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
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CHAPTER - I

Chapter -I

Plan Overview

1.1 Introduction

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan was started in the year 2001-2002 to fulfill the constitutional guarantee of compulsory elementary education for all children up to the age of 14. It is an attempt to universalize and improve the quality of elementary education in a mission mode.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is a result-oriented time-bound programme which goes through a long process of decentralized micro-level planning which has its roots in the villages.

District Elementary Education Plan is a document, which sets priorities and pronounces implementation strategies

The Annual Work Plan and Budget for the year 2003-2004 is presented in the following pages.

1.2 Planning Process

Decentralized and participatory planning process was adopted for the preparation of AWP & B for 2003-2004. An orientation programme for the ADPCs of all the districts was held at Trichy on 7.3.2003. Dr.S.Chandrasekaran, State Project Director and Mr. S. Ramakrishnan Asst. Director (Statistics) gave elaborate guidelines on plan preparation.

A workshop on plan preparation was conducted at the Conference Hall of the TamilNadu Textbook Corporation, Chennai on 16.3.2003. The District

Programme Co-ordinator (CEO), the Additional District Programme Co-ordinator (DEEO), the Assistant District Programme Co-ordinator and two faculty members from the District Institute of Education and Training, Theroor participated in the Workshop.

Mr. C.V. Sankar I.A.S., Secretary, Department of School Education, Dr.S.Chandrasekharan, State Project Director, SSA, Directors and Joint Directors of School Education Department interacted with the participants and offered their suggestions regarding Plan Document preparation.

State Level Planning Team members Mr. N. Murugesan and Mr. V. Expedith reviewed the progress of Plan Document preparation at a meeting on 18.3.2003 at Tirunelveli. The District Planning Team members of Kanyakumari, Tirunelveli, Thoothukudi and Virudhunagar districts participated in the meeting.

The State Planning Team members visited Kanyakumari District on 19.3.2003. Accompanied by the ADPC, they visited Govt. Primary School, Variyoor where a 2 Classroom building was constructed under SSA project. They interacted with the Village Education Committee members of the School. From the interaction, it came to light that the VEC had shown its involvement in the development of the School. The VEC purchased 1 acre of land for the school. Out of this one acre, ½ acre of land was given to the primary section. A building had been constructed in the land which was purchased. Over and above the SSA norms, the VEC spent Rs.35000/- for the construction of 2 classroom building. Then the team visited Government Middle School, Suchindrum where a Resource Persons' Training was being conducted by the BRC, Agastheeswaram. This 2 day training was for Resource Persons for VEC training. The team interacted with the Resource

Persons and BRC Personnel about the quality of the module and the training process. Then they met the Coordinator of the Cluster Resource Centre at Govt. Middle School, Asaripallam.

A broad-based District Planning Team consisiting of the Chief Education Officer, Nagercoil, District Elementary Education Officer, Assistant District Programme Co-ordinator, Two DIET faculty members, a BRC Supervisor, an AEEO and the Statistical Officer was constituted. A core District Planning Team with the ADPC, 2 DIET faculty members, the statistical Officer and a BRC Supervisor as its members was constituted to finalise the draft AWP & B.

The District Programme Co-ordinator and the Additional District Programme Co-ordinator convened a meeting of the BRC Supervisors and Assistant Elementary Education Officers at Valliyoor on 18.3.2003. They instructed the participants to constitute Block Level Planning Committee and Village Level Planning Committees. As per the guidelines given by the District Level Planning Committee, Block Level Planning Committees were constituted in all the Blocks. The VEC of every School listed out the needs of the Schools. After getting the School Development Plans from the VECs, the Block Elementary education Plan was prepared. By combining the BEEPs, the District Level AWP & B was drafted. The Draft Plan was presented at the State Level Workshop on Consolidation and Preparation of District Level AWP & B held at Gandhigram Rural University, Dindigul District from 27.03.03 to 29.3.03.

The Draft Plan Document was brought back to the district and it was redrafted in the light of the suggestions offered by the State Project Director and the State Planning Team.

The thoroughly revised plan document was placed before the state Project Director and the State Planning Team in the Workshop held from 7.4.2003 to 10.4.2003 at the D.P.E.P. Headquarters, Chennai so that the considered views of these experts would enrich the contents of the Document.

1.3 General Profile

Kanyakumari District with its headquarters at Nagercoil is on the southern most tip of the Indian sub-continent. It is bounded by Tirunelveli District in the North and North-East, Kerala State in the North-West, the Bay of Bengal in the South -East, the Indian Ocean in the South and the Arabian sea in the West. The District covers a total area of 1684 sq.km.

A district with two Revenue divisions, viz. Nagercoil and Padmanabhapuram, Kanyakumari consists of four taluks namely Thovalai, Agastheeswaram, Kalkulam and Vilavancode. There are 4 Municipalities, 56 Town Panchayats and 99 Village Panchayats. The District comprises of 9 Administrative Blocks namely Thovalai Agastheeswaram, Rajakkamangalam, Kurunthancode, Thuckalay, Melpuram, Killiyoor and Munchirai.

Demographic Profile

According to the Census, 2001 the total population of the district is 16,69,763 out which there are 8,29,542 males and 8,40,221 females. The sex ratio is 1000:1013 and the population density is 992 per sq.km. The sex ratio for ST-works out to be 992.

SCs constitute 4.64% of the total population and STs constitute 0.32% of the total population.

Bilingual nature

Even after Independence the Kanyakumari District was part of the Travancore-Cochin State i.e Kerala State. It is a bi-lingual district and a sizeable number of people speak both Tamil and Malayalam.

When the states were reorganised, Kanyakumari district was delinked from Kerala and merged with Tamilnadu. The district was named after the shrine of Kumari Amman at Kanyakumari.

Though the district was detached from Kerala the tradition and cultural activities of Kerala still exist in some parts of the district.

Literacy Rate

Kanyakumari is one of the educationally forward districts of Tamil Nadu. The literacy rate of the district is 88.11% as against the state literacy rate of 73.47%. The gender-wise literacy rate of the district is 90.88% for men and 85.38% for women.

The literacy rate in Kanyakumari district is 14.64% higher than the average State literacy rate.

1.4 Educational Profile

1.4.1 Access

There are 1994 habitations in the district. All the eligible habitations are served by Primary schools as well as Upper Primary Schools.

1.4.2 Enrolment - GER & NER

The GER and NER of the district for the year 2002-2003 are given in the following table.

The GER for the district is 102.7 at primary level and 101.9 at the Upper primary level. The NER is 98.9 at Primary level and 98.8 at Upper Primary level.

In Kanyakumari District the GER is more than 100 which indicates that all children are in the system. i.e, repeaters are continuing their studies.

At Primary level the average completion Rate in the district is 91.6. and at upper Primary level the average is 91.42.

At primary level the completion Rates in Thovalai, Agastheeswaram, Rajakamangalam and Melpuram Blocks are less than the district average. Among the Blocks where CR is less than the district average Melpuram has the lowest Completion Rate of 81.8.

Similarly at Upper Primary, level the district average is 91.42. In Thuckalay, Melpuram, Munchirai Blocks Completion Rate is higher than the district average. In all other Blocks Completion Rate is less than the district average. It is very interesting to note that in Melpuram Block the Completion Rate at Upper Primary level is higher than the district average, whereas at Primary level the Completion Rate in less than the district average.

At Primary level, the average of Repetition Rate in the district is 6.80.At Upper Primary level the average is 6.7..

At primary level, in Kurunthancode, Thuckalay, Thiruvattar and Munchirai, Blocks Repetition Rate is less than the district average. Among the Blocks where low Repetition Rate is found Munchirai is the lowest with the Repetition Rate of 4.04%.

Similarly at Upper Primary level, the average Repetition Rate in the district is 6.7%. In Thovalai, Agastheeswaram and Kurunthancode Blocks the Repetition Rate is higher than the district average.

In Munchirai Block, the Repetition Rates both at Primary and Upper Primary levels are lower than the district average.

At Primary level, the district dropout rate is 1.50. At upper primary level, the district average is 1.78.

At primary level, in Thuckalay, Thiruvattar, Killiyoor and Muncharai Blocks the Dropout rate is lower than the District average. Among the Blocks with low dropout rates, Thuckalay is the lowest with the dropout rate of 0.4. It is observed that Kurunthancode Block has the highest Dropout Rate.

The district average of dropout rate at upper primary level is 1.78. In Thovalai, Agastheeswaram, Rajakkamangalam and Melpuram Blocks, the Dropout rate is higher than the district average. Among them, Rajakkamangalam has the highest dropout rate of 3.37.

In Thuckalay block, the dropout rates both at primary and upper primary levels are much lower than the district average.

1.7 Special Focus Group

Education of SC/ST children, disabled children, girl-children, socially and economically backward children, tribal children, street children, children of sex workers, slum dwellers, parent-less children etc. come under Special

Focus Group. These children require special attention, as the normal schemes are not able to attract these children to schools.

a) Education of SC/ST

The number of SC/ST children enrolled at the Primary level and Upper Primary level in the year 2002-2003 were 12,673 and 10,593 respectively. Special Coaching classes were arranged for them. 4384 children studying in classes III to VIII were benefited.

In 6-10 age group Agastecswaram Block has the largest number of disabled children and Kurunthancode Block has the least number of disabled children. 1.8. VECs, CRCs, BRCs

Without the participation of local community the objectives of SSA cannot be achieved. Therefore Village Education Committees have been formed in all the villages. The Panchayat President is the President of the V.E.C and the Headmaster of the schools is its ex-officio Secretary. The V.E.C.s take care of the educational needs of the villages. Civil construction works are executed by the V.E.C. In some schools especially High and Hr.Sec.Schools the P.T.A. functions in place of VEC.

There are 96 Cluster Resource Centres in the district. Every C.R.C will have a building of its own at an estimated cost of Rs.2 lakh each. They will also be supplied with adequate furniture.

Construction works on three C.R.C.S have already been undertaken by the Village Education Committees. It is proposed to supply furniture and books soon.

Nine Block Resource Centres are functioning in the district. Each B.R.C is headed by a Supervisor who is in the rank of a High School Headmaster. There are Seven Teacher Educators in each B.R.C.

Block Resource Centres have to ensure that quality education is imparted to each and every child in the Block. The Schools in a Block are divided equally among the Teacher Educators who visit the schools often as a friend and guide. Block Resource Centres guide the children, train the teachers, undertake educational researches, monitor the activities and evaluate the progress achieved.

1.9 Infrastructure

1.9.1. Block Resource Centres

All the 9 B.R.Cs in the district are temporarily housed in the buildings of Govt High Schools and Higher Secondary schools. It is proposed to construct buildings at an estimated cost of Rs. 6 lakhs, for each BRC. The construction work will be undertaken by the Technical Education wing of the

Directorate of Technical Education. Steps have been initiated to supply furniture worth Rs. 1 lakh to each BRC.

1.9.2. Cluster Resource Centres

96 CRCs are functioning and they do not have buildings of their own. CRC meetings are now conducted in School buildings. Each CRC will have a building at an estimated cost of Rs.2 lakhs soon. 3 CRCs are being constructed by the VECs concerned. Each CRC will be supplied furniture worth Rs.10,000/-.

1.9.3 Three Classrooms

3 Classrooms now available in the district are inadequate. Five 3 classroom buildings are constructed this year by the VEC.

1.9.4 Two Classrooms

Fourteen 2 Classroom buildings have been sanctioned this year. Four 2 classroom buildings have been opened and the construction work in the rest of the buildings is under progress.

1.9.5 Toilets

34 Toilets at an estimated cost of Rs.20,000/- each are being constructed by the VECs.

1.9.6 Drinking Water Facilities

26 drinking water facilities have been sanctioned. School children get protected drinking water through the scheme.

1.10 District Project Office

The District Project Office is headed by the chief Educational Officer who acts as the District Programme Co-ordinator (D.P.C). The District Elementary Educational Officer (D.E.E.O) is the Additional DPC.

The D.P.O. functions as a separate wing in the C.E.O.'s Office. It has the following members as its staff.

CHAPTER - II

Chapter II

Progress Review

2.1 Introduction

The progress of all activities are reviewed periodically to ascertain how nearer we are towards the goal.

Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan is a ten-year programme which was started in the year 2001-2002. Two years have elapsed since the programme was started. Sarva Shiksha Abhiyan scheme is an additionality. It does not replace any of the existing government schemes but it strengthens those schemes. This chapter deals with the achievement in the last one year with respect to various activities.

2.2. Progress in ACCESS:

2.1. Opening of Primary Schools

There are 1994 habitations in the district. In 2001-2002 the access rate for primary was 99.8%. There were two unserved habitations. In order to achieve 100% access 2 new Primary Schools were opened in the year 2002-2003. Consequently the GAR at Primary level has become 100%. The school opened at Pantricode was subsequently shifted to Samathuvapuram in Thovali Block.

2.2.2. Upper Primary Schools

During the year 2001-2002 three eligible habitations did not have Upper Primary Schools. The access rate for upper primary was 99% during 2001-2002. In the year 2001-2002 the Primary School at Alankottai was

upgraded as an Upper Primary School. In the year 2002-2003 the Primary Schools at Bharathapally and Thatchoor were upgraded as Upper Primary Schools. Totally 3 Upper Primary Schools were upgraded. Consequently the Access Rate at Upper Primary levels has also become 100%.

2.2.3 E.G.S Centres

Since Access Rate has already reached 100% no school-less habitation is available. Hence E.G.S Centre is not opened.

2.3 Progress in Enrolment

2.3.1 Boys / Girls

Because of SSA interventions enrolment of boys & girls has improved.



2.3.2 SC / ST

In the year 2001-02 the SC/ST population in schools was 21330 whereas it increased to 23207 during 2002-03 thanks to the efforts of S.S.A

2.3.3. Disabled

Inclusive Education for disabled children are implemented through NGO's. Because of the joint efforts by the project officials and NGOs, there is some increase in the number of disabled children enrolled in schools. The following activities were carried out by NGOs.

- 1) Conducting awareness campaign.
- 2) Organizing medical camp.
- 3) Conducting health check-up.
- 4) Counseling for parents.
- 5) Mainstreaming the children into schools.
- 6) Providing Aids and appliances to the needy children.



There is an increase in Attendance Rate of 1.46 % at District level. In all the Blocks, the Attendance rate has increased. There is a remarkable increase in Attendance Rate in three Blocks namely Rajakkamangalam, Munchirai and Thiruvattar. Killiyoor, block has the lowest Attendance rate of 90 when compared to the district average of 93.8.

2.8 Pupils' Achievement

The Achievement level was calculated on the basis of the marks scored by the students in the Half-yearly Examination, 2002-03. The Achievement level is the highest in Tamil/Malayalam and the lowest in English. It is proposed to conduct training for teachers in English through DIET & BRC.

The achievement level at Upper Primary stage has increased by 16% in Tamil, 5% in English, 13% in Mathematics, 14% in Science and 5% in Social Science.

2.9 Mainstreaming out of school children

Out of school children is really a problem for the society. Generation after generation the phenomenon of Out of School Children is continuing. At one stage we should stop this by enrolling Out of School Children either into formal schools or AIE Centres. Most of the parents of the dropped out children and never enrolled children are themselves illiterates and dropouts. In order to mainstream out of school children SSA framework provides conduct of Bridge Courses and Transit Camps.

2.9.1 Bridge Courses / Transit Camps

As per the perspective plan there are 3020 out of school children in the district. All these children should either be enrolled in formal schools or enrolled in AIE centers. 861 children were enrolled in formal schools in the year 2002-2003. Apart from this 900 children were offered Bridge courses and they were enabled to appear for the ESLC Examination.

There are 1259 out of school children in the district as on 31, Dec. 2002. Concerted efforts are being taken to provide alternative schooling facility to 1259 children. It is proposed to open 34 Bridge course centers in the year 2003-2004. 813 children will be enrolled in these centers. There are 246 children who have attained the age of 14. These children will be given special coaching so that they can appear for the E.S.L.C. examination to be conducted by Directorate of Government Examination. The remaining 200 children will be enrolled in 5 Residential camps to be opened in the year 2003-2004. Identity Cards are to be issued to out of school children.

2.9.2 Residential Schools

Five Residential Schools will be opened during the year 2003-04. These schools will be run for six months. Thereafter the children will be admitted into formal Schools attached with hostels. 5 residential schools will be opened and 200 children will be enrolled.

2.10 Appointment of Teachers

Two teachers each have been appointed at the Govt. Primary School, Moovendhar Nagar and Government Primary School, Samathuvapuram (Pantricode).

Two teachers have so far been appointed at the Govt. Upper Primary School, Alankottai, which was upgraded in 2001-2002. One teacher each has been appointed at the newly upgraded upper Primary Schools at Thatchoor and Bharathapally. These two schools were upgraded in 2002-2003.

2.11 Programme for Disabled

Inclusive Education for Differently-abled Children were proposed under SSA Scheme. Under this Scheme 1016 children have benefitted.

- 1) Awareness Campaign
- 2) Survey of Disabled Children
- 3) Medical camps
- 4) Training to BRC staff
- 5) Counselling to parents of the disabled.

By the efforts of the NGOs and Project staff, 1016 disabled children have been enrolled.

2.12 Programmes for SC/ST

The total SC/ST Children in the district is 23266. The SC/ST Children were given Achievement Test through which slow-learners were identified by the same teacher who handled the class. Remedial teaching and special coaching classes were conducted for 1 hour every day.

2.13 Programmes for Girls

More emphasis is given for Girls' education under SSA sibbling care, helping the parent in domestic work etc. are the main causes for girls' dropout. In order to avoid dropout of girls at Upper Primary Level, Vocational skill

development activities are planned. The Girls will be trained in making the following things.

- 1) Making soap, shampoo, incense sticks, ink, paste etc.
- 2) Making baskets and doormats
- 3) Making articles of decoration especially of sea shells..

Volunteers are to be trained. They will be appointed by the VEC. Academic support will be given by the DIET and BRC.

2.14 Early Childhood Care and Education

In Kanyakumari district 14897 children are enrolled in Anganwadis / Balwadis / TNIP Centres. It is proposed to open new centres in uncovered areas. Training for Balasevikas will be arranged and play articles at the cost of Rs.1000/- per centre will be supplied. It is proposed that some centres are to be converted into pre schools whereby school readiness programme may be provided to the children below 5 years.

2.15 Functioning of Village Education Committees

Every school has a VEC headed by the President of the Panchayat or a member of the PRI. The Headmaster of the school functions as the ex-officio Secretary. The VEC meets twice a month. In the meetings issues relating to enrolment, retention, dropout and quality of education are discussed. The needs of the school are identified and efforts are taken to fulfill them. In the beginning of the academic year the VECs organise enrolment campaigns in schools.

Civil construction works sanctioned by the District Programme Coordinator are executed by the VEC. Community ownership rather than community participation is an important component in SSA. The VEC actually owns the school and the infrastructural facilities are made available by them. The VEC records the proceedings of the meetings and the minutes are made available to anyone who wants to read it. It is the responsibility of the VEC to maintain the Village Education Register.

Village Education Committees have donated lands for construction of school buildings. 5 cents of land has been donated by the VEC of Government Primary School, Moovendar Nagar for constructing a 2 classroom. The value of the land is Rs.25,000/-. The V.E.C. of G.P.S., Variyoor has donated half-an-acre of land for constructing a 2-classroom building. The value of the land is Rs.5/- lakhs.

Training programmes were organised for VEC members. The module for the training was made by the DTERT.

2.16 Activities in Cluster Resource Centres

CRC is a teacher-empowering body. Once in a month about 40 teachers from 10-16 schools meet at CRCs in order to update their professional skills. The duration is 3 hours. The entire 3 hours are properly utilised for teaching professional skills to teachers and time schedules are drawn by CRC Co-ordinators in such a way that all the 40 teachers get a chance to participate. Usually the senior most Headmaster is the CRC Co-ordinator and he guides the activities of the CRC. In the CRC meetings problems relating to CR/RR/DR/ hard spot etc are discussed.

2.17 Programmes in Block Resource Centres

B.R.C. is a miniature DIET at Block level. For all training activities BRC faculty members are acting as Resource Persons for training the teachers. The following programmes were conducted at BRC.

- 1. Compilation of DISE
- 2. Identification of Out of School Children
- 3. Identification of Disabled
- 4. Identification of Child Labour
- 5. Training Programmes on content and methodology
- 6. Co-ordinating with CRCs
- 7. Training to VEC members.

Under S.S.A quality plays a vital role. B.R.C. is the most important institution which ensures quality education in the Block.

2.18 Research, Evaluation and Monitoring

a) Research

Research forms part of the on-going programme. In Kanyakumari District DIET, Theroor is a nodal agency for all research activities. The following areas are identified for making research by the DIET.

- 1. Reasons for the low achievement of slum children.
- 2. Difficulties faced by the teachers of Stds VII & VIII in handling Chemistry.
- 3. Difficulties faced by the teachers in teaching Stds VII & VIII Geography.

Teachers are encouraged by DIET faculty members to do Action Research.

b) Evaluation

All educational programmes have to be evaluated with reference to the objectives. In Kanyakumari district, District Information Systems for Education was adopted for collection of data relating to elementary education. DISE forms were supplied to each and every school through the BRCs. Filled in forms were collected and the particulars available where computarised. The computarised data is the basis for preparing this Plan Document.

The achievement level of the primary and upper primary children were calculated on the basis of their performance in the Half Yearly examination assessed by the Teacher Educators Working in the 9 BRCs. It was observed that the achievement level was the highest in Tamil/Malayalam and lowest in English.

A Co-hort study was undertaken to determine the various educational indicators

C. Monitoring

Monitoring is done by BRC Supervisors, Teacher Educators, AEEOs, DIET faculty members, ADPC, D.P.C. and Addl. D.P.C. They visit the schools at regular intervals and monitor the progress achieved. Apart from this, Dr. Palaniyandi, Joint Director, (Secondary) visits the district every month in his capacity as Review Officer. He monitors the activities being carried out in the offices of the CEO, DEEO, D.E.O and the DIET.

Further, the district collector as Chairman of S.S.A reviews the progress by conducting monthly review meeting.

2.19 Improving Infrastructure

2.19.1 Construction of Block Resource centres

The B.R.Cs play a vital role in implementing the objectives of S.S.A. Each BRC will have a building with 2 rooms. One room will be used as Office and the other will be used as Training Hall. All the BRCs are now functioning in Govt. High Schools and Higher Sec. Schools. Works on Construction of the B.R.C buildings at Agastheeswaram, Thovalai and Munchirai are in progress. The construction is undertaken by the Technical Education Wing of the Directorate of Technical Education. All other B.R.Cs will be provided with buildings of their own in a phased manner.

2.19.2 Construction of Cluster Resource Centres

There are 96 CRCs in this district. Each CRC will be provided with a hall to conduct the monthly meetings. The buildings are to be constructed at an estimated cost of Rs. 2 Lakhs. The construction work is being undertaken by the local VEC. At present the construction works are in progress in three centres.

2.19.3 Construction of Three Classrooms

Five 3-classroom buildings are being constructed during the year 2002-03. The work is being executed by the VECs concerned. Each building is constructed at an estimated cost of Rs. 45 Lakhs.

2.19.4 Construction of Two Classroom

Fourteen 2 class room buildings have been sanctioned for the year 2002-03 and all of them are under construction. Each building is constructed

at an estimated cost of Rs. 3 Lakhs and the construction work is being executed by the VECs concerned.

2.19.5 Provision of Toilet facilities

Thirty Four toilets have been sanctioned and all of them are under construction. Each toilet is constructed at an estimated cost of Rs. 20,000/-

2.19.6 Provision of drinking water facility

Protected drinking water should be provided to all children. In this district 26 schools have been provided with drinking water facilities during this year.

2.20. Maintenance and Repairs

Maintenance and repairs of school buildings is an important component of SSA. All government schools are given an annual grant of Rs 5000/- for undertaking maintenance and repair works. During the year 2002-03, 511 schools have been sanctioned a total amount of Rs 25.550 lakhs.

2.21 Programmes for quality improvement

Sixty one per cent of the fund allocated for this programme is utilised for improving the quality of elementary education. BRCS play a vital role in improving the quality of education in the schools of the Block concerned. Infrastructure development is the first step towards improving quality of education. Most of the elementary schools lack the required minimum infrastructure. In order to change this situation all Government Primary and Upper Primary Schools are provided with an annual Infrastructure Grant of Rs.2000/- each. This amount is utilized for purchasing chairs, benches, table,

cupboards and drinking water vessels. An amount of Rs.7.86 lakhs was disbursed to 393 schools during the year 2002-2003.

Teaching Learning Materials ought to be used by teachers in order to create a good classroom climate.

To motivate the teachers to make Teaching Learning Material of their own a TLM Grant of Rs. 500/- each is disbursed to the teachers working in Government Schools and Aided Private Schools. An amount Rs. 23.585 lakhs was released to 4662 teachers during the year 2002-2003.

The new Primary Schools are provided with a one-time Teaching Learning Equipment Grant of Rs. 10000/-. Similarly the new Upper Primary Schools are provided with a one-time TLE Grant of Rs. 50000/-. This grant is utilized for purchasing permanent articles which can be used as Teaching Learning Equipments.

C.R.C. Meetings and teacher training programmes contribute a lot in improving the quality of education.

2.21.1 Capacity building for project staff

BRC supervisor and teacher educators have been given trained in capacity building. At first a three month School Attachment Programme was undertaken by each teacher educator. The supervisors guided and monitored the Block Resource Teacher Educators. It was followed by a five day orientation programme where the various components of SSA were dealt with in an in-depth manner. Modules on all components of S.S.A., were supplied to the Teacher Educators.

The B.R.C. Teacher Educators were given training in School Adoption Programme. Schools are classified into different categories based on the indicators like Completion Rate, Repetition Rate and Drop-out Rate. Low-performing schools are adopted by the teacher educators in order to improve the efficiency of the school. Each teacher educator adopts five schools. He visits the school regularly and offers suggestions for the all-round development of the school.

The B.R.C. Teacher Educators were given training in School Based Training. S.B.T is new method of giving training to school teachers. When a school teacher attends a training away from his school the teaching learning process in the school is affected. S.B.T. is an alternative to this kind of situation. The teacher educator visits the schools and identifies the difficulties faced by the teachers and the students by observation by interviewing teachers pupils, parents and V.E.C. members and by using questionnaires. Then the teacher educator provides the required training in the school itself. S.B.T. is a school specific training which takes into account the resources available in the locality.

2.21.2 Training to teachers

BRCS conducted training to teachers in three stages. It was a content and methodology training. In the first stage teachers handling classes I and II were trained. In the second stage teachers handling classes III, IV and V were trained. Finally teachers handling classes VII and VIII were given the training. In all 1472 teachers were benefited.

2.21.3 Orientation to VEC members.

VEC plays an important role. The Annual Plan is prepared on participatory process. Village level planning committees are formed and the requirements of each school are finalized. The resolutions of the VECS are consolidated at Block level. Therefore the VECS should have a thorough knowledge of SSA norms. A two-day training was arranged by the BRCS for the benefit of the VEC members. Two members from each VEC attended the training programme. In all 775 members were benefited.

2.21.4 Provision of TLM, TLE, School grant

TLM Grant of Rs.500/- each was given to each teacher to enable them to purchase teaching learning materials. 2273 primary school teachers and 2389 upper primary school teachers were granted an amount of Rs.23.585 lakhs during the year 2002-03.

A one time grant of Rs.50000/- is released to a new upper primary school. In the year 2002-03 G.M.S. Alankottai was provided this grant.

School grant of Rs.2000/- is given to each Government Primary and Upper Primary Schools to purchase furniture, drinking water vessels, cupboard etc. 290 Primary Schools and 103 Upper Primary Schools were provided with this grant.

2.21.5 Curriculum revision- VI Standard Text Book

The curriculum for std VI is being revised. No teacher or DIET faculty member of this district was involved in curriculum revision process.

2.21.6 Innovation-computer Literacy, vocational skill development skills

Computer Literacy Programme has been arranged for students of upper primary schools. The programme will cover students in Classes VI, VII & VIII. There are three levels in the programme. Level I is for Class VI, Level II is for Class VII and Level III is for Class VIII. The programme is being conducted for students studying in Std.VI to VIII in a phased manner for three years. Computer Literary programme will be implemented in co-ordination with NGOs.

The District Resource Group has been formed under the chairmanship of the District Collector. The DRG consists of the Chief Educational Officer and three members from the N.G.O.s who are implementing the programme in the district. The District Resource Group guides the Block Resource Group.

At school level for every group of 40 children one teacher working in the school is trained to handle the computer class.

Vocational skill development programme has been launched for the benefit of the girl children studying in classes VI, VII and VIII. They will be offered training in making soap, shampoo, doormats etc. They will also be given training in fine arts. Instructors will be appointed on contract basis and the expenditure will be met from SSA funds

2.22 Project Management

2.22.1 Establishment of MIS

The MIS is one of the primary factors in the execution of SSA. Collection of information on infrastructural facilities available in primary and middle schools- TLM, furniture, equipments etc, total children in the age group 5-14, out of school children, achievement of children in different subjects, teachers-pupil ratio and progress of SSA in schools are assessed by MIS.

2.22.2 Implementation of DISE

DISE forms were printed and supplied to each and every school in the district through BRCs. The information collected from the school were computerised and the data have been used for the preparation of this Annual Work Plan and Budget.

2.22.3. Appointment of Project Staff

The District project office is headed by the chief education officer. The District Elementary Education Officer functions as the Additional District Programme co-ordinator. An Assistant District Programme coordinator, a Statistical Officer, a Media and Documentation officer, a Training officer, a Superintendent, an upgraded Superintendent, an Assistant, a Civil Consultant and a Data Entry Operator are working in the District Project Office.

2.23 Convergence with Ongoing Schemes

1. Scholarship

To reduce dropout of girl children and to improve the holding capacity of the school, the government of Tamilnadu is awarding scholarships to girl students belonging SC/ST and MBC communities. An SC girl gets RS.1000/- and an MBC girls gets Rs 500/- and the amount is deposited in the name of the mother of the child.

2. Books and note books

All the students of SC/ST,MBC community are supplied with Text books, Notebooks free of cost. If they are studying in High schools, the special fees and tuition fees are reimbursed by the government. On enrolment all students are supplied with slate. In the year 2002-2003 free text-books were supplied to 1,13,215 children.

3. Noon-meal scheme and Free Uniform

Irrespective of caste or community poor children are enrolled in Nutritious Noon Meal Scheme. Cooked rice with dhal and vegetables is given to them. They are provided with one set of uniform every year. The beneficiaries of noon-meal scheme in the year 2002-2003 were 2,16,210.

4. Special Schools

There are special schools including residential schools for the students of SC/ST community. Text-Books, Note books, study materials and two sets of uniform are given to these students. Hostels provide them with free boarding and lodging. There are 360 orphanages attached with schools for the benefit of orphans and destitute children. The Government is running special schools for physically handicapped children also.

5. Child Labour

Child labour is another impediment in attaining the goal of universal elementary education. Because of broken families and poverty and other socio economic factors, many school age children are engaged in child labour. Silk industry, match industry, quarries, agriculture field, cracker industry are some of the areas in which child labour is in existence. Household survey was

undertaken in such areas. Meetings were conducted at the district level to create an awareness among parents regarding child labour.

2.24 Issues and Strategies

2.24.1 Dropout

In Thuckalay Block 368 children have dropped out in the year 2002-2003. Most of the drop-outs might have become child labours. Bridge courses should be started in that Block.

2.24.2 Low achievement in English

The achievement level is the lowest in English in all the Blocks. Remedial measures should be taken to offset this trend. More content and methodology trainings should be given to the teachers.

2.24.3 Training to Malayalam Medium teachers

Being a Bilingual district, there are Malayalam Medium Sections in many schools. The Malayalam Medium teachers have not been given subject oriented training in Malayalam. This is due to lack of Malayalam knowing Teacher Educators. The services of teachers handling Malayalam medium subjects can be utilised for this purpose.

2.24.4 Preparation of Training Modules in Malayalam

All the training modules prepared by DTERT for Primary and Upper Primary classes are in Tamil only. These modules are not effective for the Malayalam-medium teachers. Therefore steps should be taken to prepare modules in Malayalam. The D.I.E.T., Theroor may undertake this project.

CHAPTER - III

Chapter - III

Activities and Budget

3.1 Primary Schools

There are 4 new teachers. The amount allotted for the salary of these teachers is Rs. 3.360 lakhs.

No additional teacher is appointed. School Grant (Infrastructure Grant) of Rs. 5.900 lakhs will be released to 295 schools @ Rs. 2000/- per school.

Teacher Grant of Rs. 11.370 lakhs will be released to 2274 teachers @ Rs. 500/- per teacher.

3.2 Upper Primary Schools

There are 7 new teachers. The amount allotted for the salary of these teachers is Rs. 5.880 lakhs.

School Grant of Rs. 4.620 lakhs will be released to 231 schools @ Rs.2000/- per school.

Teacher Grant of Rs. 15.820 lakhs will be released to 3164 teachers @ Rs. 500/- each.

T.L.E. Grant of Rs. 50,000/- each will be released to 12 Upper Primary Schools which were not covered under OBB Scheme. The total amount earmarked for TLE Grant is Rs. 6.000 lakhs.

3.3 Alternative and Innovative Education

No E.G.S. Centre is proposed as 100% G.A.R. has been achieved.

It is proposed to start 5 Residential camps. It is also proposed to open 34 Bridge Course Centres.

3.4 Special Focus Group

a) Education for the Disabled

The task of providing integrated education for the disabled will be entrusted to Non-Governmental organizations. Their activities will be monitored by District Project Office and Block Resource Centres. The disabled will be supplied with aids, appliances and special training will be arranged to teachers handling classes for disabled children by the N.G.O.s. The amount allotted for education of disabled children is Rs.15.324 lakhs.

b) Education of Girls

Girl children who are below the poverty line will be identified and they will be given special coaching in the schools. They will be given training in arts and crafts. The amount allotted for education of girls is Rs.3.6 lakhs.

c) Education of SC/ST

Special coaching classes will be arranged for SC/ST children studying from classes III to VIII. The teachers handling special classes will be paid an honorarium of Rs. 10/- per child. A coaching centres can be opened if there are 20 SC/ST/Disabled children in a school. The amount allotted for education of SC/ST children is Rs.4.2 lakhs.

3.5 Village Education Committee

There are 800 V.E.C.s. An amount of Rs. 14.400 lakhs @ Rs. 1800/-per VEC is earmarked for conducting meetings. Apart from this an amount of Rs. 7.200 lakhs is earmarked for training the V.E.C. members.

3.6 Cluster Resource Centres

Budgetary provision has already been made for purchase of furniture for 56 C.R.Cs. The remaining 40 C.R.C.S. will be supplied furniture for Rs. 4 lakhs @ Rs. 10,000/- per CRC. in 2003 - 64

An amount of Rs. 0.192 lakhs will be released @ Rs. 200/- per CRC for conducting workshops and meetings.

An amount of Rs. 2.4 lakhs will be released towards contingency Grant @ Rs. 2500/- per C.R.C.

T.L.M. Grant of Rs. 0.960 lakhs will be released to the 96 CRCs @ Rs. 1000/- per C.R.C.

3.7 Block Resource Centres

There are 9 BRCs. Rs. 75 lakhs will be spent on the salaries of the staff. Rs. 4.5 lakhs will be earmarked for paying TA/DA @ Rs. 0.500 lakh per Block. A contingency grant of Rs. 1.125 lakhs will be released @ Rs. 12,500/- per Block. Rs. 0.045 lakhs will be allotted for conducting workshops and meetings @ Rs. 500/- per Block. An amount of Rs. 0.450 lakhs will be allotted for TLM Grant @ Rs. 5000/- per Block. Training equipments will be applied to 5 Blocks for Rs. 5 lakhs @ Rs. 1 lakh per Block. An amount of Rs. 4 lakhs will be earmarked for 4 Blocks for supply of library books @ Rs. 25000/- per Block.

3.8 Research Evaluation and Monitoring

An amount of Rs. 6.750 lakhs is allotted for REM.

3.12 Training

Quality teaching helps the pupils in developing their cognitive, affective and psychomotor domains. In class room situations, the teacher's role is very significant. Teaching is an art and teachers should master the art. The teachers working in primary and upper primary classes are well-qualified. They should be given proper training in various fields of education. Good relationship between the teachers and pupils helps the retention of pupils in schools. The objective of S.S.A. is to provide quality education to the pupils in elementary education. Proper qualitative training to teachers leads to quality learning among pupils. 61% of the total expenditure is spent on

quality aspect in S.S.A. The DIET of every district, under the guidance of DTERT imparts training to Block Resource Teacher Educators who in turn give various kinds of training to teachers of Primary and Upper primary Schools. Emphasis is given for need-based and local-based training. An amount of Rs.69.888 lakhs is allotted for training teachers.

- 12. Training in Map-reading and use of Globe.
- 13. Training to B.R.C. Teacher Educators. on
 - (i) Computer Literacy.
 - (ii) Training on Quality Indicators.
 - (iii) Workshop on Planning Management and Documentation.

3.13 Innovation

Four innovative programmes are planned for the year 2003-2004. Computer Education will be offered to the boys and girls studying in Stds VI, VII and VIII. An amount of Rs. 15 lakhs is allotted for this programme.

Arts and craft activities will be offered to girls studying in upper primary classes. Rs. 15 lakhs will be earmarked for this purpose.

An amount of Rs. 5 lakhs is allotted for the education of SC/ST children.

Nursery Education will be allotted Rs. 15 lakhs.

3.14 Procurement Plan

TLE Grant of Rs. 10,000/- has been released to new Primary Schools. For new Upper Primary schools the TLE Grant sanctioned is Rs. 50,000/-. The District Resource Group has finalised a list of equipments that can be purchased with the TLE Grant. The schools have purchased the equipments recommended by the DRG.

While purchasing furniture three quotations are obtained and the lowest quotation is accepted.

B.R.C. Buildings are constructed by the Technical Education Wing of the Directorate of Technical Education as the estimated cost of the buildings exceed Rs. 5 lakhs.

3 class rooms, 2 class rooms, Drinking Water facilities and toilets are constructed by the Village Education Committees.

3.15 Implementation Schedule

The activities proposed in this Annual Work Plan and Budget will be implemented from the month of April, 2003 over a period of one year which can be divided into four quarters.
