesthese, various commercial tests are conducted in different laboratories of technical institutions.

#### Direct Central Assistance.

The Government of India have selected certain technical institutions of this Department for availing of the grant of Special Direct Central Assistance. The Scheme involves the State's share of assistance at 25 per cent of the total financial commitment of each proposal approved under the scheme. The Government of India have provided a total assistance of Rs. 88.76 lakhs for the period ending 1979-80. The State's matching share so far released comes to Rs. 25.30 lakhs.
