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FOREWORD

Along with the expansion of Education, there should be qualitative improvement. There cannot be two opinions about this. With a view to improving the quality of a school one must get a comprehensive and clear picture of the various aspects of the activities of the school. This would enable one to pin-point attention on the strong and weak points of the functioning of the school and facilitate the classification accordingly.

The need for evolving some criteria for the gradation of secondary schools has been felt for quite some time. A committee had been assigned the job of evolving the criteria. The committee met in sixteen sessions and laid down the criteria. It also considered an article 'The Criteria for the Gradation of Secondary School in Samachar Patrika — May 1973' published by the Maharashtia State Board of Secondary and Higher Secondary Education, Pune. These criteria were tried out in some selected schools and the reactions of the Heads of the schools were considered before giving them a final shape. With a view to enabling the Heads of the schools to give the feedback as objectively as possible the questions were re-designed and the scheme of scoring was given a final shape.

A booklet 'Gradation of Secondary Schools' was thus made available to the schools The committee fixed the criteria for the classification of schools into categories A, B and C. Some Education Officers used these booklets and classified the schools in the respective district. in A, B and categories. Some officers of the Department of Education also used the booklet under the project-'Adoption of Schools'. It was observed that most schools fell in the 'B' Category and only a few in categories A and C. It was felt that the objective evaluation of the schools in 'B' category posed a serious problem. Therefore, it was decided to classify the schools in five categories. Accordingly, each aspect was reconsidered and a scheme was drawn up for the classification of schools in five categories. A, B, C, D and E.

The Heads of schools are supposed to evaluate their schools themselves and grade them on the basis of these criteria. This would enable them to focus their attention on the strong and weak points of their schools. They would make planned efforts to improve the quality and aspire for higher grade. The College-School Complex would render a positive help in this regard. The schools should seek help from the Arts. Science and Commerce Colleges in the vicinity and also from experts from various educational institutions. Sometimes the schools feel isolated. A close co-ordination between the Society, Administrative Officers and the schools is, therefore, absolutely necessary for the improvement of schools. This would enable the schools to overcome their academic and administrative problems.

Once the schools are graded it would be convenient for the Inspecting Officers to guide the schools in the right direction.

It is hoped that these criteria would help a good deal in raising the standard of schools in Maharashtra.

GRADATION OF SECONDARY SCHOOLS

(A Rating Scale)

Introduction

Systematic efforts are needed for the qualitative improvement of secondary schools. For this purpoe, it is necessary to grade the schools on the basis of objective evaluation. While deciding the grade of a school the criteria given in the booklet are to be used. The Head-Master of the school can evaluate his school on his own with the help of these criteria. He will be in a position to know the requirements and shortcomings of his school. This information will be useful for the institutional planning so as to make efforts for qualitative improvement as well as objective inspection of the school in future. The officers concerned will verify the gradation of the school arrived at by the head-master.

This rating scale is divided into two parts viz.

- (1) General Information of the school and
- (2) Evaluation of the school:
 - (i) School Environment
 - (ii) School Management
 - (iii) Educational Progress
 - (iv) Supervision
 - (v) School and Community.

The marks are allotted for every sub-division of Part II. The head-master has to grade his school on the basis of these marks. The information in this part is to be filled in by two point scale (Yes/No) and five point scale (ABCDE). One mark is to be given for the answer 'Yes' and zero for 'No' in the items provided with Yes/No type answers. The statements with the scale A, B, C, D, E. are of qualitative or quantitative nature. The marks are given on the following basis.

The marks obtained in each sub-division should be added and converted into percentages. Similarly the marks obtained in all the sub-divisions should be added and converted into an overall percentage. The final grade should be a decided as follows:

- 1. The school obtaining minimum 75% marks in each sub-division and 90% and above marks on aggregate will be given Grade A.
- 2. The school obtaining minimum 60% marks in each sub-division and 75% and above marks on aggregate will be given Grade B.
- 3. The school obtaining minimum 40% marks in each sub-division and 60% and above marks on aggregate will be given Grade C.
- 4. The School obtaining minimum 30% marks in each sub-division and 40% and above marks on aggregate will be given Grade D.
- 5. The school not satisfying any of the above criteria will be given Grade E.
