



DISTRICT REPORT

I SALEM DISTRICT GEOGRAPHICAL AND CULTURAL STATUS

Salem District is geographically situated in the centre of Tamil Nadu. It is surrounded by Shervaroy and Pollihills of the Eastern Ghats. These hills protect Salem from natural calamities like cyclones, storms etc. The area of the District is 8043 square kilometres with a population of 34.3 lakhs according to the 1981 census. Among them only 13.25 lakhs people are literates. (Men-6.66 lakhs, Women-4.59 lakhs.). There are nine taluks and 35 Panchayat Unions in this District.

The main occupations of the people are Agriculture and weaving. The District is having the biggest public Sector unit Salem Steel Plant (under construction) besides cement, sugar, paper, Aluminium, Magnesite, Cango factories and handloom textiles. The biggest dam in Tamil Nadu namely the Mettur Dam constructed across the river Cauvery in this District only helps the Agricultorists on the Western and Southern parts of the district to a certain extent. In the other parts, farmers rely on borewells and seasonal rains. The Attur rice that is being cultivated in this District is considered to be a good variety. Salem is also famous for mangoes.

Health resorts:

Yercaud and Kollihills are the two health resorts of this district. They are also known as resorts for middle class people. Yercaud is situated at a height of 5000 feet in the Utharvarayan hills at a distance of 30 kms from Salem. The main attraction is the beautiful natural scenery of the place. Summer festivals and flower shows are celebrated every year in May. Kollihills is situated 90 kms away from Salem and its height is 3000 feet. This hillock is having fully grown herbs and medicinal plants. There is also a water falls from a height of 150 feet. It is also famous for honey.

Temples:

There are beautiful temples in this District. The temples at Manakkal, Paramangalam and Tiruchengodu are famous for the best sculptures of our country. There are also two historical forts on the Manakkal and Sankari hillocks built by Tippusultan.

II ADULT EDUCATION FOR THE UPLIFT OF MASSSES

All our Five Year Plans emphasize removal of unemployment, appreciable rise in the standard of living of the poorest sections of the population and provision by the State of the basic needs of the people including clean drinking water, adult literacy, elementary education, health care, rural roads and rural housing. It is recognized that adult education -- looked upon as a method of human resource development including literacy, functional development and creation of

awareness among the poor regarding their inherent power to determine their destinies—should become the method in the new development process. It can contribute to the new development strategy by making a substantial part of the work force literate and better skilled.

The State Adult Education Programme recognizes the importance of giving special priority to the age-group 15-35 which is important from the production point of view. Women form a substantial and integral segment of the labour force. An understanding about the role and status of women in society will therefore be an essential part of all programmes organized under State Adult Education Programme. Highest priority needs to be given to Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes. The State Adult Education Programme emphasizes acquisition of literacy skills, development of functionality and creation of awareness. It is really a mass movement.

III PHASING THE PROGRAMME

Taking into consideration all the aims and objectives of the State Adult Education Programme, the I Phase of the Programme was implemented in Salem District during 1980 in the Self-sufficiency blocks, Kadayanpatti, Kolathur, Managiripet and Tiruchengodu at the rate of 100 centres in each block. The population of the District according to 1981 census is 34.3 lakhs as against 29.9 lakhs in 1971. The literacy rate is 13.25 lakhs, (Men-8.66, Women-4.59 lakhs). The successful implementation of the State Adult Education Programme of all the agencies helped to increase the percentage of literacy

among adults. 400 animators were selected from the teaching community and unemployed youths and they were given pre-service training for 10 days. All the 400 centres functioned for 90 days during 1960. An analysis of all the four State Adult Education Programme projects organized in this District is given in detail in the following pages. A complete picture of the four blocks in the form of Fourteen Tables is also given. A District map is also attached with this report.

DISTRICT LEVEL ACTIVITIES

In order to tone up the administration at the district level effort has been taken to obtain successful results. /

Meeting with development officials and District Adult Education Board members

The District Adult Education Officer used to meet frequently all the Developmental Officers at the District level to get their co-operation. A District Adult Education Board was formed with Collector as its Chairman and the District Adult Education Officer as Secretary and all Development Officers, Commissioners, Project Officers and other individuals involved in Adult Education Programme as members. The board met once in a quarter to discuss and find ways to solve problems in adult literacy centres.

Monthly meeting of Project Officers

The District Adult Education Officer convened once in a month meeting of the Project Officers and had discussions with them to successfully implement the scheme. He also had frequent visits to the Projects and gave proper guidance.

All India Radio Seminar on Adult Education

The Director of All India Radio, Coimbatore with the help of the District Adult Education Officer and Project Officers conducted a seminar on Adult Education on 2.10.80 at Salem. The seminar was largely attended by adult learners and animators. The Honourable Education Minister also participated in the seminar. The seminar was presided over by Dr. Int. Stella Sundraraj, Director of Non-formal and Adult Education and inaugurated by Thiru S.R. Karuppannan, District Collector; Thiru C. Adhiraman, Assistant Director also participated in the seminar. The Honourable Education Minister Thiru C. Aranganayagan in his address stressed the need for adult education besides giving valuable and practicable suggestions in the implementation of the programme. The seminar was found very useful. An exhibition stall was also installed with aids charts and flash cards used in the adult education centres. The exhibits won much appreciation from the audience. Cultural performances of learners were the highlights of the seminar.

Anniversary Function of the State Adult Education Programme

The District Level Valodictory function of all the Projects was celebrated in a fitting manner on 23.12.80 at Salem. The District Collector Thiru S.R. Karuppannan presided and declared open the aids exhibition. The Collector appreciated the successful implementation of the scheme in Salem District. He also suggested that the "Adult Education Centres" can better be named as 'Revived Opportunity' centres for learning. Thiru K.S. Subbiah

Assistant Director also addressed the meeting.

SUCCESS OF THE SCHEME

It is because of the sincere and hardwork turned out in the field by the animators, Supervisors and Project Officers the scheme has been a great success in this District during the 1st Phase of the Programme 1980.

A N A L Y S I S

A total number of 13310 learners (7547 men + 5763 women) were enrolled in all the four Self-sufficiency blocks in Salem District. Madayampatti stood first in enrolling more learners. There were 4737 Scheduled Caste learners (2757 men + 1980 women). Compared with other blocks, in Tiruchengodu, there were more Scheduled Caste learners.

The State Adult Education Programme aims at educating all the illiterates in the age group 15 to 35, during the year under report though the total enrolment was 10684 under the age group. This forms 82.5% of the total learners. This group of learners is the vital force of the community.

Majority of the learners were agricultural labourers.

Unemployed youths, unemployed teachers and Bala Sevikas did good work in the field as animators. In general women animators were more devoted than men in running the centres. There were 80 animators belonging to the Scheduled Castes. In Madayampatti block, two centres where the learners were exclusively Caste Hindus were run by two Scheduled Caste animators. The response was good. If proper environment is created and opportunities given.

there would be no illfeeling between caste Hindus and Harijans.

240 Centres were located in private houses, in public buildings and in temples. This shows the involvement of the public in the implementation of the programme. The working hours prescribed were quite suitable to the learners. The visits to the centres by developmental officials were found inadequate. More visits by them would have helped development in functionality.

EVALUATION

The final evaluation of learners was taken up in December '30, the last month of the programme. A common tool for evaluation was prepared and used.

Centre level evaluation

Centre level evaluation of all the four hundred centres was done by the supervisors concerned. The supervisors met three important persons where the centres functioned and included their observations and remarks in the evaluation sheets. A limited number of centres were also evaluated externally by

developmental officials and other important persons of the locality.

Project level evaluation

The Project level evaluation was done by the project officers themselves.

Conclusion

In general everyone feels the change of improvement in the village life and wants the scheme to be continued for some more time. The State Adult Education Programme Scheme in this district has been very successfully implemented. The District has also earned a good name.



STATE ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMME - I Phase 1980

KADAYAMPATTI BLOCK. SALEM DISTRICT

Aims and objectives:

1. The implementation of Adult Education Programme in our country is based on the assumptions

a. that illiteracy is a serious impediment to an individual's growth and to country's socio-economic progress;

b. that education is not coterminus with schooling but takes place in most work and the life situations;

c. that learning working and living are inseparable and each acquires only when correlated with others;

d. that the means by which people are involved in the process of development are atleast as important as the ends and

e. that the illiterate and the poor can rise to their own liberation through literacy dialogue and action.

2. Adult education should emphasize imparting of literacy skills to persons belonging to the economically and socially deprived sections of society.

3. Adult education programme is looked upon as a method of human resource development, including literacy, Functional development and creation of Awareness among the poor. Based on these principles, State Adult Education Programme has been implemented in Kadayampatti block.

Kadayampatti Block (Salem District) Location :

Kadayampatti block is one of the most backward blocks in this district. It lies in Onalur Taluk. On the eastern side the block is surrounded by Sheraroy hills. The Population of the block as per 1971 census is 81,734. (41757 men and 39977 women) The literates as per 1971 census are 18148. (15312 men and 4836 women) The literacy is only 22.2%. The State average is 39.5%. Agriculture, mat and cloth weaving are the major occupations of the people in the area. Proper irrigational facilities are not available. Hence agriculturists are doing only dry crops. The block has been taken under Self Sufficiency Programme of the Tamilnadu Government. Hence it is in the fitness of things that the State Adult Education Programme has also been implemented in this block along with the Self-sufficiency programme.

Formation of State Adult Education Programme centres :

A total number of 100 State Adult Education Programme centres in Kadayampatti block were started in two batches on 18.1.80 and 1.2.80 after giving 10 days training to the animators. 47 centres were started on 18.1.80 and 53 centres were started on 1.2.80. There were 47 men centres, 40 women centres and 13 combined centres. A total number of 3511 learners (1959 men and 1552 women) were enrolled.

Kadayampatti SAMP centres - An analysis :

An analysis of the functioning of centres in the form of fourteen tables will enable us to have an idea about the Scheme.

Meeting made by the Project Officer with the Developmental Functionary at the Block level and District level :

The Project Officer met the Developmental Officers in the area once in every month. In the District level, the Project Officer met the Personnel Assistant to the Collector, Assistant Director, Village and Khadi Industries, Manager, Small Scale Industries on 2.9.80 in connection with starting some Industries in the Project area. The Project Officer explained in detail, the functioning of the centres at Kadayampatti to the District Collector on 23.12.80 when the latter presided over the District Function.

Spinning centre at Bommiampatti :

A spinning centre with 30 mechanised charkas was started in Bommiampatti village to employ 30 women adult learners of the State Adult Education Programme. The Gandhi Ashram, Tiruchengode provided the charkas to the centre. After proper training, the women learners working in this spinning centre get daily wages ranging from Rs.5/- to Rs.7/- according to their ability. The women learners get continuous employment even after the closure of State/ Adult Education Programme centre. It is to be specially noted that the attendance of the women centre was on the increase after the starting of the spinning centre.

Conduct of meetings of Supervisors and Animators:

The Project Officer used to meet the Supervisors once in a week and give them suitable instructions. The Project Officer also used to convene monthly meetings of Supervisors to review their diaries and the work turned out in the field. One day seminar was regularly conducted from March '80. The Programme for one day inservice training includes free and frank discussions on the difficulties in running the centres, salient features, demonstration lessons, preparation of aids, cultural activities and special lectures by Developmental Officials.

ORGANISING FUNCTIONS, - FESTIVALS - AND EXCURSIONS:- In all the

centres National Festivals were celebrated in a fitting manner, besides the following functions in Block level.

1. International Literacy Day: The International Literacy Day was celebrated in a fitting manner at Naduppatti on 8.9.80. The District Adult Education Officer, P.A to the District Collector, Project Officer, Rural Functional Literacy Project, Salem, Deputy Inspector of Schools, Kadayampatti, Extension Officer (Education) and other important persons of the locality participated. A large number of people attended the function. Cultural activities performed by the animators and learners were largely appreciated.

A full page Special Supplement in "Malai Malai" daily newspaper was brought out on the same day.

2. Radio Seminar on Adult Education: A large number of learners from this block attended the Radio Seminar on Adult Education at Salem on 2.10.80. A learner, one animator, one Supervisor and the Project Officer participated in the seminar discussions which was presided over by the Director of Non-formal and Adult Education. A stall was also executed on the same day with all exhibits on Adult Education prepared and used by the animators in a fitting manner.

3. Hundredth day celebration of Bommiampatti Spinning centre

The Hundredth day of Bommiampatti Spinning centre specially started with the help of Tiruchengode Gandhi Ashram for the benefit of women learners of the State Adult Education programme women centre, Bommiampatti was celebrated in a fitting manner on 28.10.80. The District Adult Education Officer, the Salem District Secretary of the Parent Teachers Association,

the Headmaster, Government High School, Bembiampatti, the Deputy Inspector of Schools and others participated.

4. Mupperum Visha : The Mupperum Visha i.e Tamilnadu Government's Self Sufficiency Scheme propaganda celebration ^{and Prime Minister Smt. Indira Gandhi's Birthday celebration} Nehru's Birthday celebration were combined and celebrated on a grand scale at Pessariipatti on 14.11.80. The Assistant Director of Non-formal and Adult Education, The District Adult Education Office., Salem, Project Officers of Pennagaram and Namagiriipet, the Deputy Inspector of Schools, Salem Scout Organiser and others participated. A poetic recitation of Nehru's life and a drama enacted by the animators drew the attention of all.

5. Excursion : Learners and animators went on ^{an} excursion to Salem, Gangee, Sathanur, Tiruvannamalai and to Hegenakkal. A total number of 649 learners participated.

ORGANISING special Programmes like Newsletter, Film shows All India Radio Programme etc. :

A special supplement insisting on the importance of Adult Literacy, through two articles and a poem was brought out on 8.9.80 in Malai Malai daily newspaper. All the functions celebrated in the area were given in the news form in the All India Radio, Coimbatore and in leading news papers.

The Project Officer has written a special article in the All India Radio, Coimbatore Souvenir on Adult Education brought out on 2.10.80 at Salem.

Creating Public awareness in the Project area:

Wall posters were printed and published when functions were celebrated. An information hand book-let containing the names of centres and animators, no. of learners benefited the particulars showing the effect of literacy, functionality and awareness and can res visited by development and other individuals was brought out at the time of the Valedictory project level function. The book-lets were widely distributed. The book-let was self explanatory on the work turned out in the field of Adult Education and won much appreciation.

Attainment made by the learners in the Literacy aspect:

Out of the total number of 3511 learners enrolled, 2896 learners have successfully completed the course and received certificates. The achievement is 82.7%. Most of the learners were able to read and write. They were able to read News papers, Sign boards and Cinema posters.

Evaluation at Learner level:

The final evaluation of the learners was conducted in November 80, the last month of the programme. Out of the 2896 successful learners 659 declined to write the evaluation test as they felt shy of writing the same. 2237 learners wrote the evaluation test and the gradings are as follows.

Grade I (V std) level	923

The evaluated papers are kept in the office in a bound form. A tool used for evaluation is enclosed.

Evaluation of Functionality and Awareness:

Learners showed progress in their mode of living. The involvement of learners in Developmental activities were tested individually by keen observation and through oral questions. Health habits, cleanliness, avoidance of evil habits, community co-operation and obedience to elders etc. were the source of the activities involved in the programme to create awareness. The following is the break up of figures of involvement of learners in Developmental activities during the year under report.

The valodictory function of all the 100 centres was celebrated in a fitting manner centrewise in all the 100 centres. The local officials and important people of the locality were present during these functions. Certificates were issued to all the learners. The Project level function was celebrated on 15.12.80. Wide publicity was given through Wall Posters and through a hand book-let containing all statistical informations of all the 100 centres functioned at Kadyampatti.

The Deputy Director of Non-formal and Adult Education the District Adult Education Officer, the Project Officers of Salem, Tiruchengode and Namagiripet, the commissioner, and the Deputy Inspector of Schools of the locality participated. The local M.L.A opened the exhibition and he appreciated the scheme. All the participants praised the functioning of all these centres in the locality. The Karaga Attam was performed by the animators. 2564 learners participated in all these functions.

A copy of the certificate is annexed in this report. The final evaluation conducted in this block at the three levels, viz. learners level, centre level and Project level reveals the success of the State Adult Education Programme in this block.



Adult Education was introduced in Kolathur Block during 1980. 100 centres were selected in rural areas to educate the poor villagers. 100 animators were selected to run these centres. They were given training for 10 days in two batches of fifty each. The training for the first batch was conducted from 22.12.79 to 31.12.79 and the second batch from 21.1.80 to 30.1.80. The first batch of centres started functioning from 18.1.80 and the second batch from 1.2.80. 3379 learners were enrolled in these centres.

The population of Kolathur Block according to 1971 census was 56,054. Out of this, 8,554 Scheduled caste, 3,929 Scheduled tribes and 43,572 others were in it. The total number of literates were men 8,650 and women 3,328. The percentage of the literates in Kolathur block was 21.4. The percentage of literacy in this block was lower than the state average which was 39.5% as per 1971 census. The percentage of women literates was very low being only 12.3%

Objectives kept in view in implementing the Adult Education:

Majority of the learners were small agriculturists and agriculture labourers. The main objective kept in view in this block was agriculture oriented. It was aimed to improve the standard of living of these people in addition to imparting literacy and numeracy and make them aware of their position in society.

Evaluation: The first phase of the programme came to an end by the end of November 80. Evaluation was conducted by the last week of November 80. Printed question papers were given to the learners in all these centres. The attainment in literacy and numeracy was judged from their performances.

The attainment in functionality and awareness was judged by their change of attitude towards life and their improvement in their occupation.

Achievements in literacy and numeracy:

Most of the learners were able to read and write. They were able to read news papers and sign boards and do simple arithmetic calculations relating to their life situations. Some of the learners could write letters.

Achievements in functionality:

Most of the agricultural learners were enlightened with improved methods of cultivation. They started to use certified seeds and pesticides. Some of them made use of preventive medicine and insemination for the up keep of their cattles. Some of the women learners were taught handicrafts such as net work, wire bag making and embroidery.

Achievement in awareness :

A change in their attitude towards literacy was seen among the learners. An interest in making their children literate was created among the learners and changes in their health habits and cleanliness and their attitude towards family welfare were also noted among them. A habit of saving was developed among the learners and some of them opened accounts in Banks and Post Offices.

Valedictory Functions:

Valedictory function for the issue of certificates at the Project level was conducted on 16.12.80. The District Adult Education Officer, Salem presided over the function. The Mettur constituency M.L.A Thiru K.P.Nachimuthu issued the af certificates to the learners was held in each centre. The functions were attended by the important people of the villages. Out of 3,579 learners 2,700 were issued certificates. This comes about 80%. This is really an achievement in this field.

Awareness about the centres to all villagers:

The change among the learners of Adult Education centres made the other illiterate villagers to think about their positions. The illiterates wish the centres to continue for a few more years. The learners wish to have continuing education so that they may not forget what they have learnt. The prominent people of the villages feel that

Adult Education Programme is a gift to the illiterate population of the villages. Thus Adult Education Programme sets in a change in the attitude among the villagers.

Introduction.

The one thing that will make a nation great is the education of the people. Education makes the people easy to lead, but impossible to be driven, easy to govern but impossible to be enslaved. The masses must have opinions of their own and should be in a position to follow, guide, criticise or initiate proposals connected with local or provincial, national or international matters. So in a democratic country every citizen must be free and be in a position to understand the problems they have to face and the issues they have to decide. This is possible only by imparting the right type of education to the citizens of a democratic country.

The Self-sufficiency Scheme of the Tamil Nadu Government aims to raise the standard of living of the people who are below the poverty line. To create awareness and literacy and numeracy are the most essential factors. Therefore State Adult Education Programme was launched with the objectives of providing the villagers literacy and numeracy, improving functionality and creating social awareness.


The first phase of the programme started in Namagiripet on 18-1-1980.

Whooping Cough, Polio attack etc., As a result people are able to keep the environment and their houses neat and clean.

People come in contact with Government Officers for their needs.

Voluntary Agencies in the villages: people voluntarily come forward to help open Adult Education centres. They give public buildings and Temples for conducting Adult Education classes. On arranging meetings also, they gave their Co-operation voluntarily.

It was conducted in a grand scale. All the animators and many of the learners participated in the function. Minister for Education, Minister for local self Government and Panchayat, *and* Minister for Law and Co-operative Society ~~ere~~ participated in the function. Director of Non-formal and Adult Education Tmt. Stella Soundararaj, M.Sc., (London) Phd., B.T., presided over the function in morning session. Janagiram, B.Sc., B.T., Chief Educational Officer Salem etc., were the important persons who took part in the function

7. EXCURSIONS.

755 men and 567 women participated in the excursion. They visited Salem, Kollihills, Yercaud and Mettur Dam.

About 915 men and 605 women participated in Cultural activities.

About 1350 men and 1275 women participated in the public meetings. About 420 men and 322 women participated in the Social organisations. About 695 men and 300 women took activities in Social work.

8. EVALUATION.

Evaluation is the most important factor in any scheme. The progress of a scheme can be watched through evaluation. It helps

for planning, modification, fulfilment of the objectives, to identify the defects and difficulties and for future planning.

Evaluation of learners was done periodically by the animators of the centre on three main aspects of adult education namely literacy and numeracy, functionality and awareness. Final evaluation was done by the superiors directly in all the centres. A tool had been evolved to assess the attainment of literacy and numeracy, functionality and awareness. The assessment is given separately. Certificates were distributed to the beneficiaries with functions arranged in the centres.

Besides evaluation of learners, evaluation of centres by supervisors and also by external agency was conducted. The reports approve the success of the scheme besides giving valuable suggestions for improvement.

9. ATTAINMENT MADE BY LEARNERS IN THE LITERACY ASPECT.

Most of the illiterate people in many centres are now able to read newspapers and write letters to their friends. They are also able to read the posters and name boards. A sense of awareness has been created among the people towards better life, prohibition, cleanliness in villages, co-operation and citizenship.

The Valedictory function at Project level was celebrated on 6-12-60 at Panchayat Union Elementary School, Namagiripet. The Chief Educational Officer, Salem District Thiru S. Janakiraman, B.A., B.Sc., B.T., presided over the function. Certificates to the.....



TIRUCHENGODU BLOCK, SALEM DISTRICT.

INTRODUCTION;

The success of a democracy rests on the qualitative progress of the citizen of the State. To achieve this, the Government of Tamil Nadu introduced the Self-sufficiency Scheme in the year 1979. The scheme aims at raising the standard of living of the rural masses who are living below the poverty line, by creating employment opportunities in the villages. The deprived sections of the community should develop literacy, numeracy, functionality and awareness through this scheme. The State Adult Education Programme has been implemented in the Self-sufficiency Blocks with the above objectives from the year 1980 onwards.

The programme has been launched in Tiruchengodu in one of the Self-sufficiency Blocks selected at the first instance. The first batch of 50 centres commenced from 18-1-1980 and the second batch of 50 centres started functioning from 1-2-80. The orientation training to the first batch of animators was conducted from 22-12-1979 to 31-12-1979 and to the second batch from 21-1-1980 to 30-1-1980.

The population of the block is 54,111. Out of which 10625 belong to Scheduled Caste.

Tiruchengode Taluk occupies a prominent place in Salem District. The taluk is named after the mountain Tiruchengodu hill. In sangam literature Tiruchengodu hill occupies an important place.

At the top of the hill there is a temple. A large number of people come from far and wide to worship here.

The height of the mountain is about 1000 ft. It extends from north to south for about three kilo metres.

The average rain fall is about 75 cm. During summer season the temperature is unbearable. The river cauvery flows on the south west border of Tiruchengodu Taluk. There are only a few lakhs in this area.

Irrigation is carried on only with the help of pump sets. Cauvery water is brought here and most of the houses are connected with water taps.

Only in rainy season dry cultivation is carried on in many places. There are many power loom factories and sising mills. In dry land groundnuts is the main crop. Pullicar spinning and weaving mill is the important textile mill in this area. About 3000 people work here. There are many workshops here. Lorry building is going on here. In rural area Gounders are very prominent. They are sufficiently rich and their standard of living is to a certain extent satisfactory. In urban area Mudaliars are very rich. A large amount of finance flows in this community.

There are scheduled caste people cobblers, Adi-Dravidas etc., They are very poor and their standard of living is also very low. The Kongu Vellalas are culturally developed people in this area.

ENROLMENT:

Total enrolment in the adult education centre was 1910 Men and 1277 women (3187) Out of this 1557 belonged to

Scheduled Caste (960+597) This is 49%. 2230 learners were in the age group 15-35 and 957 were above 35 years. 175 learners below the age of 15 also attended centres. They are not enrolled but benefitted by attending the centres.

OPENING AND CLOSING OF CENTRES DURING THE PROJECT PERIOD.

Out of the One hundred centres opened during January/February 1980 four centres had to be closed for unsatisfactory functioning. They were 1. Anangur (Men), 2. Athipalayan (Men) 3. Paramasivagoundampalayan and 4. Simmolasi (Women) new centres with serial numbers from 101 to 104 were opened. They were at Palasalai, Morpalayan (Women) Prithy and Panneerkuthy palayan (Women)

SUCCESSFUL IMPLEMENTATION OF THE SCHEME.

a) Meetings of the Project Officers with developmental functionaries.

One day Inservice training to animators was conducted every month except March and April. The Project Officer and the Supervisors were the resource persons in these meetings. Besides, the Project Officer and the Supervisors, Extension Officers of the Panchayat Union, Headmasters of high schools and persons from other departments participated and gave guest lectures. These were very useful to the animators in running the centres.

The Project Officer and the Supervisors met the developmental functionaries often to make them visit the centres also.

b) ORGANISING SPECIAL PROGRAMMES.

Adult Education seminar was conducted in co-operation with All India Radio, Coimbatore at Nehru Kalaiarangan, Salem on 2-10-1980. Dr.(Tmt) Stella Soundararaj, MSo.,(Load) B.T., Ph.D., Director of Non-formal and Adult Education presided over the function. Hon.C. Aranganayagam, M.A.,B.T.,B.L.,

Minister for Education also participated. An exhibition was arranged in this connection and our Project participated in it. A souvenir was published on the day which contained a newsletter of the project.

A supplementary of the local daily "Malai Malar" was brought about in this connection and also on the day of the valedictory function.

C) Creating public awareness in the Project area for the Programme.

It is a mass scheme and hence publicity is a necessity to create public awareness in the project area. Wall posters published by the State Resource Centre were exhibited at important places like bus stand, market places etc.,. Wide publicity was given through mike sets in villages at the inauguration of the centres.

D) Organising functions, festivals etc.,.

Functions were held to celebrate the following.

1. Republic Day.
2. Independence Day.
3. World Literacy Day
4. Gandhi Jayanthi etc.,.

Centre level functions were held in almost all centres to celebrate Republic Day and Independence Day with the co-operation of the public.

World Literacy Day was celebrated on 8-9-1980 at three places namely Morpalayan, Thokkavadi and Erayamanalam.

Gandhi Jayanthi was celebrated at District level at Salem in a very grand manner. Our Beloved Director presided over the Adult Education Seminar in the morning session.

Our Education Minister participated in the evening session. An exhibition was also arranged.

495 learners took part in excursions.

Evaluations:

Evaluation of learners was done periodically by the animators to assess the progress of achievement of the objectives of adult education namely literacy and numeracy, functionality and social awareness. Final evaluation was conducted by the Supervisors. A tool was evolved at district level to assess literacy and numeracy. 2304 learners were assessed and they were graded. 735 learners were assessed and they were graded. placed in the I grade which is equivalent to 5th standard level. 1227 learners were assessed as grade II which is equivalent to 3rd standard level and 342 learners were placed in grade III which is equal to 1st standard level.

Functionality and awareness were assessed with the help of records maintained by the animators.

Besides evaluation of learners, evaluation of centres was also done. This was done by the Supervisors as well as by external agency.
